FARMINGTON—Five local lawyers met the filing deadline this week to enter the race for the newly-created post of District Judge which will carry an annual salary of \$27,500. Two will survive the Aug. 6 primary to meet in a Nov. 5 runoff election. The quintet includes the present municipal judge and a justice of the peace.

FARMINGTON — U.S. Sen. Philip A. Hart's appearance as speaker highlighted the Farmington area's Independence Day observance. He declared that despite current turmoil and dissent "our generation is likely to get pretty good marks" from historians.

REDFORD—Eleven Democrats and four Republicans have filed for primary election to represent their party in November for the 19th District Wayne County Board of Supervisors seat. Redford Township Dems are Wade Mitchell, Richard A. Banning, William C. Ford, Harvey J. Beadle, Charles G. Wiley, Bill J. Robbins, and William E. Wiley. Redford GOP candidates are Orville J. Keene, Lapiere G. Linghold and Donald M. Hanson. From Dearborn Heights, which area above Cherry Hill road joins Redford Township to form the district, are Dems Joseph F. Sapala, Harry E. Martin, Robert J. Bullinger, Harry Bennett and Republicans Helen Therese Gatowka and John H. Brennan.

REDFORD—Seven candidates have filed for two district judgeships in Redford Township. They are incumbent Justice of the Peace John Dillon, Robert Brang, Paul Hart, Joseph Pfister, Walter Lysyak, James H. Kennedy and Gerald R. Klask.

LIVONIA—A Livonia pharmacist sounded the alarm this week about non-prescription drug store items such as cough syrup, corn removers and cold tablets being purchased by teens who seek "psychedelic drug thrills." Don Roach, owner of Roach's Livonia Pharmacy, and fellow members of the Greater Northwest Pharmacists Association say they will seek drug-education programs in the public schools this fall.

LIVONIA — Eight Livonia lawyers are running for the two nonpartisan nominations for District Court judge in the Aug. 6 primary. The runoff is to be Nov. 5, at the general election. Seven Democrats and six Republicans seek their party nominations for a 26th-district seat on the reorganized Wayne County Board of Supervisors, to be chosen and elected on the same dates. The winners take seats in January. The present Municipal judge retains one of the two seats on the new Livonia Court.

City Considers Smoke Test For Entire Sewer System

In the wake of the recent rain spell that flooded the central parking lot and was rated the worst storm in a quarter of a century the City Commission is considering a thorough examination of the entire city sewer system.

"It has been suggested that we give what is called a smoke test to the entire line," Mayor James Jabara explained, and in this way could learn the con-

ditions that cause the floods in the various areas."

The Mayor made it plain that the plan hasn't been finalized by emphasizing that it was "being considered" and that no date has been set.

He did concede that the plan has merit and that it will be considered as a service to the taxpayers in the hope that a remedy can be found and thus eliminate such things as

flooded crossings and flooded basements in the homes.

DURING THE peak of last week's storm, the flood waters flowed over Harvey Street for the first time in years and made a pond of the central parking lot.

The water reached a point just about even with the door sills in the rear of the business houses along Ann Arbor Trail

and narrowly averted a disaster.

The other areas included the section at the crossing of Byron and all along the Tonquish Creek basin.

For years there have been complaints about Tonquish Creek and more emphasis has been placed on this section because the proposed Senior Citizens Housing Project is to be built there.

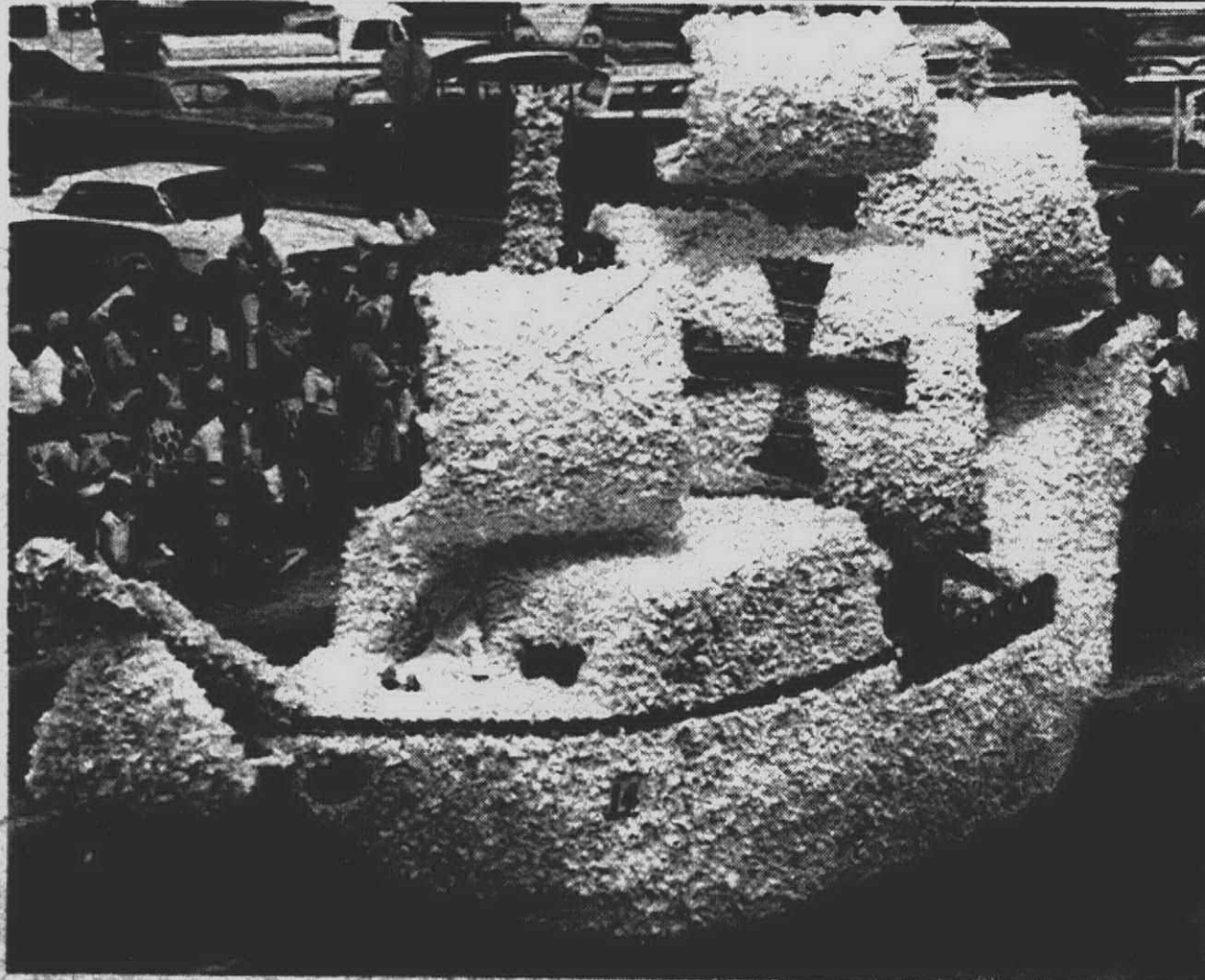
According to the engineers' reports the water didn't reach a peak last week that would have endangered the senior housing project had it been built. But no chances are going to be taken—and that is one of the reasons the thorough examination of the entire system has been suggested.

IT IS KNOWN that in some sections there are bottlenecks

that cause trouble in the heavy rains—one section in particular along the Tonquish Creek portion where one of the lines is smaller than the main section.

These things will show up in the smoke test, according to the authorities, and the results will be such that the Commission can have definite knowledge of the entire sewer system.

Pages Out Of History Unfolded In Parade

American history, paraded down Main Street Thursday afternoon.

Indian chiefs, frontiersmen, pilgrims, soldiers, sailors, farmers, craftsmen, industrialists, symbols of the space age and a bevy of American Beauty queens joined in the procession that marked the annual July Fourth parade and required an hour and a half to pass a given point.

Sponsored by the Plymouth Jaycees, it drew capacity crowds along the line of march and was adjudged by the city officials as one of the best of all time.

And it was only fitting that, at the conclusion, a float sponsored by the Elks Lodge depicting the Mayflower on which our forefathers sailed from Plymouth, England, was selected as the outstanding representative of an organization and another, bedecked from end to end with modern American Beauties displaying the latest hair-dos, from D D Hair Fashion, was given top honors in the commercial division.

THE TWO floats were not only the best in the line-up but bridged the gap in American history from 1620 when the Pilgrims landed in the Mayflower to the present day when American beauty is at its peak.

As another reminder of the historic past, the parade paused briefly at City Hall where the Plymouth Rock that was presented to the city a year ago by His Worship Frank Chapman, Lord Mayor of Plymouth, England, was unveiled in a charming new setting.

At the official unveiling E. J. R. MacGregor, British Consul General, paid his respects to Mayor James Jabara and the people of Plymouth, Michigan and brought a special message of friendship from Alderman Lowe, present Lord Mayor of Plymouth, England.

In his message Alderman Lowe thanked the residents of Plymouth for the cordial treatment accorded the Lord Mayor and his aides a year ago, and also reported that the four loudest cheers sent as a gift from Plymouth, Michigan were in the city's main government square and were doing nicely.

This exchange of messages is

planned as an annual custom and Mayor Jabara proclaimed to the throng that all Mayors in the future will be instructed to make it part of their duties during the July Fourth celebration.

FAVORED BY weather, the Jaycee officials were jubilant at the success of the venture

that attracted throngs four and five deep in the central business district and more entries than ever before for the parade.

"We had only 51 official entries," Chairman Dr. Gary Hall stated, "but more than 100 vehicles were in the line when the procession got under way."

Aside from the two prize winning floats there were others that drew considerable attention. Among them were the Newcomers entry showing a replica of Kellogg Park and the mule-drawn vehicle that carried members of the Plymouth Theatre Guild with the slogan, "The Beat Goes On."

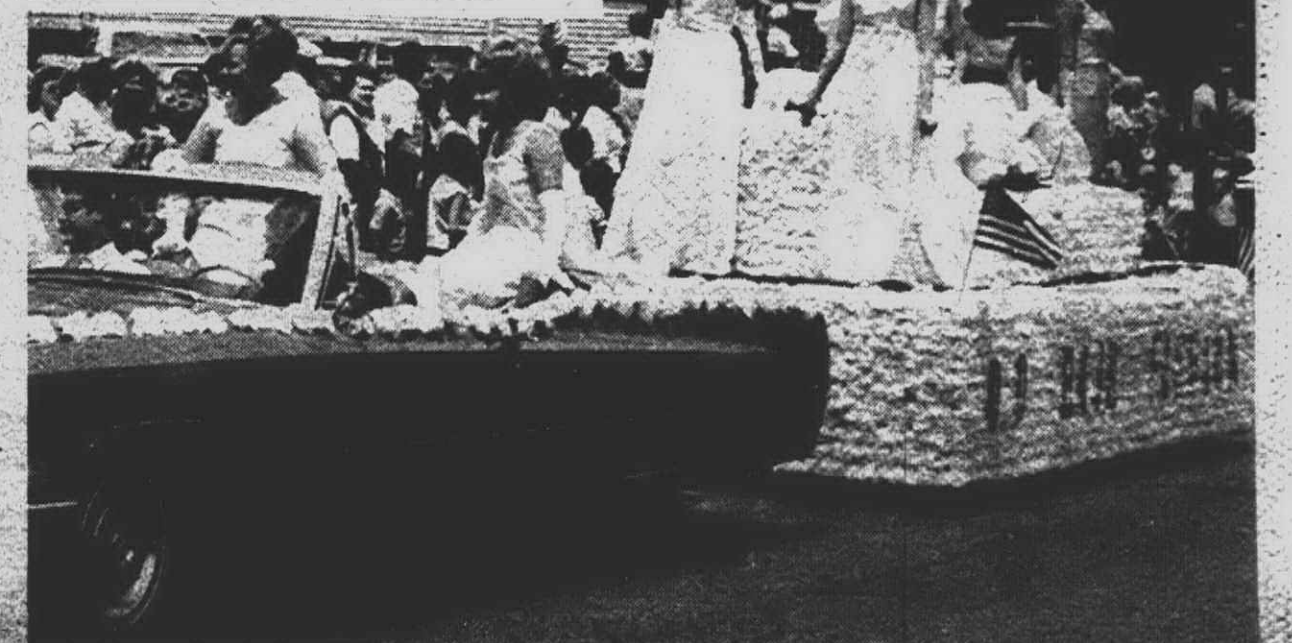
Another outstanding attraction was the Plymouth Bridge Club with 30 horses and ponies in the line.

Four bands supplied the martial airs for the affair, the most eye-catching being the Marching Angels Girls Band from Sarnia, Ontario. The Plymouth Community Band, and the Redford Highlanders, a Scottish bagpipe group, lent additional color to the occasion along with the State Champion color guard from Mayflower Post.

The color guard put on quite a show and was given a new duty when it escorted Mayor Jabara from his car to the City Hall lawn for the ceremony at the Rock.

All told, it was a great day—and one that will give Plymouth cause to remember for a long time.

Worst Traffic Jam In Years Climaxes Fireworks Display

Even though a peculiar set of circumstances forced the people of Plymouth to go to Northville Township for their annual July Fourth fireworks display the end result was just the same—a spectacular display and a terrific traffic jam.

Because of last week's heavy rains that made many areas too soggy to bear the traffic and ordinances that prevented the use of suitable locations in both the City of Plymouth and Plymouth Township, the Jaycees, sponsor of the event, finally chose a golf driving range at Five Mile and Haggerty Road in Northville Township for the heavenly display.

Fearing there would be little room for parking, the lovers of

fireworks started arriving before dusk and by the time the display was under way the highways on all sides of the site were jammed for more than two miles.

One member of the Sheriff's Patrol estimated that if the traffic had been linked in a single line it would have extended eight miles.

The cars were parked on both sides of Five Mile Road for a mile on either side of the range. The same was true on Haggerty for a mile on either side of Five Mile and Eckles Road was the same.

Not much attention was paid to the line-up until the fireworks display ended. Then, all tried to move at once, and if

you've ever seen an eight-mile traffic jam trying to get free, you can visualize the scene that marked the climax of the July Fourth celebration.

There was nothing above the ordinary in the fireworks display—but the traffic jam was one of the best—or worst.

Gang Fights Cause Shift In Dances

Because of gang fights between groups of teen-agers from Plymouth and Northville on two successive weeks, the Wednesday Night Summer Teen dances at senior high school being sponsored by the Plymouth Jaycees will be limited to Plymouth residents.

This announcement was made by Jon Kipke, chairman of the activity who also explained the new system for admission. Beginning July 10 an official pass from the Recreation Department will be required for admission.

These passes may be obtained by presenting proof of Plymouth residency at the Plymouth Recreation office any week day from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m.

Out-of-town guests will be permitted only when approval is given by the Recreation Department officials.

Dress regulations also will continue. Boys must wear slacks or dress pants (no blue-jeans) and a sport shirt. Girls must wear a skirt, dress or culottes.

Plymouth vs. Livonia

Supervisor's Race Packed With Interest

It will be Plymouth against Livonia in the primary election battle for the lone seat available in the new streamlined Wayne County Board of Supervisors.

Under the one man-one vote plan the County Board will be reduced from 126 to 26 seats and it promises to be a merry battle on all sides. But nowhere else in the county will be the race be more interesting than in the Plymouth-Livonia district.

Of the 13 eligible candidates only two—City Commissioner Arch Vallier, a present member of the County Board, and Carl Pursell, president of the

Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce—represent Plymouth and they are on different sides of the political fence.

VALLIER, whose several weeks ago said he didn't know whether to run as a Democrat or a Republican, chose the former banner. Pursell, on the other hand, is the leader of the Republicans in Plymouth.

Opposing the Plymouth pair will be six Democrats and five Republicans.

Heading the Democratic group are Paul Kadish, head of the Livonia Democrats, and Don Friedrichs, Director of Secondary Education in the Li-

vonis schools. With them are Gerald K. O'Brien, James Carroll, James P. McCarthy (not to be confused with the Plymouth Township Justice of the Peace) and Vernon Foster.

The Livonia Republican delegation includes Henry Sladek, Wayne County Chairman, Albert Ayotte, Councilman Edward Milligan and Joseph C. Keane.

UNDER THE new plan, making the supervisor role a full time position, either Milligan or Vallier, if elected, would have to resign from their city posts.

The Plymouth Commissioner has made no secret of the fact that, in his opinion, the county job is more important than serving on the City Commission and he would resign immediately—if elected.

Pursell is not a newcomer to the political arena. He topped the Republican ticket in Wayne County in the last state senatorial election, but lost out in Oakland County.

So, it promises to be an interesting battle — Vallier against Pursell in Plymouth —the both of them against Livonia in the big battle for votes.

Police Sound Warning Of Phone Racket

Assistant Plymouth Police Chief Loren Johnson has issued a warning for Plymouth residents telling them to be extra cautious when answering questions over the telephone regarding their bank accounts.

Johnson said one case was reported last Tuesday and he is confident that someone else will be contacted in the Plymouth area again.

The people doing the calling, he said, usually call elderly men and women and tell them they are bank officials. A hundred different approaches can be used to gain the persons confidence, he added.

The case reported wasn't successful because the woman became suspicious before the caller was able to complete the transaction.

JOHNSON said the woman,

an elderly widow who wished to remain nameless, was telephoned by someone who said he was from a local bank. He asked the lady when she had the interest entered into her pass book the last time.

Before she was aware that the man was a fraud she gave him all of the information he asked for and volunteered some other information.

The caller then asked if she would come to the bank and straighten the matter out. The caller said he would be glad to send a car to pick her up.

She was about to accept the caller's offer of a ride when he asked her when she had made the last car payment.

The woman told the caller that she never owned a car and flatly refused his previous offer. The caller then pretended to have called the wrong party

and said he thought he was talking to a depositor in a Northville bank.

As soon as the caller hung up, the woman telephoned Plymouth police and explained what had happened.

JOHNSON explained that if the woman had agreed to go to the bank—which was never intended—then as time was running out last Tuesday afternoon he decided to forego entering the campaign for his county job under the setup for a streamlined Board of Supervisors.

For several weeks he claimed he was undecided and even last Monday he displayed a filing check to friends and confided he still hadn't made a decision.

Then, with the deadline hour of 4 o'clock approaching, he acted.

"I think my services are more important to the Township than the County," he explained, "and I'll stay home and do the job here."

His decision not to make a bid for a seat on the County Board will have no effect on his serving as a member of the Detroit Water Board. He is serving here as an appointee of Detroit Mayor Jerome Cavanagh.

When they would arrive at the bank, Johnson speculated, the men would probably tell her they were trying to catch a teller who had been stealing money and ask the lady to withdraw a certain amount and turn it over to them.

The men would then give the woman some kind of plausible story and leave with her money and she would never hear from them again.

The assistant chief said, "Even if the bank should call a person they shouldn't say anything until the caller had completely identified himself."

He cautioned everyone to be extremely careful and take nothing for granted when speaking on the phone.

The persons operating this sort of racket, he added, usually pick elderly persons to call upon. He said they are not the strong-arm type of operator and would be frightened away at the least hint of trouble.

The recent rains registered 3.92 inches over an eight hour period on the city's new rain gauge. This is the highest recorded here in years. Ken Vogras, Director of the Department of Public Works, explained.

WHILE THIS was bad in the city, it also brought about unusual flooding in Hines Parkway and the area on Ann Arbor Road, just east of Lilley Road. In this area the water was up to windshields on autos that attempted to drive through and stalled.

Nothing like this had happened before and with the increased amount of building in recent years cutting down the amount of land that will absorb the water, the danger of flooding is ever present in a heavy rain.

That's the reason the City Commission is taking the suggested plan for thorough examination of the city under consideration.

With the world turning more and more to automation the time has come to look around for additional outlets to help the people make use of their increased leisure time. And there's no better place to start than the Hines Parkway.

Running from Northville to Metropolitan Detroit this strip of land through which flows an arm of the Rouge River could be made one of the real beauty and recreational areas in the entire state. It has all the ingredients for an outstanding recreational program—and its scenic splendor is all that one could ask.

On the surface it looks ideal now with lakes, rivulets and singing little brooks and the man-made baseball diamonds, football fields, and picnic areas.

Look behind the outward beauty and you'll find polluted and stagnant water, shores piled with debris and unkempt areas that would almost make one heartsick. One drive through the park at a leisurely rate furnishes ample proof to the old saying that "beauty is only skin deep."

THE OFFICIALS who have jurisdiction over the parkway must know the real conditions for it is brought to their attention each year when the Jaycees and the Boy Scouts combined their efforts to clean up a small section of the Rouge River.

Just a few weeks ago these combined forces took more than three tons of debris from the water in four short hours. Despite this yeoman service, they made only a dent in the "junk" that is in the stream.

They did the same thing a year ago when the work was called to the attention of the powers that be—and to no avail.

Now the time has come to act.



Healy Favors Holding New Court In Township

Thomas H. Healy, prominent attorney and former legal counsel for the City of Plymouth who has entered the race for nomination as judge of the new district court, firmly believes that the court should sit in Plymouth Township.

Under the law, the Township will not be eligible for a court facility until 1970, but a week ago Supervisor John E. McEwen announced that he was studying a plan with the hope of establishing the court now. At the time, McEwen explained that Plymouth Township had the largest population, the largest area and the largest assessed valuation. Because of

Healy is one of six seeking the nomination. With him are two incumbent municipal judges—Dunbar Davis, of Plymouth, and Philip Ogilvie, of Northville. Others in the race are Robert Greenstein and Alton Shirley, of Canton Township, and Allen Ingle of Northville.

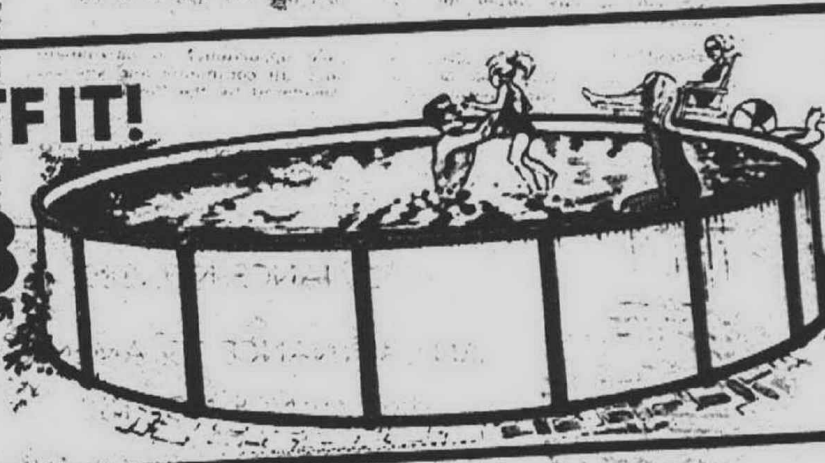

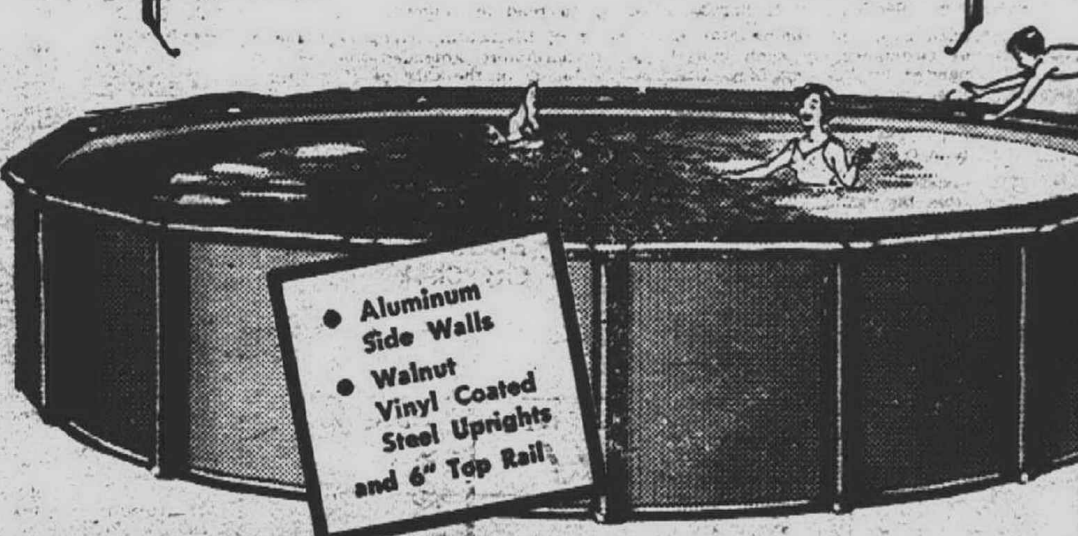

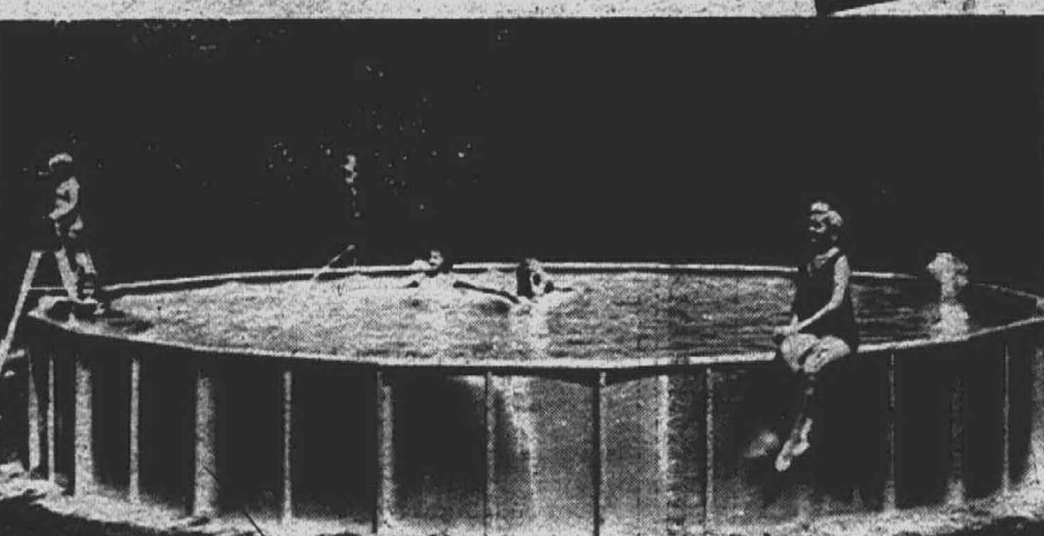

The stereotype was passed on in part by motion pictures in which the real accomplishments of black people were never shown.

THIRTY - THREE thousand movies have been produced in the last 60 years; 6,000 of them had roles for Negroes—all portrayed the way whites wanted to see them: eating watermelons, being frightened, sounding dumb, being servants to white people, never as intelligent people who had a major share in the history of this nation.

All films, incidentally, were written, produced and directed by white.

"Even newsreels," Cosby said, "helped black cats in their place. Everything suggested the black man was nothing."

THE RESULTS of these lies about history have been devastating. The white man thought of himself as superior; the black man learned to be inferior. He was not permitted to learn the history of his own race. Only white history.

Now black children have lost almost all sense of themselves as humans. Instead they see themselves as faceless people without arms and strength.

The television program demonstrated this with pictures of trees, homes and people drawn

by 10-year-old black children who have been the victims of white superiority in education. In contrast, white children of the same age were able to draw pictures of themselves which were complete with faces and arms.

IS IT SURPRISING that the black kids grow up to be adults unable to participate fully in American life? And when that happens we whites feel justified in saying, "See how lazy they are."

That nonsense is just one fragment of the lies produced by whites about black people, the lie which almost succeeded in keeping blacks "in their place."

The truth is being heard now, thanks to television programs like "Of Black America," CBS-TV and the Xerox Corporation have six more Tuesday night programs planned about black history.

Every white man should watch.

ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE

THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

Section 1. The Zoning Map of the City of Plymouth Ordinance No. 182, Zoning Ordinance of the City of Plymouth, Michigan, is hereby revised as follows:
Area "A". That part of Lot No. 662 of Assessor's Plymouth Plat No. 19 of part of S.W. 1/4 of Section 26, T.15S., R.1E., City of Plymouth, Wayne County, Michigan, as recorded in the Wayne County Records in Liber 67 of Plats, on Page 26, on March 16, 1940, described as: The Southern 300 feet of said Lot No. 662, except the Western 145 feet thereof, changed from M-2, General Industrial District, to M-1, Light Industrial District, zoning.
Area "B". That part of Lot No. 662 of Assessor's Plymouth Plat No. 19 of part of S.W. 1/4 of Section 26, T.15S., R.1E., City of Plymouth, Wayne County, Michigan, as recorded in the Wayne County Records in Liber 67 of Plats, on Page 26, on March 16, 1940, described as: The Northern 75 feet of the Southern 300 feet of said Lot No. 662, changed from M-2, General Industrial District, to M-1, Light Industrial District, zoning.
Area "C". That part of Lot No. 662 of Assessor's Plymouth Plat No. 19 of part of S.W. 1/4 of Section 26, T.15S., R.1E., City of Plymouth, Wayne County, Michigan, as recorded in the Wayne County Records in Liber 67 of Plats, on Page 26, on March 16, 1940, described as: The Northern 75 feet of the Southern 300 feet of said Lot No. 662, changed from M-2, General Industrial District, to M-1, Light Industrial District, zoning.
Section 2. Section 2.03 is hereby amended to read as follows:
Section 2.03. The Zoning Map of the City of Plymouth, originally made a part of this Ordinance, as such map has been heretofore amended and as now further amended by "Zoning Map Amendment No. 42 of the City of Plymouth" which map is hereto attached and made a part of this Ordinance, shall be the official Zoning Map of the City of Plymouth.
Section 3. This Ordinance shall be declared an emergency ordinance and become immediately effective.
Made, passed and adopted by the City Commission of the City of Plymouth, Michigan, this 1st day of July A.D. 1968.

Summer Is Time To 'Play It Cool' While Gardening

Summer gardening can be sheer delight or absolute torture. It all depends on your point of view and on your plan of action. This is the time of year to take it a little easy and do only the chores necessary to keep the yard and garden growing and pleasant.

Pick the times, places and jobs carefully. When temperatures soar keep tempers down by gardening in the early morning or early evening when it's cool.

Follow the shade around and wear a broad-brimmed hat unless you are actively working on a sun tan or sunstroke. Divide up the work into small jobs. Do a job or two and then head for the hammock or a comfortable chair and relax and enjoy the garden.

Grass cutting is one job that just can't be avoided. Other chores can be evaded or postponed, but not this one. Grass grows quickly in warm, humid weather. Set the mower a bit higher in summer. Two inches is about right.

KEEP after the crab grass. It sprouts and grows well in warm weather. Dig it out if there's only a little. If there's a big invasion use chemical controls. Get it, though before seed heads form.

This is the best season to use 2-4-D to kill broadleaf weeds. Be very careful, though, that you do not get any spray drifting onto ornamental plants.

Also, where roots of trees and shrubs extend out into the lawn beneath the grass they can be injured by absorbing weed-killers. Roots often extend much

further than is realized, so use these chemicals with caution.

CAUTION is the watch-word, too, when using insecticides and pest killers. Even though we depend on them to keep our gardens from being chewed up or destroyed by fungus and blights, they are all potentially dangerous to humans. Use them only when conditions indicate that they are necessary, and use them only where they are needed, not indiscriminately all over the yard and garden.

Those considered safest to

use include Sevin and Malathion. Follow all directions on the labels carefully.

If a problem is a special stickler or special advice is needed the county extension service can be contacted, Wayne County Cooperative Extension Service in cooperation with the Metropolitan Detroit Landscape Association has a unique service. Dial 728-8000 for a two minute recording on how to deal with a current garden problem. This is known as the "Problem of the Day Report".

So far this year there has been

a super-abundance of rain, so gardeners have not had to water. If dry weather comes later, don't neglect newly planted trees and shrubs, especially evergreens. They should be watered every couple of weeks.

Lawns can survive without watering. During dry spells the grass becomes dormant, but not dead. It revives when cool, moist weather comes. If you do water the lawn, don't give it light sprinklings. Soak it deeply when you do water so roots will grow deep and the lawn will be healthy.

To get the most color from your annuals keep the seeds from forming. Cut off faded flowers. Also feed them with a fast acting liquid fertilizer every ten days for a real boost. This "force feeding" will really make them lush.

Planting is normally finished by this time, but "canned" plants can be set out at any time. In fact most perennials can be moved even when they are in bloom if great care is taken. It's easier, though, to wait and do the transplanting when they are dormant.

If heavy rains washed out seeds of flowers and vegetables, it's not too late to start over. Choose quick growing annuals that will come into flower in a few weeks, or else buy seedlings from a nursery. Many vegetables can be sown in mid summer for a late season crop.

Check the growing times needed to make sure they will mature before frost time in mid-September.

Alleged King Slayer Fights Extradition To U.S.

LONDON — Chief Magistrate Frank Milton granted the order for extradition of James Earl Ray to the United States. Ray is wanted in this country for the murder of Dr. Martin Luther King. Ray was given the right to legal aid to appeal the decision within the required 15 days. Ray's attorney had pleaded that the murder of King had

been a political act, hence not a legal reason for extradition. The judge refused to accept

this. A British lawyer representing the U.S., said, "There is not a shred of evidence to show that the murder took place to further the ends of a larger enterprise."

PARIS — Averell Harriman, U.S. Ambassador in the Paris peace talks, thanked Hanoi for its decision to free three Amer-

ican pilots. Harriman hopes this is a move toward future progress in the peace talks. The North Vietnamese Ambassador Xuan Thuy accepted the thanks but insisted there was not one "centimeter" of progress made.

MOSCOW — Ambassadors from Britain, France and the

U.S. each delivered notes of protest to the Soviet government, urging them to ease the East German restriction on travel into Berlin.

In answer to the pleas of "fulfilling their international obligation to assure freedom of access to Berlin," the Russians said East Germany "has a right to protect its terri-

tory."

PARIS — American negotiators feel that North Vietnam does not trust the U.S. military promises that American troops will be pulled out of South Vietnam as soon as possible after a peace settlement.

The problem is still deadlocked, after seven weeks of

negotiation, with neither side showing inclination to make a move that would lead to a break.

PARIS — Red China openly supported the rioting students and striking workers in France's social strife last month. And French students who label themselves Mao Tse-

tung admirers, played a crucial role in provoking the six-week university upheaval.

However, there is little evidence that Red China actually was directly involved. According to available estimates, the Maoist wing of the French party has about 1,000 members.

Stop and Frisk Law Passed In Detroit

DETROIT — The controversial stop and frisk ordinance has been approved, 5 to 2, by the Detroit Common Council. But there is speculation that Mayor Jerome Cavanagh might veto the ordinance.

The stop and frisk law as approved contains three sections. The first says a police officer can stop and question a person when "the behavior of an individual warrants further investigation."

The second says he can conduct a "limited search," meaning a frisk or a patdown for dangerous weapons. He can then either make an arrest or set the suspect free.

The third section requires police to take special care in protecting civil liberties and individual dignity.

DETROIT — The Paper and Plate Handlers Union has voted to accept the \$33-for-34 1/2-month settlement with management of the Detroit News and Detroit Free Press.

The approval made the union the first in the printing crafts to accept general terms negotiated by Dr. Nathan Feinsinger, mediator.

The Teamsters Union earlier had accepted the general formula.

LANSING — The controversial Sunday liquor bill is now in the laps of county boards of supervisors after Gov. George Romney permitted the bill to become law without his signature.

Romney, a non-drinking Mormon, said he declined to veto the measure despite his personal feeling that "this would be a much better world if there was no consumption of alcoholic beverages."

The bill which becomes effective immediately, authorizes county boards to legalize sale of liquor by establishments which derive at least half their gross receipts from sale of services or goods other than liquor.

STANFORD, Calif. — Arjay Miller, a 20-year Ford Motor Co. executive, will leave his post as vice chairman of the board next July 1 to become dean of the Stanford University graduate school of business.

The announcement was made last week by the university. Miller, 52, of Ann Arbor, had served as Ford president until Semon Knudson came over from General Motors to assume the Ford presidency and Miller was elevated to the vice chairmanship of the board.

WASHTENAW COUNTY — Robert F. Thompson, a former Ypsilanti urban renewal director, pled guilty in Washtenaw County Circuit Court last week to fraudulently obtaining signatures on a contract for sale of real estate.

The contract dealing involved William Schumacher, a builder, involved in an urban renewal program.

FLINT — Approximately 2,600 Buick Motor Co. plant employees were laid off for three days after an explosion ripped through the Flint plant burning one man on the neck last week.

A faulty pilot light in a gas oven apparently allowed gas to accumulate in the oven, then exploded. There was no fire, authorities reported.

The blast on Flint's north-east side knocked out glass panes and steel window frames on the plant's third and fourth floors. No damage estimate was given by company officials.

LANSING — State Atty. Gen. Frank J. Kelley ruled that there was legally no conflict of interest in the acquisition and

sale of property near the Michigan State University campus by MSU President John A. Hannah.

However, Kelley observed, "there are potential dangers in permitting officers of state institutions to acquire real estate in close proximity to the very institution in which they exercise their delegated powers."

EAST LANSING — Gov. Romney has given his approval to the city to place on the Nov. 5 ballot a proposed amendment to the city charter to permit the sale of alcoholic beverages.

Approval must also be received from the office of the attorney general before the question can legally be placed on the ballot.

If approved by East Lansing residents, the proposed amendment would permit the sale of alcoholic beverages in hotels and motels where there are more than 50 sleeping rooms, a public dining room and a general kitchen.

LANSING — Declaring it "is not too much to ask" that bars be separated from churches and schools by 500 feet, Gov. Romney last week vetoed a bill that would have repealed the physical barrier.

Romney rejected the measure that would have allowed establishments now licensed to sell beer and wine to peddle liquor if they are located within 500 feet from a church or school.

LANSING — The State Administrative Board has awarded a two-year state printing contract to Speaker-Hines & Thomas, Inc., of Lansing for \$1,583,878.

Included in the contract is book printing, forms, letter heads and envelopes, Conservation Department license forms and law digests and the Conservation Department magazine, "Michigan Conservation."

LANSING — Last week Gov. Romney signed into law five special housing measures — four of the five deal with tenant's rights.

Romney called it "the most significant package of breakthrough legislation in Michigan history."

LANSING — A proposal for a \$100-million state bond issue for money to carry out major expansions of the state's public recreation facilities next year will go before Michigan voters this November.

"With this bond issue," Gov. Romney said, "we can expand our state park system with 6,000 new campsites and day-use parking space for 18,000 more cars, which will enable us to serve an additional 189,000 people every day."

SAGINAW — City firemen staged a slowdown last Monday, refusing to perform any routine jobs other than fighting fires and answering emergency calls.

DETROIT — Three occupants of a private plane that crashed into a building on the city's east side last week remain in serious condition in the hospital.

Authorities said the plane ran out of gas while circling the Detroit River to view a fireworks display and crashed about a mile from the City Airport.

The pilot, Fred Hargrave, 23, of Pontiac, passengers, Josephine Peterson, 19, of Rochester, Mary Sobourin, 21, of Pontiac remain in the hospital while Paul Sobourin, 24, was treated and released.

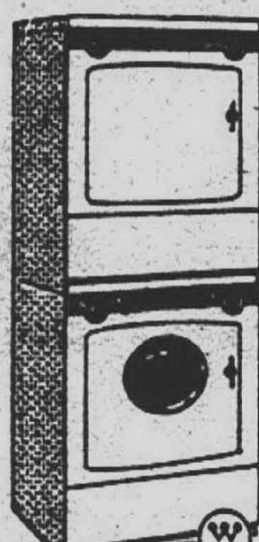

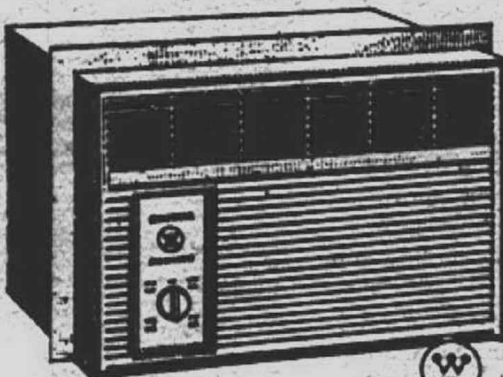

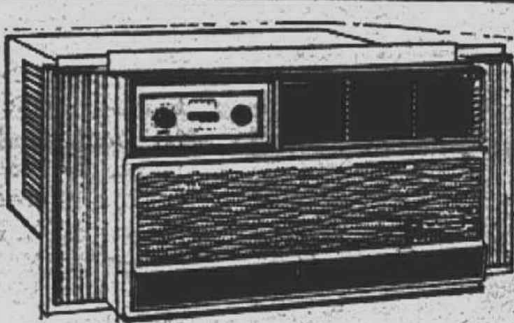

A Cow Starts It All; Then Kroger Takes Over

The most recent addition to Observerland's major industry shines with cleanliness and bristles with efficiency.

In the process, it handles a daily output of 20,000 of Michigan's best dairy cows.

The new Kroger Co. Dairy, located at 29600 Industrial Rd., Livonia, beside the Kroger warehouse, is the largest combined milk and ice cream plant in the United States.

Actually in operation for sev-

eral months, the plant was dedicated officially in three days of June Dairy Month festivities last weekend. Many Kroger officials from the food chain's headquarters in Cincinnati were on hand as Robert Montgomery, executive vice president, and Livonia Mayor Harvey W. Moelke joined in the opening.

PRECEDING the ceremonies were tours for press and stockholders of the 115,000 square

foot dairy plant, where 13,800 gallons of milk can be pasteurized in an hour and where no part of the consumer product ever is touched by any of the hundred or more employees.

"Sanitation is the secret of the dairy business," said Bob Johnson, who is Kroger's manager of regulatory compliance in the Cincinnati headquarters and served as one of the guides during the press tour.

Everywhere in the plant were

evidences that this principle is gospel there.

Floors are wet most of the time from constant washing.

Large tanks hold seemingly inexhaustible supply of cleaning fluid, which Johnson explained is pumped through all the equipment after each batch of milk is processed.

And the entire plant is connected by a series of pipelines that carry the milk and cream from process to pro-

cess, never touched by workers and rarely exposed to the air.

The number of steps needed before Mrs. Housewife takes that half-gallon of homogenized milk or pint of cottage cheese out of the supermarket cooler amazes each visitor.

FROM THE MOMENT the tank-truck, laden with raw milk picked up at one of Kroger's 12 collection centers around the state, pulls into the dairy plant garage, every step in the processing is precisely controlled.

At the intake point, the milk is checked for its butterfat content and to see if any water has been added.

Then it starts through its first series of pipes, a set of coils that is set to keep every particle of milk at 175 degrees Fahrenheit for 16 seconds for the pasteurizing process.

If anything goes wrong, the plant guide explained, the milk is automatically diverted back to the raw milk tank and the process starts over.

NEXT STOP for the pasteurized milk is a nearby tank where it is homogenized or separated.

Then comes an intricate series of valves which direct the necessary amount of milk into huge tanks that hold the various liquid products—one for homogenized milk and others for skim milk, buttermilk, chocolate milk, low-fat milk.

The valves also send some of the milk on its way to be used for cottage cheese, sour cream and ice cream.

Waiting for processing or bottling, the milk is stored in four tremendous tanks that rise four stories and hold 25,000 gallons each. There also are two spare tanks.

Gadgets in the laboratory are marks of the careful attention paid to quality control.

There is a cryoscope to determine whether any water has been added, and a milk-o-tester to make a quick check of butterfat content. Another machine makes the Babcock test, which is the only government-approved method of determining butterfat, and a Majomier tester to learn the amount of butterfat in solid milk products.

Laboratory technicians also check a sample of each dairy product for bacteria each day, and they repeat the tests on each one five days later and seven days later to assure safety in storage.

COTTAGE CHEESE is made in huge 4,800-pound vats, about four feet long and four feet high and stretching the length of a vast room. After the product is solidified with the addition of rennet, wires strung onto a frame make the giant cheese-cutters that divide it into large or small curd cottage cheese.

After being processed and boxed, the non-frozen products are stored in a cooler room, where they are kept at a temperature of 36 to 38 degrees until being shipped to the stores.

ICE CREAM, mixed in batching tanks by means of a wall gauge that determines the ingredients and flavors, get boxed on a large conveyor line and they are stored in a refrigerator room that is kept 30 degrees below zero.

When the creamery products are ready, they go by exact order to each of the Kroger stores in large areas served by the dairy.

Each order, computer-compiled, is loaded with precision onto a small truck that can drive right into the rear door of the large delivery trucks backed up to the loading platform.

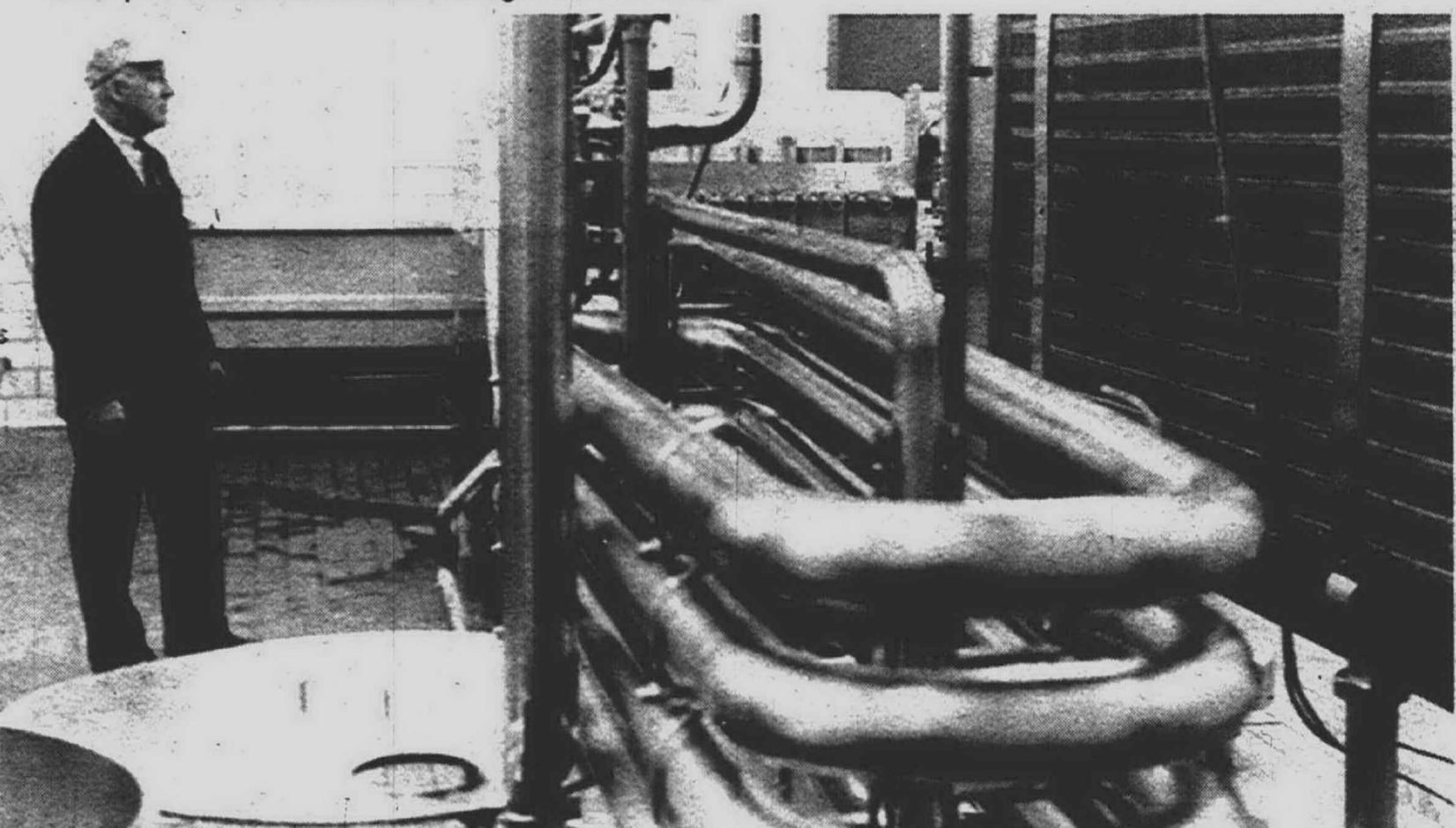
The Kroger Company, celebrating its 85th anniversary this month, also plans to open a new dairy in St. Louis in September to add to its service in the mid-west.

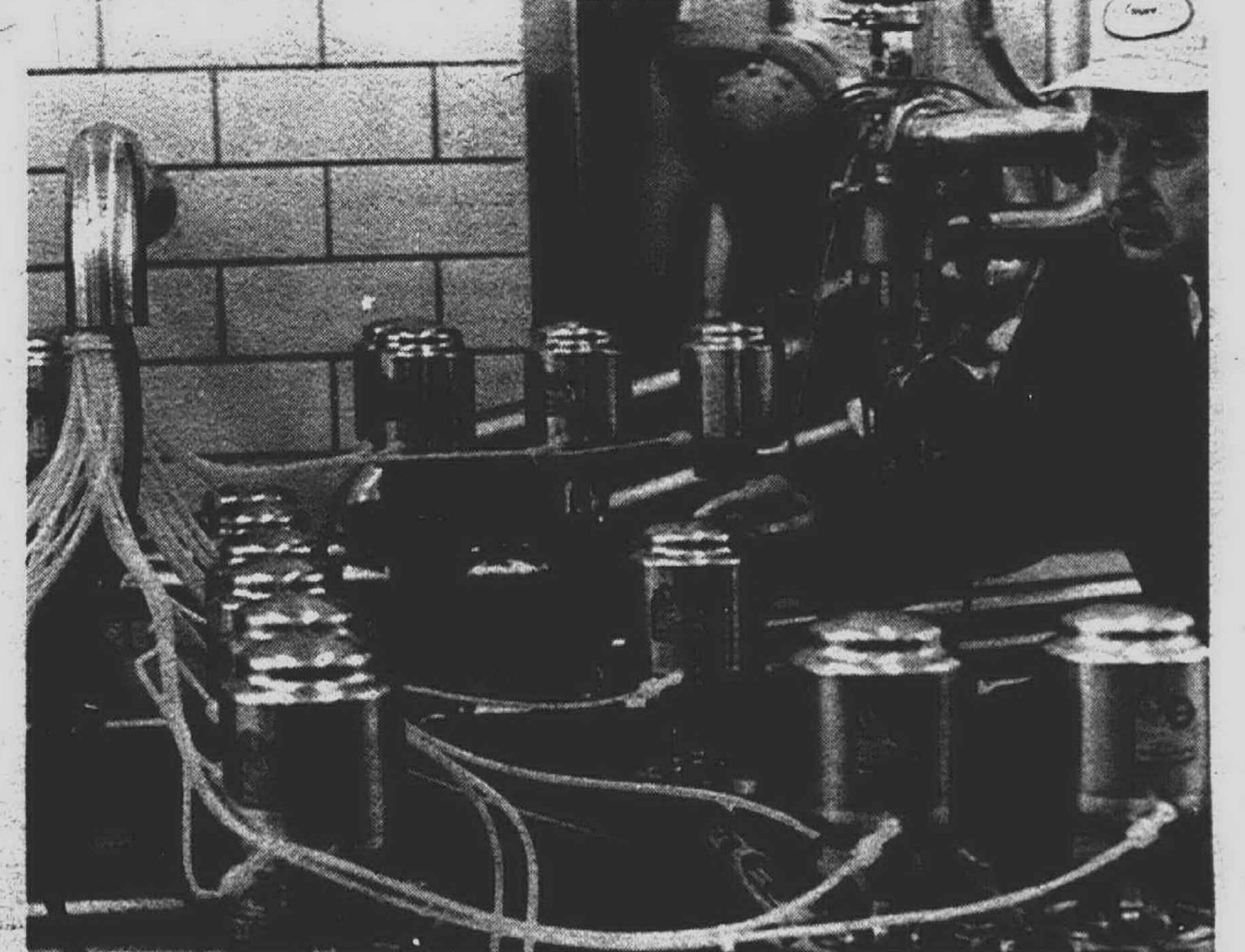

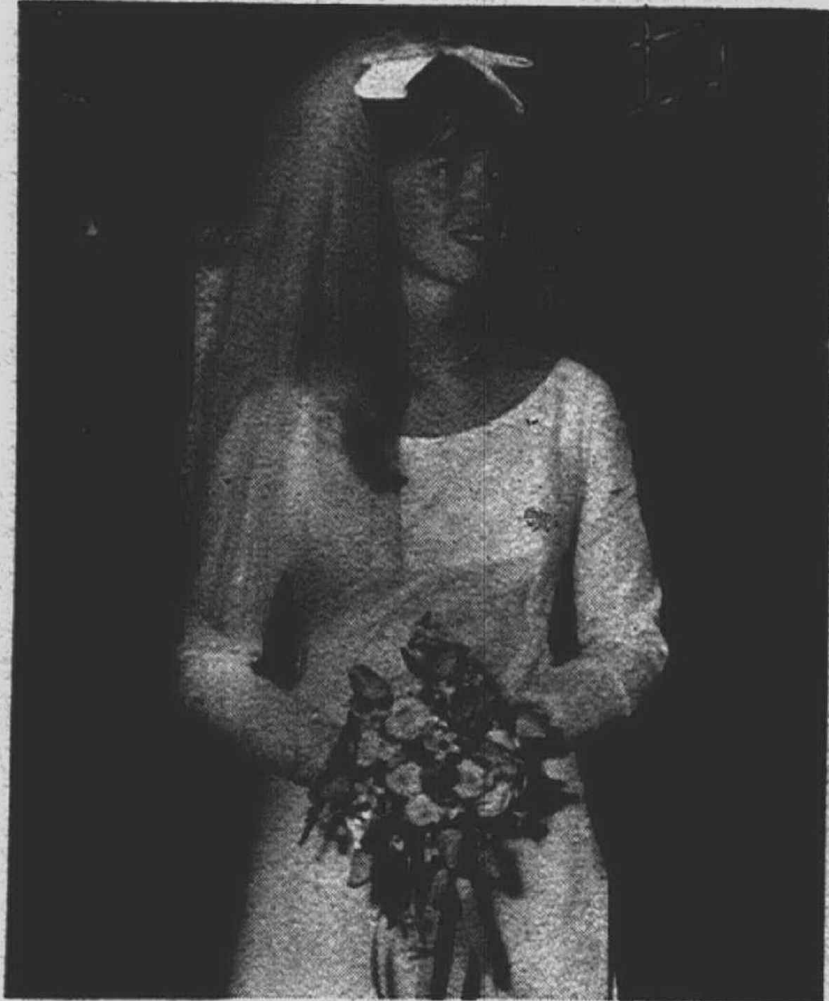

Bank Card Credit Use To Expand

Credit cards from national oil companies and major retailers have provided for many years the convenience of delayed payment and freedom from carrying large sums of cash.

Added to them in recent years are travel and entertainment credit cards.

The credit-card way of life seems to be accepted. Almost 500 million credit cards are currently in circulation in the United States, according to Helen E. Bell, extension home management specialist at Pennsylvania State University.

A NEW USE for credit cards includes the extension of credit. Many large city banks are now offering multi-purchase credit cards.

The bank-card plan entitles the holder to make purchases in several stores and to pay for them with one payment to the bank. In effect, the bank extends credit to the customer by assuring member stores in the bank's plan that the buyer will pay for his purchases.

Electronic devices have simplified bookkeeping details to the extent that many kinds of payments can be included in the one-bank card plan, Miss Bell explains.

Detour: Farmington Rd. Project To Get Underway July 8

If your business or pleasure takes you to Farmington Road, between Five Mile and Schoolcraft, the going may not be easy for the next four months. Construction work, which includes widening and paving of that important mile in Livonia's center, is underway.

Beginning Monday, the mile will be closed to through traffic. Let Lieut. Robert E. Thorne, officer in charge of the Traffic Bureau for the Livonia police, tell you what to expect, now that removal of trees and sewer construction on the right-of-way has been going on for a week.

Says Lieut. Thorne:

"ON JULY 8, 1968, excavation

and sub-base construction will start on the east side of Farmington, working north from Schoolcraft. They will work north to Five Mile, then south from Five Mile on the west side.

"Actual paving should be completed by September 15, although work will continue until November 1.

"Lyndon will be open for cross-traffic until the paving work starts, probably some time after the first of August.

"The fire drive and the police vehicle drive will be open. Civic center drive, the school board drive, summers, etc., will be closed."

(The police headquarters building, water board building,

and parks and recreation office are in this mile. Other city offices on Farmington are below in this mile. Other city offices on Farmington are below Schoolcraft in the mile to be paved next year).

"THE DETOUR will be Schoolcraft, Middle Belt, Five Mile Roads, Merriman, north of Schoolcraft, will be closed for sewer construction until sometime next week. The Merriman widening between Plymouth and Schoolcraft will probably start about the middle of August.

"The project cost (Farmington mile) is \$523,260.25.

"The section between Five Mile and Lyndon will be boulevard similar to the section north of Five Mile Road. The road will be a five-lane 60-foot-wide highway from Lyndon to Schoolcraft."

The three-mile stretch of Farmington between Five and Eight Mile Roads was completed last fall by the Wayne County Road Commission, which pays 60 per cent of the cost, the city paying the remainder.

Robert A. Shaw, director of Public Works, said the mile of Farmington between Schoolcraft and Plymouth can not be completed for another 18 months, probably, because of the grade separation that must be built at the C. & O. Railroad crossing. The railroad

will pay a large part of that cost.

THE COMPLETION of Merriman between Plymouth and Schoolcraft this fall will provide a good detour route next summer, when Farmington is closed below Schoolcraft, Shaw said.

The city expects to press the Wayne County Road Commission to keep a promise, reported now delayed indefinitely, to widen and pave Five Mile road across town. It passes city hall, and is considered because of its age and its patchwork, to be "dangerous." The city has funds for its share of the cost—including a mile of boulevard probably from Hubbard Road west. The commission contends that other communities complain that Livonia, younger and larger and growing faster than other Wayne County suburbs, has been getting more than its share of highway money, at their expense.

A number of bargaining meetings have been held since April 1, in an effort to solve salary and other differences before school starts in September. Reports were that the two sides are far apart on money matters.

After the civil strife of 1967 and the assassination of Martin Luther King Jr. and Senator Robert Kennedy this year, the issue most talked about now is imposing a new strict gun control law throughout the country. President Johnson believes that gun control would curb acts of wanton violence.

Opposition to this law is coming from the N.R.A. (National Rifle Association), which feels that having registration of rifles and shotguns is infringing on the rights of hunters.

Gun control has been in discussion for 30 years, and pressure has mounted to get it passed.

Here are some of the views of residents on the subject: PORTER BOURNE, 26530 Plymouth Rd., Redford.

"I am in favor of a gun control law. I feel that when anybody buys a gun of any type, he should have to show a hunting license and registration, and prove that he knows how to use the weapon properly."

MRS. JERRY FLOYD, 11768 Haller, Livonia.

"I feel I should be able to get a gun when and where I want, and I want a gun! I feel I should have one to protect myself, and to feel safer."

R. KRINCH, Inkster.

"I feel they should just ban guns, period, and the hunters can use a bow and arrow."

CARLA JACKSON, 5831 Ambury, Dearborn Heights.

"I can't see where gun control will solve the problem. Registration of guns cannot tell who fired the shots. If a person wants a gun he will get one, and only a good citizen will bother to register it any way."

LILLIAN WOODWARD, 30055 MacIntyre, Livonia.

"I am in favor of strict gun-control laws. I don't think it will solve the problem we have with guns, but it will help somewhat. It is important to start somewhere and it certainly couldn't hurt."

City Seeks Aid For Handicapped

Budget Increases Raise EMU Salaries

Eastern Michigan University's operating budget for 1968-69 will jump from \$16,723,467 to \$19,562,105, an increase of \$2,838,638.

The budget is based on an anticipated enrollment of 16,000 students, an increase of about 13,000 from the 1967-68 enrollment of 14,700.

Major revenue will come from an estimated state appropriation of \$11,648,257, and tuition and fees estimated at \$6,630,213.

Provisions are made for additional faculty and staff to serve the increased enrollment. EMU has also adopted a new salary schedule that provides for substantial upgrading of faculty salaries.

MAJOR PROVISIONS of the faculty schedule are substantially higher minimum salaries, an open-ended schedule for full professors, and a substitution of salary ranges for regular increments.

Under the previous salary schedule, put into effect in 1963, instructors were paid from \$5,400 to \$7,700. The new range is from \$6,500 to \$11,500.

Assistant professor pay ranges were changed from \$6,200-\$9,900 to \$8,000-\$14,300. Associate professor ranges move from \$8,400-\$12,400 to \$10,100-\$17,400.

Full professor ranges move from \$9,400 to \$15,000. The new scale provides for a minimum of \$12,000 and no maximum.

Among the 43 players checking in Thursday, there'll be 17 who were rookies or on the taxi squad last year, 11 new draftees and 11 free agents, plus the four new veterans—quarterback Bill Munson, late of the Rams, running back Dave Kopay and defensive ends John Baker and Joe Robb.

Heading the list of 17 players who were with the Lions last season are Mel Farr and Lem Barney who made it big as 1967 rookies. Joining them at early drills will be Nick Eddy, the Notre Dame All-American, who

missed the entire '67 season following knee surgery.

EDDY REPORTS that his knee is causing no trouble. "I've been playing a lot of handball," he says. "I also have been working on a weight-lifting program and now can lift more pounds with my operated knee than I can with my other one."

"I feel great. The knee doesn't bother me at all. I'm anxious to make up for missing action last year. Since I'm technically an NFL rookie, I'm shoot-

ing for one goal. And that is to see if I can do this year what Farr did last year when he was named rookie-of-the-year."

In six seasons of football in high school and at Notre Dame, Nick missed only one game by injury. That was the famous 1966 tie with Michigan State.

Rookie Phil Odle of Brigham Young heads for camp after a brilliant showing in the recent Coaches' All-Star Game at Atlanta where he caught 12 passes, one for a touchdown. He

also played defense and recovered a fumble.

A GROUP of 11 free agents—players who were not picked up by a pro team in the collegiate draft—will try to elbow into the Detroit football picture. Included are Stan Kemp, former U-M punter; Roger Lopes, ex-MSU runner, John Simkus, 6-7 line-man from Wayne State, and Greg Keller, a rugged linebacker from Pitt.

Coach Joe Schmidt will start two-a-day drills for all players July 16. The annual inter-squad scrimmage will be staged under auspices of the Detroit Lions Alumni Association at U-D Stadium on Friday night, July 26 with the first pre-season game scheduled at Buffalo on Aug. 5.

The only local pre-season game in Detroit this year will

be Friday night, Aug. 23, when the Lions take on the Baltimore Colts at Tiger Stadium. Four games will be played on the road, including an Aug. 11 meeting with the Philadelphia Eagles in Mexico City's 105,000-seat Aztec Stadium.

This game will be the first NFL game ever played in Mexico and will be televised nationally.

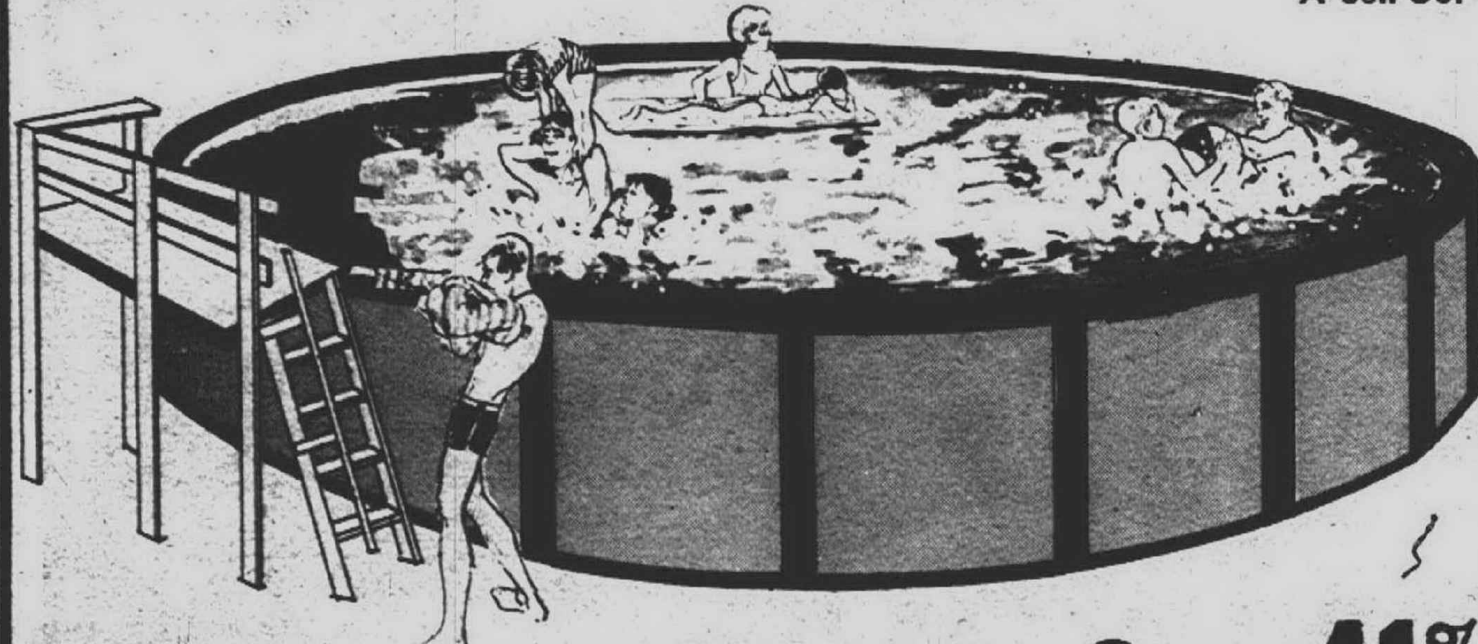

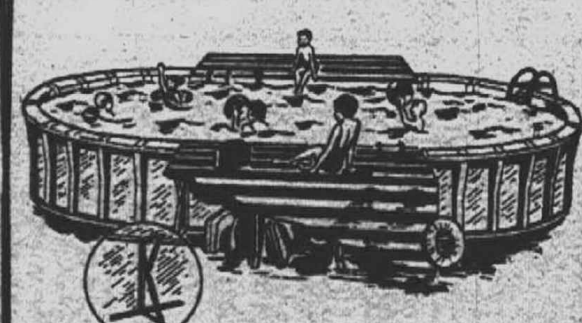

Nothing excites the chronicler of these words more than the realization that Denny McLain will be pitching to Bill Freehan in Tuesday night's All Star baseball game.

Over the years we've come to know both. Our first sight of Freehan dates back to the days when he couldn't have been more than 10 years old. His parents would bring Bill over to visit his grandparents who lived across the street from us.

A few years later we ran into Freehan on the Detroit sandlots. He was catching and we were trying to call the pitches correctly.

Later we had the privilege of escorting Bill to New York where he was one of the standouts in the Hearst All Star game.

Still later we watched him shine in baseball and football for the University of Michigan.

Then came the big bonus contract that made him a Detroit Tiger.

The rest of the Freehan story is well known. He has developed into the best catcher in baseball and not a bad first baseman, either.

He was voted the most valuable Tiger last season and appears a cinch to repeat this season. He could be the American League's MVP, assuming the Tigers remain where they are and roll on to win the pennant.

SUCCESS AND RICHES haven't changed Bill Freehan. He remains the same kind of a fellow he was ten years ago.

His teammates have great respect in his ability to do other baseball things, aside from playing. He's been the Tigers' player representative to meetings with the owners and from what we hear he's one of the most astute.

Freehan has had a lot to do with settling many of the problems which have arisen between the players and owners when it's come to salaries, pensions, etc.

Quietly, he worked to get the American League to reduce its schedule for next season. He's helped to hike minimum salaries for players, obtain extra money for road trips and straighten out other problems.

For this Bill has received no headlines.

ACROSS THE TIGER dressing room sits Denny McLain, who has to be the most misunderstood among the Tigers.

Many dislike him. Some don't believe him. There are those who still insist that Denny didn't hurt his toe last September when he got off a couch in his home in Farmington Township.

They say he had to be drunk or mad and kicked a bar stool, or something.

True, Denny has sounded off a few times about Tiger fans and their actions. Denny isn't all wrong when he expounds on this subject.

(A few recent incidents at Tiger Stadium didn't help but build up the Detroit fans as being some of the best in the country.)

Yet, we always have found Denny honest and interesting.

Also very helpful. NEXT TO BASEBALL and his family, Hammond organs play a major role in McLain's life. He's an excellent player at the keyboards.

"I think I'll wind up making more money in the organ business than I will in baseball," he told a sports writer in New York last week.

He teaches 21 students and it can be a little tough during the baseball season to squeeze the youngsters in between games at Tiger Stadium and road assignments.

McLain has changed in many ways. He has become more mature. Remember, he was only 20 when he came to the Tigers. He just turned 24 in March.

He used to guzzle down two or three gallons of soda pop a day. Now he's down to a few bottles. His pitching, which is most important, keeps improving with every season, with every game. He's already won 74 games in the big leagues.

BY THE RATE he's winning this season, he's a cinch to chalk up 25, or maybe even hit 30 triumphs.

"I had a lot of things to prove to a lot of people this year," Denny says. "I guess I'm bearing down harder, concentrating better."

"I can hardly wait to go out there and pitch. It's fun to win, but when you win and have a good lead like we have, there's nothing like it."

Only serious injuries can keep the Tigers from copping the pennant, Denny feels.

Denny certainly hasn't forgotten that the Tigers have roared without Al Kaline, without Earl Wilson, without Don Wert and without some of the others this season.

All of which proves they are a solid team... a team made more solid when they have a guy by the name of McLain around to pitch—and win—every fourth day.

Racing Enriches State Treasury

Horse racing poured \$16,585,788 into the treasury of the State of Michigan in 1967. The thoroughbred and trotting tracks paid the state a total of \$15,365,499 in taxes on their mutual handle, plus another \$1,220,288 in breakage.

The thoroughbred meeting at Hazel Park produced \$6,649,806 in taxes and breakage, the highest amount of tax revenue the state has ever realized from any track in a single year.

The present Hazel Park thoroughbred meeting, which will continue daily except Sundays through July 27, promises to provide considerably more tax revenue for the state than ever before. There is a strong likelihood that Hazel Park will average an unprecedented \$11-million a day in mutual handle.

Since its inception in 1949, the Hazel Park thoroughbred meetings have paid to the State of Michigan \$60,826,387 in taxes plus another \$5,428,229 in breakage for a total of \$66,254,616.

The Detroit Race Course paid the state \$6,133,722 in tax and breakage last year. The revenue from the trotting tracks follows: Wolverine Harness Raceway, \$1,398,410; Hazel Park Raceway, \$1,235,242; Northville Downs, \$786,003; and Jackson Raceway, \$382,602.

Revenue from racing was the highest ever in Michigan last

year--and the same held true for the country as a whole. Revenue to state treasuries from all forms of racing soared last year to \$394,381,913, according to statistics compiled by the National Association of State Racing Commissioners.

This marked the 18th consecutive year in which national racing revenue showed an increase over the previous year. Thoroughbred racing, of course, provided the greater part of the revenue with payments that totaled \$266,385,121 in 27 states.

This year's festival is the second in a series that began last year. The Court orchestra is small—27 to 30 members—uses top Schoolcraft students, and members of the Detroit

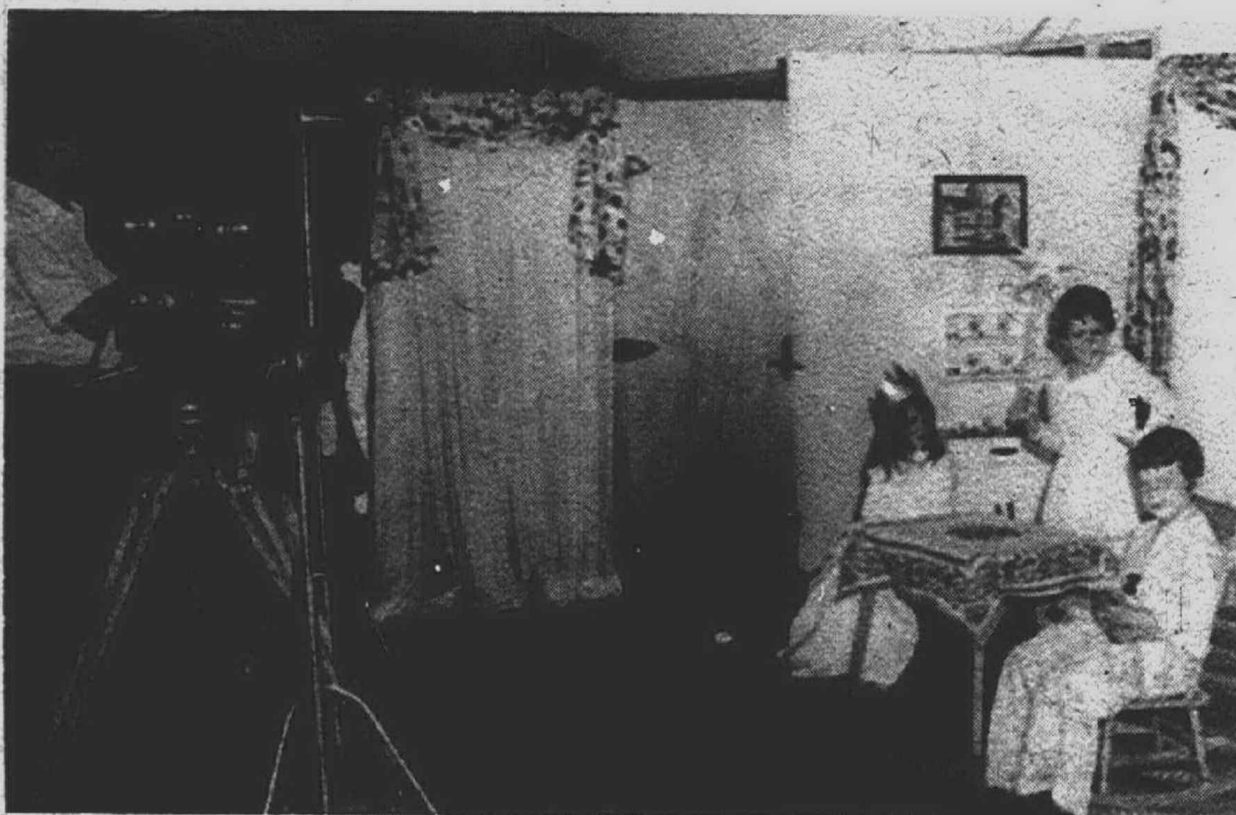
and Plymouth symphonies.

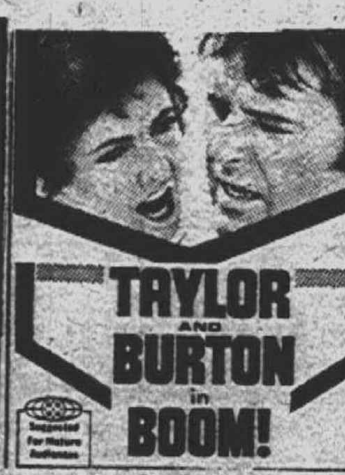

Legislative Roundup

Stempien And Schmidt Fight In Swing District

Former Rep. Marvin R. Stempien dusted off his old campaign signs in the garage and started running for the House seat he lost in 1966 to Rep. Louis E. Schmidt.

Stempien, a Livonia lawyer and recently resigned manager of the Secretary of State branch office, served in 1965-66.

Schmidt, retired superintendent of the Clarenceville School District, defeated Stempien by 2,188 votes in 1966.

The 35th district includes Livonia and Northville.

BOTH parties consider the area a swing district. Stempien won in President Johnson's sweep in 1964 and Schmidt rode in when Gov. Romney staged a Republican landslide two years later.

Stempien in two years played a major role in passing 26 key bills, 19 as the original sponsor and seven others in which his original proposals were incorporated in similar bills.

His major thrust was in the package of consumer protection bills, mental health, traffic

safety, education and court and legal procedures.

"It's time for a change back to respect for law and order and to support for our local law enforcement agencies," he said. "The legislature must squarely face its responsibility to provide funds to local government for more and better trained policemen."

In Lansing, Schmidt has voted generally with the Republican majority in the House. All present House members have primary opposition as the Aug. 6 primary approaches.

Schmidt will be opposed by Neal C. Hall, most recently a candidate for the Livonia City Council. Democrats will place John McDonald against Stempien.

In the 34th district, centered in Redford Township, the veteran Democratic Rep. John Bennett will be opposed in the primary by Eugene P. Melnick. Republicans will have a single candidate, Ronald C. Rice, in the race for the House seat.

Rep. James Tierney, former Garden City mayor, will have Lawrence Keller and Donald A. Sellers, both of Garden City, as his primary opponents.

Republicans will send Gregory Pillon and Harold E. Bergquist into the primary.

Rep. Vincent J. Pettipren, Westland Democratic incumbent, will be challenged in the primary by Robert F. Reichard, also of Westland.

In the Republican primary, Edward Bivens, Jr., and Leonard D. Johnston, both of Inkster, will be candidates for a shot at the Democratic winner in November.

Endorse 1 Mill For County

GOP Pushes For Absentee Votes

At the June 26 meeting of the Wayne County Intermediate Board of Education, a formal resolution endorsing the continuation of the Wayne County one mill property levy for an additional five-year period was passed unanimously.

County Proposition No. 1 (the one mill levy) will be placed before the voters in Wayne County at the August 6, 1968 primary election.

The one mill improvement tax (County Proposition No. 1) will continue to maintain vital services in such fields as education, public health, child care, mental health, law enforcement justice, libraries, and parks.

Wayne County school superintendents in 43 school districts have been urged by a special letter from William A. Shumack, superintendent of the Wayne County Intermediate School District, to have local boards of education actively support the passage of County Proposition No. 1.

Supervisor Races Wide Open As Numerous Candidates File

Voters will have a wide variety of choices in the August primary for seats on the newly reapportioned county boards of supervisors in Wayne and Oakland Counties.

Democrats in the 26th district (Northville, Canton, Plymouth and Livonia) will have to choose from a field of seven; Republicans will have six.

In the Redford district - the 19th - 11 Democrats and five Republicans have filed. The deadline was Tuesday.

He Gets Convention Position

Aldo Vagnozzi, 26193 Kiltartan, Farmington, has won a top position at the Democratic party's national convention in August in Chicago.

Vagnozzi, who chairs the party's 19th district party organization (which includes Farmington and Livonia), is currently a state representative candidate.

He will serve as one of the two Michigan members of the convention's platform and resolutions committee. His election came last weekend as the state's 196-member delegation met for the first time in Lansing.

Vagnozzi said he would welcome any items or suggestions on issues for the platform. "The Democratic party is an open one and is receptive to ideas for consideration by the platform committee," Vagnozzi said.

State OK's In-Service Teacher Plan

A statewide system of upgrading teachers now in the classroom was approved last week by the State Board of Education.

The board will seek a \$281,984 grant from Washington for the first year of a three-year program to develop the plan.

If approved, the program would be operated through the Michigan Department of Education, the 60 intermediate school districts in the state, all local school districts and all public and private colleges and universities.

Identifying needs and determining specific in-service programs would be accomplished during the first year with the final two years used to install programs, obtain evaluations after some operation and, if necessary, change them and put them into effect again.

Many Michigan teachers now attend institutes one or two days a year but such a statewide effort could provide more extensive programs.

Park Sets 2 Swim Contests

Two swimming meets will be held this summer in the pool at Lower Huron Metropolitan Park near Belleville.

These are the novice swimming meet on Wednesday, July 17, and the age group swimming meet on Tuesday and Wednesday, Aug. 6 and 7.

Boys and girls, ages 8 through 14, may compete in the 28 event novice swim meet, providing they have never placed first, second or third in the event for which they are registered.

The meet is designed for swimmers who are just beginning to swim competitively and novice swimmers are limited to two events and must compete in their own age bracket.

Ribbons will be awarded to winners placing first, second or third in all events of the boys and girls divisions. The swimming pool will be closed for general swimming during the days meets are scheduled.

17th and 18th in Farmington. In the 17th, only one man has filed for each party. In the 18th, four Democrats and one Republican filed.

All will appear on the primary August 6 ballot as each party will choose a nominee. The two will square off in November for the seat.

Reapportionment of the cumbersome county boards was brought about by a 1966 state law which applied the "one man-one vote" principle. The Michigan courts never finally decided the constitutionality of the change, but the U.S. Supreme Court earlier this year upheld the principle.

The county boards had long been criticized for their size. Top on the list was the Wayne County Board, which seated 135 representatives; virtually every township and city was represented.

Under the new plan Wayne County gets 26. The plan met

with immediate opposition in Livonia, where the city filed an unsuccessful lawsuit asking for nullification of the 26-man plan. In Dearborn Heights, Mayor John L. Canfield of Dearborn Heights tried for a 35-member setup, joining in the Livonia suit.

The whole legal snarl revolves around the 1963 constitution which says each township will retain a representative on the county board of supervisors.

Marvin R. Stempien, who was chairman of the House committee which helped launch the county reapportionment bill, took a different matter to court in April, demanding an election be set, since the U.S. Supreme Court decisions had cleared the air of legal questions.

Then Wayne County's reapportionment committee had filed its plan May 12 to beat the May 15th deadline.

Candidates in the Livonia-Plymouth district include sev-

eral known vote getters, or well known community officials.

A.E. Vallier, currently a supervisor from Plymouth, will be joined by Paul Y. Kadish, active Livonia Democrat; Dr. Donald Friedrichs, top Livonia school administrator. Other Democrats include Gerald K. O'Brien, James Carroll, James P. McCarthy and Vernon Foster, all of Livonia.

On the Republican side, Carl D. Pursell, who ran for the Michigan senate seat that George Kuhn now holds, will seek the supervisor's seat. As well, Livonia city councilman Edward Milligan will run; Henry Sladek, active Livonia Republican and member of the reapportionment committee that drew up the 26-man plan, will run. In addition, Hazel Jones and Joseph C. Keane, of Livonia, are seeking the election.

In Redford Township, the five Republicans include Orville J. Keene, Lapiro G. Ling-

hold and Donald Hanson seek election. Two from Dearborn Heights—Helen Therese Gadowka and John H. Brennan will run.

Democrats seeking the seat for the new 19th county district will be Wade Mitchell, Richard Manning, William Ford, Harvey J. Beadle, Charles Willey, Bill J. Robbins and William E. Willey.

Three other Democrats, Joseph F. Sapala, Harry Martin, Robert J. Bullinger, are from Dearborn Heights.

In the City of Farmington, Gerald Freedman has filed for the Democrats, Delos Hamlin for the Republicans.

In the Township -- district 18 -- Michael J. Kelley, and run. In addition, Hazel Jones and Joseph C. Keane, of Livonia, are seeking the election.

Republicans include John Dent, Wayne Francisco, Christian F. Powell and John F. Warren.

Vote In The Fall

Large Field Assures Hot District Court Races

Virtually every new district court seat will have several contestants seeking the \$27,500 job this fall.

District courts are part of the sweeping lower court reform bill put into effect by the Michigan legislature last month.

The bill replaces the old justice of the peace system with district courts. In the past, JP's didn't have to be attorneys. Under the new district courts, uniform control will be administered over elected judges, who must be attorneys.

Justices of the peace in the past were elected from a slate of whoever chose to run. They did not need to know law, or be attorneys to become a judge.

CRITICS often said defendants "never got their day in court" when they faced a JP.

The new law gives the court jurisdiction in all civil matters involving less than \$3,000, all misdemeanors, ordinances and charter violations. They will also hear preliminary examinations in felony cases, deciding whether or not to bind the defendant over for trial.

In areas with small popula-

tions, the court may appoint magistrates to assist in such things as traffic violations.

In the Livonia race seven attorneys have filed, including James Mies, past chairman of the charter commission, Steve Polgar, Livonia city attorney, and Lonnie Brashear, member of the Livonia board of education.

Others include Nicholas Smith, Benjamin Williams, James P. Connolly, Jerome Harris and Robert Lorton. Two seats are open, but incumbent judge James McCann will automatically take one.

In the Plymouth-Northville-Canton district -- the 35th -- Thomas Healy, and Dunbar Davis of Plymouth have filed. From Northville, Allen C. Ingie, and Philip Ogilvie will run.

Robert Greenstein, a Livonia based attorney will also seek election. He lives in Canton Township. Davis is currently city judge in Plymouth.

In Farmington, six men have filed, including Bernard S. Kahn, Earl C. Oppertausner,

Edward R. Reagan, Michael J. Hand and Robert Nelson. Their district will be the 47th. Hand is currently municipal judge in Farmington. Nelson is a Farmington township justice of the peace.

Redford will be in the 17th district, and voters there will

choose from seven candidates -- John Dillon, Paul Hart, Robert Brang, Walter Lyshak, Joe Pfister, James Kennedy and Gerald R. Klask.

Pfister is now Township attorney; Dillon is a justice of the peace, and Brang is on the Redford board of trustees.

Voters Must Choose Appeals Court Judge

The congressional, state House and district courts races have overshadowed a little known court race that affects the area.

Farmington voters will be asked to elect one judge for the second court of appeals in the fall from a slate of three -- John F. Foley, Robert J. Danhoff and F. Jerome Bronson. Foley is a commissioner in the Michigan court of appeals, Bronson is Oakland county pro-

secutor and Danhoff works for Governor Romney.

In Wayne County, Charles Kaufman and Vincent J. Brennan, both of Detroit, have filed. This race will affect voters in Redford, Livonia and Plymouth.

A new law expanded the appeals level of the Michigan court system from nine to 12 judges.

Voters Kind To New School Tax

School operational millage votes have fared extremely well in the area, with the only loss coming by a close margin at Clarenceville School District.

A summary of elections compiled by the Michigan Education Association shows state wide that 438 elections were held June 10, with 279 won, 159 lost.

The margins were much improved in the immediate area.

Bloomfield Hills, Brighton, Farmington, Garden City, Madison Heights, Novi, Nankin Mills, Plymouth, Redford Union, Southgate, West Bloomfield, Wayne and Wyandotte all

passed new operational millages.

In contrast, Dearborn Heights, Melvindale, Northville lost. Northville's defeat was very close, 867-805.

In school construction bond votes, the only local issue, in Plymouth, passed easily. Nearby, Brighton, West Bloomfield and South Lyon passed new bonding. South Lyon lost on a second bond issue, however.

School officials around the state worried about the elections, as Michigan school voters this year faced a new income tax, the possibility of a surtax, and higher license plates next year.

Senator Griffin Raps Timing Of Abe Fortas Appointment

Should the United States Senate condone the "cronyism of President Lyndon Johnson?"

That, in a nutshell, is how Sen. Robert Griffin, R-Mich., views the Senate debate over confirmation of President Johnson's recent appointments to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Griffin, who is leading the fight against approval of Abe Fortas as Chief Justice and Homer Thornberry as Associate Justice, addressed reporters at a brief news conference in Detroit's Metropolitan Airport Wednesday. The Senator was returning to Michigan for the Fourth of July holiday.

President Johnson announced several weeks ago the appointment of Justice Abe Fortas as Chief Justice and Circuit Court Justice Homer Thornberry as Justice to the Supreme Court.

The United States Constitution requires the Senate to approve any appointment to the Court.

Griffin and other Senate Republicans have spoken out against the appointments, claiming Johnson chose the men as friends and not as the most qualified candidates.

Griffin said he held no personal objections to Johnson's appointments, but added he thought thousands of other lawyers were as qualified for a seat on the Supreme Court. Thornberry, a former Texas Democratic congressman and long-time Johnson friend, is now a circuit judge.

"What I do object to," said Griffin, "is the manner and timing of the President's appointments."

"The White House is pulling out all the stops trying to ram through these appointments," he said. "If the Senate acts as a rubber stamp now, any future President will feel free to appoint his cronies to the Supreme Court."

"We senators must get our story across to the people. This is more than a partisan fight; it is a historical debate of far-reaching consequences."

"The people of the United States are in the process of choosing new leaders," Griffin continued. "I believe the Senate should wait for the people to speak in November before approving appointments."

Griffin evaded questions as to whether he would back the appointments if President Johnson were seeking another term.

THE SENATOR also refused to elaborate on reports that he had received phone calls from Michigan business executives pressuring him to support President Johnson. "That would be getting away from the issue at hand," he said.

According to Griffin, debate should reach the Senate floor sometime in the middle of July.

"Right now, we can claim the support of 19 or 20 senators," Griffin said. "We are not

trying to start a filibuster, but this is an important issue and discussion could last a long, long time."

Answering questions in other areas, Griffin said he would like to see stronger gun control legislation passed. But, he added quickly, "gun control legislation is not in itself a solution to crime in America."

As to the Republican Presidential nomination, he feels Richard Nixon is "a long way down the road to nomination."

"If the convention were held today, Nixon would certainly win. But a lot can happen between now and the Miami convention," he added.

Advance State Aid Available

Advance State aid for education, some \$20 million will be made available this week to hard hit school districts in Michigan.

According to state superintendent Ira Polley, the funds "may prove to be some of the best invested money in Michigan education."

The monies were authorized by the State Board of Education. The funds will go to the districts which need it the most.

The Department has no formal requests for state aid, because for more than a year no advance funds have been available.

"The several informal requests which we have had could only be answered by suggesting that the schools borrow money against future state aid payments," Polley said. "This is becoming more difficult and is expensive for school districts because borrowing entails considerable interest payments in some cases and the money paid in interest is money not available for other education costs."

"The \$20 million isn't going to be a cure-all for poorer districts by any means but it will, for some, make an extremely critical difference because for most districts every dollar counts," Polley said.

Pilot 'Confesses', Gets Crew, Passengers Released

TOKYO -- Capt. Joseph Tosolini signed a letter confessing that he violated Soviet air space so that the ship and 214 troops aboard could be freed. When released, Tosolini said, "I did not stray over Russian territory."

A Federal Aviation Administration spokesman said in Washington, "We have reliable information that there was a violation of Soviet air space."

WASHINGTON -- The Federal Aviation Agency and U.S. airlines have said it is impossible to prevent passenger planes from being hijacked.

FAA spokesman, Irving Ripps, said, "It's an impossible problem short of searching every passenger." Another spokesman said, "The only real way to halt these hijackings is to eliminate firearms from the airplane, and the only way to do this is to detect them." He added there was no foolproof system for this in existence.

COLUMBIA, Mo. -- The first application of computer heart detection, outside the laboratory, is being funded by federal funds in six Missouri cities.

Electrical impulses from the patient's heart are sent to a computer at the University of Missouri Medical Center, by use of long-distance telephone lines.

National Roundup

CALIFORNIA -- Gov. Ronald Reagan has announced he will be a presidential contender, but not before the GOP National convention. Reagan said, "I intend to be placed in nomination by the California delegation and if at that time the convention wishes to consider me a candidate, the convention can do so."

He added, he didn't think anyone had the delegate votes tied up and that it was still an open convention.

NEW YORK -- A lone sniper entered a public comfort station in Central Park and shot a woman to death. Before he was brought down by police shots, he also wounded an elderly man and two policemen.

Forced out of a group of trees near the Metropolitan Museum of Art by police-fired tear gas, the heavy-set, middle-aged gunman was shot down.

MIAMI, Fla. -- The self-appointed modern-day Robin Hood, jewel thief, Jack "Murf the Surf" Murphy, has been declared legally insane.

Murphy's robbery and murder trials were canceled by Criminal Court Judge Carl Stedman after the judge declared him, "Mentally unable to aid his defense counsel or understand charges against him."

FAYETTEVILLE, N.C. -- A leak in a gas-line in a water purification plant sent more than 1,000 families and personnel from Pope Air Force Base fleeing from their homes.

Highly dangerous in large amounts, the leaking chlorine pipe was repaired with emergency work. The plant is on the air force base.

PHILADELPHIA -- After a month's illness, Francis Cardinal Brennan, 79, died in Philadelphia's Misericordia Hospital.

Cardinal Brennan was known as the "Quiet American" in Rome, where he served in the highest Vatican post an American has ever held. The cardinal began serving the church as an altar boy in a small Pennsylvania coal town.

WASHINGTON -- Congress chopped funds requested to aid in heading-off ghetto violence and approved:

-\$6 billion for Vietnam costs, -\$1 billion for federal welfare,

-\$5 million, out of \$25 million requested, for anti-poverty programs.

WASHINGTON -- The only government agency empowered to get back excessive profits on defense and space contracts, expired this week.

A bill to renew the authority of the Renegotiation Board is still tabled in the Senate Finance Committee.

BERKELEY, Calif. -- Before the 8 p.m. curfew went into effect, a crowd of 1,000 on the campus of the University of California, voted to demand from the city council an end of the curfew.

Other demands by the throng, listening to leaders of the Young Socialist Alliance and Peace

and Freedom party, were for a civilian board to review actions of the Berkeley police.

MIAMI -- A rare coin, the Brasher doubloon, worth \$100,000 was recovered in Miami when a detective posed as a rare coin buyer.

The valuable coin had been

stolen from the home of multi-millionaire Willis Dupont.

BOSTON -- Attorneys for Dr. Benjamin Spock and three co-defendants in anti-draft conspiracy charges, have moved to U.S. District Judge Francis J.W. Ford to reverse their convictions.

Ford has not indicated if he will rule on the motion. The maximum penalty for the charge is five years in prison or a fine of \$10,000.

WASHINGTON -- The bill for the six-week Poor People's Campaign came to at least \$1.2 million. The cost to the cam-

paigners and every one involved, including the public, may be cut if the materials used to build Resurrection City are negotiated as partial repayment.

The SCLC was required to post a \$5,000 bond.

WASHINGTON -- The U.S.

Public Health Service is again attacking the tobacco industries. Recent findings by them indicate heavy cigarette smoking can shorten life by as much as eight years.

These reports fit in with suggestions by the Federal Trade Commission, that all ci-

garette advertising on radio and television be banned.

NEW YORK -- Coming after an agreement calling for a five per cent increase in base pay and 15 more vacation days, the National Maritime Union has ended its strike.

The three-day strike had id-

ed 128 American flagships.

MADISON, Wis. -- Wisconsin is the only state in the U.S. that's in the insurance business. According to Belford Hogboom, head of the state division administering the fund, 7,518 persons held policies with the state last year.
