REDFORD - South Redford Schools Board of Education declared its support of high school administrative policy allowing the principal to decide whether speakers secured by clubs and classes could appear. The Thurston current events club, backed by an American Civil Liberties Union representative, had appealed for freedom of choice constrained only by threat to physical safety.

REDFORD-State Rep. Leonard Walton (D - Detroit) pleaded guilty to a reduced charge of 'impaired driving' and paid a \$50 fine in justice court. Arrested on a charge of drunken driving Nov. 14, he had recently forfeited his license for 90 days after losing an appeal for excuse from the state Implied Consent Law "breathalyzer" test.

GARDEN CITY - The City Council Monday approved the lowest of three bids for its garbage and rubbish collection service at nearly double the current rate. The contractor, Painter and Ruthenberg, submitted the low bid of \$1.35 per unit per month, starting April 1. Local residents and merchants now pay 70 cents per unit per month.

GARDEN CITY - The community will soon have two competing taxi cab companies for the first time in its history. The City Council Monday agreed to allow a franchise to Royal Cab Co. following numerous complaints about Garden City Cab Co.

WESTLAND - Cpl. Edward Bova, a 19year-old soldier who lived most of his life in the community, was killed last week in South Vietnam during the major offensive staged by the North Vietnamese and the Viet Cong.

WESTLAND - A liquor license was approved for a Howard Johnson restaurant and tavern, part of a nearly \$2,500,000 development. When completed, the development will include a five-story, 125-unit motel on Cowan and Wayne Rds.

LIVONIA - Mayor Harvey W. Moelke said the gun instruction school he has directed the Police Department to organize is designed to promote gun safety and not to promote the purchase of weapons by citizens.

LIVONIA - Plans are underway to use a state law authorizing contracts for bus service to bypass a court ruling and the Michigan Public Service Commission to obtain DSR routes for Livonia.

FARMINGTON - Township taxpayers are in for a jolt when they receive notification of their new assessments this week. An order from the Oakland County Equalization Board to raise total assessments 20 per cent' and the constitutional requirement to bring assessments up to 50 per cent of actual cash value have resulted in hikes as high as 200 per cent.

FARMINGTON - Negotiations for a teachers contract will begin in February. Monday night the Farmington Board of Education and the Farmington Education Association announced the negotiating teams. Robert Newhauser, FEA vice president, will head the four-man teachers team, while Asst. Supt. Marinus Van Ameyde will head the four-man board team.










Schoolcraft Offers Chance For 52-Day Trip To Europe

If you are a geography bug graphy tours of Europe for with a yen to travel, the Schoolcraft College Geography Department is offering a 52-day field trip to five Western European countries that may be just the way for you to satisfy both desires this summer.

Offered as part of the department's curriculum, Geography 280 will carry sixhours of college credit during the Summer Session, and will emphasize rural as well as urban geography of Europe.

The course has been in the planning stage for a year and a half and will send its first class of students to Europe via prop jet charter aircraft on June 25.

THE 16-CITY TOUR will include stops at Amsterdam. Munich, Rome, Paris and London, as well as small agricultural villages along the Rhine River of Germany and to such cultural centers as Heidelberg and Florence.

SCHOOLCRAFT has been trying desperately to gain accreditation and appears on the verge of approval, depending entirely on the report of the accreditation team and a hearing before the NCA Board next month in Chicago.

There isn't any question but that settlement of the turmoil came as a direct result of the scheduled appearance of the accreditation team.

2 Detroiters Face Execution In Cop Slaying

TWO YOUNG Detroiters, if convicted, could become the first persons legally executed in Michigan in more than a generation. Ovis Frierson, 24, and Nathaniel Spivey, 19, are charged in federal court with robbing the Trenton State Bank last week and murdering Trenton Patrolman Robert Pare, 34, as he tried to arrest them. Frierson is accused of being the actual gunman, Michigan law has no capital punishment, but an execution could be performed for a federal crime at the federal prison in Milan.

MAJ. GEN. Ronald D. McDonald, Michigan's Sormer adjutant general, was momentarily reinstated by Acting Gov. Milliken under orders from the State Supreme Court, which had ruled that McDonald was improperly removed by Gov. Romney. But Milliken then immediately retired McDonald "under honorable conditions." McDonald will receive back pay amounting to \$78,000 and montly retirement benefits of \$1,200. He had been suspended in 1964 during a land-liquor-money scandal involving the National Guard.

THE STATE SENATE has given 30-1 approval of a bill to license private police, security guards and patrol services, all to be regulated by the State Police. Another bill, approved 27-0, will allow the election, in the next general election, of county officers in cases where the office has been filled by appointment; county officers ordinarily have a four-year term. Both bills go to the House.

CHIEF JUDGE T. John Lesinski resisting a bill that would give his State Court of Appeals the job of hearing appealsfrom probate courts and state administrative agencies. He says his court would need 11 to 16 more judges, adding that he's not out "to build an empire."

SEARS, ROEBUCK & Co. is recalling some 6,000 Homart natural gas baseboard heaters after the death of a Jackson man in October. The Tennessee firm which manufactured them has gone out of business. The State Health Dept. attributes the problem to a defective tube which cracked and allowed carbon monoxide gas to escape.

GOV. ROMNEY, campaigning in Wisconsin for the GOP presidential nomination, has been adopted and made an honorary chief by the Winnebago Indian tribe. A sign carried in the ceremony said: "We need them who speak without forked tongue."

The current population survey is taken each month from a representative sample of households throughout the United States chiefly to obtain national estimates of current employment and unemployment. The identity of households is confidential by law, and the facts obtained are used for statistical purposes only.

Cooking With Eggs

By JOYCE TOTTEN

It's quite special, that welldesigned food package called the egg! Whether you enjoy it in a puffy omelet or plain poached, use it as an ingredient in recipes, or transform it into a smooth-as-velvet custard or other dessert, the egg is a good cook's most versatile standby.

In the selection of eggs, sizes and grades make the difference in price.

Egg grades are based on the shell as well as the interior quality. Eggs are candled by experienced graders. Buy by grade for protection. U.S. Grade AA- 1st quality; U.S. Grade A- 2nd quality; U.S. Grade-B-

3rd quality. Grade B eggs are excellent for cooking and in places where appearance is not important.

THE COLOR of the shell does not affect the nutritive value, but it may affect the price.

A good rule to remember in selecting among various sizes is this -- small eggs are as economical as large ones when they are at least 1/4 cheaper. Medium eggs are a better buy than large when they are at least 1/8 cheaper. Lower grade eggs may be used for cooking or scrambling. This can be a money saver.

Popovers are an impressive scrumptous surprise for breakfast or any meal. They're light as clouds, crisp and crusty. Serve them hot from the oven, with butter curls and sweetly tart jam, marmalade or jelly.

Eggs in Shrimp Curried Sauce will become a Lenten favorite you'll fix the year around. The sauce, made from frozen cream of shrimp soup, is delicately flavored with American cheese.

Angel Fluff Cake owes its elegance and its taste -it-tobelieve- it goodness to the unassuming egg! Air beaten into the whites makes the cake rise to heavenly heights, while you use some of the yolks in a rich custard-whipped cream filling.

POPOVERS

2 eggs 1 c. milk

1 c. sifted all-purpose flour 1/2 t. salt 1 T. cooking oil

Place eggs in bowl; add milk, flour, and salt. Beat 1 1/2 minutes with rotary or electric beater. Add cooking oil; beat 30 seconds more. (Don't overbeat.) Fill 6 to 8 well greased custard cups 1/2 full. Bake in very hot over (475) 15 minutes. Reduce heat to moderate (350) and bake 25 to 30 minutes or till browned and firm. A few minutes before removing from oven, prick each popover with a fork to let steam escape. Serve hot. Makes 6 to 8. Note: The eggs hold in the steam which makes these little breads "pop".

> CURRIED EGGS IN SHRIMP SAUCE

8 hard-cooked eggs 1/3 c. mayonnaise or salad dressing

1/2 t. salt 1/4 t. curry powder

1/2 t. paprika 1/4 t. dry mustard

2 T. butter or margarine 2 T. all-purpose flour

1 can frozen condensed cream of shrimp soup

1 soup can milk 1/2 c. shredded sharp natural cheddar cheese



Cut eggs in half lengthwise; remove yolks and mash; mix with mayonnaise and seasonings. Refill egg whites; arrange eggs in 10 x 6 x 1 1/2 inch baking dish. For Shrimp Sauce: Melt the 2 T. butter; blend in flour. Stir in soup and milk; cook and stir till sauce thickens. Add cheese; stir till melted. Cover eggs with sauce. Mix crumbs and melted butter; sprinkle around edge of mixture in baking dish. Bake in 'moderate over (350) 15 to 20 minutes or till heated through. Garnish with parsley. Makes

NEWARK, N.J. -- A special commission on racial disorders has condemned the methods used by the state and Newark police and city administration and New Jersey National Guard in handling riots in Newark last summer. It's never our desire to knock or blast. Sometimes, though, it's a good idea to set the record straight.

To the Observer offices each week come complaints from interested sports followers.

One fan will cry: "How come you play up Bentley so much?"

Another screams: "What's the matter with you guys? You

never say anything about Bentley.' There are complaints, too, that we overplay basketball and underplay cricket or ten-

nis or swimming. One tries to be diplomatic in handling such complaints. It's part of our business.

OBVIOUSLY, the points that many miss are: 1 - The editor of these sports pages (nor anybody else connected with the Observer) plays no favorites when it comes to Bentley or Glenn or Franklin or North Farmington or any of the other high schools in this area.

2 - As often is the case, it's the survival of the fittest which determines who gets the big play. 3 — The cooperation of the schools themselves plays a major role in how well they are represented on this, or any other sports page.

WE ARE COGNIZANT of the fact that very few high schools hire public relations or publicity directors. We also realize that coaches are burdened with a heavy load. They teach, they coach, they serve as trainer, as doctor, and what have

But, daily newspapers as well as bi-weekly productions, lack sufficient staff to cover every game. Not even a paper like the New York Times with something like 50 men in its sports department can assign a man to every contest or event.

So, it's up to the schools themselves to lend a hand. If there's no publicity man, then somebody in the athletic department should take an interest.

Many coaches delegate a journalism student to call in and report the news.

Other coaches assume the responsibility themselves. Some do an excellent job. Others do a pitiful job.

Unfortunately, it's usually those who don't call anything who yell the loudest. And so do their

WE'D LIKE to relate just one of the problems

A week or two back, one of the top basketball teams in Observerland didn't get a mention after scoring a victim. Not one word.

The coach, it seems, forgot to call on Friday evening because of some "celebrating." The next day he left town. He was gone for a couple of more days.

All efforts to obtain any information on the game failed despite the fact that a certain person we know must have spent 10 hours try-

ing to track down one score. The coach later apologized. He hasn't missed

But there are colleagues in his school who

can't spare a minute to check in with results. They don't seem to have any real reason for not calling. Forgetfulness, perhaps.

WHO SUFFERS the most?

We always felt that the prime reason for writing schoolboy sports is to tell about the kids themselves who play. Occasionally, we like to mention the work of the coaches . . . and we do.

But the boys . . they come first. The coaches agree. Yet, if the coaches can't salute their boys via the press, it's the boys, along

was concerned. We must say that in some sports Farmington and North Farmington rate high. In a few others,

they are at the bottom. It's not our intention to follow Kearns with a rating system; all we strive to pass along here is an explanation of why sometimes your favorite school doesn't get the writeup you might think they deserve.

We probably agree with you. The coaches no doubt know who among them are neglectful.



Fudge Can Be Easy.

If you like fudge but have trouble making it turn out right. chances are you'll go crazy over this recipe. With the one basic formula for Quick Chocolate Fudge, you can turn out a dozen delightfully different candies.

QUICK CHOCOLATE FUDGE

1/4 cup margarine

3 ounces unsweetened chocolate 1 pound confectioners sugar 1/3 cup instant nonfat dry milk (dry form)

1/2 cup light or dark corn syrup

1 tablespoon water

1 teaspoon vanilla

1/2 cup chopped nuts or 1 cup miniature or cut-up marshmallows (optional)

Melt margarine and chocolate in top of 2-quart double boiler or saucepan over boiling water. Meanwhile, sift confectioners sugar and nonfat dry milk together; set aside. Stir light or dark corn syrup, water and vanilla into chocolate mixture over boiling water.

Blend in sifted dry ingredients in two additions, stirring until mixture is well blended and smooth. Remove from boiling water. Mix in nuts or marshmallows. Turn into greased 8 x 2-inch square pan. Cool. Cut into squares. Makes 1 3/4

QUICK LIGHT FUDGE: Follow recipe for Quick Chocolate Fudge, omitting chocolate and water, using light corn syrup and increasing vanilla to two teaspoons.

QUICK PEANUT BUTTER FUDGE: Follow recipe for Quick Chocolate Fudge, omitting chocolate, melting 1/3 cup Skippy creamy or chunk style peanut butter with margarine and using light corn syrup. STUFFED FRUIT: Prepare Quick Chocolate or Blonde

Fudge. Stuff into dried fruit. FUDGE ROLL: Grease two (9-inch) square pans. Cover bottom of one pan with two cups chopped nuts. Prepare one recipe Quick Chocolate Fudge and pour into pan with nuts; spread and smooth. Prepare one recipe Quick Blonde Fudge and pour into other pan.

Let stand until set, but still soft. Turn out chocolate fudge into waxed paper, then turn over so nuts are on bottom. Roll blonde fudge into tight roll and place on one end of chocolate fudge. (Do not stretch blonde fudge.)

Roll up with chocolate on outside, using waxed paper as aid. Chill until firm. Slice with sharp knife.





First State Income Tax Returns Due On April 15

By Atty Gen. Frank J. Kelley

(This is a public service article explaining in general terms a provision of Michigan law. Individuals who wish to determine the effect of any law upon their private legal affairs should consult a private attor-

Last Summer the Michigan Legislature passed the first Michigan' income tax act, Michigan thus joined the ranks of 36 other states which had previously adopted similar tax laws. Under the act, a 2.6 per cent tax was imposed on "taxable incomes" for individuals effective Oct. 1, 1967.

Taxes on the income of corporations and financial institutions became effective on Jan. 1 of this year.

The first return required to be filed by the employer was due on Nov. 15, 1967 for taxes withheld from the employee's wages in October of 1967. Individuals should have filed with their employers certificates by which they claim their personal or dependency exemptions which are provided in Section

FOR MICHIGAN, this exemption is \$1,200, rather than \$600 as provided by the federal government. An additional exemp-

tion is allowed if the person is 65 years of age or is blind. The first Michigan income tax return of an individual will be due by April 15, 1968 and will cover the last three months of 1967. On this return, the taxpayer will compute his actual tax liability.

taxpayer may either pay taxes on income accrued or received after Oct. 1 or upon one-fourth of his total "taxable" income. After deciding which of the methods he wants to use, the individual should deduct \$300 for each personal or dependency exemption to which he is entitled since the return covers only one-quarter of the







Schoolcraft Firing Case Dies With Quiet Explanation

Much ado about nothing.

That appears to be an apt way of describing the recent turmoil on the Schoolcraft College campus concerning the dismissals of six probationary teachers who apparently failed to meet the probation standards.

Perhaps it was the fact that an accreditation team from the North Central Association was coming in for a final inspection of the college prior to judgment whether Schoolcraft should be accepted. Perhaps it was the fact that the administration was absolutely right in its stand and had followed the provisions of the contract to the letter. Or perhaps it was just a case of a group of students receiving a good "brainwashing" from members of the Faculty Forum, the group which represents the faculty in negotia-

Regardless of the reason, everything was serene on campus when the accreditation team appeared last Thursday

The matter of evaluating teachers will always be a major problem, whether in Schoolcraft College or at the high school level, but the facts in this case are completely jumbled.

THE MATTER FIRST came to light a few days after the Jan. 17 meeting of the Board of Trustees when College President Eric Bradner announced that contracts would not be offered to the six probationary teachers. A group of students asked The Observer for a meeting to discuss the situation.

The students indicated they represented most of the major organizations on the campus and were an investigating committee probing into the six dismissals. Their chief concern was that the firing could lower the quality of education since it could result in competent teachers not applying for positions at the college.

The meeting was held in The Observer offices in Plymouth with board Chairman Harold Fischer and Vice Chairman Mrs. Jane Moehle sitting in as observers and nothing else.

During the course of the meeting. Fischer told the group that he would call an executive meeting of the board if a petition was presented by the students asking for such a meeting to discuss the matter.

The petition was presented, but Fischer was unable to get a quorum and thus delayed the session until the regular meeting of the Board-last Wednesday.

In the meantime, Dr. Bradner was called home from his annual vacation to Phoenix, Ariz., and

the administration had a soulsearching session with department heads to clarify the situation. It was a lengthy session and did resolve many touchy things that had been allowed to go unnoticed for a long time.

From all reports, the session was a bit stormy at times but did have the desired results of bringing harmony and a more complete understanding of the administration's stand.

WITH THAT OUT of the way, Dr. Bradner, Vice President John Brinn and Dean of Students Edward McNally called a meeting with the student committee a week ago Tuesday where every detail of the administration action was explained.

. The administrators apparently proved to the satisfaction of the students that they had acted according to the contract, for the discussion died very quickly. Nary a word was heard at the board meeting the following night. Nary a word was heard by the Observer from the students either which definitely leads one to believe there was a great deal of brainwashing of an immature

The situation was even more strange on the following night, Wednesday, at the regular board meeting. There wasn't anything on the agenda in regard to the turmoil - in spite of the fact that Dr. George Martin, a member of the board, had sent a memorandum to each Trustee giving his views on the matter.

In fact, Dr. Martin asked The Observer to publish the memorandum so that voters in his area (Livonia) would know of his stand. Despite this, Dr. Martin had nothing to say at the board meeting, and his memorandum wasn't discussed.

So when the accreditation team arrived on the scene Thursday, everything was serene and quiet. The students were going to classes, the teachers were teaching, the administration was cool, calm and collected, and the trustees were at their absolute best in telling of the rapid development of Schoolcraft College.

As we indicated in the opening sentence, it was much ado about nothing. And none cared to talk about the matter. We suppose this could be called another case of a college with growing pains except that there were some charges and counter-charges made during the heat of the turmoil and the public doesn't have any of the answers at this time.

Even Dr. Martin, who had the most bitter comments, had nothing to say as he left the board meeting.

This is, why campaigns are important. They inform the voters and at the same time get the candidates to lay their positions out on the line.

Endlessly repeating "Re-elect Joe Soandso, he's a nice guy" doesn't add much content to the campaign.

Second, those candidates who have been in office ought to be held responsible to show just how they met their previous cam-

paign promises.

If there is no clear way of remembering just what his promises were, the politician can slip out of being forced to 'fess up to the public about just what he was doing while in office.

THIS DOESN'T MEAN that campaigns in Observerland are not energetic. They certainly are.

In Livonia, where the primary election is next Monday, there has been a series of public meetings for candidates to express their various points of view. In Westland last year, campaigning was heavy and effective. Plymouth and Farmington both have a reasonably effective series of public meetings at schools and through the League of Women Voters, respectively, and Redford Township politics are always a top conversational topic.

And, of course, there are all the roadside signs, brochures, ads in the newspapers, and so forth.

BUT AFTER ALL this energy has been expended, there still is no real way to pin candidates down on exactly what they think the problems of the community are and what specifically they intend to do about them.

What might be useful would be to follow the lead of the President and the Governor and have an annual State of the City or State of the Township speech.

Here's how it might operate. All candidates for Mayor or Township Supervisor would continue to wage their present sorts of campaigns. Some would be explicit about their view of the problems facing the community and their solutions; others would remain vague.

After the election, the elected Mayor or Township Supervisor would make his first speech in office a general review of his conception of the problems facing the community together with the policies his administration intends to pursue to solve these problems.

This would force the Mayor or Supervisor himself to do some thinking about just what he plans to do while in office. It would require him to rank the issues in terms of priorities, and it would force him to think about realistic ways to cope with the problems

the community faces. Then when the Mayor's or Supervisor's term comes to an end, the public would have an' excellent way of finding out just how the incumbent defined the issues and what he did about

The State of the City (Township) Speech would become the central political statement for debate in the community, both defining the plans of the administration and laying down the subjects for discussion during the

next election. It would function to sharpen debate and to give it content, and it would force politicians to be responsible both to their prom-

ises and to the voters. Here's hoping someone has enough guts and political responsibility to try it.

Legislators' Junkets Draw Fire As Big Tabs Are Submitted

LANSING - Junketing state legislators are coming under fire as financial records spelled out the stories of \$110-aday hotel suits and a \$906 San Francisco party to boost Gov. Romney.

The disclosures came in the middle of a hot battle over district offices for senators estimated to cost taxpayers \$700,000 a year.

It was touched off by criticism of Senators Basil W. Brown and Stanley Novak, both Detroit Democrats, who spent more than \$2,000 in tax money studying fishing

Brown said the trip was authorized by Senator John F. Toepp, whose committee is looking into Great Lakes fishing problems. Toepp said the trip was not authorized, * * *

SENATOR GEORGE W. KUHN (R-West Bloomfield), the only Observerland legislator listed, conceded he spent \$114

junkets to investigate metropolitan government.

"I think personally that if any committee had substance, this one did," he told the Observer. "We worked from early morning to late at night to get information which will be valuable to us in considering these bills."

Senator Gilbert E. Bursley (R-Ann Arbor), a center of the junket controversy, was "an extra on the trips," Kuhn said.

"Personally, I was reticent about going on any of these," Kuhn said. 'There's no doubt there are some abuses, and I think the more these trips and expense claims are made public the better it will

BURSLEY'S WHEREABOUTS are sometimes a mystery even to the Senate GOP leadership. Asked where Bursley was during a period of prolonged absence. Senator Emil Lockwood, majority leader

Bursley, a former member of the Washington diplomatic corps, has traveled to the Far East and headed a mission to Europe with Gov. Romney to promote Michigan as a business source.

Bursley visited Tokyo, Taipei, Formosa, Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, Singapore, Hong Kong, Manila and Honolulu. On the same trip were Senators Milton Zaagman (R-Grand Rapids) and John T. Bowman (D-Roseville). * * *

A SPECIAL COMMITTEE on Contractual Relations charged \$2,924 for a western United States trip and \$2,639 for an eastern visit.

Legislators on the trips were Senators Robert J. Huber, John E. McCauley, Kuhn, and Anthony Stamm. They took along Nick Rini, a committee aide who was formerly lobbyist for the Detroit Board of Commerce.

At another time, Bursley's committee was in Seattle and San Francisco. His bill was \$183 plus travel costs.

Tourist Patterns Shift

· Michigan's vacation travel Michigan shoreline." industry, hit hard by a series of setbacks in 1967, still managed to register more than \$1 billion in tourist spending during the year, according to the State Tourist Council.

Results of the Council's year- according to McGraw. end business survey of tourism announced at the group's recent meeting in St. Clair, showed vacation travel spending in 1967 totaled about the same as in the previous year when tourist expenditures throughout the state reached a record \$1.065

BUSINESS REPORTS from Michigan accommodations, restaurants, attractions, other tourist facilities and chambers of commerce showed 1967 as a year of extremes in tourism, the council said.

Several communities reported record tourist volumes, with increases ranging up to 22 per cent, while other localities registered tourism declines of as much as 30 per cent.

"The year saw a great deal of shifting in normal recreational travel patterns," according to William T. McGraw, Council director, "We think this was largely due to a siphoning off of regular vacation customers to Expo '67 in Montreal and the alewife problem, particularly in diverting vacationers from the lower Lake

BIGGEST NEWS in tourism during 1967 was the spectacular attraction of Coho salmon fishing in the Great Lakes and in some Michigan streams,

"There's no question that the Coho success and a resulting surge in recreational travel last autumn gave Michigan a respectable tourist year after a rather disappointing summer season," he said.

"Tourist trade generally was down in the summer months as a result of cool weather, dead alewives on Great Lakes beaches, riots in some of our cities, competition from Expo '67, auto strikes and a general economic uncertainty throughout much of the country."

TOURIST COUNCIL spokesmen emphasized that while 1967 business equalled 1966 vacation spending, the year could not be considered an outstanding success because Michigan "stood still" as other vacation states and areas showed substantial increases in tourist during the

New protection for the young worker and his family stands out among the new provisions in the social security law for

FOR BENEFITS to be paid to a disabled worker and his dependents under the old law he needed social security credits for at least five out of the 10 years before becoming disabled.

Now, if you become disabled between 24 and 31, you need credits for only half the time between age 21 and the time you become unable to work. If you are disabled before you For young workers who be- reach age 24, you need only 11/2 security out of a three-year period ending when your disability began.

Benefits under this new pro-

vision are first payable for the month of February 1968. About 100,000 people -- disabled workers and their dependents -- are eligible. An estimated \$70 million in additional benefits will be paid out in the first 12 months.

The new law could mean benefits even for some people who have recovered from their disabiling condition, or if they were denied benefits previously because they lacked enough work credits. .

Controversial Subjects Readers 'Speak Up' O

EDITOR:

Livonia has a school bus problem, and its elementary school children are suffering the consequences, unnecessarily, we feel.

more than one load of children greatly in its success. to each school. This means that voungsters assigned to affrstload bus are taken to their school and left there while the driver makes a second trip.

On cold winter mornings, children stand shivering outside the doors of elementary schools, waiting for the time when they will be allowed into the warm buildings. Some must walt 15 or 20 minutes, others a half an hour or more.

There are occasions when the doors are opened early. The Board of Education requires that students be admitted in "inclement weather". Elementary school principals wrote their own definition of inclement weather in March, 1965. They agreed to give the children shelter under the following conditions: "heavy rain, under 15! degrees, strong wind, or other cases at the discretion of the principal."

We would have preferred to feel that those persons in charge of the schools were a little more humane.

Protests to our principal and to the Board of Education have accomplished little. We were told that parents from other schools have not protested. Why not? Are they aware of the situation?

We know there is plenty of grumbling among parents of children in our school. One mother was quoted as saying, send my child to school to get an education -- not pheumonia!"

Why is it necessary for the children to endure this earlymorning chill? The teachers and principals are in the warm buildings, and could be assigned to supervise the youngsters in the "multi-purpose room".

Board policy states that "supervision will be provided" for these children. Yet, at our school, there was no teacher on morning playground duty until ecent weeks, since one mother instituted a campaign to get supervision. One teacher was on duty at the front of the school to see that children got off the buses safely. The playground is back of the school.

Children don't want to play on the playground before school tarts.

The schools are responsible or the children from the time hey arrive. These youngsters o not choose to take an early

An attempt was made at our chool to solve the morning supervision problem by asking arents to volunteer for duty. lew parents were recruited and most of those few soon fell by the wayside. They probably couldn't stand the cold.

Perhaps teachers don't like e cold either. We wouldn't lame them. But the children re outside. And they don't like

Shouldn't the children's welare (possibly, even their comfort) be the first consideration? At a recent meeting of proesting mothers with Dr. Henry Heisner, Livonia's director of elementary education, we presented to Dr. Heisner a copy of "wind-chill" chart drawn up by the U.S. Army and National Science Foundation. He decided to distribute copies of the chart o principals. This may help, but not solve the problem.

We want our children let into the buildings when the temperature is not as low as "under 15 degrees", and without the necessity for "strong wind" or "heavy rain".

We are also asking the School Board to put this matter on the genda for discussion at an arly meeting. We hope to get results.





A University of Michigan child psychoanalyst who wanted to know more about the differences in the way children develop has discovered the obstacles to be overcome before blind babies can creep.

MRS. SELMA FRAIBERG. associate professor of child psycho-analysis at the U-M Medical School, also has learned much to help mothers do a better job caring for and educating their infants. She described her research at the 134th annual meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in New York recently.

In the study, Prof. Fraiberg has closely followed the first three years of life of several babies who were otherwise healthy but were born blind or able only to perceive light. The project, started in 1960. is supported by the National Institute of Child Health and

Human Development. The child who is born blind exists in what Prof. Fraiberg calls "a perilous world." And he must travel "a long and difficult route" before he learns to bridge the gulf between himself and the outer world he cannot see.

SHE LEARNED in sessions spent with the infants and their mothers that there is a marked lag in the achievement of creeping. In fact, many blind babies do not creep at all. And for all blind children, independent walking is delayed.

Why shouldn't the blind baby propel himself forward? "For a time," explained Prof. Fraiberg, "we could come up with only half the answer."

"The sighted baby who has learned to support himself on hands and knees is also expert in reaching and attaining an object on sight. The reach for the out-of-range object propels him forward-the early creepcollapse, a reach and a col- a thing that can be grasped." lapse. This pattern gradually smooths out and becomes the motor pattern of creeping."

But for the blind baby, there was no stimulus for reaching. Why, the researcher wondered, should not an attractive soundmaking object substitute for the visual stimulus of reaching?

PROF. FRAIBERG was puzzled to see that a totally blind child does not spontaneously bring the hands together at midline, but keeps them at rest about shoulder height in the posture of a newborn, Comparing blind and sighted babies at five months, the investigator found that "there is no behavior in the blind infant that is

equivalent to reaching and attaining an object on sight." Using a movie projector, it was seen that the blind baby's hands remain motionless if a sound object is experimentally introduced within easy reach of

"There is not even a fleeting activation of the fingers in response to the sound. If we jingle the bell on his cradle gym a few seconds after he himself has set the trapeze in motion and heard the bell, we will not elicit any behavior that behavior," Prof. Fraiberg said.

THROUGH OBSERVATIONS the U-M team learned about the adaptive problem for the blind baby. "The whole question of con-

structing an object world is really essential to creeping," the psychoanalyst stated. The child who is ready to creep, but who hasn't yet learned that the sound connotes the object cannot propel himself forward. It's the reaching out by the sighted child that is the start of creeping."

CLOSE CLINICAL observations enabled the research team to assist the mothers "to edu-

cate the infants hands," she said. "We encouraged patty cake and other games to ensure pleasurable contact of the hands at midline." With a playtable, "an interesting space" was created for the baby. Toys and objects were placed there to facilitate finding and grasp-

"We have reason to believe that our education of the baby's hands has had a significant effect in facilitating adaptive hand





melodious musical comedy filled the cavernous confines of the Hill Auditorium, (4,000 seats). In New York, 'The Fantasticks" is still playing nightly (3,282 performances so far) at the Sullivan Street the other New York traveling Playhouse (199 seat capacity).

In two evenings at Ann Arbor "The Fantasticks" played to more than 7,800 customers. Near capacity crowds relished the charm of this simple, yet profound musical. The appeal of "The Fantasticks" comes in its utter simplicity. Under the guise of its universality. however, some of life's profoundest truths find effective and pleasant ways to make their point.

AS THE TWO fathers in this eight-character musical arrange a marriage between their children, larger conflicts loom significantly overhead in the shadows. Conflicts develop between the parents and one sees the wall being constructed in the musical garden as a Berlin Wall or the DMZ line in North Vietnam. 'The Fantasticks' is certain to be a classic in the years to come. No matter how many times you see it you can gleam more hidden truths and comtemporary comparisons.

The first time you see 'The Fantasticks" you enjoy it for its merry, bright musical score, clever choreography and dialogue. There is a

"The Fantasticks", the spareness about the dialogue that adds appeal. No actor gets an opportunity to carry on for over 30 seconds in any of his two performances at U of M's speeches. Consequently, the storyline of "The Fantasticks" The musical magic of this keeps the production whipping along with great rapidity.

The University of Michigan Professional Program can beam with pride at this opening production of their 1968 Show of the Month series. If productions coming in future months have as high caliber. it will be a season long to remember. Or as they sing so beautifully in 'The Fantasticks". . . "Try to remember". . . and you will remember the colorful explosion of wit, music, and dancing so competently presented.

WHILE 'THE Fantasticks" started the week off in Ann Arbor on a most happy note, the dramatic happenings nearby in the Lydia Mendelssohn Theater on Feb. 7 were of a more somber nature. Strindberg's "The Ghost Sonata" had its midwest premiere by the University of Michigan Play-

The stricken vessel's 22 crew members and two passengers had been saved from two life boats and a life raft Saturday and taken aboard the Norwegian freighter Vinni, enroute to Norfolk, Va.

U-M To Emphasize Role Of Intramural Athletics

ing greater independence to the physical education department and emphasizing intramural sports has been announced by University of Michigan President Robben W. Fleming.

Two associate directors will be named, one for intercollegiate athletics and one for physical education. Both will report to the director of physical education and athletics.

No one has yet been named to succeed director H.O. "Fritz" Crisler, who will retire June 30. "The structural solution was a necessary prerequisite to the search for a successor," Fleming said.

"THE NEW structure requires a re-evaluation of the qualifications of possible physical education and athletics directors, and that process will now take place," Fleming

"Though members of the present staff will certainly be considered for the newly created posts and the over-all director-ship, it is understoodthat coaching, teaching, or other assignments for next year will not be affected. This is essential in view of the late de-

·tion." The president noted that intercollegiate sports were not being downgraded by the additional independence for phy-. sical education and emphasis on intramurals. "The University has always been a great competitor in intercollegiate athletics, and it expects to remain so," he said.

THE RESTRUCTURING was decided upon after long discussions with faculty committees and the University Re-

Fleming noted that neither the Regents nor the university administration felt that this is the time to establish a separate school of physical education, as some faculty members suggested. But all agreed that the physical education program deserved greater independence.

An advisory committee on intramurals, recreation, and club sports will be established to work with the athletic director on expanding programs in this

mations, originated at the annual Advocacy Institute, are said to be the most effective and realistic method of providing new information, as three attorneys cross-examine the same witness under simulated courtroom conditions, Observers thus see a number of approaches to the same prob-

In the past two years, more than 5,000 lawyers from 49 states, every province of Canada, and Mexico have attended the Advocacy Institute, and it is expected that this year's attendance will be greatest in the institute's 19 years.

The new stacks, which are higher than other structures in the general area, will serve as a new landmark for Detroit River traffic in the same tradition as the well-known Seven Sisters at Edison's Conners-Creek Power plant, opposite Belle Isle, have done for many

Computer Speaks Answers

Burroughs Corp. has announced its newest data communications system, which uses computer-stored information to generate a spoken reply through a telephone hand set.

The new equipment, called the Burroughs Audio Response System, can retrieve and play data such as a bank account balance, inventory quantity or the winners, who have been to send coded data to computer memory through a Touch Tone telephone keyboard.

Burroughs President Ray W. Macdonald said the new system "provides fast, economical and convenient two-way communication with an electronic computer using a telephone, which is familiar, inexpensive and can be located anywhere."

THE AUDIO Response System can be used with all Burroughs electronic computers that have data communications capabilities.

The new system is under computer program control, and appropriate words, numbers and phrases are selected, are amplified, and are sent to the telephone as a spoken response.

In a typical work situation,, a bank teller, for instance, first establishes a telephone connection with the computer, then keys in an identification code and numerical codes representing the type of inquiry, and the account number.

The request is transmitted to the computer over conventional telephone lines. The computer instantly locates the information in its electronic random access files and formulates codes which cause the voice response generator to produce the proper message.

THE ENTIRE PROCESS. from beginning of inquiry to end of response, takes about 30

seconds. In other applications of the new system, an operator could make inquiries about information such as order levels, inventory amounts or payroll data, or the operator could use the telephone keyboard as a device to add to or alter data stored in computer files.

What Are Rights Of Child?

ANN ARBOR--Society faces the dilemma of wanting to strengthen family ties by allowing parents to raise their children by their own means, and yet knowing that the rights of their children are often substantially ignored.

Dean Robert F. Drinan, of the Boston College Law School presented this problem to lawyers, judges, police officials, and social workers attending "Gault: What Now for the Juvenile Court?" a program of the Institute of Continuing Legal Education at The University of Michigan.

Designed to explore the ramifications of a recent Supreme Court decision which has begun to revolutionize juvenile court procedure, "Gault" featured a faculty of authorities from throughout the nation.

DEAN DRINAN, the Jesuit priest who is chairman of the family law section of the American Bar Association, stated "we must realize that 40 per cent of the population is under 21, but they must have rights before the law as do those individuals who are over 21."

Emphasizing the absence heretofore of substantial rights for minors, Drinan traced the life of a hypothetical youth from birth to the age of legal adult-"Obviously," he noted, "the

child has no control over his being born, but what if he is born illegitimately? Is he guaranteed equal rights? Does the infant have any rights regarding his own adoption? Someone must speak for the child if he can not speak for himself."

DRINAN ALSO probed the area of emotionally disturbed children. "What is to guarantee that children who are committed at an early age will get treatment or a consideration of their cases?" he asked. "What guarantees them due process?"

All of these matters have been touched upon by the Gault decision, he stated, and some changes may come in the future. At least, the educator maintained, courts have started to say that a child has rights.

Regarding one change which could be made now, Drinan asserted that 18-year-olds should be given the vote.

"We must release them of the frustration of the 18-21 year population by letting them participate positively in the government of this country," he said. 'This group, which compromises seven per cent of the population, is in my opinion the most intelligent and idealistic in the country and should be recognized."

It's probably a pretty good sample. The number of engagements is heaviest this time of year, according to Women's Editor Margaret Miller, because the Christmas-to-Valentine's Day period is a good time to announce the rash of forthcoming June and August weddings.

There are a couple of soft spots in the sample, however. It doesn't necessarily follow, for example, that all the engaged couples will actually get married. And not all engagements are announced.

Nevertneiess, there can be no better guide to the patterns of romance and first marriages in Observerland than the announcements made by the parents of the lovely young ladies on these pages.

"THE GIRL NEXT DOOR" pattern of marriage is pretty much a thing of the past in Observerland.

Only one-fourth (44 of the young persons) was marrying someone from the same town. More than half the girls weren't even marrying boys from other Observerland towns. Data on the number of boys marrying "outsiders" tends to be unreliable — a lad's fiancee is less likely to announce the engagement in the boy's home town paper.

And the number of apparent home town

marriages tends to be beefed-up by the sheer population size of Livonia (est. 103,000), with many high schools.

Ours is a mobile society. Increasingly, it's a college-educated society. It's only logical that romance follow the same pattern.

A HIGHLY INBRED area is Redford Township.

Five of the eight boys and five of the 16 girls were planning to marry other Redfordites. Thus, of 19 separate engagements, five were entirely intra-Redford.

Even more inbred is Livonia, where 10 of 24 girls and 10 of 12 boys were planning to marry fellow Livonians. Thus, 10 of the 26 separate engagements were intra-city.

Only two of the 15 Farmington brides-tobe and two of the eight prospective bridegrooms are planning to marry persons from the same town. That's two "local" engagements from a total of 21.

Ironically, adults and politicians in the hills of Farmington often take a sniffish attitude toward the plains of Livonia, but Farmington girls apparently disagree. More Farmington girls plan to marry Livonia boys than Farmington

In Plymouth, three of the 13 girls and three of the eight boys planned to marry other Plymouthites. That's three local engagements from a total of 18.

The Garden City and Westland figures are inconclusive because of the small statistical base. Two of the five Garden City girls and two of the five boys were planning to marry "in town." None of the three girls and four boys from Westland was marrying

A few engagements that don't appear entirely local actually are. A Livonia girl and Farmington boy both turned out to have attended Clarenceville High School. A Livonia girl and a Westland boy both attended Bentley High School. In engagement announcements, parents use their post office addresses rather than school district ad-

AMONG SCHOOLS, the biggest producer of engagements was Michigan State University with seven.

Bentley High School followed with five. Western Michigan University, which is drawing increasing numbers of students from Wayne and Oakland counties, accounted for four.

No other school produced more than two

of the 90 engagements.

The U.S. Air Force, of which the WAFs

are part, produced one. Eastern Michigan University, strangely, produced none during the two months from which the sample was drawn. Usually, it pro-

duces several in a sample of that size.

One matter of curiosity was the engagement of two employes of International Business Machines. The announcement didn't indicate whether the young couple had met on the job or whether the match-making had been done by a computer.

During last July's Detroit riots. McMath's wing flew photo missions over Detroit, and more than 800 guardsmen performed duty on the streets of



Follow Tips In Deducting Local Taxes

(This is another in a series of articles prepared by the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants on money-saving tax tips and errors to be avoided in preparation of the 1040 Federal Individual Income Tax Return.)

As a taxpayer, you will want to take all the deductions allowed by law when filing your 1040 Federal Individual Income Tax Return for 1967.

You can deduct most state and local taxes when you itemize your deductions on Page This includes payments withheld from your wages for state or local income taxes as well as payments made on your estimated state and local income taxes during the year.

State and local gasoline taxes can be deducted, as well as personal property and general sales taxes. Real estate taxes can be deducted only by the owner of the property. In the event that separate returns are filed by husband and wife. real estate taxes paid by the wife can be deducted only on her return.

OTHER ITEMS you can deduct include: dues to a union or professional society, the cost of tools and supplies needed in your job when furnished at your own expense, and fees paid to employment agencies for helping you to find a new job.

Under certain conditions, you can also deduct the cost of courses and instruction needed to help you maintain or improve skills required in your job or profession.

You must, however, be already employed or selfemployed before the expenses are incurred and meet the minimum standards of skill and proficiency required by your cumstances when not rejob or profession.

NON-BUSINESS bad debts are ital losses and should be reported in Schedule D and offset against short-term capital ductions for capital losses.

Alcoholic beverage, cigaret and tobacco taxes are not deductible. Neither are federal excise taxes on theater admissions, furs, jewelry, cosmetics, railroad or airline fares, telephone service and long-distance

Casualty losses and losses due to thefts can be deducted. Property damage caused by a hurricane, tornado, flood, fire, is known as a casualty Damage to your auto is also a casualty loss unless caused by a willful act committed by you or through your own negligence.

You can deduct personal casualty losses and losses due to theft in excess of \$100 which are not covered by insurance. Only the owner of the damaged or stolen property can claim the deduction. You must also be able to prove that you actually suffered the loss (reported it to the police, for example, in the case of a stolen purse) and be able to establish the amount of the loss (fair market value of stolen item, cost of repairs, etc.)

Casualty and theft losses to business property which are not covered by insurance are deductible without regard to the \$100 limitation.

TAXPAYERS WHO USE their personal cars for business and are not reimbursed by their employers for travel expenses can deduct 10 cents a mile up to a limit of 15,000 miles and seven cents a mile after that.

Moving expenses can also be deducted under certain cirimbursed by the employer. The deduction can include reasonable charges for shipment of deductible as short-term cap- household furniture and effects, meals and lodging for the family while in transit, etc.

Psychiatrist Says Med Student Sex Ed Poor

The physician in today's society should be comfortable discussing sex and family planning with his patients.

A University of Michigan psychiatrist says the medical schools are not doing well in sex education of medical students, and he questions the low priority given to maturity in the student selection pro-

'There is an amazing lack of knowledge about sexual matters in even graduating physicians," says Dr. Stuart M. Finch, professor of psychiatry at the U-M Medical School,

THIS SITUATION is being slowly improved, Dr . Finch says, but the vast majority of medical students still are denied the adequate sex education for which they are eager.

"However, during the last few years there has been an almost remarkable increase in

ical schools throughout the wers given by these candidates country and we are only beginning to get some ideas about how much this new approach an occasional individual showwill change the attitudes of

students. "Recently at a specialty board examination I heard for the first time candidates being quizzed on their knowledge of such things as abortion laws. contraception, and sex education. Only a few years ago such questions would have been thoroughly taboo.

Interestingly enough, the answere for the most part quite realistic and scientific. Only ed distorted prejudices."

Since emotional immaturity is a chief reason people do not understand the need for family planning or achieve sexual adjustment, it is especially important that the physician be adequately educated as well as mature himself, says the Michigan psychiatrist.

"Recent publicity has been given to the fact that physicians as a group kill themselves oftener, divorce more frequently, and turn to alcohol and drugs in greater proportion than others in our population. We certainly cannot claim to have the most mature segment in the population engaged in the practice of medicine."

"Why then," says Dr. Finch. "should we assume that doctors are the most effective dispensers of sexual education and contraceptive knowledge to their patients, especially when we realize that these topics closely reflect an individual's emotional maturity?"

THE MATURE physician feels responsibility to inquire into and understand the sexual attitudes of his patients and their knowledge about family planning.

"This is a routine, nonprurient inquiry which he feels is just as important a part of his knowledge about his patients as is any other aspect of their lives. His own matterof-fact discussion of the topic is communicated to patients and they in turn become much more at ease in such discus-

In contrast, immature physicians consider the sexual life of their patients to be "a private matter." This, notes Dr. Finch, usually stems from the physician's own distorted attitudes about sex and his own inability to discuss it.

One problem in the preation of medical students for their future roles may exist in the method of selecting them, says Dr. Finch.

"At the present time medical school applicants are chosen primarily on the basis of intellectual prowess."

THE SCHOOL admissions committees take into account only slightly the candidate's degree of maturity and his interest in medicine, says Dr. Finch. Instead, they focus on the Medical College Admissions Test scores and over-all grade point averages.

"We have a peculiar selection problem which picks a high percentage of obsessional candidates and then we proceed in our medical education to make such compulsivity more rigid than ever. .

"Any psychiatrist can tell you that the average obsessivecompulsive has difficulty in relating warmly to others and dealing effectively with sexual matters," the doctor says.

Poachers Fined And Penalized

Game poaching in Michigan has become an unprecedented highcost risk, latest Conserva-


tion Department figures show. Putting an added pinch on violators is a new reimbursement penalty which has been meted out to the amount of nearly \$22,000 since it went into effect last July. These damages are above regular fines and court costs.

They are pegged to special rates covering the value of wildlife illegally taken. The reimbursement costs, per animal, run up to \$300 for elk, \$200 for deer, and \$10 for small game and waterfowl.

Among the latest to feel the full measure of this new penalty is Donald E. Parks of Luzerne who was assessed the maximum \$200 charge for each of three deer he poached early this month north of Curran in Alcona County.

Justice of the Peace Morrell Browne of Harrisville also fined Parks \$100, levied court costs of \$15, and sentenced the Luzerne man to 15 days in jail with total charges of \$715 to think about. This sort of takes the sport out of poaching.

The charges and jail sentence against Parks are among the stiffest prices that a game violator has ever been ordered to pay in Michigan.

Autos Look For 9-Million Unit Year In 1968

quarter sales in several years and a serious work stoppage in recent months, 1967 has turned out to be the third best year on record for the U.S. automobile industry.

Virtually all business indicators point to a marked improvement for the industry in 1968, with the strong probability that automobile sales will exceed 9 million units.

THE LAST FEW months of 1967 were similar in some ways to the last few months of 1964. Then as now the industry was being affected by an extended interruption of production related to negotiations on new

Then as now the public had responded with unusual enthusiasm to the industry's new models. And then as now virtually every indicator of business activity and economic growth was pointing to an excellent year ahead for the industry once it could return

marketing. At the end of 1964, just before the automobile industry headed into its greatest year to date, personal income had reached the record annual rate of \$502 billion. Now at the end of 1967 personal income is running at the annual rate of \$631 billion. Even with a correction for the 7

to normal patterns of production and

percent of inflation that has been experienced since 1964, this is still an impressive gain.

At the end of 1964, people were saving money at the record annual rate of \$25.6 billion. Now at the end of 1967 the rate of personal savings has reached the level of \$38.5 billion. This is a gain of more than 50 percent in the rate of personal savings in the past three years.

At the end of 1964, there were approximately 123 million people in the U.S. who were over 18 and potential buyers of automobiles. At the end of 1967 this sector of the population numbers slightly over 129 million. This is a net increase of 6

million potential customers in the past three years.

THESE FACTS point to a good year ahead for the automobile business. But they are by no means the only promising indicators of a strong automobile market in 1968.

Also encouraging is a surprisingly high level of confidence on the part of consumers in the strength of the economy and clear evidence that they plan to buy cars and other durables in great volume in the months ahead.

Supporting all these indicators of effective demand for cars are other positive factors, such as the rising scrappage rate for automobiles -- now

well over six million a year; the continued reliance upon the automobile for personal transportation as the rapidly growing population of our cities moves out into the suburban areas; and the remarkably strong current

Ford Sales Top Record

Ford Division's combined passenger car and truck sales in the first 10 days of January were 60,188, the highest on record for the period.

Car sales during the eight selling days making up the first reporting period of 1968 were 46,703, and truck sales reached an all-time high of

demand for used cars.

Used-car prices are even stronger than they were at this time last year and good used-car prices are of course a critically important factor in newcar sales, since they give the prospective new-car buyer a strong incentive to trade.

IT SEEMS CLEAR that the demand for used cars will continue to increase. This growing demand will be generated in the main by the nearly four million young people who will be reaching driver-licensing age every year from now on, since young people are excellent customers for used cars.

Dip Gives State Economy Breather, Gains Seen

After five consecutive years of steady improvement, the Michigan economy lost some of its momentum in the early part of 1967. Although the year ended with a modest employment gain, 1967 did not match the performance of 1966. In many respects, the State took a "breather" from its earlier blistering pace.

Michigan's non-farm employment averaged 3,167,000 during 1967. This was 29,000 better than 1966 but the increase was small compared with a gain of 116,000 between 1965 and 1966 and 165,000 between 1964 and 1965. Nevertheless, 1967 average employment was the highest in the eleven years for which

comparable data are available.

The small over-the-year increase in statewide employment did not keep pace with the growth in the labor force. As a result, unemployment climbed to 155,000 or 4.5 per cent of the labor force in 1967, about 38,000 above the 1966 average of 116,900 and exceeded the 1965 average by 29,800.

On a monthly basis, unemployment in 1967 fluctuated from a low of 113,000, or 3.3 per cent of the labor force in October, to a high of 217,000 or 6.3 per cent in July. This year July was the significant model-change month in in the automobile industry. August was second highest with 211,000 or 6.1

The manufacturing group reflected the slowdown in the labor economy. Factory employment decreased by 33,900 during the year. This contrasts with an increase of 43,500 in 1966.

The trend was very similar in the Detroit area with private nonmanufacturing going up 27,100, government 7,100 and manufacturing declining 18,800 below the 1966 figure.

The most important factor affecting employment during the year was a decline in the market for new automobiles during the first half of 1967. The auto assembly plants and closely related industries were affected most by the lower volume of automobile sales. On the average, employment in auto assembly plants was 22,300 below the 1966 level. with 103,800 in 1966. Although the natural growth in the labor force was about the same in both years a decline in the volume of job opportunities attracted fewer immigrants during 1967.

Shortages of skilled metal workers, clerical workers and professional workers have continued throughout the year despite a reduction in the over-all demand. The demand was particularly strong for programmers, medical technicians, nurses, machinists, machine repairmen, auto mechanics, secretaries and stenographers.

On the other hand there was a good supply of unskilled labor, some types of sales clerks, kitchen helpers, laundry laborers, production machine operators, welders and a few types of professionals such as draftsmen, buyers and sales managers.




