## Plymouth Flier Given Another Important Post

Col. Earl Russell, one of Plymouth's outstanding military figures, has been granted another promotion and now is in the G-1 position, or second in command at the Army

aviation Center at Ft. Rucker, Alabama.

This new promotion came about through a shifting of the personnel in which Col. Conrad L. Stansberry, Chief of Staff, was assigned to Vietnam.

Replacing Col. Stansberry as Chief of Staff, is Col. James D. Brown, who had been assistant chief, G-1, and moving into his place is Col. Russell.

THE SON of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Russell, of Plymouth Colony, brings the experience of more than a quarter of century of service to his new post.

Along the way he had the unique distinction, too, of planning the wings on his son, Earl Russell, III, who now is serving with the Air Force in Vietnam.

Col. Russell served with the Canadian Air Force as a bomber pilot before entering the U.S. Army Air Corps as an enlisted man in May 1942. He later was assigned as a glider pilot at Albuquerque, N.M., until September 1942.

From 1942 to 1945, he was a flight instructor at Ft. Sill, in the Department of Air Training. He received his helicopter training at San Marcos and Ft. Sill in 1952, before assuming command of the 50th Helicopter Ambulance Medical Detachment, Far East Command, and later the 1st Helicopter Ambulance Company.

COL. RUSSELL served on The Staff and Faculty of the Command and General Staff College from 1961 to 1964.

After commanding the 8th Aviation Battalion in Europe and serving as the Asst. Chief of Staff G-1, 8th Infantry Division, Col. Russell came to Ft. Rucker in July 1967.

The colonel has attended Wayne University in Detroit and the University of Alabama. His military schools include the Artillery School and the Command and General Staff College at Ft. Leavenworth, Kan.

Col. Russell wears the Bronze Star Medal, Air Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster and the Army Commendation Medal with two Oak Leaf Clusters.

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## Houk Loses Hard Fight On Parking

Former Mayor James Houk put up a game fight Monday night at the City Commission meeting before losing a battle to have the police department ease up on the issuing of parking violation tickets.

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## City Commission Starts Move To Correct Planning Oversight

At the suggestion of the revitalized Planning Commission the Plymouth City Commission started a move Monday evening to correct an oversight of long standing in designing the future layout of the city.

It was pointed out to the commission that it never had

updated the master plan of the city after switching from the firm of Waring and Johnson to Vilcan-Leman as the official city planners.

Because of this oversight, according to the Planning Commission, the validity of all revisions made in the last three

years could be questioned.

THE COMMISSIONERS offered no reason for the oversight, but quickly agreed to meet with the planners at their next meeting, January 10, to coordinate the two plans and thus prevent any further road

blocks in the planning of the city.

City Clerk Eugene Slider, who also serves as Secretary of the Planning Commission, explained that the planners were deeply concerned with the master thoroughfare plan, and Kellogg Park, among other things,

and would welcome a meeting to help straighten out the planning problem.

This oversight was called to the attention of the City Commission last June 5 when City Manager Richard Blodgett, in his manager's report, recommended that the Commission

"study the possibility of adopting the Vilcan-Leman General Development Plan as the Master Plan for the City of Plymouth."

NO ACTION was taken on the recommendation at that time --and again no reason was given.

"I knew about it," Commissioner McKeon remarked after Monday night's session, "but I didn't think it was that important."

Slider also informed the Commissioners, in a letter, that quick action on reconciling the two plans would be needed to supplant the City's Workable Program requirements in the quest for Federal Aid.

"I have been asked by the Federal officials in Chicago," City Manager Blodgett explained, "why we hadn't updated the Master Plan since 1959, and I had no answer for them."

He quickly pointed out that no projected federal project, such as the Senior Citizen's housing had been effected, but that the government was interested in knowing why the plans were never brought up to date.

FOLLOWING is the resolution adopted by the Planning Commission that caused the latest action of the City's legislative body.

WHEREAS, the City Commission formally adopted the 1961 Development Plan prepared by Johnson and Waring, but has not formally adopted the 1964 Development Plan and subsequent supplementary plans prepared by Vilcan-Leman;

WHEREAS, the 1964 Development Plan is designed to revise and augment the 1961 Development Plan, but not to replace it; and

WHEREAS, subsequent plans, such as the Beautification Study, have revised some aspects of the proposed 1964 Plan; and

WHEREAS, the City of Plymouth has been carrying out aspects of the 1964 Plan and subsequent plans without adopting them or reconciling them with the official 1961 Plan, which raises questions as to the validity of the officially adopted Plan as a guide for the development of the City, and question as to the relationship of the 1964 and subsequent plans to the development goals of the City;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Planning Commission strongly recommend that the City Commission take immediate action to reconcile the Vilcan-Leman plans with the official 1961 Plan, and adopt the reconciled plans as the official Development Plan for the City of Plymouth.

## City Delays Joint Plan With Livonia

"This is like the wedding of an elephant and a mouse and I certainly wouldn't want to enter into anything like that until I had completed an exhaustive study."

With this comment City Commissioner James McKeon asked Monday night that the Commission make an exhaustive study of the garbage disposal problem in Plymouth before entering into an agreement with the City of Livonia for a joint authority that could lead to the building of a costly incinerator.

McKeon explained that a joint meeting had been held with the Livonia City Council and an agreement reached to have the attorneys of the two cities study the legal entanglements of making a thorough study and the steps to be taken to form a Garbage Disposal Authority.

"The Livonia people had all the facts for their end," he stated, "but we had no definite figures for our side. Therefore, we couldn't enter into much of an official agreement, especially involving so much money as that required for an incinerator."

McKeon was moved to make his remarks when a report on the land fill operation in Salem Township revealed that there was only about five years left for usage of that site.

"I think," McKeon continued, "that we should make a thorough study of our problem, the amount of garbage that is produced each week or month, and then sit down and figure the cost and compare it with the building of an incinerator."

As a result of McKeon's demand, he was named chairman of the study committee, to serve with Commissioner Peter Schweitzer, City Manager Richard

Blodgett and Mayor James Jabara.

He promised to have a report for the next regular meeting on January 2, 1968.

## School Bus Drivers Get Own 'Home'

Plymouth Community School District employs 38 part-time school bus drivers, and for a long time these drivers have had either to sit in their cold buses or stand in a cramped, small building while they waited for the machines to warm up on wintry days.

After all the complaints were received by the Board of Education from the left-out-in-the-cold drivers, the board purchased property and a house on the south side of the board's offices.

The house will be for the exclusive use of the drivers. There will also be an office for the supervisor of transportation plus a women's restroom and a men's rest room, which previously were non-existent.

The purchase of the land and the house will cost the board \$17,461. This figure includes the cost of revamping the house.

The only other action taken by the board during its abbreviated Monday night meeting was to authorize payment of a \$4,509.90 electric bill to Plymouth Electric Co.

The bill covered the installation of electricity in nine portable class rooms at different schools installed in the past five months.

The \$4,509.90 was four-fifths of a total electric bill that reached \$5,867.90.

## Goodfellows Set All-Time High

With the generous help of the weather man the Plymouth Old Newsboys had the best day in their history last Saturday and now really can make good the slogan "No Kiddie Without A Christmas."

When the final Goodfellow paper had been sold and accounted for, the sales and contributions for the day totaled \$2,456.35.

"This is the best day we ever had," Fire Chief George Schoeneman, President of the Goodfellows, remarked, "and it sure was a good feeling to know

that we passed the other years."

THE TOTAL in 1966 reached \$2,068.95 and in 1965 it was \$2,179.09. But in each of these years the weather man didn't offer much help.

Of the amount collected this year \$235 came in checks that were mailed to headquarters and another for \$100 that was delivered by Chuck's Shell Service.

The largest sale at the gates of the industrial plants was recorded at Burroughs where \$422 was obtained.

"Our top salesman this year," Chief Schoeneman reported, "was Fritz Honky, of the Township Fire Department, who turned in \$107.45 for his efforts."

"The day was not without its humorous incidents," the Chief went on. "In one case a salesman reported that he stopped a woman driver and offered her a paper. She took it and drove on."

"Finally, she realized what the paper sale was for and returned to the salesman and made her contribution."



# Postal Rates Will Climb Again On January 7

POSTAL RATES will go up Jan. 7. First class letters will go from five cents to six. Postcards will rise from four cents to five. Domestic air mail will jump from eight cents an ounce to 10. President Johnson also signed postal pay increases averaging 4.5 per cent, retroactive to July 1.

THE ARMY says that Communist troops killed in a pitched battle Dec. 10 were not, in fact, carrying heroin, as originally reported. The Army investigation found a white powder they carried to contain

a fungicide and water purifier.

NEW YORK fire officials are investigating that a fire which destroyed millions of pieces of Christmas mail in a branch post office was the work of an arsonist.

LOCAL DRAFT Boards have the go-ahead from Selective Service chief Lewis B. Hershey to draft anti-war protesters, but so far, few boards have called up those men who are burning or turning in their draft cards.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., will have an open housing ordinance effective Dec. 27. Mayor Kenneth A. Schmied let it become law without his signature, criticizing it because of fines that could be as much as \$100 and because he felt it gave much power to local and county human relations commissions.

TEXAS REPUBLICANS are jubilant about the victories of four of their candidates in special legislative elections since Dec. 1. They even speak of defeating President Johnson in his home state next year.

DIVERS have located but not recovered some 60 cars that sank in the 30-foot-deep Ohio River when a bridge collapsed last week. Built as a private toll bridge in 1928, the structure was sold to the State of West Virginia in 1941. The bridge had two fully loaded limestone trucks and six or seven tractor-trailer rigs, in addition to a long line of cars and other trucks, when the collapse occurred, but it wasn't a capacity load. So far, the cause and the final death toll are unknown.

THE U.N.'s outer space com-

mittee has approved an astronaut rescue treaty that was strongly backed by the U.S. and the Soviet Union. The Russians were particularly anxious for approval because they are expected to test a manned spaceship around the moon next summer which could increase chances of an unplanned landing.

GHANA politicians and intellectuals are looking forward to the resumption of political activity and open debate on public issues. The military government which deposed dictator Kwame Nkrumah in February

of 1966 may lift the ban on politicking after the second anniversary of its revolution.

ALGERIA'S government has put down a rebellion of some army units. The government of President Boumedienne relied on loyal army troops to stop former chief of staff Col Tahar Zbiri, whose supporters were reported to be left-leaning.

THE BRITISH cabinet has split openly over Prime Minister Harold Wilson's request for continuation of a blanket arms embargo to South Africa. Wilson's Labor party has consistently taken a tough line toward the racist South African regime, but recently the former colony has put out feelers for a big order of naval frigates—a deal that could help the troubled British economy.

GREECE'S military government says that young King Con-

# State Housing Bill Future Up To House

REPUBLICAN SENATORS have turned thumbs down on a proposal to bring up the open housing bill in their chamber, and the bill's fate is now up to the House. Acting Gov. William Milliken had been joined by the Senate GOP leadership in the attempted procedural speed-up. The Senate Republicans acted in a special caucus.

WITH LITTLE TROUBLE, State Sen. Sander Levin, 37, of Berkley, was elected chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee. (Details of Levin's problems and goals, and the money woes of Michigan Democrats, are reported on the Observer's Public Affairs page.)

REPUBLICANS in the State Senate found their margin whittled to one vote--19 to 18--with the sudden death of Sen. Harold J. Volkema, 37, of Holland. A second-term, Volkema leaves a gap in the State Affairs Committee, which will probably handle the open housing bill if it's passed by the House. The district is considered "safe" Republican territory. A special election, probably early next year, will fill the vacancy.

BERNARD F. O'BRIEN, former state senator from Detroit who was ousted after he was charged in a morals case, says he may try a comeback now that the charge has been dropped. The case was wiped from the records of Ingham Circuit Court after the chief witness, MSU coed Marian Lukens, and five

# Dr. Clark May Leave Jail; Bond Reduced To \$15,000

Release of Dr. Ronald E. Clark from Oakland County Jail, where he has been held since Nov. 16 on a manslaughter charge, is expected by the end of the week following reduction of the physician's bond from \$50,000 to \$15,000 by Circuit Judge W.J. Beer.

The judge's action was taken at the time of Circuit Court arraignment Monday and in the face of vigorous opposition by

Assistant Prosecutor John Davey who argued there is "great likelihood" that Dr. Clark will flee from the state if released from custody.

Judge Beer stipulated two conditions to lowering the bond: 1) Before bond is accepted, Dr. Clark's certificate from the State Medical Board allowing him to practice medicine, and his three drug licenses, must be impounded by the pro-

secutor.

2) He will be subject to forfeiture of up to \$25,000 in personal holdings upon any violation of the court's order that "he keep the peace."

Attorney Philip Rowston, the physician's court-appointed counsel, agreed to both conditions and predicted the necessary fee to meet the new surety bond (\$1,500) can be raised from among Dr. Clark's

"friends and former patients within a few days."

AFTER HIS Circuit Court success in obtaining the reduced bond, Rowston also succeeded in staying a 60-day sentence and \$125 fine handed the doctor by Farmington Justice of the Peace Byron Walter upon conviction last Friday of a misdemeanor count. Rowston posted a \$500 cer-

tified check with Judge Walter's court Tuesday as a necessary step in appealing the latter's verdict, the effect being that this causes both the jail sentence and fine to be held in abeyance until the case is retried in Circuit Court.

Earlier, Judge Walter had set a separate bond of \$10,000 on the misdemeanor charge but this has since been reduced to \$500.

Assistant Prosecutor Davey said Monday that Dr. Clark probably will be brought to trial on the manslaughter issue "late in January or early in February."

Both the manslaughter accusation and the misdemeanor charge of failing to notify the coroner of an unusual death stem from the fact that on Nov. 3 Mrs. Grace Neil, 43, of 20225 Rensselaer, Livonia, died in Dr. Clark's office at 30735 Grand River, Farmington Township.

THE PROSECUTION charges that Mrs. Neil, a part-time nurse in Dr. Clark's office as well as a patient, died from an overdose of sodium pentothal.

Several other deaths which also have occurred in the physician's office, and in which sodium pentothal has been administered, also are under investigation, according to Prosecutor S. Jerome Bronson.

In arguing before Judge Beer, to continue bond at \$50,000, Davey contended that "the prosecution feels responsible for keeping this man in custody. Even if he turns in his license, there is no guarantee that this man will not practice medicine again," Davey argued. Rowston based his plea for a reduced bond upon Dr. Clark's "long residence in Farmington and his professional standing."

THE ATTORNEY also revealed that Dr. Clark is suffering from gangrene of two toes on the right foot as a

result of frostbite suffered the night of Nov. 15, when he spent several hours in the snow-covered woods near Port Austin while eluding capture.

## Set Plans For Xway Patrols

Special holiday traffic patrols will be operated by the Michigan State Police for the Christmas and New Year weekends, Col. Frederick E. Davids, director, reports.

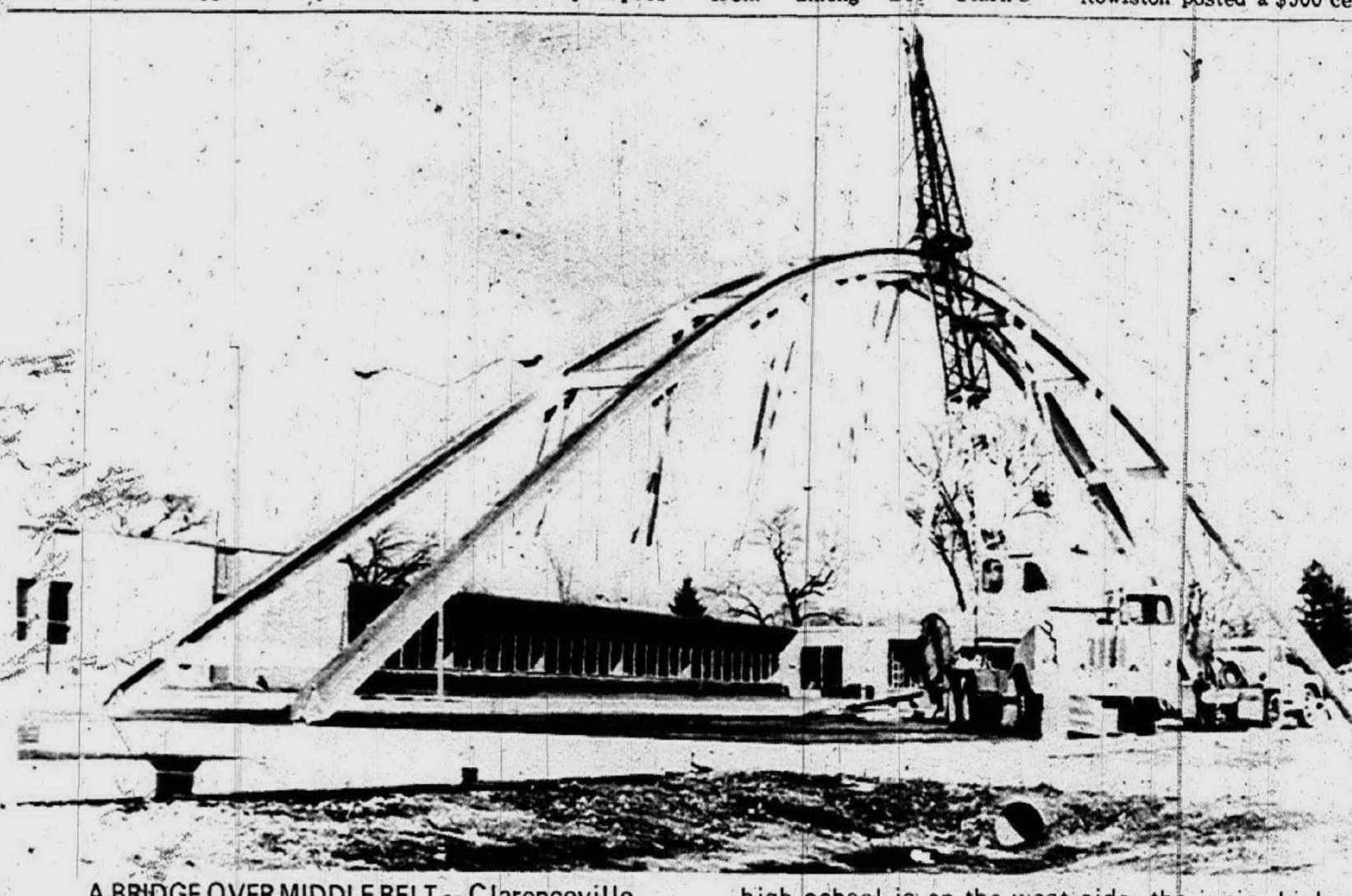
Davids noted that Michigan's traffic toll so far this year is showing a reduction of about 200 deaths compared with the same period of 1966, a decrease of about 10 per cent.

In a traffic safety plea to motorists, he added, "Let's extend this improved traffic record right through to the end of the year. I'm sure the continued cooperation of drivers and pedestrians can effectively counter the added risks of this season. Above all, drive and walk so that you keep your holiday unspoiled by an accident."

THE CHRISTMAS PATROLS will begin at noon Friday, Dec. 22, and continue until midnight Monday, Dec. 25. The New Year weekend patrol hours will be from noon Friday, Dec. 29, until midnight Monday, Jan. 1.

Maximum patrol coverage will be provided by the State Police from 3 p.m. to at least 9 p.m. each day of the holiday periods. Special attention again will be given to the sections of highways having bad accident experience.

Last year there were 30 persons killed in 24 fatal accidents during the Christmas period and 26 deaths were recorded for the New Year weekend.

A DETROIT CHIROPRACTOR Clarence V. Hunsate, 63, was arraigned in Ann Arbor Municipal Court and charged with manslaughter in the abortion death of Miss Mabel Ann Huckins, 19, who died, Dec. 6 in St. Joseph Hospital, Ann Arbor. The Ann Arbor woman was four months pregnant at the time of the abortion, which reportedly took place in Wayne County.

THE 10,000 MAN Michigan National Guard will be reorganized in January and broken up into smaller units as part of the new Army Ready Reserve. Part of the move includes the assignment of some 230 military policemen for riot duty. Officials insisted, however, that the reorganization was not prompted by the Guard's performance in the July Detroit riots--a showing that a Regular Army general called "trigger happy."

SHARON MERLO SPIT in his face, John Merlo testified in Oakland Circuit Court Monday as his trial for his wife's murder drew to a close. Merlo, 25, is accused of gunning down his estranged wife, a Redford resident, Jan. 6 in a Farmington beauty salon, where, he testified, he went to try to patch up their marital differences. She spit, said Merlo, and Merlo shot, says the prosecution.

THE SPIRITUAL LEADER of the Russian Orthodox Church in Michigan, Rt. Rev. John J. Chepeleff, is dead at 87. He came to Detroit 30 years ago and retired five years ago as dean of All Saints Russian Orthodox Cathedral. After World War I, he administered America's massive relief program, headed by Herbert Hoover, to the Russians but later left his homeland when charged with anti-Communist activity.

## Hospital Recertified

ANN ARBOR--The University of Michigan Hospital has just received a three-year renewal of its certification by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals.

According to Dr. A.C. Kerlikowske, hospital director, formal accreditation helps ensure patients of protection in all major areas of hospital activity.

To be accredited, the hospital must show that the highest professional, legal, and ethical qualifications are demanded of all the allied medical personnel; that the medical staff holds meetings and consultations; and that the hospital maintains maximum safety precautions, a complete file of medical records, and other effective procedures for the care and safety of patients.

The Joint Commission is made up of representatives of the American College of Physicians, the American College of Surgeons, the American Hospital Association, and the American Medical Association.

## AAA Plans New Safety Program

Michiganians who plan to host a party and motorists attending parties or visiting bars over the Christmas-New Years holidays are all targets of a "First a Friend, Then a Host" traffic safety campaign announced Monday by Automobile Club of Michigan.

"Last Christmas season for the first time we abandoned the traditional 'If you drive--Don't drink' admonition," said Auto Club General Manager Fred N. Rehm. "We are now re-emphasizing that liquor is involved in over half of all Michigan traffic deaths. We don't condone mixing alcohol and driving."

"BUT WE ARE recognizing that 80 per cent of motorists do drink and then drive. That is why we are aiming this campaign at holiday hosts and bartenders to encourage them not to let guests overindulge before getting behind the wheel."

Rehm noted that the 44 Christmas and New Years 1966 weekend traffic deaths in Michigan comprised a 30 per cent drop when compared with the same period of 1965.

"No one can say why this happened. But if hosts and drivers will be moderate in use of liquor, last holiday's reduction can repeat itself," Rehm said.

PART OF THIS year's holiday program is to point out that the new implied consent law can affect more motorists during the holidays than at any other time, Auto Club states. Through its "First a Friend, Then a Host" campaign, Auto

Club is placing the responsibility for keeping impaired and drunk drivers off the road jointly on party hosts and others who serve liquor during the holidays and on drivers themselves.

One of the promotional items Auto Club is distributing statewide as part of its "Bring 'Em Back Alive!" campaign is an educational folder which can be made into a sleeve and slipped over a bottle of liquor. It is free to all at all Auto Club offices, along with posters which will be distributed to bars and restaurants.

## Army Experience Helpful To City Clerk

Gene Sider, Plymouth city clerk, attributes his success as a municipal administrator to 20 years in the U.S. Army.

"When I was a boy, I no more dreamed of working in municipal government than the man in the moon," he recalled.

The clerk was born on April 1, 1920 at Fort Robinson, Nebraska. His father was a civilian employee at the Army installation.

Nineteen years later, in 1939, he enlisted in the Army at his birth place. After World War II he re-enlisted and spent the next 18 years in different administrative posts all over the globe.

He had planned to retire at Fort Robinson but the installation was deactivated before his 20 years expired.

In 1959, he retired as Chief Warrant Officer in Ann Arbor, where he was administrative advisor to the Army Reserve Center.

SHORTLY AFTER retiring he became the college town's deputy city clerk and served from 1959 to 1961.

He then traveled to Aurora, Colo., a city of more than 70,000 people, and worked in that city's government for a year.

From 1962 to 1966, he served as city clerk at Edgewater, a suburb of Denver.

Gene then moved back to Michigan and was appointed city clerk for the City of Plymouth on Jan. 17, 1966 and officially took office in February.

Sider, his wife Helen, and three of their four children, Douglas, 17, Diana, 15, and Deborah, 12 now live at 1313 Carol in Plymouth, but no one anticipates any more moves for quite a while.

The fourth son, Michael, is married and lives in Ypsilanti. The city clerk proudly announced that, among other things, he was also a new grandfather.

THE CITY CLERK and his staff have many varied duties and responsibilities. Primarily they include being clerk of the city commission and records keeper pertaining to commission actions, issuing licenses and permits, acting as chief elections officer, being recording clerk of boards and committees, planning and zoning, taking custody of city accounts and assuming budgetary control of all funds related to city financial transactions.

His Army training, he believes, enabled him to effectively delegate authority to his staff because he said that he couldn't possibly do the entire job all alone.

The former Army man added that one of his biggest duties is chief elections officer of the city.

He explained that responsibilities are the same for a national or local election, but the work becomes harder and more time consuming the bigger the election.

Normally, he said, about 15 per cent of the city's registered voters participate in a local election. On the other hand, close to 85 or 90 per cent of the city's electorate vote in national races.

Obviously, Sider continued, the bookkeeping becomes greatly increased as elections become more important to the people.

SLIDER ADDED that another facet as clerk, requiring year around hard work, was being head bookkeeper of all of the city's accounts.

Of his six member staff, four are in the accounting department.

They are the head bookkeeper-payroll clerk, two accounting clerks, a bookkeeping machine operator, and an account clerk in charge of water and sewer department books.

He also has the equally heavy responsibility of preparing, along with the city manager, the city's annual budget which must be submitted to the city commission for its first meeting in April of each year.

The city clerk is a member, in one capacity or another, of every city committee and board.

Besides being chairman of the Election Commission, he is secretary of the Zoning Board of Appeals, secretary of the Municipal Building Authority, chairman of the Refrigeration

Licensing Board, and director-secretary of the Housing Commission.

HE KEEPS ABREAST of current local and national municipal affairs, by holding active membership in various city oriented organizations, he explained.

The clerk is a member of the International City Managers Association, the International Association of City Clerks, the Municipal Finance Officers Association, and the Michigan Association of Municipal Clerks.

The retired warrant officer speaks with an order-giving staccato manner and emphasized each word with a pen-

etrating stare.

There is still a part of the Army officer in him and he displayed this by the casual but succinct answers he gave to each question.

All in all, he appears confident that nothing could stump him as city clerk and he exudes a calm assurance that might express, "You don't have to worry. The job will be done."

# Lions Smother Vikings To Win Season Finale

It was a happy ending for the Detroit Lions — two straight victories.

Following up a romp at New York the previous Sunday, the Lions finished up their 1967 campaign Sunday by downing Minnesota, 14-3.

The triumph, notwithstanding the Lions didn't gain a .500 record. They would up 5-7-2.

There were some encouraging items in the closing stages, especially the work that brought Mel Farr rookie-of-the-year offensive honors and Len Barney, rookie defensive laurels.

BARNEY WAS the big difference Sunday against Minnesota, a loss which dumped Minnesota into last place to stay in the final Central Division standings.

Barney came up with three intercepted passes. He turned the first into a 71-yard touchdown run.

Later he nailed another Minnesota pass on the Detroit 40.

After series later, he leaped high to haul down a Minnesota pass on the Minnesota 13 and it was turned into Detroit's second and last touchdown when Karl Sweetan passed three yards to Tommy Watkins.

The Lions actually showed little offensive punch in the game, making only five out of 17 passes for 40 yards, and 90-yards rushing. Sweetan did so little that Milt Plum got a chance in the closing moments. But he didn't do much either.

Thus while the taste of two straight victories gave the Lions a happy finish, there still was the matter of solving the quarterback situation before another season rolls around.

SWEETAN HAS been spotty... great one week, as he was in New York, then nothing seven days later.

Plum likewise has had his inconsistent moments.

In the finale, Minnesota con-

trolled the ball most of the time. But all Minnesota could do was score once on a 36-yard field goal by Fred Cox, who previously had missed on four attempts.

Without a staunch defense and Barney, in particular, it easily could have been a different story—like last place—for the Lions.

## Hoosiers Regarded Lowly

Indiana may have been the cinderella team of the Big Ten, but as far as the oddsmakers are concerned, the Hoosiers aren't given much of a chance in the Rose Bowl Game on New Year's Day. They are 14-point underdogs against Southern California.

In the other majors—it's Tennessee by 6 over Oklahoma in the Orange, Alabama 6 over Texas A and M. In the Cotton and LSU by seven over Wyoming in the Sugar.

Penn State and Florida State are rated even in the Gator and Georgia a 6-point pick over North Carolina State in the Liberty Bowl, which is slated to be played Saturday in Memphis. (Channel 7).

Two other bowls are slated Saturday—the Tangerine at Tampa pitting West Chester State of Pennsylvania against Martin of Tennessee and the Pecan at Abilene, Tex., in which North Dakota State meets Arlington of Texas.

KEN CORBON ran 80 and 45 yards with intercepted passes as Miami (Fla.) downed Florida, 20-13. In all, the Miami team picked off five enemy passes... A 31-yard touchdown gallop by George Edwards in the last period enabled Fairmont State (W. Va.) to beat Eastern Washington, 28-21, for the NAAI grid championship.

DON'T LAUGH at left-handers. Dave Davis, a southpaw, won the pro bowlers' national title, outrolling Pete Tountas, a native of Greece, 216-191. The victory upped Davis' earnings to \$54,115 for the year and virtually assured him bowler-of-the-year honors.

DETROIT TECH HAS a streaking basketball team. The Dynamics made it four straight, beating George Williams College, 70-64, as star Jim Garza scored 27 points.

There's no stopping UCLA either. The national champs bounced Wichita, 120-86, as Lew Alcindor scored 28 and then came right back to dump Oregon State, 121-80, as Big Lew tallied 45.

UNIVERSITY OF DETROIT'S cagers won a thriller from Xavier, 85-84, when Tommy Richardson and Vito Abramivich scored in the closing moments to wrap it up. Bruce Rodwan and Richardson each had 21 for the winners.

Michigan suffered its third loss in four starts, bowing to Davidson, 90-71. Exams now confront the Wolverines who don't resume action until they play in the Sun Devil Classic at Tempe, Ariz., Dec. 21.

NO MORE \$12 seats remain for the Super Bowl game to be played in Miami at the Orange Bowl on Jan. 14. You still can buy \$6 or \$8 seats in the end zone. Something like 13,000 remain.

Of course, if you stay in cold Michigan, the game will be televised right into your living rooms.

WAYNE STATE hosts its first holiday basketball tournament, starting Monday. Eastern, Central and Northern Michigan along with Wayne represent Michigan against Hardin Simmons, Maine, South Dakota and Washington of St. Louis. The meet runs three nights.

50TH SEASON The 1967-68 season is Wayne State University's 50th year of collegiate basketball.

OFFENSIVE RECORD Wayne State University senior quarterback A.J. Vaughn ran and passed for 1,892 yards in 1967 to set a new total offense record. The old record of 870 yards was set in 1966 by Vaughn.

# Bentley Pressure Spanks RU Cagers

Pressure tactics worked in a hurry for Bentley High's basketball team and produced a 75-61 win over Redford Union Friday night.

It was the Bentley team's second straight win in Suburban Six League action.

The triumph stemmed pretty much from what happened in the first period when Bentley pumped in 20 points to RU's five.

"They came at us with a full course press and there's no denying these tactics rattled us for a while," said coach Dave

Nattingly of RU.

Once the first period was over RU settled down and actually outscored Bentley, by a point, the rest of the way. But the damage had been done.

In addition to the defensive excellence, Bentley also was red hot with its shooting in the early going.

Both games will be televised in Detroit on Channel 2.

Only Los Angeles had to win last weekend to make the championship round. And only the Rams won.

With Roman Gabriel sparking the offense and with ex-Lion Roger Brown leading the

defense, the Rams whipped Baltimore, 34-10, to finish in a tie with the Colts for the Coastal Division crown.

But since the teams had tied in their previous meeting, the Rams were ruled the overall victors on total points despite their identical season's record of 11 wins, one loss and two ties.

Baltimore, striving to become the first NFL team to go through a campaign unbeaten, held an early lead against the Rams. But in the end, the Colts

were not in the same class with the Rams.

BALTIMORE HAD struck on a Johnny Unitas pass to Willie Richardson for a 7-3 lead in the first period.

But when Gabriel drilled a pass-run bomb to Jack Snow for 80 yards and a TD, the Rams took command and they merely added to Baltimore's miseries the rest of the way.

Before the halftime break, the Rams were on top, 17-7, thanks to an interception by Ed Meador and some aerial fireworks that moved the Rams

## This Is The Week That

There was a story in a metropolitan Detroit paper before what has become an almost annual crisis with labor which closed down the state's biggest newspapers, that should give nightmares to everybody out here.

It was done by Larry Green so believe it.

The story quoted Mayor Jerry Cavanagh to the effect that any suburb not practicing open housing might get to thinking right if there was tinkering with its water contract with Detroit.

There was mention here a few months ago that the political vagaries of Detroit would make it better for the suburbs under contract if a water authority were established.

As of now, the Detroit Water Board is appointed by the mayor of the city. Detroit residents, naturally, are in the majority with a minority representation given the suburbs.

**BUT THE MAYOR** can force the suburbs—as he has in the past—to nominate a board member to his liking. In practice, then, whoever is mayor of Detroit can shut off our water (no pun here, folks).

Legislators and others pooh-poohed the water authority idea. That was before Cavanagh mentioned open housing.

In Cavanagh we trust, but figure a Huey Long or somebody in the mayor's office with a real axe to grind, politically or philosophically—or just vindictive through sheer cussedness.

Love my water, love me. That kind of thing.

Detroit now provides water to more than one-third of Michigan's population. And the number of customers is growing every year. It now stands at 66 separate municipal jurisdictions.

**THE FIRST EFFORTS** in Lansing were to place all municipal water systems under the Michigan Public Service Commission, a condition now enjoyed by Michigan Bell Telephone Co., Consumers Power Co., Detroit Edison Co., the buses, and railroads and trucks, among others. The commission fixes rates, holds hearings on increases and decreases, enforces standards, blocks contraband cigarettes (for example) at the state borders and performs other functions.

For reasons too tiring to bore you with, it would be a trifle much to toss municipal water systems into this maelstrom of bureaucracy.

So the proposal still stands—a southeastern Michigan water authority to handle a commodity we can't live without to establish and review rates and standards of service, exercise a veto over bond issues for construction and, in general, represent the consumer.

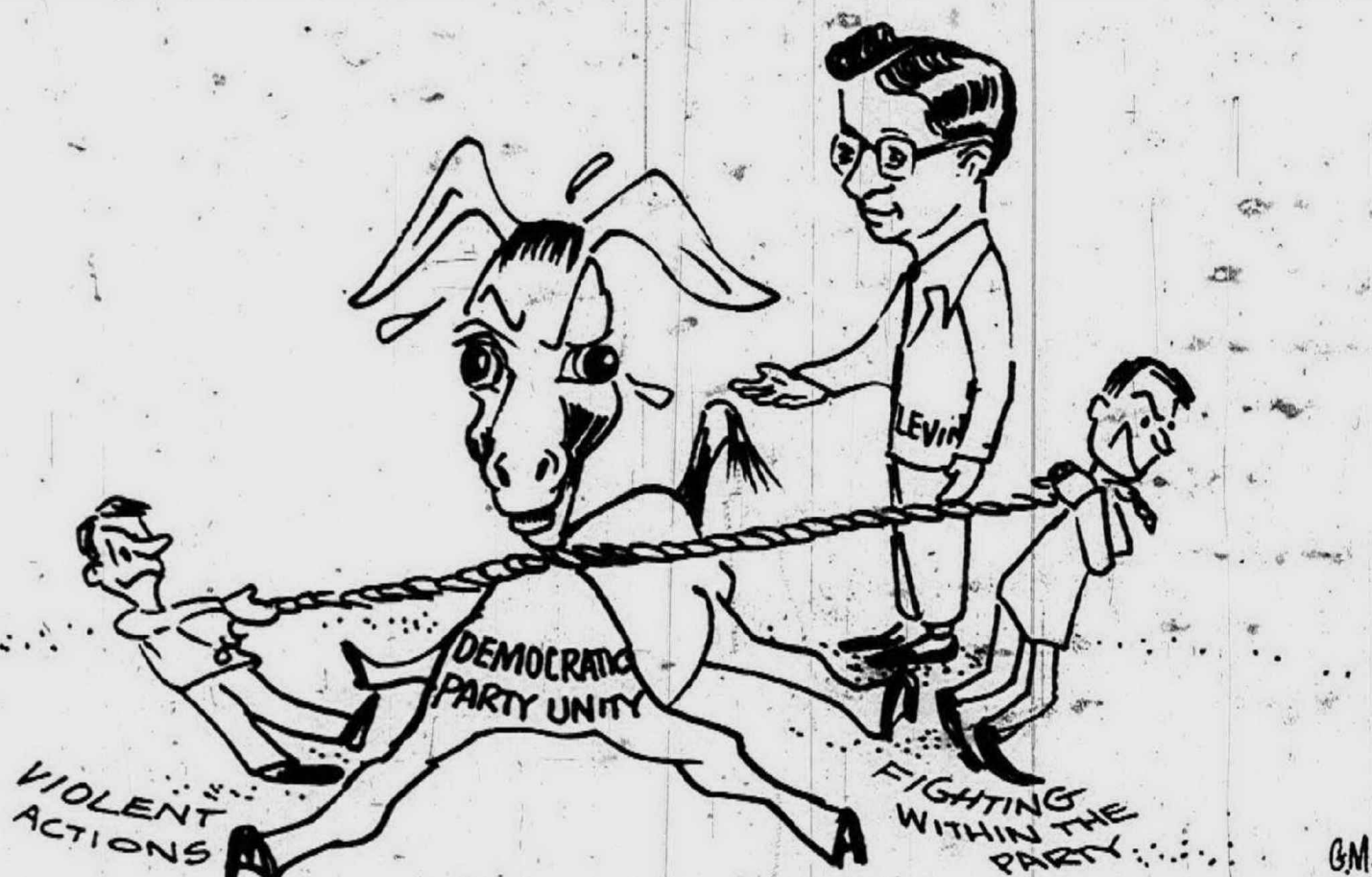
There should be experts and citizens on this panel, organized only to represent the people who pay the bill. Detroit wouldn't lose. The only gain is that a broader-based authority would be in charge of the water.

The suburbs are now fighting the recent increase in rates imposed by Detroit. An authority might find the increases to be entirely justified. Probably would.

But whether or not, the fellow living with his water bill in Livonia, Farmington, Plymouth Township, or wherever else, would know the decision would not be the whim of the head guy in Detroit.

Suburbanites don't get mad about things like this, since they've put Detroit behind them. But they won't like shaving some morning without water.

## Random Reactions On Rouge Report

Random reactions to our stories of last Wednesday and Sunday about pollution in the Middle Rouge River:

**BURROUGHS CORP.** in Plymouth Township was reportedly miffed because no mention was made of the expense and efforts it's engaged in to combat its situation.

Burroughs was one of four companies intensively studied by the state Water Resources Commission. Our articles were based almost entirely on the WRC's 59-page report.

No mention was made in the WRC report of Burroughs' corrective action, although the WRC did mention other firms' corrective actions.

Both the company and the state agency have been invited to respond.

**A LADY IN Livonia** called to tell us about the mess along Bell Creek between Hubbard and Farmington roads. Her observations were sharp:

We have a society which stresses personal neatness and hygiene—deodorants, mouth washes, unwanted hair, eye makeup, men's and women's colognes.

And yet we throw trash around as if the world were coming to an end. We keep our bodies neat, and desecrate our environment.

What can we do about it? she wanted to know. More ordinances? More enforcement? Stiffer penalties? Make those who are caught dumping trash in Bell Creek or the Rouge River clean it up—if you can catch them?

She was at a loss. Bell Creek, at the Farmington Rd. bridge between Five and Six Mile, incidentally, was one of the horrible examples the Observer Newspapers used last summer in a Sunday picture story about the "Water Un-Wonderland."

IN PLYMOUTH, the Jaycees

get together with some Boy Scouts once a year or so and make a trip up the river to clean out junk.

I forget how many truckloads of cans, bed springs, tires, toys and miscellaneous litter they get out, but it's a staggering figure.

Possibly, Bell Creek in Livonia could be improved by the same kind of project.

**DUMPING TRASH**, particularly in creeks, is not human nature. It's an American habit.

In the Scandinavian countries, according to their apologists, a person sticks a gum wrapper in his pocket until he finds a basket. In America he throws it on the street.

Attitudes toward the cleanliness of one's environment can be changed. The Chinese have proved this with their wars on sparrows, insects and other pests. The Chinese may not be able to feed all their people, but you have to give them credit for that kind of environmental improvement.

**WE HAD** A 50-mile hike fad during the Kennedy Administration, but that lasted a few months and died when John F. Kennedy died.

We had a highway beautification fad in the early part of the Johnson Administration, but that died with LBJ's plummeting popularity. (In Greenwich Village, though, you can get buttons that say: "Beautify America—Sterilize the Johnsons." But that's probably politically motivated.)

The Rouge problem involves more than just pollution, which is currently getting national attention. The Rouge problem involves silt, chemicals, weeds and trash, too.

Let's hope that the river-cleaning movement isn't tied to Chinese-style government or a politician's temporary popularity. Let's hope it goes deeper.

## Black Eye For Black Power

The elections of the Nation's first major-city mayors in Cleveland and Gary are not Negro victories. They were victories FOR the Negro, and because of this, are victories for the entire community.

It took white votes—a great many white votes—in addition to Negro votes to make Carl B. Stokes and Richard G. Hatcher the first of their race to win the top elective job in their respective cities.

In Boston, where Negroes are a much smaller minority than in Cleveland or Gary, white voters decisively rejected a white mayoral candidate who pitched her bid for office on a reactionary racial basis.

This is the answer to "Black Power," with its cry of separation from, if not outright war against the "white establishment." This is democracy's answer.

November 7, 1967, should make it clear to all which route—riots and revolts or constructive politics and cooperation—will eventually lead to equal citizenship and equal opportunity for all Americans.

## Observation Point

On the Public Affairs page of this edition, you will find a story out of Lansing that Michigan Democrats have elected Sander Levin their new state chairman.

Levin is a state senator. He's from Berkeley, which is in suburban Oakland County. He is a labor lawyer who was educated at Harvard and at the University of Chicago. He has a reputation as one of the most thoughtful and able men in the party, and he has gained the respect of almost everyone who has worked with (and against) him in the state legislature.

He's got a lot going for him. And he'll need it.

**IT'S NO SECRET** that the Michigan Democratic Party has come upon evil days in recent times.

Some people claim that the rot set in way back in the late 1950's even during the hey-day of former Gov. G. Mennen Williams, and that the big victory in the 1964 election merely covered it up.

Others say that the 1966 debacle, which saw the party lose five freshmen Congressmen and drop control of both houses of the state legislature, was the real tip-off.

Regardless of how you slice it though, the party that was once looked on as the best organized, most effectively led in the nation has lost a lot of ground. The current rumor in Washington is that the Michigan party is even in worse shape than California's. That's going a long way.

**OF COURSE**, everyone knows the party has been squabbling over Viet Nam. Zolton Ferency, the now resigned state chairman, has been sore at President Johnson for some time, and he has made no bones about it. A group called the Concerned Democrats has split off from the regular party, and is now exploring whether or not to run peace candidates next fall in addition to supporting the bid of Sen. Eugene McCarthy to deny the President the democratic nomination.

Published figures indicate that the party's debt is presently \$110,878. The proposed 1968 budget is only a little more than

twice this, \$289,112 in all, and this in turn is some \$40,112 out of balance.

Family fights are troublesome enough, but when the family is badly in the red they can be devastating.

**BUT THE FIGHTS** aren't only over Viet Nam.

The once coherent leadership structure of the party has been badly fractured since the departure of Williams and his old state chairman, Neil Staebler.

In place of a party leadership unified by commitment to a central program, what developed was all too close to a series of feudal princes, each jealously preserving his own domain, resentful of any intrusion and suspicious of all outsiders.

**WHILE ALL THIS** was going on, Michigan Republicans continued to surge behind George Romney. Money poured in, (although it's now pouring out to finance Romney's bid for the presidential nomination.)

Republican organizers started work in the previously all-Democratic areas of Wayne County. The first groups to offer help to those displaced by the Detroit riots were Republican clubs here in Observerland.

Republicans also managed to tone down some of the more notable stone-age members of their party, and they adopted reasonable party platforms.

**SO LEVIN** has a lot to do.

As he put it, "Are we going to solve our problems by debate, discussion, dissent and then decision? Or are we going to solve them by violent words and violent actions?"

He is a reasonable person, and he isn't expected to blow the party's credibility by making over-partisan statements in public.

Levin is talking about holding a series of state-wide issue conferences. About hiring a full-time public relations guy. About getting some field staff. About raising some money.

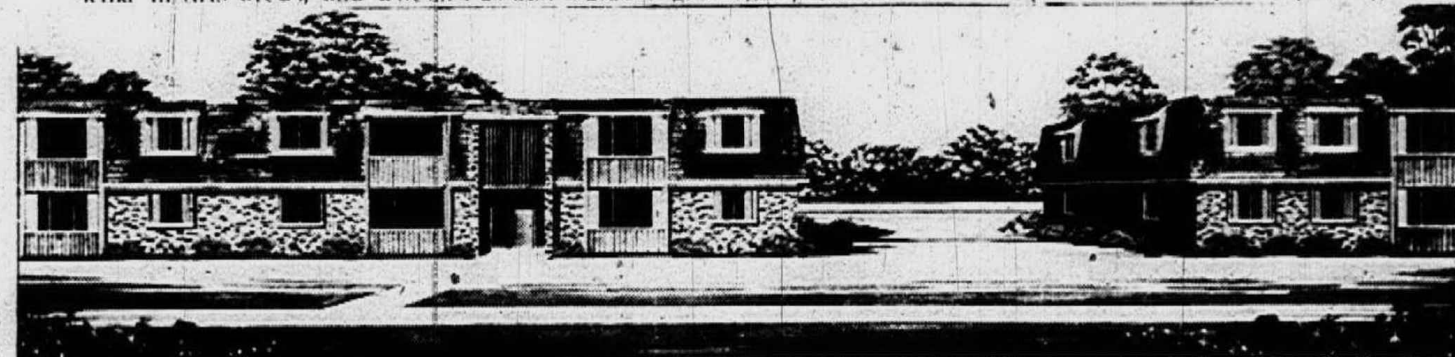
About pulling the party back together.

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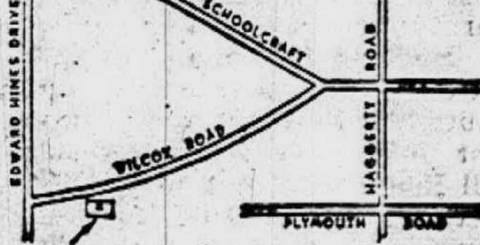

# GM Tells Terms Of New Contract

United Auto Workers members in General Motors plants are expected to approve a new national contract with the company following the UAW executive board's recommendation for a "yes" vote.

The contract would cover 387,000 UAW-represented employees and run until Sept. 14, 1970.

Reaction of skilled workers, often dissatisfied with UAW policies, remains to be seen. Skilled workers campaigned for \$1 an hour pay hikes.

The contract, according to a GM announcement, would give them 50 cents an hour--20 cents as part of a general boost and

another 30 cents to skilled persons.

MEANWHILE, local agreements must be reached at the large majority of GM's 134 bargaining units.

Louis G. Seaton, GM vice president in charge of the personnel staff, said, "The economic settlement follows those previously negotiated with our major competitors, with respect to wages and insurance, pension and unemployment benefits."

PROVISIONS of the new agreement, according to GM's staff, include:

- A general 20 cents an hour increase for all hourly-rated employees, and an additional 30 cents an hour for employees in skilled trades classifications. These increases are effective upon ratification of the national agreement. They will be retroactive to Oct. 16. Payment of the retroactive portion will be made at each plant as soon as all local issues at that plant are resolved.
- An annual improvement factor wage increase for all employees in both the second and third years of the agreement which would range from nine to 18 cents.
- Eighteen cents of the present 23 cents cost-of-living allowance under the previous agreement has been transferred to the base wage rate. The remaining five cents will be continued as the cost of living for the first year of the agreement.
- The new formula for computing the cost-of-living allowance assures at least six cents of new money during the life of the new agreement. It could add as much as 16 cents to the cost-of-living allowance.
- One additional paid holiday. A second new paid holiday will be provided in 1970 if the allowance of the second cost-of-living adjustment exceeds 11 cents.
- Increased pension benefits.
- Improved disability and survivor benefits.
- Expanded hospital and medical expense benefits.
- Increased amounts and longer duration of supplemental unemployment benefits.
- A GM-UAW administered apprenticeship program.
- Changes in the program for employees-in-training for skilled trades classifications which provide additional opportunities for advancement.
- Additional relief time for assembly line jobs.
- Revised representation provisions.

## Congress Studying Airports

The airport problem--from congestion to noise pollution--is receiving serious attention from Congress, says 19th District Rep. Jack McDonald, R-Redford.

"The Federal Airport Act, first passed in 1946 to make matching grants available for safety improvements, was extended last year through 1970. The extension authorized appropriations on a formula basis of \$75 million a year. Approximately \$1.1 billion has been spent or allocated in the program's 21 years."

"The Federal Aviation Administration estimated in 1967 report that the cost of recommended improvements and new airports would be \$1,529,917,000 during a five-year period beginning in the 1968 fiscal year. These costs extended only to safety improvements."

"Transportation Secretary Alan S. Boyd estimates that \$3 billion must be spent by 1973 simply to meet 'our needs and not our desires' in airport development. Most of the costs 'should be borne by the users,' he said."

"A number of financing methods have been suggested, including higher aviation gas taxes and a \$1 'head tax' on each passenger ticket," McDonald says.

"The Airport Operators Council International, which represents local airport authorities, warns that vast expansion programs will create 'staggering financial problems' and suggests an airport trust fund patterned after the highway trust fund."

"A Senate bill would set up an airport development trust fund financed by higher aviation fuel taxes and a 2 per cent surtax on passenger fares. The fund would subsidize local airport bonds and boost the present federal-aid program to \$150 million a year."

## SBA Says It Made 64 Disaster Loans

Robert F. Phillips, regional director of the U.S. Small Business Administration, reports that a total of 64 disaster loans have been made in Oakland and Macomb County area to home owners and businessmen for damages caused by last summer's July 19th torrential rainstorm.

President Johnson directed the S.B.A. to declare the Oakland and Macomb Counties a disaster area and to make available low interest rate loans to those affected from the floods.

Phillips says this effort amounted to a total of \$185,350 in loans approved and dispersed by SBA in the last four months. These loans carry an interest rate to the borrower of 3 per cent and repayments were geared to the applicant's ability to repay.

Victims of this storm--whether business concerns, homeowners or others--are eligible under this program to apply for loans to replace, repair or rebuild damaged property, real or personal, less any insurance proceeds, or any financial assistance. They have until Jan. 19th to apply to the S.B.A. in Detroit.

# Levin's Job: Patch Legislator-Party Rift

LANSING--Michigan Democrats set about today to pull together the fractured pieces of their party and fight Republicans at the polls with a unity harking back to the 1950s.

They said they will make room for the anti-LBJ Concerned Democrats, for youth, for remnants of the former Gov. G. Mennen Williams organization, for everyone who wants to work and win.

And Sunday they elected State Sen. Sander M. Levin, a Harvard-educated labor lawyer from Oakland County, as state chairman to succeed the resigned Zolton A. Ferency.

Effective Jan. 15 or when a successor was chosen.

"Perhaps in the future there will be new causes and new vineyards in which we can work together," his letter said.

Delegates quickly adopted a resolution praising Ferency for his work as chairman since February 1963, stating his name "has become synonymous in this state with vigorous and articulate expression of the principles of the Democratic Party."

Ferency became chairman after stretches as chairman of the Workmen's Compensation Commission, member of the Liquor Control Commission, executive secretary to Former Gov. John B. Swainson and in 1966 the party's candidate against Gov. Romney.

WAYNE 19TH delegates, Caroline Maggio and Glenn Hartsell, of Redford; and Oakland 19th delegates Dorothy Olson, of Waterford Township, and Otis Lawrence, of Pontiac, all voted for Levin on the first ballot.

Levin's wife, Vicci, sat brooding at his side as delegates heard Mattheussen question whether the party should "experiment with" its leadership by naming a part-time chairman.

He said it would be the first statewide party organization in the country to be headed by a state legislator and a part-time chairman.

Robert Craig, president of UAW Local 741 in Flint, withdrew.

Levin was nominated by George Googasian, Oakland County chairman, who said Levin would be a "dynamic kind of leader" who would "both build the party and make room for debate within the Democratic Party."

On a state level, Democrats said their first task would be to wrest control of the House from Republicans next year.

## Open Housing's Chances Dim-Kuhn

State Sen. George W. Kuhn (R-West Bloomfield) says that the prospects of enacting a statewide open housing law during the current special legislative session seemed almost doomed when the Senate refused to take up the issue until the court reorganization bill was passed.

The reason, said Kuhn, was that the Senate feels the number one issue for the call of the special session was to carry out the constitutional mandate to reorganize the state's lower court system.

"I'll predict frankly that if we don't get a court reorganization bill passed by mid-December the open housing bill will die a natural death. The enacting of a court reorganization bill requires a two-thirds vote in both houses, and this will be extremely tough. That means 74 votes in the House and 26 votes in the Senate," Kuhn said.

"OTHER REASONS discussed in the Senate Republican caucus last Tuesday for not tackling the open housing bill first were:

- (1) "Questionable constitutionality of the bill.
- (2) "Failure to enact or to consider to enact crime or anti-riot measures.
- (3) "Disputing with attempts to swap votes on such major issues.
- (4) "The feeling by many that the open housing bill does not directly resolve the critical

housing shortage and the need for low cost housing.

"The real tragedy of the current special session is the overloading of the agenda by the governor of many, many items not of a high priority nature with the end result of nothing much being accomplished."

THE DEMOCRATS were without a state chairman for 44 minutes after Kenneth Hyton read Ferency's official resignation. Ferency, under fire for his anti-Johnson stance on the Vietnam war, said in his Nov. 27 letter he would resign effective Jan. 15 or when a successor was chosen.

Levin gets \$15,000 a year as a state senator and most insiders assume he will get an additional sum from the party but just how much is uncertain.

DEMOCRATIC HEADQUARTERS has seven vacancies at the moment, ranging from a \$15,000 a year public relations director, to a \$1,500 a year parttime receptionist.

The budget for 1968 will be \$289,112, with certain revenues pegged at \$249,000, with \$55,500 anticipated to be the biggest source--voluntary contributions.

Delegate Willie Baxter, of Detroit's first district, got a promise from the state central committee that any new staff would be integrated at both professional and clerical levels.

JAMES HARRISON, a top aide to Ferency and now Ingham County chairman, asked for assurances that the party machinery would not be used to back any candidate who wants to run against President Johnson.

He was told the party does not crank up its machinery until after the national convention.

State Rep. William Ryan, minority leader in the House; and Senator Jerome P. Hart, a party leader in the Senate, gave the delegates a status report on legislation of the special session now underway.

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# Greek Planner Describes City Of Future To M Grads

ANN ARBOR -- It is up to man to mold the city of the future for his own benefit, 2,000 new graduates of the University of Michigan were told.

"This megalopolis will be a continuous urban area which should not crush man as it threatens to do at present; but, built in a human scale, it should

preserve all human values and help man to develop further and better," Constantinos A. Doxiadis said at the winter commencement.

The Athenian city planner, who is at work on defining the future of the Detroit area, received an honorary doctor of laws degree.

THE SAME degree was presented by retiring U-M President Harlan Hatcher to his successor Robben W. Fleming, who will take office Jan. 1. Doxiadis said that when the University of Michigan, now 150 years old, celebrates its 300th anniversary, the present Detroit and Ann Arbor will be only a monument.

While only 60 per cent or less of the city of the year 2000 has not yet been built or committed, man can still build afresh 80 per cent of the city his children will inherit and 90 per cent of his grandchildren's city.

"Our generation has inherited a world which was still thinking as the Homeric man, looking at the past, walking with his back turned to the future," Doxiadis said.

"For this it has paid with two world wars, and for this it lives in bad cities which are the result of uninformed and unwise action of all generations since the beginning of the scientific and technological revolutions....Great progress was made in many directions, but not in a unified way leading to a better city and to a better

life for every individual.

"BUT, UNLIKE the previous generations, ours begins now, under the pressure of many changes, to recognize a crisis in human affairs, to open its eyes, to turn to the future, and to try to create a better city for man."

"Our generation begins to turn around, to turn its own steering wheel, and look into the future. It does not have, though, the time to complete the full turn. Humanity has been moving for such a long time turned to the past that it now has a stiff

neck. It cannot complete the turn.

"This is the task of your generation," Doxiadis told the graduates, "easier in the sense that others found at last the need of turning around, more difficult in the sense that you will have to continue to turn, to define the proper course and consolidate it."

"Your great challenge is to turn what is unavoidable, the great city of man which is extra-human in dimension and threatens to become inhuman, into a city with human content."

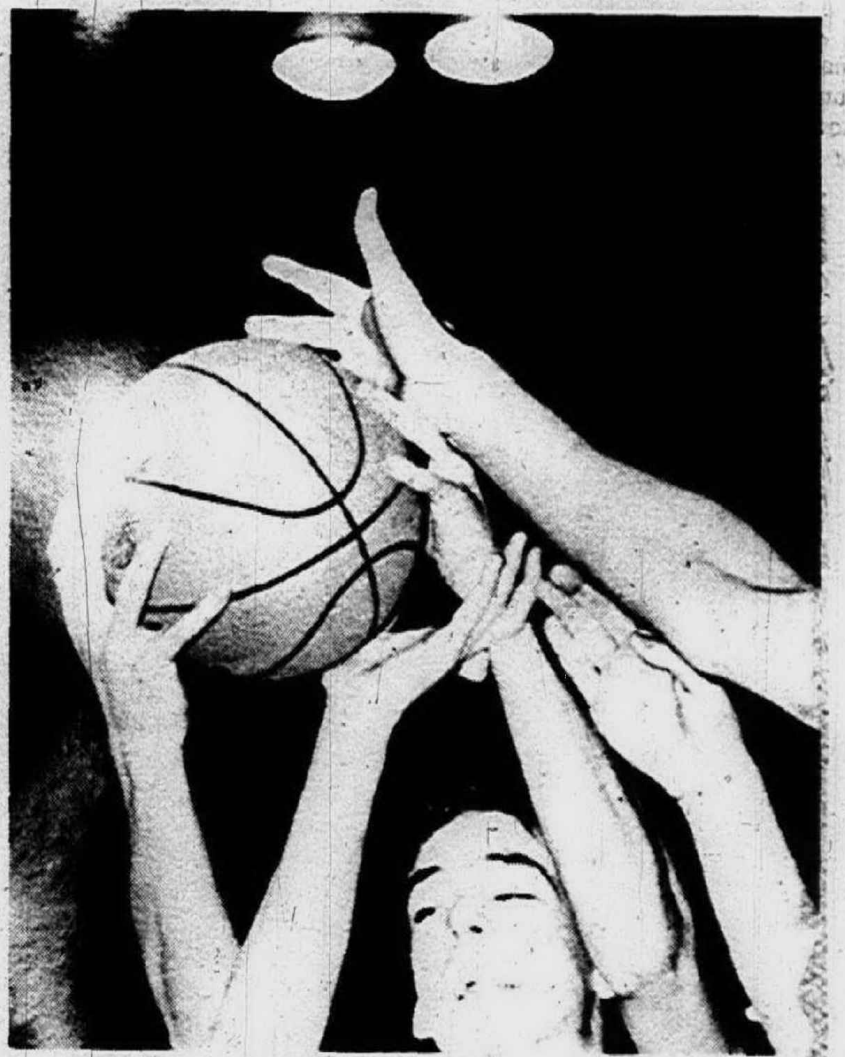

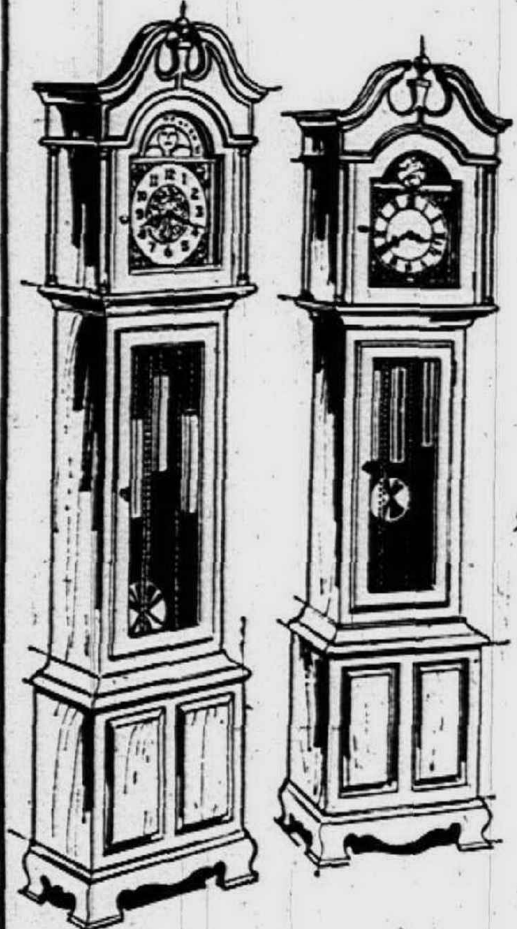

Now's the time to be jolly and how else would Herm Fishman want to have it?

Herm had to be one of the first schoolboys we ever wrote about when, as a youngster, there were ambitions to pound away with articles for sports pages.

He was a soccer player at Hutchins Intermediate (now junior high) in Detroit. Our assignment for the school paper was "to cover" the team on which Herm performed.

So we made "a long" trip (two miles), over to Sharrard Intermediate and if memory serves correctly, Hutchins won, 1-0.

In the years to come, we wrote about Herm as a basketball and baseball star at Detroit Northern... later as a two-sport great at the University of Michigan;... still later when he pitched professionally for teams like Syracuse in the International League.

And still later as a man who dedicated himself and his life, that everything was good in sports and almost anything else you could mention.

Herm was a man who got the fullest out of life. There was nothing halfway about him... either in the way he reacted to his family... to his associates in a growing insurance company... to the countless who played with and knew in the world of sports.

You'd find him one hour serving on the parents council at Mumford High in Detroit... the next hour out at Ann Arbor devoting his time to the University of Michigan.

That was the way Herman Fishman operated.

Herm was a short, squatty man. You never saw him when he wasn't smiling.

He loved his kids... his own son and two daughters... and everybody else's.

He frequently was found in schoolboy gyms or at the Jewish Center in Detroit passing out advice to would-be basketball players.

For many years with his brother Mickey he ran a summer camp up near West Branch. The emphasis was on athletics.

They had basketball and baseball and swimming teams. And wherever and whenever a team competed, there was Herman. He coached and helped.

But more important, he was like a second-father to so many kids. Probably his lovely wife, Betty, doesn't know just how many boys and girls Herm provided education funds so that they could study—especially at the University of Michigan.

Never did anyone, in any walk of life, boast so many friends... of all races... of all creeds.

The highest testimony to what a man means to the world he has departed comes in the "turn-out" for his funeral.

As they say in sports, there was "standing room only" for the farewell his loved ones and friends gave to Herm Fishman.

Men like 80-year-old Ray Fisher, Herm's one-time coach at Michigan attended; so did the present members of the U. of M. cage team, led by their coach Dave Strack.

Outstanding professional men in other fields came. There were rich and poor, etc.

Life moved at a fast pace for Herm. Death came that way, too.

He was playing squash at the Jewish Center. He had finished a couple games with Billy Jacobs, with whom Herm once had won the state title.

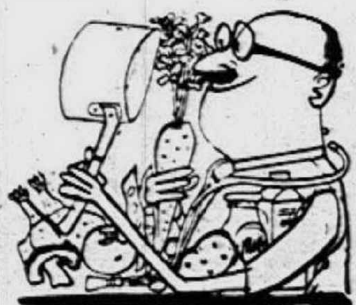
Herm went upstairs to the locker room to chat with friends and talk about how the Pistons had beaten Bill Bradley and the New York Knicks the night before.

Suddenly he gasped. A moment later he had collapsed. Two doctors rushed to his rescue.

Death had come swiftly... and as he had in life, Herm still flashed a faint smile as he went on to the world none of us know anything about... but to where all will eventually wind up.

The world has boasted too few like Herm Fishman. Fortunately, what he accomplished in his short span of 50 years with us will have lasting effects.

He did so much that was good.

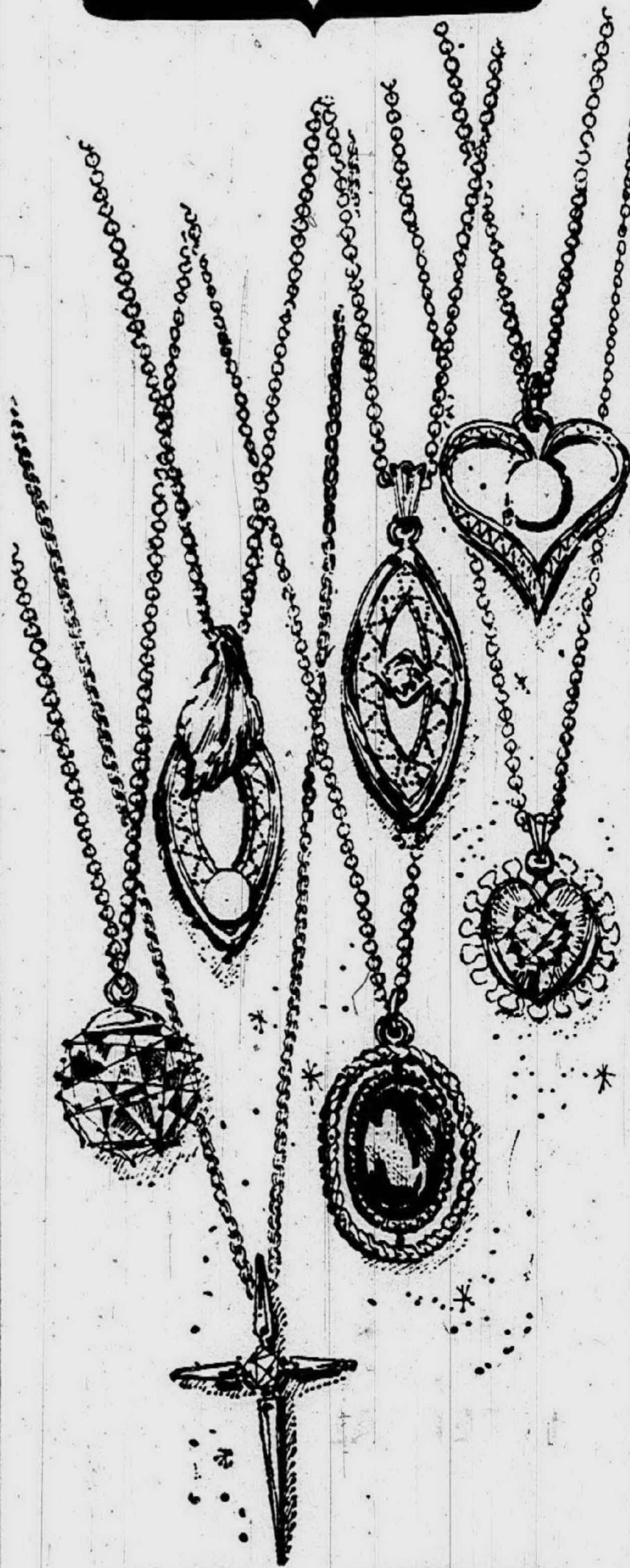


## Doctor in the Kitchen®

The gentleman from Livonia, Norm Ullman, had himself a scoring party for the Detroit Red Wings Sunday night.

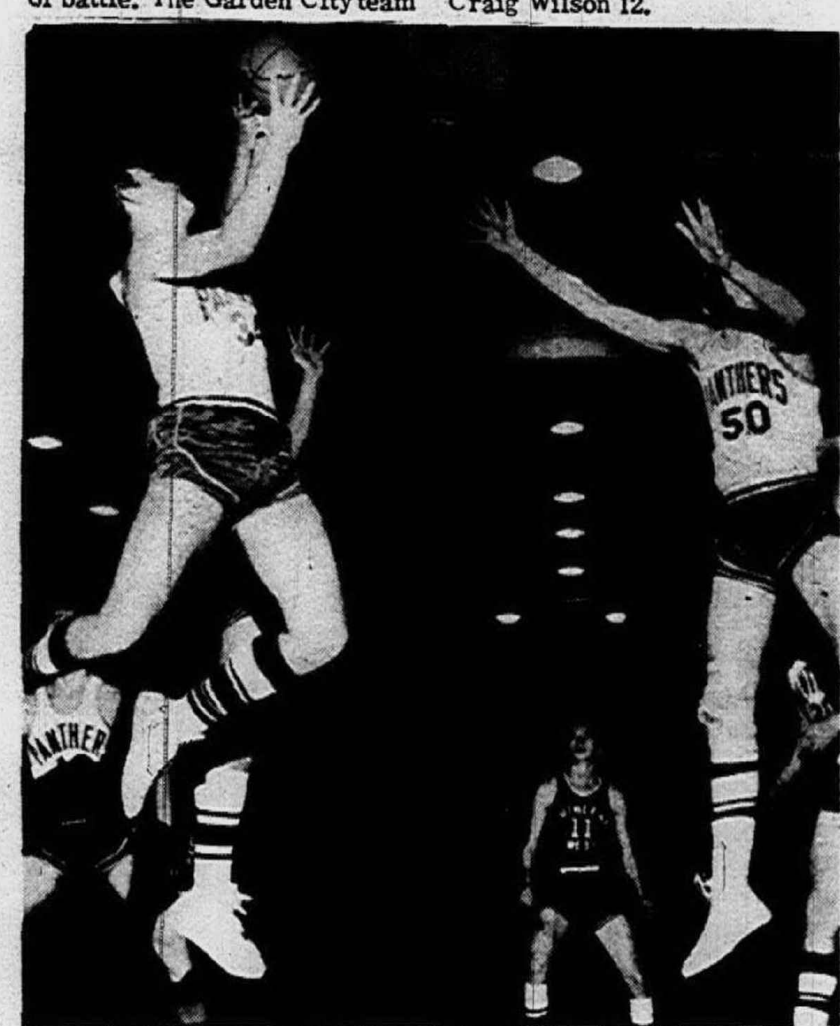
So did his mates.

## Students Build Nativity Scene

A replica of the nativity scene, built by the students of Sacred Heart Novitiate, is on view at the institution north of Monroe from now until Jan. 14.

The scene, called a diorama, is 500 square feet in area. It will be open to the public at no charge on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays, from 1 to 9 p.m.

The diorama is a miniature three dimensional reproduction of the landscape of Palestine

as it was at the time of Christ with hills and valleys, caves and homes, water wheels, mills, castles, and more than 150 figures, some of which are animated.

While the visitor watches the scene, the lights dim, stars appear in the sky above; the tiny homes scattered throughout the countryside light up during the night. The narrated story of the wonderful event which took place nearly 2,000 years ago carries the imagination back to the first Christmas night.

The story told in words, with light, music, and motion is truly educational for children and moving for older people.

The novitiate is conducted by the Verona Fathers, a missionary society with training centers in: U.S.A., Italy, England, Spain, Portugal, Brazil, and Mexico. Sacred Heart Novitiate is located at the intersection of Nadeau Road and Combal Way north of the city of Monroe, west of Toledo-Detroit Expressway (I-75). To reach it from Expressway, exit on Nadeau Road and follow "Nativity Scene" signs.

### CHRISTMAS PRAYER

St. Francis of Assisi is credited with making popular the Christmas Nativity scene. He is also author of a prayer inspired by the Christmas spirit:

"Lord, make me an instrument of thy peace. Where there is hatred, let me sow love. Where there is injury, pardon. Where there is doubt, faith. Where there is sadness, joy. O Divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood, as to understand; to be loved, as to love. For it is in giving that we receive, it is in pardoning that we are pardoned. And it is in dying that we are born in Eternal Life."



Throughout the Christian world, Christmas is THE holiday, universally celebrated, universally recognized.

Probably no library in the world could house the volume of material that is written about this great holiday in a single season.

Because so much has been written — and will again be written this holiday season — we must consider it remarkable that the story of the Nativity has continued a simple and unaffected narrative — "For God so loved the world, He gave His only begotten Son."

## Presbyterians Hit Vigilante Groups

Presbyterians took a stand against negative and militant reactions to urban problems at a meeting of the Presbytery of Detroit of the United Presbyterian Church in Redford Church recently.

Stephen E. Hack, chairman of the committee on religion and race, presented his committee's alarm about the wide-spread purchase of arms, the formal and informal organization of local "vigilante" groups, and the calling of meetings sponsored by such organizations as Break through and others which encourage resistance, hate and self-defense, among both the whites and blacks.

The Presbytery in adopting "A Statement of Concern" called upon its members "to resist, and to lead others to

resist, negative, militant, cold and hard analyses and solutions to our present urban malaises and to be diligent in understanding the serious underlying causes of social unrest,

which, in both cause and effect, leaves no person without some share of the responsibility and solution."

DR. PETERS urged that the measure for success in the

church be faithfulness and labeled as scandalous "jockeying for place" and "fixation on statistics."

# Volunteer Service Popular

Americans have a high regard for the volunteer spirit, and they strongly favor volunteers working in the war on poverty, according to a Gallup survey just released.

The Gallup organization asked Americans how they felt about their children volunteering for service overseas in the Peace Corps or in VISTA (Volunteers in Service to America), an Office of Economic Opportunity Program that sends volunteers to serve among the poor in America.

Nine out of ten favored volunteer service for youth. Seventy-four per cent, when asked, chose one of the programs. Sixteen per cent said it made no difference which program their children chose and 10 per cent had no opinion.

BY NEARLY two to one, they would choose VISTA service for their sons over service in the Peace Corps -- 47 per cent to 27 per cent. Two out of three reflected the American axiom "Charity begins at home" when they said their choice of VISTA was because "it helps people in this country."

Recruitment figures of the two agencies seem to bear this out. A Peace Corps official revealed in a news story this past week that applications to the Peace Corps are down 30 per cent over the past year. He said the decline is because conditions "have made Americans cynical about their ability to change anything in the world."

The opposite situation prevails at VISTA, where applications are up 34 per cent over the past year, based on September, October, and November figures, the latest available.

RECRUITMENT DIRECTOR Alexander Grant reports that "in November alone, our applications were up 62 per cent this year, and since July we have received 37,564 written inquiries about VISTA service, a 75 per cent increase in inquiries over last year."

People who knew something about VISTA and said they would be interested in seeing their sons serve had a variety of comments.

"It's a domestic Peace Corps where you go into ghettos and help solve problems" was the VISTA definition given to Gallup by a 28-year old businessman in Illinois.

The wife of a store manager in Texas said, "Well, they're calling for Americans to help Americans—a nice idea. I'd like to do it if I didn't have small children of my own."

AN AUTO MECHANIC in California said, "It would be good for my son to learn how the other half lives." A tobacco binder in Jacksonville, Florida said his son in VISTA "would be helping the poor, and there are a lot of us."

The wife of a salesman in Wisconsin thought, "In serving in such a program one becomes a better person." A 40-year-old auto repairman in Savannah, Ga., said, "It doesn't hurt to help people."

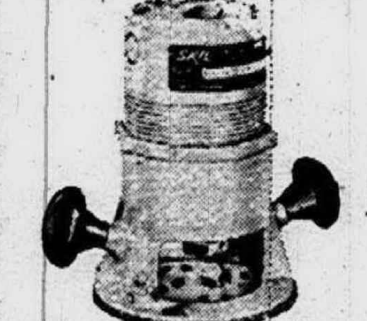

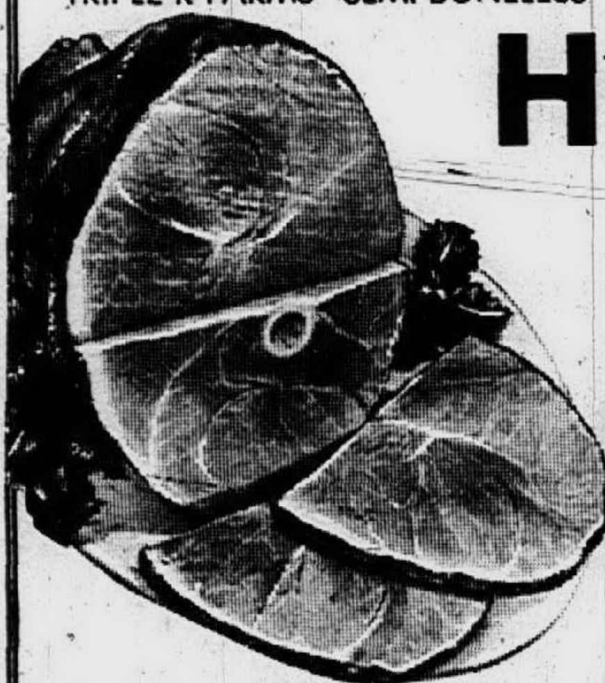

## Fire Chief Issues Warning

## Great Care Must Be Taken With Yuletide Decorations

"Have a fire safe Christmas." This plea came from the office of City Fire Chief George Schoenneman this week. With the use of this slogan, the chief urged every city resident to be fire conscious as well as fire safe.

The Christmas season brings with it different kinds of fire hazards than are found at other times of the year and Schoenneman pointed to five outstanding items that are possible fire starters.

Chief Schoenneman said,

"When you obtain your Christmas tree, store it outdoors. Stand the tree in the snow until you are ready to bring it indoors. This will help keep the tree from drying out."

"Do not purchase a tree bigger than your need. Remember, the larger the tree the greater the hazard of fire."

He continued, "When the tree is placed in the house, it should be well supported. There are some excellent stands on the market which not only have a receptacle for water, but are also sturdy, have a broad base and incorporate clamps for anchoring the tree."

"Keep the tree away from sources of heat--fireplaces, radiators, etc.--and place so

that, standing or fallen, it could not block the way out of the room or out of the house in case of fire," he said.

Schoenneman added one last tree warning. "Place the tree trunk in water and keep the level of water above the cut the entire time the tree is indoors. Check the water level at least once a day for absorption and evaporation."

In close connection with the Christmas tree, the chief explained the safe way to use

lighting.

He said, "Do not use wax candles on the tree or nearby where there is any chance for an open flame to contact the tree or combustibles piled beneath the tree."

"Use electric lighting sets that bear the U.L., (Underwriters Laboratories, Inc.), label and check lighting sets every year before using for frayed wires, loose connections and broken sockets."

"Be sure the fuse of the

electric circuit serving the tree is not over 15 amperes and make certain that all tree lighting is turned off before retiring or leaving the house," he continued.

The third and fourth items the fire chief talked about were decorations and wrappings.

"Do not," he warned, "let combustible Christmas wrappings accumulate in the home. Place them in a metal trash barrel outside of the home or burn them in an incinerator at a safe location."

"Use noncombustible material, such as metal, glass, or asbestos, to decorate the home for Christmas wherever possible," he said.

"Untreated cotton batting, polystyrene foam, paper and certain cloth costumes will ig-

nite quite easily and burn with great intensity unless they are flameproofed. Santa Claus' whiskers have caused Christmas tragedies--be sure they are flameproofed."

The chief added that above all "do not use the fireplace to burn Christmas wrappings and decorations."

His last words of caution dealt with Christmas gifts which are probably among the most treasured Christmas items.

"Look for the Underwriters Laboratories label when buying electric toys. This means they have been tested for fire and shock hazards and may be considered safe if properly maintained," he added.

Schoenneman warned, "Do not set up electric trains, self-propelled toys or toys fueled

with flammable liquids under a Christmas tree where they might be responsible for upsetting the tree or igniting it."

He concluded, "Do not allow smoking near the tree, amid decorations or wrappings. Have plenty of ashtrays around and use them."

Smith, of 42188 Lakeland, Plymouth, was appointed building inspector for the township on May 16, 1966.

This was the second death of a township employee in the past two months. Matthew McLellan, director of buildings and the DPW department, died of a heart attack while on a hunting trip.

Service for Smith were held in the Schrader Funeral Home on Tuesday Dec. 19. He was buried in Oak Grove Cemetery in Morenci, Michigan.

Surviving him is his wife, Catherine M. Smith, and two sons James and John, at home. He was born on March 17, 1909 in Buffalo, New York, and graduated from the University of Rochester in 1930 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Mechanical Engineering and then received his Master of

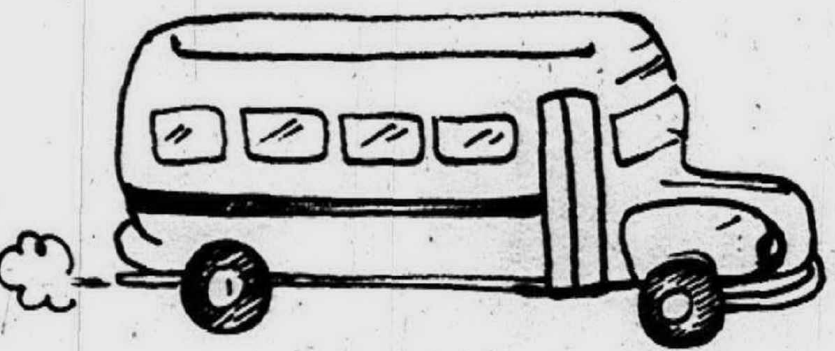

Blind Woman Teaches Others; Seeks Driver

Ironing, baking, cooking, washing, mending--these are simple household tasks that become so humdrum many women have often said they could do them blindfolded.

Try it. Try ironing a shirt, mending a tear in your son's sweater or preparing a meal for your hungry family without the benefit of sight, and then thank God that you are able to see.

Mrs. Suzanne Illingworth can't.

MRS. ILLINGWORTH is partially blind--her condition is called tunnel vision which means she has no depth perception. The sighted can ex-

perience the same feeling by looking down the wrong end of a dime store spy glass. The images sometimes focus--more often they don't.

In spite of her handicap, or possibly because of it, Mrs. Illingworth travels many miles each day teaching the adult blind to take care of themselves and their homes.

She is employed by the state in the Department of Social Welfare.

MRS. ILLINGWORTH's well-known visits cover a large area--Washenaw and Jackson counties.

Unable to hop in the car and drive the distance from her Redford Township home, Mrs. Illingworth has had to rely on the services of a woman who must resign soon after the first of the year.

Without a driver Mrs. Illingworth will be unable to continue her work. Her long-time and newly-blinded students will be without the understanding help of their courageous teacher unless a driver is found.

IF THERE IS someone in Observerland with a warm heart and a willing automobile, the Illingworths would appreciate a telephone call. They can be reached after 5 p.m. at 533-9240.

MRS. ILLINGWORTH's work is a lesson in courage. The needs of each individual guide her teaching.

A newly-blinded person may have to learn something as basic as feeding himself.

A woman may learn the trick of putting her hair up in rollers or a man may learn how to write a letter to his son in service.

PHYSICAL SKILLS can be mastered in time, but how do you teach a sightless person self-confidence? If Mrs. Illingworth's blindness has an advantage, it is in this area. "When I tell them they can do something they know that I know what it's like to be blind and it makes them confident they can do it too."

"With a sighted person it's different," she admitted.

THE MOST discouraged person can find inspiration in Mrs. Illingworth's own story.

She has been married for nine years and her husband has been totally blind since infancy. The Illingworths live at 26695 Southwestern in Redford Township and care for their five-room brick home themselves.

Illingworth is a dictaphone transcriber with American Community Mutual in Plymouth and a member of the Plymouth Lions Club.

Prior to her marriage Mrs. Illingworth served the state of Ohio in a very similar capacity for 12 years. She attended elementary school for the blind

Westland Girl In Thick Of Vietnam War With Red Cross Clubmobile

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Beatty reported.

Besides the satisfaction she finds in bringing a bit of home to the men on the fighting lines, her stay so far has been highlighted by a Thanksgiving Day reunion with her brother, Charles, a helicopter pilot in South Vietnam.

"WE HEARD about their getting together," Mrs. Beatty said, "but we haven't yet had any details on how Charlie got to her area."

"Charlie had just returned from a mission to the Dak To area. It's wonderful they were able to see each other--they always have been very close."

Diane, who graduated last year from St. Louis University, had been a social worker

in St. Louis before joining the Red Cross for overseas duty. "She's always been pretty shy and reserved," her mother

said, "and now a big part of her job is just talking to the boys who have been away from home for so long. It's something quite new for her."

THE CLUBMOBILES in Vietnam are in themselves a fairly new project. The big, bus-type vehicles go into the remote areas where the fighting is going on, and the girls on them have records to play, games, refreshments and just conversation for the fighters.

In the case of Diane's unit, the job sometimes involves going to the far front lines by helicopter.

In one of her first letters, Mrs. Beatty said, Diane wrote that she was "in the safest place in Vietnam."

"Then a few days later we heard a newscast about the Communists setting fires all over the Bien Hoa area," her mother added. "She's written since that the fires had increased the constant dustiness in the area, and that she and the other girls had a terrible time trying to get things clean."

THE HOURS are long and the clubmobile girls often work seven days a week, Mrs. Beatty said, but Diane seems to be getting great satisfaction from her service.

The Beattys also have a lot of pride in the accomplishments of their pilot son, who went to Vietnam in July after about a year of training in this country.

"I know he likes the flying--it sounds great," said his dad, a bombardier officer in World War II.

Mrs. Beatty is planning to meet her son in Hawaii when he gets leave early next year. The couple also has another son, Dennis, a student at Stevenson High School.

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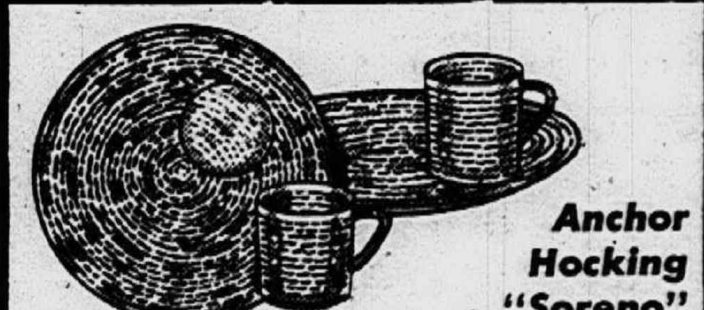

## It's A Joyful Time For Pastors Wife

If you're the mother of three lively youngsters, you tend to be pretty busy at the Christmas season.

If you're also a minister's wife, things get even livelier with all the church activities during the days when we celebrate the birth of Christ.

And if you also add the directing of the church choir and all the preparation needed for the annual Christmas program, then you might be Mrs. Herbert Noe, wife of the pastor of Galilean Baptist Church in Livonia.

MAE NOE just now is taking a breathing spell after completion of the cantata "Born a King," at the church Sunday night. It's not a very long pause, for there's a lot more activity coming this Sunday, Christmas Eve.

That will be the day of the church's children's program, and the three Noe offspring, Neva, 13; Cheryl, 12, and Danny, 11, will be taking part. "We have found it works out very well to separate the adult and the children's programs," said Mrs. Noe, who didn't seem a bit rushed or harassed. "And we keep the service for children simple, with the familiar Christmas carols, so that any child who comes that day can take part."

THE ADULT CHOIR cantata, a work by John W. Peterson, involved about 35 or 40 singers. "That's all we can crowd into our little choir loft, even standing through the whole thing," explained Mae Noe, who also was one of the soloists for the cantata, in addition to her directing duties.

"When our new auditorium is ready, in a month or so, we'll have more room and a bigger group."

This year's cantata featured a new project for Mrs. Noe's group—living scenes to illustrate the various parts of the musical work.

"We used ultra-violet light and glowing white paint to show the manger scenes," Mrs. Noe said. "For the wise men scene we had something really spectacular—some seven-foot-high camels made of plywood. No, the wise men didn't sit on

top—they stood beside them."

MAE WORRIED right up to the last minute that her husband, Pastor Herbert Noe, wouldn't be able to narrate the cantata because of an attack of laryngitis.

Mrs. Noe has directed the choir at Galilean Baptist, located on Seven Mile Road, for five years.

"Before that I did a little bit of everything else in the church," she said.

She and her husband both went to Bob Jones University in the South, but Mrs. Noe had not had special musical training.

"I've gone to Baptist church services all my life, though, and sung in choirs," she said. "And often, in church work, it's just a matter of knowing that a job needs to be done and learning to do it."

MAE AND HERBERT NOE have been with Galilean, an independent Baptist church, since its inception 14 years ago.

The meetings were held in a Veterans Hall on Grand River until the present building was erected 11 years ago. The Noe family moved to Livonia from a home in Detroit in 1963.

The Noes are convinced

there isn't a congregation in the world like theirs. This month the people of the church presented a new dishwasher to Mae.

And they still are remembering with great pleasure the wonderful present the congregation gave them last spring—a trip to the Holy Land just before Easter.

"A trip like that changes your whole outlook," Mrs. Noe said. "Our lives just are different because we made it. We looked at pictures of the recent fighting there, and could see the scenes so much more clearly because we had been there."

IT ISN'T JUST at Christmas that Mae Noe's life is a busy round of activity.

Sundays throughout the year include Sunday school and church in the morning, then a return to the church in the late afternoon for the congregation's Bible Training Union, then evening service, then choir practice.

"It's a busy life, but one I thoroughly enjoy," said Mrs. Noe. "I wouldn't want my husband to be anything but a minister."

## Prof. Says Inflation Threatens

ANN ARBOR -- The United States is facing serious inflation which could bring difficult problems similar to those that led Great Britain to devalue the pound, says a University of Michigan business economist.

Associate Prof. Ross J. Wilhelm of the U-M Graduate School of Business Administration explains that devaluation of the pound from \$2.80 to \$2.40 in effect reduces the prices of goods which the United Kingdom sells to other nations and increases the prices of imported goods.

The British have been unable to maintain their position in the world markets because their goods have been overpriced," he adds.

"The overpricing of the export products has come about primarily because the government has used expansions of the money supply and inflation as a means for keeping the economy operating at high level and unemployment at abnormally low levels.

"THE BRITISH labor unions have very great power and have been able to obtain wage increases in excess of efficiency gains. They also have resisted efficiency improvements in industry. In addition, British businessmen have not been strong competitors and have been slow to adopt innovations."

Wilhelm, observes that while the Labor government has reduced its expansion of the money supply and inflationary pressures, "the problem of the labor unions and the lack of competitive spirit on the part of the businessmen remains."

"We in the United States also have been faced with chronic balance of payments problems, the U-M economist notes. "Due to our huge gold reserves and relatively mild inflation, however, we have not faced the grave difficulties experienced by the United Kingdom."

"We are now in a serious inflationary situation, however, and unless our inflation is checked soon, we could face difficult problems," Wilhelm warns.

WHEN THE British devalued and raised interest rates, the U.S. also raised interest rates to help keep foreign capital invested in our bonds and securities from shifting to British securities. This will help somewhat to reduce our balance of payments and our inflationary pressures, he adds.

With British prices now being relatively lower than U.S. prices, U.S. exports probably will tend to be somewhat lower than would have been otherwise, and this too will help reduce our inflationary pressures, Wilhelm suggests.

On the other hand, our reductions of tariffs on foreign goods and European reduction in tariffs on our goods with the completion of the Kennedy Round probably means a rise in exports as well, he adds.

While these factors make forecasting difficult, according to the U-M economist, "It is certain that unless we do something decisive about the inflationary pressures in our economy, we are going to face very serious balance of payments problems for this reason. The rate at which the money supply is being expanded by the Federal Reserve must be reduced and, in addition, there must be a sharp reduction in the anticipated deficit in our federal budget."

"Both the President and the Congress have been behaving irresponsibly," Wilhelm concludes. "The President has failed to provide the leadership needed to decisively cut our federal spending."

"The Congress has failed to raise the taxes to increase the revenues of government and to reduce the effective demand in the economy. Time is running out for us and there is a need for immediate action by both the President and Congress."

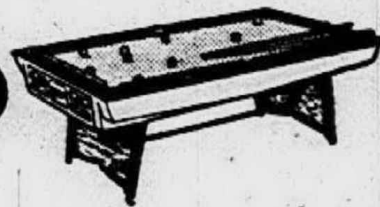

"Wait A Minim", a musical entertainment, now at the Fisher for the holidays combines the zany shenanigans of "Beyond The Fringe"; the polished sophistication of "At A Drop Of A Hat" (The Flanders-Swanopus); and the musical inventiveness of "An Evening With Victor Borge".  
Such an entertainment soufflé has all the ingredients so necessary to please even the most discerning theatre-goer. "Wait A Minim" began its five year run in South Africa and was such an instant success that long runs in London, New York, and across the United States were in order.  
"Wait A Minim" is the type of theatrical production that must use its original stars. No one else would have the musical know-how to play the following instruments: bagpipes, mandolin, the double respiratory linguaphone, trombone, the kalimba (an African hand piano), Lozi drums, the Umakweyana bow, the Japanese koto zither, and a host of other native instruments.  
"Wait A Minim" is a fascinating excursion into the world of native musical instruments. The difference between making what could have been a dull, boring academic evening is the exciting brilliant approach by the talented group of eight who play these unusual instruments. They never let the evening get serious.  
Only occasionally during the two hour program do the performers let their songs and demonstrations veer to the maudlin or sentimental. These moments are welcome relief from the excess of comic sight gags.  
Director Gluckman puts his talented eight singers, dancers and instrument players through a man-killing pace. Number after number tumble one upon the other. Applause and laughter hardly subside before we are on to another new musical adventure.  
The finale of Act I with its lively Izicatlato gumboat shoe dance pounds its way into your cortex so that you will long remember it. The topical gags in which Mayor Cavanagh and other local items creep into the dialogue indicate that "Wait A Minim" while it has a paucity of words those words do change nightly.  
Paul and Andrew Tracey form the talented core and inspire the other six performers to do a magnificent job of performing. All of the actors in this musical entertainment work at break-neck speed and appear to be enjoying their work.  
When you consider that they have been at this stage venture for more than 2,000 performances, it is even more amazing. The fresh, uninhibited quality of "Wait A Minim" gives the entire production a rosy glow found in too few theatrical performances.  
While a few of the sketches found in this combination revue and musical concert might have a bawdy moment, the bulk of "Wait A Minim" is as clean as Aunt Hettie's sheets. The social commentary about integration is done tastefully and in a low key; consequently, it has great impact.  
"Wait A Minim" will be at the Fisher until Jan. 7.

# McCann Rips Court Reform 'Power Grab'

Municipal Judge James R. McCann today attacked the court reorganization package killed last week in Lansing but certain to be revived shortly.

He said Livonia will lose revenue from its own court and control of one branch of local government.

"The state has just passed an income tax and we have a sales tax of four per cent," McCann said. "The court bill is just one more way for the state to take city income which must be made up by local taxpayers."

"OUR MAYOR and city council have gone on record opposing the court bill and I urge our legislators to do the same."

"There is no mandate for our legislators to do anything with the city courts. There is a mandate in the 1963 state constitution to abolish the justice of the peace courts and their fee system."

"The legislature can accomplish this without interfering with Livonia regulating its own court and retaining its own revenue."

McCann said the present package in Lansing will have this effect on Livonia:

"It will abolish the City Court in favor of a State regulated court."

"It will abolish the revenue received by the City from the court. The revenue was \$144,000 for 1967."

"Of this amount, \$75,000 pays for the Livonia Court expenses and the balance goes into the general fund for services, such as the police department."

"Under the proposed court bill the state will be paying the court expenses, but in turn, will return only 30 per cent of the revenue to the City, the rest going to the State and county."

"THE COURT income in our growing city has increased 40 per cent over the year 1966 and future income will continue

to increase as the city grows."

"The biggest part of the future income under court reorganization will go to the state and county. It will abolish the Livonia probation department. There is no provision in the bill for local probation departments."

"Today the people of Livonia have the service of approximately 50 voluntary probation officers who work to make our city a better place to live, with no cost to the people."

"It will abolish the volunteer work program. Under this program, persons who have been sentenced to short terms and who have regular jobs, may

elect to work Saturdays for the city in the parks on cleanup work, instead of going to jail. "It will abolish our volunteer probation under which first offenders have a choice to earn their freedom without a lasting police record."

The four-year-olds have two groups, one meeting on Tuesday and Thursday mornings, and

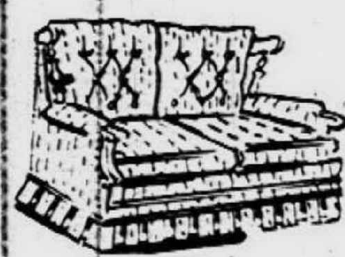

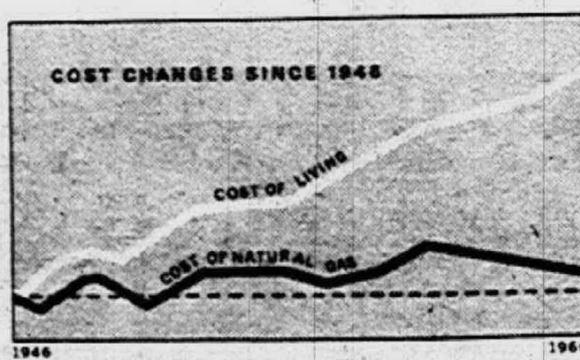

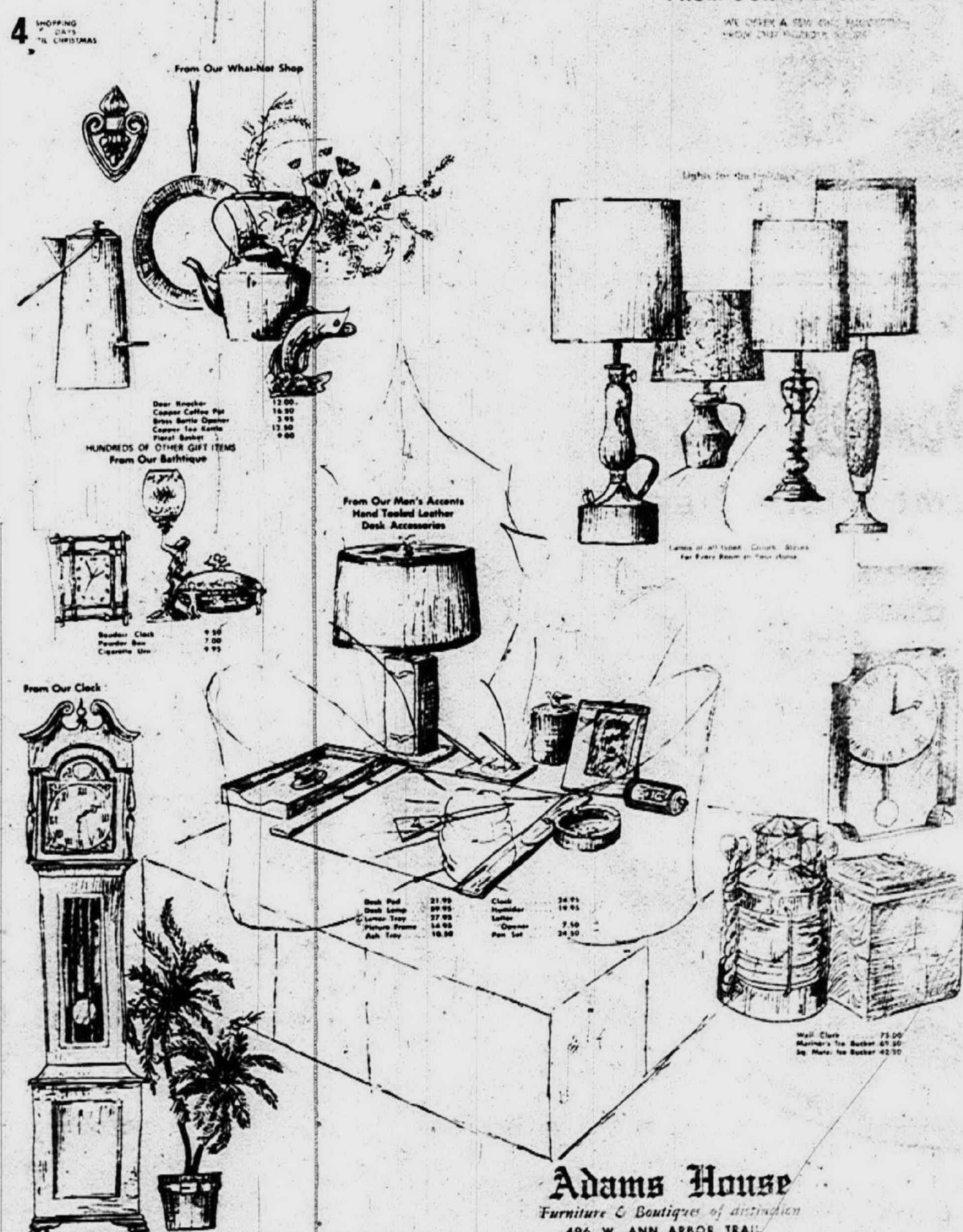

## Redford's Animal Problems

EDITOR:

I have only recently learned of the letter and newspaper article concerning Mrs. Helen Sherrill and the work of the Humane Rescue League in Red-

ford Township.

I of course cannot and do not expect everyone to agree with my views. However, I have received help from Mrs. Sherrill on numerous occasions during the past ten years. One of my three cats was adopted from the League; and whenever it is necessary to take a lost, abandoned or injured animal to her, I have always received courteous, sympathetic treatment.

As to euthanasia, or "mercy killing" of animals when necessary, I share her views that it is both humane and necessary. Redford Township at the last count had a population of over 82,000 and we are over-run with stray animals.

Being a suburban area, many people "dump" unwanted animals in our district with the well meaning but misguided idea that it is the "humane" thing to do, and that someone will give the animal a home. Others will do this because it is the easiest way of disposing of a problem.

I myself have at times had over half a dozen stray cats feeding at my home in winter --lost, stray, unwanted, injured--animals that need care and attention. When I am convinced after weeks of care that they are homeless or unwanted, I have taken them to the league. One can't solve a problem like this by ignoring it and M-s. Sherrill, to my knowledge, is about the only place in Redford Township where we can seek help on this problem.

I believe I am correct in stating that at the present time we do not have a pound or adequate facilities for caring for the many unwanted dogs and cats that roam the streets. I believe those that are picked up are turned over to Livonia--and while I don't know exactly what Livonia does with the animals, I am sure they do not care for and board them indefinitely.

I also believe I am correct in stating that the Humane Society refuses to put out female cats or kittens for adoption. Personally, I agree that it is best to have a cat spayed or altered, unless one has a very definite reason to raise the ensuing litters, and can really find good homes for the kittens.

A township such as ours should attack this problem and try to work out some solution --such as an adequate animal shelter. However, in the meantime, I believe Mrs. Sherrill and the League render a real service and I am grateful for her help.

For those who do not care for her method of operation --have you any constructive ideas for a better way to handle the problem?

## Electric Car Prototype Unveiled

A small, three passenger prototype electronic automobile which is shaped something like an arrowhead, has been unveiled by co-producers, the American Motors Corp. and Gulton Industries of Metuchen, N.J.

The joint makers of the much touted vehicle claim that it will have a cruising speed of 50 miles an hour and a range of 150 miles without recharging.

An operational model of the car, called the "Amtron" will be road tested within a year, said Roy D. Chapin Jr., board chairman of AMC. It has a newly developed long life Gulton lithium battery system.

"THIS JOINT project is the result of the development of this new power system. It could eliminate many problems which to this point have made electric-type cars impractical," Chapin said.

Dr. Leslie K. Gulton, president of Gulton Industries, said, "for the first time in a half century, the gasoline-burning automobile is about to share their road with an electrically powered car whose performance needs no apologies."

"We make no claim that the forthcoming electronic vehicle is about to put conventional cars out of business. What we do say is that we have made considerable strides toward the creation of an electronic car with characteristics far superior to any that have thus far been seen," he said.

THE NEW lithium-nickel fluoride battery system is lighter than batteries used in other experimental cars, Gulton said.

Ford and General Motors recently showed electric car projects on which they are experimenting.

The system has two lithium units, each weighing 75 pounds. Each is 13 inches wide, 12-1/2 inches high and 23-1/2 inches long.

He said batteries made from lithium, the world's lightest metal, can store 10 times as much energy as conventional lead-acid batteries of the same size.

He explained the electronic system also includes two 25-pound bipolar batteries of nickel cadmium and a solid state control system. Each bipolar unit is 18 inches long, 10 inches high, and 2-1/2 inches thick.

THE LITHIUM battery is rated at 150 watt-hours per pound and is designed to provide cruising at moderate output. Gulton said the bipolar units have a rapid energy output which is expected to provide acceleration from zero to 50 mph in 20 seconds.

The system provides for the recharging of the bipolar units from the lithium batteries while the car is cruising.

Gulton said the complete system can be fully recharged about 1,000 times over a period of three years. The batteries can be recharged in four hours.

The capacity to drive about 20 miles can be recharged in 30 minutes on ordinary house current or in 10 minutes with a special outlet, he said.

The prototype has an over-all length of 85 inches, a width of 69-1/2 inches and a height of 46 inches. It has a wheelbase of 60 inches and a tread of 50 inches. It has eight-inch wheels.

## WSU Library Course Open In Southfield

Beginning in the winter quarter, Wayne State University's department of library science will initiate courses at the Southfield campus in the 11 Mile Rd.-Franklin Rd. area.

Although the deadline has passed for admission to graduate school for the winter quarter, it is possible for students to register for the course as extension students and transfer credits after they have been admitted to the degree program.

The first course to be offered will be the required course in introduction to librarianship, carrying four credits.

Genevieve Casey, associate professor, will teach this course from 9:30-11:20 a.m. Mondays and Wednesdays.

Depending on response to the course, WSU will offer additional courses in subsequent quarters.

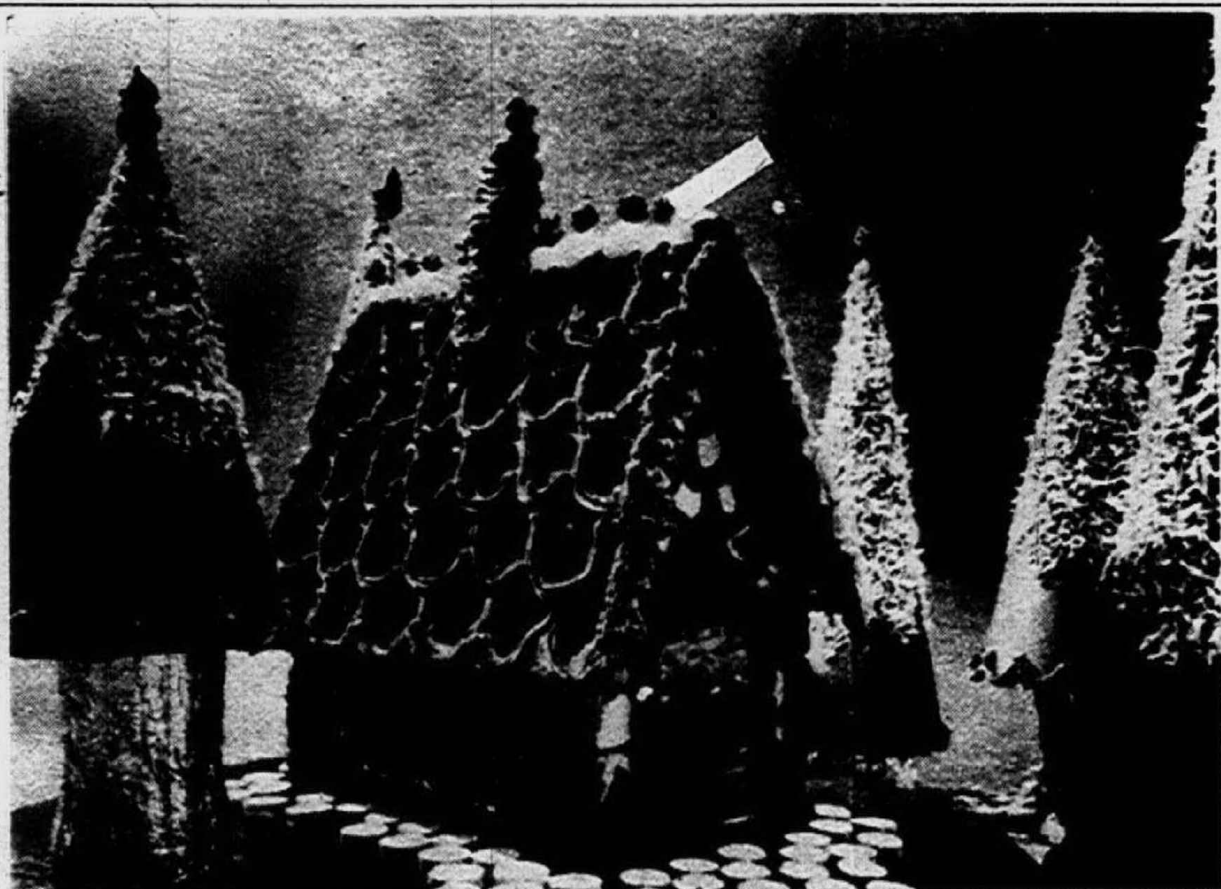

## Home Builders Hear Teddy On 'New Town' Idea

Several home builders from the suburban Detroit area were in the audience last week when Sen. Edward (Ted) Kennedy urged attention to the "new town" concept.

Kennedy, D-Mass., addressed them at a convention of the National Association of Home Builders in Chicago. In the closing section of his speech, Kennedy turned to the problems of suburban growth, saying:

"Rebuilding our center cities is not enough. We must also guarantee that the inevitable growth of our outlying areas meets high and modern standards."

"The new town concept is key to any sound growth pat-

tern. I do not suggest, by using the term 'new town,' that the English or Swedish or Russian experience should prevail. For if American history has any lesson, it is that flexibility and diversity are the key-stone to advance."

"We do have 'new communities' in the Federal Housing legislation Title X. This section offers mortgage insurance for certain specified costs in suburban land development."

"We cannot meet the pressures of our future growth without concerning ourselves with the suburbs. We need new forms of investment guarantees; we need new definitions of allowable costs; we need new forms of incentive to developers."

# Civil Service Asks Big State Pay Hike In '68

A \$20.5 million pay hike for 41,000 state classified employees has been approved by the State Civil Service Commission.

The proposal will be sent to the governor for inclusion in his 1968-69 budget recommendations. The commission staff recommended \$19 million in pay raises and a five per cent differential for lower level employees which would cost another \$1.5 million.

The average increase is 6.3 per cent and would mean \$390 more a year for the average worker.

THE NEW HIKES are in addition to \$21 million in salary increases and fringe benefits approved by the commission last year.

State employee organizations protested the plan at a public hearing and asked for across-the-board pay hikes instead of percentage increases as a means of beefing up the pay rates at the lower job levels. The commission adopted the staff recommendations generally as they were proposed, but backed off on one proposal to eliminate Veterans' Day as a paid state employee holiday. Instead, the commission voted to retain Veterans' Day as is and add two additional personal leave days for state employees. The time could be used for voting, attending religious services on such observances as Good Friday and other needs.

THE INEQUITIES will be broadened by percentage increases rather than be bridged by an across-the-board increase," said Roy Babb, president of the Michigan State Employees Association, which represents some 17,000 state workers.

The association also called for elimination of the two lowest classifications in state civil service. Instead it proposed a base salary of \$4,800, or \$2.25 an hour.

Increases of from 30 to 40 cents an hour for other classes, with the lower level workers getting the highest raise, also were asked by the association. The group further said the state was ignoring its request for increased fringe benefits, such as full payment of hospitalization and life insurance and 100 per cent payment of sick leave upon death or retirement.

Babb said the lowest paid state employees "are almost in a spot where they could qualify for the poverty program."

THE MICHIGAN State Employees Union, representing some 8,000 state workers, asked for a 25 cent an hour across-the-board increase for all hourly-paid workers.

Robert Grosvenor, union president, also objected that the proposed scale did not take into account new wage patterns being set by settlements in the auto industry.

Franklin K. DeWald, state personnel director, said the proposal would increase the median state pay rate from \$6,452 to \$6,890. He said the adjustments approved generally range between 5 and 8 per cent for 37,000 state employees.

DeWald said the proposal, in fact, advocates widely varying percentage increases, some of the largest applying to the lower classifications.

Increases for 4,000 other state employees would range from 8 to 17 per cent.

LARGEST PERCENTAGE increases of from 9 to 17 per cent would go to about 100 specialized classes including account clerks, boys' supervisors, graduate nurses, some biologists, naturalists, foresters and some positions in higher education.

The shift differential would pay a 5 per cent premium to employees who work afternoon and night shifts in various state jobs where these employees currently get the same hourly rate as daytime workers.

DeWald cited as examples a 10 per cent hike for account clerks and 15 per cent for boys' supervisors in state training schools.

ANY ATTEMPT to give the lower classifications an across-the-board increase at the expense of taking the money from higher positions would be impractical and would not even begin to provide sufficient money to give the lower classifications a substantial raise, he said.

The director said the pay proposals are "based on factors which include a detailed comparison with our pay rates in specific classes covering more than half of all state workers with other public and private employers."

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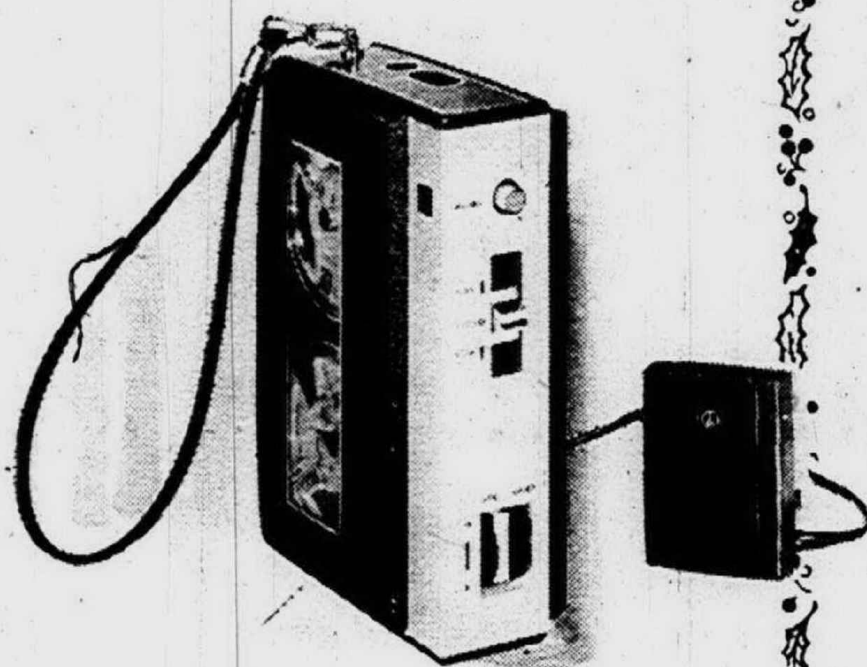
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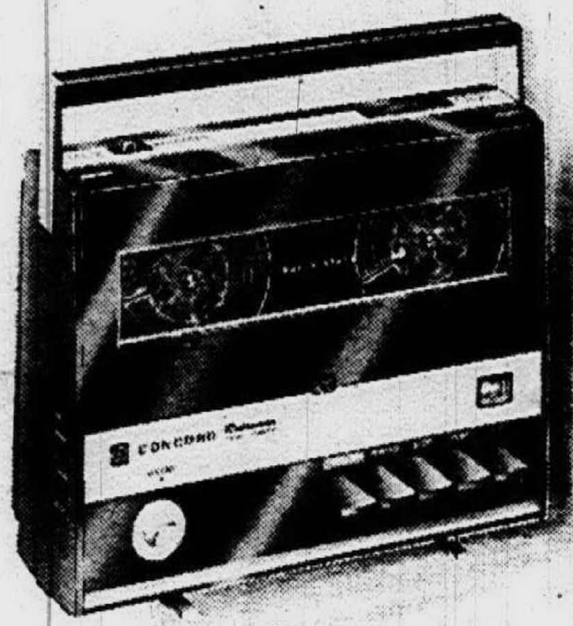


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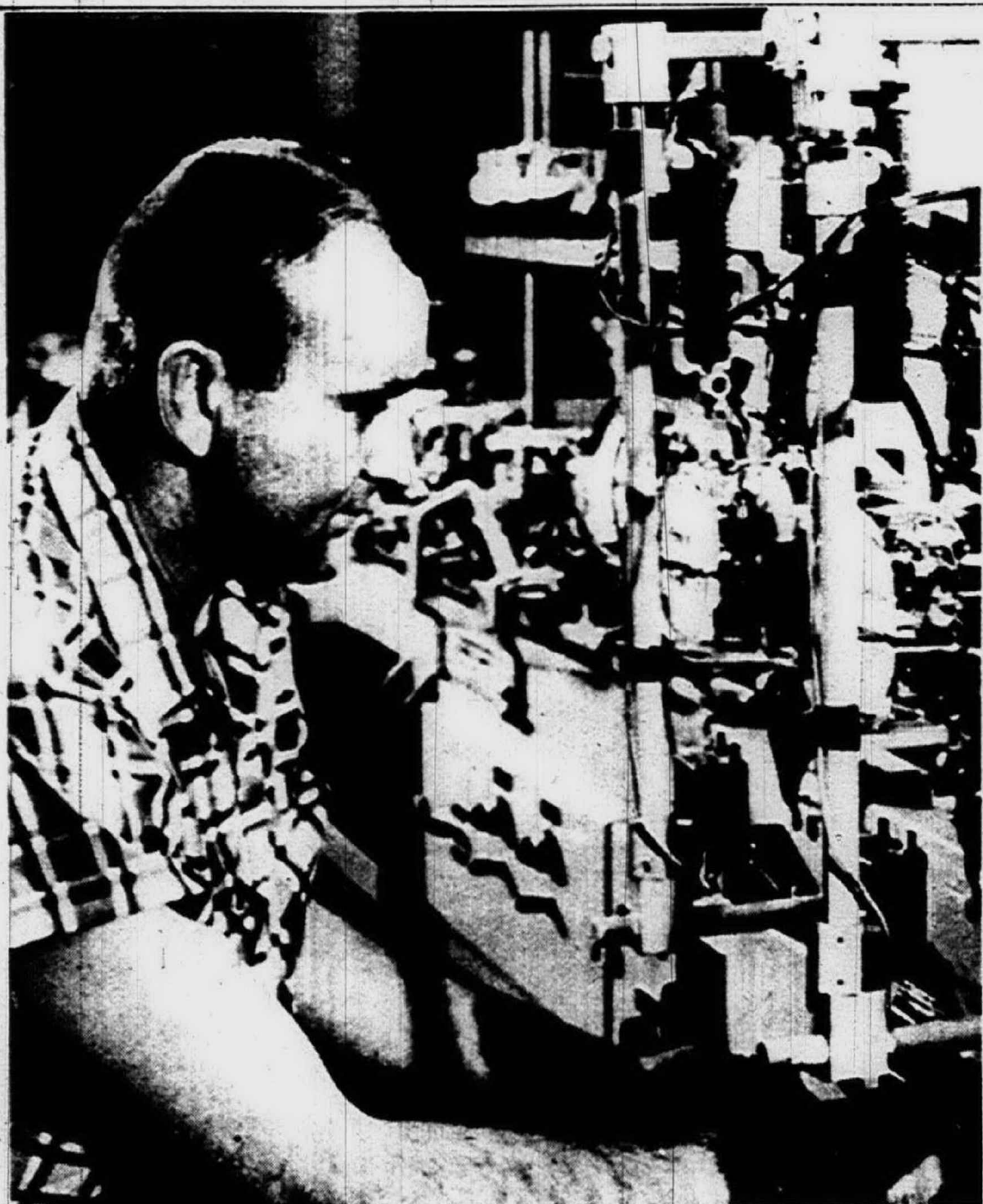

## Dow Fears Protests Scare Off Creative Men

Dow Chemical Company college campus recruiters have been the object of numerous student protests.

The protesters, in most instances, blame Dow, which is the only manufacturer of napalm-B, a substance used in liquid firebombs, for the deaths of women and children in Vietnam.

IN A COPYRIGHTED article from the New York Times News Service, Anthony Ripley, tells of the long Dow family history and the woes of the company founder's grandson, H.D. (Ted) Doan.

Ripley said, "Doan, 45 years old, is president of the company and is aware of all the family history. It is this that troubles him most about the napalm demonstrations against his company."

"The company has not been hurt by the demonstrations. But what troubles Doan is that the truly creative man may be frightened away from Dow or may go to another company which doesn't make napalm."

## McNamara Reassures Dow Co.

In a letter of reassurance to Dow Chemical Co., Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara said that demonstrators who protest the company campus recruiter's presence are misdirecting their efforts.

McNamara wrote the letter to Dow's President Herbert D. Doan and said, "These are matters of military policy and foreign policy over which private industry has no control."

Commenting on protests against Dow supplying napalm to the Defense Department, McNamara pointed out that the company's sales of napalm constitute less than one half of one per cent of its total sales.

DOW EMPLOYMENT recruiters have been the target of pickets and protest demonstrations on various campuses around the nation. The company has acknowledged that the activity has hurt its image.

In his letter, McNamara said, "The implication that napalm is used indiscriminately in Vietnam is not true."

The defense chief added that Gen. Earle G. Wheeler, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, has said publicly that napalm is a military necessity, answering a specific military need in certain combat situations peculiar to the type of warfare practiced by the Viet Cong.

"GENERAL WHEELER has also pointed out," McNamara wrote, "that the precautions we take against injury by this weapon to noncombatants are as painstaking as we can make them without hamstringing our military operations."

RIPLEY CONTINUED, "Doan said the company could be hurt most by the demonstrations 'if we miss the one guy who is going to invent the great thing for Dow in the future.'"

"Doan himself does not fit the usual pattern for the executive of one of the nation's large corporations. In a sports jacket, blue button-down oxford cloth shirt and dark tie, the short, slim president drank black coffee in his small, unpretentious office as he talked to a reporter and a company public relations man who called him Ted."

The New York Times Reporter wrote, Doan "firmly believes the company's stated position on napalm: 'The United States is involved in Vietnam, and as long as we are involved we believe in fulfilling our responsibility to this national commitment of a democratic society. And we do this because we believe in the long range goals of our country.'"

"We respect the right of people to protest peacefully against any action with which they disagree. However, our company has made the decision to continue to produce napalm and other materials as long as they are needed by our government."

RIPLEY COMMENTED, "During the 1966-67 school year, Dow recruiters seeking new employees at just over 300 colleges were the target of 500 demonstrations. Since September, there have been 46 demonstrations as Dow recruiters have appeared at 178 colleges."

"Last year, the company received 24,000 employment applications, held 11,000 campus interviews and hired 1,300 new employees."

"The company received an estimated total of 200 letters in November on the subject of

napalm, a majority of them protesting its manufacture."

"I don't think anybody has left the company because of it," Doan said. "Most of our employees support it. I've had letters from two or three employees against it but I am not aware of anyone who has left."

## Trinidad Gets Road Loan

PORT OF SPAIN--The World Bank has granted an \$8.6 million loan to the government of Trinidad and Tobago to improve the north-south road that connects the two most important centers on the Island of Trinidad: Port of Spain, the capital, and San Fernando, the No. 2 city.

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## P-DPlans Addition To Lab

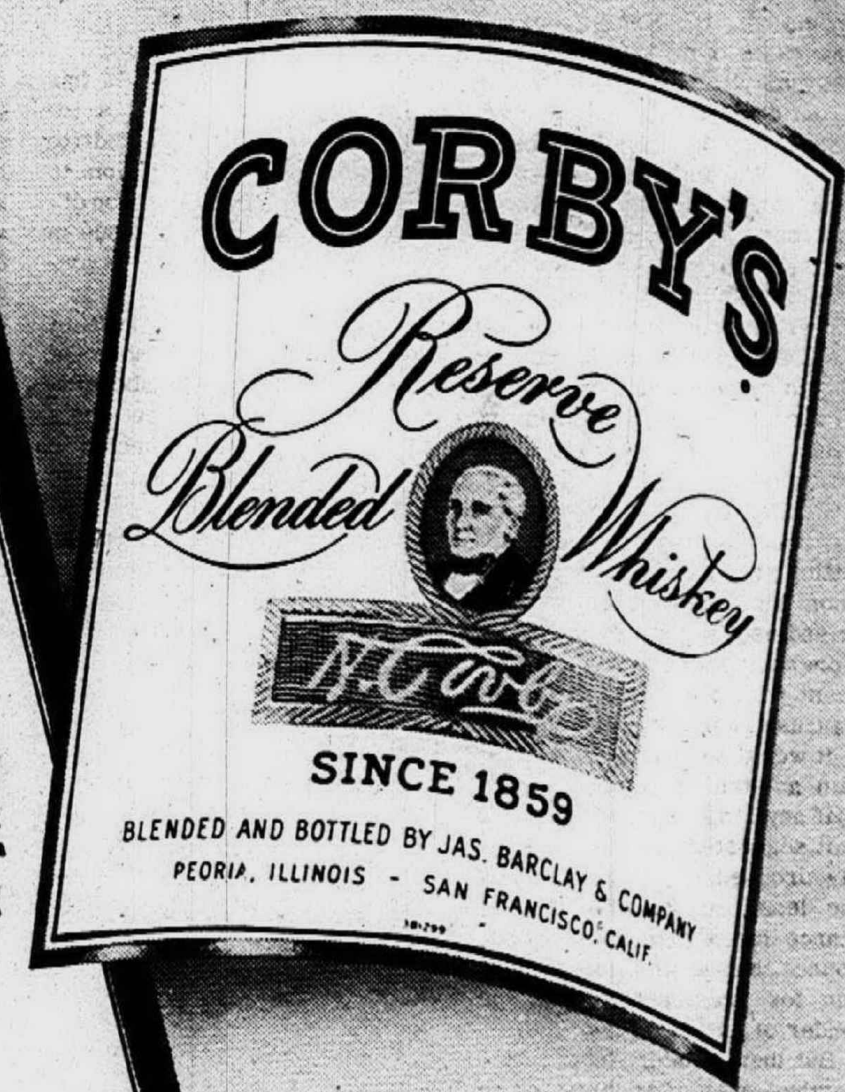
ANN ARBOR — Parke, Davis & Company has announced a \$1 million addition to its research-administration building here that will provide 22,000 more square feet of laboratory and office space for the drug firm's departments of clinical investigation and research information.

Included in the two-story project will be space for medical personnel offices, laboratories, an area for the future installation of computer equipment, and a section that will be used for handling chemical and biological records.

In all, the construction will add another 126 feet in length to the existing front of the research-administration building, bringing its total length to 378 feet. Both old and new sections will be 84 feet wide.

Henry W. Grubb, Parke-Davis' superintendent of construction engineering, says he expects construction to begin immediately.

Enlargement of the research-administration building brings to about \$17 million the total investment in five separate structures at the Parke-Davis complex on Plymouth Road since it was opened here in 1960.



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# McCarthy Still Perplexes Pros

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Comment on the American political scene appearing in English newspapers is often more objective and analytic than much writing in our own country. This article, written by the London Observer's Washington correspondent, Anthony Howard, explores the inner workings of Sen. Eugene McCarthy, who has now emerged as a Democratic challenger to President Johnson for the Democratic nomination. It should be noted that the London Observer, although similar in name to this newspaper, is not affiliated with it.)

WASHINGTON—Last Thursday morning, wearing a loose-fitting grey suit and a quiet maroon tie, the currently most friendly figure in the U. S. Congress appeared by appointment with the press in the old caucus room of the Senate.

It would be wrong to describe him as striding in purposefully—if anything, indeed, his whole gait suggested that he had simply dropped by. It was, to say the least, an improbably entrance for a man about to announce that he was proposing to run for president against the leader of his own party.

But then Senator Eugene McCarthy—even after 20 years on Capitol Hill—is still an improbable politician. The professionals have never known quite what to make of him. More than any other member of the House or the Senate he has always been his own man.

That is as obvious in his private life as in his public career. There are probably not many Senators' homes in Washington where you find on your way upstairs two chairs with a guitar strung across them blocking our way ("it's all right," you're told cheerfully afterwards, "it's only to keep the dog from coming down").

NOR, FOR THAT matter, can there be many leading political figures in America who—regardless of the threat to their own careers—insist on going to stand on the sidelines of mass peace demonstrations if only to make sure that an 18-year-old daughter comes to no harm.

Gene McCarthy, of course, comes from Minnesota—and that is probably half the secret. He belongs to what America's best television commentator, Eric Sevareid, has called "that cold weather stretch of political contrariness reaching from Wisconsin to Montana where something in the soil or barometric pressure has always produced rebels."

McCarthy's own claim to being a maverick is, if anything, re-inforced by the fact that he is the first Catholic—though a very different one from the East Coast Irish or Italian variety—to be elected to state-

wide office in predominantly Protestant Minnesota in over one hundred years.

ALL THIS, NO doubt, has something to do with his (to many people) reckless and (to others) romantic decision to challenge President Johnson directly on the Vietnam issue in at least four of next year's primaries.

Initially, if only because of his reputation for detachment and diffidence, he was about the last person whom the dump Johnson Democrats expected to emerge as their champion: in fact when a group of professional liberals were shopping 'round for a candidate last September they did not even bother to go and see the senior Senator from Minnesota.

But, quietly and unostentatiously, McCarthy had nonetheless been making up his mind. He says today that the decision to run was really made for him by Dean Rusk's performance at a press conference on October 12—when the Secretary of State suddenly presented a new justification for the Vietnam War in terms of the peril of there being within a decade "a billion Chinese armed with nuclear weapons on the mainland of Asia."

"There comes a moment," McCarthy explained over a lunch-table a week or two later "when you just can't let people be denied a voice in Democracy any longer. Some had to say you've gone too far. Some had to stand up against them."

IT IS VERY much in the pattern of McCarthy's political history—and indeed in his youthful background as a postulant in a Benedictine seminary—that he should eventually have decided that he had no alternative but to be that "someone" himself.

One of the least noticed aspects of his 20-year career in American politics is his readiness to take risks that would make most conventional politicians shudder.

He did exactly that when, as a House member with 10 years' seniority, he gambled his whole political future by successfully taking on an establishment-backed rival Senate nominee in a Democratic primary and then going on to dislodge an entrenched and popular incumbent Republican.

The odds this time admittedly are a great deal heavier—a fact that McCarthy publicly recognizes in a way that journalists find irresistible and politicians infuriating.

"I think," he will say with a mocking half-smile "that I should acknowledge that the President probably is the leading candidate for the Democratic nomination in 1968 right

now."

IN FACT, THE challenge that McCarthy presents to Johnson is not just one of policies; at least equally it is one of personality. Both his enemies and his friends agree that "Gene just doesn't give a damn"—and it is precisely this care-free quality that makes him a much more serious personal threat to LBJ than a routine cautious, calculating politician could ever be.

"You know," a Senate colleague said to him the other day, "What I can't forgive you for, Gene? It's when you discuss these serious matters—and then give that twinkle in your eye as if to suggest that we'll all have a good laugh about it afterwards."

THE SENATE colleague, it's fair to say, was every inch a

politician; but McCarthy is as much aware as anyone that one of the things he will have to live down is his reputation for irresponsibility and flippancy—for being the type of politician who prefers to stand at the back of the Senate chambers whispering bonnets and aphorisms rather than taking part in the real battle going on on the floor.

But what can be a liability in a legislator can easily be an attraction in a candidate. Certainly, all those who heard Gene McCarthy announce his candidature and deal with superb aplomb with the questions afterwards were in no doubt that there had suddenly emerged on the American political scene the wittiest and most literate political figure since the early days of Adlai Stevenson.

Stevenson, though, eventually became no more than a martyr

for another man's triumph—and the most informed estimate remains that that is the best McCarthy can hope for. But, again, what totally defeats other politicians is that he appears genuinely not to mind.

Would he, he was asked the other day, if the cards fell out that way, stand aside and make way for Bobby Kennedy as Johnson's challenger in 1968.

"WELL," HE SAID, this time grinning broadly, "I don't know about stepping aside—it might not be quite as voluntary as that—though I want to make it clear that I don't necessarily see that as a great disaster." (In private, he had already told Kennedy that if he should feel compelled eventually to make a move and take the whole thing over "then that's perfectly alright with me.")

The romanticism is indeed

throughout balanced by realism—a realism that can show itself in surprising, and, to some of his new farout admirers, probably disconcerting ways. McCarthy, for example, has no hesitation in branding the Vietnam war "politically indefensible and morally unacceptable." But that does not mean that he is prepared to argue for a unilateral withdrawal forthwith or even an immediate stopping of all the bombing especially on supply routes.

He was strongly in favor of not resuming the bombing after the 37-day pause in January, 1966—as he thought then there was a genuine chance for negotiations; he was nothing like so concerned about prolonging the brief Christmas bombing pause a year later as he was certain at that time that there was no hope of getting peace.

It is this type of sophistica-

tion that threatens to make the administration's only-too-apparent effort to pin upon him the label of being "a peace at any price" candidate a difficult feat to bring off—the more so as McCarthy has already rather cheekily accused LBJ of being "precipitate" in giving his Manila promise to pull all American troops out of Vietnam six months after any negotiations were concluded.

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# This Is Carefree Cookery

The day of the casserole is here. No longer is the casserole confined to a hurried, last-minute family meal. The casserole, in any of its many decorative serving dishes, now graces the most formal table. Casserole cookery goes further back into history than most people realize. The first method of cooking was probably nothing more complicated than burying meat in live coals. As man became more civilized over the centuries, he invented woven reed baskets in which to cook his food. The first one-dish meal was probably prepared by cooking meat and wild vegetables or roots together in a skin or reed basket. The American Indians of the Southwest still make waterproof baskets of this kind. Later the hunter's spoils were tossed into a big pot on the fire to simmer into edibility. The word "casserole" means "little pot".

CASSEROLES probably came into being because a thrifty cook couldn't bear to throw away a bone with pieces of meat still clinging to it or a lone vegetable. The virtues of the casserole are many. Some require long hours of cooking but require little attention during the process. Many can be made one day, refrigerated or frozen and served later.

**CHILI PIE CASSEROLE**  
3 c. corn chips  
1 large onion chopped  
1 can chili, heated  
1 c. grated Cheddar cheese  
Place 2 cups of corn chips in a 2-quart baking dish. Arrange onion and half the cheese on top. Pour chili over onion and cheese. Top with remaining corn chips and cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes. NOTE: All of cheese may be used as topping. Yield: 4-6 servings.

**CHOW MEIN CASSEROLE**  
1 lb. hamburger  
2 medium onions, chopped  
1 can cream of chicken soup  
1 can cream of mushroom soup  
1/2 c. rice  
1/4 t. pepper  
1 T. soy sauce  
1 1/2 c. warm water  
1 can chow mein noodles  
Brown meat; drain off fat. Add remaining ingredients except noodles. Pour into 2 1/2-quart casserole. Cover. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Top with noodles; bake uncovered for 15 minutes. Yield: 4 servings.

**LEFT-OVER TURKEY CASSEROLE**  
3 T. butter  
1 T. flour  
1 c. chicken or turkey stock  
3 T. sherry wine  
Nutmeg  
Salt and pepper  
Milk  
1 c. light cream, scalded  
1 c. mushrooms, thinly sliced  
3 egg yolks, beaten  
1 t. onion juice  
1 T. green pepper, finely chopped  
3 c. turkey, diced

Heat butter and stir in the flour until mixture is bubbling, but not brown; gradually add stock and sherry. Cook for 3 minutes; season with a pinch of nutmeg, salt and pepper to taste. Bring the sauce to a boil; stir in the cream. Stirring occasionally, bring the sauce to a boil again and add the mushrooms cooked in butter. Add a little cold milk to the egg yolks; add to sauce slowly, stirring briskly. Add onion juice, green pepper and the turkey. Taste for seasoning. This mixture may be served on Chinese noodles or rice, or it may be divided into 6 individual casseroles or 1 large casserole. If served in a casserole, sprinkle top with fine bread crumbs and grated cheese. Dot with butter. Put the casseroles on a baking sheet and brown under the broiler or in a moderate oven. Serve bubbling hot. Yield: 6-8 servings.

# Ford President Urges 'Negative Income Tax'

NEW YORK -- The president of Ford Motor Company has urged adoption of a "negative income tax" to help solve the nation's poverty problem.

Arjay Miller said that of all the country's social problems demanding attention, the most basic is the elimination of poverty.

"It is from poverty that many other social ills spring," Miller said, "and any successful effort to eliminate or greatly reduce this malignant growth could bring about dramatic improvement in the general health of our society...."

"I believe, strongly that it is now time for us to take a 'total approach' that would reach all of the poor and not just certain segments," he said. "What I have in mind would include both direct income assistance to those in need and measures to increase employment of the disadvantaged."

MILLER SAID A satisfactory income assistance plan should:

1. Preserve incentives to

those able to work to get jobs and increase their earnings as rapidly as possible.

2. Be efficient in getting money to those in need only, without favoring some and ignoring others.

3. Be relatively simple to administer.

"In my opinion," he asserted, "the proposal that meets these requirements best is one called the 'negative income tax.'"

"Under this plan, a family with zero income would receive a basic allowance related to the size and composition of the family unit. When a member of a family began to earn income, the basic allowance would automatically be reduced by an offsetting tax, but not by a corresponding amount.

"Thus, a family with a member at work would always be better off than a family without anyone at work, in contrast to present situations where every dollar increase in earned income is entirely offset by withdrawal of a dollar in welfare payments.

# 'Reform Welfare At U.S. Level'

The present welfare system must be modified at the federal level if it is to provide adequate assistance for the nation's needy, Dr. Fidele F. Fauri told members of the American Public Welfare Association last week.

Fauri, president of the APWA and dean of the University of Michigan School of Social Work, spoke at the association's biennial Round Table Conference in Washington.

He took issue with backers of such proposals as "guaranteed annual income" or the "negative income tax," which, they say, will eliminate the need for a public welfare system.

Advocates fail to mention the extremely high costs of such programs if the payments are to meet "even the average inadequate public assistance payments of today," he said.

FAURI PROPOSED modifications in the present system as recently recommended by the Advisory Council on Public Welfare:

- Establish a national minimum standard for public assistance payments.
- Set up a more realistic plan for financing public welfare programs.
- Provide comprehensive assistance and service based on one imperative of eligibility --need--and make this a legally enforceable right.
- This would provide a new method of federal-state cooperation, with the federal government responsible for implementing the minimum standards by financing all welfare costs over and above objectively determined state shares, he noted.

"SOME 30 YEARS of leaving the implementation of public welfare programs largely to the fiscal ability and willingness of the states has not worked," Fauri declared.

The recommendations would correct present variations among states in financial assistance levels and broadness of coverage. At present, he said, payments to needy individuals often depend upon where they live instead of how badly they need help.

Fauri called a Social Security Act amendments bill, currently under House discussion, a "movement in the right direction." One area of the bill, as revised by the Senate, calls for a 15 per cent across-the-board increase in Old Age Survivors and Disability Insurance (OASDI) benefits and a minimum \$70 per month retired worker benefit.

This would eventually remove 200,000 aged from public aid rolls, he estimated.

Fauri said OASDI should also provide greater protection for low-wage and frequently unemployed workers. Of the 15 million jobs not covered by OASDI, many are low-wage seasonal or part-time jobs.

In Russia, Christ was officially plucked out of Christmas 50 years ago, and not until 20 years later did the inner circle allow a Russified Santa Claus, his reindeer, his sackful of toys and his tinsel fir tree to return to the Eurasian countryside.

Therefore, if you follow the party line, you will do as most Soviet citizens and observe the holiday on New Year's Day, however, the choice of your Russian Christmas falling on Dec. 25 or Jan. 7 is still open to you.

TO THE OVERWHELMING majority of Russians Dec. 25 stacks up as just another blue Monday.

The Russian Orthodox Christmas falls 13 days later, on Jan. 7, because the Moscow Patriarchate followed the Julian calendar through 1917 rather than the Gregorian calendar used in the West. But Jan. 7 will be just an ordinary Sunday to the average Soviet citizen.

The Ivan in the street will center his mid-winter merriment on Jan. 1. He will wish his fellow citizen "Happy New Year"—with no thought of a "Merry Christmas" and send New Year rather than Christmas cards.

AND THE LIGHTS, colored glass balls, wreaths and silvery stars which festoon downtown Moscow and its jammed toy stores are called "New Year's decorations" for shoppers who are busily buying "New Year's presents."

Kindergarten teachers tell bad little boys that they better

behave or Ded Moroz (Grandfather Frost) won't bring them any presents on New Year's Day.

Never mind that Ded Moroz has a long white beard and a fur-trimmed suit. This Soviet Santa Claus is adapted from a character out of Russian folklore which predates the West's Santa Claus by several centuries.

School closes down from Jan. 1 through Jan. 10. The state organizes dozens of massive parties for tens of thousands of toddlers and grade schoolers with men garbed as Ded Moroz to hand out gifts to each tiny guest—for a fee paid by his parents.

GOVERNMENT offices, industrial enterprises and every one else not involved in vital services shuts up shop on Jan. 1 and 2.

This is when children open their presents at home and adults drink, usually too much, of the vodka and champagne they laid in for the holiday season.

It's just like Christmas anywhere except for the date—and the lack of religious involvement.

This comes earlier, and later, for a tiny minority.

On Dec. 25 Roman Catholics, Lutherans and several thousand foreign diplomats and journalists resident in Moscow celebrate Christmas with church services and "New Year's" with fir trees (yolka) which hit the market about Dec. 20.

MOSCOW'S CATHOLICS attend services at the Church of St. Louis de France, established by French businessmen before the revolution and since handed over to the Polish Catholics.

Foreigners attend religious services in private apartments made over as miniature chapels or in embassy meeting rooms. American diplomats even treat themselves to dinners of turkey and cranberry sauce shipped in by the embassy.

But, the biggest religious celebrations don't begin until Jan. 6, the eve of the Orthodox Christmas.

They are frequently characterized by outbursts in the official Soviet press. These outbursts don't hail the Savior's birth. Frequently they doubt it ever took place.

They have said in the past that "there is no Christ. Those who have lost faith in themselves are inclined to pin their faith on a non-existent God."

"When I look at the skies I don't see Jesus Christ there but Yuri Gagarin" (the world's first cosmonaut, a Russian.) Despite these attacks large numbers of older people, mostly women, turn out for services beginning at 11 p.m. Jan. 6.

# Bar Objects To Highway Hearing By Appellate Court

The Michigan State Bar Association, in a legal brief filed by the bar's criminal jurisprudence committee, advised the State Supreme Court to rule "hands off" on any grand jury probe of the Highway Department by the Appeals Court.

Responding to the request of the high court the bar claimed the appellate court has no jurisdiction to perform the "inquisitor" role.

Gov. George Romney had asked the Supreme Court to decide if the appeals court could conduct a grand jury investigation into alleged wrongdoing in the road department.

THE REQUEST was made to clear up questions which might furnish grounds for challenge of any indictments issued in what could be the first grand jury in the young court's history.

Last month, the high court said it would consider the request but asked for advice from the state bar committee.

That committee now has voted unanimously against any appellate court grand jury. It suggests a circuit court probe instead.

"OBVIOUSLY, the original one-man grand jury act was amended to provide for the conduct of such investigation by a circuit court, 'a court of law and of record' . . .," says the brief.

Michigan's appellate court was set up as a "conservator

of the peace" under the 1963 constitution which "never possessed inquisitorial powers comparable to those exercised by one-man grand jurors" under present state law, says the brief.

Traditionally, all one-man grand jury investigations have been held by justices of the peace, police courts or circuit judges, said the brief which adds "the court of appeals is not the court of law and record" referred to in the present grand jury act.

CIRCUIT COURTS have conducted grand jury investigations since the last amendment to the act, says the brief. No reference is made to the appellate court in the act because no changes have been made in the law since the appeals court was formed.

If the legislature had wanted the Appeals Court to hold the "inquisitorial function" the present one-man grand jury act would have been amended or the law forming the court would have provided for it, says the brief.

"The exercise of such original jurisdiction by this court (the Supreme Court) or the court of appeals is expressly prohibited in the constitution itself," adds the brief.

THE STATE BAR committee said it would be "dubious due process" of law for an appellate court judge to hand out an indictment because his finding could "seriously affect" presumption of innocence and impartiality of both judge and jury in a trial.

An Appeals Court should be "above the battle and political strife" and shouldn't play the grand jury role, said the brief. Giving the appellate court grand jury powers would "further compound the confusion" created by recent U.S. Supreme Court decisions, the brief states.

Appellate jurisdiction of high courts would become meaningless if both courts were involved in grand jury investigations, said the committee.

"Even a relatively dull imagination can conceive of circumstances in which both the Court of Appeals and the Supreme Court would be disqualified because of prior inquisitorial service. . .," said the brief.

THE SUPREME Court has given Atty. Gen. Frank J. Kelley and others interest in the case until Friday to file briefs. Deputy Atty. Gen. Leon S. Cohan said a brief will be filed early this week.

Union, plans to question the scope of any grand jury probe.

If normal procedures are followed, one of the eight justices then would prepare a written opinion on the question of appeals court jurisdiction. That opinion would be discussed during a conference session, probably in January.

The other justices then might write opinions with conferences continuing until a final decision.

# U.S. Big Backer Of Research

The University of Michigan spent nearly \$60 million on research last year, with more than three-quarters of it coming from the federal government.

Some 30 per cent was provided by defense agencies, but this proportion has declined as federally-sponsored research has expanded in other fields.

After the defense establishment came the Health-Education-Welfare Department. It spent \$15.7 million at the U. of M., most of it through the biomedical programs of the Na-

tional Institutes of Health.

THESE FACTS came in a summary for the 1966-67 fiscal year from Geoffrey Norman, U-M's vice president for research.

Altogether, the federal government contributed \$45.8 million, or 77 per cent of the total.

The university itself provided another \$5.6 million. The final \$8.5-plus million came from industry, foundations, health organizations and other sources.

Norman said it isn't true that the federal government pro-

vides "undesigned" funds that the university may use as it pleases. All federal funds must be justified in terms of their contributions to the sponsoring agency's goals.

"The university per se does not perform research. Rather it is the individual faculty members or groups thereof that develop projects which find support from sponsors."

HE NOTED THAT more than 3,700 students, about equally divided between graduates and undergraduates, took part in the projects active in the past year.

Funds for research purposes are primarily awarded on a competitive basis. Norman pointed out that the evident success which U-M faculty members have in obtaining financial support for their research projects is a recognition of their competence, stature, and performance.

"The dollars received in support of research are of great importance to the university in maintaining those scholarly activities which contribute to its recognition as a leading institution in graduate training in so many fields of learning."



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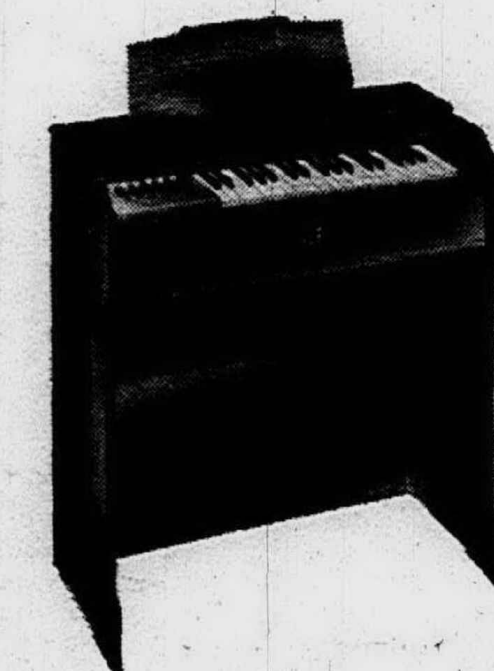
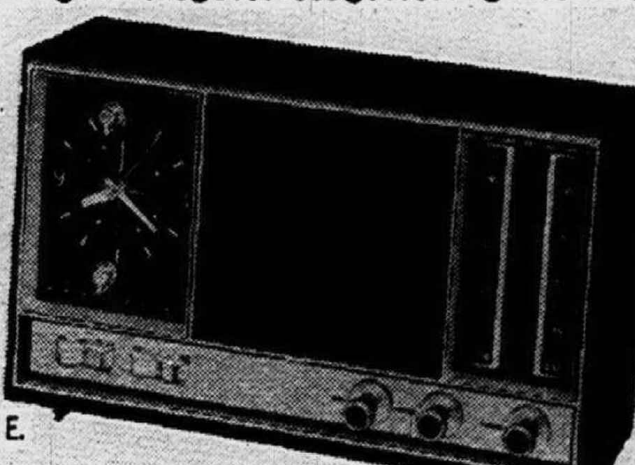
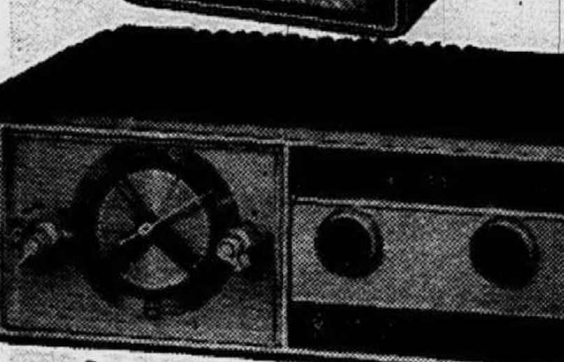
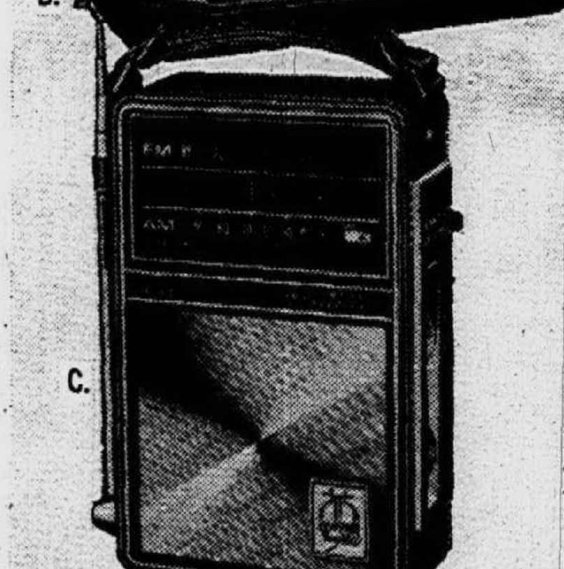

## Home Noises Cause Sickness

Noises commonly found in most every house and which almost everyone take for granted have been discovered to have an adverse effect on the emotional health of the family.

Sounds generated by ventilator fans and labor saving devices are marked as the culprits by Dr. Lee E. Farr, writing in the "Journal of the American Medical Association."

What Dr. Farr failed to mention, which remains a mystery why, is the adverse effect of screaming children all demanding--in loud voices--their particular desires at the same time.

\*\*\*  
HOWEVER, the Doctor does claim that many modern kitchens have become "miniature simulators of old-fashioned boiler factories."

Ventilating fans (about 84 decibels), dishwashers (69 decibels), garbage disposal units (78-100 decibels), among other pieces of household machinery, create a volume of sound which reverberates off steel or plastic-covered cabinet and working surfaces.

Dr. Farr says that a housewife who prepares a meal to the accompaniment of the "roars, squeaks, whirrs and whines" of the contemporary kitchen cannot leave the room in a relaxed frame of mind.

\*\*\*  
OVER THE PAST 30 years acoustical engineers and architects have been trying to reduce noise in factories, offices and public meeting places. This has led to a steadily observed increase in industrial efficiency and improvement in industrial health.

By contrast, the home has become a noisier place, to the point, Dr. Farr says, where the hearing of the occupants may be impaired. The major harm results, however, from the effect of noise on the emotional state of the members of the family.

\*\*\*  
ONE STANDARD make of vacuum cleaner, for example, may produce 81 decibels at a distance of six feet. The occupants of one household who took part in Dr. Farr's inquiry complained that the hi-fi set was very loud when it produced 80 decibels.

In urban communities, where a high and increasing percentage of families live in apartments or terrace houses, intrusive sounds from neighboring homes can interfere with the individual's well-being. They may prevent him from relaxing, make him furious or limit his time or depth of sleep.

The State Department of Education wants to see a limit set on both the number of community colleges in the state and some control over location of campuses within community college districts.

The department's recommendation was contained in a report to the policy-making State Board of Education.

One board member, Thomas J. Brennan, backed the idea. The existing situation, he said, allows a community college to set up a satellite campus on the border of another county which may want to establish its own district in the near future, thus cutting into the second county's service area.

THE COMMUNITY college position paper is expected to be incorporated into the state master plan for higher education when that document is eventually completed by the state board.

Some other board members said they had reservations about some community colleges developing dormitories on their campuses because this seems to be against the general concept of community colleges serving only localized areas.

THE STATE board expects in the not distant future to adopt a districting plan which would divide the state into specific community college districts so that every geographical area of the state would be served by at least one such college.

It is hoped that in those areas where no such colleges exist, the state will provide initial funding to get one started.



# Record Growth Adds 9 Million Jobs In U.S.

WASHINGTON -- Eighty months of unbroken economic expansion have added nine million jobs to the economy and brought a wide range of other improvements for workers, Secretary of Labor Willard Wirtz has said.

In a speech at a U.S. Information Agency awards ceremony, Wirtz also noted a sharp decline in the unemployment rate, higher wages and improvements in "real" spending power during the period.

HE SAID the country's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate dropped between 1961 and 1967 from almost seven per cent to slightly over four per cent, adding that:

"In 1961, there were three-quarters of a million people in this country who had been out of work for 27 weeks or more. Now, that number is down to 155,000."

"Ninety-eight out of every hundred married men, heads of families, are employed today. For the two who still have trouble finding a job, there

were five in 1961."

THE NATION MOVED this month into the 81st month of uninterrupted economic expansion. The current expansion began in March 1961.

Wirtz also pointed out these dramatic gains for the country's workers during the record expansion:

--The average cash weekly earnings of workers in manufacturing increased by \$28, from \$89 to \$117.

--Although prices have risen, the average weekly pay check today buys 17 per cent more than it did 6-1/2 years ago.

--The "real" purchasing power of all citizens (pay after taxes and adjustment for higher costs) now averages 28 per cent more than it did 6-1/2 years ago.

--The legal minimum wage for most workers covered by the Federal law has increased from \$1 an hour to \$1.40 and will go to \$1.60 next February and more than 10 million additional workers are now covered by the law.

The appointment of Congressman Jack McDonald (R-Mich.) to the new House Republican Task Force on Urban Affairs has been announced by Congressman Charles Goodell (R-NY), chairman of the House GOP Planning and Research Committee.

Goodell said McDonald was named to the new group "because of his outstanding record in urban government."
