Football Loses Popular Coach After '64 Season

School Board Names Smith, Taylor, Junior High Principals; Hoben Assistant at Senior High School

Three promotions at the administrative level, one of which will cost Plymouth High School its popular and successful football coach after the 1964 season, were approved Monday night by the Plymouth School board.

which came in the nature of surprises, were recommended by Supt. Russell Isbister after interviews of all involved and after receiving a green light from the board to revise the principal high setup at the principal level.

The junior highs, recently received a promotion to assistant superintendent in charge of secondary education. Harding had been in charge of Junior High East and West with an assistant principal at each.

Monday night, Isbister recommended the appointment of Robert Smith, assistant principal at the senior high in charge of Guidance and Counseling, to principal of Junior High West and the promotion of Carl Taylor, assistant principal at Junior High East, to the principal's post.

John "Mike" Hoben, football coach and member of the senior high counseling staff, was promoted to the vacancy created by the transfer of Smith.

Immediately relinquish his duties as head baseball coach. Inasmuch as football practice is slated to start within two weeks, Isbister informed the board that it would be impossible to hire a successor at this late date. More than that, Hoben is reported to have asked

to remain for one more season. It has been known for some time that Hoben has been interested in moving into the administration field but the promotion came as a complete surprise to most members of the school's teaching staff.

Both Hoben and Smith were among the candidates for the assistant superintendency when that post was created last spring. It was a foregone conclusion that each would be considered for promotions if the junior high setup was changed to two principals instead of two assistants.

Smith is also a member of the City Commission and has served as assistant principal in charge of Guidance and Counseling since September 1957.

He joined the Plymouth system in 1947 as a chemistry and physics teacher. Prior to that he taught at the Boys Republic in Farmington for two years where he was coach, athletic director and health teacher.

He is a native of Plymouth and was graduated from PHS in 1938.

Hoben, who served in the Korean War as a captain in the Marine Corps, came to the Plymouth school system in 1955 from Cheboygan as mathematics teacher, counselor, football and baseball coach.

He has had tremendous success on the gridiron and turned out one of the state's few undefeated teams last fall. Plymouth's only two all-state players, Randy and Dick Egloff, were members of Hoben-coached teams.

In addition to his school activities, Hoben is president of the Plymouth Education Association, an organization of teachers in the system, and has headed the Youth Employment Bureau of the Y.M.C.A. for the past year and a half.

The future of his work as director of the Job Bureau is still in the air but it is believed that he will have to resign the post before the start of football practice.

Taylor, who joined the system in 1958 as a junior high math teacher, was promoted to the assistant principalship of Junior High East in February 1962.

He served under Harding throughout his time in that position and received a high recommendation from the assistant superintendent when the eligibles for the principalships were being studied by the administrative staff.

All three will report to their new assignments this week to start plans for the coming school year.

Bob Sincok Joins J. L. Hudson Staff

Robert Sincok, former Mayor and a longtime member of the City Commission until his second term expired in April, 1963, has joined the sales staff of J. L. Hudson Realty Co. in its Plymouth office.

Even Though Not Quite Ready

City Moves Offices Into New Quarters

The new City Hall wasn't quite ready. Workmen were still putting in electrical fixtures, cleaning up, putting in partitions, taking care of final details but the City of Plymouth's official family moved into the new quarters anyway on Monday.

It wasn't quite "anyway" since the Livonia Moving Co. has squads of men on hand, all working like busy bees, carrying furniture, equipment and the lighter items down the street from the old City Hall.

The big move started at 8 a.m. Monday and workers in the Treasurer, Clerk, Municipal Court, Engineering and Police Department didn't have any idle time for the remainder of the day.

They weren't able to carry on work as usual but had the task of unloading the huge boxes of records and other material and placing them in the new files.

Carol Olear, assistant to City Treasurer Kenneth Way, didn't have any time to herself—she took up offices at the new cash register in the new City Hall and was busy all day accepting water bills.

Clerk Richard Shafer and his feminine crew were stymied for a while in the morning and then began the task of putting all the records in the proper places.

City Manager Albert Glassford toted his old wooden clothes rack from the old City Hall personally and was busy with city business in short order even though his secretary, Mrs. Linnea Salow, didn't have her office in top condition until after noon.

As it stands, the workmen will be around for at least two more days but Glassford expects to have the new City Hall working efficiently by the start of Thursday's work day.

The Police department and all of its complicated radio and electronic equipment was in operation by late afternoon.

It was a hectic day for all, but everyone expressed delight at the move into the spanking, new quarters in the City Hall which was built at a cost of more than \$600,000.

Last to appear in an official capacity will be the City Commission which doesn't have its first official meeting in the new chambers until next Monday night.

Thus the project that started in mid-September of 1963 was finished on schedule despite a strike of electricians, an extremely cold winter, hot summer and the many other pitfalls that always come between starting date and the target date for completion.

The Municipal Building Au-

thority, headed by Harold Guenther, is expected to make a tour of inspection within a few days and then make plans for a formal opening for everyone in the city.

Largest, Finest Sears Store Yet Opens In Livonia

Sears Livonia Mall, finest and largest of all stores constructed by the huge chain, and its twin, Sears Macomb Mall, officially open doors for the first time Thursday with ribbon-cutting ceremonies slated for 8:55 a.m.—the doors swing open to customers at 9 o'clock.

Unofficially, Sears Livonia Mall opened for business Monday when visitors and customers from all parts of the area streamed into the magnificent building. They were recipients of 120,000 invitations extended to area residents for three days of pre-opening tours.

Mayor Harvey Moelke, members of the Livonia City Council, heads of city departments and local representatives in the State Senate and House will participate in the ribbon cutting.

The twin opening—Livonia and Macomb—is the second in Sears history and strange enough both were in the Detroit area. The first double came in 1928 when the Gratiot and Grand River stores were opened.

Board Hires 5 Teachers; 4 Resign

The Plymouth Board of Education Monday accepted the resignations of four teachers and approved contracts for five others on recommendation of Supt. Russell Isbister.

Three of the four resignations were from teachers who had accepted contracts and would have joined the staff for the first time. These included: Donald Cupps, Patricia Oldford and Jane Howard Smith.

The fourth was from Patricia Tucker who taught at Gallimore school last year.

The five newcomers include: Sally Jo Botzler, second grade at Farrand, and Marcia Raafaub, kindergarten at Farrand; Thomas Cavanaugh, mathematics and science at the Junior High; Ruth Heidorn, sixth grade at Junior High West; and Donald Chadderdon, strings-orchestra for Grades 5 through 12.

Miss Botzler is a recent graduate of Wayne State and will be in her first year of teaching.

Miss Raafaub, a graduate of Cortland College in New York, taught one year in Fremont, Ind.

Miss Heidorn, a graduate of Northern Illinois State College, has previous experience in Leipzig, Germany; Villa Park, Ill.; and in Livonia for the past two years.

Cavanaugh, who attended St. Joseph's College in Indiana and Eastern Michigan University, taught in Dearborn for two years.

Burroughs Sees Bright Future For Plymouth

Burroughs Corporation expects to boost its employment at the Plymouth plant to approximately 4,500 by mid-1965 from the 3,700 now on the payroll and is making plans for a huge civic and employee open house at the Plymouth facility by mid-year of 1965.

That was the statement of Herbert DeBorde, general manager of the Michigan Manufacturing Division, before the businessmen's form of the Plymouth Chamber of Commerce in the Hillside Inn. More than 50 attended the monthly meeting.

"Burroughs believes in Plymouth," DeBorde said. "Let me tell you of some of the ways we are expressing that confidence."

"Our corporation announced last December that the Detroit and Plymouth manufacturing and engineering divisions would be combined into one unit—at Plymouth."

The seven months since that announcement have seen the planning and the partial execution to consolidate Burroughs' two huge manufacturing plants under one roof in Plymouth.

"We used a task force of engineers to determine requirements and to completely re-layout the Plymouth facilities. Consolidation of plant and personnel has now been completed here in our tool division, in our special parts and tape-controlled fabricating division, in the maintenance office and shops and in our punch press area."

"At the present time we have 3,700 employees in Plymouth and before the Detroit manufacturing operations are completely closed out by approximately mid-1965, we will be bringing in another 500 to 700 workers from Detroit."

DeBorde pointed out that the Plymouth plant had been for 15 years the home of the highly successful sensimatic facility of accounting equipment.

The newest achievement in this product group, the Burroughs electronic direct accounting computer E2100 was acclaimed in Michigan and at the New York World's Fair as

the Michigan product-of-the-year.

"The E2100, which combines the best features of a computer and an accounting machine, was completely engineered and is being exclusively manufactured in Plymouth," DeBorde said.

"The E2100 racked up \$20 million worth of orders in its first four months. It will carry the 'Made in Plymouth, Mich.' mark to all 50 states plus 126 countries."

"The E2100 is symbolic of the fact that Burroughs, more than any other Michigan manufacturer, has been responsible for bringing electronics to Michigan."



School Board Asks Annexation Opinion

Contract for paving Allen School was awarded to the Thompson - McCulley Asphalt Paving Company by the Plymouth Board of Education Monday on its low bid of \$5,680. Three bids were submitted including: Stolaruk Asphalt Paving of Detroit, \$9,500; and Kiriluk & Company of Southfield, \$8,200. The Board will open bids for the construction of the additions to Farrand and Allen

School in a special meeting Thursday night. Members of the school board received notice that the Laphan School district, which has been sending students to Plymouth on a tuition basis for several years, will take a vote on Sept. 14 seeking approval of annexation to the Plymouth system. Only a majority vote of the electors going to the polls is needed to make the annexation official.

Supt. Russell Isbister told the Board that the Laphan School district already has received approval from the Washtenaw County Board and the State Department of Public Instruction for the move. Under statute passed two years ago, an adjoining district may seek annexation by vote of the electors and a green light from the County and State Boards. The statute also provides that

the district to which annexation is sought must accept. There isn't any sound basis for an appeal under the law although the Plymouth Board has asked Attorney William Sempliner for an opinion. A year ago, Laphan sent 22 students to Plymouth on a tuition basis. If the annexation is approved, an additional 23 in the kindergarten to grade six level will be added to the total.


The Plymouth Board is seeking an opinion on the legality of the annexation, the collection of tax monies from the new district and whether it has to accept the students this year or wait until next fall. The tax millage for a school district must be set prior to Sept. 1 and the Laphan election isn't until Sept. 14. Therefore, the question arises whether Laphan will set a 23.7 mill tax rate for schools

in accordance with that for the Plymouth district or whether it will set a lower rate. Plymouth is much interested either way—the first will assure it of the same tax rate as for the remainder of the school district, the second will mean that Laphan will be paying a lower rate. Leisure time is the direct result of greater efficiency.

Livonia Schools Borrow Money

The Livonia Board of Education at its meeting on last Thursday, authorized the borrowing of \$2,000,000 in anticipation of the receipt of state aid appropriations. According to school officials the Livonia district is entitled to approximately \$4,700,000 in State aid for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1965. Because of recurring delays in processing this money from the State to the local level, it is common practice of school districts to borrow some of the money

needed at low interest rates on short term loans until the tax monies are transferred to the schools. Ron Upton, business administrator said, "The \$2,000,000 will be used to pay for operating expenses until state reimbursement is received. "We will begin soliciting bids from banks shortly. The usual rates on these loans run around 1 1/2 per cent." The resolution to borrow was unanimously passed by the Board.



Teachers Compile Data On Job Opportunities

Suburban teachers concerned about the problems of school dropouts and achieving realistic vocational training for suburban employment-bound youths, interviewed scores of men and women who hire young people for jobs in Livonia, Plymouth, Redford, Farmington, and other northwestern metropolitan area communities.

A recent article in the Observer, which stressed the growing job opportunities for youth with training in such service occupations as deliverymen, nurses, food handlers, and related jobs, drew a great deal of attention and raised additional questions regarding the current drop-out rate in the United States.

STUDY YOUTH NEEDS

Trustees of the Livonia Board of Education and other school board members in the Schoolcraft College area recently reviewed and published a study of the curriculum needs of youth who did not plan to go to school much beyond the high school level.

Listed too, with the help of Livonia School Board and Schoolcraft College researchers, were selected occupations offering greater job opportunities for suburban youths. These were:

Johnson, who was chairman of the Schoolcraft College advisory committee which compiled the occupations having the greatest potential for suburban youth, praised the Workshop committee for helping to sharpen the identification of and the location of occupations for youth.

Newspaper Strike Enters Fifth Week

Detroit's newspaper strike goes into its fifth week with no end in sight and 1,213,000 subscribers scrambling for word about what's going on in stores, theaters and in the world.

It is the seventh time in nine years that the two newspapers, The Detroit News and Detroit Free Press, have been shut down by a labor dispute. The longest was forty-seven days in 1955.

The papers were struck by two local units of the International Printing Pressmen and Assistants Union of North America. They are Local 13 of the Pressmen's union and Local 10 of the Paper and Platehandlers Union.

Since then the two papers have laid off about two thirds of their 4,100 employees. Lawrence Wallace, Secretary of the Detroit Publishers' Association which represents the two newspapers in the dispute, said there were 291 pressmen and 150 platehandlers employed prior to the strike.

Three major issues which have blocked a settlement are:

1. A Pressmen's demand that the Free Press pay time and a half for work done on Saturday on the Sunday edition.

2. A Pressmen's demand that The News employ 16 men and one apprentice on each 8 unit press.

3. A Platehandlers' demand that the number of men assigned to new equipment be settled before the equipment is put into use rather than afterwards as provided in an arbiters' award of a previous negotiation impasse.

In a letter to Free Press employees Publisher Lee Hills said the Saturday premium pay demand was an attempt to extend to that newspaper a practice which had begun during the life of the Detroit Times.

With fewer pressmen available, Hills wrote, The News and Times hired the same pressmen to print the Saturday and Sunday editions, paying overtime for the work on the Sunday paper.

Since the Times folded The News has continued premium wages for Saturday night work although the practice of double shifts and overtime work has been abandoned. Attempts to get it out of the contract have failed, Hills said.

Hills also wrote that the pressmen have a 35 hour week at the Free Press and that the paper now pays three press crews overtime for early show-ups on Saturday in advance of the normal 7 p.m. start of the Saturday night trick.

Freeman Frazee, president of the pressmen's local, in a statement issued today said "I am particularly amazed at the reluctance of The Free Press to pay time and a half on Saturday nights and Sunday morn-

ings because of the fact that The Detroit News and Detroit Times paid time and a half for Saturday night and Sunday work for many years.

"And in fact The News still recognizes that for the Saturday night and Sunday operations for the Sunday publications by hiring men for 10 hour shifts with a guarantee of two days pay, which is a half day's pay more than The Free Press pressmen are requesting."

In the press manning dispute at The News, Frazee said the union wanted 16 men and an apprentice on each of the recently installed eight unit presses.

He said The News, under protest, had been working that many men since the presses were installed but that in the current negotiations had first sought to reduce the number to 12, later agreed to 15.

"An eight unit press, by mechanical adjustments made by competent newspaper pressmen, can print a 128 page newspaper at rate of 60,000 to 70,000 an hour," Frazee said.

"This simply means that the publishers in the year 1964 can print almost double the number of pages. Also, the press speed in 10 years has been doubled."

Wallace said that on April 30 the Pressmen proposed a 15-man press crew. The publishers, he said, "reluctantly" agreed to the figure during subsequent negotiations. Shortly before the strike, he went on, the union increased the demand to 16. The News publishers early had proposed crews varying from 11 to 14 on the new equipment.

The Platehandlers' demand is an outgrowth of an arbiters' ruling that The Free Press could install new equipment and determine the number of men to be assigned to it. The union retained the right to file a grievance if it did not agree with the manning quotas.

The demand in the current negotiations is that the new equipment not be put into production until an agreement is reached or arbitration completed on manning quotas.

Hills termed the demand an attempt to obtain veto power over installation of new equipment.

The Platehandlers also have demanded Saturday premium pay similar to that sought by

the Pressmen from the Free Press.

The Publishers had reached agreement with 10 other unions—including all newspaper craft unions—in both plants prior to the Pressmen's strike.

Wallace said the Pressmen and Platehandlers were offered contracts comparable to those agreed to by the other locals.

The Paperhandlers work a 37½-hour week on either day or night shifts. Pressmen work 37½ hours on the day shift, 35 hours at night.

The Pressmen were receiving \$140.55 base pay weekly for day work, \$141.70 weekly base pay for night work. The Platehandlers were paid \$121.65

base weekly for day work. \$126.90 base weekly for night work. Premium pay and fringe benefits were in addition to the base pay.

The Pressmen were offered a 21-month contract with a \$4.55 base wage increase the first year, either a \$4.90 increase the second or \$2.50 a week cash increase plus a four week vacation after five years of service.

Neither side will estimate when there might be a break in the deadlock. The two sides last met Monday, July

20, made no progress and recessed subject to call by state and federal mediators. Frazee said the unions' international president, Anthony J. DeAndrade, has been asked to come to Detroit but is not expected until next week.

In a television interview shortly after the strike began Platehandlers' President Bart Piscitello said it could last 13 weeks. He said he understood the Publishers had strike insurance covering that period.

In his letter to employees, Hills said the Free Press had

suspension insurance but that it did not cover continuing overhead, adding:

"This strike in the first week alone cost The Free Press more in expenses and lost revenue than the paper could ever recover from insurance if the strike lasted for months."



After two rough and tumble campaigns in Livonia I shall never forget the scene of seeing the Mayor of Livonia, Harvey Moelke's wife Betty, going out of her way to speak to the wife of one of her husband's most severe critics at a reception, where the critic had left her (to fill his punch cup again) and she was surrounded by strangers. It was a warm and generous gesture—natural with the person—and incidentally, one of Mayor Moelke's greatest assets, too.

Union, Board Talk Policy in Schools

Meetings are currently being held between the Livonia Public Schools administrators and representatives of 90 Board transportation employees to formulate recommendations on personnel policies affecting bus drivers. The suggested policy revisions will be presented to the Board of Education for consideration at a fall meeting.

Concurrently transportation and other employees were being advised changes in bus routes, of the additional services to be given under the new State law to non-public schools, and legal or policy changes which affected school children, parents, and the drivers of school vehicles.

Assistant Superintendent Ron Upton said, "We are meeting with representatives of employees charged with the responsibility of transporting Livonia youngsters to and from school. We want to make sure that these non-teaching members of the team continue to work under good conditions. If we plan ahead together we can coordinate the work of men and machines and continue to give taxpayers who pay the bill the services they pay for."

The group will pass on to the Board their recommendations on job policies, conditions of employment, and related matters. Transportation employees' representatives were led by Mrs. Mabel Ammon, chairman of the bus drivers unit, and Edward Heymeyer, President of Local 118 of the American Federation of State, County, Municipal Employees.

"Any decisions we make will be based upon what is good for the students," Upton stated. "Most of the problems we have are due largely to the rapid expansion of this school district. The department which transports our school kids and our school supplies has increased five-fold since 1955. As our system adjusts to such rapid growth, we must revise and adjust our policies with our program periodically."

**Principal's New
Salary Schedule
Gets Approval**

Livonia School Board President Robert Cain has been meeting with the Principals' Committee headed by Carl Bovee to work out a formula for their salary schedule.

The Board met in executive (secret) session 7:30 last Thursday night for President Cain to talk over with his Board the salary proposals which all agreed to unanimously.

"With the principals accepting our proposal I think one important fact shall be told, stated Cain. "The principals have been willing to go along working with us for a salary schedule they have never really had. This year is just the first step in fulfilling our responsibility toward them."

The base salary of the principals has always been based on the teachers' salary schedule.

Presently this has not changed with the exception of several points of increment arrived at for principals are independent increments.

Their base pay is still the maximum salary for teachers which this year was raised \$300 to \$8900.

Maximum salary for elementary Principals is \$13,500; Junior High School maximum \$14,000. Maximum raise is \$900.

Other increments approved by the Board Thursday night were as follows:

Administrative Increments: Increments for the added responsibilities of the administrative position shall be granted to elementary and junior high school principals and high school assistant principals up to a maximum of \$900.

Advanced Training Increment: Increments for advanced training beyond the master's degree shall be calculated at \$10 per semester hour up to a maximum of 30 hours, with \$600 granted for 45 hours or the education specialist's degree, and \$900 for the doctorate.

Administrative Experience Increment:

Increments for administrative experience shall be granted, on the superintendent's recommendation, on the basis of \$150 per year for elementary and junior high school principals up to a maximum of ten years; for all assistant principals the amount will be calculated at \$100 per year up to a maximum of ten years.

**Annexation
Ruling Won't
Be Appealed**

A ruling by Wayne County Circuit Judge John Wise against Livonia's contention that petitions filed for incorporation of the "city of Westland" were invalid won't be appealed.

Judge Wise handed down his decision July 16, after Livonia Mayor Harvey Moelke had contended that Livonia's petitions for annexation of a northern part of Nankin Township had been filed earlier than the incorporation petitions, and thus should have been acted upon first.

Subsequent changes in boundaries of the land in question were cited by Judge Wise in his decision.

City Attorneys asked Councilmen for a decision on whether or not to appeal the decision Wednesday night, but were told "no".

State Leads Nation In Boating Deaths

LANSING—Michigan, which is rapidly becoming the motor-boating mecca of the United States, had the dubious honor of also leading the nation in the number of fatalities coming as the result of boat accidents.

Michigan recorded 67 boating fatalities last year to rank No. 1 in the country. Meanwhile, the state rated second in the total number of boats registered at the time of the report with more than 300,000 registrations.

The Secretary of State's office which numbers all motorboats picked up during the warm months this year, and a total

of 335,770 boats have been registered through the first six months of this year.

Secretary of State James M. Hare estimates that Michigan could register at least 500,000 motorboats if all owners would register their craft. "I'm sure many persons are unaware that all motorboats have to be registered and numbered," Hare said. "They may get this registration by paying a \$3 registration fee at most branch offices of the Secretary of State, certain marinas, several sheriff's offices, or by writing direct to our Lansing office, Watercraft, 300 East Michigan

Avenue, Lansing, Michigan. In other boating accident notes, a total of 257 accidents were reported. Michigan was third in the nation in this category. Non-fatal injury accidents totaled 83, while property damage was involved in 107 of the mishaps.

Hare, who is also Chairman of the Michigan State Safety Commission, urged the growing army of boating enthusiasts "to observe all the rules of good boating safety on Michigan's many lakes and other bodies of water. Just as in automobile driving, there are good and bad boaters . . . but unfortunately

we have no water point system where licenses can be revoked for bad boating."

State Representative Candidates Speak to Local Voters

(Editor's Note: From now until the final election, in November, The Observer will welcome statements on issues by rival candidates for various public offices. We'll edit them, as to length, and will attempt to give the same amount of space, each week, in the same story, to opponents.)

Candidates for the State Legislature in Livonia's two House districts continued their campaigns at full steam this week, with less than three weeks to go before the September 1

primary election.

Ed Dymek, one of eight candidates for the Democratic nomination in the 35th District, which includes most of Livonia and Northville, spoke to the Northville-Plymouth Democratic Club last Friday.

"With eight names on the ballot," Dymek told the group, "each voter must become aware of what these candidates have accomplished for the Democratic Party and what they will do for the Democratic voter. I have had six active years in the Democratic Party. I am a member

of the executive board of the Livonia Democratic Club and I have worked full-time in each of our elections in the last five years.

"Apparently my Democratic background is good enough to warrant my being selected as the only candidate in the 35th district to be endorsed by COPE. And that's saying a lot for someone who has never been a member of a union and who is a member of Burrough's supervision. Now if anyone implies that this makes me a captive candidate, then I must admit they are right. I do admit

to being a captive candidate to the people who work for a living. I am a captive to those who worry about a living, and I do concern myself with those who need protection to keep on living in dignity."

One of Dymek's opponents for the post, David Jones, told voters this week: "The population explosion and the growth problems of this state make it mandatory that the office of State Representative be filled by full time professionals trained for the job. The only way our laws can be implemented under the new

Constitution is to elect people to public office who have experience and knowledge to accomplish the task.

"As assistant director of Public Works in Livonia, it's been my duty to write and promote through the City Council a new \$6 million master sanitary sewer program; a new water rate study that has reduced the cost of water to residents by over 16 per cent (Livonia now has the lowest water rates in Wayne County except Detroit) and coordinate and promote federal grant applications through the Acceler-

ated Public Works Program and Open Space acquisitions.

"The experience gained in acquiring nearly a million dollars in federal aid for Livonia will be used to promote stronger laws on air and water pollution and to preserve the natural resources so precious to all of the people of this state. My experience before the House in talking on Towns and Counties convinced me that new, more vigorous, and knowledgeable representatives are needed."

Meanwhile, in Livonia's four

southerly precincts (between Joy Rd. and the C & O Railroad, Merriman and Middlebelt), which are tacked on to Nankin and Dearborn to form the 33rd district, Bernard Kosteva, who seeks the Democratic nomination, told voters his background this week.

"I feel I have the experience needed to fulfill this important post in the best needs of the people of Livonia and other parts of the district," Kosteva said. He promised "to support and sponsor any measures that will bring into being conditions that will result in the best

interest of our children, our schools, our homes and communities." A World War II Naval veteran, Kosteva is active in the League of Nankin Democratic Voters, the Peoples Community H.S. Political Authority, homeowners associations, and the American Legion. He is a member of the Nankin Township Board.

Livonians heard another candidate for the 33rd district seat this week. Tom McLennan, GOP hopeful, blasted the new state apportionment law before a "Livonia for McLennan Committee" meeting at the home of Betsy Tagami.

McLennan cited the 33rd district, which includes parts of four municipalities, three congressional districts, and two senatorial districts in its midst. "Anyone who is familiar with a campaign organization would recognize the absurdity of a district which lies in three congressional districts," he said. "Further, this gerrymandered plan shows absolute disregard for the needs of suburban voters who had been under-represented before, and will conceivably be misrepresented now."

McLennan pledged at the meeting to do everything in his power to correct the situation as it now stands. When asked if he would jeopardize a house seat he may well hold, he replied, "I'm in this race because the suburban voter needs a voice in Lansing. I would rather serve my district well for two years and lose my seat through sensible reapportionment than encourage such gerrymandering to continue. While I am in the process of familiarizing myself with Livonia's special problems, I nonetheless feel that we all want the same things generally—sincerity and honesty in government, as well as representation of our special needs. I will continue to dedicate myself to these tasks."

State Gets Tough With Bad Drivers

LANSING—Michigan's problem drivers are receiving the "get tough" treatment from the state's enforcement agencies, a report covering activities in the driver improvement program of the Secretary of State's office revealed.

Secretary of State James M. Hare said revocations and suspensions on Michigan's point system were up more than 2,500 during the first six months of 1964.

Of this total, 563 licenses were revoked, while 6,268 were suspended. Totals in 1963 were 289 revocations and 4,030 suspensions. "Vigorous action in suspensions and revocations has brought about a reduction in the number of licenses restricted," Hare said.

Tempering the tougher treatment of the chronic problem drivers is an acceleration of the positive aspect of driver services . . . the driver improvement program through the multiple interview programs, the newly-established conference interview programs, and the warning letters to persons who are at the seven-, eight-, and nine-point levels.

Multiple interview instructions increased more than 1,000 during the first half of 1964, while warning letters went up from 15,775 last year to more than 40,000 already in 1964.

In the other phase of the driver licensing program, mandatory suspensions for felonies, drunk driving, and reckless driving went up nearly 600 from 2,988 to 3,584. Unsatisfied judgment suspensions under financial responsibility laws jumped from 1,922 to 2,434. Accident suspensions were up from 2,693 to 3,110.






Tax Hike For County Endorsed

At its regular meeting last Thursday, the Livonia School Board went on record as supporting a one-mill county tax limitation increase proposal which will be on the Sept. 1, 1964 primary ballot.

Trustee Strela Schreiber, who is also recording secretary for the Wayne County Association of School Boards, explained the purpose of the proposal and urged that Livonia voters support it at the ballot box next month.

Mrs. Schreiber moved that the Livonia Board join other school boards in Wayne County in supporting the proposal. After a short discussion the Board gave its unanimous approval.

Board Vice-President Steve Polgar raised the question of the propriety of one governmental unit backing another agency's legislation to obtain additional funds, but Assistant Superintendent of the District Ronald Upton assured Mr. Polgar the County needed the additional funds, and if they could not raise the extra mill to run its county-wide program the money would come from the local school board allocations. Mr. Polgar then agreed to vote "aye."

"Under the old law the County had a 15-mill limitation," Mrs. Schreiber pointed out. "Under the new constitution the limit is 18 mills. However, instead of requesting a three-mill increase the County is seeking a one-mill addition this fall.

"The County needs these additional funds. If they cannot raise the extra mill to run its county-wide program the money will have to come indirectly from local school board allocations. Having these tax monies flow directly to the County is more efficient than having the funds drained away from Livonia, Farmington, Plymouth, Redford, and other school board coffers," concluded Mrs. Schreiber.

There are 43 school districts represented in the Wayne County Association of School Boards. In a statement sent to all participants early this month recording secretary Mrs. Schreiber wrote, "that it should be pointed out to our members that all of our districts with the exception of one have had to increase their local millages in order to meet added school costs. 



Livonians Asked to Help Beat Poindexter Ordinance

Livonia residents opposed to the proposed "Poindexter Homeowner's Ordinance" in Detroit are being asked to contribute time and financial help to the fight for its defeat at the September 1 primary election. The proposed ordinance — which critics charge would solidify racial discrimination and prejudice in housing — is the target of a campaign organized by Citizens for United Detroit, headed by Mayor James Cavanagh and the Very Rev. Dean John Weaver.

Local support was asked this week in a letter to members from the Livonia Citizens for Better Human Relations. "As residents of Livonia," the local organization said, "some here may be reluctant to ask Detroiters to defeat the issue. However, the results of the voting will have wide repercussion, and we in the immediate area will be closely involved. We do relate directly to the city of Detroit in many areas, and most Livonians pay taxes to

the City of Detroit. This issue concerns Livonians." The committee asked for volunteers to staff the Citizens for United Detroit headquarters at 4750 Woodward, for door-to-door workers who will explain the issue to voters, and for financial aid. More than \$40,000 is needed for the campaign, they said. The Detroit organization may be contacted at 832-0550. Explaining the issue further, the Livonia group said, "Although it has been called un-

constitutional by prominent lawyers even before the balloting, though leaders of all the major religious faiths in Detroit have branded it as fostering prejudice, bigotry, and hate, there appears to be a major fight ahead for votes." 



Lakepointe Sub Approved Without a Playground

After considerable discussion pro and con on whether Builder Fred Greenspan should have a playground in plots No. 8 and 9 in Lakepointe Village, the Plymouth Township planning commission in a special meeting approved preliminary plans for the two subdivisions as presented—without the playground.

Greenspan through Township Engineer Herald Hamill presented the preliminary plans two weeks ago at a meeting and the commission withheld a decision until it learned what had happened to the playground in the original plans.

C. W. Koch recalled that there had been such acreage set aside and asked the builder for an explanation.

In the special session, Greenspan explained that it would set his plans back as much as a year and a half if he was forced to revise them to include the playground.

At this point, he received backing from Township Attorney Earl Demel who advised the commission that it did not have the authority to force a developer to include a playground in his plans.

"If the developer desires to make a gift of such land,

he has that option," said Demel, "but the planning commission does not have the power to force him to make allowances for a playground."

Supervisor Roy Lindsay told the commission that he felt a playground shouldn't be considered a necessity.

"Other builders have donated playgrounds," Lindsay said. "People in the subdivision appreciate the play area but none want to live in homes surrounding it. Matter of fact, most of the time they want the township to build high fences to keep the kids off their property."

"There are other things to take into consideration. The Township Board doesn't have the money to properly equip a playground and there's the problem of policing and care of the land. There's a lot more money involved in this than meets the eye. I don't think we should try and force an issue over which, our attorney already has told us, we have no jurisdiction."

With the admonishments from both sources, the commission voted on the proposals and approved preliminary plans for both.

At the same time, however, members gave unanimous backing to another local candidate—Thomas Foley, who is running for a seat on the new Court of Appeals.

Vallier, a member of the County Board of Supervisors, announced his candidacy on the Democratic ticket just before the deadline to register. He's one of three Democrats seeking the 14th District nomination.

The local Democrats acted Friday, after hearing 18 candidates speak at their regular membership meeting, asking for support.

Only other Democrat to get the Plymouth organization's nod was Joe B. Sullivan, candidate for Wayne County Prosecuting Attorney.

"We certainly need a change in the prosecutor of Wayne County," Orville Tungeate, candidate for Plymouth Township Supervisor, said. "Now is the time for men of integrity in the Democratic Party, as well as independent voters, to get out and make this change."

The four are Nils Eklund, taking graphics and illustration, sophomore year who spent the summer painting . . . Halmark Award, Scholastic Art Keys.



Wednesday, The Observer for the first time offers that inexpensive means of communication to anyone. There are 11,000 homes in the Farmington area. This brings some 40,000 new readers which our reporters and editors now must serve with the kind of news which is important to their lives. For our advertisers, the new Farmington market is a "bonus" of some 20 percent. The same ad, seen by 20 percent more people than before, will bring increased sales and profit and general retail prosperity. To advertisers located in Farmington itself, The Observer offers a sales weapon never before available, and one which has worked to the profit and respect of merchants elsewhere over a wide section of northwestern metropolia.

Farmington merchants are going to be surprised. Many do not realize how handicapped they have been heretofore in their effort to stir sales. In recent years Facts and Opinions has become extremely discouraged with the increase in juvenile and teen-age mischief in our communities. For some time it has been a belief that much of it comes from the breakdown of desire to discipline by parents . . . or at least, a ducking of responsibility there. Recently we read of a Judge out west who said he had seen a reduction in the amount of juvenile crime in his community after he instituted a policy of giving his court actions wide newspaper publicity. (As contrasted to the general policy here and in most places of withholding publication of names of offenders if they are 17 years old or younger.)

The Observer always has withheld juvenile names in police matters, but we do it with misgivings. Such a policy protects the parents of delinquents; shields them from public embarrassment and disapproval. And we maintain that the place from which corrective action best can come is the home. Anyway, Facts and Opinions took the question to Judge James Lincoln, the Wayne County juvenile court expert. Lincoln returned his views in a letter, parts of which follow. Main point of interest is that Judge Lincoln has no sympathy for the "publish the names" suggestion. He writes: "It would not decrease delinquency to change the law. I should be on the Bench five years next May, and I have repeatedly invited news reporters to come to my Tuesday Waiver Docket. They walk out after an hour or two. No news reporter has ever sat through one complete docket.

"The newspapers do not write about the 'run of the mill' case-hardened delinquent. There must be something especially shocking about an incident to catch their attention. They get the names from the Police and four out of five of the times they print names, they refer to boys who are not case-hardened delinquents, but are involved in something that makes news. "For the most part, newspapers are not interested and make little effort to inform themselves about the day to day problems of Juvenile Court. They are interested in news and from this point of view, the "run of the mill" case is dull. "The juveniles who give me the most trouble do not read newspapers anyway. Over eighty percent of the juveniles in the Youth Home never graduate from high school. Eighty-six percent of them are two years or more being actual grade placement in reading level. The sixteen year olds average over four years behind grade placement in their reading levels. I am very certain that most of the juveniles in the Youth Home are unaware of the newspaper strike in Detroit and would be unaware of it if they were outside except for a curtailed opportunity to hold up newspaper boys.

"New York treats sixteen year olds as adults. They can print the names of sixteen year olds and they are having more trouble than Michigan. "What makes you think that the papers would cover Juvenile Court any more than Recorder's or Circuit Court? They only print the names of a few of the 17 or 18 year olds largely in the cases that have some aspect that makes them newsworthy. "You suggest printing the names of repeaters only. Why not put case-hardened delinquents in training schools? "I have had to turn loose many boys because of the lack of space, but I never saw one that would be rehabilitated by printing his name. I have seen cases where printing names hurt. "One boy who had never been in trouble got his name and picture in the papers on a murder charge. His brother had committed the murder. When I released him he had acquired a reputation due to the newspaper publicity, so he started living up to his reputation by pulling fire alarms, etc. "Since I have been on the Bench, the papers have printed the names of many boys involved in trouble. In no case has printing the name ever helped, but I know of cases where it hurt.
