

Election Chief Cites Rules For Open Housing Referendum

Proceeding on the theory that rumor will become fact and that petitions will be initiated to have the open housing ordinance placed on the ballot, Eugene Slider, Plymouth City Clerk who also is Chairman of the Election Commission, has announced the steps that must be taken.

"To initiate such a petition," Slider explained, "it must be signed by not less than 15% of the number of electors of the City who voted for Governor of the State of Michigan at the last fall election held in the State."

"The last fall election for Governor was held on November 8, 1966 and, according to the tabulation of votes cast for this office, 3,463 votes were cast."

"Based on this," he continued,

"\$20 valid signatures would be required for a referendum petition, it also is required that the City Attorney approve the form of any petition being circulated prior to its circulation."

Slider also stated that all procedures and actions required of the City Commission and the City Clerk pertaining to any referendum petition are in the following sections of the city charter and will need to be followed accordingly.

INITIATIVE AND REFERENDUM:

Section 6.11. An ordinance may be initiated, or a referendum on an ordinance enacted by the Commission may be had, by a petition, as hereinafter provided.

PETITIONS:

Section 6.12. A petition initiating an ordinance, or re-

questing a referendum on an ordinance, shall be signed by not less than fifteen per cent of the number of electors of the city who voted for governor of the State of Michigan at the last fall election held in the state. Before being circulated for signatures, all such petitions shall be approved as to form by the City Attorney. No such petition need be on one paper but may be the aggregate of two or more petition papers. Each signer of a petition shall sign his name in ink or indelible pencil, and shall place thereon, after his name, the date and place of his residence by street and number, or by other customary designation. To each petition paper there shall be attached a sworn affidavit that each signature

thereon is the genuine signature of the person whose name it purports to be, and that it was made in the presence of the affiant. Such petition shall be filed with the Clerk, who shall, within ten days, canvass the signatures thereon to determine the sufficiency thereof. No signature on any petition initiating an ordinance or requesting a referendum on an ordinance shall be counted in the canvass thereof which was signed more than six months prior to the date on which such petition was filed with the Clerk, or in case the date following such signature has been altered in any manner. If any such petitions shall be found to contain an insufficient number of signatures of registered electors of the city, or to be improper as to

form or not to be in compliance with the provisions of this section, the Clerk shall notify the person filing such petition forthwith, and ten days from such notification shall be allowed for the filing of supplemental petition papers. When found sufficient and proper, the Clerk shall certify such fact on the petition of not less than one paper thereof, indicating the date and time of such certification, and shall present the petition to the Commission at its next regular meeting.

COMMISSION PROCEDURES:

Section 6.13. Upon receiving a petition initiating an ordinance or requesting a referendum on an ordinance from the Clerk, the Commission shall, within thirty days, either:

(a) If it be an initiatory pe-

tion, adopt the ordinance as submitted in the petition, or determine to submit the proposal to the electors of the city and provide for the holding of the election thereon; or

(b) If it be a referendary petition, repeal the ordinance to which the petition refers or determine to submit the proposal to the electors of the city and provide for the holding of the election thereon.

SUBMISSION TO ELECTORS:

Section 6.14. Should the Commission decide to submit the proposal to the electors in either case, it shall be submitted at an election to be held not less than forty days, nor more than ninety days, after the date of action thereon by the Commission. Provided, that, if any election, other than

a school election, is to be held, in the city, for any purpose whatsoever, within one hundred and twenty days after such action by the Commission, such proposal shall be submitted to the electors of the city at such election. If such proposal must be submitted at a special election, and no such election may be held in the city because of any limitation thereof imposed by law, then such proposition shall be submitted to the electors of the city at the next election other than a school election, held in the city for any purpose whatsoever. The result shall be determined by a majority vote of the electors voting thereon, except in cases where otherwise required by the constitution or laws of the State of Michigan.

ORDINANCE SUSPENDED:

Section 6.15. The certification by the Clerk of the sufficiency of a petition for referendum within thirty days after the passage of the ordinance, shall automatically suspend the operation of the ordinance in question pending repeal by the Commission or final determination by the electors, as the case may be. An ordinance adopted through initiatory proceedings may not be amended or repealed by the Commission for a period of two years after the date of the election at which it was adopted. Should two or more ordinances, adopted at the same election, have conflicting provisions, the one receiving the highest vote shall prevail as to those provisions.

Township Boom Goes \$3 Million Over 1966

Plymouth Township is experiencing a building boom this year and it doesn't appear as if it will taper off for some time to come.

Although raw figures seldom tell a complete story, the 1967 figures, which have only been tabulated up to the end of November, show an increase of almost \$3 million over the whole of 1966.

So far, in 1967, the Township has issued permits having a total value of \$15 million with fees received from these permits amounting to \$29,125.

Last year's permits were valued at \$12 million with accompanying fees amounting to \$28,022.

The Township issued 32 permits in November with a total valuation of \$262,380, plus \$1,273 in fees.

For the same month last year the Township issued only 15 permits worth \$115,670 with the fees amounting to only \$536.

In October 1967, 53 permits were issued. They were valued at \$343,357 and the fees received were \$1,547. October's high valuation was attributed in part to the issuance of an industrial permit worth \$90,850.

Not included in current yearly and monthly figures are the large apartment complexes that have sprung up in the township in the last few years.

Altogether, there are six complexes, three of which are almost completed.

The two largest complexes, each having 172 units, are the Heritage Apartments on N. Territorial and Sheldon Roads and the Lake Pointe Village Apartments on the south side of Wilcox.

Next comes a complex which is being developed by the Hope Valley Land Co. and numbers 152 units. This is on Eckles Rd. between Ann Arbor Rd. and Ann Arbor Trail.

The fourth largest is the 104 unit Broughman Manor Apartments which is located next to Lake Pointe Village. This complex is valued approximately over a million dollars.

One of the most recent com-

plexes to date is Plymouth Estates which is located between Ann Arbor Rd. and Joy just off of Lilley Rd. This will have 94 units.

The smallest, in terms of units, is the Plymouth Park Apartments at Plymouth Rd. behind the Plymouth Bowl. This complex has 56 units.

Bob Willoughby Hurt When Car Hits Train

Robert Dwight Willoughby, owner of the Willoughby Shoe Store, 322 S. Main, Plymouth, is in serious condition in St. Mary Hospital, Livonia, after the car he was driving struck a train at a C & O crossing near Five Mile and Napier Roads on Friday morning.

Willoughby was driving south on Napier Rd. when his automobile struck the first engine of an east bound C & O freight train.

According to the Wayne County Sheriff's Department, there are no warning flashers at that particular crossing.

The car struck about 20 feet from the front end of the engine and was pinned between the railroad sign and the train. The Sheriff's Patrol stated that all 68 cars of the train sideswiped the car before the train was stopped.

Willoughby was also pinned in the car for nearly an hour before he was freed and rushed to the hospital.

The Engineer, Arthur Miller, told police that his engine had cleared the crossing when he heard the impact of the crash.

At the request of the federal government the City of Plymouth has agreed to reduce the number of units in the proposed senior citizens housing project from 64 to 60 with the result that a timetable has been established for the construction of the long awaited facility.

Announcement of this agreement was made through the Washington office of Congressman Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor) and later verified by Richard Blodgett, Plymouth city manager, who accompanied Mayor James Jabara to Chicago several weeks ago for the meeting with the federal housing officials.

Under the terms of this new agreement, according to Blodgett, the schematic drawings will be presented on January 15 and the final plans will be available and advertising for bids will be on April 15. If all goes well construction will be started in May.

SETTING OF the official timetable climaxes more than two years of work on a senior citizens housing project and brings new hope to those who are contemplating occupying them when completed.

For some time it has been known that the city and federal officials were at odds over the workable program for the city and several months ago it was made known that the city's plans were not complete enough to satisfy the demands of the government.

On learning of this, the city stepped up its work and it had been rumored for the past month that the latest plans were being looked upon with favor.

To step up the pace Mayor Jabara and City Manager Blodgett visited the officials in Chicago and agreed to the final demands that now should make the senior citizens housing program a reality.

"It was just a matter of going back to our original request," Blodgett explained. "When we first made application several years ago the site we had in mind was the Wilcox property on Ann Arbor Trail. The proposed plan called for 60 units. At the time the City of Plymouth was awarded \$1 million for the project. It was sidetracked then when the appraisals were too high."

A CHANGE in sites was made about a year ago and the area in the rear of the Christian Science Church on Ann Arbor Trail was selected.

The proposal on the new site called for 64 units and it was this addition of the four units that has unknowingly been holding up the project for some time.

According to Blodgett, the City of Plymouth had been working with the Housing and Urban Development (HUD) group in Chicago and it was learned several weeks ago that the Housing Authority had full jurisdiction. It was an appeal to this group that brought to light the request for the four additional units and the demand from the government that the plan be cut back to the original 60 units.

"It was just that simple," Blodgett confided, "and now it looks as though we will be on our way."

He also let it be known that the city's workable program which was deficient now is being looked upon favorably and that approval may be given any day.

Businessmen Given Reasons For Open Housing Controversies

More than 40 business leaders of the area now know why the Open Housing Ordinance has been referred to as a "controversial issue."

They attended the monthly meeting of the Businessmen's Forum at the Meeting House on Thursday and during a panel discussion heard—

State Rep. James Tierney, D-Garden City, state that the proposed bill gives too much power to the Civil Rights Commission.

City Attorney Charles Lowe explains that, even though he wrote the measure passed by the city, he didn't know whether it was legal because it never was tried in court.

Rev. Henry Walch, president of the Plymouth Ministerial Association, implore that

we were all human in the eyes of God and should act that way, and—

Earl Keim, prominent real estate man, declares that the proposed state bill and the ordinance passed by the City were

against all tradition in the buying and selling of property. THE PANEL had been arranged by the Forum in the hope that all issues of the ordinance and the contents of the state bill would be discussed.

Instead, the discussion turned to a defense and attack on the measures.

"This is not a case of prejudice against rights," Rep. Tierney stated, "but I think the bill now before the legislature is extremely unjust because it gives much too much power to the Civil Rights Commission."

"This is a body of political appointees with more power than the attorney general or other bodies because it has the right of subpoena."

"I am in a quandry trying to arrive at a decision on how to vote. I have never hated a man because of the pigment of his skin—but I don't like the bill in its present form."

"Even though I wrote the city ordinance I realize that you can't legislate such things. There is a law against riots, but we had them," Charles Lowe, Plymouth city attorney, stated.

"In writing the ordinance I stipulated a fine of \$500 for violators, but I purposely avoided including a jail term. I don't want to take away a man's freedom because under the set-up there could be a miscarriage of justice."

"I don't know if the ordinance is legal, because it never had been tried in court—and I don't know if it will work, because it never has been tried."

"I don't know whether I am Daniel in the lions' den or a lion in a den of Daniels," Rev. Walch remarked, "but no matter what we say or do this ordinance comes down to a matter of color."

Flu Hits Schools

Flu, the harbinger of runny noses and related discomforts, is stalking the corridors of Plymouth Junior High-East, causing approximately 230 students per day to miss roll call and resulting in a 7% increase in absence over last year.

"Yes, the absenteeism among our students is above normal," said Carl Taylor, principal of Junior High-East, "but there is nothing to be alarmed about."

All other schools in the district reported that absenteeism was about average.

Garbage Under Study Again

With the hope of arriving at a solution to the garbage disposal problem and the possibility of setting up an authority to build an incinerator the members of the Plymouth City Commission will meet with the Livonia City Council on Thursday evening in Livonia.

Officials of the two cities have been meeting from time to time to discuss the problem, but thus far no definite solution has been reached.

"We are exploring all the possibilities," City Manager Richard Blodgett explained, "and the meeting this week

is just another in the series."

The Plymouth officials were moved to swing into action with the warning during the past week that the land fill project in Salem Township will be concluded within three years.

It was pointed out in the warning that the land would be filled by that time and that a new site would be necessary.

Knowing that three years is not a long time, Commissioner Arch Valier has been urging a meeting with the officials from nearby cities to develop a joint program.

"The warning this week was

not too frightening," City Manager Blodgett pointed out, "for the simple reason that the compaction has not been as great as expected and the land is not filling up at the anticipated rate. This may give us added usage for a year or two."

"We also understand" he said, "that the contractor has a new site available and, under agreement, any land he acquires within 15 miles can be put to our use."

No chances are being taken, though, and every avenue toward a solution will be explored with the Livonia Council.

Township Officials Explain Tax Bills

Mixed in with their early holiday greeting cards many residents of Plymouth Township received a shock during the past week.

It was their annual tax bill which showed an increase in-

stead of an anticipated decrease in many cases and brought howls of protest to the Township Hall.

"It is simply a case of misunderstanding," Supervisor McEwen explained. "Many of these people thought that when

the rate was decreased their bills also would be decreased. They didn't take into consideration the fact that their assessments were increased under the state law which states that all property shall be assessed at 50 per cent of its true cash value.

"SURE," HE continued, "the rate was reduced, but the assessments took a jump."

"These people had plenty of warning of what was going to happen," Mrs. Elizabeth Holmes, Township Treasurer, explained.

"They were told last Spring during the Board of Review and it has been published, too." Asked if the tax bills showed large increases, Mrs. Holmes said, "they increased from a little in some cases to a lot in others."

In order to help clarify matters Mrs. Holmes explained just what has happened.

"Last year," she said, "our rate was \$74.34 per \$1,000. This was with the state equalization factor of 1.83."

"THEN WE had a re-assessment of land values to make them more uniform. This brought some assessments up much higher than they had been. Along with this the method of using the equalized factor was changed. In other years it was applied to the rate. This year it was applied to the individual assessment."

She then provided this example: "Last year, with an equalizing factor of 1.83, our rate was \$74.34 per \$1,000, of assessed valuation."

This year the Township rate

before applying the equalizing factor is \$39.13. By applying this equalizing factor of 1.78 the figure comes to \$69.65 per \$1,000 of valuation.

This is a reduction in the rate and proves that the increased tax bills are the result of the re-assessment of the property to bring it closer to the state's requirement.

"Some of the property on the west side of the Township," Supervisor McEwen pointed out, "hadn't been re-assessed for 25 years, so the change came as a shock."

He also let it be known that some of the owners of the larger tracts already were preparing for the splitting of the property to some portions of it on the market.

ORDINANCE NO. 333

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 8 OF ORDINANCE NO. 157, ENTITLED, "AN ORDINANCE FOR SAFEGUARDING LIFE AND PROPERTY BY REGULATING AND PROVIDING FOR THE INSPECTION OF THE INSTALLATION AND MAINTENANCE OF ELECTRIC WIRING, ELECTRIC DEVICES AND ELECTRIC MATERIAL; TO PROVIDE FOR THE LICENSING AND REGISTRATION OF ELECTRICAL CONTRACTORS AND THE LICENSING OF JOURNEYMEN ELECTRICIANS IN THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH; TO PROVIDE A RECIPROCAL ARRANGEMENT FOR THE RECOGNITION OF EXAMINATIONS AND LICENSES ISSUED BY OTHER MUNICIPALITIES IN THE STATE OF MICHIGAN; TO PROVIDE A PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF; AND TO REPEAL ORDINANCE NO. 98 (AS AMENDED BY ORDINANCE NO. 109) AND ALL OTHER ORDINANCES AND SECTIONS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERewith OF THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH, MICHIGAN.

THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

Section 1. Section 8 of Ordinance No. 157, entitled, "An Ordinance for safeguarding life and property by regulating and providing for the inspection of the installation and maintenance of electric wiring, electric devices and electric material; to provide for the licensing and registration of Electrical Contractors and the licensing of Journeymen electricians in the City of Plymouth; to provide a reciprocal arrangement for the recognition of examinations and licenses issued by other municipalities in the State of Michigan; to provide a penalty for violations thereof; and to repeal Ordinance No. 98 (as amended by Ordinance No. 109) and all other ordinances and sections of ordinances in conflict herewith of the City of Plymouth, Michigan" is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 8. Construction Requirements -- No certificate of inspection shall be issued unless the electrical installation is in strict conformity with the provisions of this ordinance, the statutes of the State of Michigan, the rules and regulations issued by the Michigan Public Utilities Commission under authority of the state statutes, and unless they are in conformity with approved methods of construction for safety to person and property. The National Electrical Code with the uniform rules, as revised in the year 1965, are hereby adopted as part of this Electrical Ordinance.

Section 2. This ordinance shall become operative and effective on the 28th day of December A.D. 1967.

City Commissioners Find Political Glamour Carries A High Price Tag

Political glamour and prestige oftentimes carry a high price tag.

The members of the City Commission found this out the hard way before they finally passed the open housing ordinance last Monday night.

It is no secret that several members would have preferred placing the controversial measure on the ballot to let the voters decide the issue.

It is no secret, either, that there were some members who would have preferred putting final action off for further study with the hope that the state legislature would have adopted a measure and made it, more or less, unnecessary for a local ordinance.

In the end, however, they had to accept the responsibility given them by the voters and stand up and be counted.

This sometimes is difficult to do — and takes a great deal of courage — especially before a large gathering of the taxpayers.

Few measures that have been brought before the City Commission have caused as much concern as the open housing ordinance. It was brought to the attention of the lawmakers several months ago and studied to the point where the City Attorney was asked to prepare an ordinance.

Once written, it started through the legislative mills, which, at best, is a slow process. However, this was one ordinance that was handled differently than all others.

On the night of the first reading there was an attempt to pass it. Then came a public hearing, supposedly to learn the feeling of the people. And the people who favored the measure spoke in no uncertain terms. But with every word uttered the pressure built up on the members of the Commission.

It became a virtual tug of war between two groups — one headed by Commissioner Robert Smith, to

pass the measure, and the second, with Commissioner Arch Vallier as the spokesman, to pass it along to the voters for a decision.

It is a matter of note that no other ordinances are passed on to the people for a decision. Then, why should a different procedure be used for open housing?

This measure was important.

There is no denying that. But other measures that come before the august body are important, too. There are tax measures which hit the voters in the purse . . . these are other measures in which the public money is spent without going to the voters for an opinion.

In all of these matters the holders of public office take bows for

legislating changes that improve the area. They accept the plaudits of the populace for what is called a good job.

These are the times when being a public official carries a touch of glamour and prestige. They are the times when the man in office gleefully takes bows.

But it is a much different matter when a controversial subject moves to the front.

This is seen now all along the line. It is not only the City Commission in Plymouth that studied and fidgeted over the open housing measure.

Our state legislature has been doing the same thing for several months — and there is still no decision.

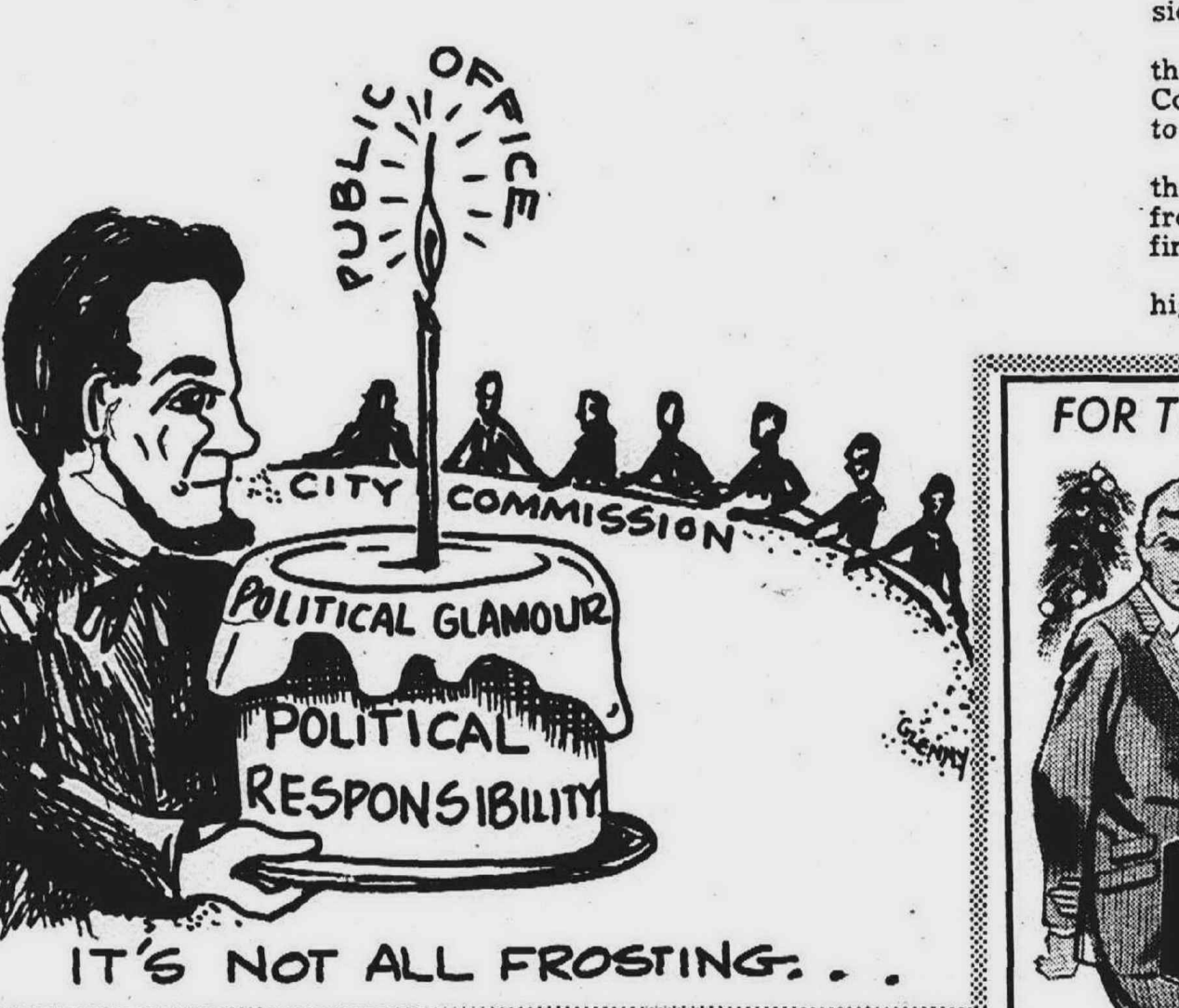
But to the everlasting credit of the public officials in the Plymouth Community they had the courage to stand up and be counted.

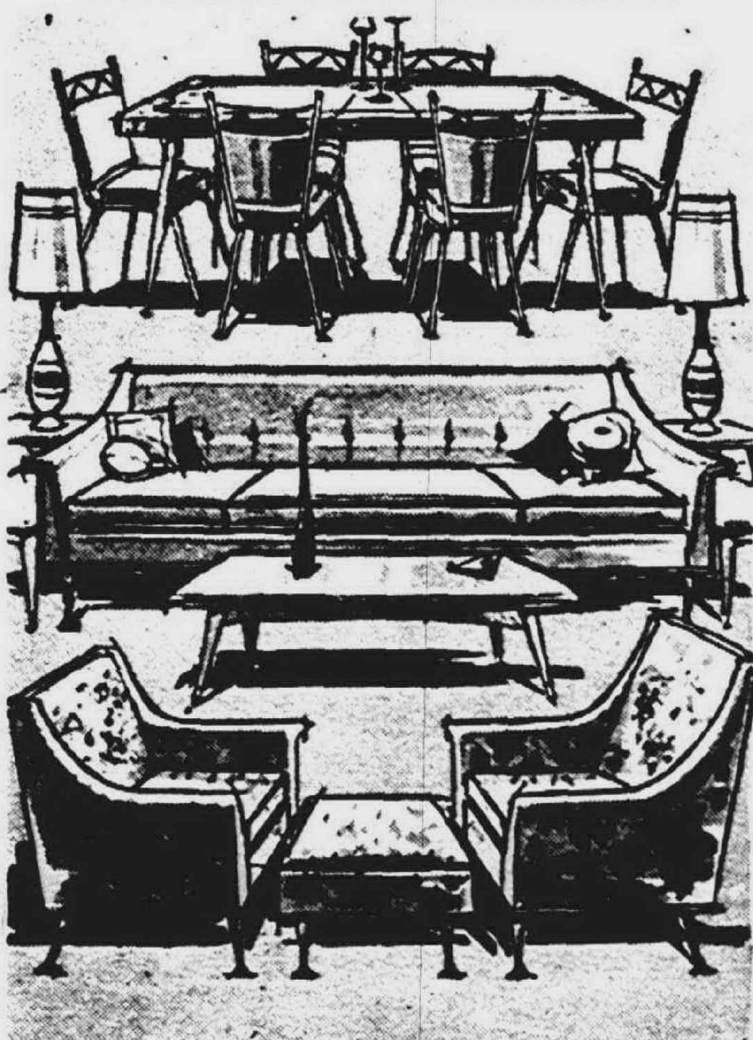

"The average age of the world's great civilizations has been 200 years. These nations progressed through this sequence:

From Bondage to Spiritual Faith
From Spiritual Faith to Great Courage
From Courage to Liberty
From Liberty to Abundance
From Abundance to Selfishness
From Selfishness to Complacency
From Complacency to Apathy
From Apathy to Dependency
From Dependency back again into Bondage."

This little piece of information was reprinted by the Chamber of Commerce with the heartwarming reminder that in eight years the United States will be 200 years old.

But it goes on to tell us that the cycle is not inevitable—it depends on us.

Inevitable or not it does appear as if a good portion of this cycle goes hand in hand with American history.

Personally I am inclined to fit 1967 in somewhere near the bottom of the progression, but again, the final outcome does depend on us.

In keeping with our American system we have chosen for the most part to carry out this responsibility through other people, be they elected, appointed or otherwise. However, if this system is going to work; if the cycle is going to be broken we are going to have to be more consistent than we are.

In a documentary based on John Steinbeck's "America for Americans" given on television last Sunday evening it was mentioned that Americans have reserved the right to destroy the people to whom they have given this responsibility.

The day that any man takes on the role of public servant he becomes vulnerable to public attack, gossip, slander and whatever else the public wishes to throw his way. He may be misquoted, misinterpreted and misunderstood.

The public will never know the reasons, the sleeplessness, the turmoil and the effort put forth by those men who meet in a city council, a state legislature, a session in Congress or wherever else men in the role of public servant open their mouth or follow their convictions.

This holds true—be that person chief of state, minister, school teacher or anyone else with a responsibility to the people.

Whether it be over a supermarket basket or a telephone line, we have reserved the right to speak without facts and pass judgement on the basis of misinformation.

While this may be the American way, it can hardly be called the Christian American way.

While we can thank God that we have men who for the sake of our society, our culture and our religion will continue to make themselves vulnerable in the above fashion we might at the same time show this gratitude by giving more consideration to these men upon whom we have thrown our responsibility—these men who in one role or another are committed to breaking the cycle of bondage to bondage.

Rev. Berg Accepts Milwaukee Appointment

Rev. Norman Berg, pastor of St. Peter's Lutheran Church, will deliver his farewell sermon on Sunday, January 21 after serving here for nine years.

Rev. Berg has been appointed executive secretary of the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod's General Board for Home Missions. He and his family will leave Plymouth the latter part of next month, making their home in Milwaukee, near the Milwaukee Synod Headquarters.

The 368,000 member Wisconsin Synod has 214 missions and preaching stations located in 27 states and Canada, with a \$1.2 million annual domestic mission budget.

Rev. Berg will be busy for the next few weeks preparing to leave not only his church and congregation, but his position as District President of the Michigan Synod and Vice President of the Synod.

As executive secretary of the board Pastor Berg will coordinate the Synod's domestic mission work which is supervised by 11 district mission

boards. He will also participate in the administration of the church extension funds.

On Nov. 3, 1959 a formal call was sent to Benton Harbor requesting Rev. Berg as successor to St. Peter's Rev. Hoenecke.

Rev. Berg was formally inducted into the office that he has held for eight years on January 10, 1960.

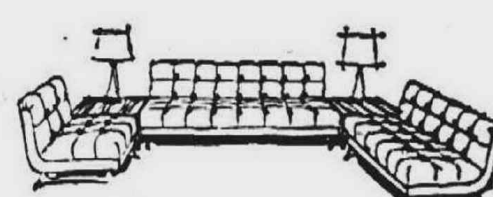
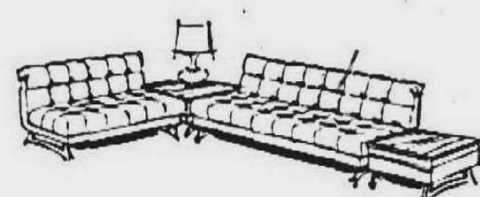
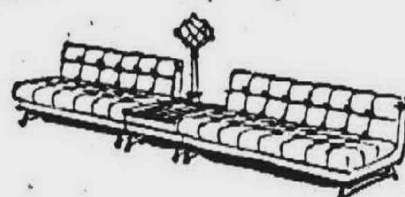

State

News

Round Up

STATE SELECTIVE Service Director, Col. Arthur A. Holmes warned persons who turn in their draft cards in protest against the draft and the Vietnam war may go to the head of the induction list. Holmes added that no Michigan residents have yet been ordered to report for induction into the Army. However, he stated, Selective Service officials are in the process of taking action against individuals in several such cases.

DETROIT MAYOR Jerome Cavanagh is contemplating calling for a revision of the city's 49-year-old charter saying, "We're trying to solve 1967's problem with 1918's answers." Of the 10 areas he said he knew needed changing, he said one crying for immediate attention is police and firemen's pensions. He cited as other areas of needed change a provision for filling of vacancies on the city council and the relaxation of the residency requirement for city employees.

LEO C. SHIRLEY, of Dearborn, a retired FBI special agent, has been appointed by Gov. George Romney to succeed Joseph Childs as state racing commissioner. Childs resigned for a term expiring at the pleasure of the governor. Senate confirmation is not required. Shirley, 55, is a manufacturers' representative. He joined the FBI in 1942 and was assigned to the Detroit office from August 1943 until his retirement. Romney also announced the reappointment of Herbert W. Fox to the Saginaw Valley College Board. Fox is an assistant principal of the Alpena Public Schools.

THE BODY of a 41-year-old Ford Motor Co. official was found atop a hotel marquee in Sao Paulo, Brazil, and has been identified as Alexander Wilson, Jr., of 30360 W. Warren, Westland. Police said that Wilson either jumped or fell from his sixth-story room. He was employed as international operations manager-Latin America for the Ford Motor Credit Co. Wilson was not married. His body is being shipped to Largo, Fla., where his parents live, for burial.

JACKSON County Sheriff, Gerald H. Austin, died Dec. 6 in a hospital of complications from a gall bladder operation. The 62-year-old policeman began as a Jackson policeman and he was a commander of State Police posts at Jackson, Blissfield and Jonesville. He is survived by his wife and three children.

AN ISSUE which began in 1963 was sent back to Ingham County Circuit Court by the State Supreme Court when the high court stated that it is up to a lower court to decide whether branch managers of the Secretary of State's license plate offices in major cities should come under civil service. A majority of four justices held that defendants Secretary of State James M. Hare, Treasurer Sanford Brown and Controller Glenn Allen should have another opportunity to ask the trial court to dismiss the suit. The Civil Service maintains that branch license offices in major cities with managers appointed by Hare was in violation of the constitution.

IN ANOTHER health dispute, Dr. Lawrence Jackson, head of Herman Keifer Hospital's mental health services for children, denied charges against his department that ill patients lie strapped to stretchers in the halls. Jackson was answering statements made over the weekend by Dr. Ralph Rabinovitch, director of Hawthorn Center, another mental health facility for children, who had stated that overcrowding at Herman Keifer had resulted in patients being restrained in the halls because no beds were available.

AFTER BEING charged with "flagrant contempt" of court by Wayne Circuit Judge Horace W. Gilmore, slum landlords Albert, Hyman and Samuel Goodman were each sentenced to five months in jail and fined \$1,000 Wednesday for allowing prostitution in one of their inner city apartment buildings. The three were given a court order last March 31 to stop the illegal practice in a 40-unit building they own at 124 Alfred. The Goodman Brothers, whose extensive holdings include slum apartment buildings as well as the new St. Regis Hotel, will appeal.

AFTER HOLDING nine persons hostage for 16 hours, Eugene Ector, 62, a steamfitter at Ford Motor Co., gave up to Detroit police Dec. 5. He was seized after he stepped onto the front porch of his west side home to greet an old friend. During the ordeal, Ector sporadically fired two guns, apparently hitting no one. It resulted from a drunken spree fueled by an argument with a girl friend and grief over the loss of a son during the Detroit riots in July.

All was going well . . . and then Kathy Roberts of the Pistons staff blurted:

"Harry Wismer, the announcer, is dead!" She wondered if we knew Harry. Few connected with sports didn't.

But to us, Harry Wismer was something special, one of those fellows who helped us to get started in this business.

We met him that day in November 1945, when Eddie Hayes sent us up to East Lansing to serve as Michigan State correspondent for the old Times.

At that time we hadn't enrolled at Spartanland. That was to come after Christmas.

A spry young man, still in our teens, we trudged out to the football practice field to introduce ourselves to Charlie Bachman, then the Spartans' head football coach.

Bachman welcomed us aboard and quickly turned to do a little introducing himself. One gent in the group was Harry Wismer.

Harry was what they still refer to around universities — a B.M.O.C. That's a big man on campus.

He was sports editor of the college paper. He did sports for the college radio station, and night after night during the fall he'd borrow somebody's car and buzz (40-50 m.p.h.) into Detroit to perform as the Lions' cub reporter on Station WJR.

SINCE WE HAD no college work to worry about, we'd occasionally make the trip into the city with Harry. He was one way to kill time.

Besides, Harry had invited us to write sports for the State paper, even though we hadn't become a student.

In what then was a two to three-hour ride in from East Lansing, Harry would talk about his future.

"I want to be a big time sports announcer on one of the national networks," he'd say. "I aspire to be the owner of a major league sports team."

"And . . . you know what . . . I'm going to have my dreams come true."

A lot of people talk that way. But most people never were or are like Harry Wismer.

They lack the determination. Harry went on to become a big-time sports announcer. He was heard from coast-to-coast, airing the big games in football, basketball and what-have-you.

He had an interest in the Detroit Lions, in the Washington Redskins and then landed the New York Titans as he helped found the American Football League.

GOOD FORTUNE DIDN'T follow Wismer in any of his football dealings. He had to sell the Titans, who were to become the Jets and a million dollar enterprise.

Harry, they say, passed away broke in the pocketbook and no doubt with a broken heart.

The smiles that he flashed in college and for many years thereafter gave way to worried looks. His first marriage failed.

Fame started to elude him. The man, whose voice carried into millions of homes at one time, had quieted down almost to a whisper.

He'd return to Detroit and Michigan to visit his family in Port Huron. You'd see him around the Press Club or maybe one of the newspaper offices. He'd like to call Al Ackerman and chat on Sportsline.

But the other morning he was rushed to a New York hospital. Within two hours, Harry Wismer was no more . . . just a memory.

To some of us . . . a wonderful, nice memory.

Plymouth High To Test Pro 24 Second Rule

Permission has been granted to athletic director John Sandmann of Plymouth to try a high school basketball experiment. When the Rocks play Farmington on Jan. 5 in a non-league game, the two schools will borrow from the professionals and use a special 24-second, shooting clock.

"It's TIME something is done to speed up prep basketball," Sandmann said. "Right now, we have a lot of stalling around and also we fre-

quently run into two types of games being played by a team on the same evening. "This is particularly true when your team leads. For three periods or so, you move the ball and shoot. "Then you go into a stall and the only course open to your opponents is to shoot."

SANDMANN FEELS that with the 24-second clock in operation, the tempo of high school games will remain the same. "It's worked for the profes-

sionals, why can't it work for us in high school?" Sandmann asked. Apparently, Sandmann has some supporters on the issue. Dick Bearup, the Plymouth coach, is anxious to see how it works. So is Ray Boyles, who coaches at Farmington High. And Farmington's veteran athletic director Jack Cotton is for it, too. Equally interested is state prep director Charles E. Forsythe who has given Plymouth and Farmington the official "go-

ahead." "Mr. Forsythe is very anxious to hear from us how he works," Sandmann explained. "After the game, we will sit down and write a detailed report, which probably will be published in special magazines for schoolboy coaches." SANDMANN said there was some discussion on whether the preps should try a 24 or 30 second clock. In the Olympics the teams utilize a 30-second ruling.

"Obviously it will take a certain amount of experimenting first," said Sandmann, once a basketball coach and also one of Michigan's leading cage referees for many years. "We just might wait until a team brings the ball to the mid-court line before we flip the clock on. In the pros, they start the clock as soon as a team gains possession." Since no area high schools or colleges have the 24-second

clocks, the Plymouth athletic director sounded out the Detroit Pistons, who have a spare set of the special timing devices. "We're very happy to cooperate with any schools on this matter," said Pistons general manager Edwin E. Coil. "We in the NBA feel that the institution of the 24-second clock revolutionized our game. We think it would help in high school and college play, too."

The victory was sandwiched between two losses for Michigan. The Wolverines bowed to Kentucky in their opener and then were no match for Duke on Wednesday, 93-67.

BILL BRADLEY, the former Princeton All American has completed his tour of duty with the military, and is ready to make his professional basketball debut with the New York Knicks. The Knicks haven't said when Bradley will play his first game, but it's possible that he'll be on the active list in time to invade Detroit Wednesday when the Knicks face the Pistons at Cobo Arena.

U-M Shows Power In Victory Over Titans

The University of Michigan proved too much for the University of Detroit, 104-99, in the Wolverines' invasion of the Motor City.

Sophomore sensation Rudy Tomjanovic turned in a brilliant effort with 28 points while Dennis Stewart had 29 for the winners, who stormed away in

the closing moments to wrap up the verdict.

THE RED WINGS rallied twice to tie New York, 3-3, on Wednesday. Livonia's Norm Ullman produced the equalizer after Alex Delvecchio, also a Livonian, and Gordie Howe had scored earlier for the Wings who return home Saturday night against the same Rangers.

Wayne State University will stage the largest holiday basketball tournament ever held in the City of Detroit on Dec. 18, 19 and 20. To be called the Wayne State University Centennial Classic, it will be held in the new Frederick C. Matthei Building on the campus.

Besides host WSU, the Michigan schools competing include Central Michigan University, state representative in two national tournaments for the last two years and winner of 23 of 26 starts last year; Eastern Michigan University, winner of 18 of 25 starts last year; and Northern Michigan.

They are complemented by the University of Maine from the Yankee Conference; Hardin-Simmons (Texas) University, an independent; South Dakota State, NCAA College Division Champion of 1963; and Washington (St. Louis) University.

The tournament will have afternoon (3:15) and evening (7:15) doubleheaders each of the three days (Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday).

In game one (Monday 3:15) of the first round, Northern Michigan University will host Washington University. In game two (3:15) Central Michigan University meets Dakota State. In the second doubleheader, game three, (7:15) Eastern Michigan University will host Hardin-Simmons, and in game four (9:15) Wayne State University faces Maine.



National News Round Up

TREASURY officials said Tuesday that no attempt will be made by the United States to collect the repayment of France's \$6.85 billion World War I debt as urged by Rep. Lester Wolff, (D-N.Y.). The officials said that politics and the world economic system prevent the U.S. from demanding the principal and interest France still owes this country. Wolff's call came in the wake of President Charles DeGaulle's summons last week for a worldwide gold standard. DeGaulle also criticized the U.S. for attempting to control European industry through investments.

WASHINGTON sources stated that North Vietnam is experiencing a food shortage due to the intensified U.S. air attacks on North Vietnam roads which apparently disrupted this year's rice harvest. Intelligence reports say that the North Vietnamese rice harvest has been poor for two years and that the food situation might have worsened. Authorities declined to say how this information was gathered.

OVER 2,000 anti-war demonstrators were frustrated by over 4,000 police in New York recently at the antiwar group's second attempt to disrupt activities at an armed forces induction center. The police kept the mass of protesters broken into small groups and herded them behind barricades in Lower Manhattan. The demonstration lasted only for three hours, and just a score of persons were arrested as compared to 264 the previous day. In Philadelphia, police hauled away 70 demonstrators who tried to block a door to an induction center.

IN BUFFALO, N.Y., nine persons were arrested in anti-war protest that drew jeers from onlookers. There were also counter-pickets at San Fernando Valley State College, where anti-war pickets were protesting the campus presence of Dow Chemical Co. job recruiters. All demonstrations were part of a national "Stop The Draft Week" project sponsored by a coalition of some 50 anti-war and civil rights groups.

STOKELY Carmichael, a black power leader for SNCC, was granted a visa by French authorities to address a Vietnam War protest meeting in Paris after being held at Orly Airport overnight. The controversial leader was held at the airport after an Interior Ministry official said his presence in France was undesirable. The ban was lifted while his case was considered by higher authorities at the Foreign Ministry.

THE NO. 4 official in the State Department and the highest ranking diplomat in the foreign service, Foy D. Kohler, will be replaced as deputy undersecretary of state for political affairs by Charles E. Bohlen, who is currently ambassador to France. The White House announced that Kohler is retiring to become a professor at the University of Miami's Center for Advanced International Affairs.

CYRUS VANCE, 50, one of President Johnson's number one troubleshooters who recently helped resolve the dispute between Greece and Turkey over the island of Cyprus, has been touted as the most likely candidate to succeed Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara. Vance recently told newsmen that his being considered for the top job was "out of the question." As deputy defense secretary from Jan. 9, 1964 to June 30, 1967, he handled many of the touchy jobs involving the military services and Congress.

ALABAMA Gov. Lurleen Wallace took another poke at Washington when she predicted "The people are ultimately going to change the effect" of a U.S. Supreme Court ruling upholding court-ordered desegregation in Alabama's public schools. Striking another blow for "state's rights," Mrs. Wallace called the ruling, "a part of the master plan being pushed and sponsored by the enemies of our Constitution to nationalize our schools."

A SECOND attempt to transplant a human heart ended in failure Wednesday when a 2 1/2 week old boy lived for only seven hours with a heart from a dead two-day old infant. Dr. Adrian Kantrowitz, who performed the infant transplant at the Maimonides Medical Center in Brooklyn said that the child born at the hospital had a lesion that blocked the entrance to the heart's left ventricle and could not have been repaired by surgery. Wednesday's failure came four days after doctors at the Groote Schuur Hospital in Capetown, South Africa, announced the first human heart transplant in which a 55-year-old grocer, Louis Washansky, received the heart of 25 year old traffic accident victim, Denise Darvall.

OFFICIALS OF the 36,500 member Associated Society of Locomotive Engineers and Firemen ended a two day slowdown that tied up much of southern England's rail traffic when the union accepted a peace formula proposed by Prime Minister Harold Wilson. The union was protesting, with their slowdown, the stationing of brakemen from the rival National Union of Railwaymen in the rear of diesel locomotives.

URUGUAY President Oscar Gestido died Dec. 6 after a heart attack. The 66-year-old retired air force general took office March 1 for a five year term. The new president is Jorge Pacheco Areco, a 47-year-old university professor, journalist and amateur boxer.

THE PICCOLO Opera Company, of Detroit, will sing the lead roles in the Humperdinck opera, presented in a new English version. The group has performed with the Detroit Symphony and around the state.

Support will be given by the Ann Arbor Civic Ballet, an 11-year-old group which has performed with orchestras in

Detroit, Jackson, Ann Arbor and Saginaw. It has produced several professional dancers. Members of the Schoolcraft College Choir will provide vocal accompaniment.

THE STORY line of "Hansel and Gretel" is based on the Grimm fairy tale with the music written by Engelbert Humperdinck, a German contemporary and understudy of Richard Wagner. Humperdinck sometimes uses the Wagnerian technique of the "endless melody" in this score.

First performed in Weimar 74 years ago, "Hansel and Gretel" was an instant and continuing favorite among audiences of all ages.

The Plymouth Symphony has twice presented the opera--in 1955 and 1956; Wayne Dunlap is musical director of the orchestra.

Congressmen Ask Cuts In Spending

Two local Republican congressmen say federal spending should be cut before any tax increase is passed--and one is opposed to a tax hike at all.

Reps. Jack McDonald (19th District) and Marvin Esch (2nd District) were particularly wary of a White House "dollar for dollar" proposal.

Under that idea, the Johnson Administration would agree to a \$1 cut in government spending for every dollar brought in by a surcharge on personal and corporate incomes taxes.

"THAT'S INSUFFICIENT as far as I'm concerned," McDonald said in a telephone interview.

"It doesn't make sense to wait for the tax until he (Johnson) makes the cut. He could do it now and he isn't doing it."

Where should spending be cut? McDonald answered:

"The farm program, Foreign aid, Space. Across-the-board in almost every area."

"There could be a curtailment of hiring new federal employees. You see, there's a huge turnover in federal employees. There should be a blanket reduction."

"He could cut research in various departments. I'll give you an example. There's \$10,000 being spent for the purpose of studying the backfin of the North American dogfish."

"There are thousands of such ridiculous items in every budget. These should be trimmed."

McDonald repeated his opposition to a federal tax surcharge. "It would be harmful to the economy. If we want to take care of inflationary problems, we must do it by cutting federal spending," he said.

"SPECIFIC and meaningful cuts" should come before any tax increase, said Esch, whose district includes Plymouth.

"The question of the national debt is full of great inconsistencies. Secretary of the Treasury Fowler said it will be 22 to 25 billions. President Johnson said it will be 30 to 35 billions."

"Clearly, there has been some juggling."

"A tax increase and spending decreases combined would do the trick" to stem inflation, Esch said.

The Ann Arbor congressman also revealed that he has received more than 90 letters against a tax increase and only five in favor.

But those favoring a tax hike tend to be well educated persons in the middle income bracket and usually associated with an educational institution, he said.

Medics To Sharpen Up On Bedside Diagnosis

Practicing physicians will get a chance to sharpen up their technique in bedside diagnosis this week at the University of Michigan Medical School.

A new "refresher" course is being offered to doctors from throughout the state. There will be opportunities for the doctors to "learn by doing," instead of "being talked at," says the course chairman Richard D. Judge, M.D., associate professor of internal medicine.

"The major aim is to present practical methods of diagnosis that are available to all physicians in their offices or community hospitals," he explains.

Closed-circuit television and audio tape will be used to present problem cases and to demonstrate techniques of examination and abnormal signs. Advances in physical diagnostic techniques and their correlation with recent research findings also will be discussed.

Topics for the conference at the Medical Science Building will include assessment of heart size, systolic murmurs, and gallops; estimation of pulmonary function; blood coagulation at the bedside, the hand as an indicator of systemic disease, evaluating the anemic patient, and identification and interpretation of extra sounds.

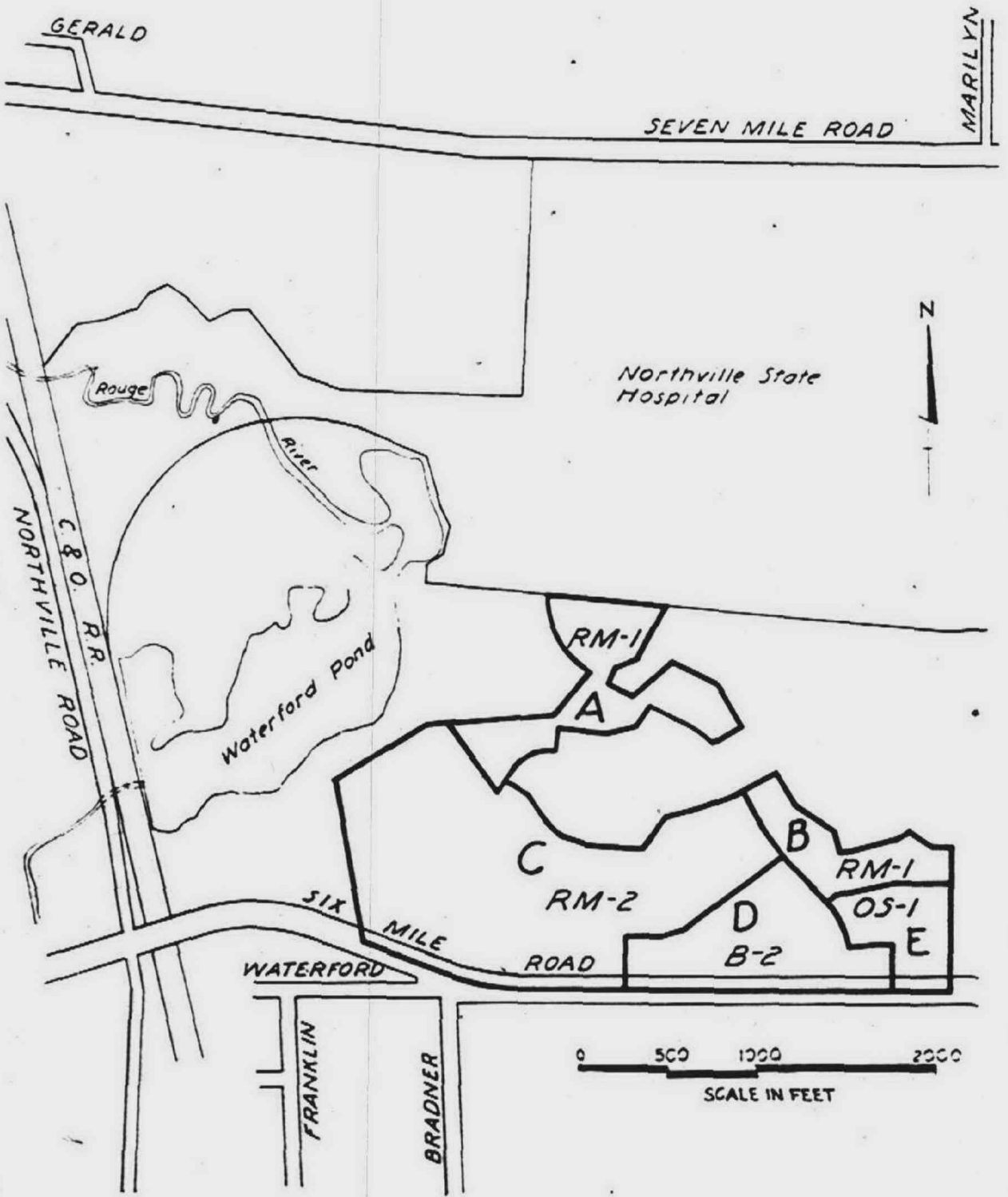



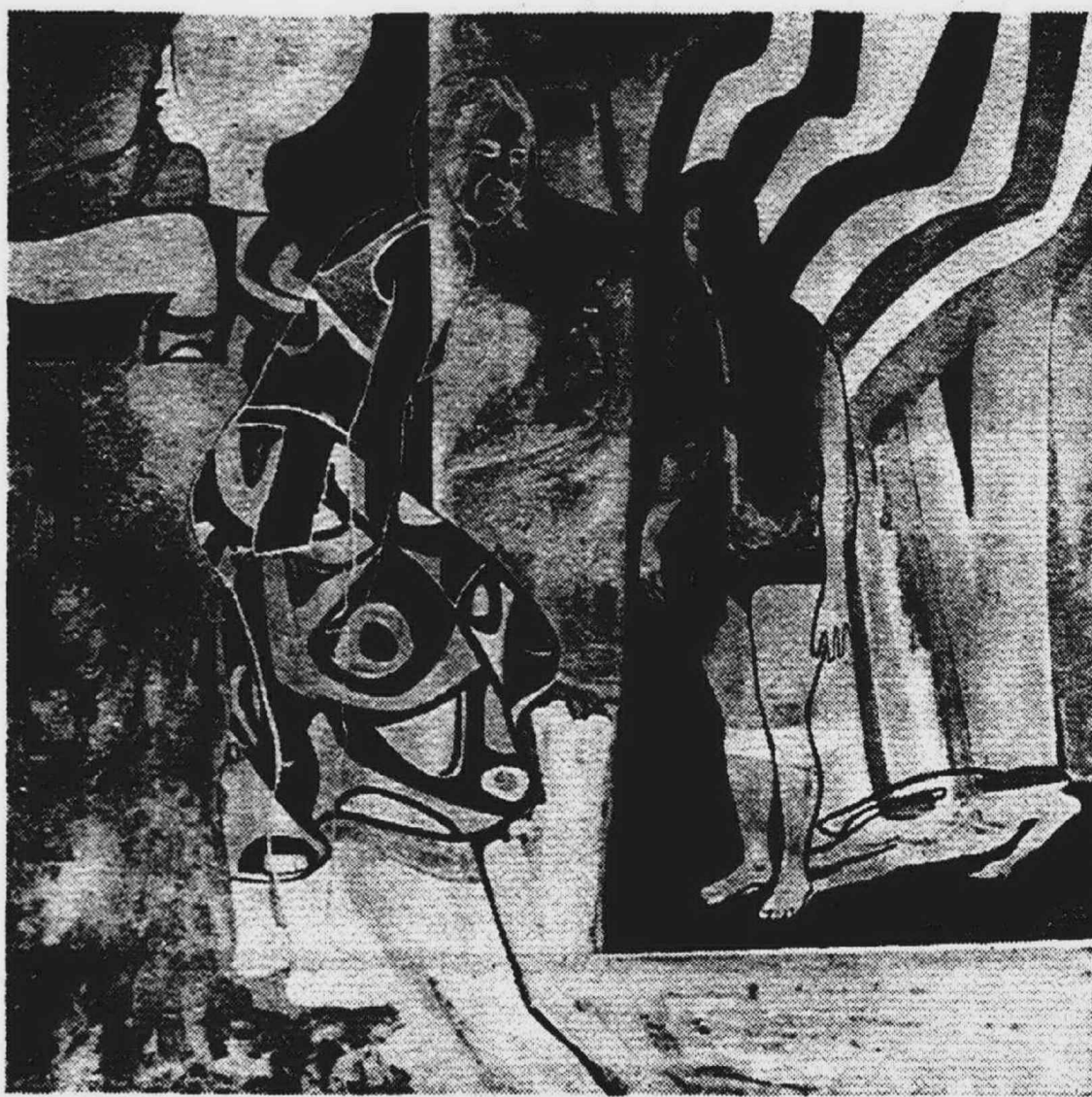

The Lady Wants To Be A Jockey

Is it a violation of a girl's civil rights to refuse to let her be a jockey?

Yes, says Kathy Kusner, 27, a member of the U.S. Equestrian team in the Olympics.

No, says the Maryland Racing Commission, which refused Miss Kusner a jockey's license. But Miss Kusner has a lawyer and charges that to deny her a license on the basis of her sex is a violation of the 1964 Civil Rights Act.

"I ASKED permission to ride when I was about 18 years old, but was told to forget it," the 103-pound Miss Kusner said Wednesday. "The reason? I'm a girl."

This time, however, she has an attorney to represent her before the commission and a ruling on the application is expected next month.

Chairman D. Eldred Rinehard of the racing commission raised the question of what provisions would have to be made in the all-male jockeys' quarters if Miss Kusner got a license.

"She is ready, willing and able to comply with all regulations," said Miss Kusner's attorney, Mrs. P.G. Melbourne III of Laurel.

MISS KUSNER is a prominent member of the equestrian team. She said she intends to keep her amateur standing to retain eligibility for the Olympic games and other leading riding events but did not go into details about how this would be done.

One member of the racing commission, J. Newton Brewer, said he would favor granting a license to Miss Kusner if she can cite experience with race horses.

Too Many Vitamins May Slow Athletes

Too many vitamins? Too much protein? An Army nutrition authority has said that the practice of giving some athletes massive doses of vitamins and high-protein supplements may actually lower their performance.

The statement was made before the American Medical Association's Ninth National Conference on the Medical Aspects of Sports.

The idea that massive doses of vitamins will improve athletic performance was based on a finding, later disproved,

that considerable quantities of vitamins are lost in sweat, C. Frank Consolazio, chief of the bioenergetics division of the U.S. Army Medical Research and Nutrition Laboratory, Denver, explained.

Vitamin supplementation does not improve muscular endurance, work ability or oxygen uptake, Consolazio said.

Dietary allowances established by the National Research Council and the Food and Agriculture Organization "are quite liberal, and there is no requirement for additional food supplements," he declared.

FISH HOUSE PUNCH

3/4 pound loaf sugar
1 1/2 pints lemon juice
2 fifths rum
1 fifth cognac
3 1/2 pints water
4 ounces peach brandy

Dissolve the sugar in part of the water in the punch bowl.

Add the lemon juice and the balance of the water and stir thoroughly. Then add the liquors and allow the mixture to stand for at least two or three hours to ripen and blend, stirring a bit from time to time. Place a large block of ice in the bowl, stir to cool, and serve.

Makes about 1 1/2 gallons, enough for 30 or 40, served in six-ounce cups.

The formula is supposed to have originated in 1732 with that famous old Philadelphia Club called the "State of Schuylkill."

Ypsi Backed For Criminally Insane Facility

Two state departments are seeking Gov. Romney's backing for an unusual joint mental health and corrections facility for the criminally insane.

The proposed site is Ypsilanti, near an existing state hospital.

Under consideration is a 200-bed mental health unit and a 500-bed prison facility.

THE CRIMINALLY insane and criminal sexual psychopaths would be housed in the new center, under one plan that has much backing.

The departments are seeking planning funds in the budget they want Romney to present to the Legislature in January. Completion is, at the earliest, three years away.

Ionia State Hospital, under much legislative fire because of escapes and its own parole policies, would be phased out as an institution for the criminally insane. It would become instead a general mental hospital.

Another part of the plan involves moving the Corrections Department's reception and diagnostic service center from the state prison at Jackson to the new Ypsilanti institution.

MOST OBJECTION to this center involves intermingling first offenders and hardened criminals.

At the center, inmates undergo 30 days of physical, mental and classification tests before being assigned to one of the corrections department's prisons.

At the joint facility, both departments could share personnel and common buildings.

"This (new institution) will be a prelude to the revamping of Jackson Prison so it will be smaller, more manageable," said Corrections Director Gus Harrison.

The Corrections Department is expected to provide security and the Mental Health Department treatment personnel at the new institution.

Prison inmates needing psychiatric treatment would be transferred to the new institution.

Cost of the new institution would run well over \$1 million.

Survey Shows Spending Increases At Conventions

A new reading has been taken on the spending habits of convention delegates.

It shows that delegate spending, on a national average, has increased substantially in the last ten years. More importantly, for Detroiters, it shows that every visiting delegate attending a national convention in Detroit leaves \$155 with local businessmen.

The new figures on delegate spending are the result of a national survey, conducted in 1966 by the International Association of Convention Bureau's. More than 700 conventions, which met in 46 cities in the United States and Canada, were surveyed. The final conclusions of that survey reflect a statistically valid sampling of the 1,029,267 delegates who attended those conventions.

Detroit was one of the cities participating in the survey. Bureau Executive Vice President Leonard E. Roiston was co-chairman of the committee that directed the sampling and

tabulated the results. This is the first comprehensive sampling of convention delegate spending habits since 1957.

THE DATA FROM the survey confirms the tremendous value of convention business to the Detroit area. Its results show that the average delegate to a national or international convention in Detroit remains in town for 3.58 days and spends \$154.76 while here, for such things as lodging, food, entertainment, gifts, taxi fare, cigarettes and a myriad of other items.

The average delegate to a state or regional convention here stays 2.69 days and spends \$108.76.

As impressive as they seem, these figures do not include transportation expenses to and from the convention city; nor do they reflect delegate registration fees, which often are spent on banquets, cocktail parties, tours and other convention activities.

Delegate spending in Detroit,

on a per-capita basis, is higher than in most other cities. National averages, revealed by the new survey, are \$148.70 per delegate to national and international conventions and \$86.56 for state and regional meetings.

On the basis of the previous survey (1957), the Bureau estimated that convention business brought \$30,200,000 into Detroit's economy in 1966. Applying the new data, that figure increases by approximately \$2 1/2 million, to \$32,700,000.

THE \$155 SPENT HERE by the average delegate is distributed throughout the local economy. When consideration is given to all non-delegate expenditures, such as money spent by exhibitors and convention managers for space rental, equipment, supplies, labor and other goods and services, the impact of conventions on Detroit's economy is multiplied.

- 1-1/3 cups (one 15-oz. can) Eagle Brand sweetened condensed milk

- 8 eggs, separated
- 1/3 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/8 teaspoon salt

Fold gently into chocolate mixture. Pour into prepared souffle dish. Bake in a moderate (350°F.) oven, 65 minutes, or until puffed. Remove from oven; remove collar. Serve immediately.

Politics' Jekyll & Hyde

EDITOR'S NOTE: As a reporter and editor with this newspaper and in Kalamazoo, Tim Richard has covered Zolton Ferency, retiring Democratic state chairman and 1966 gubernatorial candidate, many times. These are his personal views on Ferency the man and do not reflect any political opinions.

The last time I covered Zolton Ferency, it was a snowy February evening in Farmington, and whoever was supposed to have a key for the bank building where the local Democratic Club was meeting didn't have it, so we had to stand around in the cold for awhile. Ferency and I sat down in a car, and I asked him the usual reporter's questions about the usual topics of the moment and got the usual answers.

THEN WE GOT to shooting the breeze about the parliamentary system versus the independent executive system. The parliamentary system is where the legislative body picks the chief of government, and you know ahead of time that that chief can get along with the legislators and doesn't have to promote a demagogic image to stay in office.

We talked about the television star type of politics practiced in America for a few years now, and the lack of attention people pay to what a guy stands for. Any criticism of personalities was made irrespective of party lines.

I couldn't imagine holding that kind of a conversation with George Romney, G. Mennen Williams, John Swainson, the late Albert E. Cobo, or most of the politicians who have run for high office in Michigan in the last decade. Possibly Neil Staebler; more possibly Paul Bagwell.

The point is that the Ferency mind was able to leap beyond the immediate "public" issues and savor a more cosmic idea.

AND NOW Zolton Ferency is quitting as Democratic state chairman and will practice law (ugh!) in Flint (double-ugh!).

The top Democrats who dumped him had their reasons--Ferency's attack on the Democratic President's handling of the Viet war along with the party's internal operations--and that's their business. But the intellectual caliber of political conversation will be lower with Zolton gone.

The standard journalistic analysis of Ferency is that he was glib and acid-tongued. That's not quite the truth.

THE TRUTH is that Ferency is a Jekyll-Hyde sort of split personality.

The Hyde side was best known to the public, for in his political speeches Ferency was a name-caller. He threw around uncompimentary names, feigning shock and infinite disgust at a Romney proposal that wasn't very far from what Democrats wanted. Some of those names were pretty funny, like when he referred to Gov. Romney and Sen. Griffin as "Batman and Robin," but the majority were low-level prose intended for consumption by the groundlings.

In an informal talk to a small group, Ferency would open with a name-calling standard line, and then a button would go click in his mind, and he'd stop it. He'd let down his hair and talk about ideas and history and plain people.

I saw this kind of performance the first time I covered him, at a Young Democrats Club meeting at Western Michigan University. He recited his canned, name-calling speech, the text of which was available to the press, and then reminisced about being poor in the Hungarian neighborhood when he was a kid, and how the Communists used to try and recruit, and how people felt about it.

IT WASN'T JUST a recollection of bygone days, but a high-level analysis of ethnic groups, politics, economics and history. It wasn't the kind of oration that made anyone cheer. Rather, it was fascinating, whether you agreed with Zolton's brand of flaming liberalism or not, and the speaker got as much intellectual respect out of those students as most of the best members of the faculty.

About the only person you can compare him to is perhaps Wm. F. Buckley Jr., the professional conservative. A lot of people who don't buy Buckley's brand of politics will listen to him or read him just to keep on their toes and have their mental faculties challenged.

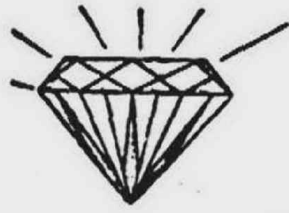

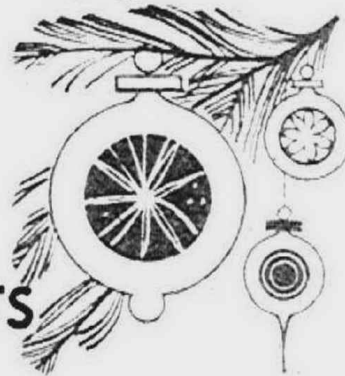

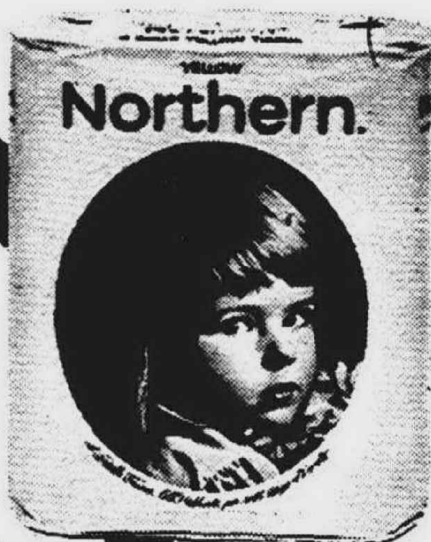
