M Professor Offers New X-Ray Head

ANN ARBOR-Less radiation, better X-ray pictures. Dental patients and dentists will soon benefit from an X-ray machine invented by University of Michigan Dental Prof. Albert G. Richards.

The newly-designed X-ray head houses its radiation source seven inches farther X-ray machines. Because of the recessed location of radiaation filter and cone, the new machine will produce less gonadal exposure of the patient, reports Professor Richards.

The new dental X-ray head also produces less wholebody exposure of the dental operator than the standard apparatus with short-pointed plastic cones.

Dental radiographers have long recognized that longer distances between patient and X-ray machine produce clearer X-ray images. The long cone was introduced in past years to gain this advantage. But, says Professor Richards, the long cone was cumbersome and awkward to use.

Then using a toothbrush or a mascara brush, brush vigorously around the sides and back of the diamond. Short jabbing strokes are better than long strokes. Immerse frequently in the solution while cleaning. If your time is short, you may want to soak them in the solution to loosen the accumulation of dirt and soap. This is fine but don't go away and forget that they are soak-



Dueen of Hearts Tells Of Favorite Recipe for Chili Sauce

By FAITH GILLESPIE

"You eat what you can, and what you can't, you can." That used to be the rule for the housewife in this country, back in the days when the major portion of the population was rural or semi-rural. Commercially canned foods were quite a luxury, and large gardens

Everyone canned. This was still the way of life when I was a child on the Dakota prairie, and one I should be reluctant to shoulder again. Running water and electricity are pleasures I have come to depend on. And I was never much good with a hoe.

were part of the way of life.

Late summer was a backbreaking season. The produce got ripe all of a sudden, and when it did, it wouldn't wait. Everybody picked and cleaned and peeled and pared and pickled and canned, practically without stopping, till the cows came home, you might say.

It was very hard work, and I'm glad we don't have to do it any more. Store-bought canned goods taste better than most of the things we labored so hard to preserve, and nature's necessity no longer makes such demands upon us, thank goodness.

But you know, I still can. Maybe it's because the sight of the beautiful product is such a pleasure—those jars are jewels. Or perhaps I'm right in thinking that some home-canned things still taste more delicious than any you can buy. Or it could be that you really can't take the country out of the girl.

Whatever the reasons, grape jelly from my own vines is a priceless treasure, and not even Mrs. Smucker can approach the perfection of home-done strawberry jam.

The delight of these is matched only by the goodness of the tomatoes that plop out of the jar into the spaghetti sauce and chili in the winter; that jar holds the scent of summer.

The tomatoes are ready. Do join me in the canning kettle. You don't have to do a lot, and you don't have to buy very much equipment to start with. Just scare up three pint jars, buy rings and lids (they're cheap), land talk your nearest gardening neighbor out of six pounds of firm, ripe tomatoes. Make chili sauce . . . I guarantee you can't buy any this good.

Sterilize your clean jars by putting them in the oven at 250 degrees for half an hour or more. Pour boiling water over the lids and rings and let them simmer five minutes or so.

Wash the tomatoes and pop them into a pot of boiling water for two or three minutes, and then dump them into a sink of cold water. The peels nearly peel off by themselves. Cut out the cores and cut the tomatoes into chunks, walnut sized, roughly.

This recipe is one I have evolved over the years. It gives you a rich, deep red chili sauce that is perfect for seafood sauces (add tabasco and horseradish and stir it up for a hot shrimp sauce), and lovely in a Louis -dressing for seafood salads. Try it on meat loaf and hamburgers . . . you'll love

QUEEN OF HEARTS CHILI SAUCE

Combine in a small sauce pan 11/4 cup white vinegar, two teaspoons whole cloves, one teaspoon coarsely broken stick cinnamon, 11/2 teaspoons celery seeds, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg. Bring to boil, remove from heat, set aside.

Prepare six pounds of ripe tomatoes (peel, remove core, and cut into chunks). Cook half of them with 1/2 cup sugar (granulated) for 30 minutes, stirring almost constantly at a vigorous boil.

Home Canning Not a Thing Of The Past

Home preservation of food isn't just a homemaking practice of grandmother's time. According to specialists at Michigan State University, studies made during the last 10 years reveal that canning and home preservation of food are still important.

Even with the popularity of the freezer today, more homemakers are canning than freezing fruits and vegetables, but over half of all homemakers use a home freezer for some food preservation.

The studies also showed that the peach is the most popular fruit for canning while the tomato is by far the most popular vegetable. For freezing purposes, strawberries led the way, followed by raspberries, blueberries, and blackberries.

Geographically, nome canning was most popular in the east south central, west north central, and mountain states.

Its popularity also seems to be influenced by family income. Those in the lowest income group (under \$3,000) do the most home canning and those with the highest incomes (over \$10,000) do the least.

Home canning is also somewhat more popular among rural families than city dwellers.

Offer Tips To Beat Back Attack

If you're a typical American woman, chances are better than even that you'll have back problems before you're

That's the word from medical specialists of a wellknown insurance company movie on physical fitness in hopes of improving the odds.

One of the nation's leading writers of health insurance, says lack of proper exercise, poor posture, and unsafe home or office work habits lead the "back attack."

"Our society generally discourages women from strenuous physical activity," it points out. "And the multitude of labor-saving conveniences we have makes it that much more difficult for women to get in top condition; even in their youth.

"Few women enjoy perfect posture and taller women are especially vulnerable to 'slouching.' which increases chances of back muscle strain. Combine unconditioned muscles and poor posture with the strain induced by bad work habits and back pain often pops up."

A color film, called "Maximum." features the Royal Swedish Ballet. The troupe uses dance techniques to demonstrate the proper-and safe—way to perform household and office chores.

Examples: 1. When vacuuming, keep your back straight. If you bend to clean under furniture, do it at the knees.

2. The back-straight, knees-bent rule also applies to lifting, even when the object is light. If you must lift something heavy, hold it close to your body. This allows you to keep your back straight and in balance, and puts the strain on stronger leg and thigh muscles.

3. Sit, don't stand, to do such chores as peeling pota-

4. Plan your work schedule so that you don't "overdo it." Rest periodically, preferably in a chair that provides good back support.

5. If you work in an office. keep your back straight and your feet firmly on the floor when working at a desk.

6. "Maximum" also points out that posture and general health can be improved by a sound exercise program. It can range from a few minutes of calisthenics at home to relatively strenuous outdoor sports. The film recommends swimming, bowling, cycling, and anything that requires plenty of walking.
