# City Ponders Tax Boost For Street Improvement

Love And Generosity Help Start

American School In Vietnam

The Plymouth City Commission is going to come face to face with one of the most difficult problems it has encountered in years when it meets in study session Monday.

It is the problem of setting up a street improvement program for 1969 and the means of financing it-whether to follow a special assessment formula or go on a pay-as-you-go plan that would call for a tax increase of at least two mills.

It has been some time since any major work was done on the streets. Now, some of them are in poor shape, and the improvements must be made.

The three projects under immediate study will include Linden, Amelia and Evergreen, along with the extension of Farmer Street from Starkweather to Mill St. These proposed improvements have been on the list for some time and the Commission now finds that some of the work is ur-

ACCORDING to the report of City Manager Richard Blodgett, which was given to the Commission for study, the city's share of the cost of the four projects will approximate \$139,068.87, while \$53,014.07 could be raised by the usual special assessment route.

"On the Farmer Street project," the report stated, "we acquisition. Therefore, if the Commission chooses to acquire only the land this year and do the construction next year, we could knock off \$27,000 from the construction costs this

For some time the Commission has been considering a special assessment plan that would call for the payment of \$14 per front foot of residential property and \$17 per front foot of commercial or industrial property.

NOW, ACCORDING to Mayor James Jabara, some thought is being given to levying the special assessment on a percentage basis. The terms of this sort of program will be one of the items studied Monday night.

In his report, the City Manager explained that there are several ways in which the street can be financed. The specially assessed share of\$53,000 could be financed by the sale of special assessment fund bonds and the city's share of \$139,000 could be handled by various

THEN HE dropped the real bomb in the issue when he stated, "it is the manager's recommendation, at this time, that serious considerations be given to the increase in the assessment share and, secondly, that consideration be given to picking up the city's share or that amount over roughly 50% of the project through a two-mill levy,"

The variables will furnish the grist for the major portion of the study at Monday's meeting.

Under the proposed plan North and South Evergreen is to be improved from Ann Arbor Trail to Penniman at a cost of \$47,401.32, of which the city's share will be \$32,845.57. Amelia Street is to be improved from Farmer to West Liberty at a total cost of \$34,550.80. of which the city's share is \$18,132.40. And Linden is to be improved from South Main to McKinley at a total cost of \$54,829.82. Of this amount the city's share will be \$32,790.90.

The remainder of the \$153,000 would be the cost of acquiring and improving the extension of Farmer Street.

## Townhouses Tax Exemption Is Denied

"In my opinion," City Attorney Lowe wrote, 'the Mayflower Townhouses Cooperative can not qualify as a consumer housing cooperative under the act since there is no showing that the State Housing Department authority has determined that it would be qualified under the federal statute and the regulations of the Department Housing and Urban Development as required.

'Therefore, it is my conclusion that the request for tax exemption for the year 1968 must be denied and the property placed on the tax rolls for this taxable year."



"I don't feel it so much during a game. You skate hard and you really get tired out there as you concentrate on the puck," he commented. "It isn't until you get home and realize that you lost again that it gets you. Then you start to wonder and imagine that maybe you've had it.'

"The attitude isn't the same any more," he explained, "not only in hockey, but in everything

"In my playing days and early in my coaching career, we looked upon our opponents as 'enemies' and treated them as such. And every time we went out on the ice, it was a case of do or die.

"That attitude doesn't prevail any more." These gents gave The Stroller something to think about.

#### HOW ABOUT THE ALUMNI?

On another occasion, The Stroller had the pleasure of listening to Adolph Rupp, the winningest basketball coach in history who master-minds the University of Kentucky forces.

"Down our way," he explained, "we teach the boys that the game is free enterprise . . . that you have got to compete with the idea of winning . . . or you'll be lost in the shuffle.

"Oh," he said, "it's nice to deal with mottos of some of the great thinkers and be idealistic about it. But we coaches must think differently.

"You've all heard this one," then he quoted these famous lines -

"And when the one great scorer Comes to write against your name He writes not that you won or lost But how you played the game.'

"Sounds great doesn't it," Rupp emphasized, "but any fellow who teaches that philosophy does not have to face a demanding alumni. Those fellows want a winner. Don't tell them it matters not that you won or lost.'

Here was a coach of the old school - and a very interesting one.

This led to the inevitable question -



# School Town Meeting Should Be Inspiration For Others To Follow

There was something significant about the meeting of the school officials and the taxpayers in the high school last Monday night and it touches the very roots of life in the Plymouth Community.

On the surface, it was an experiment to learn if there was sufficient interest to establish regular dialogue between the body that governs the education of the children and the parents who raise them.

There always has been a certain amount of interest after a rule is adopted or a school building planned. On those occasions the taxpayers, through the various Parent-Teacher groups, make their voices heard. Oftimes in no uncertain terms.

Usually, when such meetings occur, it is evident that the parents do not have all the facts - or that they have made the wrong interpretation of them. As a result, there is considerable animosity express-

It was to bring about a better understanding that last Monday's experimental meeting was held.

The members of the school board and the officials at the top echelon had the courage to stand up and be counted on any issue the taxpayers cared to discuss.

The word "courage" is used advisedly. Not too often are government officials found who will consent to a grilling in public.

But the idea behind the meeting was twofold. First, it was to acquaint the taxpayers and parents with happenings in the school. Better yet, they were acquainted with the reason for their happening.

Second, it was the feeling that with a better informed public the less chance there would be of misunderstandings in the future.

Most important of all, though, was the fact that no holds were barred. Any questions regarding the school system or the administration could be asked. And they were answer-

#### IT HELPS TO FACE THE MUSIC

It was refreshing to note that the officials readily admitted some mistakes in the past and proved their humanism by confessing that they might happen again.

The meeting was a throwback to the old colonial days of our forefathers when town meetings were held on the village green or "commons" as they then were known.

Almost every New England town or city still boasts a "commons," though the town meetings have given way to other forms of government.

In these new forms, government often becomes far removed from the people - so far. in some cases, that the taxpayers no longer maintain interest or question the officials' actions. They shrug off any complaint they

might have with the simple statement, "You can't beat City Hall".

That's why it was so refreshing to learn of the school meeting last week and that the impetus came from school officials. It proved, among other things, that in Plymouth, at least, school government hasn't gotten too far away from the public.

Meetings of this type can do nothing but good for the entire community. There is nothing more important than the education of the rising generation. By the same token, there is nothing more expensive. And when the taxpayers' dollar is being spent, he has the right to know where the dollar is going - and an opportunity to try to stop the flow, if it is in the wrong direction.

A continuation of the sessions will not only bring about a better informed public, but also will help to keep the school officials on the alert at all times.

Some of the biggest problems in the world today resulted from the lack of communication. It was a certain stiffness on one side or the other. The result is no secret. The world is on the edge of chaos.

The same can be said about many city governments. The lack of communication has left them in bad straits, and the public image has been anything but

The Plymouth City Commission has made an effort through the years to develop communication with the taxpayers by setting aside a certain portion of e a c h meeting to hear from the citizens. Too often, no citizen responds.

However, even though the citizen is asked to bring up any subject he wishes, the result has not been too successful.

A leaf could be taken from the school board's book and have an evening set aside occasionally to have dialogue with the people who pay the taxes. Many of our churches are now setting

aside one night each week for dialogue with the pulpit. It still is in the experimental stage. But it should succeed. It would be worth a try by the City Com-

4 bacon slices. Cover broiler pan rack with foil. Oil it. Put bed of assorted sliced vegetables on foil. Lay fish on vegetables.

Put bacon slices on fish, Bake in 425 degree oven for about 20 minutes for a small whole fish and 50 minutes to an hour for a large fish.

When done lift off with spatula or use foil to transport fish to platter. Remove vegetables that fall to platter. Be sure platter is hot. A three to four pound fish will serve six.

The medical industry's fees have been shooting upward since new federal medical programs went into effect. Congress and the administration are taking a hard look at the \$46 million

 Median net income of U.S. physicians rose from 1955's level of \$16,000 to a 1966 level of \$32,000, according to Medical Economics magazine.

ON THE OTHER hand, American Medical Association President Milford O, Rouse says that physicians' fee hikes have been "moderate" considering doctors' burdens.

He also asserted that medical care in the United States is the best in the world.

These claims and counterclaims will be aired extensively during the coming months by two White House commissions Furnishings worthanes- and four Senate committees,

The aim is to try to pinical costs and deteriorating ctile what, if anything, the gov-

ernment can do about it. The question of legislation is an iffy one. Any proposal to establish a fixed-fees national health scheme similar to that in Britain and some other nations would get short shrift in Congress. But the legislators could impose a ceiling on fees paid under the Medicare and Medicaid programs.

They also could take action to improve nutrition and sanitation in the big city ghettos where illness and disease are contributing sharply to the decline in national health standards. Action to combat rural poverty is another possibility.

Medical Economics Magazine estimates that the median fee charged by general practitioners has increased 25 per cent since the new federal programs went into effect. Hospital charges went up comparably.

## Quickie Gun Course Draws Fire In City

The Livonia Police Department packed away its pistols and patted itself on the back last week after holding its first two lightning-quick Gun School classes in the police station basement.

Twenty-five persons attended each two-hour session Monday and Wednesday--sessions police officials described as "completely covering" the gamut of the safe handling of small arms.

AND 200 MORE men and women, some housewives who haven't touched cold metal before, and some army veterans, will flock to police quarters for the upcoming Gun School classes to be held on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings for the next three weeks. Each class will have 25 stu-

Each student must carry a letter confirming his class date. And each student will get just two hours of instruction on one night only--no more, no less.

That's the course. "It's absolutely adequate." according to Chief of Police James M. Jordan, who organized the Gun School on request from Livonia Mayor Harvey W. Moelke.

Jordan says his instructors (including himself) cover: (1) parts of a gun; (2) care of guns and security measures: (3) education of children concerning weapons; (4) handling of guns; (5) manipulation of guns; (6) loading and unloading.

Jordan says his department's lightning course in weaponry accomplishes three main objectives: First, "it helps people overcome their initial fear of a weapon." Second, he says, "it gives them a basic mechanical knowledge of a weapon."

AND THIRDLY, Jordan said proudly, "We have demonstrated to the students the instinct of pointing."

Jordan's theory on the "instinct of pointing" a weapon he himself describes as "developed, patented and sold to kill people--not rabbits" is a feat he feels can be accomplished in a matter of minutes in Gun School classes.

A sergeant major in the United States Army and a veteran instructor in advanced weaponry, begs to differ.

Asked what could be covered in two hours of gun instruction, the expert said: "In two hours, an instructor could just about manage to tell his class what he plans to teach them in the next 53 hours. I would say a person should be able to become proficient in the safe handling of firearms in about 55 hours.

"Safe handling of a weapon alone, is a block of instruction that should cover from four to five hours.



# Interest Slips On Pay Raise For Policemen'

Reaction to Councilman Edward H. McNamara's recommendation that Livonia patrolmen be paid a maximum of \$10,000 a year after four years of service has been "a little negative to neutral," the promoter said.

"I'm not disappointed, but rather surprised," said Mc-Namara, who is seeking reelection to his council seat April 1. "The council hasn't discussed my request that the Civil Service Commission and the city's Bargaining Team begin negotiations to make the raise effective in the 1969 budget, December 1."

Not only is the man in the street indifferent, but McNamara said he had had no word from the Livonia Police Officers' Association, which negotiates the police pay package and, itself, had asked for a \$10,000 maximum plus many improvements in extra benefits.

THE BARGAINING Team now is attempting to reach agreement with the LPOA for the present year, now three months

It has recommended a \$300 raise, similar to that given to other city employes except firemen, that would raise maximum pay for patrolmen to around \$8,500 a year. McNamara would add another \$1,500 based on experience. Firemen, now negotiating, want 10 per cent.

Where McNamara says the raise would cost about \$150,000 a year, Mayor Harvey W. Moelke fixes the figure at around \$200,000. McNamara says the money will be available from \$61,000."

the city's share of state income tax, which Moelke says already

is absorbed in the budget. The mayor's worries suggest that the raise for police would result in demands for higher salaries and wages for all city employes at a time when the city budget is facing a deficit. He said a property tax increase might be required, but that raising the money would be a coun-

cil responsibility. McNamara contends he is looking ahead to needs for competent police, and recommended the \$10,000 as an attraction for college-trained men.

"I don't blame Mayor Moelke for being concerned over costs," McNamara said, "The income tax money will be available, but Moelke can see probably 400 other places to use it. I'm just concerned over attracting high calibre and well educated men to the ranks, because they become the police administrators, except for the civilian commissioner."

McNAMARA said that Livonia's police should be "second to none," and that if Detroit raises salary, as recommended, to the \$10,000 level, so should Livonia. Moelke contends Detroit dangers entitle metropolitan police to 15 per cent more pay than suburban police."

Mayor Moelke produced figures showing that this fiscal year will see the cost of operating the police department "without regard to any current year wage adjustment, bringing an excess expenditure of

Voters, to provide a top police force, provided an extra mill of taxation.

"The first year of additional police millage resulted in a surplus of about \$55,000 due principally to time necessary



# A Bull Session With Robben Fleming

The U. of M.'s new president is a professional argument-settler who faces problems of controlling growth

Whenever the University of Michigan has been in the national news in recent years, it has usually been because of some kind of fight — student sit-ins, flamboyant editorials in The Daily, disagreements with the state over money and autonomy.

And so there was a certain logic — as well as a certain wry humor — when the Board of Regents last year appointed a professional labor arbitrator, a man used to bringing agreement out of conflict, as the new president.

Robben W. Fleming, 52, will be inaugurated Monday. He has already been in Ann Arbor for some months, learning the ropes from the retiring Harlan H. Hatcher and actually taking office on Jan. 1.

And he has already made one extremely important decision — the hiring of Dr. Arthur M. Ross as executive vice president effective July 1.

Ross, also an arbitrator and currently U.S. commissioner of labor statistics, has a reputation as a sort of McNamara, a computer-minded planner. Ross' jobs will be the university's long-range planning (like Topsy, it has tended to "just grow") and its relations with the newly-important State Board of Education.

A native of Paw Paw, Ill., President Fleming earned his B.A. degree from Beloit (Wis) College in 1938 and his law degree from the University of Wisconsin in 1941. After a year with the Securities and Exchange Commission, he spent four years in the Army.

He was in industrial relations posts at the universities of Wisconsin and Illinois from 1947 until 1964, when he returned to Wisconsin as chancellor. That gave him administrative experience.

There's a tradition that a university president have some scholarly competence in his field. Fleming points out that he has written several books and articles on labor law and industrial relations. The United Auto Workers union knows him as a member of its Public Review Board.

He dresses with an academic lack of style. He's neither boisterous nor shy. He knows enough not to talk too much, but he's not afraid to speak on the record.— as we found out when we talked with him for an hour in his office one day.

Q. You have a background as a labor arbitrator; your new vice president, Dr. Arthur Ross, has been a labor arbitrator; and the dean of the liberal arts school, Dr. William Haber, has also been a labor arbi-

trator. Why is this?

FLEMING: "I think the reason you find a number of people with backgrounds like mine in university administrations is that we are in a period in history with a great deal of — well — group tensions. People with backgrounds like mine are used to dealing with

"I've never thought it had much to do with one's knowledge of labor-management relations. I think you find the same kind of background in people who deal with international disputes... Arthur Goldberg, of course, is one who has transferred his skills from the labor area to the international area.

"It's going to be difficult to protect our rank, but I have no doubt it's going to remain one of the very great universities in the world."

workers union and is now ambassador to the U.N.)

"You've got Ed Young, who's president of the University of Maine; Jack McConnell, who's president of the University of New Hampshire; Clark Kerr, who was president of the University of California; George Schultz, who's dean of the business school at the University of Chicago."

Q. Can you characterize the administration of Dr. Hatcher? Not in the sense that he was president a certain number of years and enrollments increased by X number of students, the budget by Y dollars and research funds by Z. Can you characterize the direction of the university the past 16 years?

FLEMING: "That's not an easy question for me to answer, because I was not intimately familiar with the University of Michigan during these years. I knew it as a colleague from one university watching the other university, so I can give you some ideas.

"I would say the great accomplishment was the expansion that was necessary as a result of the greatly increased demand for higher education, and the retention of quality during that expansion.

"And I don't have any doubt that history will record that Dr. Hatcher's great decision was to acquire the North Campus. And I think there was the attention he gave the arts, and in particular the theater

"To go beyond those things requires a little deeper knowledge than I have . . ."

Q. This leads us to the key question: Where will the university head in the future? To start with, your total enrollment is...

FLEMING: "36,000, if you're counting

Q. And what percentage of that is undergraduate?

Q. Well, is there any maximum size this university can and should attain? Will it expand indefinitely? Is there any optimum point at which you lose the efficiencies of size and wind up with a number of isolated colleges—as you indeed have now with the North Campus?

FLEMING: "These questions, of course, are always relative.

"If you'd asked at the time I was going to the University of Wisconsin (law school, 1938-41), which at that time was 10,000, and it's now a little bigger than we are, if you'd asked people how big that university could grow, they would have said, 'Certainly not more than 20,000.'

"Here we are over 30,000, and people are asking, 'Can you handle 40,000?'

"The reason I say it's a relative question: Suppose we reach 40,000. How big you can grow is partly a function of how people happen to think. If you just look at cities, now, the way they've grown, the people that once said you couldn't have cities of a certain size — population grows, and you don't stop the population.

"I think everybody believes there's some point beyond which you can't accommodate more people.

"Look at Ann Arbor, for instance.

"Surely there is a physical limit on how many people you can accommodate. That raises the question: Will the University of Michigan someday be like the University of California in the sense that we have campuses in Dearborn and Flint.

"Conceivably you could start to expand at those campuses. Conceivably you could accept applications at the University of Michigan as California does — 'you can state a preference of whether you want to go to Flint, Dearborn or Ann Arbor, but we can't necessarily honor that preference.'

"That breaks you down into the sub-question of where and what kind of growth are you talking about with respect to the various colleges — engineering, medical, law, liberal arts and so forth."

Q. Does the Board of Regents or administration have any figure in mind?

FLEMING: "Not really. I understand in the past there has been some talk of 40,000.
"One reason I made the appointment of

"One reason I made the appointment of Arthur Ross was that I think we have to put together a more comprehensive plan than we have ever had. I'm assuming that will be a major development in the next year or two."

Q. What would a comprehensive plan cover?

FLEMING: "It covers everything.

"It covers your academic planning — where you think you're going in the various colleges, what you think the growth factor will be, what you think the new disciplines will be that grow out of changes in knowledge.

"What consolidations you think there may be, what programs you have that you think will phase out, what new colleges if any there will be . . .

"What physical growth you'll have in terms of buildings, where you'll have it, what kinds of buildings you'll have, will you be going increasingly high rise..."

"How will you take care of the demand for recreational facilities, will you build increased residence halls, and if so will they be dormitories, will they be apartments."

"How many graduate students will you have versus how many undergraduates, how many are going to be married

"What kinds of electronic techniques are there going to be, will they save you money or only cost you more money and increase the quality of the product . . .?

"All the problems you can think of on both the physical and academic side."

Q. Perhaps we should ask you that question one year from now rather than today.


FLEMING: "Well, one year from now, I will be in a better position to answer it, I think."

Q. We're interested in the question you raised about academic disciplines — what new ones there might be, which way will the university go, what will they phase out? And where will the University of Michigan NOT go? Will it be all things to all people, or will there be some areas of specialization?

FLEMING: "It's true that we're very, very broad, but there are also areas of specialization.

"For instance, most of the big universities today have decided that in the international sphere, they'll concentrate on certain

## Biology Majors Go To Teaching

getting pretty mixed up for Kalamazoo College biology stu-

In fact, from now on, the typical biology major must do

The reason for deliberately blurring the line between learning and teaching is the belief. that the student who learnsand-teaches learns more and better.

"You almost have to," said one student, "You find yourself working harder when you have to answer questions."

The formula for this new undertaking, required of all upper-class biology majors as of this spring, can be summed up simply: pull together into a course what most Kalamazoo biology seniors do anyway-individual research, seminartype classroom work, and teaching in the lab with some help from mechanical tutors.

One other thing: the lab teacher gets paid for his 10-hoursa-week assignment.

Up to now, lab teaching has never been a part of any formal required course work, although, for various reasons, 80 to 90 per cent of the biology majors have traditionally worked in

Learning and teaching are the lab before their graduation. Thus, the new requirement to teach-perhaps exceptional in undergraduate education generally--is based on many years

Center for Adult Education.

It is hard to measure exactly how valuable the experience is, but many personal reports provide important clues. Dr. Samuel Townsend, chairman of the biology department who graduated from Kalamazoo in 1957. is an example. He recalled that, then as now, it was commonplace for the biology majors to teach in the lab and that the experience helped him in graduate school as much as did his classroom work at Kalamazoo.

Those biology students who have more recently served as lab teachers agreed that the experience has proved of great value to their own education. It was a good way to review what they had already studied; it led to questions they had not thought of before; it gave them new insights into teaching and a closer association with the professors-these and other specific advantages were cited.







> 2. Bleeding makes for unattractive results. This staining of the paint--over knots or sappy places in wood by resins and gums drawn to the surface by heat--can be prevented by removing all the paint in the area, then sealing in the gums with a coat of pure shellac, special knot sealer or varnish. Apply primer then continue with the normal painting procedure.

3. Stickiness is caused by excess oil or the wrong type of oil in the paint. Sticky paint can sometimes be hardened by wiping it with turpentine. But placed is all that's necessary. if this method fails, you're In other cases, the solution is stuck--the only thing left to do is to remove the defective paint and start over.

> 4. Early chalking -- or loss of gloss -- in small areas is another painting blunder that shouldn't be glossed over. It's caused by the absorption of oil from the top coat of paint by the wood beneath. It is apt to occur sooner if the wood or masonry surface has been given an insufficient paint coating. The problem can be remedied by applying an additional coat of paint. When doing this, don't thin the paint--often a cause of chalking in the first place.

5. Blistering frequently results when there's moisture in

There are several major a wood surface you're painting. When drawn to the outer surface, it breaks the paint bond, stretching and swelling the film. Using a latex paint which is blister-resistant is one good way not to be a painter who's

> 6. Peeling may occur without blistering, but often results from the same causes. A greasy or oily surface, a previously painted surface that's in poor condition, or a weight has loosened the prime coat are also major causes of peeling.

7. Mildew occurs under damp conditions, whether indoors or out, and develops on your new paint job in the form of a rusty or sooty deposit. The resistance of ready-mixed paints to mildew can be improved by adding a fungicide, available at paint or hardware stores in a special form for mixing with paint.

8. Laps and brush marks

On a porous surface, "brush in" paint with short strokes then smooth it out with longer ones. On a flat surface, use light, long strokes, gradually lifting the brush at the end of each stroke.





JUST FOR OPENERS

Two weeks ago I received a call from one of Farmington's senior citizens. This charming lady, whose name wasn't offered, asked me to recommend a champagne for a modest price and one that would please a group of ladies.

Her questions answered, I asked a couple myself regarding her experience with opening champagne bottles. Her understandable lack of experience in this department and enthusiasm for the correct method prompted me to save this colmun...just for openers.

Champagne is a naturally carbonated wine which achieves its bubbly state through a second fermentation. Saving the champagne process for another time, let it suffice to say that CO-2 becomes entrapped in the wine and builds a tremendous pressure on the internal walls of the bottles and bottom faces of the corks used to seal the bottles, up to 96 pounds per square inch or about eight atmospheres.

YOU CAN READILY see why champagne corks need little prodding for their rapid removal. Consequently these corks are wired down by means of a wire 'hood" placed over the inserted cork and fastened securely by twisting the ends together beneath the "bulge" on the bottleneck.

Champagne leaves the winery in a gayly packaged state, often wrapped in tissue and always attractively labeled and decorated with bright and colorful foils on the top and neck. Careful opening will preserve much of the original appearance so your guests will readily discover the brand you chose. You will not need to present your wine wrapped entirely in anapkin as was the custom during prohibition when one never knew what was being served.

Sparkling wines are all opened in the same manner and I suggest you respect the potential danger offered by careless guidance of exploding corks, I have seen eye glasses broken. noses upturned, and chandeliers shattered...all by champagne corks improperly removed.

STEP ONE: Chill the wine with ice and water in a deep container or bucket for fifteen minutes. This makes the wine ready to serve when opened and also reduces the amount of CO-2 that will want to escape, as CO-2 dissolves in cold wine. As the temperature increases the greater the explosive quality becomes as in warm beer or

The worm should have a hollow center large enough for a paper match to be inserted within, the length of the worm should be two or 2 1/4 inches in length to penetrate fully the longest corks, the outside diameter of the worm must be just under 3/8 inches (according to a study by Almaden vineyards as reported in the Wall be something. This does not Street Journal), the outer edge of the worm should be round, not sharp, so that the cork will not be cut as the worm penetrates and lastly, the point should be a continuation of the worm's spiral.

Various levers, wings, handles and contraptions are attached to this perfect worm so that it resembles a cork puller. The T-shaped puller, found in party stores, conforms to the above standards but I personally find it inconvenient and awkward to place a bottle of wine between the knees so that the T-puller can be used propno condensation, so that erly, as no other leverage you won't drop the bottle as mechanism exists on same.

STEP ONE: Cut and remove the lead foil "capsule", covering the cork, just below the bulge. Wipe away the mold, dirt and moisture accumulated on the cork and top.

STEP TWO: Begin insertion of the worm or auger by placing the tip on or about the center of the cork and twist the instrument into the cork using sufficient pressure to allow penetration without punching the cork into the bottle. When the spiral is completely through the cork or when no. more spiral shows ... stop.

STEP THREE: Using the "wing-type", pull the wings down (they automatically raised themselves as the spiral penetrated the cork) with a slow. even pressure being careful to observe the very center of the cork. The cork should break away from the bottle, making a little "crack" sound, however, if the center of the cork begins to pull out before the cork breaks away from the bottle then you must turn the spiral in further...then proceed.

STEP FOUR: Once the cork is out, wipe the lip and inside of the bottle neck with a clean napkin and serve the wine.

Should you pull the center out of the cork or break the cork in half (caused by not inserting the spiral through the cork entirely) then use a T-shape puller with a hollow spiral and carefully and at an angle, if need be, penetrate the remaining cork that is intact and draw the cork out slowly. I am currently experiment-

areas of the world; they will not try to cover all parts of the world.

"Here, we have a center on the problems of the Middle East. But at Wisconsin, they'd decided they would pretty well eliminate that.

"You get quite different emphases in different universities on, let's say, the life sciences...

"The interesting thing at Michigan — I suppose, the interesting thing at all colleges today in the biological sciences area — is that many of the old disciplines are now crossing over so much that traditional departments — biology, biochemistry, genetics, zoology — there's so much crossing over of lines that traditional departments don't look much like they did.

"It's true among the psychologists, for instance. They tend these days to be split in various directions, and you may very well be breaking and forming new constellations in the future."

Q. What's the status of the Residential

College that the university was working on?
The last bit of information was that it was quartered in East Quadrangle . . .

FLEMING: "The original plan was to

FLEMING: "The original plan was to construct a residential college over on the North Campus.

"Neither the legislative funds nor the private funds which we had hoped to attract proved to be available.

"Therefore, we started it in East Quad. That has proven to be quite satisfactory. As a matter of fact, the students rather like the idea of being close to the main campus.

"We're making some more conversions of space this next year, and we'll go into the second year in East Quad.

"And the internal difficulty is this. It's clearly more expensive on a per student basis than the balance of the liberal arts college. And that raises the question of how much of your resources can you fairly allocate to a relatively small group of students compared to the others?

"Because, if it's going to be considerably more costly — and it is, there's no doubt about it — then is it fair to other students to allocate a disproportionate share to the Residential College?"

"It's rather interesting, you know, that we thought that would be a rather attractive concept to donors during the 55 M campaign (the 1966-68 sesquicentennial campaign of the alumni to raise \$55 million in capital funds).

"And it did not attract significant gifts.

"That throws us back on the Legislature, and the Legislature is very money-conscious."

Q. The University of Michigan has a national — even international — reputation as one of the stellar institutions of higher learning. Yet a number of other schools across the country, with the help of federal money, are seeking a place in the limelight.

Can the University of Michigan hold its same exalted rank in the future with stiffer competition?

FLEMING: "Well, I have no doubt it's going to remain one of the very great universities in the world

"It is going to be difficult to protect that rank.

"It's going to be difficult for a lot of reasons — competition for the state tax dollar is getting rougher all the time; there's an ever increasing demand for higher education; some will be siphoned off by the other four-year colleges and the community colleges;

"Our great competence, increasingly, is in the upper levels. Also, our admissions standards are such that it's not every Michigan youngster that can come to the University of Michigan, on academic grounds. So the competition's going to be much rougher.

"On the other hand, I have a feeling that the people of Michigan realize that this is a very distinguished university, and they want it to remain that way.

"Now, it cannot remain that way unless they're prepared to support it.
"I think that in the showdown, they really

"I think it's clear also in the years ahead there's going to be increased money put into the universities. There is a great national stake in maintaining the universities. You cannot build every university in the country with the prestige of and capacity of the Harvards, the Berkeleys, the Michigans, the Wisconsins and places like that.
