> The group of which we speak next Monday will be participating in an election for millage and at the same time providing the money to pay the expenses of holding said election. It's a situation without precedent in this northwestern part of Wayne County, at least, and maybe it's completely unique in the whole State of Michigan.

Normally the Board of Education pays the cost of any such election, of course. It is being done differently in South Redford because some 2,000 parents signed special petitions imploring the School Board to re-stage an earlier balloting, and promising the Board that it wouldn't draw anything from the general fund of the school district. South Redford School District covers that portion of Redford Township which lies in the south half of Redford Township.

A previous voting saw the millage proposal fail amidst a great campaign uproar and charges of deliberate deceit and misleading of the public by using false data. The jackal newspaper of Michigan, the tabloid published in the old Redford section of Detroit, was the principal communications organ used by opponents of the last proposal. Some of the most active opponents came from the far right and John Birch elements of the community. The same persons—the Birch types and ground breaking for the new the fascist tabloid - have assailed the South Redford school officials for many years at various times attempting to inflame local passion over "dirty books in the library". "absence of religion in the classroom", "lack of patriotism in the schools", "communist teachings and text books", "lack of discipline by teachers", "secret meetings of the school board", "unauthorized spending of public money", and a few other things. It has been a deliberate, lengthy and calculated plan to destroy the reputations of the incumbent staff and board members and to ruin the public's confidence in their school system.

The 2,000 petitioners apparently believe that false propaganda played a major role in deceiving the public at the last election and, hence, the request for a rematch. This is what will be taking place next Monday.

One part of the ballot request is to renew 10 mills which the school district has been levying for several years and without which the general school program would have to be slashed mortally. There also is a request for four new mills to take care of rising teachers' salaries and all the other higher costs which the recent inflationary years have caused.

There hardly could be a more sincere concern for schools than that demonstrated by people who are willing to dig into their own pocketbooks to pay for a special election. At the moment it has issued bonds for a 18-year period for the present building program. But the financial picture has changed considerably in the past year and a half and the Board finds itself with \$300,000 available for the building program of which it can legally use only \$250,000.

Thus the Board will ask the voters of the College district, which includes Livonia, Garden City, Plymouth, Clarenceville and Northville, for permission to issue bonds for the additional \$50,000 per year for 29 years to set up a \$2.8 million building program. It has set an election for Monday, June 8 on the proposition.

Of this amount \$1,250,000 must be raised by the College District by borrowing and issuing bonds and the remaining \$1,550,000 will be secured by matching funds from the state and federal governments.

"This will not increase the millage by as much as a penny," emphasizes Board President Harold Fischer. "The Board isn't interested in increased millage. We are interested in getting as much financing for the college as possible through

the matching funds. "We already have the \$50,000 from the college funds available. If the voters grant permission, then we can go ahead with the bond sale, make the request for the matching monies and advance our building program by several years."

Fischer points out that the college district has an assessed valuation of more than \$600 million now, considerably more than the \$500 million of a year

He cited the addition of Northville to the district as one reason for the increase, and the tremendous growth in the entire area as the other.

"We feel that this valuation will continue to grow," he said. "There's a new multi-million dollar shopping center under construction in Livonia, expansion programs amounting to millions have been announced by General Motors Corp. in Livo-

Library Features Shakespeare

The 400th anniversary of Shakespeare's birth in April will focus international attention on the famous Bard of Avon and the world's most popular playwright.

Numerous books about William Shakespeare and his plays are available at the Livonia Public Library, according to Skip Rosenthal, the Librarian.

Some of the books which tell the story of Shakespeare's life are "William Shakespeare," by Peter Quennell; "A Life of Shakespeare," by Hesketh Pearson; "Shakespeare," by F. E. Halliday; "Shakespeare of London," by Marchette Chute; and "The Living Shakespeare," by Robert Gittings.

An excellent recent book of criticism and interpretation of Shakespeare's plays is Alfred Harbage's "William Shakespeare: A Reader's Guide." The author, a professor of English at Harvard, characterizes Shakespeare's language and dramatic techniques and then comments on his greatest plays scene by scene.

The Shakespeare-Bacon controversy and other authorship theories are discussed in H. N. Gibson's "The Shakespeare Claiments."

Other books available about Shakespeare include "A Player's Handbook of Short Scenes from Shakespeare," selected and arranged by Samuel Selden, and the complete works of Shakespeare, both in one volume and in separate editions of various plays.



Fencing for Many Needs The time has long gone when

There's New

a picket fence was about the only choice a homeowner had for the yard. Today's interest in outdoor living has outmoded stereotyped ideas about fencing and developed new concepts for their utility. Fences make for privacy but

need not be monotonous and forbidding. A protection fence is one solid and tall enough to keep small children from toddling into the street and tight enough to keep the neighbor's dogs out of the yard.

Privacy can also be attained by placing louvered panels near the area you wish to screen.

Boundary fences can be low and simple, or patterned in a design that complements house and yard, since their main purposes are definition and interest.

By careful placement and design, a slotted, louvered or solid wood fence controls and directs the wind and sun, creating privacy areas for you and your garden. Fence-louvers cast shadows where desired and filter the sun's rays.

A solid lumber fence in Western pine region wood, placed along the windward side, gives protection from eddies and streams of air currents.

LINOLEUM (tile or sheet) subdivides as follows: (1) Inlaid linoleum, which is durable. long-wearing and easy to clean and (2) embossed linoleum which has texture interest, often resembling masonry.

Most of the resilient floor tiles are made in more than one gauge (thickness). Naturally, the thinner gauges cost less and are usually adequate for most home installations. However, if there are slight irregularities in the old floor surface, these may show through. Also, if exceptionally heavy traffic is expected, the heavier gauge material should be used.
