There are still far too many pockets of poverty among us after these many years. There is still an uneasy peace with our neighbors in our cities' slums. The minority is still oppressed, and still treated inferior. Great material wealth char-

acterizes the land. But is there gratitude?

The basis of gratitude is joy, simple naive joy in life itself. This has been said in so many ways that it has become a cliché. Children know this kind of joy — as Jesus pointed out. The kingdom of heaven, which is a condition of joy, is to be entered into only through "the great joy of life. Thanksgiving, in any true form, is not a ritual of ceremony and word. It is rather the spontaneous paean of the deepest feeling man knows — his joy. Therefore does the psalmist cry, "Oh be joyful in the Lord, all ye lands!"

Whatever we possess should make us humble in the sight of God — it is His grace alone which gives it. The true meaning of Thanksgiving is the humble recognition that whatever we are, or possess, we owe to the grace of God, which we are to accept, humbly, and gladly.

A Thanksgiving Promise

Ed Schening Keeps Word By Buying Turkey In Kellogg Park

Ed Schening, general manager of the Burroughs plant, made good a promise last week in a most unusual way.

He stood in front of the Plymouth Rock in the center of Kellogg Park and purchased his Pilgrim turkey for Thanksgiving. Behind this purchase is the story of a man and his word.

It had its beginning last spring, shortly after the Plymouth Centennial Committee was formed and Joe Tarantino named chairman of the group. In his energetic manner, Tarantino set about the task of developing a program for the entire year and he had visions of having the activities in Plymouth the subject of picture stories in national magazines.

TO THAT END he named your Editor as chairman of the public relations committee and reminded him that he would like to see a picture story in either Life or Look magazine.

Informed that this was quite a task and that some sort of outstanding gimmick was needed, he countered, "Well, come up with one."

Half seriously and half in humor, your Editor suggested that a turkey sale be held in Kellogg Park immediately before Thanksgiving Day, with the slogan "Buy Your Pilgrim Turkey in Plymouth." The suggestion drew a hearty laugh, but when the laughing stopped there were some in the committee room who thought the turkey sale was a good idea. So, it was made part of the official program. What's more, Ed Schening promised to purchase the first turkey.

Shortly after that, Tarantino was transferred to a new position in Dallas, Texas, and had to leave the city. As he departed for the new post he remarked, "Don't forget the turkey sale—I think it is a great idea and it could become an annual event."

DAYS WENT BY. The Centennial continued in planned pace and reached a high point when the Lord Mayor of Plymouth, England, Frank Chapman, and three members of his cabinet visited the city over the July Fourth period. It reached another with the annual Fall Festival. But even during these two big events members of the committee remarked, "But wait till you see the turkey sale in Kellogg Park. That will be something to see with hundreds of turkeys on hand."

Then came November. But the high hopes

for another outstanding event were crushed when the turkey raisers in the area scoffed at the idea of bringing their birds to Kellogg Park.

"There are no facilities there," they said, "and we can sell all we want at the farm without extra help we'd need if we came to the park."

WORD OF THIS disappointing turn got to Ed Schening during the Community Fund dinner last Wednesday night and he sat at the table and shook his head mournfully. Then he got an idea.

Up to the Editor's place at the table came the word—"Ed Schening is not going to let you down. He's going to work on a plan in the morning whereby he can buy his turkey in the park."

The message was passed off lightly. But the next morning the phone rang. It was Eber Readman, Schening's right hand man at Burroughs.

"Get your camera ready," he said, "we're coming down to the park with a turkey and the man who raised it. Mr. Schening is buying it and he has asked delivery in the park."

IN A HALF HOUR they were there—turkey and all. The Burroughs boss had called on Loyd Sharland at the Gottschalk Turkey Farm and had him deliver the bird to the park. It was a dandy, weighing 33 pounds, and the transaction took place right in front of the Plymouth Rock to make it official.

"Ed," Schening said, "I promised you I'd buy a turkey in the park and I just couldn't let you down."

He proved to be a man of his word. And who knows, he may have started a trend for an annual turkey sale in the park.

Commission Rejects Surprise Move To Force Vote On Open Housing

The Plymouth City Commission, by a 5 to 1 vote Monday night, rejected a surprise move to be put on record endorsing an open housing ordinance.

The move during its reading of correspondence which included a letter from the City of Highland Park containing a resolution recently adopted in that city.

The resolution urged the State Legislature "to enact fair, impartial, effective Open Housing legislation which will insure uniformity and equality of rights, benefits, terms, conditions, and enforcement throughout the state the equal opportunity to establish their (all residents) residence wherever they desire, restricted only by their financial resources."

No sooner was the letter received than Commissioner Robert Smith moved that the Commission adopt a like resolution and send copies to the members of the legislature.

"Mr. Mayor," Commissioner Arch Vallier remarked in booming voice, "I am against this motion. This is an attempt to get us on record and we promised Commissioner Jim Houk that no action would be taken on open housing until his return."

Commissioner Houk was absent from the meeting as he is visiting his son in New England for the Thanksgiving Holiday.

"I know of no such agreement," Commissioner Smith fired back, "and I will stick with my motion."

At this point Mayor Jabara acknowledged that an agreement had been made that no action on open housing would be taken until December 4.

There was silence for a moment. Then Commissioner James McKeon, one of the commissioners who voted a week ago to give the Plymouth open

housing ordinance its second reading, joined in the discussion.

"I don't see any harm in such a resolution," he said, "I don't know that I exactly favor the Highland Park resolution, but I would be willing to have our city attorney (Charles Lowe), prepare such a resolution—just in case."

"IT WILL be time enough for such a resolution" Commissioner Vallier charged, "After

this Commission takes action. We promised there would be no action tonight and I think we should stick to that."

It further was pointed out to Commissioner McKeon that Commissioner Smith's motion

called for immediate adoption of a resolution and notification to the State Legislature.

Commissioner Smith confirmed that was his intention.

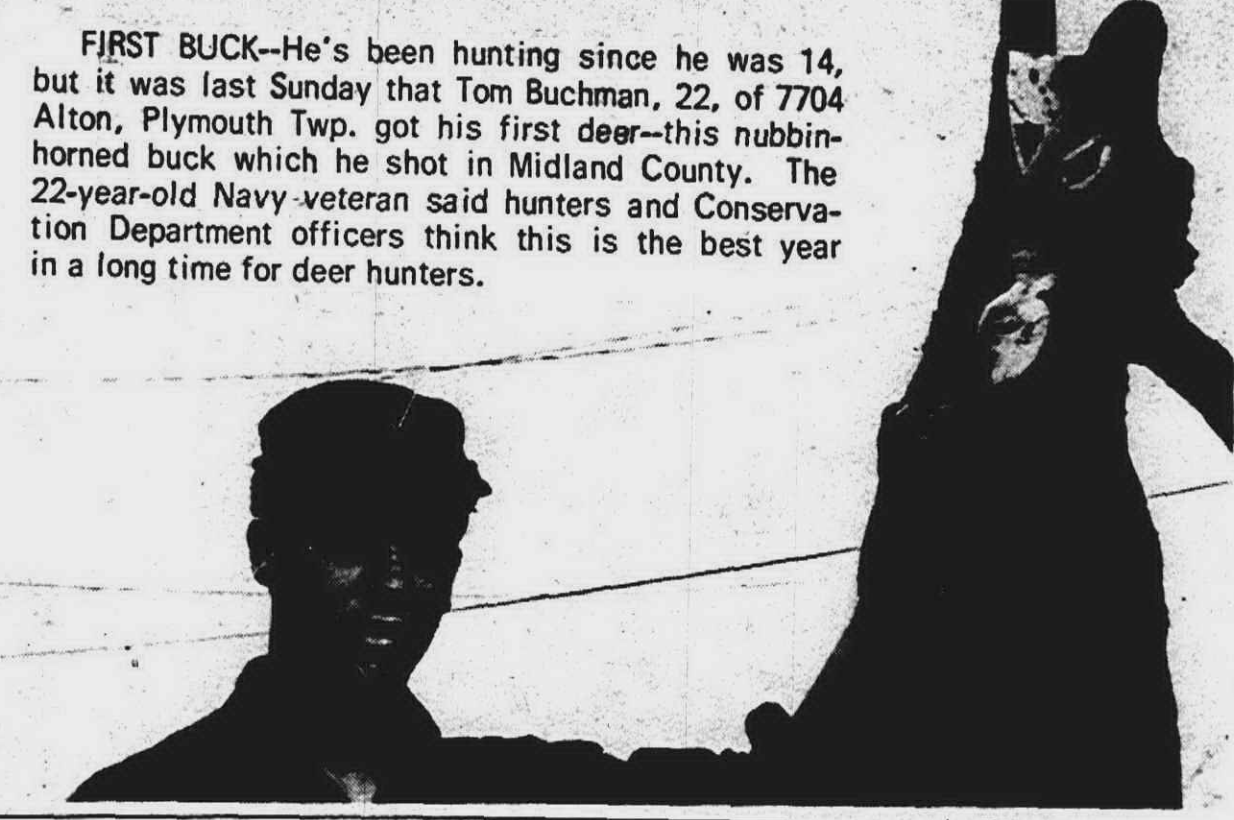
On record for the second time with the plan to adopt the resolution, Commissioner Smith sat back while Commissioner Vallier, with the support of George Hudson, another Commissioner who voted against the second reading of the ordinance a week ago, offered a motion to table the proposal.

Under parliamentary procedure, a motion to table is not debatable, so the roll was called and Commissioner Smith cast the only negative vote.

This action removed all barriers and cleared the stage again for the final determination of the open housing ordinance at the regular meeting on Monday, December 4. There is no regular meeting scheduled next week.

The Commissioners rejected several other items on the agenda. Among them was the recommendation of the City Manager to retain the services of the City Planners, Villcan-Leman & Associates, to draw up final plans for the beautification of Kellogg Park at a

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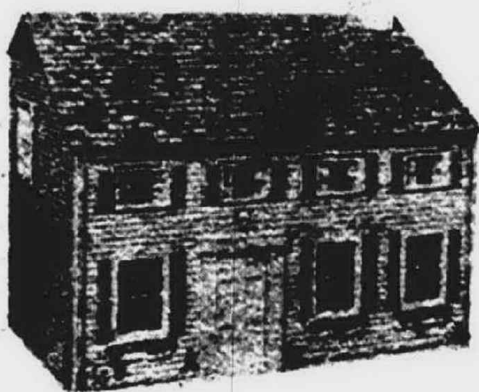
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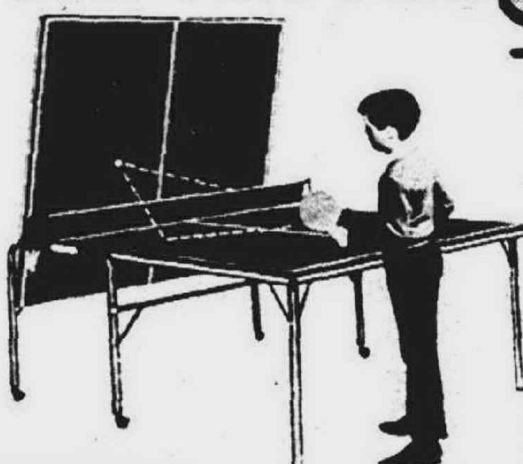


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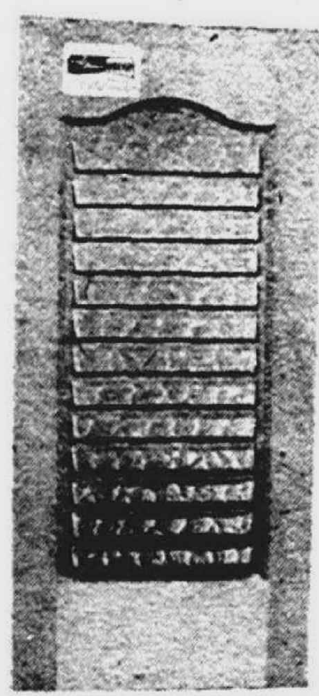


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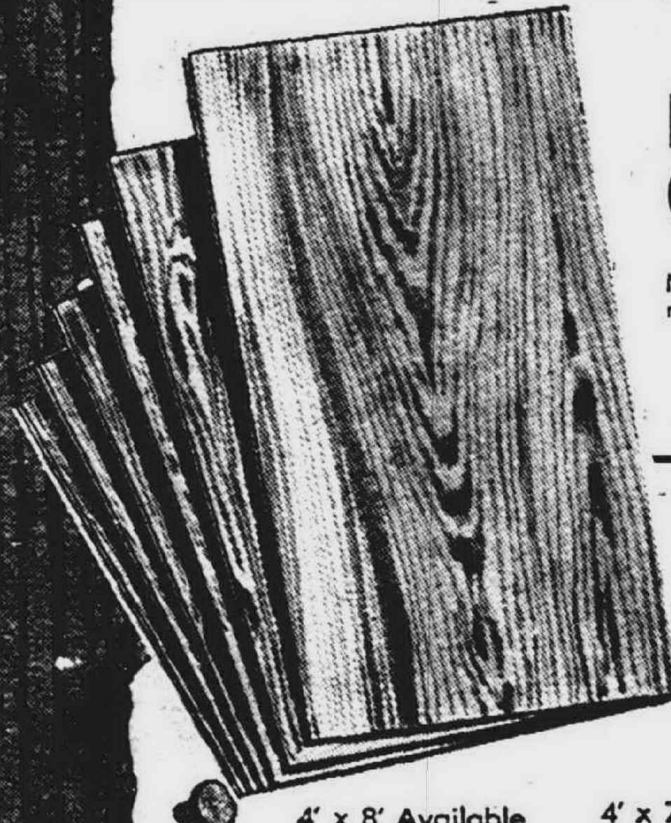
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Americans Praise British Devaluation

Britain's economic belt-tightening—highlighted by its devaluation of the pound—was generally hailed as wise and necessary by American circles.

Minutes after Prime Minister Wilson made the announcement Saturday, President Johnson issued a statement the devaluation would help Britain "achieve the needed improvement in its ability to compete in world markets."

A New York banker said: "It ought to help—it will be a shot in the arm for Britain's exports for a little while." "It's going to put a strain on us," said another banker. "We are going to have to take some steps to strengthen the

dollar. Maybe Congress will put in that income tax increase."

UNIVERSITY OF Michigan economist Daniel Suitts said Britain's move is to be "welcomed ... I had hoped that Wilson would take this step when he first took office ... The British chose a couple of years ago to try to change buying power internally rather than devalue the pound," but failed.

Most American press services attributed the announcement to the "British government," but the politically conservative Chicago Tribune constantly referred to "Britain's Socialist government," adding:

"Britain has now had three Socialist prime ministers, and each has devalued the pound. Ramsay MacDonald in 1931 ended the historic relationship of \$5 to the pound. Clement Attlee further reduced the value to \$2.80 in 1949." And the Wilson government has now devalued it to \$2.40.

DEVALUATION, HOWEVER, was only one step the British government took. It either announced or hinted at:

• Closing the London Stock Exchange and all banks Monday.

• Raising the bank rate of interest on loans from 6.5 to a whopping 8 per cent.

• A cut in expenditures—100 million pounds in the defense budget, and another 100 million pounds in other public spending, including nationalized industries.

• Abolition of export rebates.

• A strict watch over corporate dividends and a sharp increase in corporation taxes.

• A tightening of installment credit for autos.

• A loan of \$1.4 billion from the International Monetary Fund, with approximately half the money coming from the U.S.

WILSON HAD TWO alternative routes he could have traveled in preserving Britain's gold supply and correcting its unfavorable balance of trade.

He could have resorted to heavier borrowing from the International Monetary Fund and freezes on costs and wages.

Or he could have—and did—resort to devaluation and less severe internal belt-tightening.

A clampdown on costs, wages and governmental spending would have been unpopular with his Labor Party's left wing.

WHAT IT MEANS to the average Briton is this:

An American item that previously cost him one pound will now cost about 14 per cent more, making imports more expensive.

A British item that he previously sold for \$2.80 will now sell for \$2.40, making his goods cheaper on the world market.

The cost of home-built products should remain unchanged for the British.

In time, the greater cost of imports will fire up British union's demands for wages and thus push the cost of British goods back upward.

Thus, devaluation is seen as only a temporary measure to save the value of the pound. Britain still has a long way to go to cure its internal economic problems.

Chas. Peck, President Of Demery, Dies

Charles Alfred Peck, president and general manager of Demery Department Stores died Friday, Nov. 17, following a long illness.

Peck began his career in merchandising with McCreey and Co., in New York. He was later affiliated with the Associated Dry Goods Corporation as a divisional merchandiser.

While still in his twenties, he was appointed general merchandise manager of Bloomington.

He came to Detroit with Crowley Milner Co., and became vice president and general manager. Leaving Detroit in 1940, he joined Boggs and Buhl, one of Pittsburgh's oldest and largest department stores, as president and general manager.

PECK RETURNED to Detroit in 1951 to purchase Demery's from the William Demery family. A branch was opened in Birmingham in 1961 and recently a third store was added in the Demery Shopping Plaza, Farmington.

A member of the Episcopal Church all of his life, he served in Detroit as a trustee of the Episcopal Diocese of Michigan, as well as warden and vestryman of the Cathedral Church of St. Paul.

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Will Carry Story Into Ghettos

Romney Promises Nomination Fight

Gov. Romney will carry his campaign for the presidency around the world and into the ghettos of his own country in an evangelistic crusade for a New America.

That was his promise as he stood before the nation Saturday and said:

"I have decided to fight for and win the Republican nomination for the presidency of the United States."

Romney, surrounded by his family and friends who took the first political steps with him in 1962, said he will enter presidential preference primaries in New Hampshire, Wisconsin, Oregon and Nebraska. "Then we'll see where we go from there," he said.

HE MADE THREE major points as he made his announcement in the same room he used to launch his campaign for governor Feb. 10, 1962:

• He will use every measure of his political prestige and twist every legislative arm in sight to give Michigan a landmark open housing law as the fulfillment of a national pledge to the ghettos.

• He will campaign on the issues of religion and morality as the elements of his New America, raking the Johnson administration on foreign issues for its conduct of the war in Vietnam.

• He acknowledged he is an underdog in the campaign for the GOP nomination to former Vice President Richard M. Nixon, loser in 1960 to John F. Kennedy and later to Edmund G. Brown for the governorship of California.

First, Romney called legislative leaders together in Lansing today for a blitz on the open housing issue. He disclosed he has an agreement that it will come to a vote during the special session.

His only public appearance before his Europe-Asia trip, Dec. 7-Jan. 6, will be a lecture in Topeka, Kan., for a program named for former Gov. Alfred Landon, Dec. 6. Landon was the GOP loser to Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1936.

ROMNEY'S TROOPS are rolling together a combined Lansing-Washington campaign office in the nation's capitol and will start a New Hampshire drive when he gets back.

Scott Romney, now a 26-year-old Harvard law student and his wife will carry the family name into New Hampshire with the A New America slogan and a people-to-people campaign while he's gone.

Romney said he would go through the first four presidential primaries pell mell despite the results of any of the early tests.

During the jammed press conference where 12 television cameras threw up a jungle of cables and lights, Romney said he has been an underdog since his family was chased out of Mexico by Pancho Villa.

"I expect to win in the same way I've overcome underdog positions in the past," he said. "My critics have predicted failure all along."

"When I went to American Motors (as president) they said I couldn't keep it alive. We forced the other automobile companies to change their approach and we prospered."

"The people of this country still exercise the ultimate decision."

A BRITISH reporter revived the question of Romney's eligibility to run for the office since he was born in Mexico, a point Rep. Emmanuel Celler (D-N.Y.) is still trying to have tested in the courts.

Romney answered that he's had major law firms checking the legal tangle, adding:

"There's no question about my being a natural born citizen. All I had to be was born."

He said his biggest problem would be "reaching the people," and he side-stepped a direct question on how much money he would need in the pre-convention campaign.

"I place more importance on getting to know the people and giving them the opportunity to know me," he said. "I have never run for office with a commitment to anybody and I don't intend to start now."

He said Nixon is the darling of the "Republican hierarchy and organization" but did not refer to California's Gov. Reagan, New York Gov. Rockefeller or others.

ROMNEY, REMINDED of his day of seclusion before announcing his candidacy for governor, was asked the circumstances when he made his decision "about a week ago"

to seek the GOP nomination for president.

"I was thinking hard," he said.

He said he has not declined in the public opinion polls "as much as the press would indicate," Romney said former President Eisenhower did not have the early support of all Republican governors in 1952 or later and that the Lou Harris poll shows him in much better shape than Gallup or the recent Associated Press poll of 1964 Republican national convention delegates.

In his formal announcement which ended speculation which started the day he took office as governor, Romney attacked the Johnson administration on foreign and domestic fronts and said his New America must

return to religion and morality on both.

HE SAID the crime rate, which shows more than half the major offenses are committed by teen-agers, indicates a breakdown in morality--turning youth to a drug and alcohol life of protest.

The adults in the ghettos, bitter over no-action promises, are ripe and receptive targets for revolutionaries, he said. Protest and violence, he said, are the result of unfulfilled promises.

On the international front, Romney flared:

"As we have drifted away from principle at home, we have undermined the foundation of our position in the world. Once a beacon of hope for people everywhere, America is

now widely regarded as belligerent and domineering.

"We are mired in an Asian land war which sacrifices our young men and drains our resources, with no end in sight.

Time and again we have been taken toward the mountain top only to fall back into the crevices of sickening reality.

"False optimism and lack of candor on the part of our

leaders have confused our citizens and sapped their resolve.

"But I am confident that the American people can reverse this trend. We have the creative energy and the basic principles

to build a New America."

HE CALLED for "full and equal citizenship" in the race conflict, adding "it is more important to make our streets safe than to put a man on the

moon."

Romney said America must establish business-labor peace, measure contribution to the national interest in terms of the individual, "not power blocs, must reestablish controls over federal spending and promote public and private responsibility.

"To apply these principles, to achieve these goals, to build a New America, we must have a Republican president," he said.

Romney, a Mormon bishop whose younger son, Mitt, is now serving a two-year missionary commitment in France, said the answer lies in a return to religion and morality.

"We must end the spirit of 'anything goes,' and restore the importance and quality of our personal lives."

He charged that President Johnson is "experienced only in the tools of government" and will continue to build a bigger governmental control over individuals.

ROMNEY SAID the major problem is to de-centralize the problem-solving process and energize "the great talents and character of the American people." He added:

"I have had such experience. I have worked in the fields, in construction, in independent and voluntary national and local agencies during war and peace, in international trade and labor conferences, in two of the nation's largest corporations operating in three major industries and in state and federal governments."

Romney went downstairs to the banquet room where more than 600 (475 were served brunch, the rest were overflow) had watched his press conference on closed-circuit television.

To the old but enthusiastic chant of "We Want Romney" and the waving signs "Romney's Great in '68," he replied:

"Romney's going to need you. Romney has known that all along."

63 Killed As Plane Crashes In Cincinnati

A Pan American Airways jet liner from Los Angeles crashed in an apple orchard a mile and a half short of the runway in Cincinnati, O. Monday night killing 63 of the 72 persons aboard. The plane was scheduled to fly to Pittsburgh and New York. The identities of the victims were withheld pending notification of next of kin.

Rank and file Republicans, independents, and dissenting Democrats of President Johnson's administration make Richard M. Independent give Nixon 28 per cent; Rockefeller 21 per cent; Reagan 14 per cent; and Romney 14 per cent.

A 22-year-old bridegroom on his honeymoon was one of three persons dead when carbon monoxide fumes from a swimming pool heater seeped through an Akron, Ohio inn. He is Bruce Plagman, of Cleveland. His bride, Joan, 21,

is being treated for shock and carbon monoxide poisoning. Two sisters, Miss Mary Bishop, 56, and Betty Bishop, 50, were the other dead. One hundred guests were evacuated from the hotel and 70 treated at local hospitals.

Senator Robert F. Kennedy has come out in support of Senator Eugene J. McCarthy's challenge for the Democratic presidential nomination opposing President Johnson. Alluding to the war in Vietnam, Kennedy declared McCarthy's entry in the bid for the White House "would allow Americans to take out their frustrations in talk instead of violence. It could be a major, important service for our society." McCarthy, an outspoken critic of the President's handling of the war, has yet to announce officially he is a candidate and Kennedy, himself, did not voice any direct promise of support if the Wisconsin Senator does run.

Mayor Lindsay of New York, in Los Angeles and having breakfast with California Lt. Gov. Finch who managed Nixon's 1960 presidential campaign, denied growing speculation and a report that Gov. Rockefeller believed the mayor was campaigning for the presidency. "I'm not a candidate for anything," he replied to questions.

Florida Gov. Kirk has threatened to drive a nomadic gang of motorcycle riders called the Outlaws out of the state within 30 days. His orders went out to law officers after 18-year-old Christine Deese of West Palm Beach was nailed to a tree by four-inch nails driven through her hands after she disobeyed orders as one of the gang members.

Want to own one-square-inch of land close to the border of Communist China? You can buy a mini-plot of Hong Kong property for 10 Hong Kong dollars which is about \$1.75 from promoter David A. Jackson of the Lands Association of Hong Kong. With it you get a title certificate printed on the background of a Chinese painting. A group in England recently sold 40,000 such identical plots of a little bit of England for 29 shillings (\$4.35).

Los Angeles Authorities have allocated \$2-million for armed guards and two-way radios for 1,500 local buses following a wave of holdups in which one driver was killed, two shot, and several others knifed and assaulted. The move followed a threat by bus drivers to walk off the job after 353 robberies this year.

The Glen Cover, Long Island, City Council held its meeting before a group of high school students and flunked out with a \$69,929.11 error quoted as overtime due employees of the city water department. It should have read \$70.89, a correction brought to the Council's attention by teacher Mrs. Barbara Gallison.

Valentine Reuther, father of UAW President Walter Reuther, died Friday in Wheeling, W. Va., hospital at the age of 86.

Big Moment Arrives For McManus

Dick McManus has given his life and his money to George Romney every day since before the first campaign for governor.

McManus, a civil engineer with a firm in Southfield, can afford the money now.

Romney-watchers who have traveled and wept with McManus, have munched hamburgers together in the back of forgotten station wagons and have cheered when he scores, wonder about the time.

"It's a great opportunity for me after a lifetime of making money for myself," said Dick. "I've been with him from the start and I'm still his advance man."

McMANUS, a short gray man with the instant smile, is with others planning the Asian phase of Romney's trip which starts with the flight to Paris on Dec. 7.

"I'd like to spend some time in Asia with some of my friends from World War II," he said. "I was a Marine and some of my friends are generals now."

McManus has accepted every chore Romney and his staff had for him, from scheduling the hectic campaign stops and making sure the candidate made every one, to preparing the way as an advance man.

It was McManus, in 1962, who coined an advance man's creed after chasing and running sometimes ahead of the campaign all over the state:

"There goes Romney. I must hurry and catch him for I am his advance man."

AS ROMNEY took the biggest step of many in his political career, McManus was there.

In the crowd were former GOP candidate Paul Bagwell, who lost to Gov. G. Mennen Williams in 1958 and to Gov. John B. Swainson in 1960, former Gov. Wilbur Brucker, Federal Judge John Feikens, a former GOP state chairman, Lawrence Lindemer, another former state chairman, U.S. Senator Robert P. Griffin, nine congressmen, legislators and others.

Romney by his magic posture and by mentioning their names swept them all into his political whirlwind now grinding with cosmic direction toward GOP presidential nomination campaign.

The scene was typical Romney verve and dash. There was a Romney Band, a group of teenagers playing marches as the faithful flocked to pay \$5 a plate for brunch in Detroit on a rainy Saturday morning.

The band, while talented, knew "On Wisconsin" better than any other selection. The pace changed to "George Girl" when the brunch started.

Prepared Applications Stimulate Plate Sales

LANSING--Prepared license plate applications sent out to most of Michigan's nearly five million vehicle owners have stimulated unprecedented early sales of 1968 license plates. Branches of the secretary of state reported sales higher than recorded in previous years. A survey indicated that early

customers were using the prepared applications when buying plates on ratios of from three to one to seven to one in some instances, reported Secretary of State James M. Hare.

HE SAID his Department had run into a "few minor problems with the new applications,

most of these involving wrong information about the vehicle. "This is the very kind of problem we intend to overcome with prepared applications this year," Hare commented. "We hope to correct wrong information through the prepared applications and our mechanized files will then have complete and accurate information on virtually all vehicles in Michigan."

Hare said he had received some inquiries from persons who felt that continuing the old system of filling out the application manually at a branch office of the secretary of state as in previous years would save money.

"Certainly, going to a prepared application this year means an increased expenditure," he said. "But actually, we had no choice if we wanted to mechanize our files for the future to be able to furnish vital information to state police and other enforcement agencies on a moment's notice. It was necessary for this information on vehicles to be compiled and put on tapes for our computer."

HARE SAID even though prepared applications would cost more the first year, savings over "the long haul" would be "substantial."

"Previously, vehicle information was captured on a catch-as-catch-can, year-to-year basis and typed out manually. This resulted in many inaccuracies as well as a slow, cumbersome process."

"But once the information is captured on a particular vehicle, it will become a part of a permanent computerized file available to official agencies on a moment's notice," Hare said. "What's most important, the information will be correct."

He said mechanization of the vehicle files would eliminate long and costly and oftentimes inaccurate typing, and the state's taxpayers will be saving an estimated \$300,000 per year when the program gets into full swing.

IN THE LAW enforcement area, Hare termed the information an invaluable tool for police agencies.

"In a few seconds, our computer can ferret out information and send it on a direct line to state police or other police agencies on stolen cars by listing the correct serial number and complete description of the vehicle."

An important by-product of the whole operation, says Hare, is that it saves time and effort on the part of many of the state's vehicle owners when they buy their new license plates.

"The new forms should be helpful in cutting down somewhat on the long lines and the time it takes for persons to purchase plates. After all, these applications will be filled out before persons reach our license plate offices."

He cautioned vehicle owners to "obtain 1968 plates as soon as possible and not wait until late February. The prepared applications should serve as a reminder as well as a stimulus to persons to get their plates early," he said.

Yule Seal Drive Off In Big Way

The 1967 Christmas Seal campaign in Wayne County is off to a flying start.

Jack A. Tompkins and Judi Kuneman, co-chairmen of the drive, reported that \$60,297, or nearly 15 per cent of the \$425,000 goal was reached in the first week of the campaign which began on Nov. 14 and continues through December.

Tompkins is vice president of American Airlines while Miss Kuneman, 18-year-old recovered tuberculosis patient, is Michigan's Christmas Seal chairman.

Detroit Mayor Jerome P. Cavanagh, meanwhile, proclaimed the week of December 3 through December 9, as Christmas Seal Week.

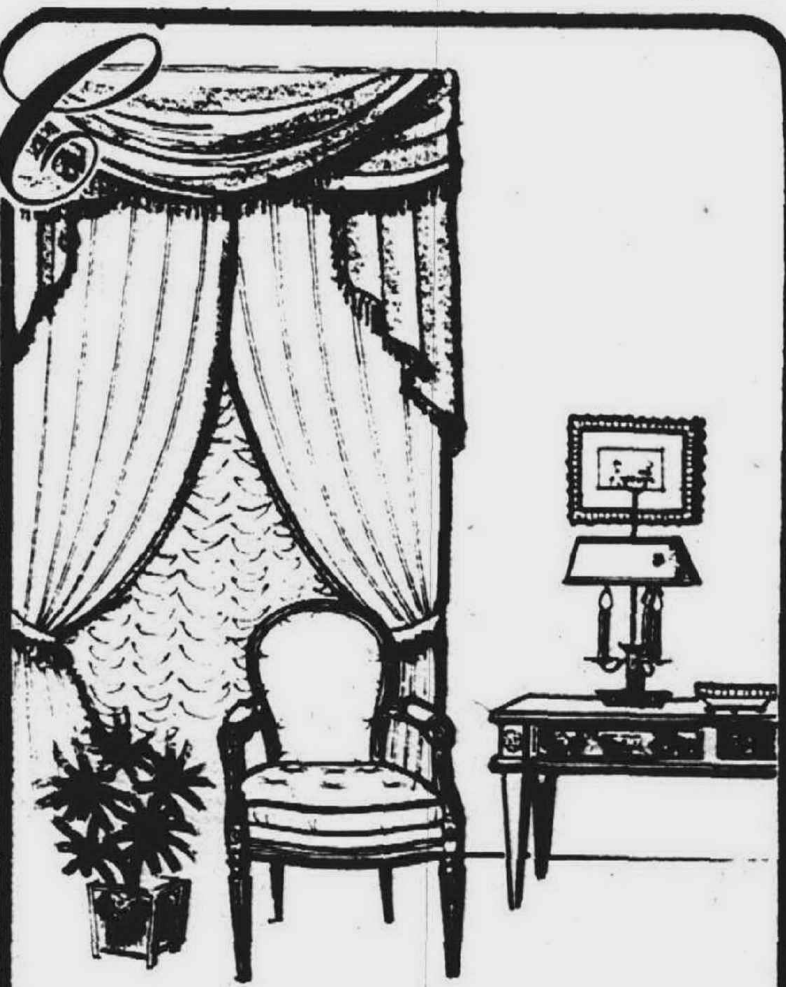

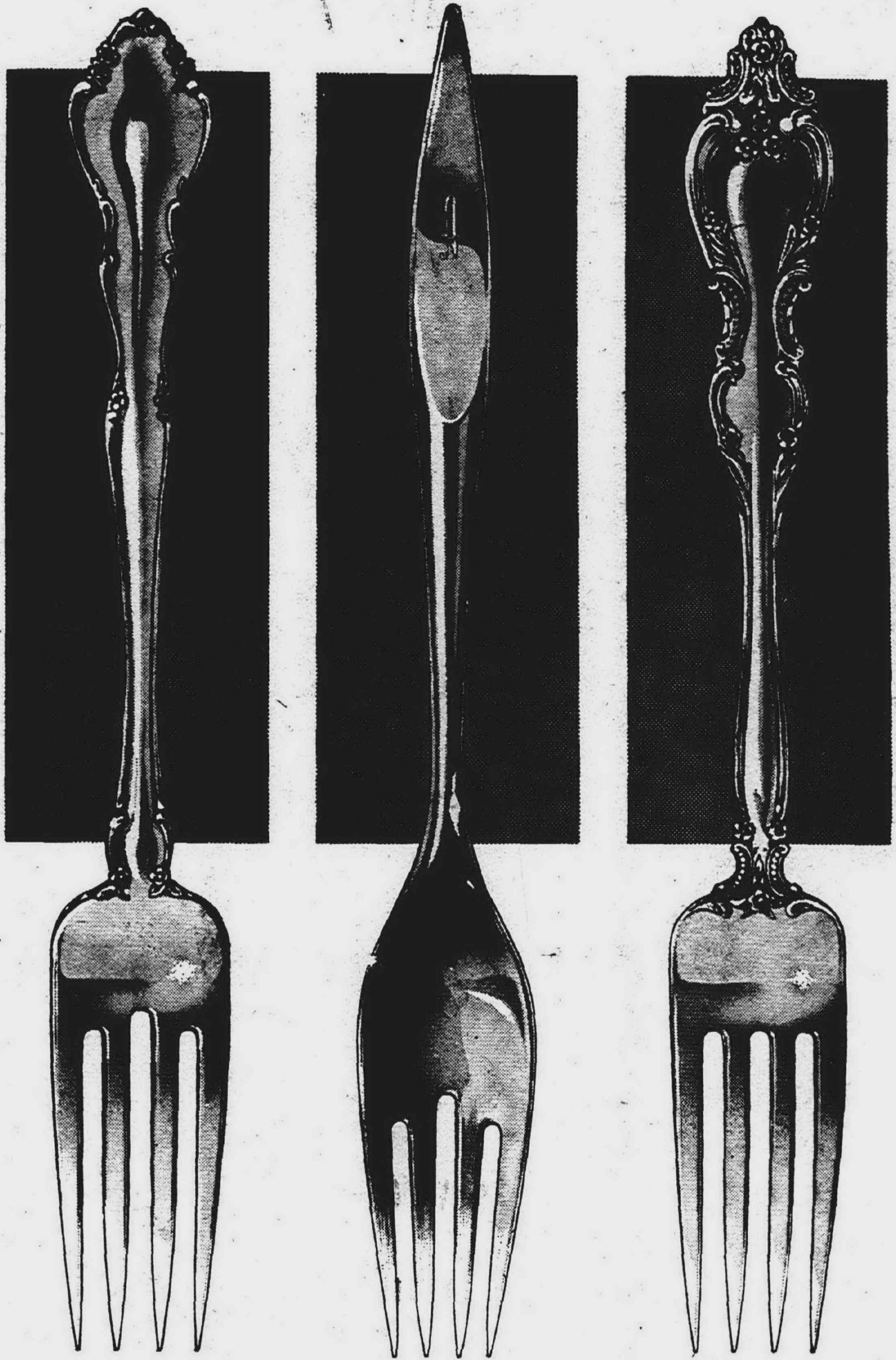

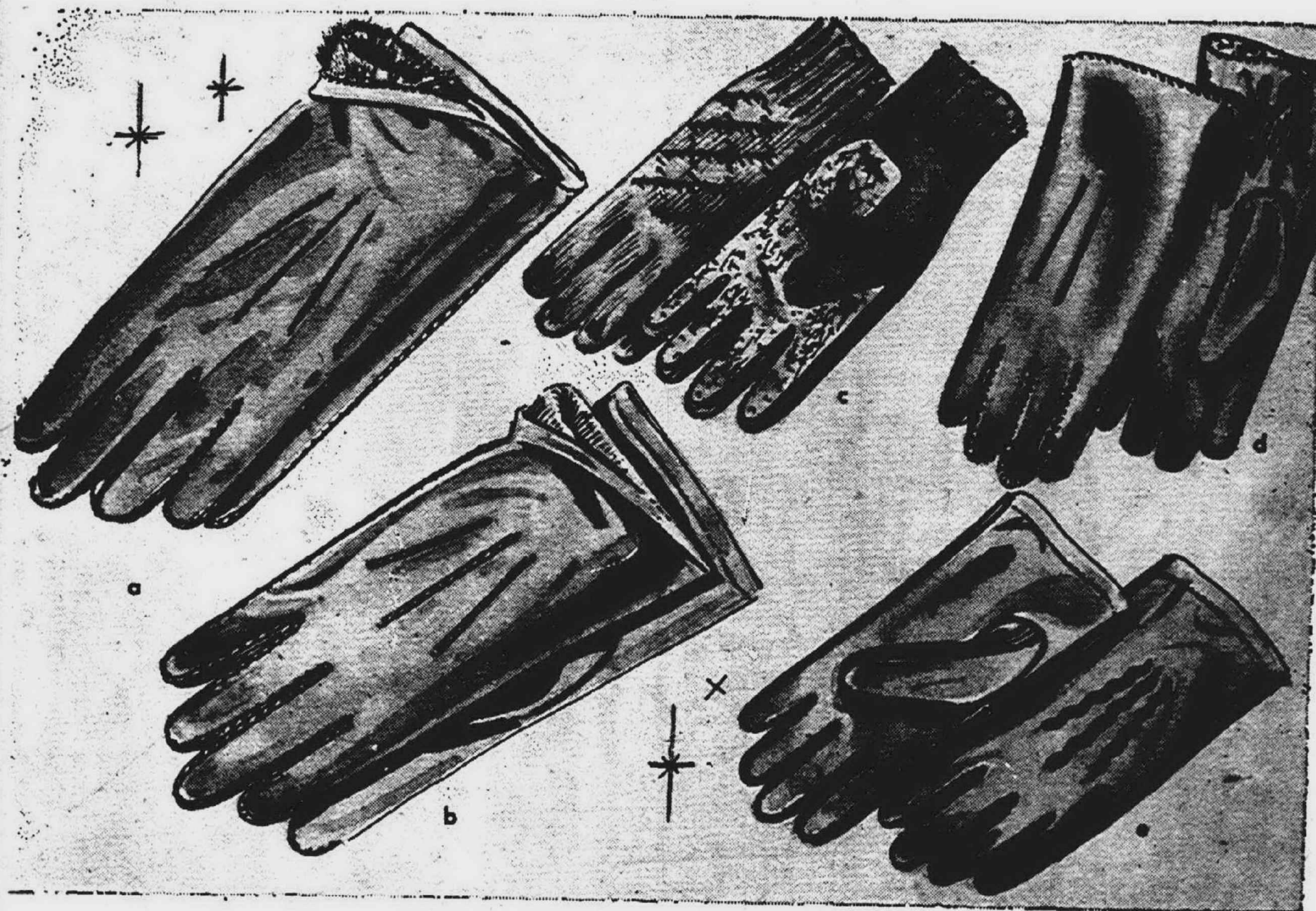

Poverty War A Skirmish

"Arson, looting, and murder have no relation to civil rights, but neither do the riots offer the slightest justification to calling a halt to programs that strike at the evils that breed riots," University of Michigan economist William Haber declared last week.

Speaking to the Michigan Welfare League in Lansing, Haber, dean of U-M's College of Literature, Science and the Arts, said that:

Americans are "too easily discouraged" by setbacks in the campaign against poverty--although the campaign itself is badly inadequate.

"We are not engaged in a war on poverty," he said. "It is only a skirmish."

"Progress will be slow and many of our poverty dollars are going to be wasted. In the long run, however, I am of the view that these expenditures will provide substantial dividends."

PROBLEMS WHICH the poverty program is trying to attack were long in building up, Haber noted.

Since the technological revolution in Southern agriculture

barely 25 years ago, five million Negroes have migrated to the urban North.

Negro teen-agers have increased by 50 per cent in just five years. Unemployment is higher among Negro high school graduates than among white dropouts. Many Negro youths have a better education than is needed for the best jobs they can get.

Negro unemployment runs at twice the rate of white unemployment--and often three or four times as high among Negro youth. As Negroes have moved into Northern cities, whites have moved out--and so has much industrial activity.

"THE NEGRO IN our Northern industrial cities, such as Detroit, has been subjected to increasing isolation from the white community and from available jobs."

Among the solutions, Haber insisted that "the concentration of Negroes in the core areas must be diluted; nondiscrimination in housing laws must be provided to industries to relocate within the inner city and these must be adequate to overcome the economic advantages of suburban location."

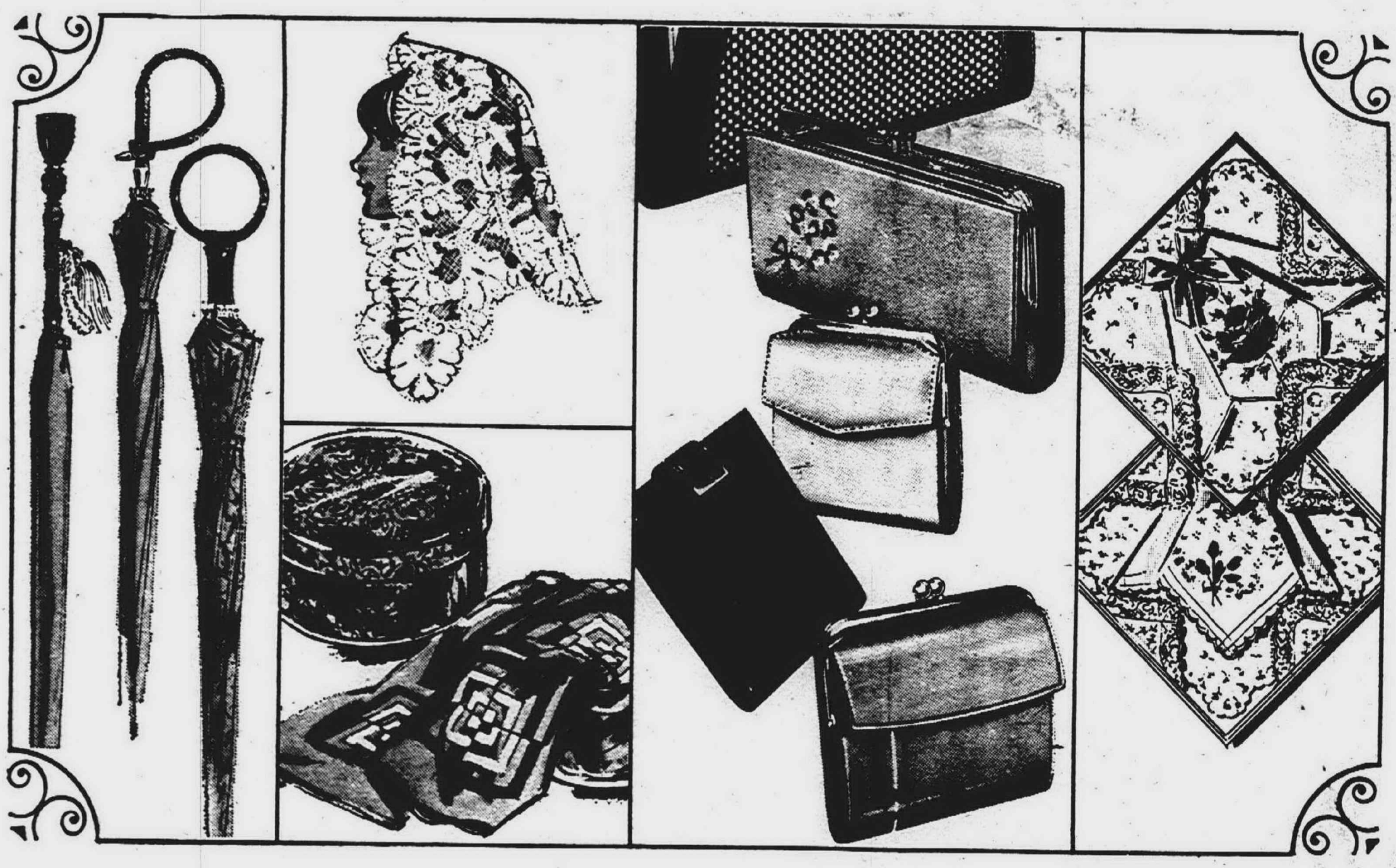

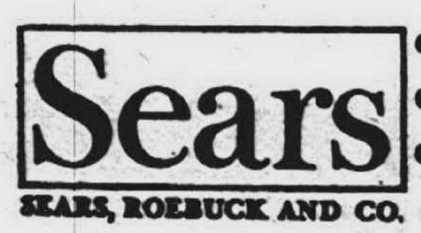

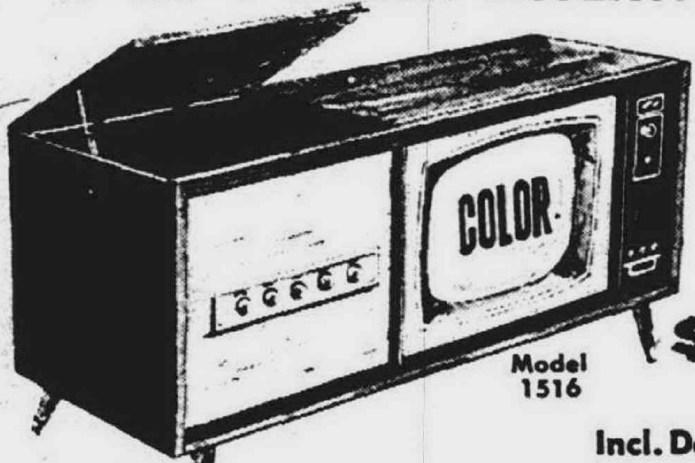

Acting State Highway Director Henrik Stafseth said net receipts of the Highway Fund during July, August and September of 1967 amounted to \$56,131,606, an increase of \$1,285,829 or 2.3 per cent for the same period in 1966.

MVACF Claims Averaging \$1,000

LANSING -- Average claim paid from the Motor Vehicle Accident Claims Fund since the beginning of the fiscal year was over the \$1,000 mark, it was disclosed in a three-month finance report of the Fund.

Fire Calls Drop In Township Areas

Paul J. Albright, director of public safety in Plymouth Township, is keeping his fingers crossed--and for a good reason.

Labor Group Appointed In Township

Even though Plymouth Township contract with the firemen doesn't run out until April 1968 the Board has already set up a collective bargaining committee of three trustees to begin study on the matter.

Albright explained that the Township Fire Department had made 118 fire runs up to October, 1967. This figure was down 46 fire runs from the same period in 1966, when 164 fire runs had been made.

Albright also said that the total alarms answered in 1966 were 248 while so far this year there have been 232 alarms answered.

In these total figures were 55 rescue runs for 1966 and 61 for 1967.

The director had no explanation for the fact that there have been fewer fire runs so far this year. He said that things were just happening this way.

He explained that grass fires are usually heavy, but this year there have been only 25 as opposed to 59 last year.

For the month of October 1967, there have been eight fire runs while for the same month in 1966 there were 17.

Albright commented that he hoped that things remained as quiet as they have been.

IT WAS AGREED that the Beautification Committee could do the job at a savings to the city and the money could be used in other projects.

The Commissioners also rejected a recommendation of Loren L. Johnson, Assistant Chief of Police, that the "no parking" signs which had been in use on Spring Street, between Starkweather and Mill, for a 30-day trial period be made permanent.

"We have gotten along with the parking for so long", Commissioner McKeon pointed out, "I don't think any harm will be done if parking is allowed for several more months. We should make a more thorough study of the area inasmuch as we have had no complaints from the citizens."

After months of study the Commission passed a purchasing ordinance which provides guidelines for all future purchases. And it also gave first reading to a new electrical ordinance.

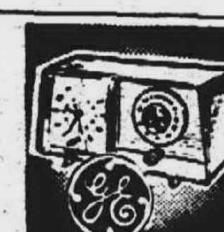

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Congressman Esch Reports

Congress Starts Another Move To Share Federal Funds

The ice finally was broken for consideration of sharing federal revenues with states and local communities as the Subcommittee on Fiscal Policy began hearings on the subject recently. To date the majority in Congress has shied away from any official discussion of this concept and this latest move is encouraging.

Last week I had an opportunity to submit testimony to this group in support of revenue sharing. The occasion was in conjunction with an appearance by Mayor Wendell E. Hulcher, of Ann Arbor, who is recognized as a strong supporter of the concept and who is representative of the thousands of smaller cities throughout the nation who will soon find themselves without sufficient revenue sources to serve their expanding populations.

One reason these cities will be faced with this problem is because the federal government has usurped the largest and most effective method of taxation. Of course, portions of federal revenue are returned to local areas, but hardly in proportion to its future needs and certainly not in the most efficient manner.

IT HAS long been clear that the federal government is the most efficient and effective tax collector. However, anyone who has had the opportunity to deal with massive federal red tape and bureaucracy knows that

Washington is far from the most efficient distributor of funds. In nearly every federal program vast amounts are wasted in irrelevant management expenses.

Every local official is frustrated by extensive forms that must be submitted to numerous federal agencies in applying for a proliferation of specific federal grants-in-aid. Each program requires different sets of data, involves different auditing procedures and grants different

percentages of the total cost on a given project.

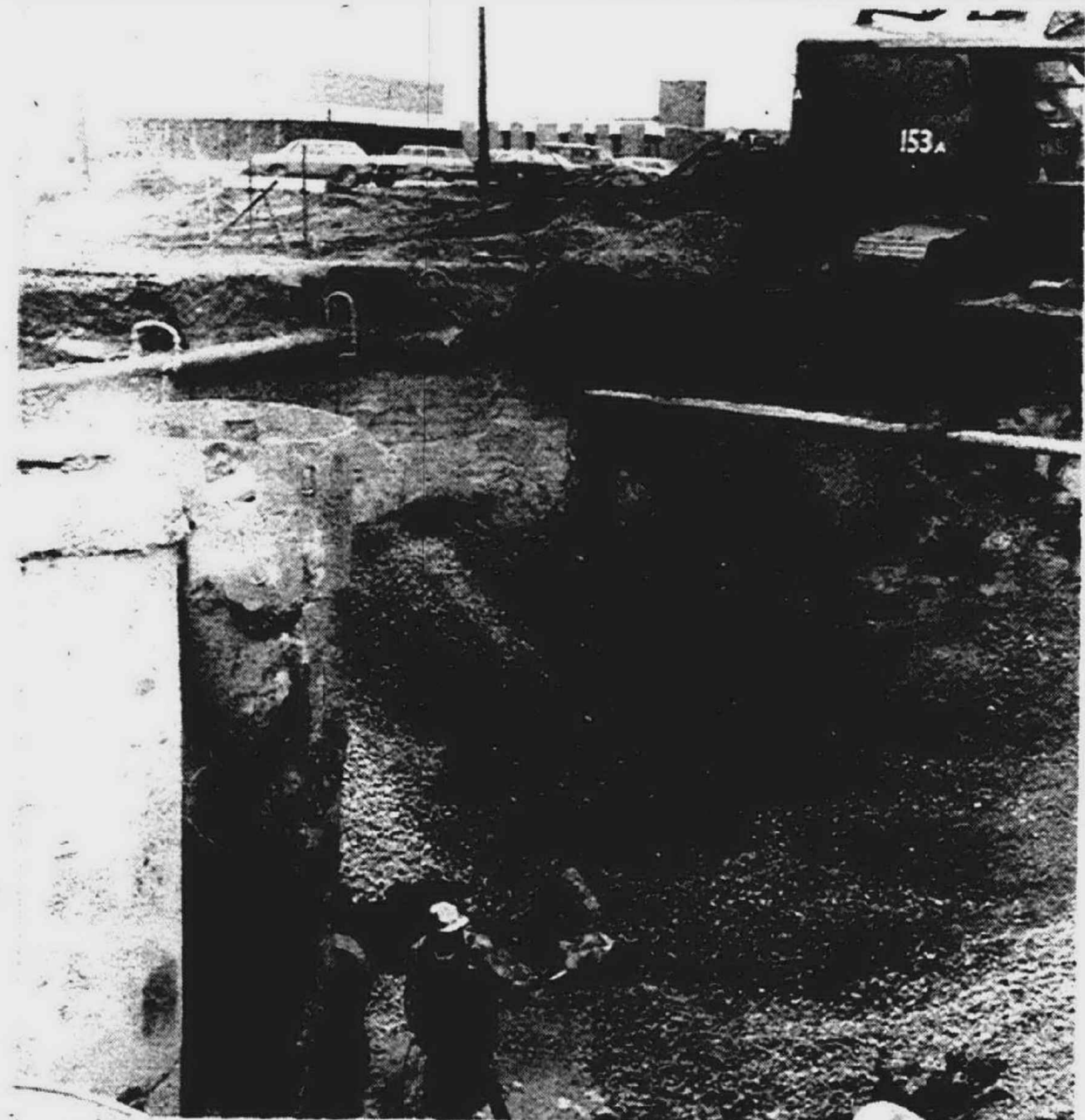
Indeed, the current federal approach has become so complex that many communities and school systems find it necessary to employ outside experts for the sole purpose of keeping track of programs and the procedures for applying. I have had to designate one person in my office to work with these people and more importantly to work with those local governments who cannot

afford to hire such an expert.

ALL OF this indicates one thing—that we need a more efficient and effective means of returning federal funds to local and state governments where they are being used. The grant-in-aid system may have been adequate when the flow of money from the federal government was small. But today that flow has reached \$15 billion annually in 485 separate programs and the amount is steadily rising.

New and creative concepts must be instituted if we are to maintain a viable federal, state and local system.

Under consideration by the Subcommittee are various proposals all of which deal with the broad area of tax sharing. I expressed the hope that they would recommend specific proposals that would stop the ever-widening proliferation of the inadequate and inefficient grant-in-aid approach. A beginning might be found in shifting

Perry Richwines Find New Zealand Most Fascinating Country On World Tour

We have really had a formal introduction to New Zealand. I would consider this to be an outstanding "Socialized State".

New Zealand became a Welfare State in 1890 when acts were passed guaranteeing protection to workers and their unions, minimum wage was established, large estates were taken from their owners and subdivided, financial assistance given to small farmers, an old age pension act enacted, and now Social Security is literally granted from the cradle to the grave.

As a result, poverty is not apparent and taxes make it almost impossible to be rich.

This is the cleanest country I have ever visited. More sheep are raised here than in the U. S. and Canada put together.

Approximately 80 million sheep are grazing in this nation. The average sheep produces 12 pounds of wool per year and the price of wool is lower than the cost of production.

The average skilled laborer, which includes the carpenter, bricklayer and electrician works a 40 hour week for a dollar an hour!

Their dollar is worth \$1.40 American money. Social Security payments run from \$44 per month at age 60—to \$50 a month at 65.

Persons on Social Security can occupy Government owned housing units from \$3.50 to \$5 per week.

This nation is very much aware of what our Government is trying to do in Vietnam.

Attacks were actually made on these islands by the Japanese during the war, but they were unsuccessful. Many of our troops were hospitalized in New Zealand and some of the buildings used as hospitals are still located in the city park.

I ATTENDED the meeting in Newmarket today and it was District Governor's Day. Here reminded the Rotarians that, "Profit is a by-product of success."

Also that, "The destiny of our community is determined by the serious community effort of its Service Clubs."

He reminded everyone that in order to make your Rotary membership effective, the member must be personally involved in Rotary.

We were reminded of our serious obligations as members of our communities. The cordiality extended to us by the people of this country was very impressive.

WE ARE now aboard the ship heading for the Fiji Islands. The more we saw of New Zealand, the better we liked it.

They have earthquakes there but most of them are not serious. We had two earthquakes on Sunday morning but they were hardly noticeable.

They take excellent care of their soil and fertilize mostly from small airplanes.

The land has too many steep hills to use horse or tractor driven fertilizing equipment.

They have to use steel cor-

rugating roofing material or clay and tile shingles on the roofs because of the high winds.

The winds go up to 80 miles an hour and it is often necessary to string rope along the sidewalks to give the pedestrian something to hang on to.

There are very few tall buildings and the city owns most of the multiple dwellings. The state owns most of the buses and all of the railroads.

THE PEOPLE ARE very friendly and seem to work like a team. They live together in a friendly manner and seem to have a great sense of responsibility to their neighbors.

We checked over many new houses and buildings under construction and found that their building code, in spite of high winds here, does not require building materials as strong as those required by the city and township of Plymouth.

Two by four rafters and two by six floor joists are used. Their two by fours are full size however, and not one and

five eights by three and one half like in our area.

Re-enforced concrete is used more and cement floors are very common.

We watched a wedding party and instead of having their own cars they had rented three tax cabs.

The taxis were all trimmed up like our wedding cars at home but the taxi drivers were very much a part of the wedding party and dressed up with long white coats like the butchers wear in the super markets at home!

VACANT LOTS HERE with all improvements including asphalt streets cost \$4,000.

The city puts in all the improvements to the water line but do not assess the cost to the property.

The beautiful parks and lawns with flowers add much to the general beauty of the area.

There are lots of protected bays and all types of water craft are used. Their best season is from Oct. 1 to April 15.

They have developed their own diesel with jets that can go in shallow water.

They have tides up to 12 feet and many of their small craft are standing on dry ground when the tide is out.

Many of the parks fence off areas to permit the beef (mostly black Angus) and sheep to mow the lawns.

The fact that all the residents keep their property clean and

in good repair was very noticeable.

Junk yards were not to be seen. Still it was not at all uncommon to see good residential properties adjoin commercial or industrial areas.

Segregation is not known. All people live together without problems.

The only thing wrong with the area is that it is not home.

Kellogg Park was cleaned up plus major and local streets were swept.

Cleaning up also was done at Riverside Cemetery plus 40 foundations were dug and poured and four funerals were conducted.

"No parking" signs were removed along S. Harvey and Hartsough Streets and various other sign work was accomplished last week.

Cold patching of asphalt was done from Burroughs to M-14 and from Main to Mill Streets.

The DPW did some major work in repairing a broken water main at Ross and McKinley and one sanitary sewer tap was installed at 800 Plymouth Rd. while one service was dug up.

Fluid Dissolves Films

Ever notice a streaky or lacy film on your car windshield when you first operate the wipers in wet weather?

To remedy this potential interference with vision, chemists at General Motors Research Laboratories, Warren, have developed a new windshield washer fluid, the company has announced.

Beginning this month, the new all-weather washer fluid, called "Optikleen," will be available to motorists through GM automotive dealers—Chevrolet, Pontiac, Oldsmobile, Buick and Cadillac.

Optikleen contains a special chemical ingredient—unique in commercial fluids—that quickly removes not only visible dirt but also traces of organic contaminants on the windshield. These invisible contaminants, the researchers found, are the cause of lacy water films on windshields.

The patented washer fluid also contains a second chemical ingredient that keeps minerals from precipitating in the tap water with which it is mixed.

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U-M Regents Study Effect Of Decision

ANN ARBOR—University of Michigan President Harlan Hatcher says the Regents will decide whether they want to accept a circuit court ruling on a constitutional question or appeal to a higher court.

Washtenaw County Circuit Court Judge William F. Ager's decision, rendered Nov. 14, is that Act 379 does not conflict with the constitutional responsibilities of the Board of Regents.

ACT 379, which amended the

Hutchinson Act of 1947, provided for the Michigan Labor Mediation Board, an administrative agency created by the legislature, to regulate and make certain decisions on collective bargaining in the public sector.

While contesting application of the legislation in a suit filed in December 1965, the University has declared itself "not in opposition to the principle of representation elections and collective bargaining."

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Esch Asks Full Status Be Given DC

Congressman Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor) has urged the House Rules Committee to allow consideration of a measure giving Congressional representation to the District of Columbia.

In a letter to the committee chairman, Rep. William M. Colmer, Esch urged immediate hearings on granting a rule on the D.C. legislation, which has already passed the House Judiciary Committee. Rules Committee action must precede consideration by the full House.

"The people of the District are deserving of much more than anonymity in the halls of Congress. Let us not make them wait any longer," Esch stated in the letter which also pointed out that the District has been without representation for 167 years.

The legislation, which apparently has been bottled up for this year by the Rules Committee, would allow the District to elect two Representatives and two Senators. It is similar to a bill introduced by Esch earlier in the session. Nineteen previous attempts to enact such a measure have failed.

At present, the people of the District can only vote in Presidential elections, a right secured in 1964 with the implementation of the 23rd Amendment to the Constitution. The District neither elects its own officials nor has representation in Congress.

Letter To Editor Another Side To Open Housing

ED. NOTE: The following letter directed to Mayor James Jabara also was sent to the Mail & Observer by an opponent of the open housing ordinance.

Dear Mayor Jabara:

I would like to register my objection to the proposed "Open Housing" legislation for the City of Plymouth.

To oppose such legislation today implies bias and bigotry. If I am judged by those terms, then it is the chance I have to take. But I can no longer sit by and listen to the fallacious arguments being put forth in behalf of such a law (and the arguments for integration and, worse yet, forced integration.)

My position is that such legislation is not necessary for the City of Plymouth and that it will serve no useful purpose -- on the contrary, we are ignoring the experience of other communities.

The Plymouth Assembly for Equal Opportunity and the Ministerial Association talk down their long noses, call our town "illy white" in that we do not have any Negroes, or experience with Negroes, or that it is a sociological necessity that we be integrated. This argument implies that all in Plymouth live on an island on which they were born and that

association with other races will ordinarily make that race love us, and that we will love that race.

I WOULD remind you that most people in Plymouth came from someplace else and have associated with other races and religions. Many are prejudiced for good reason. The ministers and the Assembly use this "association" argument as the solution to racial problems. I would hasten to ask that if "association" is the answer, then why aren't race relations in the South any better than they are?

Negroes will come to Plymouth, and they will live in Plymouth. A law such as Open Housing will not accomplish that. A feeling that integration is desirable, as mentioned by the Plymouth Assembly, will not accomplish that. It can be guaranteed that if a Negro, or any other family, moves in only under the protection of such a law, it will not be received gracefully.

Proponents of Open Housing legislation equate such action as the panacea for all so-called social ills of our time. It is a means to an end. The end justifies the means. Human nature, morality, and even every day realities are ignored!

First, it says that the Negro wants to live with us. The inference being that we are the better society, and that he can only be a human being by being "integrated." Many Negroes reject this even more wholly than whites. "Black Power" is not an integrationist slogan. Proponents of integration tend to deny that there can be pride in being a black. On the other hand, we find few proponents of integration moving into black areas--which they can easily do--to show belief in their thesis. The point is this--Apartheid as practiced by the Government of South Africa is onerous. As a long time prospect, it is doomed to failure. The Civil Rights idea of integration is a mirror image of Apartheid--it is the opposite of the South African idea. Both concepts are interpreted as total and coercive. I believe that human nature is being ignored here!

A SAD reality of our day is that we tend to look at Government as something that is not, and should not be! Much Civil

Rights "legislation" has been passed. The recipients of such legislation have been given political equality and nothing more. But there are those who reason that political equality means equality of condition. Because equality of condition has not come about, there are those who believe it can be legislated. To attempt to legislate such equality would strike at the very roots of our freedom.

The most striking aspect of this whole problem is that those who are proposing and, of course, supporting such legislation are the churches and the clergy! One should recall that the North American continent was meant to be God's country, a haven for the 17th century Protestant fundamentalists who did not understand, as Holderlin so sweetly put it, what a sin it is "to make the State a school of morals. The State has always been made a hell by man's wanting to make it his heaven." Into this heaven they came; the secular minded 18th century sceptics who proceeded to organize the United States along free thinking lines. Since then the paranoid style has been a constant in the affairs of our country.

Open Housing is said to be a moral issue. We are told it is the Christian thing to support Open Housing. Where I find it amusing is where the clergy, by sermon and newspaper ad, acknowledge their failure to convince us that this is a moral issue and a Christian principle and want this morality legislated. What little faith they have in us, religion in general, and themselves in particular. A logical extension of such thinking, upon success of their venture into State affairs, will enable the clergy to thump their chests and say, "See how Christian I am."

What becomes a moral issue if often times a relative

position. For example, I fully intend to support legislation for legalized abortion. Will it be Christian for the Protestant groups to support this motion and equally Christian for the Catholic groups to oppose it? I wonder how the spirit of ecumenism will reign when I go to the aid of Father Byrne to help his Catholic school, that is now in financial trouble, to get community aid? Is it moral to deny a Catholic child education because of his religion? What is the Christian morality on this issue? Will we hear the cry of separation of church and State on issues such as these?

INTEGRATED communities have been a failure wherever tried. Name one community where both races have benefited by integration. Integrated schools were the cry of the Civil Rights leaders of a few years ago. It was tried, and both black and white children suffered because of the experiment. Where Blacks move in, Whites move out--law or no law! Many are not facing the reality of the situation. Plymouth will be tested in the months ahead. It is a fine community now. There are those who will, by continued pressures, attempt to divide it. Notice that the clergy in its statement has called upon the Plymouth School District to get into the act. As has been noted in other communities afflicted with this problem when Open Housing issue arises, can busing be far behind?

This is an internal issue. If it is to be pressed to a conclusion, then let's put the subject of Open Housing on the ballot for the people of Plymouth to decide. This is a Democratic way -- if not a Christian way.



LBJ Blocks Speculation U.S. May Devalue Dollar

President Johnson has blocked any speculation that devaluation of the British pound might be followed by devaluation of the American dollar with an announcement in Washington he could "reaffirm unequivocally the commitment of the United States to buy and sell gold at the existing price of \$35 an ounce."

The battle of Dakto in the Central Highlands of South Vietnam entered its third week as South Vietnamese paratroopers and American GI's of the First Air Cavalry Division (Airmobile) engaged North Vietnamese regulars and gained possession of Hill 1338 three miles from Dakto after daylong fighting.

At the same time, two battalions of the South Vietnamese 42d Airborne Regiment with about 1,000 men fought unsuccessfully for the possession of another hill six miles northwest of Dakto. Government casualties to date include 31 paratroopers killed and 84 wounded. Enemy dead and wounded is undetermined. Air strikes have been carried out to support the ground action.

In the Mekong Delta, 64 miles from Saigon, enemy troops

attacked an artillery base of the U.S. Ninth Infantry Division. A casualty list listed seven Americans dead and 38 wounded with five bodies of the enemy found after the two and a half hour clash.

International News Round Up

Japanese Premier Eisaku Sato's meetings with President Johnson have resulted in the return of the Bonin Islands to Japanese rule after 22 years of U.S. military occupation. But sentiment in Japan is mingled with disappointment over no apparent move by the U.S. to restore Okinawa and the rest of the Ryukyu Islands, areas presently occupied by a million Japanese-speaking people. The latter territories are now used by the United States for major air and logistics bases.

Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery was celebrating his 80th birthday in London when thieves broke into his home in Alton, England, and carried off the famous World War II military leader's field marshal baton and part of his star of the Order of the Garter.

The Young Democratic Clubs of America, meeting in national convention at Hollywood, Fla., gave President Johnson in ab-

sentee a one-minute standing ovation but later in a voice vote asked that he consider a bombing pause in Vietnam and negotiate with the Vietcong. A ballot on the proposal, however, was defeated 680 to 258 with 92 abstentions.

The U.S. at 11 a.m. EST Monday officially became the fourth nation in the world (behind China, India, and Russia) to pass the 200 million population mark. The census bureau clock in Washington now registers a net gain of one person every 14 1/2 seconds based on one birth every 8 1/2 seconds, one death every 17 seconds, an immigrant every 60 seconds, and an emigrant every 23 minutes.

Final passage by the U.S. Congress of a bill providing the most sweeping Social Security changes ever considered, is expected later this week. As the bill stands now, it would assure all persons now on social security at least a 15 per cent increase with a 59 per cent hike for those at the bottom of the scale. Minimum payments would be raised from the present \$44 a month to \$70.



Hippie 'Not Issue' At Thurston

"We really have a heck of a problem here. This issue isn't whether we're for or against marijuana."

"The issue is whether or not a principal should have the right to decide by himself who should speak to a student group."

Charles Manchester, a faculty co-sponsor of the Thurston High Current Events Club stated the club's position in a telephone interview.

John Sinclair, who has been described as Detroit's "King of the Hippies" was scheduled to speak to the Thurston group last Tuesday, but the appearance was cancelled at the last minute on the insistence of the school's principal, Frank Block.

Block said that he had received four telephone calls from parents protesting Sinclair's planned speech at the school.

A conference between the school administration and club representatives last week yielded plans to form a committee which will review pro-

cedures for approval of speakers, Block said.

Frank Hepola, president of the Current Events Club, said that the club wants to be able to have any speaker as long as he obeys the law. But he admitted that he didn't expect the school administration to be quite that liberal.

The club and its advisors planned a meeting this week to set up a list of procedures they would like to have adopted for future approval of speakers. Manchester said that the procedures recommended would probably give parents a chance to deny their children permission to hear any speaker.

When Block cancelled Sinclair's appearance, he told the club that he did so because parents had objected, and be-

cause Sinclair had been arrested on a marijuana charge and had organized the Belle Isle Love-In last spring.

Both Manchester and Hepola said that they were sure the program would not have been stopped if parents hadn't protested.

The club, which was organized last spring, has had only two other speakers, Manchester said. One was a representative of the John Birch Society and the other a co-editor of the Fifth Estate, who spoke against United States involvement in the Vietnam war.

He added that the club has also contacted U.S. Senator Robert Griffin and representatives of several Federal agencies in the area.

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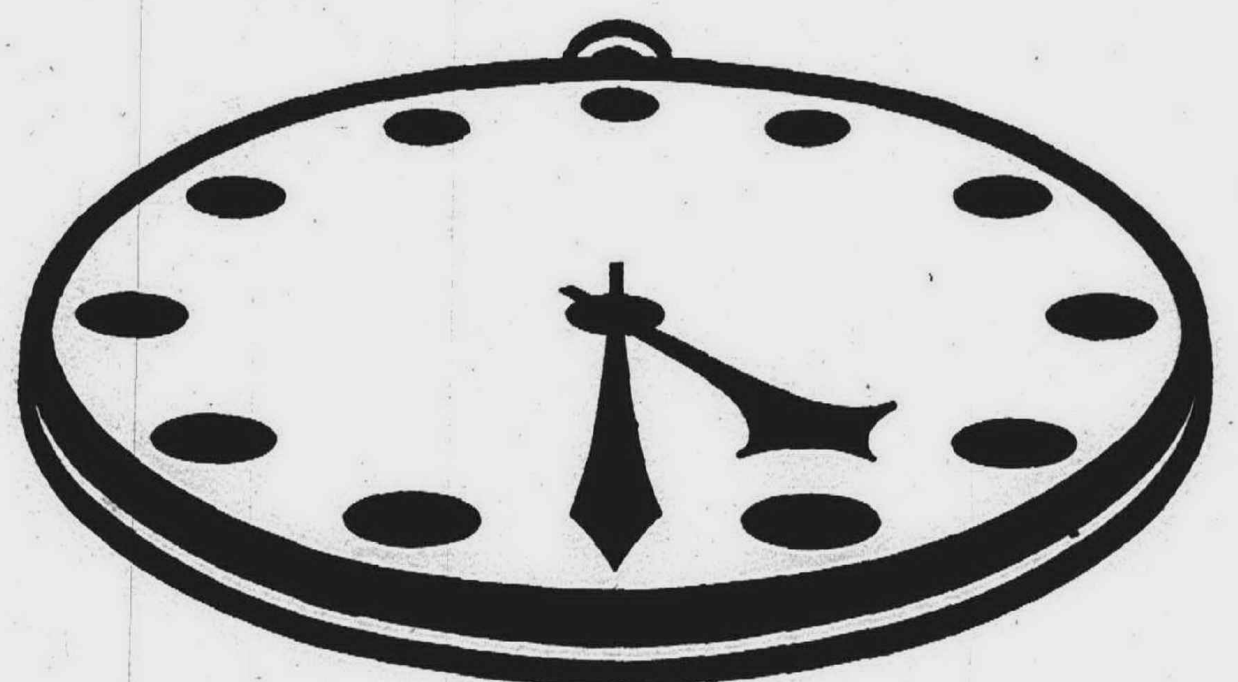

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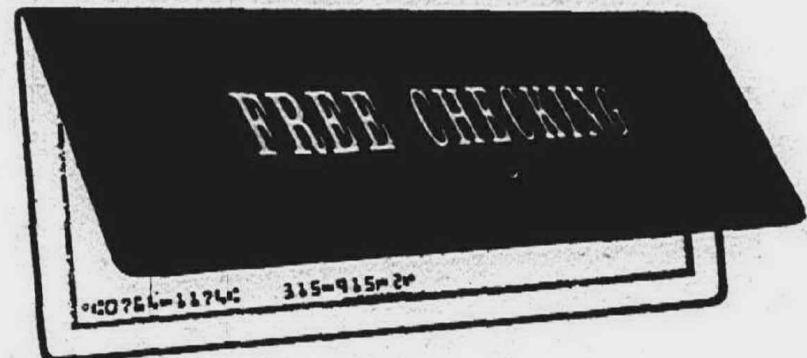

Schoolcraft Trustees Seek Traffic Lights

Schoolcraft College officials have renewed a four-year-old request for the installation of traffic lights at the intersection of Seven Mile Road and Six Mile Road with Haggerty Road by asking the Wayne County Road Commission to conduct a traffic study at the two crossings.

Trustees of the college have expressed concern that the volume of vehicle traffic from the nearly 4,000 commuting students was creating a growing traffic hazard that warranted the installation of stop and go lights at the two intersections through which pass all vehicles approaching the college.

The college first requested installation of a light at Haggerty and Seven Mile Roads in November, 1963, nine months before the college opened its doors. The request was renewed a year later, and a flasher signal was put up at the intersection.

In 1965 the college again requested a traffic study be made to establish the feasibility of installing a stop-and-go light. In November, 1966,

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Foreign Aid Splits Esch, McDonald

Two suburban Republican congressmen have split on a foreign aid bill which passed the U.S. House of Representatives last week.

Rep. Marvin Esch of Ann Arbor (2nd District) voted "yes" and Rep. Jack McDonald of Redford (19th District) was opposed.

The House trimmed the Johnson Administration's \$3.3 billion request to \$2.2 billion. The vote was 167-143.

ESCH, WHOSE district in-

cludes Plymouth, said in a telephone interview with the Observer Newspapers: "I feel strongly that we need to support any foreign aid program. I think this country is in danger of a new isolationism that is contrary to our position as a responsible world leader."

Esch felt the emphasis of the new foreign aid bill, lowest in that program's history, has been changed--for the better--toward loans and technical assistance, and "from give-away to self-help."

Although the House cut the bill by \$1 billion, Esch said there was "not a great deal of pressure" from the administration, "so they think this (the House bill) is a workable program."

McDONALD said he "voted against foreign aid at every opportunity."

"It's time to set out a list of priorities. By spending \$30 billion a year in Vietnam, we've over-extended ourselves."

"We should limit our aid to technical and advisory assistance," he went on.

"I've seen this work in Jordan when I was there just before the six day war with Israel."

"I've also seen where we've shipped to Jordan beautiful, expensive plows without tractors, and the plows were rusting in the fields."

"And I think it makes little

sense to give military assistance to the Arabs and Israelis so they can fight each other, and to the Indians and Pakistanis so they can fight each other. We don't make any friends that way."

McDonald's district includes Redford, Livonia and Farmington in the Observer area.

Stream Fishing Stops; Cohos Spawning

Northern Michigan's Platte River, Bear Creek, and Big Huron River will remain closed to all fishing until fall spawning runs of coho salmon are played out, the Conservation Department reports.

The three streams' fishing ban is being continued under special Department orders so that the fish can spawn undisturbed in wholesale numbers.

Department Fish Chief Wayne H. Tody explains: "We have succeeded in collecting all the coho eggs we need and have met requirements of transferring about 20,000 surplus spawners to experiment with their natural reproduction in eight new streams."

Tody says it is very important to let the fish spawn without angling interference which originally disrupted coho runs and forced the Department to suspend fishing in the Platte River, Bear Creek, and Big Huron River.

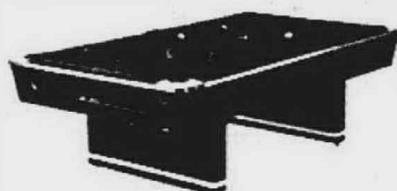

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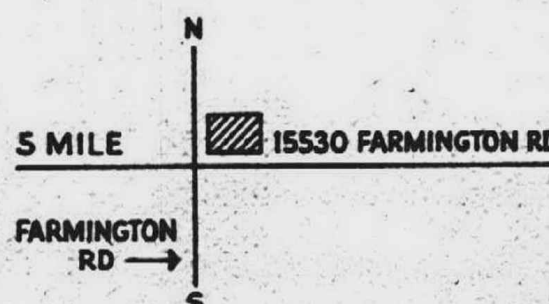


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Gophers All But Clinch Bowl Berth; Southern Cal Wins West

Southern California vs. Minnesota in the Rose Bowl! But a miracle could make it Southern Cal vs. Indiana. The Trojans, led by their ace O.J. Simpson, won their way into the Pasadena battle by beating UCLA, 21-20, in a thriller last Saturday.

Meantime, Minnesota cooled off Indiana, unbeaten in eight previous starts, 33-7, and now all that can land the Hoosiers a trip to California on New Year's Day is an upset win over Purdue Saturday while

Minnesota loses to Wisconsin. Neither is expected to happen. Purdue all but wrapped up the Big Ten title last Saturday by thumping Michigan State, 21-7, as Michigan bounced Wisconsin 27-14.

Over 90,000 saw Simpson, a prime candidate for All America honors, gallop 64 yards to pull out the victory over Southern California after UCLA had struck through the air on the passing of Gary Beban a minute earlier to seize a 20-14 lead.

AFTER SIMPSON'S gallop, Rikki Aldridge booted the conversion that certainly will make the Trojans No. 1 in the ratings again, besides giving them the Pacific 8 Conference title and the trip to the Roses.

Minnesota didn't have much trouble with Indiana in upping its season's record in the Big Ten to 5-1, which matches the Hoosiers'. However, Purdue leads the pack at 6-0.

But Purdue can't go to the Rose Bowl this year. The Boilermakers went last season. Two Indiana fumbles set up touchdowns for the Gophers who

then turned matters into a rout. Leroy Keys, another cinch All America, showed Michigan State a few things as he personally gained 194 yards rushing and 63 more via the passing route for a grand total of 257.

He also threw one touchdown pass, caught another for a TD and set up the third Purdue score with a pair of pass receptions.

KEYS HAD help from sophomore quarterback Mike Phipps, who clicked on nine passes as all totaled the Boilermakers made 467 yards at the expense of the Spartans, who suffered their seventh defeat of the season.

Michigan got a sparkling effort out of quarterback Dennis Brown in blasting Wisconsin. Brown ran 44 yards for Michigan's first touchdown, passed 60 and 31 yards for two more and set up a fourth score with a 37-yard bomb.

Halfback Ron Johnson turned in another fine effort for the Wolverines, now 3-3 in the Big Ten, with only Ohio State remaining at Ann Arbor Saturday. Michigan State, 2-4 in the conference, winds up at home Saturday against Northwestern.

Illinois won over Northwestern, 27-21, Saturday as Ohio State turned back Iowa,

21-10. Closer to home, the Wayne State bubble really broke apart. The Tartars, who had their seven-game winning streak snapped the previous Saturday by Eastern Illinois, were no match on Saturday for Central Michigan, 34-0.

Thus both Wayne and Central wound up with 7-2 records. ELSEWHERE ON the college scene: Brian Dowling scored twice and passed for two more TD's as Yale beat Princeton, 29-7, to clinch the Ivy League championship.

Tennessee rolled along with a 20-7 win over Mississippi to become an odds on choice for the Orange Bowl. Clemson took North Carolina State in an upset, 14-6, to gain a share of the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Army whipped Pittsburgh, 21-12, while Navy played a 35-35 tie with Vanderbilt. The Cadets had their hopes of going to the Sugar Bowl ended by a ruling from the Pentagon last week.

In the Southwest, Texas Christian jolted Texas, 24-17, enabling Texas A. and M. to gain the Southwest Conference lead by beating Rice, 18-3. Texas and the Aggies meet on Thanksgiving Day for the right to go to the Cotton Bowl.

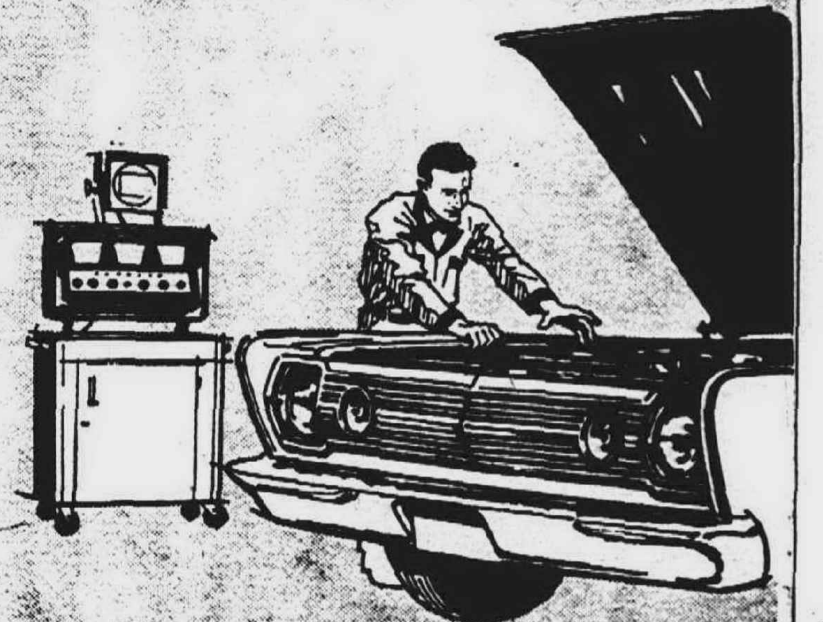
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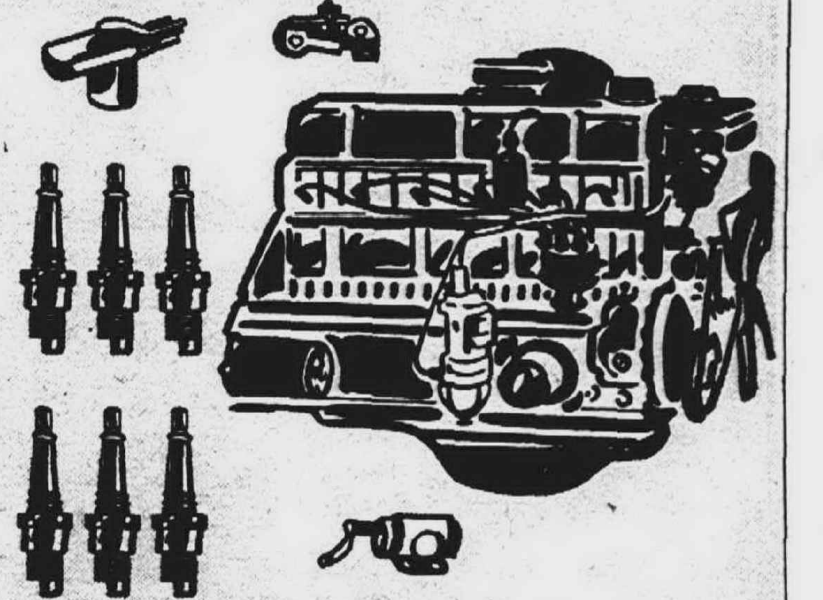

Lusk Coach Of Year

A high school star...a stand-out in the service...once a back-up man to Joe Schmidt...a very successful high school coach.

All of these credentials add up to Bob Lusk of John Glenn High, the 1967 Observer high school football coach-of-the-year.

He came originally from Williamson, W. Va., where he was a three-sport great.

Next stop was William and Mary College and a varsity football career.

Then came the Army and more football honors. Lusk was named All Army.

In 1956, Lusk joined the Detroit Lions, but as he says: "I had to play back of Joe Schmidt and Charley Ane, a couple of greats. They had me snap the ball back for punts and extra points and I was used on the specialty teams—like

kickoffs, etc. But I really didn't play much."

SO IN 1958, Lusk turned to coaching high school football at Lincoln Park. He was there five seasons as head man and in four of the years, the Parkers either won the league title outright or tied for the flag.

In 1963, he got a chance to go to Western Michigan University as an assistant coach. But the job lasted for only one season. The head man was fired and so Lusk had to look elsewhere for employment.

He didn't have to hunt far, however.

John Glenn High was starting up and the school wanted Lusk.

The first year was '64 and Glenn had no seniors. The team finished 3-6.

With twelfth graders for the first time in '65, Glenn finished 5-3-1. In '66 the mark was 4-4-1. This past season Glenn posted a brilliant 7-2 mark and shared the Northwest Suburban League crown with Franklin.

"Looking back at prep football," he said, "there have

been many changes. There is no question the kids are playing better, they are stronger physically and the coaching is much improved."

"YOU KNOW, by all standards we didn't have a big team this past year at Glenn. We averaged 172 pounds across the line. But in my first year at Lincoln Park, the line averaged 158. So you can see how much bigger the boys are in just one year."

Lusk also feels that there no longer are just a few teams which dominate the prep scene in the suburbs.

"It's reached the point when on any given week, any team can beat another. Just look at what happened in our league."

"We beat North Farmington, North Farmington beat Franklin and Franklin beat us. Time was when one or two teams stood out all the time. Not any more."

Lusk makes his home in Westland. He and his wife Peggy are the parents of three youngsters, two boys and a girl.

Green Bay, the pacesetter Central Division leaders, blanked a slightly stubborn San Francisco team, 13-0, on a touchdown and a pair of field goals by Don Chandler before a home crowd.

Elsewhere there was free scoring with Philadelphia outpointing the fiddle New Orleans Saints, 48-12, on Norm Sneed's four touchdown passes. The victory avenged an earlier loss to the Saints, the expansion club's only triumph in 10 league games.

Not only will it mark the first appearance of the Rockets in Detroit, but it also will be "Basketball Giveaway Night" at the arena.

Each youngster, 16 and under, who purchases a \$3 reserved seat will receive free from the Pistons one of their special basketballs.

More than 10,000 of the balls have been passed out to the youngsters in the last two years and the Pistons anticipate another big rush for the balls at Friday evening's game.

The Rockets boast some familiar names to Detroit basketball fans.

Among them are Johnny Green, former Michigan State star who has played with New York and Baltimore in the National Basketball Association, and Don Kojis, one-time Pistons forward.

Other veterans on the Rockets include John Barnhill, another ex-Piston; Dave Gambee, from the Philadelphia 76ers, and seven-footer Henry Finkel who played last season with the Los Angeles Lakers.

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Tresvant Pistons Big Gun

When it comes to improved athletes in the National Basketball Association, John Tresvant of the Detroit Pistons is entitled to step forward and take a bow.

In less than two seasons, Tresvant has blossomed from "a little somebody" to "a big somebody" with the Pistons.

Tresvant came to Detroit in December, 1965, in a trade that involved the Pistons and the St. Louis Hawks. He was pretty much an unheralded performer.

JOHN HAD JOINED the Hawks before, but only stuck around for four games. He left the Hawks at his own choosing to finish his work toward a degree at Seattle University.

"I could see that the Hawks wouldn't use me much and I thought that finishing my studies was more important," explains Tresvant.

He was back with the Hawks at the outset of 1965-66 and still pretty much a sub. Then followed the deal that brought him to Detroit and the Pistons.

Tresvant's role didn't change too much at first with the Pistons. The start of games usually found him perched somewhere on the bench.

Midway through last season, Tresvant got his big chance. Then coach, Dave DeBusschere, elevated Tresvant to a starting post.

HE'S STARRED EVER since for the Pistons who this week were slated for two home games—on Wednesday against the Western Division Champion San Francisco Warriors and on Saturday against the improved Baltimore Bullets.

Tresvant not only is a starter, his presence on the Pistons' roster also has prompted Coach Donnis Butcher to revise his attack. When Tresvant isn't playing in a corner position, one'll find him at center as part of the Pistons' more mobile offense.

"John may stand only 6-7, but he performs out there like a man 6-9 or 6-10," says Butcher. "He's a very good shooter and a strong rebounder even though he is the smallest center now in the league when we use him in the middle."

So here the high schools go into their basketball campaigns, although it seems like we have been knee-deep in it—well, we truthfully never get away from basketball and the Pistons.

We hate to knock the schoolboys, and really we can't say that the players or even their coaches are to blame.

But they have knocked one of the most exciting maneuvers out of the prep and the college game . . . meaning the dunk shot.

In case you missed the stories, the barring of the "dunk" came out of the off-season rules meetings. It seems that too many of the big wheels in college and prep basketball took offense to a gent by the name Lew Alcinder, now playing for UCLA.

For Lew it wasn't—and still isn't—any problem reaching up and dunking the ball.

For those who may never have seen the "dunk," it's actually a shot in which a player lifts his hands over the top of the basket and stuffs the ball through.

The pros have retained it, but it's gone from the school ranks . . . and so is all the thrill and cheers it produced.

For the true fan of prep or college basketball, the big moment in pre-game warmups arrived when the players of a team in their shooting all started to make "dunks."

It got to the point that players under six feet even were able to rise high enough to stuff the ball through.

And when that happened during the course of a game, well, the fans simply went wild.

THE EXPLANATIONS offered for knocking out the rule really didn't make much sense. It seems that a few folks feared that maybe somebody would bend the basket or pull it down.

Well, it happens pretty much every time the pros play—a Bill Russell or Wilt Chamberlain or even a Dave Bing will roar in for a dunk . . . and somehow the basket and rim withstand the mighty forces.

There's no question, of course, that basketball on the high school and college level will continue to prosper—even with the elimination of the dunk.

But, it's to be hoped that the brass will reconsider in another season and bring the rule back.

Sometime soon, the preps and collegians probably will follow the pros in adopting a specified time for getting a shot off.

In the older National Basketball Association, a player gets 24 seconds; in the newer American Association they have a 30-second time clock.

For the preps, we'd suggest the 30-second clock would be more ideal. This would give a team more than sufficient time to set up a play while cutting the amount of stalling a team might do to the limit.

One of the "beauties" of the shooting clock is that it helps to give a trailing team a better chance to bounce back without resorting to excess fouling.

This explains a great deal why a team, down by 15 or 20 points in a professional game, frequently will get right back into the thick of the battle.

It doesn't happen very much in the prep or college play when you fall behind early by so many points.

ON THE SUBJECT of basketball, how would you like an official Pistons' ball?

Interested, kids?

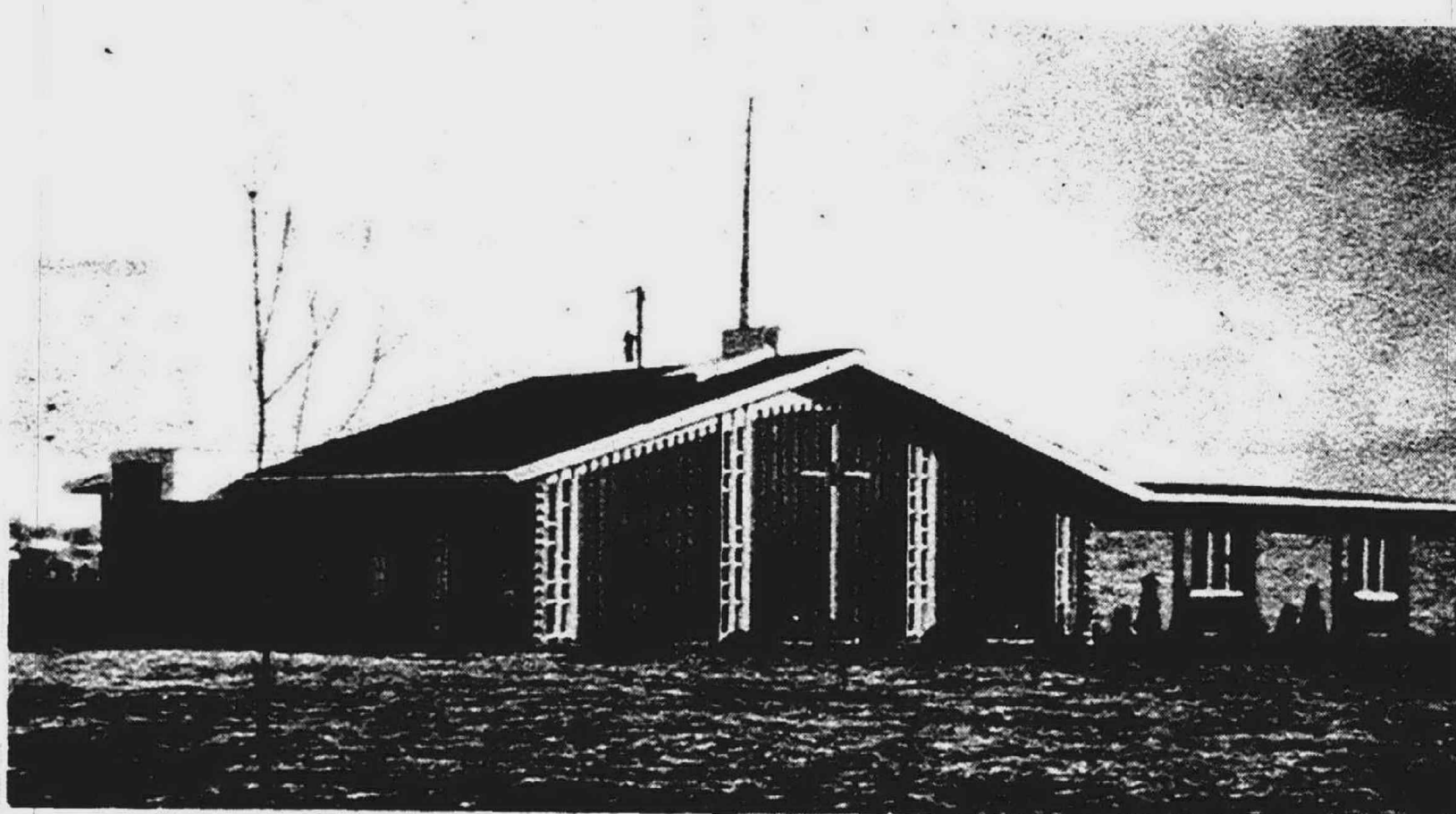

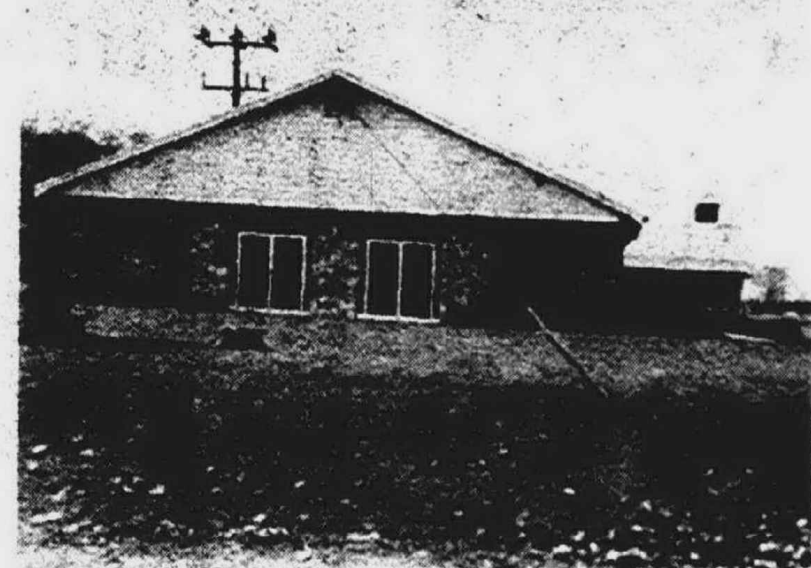
St. Timothy Church was officially organized with 84 members in March, 1965, and now has grown to 170.

Here's how to make it: Using 1x2-inch lumber, build three frames. The center one-back of the booth will be 24 inches long and 18 inches high. Hinged to it are two wings, each 13 inches long and 18 inches high. When not in use, the booth can be folded up and put away. Both sides of each frame are

covered with Masonite 1/4" Patterned Peg-Board. This prefinished hardboard becomes an acoustical barrier when insulating blanket material is placed between the panels.

Paint the framework and add the hinges. You'll have a neat-looking accessory that will keep "teeners" and family happy during those long telephone talks.

Livonia Schools Seek Radio Net To Speed Work

Interested in reducing operating costs by investing building and site money in time and labor saving devices, Livonia school administrators are considering the installation of a two-way radio station for use of non-teaching departments.

R.H. Upton, assistant superintendent of schools for business, said two years have been spent in studying new procedure and several alternatives to a radio setup.

"Repeated budget cuts that have been made by the Board of Education in the non-teaching areas have made this technique an urgent necessity," Upton and his administrative assistant William Bedell told the board at its meeting this week. "We need the two-way radio system to perform various functions."

U.S. Nears 200 Million Population

Sometime between Nov. 13 and 27, this nation's population will reach a milestone—200 million persons.

A big clock in the U.S. Commerce Department's Census Bureau—admittedly a tourist attraction—placed the time at 11 a.m. Monday, although it could have been several days before or after.

Whatever the exact hour, these things are certain: the character of the population is changing; the birth and death rates are down; and the future rate of growth will be slower.

NEARLY HALF of all the people who have ever been alive in the United States are alive today. Some 406 millions have lived here since 1790, when the first census was taken.

The first census showed four million persons. The U.S. hit the 100 million mark in 1915, or 52 years ago, but it will take 70 years for our population to double again.

The 300 million mark is due around the turn of the 21st century.

The U.S. is the fourth most populous nation in the world behind China (800 million), India (500 million), and the Soviet Union (250 million). Behind us is Indonesia (165 million).

THE BIRTH RATE has dropped.

In the milestone year of 1915 it was 28 per 1,000 population. During the Depression it dropped to 18.4.

After World War II it climbed to 27.

Today it's 21.

If the present rate continues, the rest of the world will double in population every 32 years, but it will take us 70 years.

From 1900 to 1960, the death rate per 1,000 white persons fell from 17 to 9.4; for Negroes, from 25 to 10.

AHEAD OF US is an uneven rise in population age brackets.

The 20-24 age group will increase 27 per cent between now and 1975.

The 25-29 group will increase 50 per cent.

The 30-34 group will increase 27 per cent.

SINCE 1915, we have seen our rate of spinsterhood drop in half.

But the percentage of working wives has grown from 8 per cent to 36 per cent.

We have more widows. In 1915 women outlived men by one year. Today they outlive men by seven.

The divorce rate is up only a little—from eight per 1,000 women in 1915 to 10 today.

ternate stations, in the bus garage, warehouse and administration buildings, to send and receive through the base station. Provide contact with key maintenance personnel by signaling them through a device in their pockets so they may call in by radio or phone. Provide portable equipment that can be installed in vehicles or carried by personnel.

"It also would increase supervision over scattered work crews, and should better utilize the time of high-skill personnel.

Keeping up with work orders now is an impossibility, in view of cuts in crews. It would increase our efficiency, and aid

in handling emergencies." The transportation department would install the equipment on tow trucks serving disabled vehicles, shifting them to other nearby breakdowns. While not planning to install sets on the system's 91 buses, it was suggested that portable

equipment might be used on buses on special occasions, such as field days situations involving discipline problems, and substitute buses. The warehouse would be able to use the system in dispatching trucks, used daily to handle lunch deliveries, deliver stock,

transfer supplies. Upton said there might be some application of radio to administrative procedures in scheduling, and in specific situations such as civil defense, and emergencies. He told the board installation would mean an expenditure of

\$12,000 to \$15,000. It would include such minimum equipment needs as the 100-watt base station, remote consoles, electronic paging units, 12 portable two-watt units with all related equipment, the antenna and various supportive equipment.

UP' GOING 'CURTAIN'
 It's been sixteen years since Emlyn Williams graced the local theatrical boards. He appeared as Charles Dickens in a one man show interpreting the author's works in a most consummate style. The year was 1951 and the place: the Hill Auditorium in Ann Arbor.
 In 1967, Detroit area audiences had the rare opportunity to renew acquaintanceship with Mr. Williams by attending his dramatic program extolling the works of Dylan Thomas. The program was presented last week at the University of Detroit in their cavernous field house. The U of D Memorial Building can hold over 10,000. The north third of the field house was curtained off for Mr. Williams' appearance. At least 3,000 people could have squeezed in to hear him, but unfortunately only five or six hundred did attend.
 ALL the Dylan Thomas devotees were present. The wild, wonderful works of this Welsh poet evoke great response from any lover of words or any individual who appreciates the richness of the English language.
 Emlyn Williams, an English actor of tremendous stature, handles the Dylan Thomas with great care, reverence and respect. He molds each of the Thomas selections so accurately you soon can't distinguish between Williams the actor and Dylan the poet.
 Williams mesmerizes his audience. You sit entranced as he tells of a riotous bus outing in the hills of South Wales, two young lads visiting each other's homes, a lonely lad walking in the night and ending up under a bridge arch.
 Polite laughter blossomed into guffaws and rich throaty appreciation as the tale of an adolescent with his finger stuck in a beer bottle becomes locked in a most bizarre bathroom facing the feminine wiles of a feckless female bent on seducing him.
 The simplicity of the setting utilized by Williams proved you need no fancy stage sets, elaborate costumes, or distracting technical effects as long as you have a versatile actor and top-flight material.
 Emlyn Williams' "Dylan Thomas Growing Up" program at first glance appeared to be quite stark. A lonely chair, a three-panel screen containing Dylan's signature and two small spots at either corner of the platform comprised the entire stage setting.
 THE TWO HOUR program of dramatizations from the works of Dylan Thomas that followed made active use of these items. One corner of the panel screen became the arch under the railroad bridge. The chair became a huge flat rock where Dylan and his friend Jim sat by the sea and voiced their dreams. The tiny spots highlighted the emotional climax buried deep in the Thomas poetry.
 Let's hope that Mr. Williams can come back into this area before another 16 years rolls along.

Extend Dates Of Display
 Public response has led to a one week extension of the Detroit showing of Alfred Eisenstaedt's photographs at the Institute of Arts.
 A total of 8,040 people visited the famed photographer's show. Director Willis F. Woods and Publisher Jerome Hardy agree on the new closing date of Sunday, Dec. 10.

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

New Method Thaws Turkey

by Joyce Totten

Since 90 per cent of the Thanksgiving turkeys will be purchased frozen this year, again the problem of thawing them comes up.

Thanks to new research, the Poultry and Egg National Board, and the National Turkey Federation, are recommending an easier, more convenient method for thawing whole birds.

Research on both the safety and the timing of the new method was conducted by four organizations--Virginia Polytechnic Institute, Western Regional Laboratories (U.S. Department of Agriculture), Armour & Company and Ralston Purina Company. Here's a report of their findings:

TO COOK TURKEY IMMEDIATELY:

Remove wrap from frozen turkey, place turkey on rack in shallow roasting pan. Cook for one hour in preheated 325 degrees oven. Remove turkey from oven; remove neck and giblets from body cavity and wishbone area. Immediately return turkey to oven and cook until done, according to package directions or to 180 degrees on roast meat thermometer.

TO COOK TURKEY LATER THE SAME DAY:

Leave in original wrap, thaw in running water or water that is changed frequently. Cook or refrigerate thawed turkey immediately.

TO COOK TURKEY THE FOLLOWING DAY:

Leave turkey in original wrap, place frozen turkey in brown paper bag or wrap in two or three layers of newspaper. Thaw at room temperature, under 12 pounds 10-18 hours, over 12 pounds 18-30 hours. Check turkey often during last hours of thawing, and refrigerate immediately if completely thawed.

CRANBERRY HOLIDAY SALAD

1 c. sugar
1 c. raw cranberries, ground
1 pkg. lemon or raspberry gelatin
1/2 c. boiling water
1 c. orange or pineapple juice
1-2 t. grated orange rind (opt.)
19-oz. can crushed pineapple
1/2-1 c. pecans, broken (opt.)
1/2-1 c. celery, chopped (opt.)

Mix sugar and berries together; let stand 2 or more hours. Add gelatin to boiling water; stir until dissolved. Stir in orange juice and rind. Chill until syrupy. Fold in remaining ingredients. Pour into mold, refrigerate. Serve on crisp lettuce.

CALIFORNIA SWEET POTATOES

6 med. sweet potatoes
1/3 c. brown sugar
1/3 c. sugar
pinch of salt to taste
1-2 T. cornstarch
1 c. orange juice
1-2 t. grated orange rind
1/4 c. sherry (opt.)
3-4 T. butter or margarine
Peel potatoes; cut in halves or thick slices. Arrange in baking dish. Combine sugars, salt and cornstarch; stir in

orange juice, rind and butter. Simmer for 5 minutes or until smooth and thickened, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and add Sherry. Pour over potatoes. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes. NOTE: Casserole may be covered for first 20 minutes of baking.

Yield: 6-8 servings. PUMPKIN ICE CREAM PIE

1/2 package free-flowing pie-crust mix
1 pt. vanilla ice cream
2-3 T. cut-up crystallized ginger
1 c. canned or mashed cooked pumpkin
1 c. sugar
1 t. pumpkin pie spice
1/2 t. ginger
1/2 t. salt
1/2 c. chopped walnuts
1 c. whipping cream, whipped

Prepare 9-inch baked pie shell as directed on package. Cool, stir ice cream to soften. Quickly fold in crystallized ginger and spread in pie shell. Freeze until ice cream is solid, stir together pumpkin, sugar, pumpkin pie spice, ginger, salt and walnuts. Fold in whipped cream. Pour over ice cream in pie shell. Freeze at least several hours. Just before serving, remove from freezer and place in refrigerator a few minutes to soften.

Groups of 20 or more persons may arrange for the first aid instruction by calling Quiring at PA 1-2002.

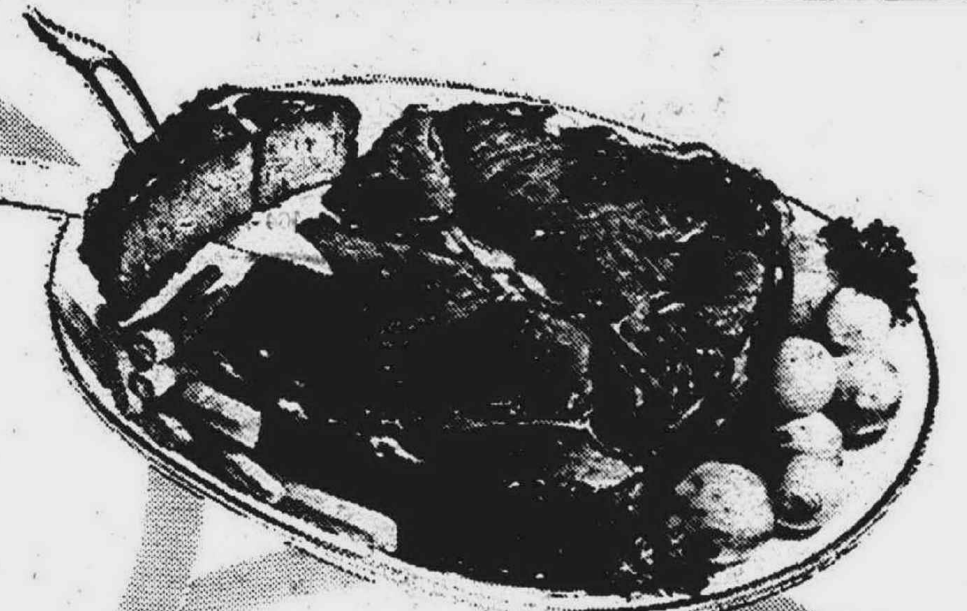

School Report Cards Now Done On Computer

The computer has invaded still another area of our existence—the student report card. The new computerized “cards” resemble to a startling degree the monthly statement sent out by any large department store.

The student's name appears across the top, followed by sex, grade, home room, counselor number, school name, school year, and student number.

The body of the form is devoted to the student's subjects with a column for corresponding grades. There is a column for remarks, one for citizenship and a “key” enabling the parent to decipher the code placed in these three columns.

The card also gives the parent an accounting of their child's absence and tardiness.

JOHN HOBEN, assistant principal and director of guid-

dance with the Plymouth School system, is enthusiastic about the cards and quick to point out advantages. “There are three copies prepared at one time,” he explained, “one goes home with the student, one is sent to the counselor, and one is kept on file in the principal's office. That makes the cards pretty hard to tamper with.”

“The grades and remarks will be accumulated right across the card so that at the end of the school year a complete history of progress is there for the parents to see.”

“The new method will put an end to the monotonous job that took two girls a week every marking period to complete. It will save six weeks in secretarial time,” Hoben said.

The report cards will eventually be mailed, this will guarantee each parent a report of their child's grades.

“The computerized cards will also enable us to pick up a whole day of teaching time six times a year, because the teachers will no longer have to go over individual grades in the classroom,” explained Hoben.

The mechanical brain responsible for all this efficiency belongs to the Detroit City School System. The teachers were given three and a half days to prepare their grades on special IBM cards, the cards were then taken down to the computer and were back in less than two days.

“We had less than 10 mistakes out of 1,584 students and every child got a card. We did have two Eric J. Smiths and one got no grades while the other got 10,” reported Hoben, “but other than a few minor problems caused by the human element the first computerized grading was successful.”

GM Hiring Plan Is ‘Encouraging’

General Motors, under a new liberalized employment program, has hired more than 12,000 hourly-rate employees in its Detroit-area plants during the last three months, more than 5,000 of whom were Negroes.

This was revealed in a report to the New Detroit Committee by James M. Roche, chairman and chief executive officer of General Motors, who also said that GM still needs 850 additional hourly-rate employees in these same Detroit-area plants to meet current production schedules. More than 450 of these jobs can be filled by unskilled applicants. Many of the new hires of the August, September and October period, both white and Negro, Roche said, are from the inner city areas of Detroit and Pontiac.

Roche told the committee that “while General Motors has had a sound and comprehensive written policy of non-discrimination in employment for many years, it became clear to us that additional implementation of our basic policy was essen-

tial. It was not enough to wait for the qualified applicant to present himself at our employment office.”

In the accelerated Detroit-area hiring program of the past few months, Roche said, GM personnel people concentrated on communicating more directly with prospective job applicants in the inner city. “It is premature to judge the program a complete success,” Roche said, “but the results to date have been most encouraging and have led us to investigate several other areas where employment potential is available.”

To this end, he said GM would embark immediately on a new project in Detroit in conjunction with the Detroit Urban League. GM will introduce an “Operation Opportunity” plan at Chevrolet's Gear and Axle Plant, which is located on Holbrook in the inner city area. This plan will be patterned after a similar program introduced successfully two months ago in the Pontiac Motor Division and Fisher Body plants in Pontiac.

Although the direction and responsibility for each play will be that of the student assigned, members of the speech and drama department staff supervise each rehearsal, evaluating the work of the student directors in developing and presenting each play.

Tough Traffic Laws Effective In State

LANSING--Possession of a driver's license now means new responsibilities subject to strong penalties if misused. Secretary of State James M. Hare noted that seven new “driver related” laws enacted by the 1967 Legislature are now in effect.

The most talked about and most widely known is the so-called “Implied Consent” law. This provides that a person who operates a motor vehicle on the public highways is deemed to have given consent to chemical tests of his blood, breath, urine, or saliva for determining alcoholic content of his blood if the person is arrested for driving a vehicle while under the influence of alcohol or while his ability to drive a vehicle has been impaired due to the consumption of alcoholic beverages, Hare said.

IF A PERSON refuses such a test, his license must be suspended for at least 30 days unless he can satisfy the license appeal board that the arresting officer was without grounds to ask him to take the test.

Public Act 132, Hare said, provides that a driver's license may be revoked if the person refuses to accept and sign the receipt of a notice to appear for re-examination to determine if he should be allowed to drive. The person's license is revoked without further notice until the person appears for re-examination.

Hare said to date expensive personal service was necessary before revoking the license of a person who had failed to appear for re-examination.

Other “driver related” laws are: Acts No. 17 and 212 provide the Department of State with the authority to deal with persons misusing their licenses, allowing others to use their licenses and the reproduction of drivers' licenses with unlawful intent.

ACT NO. 17 allows the Department of State to suspend an operator's or chauffeur's license for up to one year upon conviction of a violation of: Using a cancelled registration, suspended or altered license; lending another person a license, or committing fraud on an application for a license.

ACT NO. 212 provides in part that any person who reproduces any part of a driver's license including the photograph or using an altered photograph on a license or forged license with unlawful intent be subject under conviction to a fine of up to \$500, imprisonment of up to one year or both.

It also provides that a license of a person who uses an altered photograph on a license or a forged license with unlawful intent shall be revoked.

ACT NO. 61 increases the minimum jail sentence for persons convicted of driving without a valid license from two to three days for the first offense and from two to five days for a subsequent offense, and unless the vehicle was stolen the registration plates of the vehicle in use at the time shall be confiscated.

ACT NO. 226 provides a new concept allowing suspension of a driver's license for at least 90 days, but not more than

two years after expiration of a sentence for forfeiture of bail in connection with a charge of driving while intoxicated or under the influence of drugs.

ACT NO. 71 mandates that a driver involved in a collision with another car which is attended or unattended must notify the owner of the vehicle or the most convenient police officer regardless of whether the accident occurred on public or private property.

In other words, Hare said, accidents on supermarket or shopping center parking lots now will have to be reported to the police.

Persons from out of state will also come under new scrutiny when applying for licenses in Michigan, Hare noted. ACT NO. 212 requires the department to request the driving record of the person when he applies for the Michigan license. That license is entered against the person just as though it was accumulated in this state and driver improvement actions can be considered accordingly.

HARE NOTED that the passage of the several laws will do much to provide his department with the tools necessary to administer a more effective driver improvement program.

THANX Helps GIs Get Home

Travel organizations, under the leadership of the Detroit Passenger Traffic Club, have organized “Project THANX” to assist servicemen returning from Vietnam to “Travel Home Again Next Christmas.”

Passenger Traffic Club president Wallace E. Mitchell said the project will provide funds to purchase positive space, one-way transportation from the West Coast to Detroit, and within a 50-mile radius, on surface or air carriers.

Funds for Project THANX are being raised by donations from passenger and traffic organizations and from area corporate gifts. Individual contributions are also being accepted, Mitchell said.

VIETNAM RETURNNEES who may benefit from Project THANX are those who are completing their tour and take leave time before reporting to a new Stateside duty station.

Relatives and friends who know of the serviceman's expected date of arrival on the West Coast, and indicate a need for financial assistance for the serviceman to return to the Detroit area for Christmas, should write to Mitchell at 2406 Fisher Building, Detroit, 48202.

Servicemen whose homes are within a 50-mile radius of Detroit are eligible for assistance, Mitchell said. This includes Toledo, Flint, Ann Arbor and Port Huron.

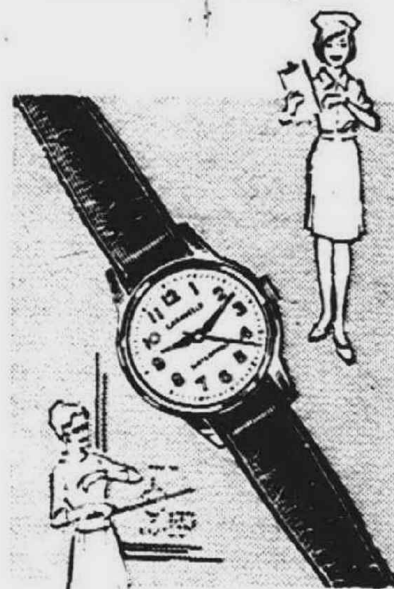

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Directs Township Traffic In Money Treasurer Keeps Busy Guiding Cash In Four Channels

Plymouth Township has four main avenues of money pouring into its coffers and Elizabeth Holmes, treasurer, has the job of seeing that none go into the wrong bin.

Mrs. Holmes has been in this position for the past 14 years. She was appointed township treasurer on Dec. 9, 1953 to fill the vacancy left by her husband who died shortly after he was elected treasurer. She has been re-elected ever since.

The four main avenues she oversees are revenues from taxes, from permits and licenses, from sales tax, and a small return from intangible taxes.

The treasurer explained that intangible taxes come from money paid to the state by banks and utility companies and is then parceled out to townships according to its population figures.

SHE SAID that the township's revenue is made up of approximately two-fifths property tax, two-fifths sales tax, and one-fifth intangible tax.

This year--fiscal year 1967-68 from April 1 to March 30--the township will receive an estimated \$265,595. This figure includes refunds and unappropriated surpluses of \$30,250.

The total is broken down the following way: \$92,225 from property taxes and interest; \$92,500 from state shared taxes; \$43,620 from permits and licenses; and \$7,000 from intangible taxes.

These figures are all estimated receipts based on last year's figures in part, and projected figures for this year.

Mrs. Holmes pointed out that the 1967 tax collection will amount to approximately \$3.5 million.

SHE SAID that the general government expenditures for this year are about \$285,000, excluding debts amounting to \$150,000. Altogether, total gov-

ernment expenditures will come to almost \$400,000.

The Township Treasurer is also in charge of the water department. When the department was begun 10 years ago, the township only had 47 customers, she explained.

roles submitted to her by the supervisor. In this regard, she is authorized to seize property and to sue, where necessary, to accomplish such collection.

The treasurer must keep proper accounts of all monies coming into her hands and account to the township board on the Tuesday preceding the annual township meeting.

I spent a few minutes in a phone booth the other day. It was torture. Sheer torture. It had nothing to do with the conversation. You see, the little fan in the booth didn't work and the air became so stagnant I could have choked. Worse luck, I had to keep the door closed to see some notes I was using.

Suburban Gardener

Don't Abandon Garden To Winter Elements

As snow piles up on the patio furniture, the gardener must reluctantly admit that the gardening season has come to an end. It is time now to prepare the garden for winter.

Flower beds should be tidied. This is more than just a matter of cleaning them up so they will look nice during the winter. That is important, but even more important is what this will do for next year's garden. Many insect and fungus pests spend the winter in a dormant stage on the withered leaves and stems of old plants.

Cut the stems off at ground level and rake up all fallen leaves. Burn the leaves and stalks. Rake up and burn foliage around roses and lilacs and other shrubs that might have had diseased leaves.

WHEN CLEANING UP perennial beds mark where certain perennials such as platycodon and other "late risers" are located. These start their growth later than many others and could be damaged by early gardening activities if unmarked. Some perennials keep a rosette of green foliage all winter. Do not remove or damage the leaves of oriental poppies and others of this type.

Rake leaves from the lawn and put on the compost pile. Leaves left on the lawn tend to mat down and kill the grass beneath them.

If the grass is over two inches long give it a final mowing and then clean the mower and winterize it. It is recommended that gas be drained from the tank of power mowers so sludge will not form and clog the motor. Cover the mower with a large sheet of plastic.



CHECK AND CLEAN sprayers and spreaders. Be sure they are clean and dry to prevent corrosion. Look over the supply of sprays and dusts. Dispose of empty containers and those with obliterated labels.

Although seeds can retain their ability to grow for numerous years, their vitality is lessened, and it is best to discard left over seed packets and start with fresh seed next year.

Also, it does not pay to keep seeds from home grown vegetables and flowers because many of the best varieties are hybrids with a mixed parentage, and the seeds they produce will not "come true."

EVERGREENS will come through the winter in better condition if they are given a thorough soaking before the ground freezes.

All newly planted trees and shrubs should be given a final soaking, and then the hose should be drained and coiled and hung on a rack or on two pegs in the garage or basement.

Roses need winter protection, especially the hybrid tea roses. Prune the stems to about eight inches and mound a cone of soil six inches high around them. There are also fiber or plastic collars that can be purchased.

Climbing roses should not be pruned, but long canes that might whip around in the wind should be removed or tied securely.

WINTER MULCHES are not for the purpose of keeping the plants warm. The function they serve is to keep the ground frozen so that the roots of the plants will not be damaged by alternate freezing and thawing and the resultant heaving of the ground.

Winter mulches should not be put on until after the ground has frozen solidly. Get your supply of mulch and have it on hand and ready to use at the proper time.

Salt hay has been a long-time favorite winter mulch. Evergreen boughs can be used and are very decorative. Oak leaves make a satisfactory mulch, but maple and other leaves tend to

become soggy and compact and are not really satisfactory.

Not everything needs to be mulched. Newly planted trees and shrubs will benefit from a mulch and perennials will also, especially those planted this fall.

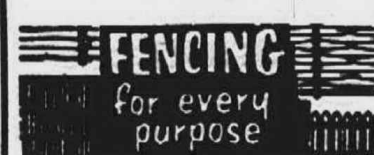
Mums tend to be a bit tender sometimes, especially the large-flowered types. A winter mulch will help protect them.

SOME EVERGREENS need protection, especially if they are exposed to winter winds and strong late winter sunshine.

Set up a screen of slats or burlap to shade them, or plan to spray them with a plastic coating designed for this purpose.

Don't wrap them up closely in plastic.

Romney Calls Legislative Leaders For Housing Talks

LANSING -- Gov. Romney summoned legislative leaders today in a pressure setting to give Michigan an open housing posture that will give hope to the minority ghettos across the nation.

In quick order, he quoted Napoleon, Abraham Lincoln and former President Dwight D. Eisenhower to make his points.

Open housing is alive but gasping for breath in the House Civil Rights Committee where Rep. Melvin DeStigter (R-Grand Rapids) is holding it to wait for sentiment to promise it life on the floor.

"In human affairs you can't compromise," Romney said. "If you start out by compromising principle, you lose the most basic principle of all."

ROMNEY CALLED on citizens to belabor their legislators with letters and telephone calls demanding action on the open housing bills.

He disclosed he had an earlier agreement among leaders of both parties to work for their passage, but that individuals and blocs of votes on the floor threaten to let them die in committee.

"I was in Detroit in the summer of 1967," Romney said.

Interfaith Center For New Campus

ANN ARBOR—A \$1.5-million Interfaith Center for University of Michigan students and religious groups will be built on the University's North Campus, according to plans announced by the Association of Religious Counselors.

The counselors are directors and professional personnel representing the 32 officially recognized campus religious organizations. They have formed a nonprofit development corporation, U of M Interfaith Center, Inc., to build and operate the center.

U-M Regents have authorized the sale of three acres to the corporation for the center. The site is at Plymouth Road and Murfin St., just west of the Northwood Apartments and near the Bursley and Baits residence halls.

There are no existing facilities on the North Campus for campus religious groups.

The Interfaith Center, expected to be completed by December 1969, will have three auditorium-style chapels, a lounge, library, office space for religious counselors, kitchen area, nursery, and several multipurpose rooms. Campus religious groups will share in the cost of operating the center after it is built.

Clarenceville Is Studying Curriculum

During the first days of school the Clarenceville School District instructional staff began an extensive study of the total curriculum now being offered in grades K-12.

Special emphasis is being placed on the K-12 coordination of all curriculum offerings; however, an equally important aspect of this curriculum study is the discussion of the latest research on how children learn.

Also being studied is a child's sensitivity to environmental and social pressures and other important factors affecting a child's desire to learn.

The program is under the direction of James Leary, assistant superintendent of schools and in charge of instruction.

Curricular areas selected for study were: art curriculum; foreign languages; guidance program; language arts program; library program; mathematics curriculum; music curriculum; physical education; science program; social studies curriculum; special education; testing program; and vocational education.

"I've been across the nation. I've talked with affluent people among the Negroes, one an entertainer who gave up a \$1 million a year income (presumably, Comedian Dick Gregory).

"I've talked with the beatniks with their beards and with the hippies, sometimes in the same groups. I know what they want. They don't want dollars primarily. They are in complete agreement.

"They want human dignity. They want white people to stop treating them as inferiors. It

doesn't cost any money or require any act by government."

He said Negroes across the nation want "equal justice," the same treatment as the whites from policemen, prosecutors, judges and jailors.

ROMNEY SAID that open housing "focuses these things more than any other single issue."

He said there are more anti-votes in Lansing among Republicans than among Democrats. It is one issue, he said, that is not being fought on a partisan

basis.

"If the Republican party is responsible for the defeat of open housing in the legislature the Republican party will start to go downhill."

The meeting in Romney's office today is a now-or-never clincher to determine whether the first announced candidate for the presidency in 1968 can go before the nation with a solution in his own state.

"Most Negroes are waiting to see whether we mean what we say in America," he said. "They're waiting to see whether

they need a war of liberation in this country."

IN DETROIT Saturday where he announced for the presidency Romney exhorted a 600-plus crowd while a dozen GOP lawmakers winced at their tables.

"I urge you members of the Republican party to go back to your districts and to get in touch with your legislators, senators and representatives," Romney said.

"You let them know you don't want the Republican party to

scuttle the heritage of Lincoln."

It was the fighting-mad talk of a governor seeking the presidency and who has seen the disasters of Detroit, Watts, Newark, Cleveland and other cities hit by rioting last summer.

Switching strides, Romney said he will be necessarily absent from Michigan during the campaign but he's leaving the state in good hands. Pointing to Lt. Gov. William G. Milliken, he said:

"HE'S PERFECTLY com-

petent, while I'm out there, to make the decisions and run with them. That's not theory. I've been away and we've had the opportunity to test it out. When I vest authority I vest it.

"There's going to be a head of this state at all times whether I'm here or not."

He quoted Napoleon's admonition that the greatest danger in any crusade is at the point of victory and Eisenhower's military philosophy on the point that any successful military action must start

"from an impregnable base."

Lincoln he quoted as the starter of the present Republican philosophy of human relations -- when the Great Emancipator signed the Emancipation proclamation 102 years ago.

Romney made it plain that he wants steadfastness in the face of triumph (Napoleon), an impregnable base in Michigan (Eisenhower) -- both attainable if the Michigan legislature writes a formidable and nationally impressive open housing law.

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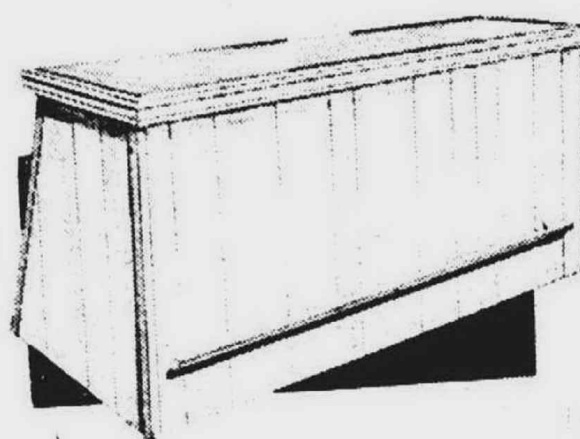
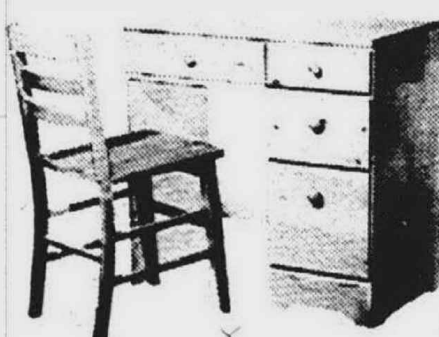

City, Township Heads Fight Water Hike

Politics and still waters run deep and Mayor Jerome Cavanagh is up to his neck in a squabble with suburban communities over an increase in water rates.

All but five of the 42 communities in Wayne County buy water wholesale from the Detroit Water Board which recently hiked wholesale rates 15 per cent.

The increase has stirred up such a controversy that a public hearing for community and township officials has been set

Nov. 28 by the Detroit Water Department's Sewage Disposal and Water Supply Committee. It will be held at 2 p.m. in the City-County Building auditorium.

The committee is a watchdog group set up when the County sold its water department to the City of Detroit in 1959. The committee's job is to make sure the Detroit Water Department does its job and without profit insofar as its suburban customers are concerned. Its recommendations go to the

Board of Supervisors who in turn could vote to join the communities in their only recourse to blocking an increase as in this instance, a suit filed in Circuit Court.

Communities can bypass the committee and Board of Supervisors by filing their own suit but it would be less expensive to have support of the County governing body and the help of its experts in such matters.

It was along about here that Mayor Cavanagh jumped off the deep end.

First, the City of Riverview announced its intention of a court action without going through the Board of Supervisors. Some dissenters contend this would be a mishmash of red tape because 51 per cent of the members of the Board of Supervisors are from Detroit and could be expected to be swung by home ties and Cavanagh.

Riverview Mayor James L. Jones said Friday that the matter had been turned over to attorneys and a course of action

will be decided in the City's Common Council soon.

But setting off the most explosive furor of political fireworks was a move originated by Dearborn Heights Mayor John L. Canfield that a bill be sought in the Legislature to force Detroit to take its future requests for rate increases before the Michigan Public Service Commission. The latter regulates the rates of all public utilities except water.

In retaliation apparently, Cavanagh proposed that suburbs

buying water from Detroit should in the future have to pledge an end to racial housing discrimination.

Retorted Canfield:

"Water rates and civil rights

have as much to do with each other as equality and the electric light bulb." Which was Canfield's way of saying what most people thought of the Detroit mayor's outburst.

8 Receive In-School Teaching

VA Seeks Income Report

More than 78,000 Michigan Veterans and dependents who last year received \$66,561,600 in Veterans Administration pensions will be called on December 1 to make their annual accounting of income.

Robert M. FitzGerald, manager of the Regional Office in Detroit, said VA needs the income information to determine the veteran's or widow's entitlement to more pension, less pension or any at all.

Cards for reporting this outside income—from wages, self-employment, Social Security, other annuities or retirements and investments—will be mailed with pension checks to be paid December 1.

Window envelopes are enclosed to facilitate return of the report cards to the proper VA office. Veterans drawing service-connected disability are not concerned.

ON THE BASIS of experience, VA knows pretty well what to expect.

Of some two and a half million VA pensioners throughout the country who must report, at least 50,000 will put the card into the window envelope backwards, resulting in misdirected mail and processing delays.

Some 4,000 Michigan veterans will spindle or bend their cards, causing more problems. Another 1,000 will take out their checks and throw away the report card and envelopes.

At least 2,000 will lose their window envelopes and in addressing substitutes will send the cards to the regional office where they usually do business but which are probably not the addresses on the cards in front of them.

A HARD CORE of 10,000 in this state will fail once again to report at all by the Feb. 1 deadline and will have their pensions cut off by VA to refresh their memories. Ultimately most of these will file reports and get back on the rolls.

Finally, perhaps a thousand beneficiaries simply won't bother to report because they know their increased incomes will cut off their pensions anyway.

For these, VA has a special treatment. It has to collect any pensions paid from the date the veterans income made him ineligible. If no report is received, the amount due would be all payments received during the year. That's the law, FitzGerald explained.

Legislators Take Vacation Without Open Housing Action

State senators and representatives, called into special session Oct. 10, are back home for a three-week rest. They'll return Dec. 12 to face one of the most controversial issues in years, the open occupancy bill. Passage is slim even though Gov. Romney is pushing for it. Before recessing, the lawmakers passed a state income tax, boosted the cost on gasoline and license plates, and tacked extra fees on such things as parks and fishing licenses.

Following a "conflict of interest" ruling by Attorney General Frank Kelley, Wayne State University Trustee William B. Hall announced his resignation from the Detroit Bank and Trust Company to retain his seat on the University's governing body.

A survey of a Detroit group, the Police Recruitment Project of Michigan, has revealed that three of the State's largest municipal police departments with more than 100 men

have no minority group representation, and that the 1,498-man Michigan State Police has only one Negro state trooper.

American Motors Chairman Roy D. Chapin, Jr., admitted his annual report to the board of directors this week will show a \$70-million loss but said the company appears now to have "turned the corner" on the way to recovery. Some \$20-million a year in overhead has been cut, he said, and AMC's break-even sales level reduced to 275,000 cars, down more than 100,000

units from a year ago.

Detroit and Highland Park have received Federal grants for upgrading of housing, education and health facilities and to research better methods of slum clearance, welfare assistance and the war on crime. Detroit will use its \$274,000 federal subsidy to find ways to rebuild a nine-square-mile section of the Inner City where more than 140,000 persons "live in poverty, blight, disorder and disease."

his child after an exhaustive search and then fought an 11-month court fight to bring the case to its present status. In the meantime, the mother's maternal rights were severed by court decision and the Appeals Court ruled the natural father has full right to raise his son. A decision is pending.

Various Negro groups have demanded that Kalamazoo's Central High School, with an enrollment of 2,200 students including about 300 Negroes, include Negro girls as cheerleaders and also teach Negro history in classes next Fall. The latter has been approved by the Kalamazoo Board of Education.

Several new regulations go into affect for deer and bear hunters this season which opened Saturday and runs through Dec. 3. Booklets issued with licenses cite 22 rifle bans in some areas and prohibit hunting of bear in the Lower Peninsula. The new heavy-paper deer tag regulations are explained. A new rule regarding the use of a light to locate game requires any weapon to be inaccessible. Fleeing from an officer or failing to stop at his signal is a separate offense.

What's The PF In Your Home?

Did you know your basement has a "best corner"; that is, a corner that provides the best protection against radioactive fallout?

It's the one with the highest outside ground level, the one with the least amount of basement wall extending above ground. Now, that's something you can easily determine for yourself.

But do you know how much protection against fallout the best corner provides? Likely not, only a scientific evaluation could give you that information. IN RESPONSE to Governor George Romney's request, the Office of Civil Defense in Washington arranged for the Bureau of the Census to make this State-wide survey.

The Bureau obtains a few simple facts about the construction of one-, two-, and three-family dwellings. On the basis of this information, a computer at the Census Bureau calculates the Protection Factor (PF) for each individual basement.

Protection Factor is a term used to indicate a certain amount of protection against fallout radiation. For example, a person in a basement corner which has Protection Factor-40 would receive only one-fortieth or 2 1/2 percent as much radiation as he would get if he were

outside and completely unprotected.

The higher the PF, the more protection the basement affords. PF-40 has been established by the Office of Civil Defense as the minimum standard for public fallout shelters. The familiar black-and-yellow fallout shelter sign designates buildings where these shelters are located.

IN ADDITION to providing the PF for the best corner, the computer calculates the PF for the center of your basement. This, in effect, tells you the amount of protection normally found in your entire basement.

But what if the PF in your best corner is below 40? The computer calculates how much weight of material should be placed over each square foot above the best corner to bring its PF up to 40.

All of this information comes to you with a Civil Defense Booklet suggesting relatively inexpensive measures you can take to increase the radiation shielding in your basement.

And if you want detailed plans for improving the shielding in your basement, mail the postage-free card attached to the booklet.

YOU SAY YOU don't have a basement? Then fill in the questionnaire anyway, and you'll receive a Civil Defense booklet containing other helpful information about fallout protection for you and your family.

Will Competition Cure Mail Service?

ANN ARBOR--Neither snow, nor rain, nor heat, nor gloom of night stops the post office from the swift completion of its appointed rounds.

But inefficiency does. Business economist Ross J. Wilhelm, of The University of Michigan, maintains that inefficiency, bureaucratic redtape, and political maneuvering not only slow down the mails, but "come close to paralyzing the system." He suggests a dose of competition.

THE POST OFFICE is one of the country's major businesses. It has 700,000 employees, a \$6.6 billion annual budget, and a volume of 75 billion pieces of mail per year. It has recently embarked on a \$100 million automation program to modernize and update its methods.

"And yet, by every reasonable test, the Post Office Department is a highly inefficient organization, and the situation is growing worse every day," according to Prof. Wilhelm. Post Office troubles are more fundamental than the annual financial deficit, the U-M economist says. "The real troubles of the Post Office were dramatically highlighted in Chicago last fall when over 8.5 million pieces of mail piled up undelivered in a two-week period. Mail delivery is much slower than it should be if we are to maintain the pace of today's dynamic economy."

POSTMASTER GENERAL Lawrence F. O'Brien has proposed that the department be made an independent government-owned corporation with freedom to borrow money for its needs and modify its rates at will, free of political control. Automation and ZIP codes are attempts to simplify and speed its operations.

"It is clear, however, that the measures which have been proposed by O'Brien or any of the other actions will not clear up the postal delivery problems in the near future," Wilhelm declares.

"And the important problem is not the organization nor the structure nor the finances of the department. The important and vital need is to get the mails moving rapidly now and removing this drag on our economy."

"There is a way the delivery of mail could be accelerated--almost overnight--and it would require no additional expenditures, equipment, or reorganization of the department. The method is simply for the Congress to pass a law which would permit anyone to carry and deliver first class mail."

"THE POST OFFICE Department now has an absolute monopoly on the delivery of letters and other first-class mail. No one but the government can deliver it. A company which tried to deliver its own mail to its own office in another city would probably be stopped," Wilhelm says, "and might be fined \$500." "The Post Office monopoly on first-class mail simply is

an anachronism in today's modern society, and this is compounded by the department's inefficiency," Wilhelm declares.

"If outsiders were permitted to carry first-class mail, then the most damaging effects of the department's inefficiency would be avoided. Companies and individuals who had letters that simply had to be delivered by a particular time would use some method of delivery other than the Post Office--such as armored car service, film delivery service, or even by sending a messenger.

"The elimination of the Post Office's monopoly on first-class mail would relieve the economy of the burdens of the department's present inefficiency, and it also would let the Post Office Department feel the hot breath of competition which certainly could do no harm."

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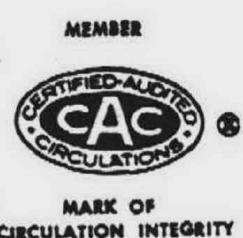

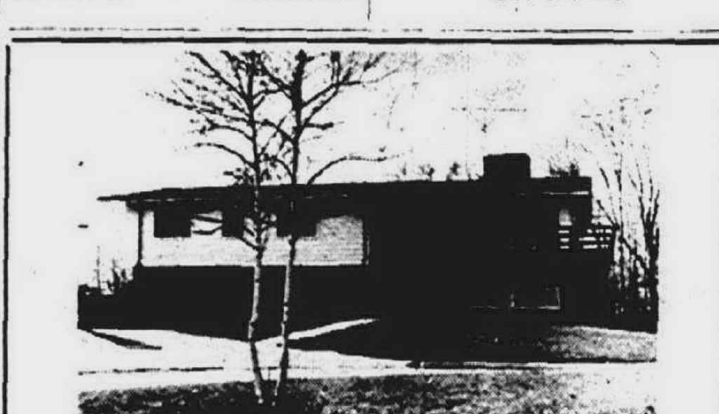
