

"Is that so?" you say. "Yep, they didn't do nothing - nothing at all." My pal stuffs an odiferous tube of dark brown tobacco in his face and, filling the room with dense clouds of choking vapor, warms to his subject. An hour later he concludes with the observation:

"And you know some-thing else? All they're interested in around here is turning out little egg-heads .Waddaya think about that?"
