State Legislature, however," he said, "it was so watered down that it didn't pass."

"There may be some areas that will oppose it," Vallier went on, "because they won't want to give up any authority. But there will be more benefits from home rule than there will be hardships."

He pointed out that such things as air pollution and water pollution and a good drainage system are beyond the financial reach of most areas and that

they can be controlled only through a county-wide effort.

McEWEN WAS less emphatic than Vallier, claiming that he would favor the recommendation "only if the rights of the local communities are not taken away. In this case, I would be in opposition."

"However," he went on, "if properly administered, county home rule would be beneficial to local communities and the

MRS. B. R. GILBERT

She Is 96 Years Young And Still Being Honored

In 1926 Mrs. B. R. Gilbert of 959 Penniman was president of the Plymouth Women's Club and now, 42 years later, at the club's recent annual benefit it was announced that she will hold an honorary membership in the organization.

Born Lillian Wallace Smith in 1871, Mrs. Gilbert has filled her 96 years of life with teaching, music and an undiminished interest in local and national events.

Her teaching career began many years ago on her father's large land holdings located in Oakland and Livingston counties.

Mrs. Gilbert was the first girl in her family to attend

college and after graduation from Eastern Michigan University, then "Ypsi Normal", she began teaching in the school built by her father on his land to serve the children of his farm hands.

"MY STUDENTS were what you might call a captive audience," Mrs. Gilbert reflects, "but those years were good ones."

When the little schoolhouse stood empty under the summer sun, Mrs. Gilbert would become a student herself and return to the Ypsi campus for the summer courses.

It was during one of these summers that she met Mr.

Gilbert. As owner and manager of a men's clothing store in Ypsilanti he was taking advantage of the school's summer courses in business.

Their marriage in 1897 was blessed with one daughter, Helen, who has followed in mother's footsteps and is a teacher with the Detroit school system.

Mrs. Gilbert holds very strong feelings on the recent teacher strikes and feels that disagreements should be resolved in a manner befitting the profession.

MUSIC is another major interest in Mrs. Gilbert's life and in addition to her love for the piano, she was church organist for many years with churches of New Hudson and South Lyon.

To this day Mrs. Gilbert reads extensively and stays in tune with happenings in Plymouth and around the world. The recent Pueblo-Korean crisis found her intently viewing the UN General Assembly debates.

"What serious and difficult times we are now experiencing," was her concerned observation.

With at least six major wars within her memory and 96 years of interested informed living, Mrs. Gilbert knows better than a great many people the wisdom of her words.

Seniors Invited To Ypsi Party

Plymouth Senior Citizens will be the guests of the Ypsilanti Senior Citizens at the Ypsilanti group's St. Valentine Party, Wednesday, Feb. 14 at 7:30 p.m.

Plymouth's open housing ordinance has been challenged by city voters -- almost 700 of them -- and now is headed toward the polls for final decision.

Commissioner George Hudson, one of the trio that voted against the measure when it was adopted by a 4 to 3 margin on Dec. 4, delivered the petitions to City Clerk Gene Slider late Thursday afternoon and set the wheels in motion for the referendum.

Commissioner Hudson filed 39 petitions, each of which was prepared for 20 names. Not all of them were filled, however, and he estimated that there were more than 700 valid signatures.

UNDER THE LAW 15 percent of the electors who voted for governor at the last state election may challenge the measure. Following this procedure, 520 signatures were necessary.

In filing the petitions Commissioner Hudson explained that he was not representing any one group, but that he had been interested in all of them who were opposing the adoption of the measure.

"At the time we voted," he stated, "I said openly that I was opposed to the measure, claiming that in my opinion it was not needed, and that if it was to be adopted it should be by a vote of the people."

According to Hudson most of the work of gathering signatures was done by Ken Schumacher, who obtained close to 200, and Dean Mardis, who added 125 more.

AS SOON AS the petitions were filed, City Clerk Slider began the task of certifying the signatures.

"This will be a tedious task," he stated, "because every signature must be matched with the voters signatures on the voting registration cards. The addresses also must be checked."

The clerk said that the certification may not be finished in time to be placed on the agenda for the regular Commission meeting Monday night.

He did point out that, should he find a deficiency in the number of signatures, under the law, he is required to notify the petitioners in order that they can have the lists supplemented.

THE PROCEDURE that must be followed now to get the measure on the ballot is a simple one.

to run it--a man who will have authority, who can get things done--and not be just a figure-head."

"By the time we got to the

mission so notified, the city's legislative body has 30 days in which to call an election. And this election must be held within 90 days after the Commission acts.

Even though the petitions have been filed, the ordinance will not be suspended until final action is taken at the polls. The voters who opposed it had

only 30 days in which to file in order to have the ordinance set aside. When that date passed, there was no time schedule.

FILING OF the petitions came as no surprise. It has been known that while there was no organized opposition, as such, solicitors were seeking sig-

natures over weekends at house parties and other types of gatherings.

"I don't think there has been an organized effort by the opposition," City Clerk Slider commented. "At least there was none prior to the adoption of the ordinance -- and I heard of none since."

Commissioner Hudson also

said that the opposition was really organized.

When asked how he came to get possession of the petition, and file them, he stated that he had worked with some of the solicitors and that, inasmuch as he had opposed the ordinance from the start, it was a natural thing for the petition.

Township Steps Up Efforts To Pave Way For Attracting Additional Large Industries

Because of the urgent need for a broader tax base in view of the projected growth of the area, Plymouth Township officials have stepped up their efforts to attract new industry.

The effort for the moment is being centered on the area between Haggerty Road and Canton Center Rd. and from Ann Arbor Rd. to Joy Rd., where condemnation proceedings are

in progress to get the right for installation of drainage sewers.

The stepped-up plans have been under way for the past several weeks, and have been given new emphasis by James Rossman, Superintendent of the Plymouth Community School District, among others. In a meeting 10 days ago the school chief pointed out that the school

district, which includes part of Canton Township, faces financial chaos unless there is a growth in industry.

JOHN E. McEWEN, Plymouth Township Supervisor, let it be known that because of the multiple ownership of the land, and the fact that some estates have yet to be probated, considerable difficulty is being en-

countered in getting to the root of the problem.

"We've been in court for the past two weeks," he said, "on condemnation proceedings. We are making some headway and it is hoped that we can get the matter cleared up by spring."

The little supervisor pointed out some of the difficulty when he said that parcels of the property in the industrial park is owned by the University of California.

Herald Hamill, township engineer, who is working on the project, stated that the work of condemnation oftentimes is a long process, but that further headway is expected when the

The Stroller...



Along about this time each year The Stroller likes to go meandering down Memory Lane—and for a good reason.

It was just little more than four decades ago that he arrived at the Michigan Central station, then a beehive of activity, to continue a journalistic career that had its inception in a little Pennsylvania Dutch town of 3,500 population.

It was a dark, dreary, rainy afternoon such as we have experienced during the past week—but all seemed bright because he was getting a chance to make good on a "big" paper.

Just a few hours after arrival he found his way to the offices of the Detroit Free Press, then near the corner of Lafayette and Griswold. And there, standing in the lobby, was the late Edgar A. Guest, America's beloved poet, waiting to greet him and get him started in the sports department.

It was a happy meeting and the rooting of a solid friendship that lasted until the great poet was called to his reward. There never is a time that The Stroller passes that building, now known as the Transportation Building, that his memory doesn't go back to that dreary afternoon when he was taken, almost by the hand, to the ninth floor and started on a big time sports writing career.

MEMORIES OF FIRST NIGHT

It was with some misgivings that the young lad who never had been away from home one night in his life, until he headed for Detroit, took a place at a desk, along with nine other sports writers. And he never will forget the first night on the job.

In those days—long before regular radio and television—the Free Press printed seven editions daily. The first "morning" paper was on the streets at 7 o'clock in the evening. This was a shock, too, as there was only one edition of the morning paper at home and that really was in the morning. But he learned about metropolitan ways that first night when he saw a fresh edition every hour until 2 o'clock in the morning.

Little did The Stroller realize that night that he was headed for a colorful career—that he would walk with kings and queens of the sports world—that he would mingle with the shady characters of the fight "game" and mix with the elite on the palatial yachts in the Detroit River.

Little did he realize, either, that he would have the thrill of such things as riding with Gar Wood in the famous Miss America when it set the world record of 124.8 miles an hour, or of riding around the Indianapolis race track (then a brick oval) with three time winner, Wilbur Shaw, at 130 miles an hour, or that he would have a part of developing Joe Louis, the "Brown Bomber," into the heavyweight champion of the world.

ROCKNE, DORAIS AND 'OLD MAN' YOST

There was little thought that first afternoon that he would travel with such football coaches as Knute Rockne, "Old Man" Yost, Gus Dorais and Fritz Crisler. Or that he would be part of the baseball troupe when Mickey Cochrane drove the Tigers to the pennant in 1934—their first in 25 years.

Yes, the trip along the sports trail has been wonderful and most exciting. And as The Stroller sits here with his memories he again can see Gene Tunney on the ring floor getting the famous "long count" in his bout with Jack Dempsey in Chicago—he can see the Mighty Babe Ruth circling the bases on those spindly legs after belting the ball out of what was then Navin Field.

No wonder the memories come sifting through the years along about this time.

Drama, color, excitement and fun. They were welded into a fine career that now is being topped off in Plymouth, where there may not be as much excitement or drama, but where there is just as much fun gathering news and sending it along to the public.

DOWNTOWN SIGHTS GHASTLY

Oftentimes it is amazing what you can find if you wander off the main streets and take a good look at what lies just beyond.

At the moment in the downtown area, garbage and trash is piled high, in many places and has been there for more than six weeks.

It matters little that there is an argument on in the offices of the City Commission over the collection.

The health conditions of the city are at stake and something should be done.

STARTING AN ARGUMENT

If you want to start an argument, any time—just for entertainment, ask how many railroad crossings there are in the Plymouth area. Chances are you won't get the right answer.

Time Has Come For People To Yell As Garbage And Trash Piles Mount

While most everyone agrees that garbage and trash disposal is one of the major problems facing the people today—and the Plymouth area is not alone—it is brushed aside and the time now has come for some action to be taken.

For several years it has been like the weather—everyone talks about it, but nobody does anything to help it.

One short trip of only a few blocks in the downtown area of Plymouth would be convincing proof that the problem is being ignored. And what's even worse, the condition is certain to get worse before it gets any better.

During the past six months the City Commission and the contractor for the garbage pickup have been at odds. One blames the other for the condition that could become dangerous from a health standpoint.

Yet, while these factions are arguing and debating over the question of who is right and who is wrong, the trash and garbage piles get bigger and bigger—much to the disgust of the merchants and the townspeople.

In some cases the accumulated trash has been laying in the same location since mid-December. This is bad. It becomes even worse when it is realized that the members of the City administration know about it—and nothing is done.

Some claim the city is at fault because of the manner in which the contract was established. Others claim that the contractor is wrong. Yet, while both sides claim they are working out a solution the rubbish and trash is not collected.

It is a ghastly sight.

THE CHOICE: INCINERATION



Under the terms of the contract, so it has been explained, payment for the pickup is based on the number of water meters. There is a charge of 90 cents for each meter.

Under this plan, the contractor would be asked to pick up the garbage and trash for an entire apartment house, or hotel, or motel,

if there was only one water meter—for a mere 90 cents.

There then enters the argument that the householder—or the businessman is wrong, in that the garbage and trash is not placed at the curb. The contractor will not haul it away unless it is placed at a certain point. This only adds to the argument when the businessmen in the downtown area charge that the pickup schedule is not firm and oftentimes, even if the receptacles are placed out in front, they are not picked up and leave an even more ghastly sight.

These arguments may be fine. But they don't solve the problem.

When garbage or trash is allowed to pile up in the center of the business district of a city something is wrong—vitality wrong—and it is time that the taxpayers raise their voices in horror to get some action.

The same is true with arguments over the land fill plan being matched against an incinerator. Plymouth will soon run out of land for continuation of the land-fill operation. When that time comes it may be too late to act.

Much the same is true with the township dump sites and the drainage problems.

Mr. and Mrs. Taxpayer cannot be blamed for yelling when, with each more than ordinary rainfall, the storm sewers plug up in the city and the health standards are allowed to suffer.

When the question is asked, the answer most often given is a simple, unenthusiastic, "We're studying the problem."

No mention is made of the amount of time thought necessary to find a solution. Oftentimes, the question is met with a shrug of the shoulder. Such tactics don't solve problems.

The time has come for action—an action that will eliminate not only an unsightly scene, but a health hazard as well.

The taxpayers are entitled to that much.

Congressman Esch Reports

Optimism Increases For Income Tax Raise

Optimism over the passage of a federal income tax increase this year is on the rise in Washington. Administration pressure has become stronger and Congress appears to be closer to raising taxes than it was last year.

At the same time, as the

rush to take a bigger cut of your paycheck picks up momentum, there are still many of us who are insisting on meaningful cuts in non-essential federal spending as a necessary first step alternative to the serious consideration of a tax increase. I, for one, believe

that this can be done without jeopardizing needed domestic programs. If and when a tax increase is considered, it will also be necessary that we have strong assurances that increased revenues will not be used for new spending.

The basic reason behind the tax and spending controversy is inflation—something that has been allowed to run rampant to the point that our total economy is seriously threatened. The rising cost of living is now wiping out pay increases. As Labor Secretary Wirtz recently said, "We are very close to the point where a price increase or a wage increase isn't going to be worth anything."

WHAT THIS means to the average wage earner was vividly pointed out in a recent article in the U.S. News and World Report which said that in 1967 the average weekly earnings of all wage earners was about \$6.50 more than in

1965. But the magazine also indicated that if an adjustment is made for the higher cost of living and higher federal taxes, the average wage earner received 53 cents a week less in 1967 than in 1965. This and other alarming fiscal facts, give the President's claims of "abundance" a rather hollow ring.

With inflation nibbling away at paychecks at an ever increasing pace, it hardly seems equitable to take out another chunk in the form of higher taxes especially when other alternatives have not been fully explored and attempted. Yet the Administration still contends that a tax increase is essential for a return to economic well being.

MOST DISTURBING is the lack of any commitment as to how new revenues would be used. Certainly an assurance that the proposed 10 per cent

tax increase would be applied against our mounting deficit would rally more support to the proposal. But the impression created thus far by the Administration is entirely the opposite. The State of the Union asks for \$10 billion increase in federal spending and a new expansion of spending at home while fighting a costly war abroad. All of which indicates that higher tax revenues would be used for higher spending thus creating more inflationary problems.

There are no simple, pat answers to our nation's economic problems. Perhaps the solution can only be found in a massive attack on all fronts.

county as a whole.

"If any attempt is made to take away from the township such rights as the authority to write our own ordinances, and regulate our own zoning and housing codes, then I would be against the move and would look with favor on the Council of Governments instead."

"From the standpoint of local participation, the COG is the answer for such things as rubbish, sewage, water, police and fire protection," McEwen said.

The version approved by the Committee of 99 is cushioned by recommendations that the Michigan Legislature make major changes in a 1965 enabling act implementing the 1963 state constitution. The proposed changes would:

Empower charter counties to determine for themselves which administrative officers are needed and whether they should be elected or appointed.

Allow counties to decide the fate of the elective offices of sheriff, prosecuting attorney, county clerk, treasurer, register of deeds, drain commissioner and road commissioner.

Remove the veto power of local units of government over reorganization plans when not directly involved in the benefits.

Eliminate the provision which restricts by designation the "establishment of minimum service standards."

Change the law to permit charge-backs to local units if a general county service is not offered, rather than not actually rendered.

Allow local units to provide services also offered by the county but requiring them to meet minimum county standards or provide them in excess of the standards.

It would be the biggest change in county government since Wayne County, which once covered the entire Lower Peninsula, was restricted to its present boundaries in 1927.

STATEWIDE campaigns to write county home rule into the state constitution were defeated in 1934 and 1936 and again under different conditions in 1942 and 1944.

In 1961-62, the constitutional convention wrote the provision which was adopted by the voters in 1963 and became effective in 1964—providing counties with the yes-or-no option.

The campaign for county home rule has taken on some of the aspects of the state legislative reapportionment drive for one-man one-vote representation, accomplished for the 1964 election.

ON THE NIGHT the ordinance was passed, Commissioner Arch Vallier and Mayor Jabara joined Commissioner Hudson in opposition.

When the original motion to adopt the measure was offered, Vallier offered a substitute motion to have the matter placed on the ballot.

This motion was defeated, 4 to 3, with Commissioners Bob Smith, James McKeon, Peter Schweitzer and James Houk opposing it.

At the time, the City of Plymouth was one of the first cities in the state to adopt an open housing ordinance. Since then several others have followed suit. The latest was the City of Pontiac, which approved an open housing measure by 4 to 3 margin only last week.

work is resumed on Wednesday, February 14, before Probate Judge Frank S. Szymanski.

"Even the Burton Abstract officials claim they cannot trace all the owners," Engineer Hamill stated, "and, therefore, we just must condemn the property."

"Some of it is divided into small portions of estates and it becomes almost impossible to identify or contact all of the owners."

The actual work of planning the drains is being done through the Office of the County Drain Commission—but the rights of way must first be obtained. Actually, there are three drains in the program. The first of these will go down Sheldon Road to service the area for the new shopping center at Ann Arbor Road and Sheldon.

The second will go down General Drive, in the Gould Industrial Park, from Ann Arbor Road to a point where it will swing over toward Haggerty to service the Spartan Stores warehouse. The third—a short line—will be located on Lilley Road between Ann Arbor Road and the C&O Railroad.

Engineer Hamill pointed out that with any kind of luck in the condemnation proceedings the work can be started in spring. This will include the laying of the drainage sewer and concrete sidewalks.

WITH A SMILE, he added, "it would be a good bet that, within a month after the sidewalks are down, the industrial park will be sold out."

Rossman Makes Plea
For Recreation Body

Speaking before a combined meeting of the Businessmen's Forum and the Kiwanis Club of Colonial Plymouth, James Rossman, superintendent of schools, outlined a recreational program for the entire area and made a fervent plea for re-establishment of a recreation commission.

"We need the commission," he said, "to represent the several units of government, meet regularly with the adult education and recreation departments of the public schools and assist and advise the program development."

Prior to making his plea for the re-establishment of a commission the school chief gave a detailed account of the facilities that are available and the programs that are being offered by the schools.

He stated that recreation and

adult education go hand in hand, claiming that if the adults are interested they will then pass the interest along to the young folks.

He also gave his listeners the first look at the plans completed thus far for the 305 acre tract at Canton Center and Joy Road that will be available in 1969 and pointed out the many outlets it will provide for recreation for young and old.

The Plymouth area has had recreation commissions in the past. There was a group in the 50's and again another that functioned until around 1965. In each instance the group failed for lack of co-operation.

In his speech Rossman pledged the support of the schools and asked that the several units of government follow suit to the end that a well rounded program could be offered in the not too distant future.

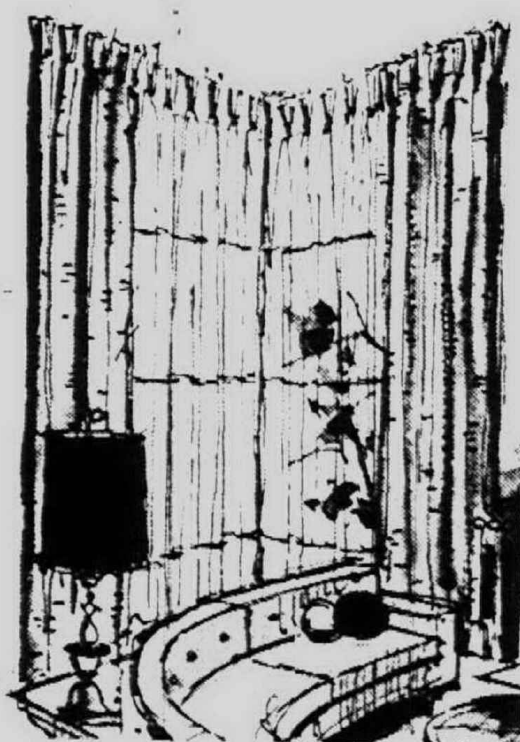

Staging 'Anastasia' Is Test Of F'ton Players' Ingenuity

When the curtain goes up on the Farmington Players' production of "Anastasia" Feb. 2, few in the audience will be aware of how much Yankee ingenuity was required to bring this story of a Russian princess to life.

"Anastasia" is a costume play set in 1926 demanding an unusual set. To create it the Players improvised with skill and imagination.

But "make believe" is the essence of the theater.

AS HE HAS for most of the

group's plays, Clifford Dixon created the set design for "Anastasia." Because of the small stage, the Farmington Players have to design a completely new set for each production.

The project for "Anastasia" required creation of an aura of magnificent grandeur on a stage measuring 20 by 15 feet.

The new production is set in an old German mansion. Producer Don Briggs constructed the set, aided by Dixon, Joanne Kaman and George Nahstoll. One of their problems

was the building of four doorways in a scaled-down mansion without making the room look as if it were all doors.

The four worked until 3 a.m. one morning building a circular staircase with six steps spiraling downward looking spacious and grand in a very limited space.

PEARL BRIGGS and Peggy Sisto had the problem of making the set look bare and dreary as required by the first act and transforming it into an impressive Russian imperial court by the third act.

Problems of staging were compounded by the fact that the Player's stage in the barn on 12 Mile Rd. has virtually no off-stage space. Professional theaters have elaborate and expensive systems of rigging over the stage on which to "fly" furniture and scenery overhead. To make their set changes possible, the Players are going to "fly" some of the set furnishings on homemade, inexpensive and entirely unorthodox rigging.

It fell to Don Briggs to dress the throne used in the third act. He created two, tall, impressive candle-torches out of porch posts, salad bowls and lots of gilt paint. Some old red

velvet draperies, purchased years ago at a Crambrook rummage sale by some far-sighted Player, will be used to upholster the throne and a couch.

PROP CHAIRMAN Betty Craig's crew has built a stage version of a "pesca," an old German tile stove. A life-sized poster of Anastasia required in the script is already in the works and the crew is scouring the area in search of a bronze horse statuette. Luckily they had on hand an antique typewriter, vintage 1908, which will be used by the cast.

All areas of the Player's Barn are bustling with activity. Members are putting up wallboards in the auditorium, workers are building and painting the set, the cast is rehearsing in the social room, costumes are being tried on and altered in the dressing room and someone is always in the kitchen discussing technical problems over coffee.

TICKETS are still available for performances of "Anastasia," which will be given Feb. 2, 3, 9, 11 and 17. A special half price rate is available to high school students for opening night, Feb. 2.

Reservations for all tickets can be made with ticket chairman, Noral McNeely, 474-2749. Tickets are also available at Weisberg's House of Magic.

Big Budget

Women To Prod Judges

A women's court watch, in which female teams will maintain critical courtroom vigils to observe the conduct of judges and other public officials in criminal trials, will be started in Metro Detroit by State Sen. N. Lorraine Beebe, R-Dearborn Heights, a member of the State Senate Crime Investigating Committee.

The idea is one originated by Indianapolis newswoman Margaret Moore and is designed to prod prosecution and sentencing of lawbreakers, in a crackdown on the mounting problem of crime in the street.

Various courts and some judges are under attack, as well as prosecutors, by a growing segment of the public concerned over lackadaisical handling and soft sentences of criminals. "Never underestimate the power of us women," the lady senator says.

Phone Cranks Need Help

Dr. Anthony F. Panzetta, head of Temple University's Community Mental Health Center, in Philadelphia, says telephone cranks are among the people his center is trying to help, not screen out.

For this reason, Panzetta issued orders this week that psychiatrists and psychologists in the operation's 24-hour-a-

day "crisis center" for psychiatric emergencies answer their own telephone.

This way, he said, cranks and other persons who need help with their problems won't "get the runaround" which he says isn't intentional but comes from secretaries' lack of professional training.

Quick Salmon Dish Is Economical



Easy to make and ready to serve in less than half an hour, this Salmon Puff Pie is rich in flavor, color and nutrition. It uses the entire can of salmon, including liquid and bones.

All varieties of salmon, of which there are five commercially canned, are packed in their natural juices. This liquid should be used in preparing salmon recipes whenever possible, since it is rich in vitamins and minerals as well as flavor. Nor should the soft bones found in canned salmon be discarded. Crush them and include them in the recipe, as they are an excellent source of calcium.

Canned salmon is rich in flavor and complete protein. Include it often in family menus. Fortunately it is one of our most plentiful foods at the moment, so keep a few cans on the shelf for quick, easy and economical dishes such as this one.

Salmon Puff Pie
4 tablespoons butter or margarine
4 tablespoons flour
1 cup hot milk
1 tablespoon grated onion
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup grated cheese
7 1/2 -ounce can salmon
3 egg yolks, lightly beaten
3 egg whites, stiffly beaten

In saucepan melt butter or margarine. Stir in flour and cook, stirring, until butter-flour mixture is smooth and bubbling. Add milk, all at once, and stir vigorously over medium heat until sauce is smooth and thickened. Stir in onion, salt and cheese. Cook, stirring, until cheese is melted. Add egg yolks and stir over low heat for 3 minutes. Remove from heat, stir in salmon liquid from can, and let cool slightly. Flake and stir in salmon. Mash and stir in bones.

Generously butter an 8-inch pie plate. Place in 400° F. oven until butter is sizzling. Fold egg whites into salmon mixture, and pour into hot plate. Bake in preheated 400° F. oven for 10 to 15 minutes, or until delicately brown. Serves 2 to 3.

Democrats Bypass Pre-Primary Slate

Livonia's Democratic Party will withhold endorsement of any city candidate until after the Feb. 19 nonpartisan primary election.

The decision was approved at a meeting of the political group's 20-member executive board this week and is a reversal of the Party's stand in previous elections, including the 1966 primary when it endorsed Mayor Harvey Moelke and other candidates in the council race.

Local Republicans, although taking no position in the mayor and city clerk campaigns, are endorsing officially two council candidates, Mary E. Dumas and Harry H. Wrightman.

LIVONIA DEMOCRATIC Club Chairman Paul Y. Kadish accused the Livonia GOP of "ignoring the best interests of the City in taking their present

stand which is completely foreign to politics in Livonia.

"They did more than endorse candidates," he charged. "They nominated them in an attempt to get at least one seat on the Council."

"It seems to me that they are supporting the two candidates for the Republican Party's sake only," he added.

The move by the Republicans has produced a rift in local GOP ranks, Kadish claims.

"I know many people who have quit the Livonia Republican Club because of its endorsement of candidates," he said.

KADISH, A 16th Precinct delegate and an alternate delegate to the Democratic State Central Committee from the 19th Democratic District, took over the Livonia Democratic Club chairmanship in November 1966, succeeding Sidney

Diamond.

He ran for the chairmanship on a platform opposing endorsement of candidates in primary elections, "primarily," he says, "because we have a nonpartisan election in the City of Livonia."

Both Parties backed specification of partisan elections in the new city charter but were turned down by the Charter Commission.

"WE FELT it confused the voter," Kadish explained. "We have a two-party system with partisan elections in all other instances except when it becomes a nonpartisan situation on the local scene. Then everyone who has become a well recognized Democrat or Republican suddenly becomes candidates without a party."

"I'm for partisan elections but as long as the City Char-

ter calls for nonpartisan elections I will stand by such. For the same reason, I don't think any political party is in a position, particularly in the primaries, and on a local level, to dictate who the candidates are going to be. But which the Republicans are trying to do."

Kadish conceded that many Democratic Party members will take an active part in the forthcoming primaries.

"In fact, they'll be very active but only as individuals...not as a Party," he said.

THE LOCAL Democratic Club will probably endorse candidates throughout the field after the primaries, according to the chairman.

"We'll do so if there are candidates that we feel will sup-

port the philosophies of the Democratic Party," he added. "And such endorsement will undoubtedly be both financial and organizational," Kadish told the Observer.

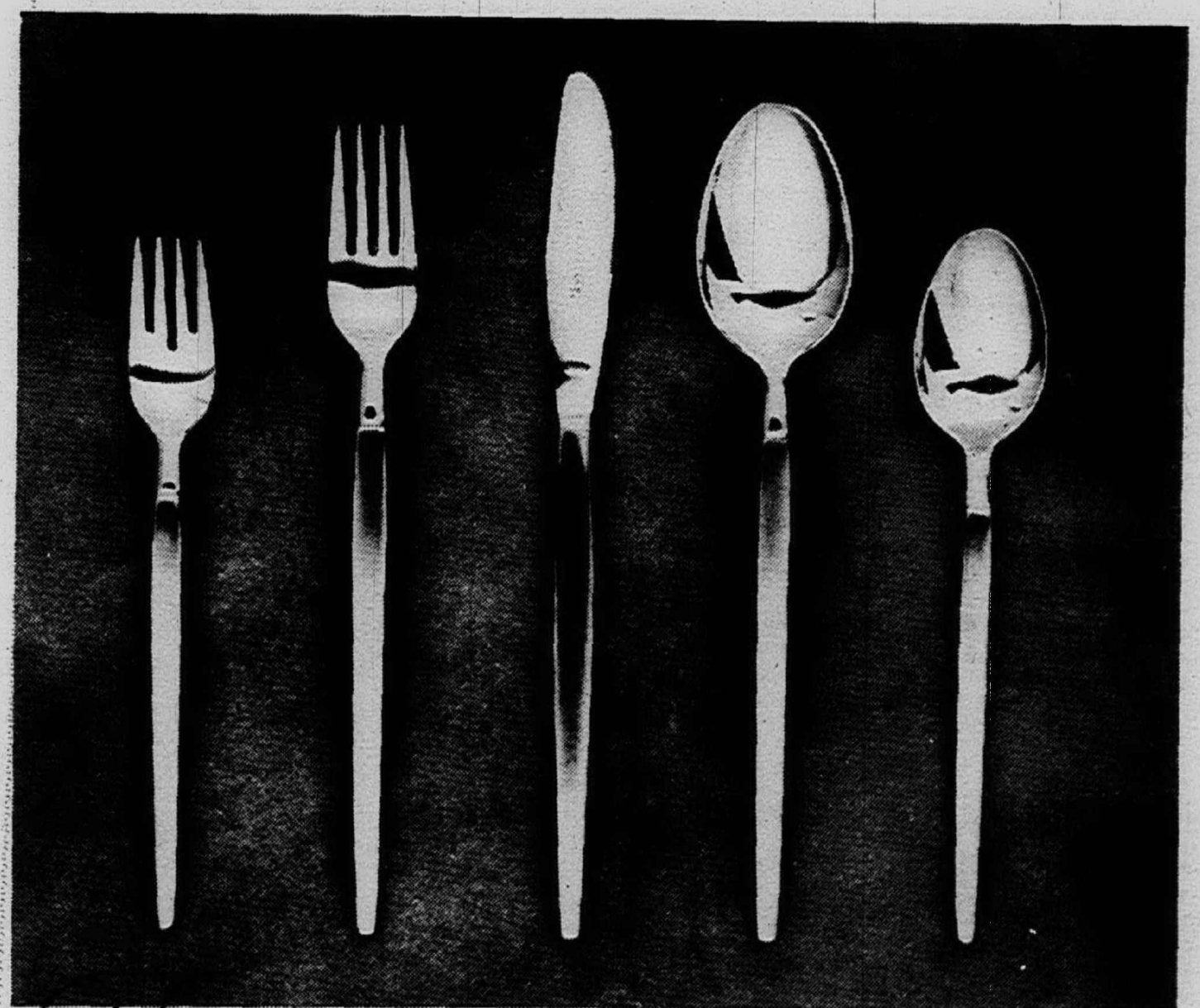

Bill Spence Places In National Talent Contest

Quantum mechanics, elementary particles, baryon fields, quarks—they're all common-place things to William Spence, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. William R. Spence, 31632 Marblehead, Farmington.

It will clear things up for you if you're told the above have to do with matters in theoretical physics, a field Spence plans to major in at Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Self-taught in quantum mechanics, relativity, elementary particle theory and other as-

pects of theoretical physics, the Farmington High senior has been named one of 40 national high school senior winners in the Westinghouse Science Talent Search. A total of 23,471 students competed in the search.

IT NATURALLY follows that Spence's favorite school subjects are math, chemistry and physics, although along with these interests he has found time to be on the FHS debate team.

At MIT, this astounding young man hopes to do theoretical research in physics, particularly in the field of elementary particles.

For his Talent Search project he wrote a mathematical

paper which developed on algebra of baryon fields.

We know you know, but if you have doubts—baryons are one of the classes of fundamental particles, or quarks, from which matter is thought

to be composed.

AS A TALENT Search winner, Spence is eligible to win a \$10,000 scholarship. His entry is currently being judged in a regional talent search.

As one of the select 40 national winners, he has been awarded an all-expense-paid trip to Washington, where he will compete for \$67,000 in

Westinghouse scholarships and awards during the five-day Science Talent Institute beginning Feb. 28. Winners of the top 10 scholarships will be announced

March 4. And let's hope the judges of that contest understand baryons, quarks, particles, etc., etc.

college's Office of Instruction.

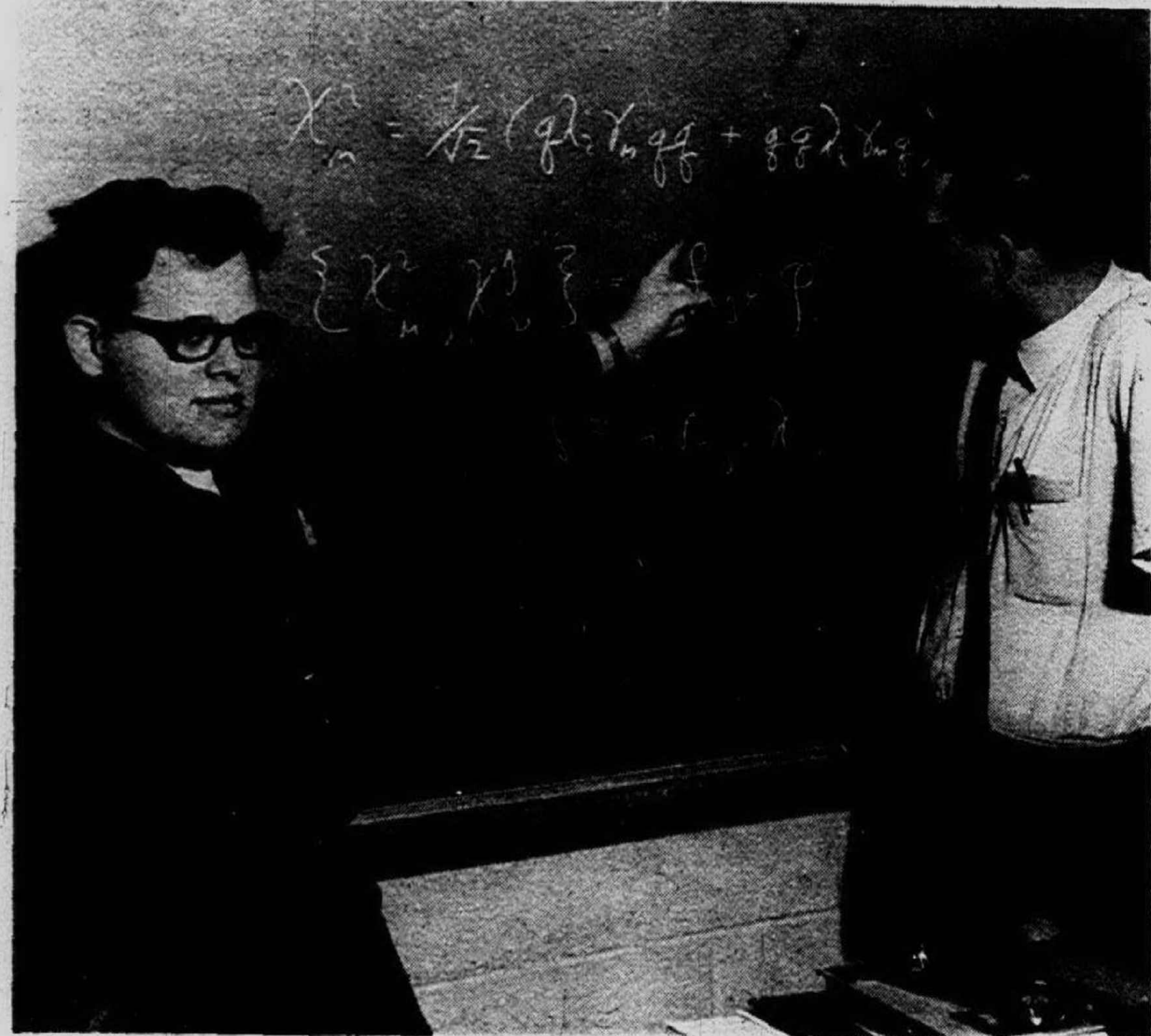
THE SECOND attraction of the series—scheduled for early April—is a pair of original one act plays.

Dunes Park Could Be Business Boon

Michigan State University, in a report released in Washington, estimated that the Sleeping Bear Dunes area would see a \$10 million-a-year tourist boom within five years of the creation of a national lakeshore park in the area.

The report, released by Senator Philip A. Hart, D-Mich., a park proponent, noted that the economic impact in Benzie and Leelanau counties could reach \$20 million annually if one adds government construction, maintenance and operation costs.

THE PARK WOULD have an estimated three million visits yearly, the MSU report estimated.

The report also pointed out that any tax losses sustained by local counties and school districts would likely "be more than offset by the potential economic gain which the park could conceivably generate."

The new assessment of the park's economic impact was prepared by MSU's Institute for Community Development and Services under contract by the National Park Service. The same institute has been involved in a Farmington area government study.

It was presented as Hart prepared for another push for congressional approval of the park. Hart's proposal last week passed the Senate and has once been favorably reported by the House Interior Committee. In the last Congress, however, it failed by days of getting to the House floor.

THE REPORT examines complaints from local opponents that the two counties and three school districts would lose substantial revenue through federal purchase of private lands.

It concludes that a federal park would remove land from the tax rolls that now produces about \$70,000 yearly in revenue. However, the report points out that:

1. The land would be purchased over at least a five-year period.
2. The school districts would become eligible for an additional \$40,000 in federal and state aid.
3. The remaining tax losses could be recouped with a one-half mill tax hike and even this might be unnecessary as land values and business activity go up.

Birthday Gift A Little Late

Christine Ehman's gift for her sixth birthday is arriving 10 years late.

A secretary for Judge Samuel Strauss of Allegheny Court found an envelope addressed to Christine in a lawbook while researching a point of law.

The envelope, with a birthday card and \$1 enclosed, apparently was inadvertently used as a book mark.

Strauss added a two-cent stamp to the three-cent stamp on the envelope and mailed it to Christine, who is now 16.

Inkster Schools Get Reprieve From Closing

WESTLAND POLICE and the FBI are hunting for two bandits who successfully held up a Westland bank Jan. 26 and got away with \$12,500. The pair, who threatened several residents before they finally obtained an escape car, apparently left few solid clues for the police to fall back on.

THE MICHIGAN Association of School Boards estimates that two-thirds of the state's 738 school districts "are in serious financial difficulty at the moment." The Association reported that Michigan's schools face a cash shortage that threatens the quality of education for two million children. The State Department of Education has identified 62 districts that are already running in the red—the ones most seriously in trouble are Bedford, Ravenna, Hart, Memphis, Carsonville, Taylor and Inkster. These school districts are caught between sky-rocketing costs and vanishing local and state tax resources. Monday Inkster voters turned down an emergency millage proposal that would have helped the school district revive.

PAMELA SMITH, of Northville, has been crowned Michigan's Miss Junior Miss of 1968. Pamela, 17, is a student at Northville High School. She is a member of the National Honor Society, the choir, The Spanglers, and the debating team.

THE INKSTER SCHOOL District may have to close its doors this Friday. Spokesmen for the system said that the district could not meet its payroll after the end of the week. No hope is in sight for the financially ailing Wayne County district because Inkster voters turned down a 10 mill levy Monday which virtually put a stop to any further attempts to get out of the red.

LANSGING -- Sen. Robert Richardson, R-Saginaw, posed a bill that would cause a driver convicted three times for drunken driving within a two-year period to lose his license for five years. The measure passed 30-1 and was sent to the House after deletion of a portion of which several senators said they felt was too stringent. Also approved were bills regulating the employment of inmate labor in Michigan's prisons and limiting construction of waterways on

the Great Lakes and on Michigan's inland lakes and streams.

LANSGING -- Refund checks were being issued Wednesday by a computer at the rate of one every three seconds to persons who overpaid the new Michigan income tax. The first refund check for \$22.98 went to a Walled Lake taxpayer whose name was not disclosed because of the secrecy provisions of the law.

LANSGING -- Long-awaited

legislation aimed at repealing Michigan's controversial criminal sexual psychopath law was pending in the House Wednesday. "Mere sex deviation, in itself, should certainly not be a working legal defense for any and all crimes," said Rep. David M. Serotkin, R-Mt. Clemens, sponsor of the bill. Many criminals, Serotkin said, evade prosecution from crimes by having themselves declared CSP's, sent to Ionia, where they work for early release. The statute was passed 27 years ago.

LANSGING -- Rep. Thomas L. Brown, R-Lansing, introduced a bill to the House that proposes minimum salaries for Michigan prosecutors. Half of the minimum salaries would range from \$6,500 to \$30,000 annually would be paid by the state. The prosecutors would be paid on an escalating scale according to the population of their counties.

LANSGING -- Earl H. Green,

of Farmington, fired as a State Highway Department construction engineer for an alleged conflict of interest, has appealed his dismissal to the Civil Service Department. He was scheduled for a hearing Wednesday before a Civil Service hearing officer, Arnold Embree, of Pontiac. The Highway Department dismissed Green on Dec. 5, charging conflict of interest because of "ownership of a construction firm" without departmental permission to engage in out-

side employment. LANSGING -- Philip H. Anderson will turn his \$56 million yearly shopping list over to an as yet unnamed successor when he retires Saturday as chief of the State Purchasing Division. As head of the division since 1963, Anderson has been responsible for purchasing the more than 4,000 different items the state buys for its offices, schools, hospitals, prison and other institutions.

Which Gifts Are Tax Deductible?

This is another in a series of articles prepared by the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants on money-saving tax "tips" and errors to avoid in preparation of the 1967 Federal Individual Income Tax Return.

You can deduct contributions to recognized religious, charitable, educational, scientific and literary organizations by itemizing them on your 1040 Federal Individual Income Tax Return.

Contributions to nonprofit organizations engaged in research or education for the cure and alleviation of diseases and disabilities are also deductible, as are donations to humane societies, such as the ASPCA and ASPCC.

THE REGULATIONS say you can deduct up to 20 per cent (30 per cent, in certain instances) of your adjusted gross income as entered on line 9, page 1 as charitable contributions. You should be able to authenticate such contributions with cancelled checks, money-order stubs, receipts, etc., in the event they are questioned and you are called in for an audit. There is no announced official policy as regards unsubstantiated charitable contributions, but the Internal Revenue Service has been known to attempt to limit them to \$78 a year (\$1 a week to your church and 50 cents a week to miscellaneous charities) when reviewing a taxpayer's return. And don't estimate your contributions in itemizing them on your return since the IRS has a tendency to regard round numbers with a fishy eye.

CONTRIBUTIONS must be either in money or property. If in property, the amount is determined by the fair market value. Stocks purchased for \$500, for example, but worth \$1,200 when donated to your church building fund, are listed as a \$1,200 contribution. Contributions must be claimed for the year in which they were made. A contribution made by check as late as Dec. 31, should be claimed on your return for 1967 even though it did not clear your bank until early this year. You cannot deduct gifts or contributions to friends and relatives, political organizations and candidates, social clubs, labor organizations and chambers of commerce. Contributions to veterans' organizations can be deducted, however.

THE MARKET value of blood donated to the Red Cross or a hospital blood bank is not deductible. Neither is the value of the time or service donated voluntarily to a charitable organization or agency. You can, however, deduct out-of-pocket expenses incurred in donating such service. If you used your own car, for example, to drive volunteer donors to a Red Cross blood bank, you can deduct a standard mileage fee of five cents a mile as a contribution. In the event your out-of-pocket expenses exceeded five cents a mile, you can deduct your actual expenses for gas, oil, tools, etc. Depreciation on your car and insurance are not deductible, however, nor are repairs. Reasonable payments for meals and lodging while away from home on volunteer service for a charitable organization are deductible.

OTHER THINGS to watch for: Raffle tickets, even though purchased for benefit of a charity, are not deductible. The courts have ruled that purchasers receive "just what they paid for"—a chance to win a valuable prize at a fraction of its actual cost. Tuition paid to a parochial school for your children's education is not deductible as a contribution to a religious organization. It is a personal, non-deductible expense.

State And Local News Round Up

LANSGING -- Last minute financial arrangements by the poverty-stricken Inkster School District will permit the district's nine schools to operate at least until April 12, it was announced, Inkster Superintendent, Dr. Edward Fort, said he had been assured of enough money to meet payrolls at least through April 12. He said he had been assured by the city treasurers of Inkster and Westland that some \$485,000 in local property taxes, collected by the cities and turned over to the district, can be available in time to meet last Friday's payroll.

ROYAL OAK -- After receiving two Purple Hearts and two wounds, 21-year-old Marine Corporal Bob Sharp, from Royal Oak, was sent to Okinawa far from the South Vietnam battle zone. However, while on the island, he tried to relieve old days at Royal Oak Dondro High School, but broke his ankle when playing football. Since then, Sharp has alternated between the Great Lakes (Ill.) Naval Hospital and convalescent leave at home.

DETROIT -- General Motors Corp., the world's largest corporation, reported that its 1967 net income fell 9 per cent to \$1.627 billion on sales of \$20 billion. A decline in sales of GM cars and increased material and labor costs were blamed for the drop, but, it was noted that 1967 was still GM's third most fruitful year.

DETROIT -- Semon E. Knudsen, executive vice-president to General Motors Corp. Board of Directors, has resigned his post to "pursue personal interests."

DETROIT -- Increased layoffs due to parts shortages resulting from strikes, all settled at least tentatively, pushed the number of General Motors' employees out of work to 134,200 Thursday. A GM spokesman said an additional 24,685 workers at plants short of parts were sent home Wednesday.

GRAND RAPIDS -- Refusal

by 200 skilled tradesmen to report for work until Monday at Kelvintor Division, American Motors Corp., resulted in 2,800 production workers being sent home. The skilled workers apparently stayed home after three of them were given three-day disciplinary layoffs.

DETROIT -- The Detroit Board of Education said it will go to court to file a landmark suit aimed at forcing the State of Michigan to provide money for "equal education" throughout the state. The suit contends that once the state has entered into the business of education by providing funds for schools, it must see that such funds are available to all children regardless of where they live.

LANSGING -- A bill establishing a permanent state women's commission, previously passed by the Senate, was approved by the House Wednesday. The measure would set up a 15-member commission to look at the problems of women "as wives, mothers, homemakers and workers."

DETROIT -- Some 7,500 United Auto Workers union members walked off their jobs Thursday at plants of Continental Motors Corp. and its affiliates in five cities. The walk-out began shortly after midnight when the union's contract ran out.

WINDSOR -- The United Auto Workers and Chrysler Canada Ltd. reached a tentative agreement on a new contract covering 10,000 striking workers at Chrysler's Canadian subsidiary. A company spokesman said details of the agreement were not readily available, although it had already been signed by both sides.

DETROIT -- American Motors Corp. announced it will shut down its Wisconsin plants Friday for one week because of a shortage of parts from supplier plants. AMC said the one-week closing would idle 7,300 workers at Kenosha and 2,900 at Milwaukee.

NW Detroiters Talk To Senate

Crime Hearing Gets Unruly

"I've never hated in my life, but in last summer's riot they were shooting at my husband. If he must die, give him something to die for with honor."

This was the emotional plea of a young, intense Detroit policeman's wife who was among 24 persons testifying last week before the Michigan Senate's Crime Investigating Committee holding its first public hearing in the state.

More than 200 persons filled Carpenters Union Local 982's hall at 22521 Grand River Tuesday night where the special senatorial crime body listened to individual testimony centering on crime in the streets which, in the words of committee member Sen. George W. Kuhn, of West Bloomfield, "has turned Detroit into the crime capital of the world."

"Take the handcuffs off our police," said the Detroit police officer's wife, and the loud, and sometime unruly, crowded hall gave her testimony thunderous applause.

"WE ARE NOW getting down to the grassroots and talking to the people in the communities," State Sen. Raymond D. Dzendzel, D-Detroit, a member of the committee and sponsor of the resolution which set it up, told an Observer reporter.

"We're finding out the private citizen's thinking on crime in the street. And it is very emphatic," he said.

The committee, brought to life by the regular session of the State Legislature last year and given until next December to perform its task, has held four closed-door meetings with community leaders and law enforcement agencies in Detroit, Grand Rapids and Lansing.

Other public meetings, at which testimony of private citizens will be sought, are scheduled in the immediate future. The latter include a second hearing within two weeks in Detroit's inner city, followed by similar hearings on Detroit's east side, Flint, Grand Rapids, Kalamazoo and Jackson.

CHAIRMAN OF the eight-member non-partisan investigating body is Jackson Republican Senator James G. Fleming. Other GOP senators, besides Kuhn, are Dearborn Heights' N. Lorraine Beebe and John F. Toepfer of Cadillac. Democrats, in addition to Dzendzel, are Detroit Senators Stanley F. Rozycki, Coleman Young and Arthur Cartwright. Young and Cartwright are the two Negroes on the committee. Senator Beebe is its only woman.

The committee started originally April 12, 1967, with six members and an appropriation of \$3,000. Senators Young and Beebe were added to it following the Detroit riots and at which time its budget was increased to \$10,000. Its chairman, Senator Fleming, former Jackson city prosecutor, estimated that expenses to date have run "about \$300 to \$400."

A preliminary report, made back to their Senate colleagues on the basis of their closed-door sessions, has resulted in several bills relative to crime and riots being introduced already in the session of the Legislature.

They include:

- A Molotov cocktail bomb law amendment which will remove the word "intent" from the law, difficult to prove in a court, and make mere possession a felony.

- A law regarding sniping, for which some legislators are advocating the death penalty.

- More control laws, in the words of Dzendzel, "with more teeth in them and giving police more power in dispersing

crowds."

- Laws granting the governor and mayors of cities more powers to act in event of riots.
- Legislation to upgrade and provide additional riot training for police.
- More pay for police, by state subsidy if necessary.

THE COMMITTEE is expected to back momentarily, swinging its weight behind a bill of one of its own members, Kuhn's current controversial "stop and frisk" law of which is now in the legislative hopper and before the Senate's judiciary committee.

More than half of the crime body's members are reported favoring passage of such a law, according to Dzendzel who sponsored a similar bill defeated two years ago.

"We should take any measure necessary to protect our eight million citizens," Kuhn told Tuesday night's audience, composed largely of middle-aged residents, who gave his statement and the stop and frisk law a clamorous response, and a core of young hecklers.

THE HECKLING of Negro witnesses at the hearing at times bordered on disorder with little attempt by the committee to curb them.

Negro resident Willis Tabor finally disrupted his testimony to turn to a tormentor who sank embarrassingly back into the crowd when Tabor said to him quietly, "I gave your lady the opportunity to speak."

Tabor's testimony to the committee included his opposition to the Molotov cocktail legislation which brought groans and catcalls from the predominantly white audience and the question "Why?" snapped at him by Rozycki.

"The basic, fundamental principle of criminal law is that you must show intent," Tabor answered, "Would you change the whole concept of our courts?" he asked Rozycki.

TABOR, never losing his composure, spoke also about police brutality.

"Have you personally ever been witness to such," Rozycki questioned?

"Yes, I have, Senator," Tabor answered, and paused: "To my own person."

The answer produced complete silence in the hall, suddenly so quiet the hum of a flickering fluorescent lamp overhead was audible.

Rozycki, disconcerted apparently, asked hurriedly, "I asked you have you been an eye-witness?"

"I was present when a friend of mine was killed in broad daylight," Tabor replied softly.

Fleming later explained to an Observer reporter's question concerning the lack of the committee's exertions to maintain order:

"We did let the people be more expressive of their opinions than we would normally at a public hearing because we wanted to get the real feeling of the people and what they want and need."

TESTIMONY AND committee comments early turned to an indictment of the state's courts. "The people," Dzendzel commented, "have an ever

growing concern not just about crime on the street but the type of justice handed out to criminals.

"Citizens feel that lawbreakers are merely being slapped on the wrists by the courts," he said.

"I sometimes wonder," he continued, "if it isn't the courts that need our attention the most. Perhaps we should read the riot act to our judges. An answer is the voice of the people at the polls when certain of these judges are running for re-election."

But even the crime body's own senators couldn't escape entirely the angry mood of one woman.

Said she, to Fleming: "We elected you to represent us and you can't do anything. But Hubbard (Mayor Orville Hubbard of Dearborn who recently had passed a Dearborn stop and frisk law) can. We need him for mayor of Detroit."

Dzendzel interposed: "We need another Mary Beck."

AT THE HEIGHT of the five-hour-long meeting, a committee member interrupted to call out the name of a resident present:

"Your real estate office has just been robbed," he said.

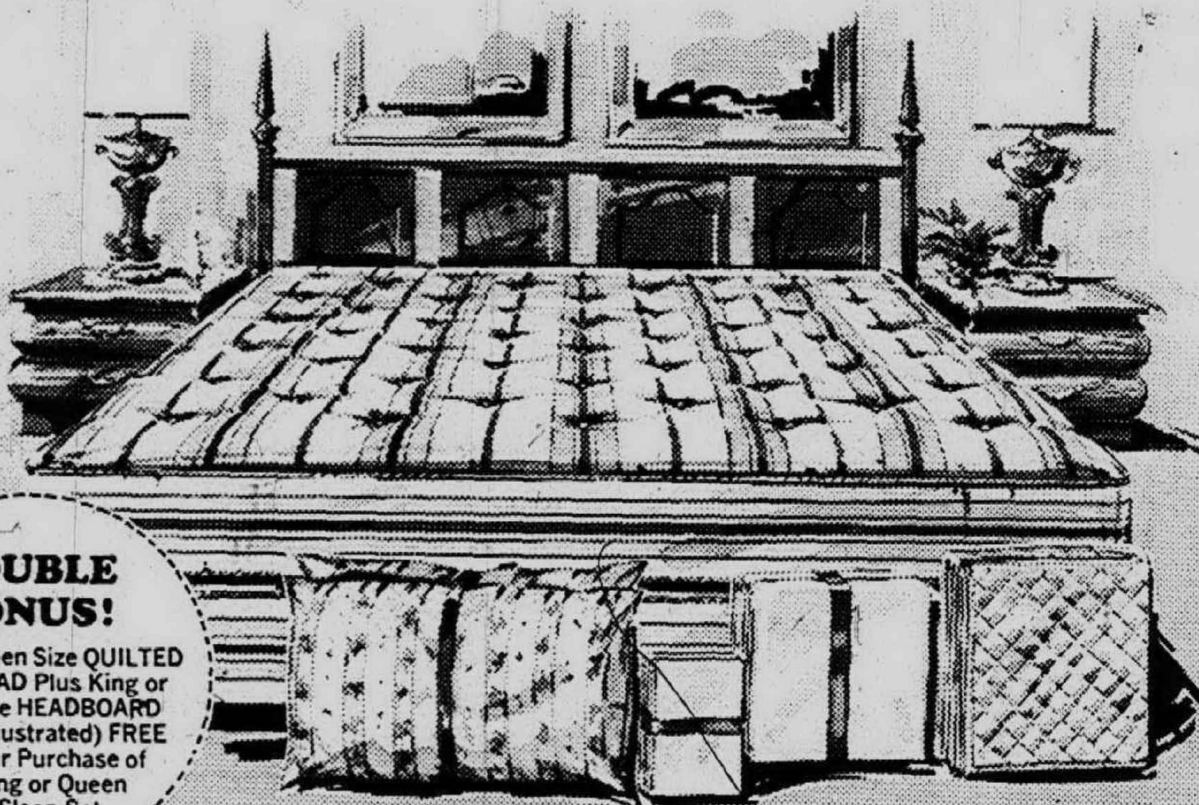

South Korea Opposes Bilateral Crisis Talks

SEOUL—South Korea's Foreign Minister Choi Kyu-hah asserted that more attention should be paid to the Communist attempt to assassinate President Chung Hee Park than to North Korea's seizure of the USS Pueblo. The South Korean government will "categorically oppose" any additional U.S. moves to emphasize the Pueblo case in efforts for an over-all settlement of the Korean situation. Choi said his government also will object to any direct bilateral talks between the United States and the North Koreans and to any proposal to exchange the Pueblo crewmen for North Korean infiltrators. SAIGON—South Vietnam President Nguyen Van Thieu proclaimed the whole of South Vietnam under martial law following a Viet Cong suicide raid on the city. Northern guerrillas staged a number of attacks throughout the south that was costing them ten men dead for every allied soldier they killed. The Communists extended their coordinated lunar new year offensive across the country while concentrating against Saigon their biggest assault of the war on the South Vietnamese capital.

LONDON—Prime Minister Harold Wilson's popularity in Britain is at an all-time low, a public opinion poll published last week reported. The poll in the London Daily Express, said 62.5 per cent of those questioned said they were dissatisfied with Wilson as prime minister, compared with 48.75 per cent in a similar poll May 9.

The record of U.S. foreign policy has given some foreign critics a base for challenging American credibility once again. The influential Spanish Catholic newspaper, Ya, said editorially the crash of the U.S. B52 bomber in Greenland recently, means U.S. "violation of its promise not to overfly with nuclear bombs the territory where the accident occurred." Reflecting leftist feeling, the pro-Communist Rome Daily, Paesa Sera, asked why the world should believe the Americans claim that the USS Pueblo was in international waters when "in analogous circumstances they have always recounted lies as big as the White House."

MIAMI—Dr. Albert Sabin, developer of the oral polio vaccine,

cine, said that Cuba has practically eliminated polio and that health services under the Castro regime are well organized in spite of the emigration to America of about 2,300 Cuban doctors. Sabin, 61, recently completed a visit to Cuba and is attending a meeting in Miami on pediatrics.

CAPE TOWN—Heart transplant patient Dr. Philip Blai-berg entered his fourth week of convalescence without any signs of rejection process or infection. The 55-year-old retired South African dentist, recipient in the world's third human heart transplant, was reported by Groote Schuur Hospital to be progressing steadily from surgery Jan. 2.

CAIRO—The Egyptian Foreign Ministry said that operations to release foreign freighters trapped in the Suez Canal have been suspended indefinitely because Israeli troops fired on Egyptian boats trying to survey the northern half of the waterway. Despite the official statement the semi-official newspaper, Al-Ahram, said that Egypt is "resolutely determined" to continue the canal operation.

TOULON—Searchers looking for some trace of the French submarine Minerve, missing since Jan. 27 with 52 aboard, found a sailor's bag of the type used by submarine crewmen. The plastic bag was spotted by a helicopter near the spot off Toulon where a large oil slick was seen on the first day of the search for the 800-ton sub. At the other end of the Mediterranean, the international search for the missing Israeli sub Danar was halted Thursday but the Israelis said they would continue the search until something shows up. The Danar was lost Jan. 25 with 69 men aboard.

ANN ARBOR—Harald Hanthe-Kass, Peking correspondent for the Scandinavian

News Service, said, in a speech at the University of Michigan, the United States, Russia and Japan ought to be making "contingency plans" for the possibility that China will soon return to "chaos." He said

destructive activities carried out in 1966 by the Red Guard, as part of China's "cultural revolution," have created a "credibility gap" between the central government in Peking and the rest of the country.

MADRID—Princess Sophia of Greece, wife of Spanish Prince Juan Carlos, gave birth on Jan. 30 to a son. He is their third child. Princess Sophia is the eldest sister of Greek King

Constantine. Juan Carlos is seen by many as Gen. Francisco Franco's choice for the throne if the monarchy is restored to Spain.

PARIS—President Charles

de Gaulle declared that France and the United States were old comrades in arms who will remain friends whatever "frictions" they may have over foreign policy issues. The French president raised a toast to

French-American friendship at a farewell lunch for outgoing U.S. Ambassador Charles Bohlen at the Elysee-Palace.

SAIGON—The official North Vietnam news agency said Jan.

27 that Hanoi has decided to release three captured American pilots in honor of Asian Jan. 29 lunar new year holiday. It did not identify the three pilots nor say where or when they would be turned loose.

Charley Excels Where You Don't Use Legs

From a scrawny eighth grader, with an intense desire to become a star athlete even though handicapped by a birth defect that crippled him in the hips, knees and ankles, to one of the most outstanding gymnasts ever developed in Michigan High School annals.

That's the success story of Charley Morse, captain of the Clarenceville High team, and a five-time winner of state championships in the meet last spring.

Coach Chuck Thompson, who also serves as director of athletics, recalls that Charley became a candidate for the gymnastic team in the eighth grade during the period when Chuck was trying to sell the program to the school.

Inasmuch as he was still in the elementary grades, Charley wasn't eligible for the varsity. As Thompson puts it, "He wasn't ready for any kind of competition; all he had was the determination to succeed."

CHARLEY PICKED gymnastics for the simple reason that all other varsity sports need strong legs, and he definitely didn't have them.

Matter of fact, he went through a series of torturing operations from the time he was a youngster to strengthen the muscles in his hips, knees and ankles so that he could walk without braces or a crutch.

"We admired this youngster from the moment he reported for the gymnastic team," smiled Thompson. "We were afraid for a time that he might hurt himself, he was that intense in his ambition to make good."

The youngster picked up the finer points of gymnastics much faster than some of his less ambitious teammates.

Even then, he had to learn the hard way that there is stiff competition in the state championships. Charley made his first move in the state meet as a freshman, entering two events and finishing far down the ranks.

He entered the same two events as a sophomore and came home highly elated with a seventh place in the sidehorse competition.

THEN CAME HIS junior year, and it was a poised, well prepared and trained Charley who took dead aim on state titles in five events.

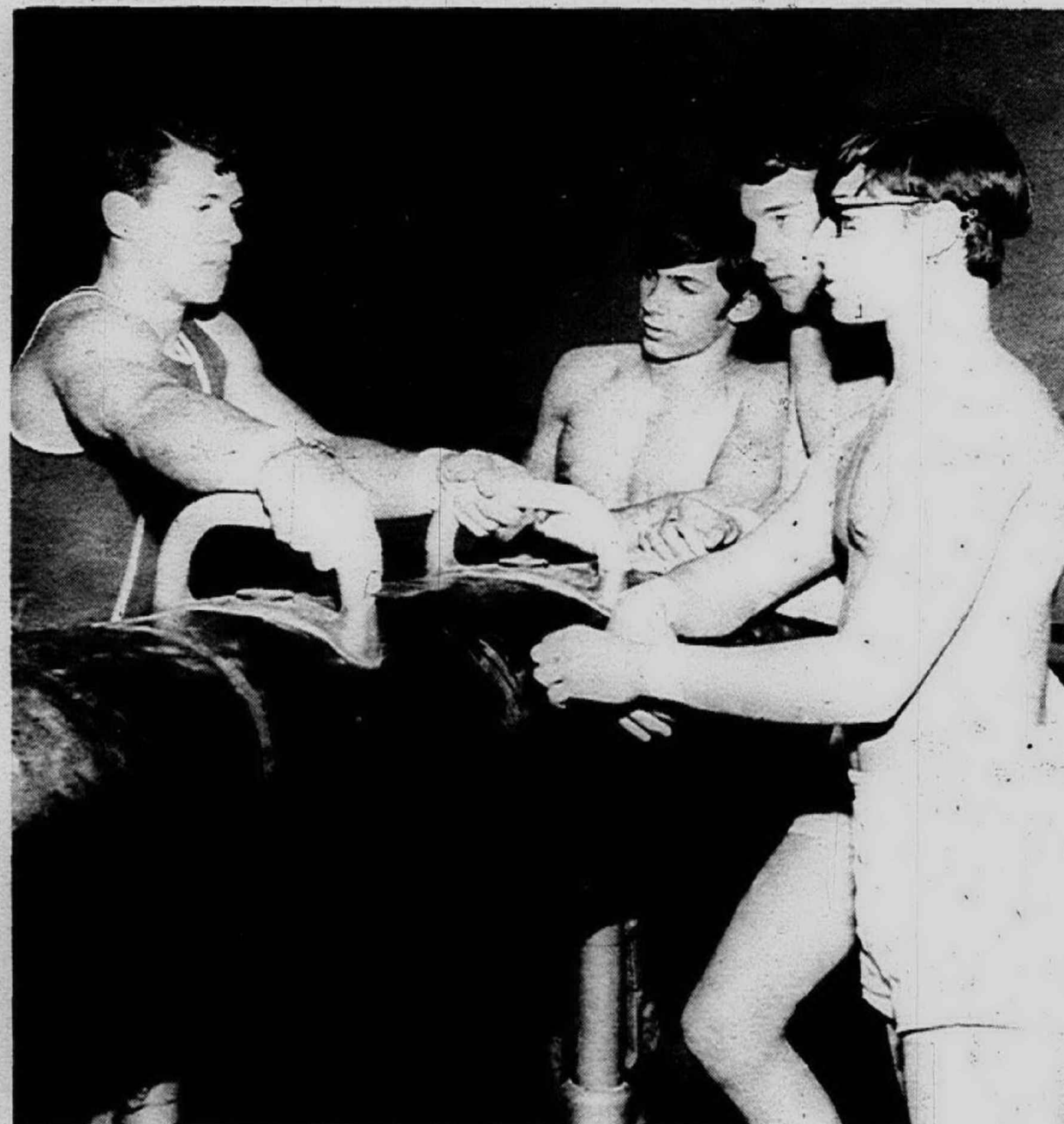
Just as he had completely dominated the events during the dual meet and league competition, Charley brought back five state titles from the championships held at North Farmington High.

He won the top award as the all-around champion and was the victor in the still rings, horizontal bars, sidehorse and parallel bars. It was one of the few times in Michigan High School Athletic Association history that one entrant had so completely dominated the state finals.

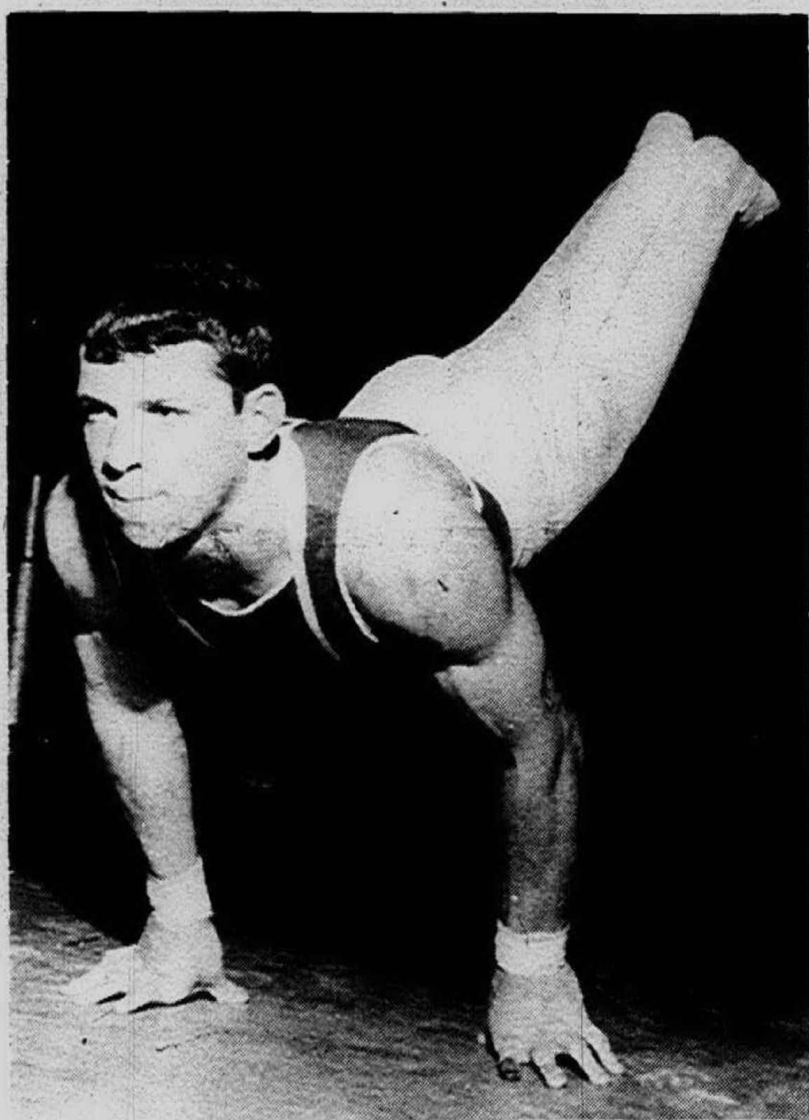
Now, as a senior, Charley is attracting capacity crowds for a sport that normally draws only parents and friends of the gymnasts. He has filled the gyms at North Farmington, Clarenceville, Allen Park, Taylor Center and Taylor Kennedy, Ann Arbor Huron and Pioneer High Schools, Flat Rock and St. Clair—all members of the Southeastern Michigan Interscholastic Gymnastic Association.

He has a string of 35 consecutive victories in the five events over a period of a year and a half, with hopes of keeping that record intact through the league meet on March 8 and 9 at Taylor Kennedy and the state finals on March 16 at Hillsdale.

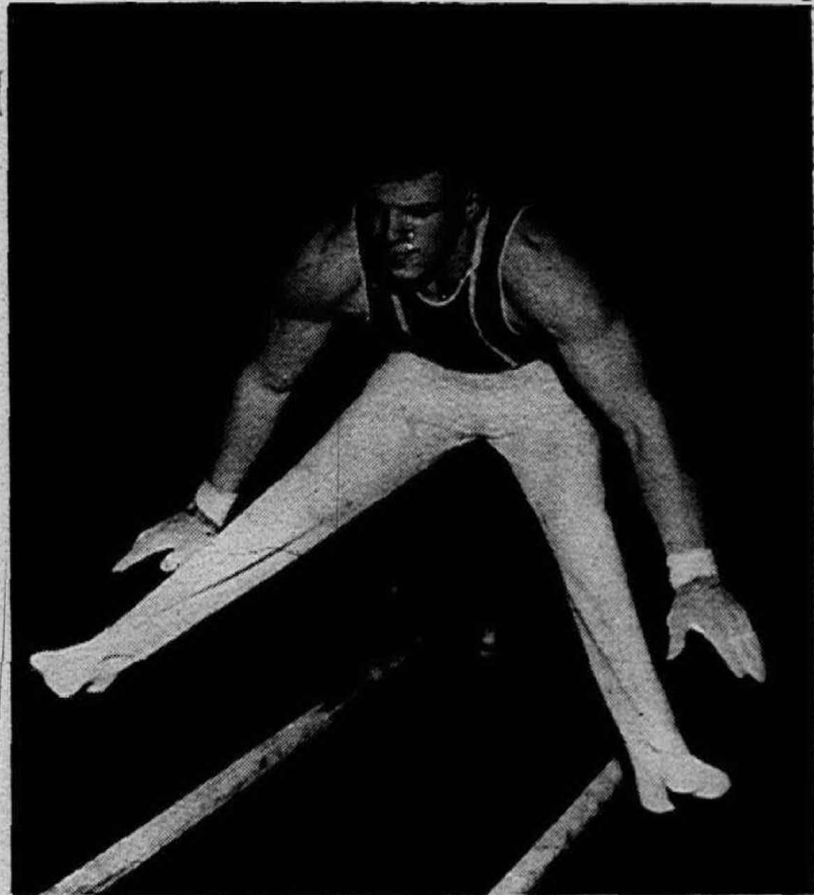

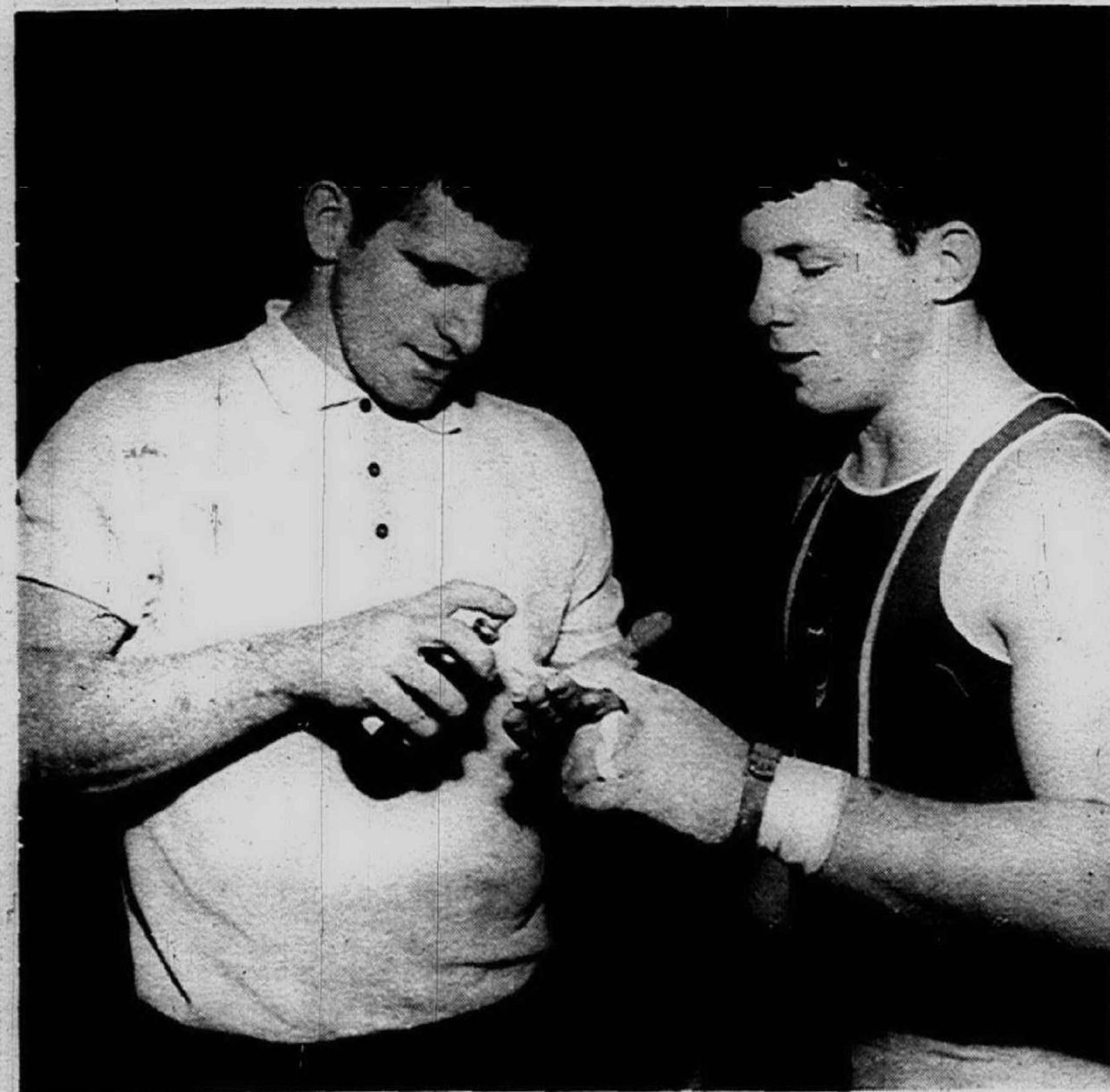
MORSE TALKS with Clarenceville teammates (from left) Benny Fréchette, Jon Paulson and Neil Funk.



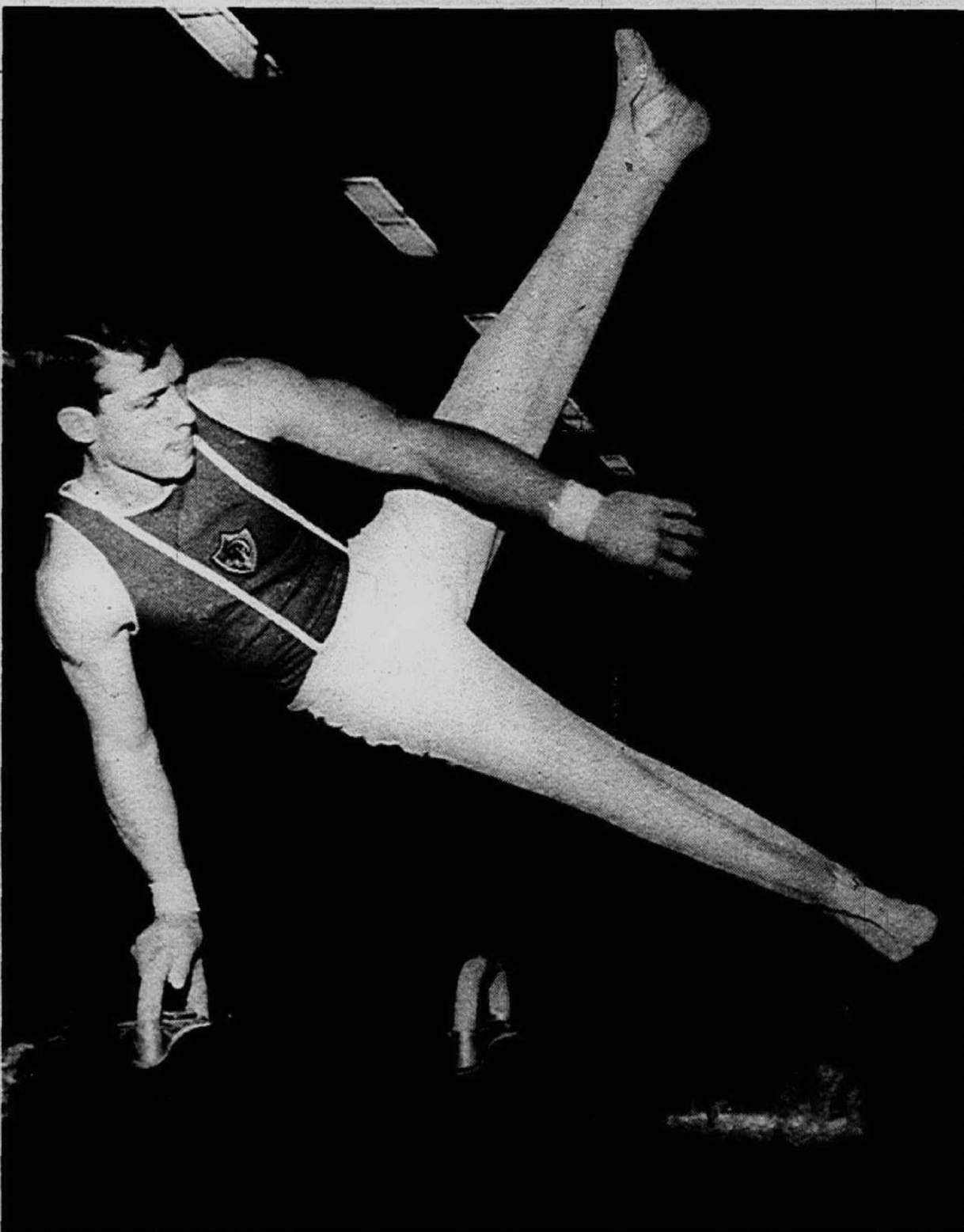
PERFECT BALANCE for a handstand.

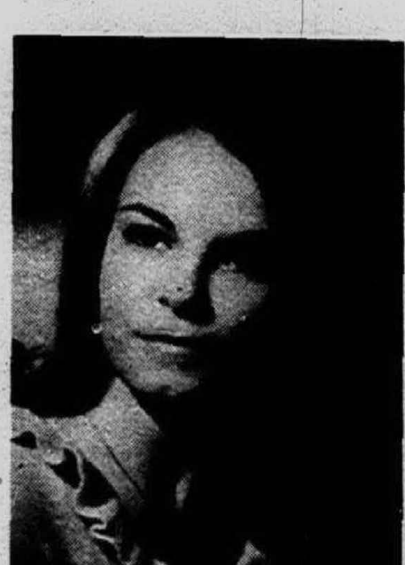

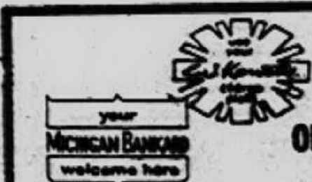

A double disqualification in the 400-yard freestyle relay, final event of the evening, enabled Redford Union swimmers to sink Plymouth, 47-46, in one of the most thrilling Suburban Six League dual meets of the season.

It was a staggering defeat for the Rocks and gave them a record of one victory and three losses in the dual meet competition, RU, on the other hand, boasts a 3-1 mark, including two triumphs over Plymouth.

High School.

HAS HE HAD AN effect on the interest in the sport at Clarenceville?

"The answer to that," said Thompson, who was a state champion diver for Thurston High in 1957 and a member of the Michigan State University gymnastic team for four years, "is that success follows success."

"Charley is just like an assistant coach. He not only attracts boys to the squad but he helps them through some of the rough spots in the early training."

As an after-thought, Thompson points out that Charley, because of his crippled legs, has some trouble and loses points in the dismounts (final point of any event) but more than makes it up with the extremely difficult maneuvers he goes through in the competition.

"He's the greatest," says Thompson, "Where else can you find a crippled boy who was determined to make good in a sport that requires the highest kind of coordination -- an aid."

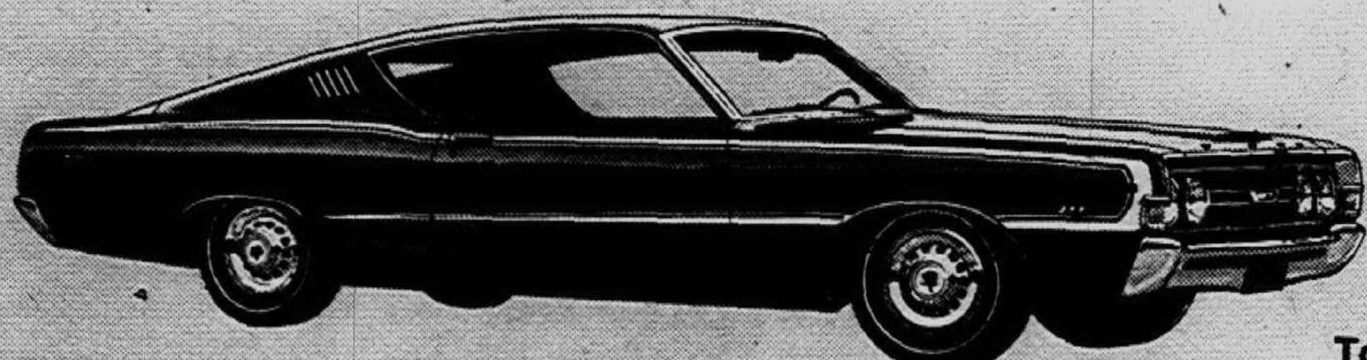

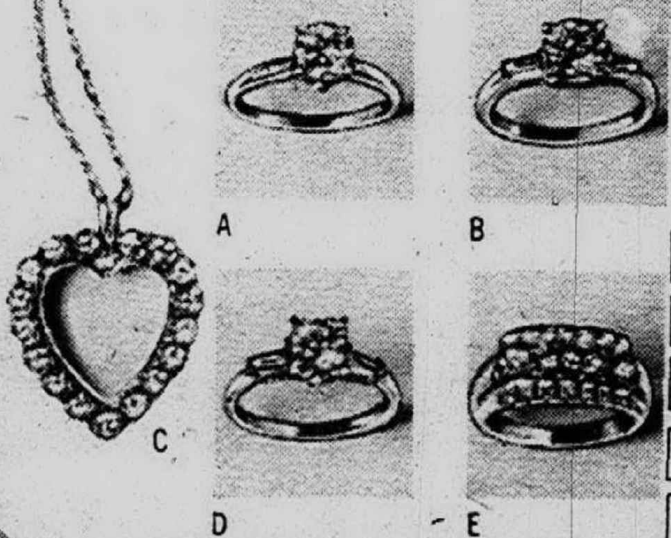

In fact, Beban went untouched until the 30th pick when the Los Angeles Rams selected him.

Why did the Lions pick Landry over Beban?

The overall first pick in the draft was Ron Yary, an offensive tackle from Southern California, who was grabbed by the Minnesota Vikings.

Yary and McCullough were among five Southern California players named in the first round, an added tribute to the Trojans, who ranked No. 1 last season and then went on to win in the Rose Bowl over Indiana.

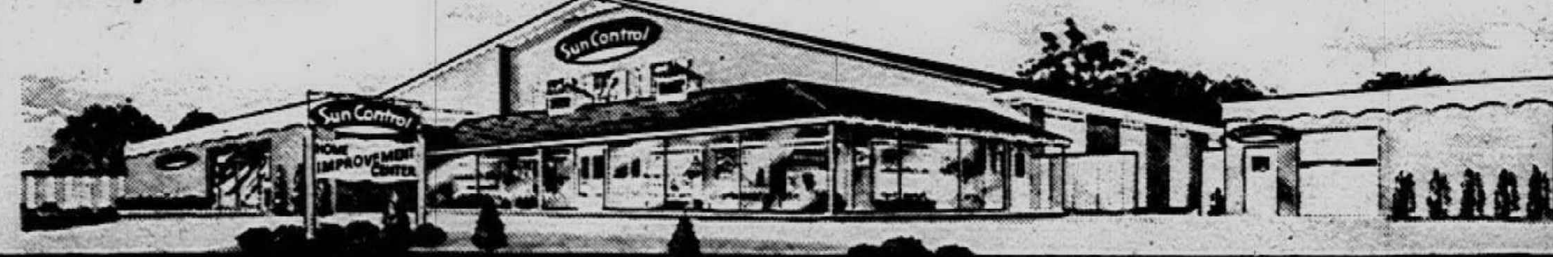

observing sports

None of us escapes death or taxes. While we live, there's always the taxman. Sooner or later, death must come as it did this past week for John Herman Kobs of East Lansing, Mich.

He was 69 when his heart gave way. In those last seconds between when a man breathes and then he no longer does, a smile must have spread over Kobs' face.

When a man goes on that last, long and endless journey, he no doubt must think of what kind of a contribution he made in this mad place, called the world.

John Kobs made a big contribution. A lasting one.

For the greater part of his life, Kobs was a teacher and a coach at Michigan State.

He was there when the Spartans were known as the "Aggies" and "a cow college." He lived to see it develop into one of the greatest and largest educational institutions in the world.

Kobs had his hand in football and basketball and other sports at Michigan State. But he carved his biggest notch in baseball as the Spartans' diamond coach for the better part of four decades.

It was men like Kobs, the late Lloyd Brazil of the University of Detroit and the now retired Ray Fisher at the University of Michigan who helped make college baseball a major sport.

NO MAN WORKED more than Kobs to develop the college world series of baseball held each year at Omaha, Neb.

No man fought the major leaguers more in their fight to sign college baseball players before the boys had completed their educations.

Kobs and his cohorts won their struggle with professional baseball. The pros no longer can touch a college student until after he has completed at least two years of his education.

"It's not that I object to a boy signing," said Kobs who saw many of his proteges get a shot in the pro ranks and a half or dozen reach the big time.

"I just feel that unless a boy gets a big bonus—something like over \$50,000—it's wrong for him to gamble on professional baseball until he gets his degree."

Kobs knew that few of the signees survived long in the pro ranks... and that once a boy signed few ever came back to finish his education.

"You can't tell me a college education isn't worth more than a \$10,000 bonus," Kobs would say.

Perhaps the greatest thrill that came to Kobs was an article in the Sporting News a few years ago. The story centered around Dick Radatz and Ron Perranowski, then the premier relief pitchers in the majors.

Both had been Kobs' "boys" at MSU. They had been on the same MSU team.

THE CHRONICLER of this effort had a personal affection for Kobs.

Had it not been for Kobs, we probably would not have enjoyed some happy years as a baseball umpire, basketball referee and a football official.

In our freshman year at State, we used to go around to do some writeups on the baseball team. During practice games, Kobs would give us a chance to umpire.

Little did we realize that a few years later, we'd be back on the same diamond, getting paid to umpire games in which Michigan State was battling a rival Big Ten school like Michigan.

Kobs would give us some sound advice. "Know the rules, keep cool, try not to have big ears," he'd tell us.

Most of the time we have kept cool as an official. But there was an occasional situation when we found that Kobs had lost his "cool."

One time he dashed out to complain about a call at first base.

He started to scream at us, when two of his players jumped into the middle of the argument and settled matters quickly.

"John, he called that one right," they said. Kobs smiled and walked back to the dugout. The last time we saw him, he was smiling as he talked about some of his "boys."

He could reflect on a fruitful life. How many of us can?

"A boy's personality and its relation to success in baseball are very important," Kujawa said.

"It's surprising what a few classes like this can do to help a boy improve his baseball skills," Kujawa said.

"So many have so much they can learn. We try to help them," Kujawa has found that the

schools have helped tremendously in Farmington.

The only equipment a boy must provide to attend the schools is a pair of gym shoes and a baseball glove.

Registration blanks may be obtained at the various schools or at any recreation center in Livonia.

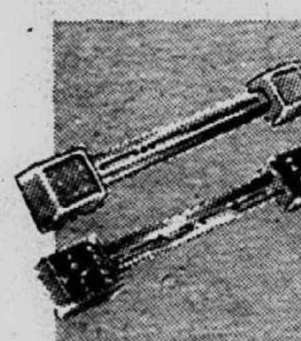

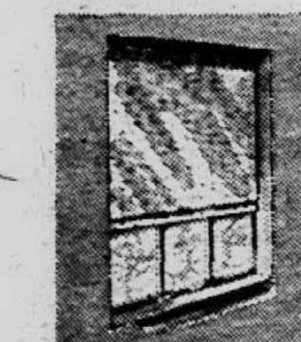

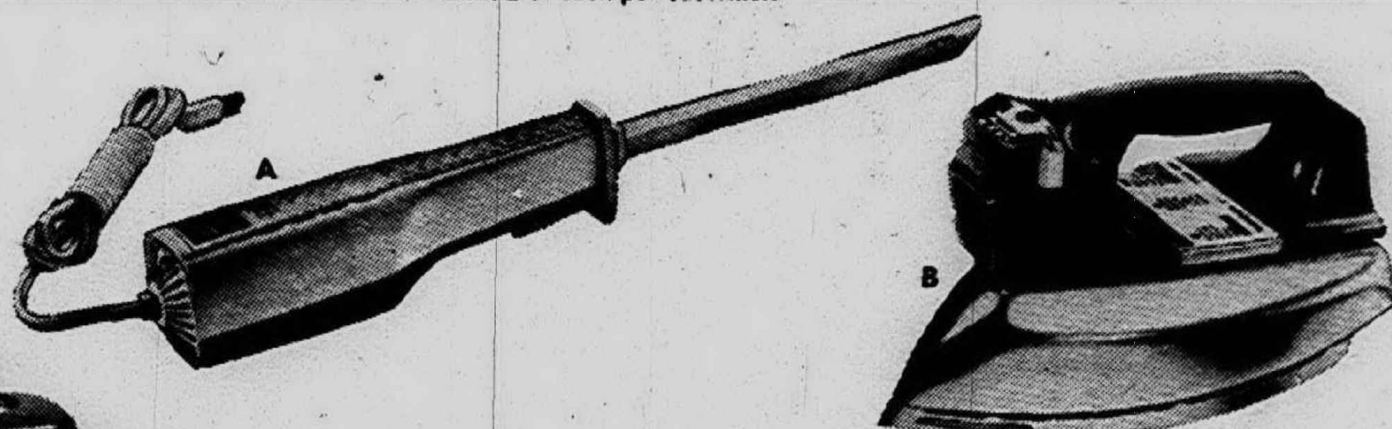

Johnson Asks Higher Ceiling For GI Loans

WASHINGTON -- President Johnson, in a special message, asked that the present 18-year-old \$7,500 ceiling on the maximum guarantee on GI home loans be raised to \$19,000. Calling the present ceiling no longer adequate, he said the higher ceiling would mean that veterans could buy bigger, more expensive houses. During the same talk, the Chief Executive also proposed a wholly new program to help finance training of veterans "to teach children of the poor, to help man under-strength police forces and fire departments, to do meaningful work in local hospitals" and to become full-time specialists in anti-poverty work.

HARRISBURG -- Pennsylvania has finished its investigation of the state's LSD blind hoax and said it would not prosecute anyone -- including Dr. Norman Yoder, suspended state commissioner for the blind, who concocted the strange tale. "The case is closed," said State Atty. Gen. William C. Sennett.

WASHINGTON -- The Senate unanimously confirmed the nomination of Clark M. Clifford to become Secretary of Defense who will replace Robert S. McNamara.

WASHINGTON -- Bill B. Ashcraft, chief agent and assistant director of the Kansas City field office of the Bureau of Drug Abuse Control, testified before a Senate Subcommittee, looking

into the diet pill industry, that several physicians carried on extensive traffic in drugs obtained under the pretext they were for overweight patients. Ashcraft, whose agency is part of the Food and Drug Administration, said it had documented cases in which some weight-control practitioners "have purchased millions of amphetamine-type drugs for diversion into illicit channels." Dr. C.C. Mendenhall, testifying before the subcommittee and who specializes in weight control, said the field was of increasing medical importance and should not be condemned for any individual abuses.

WASHINGTON -- The Post Office can't legally fire its hippie mail carriers, but it intends to make them cut their hair, trim their beards and put on their shoes, Richard Murphy, assistant postmaster general, said new regulations were being drafted to counteract the hippie invasion of the postal service. "Some of the men had hair down to their shoulders. They were wearing everything from bearskin coats to dungarees. Some wore sandals and some simply went barefoot," Murphy said. Meanwhile, 14 boys and two girls carrying placards, picketed at Brien McMahon High School, in Connecticut, where 53 pupils were suspended for wearing their hair too long. Of the suspended boys, Carl Peterson, director of secondary education, said, "No one says they're trouble-

makers or hippies. What we did in enforcing the old student dress code was to hold the line."

NEW YORK -- The Pennsylvania and New York Central Railroads, after long court delays, merged Feb. 1, for the biggest merger in corporate history and the creation of the largest privately owned railway system in the world. However, a Federal Court decision has delayed the proposed merger of the Chicago & North Western and the Chicago Great Western Railroads. The Interstate Commerce Commission has already approved the merger. But, in Minneapolis a three judge Federal Court sent the merger back to the ICC with instructions to take another look at

the complaints of the Soo Line R.R. An injunction restraining the merger was kept in effect.

CHICAGO -- Windy City police have borrowed a technique from the FBI to help crack down on chronic traffic violators who ignore their fines. A list of the "10 most wanted parking violators" is compiled and made public with arrest warrants issued -- all through the help of a computer specially set up for this purpose. The computer was purchased

in 1965 but a lot of the bugs weren't ferreted out until the following year. The first 150 tagged by the computer had more than 40 tickets each for 1966. After this batch is disposed of, the computer will continue until every parking ticket is matched with the car owner.

WASHINGTON -- The Treasury Department has \$3 million dollars in its vaults it wants to get rid of but can't because the money is in silver dollars, which are all worth more than \$1 because of their value as collector's items. Place them in circulation and they'll simply disappear and the country won't get its money's worth, the department maintains.

NEW YORK -- U.S. Steel Corp., the biggest steelmaker, has reported a 31 per cent drop in profits in 1967 from the 1966 level. It said its earn-

ings last year dropped to \$172,499,331 or \$3.19 a share, from \$249,238,569 or \$4.60 a share in 1966.

WASHINGTON -- Sen. Robert F. Kennedy publicly rejects -- at least for the time being -- the idea of carrying his opposition to administration Vietnam policies into a head-on political battle with President Johnson. Kennedy told newsmen he will not run against Johnson in any Democratic presidential pri-

maries "under any foreseeable circumstances."

CINCINNATI -- A teacher's strike in the city which closed classrooms for 23,000 students went into its third day Wednesday. However, an election scheduled to choose between two rival unions for the teachers was charged with being rigged by the smaller union. Members of the Cincinnati Teachers Union continued to walk picket lines despite a court

order banning their doing so, while members of the Cincinnati Teachers Association returned to their classrooms after accepting a salary offer.

WASHINGTON -- Solis Horwitz, assistant secretary of defense, has resigned to become a professor at his alma mater, the University of Pittsburgh. Horwitz became the first top level Pentagon employee to follow McNamara out of office.

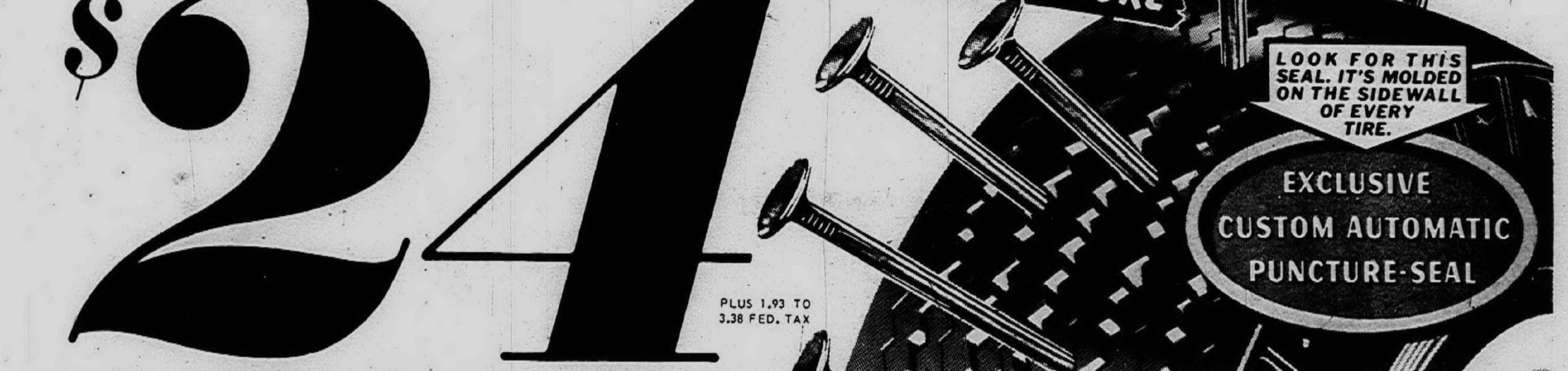

Pastry Can Be Easy

By JOYCE TOTTEN

Do you have a natural born touch with pies? Or have you prepared some tough pastries and decided to live a pie-less life.

Maybe you substitute all sorts of fancy desserts for the traditional holiday pies. Yet someone looks forward to an all-American pie. And it's really not too hard--if you know the tricks.

Little things can make the difference between poor and proud pies. You should roll the dough with a light, but firm touch from the center out along imaginary wheel spokes.

Lift the roller at the rim, and the dough should be only an eighth of an inch thick. I prefer a pastry cloth and a knit cover on the rolling pin (they come in sets) because there is less sticking and hence less need to add flour, which at the rolling stage is likely to toughen the dough. Too much water is the most frequent cause of tough crust.

Once you are pie-minded, you'll start reading, clipping, filing, testing, comparing recipes, and exchanging pie lore with every good cook in the neighborhood.

Here is a pastry for trying--especially if you have had difficulties.

NEVER FAIL PIE CRUST

- 3 c. flour
- 1 c. lard
- 1 t. salt
- 1 egg, well beaten
- 5 T. cold water
- 1 T. vinegar

Cut shortening into flour and salt until the size of small peas. Combine egg, water, and vinegar. Pour liquid into flour mixture all at once. Blend with a spoon just until flour is all moistened. This is an easy crust to handle and can be re-rolled without toughening. It also keeps in refrigerator for up to 2 weeks. Yield: Two double crusts.

DELUXE CHERRY PIE

- 2 c. pitted cherries, drained (frozen or canned)
- 1/3 c. cherry juice
- 1/8 t. almond extract
- 1/3 c. granulated sugar
- 1/3 c. brown sugar
- 3 T. quick-cooking tapioca
- 1 T. butter

Pastry for double crust pie. Combine cherries, juice, almond extract, sugars, and tapioca, let stand 15 minutes. Pour into 8" pastry-lined pie pan, dot with butter. Adjust top crust and flute edge. Bake at 450 degrees for 10 minutes, then at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

Variations: Add 1/2 t. almond extract to cherry mixture. Add finely chopped toasted almonds to pastry when rolling. In place of tapioca, use 2 tablespoons cornstarch or 4 tablespoons flour to thicken cherry mixture.

Note: If using canned cherries use a few drops of red food coloring to make it look better.

BLUEBERRY CREAM PIE

- 2 c. sour cream
- 1 c. sugar
- 1/4 c. sifted flour
- 1/2 t. salt
- 3/4 t. almond extract
- 2 eggs
- 1 9-inch unbaked graham cracker pie shell
- 2 c. canned ready-to-use blueberry pie filling
- 1/2 c. whipping cream

Combine sour cream, sugar, flour, salt, almond extract and eggs; beat well. Pour into a 9-inch pie shell. Bake in pre-heated 375 degree oven 30 minutes; remove. Spread blueberry filling over hot pie; cool. When chilled, whip cream; spread on top of pie. Serve chilled.

GERMAN SWEET CHOCOLATE PIE

- 1 4-oz. pkg German's sweet chocolate
- 1/4 c. butter
- 1 2/3 c. evaporated milk
- 1 1/2 c. sugar
- 3 T. cornstarch
- 1/8 t. salt
- 2 eggs
- 1 t. vanilla
- 1 unbaked 10-in. pie shell
- 1 1/3 c. flaked coconut
- 1/2 c. chopped pecans

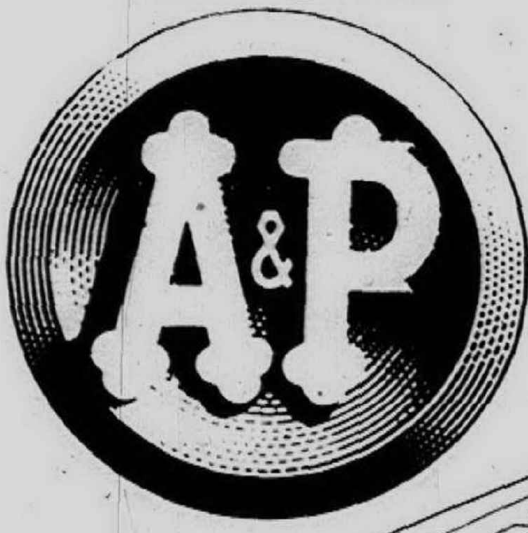
Melt chocolate with butter over low heat; stir until blended. Remove from heat; gradually blend in milk. Mix sugar, cornstarch and salt; beat in eggs and vanilla. Gradually blend in chocolate mixture; pour in pie shell. Mix coconut and pecans; sprinkle over filling. Bake at 375 degrees for 45 min. or until top is puffed. Filling will be soft, but will set while cooling. Cool at least 4 hours before serving.
