The inspection team, yet to be named, will submit a report and a recommendation on accreditation to the NCACSS in February. A final decision on Schoolcraft's accreditation will be made by the NCACSS at its annual meeting in March.

Between now and the time of the inspection visit, the college will be required to complete a series of forms covering basic institutional. ..data which provide information pertinent to accreditation.

The self-study which paved the way for the inspection visit was developed by seven major committees composed of some 50 faculty members. The study was coordinated by Dean Emeritus Lois L. Waterman.

Schoolcraft has been accredited by the Michigan Commission on College Accreditation since 1964, when the college opened. College credits earned at Schoolcraft have been accepted for transfer by all four-year institutions in the state.

"We stand now at the threshold of full accreditation by the North Central," Dr. Bradner said. "Assuming the success of our efforts, attainment of this status next spring will mean the college will have joined the select company of accredited institutions in the shortest time possible under North Central requirements."

This Is the Week That ... By DON HOENSHELL

It's harvest time for your legislator, folks, so watch that crazy old moon rising over the pasture and be kind when the political drummer comes calling with his wares.

Really!

Suburban voters have sent a good delegation to Lansing and its members deserve a listen. And summer and early fall are the only times they have two minutes to rub together.

The Governor's Special Commission on Legislative Compensation - a panel of prominent thinkers ranging from Gus Scholle to the University of Michigan's James Pollock - agreed (if you can believe THAT) that:

"Members in the legislature, if it is not a fulltime job, is a fulltime responsibility."

So summer and early fall are about the only times the legislature can really relate to the folks back home. If your guy is a junketer, forget it. We're lucky in that respect here.

Legislators try through the winter and spring to let their districts know what's going on. The system falls on its face.

It's called newsletters.

Printers in the Legislative Service Bureau have gotten up to 300,000 newsletters a month and legislators rarely see them. One exception is the crusty Rep. Frederic J. Marshall (R-Allen), a former sheriff and parttime iconoclast, who pulls up his trusty standard typewriter to his desk on the floor of the House and belts out his own ideas.

Others can call up a press agent hired by the House (both Republicans and Democrats) and order a handout, with mustard, mayonnaise or a bit of parsley.

And legislators gripe because the local newspapers do not carry them verbatim and the folks back home don't frame them and burn incense.

Often, a legislator will adapt a general handout of the Speaker's Office or the Minority Leader's Cubicle claiming pie in the sky is enroute through the courtesy of the party. They start:

Rep. Joe Bleau today sponsored a bill designed to establish an authority to build threecar garages for everybody since his party was responsible for the economic health of the state."

The first three words are changed so everbody gets the same shake back home.

Legislators have complained that the Observers do not carry the text of these things.

They're right, we don't.

We think too much of our readers to peddle self-serving banalities that - if at all - appeared in the dailies last week.

So, get your legislator back home and welcome him. Ask about any bill that interests you. You'll get an articulate and wellconsidered response.

If not:

Write a letter to the press agents you hire with your tax money and cut out the middleman.

Our Kids Are Getting Older Much Sooner

Kids are maturing faster each year, but our laws on voting, delinguency, privileges and duties have remained frozen-so we've argued over the past few weeks.

Now comes a report from a pair of University of Michigan psychologists suggesting that perhaps we need more flexible labor laws allowing kids 10 to 16 to work a bit.

The traditional argument, unchanged and unexamined since Charles Dickens' day is that child labor means sweat shops, whips, nickel - a - day wages, unsanitary conditions.

Well, Dr. Mary Engel and Gerald Marsden, the U-M researchers, first of all found in a Boston study that 73 per cent of boys under 14 had already done some work for money outside the home, not just delivering papers or cutting lawns, but also shining shoes, pasting labels, stacking boxes, sweeping shops.

Many of the boys worked illegally, and so they were not counted in the labor census.

And the psychologists thought the work beneficial to the boys.

It wasn't just money. In fact, the highest percentage of working boys wasn't in the lowest social class.

They found that the absence of a father in the home was a definite factor related to kids' working—even if the mother had an adequate income.

Why? Marsden speculated that a boy's work might replace what he misses in a father and provide him with needed authoritative contact with adult men and older boys.

(The Big Brother movement uses the same kind of argument in seeking recruits.)

The Marsden speculation ought to get some consideration from those concerned with the areas called "slum," ghetto," "disadvantaged" or whatever pet euphemism you prefer. In those areas, there are an awful lot of boys without fathers. Ironically, these are the kids who have the toughest times getting jobs once they are eligible to work legally.

Says Dr. Engel: "We found that at the age of 12 boys have definite work habits. It seems evident from our study that rehabil-

itation efforts through such programs as Job Corps should begin at an early age. By the time

Kids aren't getting worse. That isn't why they're getting into more trouble.

They need to be treated like adults-or at least quasi-adultsa whole lot sooner. They're maturing faster because of good diets and more comfortable environment.

We've spawned social dynamite by helping kids mature faster and then restraining them more and more from adult activities like working, voting and taking the rap for their sins.

The dynamite is exploding. Sunset Strip, Haight-Ashbury, 12th Street, right out here in the suburbs.

We ought to re-examine all our laws relating to age.

This newspaper hopes that the Republican Party in Westland,

admittedly weak at the moment, accepts the challenge of the Sept. 12 primary fiasco and builds itself up to a party of effectiveness - if for no other reason that to keep the party-in-power honest during election time.


Sense 'n Nonsense It makes for more nonsense

than sense to us that seldom in the negotiations between school boards and teachers and college boards and faculty members does the word increment come up except in kind of a passing

We have always thought that additional money in the pocket constituted a raise in pay. Teachers and college instructors have a written-in raise known as an increment which usually ranges from \$300 up.

Yet when representatives of the school and college boards sit down for negotiations, it is taken as a matter of fact that salary increases are over and above increments. This oftentimes involves as much as an additional \$1,000 to \$1,500 per year, and that's a big boost in any man's language.

It's Sauerkraut Time With Pangs of Nostalgia

THERE'S AN oft repeated statement that you can take the poy out of the country, but you can't take the country out of the boy.

I suppose it is true for at this time each year there comes the pang of nostaglia and I yearn again for the tour of the county fairs and the odor of boiled sauerkraut that rent the air in the "Dutch Country" in the foothills of eastern Pennsylvania.





Finds Youths Do Repay Car Loans

ANN ARBOR - New Englanders live up to their "Yankee Conservative" reputation and young people can be trusted when it comes to making automobile installment loans, the chairman of a leading lending agency suggests.

Alan G. Rude, board chairman of Universal C.I.T. Credit Corp., draws three conclusions.

He says a survey of the company's loan records indicates:

1. Young people—the 18to-30-year-old group - are not nearly as financially irresponsible as their elders are fond of proclaiming.

2. The best credit risk for auto financing, regardless of age or income, is the man who has been with one employer for 15 years or more.

3. There is a considerable variation in use of installment credit by people in different geographic areas. Users of credit are most "conservative" in New England, most "liberal" on the Pacific Coast.

Rude says his company has made 33.6 per cent of its total auto financing contracts with the younger 18-30 age group. From this group have come only 33 per cent of delinquencies (payment overdue by at least 30 days).

He comments:

"In other words, delinquencies in this group were in line with total financing -one in three of the total was in this group and one in three of the delinquencies was in this group.

"If the young were as irresponsible as sometimes claimed, one would expect their percentage of total delinquencies to be considerably higher than their percentage of total financing. This is not the case."

Income has a more significant impact upon delinquencies than does age, the author points out. "We found that 56 per cent of our financing was with individuals earning \$6,000 or less a year. But the percentage of delinquencies in this area was larger, at 68 per cent."

Noting that delinquencies almost never occur among borrowers who earn \$12,000 or more a year-except due to forgetfulness-the financial-authority admits that standards for credit could be set high enough to nearly eliminate all delinquencies among installment loans.

"But," he adds, "any institution supplying credit to the public that did this would not be fulfilling its economic obligation of making consumer credit generally avail-

Unskilled workers appear to provide the greatest financial risk, while the least risk is encountered with professional and semiprofessional workers and retired people. Married persons are considered better credit risks than unmarried persons.


Length of employment is a factor in determining the capacity to make regular payments. Rude explains. "Our largest percentage of delinquents-30 per cent-occurred in the group employed for one year or less."

Length of employment is a factor, he points out, for the primary reason that most delinquencies are the result of "some unexpected development," the most important of which is losing one's job. Illness and domestic troubles are other common reasons for delinquency.

-The most stable geographic civision from the standpoint of employment is the region taking in New England and the Mid-Atlantic states, Rude says. "In this area only 17 per cent of retail purchases were in the one year or less employment group. In contrast, 40 per cent had been employed five years or more."

Restraints on installment buying of automobiles. Rude concludes, would penalize the young and people with moderate or low incomes.

"Residential overimprovement occurs when a house is larger or more elaborate than most other houses on the street," Elsea said. In such a situation, the house is usually worth more than the other homes, but is seldom worth as much as it would be if it were located in a neighborhood where other dwellings are similar in size.

"It's only human nature for a prospective buyer to seek a \$25,000 house in a \$25,000 neighborhood before paying \$25,000 for a house in an excellent \$15,000 neighborhood," he explained.

Elsea cautioned also that houses with features not found in typical houses in the neighborhood are often overimproved. He cited as examples swimming pools, excess kitchen equipment, and patio improvements.

These features add little to the property's value because buyers of this type of house do not expect them and do not want them badly enough to pay for them.

"If the prospective buyer wants these features badly enough to pay for them, and is able to pay for them, he is likely to look for them in a higher - priced neighborhood, where such extras are the rule rather than the excep-

Capsule Sermon

HOME TESTING

(The following article was written by the Rev. Paul I. Greer, minister of the Newburg Methodist Church, 36500 Ann Arbor Trail, Livonia. The Observer welcomes similar short contributions from any clergymen and church leaders in this area.)

One time I received a form that was designed to test the standard of the house in which I lived. It had to do with the number of rooms, appliances, electrical outlets, and square feet involved.

What kind of a test would you apply to your own home to determine its standing as a Christian home? Apply these tests and others to your own home. Would Jesus be at home in your home? Go into this carefully: the climate of the home, the things you talk about and care about.

How do the materials of the house compare to the spiritual life of the home? Do we have as much concern for the spiritual life of those who use it as we do about the furnishings? I once saw an advertisement that showed a family rejoicing over the arrival of a new television and the words under the picture read: "The greatest day of our lives. The day our Television came!" If this were so, then that family's life was awfully thin.

Does love prevail in all family relationships, to the exclusion of jealousy, envy, selfishness, and indifference to other members of the family?

Does the home reach out into the outer world with real interest? When there are young children in the family, as parents, do we realize that we are "The Teacher of Religion?" Do we teach them about God, Jesus, about the Bible, how to pray, how to make right choices, and Christian attitudes about race?

Does your family have a positive attitude and relationship to God through Christ and His Church? These are some tests of A Christian Home. How do we rate?

Steak — Our Food **Favorite**

We Americans dearly love steak and our annual consumption of it is a matter of awe and amazement to the rest of the world.

It has been in this country however, that steaks have really come into their own. As living conditions have improved and more and more families could afford to splurge on a steak, the demand grew.

Perhaps the greatest impetus given to steak eating was the discovery that cooking them over glowing coals (the original way of broiling) was still the best.

Restaurants began boasting of their charcoal broiled steaks and before long smart wives figured out that their husbands could do just as good a job in their own backyard. And so they can if they follow a few simple rules.

Although most of us, including me, mean beefsteak when we say "steak," there are steaks from other animals and fish that are marvelous. The general rules applying to the broiling of beefsteaks apply, with a few slight variations. Veal, pork, lamb and mutton are all superb, as are fish steaks of various kinds.

It's fun to experiment, and any of these will be a welcome change, in the unlikely event that you find beef steaks monotonous.

Steaks vary tremendously in size, shape and tenderness. Your steaks should be government graded choice at least. Prime is the top grade but restaurants receive most of the prime grade of meat. Steaks should be cut no thinner than one inch for broiling.

Consider not only the cut, but the quality of the beef. Young beef, sometimes called "baby beef." may not contain much fat, but it will probably be tender because it is from a young animal. On the other hand, the presence of streaks or spots of fat in the meat is extremely important in judging mature beef.

The lacy network of fat in the lean is called "marbling" and is top priority by government graders, packers and retailers, in determining the grade or brand that is to appear on the carcass.

MARINATED ROUND STEAK

2 lb. round steak, cut 34-in. thick

1/4 c. wine vinegar 1 T. soy sauce

1 t. onion salt

1/4 t. pepper 1 T. catsup

> 1 sm. clove of garlic, finely minced

2 T. salad or olive oil Arrange steak in shallow pan. Combine remaining in-

gredients; pour over steak. Refrigerate for at least 3 hours; drain. Heat broiler. Arrange steak on broiler pan, 5 inches from heat. Broil for 5 minutes on each side or to desired doneness. Yield: 6 servings.

PEPPER STEAK CHEDDAR NOODLES

1/4 c. butter 11/2 lbs. beef (round or sirloin tip) cut in strips 2x1/2x1/8 inches

1/8 t. garlic powder

33 c. chopped onion 11/2 green peppers, cut in ju-

lienne strips 1 1-lb. can tomatoes

1 beef bouillon cube 1 T. cornstarch

2 T. water

2. T. soy sauce

1 t. sugar

1/2 t. salt

3c. wide noodles

I c. (4 oz.) shredded cheddar cheese

Melt butter, add beef and sprinkle with garlic powder. Saute, stirring occasionally until browned. Remove meat from skillet; add onion and green peppers and saute two minutes. Return meat to skillet with tomatoes and bouillon cube. (If using round - steak simmer 15-20 min.) Blend cornstarch, water soy sauce, sugar and salt. Add to meat mixture and cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Reduce heat and cook 2 additional minutes. Prepare cheddar noodles. Toss with cheddar cheese. Spoon pepper steak over cheddar noodles. Serves 4
