To subscribe liberally to every public, charitable and church entertainment; advertise them for nothing, pay his own way to everything and then be called prejudiced and mean spirited because a column is devoted to that particular affair. Do you wonder that there are many cranks in the newspaper business? It is bound to make either a crank or a philosopher out of a man."





ORDINANCE NO. 14U

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 14. KNOWN AS THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH.

THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

PART I. That Ordinance No. 14, known as the Zoning Ordinance of the Township of Plymouth and as amended shall be and hereby is amended by amending Section 3.40 of Article III, to read as follows:

Section 3.40 STORAGE OF VEHICLES. The storage or parking of trucks over one (1) ton capacity, truck tractors, truck trailers, moving vans, automobile trailers, aircraft or passenger cars and trucks, which are wrecked, disabled, abandoned or incapable of movement under their own power in any yard area or on the street or highway, shall not be considered a legal accessory use in any R-1-E, R-1-H, R-1-S, R-1, R-2 or R-3 Districts, except that this shall not prohibit the storage of one (1) unoccupied house trailer or mobile home, or small utility trailer, which is the property of the occupant, when such unoccupied house trailer or mobile home or utility trailer is stored within the garage building or in the

PART II. That Ordinance No. 14, known as the Zoning Ordinance of the Township of Plymouth and as amended, by amending the Zoning Ordinance by the addition of a new Section to become and be known as Section 3.41 DANGER-OUS AND OBNOXIOUS ANIMALS. The keeping, breeding or boarding of any animal which is dangerous, and may cause injury or be obnoxious because of noise or odor, shall be prohibited from all residential, commercial and industrial districts of the Township of Plymouth.

PART III. CONFLICTING PROVISIONS REPEALED. Any Ordinance or parts of Ordinance in conflict, herewith, are

PART IV. EFFECTIVE DATE. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety and are hereby ordered to take immediate effect and be in force from and after the earliest date allowed by law.


