

The request came out of last week's meeting during which the Commission spent some time discussing the highway route and the letter to McEwen.

In its letter, the commission asked the State Highway Dept. to consider a more westerly route along Five Mile Road before taking northward swing.

The route, suggested earlier by the Highway officials would have the freeway follow Schoolcraft Road and then cut across a line along Shearer Drive with a cloverleaf at the intersection of Shearer Drive and Sheldon

Then it would have extended south of the Ford Motor Co. plant, diagonally across Ridgewood, splitting one of the Township's better residential districts.

Trustees of Schoolcraft College have sold \$140,000 in tax anticipation notes to the National Bank of Detroit on a low interest bid of 3.75 percent. Detroit Bank and Trust bid 4 percent on the issue.

The notes are dated Sept. 1 and go to May 1, 1977. They will provide operating money for the college pending receipt of revenue from property taxes levied against the college district.

"There is no way of knowng for sure, but one driver said Rehm. "And five others might have lived if they'd worn seat belts. Certainly many would have survived with shoulder harnesses."

"But when a car traveling over 75 miles an hour hits another car or a fixed object, no safety device known could save anyone," Rehm said. Two cars on Labor Day weekend were traveling over 100 miles an hour and three others 75 miles an hour or more, when fatal impacts took place.

Almost half the drivers involved had these characteristics in common: male under driving too fast, drinking too much, not wearing seat belts,

similar studies after Memorial (43 deaths) and July 4 (27 deaths) weekends were reconfirmed in this study. They

Twelve, or almost half, were single-car mishaps. with probable cause falling asleep, driving too fast or a combination of these and drinking too much.

Almost 80 per cent of the drivers involved were within 25 miles of home, not on vacation. The widely held belief that taking an overnight or longer trip with the family on a holiday weekend is dangerous has been completely disproved by these studies.

No evidence shows any victim had seat belt fastened. Seven cars were definitely not equipped with seat belts. Seat belts which were not used would have saved a number of lives.

No obvious mechanical defects were found in any of the vehicles involved in fatal crashes. None has been found in any of the 109 deaths. ### Paint Fruit Trees To Avoid Trouble

If you see a fruit grower | sion Service Bulletin 533,

This fruit grower is just trying his best to produce some home-grown apricots for your table.

Michigan State University researchers have found that painting the trunk of young apricot trees with latex-based white paint helps keep the southwest side of the trunk from becoming very warm on sunny days in late fall and winter and then suffering because of night-time freezes.

Alternate freezing and thawing injures the bark and wood and permits wood-destroying fungi to gain entrance and cause a large can-

MSU scientists warn orchard men against using oil-based paint containing turpentine or oil which would kill or seriously injure the trees. White-wash formulas were tried but will not last throughout the winter and will give inadequate coverage of the trunks by late January.

Led by Stanley Johnston, who developed the famous Haven varieties of peaches, Michigan State University horticulturists have made considerable progress in developing apricot varieties that are adapted to Michigan Conditions.

Two Michigan varieties, South Haven 6 and Curtis, are now available for planting from Michigan tree nurseries. Horticulturists however, suggest planting a limited number of trees as they consider apricot growing in Michigan still in the trial

One of the first things that school administrators learn is that whenever budgets have to be cut, don't touch the bus system.

The reason is fairly obvious. The school bus is probably the most tangible evidence a taxpayer has that he is getting something for his money.

The parents are assured that their children won't have to walk long distances in cold and rainy weather and cross heavily traveled highways.

But the Wayne Board of Education, whose district includes most of Westland. has summoned all of its collective courage and decided several weeks ago to cut back the level of bus service to its students. The reason behind that move was simplemoney. The bus service reduction was just one part of the slashing of the budget and programs which eventually totalled \$558,-100 out of an \$11 million budget.

But the fact that there is a reasonable cause for the bus reduction has nothing to do with the emotions of parents whose children have to walk up to two miles to get to

The past reasons that "I walked a long-

er distance than that to school when I was a youngster" and "It didn't do me any harm" are not valid anymore. In the old days, horse traffic was more dangerous than auto traffic and the cars available then weren't enough in number to present any large degree of public danger to school children.

The board has a point in that the budget had to be cut-especially in view of the voters' rejection of two tax increases within the past five months.

But the parents of the children who will ly bussed also have a point. Money can't buy | back a leg, arm, or life.

It seems that somewhere between the two positions, an equitable and reasonable solution will be reached-and The Observer after reviewing previous bus controversies in other communities, believes that the parents will win.

To rephrase a popular saying, "Hell hath no fury like parents whose children will not be driven to school on a school bus."

### Election Fairness Urged

In less than two weeks, Garden City voters will go to the polls to elect a mayor, four councilmen and a municipal judge. With only two exceptions, all of the incumbents are running for re-election and are challenged by stiff competition. But this may have little effect on the voters' minds when they go to the polls Nov. 8. Human nature being what it is, people are inclined to think "where there's smoke, there must be fire." This may not be entirely fair to the candidate, several of whom were directly or indirectly involved in the 1961 Civic Center land purchase. /

To ask the voters to completely rule out the current Grand Jury probe as a factor in their making up their minds in the fall election would be too naive. The investigation and its accompanying publicity, I'm sure, has swayed a few votes in an election which promises to be a close one anyway without outside influences.

But The Observer hopes that the readers and voters will use their sense of fair play and elect the candidates on the basis of their past and present performances and not on rumors whispered in the rear of local taverns or street corners.

The press was one of those old time flat bed presses where the paper had to be hand fed from the top and then folded after it was "swished" out at the bottom. It was quite an undertaking and time consuming. And, up to then, there never had been anything like printing Class. "last minute" news.

On this particular day I sought out the boss and told him I thought it was rather silly to wait until the following week to print the story of the kiddies' big day on the playground.

"Why can't I write the story this morning," I asked, very enthusiastically, "We can have it in the paper this afternoon and be right up to date."

One of those old time conservative editors, he looked at me and said, "It would be taking a chance to print a story in advance. Suppose something happens?"

"What could happen?" I countered, "on a bright, sunshiny day like this?"

That was all I wanted to hear. I went to work.

Using all of the glowing adjectives at my command I wrote of the wonderful time the youngsters HAD and how thrilled the "Burgess" was in his role as host. I claimed, in my eagerness, that the big day was the best the little town ever had known.

Proudly, I helped fold the papers and carry the bundles over to the post office. After all, I said to myself, today's edition can be a symbol of a new era in the old home town-we'll have a paper with up-to-date news and we won't have to depend on the big "city dailies".

Finally, about mid-afternoon the last of the papers was on its way and a few of the carriers, who planned to reach the playground a bit later, began the home delivery.

As the lightning flashed across the skies and the rain came pelting down, the conservative old editor just looked at me and said quietly-like a father to a son-"so, nothing could happen on a bright, sunshiny day like this, eh. "Let this be a lesson to you—never take anything

for granted, especially in the newspaper business".





These are my favorite days. The October air is clear and cool. The autumn sun is warm and kind. This lovely time is perhaps the more precious because we know it won't last.

One of the nicest things about this season is that it smells good, inside as well as outside. The house no longer shelters the odors of damp bathing suits and insect sprays. Instead there is the smell of the wood fire in the fireplace, and the unsummerly aroma of stews bubbling on the stove, and soups sim-

In some houses, fruit cake is in the air. I know, because readers have told me they've been baking Mrs. Carlini's heavenly Fruit Cake Paridisio. Other readers have requested a recipe for a good dark fruit cake. There is none better than Mrs. Carlini's own dark fruit cake, which also won a blue ribbon at the State Fair, in 1963.

This recipe makes eight pounds, which is ample for the average household. If you want to make enough to give away to everybody you know, the recipe may be doubled, but you should use less than double the flour, about 61/2 cups instead of seven. A pound of currants could be used in place of the extra pound of raisins.

Mrs. Carlini told me that another newspaper used her recipe, suggesting that molasses could be substituted for the honey, and fruit juice or wine for the rum.

"You can do that," she said, "there's no law; but then, it's not my recipe."

#### MRS. CARLINI'S DARK FRUIT CAKE:

The night before baking day, prepare your pans with a light greasing, two layers of wax paper, and then two layers of brown paper. Let the brown paper extend about an inch above the pans, and cut slits in paper to fit pan, rather than making heavy folds.

Cream together at medium speed 1/2 pound of butter and 1/2 pound of sugar. Beat six eggs at medium speed until thick, three to five minutes. Add eggs to butter and sugar mixture and beat for two more minutes. (DO NOT OVERBEAT. This causes dry-

Sift together 31/2 cups sifted cake flour, 1/2 tablespoon cinnamon, one tablespoon nutmeg, one tablespoon allspice, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 tablespoon baking soda.

Use a generous half cup of the flour mixture to dredge the following mixture of fruits: one pound dark seedless raisins, one pound seeded and cut-up dates, 1/2 pound yellow candied pineapple (cut up). 1/2 pound whole red candied cherries, 11/2 pounds diced mixed candied citrus fruit. ("Save yourself," Mrs. Carlini says, "and buy already diced.") Add one pound coarsely broken walnuts.

Now add half of the remaining flour mixture to the butter mixture. Stir with

### Urge Care Handling **Poisons**

Useful and harmless when properly used, household cleaners, pesticides, medicines, paints and any number of other staple supplies are potential killers when handled carelessly.

This warning comes from the Greater Detroit Safety Council, a chapter of the National Safety Council.

"Anything can be a poison if it is misused," says Gerald E. Montgomery, executive director of the local safety group. "People should act on the principle that if it isn't food it is poison."

To prevent your family from becoming statistics, the National Safety Council offers the following sugges-

• Keep all drugs and medicines far out of the reach of children, even if it means a separate, locked cabinet.

· Label all containers, and mark prescriptions with the date of issue, the dosage, and the patient's name. Do not keep cleaners or

any other toxic chemicals in

any place accessible to children. • Get rid of an old, unlabeled or discolored medicine by pouring it down the drain -never by throwing the bot-

• Paste the day and night phone numbers of your doctor, druggist and any local poison control center to the wall of the cabinet.

When known poisons, such as iodine or alcohol, are necessary, treat them so they'll be recognizable even in a dark room. Tape the cap shut; glue on sandpaper, rough side out; or stick a sharp pin through the stop-

Never put anything potentially poisonous in a cup, pop bottle or other container that normally holds food. Anyone, adult or child, might assume it is edible.

• Impress the children that they must not taste unknown liquids., pills, leaves, roots.

· Safety-check your medicine chest at least twice a year, making sure all dangerous drugs are out and all needed materials are at hand.
