LIVONIA — Council Edward H. McNamara wants the city to raise police pay to a maximum of \$10,000 after four years of service, based on the recommendation of raises for police officers in Detroit. Livonia police, he said, should be "second to none." The raise would be effective Dec. 1 if approved.

LIVONIA — A group of state Livonia parents, whose ninth-grade children will be transferred this fall to the fifth time, since the seventh grade, will open a petition drive Monday to get five members of the seven-member Livonia Board of Education. These are Board President Strela Schreiber, Vice President William H. Craft, Secretary A. Edward Katz, and trustees Mrs. Geraldine Joyner and Dominick A. Taddoneo.

REDFORD — A 100-acre recreational facility to cost about \$1 million has been proposed for the town of Redford Township. It could be a facility similar to Camp Detwiler, Promoter Harry A. McCann, of Redford and Omar Sanderson of Farmington's Sanderson Realty, said at the start of the township officials Thursday evening at Danish Inn.

REDFORD — High rise apartment zoning proposals newly drafted by the township planning commission will be aired at a public hearing this month. It approved the zoning classification will be available just in time to apply to the second high rise development proposal, already on the planners' table. The first was denied about two years ago.

FARMINGTON — A "man on the street" survey shows that Farmingtoners are divided virtually 50-50 on the issue of whether the state legislature should adopt a measure providing assistance to non-public schools.

FARMINGTON — Negotiations for a new labor contract to cover approximately 200 hourly employees of the Star Cutter Co. were in progress at week's end between officials of the company and the UAW. Romney Refuses To Back Rockefeller In NH

Gov. Romney gave the choice of a Republican candidate to the upper echelons of the party hierarchy and said he would not support anyone in the primary.

He formally withdrew from the April 15 Wisconsin primary, but his decision came too late to get off the New Hampshire ballot.

Romney, who dramatically withdrew from the GOP race for president Wednesday night, withheld his support from New York Gov. Rockefeller and let his own backers make their own decisions.

Romney had been expected to throw his weight behind Rockefeller, though Rockefeller is not a declared candidate and his workers hope only for a good write-in showing in New Hampshire against former Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

Romney appeared in Washington to be disenchanted not only with the "frank and file voters," whom he claimed deserted him in the private polls, but also with the top level figures in the GOP.

The governor said the Governors' Conference and congressional leaders should select a candidate. Then, Romney said, he would support the choice.

Campaign workers in New Hampshire started dismantling Romney headquarters offices, packing away signs and equipment, striking the tents of the small army organized for the drive for the nomination.

Insiders considered it significant that Romney made his decision suddenly in Boston Tuesday, then announced his withdrawal at 5 p.m. the next day in Washington before even some of his staff knew.

Rockefeller said he knew of the decision before he acknowledged in Detroit several days earlier that he would accept a draft.

Rockefeller said his position was not changed by the Romney pullout, that he would accept a draft but would not say he is now a candidate.

In the New Hampshire, however, he has a great deal to gain and nothing to lose against

Nixon. But Nixon is in the opposite position.

"If Rockefeller is elected," said the nomination, "he'll have to fight for it." Nixon said Rockefeller has said he's not a candidate, and both Romney and I take him at his word.

"I would suggest that he be nominated at a convention. The nomination of Rockefeller doesn't enter the picture, he won't be nominated, I said."

In New York, Mayor John Lindsay, a Republican, whose now over 100,000 voters the "barbaric collectors" strike states that he would support Rockefeller for the nomination.

Mayor Jabara Starts Move To Plan Plymouth's Future

In one of the boldest steps taken by a city official in years Mayor James Jabara is arranging to call on the business and industrial leaders of the metropolitan area for support in planning the Plymouth of Tomorrow.

Faced with the fact that nothing much has been done in the downtown area in recent years and that major industrial and commercial developments are taking place on all sides, he has decided that the time has come to "save" Plymouth.

While no specific date has been set for a meeting, Mayor

Jabara has let it be known that no time will be lost in getting the leaders together for a heart to heart talk, dealing with Plymouth—and where it is going.

"THE TIME has come," he said, "when these major com-

mercial and industrial leaders who have a stake in the community should sit down and talk of the future.

"From time to time we have discussed plans for such things as downtown business loop, parking areas, street widening, rail crossing eliminations and other things that we thought would have an effect on the city of the future. But now we must take a look far into the future and plan for it."

The mayor, now taking the lead in the move to preserve Plymouth and its image, has intimated there can be no further delay and that the time has come to find out where we are going—and how.

It is no secret that the downtown area has slumped badly in recent years. Far from the magnet it used to be, the loop is now only an emergency stop for many residents. The large shopping areas within a few miles have lured them away from the quiet little shopping center that once stood Plymouth apart from the rest of western Wayne County.

MAYOR JABARA, in revealing his plan to call a major meeting, is aware that Plymouth no longer can stand still—that a move must be taken and quickly, to build a new attitude not only of the residents and officials, but of the business community as well.

"I always have been a firm believer that in Kellough Park," he said, "the city of Plymouth boasts an asset unmatched by any city around here. It is worth a million dollars, if used to the proper advantage."

PTA Leaders Oppose School Aid Bill

The controversial issue of whether the state should subsidize the tuition of private and parochial school children has raised some interesting questions and comments among the heads of various Plymouth parent-teacher organizations.

The Plymouth High School Parent Council, with a membership of 25, has no set meeting dates. Its last meeting was held prior to the furor created by the two bills introduced in the Michigan Legislature.

Mrs. Richard Tobin, a member of the council's steering committee could only express her personal feelings. "If there is any question of state aid being constitutionally wrong, legislation should not be considered."

"I have a tendency to waver because I can understand the parochial

and parochial schools should handle religion, thus maintaining the separation of church and state."

"It would seem that the parochial school is cutting off its nose to spite its face. When the recent Supreme Court ruling prohibits religion and prayer in public schools, just what exactly will a parochial school become if it accepts state aid?" he questioned.

Tripp proposed an interesting solution to religion and the student: "If par-

ochial schools taught only religion, the public schools could then 'release' those students wishing religious instruction for an hour or a half day to attend the school of their choice. This would give a child full benefit of public school academic subjects without increased cost to either institution.

"This system has been successful in many western states and I can see no reason for its failure here," he asserted.

ALTHOUGH the Farrand Elementary School PTA held a meeting last Tuesday, its president, Mrs. Barbara Cassidy, said that the subject was not among those discussed.

"I have personally talked to a few people about this," she confessed, "and they are opposed to it."

Township Attorney Explains Delay

Whether Plymouth Township can construct sidewalks on its own initiative has been under discussion for the last 10 months.

Ralph Cole, township attorney, attempted to explain the long delay and the pitfalls the township must guard against while giving the Board of Trustees a second draft of a proposed sidewalk ordinance at the last regular meeting.

Cole said it was unfortunate, but true, that townships are on the low rung of the ladder when it comes to authority. He said they can't do too much on their own.

"THIS HAS BEEN a very touchy subject, as you know. Many people have the opinion that where a need exists the government should do something and pay for it," he explained.

He added that there is a need for sidewalks in the townships but, because the township has the least amount of power of any form of government its hands are tied.

Cole wrote two provisions into a rough draft of the proposed sidewalk ordinance which would allow the township to do sidewalk work.

One stipulates, if the people in a certain area wish a sidewalk, they must submit a petition signed by 65 per cent of the people affected. This, in turn, will give the necessary direction to the board.

pay for a sidewalk and not put any financial obligation on the township, the township can construct it.

However, he continued, under the Township and Village Public Improvement Act, sidewalks can now be built by the township and can be paid by special assessment over a five-year period.

The people affected, Cole explained, will be the ones specially assessed. They would include anyone close enough to benefit from the sidewalk.

HE SAID it would be the duty of the DPW and the township engineer to determine special assessment districts after petitions are approved.

Once this is done and the township still wants to proceed with the construction of the proposed sidewalk, it has a green light.

Otherwise, the township's hands are still tied, and it must wait for some private source of money to bail it out.

FOREMOST is former Mayor Harold Guenther, who has been active in the community since he left public office.

pny and, then any other firm would know how it stood.

sued and that Spartan had been, in fact, occupying the building since last December they began to wonder what could be done.

HE CLAIMED he couldn't understand why the township would allow property surrounding the subdivision to be zoned other than single family residential and, on top of that, not even provide for a buffer zone between the two.

Claiming he spoke for the people in the subdivision, Young demanded that a fence be put up between the homes and the warehouse and, further, a barrier of 12-foot high shrubbery along the fence.

Later in the evening residents of Dunn Court complained of the presence of rats in their yards and neighborhood for the first time in 17 years --the longest any of them had lived on the street.

Mrs. Rodney Ash, 12800 Dunn Court, speaking for the residents of the street, said the rats are coming from the Heritage Apartments because of the overspill of garbage from inadequate trash containers.

The fence, he said, would keep children, who are allowed to run at will, out of the shipping area and the green-belt would screen off the unsightliness of the docks.

At this point, Richard Tache, the newly appointed general manager of the warehouse, made his presence known.

Tache, who had been sitting in the crowd, said he had been trying to obtain the floor but never had the chance.

He claimed that most of what the people from the Association had complained about just weren't the facts. He claimed that the warehouse was occupied only a few months ago and that it hasn't been put into operation yet.

Permits can be obtained without charge by calling your fire chief, Charles Raymor, at FI 9-1741, or if you are unable to reach him, by calling the fire department at FI 9-1155.

A fire permit is not required to burn trash in a container with a cover. However, if the fire is allowed to escape from the container all cost to the township for the suppression of said fire shall be billed to the party responsible.

A few safety rules to be followed if you have a permit are as follows:

1. Confine your burning to early morning or late evening
2. Never start a fire when the wind is blowing
3. Have enough help on hand to control the fire
4. Have water and brooms handy
5. NEVER LEAVE A FIRE UNTIL IT IS OUT!

There's Sermon Behind Resignations Of Officials Like Hudson And Fischer

The resignation of George Hudson from the City Commission and Harold Fischer from the Area Planning Commission came as a real surprise to the area during the week.

Each of them, in his own way, has been an ardent supporter of progressive moves in the Plymouth area. While going different routes each has worked hard and long in the interest of the entire community and their absence from the scene is certain to be felt.

Usually, in cases of such resignations the simple statement "personal reasons" is given as the basis for the desire to leave.

But in the two cases this week the reasons took on a different hue — and there could be a real sermon behind the moves of each man.

"I no longer have the time to do the job the way I think it should be done," City Commissioner Hudson gave as his reason for leaving the city position to which the taxpayers elected him.

"It is discouraging when the needs are not met," was the way Fischer put it in explaining his action.

Diagnosing each statement one can easily read an underlying cause that may be well to explore.

In Commissioner Hudson's case, he is a stickler for facts. A thorough going commissioner, he leaves no stone unturned when given an assignment. Sometimes he has been criticised for the length of time he puts in on a project — but there can be little, or no criticism of the job he does when the work is finished.

The recent study of the city charter is an example.

Commissioner Hudson asked for the assignment to study the charter some time ago. He voiced the opinion that some changes should be made. So he was put to work.

Month after month passed and no word was heard from him — or the committee.

WHO CAN FILL THEIR SHOES



When asked about progress he confined his philosophy by saying, "I don't like to read what is going to happen at a Commission before I get there. There will be no report until the work is finished."

Other people in political office may have relished the opportunity to gain some personal publicity. But not George. He was set on a course. And he was going to stay at the wheel until he brought the ship into the harbor.

When he filed the report with the City Commission last week it was a fitting example of the hard work that had been done. Nothing was left unturned as 30 recommendations for changes were made.

That's the way Commissioner Hudson likes to work. He likes to do a thorough job

and therein lies the real reason for his resignation.

He no longer has the time to do the job in the way he thinks it should be done. So he left rather than be slipshod in his service to the community.

By the same token, no man has worked harder for the benefit of the entire Plymouth area than Harold Fischer in his constant search for a broader tax base that would be beneficial to all concerned.

Hours have meant nothing to him — day or night — if there was an opportunity to build up the industrial or business community.

No one became more enthused than he at the slightest hint that some firm or business was thinking of coming to Plymouth.

Perhaps, he became over-confident in many cases and his disappointment was all the more when these firms selected other locations.

With each of these disappointments came an opportunity to compare the Plymouth Community with other areas. Many times the local scene was found wanting.

It was for this reason that Fischer explained upon resignation "Things weren't being done that needed to be done."

Other areas go to great lengths to attract business and industry. The City of Livonia is a fine example. Working on a new federal plan Livonia is investing \$33 million to build the facilities for Allied Products. It was a bold stroke, but Livonia obtained the facility that will greatly broaden the tax base.

Other areas, such as Farmington, are going all out to make their locations attractive. So, perhaps, Fischer had a point.

But, underlying the reasons given for both resignations during the week, was a crying lack of leadership.

It is no secret that there is a great deal of work to be done in Plymouth to save it in today's keen competition. If the work isn't done, the inner city could die, too.

There is a crying need for leadership — someone to take hold and bring the many plans to fruition.

That's why the resignation of Hudson and Fischer are a real loss to the entire area.

Their places will be difficult to fill.

Letter To The Editor

Exception Taken To Rossman's Stand On Aid

EDITOR:

I must respectfully disagree with Supt. Rossman on two points of his critique of the non-public school bill as quoted in the Observer, Feb. 25, P. 1:

1.) Mr. Rossman said: "We have worked long and hard to establish larger school districts in the state for a more economical operation. Now with the impending bill, the work will be for naught."

Now this bill proposes to assist parents of non-public school children by returning them a fraction of their own tax dollars. Thus they may in turn assist hundreds of schools whose plants are already built and equipped without tax monies, but because of the shrinking value of the dollar, and expanding operational costs, are in danger of buckling.

To those who say the prospect of their doors closing is an idle threat, may I point out that today the non-public enrollment in Michigan is 30,000 less than it was in 1965 — and that these 30,000 are costing the state of Michigan \$18 million. This fact is included in the preamble to the bill. So what better guarantee of strengthening public schools is there than to encourage private schools to keep alive?

2.) As to Mr. Rossman's statement that "Our colonial forefathers came over here to escape the church and state order of things," I must remind him that America's early schools were strongly sectarian in practice. Indeed, it was for

this reason that the Catholic parish schools were founded by zealous immigrant parents and clergy who wanted to instill their own religious traditions in the children. It seems safe to assume that other religious schools were begun for the same reason.

The country at large is well served by the existence of both

religious and secular private schools, as well as by public schools:

They provide diversity and avoid the obvious dangers inherent in a vast educational monolith.

By their very existence they serve as a competitive stimulus to each other.

The Bill of Rights states that Congress shall pass no law establishing a state religion. But in this peculiar age Materialism and a Godless Secularism threaten to become our unofficial state religion. Isn't it reasonable to expect that a thriving system of religious education will help future generations to keep their spirit-

ual balance? The victory or defeat of this bill will have no financial effect on me personally. I do feel, however, that the parents of the non-public school children are not coming, hat in hand, to beg for favors, but rather to collect a debt long since overdue.

A patient's best friend in St. Mary Hospital often is a pleasant and efficient woman in a blue uniform.

She's a member of the St. Mary Hospital Volunteer Guild, a group of 94 women who are on duty regularly at the hospital to provide valuable assistance to the busy staff.

MOST OF THEM put in several hours one day a week. A few are at the Livonia hospital once a month.

They man the front desk. They carry juice to the patients and deliver their mail.

They administer tender loving care in the pediatrics ward. They willingly take on just about any job assigned to them.

It is a tradition at the University of Michigan that its athletic teams are always at their absolute best when the chips are down and when the odds are the greatest against them.

Thus the Wolverines surprised few of the alumni and students in the crowd of 11,425 that gathered for the official dedication of the new \$7 million University Events building Tuesday when the basketballers rose to their greatest heights of the season to upend a powerful Purdue quintet, 104-94.

Given only a slight chance of holding down the score, the Blues started out with a red hot shooting streak from the opening tipoff, roared to an 18 point lead that the Boilermakers whittled down to one and even forged ahead late in the first half before Michigan took the lead again and held it for the remainder of the time.

The Wolverines, sparked by the brilliant scoring of Sophomore Center Rudy Tomjanovich, couldn't miss in the first 10 minutes and held a 54-26 lead despite the spectacular marksmanship of Rick Mount,

Purdue's high scoring sophomore whiz.

Mount, who has to be one of the most outstanding gunners ever developed in Indiana which is noted for its high quality of basketball, had 24 of his team's 49 points at the intermission. Despite that Michigan went into the dressing room with a 52-49 edge.

THEN DURING the rest period while the formal dedication program was taking place on the court, Coach Dave Strack worked out a change in defensive tactics from a loose man-to-man to a tight zone which throttled the Boilermakers throughout the second half.

Bill Flemming, a member of the class of 1949 and nationally known as a sportscaster on the Wide World of Sports program on ABC, served as master of ceremonies. He had just returned from the Winter Olympics in Grenoble, France but didn't have an opportunity to go into that great event—he was that busy with his duties in front of the public address system mike.

Flemming introduced Donald Tucker, president of the Michigan Union University Activities Center; Professor Marcus Plant, president of the NCAA and faculty representatives of Michigan; Regent Robert Brown; Retiring Athletic Director Fritz Crisler and University President Robben Fleming.

Others introduced included: members of the Board of Control of Intercollegiate Athletics at the university from the faculty, alumni and the student

body.

Then with that out of the way and the audience completely enthralled by the huge University Events building, one of the finest collegiate plants in America with a seating capacity of almost 14,000, the basketball action continued.

HOWEVER, THERE were quite a few in the audience, especially alumni, who were a bit disappointed—they had a feeling the building was going to be dedicated and named as a tribute to Crisler for his

years of outstanding service to the University as a football coach and athletic director.

That may still take place at a later date but most certainly it wasn't included as a surprise for the dedication.

Returning to the court after the long rest, the Wolverines dropped into their tight zone something that also was followed by Purdue, with the result that scoring dipped considerably.

The score see-sawed back and forth for the first five minutes with Junior Dennis Ste-

wart and Tomjanovich hitting from outside to keep M ahead. Mount, Herman Gilliam and Bill Keller kept Purdue within a few points as the teams traded baskets and found the Wolverines in front 52-57 after five minutes.

THEN THE ZONE began to take effect on Mount who found himself effectively blocked from all but long shots and his marksmanship slipped at the same time.

Stewart and Bob Sullivan took

over the scoring duties for Michigan which moved to a 10-point advantage, 79-69, at the 10 minute mark.

That's when Coach Strack ordered his team to slow down the pace which it did effectively for the remainder of the time. Purdue pulled up within six points with eight minutes remaining but that was as close as it came in the remaining time.

The Wolverines locked the gate in the final minute and a half when they tallied nine points and were still moving ahead at the final whistle.

TOMJANOVICH was the big noise for the victors with 30 points on 14 of 32 shots from the field and two free throws. Big Jim Pitts contributed 22, mostly from rebounds and un-

der the basket, and Sullivan whipped in 21.

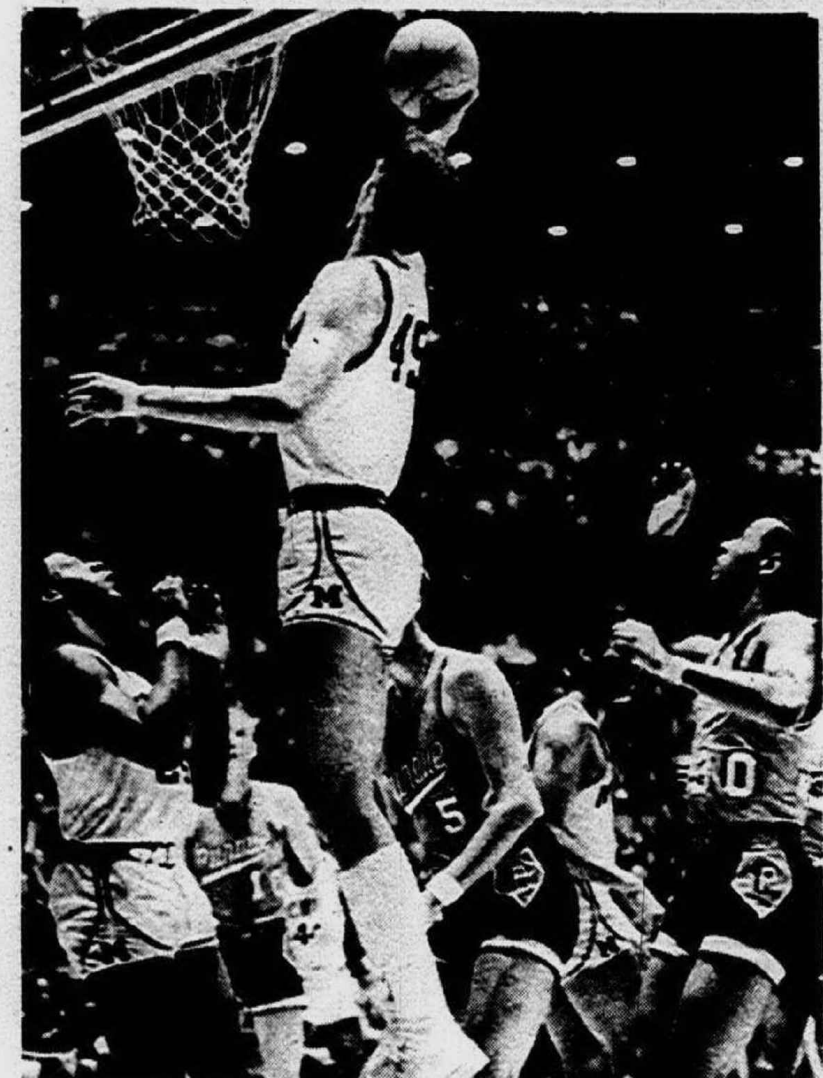
Mount, as expected, led the Boilermakers with 35 with 16 field goals and three fouls. He was followed by Keller with 23, Gilliam with 20 and Bedford with 10.

Strange enough the Boilermakers hit on 52 per cent of their shots from the field and 50 per cent from the foul line. Michigan had 46 per cent from the field and a tremendous 64 per cent from the charity stripe.

The loss dropped Purdue back to third in the Big Ten standings and weakened their chances of taking the championship. Iowa is the current leader followed by Ohio State and then Purdue. It was only the fourth win for Michigan in 12 Big Ten starts but the biggest victory of the entire season.

With Cancer Foundation

The Michigan Cancer Foundation recently announced the appointment of a new branch chairman, Mrs. Louis Dely of 690 Simpson, Mrs. Dely replaces Mrs. R.D. Nesbitt, who has served the foundation in this capacity for several years.

Mrs. Dely, a resident of Plymouth for 20 years, has been a day-worker with the Michigan Cancer Foundation for three years.

She is married, has a married daughter and three grandchildren. In addition to my work here I am secretary of the VFW auxiliary and that just about takes care of my free time," she explained.

Patients may register for transportation to hospitals and doctor's offices, dressings, and items such as beds, walkers and wheelchairs. Information is also provided regarding cancer check-ups.

Chairmen presently serving the Plymouth branch are Mrs. John Schwartz, in charge of service; Mrs. Maurice Gibson, public education, and Miss Elizabeth McDonald, public information.

Shape Of State Politics Changes

Governor Romney's withdrawal from the race for the Republican Presidential nomination could have a profound effect on the shape of Michigan politics.

The most important effects will be on the race for governor in 1970.

Had Romney won the Republican nomination, observers generally believed he would have resigned as governor, automatically boosting Lt. Gov. William G. Milliken to the top state post.

Milliken could then have run for governor in 1970 with all the political benefits that accrue to an incumbent. The Republican's chances of holding on to the state house would have been greatly strengthened.

THAT IS ALL changed now, unless for some unlikely reason Romney resigns before his term ends. It is generally expected that Romney will not run for another term in 1970, meaning that neither party will be putting an incumbent before the voters.

In a state where more voters are normally Democrats, this would give the Democratic candidate an edge.

Democratic candidates for state House and Congressional seats this fall could also be aided by Romney's withdrawal. Had the governor achieved the nomination, he would almost certainly have been a more popular candidate with his home state voters than any other Republican.

This is probably true despite indications of a recent decline in his Michigan popularity. Chauvinism would have dominated the voting habits of Michigan voters more than any evaluation of Romney's performance on the issues, analysts said.

Thus other Republican candidates lower down on the ballot would have had the benefit of riding Romney's coattails. With House and Congressional races expected to be extremely close this year, even a small coattail could have changed the outcome of several contests.

FINALLY, ROMNEY'S withdrawal raises questions about his own political future.

Out of the race for President, not likely to run again for Governor, will Romney now set his sights on Senator Philip Hart's seat which is up for grabs in 1970?

Hart is one of the most popular Democratic vote-getters in the state. Romney is the most popular Republican vote-getter in the state's history.

Any contest between the two could be one of the most interesting the state has seen in a long time.

Esch said the Republican governors at the reception were taking a "wait-and-see" attitude; although that was expected to be only temporary.

Both men, who came up through the ranks in the state, noted that Romney was pointing to the GOP governors rather than to other party elements as the source of future ideas and candidates.

ROMNEY TOOK IT well, they said, and McDonald ventured the guess that Romney might not be washed up—that he might emerge at the Aug. 8 Republican National Convention as a compromise candidate.

Neither suburban congressman reported any jelling of sentiment behind a new candidate among the Republican governors who attended a Washington reception Wednesday night.

"I know this," said McDonald. "The press immediately skyrocketed Gov. Rockefeller, or is trying to skyrocket him, as a candidate, I'm sure."

"It took Rockefeller 45 minutes to walk 75 feet from the stairway to the receiving table because of the literally hundreds of press people and photographers surrounding him, taking pictures and asking questions. It was impossible to get near him. He was mobbed."

ESCH, A FORMER Wayne State University faculty member who now represents the Second District, took careful mental notes of Romney's reaction at the hotel room wake.

"He reacted in three ways.

District: "I want a winner, and—ah—I haven't made up my mind; I was 100 per cent with the governor."

"Rockefeller, Richard Nixon, Gov. Ronald Reagan—all would be acceptable to him," McDonald said.

"But I think it's very possible George Romney will be available for a draft at the

convention. If Nelson Rockefeller or someone challenges Nixon, it's very possible we may have to look for a compromise candidate. You know, it's not to say that George Romney still isn't in the running."

"In fact, if I were a candidate for the presidency and I faced the tremendous loss in the New Hampshire primary

that Gov. Romney did and the possible loss in Wisconsin, I'd quit the race at that point and maybe start again later."

"Now, I don't know that he's got anything like that in mind—but it wouldn't be bad strategy. I'll be in the home district March 8. I was going to go to New Hampshire, but I guess there's no use going up there now."

Redfordite Says Romney Volunteers 'Disappointed'

MANCHESTER, N.H.,--"Extremely disappointed" but still not giving up hope.

That seemed to be the consensus of the volunteers manning the Romney for President Headquarters in New Hampshire on the morning following the governor's withdrawal from the presidential race.

A REDFORD TOWNSHIP resident--Dick Headlee--has been heading up the volunteer organization.

Headlee has spent the past five or six months organizing volunteer organizations in both the Granite State and in Wisconsin. He said the volunteers' reaction could be summed up "in two words--extremely disappointed."

The volunteer manager, who has worked on each of Romney's campaigns and is a past national president of the Jaycees, asserted, however, that he would not be surprised to see a "Draft Romney" movement before the "end of the year."

He noted that the volunteers in both New Hampshire and Wisconsin were "Romney people" when they were recruited, they were Romney people at 5 p.m. yesterday, and they will be Romney people in August.

"This is because no other candidate offers the leadership, the standards and the high sense of purpose that George Romney does. And regardless of political expediency, the majority of this staff is unwilling to compromise

these high standards."

HEADLEE TERMED the decision to withdraw as "the governor's" but added that he thought Romney had "grossly underestimated his strength and that he was ill-advised as to the true feeling of the voters."

"It was the consensus of the field organizations," he continued, "that if we had not won the election, it would have been

extremely close. The staff would have rather had the people at the polls determine whether our feelings were right or wrong than speculation by any group of political pundits."

HEADLEE OBSERVED that "I am confident that the people will recognize that the governor's decision was based on concern for the Republican party, the lack of leadership among

the Republican governors and the obvious necessity for the governors to take action at this time if the Republicans are to enjoy any success in November."

"The Governor's decision must have been a most difficult one, but once again he put concern for the people he represents above his own person and private feelings," he added.

Headlee asserted that the

campaign had turned in the past week and placed this emphasis on the Romney telethon last week.

"The people were becoming enthused and the calls were friendly," he noted. "People who had been Nixon supporters called and said that they were going to vote for Romney."

Calling his candidate "the only man in New Hampshire

talking about the issues," Headlee stated that the animation of Romney through the vehicle of television was the prime factor in the campaign swing.

AS THE PRIME MOVER of the volunteer group, Headlee was responsible for the establishment of the 600 Romney Home Headquarters that had been set up in the state.

In this field, the residents

of New Hampshire opened their homes as neighborhood campaign centers, Romney visited these homes on his forays into the state. Headlee said that the crowds to see the governor had "been as high as 200 people."

At the time of the withdrawal announcement, there were 15 to 20 workers from throughout the country manning the New Hampshire volunteer staff.

The average age of the volunteers was 30 to 32.

Headlee noted that Romney had announced that he would talk to the staff in Manchester on Friday and said that the volunteers were waiting until this meeting.

"After that and when we finish up with some detail work here, we will wend our way back to our homes throughout the country," he concluded.

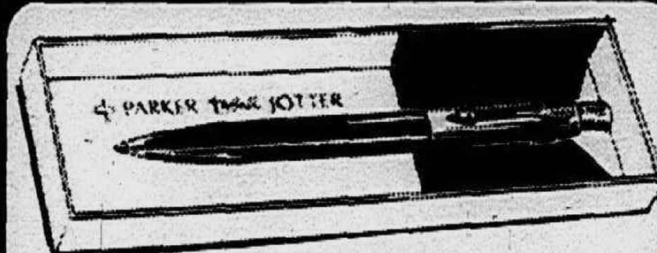

From City College To Urban University

The ground-breaking ceremony last week at Wayne State University was dull, as those things usually are, but it had a tremendous symbolic significance.

First, the building is going to cost \$24 million — the largest ever built with state funds, and in gross size only a shade smaller than Cobo Hall. It marked a big step for a school that had been fund-starved most of its life.

Second, the building, going up on E. Canfield at Brush streets in Detroit, will be the Basic Sciences Building of Wayne's excellent medical school. It was 100 years ago this year that Wayne's seeds were planted only three blocks away as the Detroit Medical College.

Third, this particular building, besides having closed circuit television and a long list of other significant features, will be nine stories tall. Space is scarce in Detroit, and Wayne is not only building out but up. (Altogether, it has \$46 million in projects under construction.)

Wayne is a century old, yes, but only a generation ago it was one main hall and a few converted houses forming some city colleges. Today it's a big and increasingly attractive urban university.

Which, incidentally, is the theme of its centennial observance — "the urban university in an urban society."

AFTER THE CIVIL WAR, so the story goes, the U.S. Army founded Harper Hospital to care for veterans, and five doctors started the medical college to train more doctors.

In 1881, after 15 years of urging by superintendents, the Detroit Board of Education started a one-year Normal Training School for teachers, on the theory that a teacher ought to have more than a high school education. In 1913 it became a two-year school, and in 1920 it was expanded to a four-year Detroit Teachers College.

Wayne's third prime root was a junior college founded in 1896. It was much like today's community colleges.

It was in the depression year of 1934 that the medical college (under public domain since 1918), the teachers college and the liberal arts college were welded into Wayne University.

At the end of World War II, Wayne was still a function of the Detroit school district; its prime structure, Old Main Hall, was the former Central High School built in 1896; other classes were conducted in converted houses with above-ground heating pipes.

But then Wayne began to get some state money for construction of a few classroom buildings, and in 1956 it became a state university with its own, separate, elected board of control.

WAYNE STATE IS BEST known for

medicine and teaching—many Observerland schools are heavily staffed with WSU graduates — but the urban university has a full range of programs.

Besides the arts, sciences and engineering, there are professional programs in law, social work, business administration, education and nursing — 10 colleges and schools, and 70 departments.

It's a huge university now in terms of students—32,000 in degree programs, another 20,000 or more in extension or non-degree programs.

They come from 40 states and 90 foreign countries, but most are from this part of Michigan, and most commute.

Three-fourths of them hold jobs, too.

Classes start at 7:30 in the morning and run to 10 at night. The agricultural summer vacation has been dropped in favor of four 11-week quarters.

Wayne State has never had a world of school spirit — at least the kind that's evidenced by whopping big alumni donations—but there is a fund, created in 1954, that has \$1 million for scholarships, loans, research and faculty awards.

Last year's football team was the first that had a genuinely good season in years. But basketball fortunes are expected to pick up now that that team has its own court for the first time in 35 years. The school is also button-popping proud of its debate team. And next summer it will host an important fencing tournament.

ARCHITECTURALLY, Wayne State is a mixed campus.

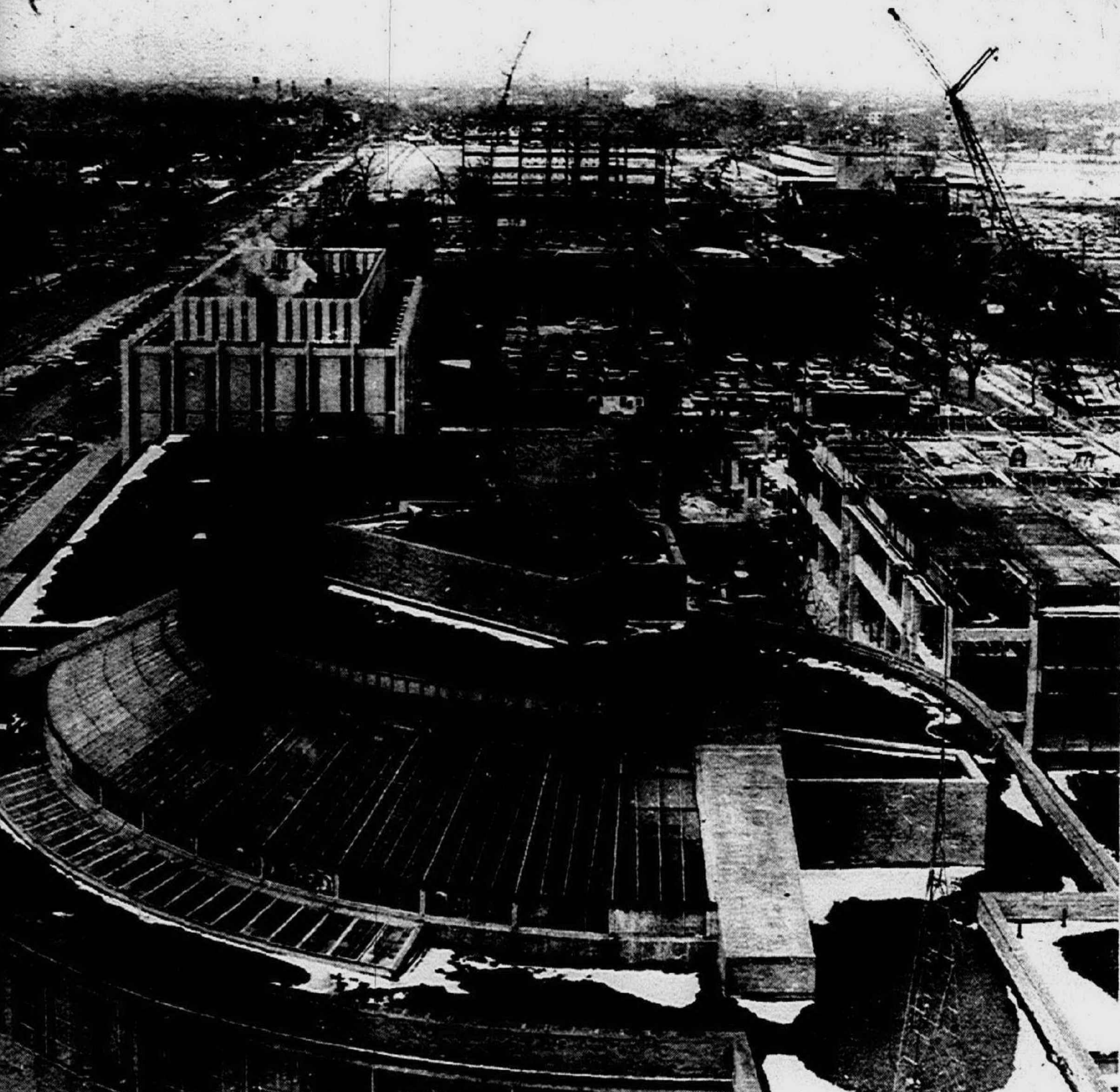
Some schools — notably Schoolcraft College, Oakland's Orchard Ridge campus in Farmington, and Western Michigan University — are designed by a single architect in a single general style.

Wayne State has spread its business around. The new Matthaei Physical Education Building (\$2.8 million) on the athletic campus west of the Lodge Freeway was designed by Alden Dow & Associates, as is the under-construction University Center (\$4.5 million).

Jickling & Lyman designed the now-abandoned Foreign Language and Speech Classroom Building (\$4.7 million), and Ralph Calder & Associates drew up the Natural Science Building and Science Library (\$9.2 million when complete). Giffels & Rosetti and John Williams Associates designed the Basic Medical Sciences Building that was started last week.

Some of the most unusual and popular work was done by Minoru Yamasaki & Associates, most notably the DeRoy Library completed in 1964. Yamasaki likes to make low, compact buildings around courts and green spots rather than build upward.

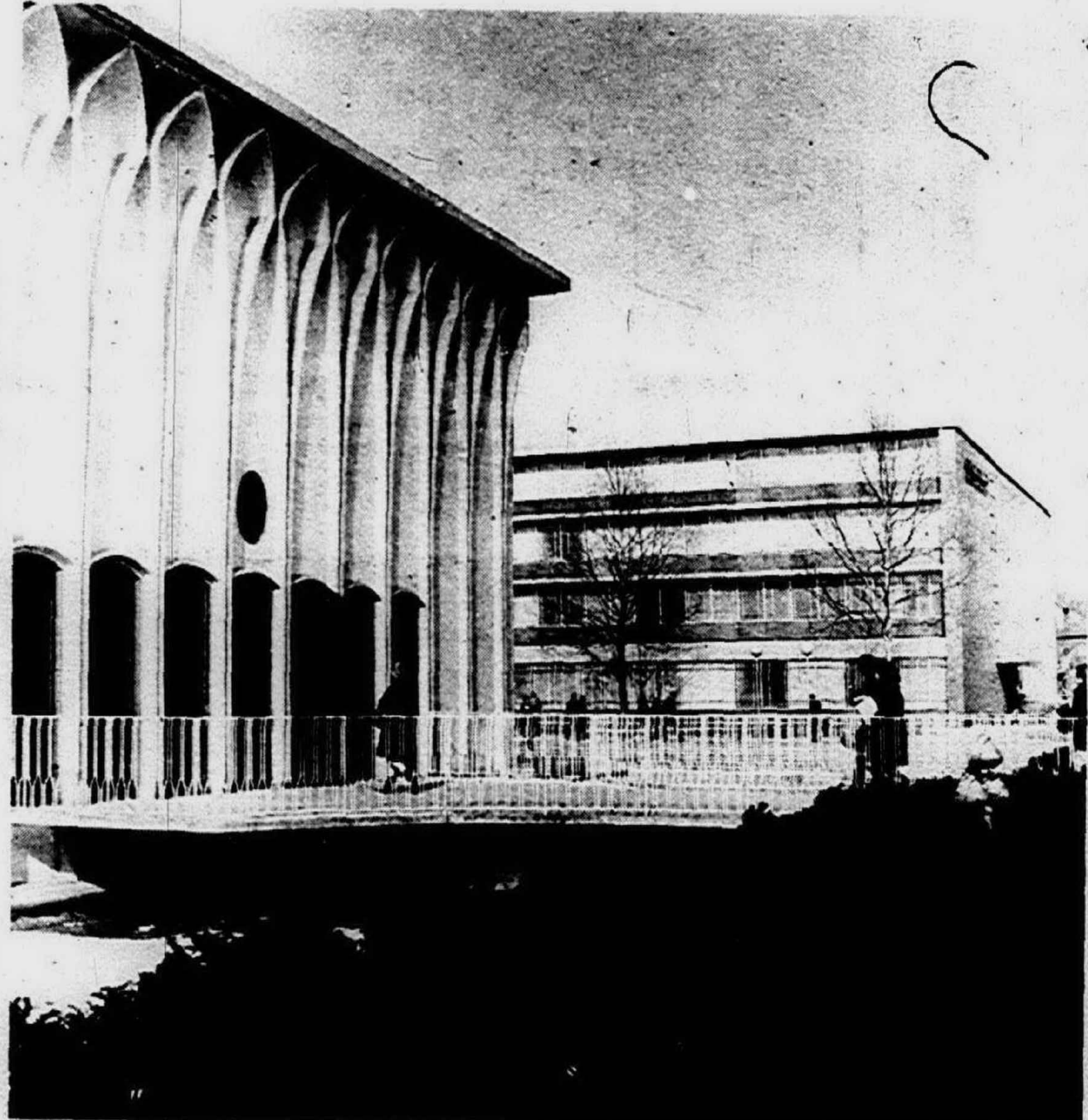
Wayne State is a century old and has a tradition as a little city college. But today it's an urban university, big and complex and fascinating.

skeleton in the upper center will be the Natural Science Building and Science Library. The new building to its right is the recently completed Matthaei Physical Education and Recreation Building.

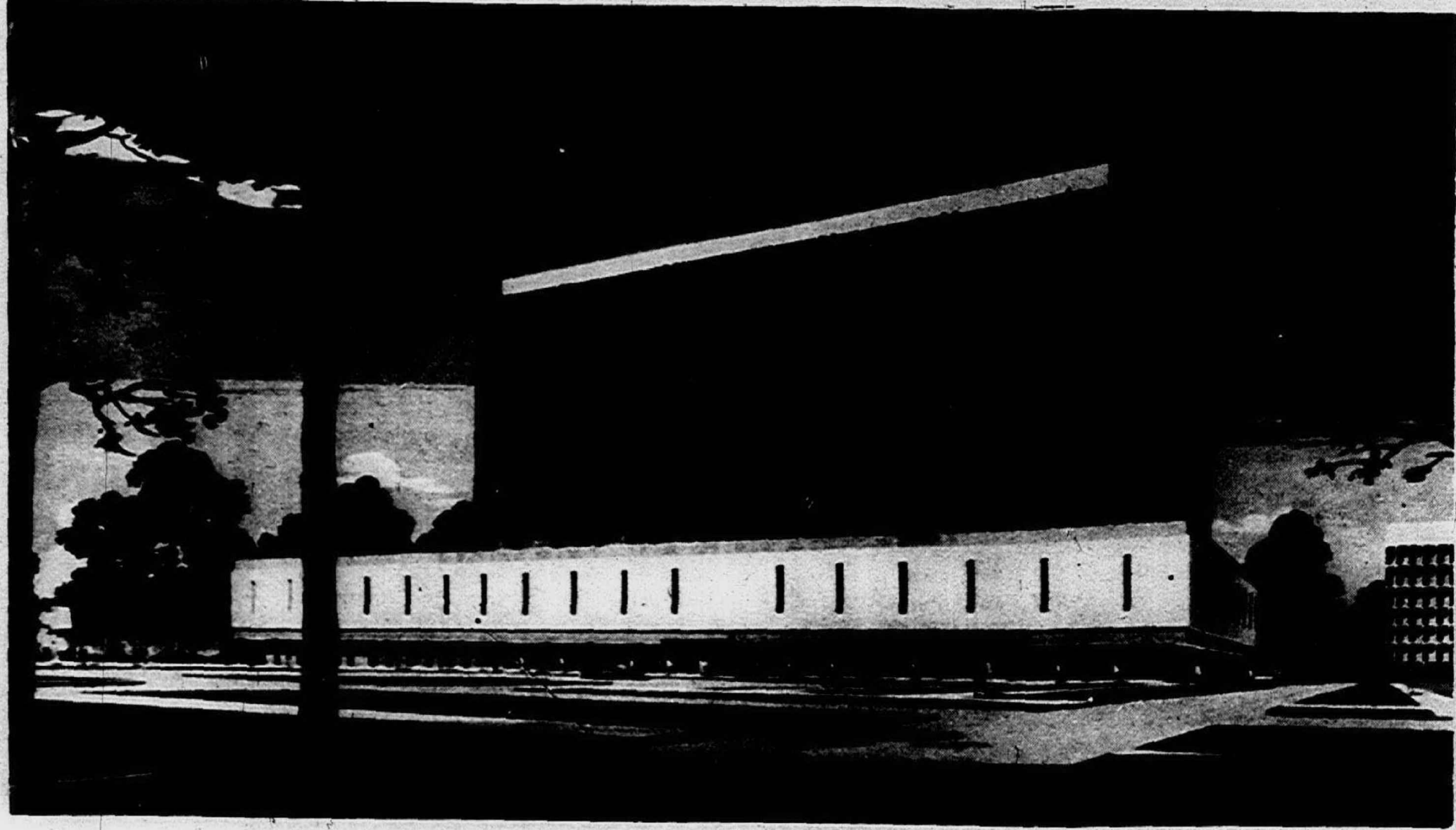

Teddy Has New Draft Bill

SEN EDWARD M. Kennedy (D-Mass.) has introduced a bill into the Senate that proposes to revamp the entire Selective Service Act—which includes a lottery type system to replace the present draft. He advocates that 19-year-olds be inducted first with a random selection plan to be set up by the president. Most of the issues contained in Kennedy's bill were rejected by Congress last year.

FIFTH-FOUR ACRES of beach property owned by California Gov. Ronald Reagan was reassessed recently at the prompting of a high school teacher and rose from \$7,500 to \$54,000. The county assessor had set the original assessment at 25 per cent of market value. The new assessment was granted, on behalf of the teacher, by the Los Angeles County Assessment Appeals Board, Assess-

State Universities' Money Bill Battle On In Senate

A BILL, PASSED last week by the House and sent to the Senate, would increase the top age limit for hiring policemen in communities which have civil service requirements from 31 to 36 years old.

DR. ROBBEN W. FLEMING, president of the University of Michigan, said the appropriation recommended this week by the Senate Appropriations Committee in Lansing for his institution was so low "it would have most unfortunate consequences on university operations. The Senate committee has recommended \$61.3 million while Fleming had requested \$75.6 million for this year."

THE STATE SENATE began debate last week on the higher education appropriations bill, which is expected to be almost \$7 million less than what was recommended by Gov. George Romney. The proposed Senate appropriations for Michigan's four-year colleges and universities is \$222.5 million, compared to \$229 million asked by the governor.

DR. J. VINCENT MURPHY, chairman of the Michigan College of Osteopathic Medicine board of trustees, said he thinks it's time a decision was made on a state supported Michigan College of osteopathic medicine without further delay. He told the State Board of Education that the issue is a shortage of physicians in Michigan and "people want some action."

A BILL PERMITTING city and village councils, county supervisors and boards of education to hold closed-door meetings has been introduced in the House by Rep. Richard Young (D-Deerborn Heights). The public could be barred from such meetings if the local leg-

islative body posted the purpose of the meeting on its chamber doors and printed the purpose in its official minutes.

PROMOTION OF John A. Maters to director of publicity for the Michigan Tourist Council was announced last week by William T. McGraw, the council director. In his new position, Maters succeeds Michael Jones, who recently transferred from the tourist council staff to the State Highway Department's public information office.

ROBERT J. BYERS, an administrator and staff member of the State Office of Economic Expansion for nearly 19 years,

retired last week. He is a former Michigan department adjutant and state welfare officer for the American Legion and was executive director of the State Office of Civilian Defense in World War II.

GOV. ROMNEY has directed heads of state departments to recognize and adopt 14 official and uniform state planning and development regions. His directive divides the lower peninsula in 10 master planning regions and the upper peninsula into four.

DETROIT MAYOR Jerome P. Cavanagh took a hand in the city's newspaper strike last week as he invited represent-

atives of the Detroit News and Detroit Free Press and the Teamsters Union to a meeting next Wednesday to seek a solution to the long tieup. The strike is 109 days old this Sunday.

A BILL ALLOWING cities to tear down or repair unsafe, dilapidated and abandoned buildings, has been reported out of the House public safety committee. From other committees came bills providing, among other things, a \$200 burial benefit for servicemen killed in Vietnam, requiring motorists to stop for school buses inside city limits and making it a misdemeanor to knowingly aid a juvenile runaway.

A PANEL, COMPOSED of officials from the City of Detroit and the Detroit Police Officers Association, said the city's police department is a manpower crisis and the police called for salaries of \$10,000 for four year veterans on force. The city said it needs time to analyze the panel's findings.

APPROXIMATELY \$480,000 recommended to go to Oakland University by Gov. Romney has been slashed from the university's budget by a State Senate committee.

NATIONAL ROUNDUP

or Philip E. Watson angrily called the ruling "stupid" and demanded that valuations on 100,000 acres of Malibu Mountain property be raised to \$50 million, an increase in taxes of \$5 million. He said that in fairness, comparable hikes should be made on properties owned by Bob Hope, Jack Benny, Marlon Brando, Edie Adams, 20th Century-Fox Studio and others.

FUNERAL SERVICES for Elmer Brown, president of the International Typographical Union for the past 10 years, were held last week in Colorado Springs, Colo. Brown, 66, died in the Union Printers Home Hospital in Colorado Springs. He had been in poor health for the past several years. Brown took over as president in 1958.

DR. BENJAMIN M. Burroughs, a professor in the medical department of the University of Chicago and a specialist in chest diseases, declared last week that a "mysterious" lung disease, not linked directly to smoking, is the second greatest cause of adult disability. He said the prevalence of the disease is increasing. The disease, which may be connected with cigarette smoking, has a death rate which may exceed that of lung cancer. The disease is an "emphysema bronchitis syndrome."

TEACHERS this week either were on strike or had threatened to go out on strike in a teacher-crisis that is developing across the nation. Florida officials are still seeking ways to break an impasse in a strike by 22,000 teachers. In Pittsburgh, 1,000 city teachers were poised to leave their jobs at any time. And in Albuquerque, N.M., teachers voted to return to classes after shutting 80,000 children out of school for more than a week.

THREE MAJOR drug firms were fined \$150,000 each in federal court last week for conspiring to restrain trade and monopolize the market in broad-spectrum antibiotics. Federal Judge Marvin E. Frankel sentenced Chas. Pfizer & Co., American Cyanamid Co., and Bristol-Meyers Co., which were convicted Dec. 29 on the price-fixing charges after a jury trial.

NEWSPAPERS HAVE been barred from courtrooms in Las Vegas and New York City by judges who have ruled that prejudicial evidence might be detrimental to defendants. The two instances were apparently the first, growing from adoption two weeks ago by the American Bar Association of the controversial Reardon report that recommends prosecutors, law enforcement officers and the courts to restrict information released to news media about witnesses and defendants in criminal cases.

THE ARMY appealed to Congress last week for an increase of nearly 1,400 per cent in funds for development of an anti-ballistic missile system. Department officials urged approval of a requested appropriation of \$312,900,000 for the system, which has been named Sentinel. This year there is \$22.6 million available.

FUNERAL SERVICES for former U.S. Senator and Democratic majority leader Scott W. Lucas were held last week in Havana, Ill. He died in Rocky Mount, N.C., while enroute to Florida. He was 76.

FIX-IT TIP

Here are a few simple repairs for faulty window shade operation:

• If the shade snaps up for no reason, it has a spring that is too tight. Roll the shade to the top, remove roller from brackets, unroll halfway by hand and replace in brackets.

• A shade that falls or wobbles may have a bent stationary pin. Straighten the pin with pliers or replace with a nail of about the same size.

• Loose brackets should be remounted with screws instead of nails.

• If lubrication of pawls seems in order, use graphite instead of oil. Oil becomes gummy and picks up dirt.

Ever step into your favorite
market in search of fresh ham-
burger and be greeted with a
friendly smile and offered three
pounds of darkened, day-old
meat? Fresh, red and lean meat
is a mark of goodness and value.
Fresh and up-to-the-minute
stock is the shopper's first
means of recognizing a pro-
gressive and reliable grocer.
Wine merchants are a lit-
tle more difficult to appraise
but just as important for your
assurance of sound wine values.
Wine is a highly perishable
commodity given certain con-
ditions.

What can happen to wine to
make it unappealing or unap-
petizing to the shopper, you
ask?

WINES, LIKE PEOPLE, tend
to improve with age...they de-
velop finesse, charm, charac-

ter, elegance and OLD AGE.
What a shame it is for a fine
wine to complete its life cycle
on a store shelf as so many do.

Here are some tips for sep-
arating the Good from the Bad
and the Ugly. American wine
makers, a large percentage of
them, change their labels every
two or three years thereby tel-
ling the customer that certain
wines have been shelved longer
than others.

Don't get the idea that all
wine must age before it is good.
Today wines are shipped from
wineries in a most drinkable
condition.

Here I must add that wines
selected and stored by you, at
home, stand an excellent chance
of providing many years of en-
joyment if they are carefully "laid
away" in a cool and dark place,
undisturbed.

WINE MERCHANTS or re-
tailers are hampered, in their
wine storing capabilities, by
limited space, overheated
rooms and poor handling meth-
ods. Light remains one of wine's
biggest enemies and one can
readily see how a well-lighted
shop with sun-drenched shelf
space would aid the enemy.

Some wines will have a year
printed on the label and unless
you have inspected the storage
area or wine cellar of a mer-
chant you would be wise not to
buy wines dated more than say
seven years previous if red in
color. White wines, even more
perishable, are a riskover four
years old and even then you
should know what you are buy-
ing. Perhaps you tasted the wine
in a good restaurant, enjoyed
it recently, and made a note of
the year or saved the label.

AIR IS THE ENEMY of all
wine under 16 per cent alcohol
by volume. Air plus wine equals
acetic acid (wine vinegar) and
wines sealed with a nonporous
screw type cap or plastic cork
are almost incapable of contact
with the "spoiler."

Corked wines, the better
American and nearly all im-
ported ones, are more fragile
however. Cork comes from the
carefully aged bark of cork
trees. Corks made therefrom
will ultimately dry out and
shrink in size unless they are
kept moist. Dry corks do not
maintain a snug fit against the
neck of the bottle. Extra care
is required when opening such
wines so that the cork is not
forced into the bottle, even
though the wine may be spoiled.
Dry corks are easily pre-
vented and you do this simply
by placing corked wines at an
angle or on their side to per-
mit the wine to remain in con-
tact with the cork. Therefore
wines found in shops that store
and display their corked wines
vertically are more vulnerable
to spoilage.

WHAT ABOUT THOSE DIR-
TY, sticky, leaking and cloudy
bottles of wine with sediment
floating or accumulating inside?
Careful handling, proper stor-
age and shelter from light may
not prevent any of these condi-
tions and may often be the very
cause of such an apparent di-
lemma.

Wanted: 30-Hour Day For Thurston's Kathy

Catch Kathy Kitzmann if you can. And if you can take a 16-hour day in stride, get A's at Thurston High, shop and keep house for your father and sister, and go to meetings EVERY night, you might catch her. "It's not anything, really, I don't have a job or anything," she says.

YET, SHE'S AN officer of five extra-curricular clubs and is third in her class scholastically. "Chemistry's my favorite class!—12 boys and me. That's fun."

She's constantly in demand by teachers. "But, I have a great time and I'm learning a lot."

And she's involved in so many varying activities that her friends are scholars, swimmers, musicians, singers. "All my friends are as busy as I am."

SINCE HER mother's death a year ago, Kathy now does the grocery shopping, cooking, washing and ironing for her

family. "All my friends have as much responsibility," says Kathy.

PRESIDENT of the Swim Club, secretary of the A.F.S., treasurer of the Honor Society, social chairman of the Christian Club and publicity director of the senior folk concert, "I keep a file of index cards, when things really get hectic," says Kathy.

Last Monday, a typical day, Kathy got up at 6:45—"A little earlier than usual: I had to iron a blouse, eat a quick breakfast...a glass of orange juice."

Clinic Stirs Interest In Gymnastics

Girls in the junior and senior high level can become just as adept gymnasts as boys with the proper instruction and training.

This fact was brought home to more than 60 physical education instructors from schools in Western Wayne County during a one-day clinic Saturday at Bentley High in Livonia.

The program was a continuation of one held at Eastern Michigan University last fall which stirred up interest throughout the area as well as in most schools in southern Michigan.

The workshop emphasized teaching techniques and progressions through the presentation of basic and intermediate skills for the junior and senior high levels.

Students from Bentley High as well as other senior and junior highs in the immediate area participated in the demonstrations.

The clinic included exhibitions of free exercises, balance beam, stunts and tumbling, vaulting and the uneven bars.

In addition to the demonstrations, those participating received written information in the areas of rebound tumbling, parallel bars and judging techniques.

The group plans on starting informal gymnastic meets in the not too distant future as part of the expanding girls athletic program.

In charge of the Bentley clinic were instructors Beverly LaBoda and Beverly Dale, of Bentley, assisted by Cheryl Caughey of Plymouth High and Mrs. Barbara Fletcher of Allen Park.

Come Down; Look Around

A man called Charlie Primas came to Livonia Tuesday night to tell a group of young suburban adults something about the hopes and frustrations of kids in Detroit's inner city.

And he left with an invitation to "come on down and have a look around, make some friends, find out what these kids are really like."

Charlie Primas grew up in Detroit's "Black Bottom" ghetto district. For a while he was a member of the Harlem Globetrotters. Now he works as a teacher for the juvenile court system and uses his evenings and other spare time as a YMCA urban gang worker.

"RIGHT NOW," Primas explained, "we're working especially with the kids of about 16 or 17. A boy can legally quit school when he's 16, but he's too young to get a decent job in industry and too young to join the military services."

"You've got to give these kids something to look forward to—convince them that living isn't hopeless. Most of them are already convinced, at 16, that if their skin is black, they are going to be failures."

"When we work with them we try to give them hope and a sense of pride," Primas said. He emphasized the importance of recent efforts to give jobs to inner-city youths who had once been considered unemployable.

WHEN THE RIOTS broke out last summer, Primas was working in the juvenile court building. Hundreds of boys were processed there.

"Most of these kids told us that all they really wanted was a chance, but they weren't getting it. A good job is a chance. It means the kid can see a future, a different kind of life."

Someone asked Primas what

the young people in suburbia could actually do to change things in the inner city.

"Well," he answered slowly, "I think it would make a big difference if you just came down to the Fisher Branch Y a few times. Right now there's a lot of fear and hate building up, both in the city and the suburbs. Nothing is going to change overnight."

"But hate is like a cancer --it spreads."

CHARLIE PRIMAS says that one way to fight the spread of hate and fear is understanding. He's inviting the young people of suburbia to come downtown, look around, talk to the kids there and try to understand how they feel and what they want.

Idealism Of Students Impresses Romney

"Gov. George Romney is interested in young people and their ideas," Jack Vandenberg, a press secretary for Gov. Romney, said in a recent interview. To further their voice in the government, Romney has "proposed and supported programs to lower the minimum voting age in our state to 18."

Governor Romney said that both parties supported the

constitutional amendment on the 18-year-old vote, but voters turned it down. Vandenberg said that Romney also urged that 18 through 20-year-old citizens should have the right to serve as delegates to county and state conventions and as challengers at the polls. The recommendation was adopted in 1966 and signed into law.

"American students clearly have plenty of willingness to dissent and plenty to dissent about. I am profoundly impressed by the idealism of today's students," Gov. Romney has said.

Vandenberg said that Romney has referred to himself as a dissenter. At Dartmouth last October he said: "In fact, some of the most significant turning points of my life have resulted from dissent."

While speaking at Dartmouth, Romney gave three suggestions that would help assure greater positive results from student dissent.

"First, I think students should guard against self-indulgence and escapism. Selfishness isn't justified in dissent any more than anywhere else."

"Second, greater emphasis should be placed on learning all the facts that can be absorbed about a problem before diving into it. Alienation is no excuse for not doing one's homework."

"Third, the chosen course should be pursued in a realistic context relevant to the problem it is attempting to influence. The pursuit of an abstract 'perfection' may both harm the cause and deny human nature."

Vandenberg said that Gov. Romney has praised students for the "dynamic undertakings which they have fostered and are now engaged in." He mentioned the Student Education Corps, Peace Corps, Vista, civil rights programs and social work in slums.
