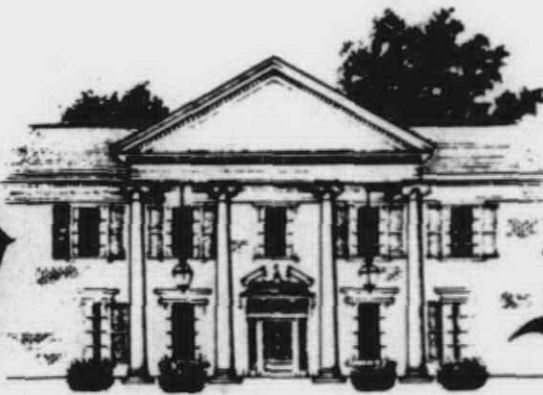

## Cape told his new Byron Ave. paving illegal, seek test

The City of Plymouth Commission Monday night told builder Thomas Cape that he had illegally paved a city street, but that they would hold off action until tests of the paving were made.

Cape had requested permission to pave Byron Ave. between Harvey and McKinley, but they had told him to wait until they heard from their engineering firm, Johnson and Anderson.

Rene Peters, the City's project engineer, had a report ready, but it was too late. The street had been paved by Thompson, McCully, the company currently paving Plymouth streets.

City Attorney Edward Draugelis said the street had been paved in violation of the law, and advised the Commission that "no private person has the right to improve a public right-of-way."

Commissioner Arch Vallier asked if he had obtained a permit, and was told Cape didn't need one, according to City ordinances.

COMMISSIONER James Jabara questioned Cape about his actions, but Cape exploded, apparently mad at Vallier, and moved over towards him. He accused Vallier of saying something under his breath:

"Arch, I don't like that kind of language."

Vallier then said: "Have a policeman come up and eject this man from the meeting." Vallier said he didn't say anything.

Cape retorted: "That's a lie. Alright, Arch, I'd like to get back to this," indicating his plans.

"As a City official do I have to take this kind of language. I'd like a ruling from our attorney," Vallier said.

City Attorney Edward Draugelis said he hadn't heard any remark from Vallier, and told Cape:

"You're a guest here. You have no right to insult any Commissioner." Draugelis further indicated that the matter was a problem for the chair.

Mayor James Houk then said: "Things have gotten out of line several times recently."

CAPE THEN was asked to explain his actions. He said he came home from work, and the workers had leveled the road off, preparing it for paving.

"We decided... we wanted so badly to get this project finished... so we would have happy tenants."

Houk then said: "If you put people in there before your buildings were ready it was your responsibility."

Jabara then told Cape: "If you could sit on both

sides of the fence you can understand our feelings." Cape said that Jabara would understand better if he had come down and looked at the scene. Jabara said he had been there, as had the rest of the Commission.

The matter was tabled after discussing who should pay for the tests of the paving... Cape or the City. Cape admitted that he had not fulfilled the first requirement of the engineer's recommendations, that of a special bore being made to check for thickness.

COMMISSIONER George Hudson commented: "I have doubts whether or not the work was done legally, and whether or not the City should ask him to remove it."

Cape is the builder of the Bryn Mawr apartment development on Byron Ave. He had requested that the City dedicate him a portion of the land so he could meet land requirements for additional units.

They told him no. He then had asked to pave the street, but the Commission deferred action pending (Continued on Page 3)

## Citizen asks aid on bike riders

Bike riding in the City came before the City Commission at its regular Monday night meeting, with a letter and a personal appearance from Kenneth Bisbee, 440 N. Harvey.

Bisbee said he was concerned about the bike riding safety problem in the community, and wanted a licensing setup for bikes established.

City Attorney Edward Draugelis said that bicycle riders can ride on either the street or the sidewalk. Commissioner James McKeon asked if other ordinances had ever been considered, and Mayor James Houk urged action on the matter.

"It is a lack of communication between school officials, parents and police," Bisbee said.

The City leaders decided to add the matter to the general police report within a month.

Bisbee read a letter to the Commission, which said, in part:

"I am a parent and taxpayer and have lived here for

over fifteen years. I am vitally concerned, as no doubt you are, with preventing people from being killed or injured on our streets and highways.

"On March 16, 1964, I formed the 'Concerned Citizens For Saving Lives on Highways' and probably some of you are among the six hundred who joined in this grass roots effort.

"I am writing you today because of the shocking way in which children, youth and even adults are riding bicycles on our city streets and sidewalks in direct violation of our Michigan state laws and our City ordinances.

"At present, as you know, six to eleven year old boys and girls are riding bicycles in our city streets. They are riding on the left side of the road, two on a bike, going through stop lights, making 'u' turns and other illegal turns and many times three and four abreast.

"The tragic thing is that we parents and the police are (Continued on Page 3)

He moved to Plymouth in 1955, was a 1961 graduate of Plymouth High School and attended Ferris State University where he was affiliated with Theta Xi Fraternity. He was employed by Selle Buick, Plymouth.

## Two cab companies to serve Plymouth

The City Commission granted taxi cab licenses to two companies Monday night, ending two months of debate on the issue of poor taxi service in Plymouth.

Checker Cab Co. of Livonia was granted five, and a new company, the Plymouth Cab Company, was granted another five. The new company will be run by Plymouthite John Florence.

Two weeks ago, the Commission had asked for written statements from each of the two applicants for the licenses, seeking their comments on the type of service they would render.

There was considerable discussion on the matter before it was finally decided. Commissioner George Hudson moved that eight licenses be given to Checker Cab Co., but his motion was defeated 4-3.

COMMISSIONER GEORGE Lawton was among those voting no, and said the City ought to take advantage of the chance to create a competitive situation. Commissioner Arch Vallier did not agree, and said that Checker ought to be given until December 31 of this year. Hudson agreed with Vallier, and said: "A split business is going to end up with no business."

Lawton then moved to grant five to each applicant, and the number allowed in the City from eight to ten. Hudson and Vallier voted against the move, with the rest of the Commission voting yes.

Mayor James Houk expressed his opinion on the matter: "It is just as reasonable to be competitive in that business as in any other."

Both companies agreed in writing to several things. John Florence wrote the following:

"Four cabs will be available for service twenty-four hours a day.

"This is my own operation, no one else has any financial interest in it.

"I intend to buy four new cabs to be put into service as soon as possible after I obtain licenses. I have arranged for the financing of these cabs and have mortgaged my home for the down payments and that cash is in the bank and immediately available.

"There will be a fifth car available to put into service if any of the cabs should be laid up for repairs, and which will be used to make package deliveries so that none of the cabs will be tied up in that service. I have drivers available who will go to work as soon as the cabs are on the street. These drivers are all Plymouth men.

"I have entered into an arrangement with a local repair garage which has promised me that my cabs will have priority for service, and they have further promised me

that any cab will be back on the street within two hours except for body or painting repairs.

"I have entered into a lease with the Yellow Cab Company of Livonia to furnish me telephone answering and radio dispatching service. My arrangement with Yellow Cab is that I am to be called at once if difficulties or anything of an unusual nature arise.

"I said before that I intend to give Plymouth full twenty-four service with local cabs and local employees. Without detracting from that, I say that I presently contemplate, because of my knowledge of the taxicab business, to have four cabs in service on the streets of Plymouth from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m., two cabs on the streets of Plymouth from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. and (Continued on Page 3)

## JC president's wife dies in car crash

Bernice E. Fletcher, 32, wife of Joseph R. Fletcher, 12176 Amherst Ct., died Aug. 2 in St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, Ann Arbor, after the car she was driving collided broadside with a truck on Plymouth Rd., near US-23 in Ann Arbor Township.

Mrs. Fletcher was the wife of well known civic leader and JayCee president Joseph Fletcher.

The truck was driven onto Plymouth Rd. from a driveway moments before the accident, according to Washtenaw County sheriff's deputies.

Mrs. Fletcher was pinned inside her car after the car hit the truck, demolishing the front of her vehicle, officers said. She was traveling southwest on rain-soaked Plymouth Rd. toward Ann Arbor.

The driver of the truck, Chester T. Wojtowicz, 35, of Detroit, and his passenger, Charles D. Zorn, 38, also of Detroit, were taken to St. Joseph Mercy Hospital for treatment.

Mrs. Fletcher was born June 29, 1933 in Bound Brook, N.J., the daughter of John N. and Gertrude Winseman Appar. She came to Plymouth in Dec. 1959 from Cleveland and was a member of the First United Presbyterian Church.

She is survived by her husband, Joseph R. Fletcher; two daughters, Pamela and Kelly; and a son, Scott, all at home; her parents Mr. and Mrs. John Appar of (Continued on Page 3)

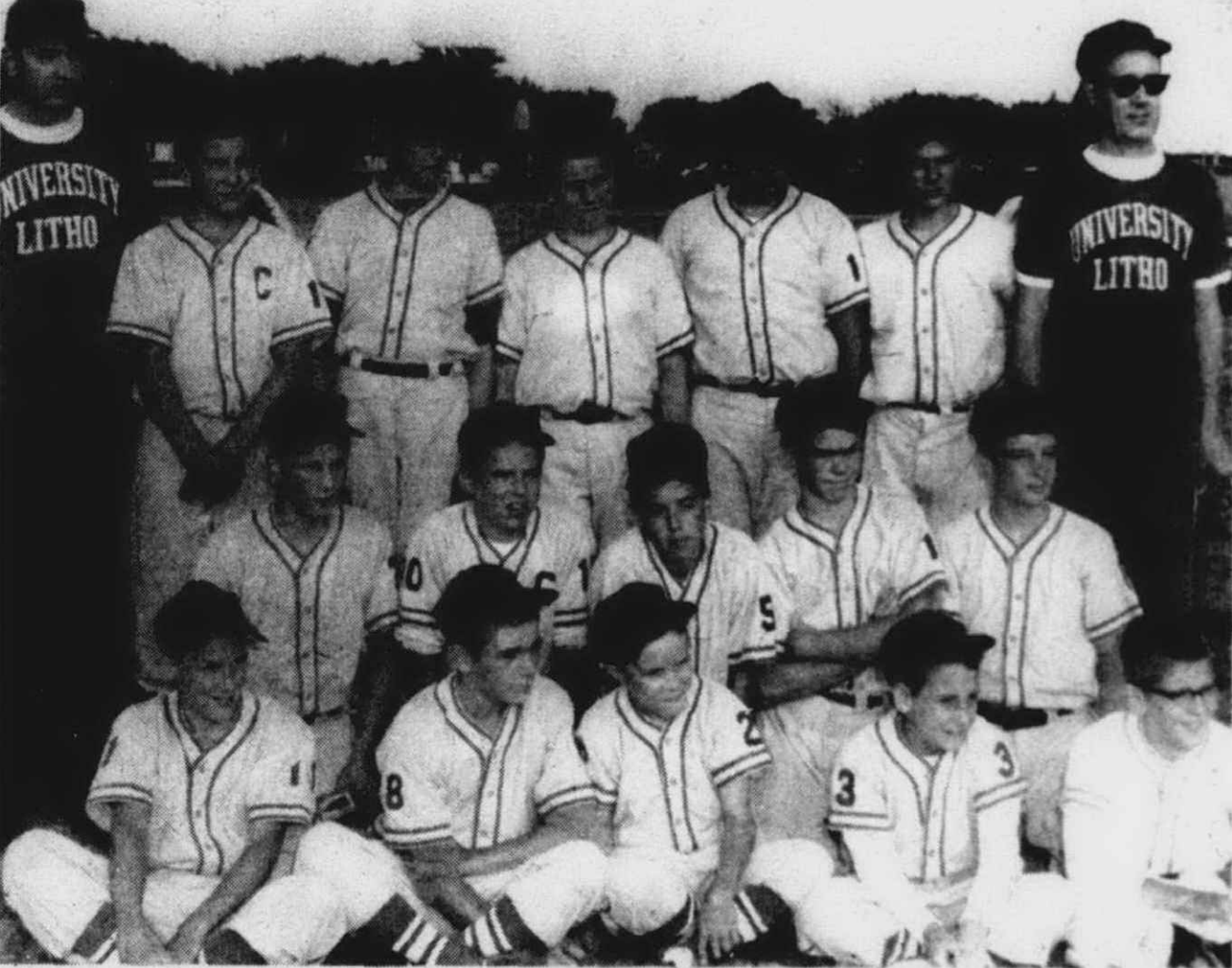

## Plymouth Township minutes

JULY 13, 1965  
Supervisor McEwen called the meeting to order at 8:00 P.M., all members being present.

The minutes of the meeting of June 8, 1965, and the Special meeting held June 22, 1965, were read and unanimously approved as submitted.

The list of bills as presented with the agenda, amounting to \$16,528.89, was discussed and approved, on a motion by Gene Overholt, read, supported by Ralph Garber.

Supervisor John D. McEwen read the Resolution of the Board of Supervisors of Wayne County, honoring our departed Township Supervisor, and presented this Resolution and one by the Plymouth Township Board to Mrs. Evelyn Lunday, his widow.

Bids for the Sheldon Road Water Main project were received and upon a motion by Elizabeth Holmes, supported by Louis Norman, bids were closed at 8:08 P.M. Carried unanimously.

Engineer Harold Hamill recommended the contract for construction be awarded to the low bidder, S. Weissman Excavating Company, in the amount of \$102,840.00. It was moved by Elizabeth Holmes, supported by Louis Norman, that we accept the recommendation and the contract be awarded subject to the receipt of an easement from Dr. Elvidge.

It was moved by Dick Lauterbach, supported by Ralph Garber, that items listed under General Communications be received and filed. Carried unanimously.

Upon a motion by Ralph Garber, supported by Louis Norman, the Board accepted the recommendation of D. P. W. Superintendent Matthew McLellan and authorized the purchase of a Van-type cab-over truck from Leo M. Calhoun Ford Agency in the amount of \$2,377.85. Carried unanimously.

Elizabeth Holmes supported a motion by C. F. Sparks that Mr. Ralph Garber be appointed to fill the unexpired term of C. V. Sparks on the Plymouth Township Planning Commission, said term ending July 1967.

Mr. Lauterbach requested that the record state the reason for the nay vote. Mr. Lauterbach: Opposed to the overbalance of Planning Commission members who reside west of Sheldon Road. Mr. Norman: Definitely in favor of more representatives from the east side of Sheldon Road. Mr. Overholt: At one time the Commission members were equally represented, but it now appears to be out of balance.

The following method is recommended for appointment by the Fire Administration:

An application for membership is reviewed by the Fire Department and Board. If deemed satisfactory, the application is referred to the Township Board for action. If approved, the applicant is placed on the payroll on a probationary status. His performance is reviewed at the end of the 90-day period, and, if satisfactory, he is given a tentative approval as a member. At the end of one year, if satisfactory to both the Fire Department and the Administration Board, he is given final approval to membership.

A motion made by Gene Overholt that we accept the method recommended by the Fire Administration Board for appointment of part-paid members of the Plymouth Township Fire Department was supported by Dick Lauterbach and carried unanimously.

The Recreation Committee report was again tabled until the completion of the 701 Program, upon the motion of Louis Norman, supported by Dick Lauterbach.

Policies relative to vacation and sick leave for Township employees were submitted, amended and adopted, upon a motion by C. V. Sparks, supported by Gene Overholt, carried unanimously. (Copy on file at the Township offices.)

Engineer Hamill recommended

that the plans for sanitary sewer and water mains for the Twin Arrows Subdivision be approved. It was moved by Ralph Garber, supported by Elizabeth Holmes, that the Engineer's recommendation be concurred in. Carried unanimously.

Plans of the Water Project in the southeast section of the Township were tabled for one month until the Engineer could consult with contractors relative to the project.

Members of the Hornback family were present and requested assistance in locating a place for rubbish disposal for those residents of Plymouth Township they now service. It was pointed out by the Supervisor that the prevailing contract between the Township and the current Haggerty Dump is for Township residents personal use and the operation for private contractors is under the jurisdiction of the respective owners. He further stated he would attempt to locate an area for their use.

Upon a motion of Ralph Garber, supported by Louis Norman, and carried unanimously, Elizabeth Holmes was authorized to sign an agreement for a pipe line crossing with the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway Company for a twenty-inch water main at a point described as Concrete Post Marked Sec. 5 Detroit 26, being 619' N.W. of water main crossing.

Gene Overholt supported a motion of Elizabeth Holmes that Mr. Russell Ash, Robert Spayth, and Robert Erdelyi be reappointed to three year terms ending in 1968 on the Plymouth Township Heating Board. Carried unanimously.

Upon a recommendation of the Supervisor, 3 new street lights were authorized at the corner of Ann Arbor Trail and Riverside, Ann Arbor Trail and Terry and S. Main and Judson.

D. P. W. Superintendent, Matthew McLellan, was authorized to lease bucketing equipment for the servicing of the Township sewers.

A resolution was made requesting that the balance of funds remaining in the Water Construction Project No. 208, dated January 1, 1961, in an estimated amount of \$31,295.07 be applied against the payments due on our bond issue until such surplus funds are used up in their entirety, upon a motion by C. V. Sparks, supported by Louis Norman. Unanimously adopted and forwarded to the Wayne County Road Commission.

Elizabeth Holmes, Township Treasurer, was authorized to transfer certain funds totaling \$170,000.00 to provide for the payment of a 12-inch water main on Sheldon Road, south from Five Mile to North Territorial by way of Ridge-wood Drive, upon a motion by Ralph Garber, supported by Gene Overholt. Carried unanimously.

## The Sporting Life Hoffman team show'em how

The summer baseball season is about to dribble out, with only a few games remaining.

One team this year deserves special mention — the University Litho team. Without a name at the beginning of the season, they were to be called just 'Hoffman', after the manager, John Hoffman. But he persuaded his boss at University Litho, a printing outfit between here and Ann Arbor, to sponsor the team.

They went with a winner. They won 14 games, lost none, a feat that hasn't been accomplished in 13 years.

"What (laughter) are you doing," says JayCee Roy Jacobsen. "What (laughter) happened. Are (laughter) you (laughter) all right?"

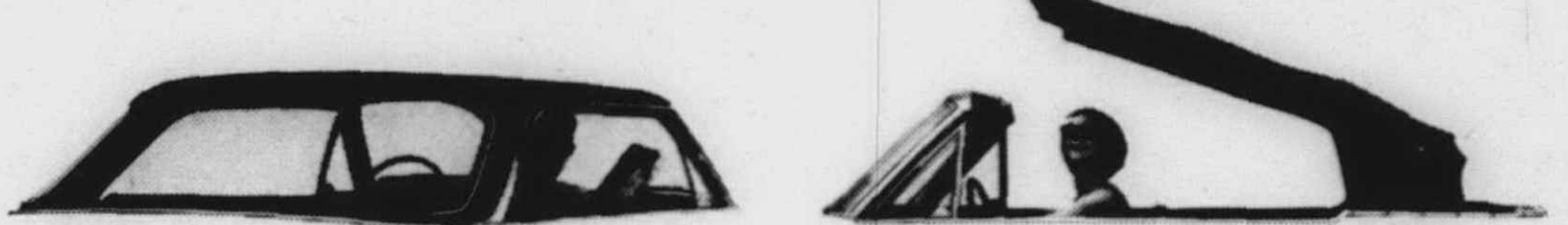
My final release drew a smattering of applause, and a comment from Dave Prince: "I'm sorry (laughter) about your fall."

Well-asserted tact

We have to give credit to Robert Jenkins for his criticism of the Plymouth Community School District recently. He hit out at the lack of a multi-purpose room in plans for a new elementary school in the Lake Pointe area at Five Mile Road and Haggerty Road.

Jenkins felt it was tantamount to a reduction in educational services, and made it very plain he didn't like the idea.

Superintendent of Schools Russell Isbister agreed that the lack of a multi-purpose room might curtail the winter physical education program. Jenkins went even further and said: "Apparently we don't make the right kind of financial opportunity for ourselves."

School Board president Gerald Fischer appeared miffed at the comments and said that the board was not going back and ask for more millage. He also noted that there were only 13 months left before the September 1966 opening date of the new school, and they needed to get going.

Jenkins agreed, but he apparently was pushing to make good some of his campaign promises, which in this day and age is a rare thing. In his successful campaign for the school board post, he had decried the lack of action to prepare for school needs in the face of the building boom and burgeoning school enrollments.

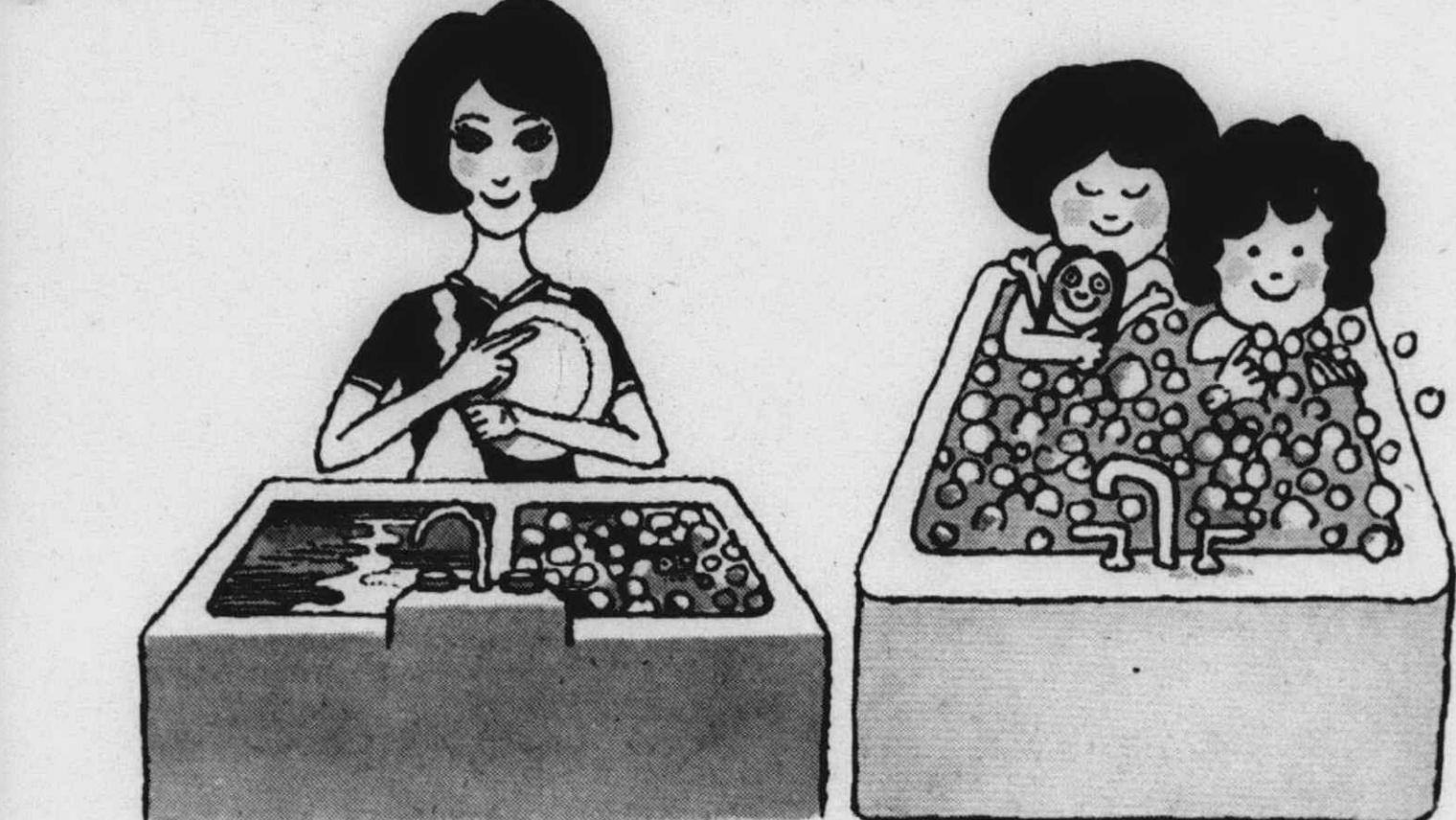

He further urged that all planning matters be brought to the attention of parents involved. He asked, for instance, that the planned addition to Allen School be shown to the Allen PTA as soon as possible. He was told they had always declined such offers in the past.

It takes, we feel, a certain amount of courage to join a well established organization like the Plymouth Community School Board, and then criticize the course of things. And it takes some knowledge to do it effectively.

Jenkins managed the matter with well-asserted tact. He may have rubbed some members of the board the wrong way; but even if he did, we hope he started all of them thinking.

Jenkins promised to start action on a new high school immediately. That may take even more tact, carefully asserted, than last week's comments.

In the meantime, we hope the board finds a way of providing physical education facilities for the Lake Pointe school. At Farrand School, last year, gym classes were held in the hallways. At the new school, the board lacks \$90,000 for the multi-purpose room. Despite the temporary nature of the matter, we would hate to see the room not built.

Such cuts can snowball, and can't help but hurt the total education of Plymouth youngsters.

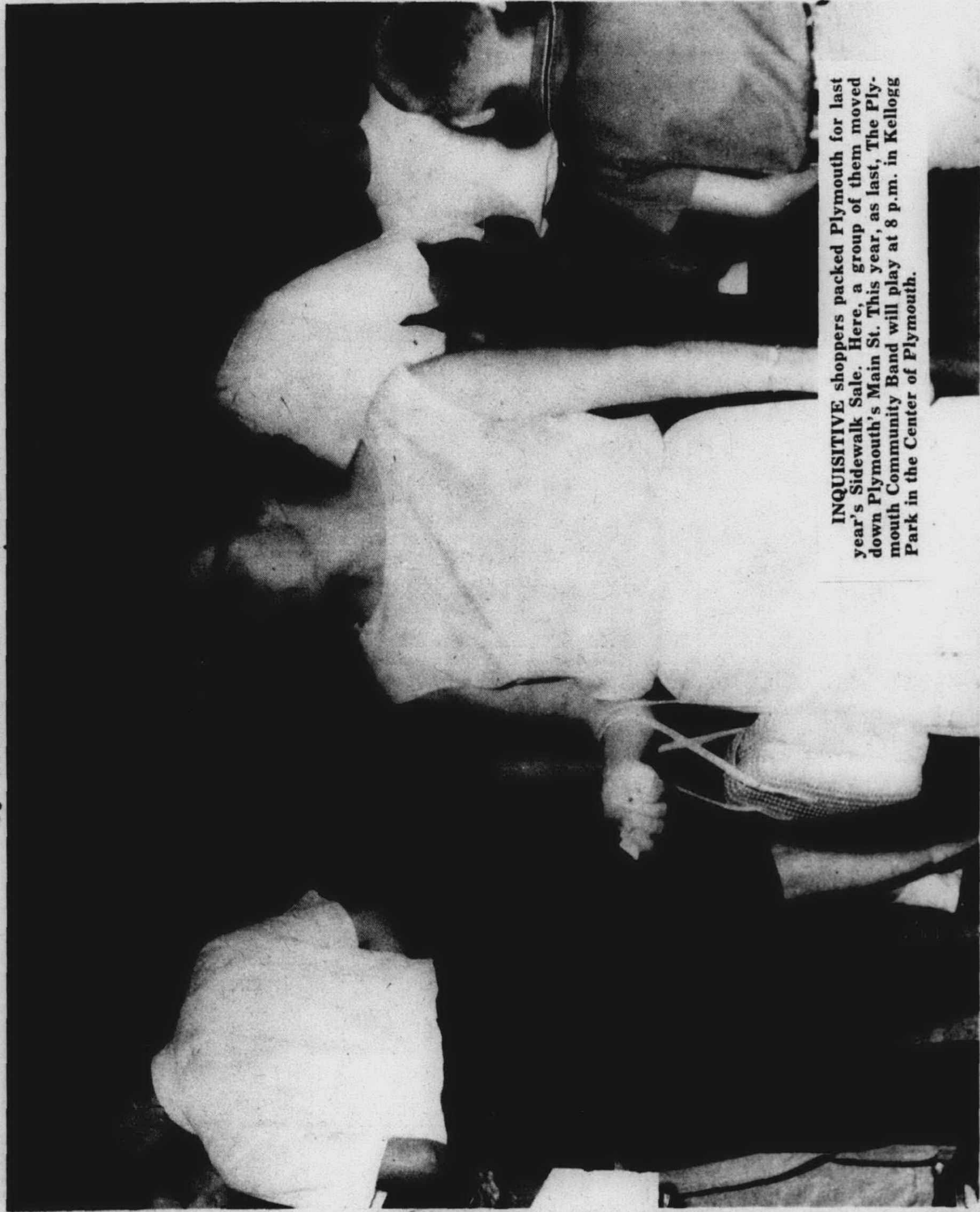

"Used homes, realistically priced, are selling extremely well in all sections of our territory," Moser said. "Any home owner who lists his property with a realtor and doesn't overprice it is likely to get fast action."

"Month after month, our members have been setting new sales records," Moser said. "Sales each month since January have not only exceeded the sales of the previous month, but sales for the same month last year, by impressive margins."

"Beginning with March, when our sales exceeded the \$10,000,000 mark for the first time, every month this year has established a new all-time high in sales volume."

While largest volume of sales continues to be in the \$10,500-to-\$15,000 price bracket, there has been a marked increase in demand for higher-priced homes, Moser reported. For June, he said, sales in the \$25,000-to-\$30,000 bracket were up 121 per cent from 1964; while sales in the over \$30,000 bracket were up 64 per cent.

"Houses 10 to 20 years old continue to be the most popular, in terms of sales to listings," Moser said. "One-and-one-half-story continue to be favored over one-story, two-story and split-level. Three-bedroom houses seem to get the nod over those with fewer or more bedrooms, while brick construction is preferred to frame and houses with basements are definitely more popular than those built on slabs or over crawl space."

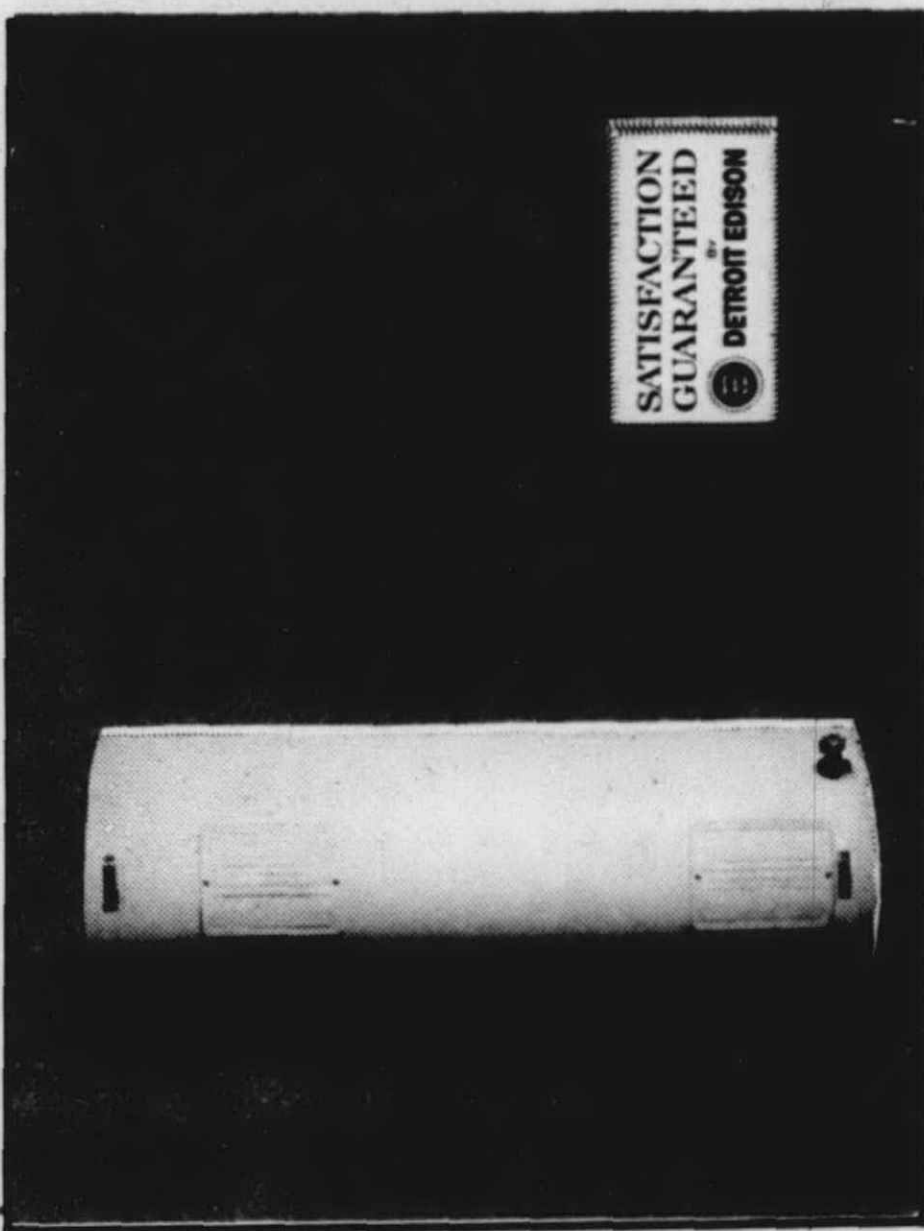

## Urge over-65 to examine Medicare

The "Medicare" bill has now been cleared for final action by the House and Senate, and signature by the President. This law demonstrates bold federal legislation which can have on citizens of local areas. Seldom has the federal government taken action which will have a greater impact on citizens in the Plymouth community.

An estimated 2700 people in Wayne County, over the age of 65, will be directly affected by the new program. These citizens are now faced with the necessity of critically examining their health insurance plans and needs.

As your U.S. Representative, I cannot stress too strongly in this situation the fact that the Medicare program will not go into effect until July 1, 1966. Therefore, those who, after consideration, wish to alter their present insurance plans should not make changes effective until that time. Anyone who drops health insurance before July 1, 1966 will be left without coverage until the program begins.

**THE MEDICARE** program itself will consist of two parts. The first is hospitalization insurance, corresponding in benefits roughly to the present Blue Cross program. This hospitalization insurance will automatically cover everyone over 65. It will provide that those over 65 have their room and board (and various other benefits) paid, while in a hospital for up to 90 days.

The patient, however, will be required to pay the first \$40 of the bill, and \$10 a day

for every day after the sixtieth.

**This hospitalization service, moreover, will not cover doctor's fees.** The second part of Medicare is a voluntary supplementary insurance program which Plymouth residents over 65 may join at a cost of \$3 per month. This insurance, corresponding roughly in benefits to the present Blue Shield program, will cover doctor's fees such as surgery and consultation.

It would also cover home and office calls by the doctor, as well as other benefits, such as payment for X-rays and ambulance services. Under this plan, the patient will pay the first \$50 and then 20% of the remaining cost.

Many Plymouth residents will want to know how protection under the new Medicare programs compares with that under Blue Cross-Blue Shield. Let us look at Blue Cross first. For those over 65 who are enrolled in a group plan, (the great majority,) benefits include complete comprehensive coverage of room and board, for 120 days. Unlike the Medicare program, the patient does not have to pay any portion of his bill. However, the rate for this Blue Cross policy is \$6.75 per month. Medicare will provide its coverage free.

Blue Shield differs from the supplementary Medicare insurance in two ways. First, Blue Shield benefits do not include payment of doctor's fees for home and office visits, an item which could well represent a significant proportion of an individual's medical expense.

On the other hand, Blue Shield pays the full cost of those doctor's fees it does cover, while the supplementary Medicare plan does not. Blue Shield rates vary according to income. In Michigan, those earning less than \$2500 pay \$2.74 per month, those earning \$2500-\$3000 pay \$3.21 per month, while those earning over \$3000 pay \$3.67 per month.

At the present time few people purchase Blue Shield without also purchasing Blue Cross. According to Blue Cross-Blue Shield officials, their organization has always lost money on their over-65 coverage.

They have had to subsidize these losses by increasing the rates paid by those under 65. Therefore, it is quite possible that Blue Cross-Blue Shield rates will be revised as a result of Medicare.

In terms of coverage of over-65 policyholders, it is also likely that private insurance companies will revise their benefits. The best guess is that companies such as Blue Cross-Blue Shield will not attempt to compete directly with Medicare, but will instead offer supplementary plans which will fill in the gaps not now covered by the newly-enacted legislation. Insurance companies will undoubtedly soon be in touch with their policyholders to inform them of any changes in policies. If any uncertainty exists concerning changes in the provisions of these policies, I suggest the best re-

Employees whose ideas are adopted nationwide will be given national awards. The Postmaster General will personally oversee the program. Postmaster Grater will be chairman of the local committee to implement PEP.

# Bell rate cuts affect everyone, new Metro service in offing

The Michigan Public Service Commission approved a rate reduction schedule and adjustment plan presented by the Michigan Bell Telephone Company recently.

The approved reductions will result in a savings of \$8,386,000 annually by Bell customers.

A new metro-calling service is to be offered October 1 to area residence customers. It provides for toll free calling to some 80 communities from noon to 7 a.m. daily and all day Sunday. Its \$10.95 monthly rate includes a private line and unlimited local calling.

Persons who use Metro-15 service will get four more weekday calling hours at no increase in costs and Metro-21 customers will pay \$2 a month less than now.

RURAL residence rates will be reduced 20 to 30 cents a month beginning September 1. The company's 302,082 two-party residence flat rate customers will receive 15 cent-a-month reduction and 74,159 residence four-party customers will pay 25 cents a month less.

Initial charges for color telephones will be reduced one third, from \$7.50 to \$5.00.

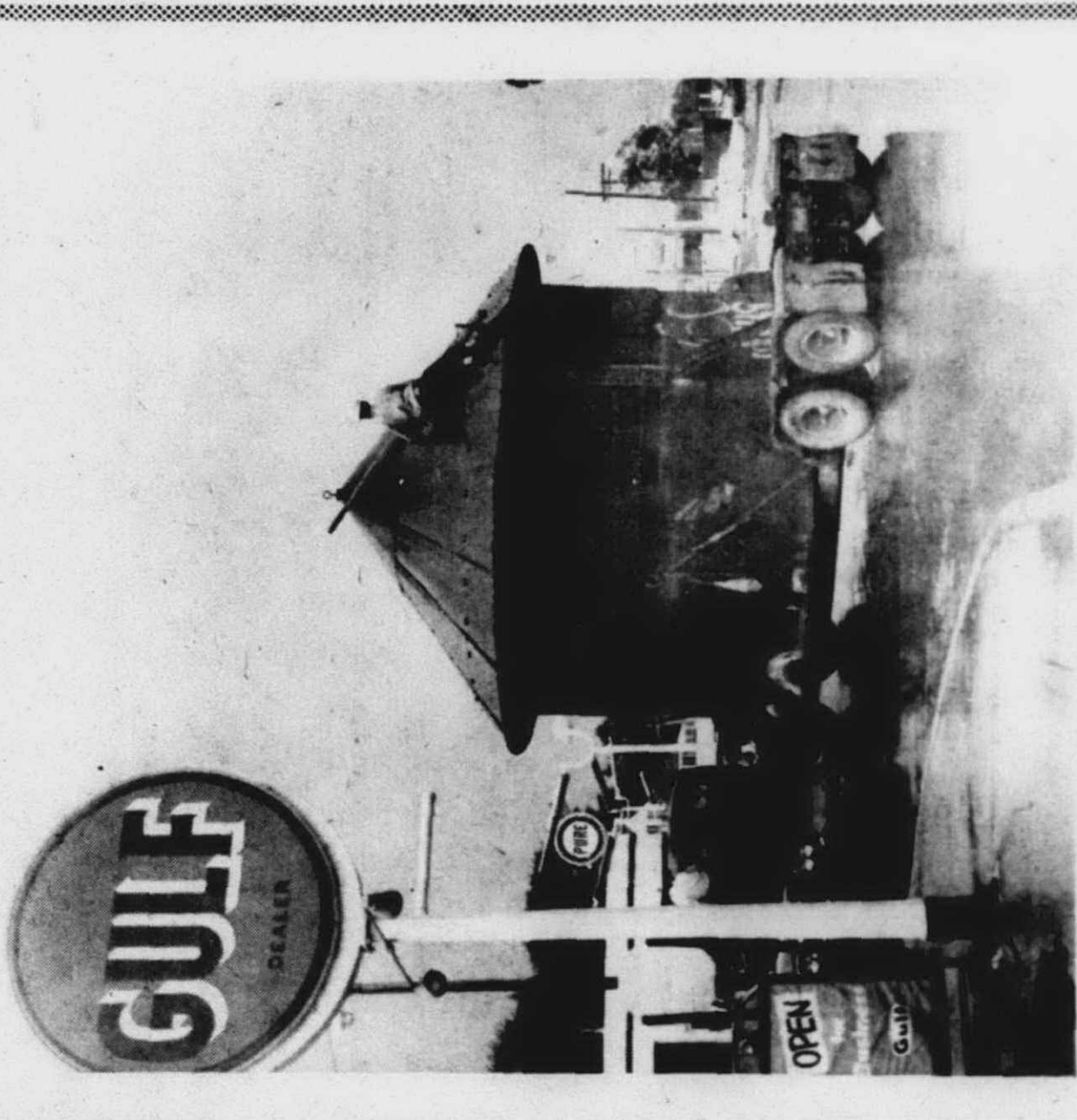
Mallory is in charge of the operation, and comes to the job with a varied background, including service in two wars, a B.S. degree in economics and a law degree.

ent infantry divisions. He was also Assistant Staff Judge Advocate General and Prosecutor, because of his legal background.

LATER he was appointed United Nations prosecutor for prisoners of war who committed crimes after their capture.

In between? A stint as a law clerk, a term as an instructor in Marketing and Law and Michigan State University.

Mallory received his first degree in 1943 from the University of Detroit; he was awarded his law degree in 1948 from the U of D Law School. He worked for Chrysler Corporation from 1959 until recently, when he quit the company, to go into private business — running a Chrysler dealership.

Thus he went from economics student to infantryman to war lawyer to teacher, to corporate lawyer to selling cars.

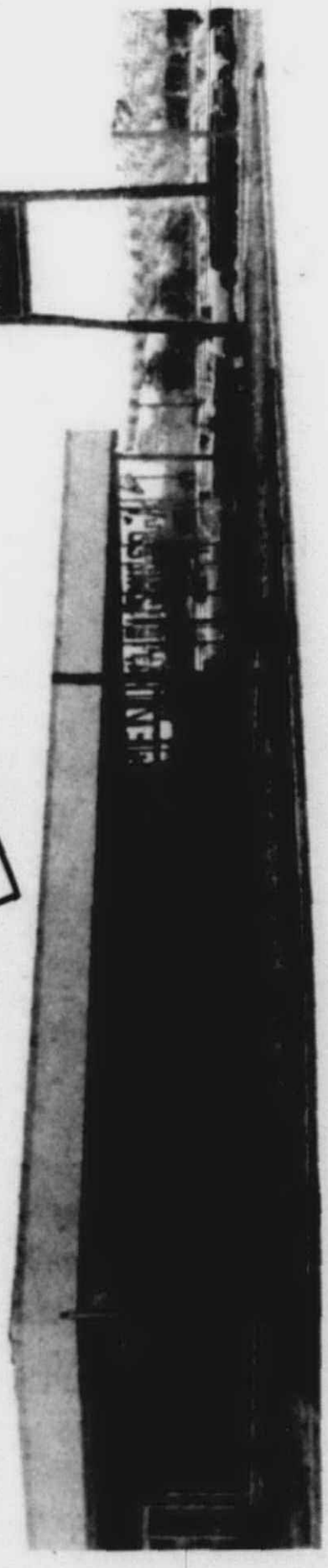
