**REDFORD**—South Redford Schools Board of Education declared its support of high school administrative policy allowing the principal to decide whether speakers secured by clubs and classes could appear. The Thurston current events club, backed by an American Civil Liberties Union representative, had appealed for freedom of choice constrained only by threat to physical safety.

**REDFORD**—State Rep. Leonard Walton (D-Detroit) pleaded guilty to a reduced charge of "impaired driving" and paid a \$50 fine in justice court. Arrested on a charge of drunken driving Nov. 14, he had recently forfeited his license for 90 days after losing an appeal for excuse from the state implied Consent Law "breathalyzer" test.

**GARDEN CITY**—The City Council Monday approved the lowest of three bids for its garbage and rubbish collection service at nearly double the current rate. The contractor, Painter and Ruthenberg, submitted the low bid of \$1.35 per unit per month, starting April 1. Local residents and merchants now pay 70 cents per unit per month.

**GARDEN CITY**—The community will soon have two competing taxi cab companies for the first time in its history. The City Council Monday agreed to allow a franchise to Royal Cab Co. following numerous complaints about Garden City Cab Co.

**WESTLAND**—Cpl. Edward Bova, a 19-year-old soldier who lived most of his life in the community, was killed last week in South Vietnam during the major offensive staged by the North Vietnamese and the Viet Cong.

**WESTLAND**—A liquor license was approved for a Howard Johnson restaurant and tavern, part of a nearly \$2,500,000 development. When completed, the development will include a five-story, 125-unit motel on Cowan and Wayne Rds.

**LIVONIA**—Mayor Harvey W. Moelke said the gun instruction school he has directed the Police Department to organize is designed to promote gun safety and not to promote the purchase of weapons by citizens.

**LIVONIA**—Plans are underway to use a state law authorizing contracts for bus service to bypass a court ruling and the Michigan Public Service Commission to obtain DSR routes for Livonia.

**FARMINGTON**—Township taxpayers are in for a jolt when they receive notification of their new assessments this week. An order from the Oakland County Equalization Board to raise total assessments 20 per cent and the constitutional requirement to bring assessments up to 50 per cent of actual cash value have resulted in hikes as high as 200 per cent.

**FARMINGTON**—Negotiations for a teachers contract will begin in February. Monday night the Farmington Board of Education and the Farmington Education Association announced the negotiating teams. Robert Newhauser, FEA vice president, will head the four-man teachers team, while Asst. Supt. Marinus Van Arneyde will head the four-man board team.

## City Considering Downtown Area Apartments

The Plymouth City Commission has taken a suggestion for combination commercial-apartment buildings in the central business district under consideration in preparing a new zoning ordinance.

This came to light Monday evening when Commissioner George Hudson informed his colleagues that the present cost of land in this area was such that it was economically unsound to limit the zoning to stores alone.

The particular area under discussion was the property on Penniman Avenue that recently was raked by fire. This includes the area where the Penniman building stood, another building to the west, owned by Perry Richwine, and the other parcels up to the corner.

Whether the P&A Theatre would be included depends on the report of the engineers on the safety of the building, now that one of the walls was exposed to such intense heat during the fire.

While the Commission could take no official action on the suggestion there were no negative voices raised when the discussion got under way.

It was pointed out that the zoning would limit the buildings to four stories in height, according to Commissioner Hudson, if the entire area was used. If only half of the area was used for the building it could be as high as eight stories.

This is under a plan where

height depends on the size of the area for a building and the availability of parking. It was even hinted that the apartment building could be approved with parking in the basement or on the top floor of a ramp. Some Commissioners even hinted that the day may not be far away when the central parking lot may be built in tiers to handle parking.

Among the other changes being considered in the new zoning ordinance are the elimination of gas stations in the

central business district and designating all of the property north of Junction Street to the railroad as industrial property. This would entail both light and heavy industry.

The central business district is designated as that area bounded by Church Street on the north; Wing Street on the south; Harvey Street on the west and Deer-Union on the east.

The gasoline stations now in the area would be allowed

to remain as non-conforming use of property.

Three new classifications also will be added to the ordinance, bringing the total to an even dozen. The additions would include a parking classification, a new classification for the central business district and another making land more restrictive for multiple dwellings.

No date has been set for the official presentation of ordinance to the City Commission for final approval.

## Police Ask Local Anti-Riot Power

The Police Chiefs Committee of the County Tactical Mobile Unit is going to ask that, in any future cases of civil disorder, jurisdiction be placed in the hands of local officials instead of the County Sheriff.

The proposed rules and regulations are going to be presented at the next meeting of the Unit on February 20 and, according to Plymouth Police Chief, Robert Corrington, who is chairman of the Police Chiefs Committee, the juris-

diction issue will be the main item of discussion.

The proposed rules and regulations will outline how the unit will be activated and how each community will fit into the total picture.

"IT IS the feeling of the

committee", Chairman Corrington stated, "that the local officials are in a better position to handle any disorder than the men from the Sheriff's Patrol who may not be familiar with the area."

The proposal to take jurisdiction away from the Sheriff is a strange move in that the Tactical Mobile Unit is the brainchild of Sheriff Peter Buba. He has been working on the unit since the disorder in the inner city last summer.

According to Corrington Inspector De Vos, of the Sheriff's Department, is in favor of the proposal.

One of the proposals that already has struck a snag is one wherein each community will assume the responsibility for damage to equipment or injury to its own men in any disorder regardless of where it may break out.

THE LONE community thus far that has balked at this proposal is the City of Livonia.

The Livonia officials have stated that "it should be the responsibility of the community requesting help to assume liability for damage to equipment and injury to the personnel.

According to Corrington, Livonia has asked that consideration also be given to setting up a community fund to take care of such things—in case the request for each community to assume responsibility is voted down.

The communities now comprising the plan include Dearborn Heights, Garden City, Ecorse, River Rouge, Wayne, Northville, Redford Township, Romulus, Westland, Inkster and Plymouth. Livonia is part of the program, but isn't listed because of the opposition to the liability proposal.

THE DOWNRIVER areas, according to Chairman Corrington, have not aligned themselves officially with the Tactical Mobile Unit because they have an organization of their own.

"But", Corrington emphasized, "they all have agreed to respond in case of a call for help."

Asked about other proposals, Corrington pointed out "you never tell your opponents what your plans are, and, after all, at the moment they are just proposals."

## Driver Gets Only Broken Arm

James Click, 19, of 35441 Parkdale, Livonia, was injured Monday morning when the car he was driving struck an east-bound C & O passenger train at Haggerty Rd. just north of Plymouth Rd.

Click's car struck the second car, directly after the engine, and was dragged approximately

200 feet before it came free of the train.

Click's car was traveling south on Haggerty and broke through the railroad warning gate.

He said all he had time to do was fall back across the front seat and await the impact.

He was rushed to a hospi-

tal with a broken left arm and multiple cuts on his head and arms. He is listed in good condition.

The vehicle was destroyed, and parts of it were strewn on the path it was dragged. The boxcar itself was not damaged.

Sid came to Plymouth in 1922 and became the first manager of the area. He also designed the seal of the city that was used for years.

Along with his many other duties as an engineer Sid also

found time to faithfully serve the Boy Scouts. Only recently he was hailed for 50 years of scout work.

Twice in the last two years Sid has been confined by illness, but he is around again, hale and hearty as a member of the Rotary Club.

Along with these honors Sid also is to be honored at the annual Chamber of Commerce dinner on April 4.

## Housewives Carry Water Problem Direct To City Hall

"We are not a protest group," stated Mrs. John Daziens, spokesman for the group of Plymouth housewives who met in City Manager Richard Blodgett's office Monday morning regarding the water condition in the Parklane subdivision.

Speaking for the delegation she said they wanted to make their concern over the water situation known and request immediate action to eliminate the problem.

Mrs. Daziens, a resident of Plymouth since 1960, has read every report and analysis printed on the water problem. After waiting seven long years for action to be taken, she feels that something must be done, whether it means purifying Plymouth's water at its source or joining the Detroit water system.

"WHATSOEVER IS best and most advantageous to the city, will be fine with me," conceded Mrs. Daziens.

The women dwell on a unified request for a solution to the problem and agreed to omit personal difficulties created within their homes by the inferior water. This was perhaps the reason Mrs. Daziens described her group as a "non-protest" one.

What the women did not men-

tion is worth mentioning, if only to illustrate their problem. First, there is the thick orange substance that flows from every tap in their homes at least once every two weeks and many times more often.

When this occurs, without warning, entire laundries are ruined (who can afford to re-

place eight white dress shirts?) sinks, bowls, and tubs are stained and there is no water with which to prepare baby's formula or the family's meals.

THE WOMEN also refrained from mentioning the expensive water-softening bills, water

heater replacements and general repair bills caused by the situation.

Perhaps because these things weren't mentioned the ladies retained their composure throughout the interview and left City Hall with feeling of accomplishment.

THE EXPRESSWAY under present plans will cut out approximately one-third of a possible school site now owned by the board.

The difficulty with purchasing the new property is that the land is rolling and would require a lot of fill to be brought up to grade.

However, Plymouth Township has projects plans for a sewer line which would run just north of the property—which is an incentive to buy.

Board President Esther Hulsing said she would "really like to explore the building of a middle and elementary school on the same site, as was proposed, because the board has never done this in the past."

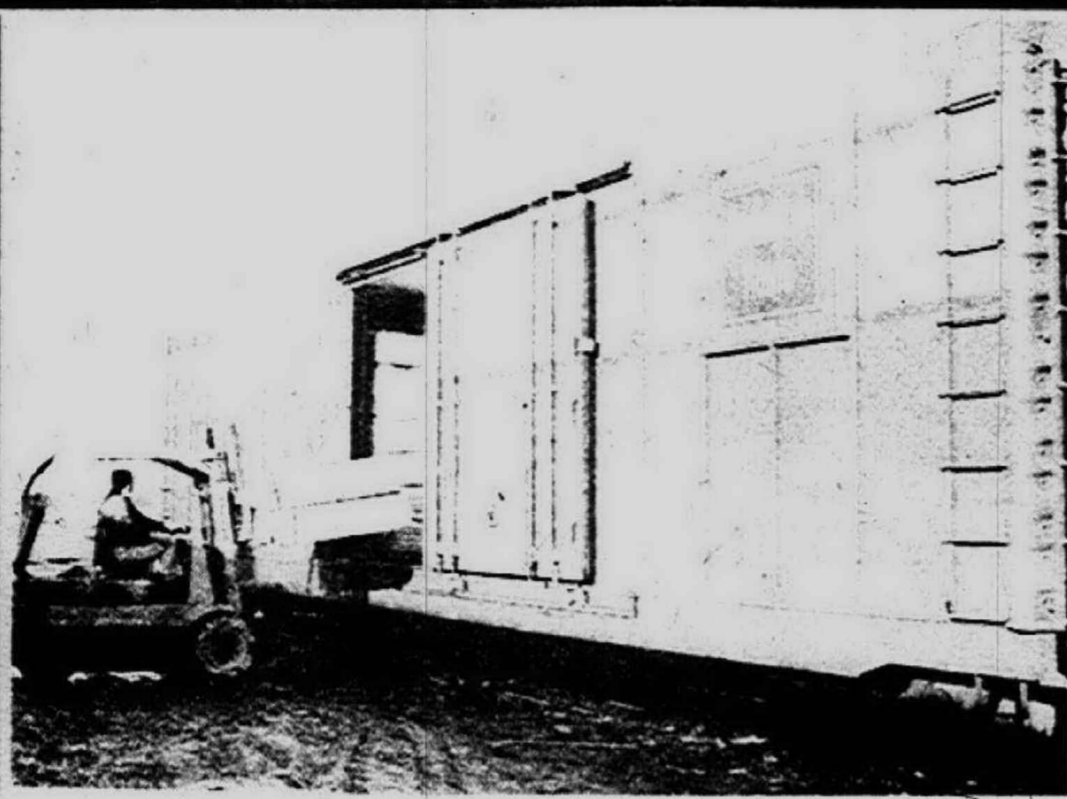
MRS. HULSING was referring to the fact that the school board has no policy which would allow Continued On Page 4A

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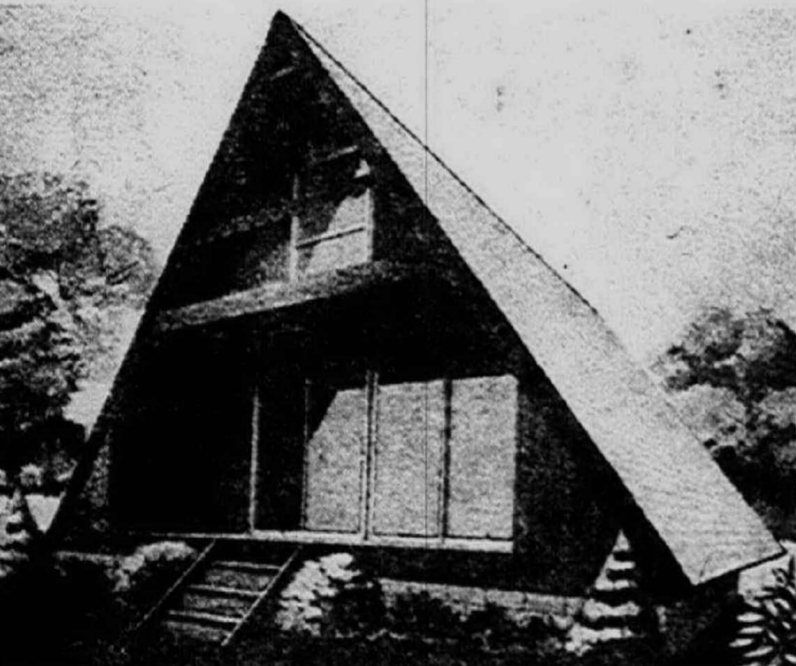
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## Schoolcraft Offers Chance For 52-Day Trip To Europe

If you are a geography bug with a yen to travel, the Schoolcraft College Geography Department is offering a 52-day field trip to five Western European countries that may be just the way for you to satisfy both desires this summer.

Offered as part of the department's curriculum, Geography 280 will carry six hours of college credit during the Summer Session, and will emphasize rural as well as urban geography of Europe.

The course has been in the planning stage for a year and a half and will send its first class of students to Europe via prop jet charter aircraft on June 25.

THE 16-CITY TOUR will include stops at Amsterdam, Munich, Rome, Paris and London, as well as small agricultural villages along the Rhine River of Germany and to such cultural centers as Heidelberg and Florence.

What's more, according to Ralph Miller, geography instructor who will lead the tour, you need not be presently enrolled in college to take the tour.

The course is open to all residents of the Schoolcraft College district who have high school certificate or its equivalent, and who can meet the requirements for the course.

Miller, who joined the Schoolcraft faculty a year ago, has conducted a number of geography tours of Europe for Wayne State University.

TRAVEL ON THE Continent will be by first-class rail coach, and by river and channel steamer. Lodging will be in University Hotels or small European-style hotels.

According to Miller, the tour plan assures constant contact with foreign students and people.

Total cost for transportation, lodging and meals for the 52-day trip is \$1,025, plus college applications fee and tuition fees for the six hours of credit. Students now attending other colleges are eligible for the tour and transferable college credit, Miller said.

## Plan Series Of Classes For Diabetics

A new series of classes for diabetics and their families will begin Feb. 26 at 7 p.m. in the Wayne County Health Center, Merriman Road, Elioise.

Instruction by professional staff covers topics which explain the condition of diabetes mellitus, its control and treatment, and the relationship of diet.

The importance of the diabetic's cooperation with his physician is stressed along with the patient's responsibility in caring for himself in order to lead an active, normal life.

All diabetics regardless of age may attend with written approval from their physicians. Families of diabetics are also encouraged to participate in the class discussions. Children under 14 should be accompanied by a parent.

The series consists of five two-hour classes on consecutive Monday evenings. Interested persons may register by telephoning the Wayne County Department of Health, PA 1-0200 or CR 4-2800, Extension 6901. Registrations are also being taken for the spring term of classes to begin April 15.

## \$900,000 Drive Set By YWCA

The YWCA of Metropolitan Detroit has launched a \$1.6 million expansion fund campaign, with \$900,000 budgeted for new facilities in the northwest area serving Livonia and other Observerland communities.

It is the first such fund drive in 40 years by the organization which plans modernization of four YW branches--Downtown, Northern, Oakland and Northwest.

Another \$700,000 in matching funds will be contributed by the United Foundation. Improvements at the Northwest Branch, at Grand River and Beech-Daly, will include a swimming pool and new meeting rooms.

Three-year pledges will be solicited by campaign volunteers contacting groups, corporations, businesses and individuals. No door-to-door drive is scheduled, however.

PLANS FOR the fund drive were announced at a Diamond Jubilee Dinner of the YWCA, Dale I. Sellers, Senior Vice President of the Bank of the Commonwealth and general chairman of the YW campaign, told the dinner audience, "This program becomes even more significant when we realize that by 1980 half the total population of Metropolitan Detroit will be under 25 years of age."

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# Accreditation Team Appearance Brings Peace Schoolcraft College Turmoil Ends Quietly

Everything is serene on the Schoolcraft College campus after a week of turmoil during which the administration was put on a hot seat after six probationary teachers were dismissed because they failed to meet the standards required of new teachers.

Charges and counter charges filled the air as a student investigating committee requested the Board of Trustees for public meeting for an explanation of the firings.

There were threats of a student strike, picketing and charges that the dismissals would lower the quality of education at the college.

Then as quickly as it started, the entire matter dissolved into thin air and the campus was as quiet as a church on a Sunday morning when a three-man accreditation team appeared Thursday and Friday for a final inspection of the college prior to a recommendation to the

North Central Association.

SCHOOLCRAFT has been trying desperately to gain accreditation and appears on the verge of approval, depending entirely on the report of the accreditation team and a hearing before the NCA Board next month in Chicago.

There isn't any question but that settlement of the turmoil came as a direct result of the scheduled appearance of the accreditation team.

The trio, which included: Chairman Dr. Charles Allen, of the University of Illinois; Dr. Ken Brunner, from Southern Illinois University; and Dr. Reed Buffington, president of Chabot College in Hayward, Calif., had specific instructions.

The report, the final one on Schoolcraft, included such things as the relationship of the students and the administration, the feeling between the

faculty and the administration, the faculty and the students, the character of the campus, the buildings, the contents of the library and similar items.

Thus, the administration and the Board of Trustees didn't want the team to run into such things as student pickets, an unhappy faculty, dissension between department heads—all of which could have been picked up in a hurry if the situation hadn't been corrected in advance.

AS IT WAS, the following events took place, none of which has been completely explained by those involved.

No. 1, a group of students, forming an investigating committee, asked for and received an audience with The Observer to explain its dismissals. The group wanted an open meeting with the Board of Trustees to hear first hand the reasons for the firings.

No. 2, Such a meeting was promised by Board Chairman Harold Fischer if asked for in writing. The request was made but Fischer was unable to arrange a quorum of the Trustees and had to delay the meeting until the regular Board session.

No. 3, The Trustees held an executive session during which they took action to deny

an open meeting and backed the administration in its action. No. 4, College President Dr. Eric Bradner made a hurried trip home from a vacation in Phoenix, Ariz. to meet with top administration officials and discuss the situation.

No. 5, Dr. Bradner, Vice President John Brinn and Dean of Students Edward McNally met with department heads and

ironed out many difficulties that had cropped out in the evaluation of the abilities of faculty members.

No. 6, The same administrators called a meeting of student representatives and went over every step of the actions leading to the dismissals of the six probationary instructors, one of whom was in the third year, three in the

second and two in the first. Normally instructors are on two years probation after which a tenure contract is tendered or a dismissal by registered mail 90 days before the end of the college year.

DURING THE MEETING with the students, it was brought out that the administration had followed the provisions of the

contract with the Faculty Forum in handling each of the six cases.

Apparently the students were satisfied, not a word has been heard from the group since.

No. 7, The Board met last Wednesday in regular session and the matter never came up for discussion. This despite the fact that Dr. George Martin, a Board member, had sent a memorandum to each Trustee charging that the Board had erred in not allowing a public meeting and so making other charges against the administration.

Dr. Martin had sent the memorandum to The Observer with the request that it be published to show voters in his Livonia district how he felt.

IN LIEU OF his letter and memorandum, it was thought that Dr. Martin would bring the matter to the attention of the Trustees at the Wednesday meeting — but he never mentioned it and neither did any other Trustee.

No. 8, The accreditation team arrived the following day and found everything in apple pie order. It was just as if the turmoil over the six dismissals had never happened.

Meanwhile, the Faculty Forum negotiating team already has started sessions with the administration team over a contract for next year. Last year the sessions continued for eight months before an agreement was reached—with the present situation, one wonders if the teams will ever reach agreement this time.

## GM Names Manager In Livonia

The appointment of Dick T. French as manager of the General Motors Parts Division distribution center at Livonia has been announced.

French, a native of Pond Creek, Okla., has been manager of the parts distribution center at Memphis, Tenn. since 1964. At Livonia, he succeeds Henry C. Wright, who was promoted to another GMPD post.

French joined GMPD in 1940 at Oklahoma City. He was transferred to Ft. Worth in 1952 and the following year

was made foreman at the Dallas distribution center, rising to general foreman in 1956. He was appointed manager of the distribution center in San Antonio in 1961 and of the Houston operation in 1962.

Active in community affairs, French has served as an assistant cub master and committeeman in the Cub Scouts, board member in the Methodist Church and as assistant coach and administrator in the Pee Wee Baseball League.

He and his wife, Dolores, have three children.

## Soil Sample

### Tool Developed

A unique tool that enables soil scientists to remove soil samples virtually undisturbed from as far down as 100 feet has been developed at the Bureau of Reclamation's Engineering and Research Center in Denver.

Known as a double-tube auger sampler, it consists of two steel barrels, one inside the other, with a cutting head and flights of augers on the outer barrel. It operates without the need of air or water injection.

## 2 Detroiters Face Execution In Cop Slaying

TWO YOUNG Detroiters, if convicted, could become the first persons legally executed in Michigan in more than a generation. Ovis Frierson, 24, and Nathaniel Spivey, 19, are charged in federal court with robbing the Trenton State Bank last week and murdering Trenton Patrolman Robert Pare, 34, as he tried to arrest them. Frierson is accused of being the actual gunman. Michigan law has no capital punishment, but an execution could be performed for a federal crime at the federal prison in Milan.

## News Round Up

MAJ. GEN. Ronald D. McDonald, Michigan's former adjutant general, was momentarily reinstated by Acting Gov. Milliken under orders from the State Supreme Court, which had ruled that McDonald was improperly removed by Gov. Romney. But Milliken then immediately retired McDonald "under honorable conditions." McDonald will receive back pay amounting to \$78,000 and monthly retirement benefits of \$1,200. He had been suspended in 1964 during a land-liquor-money scandal involving the National Guard.

THE STATE SENATE has given 30-1 approval of a bill to license private police, security guards and patrol services, all to be regulated by the State Police. Another bill, approved 27-0, will allow the election, in the next general election, of county officers in cases where the office has been filled by appointment; county officers ordinarily have a four-year term. Both bills go to the House.

CHIEF JUDGE T. John Lesinski resisting a bill that would give his State Court of Appeals the job of hearing appeals from probate courts and state administrative agencies. He says his court would need 11 to 16 more judges, adding that he's not out "to build an empire."

SEARS, ROEBUCK & Co. is recalling some 6,000 Homart natural gas baseboard heaters after the death of a Jackson man in October. The Tennessee firm which manufactured them has gone out of business. The State Health Dept. attributes the problem to a defective tube which cracked and allowed carbon monoxide gas to escape.

GOV. ROMNEY, campaigning in Wisconsin for the GOP presidential nomination, has been adopted and made an honorary chief by the Winnebago Indian tribe. A sign carried in the ceremony said: "We need them who speak without forked tongue."

FOUR OTHER winners will be able to buy a black and white portable television, an AM/FM radio, 100 gallons of Wards gasoline and a boy's

or girl's bicycle for 22 pennies. Registrations for the "bargains" will commence Feb. 15, and continue through Saturday, Feb. 24. Entry blanks will be available at all Merchants' Council member stores.

## State Troopers Arrest 21,280 During Busy Holiday Season In December

Michigan State Police officers made 21,280 arrests in December, 19,403 for traffic offenses and 1,877 on criminal complaints, according to the department's monthly activity report.

In addition, 506 juvenile traffic offenders were arrested and 519 delinquent minors apprehended.

Troopers assisted 4,781 motorists, investigated 10,431 cars, issued 27,068 oral warnings to drivers, and made 20,594 property and 2,676 liquor inspections.

THE IDENTIFICATION section received 14,579 sets of fingerprints, of which 9,292 were criminal and 5,287 non-criminal. Five wanted persons were identified.

Of 1,906 applicants for permits to carry concealed weapons, 90 were identified with criminal records through their fingerprints.

The crime laboratory conducted 1,105 examinations, of

which 374 were on documents, 328 on firearms, 142 botanical, 135 microscopic, 56 on tool markings and 70 miscellaneous.

LABORATORY assistances

numbered 90 for municipal departments, 82 for the State Police, 32 for sheriffs and four for other agencies.

The latent print unit examined 29,782 individual fingerprints,

including 21,562 for the State Police, 6,418 for local police and 1,802 for sheriffs. There were 47 subjects identified, including 32 suspects in crime cases.

The fraudulent check unit processed 236 bogus checks, identifying 139 of them by name or previous specimen. Face value of the checks totaled \$15,090.35, an average of \$63.94.

## Judge Sets Clark Trial On April 2

The Circuit Court trial of Dr. Ronald T. Clark on a manslaughter charge is scheduled to start Tuesday, April 2, before Judge William John Beer in Pontiac.

The 56-year-old Farmington Township physician is accused of causing the death last Nov. 3 of Mrs. Grace Neil, 43, of 20225 Renssler, Livonia, through an overdose of sodium pentothal.

Mrs. Neil died in Dr. Clark's office, 30735 Grand River, while allegedly undergoing treatment as a heart patient. She also was employed by the medic as a part-time nurse.

Her death is one of several involving patients of Dr. Clark still being investigated by Oakland Prosecutor S. Jerome Bronson.

ATTORNEY PHILIP Rowston of Pontiac, who is the physician's court-appointed counsel, said this week after being notified of the trial date that he is seriously considering petitioning for a change of venue because of the great publicity which the Clark case has attracted.

"However, so far I haven't talked to the prosecutor about it and really haven't formalized anything yet," said Rowston.

Granting of a change of venue by the court would mean shifting the trial to another judicial district.

# School Assured Of Canton Sewer

Robert Wade, Canton Township engineer, told the Plymouth Board of Education Monday night that the Township will have sewer and water supplied to the new high school on Canton Center and Joy Roads a year from this spring.

Wade reported that plans already have been drawn for the route of a 12 inch water line at an estimated cost to the township of \$40,000.

The route is most unusual. After the line turns north on Canton Center Road from Warren Road it has to wind behind a group of homes that have refused to grant easement privileges to the township.

After the sewer makes the turn around the lots, it will

again come onto Canton Center Road and go to Joy Road, and then west to the end of the school site.

Along with the water line there will be a fire loop through the school property which will consist of a 10-inch pipe line and might cost the school dis-

trict, which must pay for the construction, an estimated \$18,540.

The water line itself will cost the school district \$3.75 a foot or \$14,062.50, Wade said.

The sewer, which will travel almost the same route as the water line, will be under con-

struction in late Spring, Wade claimed, and the only thing stopping the township at this time were two permits.

The State Department of Health and the Wayne County Drain Commission have yet to give their approval.

it to build a middle and elementary school so close together. She also referred to the problems the land presents in its difficult topography.

In other related action, the board authorized the final payment to purchase a 17-acre future elementary school site located on Ann Arbor Trail just north of McClumpha Rd. Upon recommendation of the architectural firm of O'Dell, Hewlett and Luckenbach, Associates, the board took this positive action.

The architects reported that test borings of the ground indicate that it is well drained and that there will be no water problems.

ON THE OTHER hand, while new school sites are being considered and purchased, work progress on two schools is slowly falling behind.

Elementary school No. 9, on Canton Center and Ann Arbor Roads, and Middle School No. 3 are critically behind construction deadlines set for August, officials said.

# Rep. Esch Praises New Draft Law Revisions

Congressman Marvin L. Esch (R-Mich.) today commended the Education and Labor Committee for its hearings on the effect that recent draft law revisions will have on graduate schools

throughout the nation. Esch also urged the committee to expand its hearings to consider the disastrous effect of a recent selective service ruling that Junior College, technical, business and occupational students are not eligible for IIS classifications.

POINTING OUT that close to one third of all graduate school students might be drafted during the next year, Esch said "this would have a dis-

astrous impact on our institutions of higher education. "We must also be concerned about the effect on the future of our society caused by the interruption of the studies of these young men," Esch continued. "Our social sciences are becoming increasingly important, but promising students will be interrupted in the middle of their academic careers. Indications are that they will be less likely to complete their education if it is interrupted for a two-year period. "Non-medical science students will also be affected," Esch said, "and the nation will suffer from the lack of young engineers, physicists, biologists, and other researchers."

ESCH ALSO criticized the ruling regarding less than four-year degree programs saying, "This policy is discriminatory against students from low income families and those from disadvantaged homes. The two-year occupational program may be their only chance for higher education and they should not be penalized because their parents are unable to support them through an entire four year bachelor's degree program."

# High Court Gault Ruling Benefits Juvenile Panels

ANN ARBOR--The Supreme Court's Gault decision has reinstated juvenile courts "within the mainstream of American jurisprudence," but is not itself enough to bring about the major changes needed, according to a University of Michigan social work professor.

Dr. Robert D. Vinter told lawyers' seminar here that the juvenile courts can serve the Gault decision's requirements only if they are able to better balance their operational commitments with their resources.

has "ambitious mandates for justice, welfare, and community protection," he declared. But it depends on local good will and support in its most vital features: election of the judge, basic operating budget, cooperation of community agencies and services, and validation of court performance by such local groups as police and schools, Vinter explained. Generally, he stated, the Gault decision "places new demands upon the judiciary without reducing local pressures upon the court or resolving its community entanglements."

facts should be assessed in relation to several other modern trends, he noted.

--Welfare programs outside the court are becoming the main source of public services available to youth in trouble.

--Local resources for court support are becoming increasingly difficult.

--Manpower trends indicate that few additional skilled personnel will be available soon.

Vinter said that the juvenile court's role will be narrowed, due to these trends, to two major tasks: authorizing or reviewing state intervention in situations involving jeopardy or loss of personal rights; and acting in situations where judicial review is required for provision of specialized state services.

THE GAULT DECISION, he continued, imposes only on clear procedural requirement on the pre-hearing stage in juvenile courts: a hearing must be preceded by serving of timely notice setting forth "the alleged misconduct and particularity."

FOR THE ACTUAL adjudication in a case, Vinter related, the Gault decision implies four considerations: the hearing must be based on a notice phrased in "particular" rather than general terms; an adequate record must be kept; attorneys may be present; and appeal is possible.

This may require that evidence on the alleged events of a case be separated from considerations of the individual's social history, he said.

## Urge Care In All Ski Trips

As ski enthusiasts throughout the nation headed for the hills, a word of warning was issued by Gerald W. Shipman, Executive Secretary of the Michigan State Safety Commission in Lansing.

"We hope skiers will ski on our slopes and not on our highways," he said. "It's unfortunate that the very ingredient--snow--that is essential for skiing, is also the ingredient that makes highways treacherous."

Shipman pointed out that the best skiing weather often coincides with the worst driving conditions, and urged drivers to prepare their cars accordingly before embarking on a weekend ski trip.

"THE DRIVE TO and from the ski area is often a far more

hazardous venture than the actual skiing," he said. "Most ski enthusiasts spend days planning a ski trip, buying and maintaining equipment, getting the proper clothing, and in making advance reservations. Yet so few take the little time necessary to see that their car is ready for the trip. Even more surprising, most skiers wouldn't think of starting down a slope unless they were sure their ski equipment was in safe operating condition, but some of these same skiers give little or no advance thought to the condition of their cars."

Pointing out that inadequate traction and reduced visibility are the hazards likely to be encountered at this time of year, Shipman recommended a pre-trip vehicle checkup, paying particular attention to the

brakes, tires, lights, battery, heater-defroster, and windshield wipers.

"BE SURE YOUR tires have good treads. Conventional snow tires help, particularly in loosely-packed snow. Studded snow tires are good on icy pavements but it is important to the driver to know that on wet pavement they do not have as much stopping power as regular treads," he said.

Carry reinforced tire chains in your trunk in case of severe snow and ice conditions. They provide four to seven times as much pulling power as regular tires without chains and are particularly helpful for climbing icy grades or pulling through deep snow.

A selected sample of households in this area will be asked questions about their employment during 1967 as part of the February current population survey conducted by the U.S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census, according to Robert A. Yerkey, director of the bureau's regional office in Detroit.

The 1967 survey questions will be aimed at finding out the number of weeks worked during the year, the amount of time lost because of unemployment and other reasons, and the job held the longest time during the year by each person over 14 years of age in sample households.

The current population survey is taken each month from a representative sample of households in 449 areas throughout the United States chiefly to obtain national estimates of current employment and unemployment. The identity of households is confidential by law, and the facts obtained are used for statistical purposes only.

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# Cooking With Eggs

By JOYCE TOTTEN

It's quite special, that well-designed food package called the egg! Whether you enjoy it in a puffy omelet or plain poached, use it as an ingredient in recipes, or transform it into a smooth-as-velvet custard or other dessert, the egg is a good cook's most versatile standby.

In the selection of eggs, sizes and grades make the difference in price.

Egg grades are based on the shell as well as the interior quality. Eggs are candled by experienced graders. Buy by grade for protection, U.S. Grade AA- 1st quality; U.S. Grade A- 2nd quality; U.S. Grade B- 3rd quality.

Grade B eggs are excellent for cooking and in places where appearance is not important.

THE COLOR of the shell does not affect the nutritive value, but it may affect the price.

A good rule to remember in selecting among various sizes is this--small eggs are as economical as large ones when they are at least 1/4 cheaper. Medium eggs are a better buy than large when they are at least 1/8 cheaper. Lower grade eggs may be used for cooking or scrambling. This can be a money saver.

HERE ARE a few suggestions for eggs, fun to prepare and serve, and delectable to eat.

Popovers are an impressive scrumptious surprise for breakfast or any meal. They're light as clouds, crisp and crusty. Serve them hot from the oven, with butter curls and sweetly tart jam, marmalade or jelly.

Curried Eggs in Shrimp Sauce will become a Lenten favorite you'll fix the year around. The sauce, made from frozen cream of shrimp soup, is delicately flavored with American cheese.

Angel Fluff Cake owes its elegance and its taste --it-to-believe-- its goodness to the unassuming egg! Air beaten into the whites makes the cake rise to heavenly heights, while you use some of the yolks in a rich custard-whipped cream filling.

### POPOVERS

2 eggs  
1 c. milk  
1 c. sifted all-purpose flour  
1/2 t. salt  
1 T. cooking oil  
Place eggs in bowl; add milk, flour, and salt. Beat 1 1/2 minutes with rotary or electric beater. Add cooking oil; beat 30 seconds more. (Don't overbeat.) Fill 6 to 8 well greased custard cups 1/2 full. Bake in very hot oven (475) 15 minutes. Reduce heat to moderate (350) and bake 25 to 30 minutes or till browned and firm. A few minutes before removing from oven, prick each pop-over with a fork to let steam escape. Serve hot. Makes 6 to 8. Note: The eggs hold in the steam which makes these little breads "pop".

**CURRIED EGGS IN SHRIMP SAUCE**  
8 hard-cooked eggs  
1/3 c. mayonnaise or salad dressing  
1/2 t. salt  
1/4 t. curry powder  
1/2 t. paprika  
1/4 t. dry mustard  
2 T. butter or margarine  
2 T. all-purpose flour  
1 can frozen condensed cream of shrimp soup  
1 soup can milk  
1/2 c. shredded sharp natural cheddar cheese  
1 c. soft bread crumbs  
1 T. butter or margarine, melted

Cut eggs in half lengthwise; remove yolks and mash; mix with mayonnaise and seasonings. Refill egg whites; arrange eggs in 10 x 6 x 1 1/2 inch baking dish. For Shrimp Sauce: Melt the 2 T. butter; blend in flour. Stir in soup and milk; cook and stir till sauce thickens. Add cheese; stir till melted. Cover eggs with sauce. Mix crumbs and melted butter; sprinkle around edge of mixture in baking dish. Bake in moderate oven (350) 15 to 20 minutes or till heated through. Garnish with parsley. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

**ANGEL FLUFF CAKE**  
For a hurry-up version, use packaged angel cake mix. Slice the cake into 3 equal layers. Custard Whipped Cream Filling: In saucepan, mix 1/2 c. sugar, 1/3 c. flour, and 1/2 t. salt; slowly stir in 2 cups milk. Cook and stir over medium heat till mixture boils and thickens; cook 2 minutes more. Stir a small amount of hot mixture into 3 slightly beaten egg yolks; return to remaining hot mixture. Stirring constantly, bring just to boiling. Remove from heat; stir in 1 t. vanilla. Cool. Fold in 1 c. whipped cream, whipped. Spread between the 3 layers of the cake. Top cake with frozen raspberries, slightly thawed or fresh strawberries.

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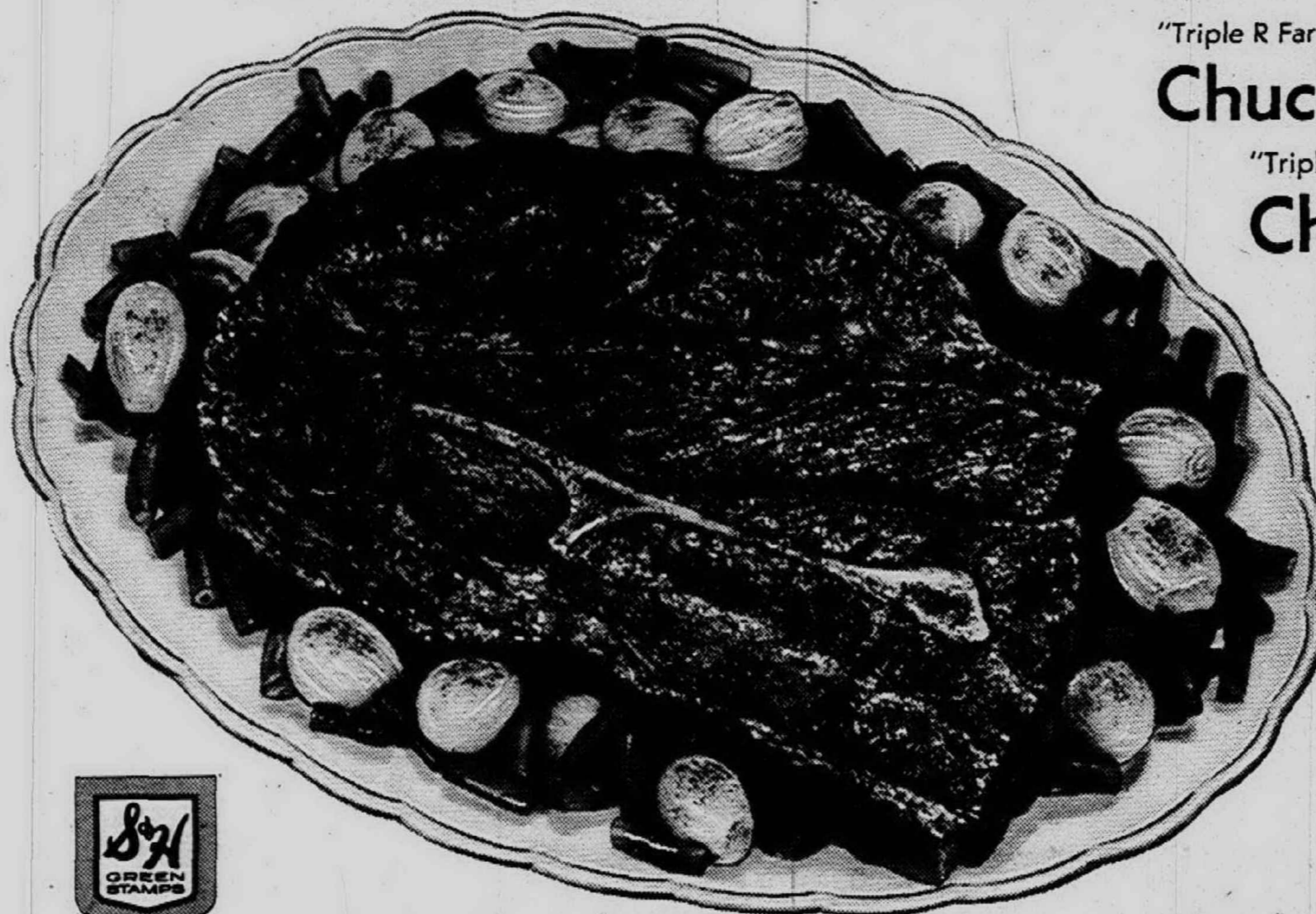
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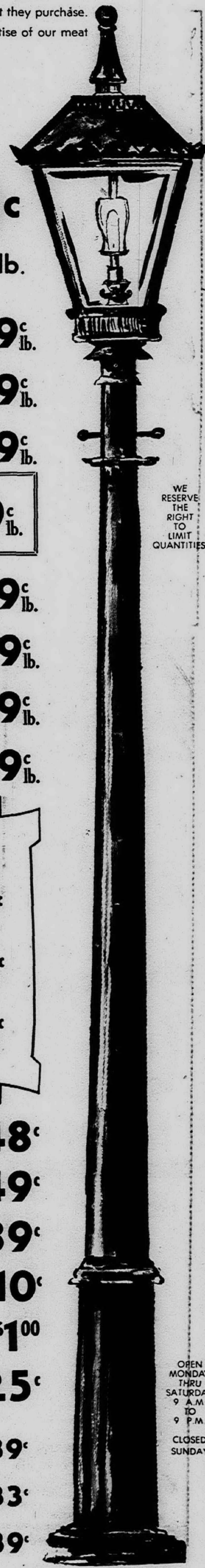

The vehicle was destroyed, and parts of it were strewn on the path.

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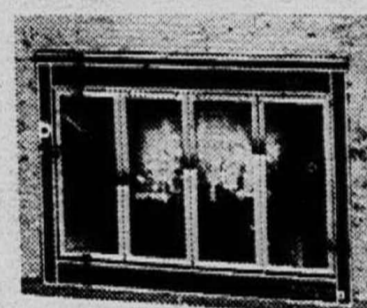
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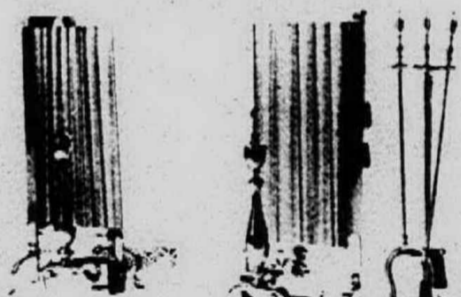


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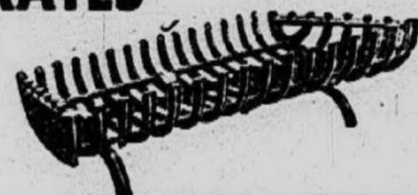

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# U.S. Acts After 3 Die, 50 Hurt In Riots

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ORANGEBURG, S.C. -- Six months of behind-the-scenes talks about the "whites only" policy of All Star Triangle Bowl in Orangeburg exploded into nighttime demonstrations and riots last week. Three Negro teen-age students were killed from gun fire. The U.S. Justice Department has filed suit to

desegregate the bowling establishment, which is the only one in the town. A department spokesman in Washington also announced that a preliminary investigation is being conducted by the FBI to determine whether federal law was violated in connection with the three deaths and the wounding of 50 other persons.

CHICAGO--Three Europeans arrested by U.S. Customs agents who said they were carrying \$10 million worth of heroin were assigned a public defender over the weekend when they said they had no money to hire attorneys. They are Antonio M. De La Cruz, 53, of Marseilles, France and Catalina Munoz, 59, and Rafaela Munoz, 61, both of Barcelona, Spain. Customs agents said De La Cruz had six packets of heroin in plastic bags strapped to his body and that the women had 14 packets under their clothing.

A. Rockefeller said Saturday night that the striking city sanitationmen's union had agreed to return to work immediately under a plan that would allow the state to take over garbage clearing chores. The plan would grant the 10,000 striking garbage men a \$425 raise.

WOODBRIDGE, N.J. -- The Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service announced that tentative agreement was reached Saturday in a strike at a New Jersey copper refinery and called it a "significant development" in ending the nationwide copper strike. The nationwide strike has closed down most of the copper industry since mid-July.

ST. LOUIS--The brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen's strike against three major railroads has ended with the railroads agreeing to increase the size of 50 per cent of the train crews. The railroads retained the right to negotiate the issue of remaining crews. The union struck the Missouri Pacific and the Texas & Pacific Feb. 5 and the Seaboard Coast Line the next day.

WASHINGTON -- Congressional backstage accounts are filled with reports that Sen. Frank Lausche (D-O.) is getting set to jump the fence and join the Republicans. Reportedly, Lausche is going to make the move for two reasons: Refusal of the Ohio Democratic organization to endorse him for reelection, while giving official nod to former Rep. John Gilligan, Cincinnati; and fear that in a primary contest the much younger and more liberal Gilligan would take the Democratic nomination away from him.

MILWAUKEE--Rev. James E. Groppi, a firebrand priest prominent in a nonstop campaign for a strong, city-wide

LOS ANGELES -- Superior Court Judge Marvin H. Lewis recently directed that the public and news media be excluded from the trial of William Anthony Clinger in Ventura, Calif. while the jury is not present. However, the State Court of Appeals in Los Angeles has ordered Judge Lewis to rescind his decision or show cause. The court's action was sought by the Oxnard Publishing Co., publishers of the Oxnard Press Courier.

NEWARK, N.J. -- A special commission on racial disorders has condemned the methods used by the state and Newark police and city administration and New Jersey National Guard in handling riots in Newark last summer. In the 477-page report, the blue-ribbon commission charged that the police and guardsmen had used "excessive and unjustified force" against Negroes during the riot. It also said that it had found a "pervasive feeling of corruption in Newark city government," and called for a grand jury investigation.

WASHINGTON -- Interstate Commerce Commission hearings on a proposal to discontinue the California Zephyr--one of the nation's last luxury trains--will become the trial for long distance passenger trains. Some observers feel that if the Zephyr--which continues to attract many passengers--can't make it, that will hasten the end of the other few remaining luxury trains, all of which have had sagging financial losses and suffered dwindling patronage.

FLORIDA-- The recent cold wave that struck the entire Atlantic seaboard has forced temperatures to abnormally low degrees in the south, especially Florida. Freeze warnings were issued in the state and the freezing cold has threatened the citrus crop.

WASHINGTON -- Cyrus R. Vance, President Johnson's emissary to South Korea and Johnson's emissary to Detroit during last summer's civil disorder, is entitled to a fee of \$92 a day, plus expenses, while on the assignment. However, Vance has never accepted a fee.

WASHINGTON -- Sen. Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.) said President Johnson in recent days repeatedly has expressed his full confidence in Gen. William C. Westmoreland's ability to cope with a threatened new Communist offensive at Khe Sanh. Mansfield, the Senate majority leader, took part in an interview of recently published reports that Westmoreland might soon be replaced as commander in Vietnam, possibly by

open housing law, faced a possible fine or jail sentence Saturday after being convicted of resisting arrest. A 12-member Circuit Court jury, that included one Negro, returned the verdict against the white, Roman Catholic cleric after two hours and 35 minutes of deliberation.

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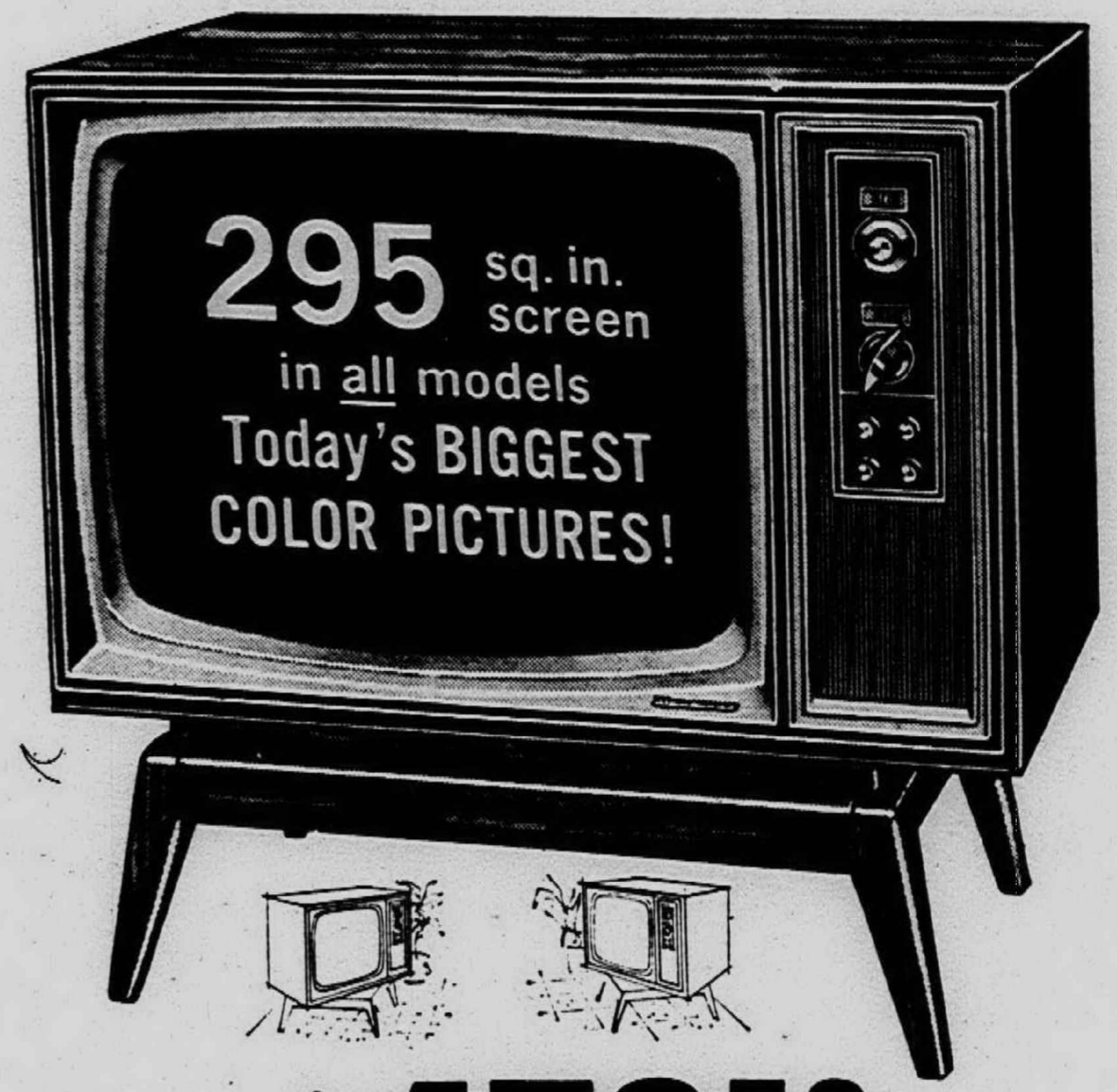
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# Hail To The Champ...East Cops League Flag

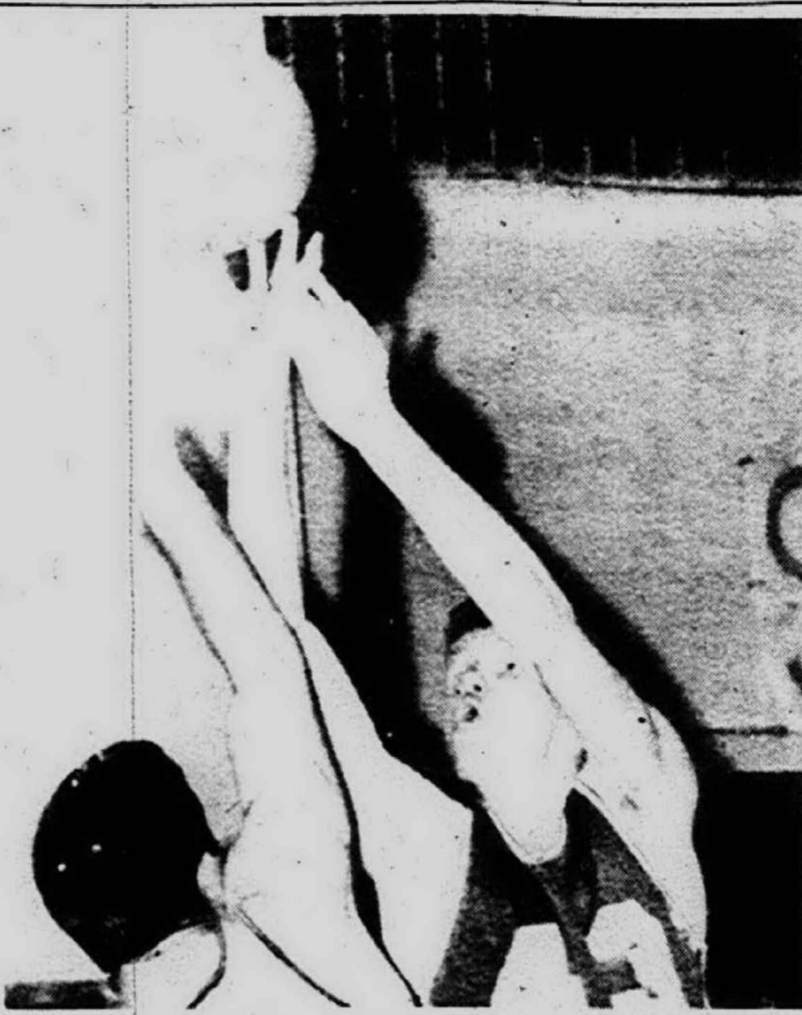
The scoring for Bentley was on the balanced side. Leroy Watson had 12 points, Doyle 11 and Bollin 10 to finish in double figures.

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## Mel Blunk Relaxes At Auto Races

# Change Of Scenery Helps Him Manage Finances

Mel Blunk is equally at ease discussing the ups and downs of auto racing as he is talking about the ins and outs of running the big business of the Plymouth Community School District.

"Everyone has to have a hobby of some kind," Blunk commented, "and I enjoy auto racing."

Each year the assistant superintendent in charge of school business travels to Indianapolis to witness the thrilling 500-mile event.

It allows him a refreshing break from the ever pressing job of managing the 54-square-mile district's finances and for a little while, at least, he doesn't have to talk shop.

BLUNK WAS BORN in Plymouth in 1915 and has spent his entire life, except for his time in the Army during World War II, in his home town.

This is his 31st year in education and a career which began shortly after he graduated from Plymouth High School in 1933.

He entered college in 1934 at Michigan State Normal College, which is now Eastern Michigan University, and finished there in 1937.

Like everyone else at that time, Blunk had to work his way through school.

He is probably one of the few people left in Plymouth who once was an usher and then manager of the old Peninman-Allen Theater in its heyday.

He started as an usher in the theater while in high school and he can remember when the huge organ, which is long since gone, used to play for silent movies and vaudeville acts.

This job kept him going until he became a math and science teacher at Decatur High School in Decatur the year after he left college.

MEL THEN MOVED to Plymouth High School in 1939 as a math instructor and two years later was drafted into the Army.

Blunk was stationed in the Adjutant General's Section of the 1st Infantry Division. The 1st is known as "The Big Red One" and is serving in Vietnam now.

Serving with this crack division is an experience that Blunk never will forget.

He said, "That outfit was made up of regular Army men who made the service their

whole life. They were a rough bunch and a man found out quickly if he could make it or not."  
The new recruit trained in England and 30 days before the big Normandy invasion he was transferred to the Adjutant General's staff.  
"I didn't mind," he said. "During training a lot of the guys would go into town for a good time each night, but the regular army men in my outfit

would sit on the steps of the barracks and sharpen their bayonets for two hours instead."

"My job was following the troops around Europe and doing all of the paper work connected with them."

He filled out replacement rosters, wrote all decorations and awards and kept records. Blunk saw almost all of Europe while in the army and was discharged in 1945.

BLUNK WAS MORE than happy to return to civilian life and his teaching post at the high school. He remained a math teacher until 1950 when he became co-ordinator of occupational training. At the same time he earned his Master of Arts degree from the University of Michigan.

In 1956, Russell Isbister, former superintendent of Plymouth schools, recommended Blunk for the job as business manager and the board approved his appointment.

Sixteen years before he became assistant superintendent for business, however, the educator married his wife, Roberta. They have one daughter, Janet, who is a junior at Michigan State University.

THE ASSISTANT SUPER-INTENDENT was called an administrative assistant at first, and he said, "When I started

I was greener than grass."

He commented that shortly after, when he had learned his job, his title was changed.

Blunk is now in charge of the cafeterias of the schools, the accounting and bookkeeping for the district, transportation, all purchases made by the district and in conjunction with the superintendent, James Rossman, the preparation of the budget for the school board's final approval.

However, he is quick to point out that his staff is a big part of the success he has had over the years.

He said that he now deals

only with the most crucial problems that arise and is also the man who solves any emergency problems that his department encounters.

THE BUSINESS MANAGER recently rejoined the teaching ranks when he taught a graduate course in the economics of public finance at Eastern Michigan, his alma mater.

Blunk is not a gambler when it comes to Plymouth School District's finances and, maybe, this explains his avid interest in auto racing which is one of the most unpredictable sports there is today.

## Fudge Can Be Easy

If you like fudge but have trouble making it turn out right, chances are you'll go crazy over this recipe. With the one basic formula for Quick Chocolate Fudge, you can turn out a dozen delightfully different candies.

### QUICK CHOCOLATE FUDGE

- 1/4 cup margarine
- 3 ounces unsweetened chocolate
- 1 pound confectioners sugar
- 1/3 cup instant nonfat dry milk (dry form)
- 1/2 cup light or dark corn syrup
- 1 tablespoon water
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts or 1 cup miniature or cut-up marshmallows (optional)

Melt margarine and chocolate in top of 2-quart double boiler or saucepan over boiling water. Meanwhile, sift confectioners sugar and nonfat dry milk together; set aside. Stir light or dark corn syrup, water and vanilla into chocolate mixture over boiling water.

Blend in sifted dry ingredients in two additions, stirring until mixture is well blended and smooth. Remove from boiling water. Mix in nuts or marshmallows. Turn into greased 8 x 2-inch square pan. Cool. Cut into squares. Makes 1 3/4 pounds.

**QUICK LIGHT FUDGE:** Follow recipe for Quick Chocolate Fudge, omitting chocolate and water, using light corn syrup and increasing vanilla to two teaspoons.

**QUICK PEANUT BUTTER FUDGE:** Follow recipe for Quick Chocolate Fudge, omitting chocolate, melting 1/3 cup Skippy creamy or chunk style peanut butter with margarine and using light corn syrup.

**STUFFED FRUIT:** Prepare Quick Chocolate or Blonde Fudge. Stuff into dried fruit.

**FUDGE ROLL:** Grease two (9-inch) square pans. Cover bottom of one pan with two cups chopped nuts. Prepare one recipe Quick Chocolate Fudge and pour into pan with nuts; spread and smooth. Prepare one recipe Quick Blonde Fudge and pour into other pan.

Let stand until set, but still soft. Turn out chocolate fudge into waxed paper, then turn over so nuts are on bottom. Roll blonde fudge into tight roll and place on one end of chocolate fudge. (Do not stretch blonde fudge.)

Roll up with chocolate on outside, using waxed paper as aid. Chill until firm. Slice with sharp knife.

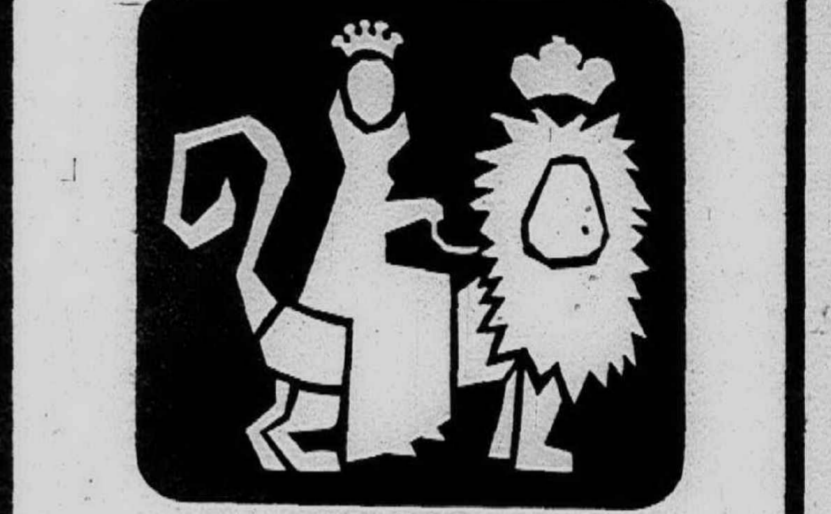

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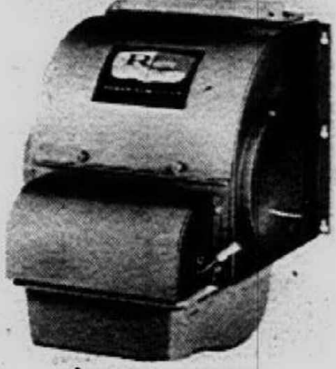

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## First State Income Tax Returns Due On April 15

(This is a public service article explaining in general terms a provision of Michigan law. Individuals who wish to determine the effect of any law upon their private legal affairs should consult a private attorney.)

Last Summer the Michigan Legislature passed the first Michigan income tax act. Michigan thus joined the ranks of 36 other states which had previously adopted similar tax laws. Under the act, a 2.6 per cent tax was imposed on "taxable incomes" for individuals effective Oct. 1, 1967.

Taxes on the income of corporations and financial institutions became effective on Jan. 1 of this year.

The first return required to be filed by the employer was due on Nov. 15, 1967 for taxes withheld from the employee's wages in October of 1967. Individuals should have filed with their employers certificates by which they claim their personal or dependency exemptions which are provided in Section 30 of the act.

FOR MICHIGAN, this exemption is \$1,200, rather than \$600 as provided by the federal government. An additional exemption is allowed if the person is 65 years of age or is blind. The first Michigan income tax return of an individual will be due by April 15, 1968 and will cover the last three months of 1967. On this return, the taxpayer will compute his actual tax liability.

For 1967 income only, the taxpayer may either pay taxes on income accrued or received after Oct. 1 or upon one-fourth of his total "taxable" income. After deciding which of the methods he wants to use, the individual should deduct \$300 for each personal or dependency exemption to which he is entitled since the return covers only one-quarter of the year.

Winter sports contributed to the best January in the 10-year history of the Mackinac Bridge, reports the Mackinac Bridge Authority.

January traffic totaled 34,437, an 8 per cent increase over a year ago, and revenues totaled \$169,421, a 9.8 per cent increase, said Prentiss M. Brown, authority chairman.

Brown said pickup trucks and trailers hauling skis and snowmobiles crossed the bridge in greater numbers than ever before.

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# UP' GOING CURTAIN

"The Fantasticks", the world's longest running musical, paid a return welcome visit to Ann Arbor last week for two performances at U of M's Hill Auditorium.

The musical magic of this melodious musical comedy filled the cavernous confines of the Hill Auditorium, (4,000 seats). In New York, "The Fantasticks" is still playing nightly (3,282 performances so far) at the Sullivan Street Playhouse (199 seat capacity).

In two evenings at Ann Arbor "The Fantasticks" played to more than 7,800 customers. Near capacity crowds relished the charm of this simple, yet profound musical. The appeal of "The Fantasticks" comes in its utter simplicity. Under the guise of its universality, however, some of life's profoundest truths find effective and pleasant ways to make their point.

AS THE TWO fathers in this eight-character musical arrange a marriage between their children, larger conflicts loom significantly overhead in the shadows. Conflicts develop between the parents and one sees the wall being constructed in the musical garden as a Berlin Wall or the DMZ line in North Vietnam. "The Fantasticks" is certain to be a classic in the years to come. No matter how many times you see it you can glean more hidden truths and contemporary comparisons.

The first time you see "The Fantasticks" you enjoy it for its merry, bright musical score, clever choreography and witty dialogue. There is a

spareness about the dialogue that adds appeal. No actor gets an opportunity to carry on for over 30 seconds in any of his speeches. Consequently, the storyline of "The Fantasticks" keeps the production whipping along with great rapidity.

The University of Michigan Professional Program can beam with pride at this opening production of their 1968 Show of the Month series. If the other New York traveling productions coming in future months have as high caliber, it will be a season long to remember. Or as they sing so beautifully in "The Fantasticks": "... Try to remember..." and you will remember the colorful explosion of wit, music, and dancing so competently presented.

WHILE "THE Fantasticks" started the week off in Ann Arbor on a most happy note, the dramatic happenings nearby in the Lydia Mendelssohn Theater on Feb. 7 were of a more somber nature. Strindberg's "The Ghost Sonata" had its midwest premiere by the University of Michigan Players.

Even though "The Ghost Sonata" had the benefit of Director Coakley at its helm, its eerie notes were muffled and became quickly lost. Strindberg's script could be blamed for much of the evening's weariness.

"The Ghost Sonata" is early Albee and a little bit of late Ionesco. August Strindberg in his later works drifted away from realism and dabbled in his own form of avant garde drama.

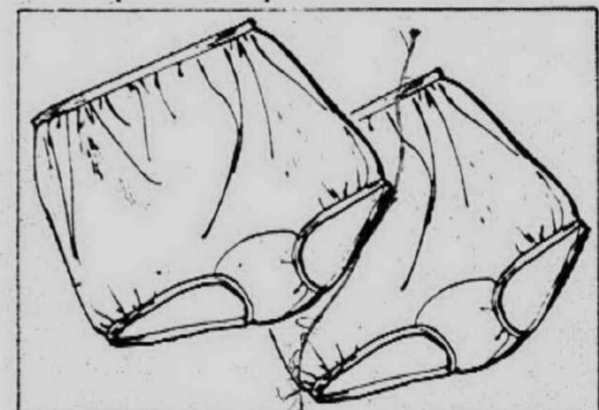

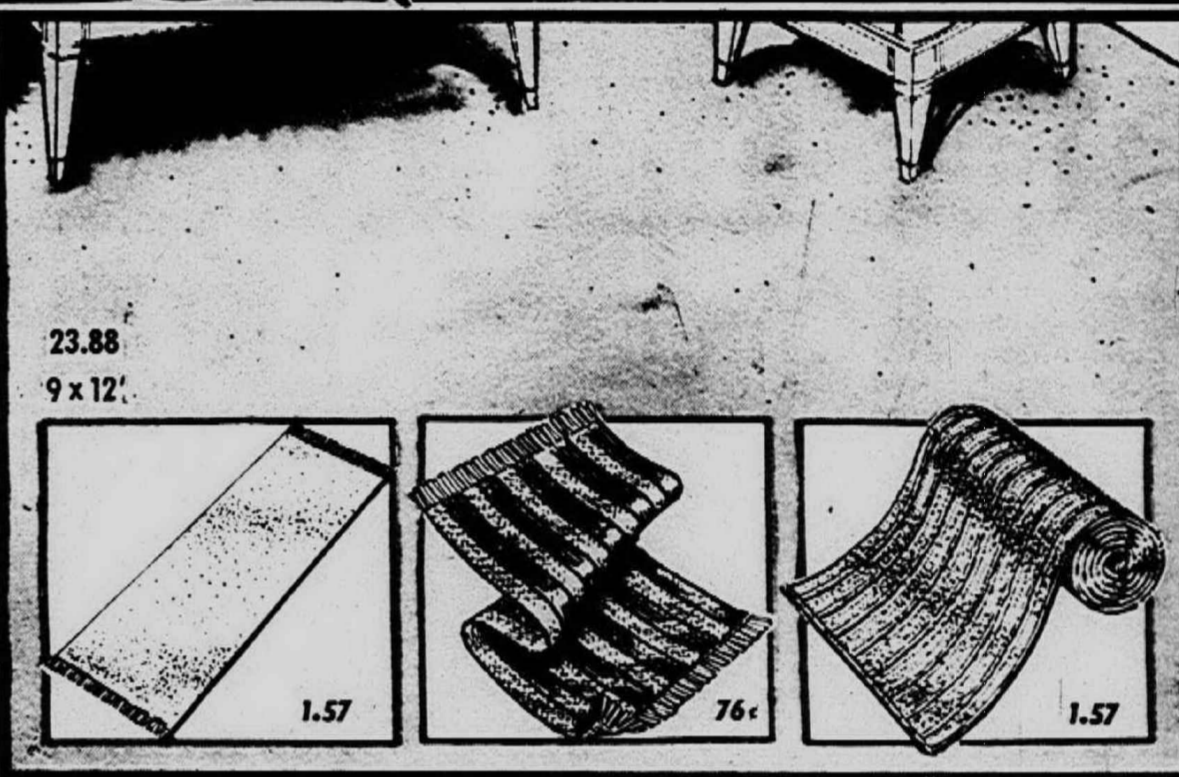
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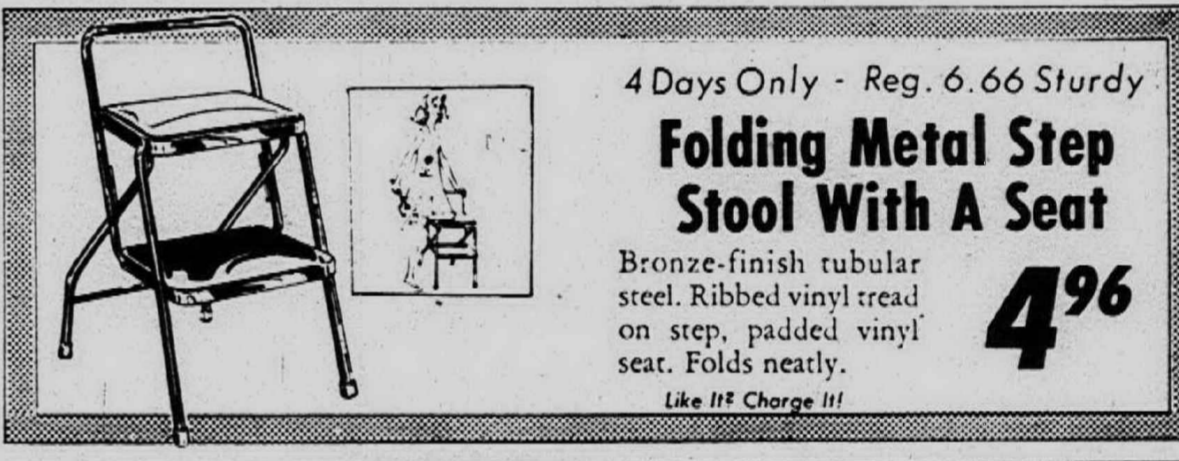

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# U-M To Emphasize Role Of Intramural Athletics

A new athletic structure giving greater independence to the physical education department and emphasizing intramural sports has been announced by University of Michigan President Robben W. Fleming.

Two associate directors will be named, one for intercollegiate athletics and one for physical education. Both will report to the director of physical education and athletics.

No one has yet been named to succeed director H.O. "Fritz" Crisler, who will retire June 30. "The structural solution was a necessary prerequisite to the search for a successor," Fleming said.

"THE NEW structure requires a re-evaluation of the qualifications of possible physical education and athletics directors, and that process will now take place," Fleming added.

"Though members of the present staff will certainly be considered for the newly created posts and the over-all directorship, it is understood that coaching, teaching, or other assignments for next year will not be affected. This is essential in view of the late de-

cision on the structural question."

The president noted that intercollegiate sports were not being downgraded by the additional independence for physical education and emphasis on intramurals. "The University has always been a great competitor in intercollegiate athletics, and it expects to remain so," he said.

THE RESTRUCTURING was decided upon after long discussions with faculty committees and the University Regents.

Fleming noted that neither the Regents nor the university administration felt that this is the time to establish a separate school of physical education, as some faculty members suggested. But all agreed that the physical education program deserved greater independence.

An advisory committee on intramurals, recreation, and club sports will be established to work with the athletic director on expanding programs in this area.

# Lawyers Set Med Exam Sessions

More than 3,000 attorneys from throughout the nation will be at The University of Michigan in Ann Arbor on March 1 and 2 to attend the 19th annual Advocacy Institute.

The program, sponsored by the Institute of Continuing Legal Education, will concern itself with the cross-examination of medical experts. In keeping with its educational approach, the Advocacy Institute will blend the theoretical and the practical through the use of lectures, discussion panels, critical evaluation, and comparative cross-examinations.

Headed by such noted attorneys as F. Lee Bailey, Bill Colson, and Craig Spangenberg, the Advocacy Institute's faculty will focus its attention on four key medical experts; the physical medicine specialist, the psychiatrist, the pathologist, and the pharmacologist.

After a lecture and discussion on each of these experts, the faculty will demonstrate step by step through comparative cross-examination how medical knowledge and legal theories should be developed in a courtroom setting.

Comparative cross-examinations, originated at the annual Advocacy Institute, are said to be the most effective and realistic method of providing new information, as three attorneys cross-examine the same witness under simulated courtroom conditions. Observers thus see a number of approaches to the same problem.

In the past two years, more than 5,000 lawyers from 49 states, every province of Canada, and Mexico have attended the Advocacy Institute, and it is expected that this year's attendance will be greatest in the institute's 19 years.

### When Heavy Snow Arrives

# Police Chief Sounds Warning To Area's Drivers

Recalling that the Plymouth area has had heavy snow storms during February in the past several years and that the trend is almost certain to continue Police Chief Robert Corrington has sounded a few warnings.

In the first place, he warned, if a heavy snow does fall the smartest thing to do is to leave your automobile at home if at all possible.

However, if you must drive your own automobile the chief

cautioned that drivers make sure they know how to handle their vehicle under heavy snow conditions.

In this day and age of snow tires, studded snow tires and

reinforced tire chains, there is no excuse for skid crashes on our streets and highways.

"THIS IS A BIG one," Corrington commented, "and the danger of traffic accidents and

stalling is great and may hamper snow removal operations and clog our main traffic arteries."

He said the less drivers move about during and immediately following the storm, the sooner snow removal crews can do their job and return streets to normal conditions.

"Snow fighting equipment has been mobilized and we have police officers working at critical points in an effort to keep traffic moving," he said.

The Chief emphasized that if you must drive during a storm, it is imperative that your car is equipped for emergency conditions. Citing tests by the National Safety Council, he said snow tires are helpful, but tire chains are even better.

"In tests on loosely packed snow, reinforced tire chains developed better than four times the pulling ability of regular tires and nearly three times that of snow tires," Corrington reported.

THE CHIEF reminded drivers that snow often is

packed and polished by sliding and spinning at approaches to intersections, especially on side streets that are last to be salted. He said the best anti-skid protection here is to look ahead and slow down before you get to the intersection.

"The basic rule is to slow down and leave more space between yourself and the car ahead. Start stopping sooner on snow and ice. That means thinking ahead as well as looking ahead so you can anticipate slowing movements," said Corrington.

The official reminded drivers that you can't make a panic stop on ice.

"Tests prove that pumping the brakes gives the quickest stop," the chief said. "This intermittent pumping action keeps the wheels rolling and helps maintain steering control."

"An important thing to remember," added Corrington, "is to avoid abrupt changes in direction. Sudden turns and lane changing can cause you to spin out. Anticipate your movements and make them smoothly and gradually.

"IF YOU START to skid, immediately turn the steering wheel in the direction the rear end is sliding. Don't oversteer. The instant you feel the car is coming out of it, straighten the wheels."

The chief reminded drivers that ice is twice as slippery at 30 degrees as it is at zero, so wet ice in sunny areas is more dangerous. Due to differences in temperature ice lasts longer on bridges and in shady spots. He advised drivers not to swerve or brake when they hit an unexpected patch of ice -- let your car roll through.

"We have the know-how and equipment available to rule out tragic skid crashes," he said, "but the trouble is that drivers grow careless or fail to use traction devices when they are needed."

"The best way to avoid a skid-crash is to keep your car in top winter driving condition. Next reduce your speed and drive sensibly. Use snow tires, or studded snow tires, and put on reinforced tire chains when the going gets tough," Corrington concluded.

# What Are Rights Of A Child?

ANN ARBOR—Society faces the dilemma of wanting to strengthen family ties by allowing parents to raise their children by their own means, and yet knowing that the rights of their children are often substantially ignored.

Dean Robert F. Drinan, of the Boston College Law School presented this problem to lawyers, judges, police officials, and social workers attending "Gault: What Now for the Juvenile Court?" a program of the Institute of Continuing Legal Education at The University of Michigan.

Designed to explore the ramifications of a recent Supreme Court decision which has begun to revolutionize juvenile court procedure, "Gault" featured a faculty of authorities from throughout the nation.

DEAN DRINAN, the Jesuit priest who is chairman of the family law section of the American Bar Association, stated "We must realize that 40 per cent of the population is under 21, but they must have rights before the law as do those individuals who are over 21."

Emphasizing the absence heretofore of substantial rights for minors, Drinan traced the life of a hypothetical youth from birth to the age of legal adulthood.

"Obviously," he noted, "the child has no control over his being born, but what if he is born illegitimately? Is he guaranteed equal rights? Does the infant have any rights regarding his own adoption? Someone must speak for the child if he cannot speak for himself."

DRINAN ALSO probed the area of emotionally disturbed children. "What is to guarantee that children who are committed at an early age will get treatment or a consideration of their cases?" he asked. "What guarantees them due process?"

All of these matters have been touched upon by the Gault decision, he stated, and some changes may come in the future. At least, the educator maintained, courts have started to say that a child has rights.

Regarding one change which could be made now, Drinan asserted that 18-year-olds should be given the vote.

"We must release them of the frustration of the 18-21 year population by letting them participate positively in the government of this country," he said. "This group, which comprises seven per cent of the population, is in my opinion the most intelligent and idealistic in the country and should be recognized."

# Inmates Now 'Residents'

There are no more inmates at the New Mexico State Penitentiary.

Warden J. E. Baker ordered that prisoners be referred to in the future as residents rather than inmates, the prison magazine reported.

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# Schoolcraft Enrolls Record 3,779

A winter semester enrollment of 3,779 students - a college record for the 16-week January through April term - has been reported by Schoolcraft College Registrar Norman E. Dunn.

The winter term figure compared with 3,078 for the same term a year ago, Dunn said. The 1967 fall term enrollment at Schoolcraft was 3,906, compared with 3,188 for the same period in the previous year.

A BREAKDOWN of the figures showed 2,871 freshmen, of which 1,612 are in academic transfer programs, and 1,259 in technical-vocational programs; and 908 sophomores, of which 653 are in transfer programs and 255 in technical-vocational programs.

A total of 1,864 students attend day classes, 1,569 are enrolled in evening classes, and 346 take both day and evening classes.

Of the enrollment, 2,531 students live in the college district. Of these, 1,149 are full-time students and 1,382 are part-time (enrolled in fewer than 12 hours of course work). Of the 1,248 non-resident stu-

dents enrolled, 649 are full-time and 599 are part-time. Male students outnumber women students nearly two to one. The figures show 2,440 men and 1,339 women.

The 3,779 students are enrolled in a total of 35,173 credit hours of work—an average of 9.3 hours per student. The figures compare with 38,093 credit hours for the fall term enrollment of 3,906—an average of 9.7 hours per student.

AN ANALYSIS of the program enrollment in the academic transfer area showed the five top choices of students were liberal arts, 765 students; business administration, 360; elementary education, 307; secondary education, 282; and engineering, 169 students.

In all, academic transfer students were enrolled in 29 different curricula in the college.

Top choices in the technical-vocational area were the college's apprenticeship program, with an enrollment of 330; general business, 136; general secretarial, 103; mechanical technology, 84; and data processing, 81.

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# But Such Isn't Story In Plymouth, Farmington Romances Bloom In Redford, Livonia

Redford boys like Redford girls. Livonia boys prefer Livonia girls. But Farmington boys and girls don't hit it off so well. Neither do the Plymouth young adults.

Marriages are made at Michigan State University, Western Michigan University and Bentley High School.

SO IT APPEARS from a survey of 90 engagements carried on the women's pages

of the Observer Newspapers during the last two months.

It's probably a pretty good sample. The number of engagements is heaviest this time of year, according to Women's Editor Margaret Miller, because the Christmas-to-Valentine's Day period is a good time to announce the rash of forthcoming June and August weddings.

There are a couple of soft spots in the sample, however. It doesn't necessarily follow, for example, that all the engaged couples will actually get married. And not all engagements are announced.

Nevertheless, there can be no better guide to the patterns of romance and first marriages in Observerland than the announcements made by the parents of the lovely young ladies on these pages.

"THE GIRL NEXT DOOR" pattern of marriage is pretty much a thing of the past in Observerland.

Only one-fourth (44 of the young persons) was marrying someone from the same town.

More than half the girls weren't even marrying boys from other Observerland towns. Data on the number of boys marrying "outsiders" tends to be unreliable — a lad's fiancée is less likely to announce the engagement in the boy's home town paper.

And the number of apparent home town marriages tends to be beefed-up by the sheer population size of Livonia (est. 103,000), with many high schools.

Ours is a mobile society. Increasingly, it's a college-educated society. It's only logical that romance follow the same pattern.

A HIGHLY INBRED area is Redford Township.

Five of the eight boys and five of the 16 girls were planning to marry other Redfordites. Thus, of 19 separate engagements, five were entirely intra-Redford.

Even more inbred is Livonia, where 10 of 24 girls and 10 of 12 boys were planning to marry fellow Livonians. Thus, 10 of the 26 separate engagements were intra-city.

Only two of the 15 Farmington brides-to-be and two of the eight prospective bridegrooms are planning to marry persons from the same town. That's two "local" engagements from a total of 21.

Ironically, adults and politicians in the hills of Farmington often take a sniffling attitude toward the plains of Livonia, but Farmington girls apparently disagree. More Farmington girls plan to marry Livonia boys than Farmington boys.

In Plymouth, three of the 13 girls and three of the eight boys planned to marry other Plymouthites. That's three local engagements from a total of 18.

The Garden City and Westland figures are inconclusive because of the small statistical base. Two of the five Garden City girls and two of the five boys were planning to marry "in town." None of the three girls and four boys from Westland was marrying locally.

A few engagements that don't appear entirely local actually are. A Livonia girl and Farmington boy both turned out to have attended Clarenceville High School. A Livonia girl and a Westland boy both attended Bentley High School. In engagement announcements, parents use their post office addresses rather than school district addresses.

AMONG SCHOOLS, the biggest producer of engagements was Michigan State University with seven.

Bentley High School followed with five. Western Michigan University, which is drawing increasing numbers of students from Wayne and Oakland counties, accounted for four.

No other school produced more than two of the 90 engagements.

The U.S. Air Force, of which the WAFs are part, produced one.

Eastern Michigan University, strangely, produced none during the two months from which the sample was drawn. Usually, it produces several in a sample of that size.

One matter of curiosity was the engagement of two employes of International Business Machines. The announcement didn't indicate whether the young couple had met on the job or whether the match-making had been done by a computer.

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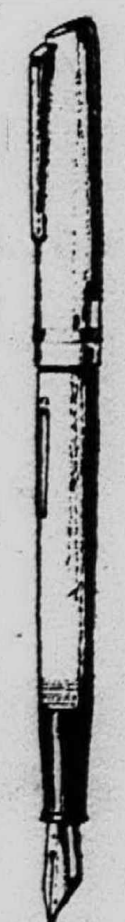

## Warn Youngsters They Must Take Boat Safety Course

The Michigan State Department of Conservation has put in effect a new requirement for young Michigan pleasure boaters it hopes will cut down on motorboat speedsters and curb accidents and serious injuries that have been mounting each boating season.

Youngsters between the ages of 12 and 15, inclusive, who operate motorboats with motors over six horsepower, are now required to take a Pleasure Boating Safety Course.

After they have successfully completed the course, the youngsters will receive a certificate which will allow them to operate their boat by themselves.

Without the certificate, the youngster must be accompanied by one or more persons 16 years old or older.

SGT. JACK BOYD, who is in charge of the Wayne County Sheriff's Marine Division, said that the boating course will be conducted with cooperation of state certified instructors from the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary and the United States Power Squadrons.

He said this program will also be coordinated with the personnel from the Sheriff's Water Patrol Division so that the program will conform to requirements adopted by the State Department of Conservation.

Anyone interested in enroll-

ing and attending any of these classes, the Sergeant continued, may contact the Wayne County Sheriff's Department for information—phone 721-1300.

He added that response has been so great that the department has had to set up a separate number to handle boating course inquiries alone.

BESIDES CONDUCTING the course at the Coast Guard station in Detroit, Sgt. Boyd said that he is also having it taught in school districts throughout the county.

He added that the Livonia School District alone has 10,780 persons in the 12 to 15 age bracket.

So far, the Livonia School District has given its full cooperation, he said.

Classes will be run after school, he said, it usually takes a minimum of five hours of instruction, which will probably be broken into two or three nights for one week.

The course itself is free, said Boyd, but there will be a charge for books and other materials.

He stressed this requirement was necessary because last year between May 31 and Sept. 19, the Sheriff's office received 729 boating complaints.

This regulation, however, is not all that the Conservation Department has required this year.

IN THE GUARD, McMath rose to squadron commander, operations officer, group commander, director of wing operations, and headquarters director of operations.

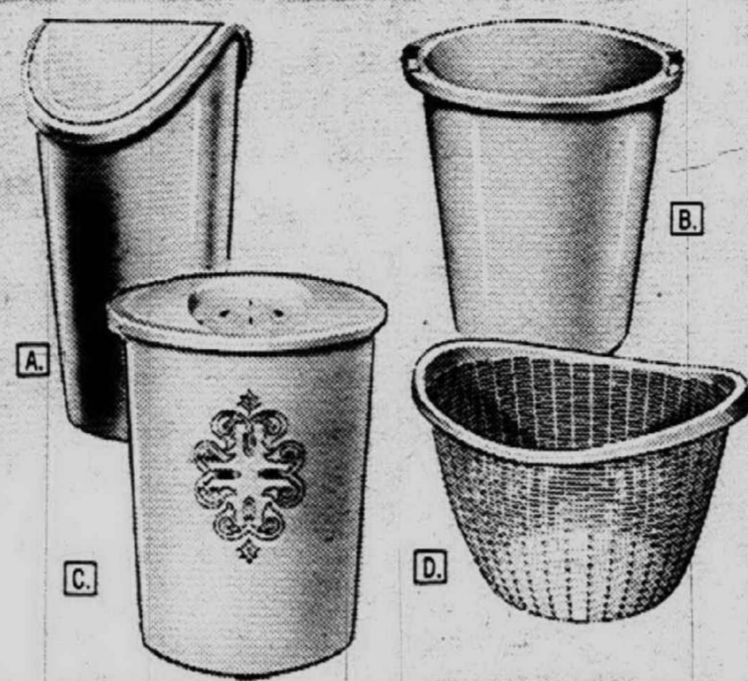

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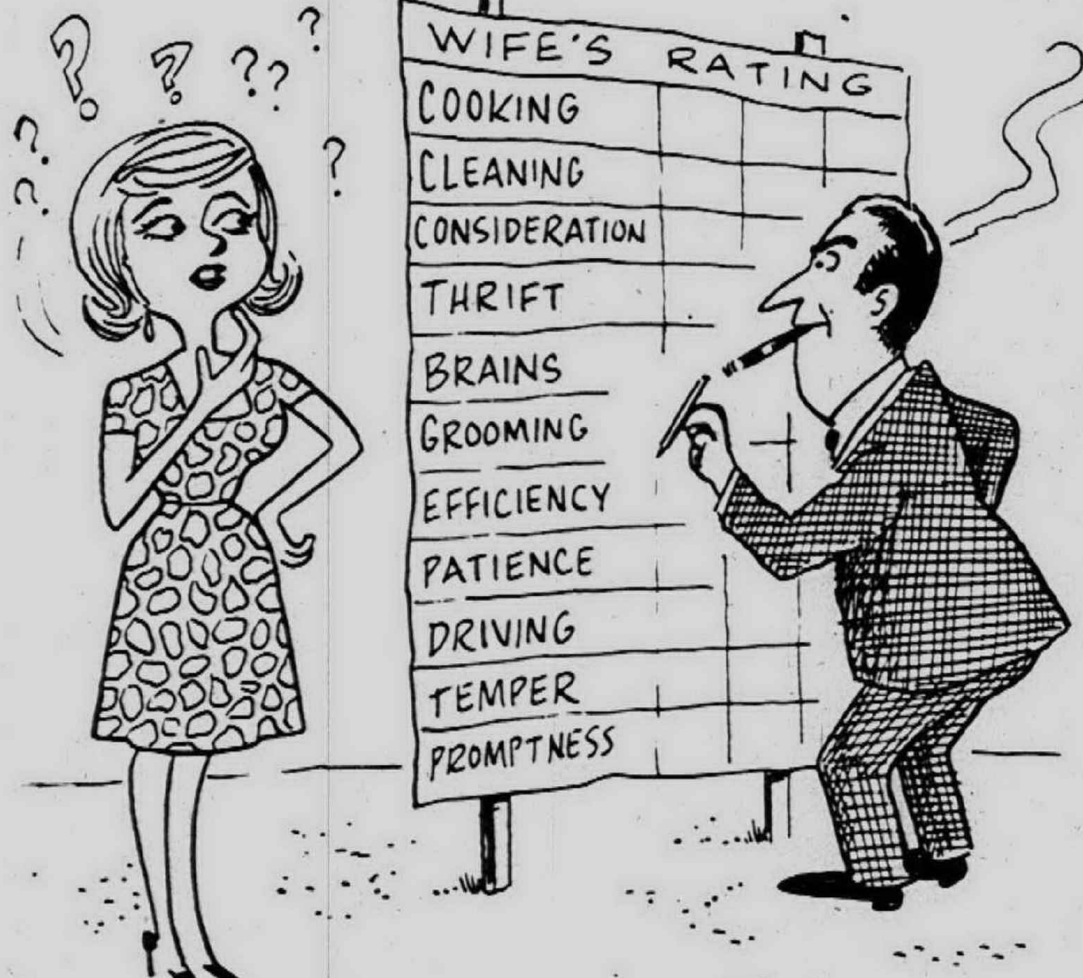
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# Are You A Big Asset Or A Liability As A Wife?

Or, glamorize longish hair from a down-do into an up-do by spraying first, then back-combing gently to make a puffy pillow. Smooth over this cushion with top hair and scoop up the hair in back into soft

loopy curls.

Hold the tall atomizer can about seven inches away from your head as you spray. The fine mist leaves your hair soft, mildly fragrant and completely free from dullness or flakiness.

# Follow Tips In Deducting Local Taxes

(This is another in a series of articles prepared by the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants on money-saving tax tips and errors to be avoided in preparation of the 1040 Federal Individual Income Tax Return.)

As a taxpayer, you will want to take all the deductions allowed by law when filing your 1040 Federal Individual Income Tax Return for 1967.

You can deduct most state and local taxes when you itemize your deductions on Page 2. This includes payments withheld from your wages for state or local income taxes as well as payments made on your estimated state and local income taxes during the year.

State and local gasoline taxes can be deducted, as well as personal property and general sales taxes. Real estate taxes can be deducted only by the owner of the property. In the event that separate returns are filed by husband and wife, real estate taxes paid by the wife can be deducted only on her return.

OTHER ITEMS you can deduct include: dues to a union or professional society, the cost of tools and supplies needed in your job when furnished at your own expense, and fees paid to employment agencies for helping you to find a new job.

Under certain conditions, you can also deduct the cost of courses and instruction needed to help you maintain or improve skills required in your job or profession.

You must, however, be already employed or self-employed before the expenses are incurred and meet the minimum standards of skill and proficiency required by your job or profession.

NON-BUSINESS bad debts are deductible as short-term capital losses and should be reported in Schedule D and offset against short-term capital gains. These in turn are subject to the limitations on deductions for capital losses.

In the event that your bad debt is the only item reported on Schedule D, you can deduct it from your income to a limit of \$1,000. If it is more than \$1,000, you can carry the excess over as a short-term loss on your return next year and the year following, if necessary, until it has been deducted in full.

A bad debt must be claimed in the year it becomes worthless and must not only be uncollectible at the time, but also appear to be uncollectible in the future. Gifts cannot be claimed as bad debts; neither can loans to children, since they are presumed to be gifts.

YOU CANNOT deduct state auto license fees (for license plates) when based on weight, horsepower or model year of your car, as in Michigan.

Alcoholic beverage, cigaret and tobacco taxes are not deductible. Neither are federal excise taxes on theater admissions, furs, jewelry, cosmetics, railroad or airline fares, telephone service and long-distance calls.

Casualty losses and losses due to thefts can be deducted. Property damage caused by a hurricane, tornado, flood, fire, etc. is known as a casualty loss. Damage to your auto is also a casualty loss unless caused by a willful act committed by you or through your own negligence.

You can deduct personal casualty losses and losses due to theft in excess of \$100 which are not covered by insurance. Only the owner of the damaged or stolen property can claim the deduction. You must also be able to prove that you actually suffered the loss (reported it to the police, for example, in the case of a stolen purse) and be able to establish the amount of the loss (fair market value of stolen item, cost of repairs, etc.)

Casualty and theft losses to business property which are not covered by insurance are deductible without regard to the \$100 limitation.

TAXPAYERS WHO USE their personal cars for business and are not reimbursed by their employers for travel expenses can deduct 10 cents a mile up to a limit of 15,000 miles and seven cents a mile after that.

Moving expenses can also be deducted under certain circumstances when not reimbursed by the employer. The deduction can include reasonable charges for shipment of household furniture and effects, meals and lodging for the family while in transit, etc.

However, the distance between the taxpayer's new job and his former residence must be at least 20 miles greater than the distance from the taxpayer's former job to his former residence.

So if the distance between the taxpayer's old residence and place of work was 12 miles, the new job must be at least 32 miles from his old residence. In addition, the taxpayer must meet another requirement to be eligible for the deduction: he must stay at the new location and work at a full-time job for at least 39 weeks during the 12 months immediately after the move.

Even though efforts are constantly being made to simplify the tax laws, there is still a formidable list of rules governing allowable deductions.

## Psychiatrist Says Med Student Sex Ed Poor

The physician in today's society should be comfortable discussing sex and family planning with his patients.

A University of Michigan psychiatrist says the medical schools are not doing well in sex education of medical students, and he questions the low priority given to maturity in the student selection process.

"There is an amazing lack of knowledge about sexual matters in even graduating physicians," says Dr. Stuart M. Finch, professor of psychiatry at the U-M Medical School.

THIS SITUATION is being slowly improved, Dr. Finch says, but the vast majority of medical students still are denied the adequate sex education for which they are eager. "However, during the last few years there has been an almost remarkable increase in

sexual education in many medical schools throughout the country and we are only beginning to get some ideas about how much this new approach will change the attitudes of students.

"Recently at a specialty board examination I heard for the first time candidates being quizzed on their knowledge of such things as abortion laws, contraception, and sex education. Only a few years ago such questions would have been thoroughly taboo.

### Black Leather Out Of Style?

Motorcyclists are abandoning the traditional black leather jacket in favor of brighter colors, says Ross Langlitz, a leather goods manufacturer in Portland.

The reason? Affluent times and mod styles, says Langlitz.

Interestingly enough, the answers given by these candidates were for the most part quite realistic and scientific. Only an occasional individual showed distorted prejudices."

Since emotional immaturity is a chief reason people do not understand the need for family planning or achieve sexual adjustment, it is especially important that the physician be adequately educated as well as mature himself, says the Michigan psychiatrist.

"Recent publicity has been given to the fact that physicians as a group kill themselves oftener, divorce more frequently, and turn to alcohol and drugs in greater proportion than others in our population. We certainly cannot claim to have the most mature segment in the population engaged in the practice of medicine."

"Why then," says Dr. Finch, "should we assume that doctors are the most effective dispensers of sexual education and contraceptive knowledge to their patients, especially when we realize that these topics closely reflect an individual's emotional maturity?"

THE MATURE physician feels responsibility to inquire into and understand the sexual attitudes of his patients and their knowledge about family planning.

"This is a routine, non-prurient inquiry which he feels is just as important a part of his knowledge about his patients as is any other aspect of their lives. His own matter-of-fact discussion of the topic is communicated to patients and they in turn become much more at ease in such discussion."

In contrast, immature physicians consider the sexual life of their patients to be "a private matter." This, notes Dr. Finch, usually stems from the physician's own distorted attitudes about sex and his own inability to discuss it.

One problem in the preparation of medical students for their future roles may exist in the method of selecting them, says Dr. Finch.

"At the present time medical school applicants are chosen primarily on the basis of intellectual prowess."

THE SCHOOL admissions committees take into account only slightly the candidate's degree of maturity and his interest in medicine, says Dr. Finch. Instead, they focus on the Medical College Admissions Test scores and over-all grade point averages.

"We have a peculiar selection problem which picks a high percentage of obsessional candidates and then we proceed in our medical education to make such compulsivity more rigid than ever.

"Any psychiatrist can tell you that the average obsessive-compulsive has difficulty in relating warmly to others and dealing effectively with sexual matters," the doctor says.

## Poachers Fined And Penalized

Game poaching in Michigan has become an unprecedented highest risk, latest Conservation Department figures show.

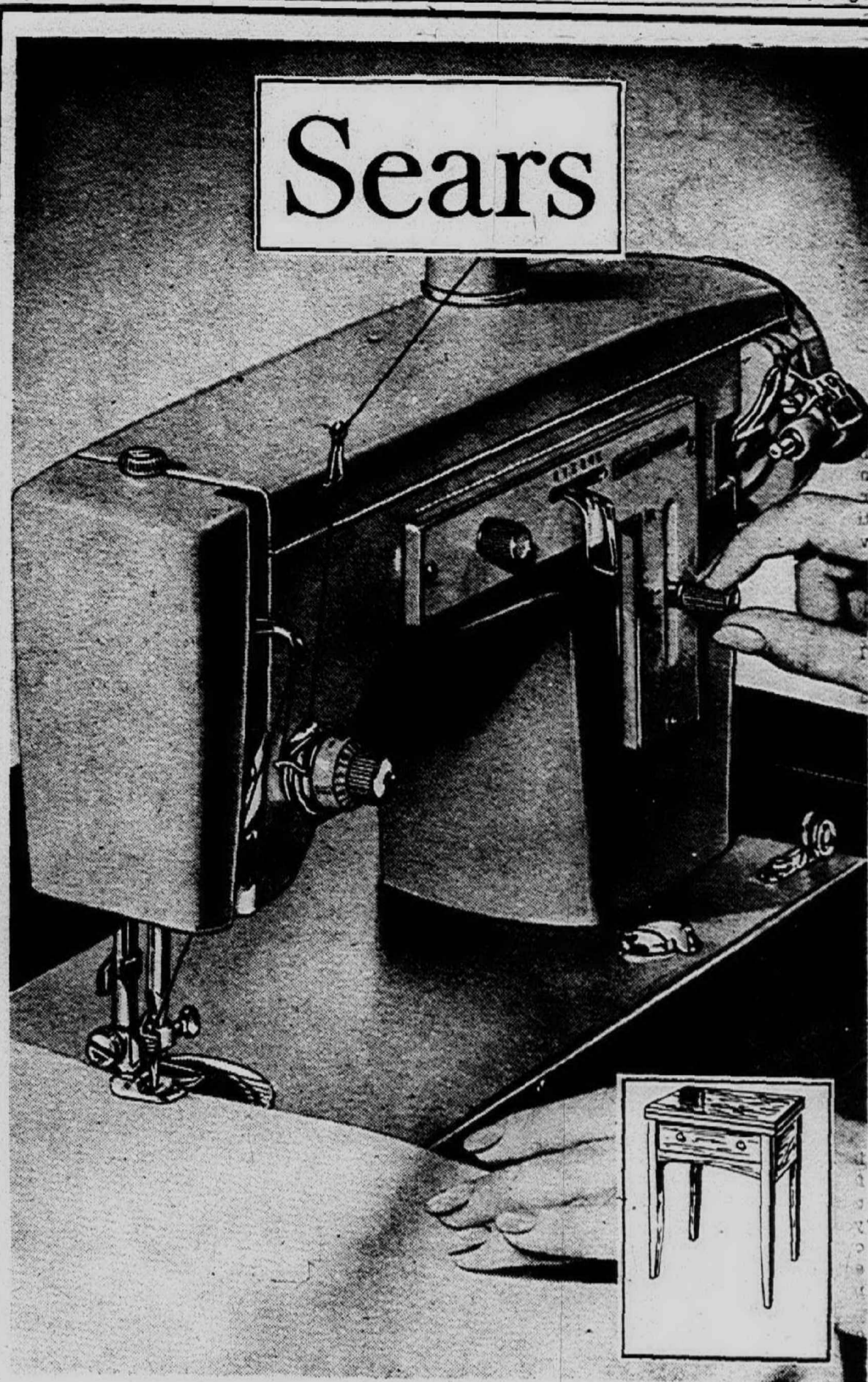
Putting an added pinch on violators is a new reimbursement penalty which has been meted out to the amount of nearly \$22,000 since it went into effect last July. These damages are above regular fines and court costs.

They are pegged to special rates covering the value of wildlife illegally taken. The reimbursement costs, per animal, run up to \$300 for elk, \$200 for deer, and \$10 for small game and waterfowl.

Among the latest to feel the full measure of this new penalty is Donald E. Parks of Luzerne who was assessed the maximum \$200 charge for each of three deer he poached early this month north of Curran in Alcona County.

Justice of the Peace Morrell Browne of Harrisville also fined Parks \$100, levied court costs of \$15, and sentenced the Luzerne man to 15 days in jail with total charges of \$715 to think about. This sort of takes the sport out of poaching.

The charges and jail sentence against Parks are among the stiffest prices that a game violator has ever been ordered to pay in Michigan.

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# Church Recalls All-Male Cast For 'Wedding'

Easily the biggest event of the 1942 season was the "Womanless Wedding" put on by the Guild and Brotherhood of the Evangelical and Reformed Church (now the Salem United Church of Christ) in the then brand new Farmington High School.

Mrs. Mary Lenz, 21620 Hamilton, an old-line Farmingtonite and one of the show's directors, chuckles with glee when she recalls the hassle of convincing Farmington's most prominent men to don women's garb for the fun of the large audience.

THE SHOW played to packed houses and netted \$125 for the guild and \$125 for the brotherhood after the taxes were paid and the accompanists Ruth Bacon and Miss Jaymie Hicks, who came from New York to help out.

Mrs. Eva Fendt was also one of the directors.

Tickets were priced at 50 cents, plus five cents tax. Performances were given Feb. 9 and 10, 1942, with reserved seats for 75 cents going on sale Feb. 6. Purchasers got their tickets at Edgar Pierce's Farmington Insurance Agency then at the corner of Grand River and Farmington Rd.

Mrs. Lenz recalls her hardest job was to sell Delos Hamlin on taking the part of the bride. She says she told Hamlin, after he agreed, "You do the proposing—you get the groom."

BEFORE Roy Plumkin said he would be the groom he told Mrs. Lenz, "I will be the groom if Delos gets me a silk hat." Hamlin obtained a silk hat from Spence Heeney but balked at renting Plumkin a dress suit unless Plumkin bought the bride some flowers. Flowers were ordered.

A quartet provided a musical touch to the proceedings on the big night. The four in it were Perce Pauline, an interior decorator who lived in Farmington; Fred Lenz; Eddie Alexander, a close friend of Hamlin's; and Leo Gildemeister, who ran the local mill.

Pauline is said to have looked beautiful in a green velvet dress which he gave a svelte line by wearing corset stays.

Harry Smith, who played a wedding guest, carried a "banty" rooster on stage. The bird got out of its cage and put out a stage light, but the show went on.

Mrs. Lenz happily recalls, "They were all scared to death the first night, but the second night they came on strong."

FROM MRS. LENZ, The Enterprise & Observer obtained a list of the cast in order of appearance. The men and the parts they played were (and it reads like a history of Farmington):

## Report Urges Campgrounds Outside Parks

The Conservation Foundation based in Washington, D.C., believes the government should stop turning over choice national park areas to campers and find accommodations for them outside the parks.

The foundation, a nonprofit research organization, said in a report that the government could "subsidize plain accommodations outside the parks rather than make costly and unsightly campgrounds inside the boundaries."

"If the national parks are to continue to be a retreat from urban civilization, much of what was permissible in the less crowded past will need to be more carefully controlled or eliminated," the report said.

# Teach Safety, Schools Told

A safety expert challenged school principals Monday to act to reduce the leading killer of school children: traffic accidents.

Principals can do so, said Dr. Donald F. Huelke of The University of Michigan Highway Safety Research Institute, by ensuring safety education receives proper attention in the school curriculum. Huelke addressed a meeting of the National Association of Secondary School Principals in Atlantic City.

In our automobile-oriented society, safety education is critical, he said. "We're talking about life-or-death situations." How can safety education help?

"A MAJOR contribution would be to show the value of wearing safety belts," the professor said. He said his own six-year research project showed

some 40 per cent of those killed in crashes would have lived if they had worn seat belts. He made his point by showing to the principals slides of crashes he investigated.

"Yet," he said, "studies still show that most people don't wear them."

"Information like this, properly delivered in school curricula, can show the value of absolutely necessary for it's sadly true that young people aren't learning these things from their parents. Not enough parents wear seat belts either."

But other U-M studies, Huelke said, show that the better educated a person is, the more likely he is to wear safety belts.

In addition to this, he said, safety education in school could stress that cars, either parked or in motion, are not playgrounds.

# Autos Look For 9-Million Unit Year In 1968

Despite the lowest level of first quarter sales in several years and a serious work stoppage in recent months, 1967 has turned out to be the third best year on record for the U.S. automobile industry. Virtually all business indicators point to a marked improvement for the industry in 1968, with the strong probability that automobile sales will exceed 9 million units.

THE LAST FEW months of 1967 were similar in some ways to the last few months of 1964. Then as now the industry was being affected by an extended interruption of production related to negotiations on new

three-year contracts with the union. Then as now the public had responded with unusual enthusiasm to the industry's new models. And then as now virtually every indicator of business activity and economic growth was pointing to an excellent year ahead for the industry once it could return to normal patterns of production and marketing.

At the end of 1964, just before the automobile industry headed into its greatest year to date, personal income had reached the record annual rate of \$502 billion. Now at the end of 1967 personal income is running at the annual rate of \$631 billion. Even with a correction for the 7

percent of inflation that has been experienced since 1964, this is still an impressive gain.

At the end of 1964, people were saving money at the record annual rate of \$25.6 billion. Now at the end of 1967 the rate of personal savings has reached the level of \$38.5 billion. This is a gain of more than 50 percent in the rate of personal savings in the past three years.

At the end of 1964, there were approximately 123 million people in the U.S. who were over 18 and potential buyers of automobiles. At the end of 1967 this sector of the population numbers slightly over 129 million. This is a net increase of 6

million potential customers in the past three years.

THESE FACTS point to a good year ahead for the automobile business. But they are by no means the only promising indicators of a strong automobile market in 1968.

Also encouraging is a surprisingly high level of confidence on the part of consumers in the strength of the economy and clear evidence that they plan to buy cars and other durables in great volume in the months ahead.

Supporting all these indicators of effective demand for cars are other positive factors, such as the rising scrapage rate for automobiles—now

well over six million a year; the continued reliance upon the automobile for personal transportation as the rapidly growing population of our cities moves out into the suburban areas; and the remarkably strong current

demand for used cars. Used-car prices are even stronger than they were at this time last year and good used-car prices are of course a critically important factor in new-car sales, since they give the prospective new-car buyer a strong incentive to trade.

IT SEEMS CLEAR that the demand for used cars will continue to increase. This growing demand will be generated in the main by the nearly four million young people who will be reaching driver-licensing age every year from now on, since young people are excellent customers for used cars.

# Dip Gives State Economy Breather, Gains Seen

After five consecutive years of steady improvement, the Michigan economy lost some of its momentum in the early part of 1967. Although the year ended with a modest employment gain, 1967 did not match the performance of 1966. In many respects, the State took a "breather" from its earlier blistering pace.

Michigan's non-farm employment averaged 3,167,000 during 1967. This was 29,000 better than 1966 but the increase was small compared with a gain of 116,000 between 1965 and 1966 and 165,000 between 1964 and 1965. Nevertheless, 1967 average employment was the highest in the eleven years for which

comparable data are available.

The small over-the-year increase in statewide employment did not keep pace with the growth in the labor force. As a result, unemployment climbed to 155,000 or 4.5 per cent of the labor force in 1967, about 38,000 above the 1966 average of 116,900 and exceeded the 1965 average by 29,800.

On a monthly basis, unemployment in 1967 fluctuated from a low of 113,000, or 3.3 per cent of the labor force in October, to a high of 217,000 or 6.3 per cent in July. This year July was the significant model-change month in the automobile industry. August was second highest with 211,000 or 6.1

per cent of the labor force unemployed.

EXPANSION CONTINUED in the private non-manufacturing industries. An over-the-year increase of 47,700 was almost as great as last year's expansion of 48,900 in this group. Government also moved upward, rising 28,100 over the year. This compares

with an increase of 31,600 in 1966.

The manufacturing group reflected the slowdown in the labor economy. Factory employment decreased by 33,900 during the year. This contrasts with an increase of 43,500 in 1966.

The trend was very similar in the Detroit area with private non-manufacturing going up 27,100, government 7,100 and manufacturing declining 18,800 below the 1966 figure.

The most important factor affecting employment during the year was a decline in the market for new automobiles during the first half of 1967. The auto assembly plants and closely related industries were affected most by the

lower volume of automobile sales.

On the average, employment in auto assembly plants was 22,300 below the 1966 level. Primary metal products was down 6,500, fabricated metals, 2,000 and textile mill products and apparel, 900.

LABOR FORCE increases during the year were substantial but not as large as during 1966. Michigan's labor force expanded by 76,400 in 1967 compared with 103,800 in 1966.

Although the natural growth in the labor force was about the same in both years a decline in the volume of job opportunities attracted fewer im-

migrants during 1967.

Shortages of skilled metal workers, clerical workers and professional workers have continued throughout the year despite a reduction in the over-all demand. The demand was particularly strong for programmers, medical technicians, nurses, machinists, machine repairmen, auto mechanics, secretaries and stenographers.

On the other hand there was a good supply of unskilled labor, some types of sales clerks, kitchen helpers, laundry laborers, production machine operators, welders and a few types of professionals such as draftsmen, buyers and sales managers.

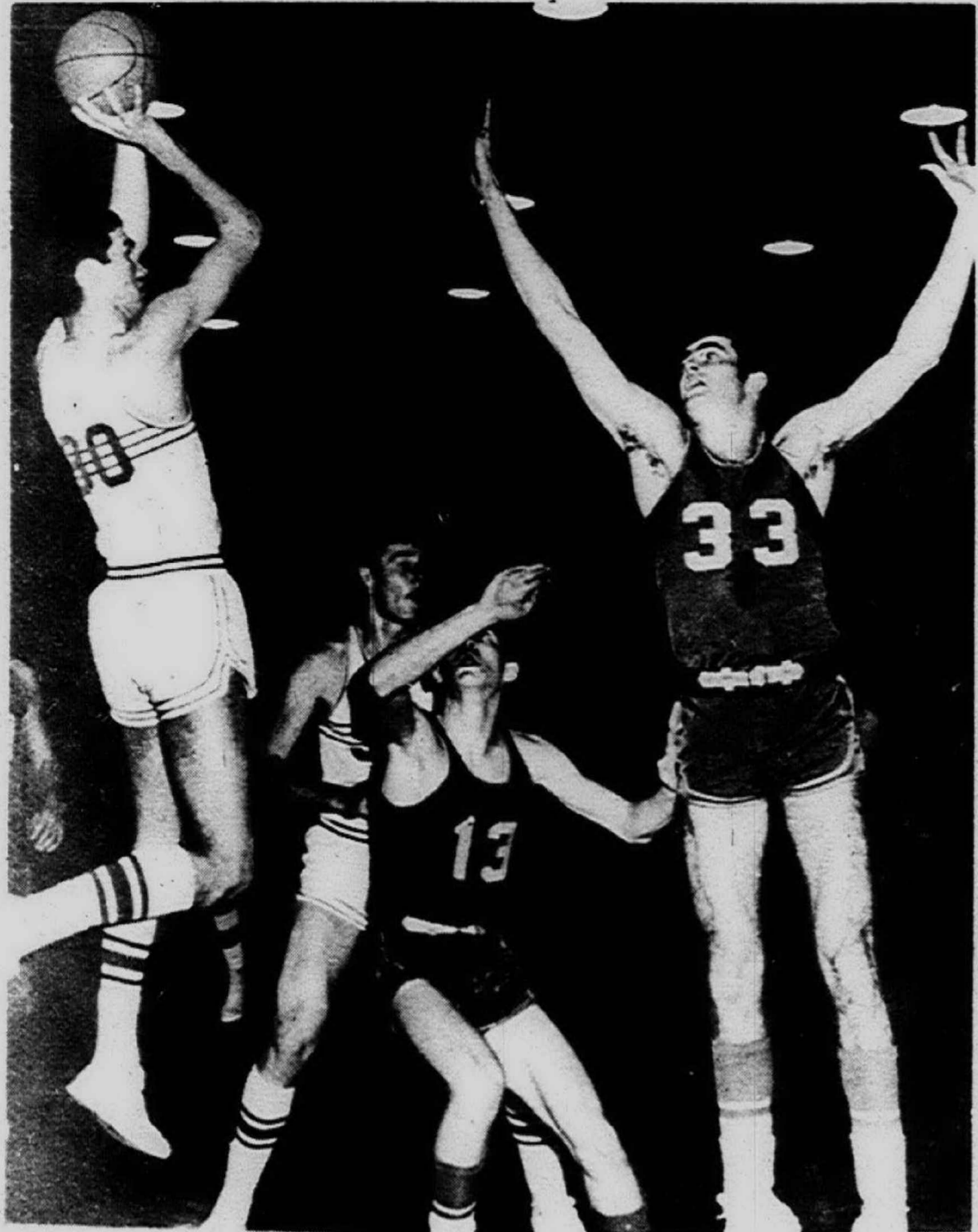

# Negro College Interns Join U-M Program

ANN ARBOR—An administrative intern program for students from Negro colleges is underway at The University of Michigan.

"It is the first such program in the country, so far as I am aware," says Clyde W. Briggs, manager of training and counseling in the U-M Personnel Office.

The first seven interns began their six-month combination work-study program in January. Briggs plans to bring another group to Ann Arbor for the second half of the year. He expects to have 20 Negro college students in the program this year.

Briggs, who joined the U-M staff in August 1967 to help

implement the University's programs for minority employment, circulated applications for the intern program among predominately Negro institutions.

In December he visited the schools to screen the applicants. He interviewed 54 students and selected 17 candidates. Ten will arrive here later.

FOUR OF THE SEVEN now interning are business administration juniors from St. Augustine's College in Raleigh, N.C.; two are seniors from Shaw University, also in Raleigh, and one is a junior in education from Bennett College in Greensboro, N.C.

They will work half time in the U-M's Housing, Business, Purchasing, Graduate School, Information Service, and Registrar's offices and be enrolled in course work half time. Academic credit will be transferred to their home institutions.

BRIGGS SEES the administrative intern program as having several purposes.

"First, it will provide these young people with good experience, which will enhance their employment prospects. Second, we expect that some of these interns, when they graduate, will accept fulltime positions with the University. Some may want to continue in graduate

school at Michigan.

"Third," says Briggs, "We are trying to develop 'ripple power' with this program. For a variety of reasons, minority groups—Negroes in particular—have been dubious about the

expressions of interest by business and industry, and educational institutions too, in integrating their management staffs. We are demonstrating this institution's sincerity, and we hope the word spreads."

Briggs has encouraged another program in the U-M Medical School. The physiology department will accept 15 Negro undergraduates for summer research fellowship.

The School of Dentistry at Briggs' suggestion, will set up a special program in 1968-69 for Negroes interested in becoming dental technicians and hygienists. "The school also hopes to identify potential dental students through this program," says Briggs.

## Observerland Cities Get \$388,849 In Road Funds

Observerland cities and villages will receive \$388,849 as their share of the fourth quarter Motor Vehicle Highway Fund collections made in October, November and December, 1967.

After deduction of collection costs and the Waterways' Commission's share, the Highway Commission gets 47 per cent, county's 35 per cent and the state's 523 cities and villages 18 per cent.

The cities and villages use these funds for snow removal and street maintenance. Townships' roads are taken care of by their respective county road commissions.

OAKLAND COUNTY will receive \$1,472,270 second only to Wayne County which will receive \$4,218,097, the most money any county in the state will receive.

Farmington, the only Observer city in Oakland County, will be given \$14,783, Quakertown and Wood Creek Farms, the only villages in Observerland, will receive \$1,659 and \$2,169 respectively.

The remaining Observerland cities receiving these funds are in Wayne County.

Of the four, Livonia will receive the lion's share of \$148,404. Westland is next with \$131,014.

Westland is followed by Garden City at \$73,379 and the fourth is Plymouth which will receive \$17,741.
