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I don't know just what it will take to alert people to their responsibility in this regard. Certainly not legislation because the Prohibition Act proved people will procure those things they have a desire for even though it was commonly known that much of the bootleg liquor on the market in those days could cause blindness and in many cases even death. In spite of this there was no dearth of any of the many alcoholic beverages and no reduction in consumption. Legislation and restriction in the case of cigarettes would probably bring about the same results.

It seems to me that about the only way to bring about any effective control of such a situation is to place the responsibility directly in the hands of the parents. Education on the home level at an early age could be the most effective. Perhaps schools and Churches could help but it will take the untiring efforts of the mothers and fathers of this country if any successful control can become a reality.

Judd Arnett in his column titled, "If I Were In Charge," appearing in last weeks Free Press noted that if he were running the government, any nonsmoking athlete, or sports announcer, who pretended to be smoking for the benefit of a television commercial, would be given a month's special duty in the operating room of a hospital where cancer patients are being treated.

This isn't a, bad idea and perhaps more exposure of the public to some of the ordeals these patients suffer in the treatments might do more to frighten people away from possible contributory things such as smoking.

Perhaps I can best wind this up by quoting from a conversation I had with Doctor Westover on Tuesday. I had just remarked that if I was again threatened with surgery, such as I had before, with seven days of no water or food and tubes connected to all parts of your body, I questioned if I would undergo it no matter what the consequences. "Yes you would, he said, if it could prolong your life, but I hope I never have to experience such a thing myself." ...

That pretty well sums it up and when you light your next cigarette or watch your youngster do the same, visualize if you will, the possible end result, which I can say, is most unpleasant whether you live or die.

Although Jim has never impressed me as an out and out politician I am not surprised at his political ambitions. I first became acquainted with Mr. O'Neil when he was making his unsuccessful bid for our capable Martha Griffith's Congressional seat in Washington.

Since that time I have been frequently in contact with him on other matters and found him to be one of the few dedicated citizens who is just plain interested in good, economical government. He has no particular axe to grind but is determined to place his services at the disposal of his fellowmen in the hope that he can contribute something constructive to our present mode of life.
