FARMINGTON — Negotiating teams of the Board of Education and Farmington Education Association were still far apart on the issue of teachers' salaries after their latest bargaining session on a 1968-69 contract Thursday. Robert Newhouse, president-elect of the F.E.A., said most non-economic issues had been settled, however.

FARMINGTON — The Farmington Area YMCA has requested rezoning of a 12-acre parcel of land in the 12 Mile-Farmington Rd. area to allow for the construction of a permanent branch building. No specific date has been set for the kickoff of the Y's Capital Funds Drive, however. The purchase offer on the land was made subject to the necessary rezoning being approved.

LIVONIA — High winds which swept the suburbs during Tuesday night's electrical storm brought down two walls of a building under construction at 11873 Market. Two hundred and forty feet of newly laid concrete block tumbled shortly after 5:30 p.m. The structure is being built for small industry by Morris Friedman, who said none of his workmen were on the site at the time the wind struck.

LIVONIA — The City Council again brushed off Mayor Harvey W. Moelke's request for \$40,000 worth of anti-riot equipment, this time by referring it to the "first study session when all seven members are present." Summer vacations indicate that won't be soon. Council also "received and filed" the mayor's request for action of the "Stop and Frisk" ordinance that was given a nod of approval by a Supreme Court ruling that a policeman can stop and frisk a suspect who might harm him.

REDFORD — Five persons have indicated an interest in two Township Board trustee posts that will be open to election this fall. First to file was Joseph Chaps, a Democrat. Incumbents Robert Anderson and Rhys Lewis, Republicans, intend to seek re-election. Other Democrats eyeing office are Roger Handy and Nathaniel Banks.

REDFORD — The supervisor's proposed township budget is \$343,000 greater this year than last.

Playing Cat And Mouse With Budget

The city officials still are playing "cat and mouse" with the 1968-69 budget and it is now back in the city manager's lap.

For more than three months they have been passing it back and forth and still are not agreed on the figures with the start of the new fiscal year only a few weeks away.

In his original presentation City Manager Richard Blodgett offered a budget calling for expenditures of \$2,085,000 and a 1.89 mill raise in taxes.

Following a series of study meetings — behind closed doors — the commission cut only \$82,000 from the proposal that still left it over the \$2 million

mark and an all-time high for the city.

Then, on the night the budget was on the agenda for final study and passage, it was tossed around again.

Commissioner Arch Vallier refused to approve a budget that called for a tax increase and he insisted that the rate be the same as the present year with a drastic cut in expenditures.

Failing to get sufficient support for his plan, Commissioner Vallier joined with Commissioner James McKeon in

a move to raise the tax only one mill and take the rest of the money needed to balance the budget out of the several

accounts.

At the time they claimed this could be done easily and they would find a way to balance

figu.

The entire debate centered on approximately \$95,000. The one mill increase, it was fig-

ured would furnish about \$51,000 of this amount, leaving the remainder to be cut from the various accounts.

Now, instead of the commission making the cuts as was intended at the meeting when the one mill increase was approved, it has passed the entire problem back into Blodgett's hands.

"Frankly," he said, "I am a bit concerned as I thought, too, that the commission was going to do the final cutting."

"The only solution I see at the moment is to forego the construction of the extension of Farmer Street. That would save about \$27,000. I can see another \$3,000 in minor ac-

counts. But that still leaves it out of balance by at least \$15,000.

The city manager indicated that the necessary funds could be taken from the contingency funds, but that would be cutting things rather close. He also hinted that some services would have to be cut.

"Even after I make some of the cuts," Blodgett pointed out, "the commission approved them."

And so the matter is being banded back and forth as the new fiscal year approaches.

Failure to adopt a budget by July 1 would cause no end of confusion as there would be no legal right to spend money.



City Police And Firemen Reach Impasse On Wages

After three months of negotiations the City of Plymouth and the members of the police and fire departments have reached an impasse with little hope of an early settlement on a new wage scale.

Over a period eight meetings have been held, the last Wednesday morning, and the two groups are still far apart. "We have asked for a 14 per cent increase," Carl Berry, President of the Plymouth

Police and Firemen's Association, explained, "and the best the City will offer is seven and one half per cent."

STRIPPED OF all details the demand is for a raise of \$1096

that will boost the salary to \$9,000 a year, and the City has stood firm on a straight \$600 increase across the board, which would bring the annual wage to \$8,502.

"So far," City Manager Rich-

ard Blodgett, head of the City's negotiating team, pointed out "we have made the concessions. We started by offering a three per cent raise and that now has been boosted to seven and one half per cent. We can't

go any higher." According to Berry, the police and firemen have dropped most of their fringe benefits demands and now are asking for only two.

The benefits call for time and one half for overtime for the firemen and the same for command officers doing stand-by duty at home where they are on call for any emergency.

"We think these are only fair," Berry emphasized, "and under the conditions we point out the men are entitled to consideration."

BERRY FURTHER pointed out that the City's offer of \$8,502 was below any other area in the immediate vicinity with exception of Plymouth Township, where a wage package of \$8000 annually was accepted.

"The Township always has been about \$1,000 behind us for some reason," Berry explained, "but this no longer would be so if we accepted the present offer."

According to Berry, Northville has just approved an \$8700 package, while Livonia settled at \$9,600, Redford \$9,100 and the City of Detroit \$10,300 over a two-year period.

Asked what would happen if the City held to its offer, Berry answered, "We will have to take our case to the people. And that's what we will do."

BLODGETT WAS non-committal on the next move. "Gene Silder, the City Clerk, and I have gone as far as we can."

"I understand the police and firemen are going to take their case to the Commission before any other move is made."

"Under the law they can't strike, and, frankly, I don't know at the moment just what the outcome will be."

Working with Berry on the negotiating team were Police Sergeant Henry Berghoff and Fire Lieut. Paul Sanders.

When the impasse was reached Wednesday, no future meetings were set.

All Citizens To Get Open Housing Code

To help celebrate the Martin Luther King and Afro-American Freedom March Day which has been set by Gov. Romney on Sunday, June 23, the Plymouth Human Relations Committee plans to distribute a copy of the Plymouth Open Housing ordinance to every household in the area.

"The day was approved by resolution of the State Legislature," Dr. Donald Davies, Plymouth Human Relations chairman stated, "and we thought it would be a fine time to acquaint all of the people with the facts contained in the ordinance."

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Liquor Code Tabled By Township Board

The possibility of Plymouth Township adopting a liquor control ordinance was tabled by the Board of Trustees Tuesday until more information could be obtained.

The State Liquor Control Commission provided an ordin-

ance written expressly for townships but the board was hesitant to adopt it without more details.

In essence, the commission's ordinance states that the township will appoint liquor control inspectors who are to make monthly reports and handle any complaints about an establishment.

The inspectors are to report either to the Board of Trustees or the commission which will in turn enforce the violation.

With the adoption of such an ordinance the township will receive a rebate on liquor licenses granted within its confines.

What the board was questioning was the matter of how the township would benefit from the adoption of the ordinance.

This stems from the fact that the liquor commission requested that the township use this rebate almost entirely for cost of its enforcement of the liquor laws.

Township Approves \$100,000 Sewer Program

Plymouth Township soon will spend \$100,000 for construction of sanitary and storm sewer projects in five locations.

The Board of Trustees agreed to pay the Wayne County Drain Commission \$10,000—at the commission's request—as part of the County's cost for construction of a storm sewer facility.

Added to this the township will soon construct \$90,000 worth of sanitary sewers in four locations.

The commission asked that the township pay the money and the board quickly agreed on

the theory that the township couldn't build the proposed facility for that price.

The storm sewer is proposed to run along Joy Rd. from Haggerty Rd. to General Dr.

TOWNSHIP TREASURER Elizabeth Holmes abstained from voting explaining she owned some property along the route of the sewer.

The board also authorized Herald Hamill, township engineer, to advertise for construction bids as soon as possible on its own project.

The first leg will be 800 feet of 24 inch pipe at an estimated cost of \$20,000.

This leg will begin at the Byron Trunk which is approximately on the northwest corner of Sheldon and Ann Arbor Rd. The City of Plymouth stopped its line on the east side of Sheldon and the township proposes to hook onto that line and continue west.

The second leg will begin from Hammill Ave. and run north to Bradner Rd. approximately 995 feet of 12 inch pipe, plus another 811 feet of six inch pipe for a total cost of

\$30,363.

THE THIRD section of sanitary sewer will be laid beginning from Garland Ave. and Hammill Ave. north. This leg will cost about \$19,057 and will be 585 feet of 12 inch pipe and another 554 feet of six inch.

The last section will again start from the Hammill Ave.-Bradner Rd. section and will run north and south. This cost is estimated at \$20,112 and will consist of 720 feet of 12 inch with an additional 264 feet of six inch.

Wide Open Race Seen In Battle For District Judge

From all indications, there will be a wide open race for the district judgeship in the Plymouth area after Gov. Romney signs the bill for court reorganization.

Under the new plan, the cities of Plymouth and Northville, along with Plymouth, Northville and Canton townships will be grouped in a third class district with one judge.

This will eliminate the municipal judges and the justices of

the peace and replace them with a single judge.

Thus far, Dunbar Davis, the City of Plymouth municipal judge, and James E. McCarthy, Plymouth Township justice of

the peace and Robert Greenstein of Canton have signified their intention of running. But the others—Alton Shirley, of Canton, and Philip Ogilvie of Northville—have been non-

committal.

Greenstein, who was appointed justice of the peace only last month, said he "believes the new system is a tremendous help to the area."

It's an improvement to the old system and I want to be part of it."

"I haven't thought much about it," Justice Shirley answered when asked about his candidacy.

Meanwhile, both Plymouth candidates are proceeding with plans for a campaign.

Under the new law for a third class district, the district judge will sit only in the cities of Northville and Plymouth, inasmuch as the townships do not qualify, population wise, for a court site.

"It's going to be a lot of fun," McCarthy said, "because there will have to be a lot of re-shuffling that will be both bothersome

and expensive.

"Under the law each political subdivision in which the court sits must supply a clerk and a magistrate—and this runs into money."

"Not only that," he continued, "the judges' salary will be a debatable matter, too. The state has set a salary of \$18,000 but granted permission for any locality to augment this amount not to exceed \$27,000."

"You can bet there'll be a move to make the salary uniform in all areas—and this will be an added expense."

According to McCarthy the field of candidates should grow and that too, will add to the fun.

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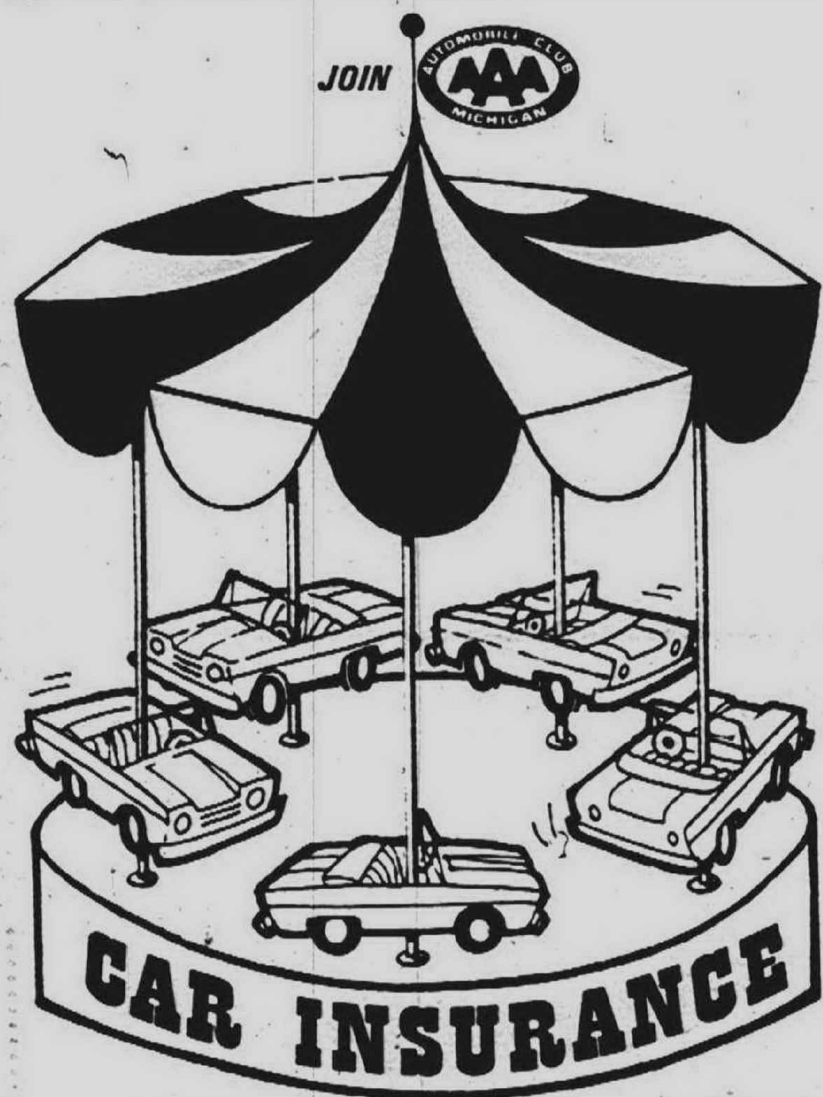
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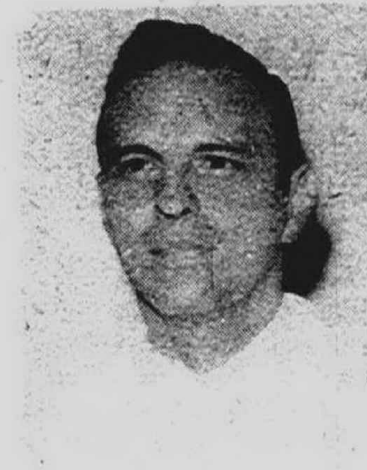
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The Stroller...



It isn't often that a fellow gets a chance to sit and chat at lunch with the director of the Michigan State Police.

But The Stroller had the opportunity the other day when he was invited to introduce Col. Fredrick Davids at the monthly meeting of the Plymouth Businessmen's Forum, and for the better part of an hour we turned back the pages of history for more than 30 years and enjoyed a couple hearty laughs.

"You know," the police boss recalled, "if I hadn't been so stubborn when you first met me, I wouldn't be sitting with you now as the commissioner of police."

With that he unfolded one of the strange tales of the queer twists a fellow's life can take at times.

"When I first met you," he said to The Stroller, "you were a sports writer and a good friend of 'Sleepy' Jim Crowley, football coach at Michigan State, and Oscar Olander, who then was the police commissioner."

"What you possibly didn't know was that Commissioner Olander was a great football fan and spent his spare time scouting new talent for Michigan State."

Fine, but what did that have to do with his own stubbornness?

Commissioner Davids chuckled and recalled that he had been a better than average football player at Midland, but that he had an urge to become a member of the Michigan State Police.

"You know, it was civil service and looked like a good thing," he explained, "so I had a friend write a letter to Commissioner Olander in my behalf."

BALKED AT FOOTBALL FUTURE

"When I got to East Lansing," Col. Davids went on, "and Olander got his first look at me, he called Crowley, who will be remembered as one of the 'Four Horsemen of Notre Dame,' who was doing a great job with the Spartans."

"He told Jim he had a good prospect for the team and then tried to talk me out of a possible job with the state police to play college football."

"This is where I became stubborn. I had made up my mind to be a member of the State Police—if I could make it—and I wasn't about to be talked out of it."

"I balked at the thought of football and stuck to my guns. Commissioner Olander finally saw things my way and I became a member of the police. Now here I am as the state commissioner."

"If I hadn't been so stubborn, I might have become a football star and there's no telling where I would be now."

Col. Davids chuckled at the recollection of those days more than 30 years ago, when the combination of "Sleepy" Jim Crowley and Oscar Olander, the State Police Commissioner, were the football giants at Michigan State.

REASON FOR ANOTHER LAUGH

"You might get a laugh out of this, too," he said. "My wife knew before I did that I was going to be appointed to the office of Commissioner."

According to the colonel, he was listed with a group of about a dozen and a half prospective candidates several years ago and invited to Lansing for an interview. Later, the group was reduced to about four and he was interviewed again.

"The third time I was called," he said, "I was told to bring my wife with me. When we got to Lansing, I was to be interviewed by the governor."

"When we reached Gov. Romney's office," he confided, "the governor spoke to me a few minutes and then called my wife up to his end of the table while I moved down and spoke to some other folks who had entered."

"It was then that Gov. Romney told her that I was going to be appointed to the vacant position. And she, in turn, told me."

"How do you like that?" he smiled. "I get appointed to the top job in the state—and I learn it from my wife."

"And she gets a great kick out of telling everybody that the governor told her before he told me."

These are some of the choice bits of conversation you often hear at the most unexpected moments over a bit of lunch or a cup of coffee.

Aside from being an outstanding ophthalmologist, my good friend "Doc" Salan is an ardent fisherman who returns from his trips into the wilds with more fish stories than fish.

Plymouth Taxpayers Saw Their Duty In School Election - And They Did It

A few years ago, a young war hero who had just received a decoration commented, "I saw my duty and did it."

The same can be said of the voters in the Plymouth Community School District who went to the polls last Monday and approved, of all things, a raise in taxes and an \$11 million bond issue.

In very, simple terms, they "saw their duty and did it."

In voting favorably for the two issues and retaining the three incumbent board members, the voters did far more than guarantee that education in the community would continue to be of high quality. They also put the entire Plymouth area in the forefront of growing, progressive areas.

True, the students for years will profit by the voters' action, but the benefit may spread far beyond our imagination.

THERE IS NO TELLING what the future holds, but it is not too much to imagine that the area will be looked upon with considerable favor by some of our larger industries and big business as a logical place to settle.

It is no secret that when one of our major industries goes on the hunt for new locations in their expansion programs, one of the first questions asked is, "What kind of a school system do they have?"

If the system is only ordinary, more often than not the location is passed over for one where the educational program would be beneficial to the families of their employees.

This is an important phase of life today. We are in the midst of a spiraling economy, and there is no telling how high it will go before the bubble bursts. In the meantime,

every effort is being used to increase the tax base in any community as a means of making the burden lighter on the home owner.

The Plymouth Community is one of the rapidly growing areas and one of the greatest needs is a broader tax base.

This is especially true now that the City of Plymouth has approved a one-mill increase and the school increase will amount to 4.2 mills. This means that taxes will be up at

least 5.2 mills this year.

Not too many such raises can be absorbed. That's why some means will have to be found to broaden the base by inducing industry and big business to locate here.

THE DAYS OF THE QUIET little community of Plymouth are limited—and the great change will take place within the next half-dozen years.

We know the needs. We recognize the problem. We see the job ahead.

That's why the voters should be complimented for their action last Monday. Sure, it meant a raise in taxes at a time everything is on the upsurge.

But there, too, was an obligation to meet. First, the children who were brought into the world could not be denied the best education possible. But measures had to be taken to improve the image of the community and make it more attractive for those who can help tremendously.

The voters met the obligation nobly.

The complacency shown in the weeks before election was not indifference or opposition. It now turns out the quiet attitude of the voters was one of determination—of doing a job that should be done.

Wise people always attempt to avoid a crisis.

It is just possible that the taxpayers looked at the package the school offered and then asked themselves, "What is the alternative?"

A negative vote would have been costly. Not only are construction costs rising, but all other facets of life are soaring.

So, to have hesitated now would have been a heavier financial burden in the future.

The voters saw this—and did the intelligent thing.

They are to be complimented.

Congressman Esch Reports

New Credit Law Is Victory For Consumer

The long battle to outlaw certain lending and credit deceptions ended recently with the signing into law of the Consumer Credit Protection Act. While this new law is a compromise and contains some questionable portions, over-all it represents a major victory for the consumer and in particular for the poor who have been the major victims of finance frauds.

Some of the new law is similar to legislation I introduced last year to combat organized crime.

The bill is aimed at those

few businesses in the nation who employ financial fraud and deception on the unsuspecting. Its target is not the majority of honest and hardworking American businesses and hopefully its regulations will not hamper their legitimate operations.

PASSING BOTH houses with overwhelming bipartisan majorities, the measure contains new regulations in six major areas -- truth-in-lending, revolving credit, credit advertising, mortgages, garnishment,

and loan sharking. The much publicized truth-in-lending portion of the bill deals with the disclosure of interest rates. Beginning July 1, 1969 lenders will be required to disclose to borrowers the amount of finance charges both in dollars and in terms of an annual percentage rate. This particular provision is expected to go a long way towards informing consumers of exactly how much it will cost them to borrow money or to buy items on time accounts.

Requiring the disclosure of actual costs and rates to per-

sons who buy on revolving credit accounts, popular with many department stores, raised a great deal of controversy in Congress. The final version of the bill requires operators of such accounts to disclose three types of interest rates -- the monthly rate, the nominal annual rate, and the effective annual rate on the store's revolving account business.

Under another provision of the bill any establishment which advertises its credit arrangements must do so in a way that will be meaningful. Advertisers are also required to meet the claims made in their ads. Fraudulent practices found

in second mortgage transactions were the target of another provision. Henceforth salesmen who advocate second home mortgages to finance home improvements and various products will be required to state clearly the nature of all transactions involved. Further the consumer will be able to cancel a contract for up to three days after signature. Hopefully this section will help eliminate the problem of homeowners who have found themselves unable to meet second mortgage payments sold by fast talking salesmen.

This mortgage section and another on loan sharking were part of a Republican effort to

include portions of our war against organized crime in the final bill. Loan sharking involves the use or threat of violence to collect on credit transactions. The new act makes loan sharking a federal offense and should give law enforcement officials a new tool toward eliminating this deplorable practice.

When we talk about the problem of the poor and the undereducated we cannot ignore the situations they are confronted with daily by those few who use poverty conditions for personal financial gain. The Consumer Credit Protection Act should mark the beginning of the end of consumer finance frauds.

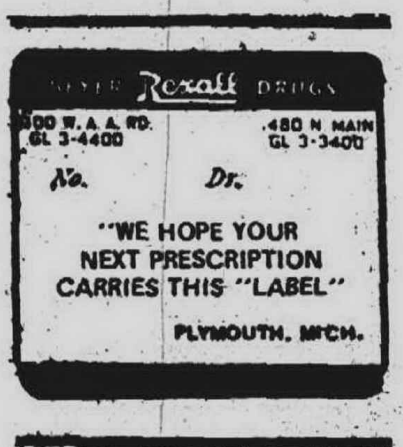

ORDINANCE NO. 4

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 5 OF ORDINANCE NO. 3, ADOPTED BY THE COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH MUNICIPAL BUILDING AUTHORITY ON JANUARY 11, 1968, ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ACQUISITION AND CONSTRUCTION BY THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH MUNICIPAL BUILDING AUTHORITY OF TWO PARKING LOTS FOR THE USE OF THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH; PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF REVENUE BONDS TO DEFRAY THE COST THEREOF; AND PROVIDING FOR OTHER MATTERS RELATIVE TO SAID PARKING LOTS AND THE SAID BONDS."

PREAMBLE

WHEREAS, the City of Plymouth Municipal Building Authority (hereinafter referred to as the "Authority"), by Ordinance No. 3, adopted on January 11, 1968, did authorize issuance and sale of Two Hundred Ninety Thousand (\$290,000.00) Dollars Parking Lots Revenue Bonds, at a maximum interest rate of five per cent (5%); and

WHEREAS, the Authority has offered bonds for sale and has received no proposals for the purchase thereof and it, accordingly, is necessary to increase the rate of interest at which said bonds are offered for sale; and

WHEREAS, an amendment to the Lease for the proposed parking lots authorized to be acquired and developed by Ordinance No. 3 has been prepared and approved by the City Commission of the City and the Commission of the Authority, increasing the rent to be paid by the City, which said amendment provides as follows:

AMENDMENT TO LEASE

MADE AND EXECUTED this 11th day of June, 1968, by and between the City of Plymouth Municipal Building Authority, a public corporation organized and existing under the authority of Act 31, Public Acts of Michigan, 1948, First Extra Session, as amended, hereinafter referred to as the AUTHORITY, and the City of Plymouth, a Michigan municipal corporation organized and existing under the Constitution and laws of the State of Michigan, hereinafter referred to as the CITY:

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the AUTHORITY and the CITY entered into a Lease Agreement dated as of January 11, 1968, by the terms of which the AUTHORITY would acquire and develop two parking lots and lease the same to the CITY; and

WHEREAS, the Lease contemplated that the AUTHORITY would finance the cost of acquisition and development of said parking lots by the issuance of revenue bonds; and

WHEREAS, the AUTHORITY has not been able to market said revenue bonds at an interest cost of five per cent (5%) and it is necessary, therefore, to increase the rate of interest at which said bonds are offered for sale and this, accordingly, will require an increase in the rental to be paid by the CITY;

IT IS, THEREFORE, AGREED BY AND BETWEEN THE PARTIES HERETO, for and in consideration of the agreement and covenants of each other, as follows:

1. Paragraph 3 of said Lease Agreement, made and executed on January 11, 1968, is hereby amended to provide as follows:

The annual rentals to be paid by the CITY and which the CITY hereby promises and covenants to pay, shall be Thirty Thousand (\$30,000.00) Dollars, payable on the first day of October, 1968, and on the first day of October each year thereafter (which annual rental is hereinafter called "fixed annual rental").

The fixed annual rentals herein required are in an amount sufficient to meet, as they mature, the principal and interest payments on the revenue bonds of the AUTHORITY in the total authorized principal sum of Two Hundred Ninety Thousand (\$290,000.00) Dollars, and to provide for a debt service reserve therefor, and after establishment of said reserve, to provide funds to call bonds prior to maturity.

In the event an increase in the fixed annual rentals here provided becomes necessary in order to provide adequate funds for the AUTHORITY to meet its debt service requirements on the bonds issued and outstanding, and the necessary reserve requirements, the CITY agrees to pay the increased annual rental.

The CITY, in its sole discretion, in any annual period, may pay in advance any proportion of its fixed annual rental in excess of the annual requirement, in which event the AUTHORITY shall credit the CITY with advance payment of the next succeeding annual requirements to the extent of such excess payments.

2. In all other respects said Lease Agreement, made and executed January 11, 1968, is ratified and confirmed.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the City of Plymouth Municipal Building Authority, by its Commission, and the City of Plymouth, Michigan, by its City Commission, have each caused its name to be signed to this instrument by its duly authorized officers and its seal to be affixed hereto the day and year first above written.

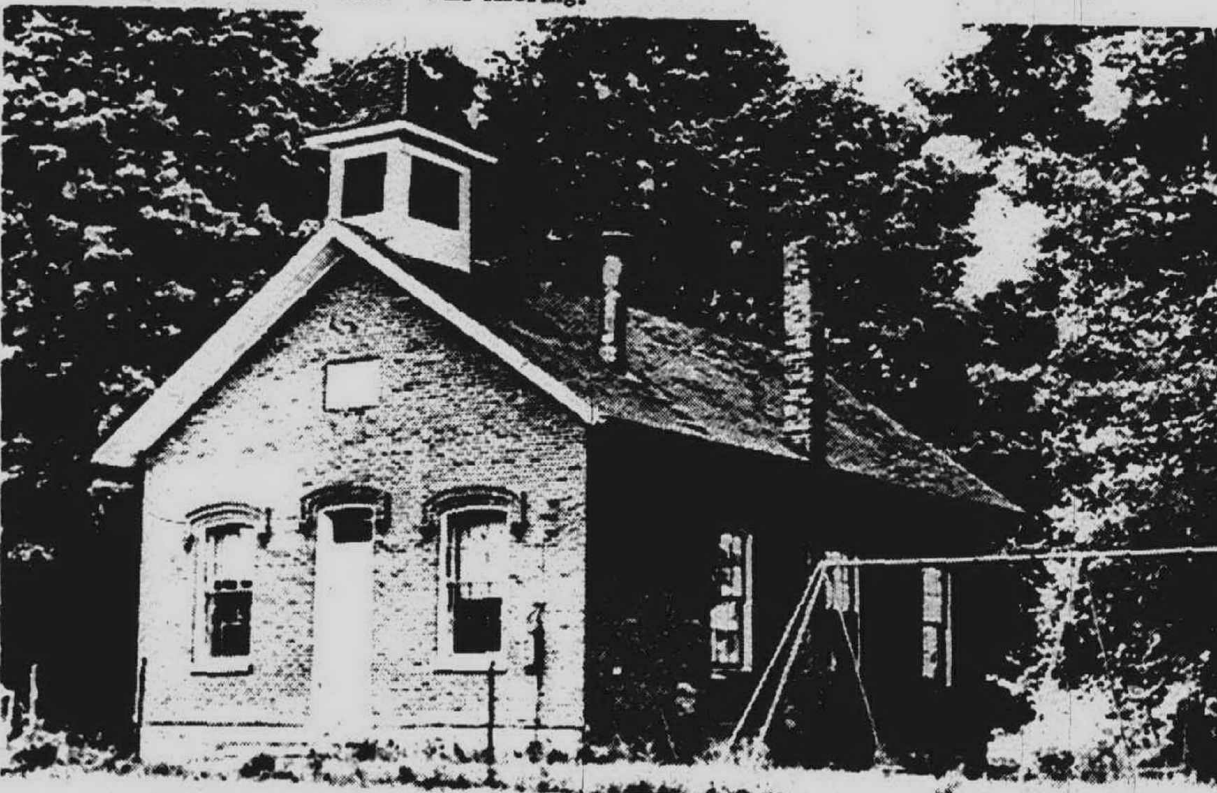

Her initial salary was \$22 each month with a promise from the school board of a \$3 increase in two months if her performance was satisfactory.

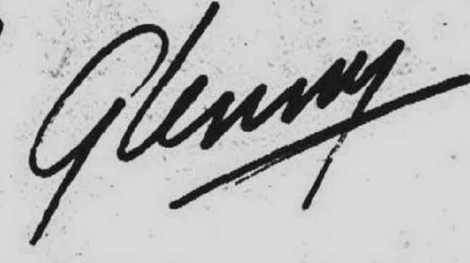
SHE RECEIVED the promised raise and an additional one the following year. Mrs. Bird continued her own education at the University of Michigan, earning her BS and master's degrees there.

Orphan Receives Help From Plymouth Family

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Mabrey would like, one day, to enter the missionary field and serve in some far off troubled land. But until their daughters, Carole, five, and Kathleen, 20 months, are grown, they will serve as Plymouth missionaries through World Vision, an organization that makes it possible for them to aid and educate little six-year-old Babu Rao Chimata, who lives in an orphanage in Masulipatam, India.

THE MABREY'S STORY is not unique, but simply another inspiring one of caring for the world's troubled, unfortunate children.

The family moved to Plymouth from Northville in April of this year and makes its home at 774 Irvin.

They became interested in World Vision through television and magazine advertisements. Their request for more information about the organization was met promptly with a copy of "Scope," a World Vision magazine clearly illustrating the worthwhile work being done in many countries.

MR. MABREY, WHO works for Ford Motor Company's Livonia Transmission plant, has a very good friend, Amal Dhruva, of India, who was in this country with Ford as an engineer. When the Mabreys decided to sponsor a child, they requested one from India, thinking that Amal, who had returned to his native land would be instrumental in transferring gifts to Babu.

As it turned out, Babu's orphanage is 600 miles from Bombay, where Amal is working.

BABU LEARNED OF his sponsors last year, just before Christmas, and since then the Plymouth family has received five letters and a Christmas greeting from their little Indian boy.

He closes one letter with: "Thank you for your love and care and prayerful support to me in this far off corner of India. I pray that God will bless you richly as you continue to remember me."

"I, too, am praying for you every day." Other letters tell of the climate, "South India, land of dry sandy soil" and "Greetings from the land of sunshine and flowers."

In one letter Babu confesses, "I like bananas, don't you?" In another he answers Carole's query on tuna fish, "I like fish too," he answered, "I like fish curry, which is fish in a very spicy gravy. I like chapatties which is unleavened bread, fried on a hot plate with oil."

"We have vegetable curry with it, or meat curry or fish curry. I like to eat spicy foods. Everyone here in India eats spicy foods."

Mrs. Mabrey still can recall a meal prepared for them by Amal while he was living here. "It was very spicy and hot," she agreed.

BABU CANNOT WRITE yet and sends his messages to his American family through a friend, Premanadam.

Mrs. Mabrey writes to Babu as though her daughter, Carole, were corresponding with him. In the letter that identifies Premanadam, he added, "Of course Carole and Kathy are my friends too. I am so happy I have such good friends here and far away that love me."

Mrs. Mabrey has been asked how she can be sure that her money reaches Babu and whether

er World Vision is a legitimate organization.

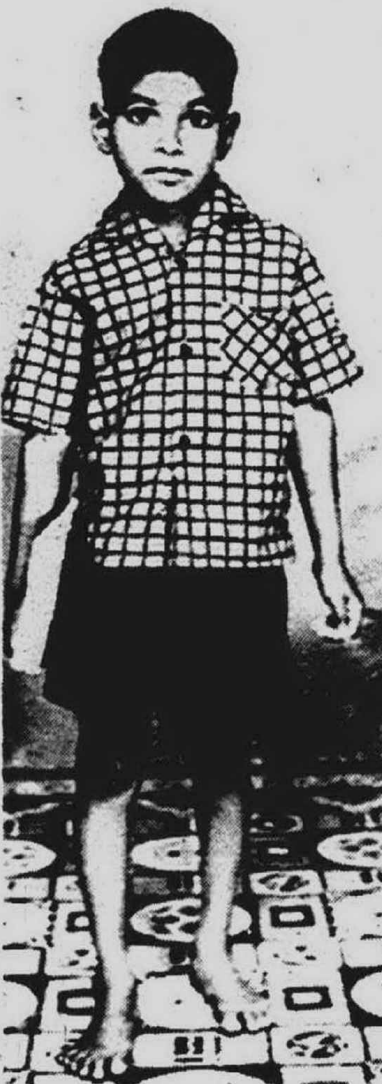
"The World Vision Magazine, which we receive regularly, carried a story of the WV orphanage-hospital in Vietnam being destroyed in the bombing and the national television news reported on that tragedy, so we know that their work is real," she said.

THEIR WORK IS VERY real to the 25,000 children who are sponsored through the organization's child-care program. All are in situations where, without help, there would be no way for them to receive education, health facilities, or religious background.

World Vision is headquartered in Pasadena, Calif. (Box O, zip code 91109). Ten dollars monthly will aid a child, who otherwise would have no hope.

Babu's Christmas message, which begins, "I extend my little hand of love and gratitude for your kindness, help and prayerful support this past year..." is preceded by Bible quotation from Luke 1:79 that tells simply what World Vision is all about:

"To give Light to them that sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of Peace."

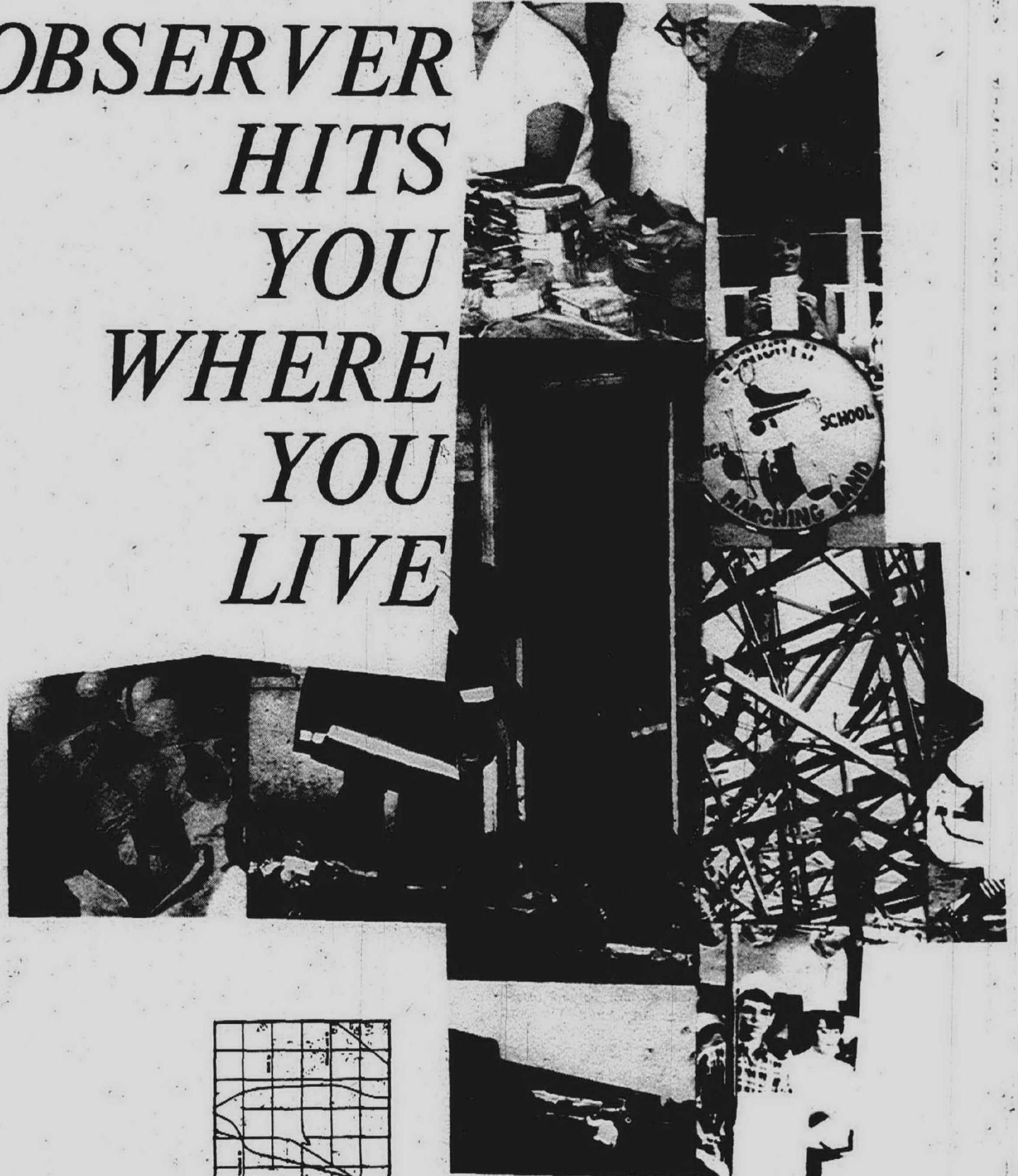

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500 In First Graduating Class At Stevenson

A High School Comes Of Age

Adlai Stevenson High School in Livonia, which first saw the light of day in 1965 when more than 550 tenth graders became the first students in the city's third high school, reached maturity Tuesday when more than 500 received diplomas.

It was the first commencement and the 500 represented the survivors of the original group—many of whom faded out prior to the senior year, dropping out for jobs and the numerous reasons that so many high school youngsters have in these modern days.

The program was held in the school gym-auditorium on a hot, muggy night that made condi-

tions miserable for all but the graduates—nothing could have made things too hot or too miserable for the members of the historic first graduating class.

Originally the plans called for the exercises on the new Les Anders Memorial athletic field but threats of tornadoes, heavy rains in the early evening forced the program indoors.

The historic event opened with the processional march, "Coronation March," played by the High School band under the direction of Conductor Richard T. Saunders.

DURING THIS TIME

the 500 graduates marched into seats in the center of the gym—a solemn procession this time inasmuch as it was the first parade in the school's three-year history.

Rabbi David Jessel, of Temple Beth El, gave the invocation, and Principal Jay Formsma welcomed the parents, friends, guests, members of the Board of Education and representatives of the administration.

Supt. Benton Yates, who had participated in the dedication program at Franklin High when Vice President Hubert Humphries was the principal speaker and paid

tribute to his long time friend and associate, Adlai Stevenson, for whom the school was named, had the honor of making a brief address to the audience and then introduce the commencement speaker.

For this special event, the man selected to address the first graduating class was Russell Wentworth, Director of Scholarships at Michigan State University.

Wentworth told the graduates of the challenges awaiting them and urged all to do everything possible to further their education so that they could take their proper places in society

in the not too distant future.

Class President Gary Sarut made a short address in which he thanked parents for their efforts in keeping the seniors in classes and affording them the opportunity to become graduates and go on to colleges.

AS A CLIMAX to his talk, he presented the class gift to the school as a token of appreciation of the 500 graduates for their three years of work with the faculty and the school administration.

Mrs. Strelsa Schreiber, retiring president of the Board of Education, presented the class to the audience and the members of the board.

The presentation of diplomas was by William Craft, Board Vice President, and Secretary Dr. A. Edward Katz.

Each member of the class walked across the stage and received a diploma as his or her name was announced.

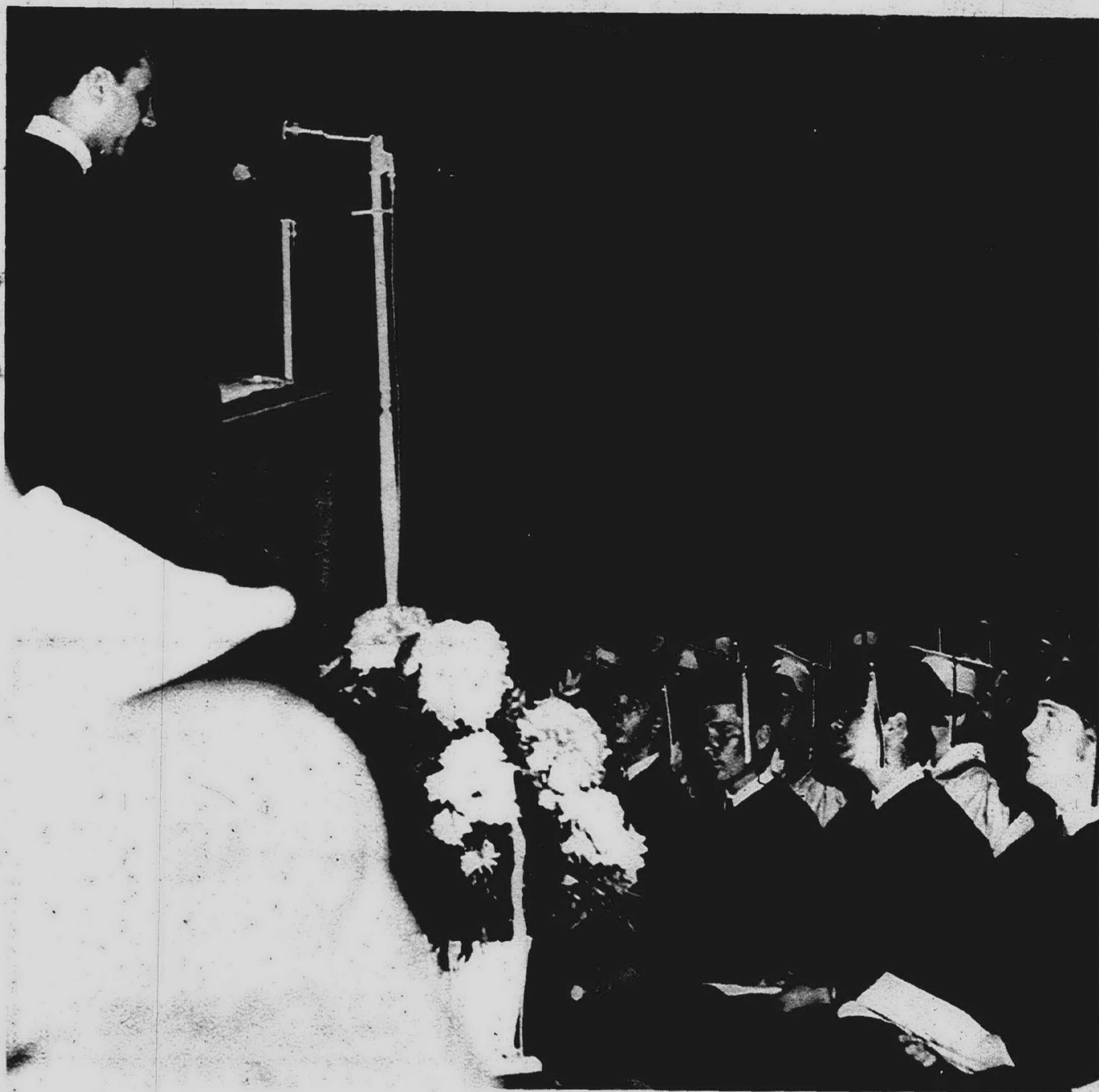
Then with all diplomas awarded, the audience gave a tremendous ovation for the 500 graduates, many of whom tossed their mortar boards high in the air. It reminded one of a commencement at one of the service academies where the graduates toss their caps high in the air to climax the event.

Rabbi Jessel gave the benediction and then the new graduates marched out of the gym outdoors for a breath of cooler air to receive the congratulations of their parents and relatives.

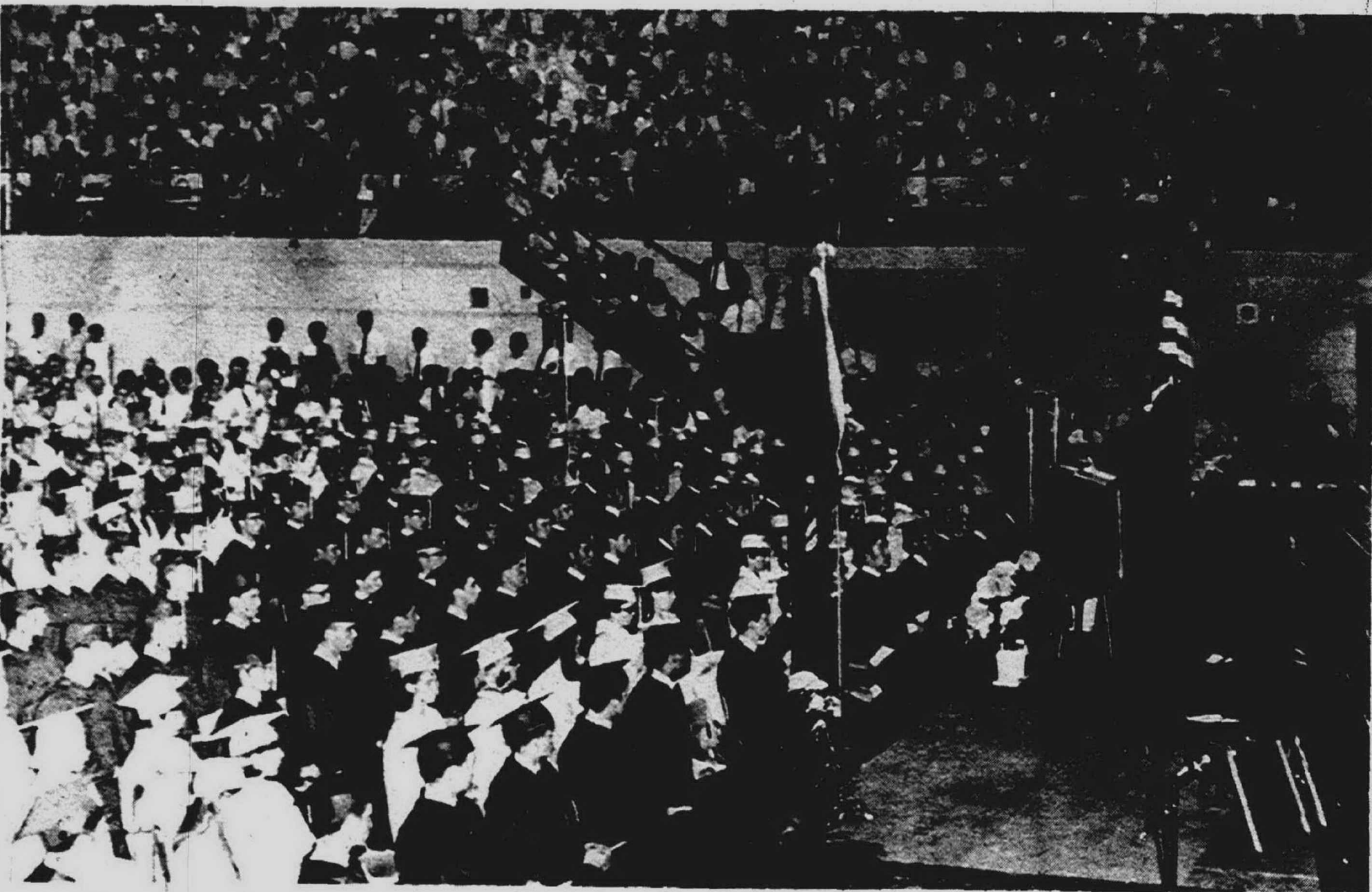
The recessional march, "Youth Triumphant," was played by the band.

High in the air go mortar boards after all 500 seniors had received their diplomas from Board of Education Vice President William Craft and Secretary Dr. A. Edward Katz.



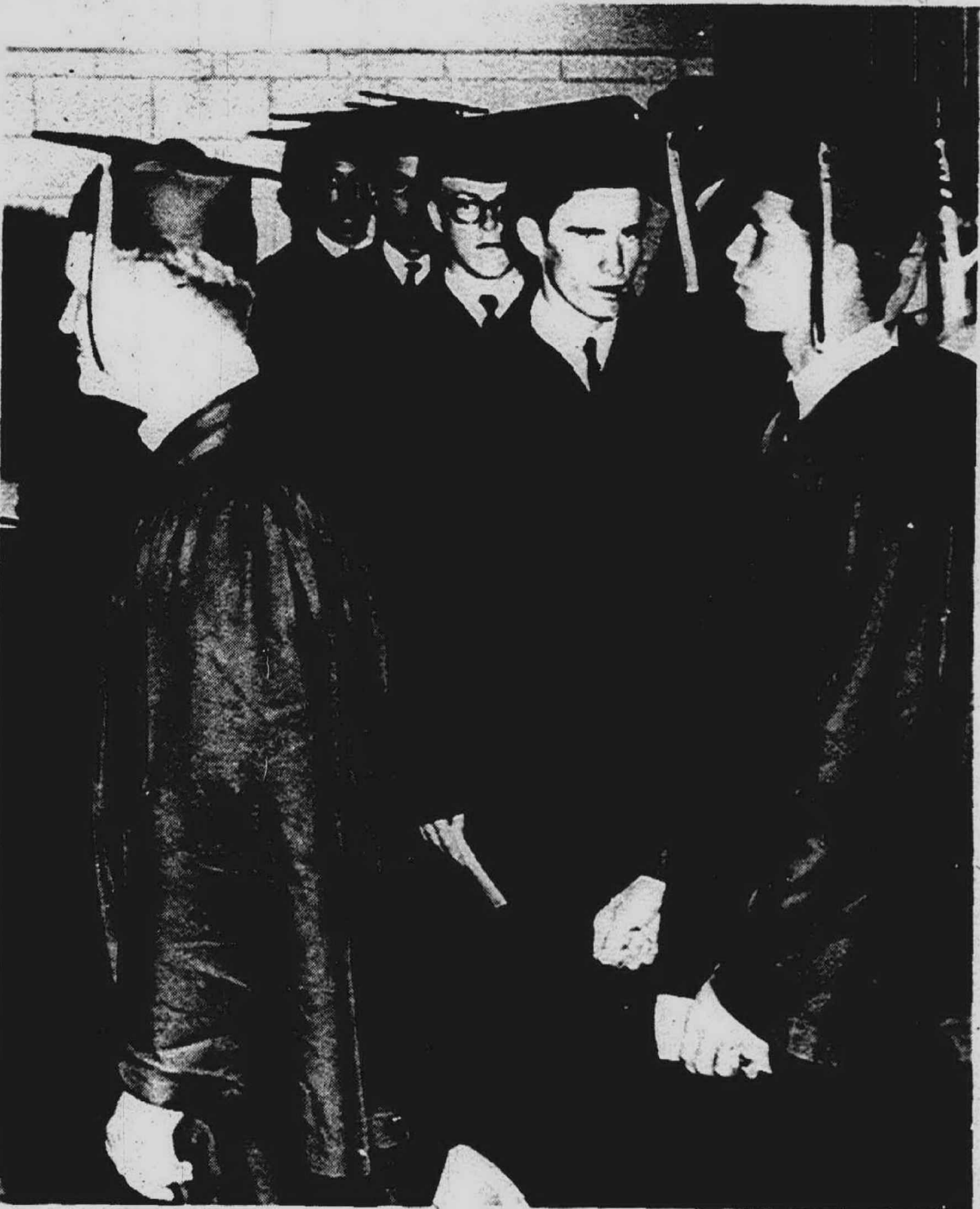
Class President Gary Sarut thanks parents and teachers for their patience and then presents gift to the school.

COG Draws Up Priorities

After getting only scattered suggestions from member governments, the Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments (COG) has made its own list of priority items.

COG's staff is drawing up studies and committee structures on regional school and municipal problems with the approval of the executive board and the General Assembly.

COG, whose members include the six southeastern Michigan county governments, school districts, cities, townships and villages, had asked its constituents several months ago for suggestions, got only 40 responses, and found no consensus.

ROBERT FARLEY, assistant to COG Executive Director E. Robert Turner, outlined 10 areas of work for the new regional agency in an interview with the Observer Newspapers:

1. Educational requirements and financing.
2. Comprehensive health planning and coordination. "This has been thrust at us by federal laws -- every metropolitan area must have a health planning agency."
3. Public safety coordination. COG will study possibilities coordinating training and in-service training, mutual aid and crime labs.

Five From NFH

North Farmington High School's work day netted scholarships for five students this year.

Those receiving aid are Lois Cherry, Diana Rolls, Randy Harp, Tom Huber and Nancy Peck.

Several hundred workers spent a Saturday working throughout the area in order to raise the funds for the scholarships. The annual project is sponsored by the student council.

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4. Housing trends and needs. "This has never been studied on a regional basis."

5. Solid waste disposal coordination. Collection of trash and garbage isn't the problem -- it's a matter of disposal. Some counties are also working in this area.

6. Building code uniformity throughout the region. This might also even involve training programs for building inspectors to lead to uniformity of enforcement.

7. Data processing.

8. Federal and state assistance for members. With a great variety of programs and the difficulty of making application, COG sees itself as a potential intermediary with the federal bureaucracy.

9. Joint purchasing programs.

10. Coordinator of regional anti-poverty programs. The Metropolitan Fund was working in this area, but the work dropped off when a key man left.

A VOLUNTARY organization, COG was established early this year.

It succeeds the former Super-

visors Inter-County Committee and is parent organization of the Detroit Metropolitan Regional Planning Commission and the Transportation and Land Use Study (TALUS).

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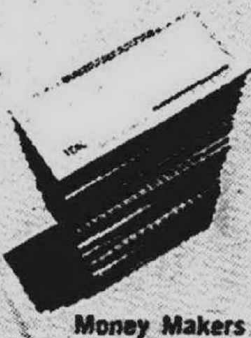
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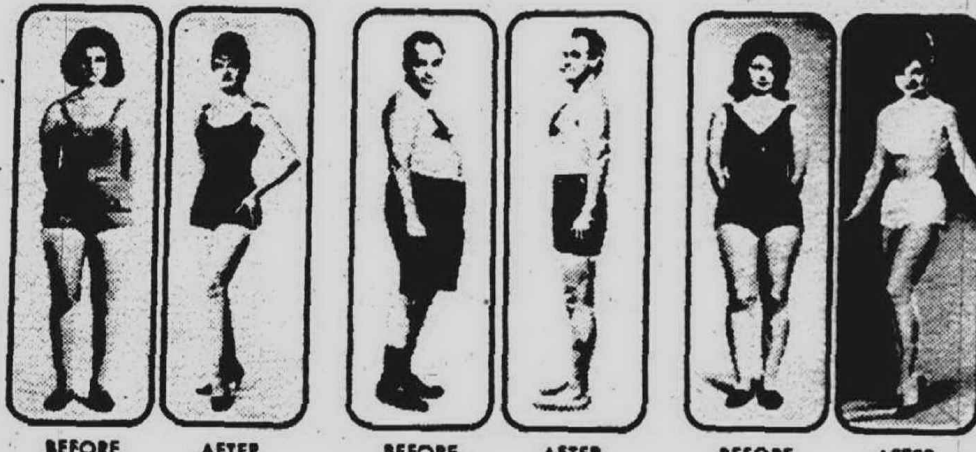
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Reservists In Texas; Pacific Next

A Livonia-based Army Reserve company, called to active duty last month, is getting advanced training at Fort Hood, Tex., and expects to be sent to the South Pacific in the fall.

Will they go to Vietnam? "Most likely," answered Capt. Edwin J. Duda, of Plymouth, commander of the 424th Personnel Services Company.

ONLY 82 OFFICERS and enlisted men of the original 153 went on active duty May 7. The rest were either too close to their discharge dates, had medical problems, or had occupational problems which qualified them for deferment.

And of the 10 Observer Newspapers area residents in the original company, only three actually went down.

The men trained for only a week (May 7-13) at the Army Reserve Center at 34450 Schoolcraft, Livonia, before being sent to Fort Hood.

"It's hot—98 yesterday," said Capt. Duda, "but the nights are cool."

ONLY DUDA, Spec. 4 Lawrence Dodd, of Redford Township, and Spec. 4 Frank L. Gable, a minor league second baseman whose permanent address is in Westland, made the long trip.

The company's executive officer, 1st Lt. Jack Beery of Farmington, was disqualified for a medical reason. So was Sgt. Paul Quenneville of Livonia. They had expected to be activated.

Five other local men were members of the company, but they hadn't expected to be called because of the closeness of their discharge dates or other reasons.

"WE'RE GETTING some good training," Capt. Duda said of the company that was organized only last Jan. 31.

"Twenty-three men are at Fort Polk, La., in personnel specialist school; one is at Fort Benjamin Harrison, Ind., in computer school; 11 are at computer school here working on Univac; two are in supply school; two are in clerk-typist school; and 24 are taking the drivers qualification course."

A few of the men took their families to Texas, at their own expense. When they are sent to their permanent station, they may be able to take their families at Army expense if the area isn't "restricted." Vietnam is restricted.

The company's task is the maintenance of the personnel records of 5,000 or more troops.

New Law Aims To Spur Joint Kids' Facilities

A new state law is designed to encourage joint ventures in the construction of recreational facilities and facilities for handicapped, retarded or mentally disturbed children.

Gov. Romney signed it along with a number of other bills last week.

The law, which has immediate effect, permits an intermediate (county) school district and a local school district within its bounds to make a deal with other governmental units to establish a building authority.

Financing of construction would be only by revenue bonds.

ANOTHER BILL Romney signed will allow a local assessor the same right, as a property owner, to file a complaint with the State Tax Commission.

Any change in the assessment resulting from Tax Commission action on the complaint would change the state equalized value of the local taxing unit.

The same measure provides that whenever a local assessing district fails to have its assessment roll prepared as required by state law, the local district must bear the cost of corrective action taken by the State Tax Commission.

OTHER BILLS, signed into law will:

- Permit a sheriff to appoint as a deputy any person designated by an incorporated society for the prevention of cruelty to animals.

- Permit a friend of the court to petition for a change in a child support judgment in a divorce case when the parent or guardian has applied for or received public aid.

- Limit filling or refilling a prescription for a habit-forming drug to not more than five times within six months after

the prescription is issued, with renewal of the prescription by issuing practitioner permitted after the six-month period.

- Grant township zoning boards authority to submit proposed zoning ordinances and maps to the coordinating zoning committee of the county when there is no county zoning or planning commission.

- Authorize county road commissions to install and maintain uniform traffic control devices on trunkline highways when the cost would be less than estimated by the State Highway Commission.

- Provide that life, accident and health insurance sold in connection with credit or loan transactions will be subject to the credit insurance act, except when sold in connection with loans for not more than five years on dwellings or mobile homes.

- Restrict the authority of county and regional units of government to purchase property outside their own boundaries for recreational purposes.

ROMNEY announced he had vetoed a bill intended to allow any local governing unit to issue bonds or notes by majority vote of its governing body to meet current expenses, without voter approval.

The bill would also have allowed the governing body of the local unit to pledge "full faith and credit" for prompt payment of the principal and interest.

The governor said he believed such a pledge, without voter approval, would violate tax limitation provisions of the state constitution.

Turks Get Radar Base

ANKARA, Turkey — The United States will hand over to Turkey a \$15-million radar and communications base near Ankara on June 14, the U.S. Embassy has announced. The turnover is the major result so far of negotiations the two nations began in 1966 to reduce the 30,000 man American military contingent in Turkey.

Dutch Halt Nigeria Arms

THE HAGUE, Netherlands — The government of the Netherlands has placed an embargo on arms sales to federal Nigeria, the Foreign Ministry said. Even licenses already issued for arms shipments will be considered invalid, a spokesman said.

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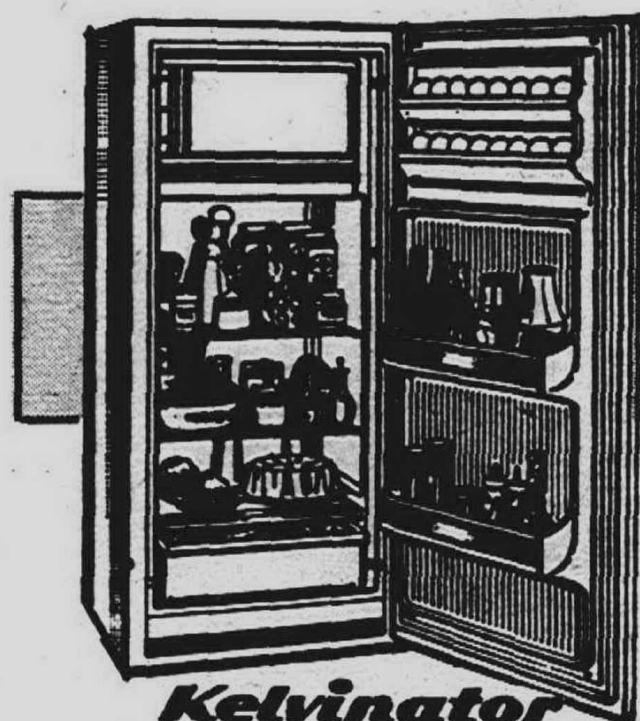
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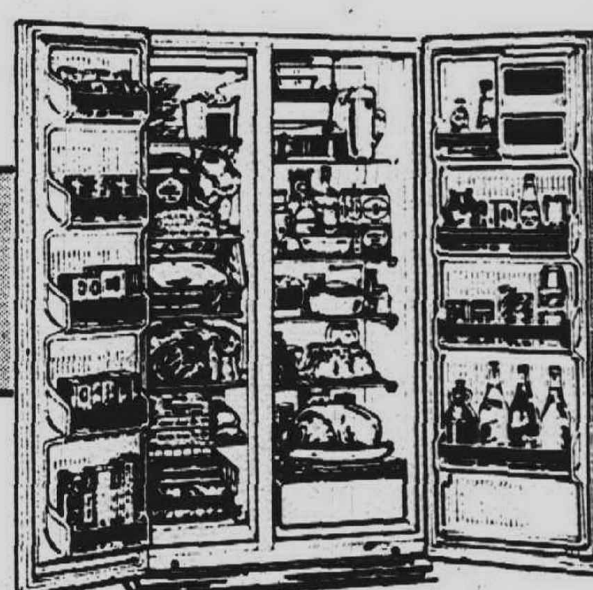
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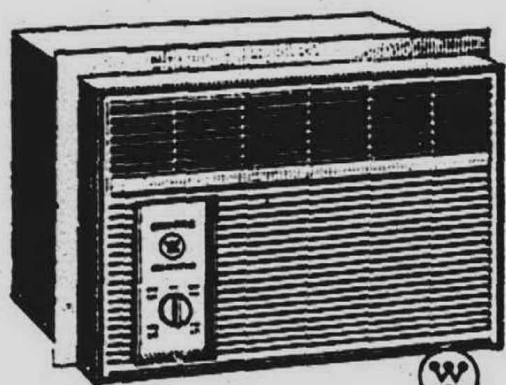
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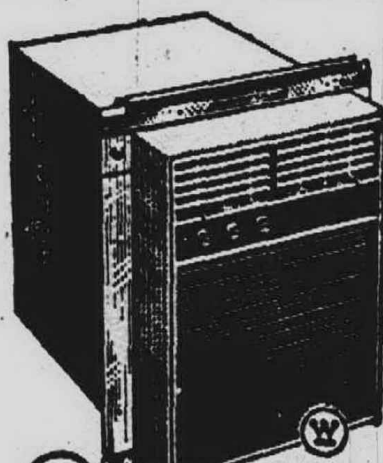


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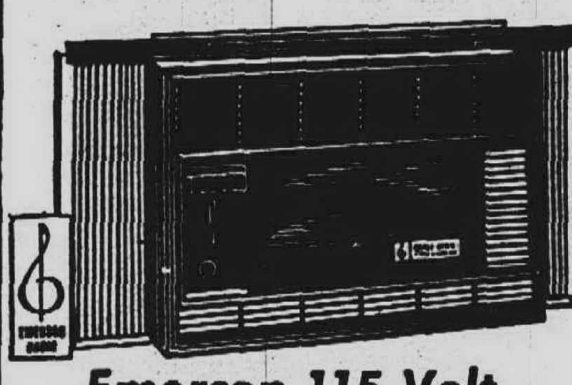


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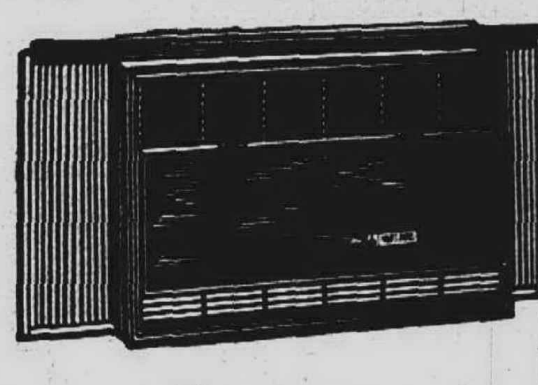
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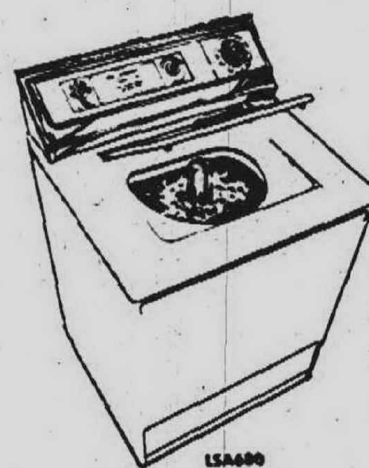
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NSH Patients Start Own Businesses

'Sheltered Workshop' Helping Elderly Build Self-Esteem In A Great American Tradition

A cup of coffee, a shelf of well-made gift items and a brand new contract—these illustrate great new strides toward productive life for many of the older patients at Northville State Hospital.

The coffee was poured and served last Labor Day for a staff member at the mental hospital by a lady of advancing years who had been a patient in the geriatrics division for some time.

"I used to sell things," she told a staff member. "That will be five cents."

The idea clicked with other patients, and the staff members who had been working toward developing it. Before long there was a patient-run refreshment business in the geriatrics division, where Dr. Fulvio Ferrari is staff psychiatrist and director of medical services.

The patients themselves named the business "Handi-Korner," and recently they added a new line—serving hot lunch once a week for staff, patients and visitors to the

hospital. They earn a small wage for their work.

But that's only part of the story.

THE REST CONCERNS a sheltered workshop—also on a pay basis—created for the hospital patients by Bernard Plummer, registered rehabilitation therapist who began work at Northville in January.

So far, the workshop's main output has been skillfully-crafted gift items—pillows, stuffed toys, feather flowers.

But Plummer said the workshop has a contract with the Ford Motor Co. for some piecework production, and he feels sure contract work will soon be the biggest part of the workshop.

"Rehabilitation" is the theme in all this activity.

Explained Plummer in sociological terms:

"The senior population of our country continues to grow, and so must the senior aged population of our psychiatric facilities.



Through increased concern and more enlightened observations, we are finding that much of this population is truly not qualified for residence at a state mental hospital, but is, instead, in need of assistance from those facilities which foster moderations in life, socio-psycho understanding of aging and opportunities to continue living."

Added Dr. Ferrari:

"The aim of any mental hospital is to return as many patients as possible to meaningful relations to the community. There's a special problem with the aging mental patients who have been excluded from society by retirement and misunderstanding."

"They suffer tremendous depression, and find no sense of self-worth and self-esteem."

Dr. Ferrari said work therapy has been tried in mental hospitals, because patients need something to do and the institutions have low budgets.

"But it was a trick—in a way a very dirty trick," he said. "You couldn't convince the patients it was the answer, and you couldn't convince me either."

The Handi-Korner, he added "is an example of the good American concept of free enterprise, and it does work."

THE EXPANSION of the business certainly follows the American dream.

Equipped with a coffee urn provided by the staff, the ladies earned \$1.60 the first day they were in operation.

That went up to a fund of more than \$1,000 as the month of April 1968 got underway.

During the month, deposits were nearly \$100 more than withdrawals for supplies, and patients' salaries amounted to \$110. The business loaned money to the patient in charge of bookkeeping for an adding machine. It also bought a shiny new refrigerator.

Then some of the profit was donated to purchase a protective fence for the hospital ground area used by senile patients.

Dr. Ferrari, who never misses a chance to buy a cup of coffee, says the difference in some of the patients over recent months is "absolutely incredible."

Plummer, who previously set up sheltered workshops in two other institutions, divides his time between working at the hospital and driving around to get orders and materials and contracts.

Because the workshop is aimed at helping patients resume places in society, he said, it has many characteristics of an "outside" work situation.

Patient-workers have specific times to report for duty, and they earn a specific wage. More and more responsibility will be given as they can handle it, Plummer said.

There are plans to spread the sheltered workshop idea to other sections of the hospital—the young adults next. And other work is going forward to set up similar systems in some of the area nursing homes where many of the NSH patients locate later.

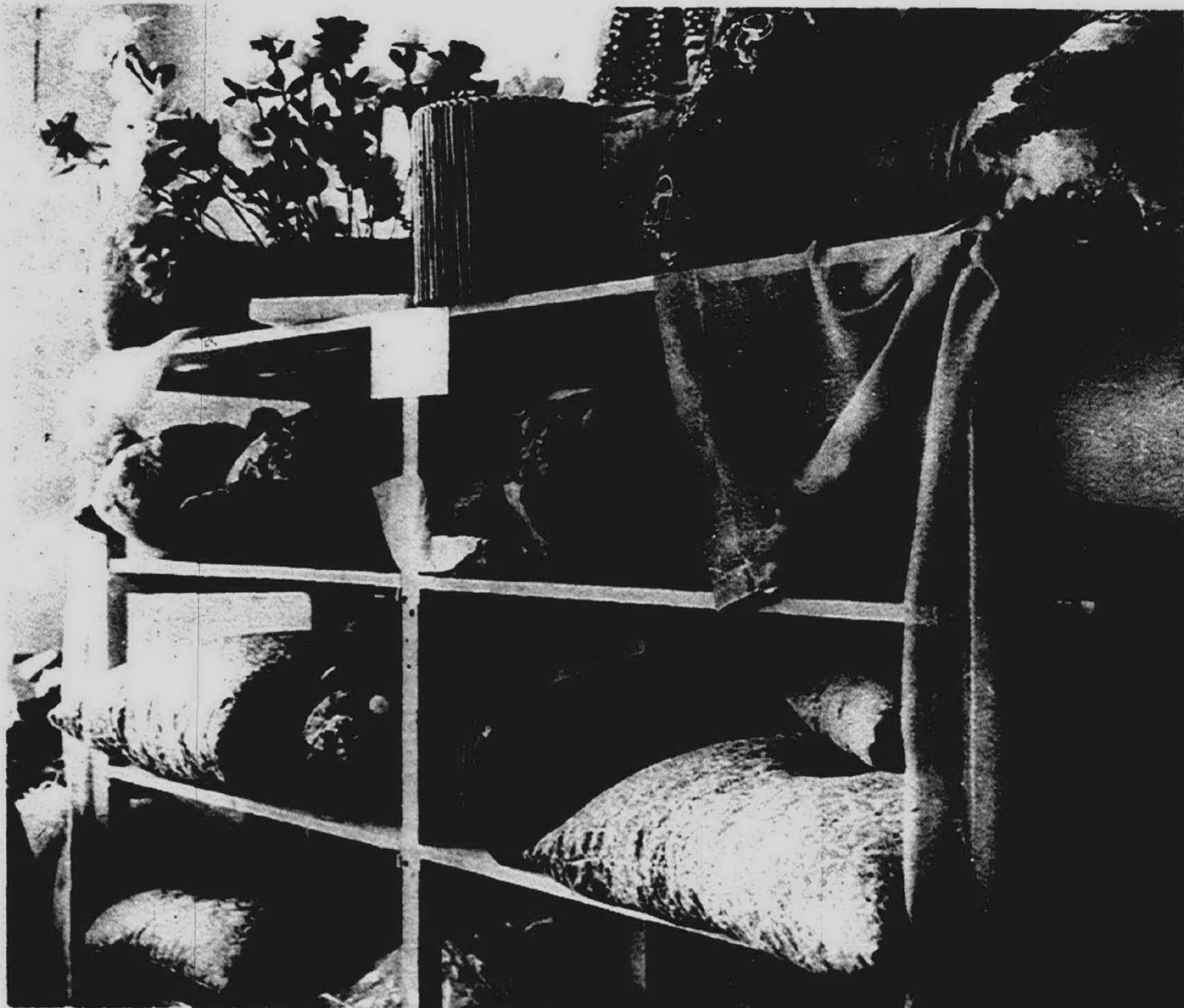

Custom Is Legalized

School Borrowing Eased

School districts will be able to borrow against anticipated state aid more easily under a bill that has passed the Michigan Legislature.

The bill allows school districts to bypass the State Municipal Finance Commission, watchdog over local units' borrowing, when they want to borrow against anticipated state aid.

The bill legalizes past practice. The practice had been challenged in a court suit, which prompted the Senate to tack the borrowing freedom onto another bill as an amendment.

THE HOUSE concurred, 62-33, but only after a sharp debate.

"No one will have control of the thing," complained Rep. Joseph M. Snyder, D-St. Clair Shores.

He said the amendment would hand school districts "an open checkbook."

However, Rep. Louis E. Schmidt, R-Livonia, said the legislation is needed to allow school districts to continue to function in summer months.

"Most of the school districts are not carrying over money

after June," he added. "Some have payrolls in June and July. They have to buy supplies. They don't get state aid until August."

A four per cent interest ceiling is imposed on the borrowings on state aid under the amendment, which also stipulates that they may be paid

before maturity.

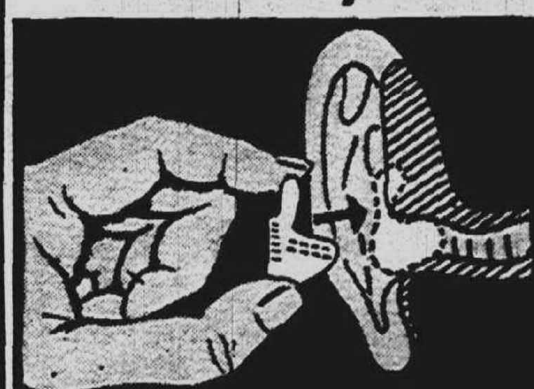
"IT'S NECESSARY for school districts to continue these borrowings," said Rep. Clifford H. Smart, R-Walled Lake, chairman of the House Education Committee.

"They wouldn't be in such trouble if they just watched

their administration costs," said Rep. Warren N. Goemaere, D-Roseville.

The House bill originally was intended to permit school districts to expand their bonding powers to five per cent of their total assessed valuation. This provision was retained.

Screens Give Privacy

Many ingredients go into the design of a successful outdoor living area—but most important is the provision for privacy. Few people can truly enjoy a patio or deck when every moment outdoors is shared with the neighbors.

The solution is obvious: screening. But where to build

it? What pattern to use? What height should it be?

These questions can be answered by taking a coffee break on the patio, sketch pad in hand. Also take along a chair light enough to move around easily. If you have one, a small camera may come in handy,

too. During this session, you'll determine how and where to block sight lines from neighboring properties and close-by streets or driveways. You needn't be an artist or draftsman.

Just figure height and width of the area needed to block a view to your patio by drawing lines that relate to distant tree branches, windows, utility poles and the like.

MAKE SEVERAL such sketches, moving around on the patio, and for each, note your position and whether you were seated or standing. Before sketching, draw a line through the center of the paper to establish eye level.

Once general dimensions are determined, the next decision will be location of the screens. Setting them near the patio's edge has many advantages. Not only are they likely to make the best sight barrier, but screens become a windbreak, too.

There'll be no wall-like effect if screens are a maximum length of eight feet. When greater length is needed, use a pair, one stepped two feet back from the other.

PATTERN and landscaping play important roles, too. For pattern, vertical slats can be perfect. They look airy without sacrificing an ounce of privacy. Cedar 2x2s spaced an inch apart are especially good finished in a wood tone or left to weather.

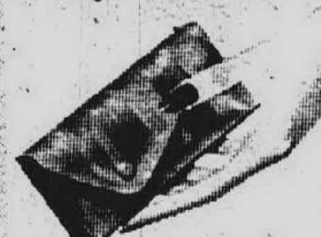

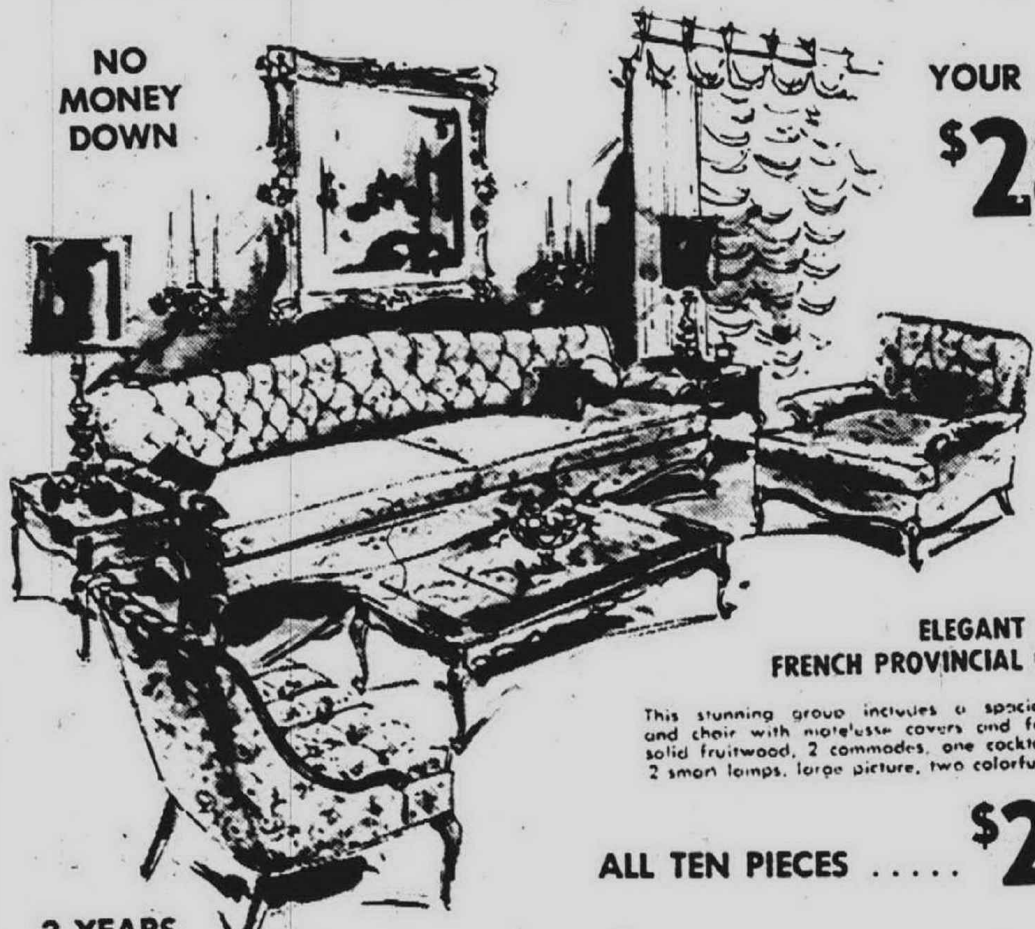

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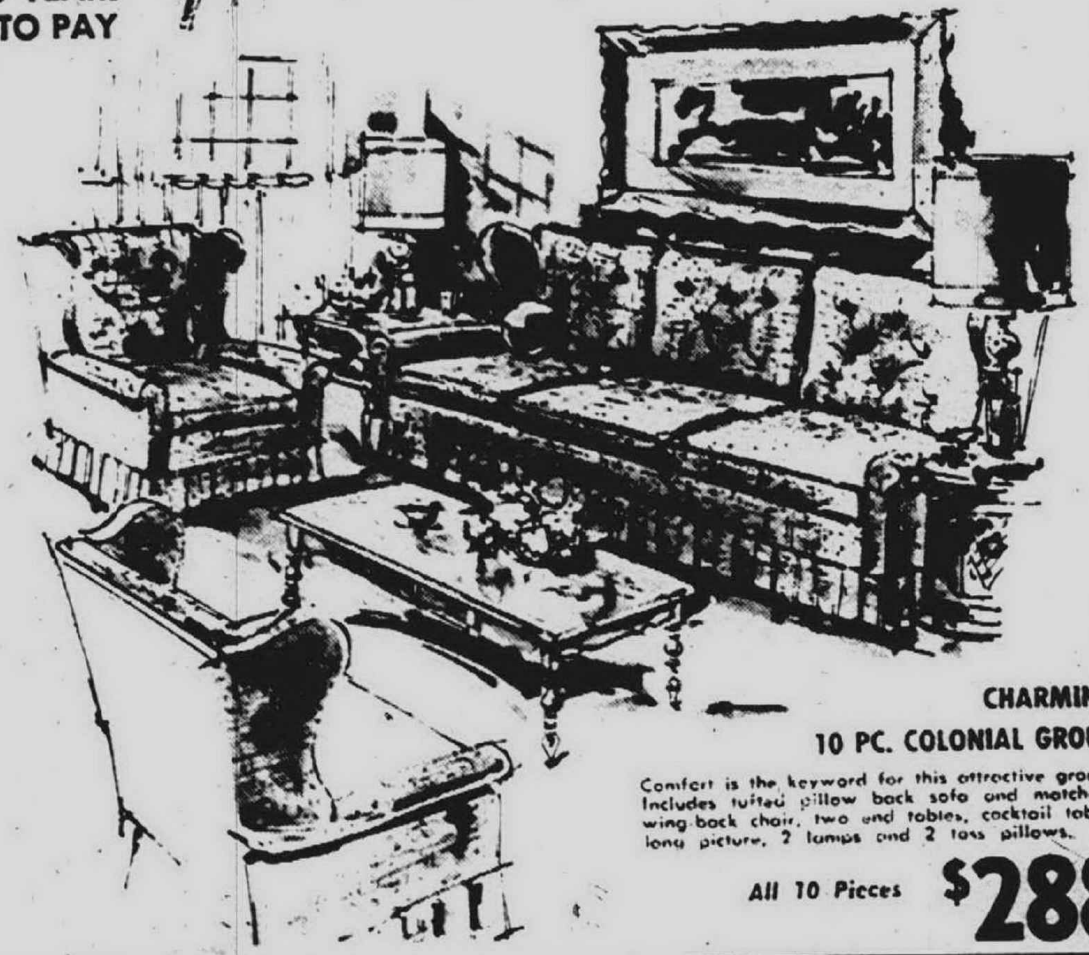

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Storms Kill 1, Hurt 3; 1 Building Strike Ends

LANSING -- High winds, thunderstorms, and damaging hail hit a humid lower Michigan in the wake of tornado warnings throughout most of the peninsula.

Several twisters were spotted and the weather was blamed for one death and at least three injuries.

Killed was a 16-year-old Ithaca youth, whom police identified as David Havelka. Havelka was leading his pony to shelter when high winds caused a barn to collapse on him.

Tornadoes were sighted in or near Detroit, Monroe, and Kalamazoo.

DETROIT -- Detroit area contractors have reached a contract agreement with laborers that they hope will serve as a pattern for settlement with other unions in a construction industry strike which began May 1.

The new contract gives union laborers a nine per cent increase in each of the next two years, and will bring their straight-time hourly wage to \$5.05 in the second year. Their base pay was \$4.25 hourly when they struck.

GRAND RAPIDS -- Striking city employees have agreed to end their walkout and return to work after accepting the recommendations of a fact-finder called in to mediate the dispute.

City Manager Julian Orr said the city also would abide by the recommendations of M. David Keefe, a troubleshooting arbitrator who is an instructor of labor relations at Wayne State University.

LANSING -- A special election on Aug. 6 to fill a vacancy in the office of supervisor of Royal Oak Township has been called for by Gov. Romney.

The vacancy was caused by the resignation of James McGrath on May 24.

PONTIAC -- Dr. William J. Emerson, superintendent of Oakland Schools Intermediate District, has been given a new four-year contract at \$30,000 per year by the school board. He was earning \$27,500 during 1967-68.

DETROIT -- Ford Motor Company's 1961 acquisition of the name and several facilities of the Electric Autolite Co. was in violation of the Clayton Anti-trust Act, according to an 80-page decision handed down by U.S. District Judge Ralph M. Freeman.

Autolite sold two plants to Ford in 1961 when it was faced with a substantial decline in its sales to Chrysler Corp., of batteries, spark plugs, and other automotive electrical components.

PONTIAC -- More than 3,000 Oakland County homes were without power for varying periods of time when lightning and high winds sent trees and branches crashing through electrical wires.

PONTIAC -- For the first time in history, two Negroes will sit on the Pontiac Board of Education.

Attorney Christopher C. Brown captured a heavy vote in Pontiac's predominantly Negro precincts to outpoll his closest competitor by more than a 2-1 margin. Brown, 29, will join Negro dentist Dr. Robert R. Turpin on the board of education.

COLDWATER -- Joint purchase of Gray Marine Engine Division of Continental Motors Corp. has been announced by marine firms in Michigan and California.

The joint purchase was made by Stokes Marine Supply Co. of Coldwater and Star Marine Engine Works, Inc., of Berkeley, Calif. The newly formed corporation will combine operations of the business under the name of Graymarine Corp.



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State And Local News Round Up

MICHIGAN SCHOOL DISTRICTS approved tax increases and bond issues in last Monday's school elections in large numbers. A survey showed approval of either a tax increase or bond issue in over 75 districts, compared with rejections in about 25 elections.

EAST LANSING -- The national convention of Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) met this week on the Michigan State campus. Approximately 500 students from campuses throughout the nation registered for the convention. A sign over the registration desk read: "Drug busts have happened here this week. Issues have been politicized. Cops are up tight--so...please keep cool." News-men were barred from the sessions pending a determination of press policy by the entire convention.

DETROIT -- A series of television programs called "In Your Own Interest," produced by the Interfaith Action Council and aimed at broadening racial understanding, has been cancelled by television station WWJ. The series, which was being run during prime-time, included five shows. Two had already been run. James Schiavone, general manager of WWJ-TV, said the action was taken because the program "contents do not show proper balance or reflect a fair representation of the issue" and because "the program was not up to prime-time standards." The series was replaced by "The Monkees."

BAY CITY -- The Bay City Commission voted 8-1 to ap-

prove an open housing code patterned after the state-wide open housing law. Bay City has a population of about 56,000, three per cent Negro. The ordinance took effect immediately.

ANN ARBOR -- Bus service, which was discontinued in Ann Arbor May 22, may be resumed by July 1. The city council has passed a resolution to authorize a franchise to the St. John Transportation Co. of Dayton, Ohio, to establish service.

ROSCOMMON -- The bodies of two Troy men, whose missing light plane had been the object of a weekend search, were recovered amid the wreckage of the plane five miles from Roscommon. The victims were Harry Kitchener, 25, and Frank Tweedale, 24.

DETROIT -- Two members of the prominent Buhl family died last week. Theodore D. Buhl, 65, who had been active in banking and real estate, died at his Florida home Saturday. His cousin, Arthur H. Buhl, 58, died suddenly Monday at his Grosse Pointe Farms home. He was president of the Buhl Land Co. and a director of Parke, Davis Co., the First of Michigan Corp. and Harper Hospital.

LANSING -- Michigan legislators, who are scheduled to return to work in Lansing June 25, will face several major budget bills and other disputed measures. The House and Senate are in the midst of an 18-day recess. Several of the bills are still in conference committees. Chief among these

are appropriations to finance the departments of public health, mental health and education--including the state's public colleges and universities--in the fiscal year which begins July 1.

KALAMAZOO -- James L. Caplinger, 31, city manager of Springfield, O., since 1965, has been named to succeed Clarence Elliott as city manager of Kalamazoo.

Kalamazoo Mayor Paul Schrier said the city commission had selected Caplinger for the \$21,000 post "because of his background which includes law, public administration, and racial matters."

Elliott, 65, whom Caplinger succeeds, has been city manager in Kalamazoo since 1951. Elliott served as city manager for Plymouth in the 1930's.

WASHINGTON -- The U.S. District Court in Washington has set a trial date of July 15 in a legal fight involving an effort by the University of Michigan and the Bay City YWCA to obtain clear possession of the \$600,000 estate of the late U.S. Rep. Roy O. Woodruff.

Heirs of Woodruff, who died 15 years ago, are contesting a will left by his widow, Mrs. Daisy Woodruff, who died June 9, 1967, leaving most of the estate to the U-M and the Bay City YWCA.

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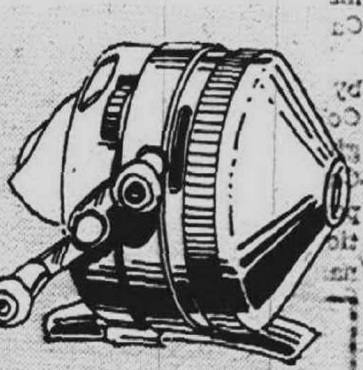
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Poor Marchers List Priority Demands

WASHINGTON -- Leaders of the Poor People's Campaign have issued a list of priority demands which they say can be met by the government without new legislation.

The Rev. Ralph Abernathy also said there are six legislative priorities which if passed would permit demonstrators to think about going home.

His list of priorities includes: food programs in 1,000 needy counties; emergency supplementary food distribution in 256 counties; free food stamps for those who can't afford to buy them; and more free lunches for school children.

Abernathy said the Department of Labor should abolish all dual school systems in the South by fall. He asked the Department of Housing and Urban Development to fight for passage of the housing bill now pending before Congress.

ATLANTA -- Four armed convicts, barricaded in the administration building at Atlanta Federal Penitentiary for more than 26 hours, released their 21 hostages and surrendered. The inmates agreed to release the hostages if their grievances were published. The grievances concerned operation of the maximum security prison and particularly parole officers. The inmates reportedly had two pistols and about 50 rounds of ammunition.

MEMPHIS -- George C. Wallace raised money and roused cheers for his third-party presidential bid as he opened a Southern campaign tour in Tennessee.

Wallace got a roaring reception in Memphis as he fired away at Republicans, Democrats, bureaucrats, the Supreme Court, militants, activists, Communists, De Gaulle, and pseudotheoreticians.

LOS ANGELES -- Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller pledged that if elected he would call a summit meeting of Western heads of state to create a "true Atlantic partnership."

Seeking to garner delegate votes from Nixon, Rockefeller offered sweeping foreign policy proposals in the opening of his California campaign. Warning against assuming a role as world policeman, Rockefeller said, "We must not find ourselves with a commitment looking for a justification."

Secret Service agents, N.Y. State Troopers and L.A. police intelligence officers guarded Rockefeller during the California visit.

WASHINGTON -- Congress is considering two tougher gun-control bills after President Johnson described gun legislation previously passed as too weak.

The new measures would outlaw mail-order sales of rifles and shotguns and require federal registration of all firearms. An earlier bill had banned only the sale of pistols.

While Congress debated the issue, a wide-spread movement began with people turning in their guns to local authorities. Some stores have stopped selling guns and ammunition and one dime store even

refused to sell toy guns.

During debate, Sen. Thomas J. Dodd (D-Conn.) repeated his denunciation of the National Rifle Association which he described as "the most wrong-headed, and probably the most dangerous, lobby that has ever existed."

WASHINGTON -- The Supreme Court has bowed to the judgment of the cop on the beat. The Court ruled police cannot be expected to run off to a judge for a warrant every time his trained eye picks out suspicious behavior.

The court also agreed it is only reasonable that he frisks suspects if he fears his questions may be answered with a bullet or knife. Supporting the thesis that police have the right to frisk suspects, Chief Justice Earl Warren gave FBI statistics of police killed and wounded in line of duty: 335 killed from 1960 to 1966 and 23,851 assaults on police in 1966 alone.

MILWAUKEE -- Wells Jr. High, one of hundreds of schools swept by a national tide of Negro discontent this school year, seemed almost a happy place. The class of 1968 was saying farewell, with tears, ceremony and tact.

The long protest against what some Negro pupils consider a blackboard barrier to their education had run its course, at

least for now. It was time for formal advancement to high school.

HOLLYWOOD -- Authorities have dropped an assault case against former football star Jimmy Brown in connection with a high-fashion model found injured beneath his second-story balcony.

Police say there was insufficient evidence to convict Brown of suspicion of assault with intent to commit murder but added the former Cleveland fullback may face a charge of battery against a police officer.

WASHINGTON -- A presidential commission has begun its study of violence in America and President Johnson wants the panel to consider whether campaigning candidates should be limited in their physical contact with voters.

Johnson met with the 10-member group and said he was asking Congress to give it subpoena powers. Johnson said he hoped the commission would uncover the causes of disrespect for law and order, violent disruptions by groups and individuals, and offer ways to prevent such outbreaks.

BOSTON -- Dr. Benjamin Spock has denied ever attempt-

ing to persuade young men to avoid service in the U.S. armed forces. Spock said he signed an antidraft statement entitled "A Call to Resist Illegitimate Authority" to support those who had already decided to resist the draft, and to reach those who might be still undecided or were attempting to evade the draft by other means.

LOS ANGELES -- Folk singer Jimmie Rodgers, 34, who underwent two brain operations after he suffered near-fatal head injuries last December, will undergo a third Monday.

WEDNESBOURY, England --

Events in France may seriously deter sales prospects of the Anglo-French supersonic Concorde just when the developers are claiming a six-year lead over its American rival, the Boeing 2707. A technology minister, warning Englishmen not to delight in France's problems, said French wage increases and other costs are bound to have an adverse effect on the Concorde budget and other aerospace projects.

PARIS -- The United States has told Hanoi its patience may wear thin if the Communists continue to increase military and terrorist attacks in S. Vietnam.

U.S. Ambassador W. Averell Harriman expressed grave concern but did not say what would happen if the attacks did not stop. The last session lasted three hours and 50 minutes. Diplomats will meet again on Wednesday.

SAIGON -- Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky has stepped down as head of S. Vietnam's People's Self Defense Committee, an apparent power gain for President Nguyen Van Thieu.

Ky's resignation letter to Thieu came after a week which Ky has not participated in any government activities and has remained almost entirely in seclusion. The committee is designed to arm and give rudimentary training to neighborhood and village groups for self defense against the Viet Cong.

LONDON -- The surprise arrival in London of a leader of the French student revolt raised speculation that student unrest in Britain is due for a spectacular change of course.

"Danny the Red" Cohn-Bendit, 23-year-old West German idol of the Sorbonne rioters, entered Britain on a 24-hour permit on a ticket paid for by the government-sponsored British Broadcasting Corp.

Cohn-Bendit joined European and American students in a BBC program called "Students in Revolt." He reportedly hopes to stay over the weekend for student meetings at the London School of Economics, a center of leftist agitation.

BONN -- Representatives from the U.S., W. Germany, Britain and France are seeking ways to counter new restrictions placed by E. Germany on W. Germans traveling to Berlin.

land. Talks are scheduled to begin on June 24.

PRAGUE -- Major General Jan Sejna's defection to the U.S. last February was prompted by fraudulent business deals, according to a recent statement made by the Czechoslovakian government. The report accused Sejna, the highest ranking political officer in the Czech Army, of embezzling \$74,000 in government funds.

CAIRO -- Work will begin next year on a project designed to stabilize Egypt's economy and make the country one of the biggest industrial centers in the Middle East. An iron and steel complex to be constructed with Russian assistance is expected to fulfill all of Egypt's needs and furnish a surplus for export.

LONDON -- Scotland Yard is delving into the mysteries of James Earl Ray's stay in Britain as U.S. officials attempt to extradite the man accused of killing Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

British police, investigating an unexplained 10-day gap in Ray's whereabouts, are searching for a short blond man who reportedly came looking for Ray after the suspect flew to London.

The end of a vacation seldom precipitates a happy feeling.

It's especially jolting when you debark from an airliner at Metro Airport after five hectic days in Las Vegas and there's No. 2 son Douglas to spread the sad news that Tommy Devine is dead.

Only a couple weeks before—just prior to heading west—we had lunched with Tommy, the public relations director at the Detroit Race Course.

He gave no hints that he was in failing health. Maybe he wasn't aware himself that time quickly was running out on him.

Devine talked about the "old days" when he wrote sports for the Free Press and later of his association with the Miami News.

Quickly, however, the subject switched to the DRC.

"We'll be switching our offices from downtown out to the track in a few days," Tommy said. "You know we get going out there on July 29."

WHAT DELIGHTED him was the fact that racing crowds and wagering were up all around the country.

"It sure looks like another record year for us, unless we're hit by a riot or something like that," Tommy declared.

He noted that good times (financially speaking in the nation) also reflect in happy times at race ovals and at other sports attractions.

"People are just busting out to spend their dollars set aside for entertainment," Tommy declared. "And for many of them sports comes No. 1."

"Look at the way your Pistons set records last season at the gate and the way the Tigers are drawing . . . and the way the Lions and Red Wings keep drawing without winning teams."

"There's nothing like sports," from A to Z. During his sports writing days, Devine thrived on controversy.

He'd dig into stories and took a lot of punches. There were times when he swung wildly. Other times he was on the target.

DEVINE LEFT OUR midst just two weeks after life vanished for George Kuhla, another member of Detroit's sports writing community.

George was only 25 and just beginning to become a star on the staff of the Detroit News when the strike silenced his typewriter—as it turned out, forever.

Kuhla had gone hunting with friends in Canada, above the Straits.

He was relaxing on the front fender of a boat trailer when suddenly there was a jolt. He fell to the ground, crushing his head.

George never regained consciousness and within a few days he was gone.

Appropriately enough, special memorial educational funds have been set up—both for Devine and for Kuhla.

The Devine fund has been established at Wayne State University, the one for Kuhla at the University of Detroit, his alma mater.

THERE'S STILL a great deal being said about whether baseball did right or wrong when an assassin's bullet struck down Robert Kennedy.

As you'll recall, some teams played and some didn't. Players took protest votes. Milt Pappas of Cincinnati sounded off so bitterly that the Reds wound up trading him to Atlanta.

Houston fined two players who refused to perform last Sunday, a national day of mourning by a decree of the President.

Those who rap baseball for not respecting the death of the senator from New York are off base as far as we're concerned.

The commissioner's office proclaimed that no games would be played Saturday until after Kennedy's funeral.

Teams promptly switched afternoon games to the evening. The Tigers were one.

Who was to know the funeral would not be over by 6 p.m., as originally planned?

THE LATENESS of the hour left baseball with no recourse but to carry on with its schedule Saturday night, even though the funeral services had not been completed.

TAKE 10 guffaws, 104 chuckles, 75 grins and 99 quiet smiles, add them up and you've got a good case of "Ecumania" or 288 delightful examples of what happens when Catholics, Jews and Protestants come together and laugh at themselves and their religions.

"Ecumania" is written by Hiley H. Ward, religion writer for the Detroit Free Press. In his preface, Ward tells his readers: "A sense of humor is important in the unbending of the church. They say you can achieve church unity eventually if you pray. But it will surely come much faster, if besides prayers and trust in the Holy Spirit men also learn to laugh."

THE ECUMENICAL movement has not yet expanded to include theological dialogue between Christian and Jew, but Ward believes that appreciation of one for the other is increasing and has included a rich fund of Jewish humor in "Ecumania."

Gov. George Romney, TV's Johnny Carson and Livonia's Rabbi David Jessel of Congregation Beth Am are among the many contributors to the book.

A typical guffaw from the pages of "Ecumania" involves a servant from each faith: A rabbi, a minister and a priest went up to Heaven. Each went to St. Peter and presented his case: "I'm a man of the cloth. I had the largest congregation in town. I preached the Scripture faithfully all my life."

Being busy at the time, St. Peter told each to have a seat until he had the chance to review their cases. While they were sitting there, a New York City cab driver came up to St. Peter.

St. Peter asked, "Who are you?" "I'm a New York city cab driver," the man said. "Welcome to Heaven," St. Peter said as he hurried to open the gate. "Come right in!"

Seeing this, the three clergymen rushed over to St. Peter, all talking at once. "This is outrageous!" they said; they were men of the cloth and he made them wait while he let the cab driver right in.

"Well," said St. Peter, "it is this simple. That cab driver scared the hell out of more people in one day than you have in a lifetime."

ONE OF THIS country's beloved comedians used to say, "You ain't heard nuttin' yet!" --he's right, there are 287 more where that came from.

The paintings themselves are owned by Gianni Mattioli of Milan, Italy, and were selected for the American tour by Professor Franco Russoli, director of the Brera Art Gallery in the same city. Only eight cities in the U.S. will see the display.

THE FUTURIST and Metaphysical movements which shook Italian art from 1910 to 1935 are particularly emphasized by this selection.

Amadeo Modigliani's "Reclining Nude" is acknowledged to be one of his best known works -- frank, sensuous, thoroughly typical of his style and temperament. The brown background brings out the glowing flesh tones; the effect is at once voluptuous and languid.

Giorgio de Chirico's "The Disquieting Muses" is a well-known fantasy landscape, the first version of a theme often repeated by the artist. The classical statues are presented as absurd mannequins, and he transforms Renaissance architecture into geometric modern forms.

The Futurists believed that "...the world's splendor has been enriched by new beauty: the beauty of speed...a roaring motor car, which runs like a machine gun, is more beautiful than the 'Winged Victory of Samothrace.'"

THE MORE SUCCESSFUL Futurist paintings do convey a sense of speed, motion and changing reality. The Futurists put the viewer in the center of the image with its elements around him, and stressed the importance of subject matter and emotion.

The show will present major works by Balla (5 works), Boccioni (9), Campigli (3), Carrà (15), de Chirico (6), Modigliani (7), Morandi (18), Rosai (6), Severini (2) and many others.

Caps and gowns, speeches and diplomas, are making up a good part of life for many people across our nation this month. But there are many more students who are not going to graduate.

They are the ones who become known as professional students. Not that most of them do not have good reason for continuing in school, nor are we implying that they do not have any direction in their lives.

But there are some of them who are staying in the classrooms and the lecture halls because they feel secure in the textbook existence that they have known for so long.

IF WE CONSIDER graduation as the moving from an old world to a new world in which we can build from the old, then we all should be graduating.

Perhaps, life presents us with a choice of hiding in an illusion of security or of moving out into a growth process that brings with it (as Robert Kennedy once said) the excitement and danger that exists in the most peaceful progress.

Why do some men graduate while others seem to float along in a kind of eternal childhood? Why, for example, could Bobby continue to move ahead after what had happened to his brother, Jack, and what made Teddy get up last week and say the things he did—in the face of what had happened to both brothers?

Maybe the answer lies in an intangible called VISION. Perhaps, like Martin Luther King, they, too, had a dream—the kind that some would term an "impossible dream."

THERE IS A current advertisement that says, "the possible is done right away—the impossible takes a little longer." Unless we can dream the impossible, we will never graduate.

We may wind up with a stack of diplomas, but we will never graduate unless we have enough courage to know that while the future is beyond our vision, it is not beyond our control.

Why is it that such visionaries are "big news" in this country unless it is because there are not enough of them? Dreaming dreams isn't really that difficult, but daring to follow the star we dream of apparently appears much too unsafe and unpopular for many of us.

SOME WILL STAND UP IN a coliseum, but too many others will not stand up for their dreams—or the ones they should have—in a supermarket or on a patio.

The Bobbys, the Jacks and the Kings have lived rather short lives in payment for their dreams—but they LIVED.

Hopefully, because they dared to live, more of us will be able to live, but the choice is still our own.

Existence can be forced upon us, but life cannot be forced upon anyone.

Safety or danger? Eternal childhood or graduation?

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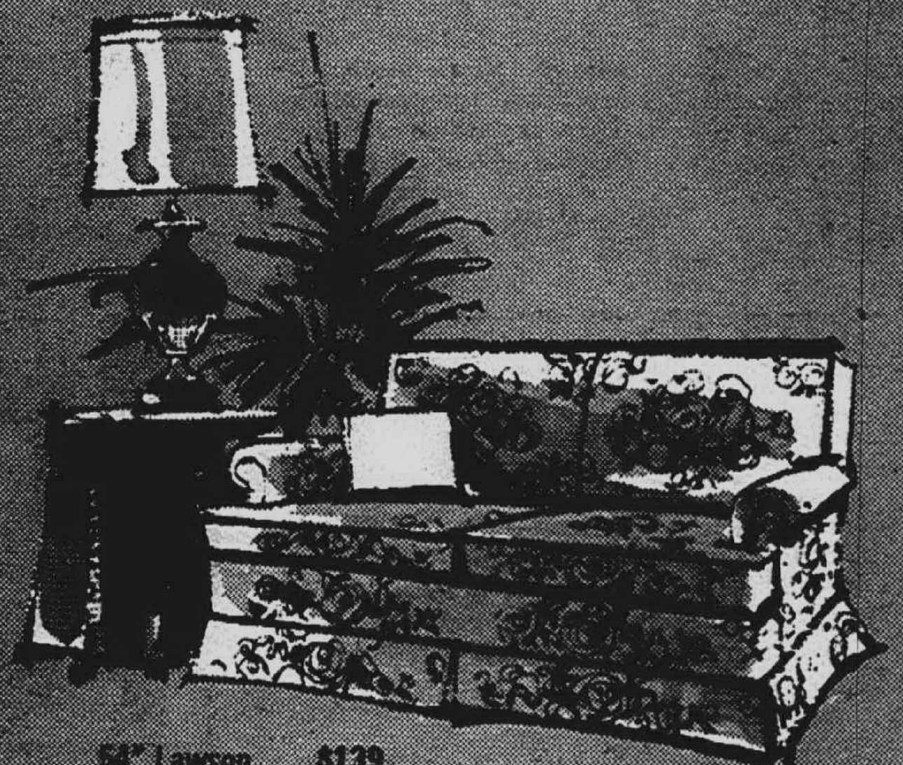
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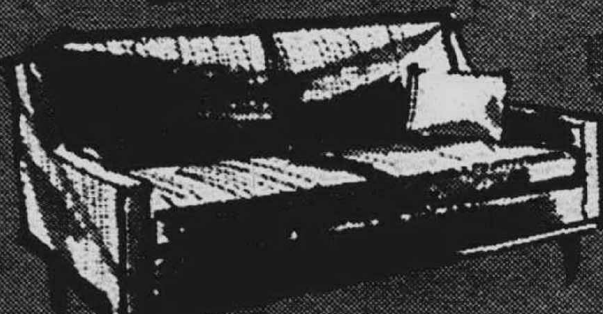
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How To Run For Supervisor

Do you want to run for supervisor on the reapportioned board of Wayne or Oakland County?

It may be difficult to win if the field is tough, but it's not difficult to get on the ballot.

You must file petition signatures with the county clerk by July 2 at 4 p.m. (Ordinary filing date for most partisan offices is July 18).

How many signatures will you need? At least one per cent and no more than four per cent of the vote your party's candidate for secretary of state got in 1966.

IT BREAKS DOWN this way on signatures:

Wayne Dist. 19 (Redford Township and north part of Dearborn Heights)--Republican 222 to 886; Democrat 127 to 506.

Wayne Dist. 26 (Livonia, Plymouth, Northville, Canton)--Republican 200 to 796; Democrat 171 to 683.

Oakland Dist. 17 (south Farmington)--Republican 53 to 212; Democrat 61 to 244.

Oakland Dist. 18 (north Farmington, West Bloomfield)--Republican 68 to 272; Democrat 48 to 191.

TO RUN FOR the office, you must be a qualified voter--21 years of age, a resident of the

district you are running in, U.S. citizen and resident of Michigan six months.

Be careful when circulating your petitions. Use a different petition form for each city or township in which you are circulating.

For example, if you're running in Oakland's 17th, use one set of petitions in the City of Farmington and another in Farmington Township.

How much may you spend campaigning?

You have two optional rules: (1) 25 per cent of one year's compensation as supervisor or at least \$100; (2) or \$40 per 1,000 votes cast for your party's candidate for governor in the last presidential election (1964).

Candidates will be nominated in the Aug. 6 primary. Republican and Democratic candidates will square off in the Nov. 5 general election.

THE NEW DISTRICTS were set up under a U.S. Supreme Court ruling and state law requiring "one-man, one-vote" apportionment of county boards of supervisors.

Oakland County will elect 27 members; Wayne, 26.

City and township officials will be ineligible to hold both their local offices and a county supervisor post at the same time, according to a ruling by Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley.

Easy To File For Judgeship: Pay \$100 Fee

The easiest way to get on the ballot to run for judge in the new district courts is to go to Lansing and file a \$100 fee.

The reason is that the Elections Division of the Secretary of State's office hasn't figured out yet how many petition signatures you'll need to qualify for a spot on the ballot.

The rule is that you must have signatures of one per cent (minimum) to two per cent (maximum) of the total vote cast for secretary of state in your judicial district in 1966.

THE TROUBLE is that the districts are all new, and no official tally for all the districts has been made in Lansing yet.

You may pay your money at the Elections Division office, New Treasury Building, Walnut and Allegan streets, in Lansing. Deadline is July 2.

If you win or place second, you get your \$100 back.

Campaign expenses will be limited to one year's salary. Each judge is guaranteed a salary of \$18,000 by the state, plus whatever his local district may want to pay.

That means a candidate will be able to spend at least \$4,500.

THREE AREA CITIES may have a chance to keep their part-time municipal courts. The city councils of Livonia, Garden City and Westland have that option because each city constitutes a single judicial district.

They will have until seven days after Gov. Romney signs the bill to make their decision. As of late last week, the governor hadn't signed it.

Under the lower court reorganization, Redford Township will constitute a single judicial district but won't have the option of exempting itself because it has no municipal court.

Farmington city and township will constitute a single district. Plymouth city and township, Northville city and township and Canton Township will be another district.

The court reorganization, required under the 1963 Michigan constitution, wipes out city municipal courts and justice of the peace courts. Detroit's lower court system, however, is left intact.

Truck Rules Consolidated

Gov. Romney has signed into law a bill that will consolidate state trucking regulation under the Public Service Commission of the Department of Commerce.

It was among dozens of laws the governor signed as the Legislature passed a flood of bills a week ago prior to taking a recess.

The trucking bill transfers the weighmaster section of the Highway Department and the commercial licensing enforcement function of the Department of State to the PSC.

Romney estimated the change will save the state \$125,000 a year.

ROMNEY ALSO signed bills that will:

- Authorize state restrictions on commercial pesticide applicators, including kinds of equipment or pesticides used.
- Permit annual readjustment of salaries of county drain commissioners, to reflect cost of living changes or work-load increases.
- Increase the minimum pension benefit for state employees with 10 years of service from \$40 to \$60 a year, not to exceed 30 years.
- Establish a two-year term for members of boards of review.
- Allow counties to contract with other counties for use of a jail.
- Eliminate the requirement that corporations must file copies of their annual reports with the State Revenue Department.
- Clarify procedures for initiating intra-county drain projects and permit a municipality to petition for an inter-county drain project in lieu of petitions by property owners.
- Allow the filing of school election petitions on the next weekday when the deadline falls on a holiday, Saturday or Sunday.
- Extend Conservation Commission authority to regulate the taking or killing of fish game or fur-bearing animals and game birds on the Great Lakes and their connecting waters.
- Require an approved curriculum in optometry of at least six years of college study and at least 12 hours of post-graduate instruction annually to qualify for relicensing as an optometrist.
- Allow state mental hospitals to retain fees collected in sheltered workshops for designated purposes.
- Prevent insurers from using accident rate statistics compiled by a fireman driving in the line of duty as a reason to cancel, refuse to issue or refuse to renew an automobile insurance policy for a fireman.
- Specify reasons for which the State Pharmacy Board may withhold, suspend or revoke any license under the uniform narcotic drug act.
