### observerland

LIVONIA - Forty families along Merriman Court, a short, seldom-heard-from street in Livonia, have complained loudly to the City Council and caused city fathers considerable embarrassment. By printer's error, Merri-man Court was left off the city's master sanitary sewer and finance plan map, leaving the street with antiquated septic tanks while sewers were being built all around. Merriman Court residents complained bitterly of septic-tank overflow, unusable sanitary facilities in their homes and the resulting menace to young children. Councilmen have agreed a city sewer line on Merriman Court will get "top priority," though "probably not until summer.'

LIVONIA - Opposition to non-public school aid legislation now being proposed in the State Legislature mounted here this week among school leaders and top educators. Livonia Public School Supt. Benton Yates went on record as opposing the legis-lation as did top officers of the Livonia Board of Education. The Livonia PTA Council under its president, Mrs. Andrew Varbedian, spoke out officially against the measure and enlisted its 7,000 members in a letter-writing campaign against it to legislators.

REDFORD - Redord Township Parent-Teacher Associations are joining in a battle with statewide opponents of state aid to nonpublic schools students. They will promote mailings to legislators March 5 urging defeat of the Brown-Traxler legislation. The hope is to help counter-act nearly 70,000 pieces of mail that flooded Lansing early this month in support of non-public school aid.

REDFORD - South Redford Schools Board of Education is hoping to get its state senator, representative and state Board of Education president down for a public forum, on financial needs. The local board figures the buck must bounce to Lansing in some

FARMINGTON - Construction of the new \$1 million Farmington District Library, on 12 Mile Rd. between Farmington and Orchard Lake Rds., is slated to begin in early 1969.

FARMINGTON - The Board of Education will make a final decision on March 11 on the busing of Gill School pupils from Farmington Village, Nine Mile and Gill Rds. Village residents had been turned down once on a request for school transportation for these children, who are within the limits set for walking pupils.

WESTLAND - The City Council and Planning Commission had the community's new master plan and its concept presented to it at a joint meeting last week by Planning Director Eugene M. Katz.

GARDEN CITY - The City Council approved a contract covering the city's rubbish pickup collections for the next three years. The new rate will be \$1.35 per unit per month, nearly double the previous rate of \$.70.

# Hudson Quits Commission Fischer Leaves Plan Board

# Director Says Need Not Met

Harold Fischer, director of the Plymouth Area Planning Commission since its inception several years ago, has resigned, effective March 1.

Giving no other reason than the fact that 'I am a bit discouraged over the trend of things lately," and that his work seems to be going for naught, Fischer stated that he has no plans for the future.

While it was mainly through his efforts that six industries moved into the area within the past year, Fischer met with several disappointments in recent weeks.

The major setback came when the Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing Company selected a site in Farmington for a major branch in preference to a location in the Plymouth Township industrial park on Ann Arbor

ASIDE FROM this he had been working silently to have the name of the organization changed from the Area Planning Commission to the Industrial Development Commission. This idea was turned aside by the Board of Directors.

From time to time Fischer also has voiced dissatisfaction with the lack of effort on the part of the governmental units to make locations more desirable for major industry.

"It becomes very discouraging", he said recently, "when you work hard and long on a prospect, only to find that conditions have been made more

inviting in another locality". In his position Fischer did more than attempt to attract industry to the area. He also served as liaison man with the various units of government.

He worked out the details of during the past year.

He made a survey of the property owners on Penniman Avenue and induced them to accept a special assessment in order that the Davis property, which had been an "eyesore", could be purchased, razed and converted into a parking lot.

HE ALSO was the moving force, along with Carl Pursell, President of the Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce, behind the final plan for the covered sidewalk program on

Ann Arbor Trail. Along with these two tasks he has served as the "leg man" on several others.

'We certainly regret Harold's decision to resign". Tom Alexsy, president of the Area Planning Commission, stated Monday, "He is a hard worker and we had hoped that some Continued On Page 8A

# Building Boom Prepares Area For Explosion Of Population

The building boom that destwo downtown area projects cended on the Plymouth area several years ago is continuing

From one end of Plymouth Township to the other apartment complexes of all shapes and sizes are rearing their way toward the sky. The same is true of Northville Township.

As a result there will be little chance of a housing shortage with the coming of the anticipated population explosion.

"All told, we have about 500 units going up now," Plymouth Township Supervisor John Mc-Ewen pointed out, "and that is not including the various subdivisions that are being planned for early development."

Among the major projects now in the process of construction include --

Northville Forest, a complex that will total 450 units when it is completed on Five Mile Road, just west of Haggerty.

Brougham Manor, 104 units, on the park near Wilcox and Schoolcraft. Parkway Apartments, 64

units, south of Plymouth Road, west of Eckles. Plymouth Estates, 94 units, off Lilley Road between Ann

Arbor Road and Joy Road. Heritage Apartments, 172 units, on North Territorial

ASKED HOW his resignation was kept secret for a week Hudson stated that he didn't know, even though he was surprised that it finally came to light.

"I did what the charter asks." he explained, "I turned in the resignation to City Clerk Gene Slider. That was my duty."

While no official announcement of the resignation was made by Hudson or the city officials, it was learned that he was leaving his post.

When confronted with the word, and asked if he had submitted his resignation Hudson said, "yes." He didn't go any

He readily admitted that his act may have come as a surprise, but he explained, --

"I no longer have the time to do the job the way I think it should be done."

While he didn't say so, he inferred that he was a bit discouraged with the manner in

which some of the legislation has been handled lately. DURING HIS tenure on the commission he has served as chairman of two important com-

mittees -- the zoning committee and the group that has just completed a study of the charter. His last official act before tendering his resignation was to submit the report of the charter study group to the commis-

sion a week ago. This report, culminating approximately six months study called for 30 revisions in the charter and represented a great deal of work.

The zoning ordinance still is under study by the commission as a whole.

A keen student of the charter, Hudson explained that of the many revisions asked there were three really important ones. These included the recommendation to close the gap between the seating of the elected officials and the organization of the commission; the need for advisory support from non-residents to serve on committees and the term of office on the commission.





# Mystery Blast Kills Nuclear Physicist A NUCLEAR PHYSICIST working for NASA was killed

Saturday when a package he picked up at a Cleveland bus station exploded at his home in Avon, O. Samuel Hammons, 42, died while undergoing surgery for his wounds. The FBI and local police are investigating, but refused to release details of the incident, A NASA spokesman in Cleveland said that Hammons worked on instruments which kept track of radiation exposure to personnel in the nuclear reactor di-

THE FBI HAS announced the arrest of Richard Harry Bedenkop, 23, of Chicago, saying that he had in his possession travelers checks taken during a \$620,000 armed robbery in New York City last April. Bedenkop was arrested in Pompano Beach, Fla.

EIGHT OHIO STUDENTS were injured in an early morning fire Sunday that raced through a fraternity house on the Bowling Green State University campus. At least two dozen residents of the building leaped to safety, some through third-floor windows.

FEDERAL POPULATION statistics announced this weekend indicate that the birth rate in the United States is at an all-time low and that it will probably dip further. The birth rate in 1967 was 17.9 live births for every 1,000 Americans. The previous low was 18,4 in 1966, 1936 and 1933.

FOUR PERSONS were killed and 29 injured when three chartered buses, a truck and a car collided in thick smoke on the Indiana Toll Road Sunday. All of the dead were from Ohio. The chartered buses involved were carrying a Black Muslim group from the Youngstown-Cleveland area, bound for the groups annual convention in Chicago.

THE TREASURY Depart-

ment's "conscience fund" last month reached a total of \$2.931-687. The money was turned or sent in by persons who claimed to have defrauded the government in some way and are now making restitution. The fund started in 1811 when the department got its first contribution from a conscience stricken citizen. In the last three years, however, total contributions have been dropping off, ranging from \$20,000 to \$25,000 yearly, the smallest since World War II.

# Judge Orders Crackdown On School Disturbances

# Requests Arrest Of Loiterers

With the help of police and school officials, Probate Judge James Lincoln has ordered a crackdown on juveniles hanging around schools.

In a memo sent to all Police Chiefs in Wayne County, Judge Lincoln indicated the court intends to let every juvenile know that if he is not enrolled in a school, and has no business in a school, that an arrest will automatically result in conveyance to the Wayne County Youth Home.

Judge Lincoln addressed the memo on the subject of loitering and disturbance in schools by juveniles who have no right to be therein .

He wrote 'the purpose of this memorandum is to take forceful action concerning school dropouts, juveniles suspended from schools, and juveniles who are enrolled in one school but who loiter in and around schools in which they are not enrolled.

HE POINTED out that disturbances caused by these nonenrolled juveniles have reached major proportions at some schools and that he hopes his memo will help correct the situation.

He requested that the fol-Iowing juveniles be conveyed to the Wayne County Youth Home as soon as arrested.

A- All juveniles found loitering or causing a disturbance within a school, if they are not enrolled in the school in which the violation occurs.

B- Violations in the vicinity of schools (outside the school building).

Minor violations inity of a school may be handled by an ordinance violation ticket without bringing the juvenile to the Youth Home.

If the violation is severe. if the offender a known repeater, he should be brought to the Youth Home at once even though the violation occurs outside the building. It is emphasized that if the violation is within the building. the juvenile should be taken to the Youth Home at once.

Judge Lincoln took his action as a result of numerous incidents in City of Detroit public schools in recent weeks, some involving teachers and dropouts which resulted in altercations in the school building corridors.

Other incidents have been reported to suburban police during the past two weeks.

The Probate Judge took his action after reviewing the numerous incidents and discussing the matter with school officials.

# Crime Group Gets **Board Okay**

The Coordinating Committee on Crime Control has been given official status by the Wayne County Board of Supervisors, after functioning on an informal basis since June 15.

Fifteen public agencies involved in crime prevention and law enforcement are represented on the committee.

The committee was established at the suggestion of Mel Ravitz, chairman of the Board of Supervisors, 'to coordinate the plans, proposals, fundraising endeavors and legislative thrusts of many of the interrelated crime control agencies."

A resolution adopted by the Board of Supervisors, gives the coordinating committee permanent status as a body under the direction of the chairman of the county board.

The committee is engaged in three major projects:

1. A task force is developing a plan for a coordinated attack on juvenile delinquency.

2. Plans are being developed for a detoxification center or centers in Wayne County to combat the problem of alchol-

3. A comprehensive plan is being developed under the County Planning Commission to better coordinate social services with other aspects of crime control.







# Asks Ruling On Legality Of Aid

STATE SEN. Anthony Stamm (R-Kalamazoo), chairman of the Senate Education Committee, has asked Atty. Gen. Frank J. Kelley to rule on the constitutionality of granting state subsidies to parents who send their children to parochial schools. The bill, which was introduced into the Senate committee last week, proposes to give up to \$150 to the parents of a child who attends a non-public school.

STRIKING TEAMSTERS Union members at the Detroit News again rejected the company's latest offer, amid speculation that the 105-day-old strike could continue for another 100 days. The Teamsters went contrary to the advice of union leadership and for the second time turned down the News' offer of \$30-a-week increases over the three years of the

ENROLLMENT at Central Michigan University has hit a spring semester record of 10,127 students, according to figures compiled by the registrars office. The spring semester total is up more than 10 per cent over last spring's 9,076. Enrollment last fall was 10,475.

RESIDENTS of the Detroit area communities of Utica, Sterling and Shelby Townships pitched in on a three-week drive and collected close to \$58,000 in food, clothing, money and tools for the blizzard-stricken Navaho Indians of New Mexico and Arizona. They shipped the supplies, by truck, over the past weekend.

A STATE LABOR mediation board examiner has found Washtenaw County Sheriff Douglas J. Harvey guilty of violating the Hutchinson Act in dismissing four deputies last December. Examiner James McCormick, in a finding announced last Saturday ordered the sheriff to offer unconditional reinstatement to Sgt. William Stander and Deputy Fred Postill.

THE SUMPTER DISTRICT Board of Education has voted to reinstate Il school bus drivers who refused to work last week after being told they no longer could drive their buses home at night. Drivers who walked off their jobs will be docked for the days they missed work and will still have to leave their buses at the school administration building overnight.

CLARENCE HUNGATE, a Detroit chiropractor, has been bound over to Wayne County Circuit Court under the charge of manslaughter in the abortion-caused death of Miss Mabel Ann Hawkins, 19, a legal secretary.

THE SENATE Appropriations Committee this week is going to recommend \$8 million cut off the funds proposed by Gov. Romney. The University of Michigan will be hardest hit. The trim is proposed in two ways: reducing the anticipated enrollment figures (since the number of students controls state support) on the basis that they were inflated; and cutting the amount for certain colleges for which there is a discrepancy between non-resident tuition and the taxpayers' cost of education.

# Hart Rips **Draft Law** Changes

Senator Philip A. Hart said Monday that new draft policies have turned graduate students into "reverse Cinderellas," trading the unfair advantage that the students used to have-for a new -- equally unfair -- disadvantage.

"I am in favor of taking students out of the gilded coach we are over-reacting when we stuff them all into a pumpkin," Hart said in a speech on the Senate floor.

Hart referred to a recent Selective Service directive that lifted deferments to most graduate students and ordered that the oldest eligible men betaken

day they graduated. Hart generally endorsed the lottery proposals of Senator Edward Kennedy (D-Mass.) who last year led an unsuccessful fight to get the draft law changed.


"In recent years," Hart said. "we have had the problem of the young man who rides his student deferment right into marriage or advanced age.

"Well, a democracy should be appalled to see men escape the draft simply because they are wealthy enough to go to college indefinitely.

"We have felt so stung by this situation that we have begun to shoot at the mosquitoes with a shotgun. The shotgun is effective; but when the mosquitoes are in a china shop, it can have certain bad side effects.

'IN THIS CASE the side effects are these: the army gets 26-year olds when it would prefer 19-year olds, the universities are damaged by the sudden drain of graduate students, classroom credit goes to waste and gaps are created in the professions.

'There are a great many equities to be balanced in the draft system and Selective Service has been a very uncertain juggler, frantically keeping three plates in the air while others, momentarily neglected, crash behind.

The Legislature last year passed a statute freezing the township officers into office for more than four years which Kelley ruled was unconstitutional.

AN ATTEMPT by Rep. John Bennett (D-Redford) to amend the bill to require all township officials to run again this fall failed when sufficient votes for support did not materialize.

Under the changes provided in the measure passed Monday, the longest term for a township trustee would be three years and eight months, backers of the bill said.

Prime purpose behind the extensions enacted last year is to provide that newly elected trustees will take office Nov. 20.







# Screen Door Glamorized With Grille

A screen door may not be the home's most glamorous feature, but there's no need to put up with poor appearance during the eight months or so that you need bug-proofing.

If the screen door is wood framed, it's easy to jazz it up with a wooden grille nailed to the outside of the door, across the screened section.

Start by nailing Douglas fir lxls vertically over the screened inset, spacing them two inches apart.

Then cut two-inch-long pieces of lxl-inch fir and fit them crosswise between the vertical pieces.

Vary the spacing and placement of cross pieces to make a pleasing pattern.

Building the screen door grille is a matter of just an hour or so, and finishing won't take much longer, whether it's painted or stained.

But spending a bit of time drawing up a pattern on graph paper speeds the building and assures that you'll have what you want when finished.

"Imaginary Friends" by Alison Lurie, author of "The Nowhere City", describes the absurd and sometimes tragic collision of two worlds the curious world of the Truth Seekers, a spiritualist group who believe in flying saucers and interplanetary communication, and the equally superstitious world of modern science, as represented by two sociologists attempting to chart and control the human mind.

"The Heir Apparent" by William V. Shannon is an attempt to understand the quality of mind, temper, and personal background of Robert F. Ken-

"Stories and Texts for Nothing" by Samuel Beckett brings together three major Beckett short stories and thirteen shorter pieces of fiction. The seriousness of the subject matter is tempered by the comedy and wit which the author has infused throughout.

In "A Shoal of Stars", Hugh Downs, the noted television personality, tells the romantic story of chartering a 65-foot ketch and sailing her with a crew of friends from Miami to Tahiti. The trip lasts three months and takes them through the Caribbean, the Panama Canal, and the vast, lonely reaches of the Pacific.

"The Shadow Wife" by Dorothy Eden is a romantic novel of suspense. An English girl marries a handsome Dane after a whirlwind romance; but, when he takes her home to his ancestral estate, he insists that their marriage is kept secret.

"North Toward Home" by Willie Morris, the editor-inchief of Harper's magazine at the age of 32, is an autobiography in mid-passage. Born and raised in Mississippi, the author went to the University of Texas, then to Oxford as a Rhodes Scholar, and finally, to New York City where last year he became the editor of America's oldest magazine.

The only practical way to supply these pensions, he said, is "a slight extention of the coverage of survivors' and disability insurance under the Social Security system."

Coverage of the loss of earnings caused by an accident poses another problem. Conard recommended the \$10,000 basic protection coverage included in the Keeton-O'Connell plan, but noted that even \$10,000 would not supplement wage loss for long, since medical and legal expenses would also have to be subtracted from that sum.

Turning to the problems of the premium payer, Conard said the first need is "to abolish the collateral benefits rule" under which the injured might collect duplicate benefits through the 'various regimes of loss reparations,"

# N'Ville Man Gets Award

Louis Schomberger, apumper at the Northville Production field of Consumers Power Company received the President's Medal from the National Safety Council and the NSC's certificate for saving the life of Charles Fox, 7808 W. Six Mile Road, North ville on Dec. 26.

The presentations were made by Consumers Vice President John Simpson, of Jackson, as the highspot of a luncheon at the Thunderbird Inn.

Schomberger was credited with saving Fox' life through the successful use of mouthto-mouth resuscitation and closed-chest cardiac massage.

Receiving a certificate at the same time was Henry Clark. 10650 W. Seven Mile Road, Northville, where Fox was visiting when stricken.

FOX, 39, was helping Clark with his farm chores who he suffered a heart stoppage. Clark was attempting resuscitation when Schomberger arrived at the farm where he had gone to purchase a half of beef.

Schomberger had received a refresher course the week before from Consumers Power personnel and credited this training with providing him with the knowledge to suggest the proper method of administering heart - lung resuscitation to

Although no pulse was evident, Schomberger administered the mouth - to - mouth breathing and Clark continued with external cardiac compression

The stricken man was taken to St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Ann Arbor where he had received treatment for his condition earlier. Treatment was continued in the ambulance. Mrs. Clark provided valuable assistance by calling the hospital with complete details so that hospital staffers were prepared to give exact and speedy further treatment.

THE PRESIDENT'S MEDAL award is granted only for successful resuscitation, by approved manual methods, from asphyxiation by gas, suspended breathing caused by gas or carbon monoxide poisoning, drowning, or electric shock, or any other accidental causes that may result in prolonged suspension of voluntary or natural

# One Driver In 20 Beats Suspension

LANSING--Only one driver in 20 who has refused to take a sobriety test in connection with Michigan's implied consent law has escaped suspension of his driving privilege, it was disclosed by Secretary of State James M. Hare.

As of February 2, three months after the program got underway, 403 Michigan drivers have been given mandatory 90-day suspensions for refusal to take sobriety tests when they were arrested, Hare noted.

"Of this total, 295 drivers were suspended through driver improvement action, and 108 were suspended after their appeals were denied by License Appeal Boards," Hare stated. "In only 20 cases were appeals

"Neither actions taken by our department internally in suspensions nor by license appeal boards determine the guilt or innocence of these persons," Hare said. "Adjudication of the cases is up to the courts."

It is the National Safety Council's only award for the saving of human life.

The award is granted upon investigation and approval by a non-staff Medal Administration Committee of a completed application form, supported by signed statements of witnesses and attending physician.

The first awards of the President's Medal were made in September 1928 and, as of December 7, 1967, 2,598 Medals have been presented to men and



It's that time of the year again which is known as "The March Madness" in Michigan. Well, to be exact, March doesn't arrive until

Friday and the "Madness" doesn't start until Mon-The "Madness" isn't any movie, or TV flicker.

or re-run. It's the annual Michigan State High School basketball tournament which turns the folks from the Ohio-Indiana border up to the farthest reaches of the Upper Peninsula simply daffy for three

In particular, if you happen to be cheering for one of the winning teams.

Big schools, as well as smaller ones, are gripped by the excitement of the tournament.

In many communities, business stops when it comes time for the preps to take to the court.

There have been instances over the years when about all that's left in a small town is one policeman, one fireman and maybe a nurse to watch over the few patients unable to leave the

THE BEAUTY OF the state tournament is that every varsity team in the state gets the same shot at the golden honors - one of the four state championships at stake.

It's not like the NCAA meet where only 16 designated conference champs, plus a few powerful independent squads like No. 1 ranked Houston, are restricted to the competition.

The Michigan tourney is like a second season for the 700 state prep teams.

What happened between the opening of the regular season in late November and the finish on the first weekend of March means nothing -

comes the state tourney. There is no more consideration given to the team which might have a 19-0 record than the one that winds up with 0-18.

 Time was that in the Upper Peninsula, they did seed the teams in the district meets to make sure that the two best weren't in the same half of the bracket.

But it's never been that way below the Straits. The only rule that prevails is that a host team can't draw a bye in the districts.

Otherwise, you dig into a hat or box . . . and pull slips to determine who plays whom.

- Coaches have been known to grumble over this setup. So have newspapermen. We have suggested - to no avail - that the

state wait until late in the season before assigning teams to their district meets.

In this way, regular-season performances could be taken into consideration and three rated teams might not wind up in the sam e district, while another district draws no ranked contenders.

But the schools obviously don't want it that way . . . and the majority naturally must rule. Just how the tourney affects the state is proved by the record sellouts every year at the finals in East Lansing.

Minus the regular daily newspapers hereabouts, the word probably eluded you that the 1968 windup at Michigan State has followed precedent. No more tickets remain for any of the three sessions - the Class B in the morning, the Class C-D in the afternoon and the Class A at night. And, mind you, it already has been an-

nounced that there will be statewide television of this year's finals!

The response to the tournament is a tribute to the way the kids play basketball in the state of

It gets better every year.

This is obvious by scanning the rosters at Michigan and Michigan State, which more and more are turning to homegrown talent to develop their teams.

It's also to be noted that Michigan boys are starring elsewhere in the Big Ten and in the country.

All Bentley has to do is to win Friday night. That would make the Bentley record read 10-0 in the loop.

LANSING - Never has there been such pressure since the practical nurses jammed the Senate gallery with ladies of indominatable spirit wearing cologne and Tots of lace.

And now there's another push on the legislature, state aid to non-public schools. It is probably the best campaign ever launched. Joan of Arc should have had such an army.

LANSING HAS BEEN snowed under by a blizzard of more than 190,000 letters urging non-public school aid. There are blitz teams of experts ready to dispatch to anywhere opposition develops.

The arguments are compelling and the approach is overwhelming. Public school people, fretful of teacher strikes and financial disaster even if they stand still on salaries, are in a quandry.

Take \$21 million — a figure being whispered - out of the present state school aid and balancing the budget is a bad joke. The crisis in education, then, is terrible to behold.

The non-publics have been educating kids for generations at no expense to the public. Non-public student parents have been paying tuition to send them to school and taxes to support public schools.

ONE OUT OF EVERY seven children attends a non-public school in Michigan. That makes 330,000 non-public school kids in the state. The publics are spending about \$645 a year for teach-

ing each student.

Mathematics shows the state is saving \$200 million a year because non-public schools exist. When a private school goes to the wall financially, it can fold up and the kids go to public school.

# From the Publisher's Desk——— OBSERVATION POINT

By Philip H. Power —

The Sunday edition of this newspaper carried a story that deserves to be more fully known. It was a summary of an article

written by Irving J. Rubin, director of the Transportation and Land Use Study (TALUS) for southeastern Michigan, and published in the Feb. 22 issue of the Reporter Magazine.

Rubin, who wrote the article on his own and not as TALUS director, dealt with the data now

available about what kind of people were involved in the Detroit riots last summer. In the process, he exploded a number of myths and misconceptions about the riots that are now circulating here in Observerland.

WAS POVERTY TO blame, as most people think? No, says

"The majority of the poor live in the deep core of the city, which

FRUSTRATION+AGGRESSION =

was not the scene of the riots . . . Relatively few of them took part in the violence."

Rubin reports that median Ne-gro income in the riot areas was \$6,200 per family, just a tad below the city-wide Negro median income of \$6,400 and only a little below the white figure of \$6,800.

WERE THE YOUNG hoodlums to blame? Not in fact, says the

Of those arrested during the riot, according to Rubin's figures, only 10 per cent were juveniles and only 18 percent between the ages of 17 and 19. The other 72 per cent arrested were 20 years or older. Nearly a third were over 30.

So the people rioting weren't all that young, but were they hoods and punks with criminal records?

Two-thirds of those arrested had never been convicted before, and 20 per cent had only one criminal conviction. That leaves only about 13 per cent with more than one criminal conviction.

WERE THOSE INVOLVED the unemployed floaters, without families or homes? Again, no is Rubin's answer. The figures showed that of 1,200

non-juvenile males arrested, 83 per cent had jobs, most in unionized plants, which indicates a good income.

Nearly 77 per cent of the Negro households in the riot area had a male head. Forty per cent owned or were buying their own homes, compared with a citywide Negro figure of 45 per cent and a white figure of 69 per cent.

THE EVIDENCE IS clear. Those who were involved in the riots were not the poor, jobless, single, criminally inclined, juvenile Negroes so much talked about in the suburbs.

The people out in the streets were not riff-raff; they were members of the Negro middle class, people who had pulled themselves up out of poverty, with a consequent stake in the society they seemed to be trying to destroy.

So why did they riot?

Rubin concludes the riots were "an outburst of frustration over unmet demands for dignity and for economic and political power" by people who had the basic necessities and were ready to move upward in society, but were frustrated by lack of equal opportunity.

Frustration. The double standard: What's all right for whites isn't for Negroes. And the TV set, showing all the lovely goodies of our wealthy, open, white society -so easily within the reach of the Negro but so relentlessly avoiding his grasp.

THE IMPORTANCE of frustration as a spark to violence is well recognized in psychoanalytic theory. Frustration and Aggression, a book written by the psychologist John Dollard and pub-

lished in 1939 put the case pre-

"This study takes as its point of departure the assumption that aggression is aways a consequence of frustration. More specifically the proposition is that the occurrence of aggressive behavior always presupposes the existence of frustration and, contrariwise, that the existence of

frustration always leads to some

form of aggression."

Dollard and his group have exerted a greater influence on psychology and the social sciences than did Sigmund Freud during his entire life's work. Although their theoretical explanations may be open to some question, there is no doubt about the pertinence of their assertions for

IF FRUSTRATION is the real then the sensible thing to do is find out what kinds of frustra-

# Couple Of Traffic Lights?

A Garden City Chamber of Commerce survey of residents has shown what was felt for several years about the city's downtown shopping district.

Something new has to be added to a commercial section which is losing its customers to neighboring shopping centers although they would rather spend their dollars in their own community.

The responses to the survey started last month made it clear that shoppers in Garden City want a variety of quality stores, preferably in a large shopping

THE PROBLEM NOW is that nothing has been done about the downtown district in so many years that many people are not accustomed to changing any-

There are four separate intersections at Ford and Middlebelt and each has its own auto and pedestrian patterns. A shopper must decide in advance where to park and shop first and then later decide if he or she should take a chance on crossing the Ford-Middlebelt intersection (already dangerous for both drivers and pedestrians alike) or using the car to move about the downtown area, thereby increasing the traffic hazards.

The northeast corner of the intersection has the appearance of the community of at least 20 years ago. An empty gas station, certain of winning no prizes for aesthetics or beauty, stands at. the center of the corner.

A new gas station stands out on the southwest corner of the intersection but a city of nearly 40,000 persons needs much more than

So nothing was done and the downtown section underwent no changes.

NOW, ANOTHER HARD look is being taken at getting federal urban renewal funds for the northeast corner of the intersection and extending as far north

as Maplewood and would include public housing for senior citizens and low income families, in addition to a new commercial district. Whether the solution is through

federal funds with private initiative or solely private enterprises carrying the load, something has to be done or Garden City will become known as the "town where a couple of traffic lights" slow up drivers getting to Westland Shopping Center, Wonderland Center, or other shopping complexes within a few minutes from the community.

# Take'Implied Consent' Hearings To Court

A legislative bill to give courts jurisdiction in hearings under the implied consent law is aimed in the right direction. In addition, bills should be passed to place all decisions relating to laws in the

Boards, commissions and agencies have no constitutional authority to be deciding guilt or innocence of infractions of federal, state, county or municipal Justice for the accused and for

the citizens at large is best served when courts, regulated by constitutional guarantees and staffed by professional attorneys, are the sole panels of judgment . of man's government.

A CASE IN POINT: Recently a state representative and six other persons almost escaped proper jurisprudence on the implied con-

Due to either political maneuvering or "oversight," the hearings were dismissed. The excuse given was that the arresting officers had not appeared to tes-

In fact, the police had not been notified that the hearings had been scheduled.

WHEN THE PRESS broadcast the circumstances an about-face was taken, new hearings were called, all parties were notified and decisions were rendered.

Actually, the elected official status of Representative Leonard Walton, 13th District, was probably responsible for the glare of publicity and his own subsequent conviction.

Walton lost his appeal before an appointed panel representing the Secretary of State. Shortly thereafter he was convicted in

justice court on a reduced charge, impaired driving, when he had been originally charged with driving under the influence of

liquor. Ironically, the appointed panel said, in effect, "We believe the evidence is sufficient to charge you with 'driving under the influence,' and therefore you were obligated to take the 'implied consent' breathalyzer test."

But! The Justice of the Peace, in this case a practicing attorney, bound by constitutional regulation of trial procedures, was able to accept a motion for a reduced charge.

THE BILL now before the House of Representatives cites the inability of the Secretary of State's panel to require witnesses' appearances by subpoena.



#### Hits Premature Report

My attention has been called to an article in The Observer papers entitled "Wayne County Home Rule Ballot Eyed For This Fall."

As chairman of the committee of 99 on whose work the article comments, I am deeply disturbed about the premature release of its Recommendations and Report to the Board of Supervisors by a committee

The Report and Recommendations are in the process of being printed for submission to the Board of Supervisors under whose auspices and authorization the committee functioned. It would seem to me only common courtesy to first submit the Recommendations and Report to the Board of Supervisors before releasing it for publication.

Additionally, such premature release coupled by statements from a single committee member has had the predictable effect of disseminating inaccuracies and distortions. Accordingly, I feel an obligation to set the record straight on a number of the inaccuracies contained in the article. First, it is untrue that 65

of the original members of the committee were Detroiters. The fact is that 57 of the original 99 members were from Detroit in keeping with the fact that Detroit has approximately 60 per cent of the population of Wayne County.

Second, the vote on the Report did not elicit "immediate dissent from a number of suburban members." The fact is that three of the five dissenting votes were cast by suburban members, the other two being cast by members from Detroit. This was a small minority of the suburban members present. Additionally, all members, both those present and not present were invited to submit in writing any reservations, dissents and comments they wished to make for publication with the Report. Thus far, not one letter of dissent, reservation or comment has been received.

Third, the statement that a sampling of suburban opinion found rejection of the concept of home rule does not jibe with the fact that the same edition of The Observer newspapers quoted suburban supervisors as supporting the home rule concept.

Fourth, the statement that "more study is needed" on various aspects of home rule is simply one man's opinion and does not jibe with the fact that the Committee's Recommendations and Report will be the culmination of a year long study conducted by citizens from every part of the County.

Substantial time and effort was expended by these people in meetings, in research and in evaluation of the present form of County government as well as possible improvements under home rule. The State

Legislature spent three years studying and debating all aspects of county home rule.

The Wayne County Board of Supervisors has been studying the question almost continuously since 1963 when the State Constitution first authorized county home rule. The vote of the Board of Supervisors is on record by a substantial majority supporting the concept of county home rule.

Last, the statement that only 14 counties nationally have adopted home rule is inaccurate. Approximately 30 counties have home rule now and another 20 to 30 counties have charter commissions in the process of drafting charters.

The important point is that nationally it is the large metropolitan counties that have adopted home rule because it is primarily in these counties that the flexibility provided by county home rule is necessary. Seven of the 10 counties in the United States with populations of 800,000 or more have adopted county home rule.

Until such time as the Recommendations and Report of the Committee of 99 are formally submitted to the Board of Supervisors for general distribution to the public, it is premature to debate their conclusions if for no other reason than that no frame of reference is established for such discussion and public dialogue.

However, because a member of the committee has seen fit, for reasons he apparently deems sufficient to himself, to endeavor to take advantage of his position on the committee by releasing the Recommendations and Report prematurely so they could be coupled with his views, I, as chairman, feel compelled to set the record

to talk on the Stevenson issue except the person most involved, the student. I am a junior and have gone to Stevenson High School for almost two years. I am very proud of our school

but not of the reputation it has

obtained. As Stevenson is a new school people are more likely to find fault with it. Unfortunately there is a reason for it here. Many harmful things have been said about our school. Some are not true (the bus and drug incidents) but most

of them are. Stevenson does have the highest rate of vandalism and crime of any Livonia high school. Fixtures have been destroyed, the building and property defaced, and many false fire alarms have been called.

Teachers and the administration live in fear that their homes will be visited upon by students with paint, eggs, and rocks. Cars are not safe in the parking lot as tires have been taken, seats ripped and acid poured on them.

Steps are taken, the police STUDENTS.

intervene, parents take action, and students at Stevenson are concerned. A group has been established to help control some of the damage, with cleanup

committees and hall monitors. However, I feel that our school has two major faults, the administration's inability to cope with the problems, and the faculty's apathy towards the problems.

There is a communications barrier between the administration and the student. The administration seems remote and unconcerned with Stevenson's problems. Perhaps by ignoring the problems, they feel that they will go away. This is not so. They make no attempt to crack down on the violators, the kids who skip classes or school, enter the building un-

wanted, etc. Lately the administration has begun a step in this direction by making the school's policies and rules known to the students and I commend them for this. Yet, this is only a fraction of the problem, the administrators must be able to communicate and work with the students.

They must make it known that violators will be punished. Only when rules are enforced will students obey them.

Teachers too, are not connected with the problems, vandalism, smoking, etc. Their main fault is that they don't want to get involved. When a teacher sees a student smoking, he either laughs or looks the other way. Most teachers do not even begin to enforce tardiness to class and it becomes common place.

A student can enter the class when half the period is over and nothing will be done. At the resource center, set up to help the modular system, books are stolen at an astonishing rate. In spite of this, teachers do not check the students to see if they take the books.

Many teachers at Stevenson do not care. The less they are involved with the students the bettter it is. As the Livonia school system pays a relatively high salary, money seems to ride over student welfare and concern. The teachers spend their consultation time or preparation time for a class in the lounge. This can hardly add to the educational aspect of our

Of course, the above does not apply to all the teachers, administrators and students. Some teachers are trying to make Stevenson a better school but they need the complete faculty's support. The student violators are only a small percentage of the student body but they have given Stevenson its reputation.

It is up to the majority torestrict the minority. Parents and citizens are essential. They can put the pressure on the teachers administration, and board. They can force Stevenson into being a better school. Taxpayers, it is your money that goes into making Stevenson High. Don't you care about this?

This season he has nine sophomores on his squad. The Baron said, "We never thought we'd be here at all. We planned this two years ago, for this team, but like anything else you never know until the season is underway."

After answering questions he'd been asked a thousand times before, the Baron strode into the main dining room and took his seat at the head table. Some people took notice when he sat down, but Rupp had arrived an hour late and most of the audience couldn't care less. They were hungry.

## State Will Double Plant Of Trout, Salmon

The state Conservation Department this fall is "shooting the works" for a take of about 19 million trout and salmon eggs which will test its hatchery system to the hilt.

losses in fish rearing, the department's energetic egg-colecting operation is hoped to promote plantings of some 13.4 million trout and salmon, more than twice the number of fish it released in 1966.

Exact timing of the plantings remain uncertain because the department's hatcheries will be crowded to capacity.

\*WE MAY HAVE to make some emergency plant-outs before all of the fish are really ready for release," reports Brad Durling, in charge of the department's fish hatchery pro-

He explains that state hatcheries will be taxed to the full limit and as the young fish grow, there may not be enough room to rear all of them before they reach the ideal size for planting.

As plans now stand, most of the fish --- about 10.4 million trout, salmon, and splake--will be planted as yearlings in the spring of 1969. The remainder, some 2,8 million chinook salmon fingerlings and about 200,000 kokanee salmon fingerlings, will be released next spring.

Your Income Tax

# Deduct Those Medical Costs

one in a series on year-end tax planning prepared for this newspaper by the committee on federal taxation of the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants.)

Before the year is over, add up your medical bills. This simple procedure may save you money (now or next year).

And since the money to be saved is "income tax money" a penny saved really is a penny found.

The income tax laws permit a deduction for payment of medical expenses if they exceed 3 per cent of your adjusted gross income. In this regard, however, only part of the cost of medicine and drugs is classed as medical expenses - the part that exceeds one per cent of your adjusted gross income.

ANY REIMBURSEMENT you have received must be deducted from the amounts you paid in order to compute your medical expense deduction. (If the reimbursement was for medical expenses deducted in prior years it is considered as income in the year received.)

Having decided how much you have already spent in this category, you should consider whether remaining payments should be made in this year or in next year.

If your payments thus far do not exceed 3 per cent of your income, it may be well to pay bills which are now due, in January of 1968. Or, if these bills will take you over the 3 per cent mark, pay them before year end.

HERE ARE SOME rules on the deductibility of medical expenses this year:

1. Medical expenses include insurance premiums to cover hospital and doctor bills. Up to \$150 of such premiums are deductible (if you itemize deductions) without regard to the 3 per cent limitation. Anything over \$150 paid for such insurance becomes part of the calculation subject to the 3 per cent limit.

2. There is no maximum

3. Insurance premiums for disability income, accidental death and dismemberment. sight loss are not deductible.

A POPULAR and legitimate means of reducing taxes is to alternate between years in using the standard deduction.

In the year itemization will be used, payment of deductible items in December will result in a lessening of income tax; while in the year the standard deduction will be used, payment of items due near the end of the year should be postponed until January.

You cannot, however, obtain a deduction by paying a bill that is not due (i.e.; making a prepayment or "advance payment" on medical or dental work to be performed at a later date).

# Open Housing: Constitutional Or Moral Issue?

What was billed as a debate on open housing turned into a discussion of the unconstitutional points of pending Michigan open housing legislation versus the moral responsibility of citizens to favor the issue.

The audience at the Farmington Knights of Columbus social meeting Wednesday evening heard Michigan Sen. George Kuhn (Rep.-14th Dist.) outline areas of pending open housing legislation which he felt were in violation of the basic rights of citizens.

At no time did he state he was against open housing itself, merely the means by which it was being brought about. Neither did he speak in favor of any possible legislation in the field which would be suitable to him.

KUHN'S OPPONENT was Kenneth Bannon, UAW-CIO regional director and chief negotiator of the Ford contract. He expressed his moral views as a citizen in favor of fair housing legislation.

Bannon said that he could recognize pitfalls in pending legislation, however, he felt that the "moral obligation was more important than the legal obligation."

The present and controversial legislation under study. called House Bill 2035, has been termed "one of the toughest open housing bills in the United States," Kuhn said, 'It is not a simple bill like some cities have passed."

To support his views, Kuhn presented a list of ways in which he felt citizen's constitutional rights would be violated should the present bill under study be passed.

"THE CIVIL RIGHTS Commission could force a person to testify against himself," Kuhn said. "It would be costly to vindicate himself if the complaint were false, yet the false complainer would have the full use of state facilities and money." In the meantime while a judgment is being debated, sale of the property would be held up for as much as 90 days,

THE NEW AIRLIFT service went into effect Monday. It was authorized under the postal rate bill signed into law December 16 by President Johnson.

Jenkins explained that the regular postage on parcels mailed to servicemen overseas is based on the distance the package is hauled within the United States. No charge is made for carrying the package between the U.S. port and the overseas base.

Until Monday airlift for parcels to servicemen overseas restricted to packages weighing up to five pounds. Upon payment of the regular parcel post rates, these packages get service transportation to the port of embarkation and are airlifted from there to the overseas posts on a space available basis.

# Hare Lists'High Priority Items' For Road Safety

igan a "high priority" for new implied consent law. legislation.

"I have concern over the many problems that beset this state. I refer to court reorganization, crime control, pollution problems, education, public employment, housing for lower income persons, and others. But I continue to have great concern about traffic safety, even though Michigan did have a better record in fatalities in 1967 than the year before."

Hare said that traffic accidents continue to be a "scourge".

"This is the horrible toll for 1967. Deaths ... 2,115; injuries ... 151,000 estimated with hundreds of these persons maimed and injured severely; property damage...upwards of \$1-million daily, at least \$400-milion a year. What a terrible drain on our most precious resources, lives, and property."

HARE NOTED that "important work has been done of late in the traffic safety field in Michigan.

"Public concern appears at an all-time high. Several important legislative programs have been passed or are in advance stages of legislative enactment. The ones in the Legislature need guidance and bipartisan support."

HARE LISTED his own program of "high priority items" in traffic safety.

1. Seizure and impounding of vehicles driven by motorists who are on suspension or revocation. In my estimation, this is the only effective means of keeping some of the "scofflaws" off the roads.

2. Revamp of the state's traffic ticket system with adoption of a system similar to that working in Illinois, This would close an important loophole in our present system...that of the failure-to-answer-summons. It would get many bad drivers off our roads. And as a by-product, it would save money by clearing court dockets and eliminating the filing of thou sands of records.

3. Changing the concept of the present License Appeal Board from a three-man review to an administrative hearing conducted by driver improvement personnel of the Michigan Department of State. Problems attendant to license appeal boards





# MDs Back Evaluation Of Drivers

LANSING -- A medical evaluation board on driver licensing for Michigan has won "strong endorsement from the Michigan State Medical Society."

The committee on Highway injury of the state medical society, headed by Dr. Paul W. Gikas, M.D., University of Michigan pathologist, met recently with Secretary of State James M. Hare, and officials of the Michigan Department of State and endorsed House Bill

UNDER THE BILL, the board would be comprised of four members but would be able to obtain consultation from all types of specialists in the medical field.

Legislation sets up a panel of three licensed physicians, designating one ophthalmologist medical doctor who specializes in eye care), one psychiatrist, and a third medical doctor whose specialty is not designated. The fourth member would be an optometrist.

Set forth in H.B. 2151, the board would serve as technical advisor to the Secretary of State relative to medical statements received regarding applications for operator and chauffeur licenses. The board's job would be to evaluate any physical or mental conditions which might impair the applicant's driving abilities.

HARE SAID he was optimistic of the measure's chances in the Legislature this year. "It has support from the administration and now that the medical society has added its strong backing, I'm enthused over its chances."

# **GM** Reports Hike In New Car Sales

New passenger car sales by General Motors dealers in the February, up 10.9 per cent from the 83,497 sold in the same period a year ago, H.E. Crawford, vice president in charge of the Marketing Staff, announced Monday.



# Find Safe Handling Of Car Based On How Tires Grip Road)

handling of your car depends in part on how the tires grip the road. Yet engineers admit they know very little about how the rolling tire and the road inter-

Case in point: The key roadtire interaction is friction. But even though friction has been studied since the time of Leonardo da Vinci, there is still no fully adequate theory to explain it.

BECAUSE OF THE critical need to understand better how cars respond to driver-control actions, engineers are intensifying efforts to learn more about tire-road interaction.

One approach is being made at the University of Michigan Highway Safety Research Institute (HSRI).

"The prosaic tire remains a challenge to all those who would unravel its secrets", noted HSRI engineers Leonard Segel. Kenneth C. Ludema, and Howard J. Dugoff, members of the mechanical engineering faculty at U\_M\_

Knowledge of tire behavior, they said is important to vehicle designers so that they can predict vehicle response and, ultimately, relate to this "safety quality."

Engineers most want to know about critical tire and road interactions near the point where skidding begins. This is where greater knowledge of friction and road surface properties now would be most useful--if such knowledge existed.

THE U\_M SAFETY engineers point out that little is known about how the tire "bonds," or adheres to, the road surface. In fact, they noted, "not enough is known even to identify all of the relevant properties" of the tire-road interface which combine to influence the tire's roadgripping quality.

In addition, foreign matter on the road surface -- such as water -- dramatically affects tire traction. An extreme example is the tire hydroplaning phenomenon: the fluid dynamic pressures developed at high speeds, even by a thin film of water, can lift a tire completely off the pavement, thereby eliminating virtually all the "friction" available for steering or

Because of the extreme complexity of the tire-road interaction processes, engineers have "enjoyed only limited success in measuring tire friction and skid properties to date."

Segel, Ludema, and Dugoff are installing two types of test equipment to help achieve this end. One is a "flat bed tire tester" based on designs by the B.F. Goodrich Co. which will be used for basic tire friction studies under controlled laboratory conditions.

The other is a high speed, instrumented test device mounted on a trailer for use in the field under varying speeds and road conditions.

State Recruits Cadets-

Newly-established Michigan State Police cadet A2 positions are now being offered to young men high school graduates aged 18 to 20 inclusive for the first time in the department's history, Col. Fredrick E. Davids, State Police director, announces.

The program is designed to stimulate the interest of young men in State Police careers and to provide some basic training for an early reserve of candidates who can become trooper candidates when they reach the minimum age of 21.

THE CADETS will be employed at various State Police locations. Ten will be selected initially. When the cadets become 21, they will be automatically appointed to a trooper training school if they have served satisfactorily as cadets and meet minimum qualifications for the recruit class. Failure to attend a trooper school will terminate their cadet positions.

Starting pay for the cadets will be \$182.40 biweekly, the current minimum pay level for typist clerks A2. This job level has automatic six-month pay increments for the first two years.

Applications for cadet examinations must be received no later than 5 p.m. on Monday, April 1 by the Michigan Civil Service Commission at Lan-

Copies of the job announcements and application blanks may be obtained from any State Police post or from the commission beginning March 4.

CADET APPLICANTS must be American citizens in good physical condition who are at least 5 feet 9 inches tall and weigh at least 150 pounds but not more than 230, with weight in proportion to height.

Applicants must have favorable school and work records and be able to type satisfactorily. They must be of good moral character and have no serious arrest record, includ-

ing traffic violations. Uniforms will be furnished. Anticipated locations for cadet employment are East Lansing, Ypsilanti, Pontiac, Bay City, Flint, Jackson, Battle Creek, Rockford, Grand Haven and Marquette. Accepted applicants will undergo cadet training at East Lansing headquarters.

# Keep A Little Black Book When Dining On Uncle Sam

Some people keep a diary so that when they grow old they can show it to their grandchildren and say, "This is what it was like when I was your age."

Others keep a diary so they can keep track of their boyfriends or girl friends--and remember who they are dating this evening.

However, a diary can be more than just a romantic past-time and the Internal Revenue Service urges all who want to deduct their business lunches from their income tax to keep a diary also.

the record must be "timely," that is, "at or-near the time you made the expenditure." If it's made sometime later, then the IRS want further details and the deduction might not examined.

on your receipt if you pay in cash). Then you will have an accurate record that meets Internal Revenue Service rules and can be used when you get back to the office should you that diary on your desk.

This maintenance of duplicate records--credit card stubs (or paid receipts) and diary entries -- might be likened to the farmer who wears a belt as well as suspenders to keep up his breeches.

On one hand, the IRS maintains that the credit card stubs with the details on the other side are all the record you need. On the other, it contends that as a practical matter, it would be 'better" to list the details again in a diary.

SAVE ALL your receipts, credit card stubs, and diary records for at least three years -- just in case the IRS wants to examine them.

# Tax Hikes To Cost Motorist \$ 16-20

17 per cent Jan, 1 when the state gas tax was raised from six to seven cents a gallon.

# How To Be A Thoughtful Guest

vacation takes you "on tour" of friends or relatives, you may receive critical acclaim by being a "guest-who-is-not-aguest."

Knowing when to stay out of the spotlight -- at a hotel or motel--and avoiding an extended run can be good ways to assure a return engagement. But no matter how long your stay, the following tips in ten scenes may help you turn in a performance that'll make you a hit with your hosts.

1. DON'T GET OUT OF CHARACTER. When you've been invited to a party, resist the temptation to help throw it by showing other guests where to find things or by offering them food and drink, unless your hosts have specifically asked you to lend a helping hand. You'll be usurping the hostess' place otherwise.

2. UPSTAGING IS TABOO! Remember that your hosts are the true stars of the show, and that it's up to you to play a supporting role that will disrupt the routine as little as possible. For instance, if you arrive by train, don't phone from the station: take a cab instead. A phone call sounds suspiciously like a hint: if your hosts could have picked you up, chances are they'd have been waiting at the station.

3. UNDERPLAYING YOUR ROLE MAY ALSO MAKE YOU A SCENE-STEALER. There's such a thing as being overly modest. At a dinner party. don't sit uncomfortably waiting until everyone at the table has been served. Instead, help bring that curtain up, serve yourself and start the action rolling! If your behavior is too formal, you'll make your hosts feel uncomfortable.

4. ENTER ON CUE. According to etiquette experts, it's possible to be too punctual, as well as too late. If you come in on top of their lines -that is, when they're still rushing around getting ready for you--you'll just be underfoot.

When a special occasion or Fifteen minutes is 'late enough" for a luncheon, dinner or card party, but there'll probably be some stomping and whistling from the audience if you keep them waiting much longer than that for dinner!

5, KNOW WHEN TO STAY BACKSTAGE. When you're week-ending or staying longer, getting advance booking at a local hotel or motel helps give you and your hosts a chance to enjoy your visit, while providing privacy and a chance for everyone to live at his own pace. Plan to eat out at least some of the time, rather than making your hosts the captive audience at every meal of 'the man who came to dinner," For a pleasant surprise twist in the plot, why not treat them to a meal out? Hotels and motels feature some of the finest dining in town, and chances are there'll be an excellent restaurant at the hostelry where

6. DON'T MUFF YOUR LINES. If your host hauls out the card table, and your hostess suggests a movie instead, don't referee! Be politely noncommittal when they ask for your views. If they won't let you remain neutral, agree with the more forceful of the pair. Silence is golden, if "discussions" or just plain arguments erupt while you're on the

7. MAKE A GRAND EN-TRANCE -- arrive bearing gifts! Candy, flowers or toys for the children are appropriate -- and appreciated; so is a bottle of liquor usually. Whatever you give, make sure it's of high quality. It's far wiser, for example, to give a pound of fine candy than a two-pound "assortment."

8. THE SHOW MUST GO ON EVEN IF YOU MAKE A BLOOP-ER. If you spill the soup or fracture an heirloom vase in the course of your visit, apologize immediately. One 'T'm so sorry," and an offer to clean up the mess is sufficient.

# **DKC Show** Attracts Top Dogs

The Detroit Kennel Club's 50th annual all-breed dog show, which will be held in Cobo Hall from 9 a.m. to about 11 p.m. Sunday, March 3, will be like no other dog show anybody has ever seen in Michigan!

# Unitized Cargo Aids Ocean Lines

The most dramatic change and greatest improvement in commercial ocean transportation today is the conversion to unitized cargo systems.

This is the view of Prof. Harry Benford, chairman of The University of Michigan's department of naval architecture and marine engineering.

SUCH A SYSTEM enables an inland manufacturer to load his goods at the factory site into a special container which is sealed, transported overland to the port, and then placed on board the cargo ship. This eliminates the need for repeated handling of goods, thereby lowering labor costs, and allows for quicker port tunaround and generally better service.

"Among the secondary benefits," he continued, "are the ease and speed with which cargo can be taken on and off the ship and the advantages for trans-shipping. For example. ship carrying goods from Seattle to Hong Kong can pause at Hawaii long enough to drop off containers bound for Australia and pick up Hong Kong bound containers dropped off by an earlier ship.

"Furthermore, transoceanic container ships can be of great size because large volumes of containerized cargo can be collected by smaller coastwise ships and brought to a single central port at each end of the route. And, of course, high speed becomes more practical as ship size increases.

This radical improvement in cargo handling allows one ship to do almost twice the work of an older design.

'I PREDICT that within the next 10 years the container system will capture 80 per cent of the general cargo trade moving in and out of the United States."

# To Fight Alewives

Several solutions to dead alebeing discussed this winter. and local, state, and federal officials are making plans now to curb the problem in 1968.

They have little hope of solving the mess completely, but heroic efforts will be made to reduce it sharply at public

In 1967, Michigan communities along Lake Michigan counted a \$55 million loss in tourist trade because of dead alewives. Millions of the six-inch fishes were driven by wind and waves onto beaches where they rotted into a smelly mess. Swimmers with money stayed home.

MICHIGAN HAS 37.6 miles of public beaches on Lake Michigan which normally host nearly four million visitors annually. But in 1967, the alewife dieoff was much larger than usual and caught beach managers without enough help or equipment to handle the load.

A few mechanical beach able -- were over-worked during the dieoff. Prison inmate labor crews performed Trojan ser-

U.S. Job Corps crews were called in. Local volunteer-labor groups helped out.

THIS YEAR, at least four mechanical beach cleaners will be in operation. Crews of laborers will again be at work. and as a result of winter planning, operations will be scheduled and better organized.

Also this year, attempts will be made to remove alewives before they arrive at beach areas. Commercial fishermen, using trawls or other nets, will be employed to make periodic sweeps to collect dead alewives offshore of beach

It is not known how well this will work, or whether it will work, but officials hope to devise some method to reduce the problem.

# Mexico Booms, Other Latin Economies Falter

While Mexico enjoyed an economic boom in 1967, five other nations in the Central American Common Market had only slight growth.

Despite an economic integration that started six years ago, the Central American republics of Costa Rica, Nicaragua, Honduras, El Salvador and Guatemala had continued

Along with Mexico, only Panama--which isn't a member of the Central American Common Market--enjoyed a continuation of its boom.

MEXICO'S GROSS national product in 1967 was estimated at \$24 billion, more than 7 per cent above the 1966 figures but purposely a shade less than the 7.5 per cent increase noted last

The government braked credit halfway through the year. fearful of the same inflation danger the country took steps to avoid in 1964. Retail prices rose by 4 per cent by summer, another factor prompting government

were put on the shelf until completion of the government construction program for the 1968 Olympics.

Industrial production and auto sales increased by 10 per cent: per capita income reached \$500 for the first time; tourism increased Il per cent, and agricultural exports increased in a variety of crops.

COSTA RICA, the most stable and democratic, struggled to solve a serious financial crisis with new taxes and international credits.

But Costa Rica's GNP increased an estimated 6.6 per cent while her trade balance worsened, with imports amounting to \$211 million against \$180 million in exports.

El Salvador, the biggest trader of Central America, suffered spending and tightened banking a recession with a decline in production and sales of its major cash crop, cotton, and secondarily coffee. A GNP increase of 4.2 per cent was expected.

Exports also declined in Nicaragua along with the GNP besales in coffee and cotton while government measures held imports to the same level of 1966.

HONDURAS, whose major export is bananas, suffered reverses by declining sales of its corn, beans and cattle to neighboring El Salvador.

Guatemala also suffered from declining exports of coffee and cotton and the need to divert funds from economic development to military and police operations against Communist terrorists and guerrillas. A public works program was cut

# U-M Makes Case For Student

A plea against raising educational tariff barriers along state boundaries has been voiced Monday by the University of Michigan's new president, Robben W. Fleming.

"The University of Michigan is recognized as a national university," Fleming said. "Furthermore, an enormous portion of our total assets have come from outside the State of Michigan, and the fact that a student came originally from within this state is no guarantee that he will remain here after he graduates."

PRESIDENT FLEMING noted that three-fourths of U-M's students come from Michigan and one-fourth from other states. Some persons, including some legislators, have criticized the cost of educating the out-of-state students, even though they pay substantially higher tuition fees than the Michigan residents.

Fleming noted that about \$60 million of U-M's \$211-million budget comes from the federal government and another \$60 million from the state Legislature. Federal funds are granted in support of national purposes without regard to state

Also, the U-M president pointed out, a large proportion of the university's private gifts and endowments come from alumni who live outside Michigan.

U-M RESTRICTS enrollment in both its medical and dental schools almost entirely to Michigan residents.



# Electric Heat Gains In Dwellings

In many areas of the country as much as 50 per cent of all residential construction (homes and apartments) used electric heat in 1967 according to the annual poll of key electric utility companies, conducted by the Electric Heating Associa-

John H.K. Shannahan, EHA's vice president and executive director, said:

"While complete figures are not yet in, indications are that about 350,000 electrically heated residential dwelling units were added in '67 including a substantial number of home conversions. The number may go as high as 400,000.

"This would bring the total number of electrically heated residences in the United States to over three million. There are also more than 150,000 commercial and industrial buildings which utilize some form of electric heating."

Spanning parts of seven states, including Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, West Virginia, Virginia, Kentucky and Tennessee, the American Electric Power Co. reported that approximately 50 per cent of all residential construction including new homes and apartments was electrically

heated in 1967. Shannahan also noted that EHA's "Electrocomp", an electronic computer, introduced last year, which can determine the actual operating cost of a home, is being used throughout the country to help sell electric heating to homeowners who wish to convert from gas or oil

# Northern Deer Thriving "If conditions stay this good Straits, they are well under a it easy for deer to paw through

on through spring breakup, our foot. northern deer herd will come out of the winter in great shape."

That hopeful "if" comes from David A. Arnold, Conservation Department deer specialist, who reads some encouraging signs into recent field reports from state game men in northern Michigan.

THE CONSENSUS is that deer in the state's north country are not being buffeted by the

normal hard stresses of winter. Unusually mild conditions have generally left these animals free to pretty much come and go as they please in search of food and shelter, notes Arnold.

Scanning over department records, the deer specialist finds that this season's snow accumulations in the Upper Peninsula are the lowest since the winter of 1960-61. Only in the Paradise area on Whitefish Bay are snow depths over two feet; elsewhere above the

As a result, whitetails in the Lake Michigan watershed of the Upper Peninsula are able to range out as much as five miles from their traditional deeryarding areas. In the usual deeper-snow belt of the Lake Superior watershed, deer are only loosely yarded and are having no real trouble moving about within their normal winter range.

IN THE NORTHERN Lower Peninsula, snow depths are also below average, with department checkpoint gauges showing them to be under a foot throughout that part of the state. Nowhere in that region have deer movements been restricted.

Besides the generally low snow depths, deer in northern Michigan this winter have benefitted from the lack of crusted snow up until recent rains which froze over in some areas.

The uncrusted snow made

snow for beechnuts

acorns, and low-growing browse, and the animals should continue to have no significant hardship finding food in wake of moderating temperatures which largely nullified recent freezing rains.

Also pointing up the happy effects of winter's mild manners so far were recent autopsies on car-killed deer in the Upper Peninsula which revealed that the animals were in excellent physical condition.

# Study Shows Rain Can Be Polluted

sometimes looks dirtier after

That's because rain carries dust and dirt particles when it falls, a University of Michigan meteorologist explains. And the more waste material we put into the air, the more

polluted our rain will be. Prof. A. Nelson Dingle of the department of meteorology and oceanography foresees "a real danger" if we continue to pour industrial wastes into the atmosphere.

ALTHOUGH we haven't had any more "mud rains," such as fell over the Dust Bowl in the 1930s, our rainfall in industrial areas is definitely getting dirtier, according to Din-

"Raindrops condense around foreign particles," he explains. "The particles are necessary for the formation of cloud droplets. These, in turn, must collect together to form drops large enough to reach the ground without completely evaporating. (It takes about a million cloud droplets to make one raindrop.) Thus the polluted material simply returns to earth, contaminating the countryside.

"There are already some areas, adjacent to ore-smelting plants, where the land has become so denuded and conwill grow."

Another dramatic effect of increased pollution may be increased rainfall. Although Dingle describes this as "a possibility we're still investigating," he cited one study which showed the city of La-Porte, Ind., 30 miles east of the steel-producing town of Gary, had received far more rain than the surrounding area.

"Over a 14-year period, La-Porte got 31 per cent more precipitation, including 246 per cent more hail days. This can be attributed, at least in part, to contamination from the hearby steel industry," he said.

Dingle is currently doing research, under funds from the Atomic Energy Commission, on the cleansing of the air by severe convective storms.

What to do with your houseplants before you go on vacation depends on how long you plan to be away.

If you are going for a long vacation, you may sink your house plants in the soil in a sheltered part of the garden and hope for a normal amount of rain and no frost.

If your vacation will be only for a few days, water the plants well, set them on blocks of wood or stones in a basin of water, just high enough so that the pot bottom is touching water.

If you are going away for a week or two, water the plants, then drape them in a polyethylene bag such as your dry cleaner uses to protect your cloth-

# **Birth Rate** Problem

In every part of the world, where people are fast outnumbering anything else, the authorities are worrying about "population explosion", but Japanese demographers are worrying about just the oppos-

In the last few years, Japan has been experiencing harmful consequences which are becoming apparent as a result of their low population growth.

As a result of birth control, Japan's population -- now roughly 100 million--has increased never more and sometimes less than 1 per cent a year over the last 10 years. This compares with growth rates of between 2 and 3 per cent in China, India, and other Asian countries.

A REPORT just issued by the Demographic Research Institute of the welfare ministry warns that a troublesome byproduct of Japan's low rate of population growth will be an increasing labor shortage, already evident in some fields.

The institute also warns that population growth is now so low that females are not replenishing themselves. If this continues, it adds, the popula-

tion will soon start to decline. The institute reports that since 1955, with the exception of one year, Japanese women have given birth during their lifetimes, on the average, to only 0.9 girls.

The labor shortage the institute refers to has cropped up in some industries, in salaried white collar jobs and, particularly of late, in United States military installations in

Because of a heavy movement of supplies for South Vietnam through Japan and heavy maintenance and other activities at U.S. military bases, the need for labor has risen in recent months and extra hands have been hard to find.

US. BASES are reported to be seeking 2,500 workers, including ammunition handlers, drivers, carpenters, and typ-

Employers in many fields in Japan complain that the traditional industriousness and efficiency of Japanese employees are declining because workers feel if they are fired there are hundreds of other jobs waiting.

Continuing economic expansion, bringing a growing need for workers and the slow rate of increase in number of laborers are responsible for the tight labor situation in Japan.

Both together have contributed to a rapid rise in wages, which, among industrial workers, increased last year 12.1 per cent in nominal terms and 7.8 per cent in real terms. Previous years showed similar increases.

The present trend of few births and rising life expectancy has changed the age structure of Japan's population. The number of persons below 15 has fallen to 25 per cent of the population and the number above 65 has risen to 6 per

# GM Pays \$13 Million For Ideas

More employes in the United States and Canada received awards and the amount of their awards was greater in 1967 than in any year in the history of the General Motors Employe Suggestion Plan, it was announced Monday by Louis G. Seaton, vice president in charge of the Personnel Staff.

"Awards totaling\$13,614,813 were paid for 266,843 suggestions during the Silver Anniversary year of the Plan," Seaton said. "The amount paid exceeded by nearly 25 per cent the total paid in any previous year and the number of suggestions submitted was 1,044,-

MAXIMUM AWARDS OF \$6,000 were paid for 131 suggestions, compared to 90 the previous year. More than 1,160 of the other awards paid were in the amounts of at least \$1,000.

The average award was \$51.02. During the record-breaking Anniversary year, over 60 per cent of the eligible employes turned in at least one suggestion. And more than 15,000 employes received awards for five or more of the ideas they turned in.

Since the Suggestion Plan was introduced in 1942, more than \$96,000,000 has been paid out in awards to employes for 2,076,676 suggestions adopted by the Corporation.



made possible with the federal grant just approved by the Department of Housing and Urban Development in Washington.

The award of \$857,525, to be matched by local funds, was about half of what the Parks and Recreation Commission had

The approved acreage also was about half what had been listed in the petitions to give Livonia plenty of parks and playgrounds. The 818.27 acres finally agreed upon was a downward revision of the 1,200 acres originally considered necessary to meet the outdoor needs of the city with a potential population of 175,000, or about 70,000 above the present estimated population.

While the original message listed the award as \$828,368, the acreage and specified sites were not listed.

NOW .COMES an itemized listing from Dwight F. Rettie, of HUD's open space division, announcing that 17 sites had been approved, totaling \$857,-525--in each instance half the city's appraisal of the earmarked sites included in the Parks and Recreation Master for the land purchases. Plan Funds are matched on a

open space land in Livonia was breakdown of 17 sites also announced that "other sites are under further review."

That gave Mayor Harvey W. Moelke and City Attorney Steve Polgar encouragement that the rest of the program will eventually be approved. It would mean that altogether about \$3.5 millions in local and federal funds would be available for purchase of the more than 800

Livonia's matching money comes from the \$4 million issue approved in 1966 by the taxpayers for development of recreation facilities.

The HUD award means that \$1,715,050 can now be spent for specific sites -- some of which the commission may already have bought with the HUD "letter of consent" to proceed with purchases -- and await reimbursement chances.

# Report Bares Blight In 11 City Areas; Neighborhoods Cited

A special report, detailing blighted neighborhoods and high incident areas of crime and juvenile delinquency in Livonia, reveals 11 residential sections in the city with substandard housing and public facilities in immediate need of rehabilitation.

. The 43-page report, titled "Neighborhood Analysis, Livonia, Michigan," was prepared by the Livonia Planning Commission and copies were forwarded to the mayor, members of the City Council, and the Federal Government.

The report divides Livonia's 36 square miles into 30 neighborhood units averaging one square mile and an industrial corridor stretching six miles across the city from Eckles Rd. to Inkster Rd., and bounded on the north and south by Schoolcraft and Plymouth Rds.

\* \* \*

AN EVALUATION of each neighborhood unit as to its environmental assets and liabilities is gauged on the basis of housing conditions, rental housing and absentee ownership, substandard streets, lands having poor storm drainage, and inadequate recreational parks and playgrounds.

Crime and juvenile delinquency is tabulated in the report, also, which draws a correlation between physical deterioration and social breakdown. The report summarizes the latter as foilows:

"In many cases, the physical environment reflects the social characteristics and conversely, social conditions reflect the physical environment."

In general, the study reveals, the condition of houses in Livonia is excellent with only 4.2 per cent of the city's 17,-2014 (census of 1960) occupied housing units in a deteriorating or dilapidated condition. (Housing units in 1967 were estimated at more than 25,000.)





THE ELECTION would be whether to elect a charter commission of 25 to 35 members in Wayne county, Charter commission candidates must be qualified electors in his charter district for six months.

The districts would be determined by the county apportionment commission, and the election would be on a partisan basis. The commission is composed of the county clerk, the county treasurer, prosecutor, and the county chairman of the two major political parties.

The apportionment commission has 30 days to carve out the single-member districts "as nearly of equal population as practicable."

In this case, the county can get the latest population count under a contract with the United States Census Bureau, rather than use 1960 figures.



# State Takes Action Against 51,735 Drivers

LANSING -- Driver improvement activities conducted by the Michigan Department of State in 1967 continued at a high level, with overall actions under 1966 record highs and actions involving the driving privilege rising to their highest level in history.

According to Secretary of State James M. Hare, actions involving the driving privilege were taken against 51,735drivers, a rise of some 4,500 over 1966 and a near 20,000 increase over 1965.

TYPES OF ACTIONS involved, said Hare, included cancellation of licenses, suspensions and revocations, restrictions of driving privilege, revocations for failure to appear at driver improvement hearings, referrals to county driver safety schools, and denial of licenses.

Hare noted that more than 9,000 drivers had been called in for appearances at multiple interviews. And 69,000 warning letters had been sent out to drivers who had accumulated between five and 12 points and who "appeared dangerously close to being in trouble.

"Most of these persons," explained Hare, "were drivers who were in point trouble for the first time. In many instances, a friendly letter citing the problem often has excellent results, and the driver straightens up without our Department having to take any further action."

# Cutback In Road Funds Hurts State

LANSING -- The recent \$600 million cutback in 1968 Federal highway aid will result in a \$10 million cutback in Michigan's road construction program, the Department of State Highways reports.

John P. Woodford, Deputy State Highway Director, said the Department was notified by the U.S. Department of Transportation that Michigan's share of the cutback will be \$7.6 mil-

"Combined with state matching funds, this will mean a \$10 million cutback in our construction program," he said.

The Department previously announced that \$185,2 million of highway construction had been programmed for 1968, an increase of \$73 million over

However, the projection was based on receipt of all Federal aid on a current basis, including \$20.5 million withheld from in 1966-67.





Moelke broached the subject of a stop and frisk law during an interview with a reporter and the story was carried in the Jan. 17 edition of The Observer. At the time, he said such a law was needed to help police

UNDER HIS DIRECTION, the City's Legal Department has since submitted a stop and frisk amendment to the present misdemeanor ordinance.

The amendment reads: "Temporary Questioning of Suspicious Persons in Public Places. No person shall refuse to give his name, address and an explanation of his actions upon demand of a police officer who has stopped such person in a public place in the City of Livonia, whom he reasonably suspects is committing, has committed or is about to commit a felony or a breach of the peace, or is violating a condition of pardon, parole or probation.

"When a police officer has stopped a person for questioning pursuant to this ordinance and reasonably suspects he is in danger, he may search such person for a dangerous weapon. The police officer may take and keep any such weapon or any other thing, the possession of which may constitute a crime, until he has completed the questioning, at which time he shall either return such item, if lawfully possessed, or arrest such
