# Hart, Griffiths Headline Michigan Week Events

Although unable to complete arrangements for President Lyndon B. Johnson to participate in the City Hall cornerstone ceremonies due to a tight schedule that calls for him to attend a meeting in Washington in early afternoon, Plymouth's

greatest Michigan Week celebration in history will start Sunday with suitable programs in most area churches and continue through a tremendous Youth Day program on the following Saturday.

Nelson, who made a trip to the national capital last week, was almost certain that he had sold the White House on Mr. Johnson appearing for the Friday, May 22, ceremonies at 2 p.m., until last Saturday morning when he received a letter of

regrets from Kenneth O'Donnell, special assistant to the President.

Senator Philip Hart and Congresswoman Mrs. Martha Griffiths, each of whom played a major role in securing federal grants for the

new City Hall, will make special trips from Washington to take part in the cornerstone laying that will highlight the week's activities.

Both Senator Hart and Mrs. Griffiths aided Nelson in his visit to the White House and

in laying the groundwork for the presentation of the Plymouth invitation.

Matter of fact, the May 22 program could well be the most outstanding of any Michigan Week celebration in the state. No other community has a Sen-

ator and Congresswoman slated for an appearance and Nelson, George Lawton and Sidney Strong have agreed to make it a double celebration by tying in "Our Livelihood" Day activities.

Lawton is chairman of Our

Livelihood Day and Strong is chairman of Our Heritage Day events on Friday.

When the petitions were filed Saturday morning, with the deadline at 4 p.m. that day, the names of President Gerald Fischer, Secretary Mrs. Esther Hulsing and Mrs. Dorothy Smith, were in the hopper.

Petitions taken out for other candidates, all of whom remained unknown, weren't filed. It is believed the petitions were taken out on the assumption that if Mrs. Hulsing and Fischer decided not to run, the candidates would reveal their identity and file.

## School Board Eyes Financing Plan To Speed Projects

With 4.5 mills assured by the Building and Site Fund, the Plymouth Board of Education plans to speed up its building program by using a section of the state code allowing a Board to bond for as much as two per cent of the state equalized

valuation.

President Gerald Fischer informed the Board of the new form of financing in the meeting Monday night, indicating that it would enable the Board to use the Building and Site Funds as backing for short term bonds that could be issued under the state code without a vote of the electorate.

However, both Mrs. Hulsing and Fischer decided to file petitions when they learned of the lagging interest in the school board posts. Neither felt the two positions should be turned over to inexperienced persons.

The code provides that a Board may issue short term bonds for that portion of two per cent of the state equalized valuation that is not already covered by indebtedness.

This the Plymouth Board has the use of \$2,314,000 (two per cent of the state equalized valuation) minus its bonded indebtedness of \$1,565,000 or an estimated \$599,000.

## Thanks To Bradner; College Gets Share

Alert, quick action on the part of Schoolcraft College President Dr. Eric Bradner, with an assist from State Representative Paul Chandler (publisher of the Observer Newspapers), is expected to bring \$500,000 of state funds for building construction on a matching basis under the provisions of the community college capital outlay bill before the state legislature.

Schoolcraft, which will ask voters in the college district including Livonia, Garden City, Plymouth, Northville and Clarenceville, to approve a \$1,250,000 bond issue that will give the Board an opportunity to apply for matching funds from the state and federal governments without costing property owners an additional penny, was on the outside looking in when Senate Bill 1278 went into the hopper.

The bill provided for a fund of \$3,000,000 to be divided among community colleges, no more than \$300,000, to any single one, on the basis of enrollment for the 1963-64 college year. Originally it had called for \$4,000,000 with a ceiling of \$500,000 but was pared in committee.

Inasmuch as Schoolcraft won't open its doors until next fall, the bill as drawn up would have eliminated the Board from receiving anything from the state.

Dr. Bradner was made aware of the bill by the Association of Community Colleges and immediately contacted Rep. Chandler, who has been on the ailing list for the past two months, for advice.

Even though hospitalized, Chandler has been able to keep up with the doings in the legislature.

Rep. Chandler outlined a course of action for Dr. Bradner that meant an immediate trip to Lansing, contacting many key legislators, checking the time schedule for the bill, and taking every possible step to see if the bill couldn't be changed to its

Meanwhile, the matter of continuing action was slated for the agenda of the Township


Board Tuesday night and Supervisor Roy Lindsey indicated the Trustees planned to take legal action against Evans as promised to complaining residents.

## Driver Ed Plans Set For Summer

Two sessions of Driver Education will be offered by the Livonia Public Schools in the summer school program. Any youth from grades 10 and up who have not passed their 18th birthday, and live in the Livonia Public School District are eligible for the course.

Driver Education Session I will start June 16 and continue through July 18. Driver Education Session II will start July 21 and continue through August 21. Classes will meet at Franklin High School for two hours each day at either 8, 10, 12:30, 2:30, or 4:30, six days a week.

Registration for Driver Education will be at either Bentley High School or Franklin High School starting May 18 through May 29. At the time of registration students will indicate whether or not they are available for only Session I, only Session II, or available for either Session I or Session II.

Selection of students for Driver Education will be based first on their grade level (with those in the higher grades being selected first) and secondly on their age (with older students first). Students will be assigned a class time corresponding with the bus schedule for their area of the School District. Class lists for both sessions of Driver Education will be posted at Bentley High School and Franklin High School the last week of classes.

Most 11th and 12th graders have had an opportunity to take driver education. The emphasis this summer will be to offer the course to as many students presently in the 10th grade as possible. A few ninth graders may have an opportunity in the second session (July 21 to Aug. 21) providing they will be at least 16 years of age this year (1964).

## Franklin Pupils Probe Careers

Business, industry, and education met in a triple-header at Franklin High School April 23, with all three sharing the victory.

Franklin's Business and Industrial Education Departments saluted Career Opportunities Week by hosting B-I-E representatives in a day-long program attended by over 1500 students. It was the first Business Careers program ever presented in Livonia.

Business, industrial, and continuing education representatives met face-to-face the young people they will be asked to hire or enroll and directly observed Franklin's program in job-and-advanced training preparation.

A separate "room" for each visitor was provided in the gym and its balcony. Here students met each hour, instead of in their own classrooms, to hear a brief prospectus by a particular representative, with the remainder of the period devoted to questions and answers.

Students attending represented grades 10-12. All had previously prepared for the opportunity by researching career information in classroom, library, counselors' offices. Welcomed by David D. Amerman, Franklin Principal, and Mrs. Ida Falik, Program Chairman, visitors included representatives of Burroughs Corporation, Chevrolet Spring and Bumper, J. L. Hudson Co., IBM, Korvette, Livonia Civil Service, Livonia Youth Employment Service, Michigan Bell Telephone, National Bank of Detroit, Schoolcraft Community College, Sears Roebuck, U.S. Federal Civil Service, Wayne State University, and Wrigley Supermarkets.

Because of the enthusiasm generated by this practical approach to bridging the gap between high school education and employment, it is expected that Franklin's first Business Careers Day will become a regular feature of the school's co-curricular enrichment offerings.

## Police Ticketing Unlicensed and Abandoned Cars

Public Safety Director Joel F. LaBo told The Observer that police had started enforcing a new ordinance which bans parking of these vehicles last Monday.

The ordinance, passed by the City Council March 11 and made effective April 15, says, "It shall be unlawful for any motor vehicle which is abandoned or unlicensed to be parked on private property contrary to the provision of Ordinance No. 60."

Said LaBo, "I have directed Chief James N. Jordan and the personnel of the Police Division to warn and note all violations of this ordinance immediately and to rigidly enforce this ordinance effective May 11.

"It can cost a citizen in violation of this ordinance an initial ticket cost of \$2 if compliance is within 48 hours and a large sum for towing and storage if the initial ticket is ignored."

# Nine Area Students Cited At U Of M Honors Program

Nine undergraduate students from the Livonia-Plymouth area were among the 1,105 cited by the University of Michigan at its annual Honors Convocation on Friday, May 8.

Students honored included the 79 James B. Angell scholars, who have maintained an all-A average for two consecutive semesters, and the 1,103 receiving class honors. The latter are awarded for a 3.5 grade average or better for the past two semesters.

## Township Group Hits Air Poisons

The Township Treasurers' Association of Wayne County, headed by John Bennett of Redford Township with Mrs. Elizabeth Holmes of Plymouth, as secretary, has passed a resolution asking the state legislature to consider passing legislation which may encourage automobile manufacturers to apply their research and engineering facilities to eliminate air pollution caused by exhaust fumes from cars.

The resolution passed on May 7 in the annual meeting of the Association, follows:

Whereas, the lead in gasoline comes out of the exhaust pipe in tiny particles of lead oxide that is carried in the air for hundreds of miles, and

Whereas, lead oxide is a poison polluting the atmosphere that harms the entire population, especially infants and children, and

Whereas, lead oxide is now raining at about 50 times the rate nature was putting it into the atmosphere before the auto age, and

Whereas, only about 10,000 tons of lead falls on the Southern Hemisphere annually, while about 500,000 tons of lead falls on the Northern Hemisphere annually, and

Whereas, Doctor Tsaihua J. Chow of the University of California and Dr. C. C. Patterson, geologist at California Institute of Technology in Pasadena, has found 10,000 times more lead in snow samples from California's Lassen Volcanic National Park than nature was putting it there from normal dust from the soil, before the auto age, and

Whereas, leading health authorities all agree that man and the auto age is the culprit.

### NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That this organization go on record as encouraging the automobile manufacturers to spend more money for research to eliminate this public health menace by building an automobile exhaust system that will decompose lead oxide, and

2. That we as public officials will encourage the purchase of the product or products that will make a sincere effort to eliminate the poisonous lead oxide from the exhaust of the automobile, and

3. That we send a copy of this resolution to every municipality in Wayne County, and that we urge each and every municipality to pass a similar resolution, with the ultimate goal being that every municipality in the State of Michigan pass a resolution to bring the problem to the attention of the general public, and

4. That a copy of this resolution be mailed to the Honorable George Romney, Governor of the State of Michigan and to each and every member of the State Legislature, so that they may consider and deliberate on this problem, and explore the possibility of passing legislation which may encourage the automobile manufacturers to apply their research and engineering facilities to overcome this health hazard so that we and our children may breathe fresh air again.

# Honor The Census Taker - Starts Now

May in Michigan means more in Livonia than warm winds, spring flowers, and restless children. It is school census time and every home will be visited by a census enumerator before the end of the month.

This week (Thursday evening) the Livonia Board of Education approved the names of 52 census takers and their alternates who will gather the data needed for school planning for next year and the years to come.

Superintendent Benton Yates pointed out that school administrators needed basic facts "to give Livonia children and adults

additional educational opportunities, to plan more efficiently for future school needs, and to more fully utilize Livonia's school buildings for the educational and cultural growth of all the people."

The collection of the basic information, which is required by State Law, will be completed by May 30, school officials said.

"It will be easy to recognize your census enumerator," Yates said. "She will carry proper identification and credentials. Information you give, such as dates of birth, are confidential. Such data is put on IBM cards.

They become group statistics, to be used for school planning purposes.

"The most important questions required by the State Law concern Livonia children: how old they are, if they are handicapped and need special school help, if they receive bus transportation to school, and similar statistical information.

"The answers to questions on adult needs and interests will help the evening school staff plan to give Livonia adults the vocational classes, hobby classes, and cultural classes they indicate they want in Livonia.

# Offers Tips on How to Collect 'Rewards'

(This is a public service article explaining in general terms a provision of Michigan law. Individuals who wish to determine the effect of any law upon their private legal affairs should consult a private attorney.)

Occasionally a crime is so heinous that a community offers a "reward" for information leading to the apprehension of the criminal. Sometimes the crime or series of crimes so seriously arouse the citizenry that even private associations offer "rewards" for aid in bringing the guilty party to justice.

We are sure all of you have seen signs on vacant property or property under construction, or sometimes on warehouses offering "rewards" for information leading to the arrest and conviction of anyone breaking and entering, or destroying the property. And, in the lost and found columns of newspapers, we often read an offer or reward for the return of a lost dog or other lost property.

Rewards such as these can be collected by the person who, knowing of the offer, furnishes the desired information or returns the lost property, as the case may be.

In the case of information leading to the arrest of criminals, sometimes several persons may provide the necessary information. Usually the person who is first to furnish the critical information is entitled to the reward.

But, when several persons provide part of the information, which taken together produces the complete information, they are entitled to share the reward.

Ordinarily, police officers in the performance of their duty are not entitled to rewards. In the case of the Michigan State

Police, and other members of the Detroit Department of Public Safety, such rewards are required to be paid into their pension, accident and disability fund by state law.





Now Dr. Bradner is busy working on the proposed bond issue election which will provide the matching funds.

The electorate in the college district will be asked to approve the \$1,250,000 bond issue. However, Dr. Bradner quickly points out that the College Board will have the funds available under the present state equalization but must have permission to use the monies.

At the moment, the College Board is permitted to use only one-half mill or a maximum of \$250,000 for construction. However, an increased tax base has placed the Board in a position where it has \$300,000 available for building but is unable to use \$50,000.

It's permission to use that \$50,000, which may become more as the College district develops, that the Board seeks in the election.

Then it can apply for matching funds from the state and federal governments that could boost the total to \$2,500,000 for building and step up the construction program.

## Plymouth Police, PO Join In Vehicle Safety Drive

The Plymouth Post Office Department and the Police Department are participating in the National Vehicle Safety check campaign during May according to an announcement by Postmaster Dr. George Timpona.

The two groups will ask drivers to help reduce the soaring national accident and death rate by following a few simple rules.

Asst. Chief Loren Johnson, of the Plymouth Police, reports that there were

276 accidents in the city during 1963 and investigations showed that 50 per cent could have been avoided if seat belts had been installed.

The following rules have been suggested:

- 1—Check brakes constantly.
- 2—Bright lights can be a hazard in a vehicle coming in either direction.
- 3—Don't get too close to the car in front. Allow a minimum of 10 feet for

each 10 miles of speed. This will allow for an emergency stop.

4—Obey all traffic signs and speed laws.

5—Give the driver behind a break by using your directional signals when making a left or right hand turn.

6—Keep windshield clean.

7—Many cars are driven with one headlight. If your car is one, then give it immediate attention.

## 'Curtain Going Up'

Time to consider the teachers and how they fare in TV. Hollywood movies and on the stage. Normally, the teaching profession and its members have been so stereotyped that every TV program or film has had overtones of the insipid "Mr. Peppers". Fortunately, Wally Cox has retired to the field of soap commercials so that once more the teaching profession can gain some lost ground.

What brings on this chauvinistic feeling for pedants of all varieties—whether in elementary, high school, or college? Last Monday, old Wally had the good fortune to view NBC's Monday Night at the Movies over a friend's color TV set. As a rule, the movies running on this series are "rejects" from years gone by.

Luckily the movie I was corralled to view was a beautiful rainbow-hued film that somehow was overlooked by most of the public. NBC deserves a pat on its broad network back for putting it on their series. Name of the film: "Good Morning, Miss Dove."

Perhaps some of you read the story of Miss Dove when it was a paperback book. Her fictional adventures were written by Frances Gray Patton. The story is a warm, wonderful narrative of a devoted elementary school teacher.

The film "Good Morning, Miss Dove" veers to the sentimental mushy side of life and even tends to be a bit maudlin at times. However, the film producers in this production always know when to stop before your heart gets too far cross-wise.

The final scene of the picture with Miss Dove (Jennifer Jones) being informed that she will have many more years to teach since she has won her battle with cancer is sparse on dialogue, long on brilliant acting.

Every school in our great land should have a 16mm copy of this film. "Good Morning, Miss Dove" captures the devotion, self-sacrifice, and untold extra hours that every teacher gives to her students. Children in school need to be reminded about the noble nature of the teaching profession.

Too often a reprimand or some strong disciplinary action brings on "Roast Teacher" for the evening meal in their home. A P.T.A. session could be well-spent in the showing of this film.

If you saw "Good Morning, Miss Dove" or read the book you may wonder if a town could be so concerned about a teacher. As indicated in the story, the entire town seemed to worry about the outcome of her operation.

The scholarships, awarded each year by the Society, are for tuition to a music camp or can be applied toward the purchase of a musical instrument or for private lessons.

Founded in 1958, the Livonia Youth Symphony Society, Inc., was built around the desires of an enthusiastic group of people to promote and increase the musical knowledge and appreciation of the community.

The Youth Symphony Orchestra gave its premiere concert in the spring, 1958. The following year a second orchestra was created to provide musical opportunities to a somewhat younger, musically-less-experienced group, the Junior Orchestra of Livonia. 
On May 20, 21, and 22, Bentley will hold a student orientation to afford the students from these junior high schools their first look at Bentley.

### What's Burning?

The Fire Department responded to 31 emergency runs.

The most spectacular fire was on Tuesday evening at the Brooks & Perkins Co., on Inkster Rd. The fire occurred in early evening and lit up the entire sky. On industrial fires of this type, we respond with numerous pieces of equipment.

On arrival we found the fire was in barrels of scrap metal in the yard of this plant. There were 100 barrels of magnesium and related metals involved. Many people questioned, "How come they don't put the fire out?" In this case and in cases of magnesium and related metals, there is a violent reaction when water is put on these burning metals. The only safe

way here is to protect the surrounding buildings, take away fuel from burning fires, and dampen the fire with special powders and compounds.

In this instance, the fire was doing no damage, as it was scrap shavings, so we allowed the fire to burn out, while protecting exposures. We had equipment not needed back into service immediately, and Detroit Edison was on the scene with its crews, if needed. The Police officers on duty in this area did an excellent job, aiding in our getting to the scene, directing traffic, and general policing during this emergency. They deserve a, "Well Done."

Also during the week we had many calls and people stopping at Nankin Mills to inquire about the boat out on the water. "Has someone drowned?" was the usual question. The Fire Dept. training officers scheduled Water Rescue all this week here. It took about a full week to complete this course so that each man gets a chance to do each job. From time to time this summer you will see a Fire Truck in the residential area, shopping center, or convenient location. They will hook up to hydrant, drop hose, spray water, put up ladders, etc. As we have no Headquarters Station, or a Training area we have to use the most adaptable location for Training Purposes. We hope this condition will be remedied in the near future. If you do see our men out on training stop and say "hello."

## It's Great Week - Lights On for Baseball

They're lighting up Livonia this week—that is, for baseball and softball. Starting Friday evening, there'll be night games at Ford Field on Farmington Road.

It's another milestone for our community, especially when comes to recreational sports.

You can't find two happier gents around Livonia than John Dufour, the city's recreation chief, and Al Roscoe, who is in charge of the town's athletic program.

"This is something Livonia and the area have needed for a long time," declared Roscoe, who has run the sports program for the recreation department these many years.

"It'll be a real shot in the arm for baseball hereabouts," added Dufour, who only recently came to Livonia after serving in recreation work at nearby Dearborn for 17 years.

Dufour then elaborated:

"You (meaning the operator of this column) just got through mentioning that baseball has fallen off in many areas for boys upwards of 16 years in age and adults after booming programs for juniors.

"Well, when I was in Dearborn, we found that when we equipped our baseball fields with lights, the number of teams for older boys and adults leaped tremendously. There is no reason why the same thing shouldn't happen here in Livonia."

Dufour declared the lights will burn for both baseball and softball just about every night in the week all summer.

"We'll have the kids play the early games and then bring on the older boys and the adult teams for later action."

Both Dufour and Roscoe have plans to bring in some top-flight amateur baseball to be played under the arcs at the plant located on Farmington Road, just south of Five Mile.

"I know we can run some district tourneys here in August and September," expressed Dufour. "Then, too, there is no reason why we can't have some kind of a high school baseball tournament here next spring."

It's to be noted that Livonia Franklin High and Redford Union will square off Friday evening in the dedicatory game. Then Bentley will tackle Trenton next Monday night in another prep attraction before the spotlight turns to the recreation softball and baseball program.

The baseball poles stretch some 90 feet in the air each. The softball poles extend 60 feet.

"We know that our lights will be the equal—if not better—than those in nearby communities, including Detroit," said Roscoe, who has been working feverishly of late to set up the huge baseball and softball programs to be carried on in Livonia

this spring and summer.

THE LIGHTS, of course, are part of the move to give Livonia a recreation department second to none in the state of Michigan.

"We're working all the time to improve our program, to give more people a chance to participate in recreational activities," said Dufour.

A shortage of playfields and parks—plus money—is holding back the recreation department. But sooner or later under the direction of a man like Dufour, and with such able assistants as Roscoe, the Livonians will be able to sing out: "We have the best."

The best also will include an artificial skating rink, something this column has clamored for since its inception some three years ago.

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# Open Letter Questions The Recreation Program in Township

**Editor:**  
I write this letter to attempt to clarify the complicated and confusing reports on the recreation program in Redford Township and to ask a few questions which have not been answered by local newspaper reports.

South Redford School Board minutes, and a statement made by School Board president Roger J. Browne, list 10 South Redford schools as providing facilities for Little League (in one school — Little League girls). Little Leagues are non-existent in South Redford School District, and one regulation in Little League Rule Book states that "girls may not be members of Little League."

But to get to the Recreation program—after several secret meetings the news was finally released early in February of

this year that the joint School-Township recreation plan needed only the formal approval of the north and south end school boards to put the plan into effect.

The minutes of one of these secret meetings (which came into my possession purely by accident) stated that the purpose of the commission to be appointed would be to co-ordinate the recreational program of the schools, the Township recreation department, and the athletic associations such as the Little League and the Redford Township Junior Athletic Association.

Listed as being present at that meeting were the Township Supervisor, a South Redford school teacher trustee, the two school superintendents, the chairman of the Redford Township Junior Athletic Association

and the owner of a township sporting goods store.

Officials of North Redford Little League, Mel Ott League and adult softball leagues were neither consulted nor even informed of such a meeting, or of any prior or subsequent meetings.

The proposal was not acted upon by the North Redford School Board, due in part to the sparsity of information brought to the members of the School Board and because of the upcoming millage election.

The subject was discussed at the South Redford School Board meeting, however, with Mr. Duston in attendance, along with representatives of the RTJAA. When agreement could not be reached a school board member suggested that a study should be made and asked for a committee for such purpose.

The committee would include (guess who!)—the chairman of the RTJAA and the owner of the local sporting goods store. Action was held up by a majority vote, and we presume the committee was not formed.

As a last resort the Township Board decided to revert to the previous set-up for the 1964 season, and Dick Campbell was appointed Recreation Director, with Stu Watson assuming the duties of the chairman of the Parks Commission.

Now it seems that some of the Township Board members have had a change of mind and would like to replace Campbell by dragging him through a legal loophole in his contract. We admit that we are a little confused at this stage of the game—we know who's pitching and who's catching, but we can't figure who's calling the signals.

So we would like to ask the following questions of anyone concerned in the ball game at Township Hall.

(1) Is it true that a large sum of money will be added to the Recreation Department budget (not at their request) to purchase equipment to be loaned to the Redford Township Junior Athletic Association for the 1964 season?

(2) Was the same thing done in 1963?

(3) Was the same offer made to Little League or to Mel Ott or to any other youth baseball program?

(4) Were the financial statements of the RTJAA checked to see why such help was necessary?

(5) Why is it necessary to have paid umpires for baseball games for boys 12 years of age and under? How much does that cost per season? (Little Leagues use unpaid volunteers, trained by a professional umpire, at no cost. These volunteer umpires can't be too bad, because they will be used in the local phase of the National Little League tournaments this year. Come out and watch them in action.)

(6) Who pays for the fancy jackets worn by all the officials of the RTJAA, and for the

caps?

(7) Where is all the equipment and the uniforms used by the RTJAA purchased, and are competitive bids sought and voted on?

(8) Does the 1200 boys and girls represent a true figure, or does it include the same boys who play in the baseball and football (or basketball) programs? (North Redford Little Leagues service over 700 boys — no duplications.)

(9) Is the question of the current Recreation Director's contractual legality the culmination of a personal or political vendetta (shades of the Mafia), or the means of replacing him with a candidate more susceptible to directions from Township Hall?

(10) Why should taxpayers' money be used to furnish equipment for a non-profit, volunteer organization, catering to youth activities only, when the Township does not have a park where parents can just sit and relax under a shade tree and watch the toddlers play in the sand or use the playground equipment?

We would appreciate answers to at least some of the questions. We believe the taxpayers would, too.

## Clean-Up Is Important

A good clean-up job around flower beds, rose beds and shrubs in fall is the best insect and disease protection. Early spring clean-up and burning of diseased leaves, especially from rose beds, will also save summer problems.

Michigan State University horticulture specialists suggest that you spray early and well. READ LABELS AND ABIDE BY DIRECTIONS.

There are some good all-purpose sprays on the market that control both diseases and insects in yards and gardens. Sometimes you need to treat for specific problems, too.

Here are some MSU rose gardening tips:

For scale on evergreens use Sevin or Malathion.

For red spider mite use any good miticide or Kethane, Tordon or Oratoron.

Aphids on any plants can be controlled by Malathion. Anthracnose on sycamore and pine can be stopped by organic mercury at the time of bud swelling and another spraying 10 days later.

Dusting is easier than spraying and can be effective if air is still and the foliage is covered with dew or moisture at time of application.

It you have more than an average sized yard you may wish to mix your own all-purpose spray. To make one gallon use:

1 gallon water  
2 teaspoons 57% malathion emulsion  
2 tablespoons 50% DDT  
2 tablespoons 50% Captain  
It is wise to mix ingredients

thoroughly in a pail before pouring into the sprayer.

Don't spray too sparingly, but enough is enough. After spray is running off plant, the job is done.

Spray most ornamentals about once each month, May through August. But roses need to be sprayed every week or ten days. Think of it as a preventive measure.

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## Thatch Causes Lawn Problems

Thatch accumulation could be the main reason why your lawn is suffering from disease or drought problems, according to James Beard, Michigan State University turfgrass researcher.

"Thatch is defined as a tightly intermingled layer of living and dead stems, leaves and roots of grasses which develop between the layer of green vegetation and the soil surface," explains Beard.

"The higher rates of nitrogen fertilization, development of more vigorous grass varieties, increase in watering and Michigan's cooler climate for mid-summer growth have contributed to the thatch problem."

Beard says that accumulations of one-half inch or more can contribute to disease activity, reduce drought resistance and inhibit aeration and water movement into the soil.

To control thatch in small areas, Beard suggests vigorous raking with a steel garden rake to remove dead vegetation. For larger areas, several vertical renovation machines are available.

"Much of the thatch problem can be stopped before it gets started by removing clippings," comments Beard. "Where clippings are not removed, the rate of thatch accumulation is increased two to three times."

## Home Pool Buyer Can Choose From Varied Materials

The shells of home swimming pools are being built these days from a range of materials far wider than one might ordinarily imagine.

Your best course is to consult a local pool builder. Even so, it is well to know what experience has been with some of the materials now in use. Here's a brief summary:

**METAL**—All-steel pools have welded or bolted sections. Strong as they come. Relatively high cost. Most have painted interiors; some have vinyl membrane liners. Strong aluminum shells are costlier, need no painting but tend to lose brightness.

**POURED CONCRETE**—Strong, long of life, but floor and wall joints must be caulked and may develop leakage.

**PRECAST CONCRETE**—Costs less than poured. Prefabricated panels are assembled at poolsite. Limited as to number of shapes.

**GUNITE**—Pneumatically-applied concrete, strengthened by steel-bar reinforcement. No joints to leak. Medium to low price. Most popular method. Most versatile for shapes.

**DRY-PAK CONCRETE**—Fairly skilled do-it-yourselfer can build pool to fit any shape or budget.

**CONCRETE BLOCK**—Low-cost masonry requiring some skill in install. Many pressure-prone joints. Difficult to make watertight. Differential expansion between blocks and interior liner or plaster or concrete makes cracking a problem.

**VINYL LINER**—Very popular. Holds up well, although seams are vulnerable and punctures not impossible. May be owner-installed. Needs no paint. Requires only wood frame shell, concrete coping.

**FIBERGLAS**—Pre-fab newcomer. Smooth interior. Easy to maintain. Color is built in. Some versatility as to shapes. May require an expert to put together. Initial cost is higher than vinyl.

**ASPHALT**—Low cost. Watertight if properly constructed. Can be primed and painted with new asphalt paint; colors available. Not good where a diving board is planned; pool must have gently sloping sides because of low strength of material.

## On the lawn WITH LARRY LAWRENCE

If you ever read a book called "The Black Tulip" by Alexander Dumas, you know what a prize such a flower would be. The same with a blue rose. Whoever could produce them would make a fortune.

This was mentioned at a garden club meeting recently, whereupon someone in the audience got up and said, "What this country really needs is a green dandelion." The applause was spontaneous.

Those bright yellow heads have become such a sign of poor lawnkeeping that it is difficult to be dispassionate about them. However, a green dandelion is scarcely the answer. During most of its life a dandelion is green. The flower lasts but a few days whereas the coarse leaves can disfigure a lawn for years.

Neither should you try digging them out. The almost childishly simple solution is to apply a modern, selective weed-and-feed, which is formulated especially for broad leaved invaders including the plantains.

At first you'll hardly notice any effect. The leaves of the weeds will begin to turn upwards. They may or may not turn brown. But in 3 or 4 weeks the weeds will have disappeared completely—leaf, stem and rootstock. And the grass will be greener and thicker because while you were weeding you were also feeding.

# Make Your Plans Now For Second Polio Drive

Physicians of Wayne, Oakland and Macomb Counties urge the 2 1/2 million persons who took polio vaccine on April 19 to remember to return for their second anti-polio sugar cube on Sunday, June 14.

Speaking for the tri-county polio immunization committees, Dr. Francis P. Rhoades, Wayne County chairman, noted the project is only half completed and that a second feeding is necessary to insure maximum protection against poliomyelitis.

Dr. Rhoades reported that in Wayne County alone, 1,631,000 persons took the first oral vaccine feeding. The Oakland County estimate is 480,000 and in Macomb County, 375,000.

In Wayne County, a gross of \$672,483.81 was collected for an average donation of 41 cents per person, Dr. Rhoades said.

He also said that another donation of 50 cents will be requested at the June 14 feeding and that any monies in surplus, after the vaccine and other expenses are paid, would go into a Wayne County Health Foundation, to be administered by both medical and non-medical citizens.

# Shevuot, Holiday of Pentecost, First Fruits Celebrated May 17

Temple Beth Am in Livonia will usher in the Festival of Shevuot with a service conducted by Rabbi David Jessel at the United Hebrew Schools' Building, Seven Mile Rd. and Osmus, on Sunday, May 17, 10:30 a.m. The weekend will also see the conclusion of the Religious School Year, as the Sabbath Service honors the teachers.

Shevuot will be celebrated by Jews throughout the world beginning at sundown, May 16. The holiday is celebrated for one day by Reform Jews and Jews living in Israel, and for two days by Orthodox and Conservative Jews.

Commemorating the end of seven full weeks from Passover, it is the time mentioned in the Bible when the first fruits of the field were harvested in Palestine. The choicest of these were taken in a religious pilgrimage to the Temple in Jerusalem, where they were offered as a sacrifice to the Lord. Shevuot was, and is today, one of the major festivals of the Jewish

religious calendar. In time the agricultural nature of the day was pre-empted by a more spiritual meaning as it became identified with the time when, seven weeks after the exodus from Egypt, the newly-freed Hebrew people stood at the foot of Mount Sinai and received the Ten Commandments for themselves, their unborn generations, and for all mankind. Thus Shevuot, originally known as the festival of the first fruits, also became known as the time of the giving of the Law.

In this spirit, Reform Judaism vested the holiday with even greater significance when, 150 years ago, it introduced into the observance of the festival the ceremony of Confirmation. At this ceremony, Jewish youth of both sexes stand before the Holy Ark of their congregation, and by a formal ceremony are inducted as full members of the household of the Jewish people. These young people, the fruit of their parents' love, thus receive the Torah for themselves.

and, as their forefathers at Sinai, pledge to uphold its ideals. Confirmation marks the successful completion of their required years of formal religious education.

One of the main features of this holiday is the reading from the Book of Ruth in the synagogue. Ruth, originally a non-Hebrew from the land of Moab, voluntarily cast in her lot with the Hebrew faith when her husband died. Eventually she married Boaz, a kinsman of her husband. So highly was she regarded, that legend has it that the great King David was descended from this union.

The Book of Ruth is associated with Shevuot to remind us that just as the Torah is for all men, so God is a universal God, and Judaism is a universal faith for one and all. Any person or any group wishing to become Jewish may do so, and are readily welcomed.

In Christianity, Pentecost or Whitsunday occurs on the seventh Sunday after Easter. Commemorating the descent of the Holy Spirit, the Christian Pentecost in all probability had its ideational sources in the ancient Hebrew holiday of Shevuot.

# St. Matthew Pastor Discusses Baccalaureate Services

A small group of parents appeared at the Livonia School Board meeting last Thursday night to protest the Baccalaureate Exercises being discontinued for the district.

A special study session has been established to discuss the questions again.

At the regular Board meeting James Lang of St. Matthew Church presented the following for the Board's consideration.

## INFERENCE TO BACCALAUREATE EXERCISES IN LIVONIA HIGH SCHOOLS:

Since the decision to discontinue baccalaureate exercises in Livonia high schools seems to have been based primarily on an "INTERPRETATION" of the recent "Supreme Court rulings on prayer in public schools" it seems proper that such an INTERPRETATION (which is purely local in nature) should be discussed. Please consider these points:

1) The Attorney General of the State of Michigan has made no specific interpretation of the Supreme Court ruling as it applies to the public schools of Michigan. In most cases (other states), this means that the Attorney General is in agreement with practices or policies of local school boards. Many school boards in Michigan have taken the initiative to end the daily practice of Bible reading and prayer.

2) Educational journals have been referred to in past discussions as supporting the discontinuation of baccalaureate exercises. A survey of educational journal articles since the Supreme Court action does not reveal a strong opinion either way. Most articles pose the question, but do not presume an answer. Some suggest that the Supreme Court would not rule that baccalaureate exercises be discontinued. The flavor of the articles can be seen in the following quotes from "The Teachers College Journal" and "The Magazine":

This quote from "The PTA Magazine":  
"Is it forbidden to hold a baccalaureate service in a public high school or a tax-supported college?"

This is another extremely close question, and I am not sure I know the answer. In the traditional sense the baccalaureate service is a religious service held on the Sunday prior to commencement. If the service is voluntary, not sponsored or directed by school authorities, and held in a church, it is clearly not objectionable. But suppose it is part of the school program and held in the school building. Then it is probably on the same footing as the morning prayer to open the school day—unless it makes a difference that the baccalaureate service is an annual or semi-annual or perhaps quarterly affair rather than a daily one. One may hope, in questions of this kind, that the Supreme Court decisions will be interpreted with a pinch of common sense. ("The PTA Magazine" February 1964, page 34)

And this quote from "The Teachers College Journal":

"This year's opinion, although sweeping and clear-cut, does not settle every aspect of religious activities in the schools, such as baccalaureate exercises or the use of prayer by a teacher on her own initiative. The opinion explicitly approved only literary use of the Bible and the teaching of comparative religion as part of a secular program of education. Possibly those may not be litigated because of the Court's doctrine of standing to sue.

To ward off academic questions and frivolous suits, the Court demands that a plaintiff show a substantial interest and a distinct injury. Thus the Court does not entertain taxpayer suits and a previous Bible reading case was dismissed as moot because the plaintiff child had graduated by the time the suit wound its way to the Supreme Court. It is unlikely that anyone would have standing to challenge baccalaureate exercises indubitably religious, even if innocuous." ("The Teachers College Journal" p. 175)

3) Other communities are continuing baccalaureate exercises as usual. The leaders in these communities are not irresponsible persons wishing to take part in unconstitutional acts.

It is not my purpose to discuss the action of the Supreme Court—or to question the action. My purpose is to make it clearly understood that we or any other community have not been directed to discontinue baccalaureate exercises.

Other points in favor of discontinuation bear comment:

a) poor attendance. There is a point of opinion here. Some say that the attendance has been poor—others say all seats have been taken.

b) negative student reaction. No doubt, some students would react negatively if they are "required" to attend baccalaureate. This could be solved by offering baccalaureate as an opportunity

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# Awake Women—"Match Us To This Hour"

(Second in a series of a report by Bebe Lindout from the YWCA National Convention in Washington.)

**MATCH US TO THIS HOUR**  
Dr. James H. Robinson, director of Operation Crossroads Africa, and a negro minister, provided fuel for the convention thought with a key-note speech delineating the "Challenge of This Hour."

It was flattering to learn that Dr. Robinson found women to be less opposed to social change than men; that mothers seemed far less concerned about letting their ducklings participate in his Operation Crossroads than fathers. (Operation Crossroads is a pre-Peace Corps program carried out through private funds. Dr. Robinson pointed out that Church missions and social agencies were "perfectly capable of doing the work of the Peace Corps if only they had the courage.") Dr. Robinson developed the thesis that the population explosion is creating new social problems. With our rapid technological advance he asks, "Is our spiritual and philosophical advance keeping pace?"

Progress and anxiety, by their very nature, are inseparable, he said. And often in times such as these there is a tendency to fatalism. We must match our personal growth and development to the tremendous material achievement of our technology. Can we be matched to this hour?

He added that the weakening of our moral fibre, internal decay, is a more serious threat to our nation than communism.

On racial differences he explained how and why the negro must continue to press for

equality. He suggested that by seeing to it that some negro girls be admitted to women's prep schools, we women might add a paving stone to the road to racial equality. Dr. Robinson concluded his talk describing what he termed the "revolution among women." The rise of modern woman, he said, will change the world more than any other force. In Africa, India, Japan, among the Muslims, Hindus, Buddhists, where women traditionally have been second class citizens, they are now being educated, voting, holding public office, in many cases controlling the wealth of the nation. To raise the level of living in any country, he said, raise the level of the status of its women.

# Plymouth Commission Watches Water Developments In 2 Areas

Members of Plymouth's Council, presently involved in negotiations with the Detroit Water Board on terms of a contract that could bring Detroit water to Plymouth at some future date, are watching two recent developments with more than a bit of interest.

The first involves the agreement of the Northville Township Board to buy water from the City of Detroit.

The second involves a possible court fight in Redford Township where Supervisor Jack McDonald charges Detroit is trying to increase charges for water supplied to township users by 40 per cent.

Plymouth's council is much interested in the outcome of both developments. The members are wondering what kind of a contract has been offered to Northville Township. They

are much concerned in Supervisor McDonald's allegations because that is one thing they want included in any contract they study—the right to have a word in determining any proposed price increases.

The resolution passed by the Northville Board sets the stage for construction of a water system to serve 18 homes in Plymouth Garden subdivision in the township's southeast section.

The Board has negotiated for several months with the Detroit Water Board in an attempt to reduce the purchase guarantee which the contract stipulates for future years.

Under terms of the agreement, Northville Township must purchase nearly 28 million cubic feet of water annually from Detroit by 1985. This would take care of approximately 7,600 homes.

The Township Board set May 25 for hearing on final confirmation of the assessment roll for the project. The assessment district to be served changed slightly when three properties withdrew.

Under the present setup, 18 homeowners will be assessed at the rate of \$1,358.67 per lot benefit.

In Redford, McDonald said Detroit is attempting to raise

the rates to help finance the costs of the Pontiac and Flint water projects.

Redford has just installed a new water line to increase pressure to the south end. Because of the pressure increase to the outlying areas, Detroit is attempting to increase local service charges, according to McDonald.

Redford Township's Board plans to fight the increase

which was supposed to go into effect June 1.

It was increases of this type that the Plymouth Council is wary of in all contract negotiations with the Detroit Water Board.

Most Commissioners fear that the Water Board could try the same thing in Plymouth that it is attempting in Redford Township, if a contract was signed.

That's why all are watching the outcome of the developments. They are interested in the rates charged to Northville Township for Plymouth is next in line on the same water main.

They are very much interested in seeing how Redford Township comes out in its protest against the higher rates—both developments could play a big role in the future of Plymouth's water service plans.
