







### **Speaker Deals** With Prejudice At Assembly

After disclaiming his ability to talk on "The Nature of Prejudice" because he was not a sociologist, Dr. Leonard W. Moss dealt neatly and decisively with prejudice in his lecture here last week by ex-amining man in strictly anthropogical detail

Dr. Moss is Chairman of the Sociology and Anthropology Department at Wayne State University. His lecture was one of a series being presented by the Plymouth Community Human Relations Assembly.

Speaking from an anthro-pologist's view, Dr. Moss said the so-called "racial characteristics" are the soft tissue of the species, those parts which it is impossible to reconstruct from observation of the skeletal structure. So that it would be impossible to tell from a skeleton -- or from a jawbone, a skull cap or other bony parts - whether the man's skin had been black or white.

The word "race" is used anthropologically to define certain genetic characteristics, or what Dr. Moss termed "a commonality of genes in a given population." He also pointed out that when interbreeding is restricted, either physically or socially, certain









The 46-foot long, 3,500 pound missile section was lifted off a railroad car at the scrap yard located at 40251 Schoolcraft Thursday. Above, 21-year-old Sanford Seskin, son of owner Jack Seskin, checks out the missile shortly after its arrival. Purchased from the government, the rocket will be dismantled for its rare and exotic metals. Composed of 22 various metals and al-

loys, the huge, multi-million-dollar missile was built at Chrysler Corporation's 16 Mile Rd. and Van Dyke plant. Extraordinary procedures will be used to dismantle the hulk. Seskin said. A regular cutting torch won't develop enough heat to eat through the high heat resistant alloys in the rocket. An arc welder will be used to disintigrate it. Seskin said some of the rarer metals in the missile will probably find their way back into the government's space program. Others will probably be used in the auto industry.

# Salem Singer Bids for Fame; **To Tour With Big Name Band**

It was less than three short years ago when Barbara Lewis, of Salem, then 18, sent a tape recording of several songs written by her to form-er disc jockey Ollie McLaughlin who had just become a music publisher, just for "the heck of it."







This same discontent is now finding its way into the police department with the latest episode resulting in the resignation of a well respected 12 year police veteran. Who's next seems to be the question?


