Gould's plans include seven units with two offices in each and 10 parking spaces for each unit. The construc-tion would be identical to those Gould has erected on Sheldon Road near North Territorial.

Township Planner W. C. Johnson recommended favorable consideration by the Commission and explained that the rezoning was a logical use.





Child Guidance Clinic Waiting To Move

Some of the Colonial atmosphere of the home will remain in the waiting room and first office at the suggestion of Mrs. Hunter.



"THIS OLD HOUSE" will be home to the Northwest Child Guidance Clinic in approximately two weeks, according to David Hoptman, Supervisor of the clinic. In a few weeks following that there will be a dedication of the Clinic for the public's inspection. The sign for the Clinic will be the next item to be placed on the property which is located on Merriman Road just the other side of Ford Road, 6221 Merriman, Garden City.

The Northwest Child Guidance Clinic has growing pains. It has completely outgrown the present facilities at the Wayne County General Hospital - the waiting room and combination office plus two interviewing rooms are hopelessly inadequate.

Since September, 115 cases have been processed by the Clinic which services 19 school districts including Redford Township, Livonia and Plymouth. At present, due to crowded interviewing rooms, there is a waiting list of children to be seen by the Clinic.

Supervisor of the Northwest Child Guidance Clinic, David Hoptman, told The Observer he is hopeful, they will be able to move into the new quarters in two weeks.

There will be a waiting room, conference room, business office and six interviewing rooms. The new space will be used to capacity as soon as the moving is completed.

Although the house is over 100 years old, the foundation is excellent and in general good condition. The floors have been leveled and the walls paneled and rewiring done. The renovating will amount to about \$3500. The home and land was purchased for \$13,900.

Assistance from any service group in the 19-district area will be put to good use, particularly furnishing the "new" Clinic.
