**LIVONIA**—Mayor Harvey W. Moelke has threatened to veto or initiate a "citizen's suit" if the City Council goes through with an offer of \$33,000 to the Felician sisters for right-of-way along Newburgh Road. The mayor charged that a "secret" session was held and that council president reversed his previous stand of supporting his contention that the sisters should dedicate the land to the city.

**LIVONIA**—Voters called the City clerk's office following the primary election complaining about the poor placement of squares for the district judge race on the ballot. City Clerk Addison W. Bacon explained that the ballots were made up in Detroit and that his office was blameless. Some 2,600 persons failed to cast votes for district judge nominee because they either did not see it on the ballot or were so confused that they didn't vote at all.

**LIVONIA**—Five Mile Road, between Inkster and Merriman Roads, will be widened and paved next year as part of the regular program of the Wayne County Road Commission. Estimated cost is \$1,200,000, of which the county will pay 60 per cent and the city, 40 per cent. The remaining four miles of Five Mile up to Eckles Road also will be improved, possibly at the same time, if the county accepts the city's offer to "advance" necessary funds. Latest reports are that the county is seriously considering the offer and will undoubtedly accept it.

**REDFORD**—Voters defeated the township's request for a one-mill tax increase by a 4-3 margin Tuesday while approving, as did the total county, a county one-mill renewal by a 2-1 margin.

**REDFORD**—Nominated for Democratic berths in Tuesday's primary were: for township trustee: Don O. Christie and Roger Handy; for county board: Harvey J. Beadle; for district court (nonpartisan): Robert Brang, John Dillon, Paul Hart and James Kennedy; for state representative: John Bennett; for constable: James Gordon; for parks commission: Chester Beadle and James Wright. The lone Republican contest was won by Donald M. Hanson for county board.

**FARMINGTON**—The Romney forces claimed a victory in controlling the Republican 19th District organization following Tuesday's election. In the District the Romney group elected 100 precinct delegates to the opposition's 47 delegates. In the township the Romneyites took 13 out of 16 posts, while in the city the anti-Romney group took three out of four precincts.

**FARMINGTON**—A pair of Farmington boys have just returned from a trip to Mackinac Island—via tandem bike. Gerry Bopp and John Davis made the trip north and got within 150 miles of home on the way south before calling for help.

# Davis And Healy Battle For Judge's Role

Municipal Judge Dunbar Davis and former Plymouth City

Attorney Thomas J. Healy, will battle it out at the polls in November for the right to serve as the first judge of the new District Court.

These two Plymouth candidates outdistanced three other rivals in last Tuesday's primary election and made it certain that the new judge who will serve the area that encompasses Plymouth, Northville and Canton Township, along with the cities of Plymouth and Northville, comes from Plymouth.

Judge Davis topped the ticket with 1,594 votes, more than 1,200 of which came from Plymouth and Plymouth Township,

while Healy, whose main strength also was in the Plymouth area, posted 1,025.

Northville Municipal Judge Philip Ogilvie placed third with 802, while Robert Greenstein, Canton Township Judge was fourth with 511 and Allen Ingle, of Northville, trailed with 367.

Judge Davis and Healy waged strong campaigns in the primary but used vastly different methods. While Judge Davis counted heavily on glaring signs and became involved in a battle over the billboards, Healy moved quietly from one neighborhood group to the other. The fact that Healy also favored

establishment of a probation division in the new court also was seen as helpful in his victory.

While these two Plymouth rivals topped their field, races for other offices furnished a few surprises.

Carl Pursell, President of the Chamber of Commerce, won the Republican nomination for a seat on the new streamlined Wayne County Board of Supervisors in a mild surprise, and Lou Norman, veteran member of the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees, was turned down by the voters.

With Norman on the sidelines, the race for the vacant

seats on the Township Board will be most interesting.

Russell Ash, a recent appointee to the Board, topped the Republican ticket with Maurice Breen as a running mate, while Irving Rozian, former member of the Township Planning Commission, and John Murawski, captured the Democratic nominations.

In other races in which Plymouth was more than mildly interested, State Representative James Tierney, Democrat of Garden City, easily won nomination and will face Harold Bergquist in November.

Meanwhile, Congressman Marvin L. Esch, Republican

of Ann Arbor, was unopposed and will face former Congressman Wesley Vivian of Ann Arbor in the general run-off.

# Community Fund Sets Record Goal Of \$118,700 For Drive

The highest goal in history--\$118,700--has been set for the annual Plymouth Community Fund drive when it opens on October 10.

Announcement of the big job ahead was made during the past week by Harold Fischer,

general chairman, when he made public the names of the various committee chairmen and the portion of the goal that has been set for them.

"Our new goal," Fischer said, "is just about 10 per cent above the amount we col-

lected last year, but its realistic goal and we can reach it with a fine co-operative effort.

Under the chairmanship of James Thomas, general manager of Consumers Power, \$108,000 was collected last year

and this was reached on the final day when industry went over the top.

To guide the drive Chairman Fischer named the following committee heads:

Chairman Fischer also introduced little Susan Kloosterman who will serve as Miss Sparkle for the duration of the drive.

In contrast to other years, Fischer pointed out, there will be no special contest sponsored by the Community Fund to select Miss Sweet Charity. Instead, he announced that an agreement has been reached with the Student Council at Plymouth High School to have the Homecoming Queen accept the added duties of Miss Sweet Charity.

"It has been agreed," Fischer said, "that the Homecoming Queen will be selected on October 5. This is five days before our drive opens and the Queen, whoever she happens to be, will have ample time to handle both assignments."

Fischer also announced another change with the result that the annual torch lighting ceremonies will be held at noon, on October 10 at Kellogg Park. "By holding the ceremony at noon," Fischer pointed out, "we can take advantage of the usual midday traffic. In other years it has been most difficult to get a sizable gathering in the evening."

"We have scheduled the Kick-off luncheon at noon, after which the lighting ceremony will be held. As an added feature attraction the Plymouth High School band will parade from the high school to the park and furnish the music for the program."

"Another new feature this year," he added, "will be a Community Fund dance which will be sponsored by the Student Council and Miss Sweet Charity will reign as Queen of the Ball."

"We have set a big job for ourselves," Fischer concluded. "But we can do it. We must do it."

## Pursell Stages Comeback In Supervisor Race

Carl Pursell, president of the Plymouth Chamber of Commerce, staged a political comeback in Tuesday's primary election.

Beaten in a bid for a seat in the State Senate two years ago, Carl won the Republican nomination for a seat on the new stream-lined Wayne County Board of Supervisors.

As the GOP standard-bearer he will oppose Dr. Don Friedrichs, Director of Secondary Education in the Livonia School System.

To win the nomination Pursell beat out Livonia City Councilman Edward Milligan, 2796 to 2134 and carried all communities except Livonia.

## Wes Vivian Due To Meet Esch Again

Weston Vivian scored a decisive victory over his two Democratic opponents for the 2nd Congressional district race which includes Plymouth and Northville.

With 14,513 votes, he won the right to oppose his former opponent Congressman Marvin Esch who ran unopposed on the Republican side and piled up 23,251 votes.

Jerome Dupont, (D) of Ann Arbor, had 4,167 and John McDermott Sr., (D) of Howell, had 1,928.

Esch beat Vivian two years ago, after Vivian had served one term as congressman. The tables have been somewhat reversed and Vivian will now be challenging Esch who has served for one term.

Esch, although running in the primary race alone, polled more votes than the three Democratic contenders combined--Esch 23,251...Democrats, 20,608.

## Dysinger Quits Recreation Post

J. W. Dysinger who was appointed to the City of Plymouth Recreation Commission only a short time ago, tendered his resignation to the City Commission on Monday Night. It was accepted with regret.

In Livonia councilman Edward Milligan polled 1,891 votes to Pursell's 873. Henry Sladek, a third strong Livonia candidate polled 982 votes but fell far short in other communities.

Pursell, despite Milligan's big lead in Livonia, carried every other area, including home town Plymouth Township with 715 and the City of Plymouth 619.

Unknowns James P. Ayotte, Joseph C. Keane and Hazel Jones netted 186, 587 and 216 respectively in the total district.

ON THE Democratic ticket Friedrichs, director of secondary education for the Livonia schools, barely topped O'Brien, a right-of-way agent for the Wayne County Road Commission.

A third candidate Arch Valler, with a popular following in his hometown Plymouth and Plymouth Township, probably kept O'Brien from winning, as he split the vote in communities outside of Livonia.

In Livonia, Friedrichs tallied 1,705 to O'Brien's 1,459 votes. Valler topped all voters with 329 in Plymouth and 259 in Plymouth Township.

Earlier returns had shown O'Brien as a winner but final returns, including absentee votes, gave the Livonia educator the victory.

AN ANALYSIS of the votes shows a tight turnout in Livonia may have hurt councilman Milligan's chances. Only 11,742 of 41,480 registered voters turned out to vote.

Milligan ran well in Livonia, but could not overcome Pursell's popularity in Plymouth and Northville. Sladek ran second in Livonia behind Milligan but could not top Pursell's lead.

In Plymouth Township 38 per cent of the electorate turned out due to a trusteeship race and interest in voting for Pursell.

Sladek, a Western Electric executive working in Plymouth, is a prominent Livonia Republican and he won a respectable 982 votes in Livonia.

## Area Officials Set Target Date For Adopting Garbage Plan

After more than two years of study and work on the project a target date has been set for a combined attack on the garbage problem in the Plymouth area.

"We have been making considerable headway," City Commissioner James McKeon, who is chairman of the six-area study committee, remarked, "but we won't be able to do anything concrete in the way of a final push until the Schoolcraft Conference scheduled for late in September."

"By this time," he continued at a press conference Wednesday afternoon, "we will know whether the six areas are in agreement for the major points of attack."

THE SIX communities now considering a new program are the cities of Plymouth and Northville, Plymouth, Northville, Canton and Salem Townships.

Representatives of these groups have held several preliminary meetings and, accord-

ing to chairman McKeon they are in agreement on a six area combine to attempt a solution.

## Disappointed By Defeat At Polls, Norman Plans To Go Fishing

Louis Norman said he was going fishing.

Tuesday night he was defeated in his bid for the Republican nomination for his seat on the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees—a position he has held for the past 10 to 15 years.

Maurice Breen, member of the township planning commission, won the nomination over Norman by a little more than 100 votes. Breen received 390 to Norman's 289.

The self-employed excavator commented, "It had to happen someday."

"I don't think it was anything I did; maybe it was something I didn't do."

He said he didn't campaign in a traditional manner but

stood on his record hoping his friends and those who knew him would vote for him.

Referring to Breen, Norman said, "When a man is a dyed-in-the-wool Democrat and turns Republican to get a public office, he's not too politically stable."

The long-time township public official was bitter over his defeat. He said, "We've got an element in all communities that want a change, however, I don't think -- as some have claimed -- anything in this day and age can be settled once and for all."

"How," he continued, "can you help not being bitter after working for the township for ten years?"

"I was always for the township at large and the community

second. I will not cater to pressure groups but have always made up my own mind."

Observers have attributed his defeat mainly to the fact that he didn't come out and meet the people. He himself said he didn't like to campaign this way but would rather stand on his record.

"I believe if I have done a good job for the township and if the people want the facts, they can find them out."

He didn't rule out any future possibilities of again running for office in the township. He said that for right now he was "going to sit back and see how things are going to turn out."

"Let me put it this way, I'll have a little more time to go fishing without coming back for a meeting."

## James Tellam Loses Out In Northville

One incumbent, James Tellam, was defeated in his bid for reelection to a four-year term to the Northville Township Board of Trustees.

A member of the board for the past four years, he was turned down by the voters for M. Richard Mitchell, who has been a constable for nine years.

Incumbent Bernard Baldwin retained his right to seek reelection this November.

Five Republicans ran for two four-year trustee seats. No Democratic candidates filed. As a result, Baldwin and Mitchell will run opposed in November.

Joseph Straub, a retired Ford Motor Co. accountant, won nomination to a two-year trustee term to fill the vacancy created by the appointment, a few months ago, of Gunnar Stromberg to supervisor.

The votes for the five Republicans for the two four-year terms were:

M. Richard Mitchell, 215; Bernard Baldwin, 169; James Tellam, 152; Joseph Straub, 77; and Allan Maltby, 53.

Straub lost out in his bid for one of the two four-year terms but won 41 votes as a write-in candidate for the two-year term.

# The Stroller...



It's a funny thing how, sometimes, a trivial thing like a piece of mail will change a fellow's outlook on the day — regardless of the weather.

The other morning, for instance, when it was so hot and sticky and you could have cut the humidity with a knife, there came a multi-colored envelope from the old home town in Pennsylvania Dutch Country and immediately the outlook for the day changed.

Sure enough, it was an invitation to attend the Great Allentown Fair that still is billed as the "greatest county fair in the country."

No sooner had The Stroller started reading the invitation than the memories came rolling back through the years, for it was at the Allentown Fair that he first learned some of the facts of life and that all was not as it appeared on the surface.

## "GOOD MONEY" AND A JOB

In this particular year it became quite the thing for the young men of the town to get a job at the Fair and pick up what was then considered "good money" while enjoying some segment of the Fair each day.

Getting a job wasn't difficult for The Stroller as one of the neighbors — a man named Fritz Kessler — had become a tradition at the Fair. He was the proud proprietor of an eating stand in the grove and specialized in sauer kraut dinners. He served a generous portion of kraut — homemade — and mashed potatoes and boiled pork and your visit to the Fair wasn't official until you visited the Kessler sauer kraut stand.

The day before the Fair opened the genial proprietor, who was as much a part of the Great Allentown Fair as the grand stand, called all the help together and assigned duties. The Stroller was assigned to serve meals at a long table at the outside edge of the big tent. This was one of the choice positions, as it gave you breathing room on busy days and a chance to chat with folks strolling the avenues between the tents.

For this job the pay was \$1.50 per day and your meals. But when The Stroller was given his assignment there was the added duty of spending the night in the tent as a sort of watchman. For this he would be paid an extra dollar. This was big money then — just imagine! — \$2.50 per day and your meals and a chance to see the fair.

## WHEN THE WORLD CHANGED

Finally, everything was ready for the grand opening the next morning and all hands left for home except The Stroller who was now the watchman. As often happens at times like these the fraternity of those who make a living "working the fairs" stepped inside the tent and wanted a taste of the famed sauer kraut.

The Stroller treated. Then his world started to change, though he didn't know it at the time.

"How'd you like to work for me," one of the chaps asked, "along with your job here?"

"All you have to do," he said, "is stand in the crowd in front of my concession over there where we have the big spinning wheel and when I call you to come in, you come in and play. I'll give you a buck (\$1.00) each day."

In a few minutes five other of the fair regulars made the same offer and their stands were all within a short span of the sauer kraut stand. The Stroller accepted the six offers and just couldn't imagine making that much money — \$2.50 a day in the sauer kraut stand and \$6.00 a day for visiting the spinning wheels.

"Just stand in the crowd," The Stroller was told, "and don't move until you hear me shouting, 'Come in and try it for a dime.' You then come in — and win and I'll give you the choice of a doll or the dollar. You take the dollar and that will be your pay."

## DOLLARS CAME EASILY

Sounded wonderful. So about mid-morning the next day The Stroller took his first stroll through the avenues and stopped at each of the six stands. At each one the story was the same — he won with the first dime and took the dollar instead of the doll. And under each dollar bill was the original dime.

Never was six dollars made so easily.

The Stroller got an idea in his youthful mind. If he could make six dollars each time he took a walk, why not take several walks each day? It would be like a windfall of gold. And, besides, the family could use the money.

Later that morning he started the second stroll.

After getting the signal "Come in and try it for a dime," he walked to the front and played the game. This time, though, he didn't win on the first time. He played again and again — until the last dime of the dollar was on the board. This time he won — and got the dollar back.

It was the same at each of the stands. Suddenly the lightning struck his youthful mind. The spinning wheels were fixed and a d stopped on demand and he had been just a "shill."

What an awakening!

Now, for the first time, he learned the moment of truth — that the world was not all it seemed to be on the surface.

What memories that letter brought on a muggy morning.

# Public Owes Vallier And Norman Vote Of Thanks For Job Well Done

The votes in last Tuesday's election have been counted and the winners are marching with renewed confidence toward the November battle of the ballots, but in their wake they have left two veteran and faithful public servants — Arch Vallier and Lou Norman.

For years, this pair, Vallier on the County Board of Supervisors, and Norman on the Township Board of Trustees, has served with honor and distinction. Though their efforts were not always in keeping with popular opinion they fought for what they thought was right and in the best interests of the community.

Each, in his own way, has made many fine contributions through the years and their services are certain to be missed. But these are days of change and the two veterans are now on the sidelines.

THE NEW, STREAMLINED Board of Supervisors, while it will be far different than the old unwieldy group, will miss much of the color that Vallier provided in his role as one of the stormy petrels.

Big, and oftentimes boisterous, Vallier was one of the best fighters on the County Board. It mattered little whether it was the condition of the county jail or the price of a sandwich at the Metropolitan Airport, Arch was always there in the midst of the argument. More often than not he was leading the verbal battle and challenging all comers. In this manner he did a great service, even though he did not always succeed.

"Arch is a great man to have around," Willis Hall, former president of the Detroit Board of Commerce and a Bellweather on the county board, often remarked. "He'll argue his point to the end and nothing gets by him."

He'll still serve on the Plymouth City Commission and use his talents for the benefit of the city residents, but one thing is cer-

tain. He'll be missed at the County Board of Supervisors.

Lou Norman traveled a much different path than Vallier. Never a shouter or one to challenge another in public debate, Lou went about his tasks with the serenity of a man

who had confidence and knew what he was doing.

IT WOULD NOT be claiming too much for him to say that he was one of the pillars of the Township. He served in all sorts of capacities, from a worker in the Department of Public Works to the role of a volunteer fireman and reached the top with both groups.

In the dozen or more years that he served on the Board, Lou saw many changes and helped bring about most of them. He was for the Township, first, last and always.

He saw it grow and helped push it along by backing many progressive measures. But there were three — the DPW, the Fire Department, and recreation — that were closest to him.

Lou never missed a fire. He helped organize the Metropolitan Club, and was Mr. Fireman to the young fire fighters who have come along in recent years.

But it was in the area of recreation that Norman was getting his latest satisfaction.

FOR YEARS he had been Chairman of the Recreation Commission in the Township — without funds. Recently, when the City of Plymouth and the Township discussed the possibility of joining forces for the erection of an ice arena, Lou was made chairman of the Site Committee and he never worked harder on any project.

"I've been waiting a long time for this," he commented, "and the opportunity won't be missed."

Now he has been dropped from the ranks, along with Vallier.

Strangely, neither of the veterans waged much of a campaign, being satisfied to stand on their records. Things don't work that way today.

Now they are gone and the public owes them a rising vote of thanks for the work they have done through the years.

Things won't seem the same without them.

But, as a sage once remarked — "The Old Order Changeth."

## Congressman Esch Reports

# Congress Turns Back On Reform Measures

The 90th Congress may be called many things, but you can be sure it won't be known for reform. Every major reform measure has faced certain death by a disinterested majority. The list includes such important issues as the draft, social security, crime and, of course, a much needed bill to reform Congress itself.

The latest of these to bite the dust was the Election Reform Act of 1968. After much prodding by the minority over a period of several years, the House Administration Committee finally reported this essential measure for floor action only to have it bottled up in the Rules Committee—the infamous final resting place for many pieces of progressive re-

form legislation. As a result it's now clear that Congress will fall once again to revise and update the ineffective laws dealing with election campaigns.

The case for election-law reform is well made and quite sound. Two current laws which deal in this area—the Federal Corrupt Practices Act and the Hatch Act—were enacted 43

and 28 years ago respectively. Studies such as the 1962 Report of President Kennedy's Commission on Campaign Costs reveal that present laws invite evasion and are filled with loopholes.

The Election Reform Act of 1968 was developed to meet the glaring need for action. In many respects, its goals parallel those of the bill I introduced last year to set up a committee on standards and conduct. It would have established a bipartisan Federal Elections Commission to supervise campaign spending. Candidates, individual contributors, and political committees would be subject to realistic and effective regulations requiring full reporting of contributions and expenditures. Safeguard against the use of campaign contributions for personal purposes were also included in the bill.

## Lilley Road Due To Get New Flasher

A flashing traffic light will be installed soon on M-153 (Ford Rd.) at Lilley Rd. in an effort to reduce the accident potential at the intersection, according to an announcement from the State Highway Commission.

The Commission said cross traffic has increased considerably because of recent commercial buildup on Lilley Rd., and that there have been several serious accidents, including one fatality.

A red flasher facing Lilley Rd. will emphasize the need for a complete stop before entering the intersection, and a yellow flasher facing M-153 traffic will emphasize the need for added caution.

The state and Wayne County will divide the cost of the light.

Unfortunately, even if Congress should suddenly wake up and act on this measure immediately it would be too late to implement its provisions in time for the 1968 campaign. Consequently, the millions of dollars in contributions and expenditures in the primary and convention campaigns this year will remain largely unreported and subject to no official scrutiny. Moreover, the current reporting and disclosure provisions applicable to the general election will remain weak and subject to little or no enforcement.

Much more is at stake here than merely preventing unscrupulous individuals and special interest groups from operating under the table. The basic issue is the restoration of public confidence in our

system of representative government. One would think that when public support of the governmental system and its representatives is at an all time low, Congress would at least take this one small step toward reform.

"The Dorak Affair" by Kenneth Pearson and Patricia Conner is the result of the authors' search to find out the truth about the claims of James Mellaart, a famous British archaeologist. Mellaart claimed to have found the royal treasure of Dorak but the Turkish government denounced the whole incident as a hoax.

"A Trace of Footprints" by Ruth Wolff, author of "A Crack in the Sidewalk," is a novel about a young man who visits

his elderly grandfather, who has lived his whole life in one small town. During the course of a summer, he learns much of the town and his grandfather's past life and, in doing so, he learns in what direction he must move.

"Poverty: Views from the Left," edited by Jeremy Lerner, contains 20 essays which investigate and probe the War on Poverty from every critical—economic, sociological, political, and, above all, practical.

# Money Troubles Will Close 9 Catholic Schools

More than 1,230 pupils in nine Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of Detroit have been notified that their classes will be closed to them in September. Only about half of the youngsters are expected to be able to find space in other Catholic schools, with the remainder applying at tax-supported institutions.

"The basic trouble is financial," said the Rev. Father John B. Zwiers, superintendent of Catholic schools, "although personnel and facilities are factors in some instances. We strain every possible resource to keep schools going but sometimes something has to give."

Six of the schools closed either completely or partially are in the inner-city—Girls' Catholic Central High, St. Cecilia High, St. Mary Commercial High, Santa Maria Elementary and St. John Vianney—and the other three are in outlying areas: St. Patrick High in Wyandotte, St. Joseph Elementary in Dexter, and St. Augustine High in Richmond.

"Every school system I know about is caught in a financial bind and ours is no exception to the general rule," Father Zwiers continued. "Tax-supported schools usually can get millage help but we can count only on the sacrifices of parents already hard-strapped to meet inflationary costs. There is a limit to what you can ask of someone already heavily taxed to support public schools."

"I WOULD LIKE to make one point clear, however. Closing a school for financial reasons is always a last resort after every possible way to keep it operating has been explored. Neither we nor the par-

ents of the children want any school to close that can possibly be kept open."

It is estimated Michigan spends \$610 a year on each child in public schools. The 600-plus to be added to tax rolls will bring an additional tax bill of over a third of a million dollars. The Archdiocese of Detroit school system is the second largest in Michigan, counting both public and private school groups. Over 140,000 are enrolled in 260 elementary schools and over 42,000 are in 96 high schools. The teaching services of over 3,429 priests and brothers and sisters helps keep per-pupil costs far below the average for public schools.

Girls' Catholic Central High School will continue in fall with only the 12th grade; grades 9-11 have been closed to 161 pupils.

Detroit Cathedral High will have 11th and 12th grades, with 9th and 10th grades being closed to 118 pupils.

St. Cecilia High will continue with the 12th grade, eliminating the 10th and 11th with 150 pupils. Hereafter the parish school will cover grades one to nine only.

## MONSTER TRANSFORMERS

Two giant transformers, each as large as a three-story building, were recently installed in the electrical generator station at Copper Cliff, Ontario, to meet the power demands of International Nickel's expanding nickel-producing facilities. A special railroad car had to be built to transport them to Copper Cliff.

ST. MARY Commercial High will complete closing out with 32 in the 12th grade finding other schools.

Santa Maria Elementary School will be closed as an elementary school and most of

its 153 1st to 8th grade pupils will transfer to another Catholic school. The building then will become the North Industrial Education Center.

St. John Vianney Elementary in Highland Park will involve

143 pupils in its closing. St. Patrick High, Wyandotte, has been in a phasing out stage over three years. A total of 177 pupils will be affected by the closing of its 12th grade. St. Joseph Elementary, Dex-

ter, will close grades one through eight, affecting 131 pupils.

St. Augustine High, Richmond, will close grades nine through 12, affecting 171 pupils.

"In some instances," Father Zwiers said, "it might have been possible to hang on a little longer by severely diluting the quality of the education offered. This is a compromise we refuse to make. If we cannot offer

quality education we will not offer any. Naturally it pains us to disappoint inner-city parents who want moral training as well as good academic preparation for their children, but we must do what is necessary."

# Egyptian Giant Pipeline To Bypass Suez Canal

CAIRO—The Egyptian government has announced that it will lay a 200-mile-long pipeline from the Suez Port to the Mediterranean shore near Alexandria.

The giant pipeline will enable

oil to be piped to the Mediterranean from the Suez Canal area.

Sen. J. W. Fulbright, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, questioned in February whether the attacks had taken place or if they had been provoked by the U.S. Navy.

Work on the 42-inch-wide pipe will begin this winter and is expected to be completed by 1970.

SAIGON—The U.S. destroyer Maddox has returned to the Tonkin Gulf for the first time since the bombings in 1964.

The Maddox, the first ship attacked in the war, triggered the first American air attack

ROMANIA—Romanian Communists have praised the G.O.P.'s plank on Vietnam saying that it is a just and equitable solution based on the principle of self-determination.

In Moscow, the Soviets, however, have said that it was unclear and a settlement from a position of force under American conditions.

The Russians also called the convention an affair where delegates are being "brainwashed" in hotel rooms.

HIROSHIMA—Japanese citizens gathered to pray for peace and give speeches against nuclear weapons on the 23rd anniversary of the atomic bombing of Hiroshima.

Pope Paul VI sent a message asking that leaders "act with great responsibility for the people and God."

WASHINGTON -- Patrick Cardinal O'Boyle has urged the church to stand behind Pope Paul's encyclical ban on artificial birth-control measures. He urged dissenting theologians at the Catholic University of America to cease actions which are "setting the church on fire."

KEREN, Ethiopia—As a warning to the populace, government officials have placed bodies of guerrillas or bandits killed by government forces on display.

Curfews are in force from 6 p.m. to 7 a.m. and many residents were forcibly removed in an attempt to deny shelter, food, and revenue to guerrillas and bandits.

JAKARTA, Indonesia—Rescue and medical teams have been sent to aid an estimated 90,000 victims of massive flooding in West Java.

Food and medicine has been sent by the Red Cross to the area where 21 persons were killed, and destruction has been estimated at \$7.5 million.

SAINT TROPEZ, France—French film star Brigitte Bardot has reportedly filed divorce actions against her third husband, German millionaire Gunter Sachs.

Miss Bardot, who was married on July 14, 1966, has been seen recently with Luigi Rizzi, an Italian shipowner.

BEIRUT, Lebanon—All participants in the Kurdish rebellion in northern Iraq between 1961 and 1966, have been pardoned by the new Iraqi government.

The Kurd tribe's demands for self-rule and a share in the oil wealth may also be met.

BRAZZAVILLE, Congo Republic—Army leaders have restored President Alphonse Massamba-Debat to power because of apparent support among southern tribes.

Leaders of the pro-Peking group are trying to find a compromise and disarm warring factions of the youth corps of the National Revolutionary Movement.

GENEVA—Britain has proposed an international convention to ban the manufacturing and use of bacteriological weapons used in germ warfare at the 17-nation disarmament conference.

The ban on microbiological agents "which had no independent peaceful justification" would also include "ancillary equipment."

The convention would call for a pledge to destroy any stockpile of such bacteria or equipment. The convention would endorse action through the U.N. Security Council against any threatened violation.

ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia—Nigeria and Biafra opened peace talks although neither side indicated a compromise in the year-old civil war.

Dr. H. J. Middlekoop, a physician for the World Council of Churches, has said that 6,000 war refugees are dying of starvation in eastern Nigeria where the Biafrans have fled.

SAIGON—Intensified fighting continues in Vietnam as U.S. B52 bombers dropped 300 tons of explosives on suspected

enemy troops south of Da Nang. South Vietnamese paratroopers reportedly killed 75 Viet Cong and North Vietnamese. Allied casualties include 11 dead and two missing.

A major enemy offensive against Saigon, Da Nang, and other cities is expected by allied commanders within the next five weeks.

LONDON—"The Americanization of Emily" may be over, but Britishers are still concerned over the continued U.S. influence in Europe.

Britain's economy, according to the LONDON TIMES, is showing a marked similarity to that of America. "Price inflation has been rampant. International trade and demands of consumer-oriented population have pulled in expensive imports." Because of this, foreign observers are closely watching the U.S. political climate.

## Dessert With Morey: This Top Comic, After A Play, Relaxes Over Pie And Coffee

Not a single "yuc-a-puck" escaped during our two-hour after-the-performance visit with the cello-playing one-liner TV comic Morey Amsterdam. Amsterdam had a dignified, quiet, reserved manner throughout the session. His interest in people and the current events swirling about us seemed all too "out of character" for the gentleman who, not two hours before, had been knocking out the audience as he related his many real or imagined experiences with buffo gags.

Morey can trade gags with the best of them. In fact, he has been on TV for more years than he would care to relate. Ole Wally used to watch him on "Broadway Open House" with Jerry Lester back in 1950.

HIS COMIC HABIT of saying "What did he say?" and repeat-

ing the leading sentences of a joke developed while on a world-wide tour in Australia.

The platform on which he was performing in Sydney, Australia moved slowly around so that all 18,000 people had a chance to see the funny American. To compensate for the loss of communication, Morey persisted in repeating himself. Thus was born a comic trademark that he uses to this day.

The "yuc-a-puck" vocal symbol was created as a fill-in while the cue card man straightened his TV "idiot cards." Morey is a devoted family man. In "Room Service," his 1968 summer theater attraction, he has the entire family taking part. Daughter Cathy is playing the love interest. His wife is his sweetheart in the play. While Cathy and Ann are competent actresses, they do not divert the attention from Morey.

Morey is the whole show in "Room Service." He has been wise in selecting a strong cast of Broadway regulars to support him.

Harold Kennedy, who directed and acts the part of the director in "Room Service," is a top scene stealer. His wry comments never fail to elicit a laugh. And his topless appearance in Act II stops the show. His protruding stomach, the shorts replete with small hearts on a silver background, and the sagging male breasts keep the audience in a merry state throughout his boxer-short appearance.

RIKI COLETTI knows how to milk the audience properly. His Damon Runyonesque way of speaking endears him to the folks. In any farce, the more improbable the situation, the faster the laughs come, and when he masquerades as a doc-

tor, the audience panics, and gales of laughter are generated. "Room Service" has been fattened up considerably with topical references. Gov. Romney comes in for some criticism along with President Johnson and his poverty program ("It must be succeeding... a man was found standing in a breadline with a toaster under his arm.")

Morey wings these topical gags during his opening appearance as he supposedly reads a paper. He concludes his performance in the same manner with a hilarious 10 minute curtain speech loaded with ageless one-liners.

EVEN AT THE table, after the show, Morey showed his creative side by fashioning new gags while eating apple pie smothered with a melted slice of American cheese. This delicacy was discovered while in

London, England. A waitress made a mistake and warmed the pie and cheese at the same time. Morey accepted the mistake and discovered a new way to wake up apple pie.

Amsterdam has several diversified businesses in operation in Hollywood. He mentioned three different animated cartoons his company was producing for TV. He has written a play called "The Office Party" and hopes to have it "on the boards" shortly.

Even though Morey recommends various delicious dishes and will tell you that the North Star Inn in Minneapolis is a top flight restaurant, you'll note that he taps sucralin into his coffee from an ingenious fountain pen container.

Amsterdam has removed that middle-age paunch. In 1955 he went on a low calorie diet and shed 55 pounds. The loss of

weight gives him a trim, youthful look, especially with his jet-black hair. He indicated it was all his, and we could thank his ancestors for such a heavy head of "fat" hair.

AFTER FIVE WEEKS of touring with "Room Service," Morey will do several state fairs, notably Oregon and California. He has just finished a Walt Disney film and he plans to do more film work.

Having an after-dinner interview with Morey was a pleasant relaxing finish to a delightful evening at the Cherry County Playhouse. It's a shame that more of the audience couldn't have joined and seen his other serene side.

He is an easy-going, considerate, creative individual over a cup of coffee and a piece of pie.

CHICAGO -- Three striking unions threaten to continue striking in spite of the Democratic National Convention, if their demands are not met. First to strike were telephone company employees. Although this strike has been partially settled, the taxi drivers and bus drivers threaten to stand still during the convention unless settlement is reached.

The cab drivers' deadline is just a few days before the convention opens and is still pending. A week ago several bus drivers announced that they would walk off the job if the

MIAMI BEACH -- Law enforcement was a big part of the Republican National Convention this year. Local and state police, working with secret service guards, were holding the tightest security ranks ever at a national convention.

WASHINGTON -- In response to the President's disfavor over the steel price hike, the two biggest companies in the industry reduced their scheduled five-per-cent increase to two and a half per cent.

Johnson had ordered the Pentagon to cancel defense contracts with companies which ignored his pleas against price increases.

NEW YORK -- Following most of its competitors, Humble Oil and Refining Co., head domestic subsidiary of Standard Oil Co. New Jersey, increased its wholesale regular-grade gasoline prices to service station owners in New York and New England.

A company spokesman said the increase is seven tenths of a cent to eight tenths of a cent a gallon.

HARVEY, Ill. -- Seven policemen and a woman were wounded in a barrage of gunfire in this Chicago suburb Wednesday during an outbreak caused by Negro youths. The area was put under tight security by police.

Mayor James Haines of Harvey announced a curfew until dawn. On Tuesday, a jury had given a verdict of "justifiable homicide" in the fatal shooting of a Chicago youth.

WRAY, Colo. -- Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Tobkin, of Dearborn, drove 93 miles from their motel in Colorado, after a vacation, before the State police stopped them to tell them they had forgotten one of their 11 children.

The management found the six-year-old Tobkin after the

PITTSBURGH -- Two Pennsylvania steel companies have agreed to merge, forming a combination that will make the surviving company the 90th biggest steel firm in the US with more than \$400 million in sales.

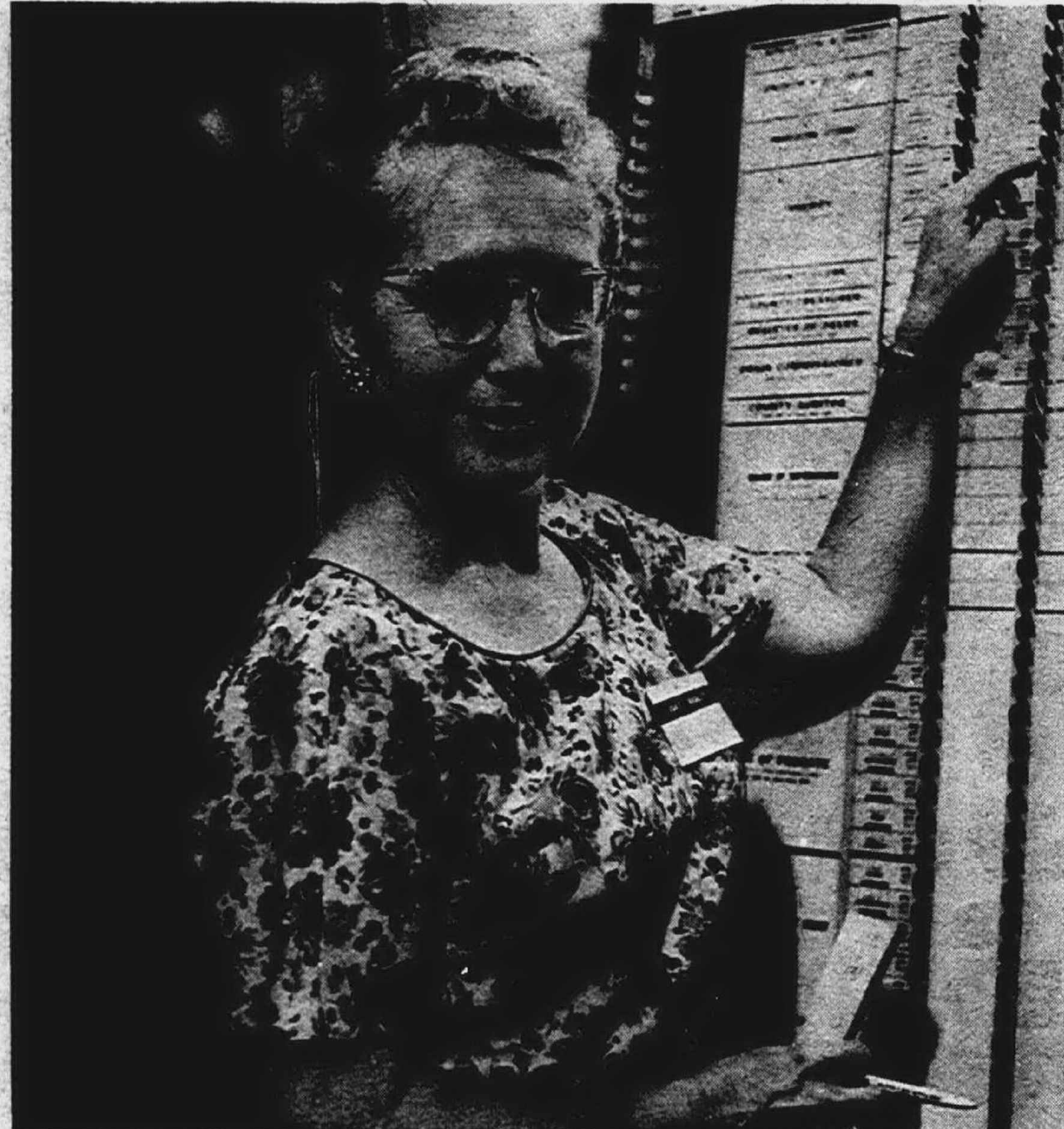
Pittsburgh Steel top officers have been handling affairs at Wheeling for more than a year. The merger will be official when passed by the directors, lenders and shareholders of both firms.

WASHINGTON -- The FBI has issued a book for airlines telling them how to deal with most crime--unfortunately, it leaves out hijacking. A spokesman for the FBI said "Airlines and the FBI" was written before the present outbreak of hijackings.

Aware of the problem, the FAA has put security men on some flights when there was reason to be suspicious. However, a spokesman said the FAA hasn't got enough people to man every commercial flight.

WASHINGTON -- Defense Secretary Clark M. Clifford got a lot of criticism when he returned from Vietnam and announced that the South Vietnamese troops were equal to American. He replied that he had received that information from Gen. Richard Stilwell, commander of the Provisional Corps in the northern part of I Corps.

As a result, the Pentagon has issued a booklet giving statistics which support Clifford's statements.

## Detroit To Stage Festival Of Arts

A city-wide ten-day Festival of the Arts called Detroit Discovery is being coordinated by Detroit Adventure, Beginning Friday, Aug. 16, the Festival will continue until and through Sunday, Aug. 25. Co-sponsors with Detroit Adventure are the Detroit Society for the Advancement of Culture and Education, and the Mayor's Youth Opportunity Council.

This arts festival grew out of a request by Mayor Jerome P. Cavanagh to bring Detroit's cultural activities into focus and to acquaint Detroiters with what is happening in the arts within the City of Detroit. All of the performing arts groups consist of local professional and non-professional talent.

There will be outdoor jazz concerts on the first two evenings of the Festival on the lawn of the Detroit Public Library. The Detroit Symphony Orchestra will play five concerts during the Festival on the steps of the Rackham Building instead of at Belle Isle.

Black classical artists will appear with the Detroit Symphony. There will be folk singing and poetry readings in the Kresge Court of The Detroit Institute of Arts; choral groups on the Rackham Building steps. Folk dancing, sponsored by the International Institute, will be outdoors on the Wayne State University campus and two evenings of rock involving four bands will be held on Cass Ave.

Art exhibitions will be held; one by children at the Society of Arts and Crafts; another ex-

hibition of photography by children from a summer Youth Opportunity Council-sponsored project. A Black Artists exhibition will be at the Detroit Institute of Arts. The Afro-American Museum will be in the area with its artifacts and historical pictures.

A fashion show will be held

on one evening of the Festival. For children, there will be a puppet show, some movies and a stage play. Dramatic productions will be held in Wayne State University's Community Arts Auditorium. The Association of Black Students at Wayne State University will stage a carnival.

## This Complete Hotel Is For The Birds

A new "Hotel Pontchartrain," constructed by George Tessmer of 141 Robindale, has been given to the University of Michigan Dearborn Campus in memory of Henry Ford.

The hotel is a martin house built like one of the birdhouses that were on the Fair Lane estate in Ford's time. The automaker had named this particular one the Hotel Pontchartrain after the famous Detroit establishment. The real hotel had opened in 1905, a decade before Ford moved to Fair Lane.

The birdhouse had been a dream of the Faculty Wives Club of the U-M Dearborn Campus. One of the wives, Mrs. Calvin DeWitt, majored in biology at U-M in Ann Arbor and did the investigation work for

the structure.

TESSMER, a former Ford engineer, built the house from a Ford Archives picture of the original Pontchartrain and from the martins' requirements as supplied by Mrs. DeWitt. The house can be dismantled layer by layer for cleaning.

Martins are peculiar birds. They require separate apartments for their pairs.

DETROIT -- An Illinois parolee has shot and killed a veteran Detroit police officer in a gun battle at the Jeffries Housing project.

Parolee Henry Matthews, 31, suffered three wounds during a shoot-out after he had fatally shot Sgt. Edward Wolski. Two other policemen, Richard Paduch and Richard Woysner, suffered minor injuries.

The fatal shooting of Sgt. Wolski occurred after he and fellow officers responded to a radio call that a man was shooting a woman.

Circuit Judge Claud Vanderploeg handed down the decision which ordered Mrs. McManus to pay a fine and make restitution for a total of \$4,907.

Mrs. McManus claimed she never benefited from the "padding claims" while an employee of the hospital. She contended the extra money was turned over to the patients.

ANN ARBOR -- Professor-Emeritus Philip E. Bursley, 87, a member of the University of Michigan faculty for 42 years, has died following a long illness.

Prof. Bursley, a member of the University's Romance language department, was the father of State Sen. Gilbert E. Bursley.

ANN ARBOR -- The Ann Arbor City Council has liberalized its liquor-sale ordinance by permitting the sale of liquor by the glass on Sundays after 2 p.m.

Establishments with food and service sales totaling at least 50 per cent of gross revenues will be eligible to apply for the special license to sell liquor on Sundays.

## Don't Let Goats Get Your Goat

Dairy goats are coming to the Michigan State Fair as participants in official competition for the first time in the 119-year history of the Fair.

The dairy goat show at the State Fair is limited to competition for junior exhibitors. Four breeds are included: Alpine, Nubian, Saanen and Toggenburg.

AS FOR FOOD, a goat will chew the label from a tin can to get the glucose. He'll pass over grass and clover to eat weeds and tree leaves which contain the vital minerals his diet requires. He'll chew on a wool jacket, untie your shoe laces or pull the handkerchief from your pocket.

The best milkers yield 4,000 to 5,000 lbs. within a year as compared to a cow which produces about 14,000 lbs. Herdsmen say that goat milk has a lower sugar content, the ash content is higher, fat globules smaller, has a finer curd and is considered one of the most healthful of foods.

The Alpine, a good milk producer, hails from France. The Toggenburg was introduced to this country in 1893 from Switzerland. He's a soft brown with a white tail and white stripe running from eye to muzzle on each side of the face.

The Saanen is usually pure white, short haired and bearded. This breed also comes from Switzerland and is considered the Holstein of goats. The long, droopy-eared Nubian hails from Africa and is a cross-breed of native Egyptian, Indian and Toggenburg stock.

A NUMBER OF GOATS, owned by junior showmen, were invited to the State Fair last year for exhibition purposes. This year cash awards are being offered.

E.J. "Jeff" Keirns, State Fair general manager, says he understands the demand for goat milk exceeds the supply and that goat herding apparently is heading for a larger role in Michigan agriculture.

LANSING -- Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley has ruled that both candidates for Congress and committees formed to aid them must file separate detailed accounts and statements for both primary and general elections.

In answer to a series of queries from Sec. of State James Hare, Kelley also ruled that:

1. Campaign committees formed to raise money for candidates must file a detailed account and statement as required by law.

2. A committee formed for political education purposes which does not actively participate in an election campaign, is not required to file a campaign account.

A committee formed to oppose propositions submitted in local elections is a political committee with the meaning of the Corrupt Practices Act, and corporations are prohibited from making contributions to such committees.

LANSING -- Construction of Michigan's proposed new \$40 million Capitol may begin as early as next year.

This stepped-up time schedule was revealed after the State Administration Board approved a \$246,800 purchase of 10 parcels of property located in a four-square block area that will be the sight of the new Capitol.

In addition to the actual purchase, the board also set aside \$3 million for land acquisitions to round out an eventual 75-acre site for a downtown state office complex.

JACKSON -- Reports that 20 to 40 shots were fired at a Jackson police car last Monday may have been an exaggeration, according to Jackson

Police Chief Earl B. Miller. Miller said he could not understand why none of the shots struck the patrol car. He said as far as he has been able to determine, none of the shots hit anything.

In the event of any similar incidents in the future, Miller said, his men have been ordered to return fire.

LANSING -- While accelerating the State Capitol Development Complex, the State Administrative Board has also pushed along several other projects.

High on the list is the Michigan State University Administration Building, allocated \$1.55 million more by the board's members.

# Michigan Local Delegates Not Happy With Agnew

MIAMI BEACH -- "It was spontaneous. There was no organized leadership. We didn't know until the last minute that it would be Romney."

That was how Observerland delegates to the Republican National Convention described their impressions of the unsuccessful attempt to nominate Michigan's governor George Romney for vice president in place of presidential nominee Richard Nixon's personal choice, Governor Spiro T. Agnew of Maryland.

The local delegates joined in giving Romney a 43-5 majority over Agnew in the Michigan delegation.

At a press conference this morning, Romney said "the revolt" helped to relieve tensions, which would have divided the party. He compared the delegates' revolt to the lancing of a boil which would have festered had it not had a chance to be expressed, Romney promised to work for the Nixon-Agnew ticket but said he would work "enthusiastically" only if the Nixon leadership makes the large northern states "at least as important as the leaders from the south and southwest--and I believe he will."

Agnew got 1,128 votes to Romney's 182, but Romney said, "There were many more that were bitter and concerned and that evaporated on the floor."

Why did the delegates do it? Delores Kory and John Cartwright of the 19th district and E.O. Weber of the Second District had difficulty listing their reasons in any one, two, three order, but the composite picture was this:

"Spiro Agnew was largely unknown to them. They doubted his ability to strengthen the ticket, headed by a man with limited appeal to Michigan suburbanites, independents and Democrats."

"They felt that Oregon's Senator Mark Hatfield had been given a bad deal when Nixon aides lead him to believe he was to be the vice-presidential choice, then suddenly dumped him."

There was some concern that Nixon had sold out to Dixiecrat Strom Thurmond of South Carolina. Thurmond had helped keep Southern delegations in line for Nixon, and thus prevented them from jumping to California's governor Reagan. In return, Thurmond appeared to have elicited a promise that Nixon would pick a running mate acceptable to the south.

As Weber related it, Romney had discouraged him from starting any revolt, but the governor couldn't stop them from taking part in something the Pennsylvania and Oregon groups started.

ROMNEY himself had not wanted to be the candidate, Weber said, because he was tired of being hurt nationally with his maverick role on issues.

Weber said the Michigan delegates felt bad that the anti-Agnew candidate had to be Romney.

It wasn't until Nevada state chairman George Abbott began speaking that Romney and the Michigan delegates knew that he would nominate Romney.

Romney and local delegates later inspected Agnew's record as Baltimore County executive and governor and were impressed by it.

A sole delegate from Nevada, George Abbott, nominated Michigan Governor George Romney. Two others seconded the nomination.

Meanwhile New York party leaders and Senator Edward Brooke of Massachusetts, were trying to collar New York Mayor John Lindsay to see if he would accept the nomination.

Lindsay, who had agreed to second the nomination of Agnew said no, and after speaking on behalf of Agnew, left the hall.

The balloting began quickly after Delaware declined to nominate anyone. Nevada's Romney support was one strong--the other 11 votes went to Agnew, as did all but 182 of the convention votes.

Once Romney saw Agnew had gone over the necessary 667

votes, he moved Agnew's nomination to be made unanimous.

WHILE the bid to nominate Romney, or Lindsay for that matter, was too late and unorganized, it was not without significance.

Romney had earlier headed off a revolt over Agnew in the Michigan delegation, saying he'd gotten delegates to agree "they would not initiate such revolt."

Yet local delegates told The Observer, feeling against Agnew ran very strongly and very deeply throughout the delegation, and that it was shared by both Nixon and Rockefeller supporters.

"Most of them, inclined to revolt in caucus," Romney said, "There were people who got up and surprised me."

Romney agreed that the southern delegations had had "considerable influence" in nominating Agnew. Asked if he was happy with Agnew, Romney said "I did not say I was unhappy."

OTHER DELEGATES from Michigan and largely urban states like New York and Pennsylvania were more specific--they felt Agnew offered little hope in helping the ticket in the cities, while a man like Lindsay would.

With eye to local and congressional tickets back home, they said Agnew would hurt them.

Unhappy or not, however, delegates went along, as have conventions in the past, with Nixon's choice. Nixon left little doubt that he was the man in charge.

MIAMI BEACH -- Michigan's hotbed of disguised Rockefellerism reacted well to Richard M. Nixon's smooth first-ballot victory for the Republican presidential nomination.

Observerland delegates not only stuck with favorite-son George Romney in the 44-4 first-ballot vote, but were willing to hold for the governor for a second ballot if Nixon hadn't won so quickly.

Once Nixon had reached the 667 required votes, Michigan joined the parade of states switching to unanimous votes for Nixon.

State chairman Elly Peterson had announced the first-ballot vote, but Governor Romney himself took the convention microphone to announce the switch, promising, in addition to deliver the states 21 electoral votes to Nixon in November.

In contrast, in 1964 Romney had "accepted" but never endorsed or campaigned for conservative nominee Barry Goldwater.

NIXON's choice of Maryland Governor Spiro Agnew for his vice-presidential running mate was only coolly accepted however by the Michigan delegation.

One delegate, David Upton, of the 4th district, unhesitatingly called it "a mistake," primarily because Maryland is such a small state and Agnew a relatively unknown.

Michigan sentiment was behind New York Mayor John Lindsay and Oregon Senator Mark Hatfield--especially Hatfield.

State chairman Elly Peterson was openly disappointed for Hatfield's sake, especially after many news leaks from Nixon's staff had pointed to Hatfield as the VP choice.

Bob Dupree, 19th District alternate, said that Hatfield had made "quite an impression" on Michigan's delegation, which sat next to Oregon's on the convention floor.

TV newsmen frequently interviewed Hatfield on the floor Wednesday night and viewers may have seen 19th District Delores Kory sitting near him.

One Observerland woman at the convention attended a reception Monday, met Agnew's wife, and had no idea who Agnew was.

ROCKEFELLER's Michigan strength was reliably estimated to be at least 30 votes if the 48-member delegation had ever decided to switch from Romney.

Mrs. Kory said that mail from the Wayne County portion of the 19th District (Redford-

Livonia-Northville) was heavily in support of Rockefeller, and she personally preferred Rockefeller over Nixon and Reagan.

The Oakland County portion, however, seemed to have a Nixon leaning, she said.

Fifteenth District alternate John Boyles of Westland, GOP candidate for Congress against incumbent Democrat William Ford, had been frankly in favor of Rockefeller.

Jack McDonald emerged as a leader among the Michigan freshmen when he endorsed Rockefeller on Sunday.

He worked hard to get Esch and the third district's Garry Brown to join him. They did, on Tuesday afternoon.

Delegate Bud Weber, as chairman of the Wayne County Second District, said Esch made his move to satisfy Washtenaw County sentiment, but Weber thought Esch had little to gain by making any endorsement and had made his endorsement too late to be effective.

IT HAD BEEN common knowledge for months that the 12th and 14th--district delegates, backers of arch conservative Richard Durant, would want to give Romney a bad time.

But other delegates, including Romney, had the impression that those four would back California's Ronald Reagan on the first ballot.

Instead, the conservatives backed Nixon in the 44-4 vote.

The dozen or so real Nixon supporters stuck with favorite son Romney.

PUBLICLY, ROMNEY never revealed his presidential preference.

He also kept his feelings secret in closed-door delegation caucuses, according to Observerland delegates.

A QUICK survey of delegates, convention watchers and Michigan newsmen indicated that one Republican congressman may be in trouble with Nixon at the head of the ticket in November.

Philip Ruppe, freshman lawmaker from the Upper Peninsula's 11th District, was seen facing difficulty in the general election.

A private poll taken for the Michigan Republican State Central committee had shown New York's governor Nelson Rockefeller running about even with Nixon statewide but some nine percentage points ahead of Nixon in the five "marginal" Republican congressional districts--those won from Democrats by five points or less in 1966.

NIXON'S TEAM won a good deal of respect from Observerland delegates who privately supported Rockefeller.

Bob Dupree, alternate for the 19th District, was impressed by the Nixon group's floor demonstration organization.

## Frink Beats Mardiros

Gary Frink topped Ron Mardiros for the Democratic nomination for congress in the 19th District, which includes Redford, Livonia and Farmington.

Republican incumbent congressman Jack McDonald, ran unopposed and was renominated.

Mardiros carried his hometown Livonia and Redford, but lost in the Oakland County portion of the district, where he is not as well known.

"I am also tremendously elated with the Nixon-Agnew ticket. Carried on a Hubert Humphrey or Eugene McCarthy ticket, we can win easily in this district," he said.

"I'm more than ever convinced I can beat McDonald. Nixon has picked a totally unknown who brings nothing to the ticket."

Frink must top McDonald, whose victory was among five new congressional seats taken away from the Democrats in 1966. Billie S. Farnum, a Democrat, had won the seat in 1964 by 11,000 votes over Richard Kuhn.

In 1966, under Governor Romney's strong vote getting power, McDonald whipped Farnum 76,884 to 57,907.

Frink points to a huge Democrat falloff in the district--more than 30,000 votes--in the 1966 election, as his key to victory.

In 1964, more than 88,000 Democrats voted, some 31,000 less than turned out in the Romney landslide.

MARDIROS said he was not unhappy with the election results.

"Where I was least known, Pontiac, and Oakland County, although the organized and established machine of the Democrats and the AFL-CIO opposed my nomination, I think we did an exceptional job with our hastily assembled volunteer group of Mardiros-McCarthy supporters."

Mardiros had campaigned as a supporter of Senator Eugene McCarthy on a "peace at home and abroad" slogan. Mardiros said he would continue to work for McCarthy, and thanked his campaign staff for their work. He then pointed to a general problem for all Democrats:

This election also points the critical problem facing the Democratic Party this November. That is the inability of voters to relate to the poor, the intellectual, the suburbanite, and the worker.

If the Democratic Party fails to recognize the principles of McCarthy - Kennedy, indifference will bring about a Republican victory.

I wish both Gary Frink and the established Democratic Party good luck and I tell both that I will be available after a short two-day vacation for any assignment that they feel will help either candidate or party.

"A cameraman was shooting piles of paper and signs on the floor, and on television we Republicans are going to look wasteful," she smiled, "but actually we're very thrifty."

## Dirksen Soothes Romney With His Great Style

MIAMI BEACH -- In Michigan politics, Governor Romney has tangled with such tough state senators as George Kuhn and Basil Brown and come out on top.

But at the Republican National Convention last week, George Romney tangled with the Grand Old Lion himself--Everett McKinley Dirksen, senator minority leader and chairman of the platform committee--and Romney was disarmed so skillfully that he seemed to enjoy it.

ROMNEY HAD WANTED to toughen the economic plank of the platform by vowing to fight "concentrations of economic power" in the hands of big labor unions and corporations. But that proposal simply failed to get in to the final draft.

So Romney announced at a

press conference a few hours before the convention session that he might try to amend the platform from the floor that night.

He didn't reckon with the tactics of convention stage manager Senator George Murphy, or with the oratory of Everett Dirksen.

The basic tactic was the one Dirksen used in the platform committee session: let the show run on, wear 'em out, then do what you had planned to do all along.

The show started Tuesday night at 8 and did run on. Singers. A speech by the still golden-voiced Tom Dewey. The introduction of Michigan's Jerry Ford as convention chairman. Ford's speech. Tributes to the new breed of freshmen congressmen the GOP elected in 1966.

At 10:30 Dirksen took over.

DIRKSEN DID NOT follow the standard custom of reading a long, dull platform in its entirety. He charmed the convention as it has been rarely charmed before.

"Quiet!" he bellowed like a stern but loving father.

"I accept the nomination," he quipped after the standing ovation.

## New Probate Code Good For 'Little Guy'

Not only "the little guy" who dies without a will, but also the practicing lawyer has "everything to gain and nothing to lose" from the proposed Uniform Probate Code, a University of Michigan law professor said here recently.

Speaking before the American Bar Association's annual meeting, Prof. Richard V. Wellman urged lawyers to support the proposed Code to serve "the long-range interest of the public and, incidentally, of the practicing bar." He has played a major role in drafting the Code as director of the project.

Noting that the current discussion of the Code by various groups is "very encouraging," Prof. Wellman cautioned lawyers against allowing "some important features of the Code to suffer from the jostling of special interest groups."

He cited as an example the proposed rules of intestacy.

The three-week course was sponsored by the Department of Biology and Division of Field Services of Eastern Michigan University and the Huron-Clin-ton Metropolitan Authority.

BUT THE proposed changes, Prof. Wellman argued, are "sound and in the public interest." They are designed, in effect, to let survivors do what "they can and will do whether or not the probate code sanctions it." The new rules deserve "vigorous support" from lawyers, Prof. Wellman said. Cumbersome rules of existing law are seriously hampering lawyers from giving service to "most people who want it," Prof. Wellman said, while estate specialists tend to concentrate on big estate matters.

"Our ability as a profession to deal simply with simple matters involving the personal and financial affairs of the vast majority of the population is growing ever more severe," The speaker assured his

listeners that the proposed Code will not "undercut the estate planning practice of established experts. To the contrary, adoption will vastly increase the value of the law oriented estate planner who will find important new opportunities for imaginative and valuable service."

"THE CODE has been brought to its present state of development by hundreds of lawyers who have recognized the necessity of putting the public interest first."

Discussion about the Code during the next 12 months, Prof. Wellman pointed out, will be critical in determining the final shape of the Code. He said the organized bar has "a vitally important responsibility to see the long-range interests of the public are identified and stoutly asserted."

The Code is being formulated under the sponsorship of the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws which is expected to give final consideration to the entire Code next summer.

The schedule of visiting artists to the Painting Department of Cranbrook Academy of Art was announced today by Glen Paulsen, Director of the Academy.

Jules Olitski, Esteban Vicente and Jack Bush are the eminent artists who will be visiting the Academy during the 1968-1969 school year.

Olitski is among the foremost of today's color-field painters. He was recently featured in the Art section of Time Magazine with three of his large-scale canvases being reproduced in color.

The Russian-born, raised-in-Brooklyn artist is one of three or four artists who represented the United States in the 1966 Venice Biennale. He is currently planning one-man shows in London, Los Angeles and New York.

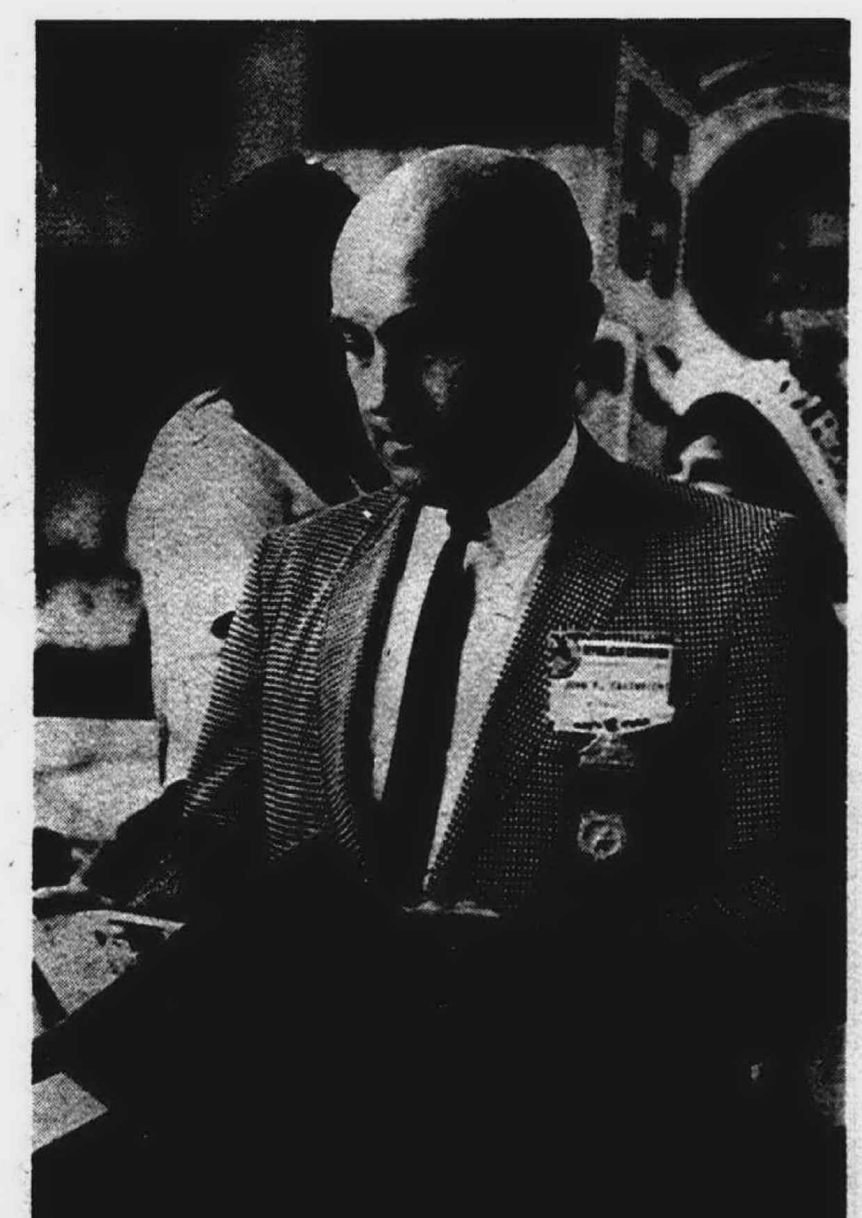

# You See More On TV Than Reporter Does On Floor

Television watchers of the Republican agony in Miami Beach saw more but enjoyed it less.

There is an aroma, a psychological thunder, a mix of

emotions playing on the synapses--and a lot of fun being there.

The news comes back more accurately and faster on the cable and through the air. The movers and shakers are life

size and talking plainly in TV mug shots.

Rumors are checked out on the floor and the strategy of politics is plainer and more direct in the living room than on the scene.

A SINGLE WATCHER from the gallery in Miami Beach's Convention Hall viewed the back of a head, the tiny figures 200 feet below on the floor or swapped homilies with the gent in the next seat.

"My seat is so high, the sea gulls are flying a traffic pattern around my head," said The Observer Newspaper's Tim Richard. "I'm in the bleachers."

The Convention Hall reserved the inner-space on the floor for the delegates. Box seats on either side were for VIPs, such

as Pat Nixon, her daughters and young David Eisenhower.

At the rear of the delegations were the "honorary sergeants-at-arms," an office which meant only that the holder had a week-long pass as the result of being a party yeoman back home.

The press sections are above and behind the box seats (and on either side of the rostrum). Richard maintained contact with Observerland delegates by wig-wag signal, telephone and talks later on the floor with delegates.

BUT ON TELEVISION, you at home saw Congressman James

Gardner, of North Carolina, describe a southern swing toward California Gov. Reagan.

There was former GOP National Chairman Leonard Hall squelching a rumor that Nelson Rockefeller's forces and Reagan were trying to hold off the first ballot until Thursday.

Another former GOP National Chairman, Meade Alcorn, said Nixon people were still twisting arms at 1 a.m., shortly before the nomination speeches ended.

There was humor. A bigger than life Nixon picture-poster, was held hori-

zontal, showing the candidate either snoozing or three minutes after being hit by a truck.

Michigan's Governor Romney had 60 balloons falling from the ceiling to pep up his spontaneous demonstration. Rockefeller and Nixon each had 500. These important facts are unavailable to those in Miami.

Old Charlie Halleck, who hoped for and missed the vice presidential candidacy with Willkie, reminisced about waking up unwanted.

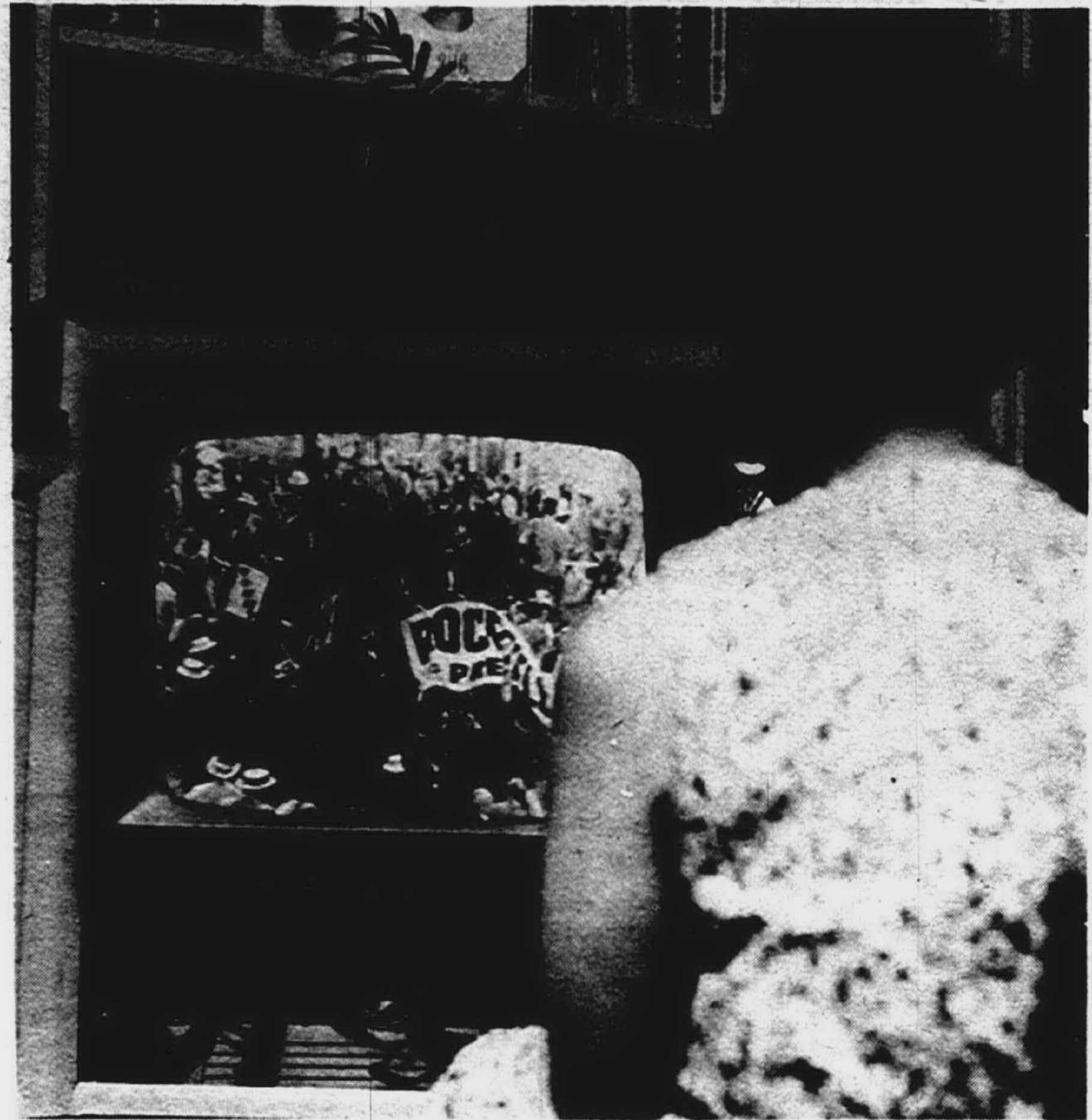
GOV. JAMES RHODES, of

## As A Hanger-on She Sees More Than Reporters

MIAMI BEACH--My wife isn't particularly interested in the details of my "beat"--votes of Observerland delegates, caucuses, committee meetings, press conferences.

So Nancy Richard has joined what she calls the "hanger-oners" at the Republican National Convention.

The result: She has met more big politicians (John Lindsay, could be a heart breaker), crashed more parties, wangled better convention hall tickets, and picked up more unprintable gossip about the great and the mighty than has her husband.

Here, in her own words is how she does it:

"THEY KEEP telling you that if you don't have a GOP convention hall ticket, the best way to see anything is to sit in your room and watch the tube. Phooey, that's no way to see anything, anybody, or Miami Beach.

"As a convention hanger-on--one with no status other than the fact that her husband is here on business--the best thing to do is listen, watch, and elbow your way around.

"One other tip: get ahold of all the campaign buttons you can lay your hands on. Why? If you want to use the facilities at the Reagan hotel headquarters, look as if you know what's going on and wear a garish Reagan button going over.

"Two gals I met, less than enchanted with the salty swimming pool at the Romney hotel, put on their suits, sported Reagan buttons and went over to the ocean beach at Reagan headquarters. Very simple if you know how to operate. And knowing how to operate is 99% of the battle.

"EVERY MORNING, get a convention schedule, zero in on what you want to do, and do it.

"Case in point, Rockefeller headquarters, we learned, had a really big bash of a reception the other night. If you want to go, grab a cab, go over and wait around until the crowd of official New Yorkers walks in to see Rocky, and walk in with them. Don't look nervous and, above all, avoid the little man at the door selling the \$15 tickets.

"One other thing you should learn in a hurry. If you see a crowd of camera men totting their big color equipment in the same direction, follow them. They know what they're doing and why.

"Following them one day, I met Nelson Rockefeller, Mayor John Lindsay, Ed Nelson (Peyton Place's Dr. Rossi), Hildegarde, Teresa Wright and Kitty Carlisle.

"And above all, if you don't remember another thing, grab those campaign buttons. Being caught in Miami Beach without your assortment of buttons is like being without a bathing suit."

ONE FOOTNOTE to Nancy's political adventures:

A Michigan politician learned that another state's favorite son, who has the same first name as an Observerland candidate, found some cute posters and buttons were available from a right wing group.

Removing their Romney buttons, the ladies passed themselves off as quasi-John Birchers and were happily given hundreds of buttons and stickers.

And so presidential campaign gimmickery will be used this fall in a local legislative race.

## OK 3 Amendments To Constitution

Michigan voters Tuesday made the first three major changes in the state constitution since its adoption in 1963.

They restored the power to appoint judges to fill vacancies to the governor in a reversal of a 1963 decision.

The other two changes will establish a judicial tenure commission to recommend disciplinary action against state-court judges and a state official compensation commission.

For years prior to the constitutional convention which drafted the document approved in 1963, Michigan governors filled judicial vacancies by appointment.

The convention wrote in a clause allowing the court administrator to fill vacancies with retired circuit judges until the following election in which the post could be permanently filled.

LEGAL sources expressed dissatisfaction with the system because retired judges were often not inclined to come out

of retirement. Lawyers led the fight for the change back to appointments.

The judicial tenure commission would be nine members, three named by the governor, three by the State Bar of Michigan and three by the Michigan Supreme Court.

Before the amendment, the judges could be removed only by impeachment, which takes a two-thirds vote of both houses of the legislature.

The Supreme Court will retain "general superintending powers" over inferior courts. The Supreme court in the past has censured some circuit judges for failing to follow regulations.

Causes for discipline by the commission would be conviction of a felony, impairing disability, willful misconduct, habitual intemperance or other conduct damaging to his role as a judge.

The compensation commission would establish salaries for all state officers. The legislature pushed for the amendment to take the heat off.

## OCC Seeks Donations For Small Loan Fund

The Financial Aid Office of Oakland Community College is creating a short-term loan fund and is requesting assistance for the fund from various community groups. The fund will supplement the scholarship, grant and loan program already in operation at the college.

According to Donald D. Nichols, associate director of student services, the fund will provide small loans to meet

some of the students' unanticipated demands.

EXPLAINED Nichols, "We have been unable to meet the needs of those students who want to borrow small amounts, between \$10 and \$30, for short periods of time. Our experience with 12 registration periods since 1965 has proven that this type of short-term loan fund would serve a great need."

## Gribbs, Incumbents Win In County Dem Primary

Newly appointed Wayne County Sheriff Roman S. Gribbs surprised even the most optimistic primary watchers as he

led the Democratic primary battle for sheriff with over 88,000 votes.

Gribbs, an attorney and rela-

tively unknown, had taken to his new job quickly and gained good exposure on area television news programs.

He beat former sheriff Peter L. Buback, and another strong contender, Phillip J. Van Antwerp, former Detroit police commissioner. The rest of the field of 13 were not even in the ball park.

Gribbs polled 88,434, Van Antwerp 28,583 and Buback, who resigned after a ticket-fixing scandal rocked his department, tallied 18,489.

Gribbs' name-alike, Norman Grubbs got 7,757 votes.

Gribbs is virtually assured of being elected unless something dramatic happens in Wayne County politics.

Long a Democratic stronghold, the county battles are in the primary. Once won, the Republican opposition is beaten by sheer historic Democratic plurality.

Gribbs will face James E. McCarthy.

In other Democratic primary results, prosecutor William L. Cahalan had little trouble hanging on to his job as he tallied 113,603 votes.

Nicholas Arvan, 15,680; Stephen Taylor, 16,735; and Samuel Thorne, 14,057, were the other candidates.

Cahalan will face Republican William H. Ferguson, Incumbent County Clerk Edgar M. Branigan won renomination, topping Charles Youngblood by 12,000 votes. Branigan will face Charles A. Brooks, unopposed GOP nominee.

Democrat Louis E. Funk, incumbent, will face Eugene Szymanski for the county treasurer's spot.

Bernard J. Youngblood, incumbent Democrat, held off a primary challenge from Charles McLean for the registrar of deeds nomination. Youngblood will face GOP nominee Thomas I. Ahart.

Incumbent County auditor John F. Williams will go against GOP winner Richard D. Berth.

In the race for Drain Commissioner, incumbent Henry V. Herrick topped Bernard F. O'Brien for the Democratic nomination. The Republicans nominated A. L. Meridith for the post.

In the non-partisan judge race for the new circuit-court seat, John D. O'Hair was eliminated. Richard Maher and Thomas J. Brennan will face each other in November. Maher polled 97,477 votes to Brennan's 70,209.

Two were nominated for the judge-of-probate vacancy. Philip A. Gillis will face Joseph Pernick. Pernick tallied over 93,198 votes, Gillis 33,980. Robert E. Murphy ran third with 32,805.

## Metro Airport Expansion Set

Plans for a \$100-million expansion of facilities at Detroit Metropolitan Wayne County Airport to keep pace with the growth of air travel have been approved by the Wayne County Board of Supervisors.

The expansion will be financed by revenue bonds, with the airlines which use the airport bearing the entire cost. No tax funds will be used.

A spokesman for the Wayne County Road Commission, which operates the airport, said financial negotiations with the airlines are nearly completed, and that construction could start late this year or early next year.

Issuance of \$100-million in bonds was approved in principle by the Board of Supervisors July 25.

Plans call for construction of two additional all-weather instrument approach runways, 2,000 additional deck-parking space; additional baggage claim area in the L.C. Smith Terminal, a new airport maintenance building, a new air cargo area, expansion of the airport road system, and another terminal development program. The latter would start in 1972.

## 'Don't Drop Police Test Standards'

State Sen. George Kuhn is fighting what he calls efforts to "relax the requirements" for new state police troopers.

Kuhn, R-West Bloomfield, said he will introduce a Senate resolution objecting to any dilution of standards.

And he will ask a Senate special committee on police salaries and recruitment to make the State Civil Service Commission explain why it is considering such a move.

HE REFERRED to reports quoting Franklin DeWald, chairman of the CSC, as saying that the group is considering eliminating a written examination as part of its entrance requirements.

Kuhn said the apparent purpose was to allow "whites and

non-whites with near-passing" grades to be admitted into the state police academy.

"There is a pressure here, and it's being exerted to get the Civil Service Commission to lower police hiring standards," Kuhn said.

WHILE KUHN DIDN'T directly tie the pressure to any person or group, it is generally true that proponents of lowering hiring standards see it as a method of admitting more Negroes to police ranks.

He said state police officials have reported "no particular trouble" recruiting, and he charged that talk of lowering standards is hurting trooper morale.

Kuhn is vice chairman of the Senate committee investigating the police matter.

## Their Signs Will Come Down To Rest Voters

Two Livonia Democrats campaigning toward the Nov. 5 election said they will take down their signs for a month to give voters a rest.

They will put them up again Sept. 15 as the drive for the general election gets down to cases.

Donald Friedrichs, primary victor for a seat on the new Wayne County Board of Supervisors and Marvin R. Stempfen, running for the Michigan House

of Representatives, made the promise.

"We're taking our signs down now and won't put them up again until Sept. 15 or after," said Friedrichs. "We think the public has been imposed upon enough."

"We think they deserve a rest."

Friedrichs said he has eight to 10 signs measuring four by eight feet. Stempfen has 18 to 20 of the signs.

Rarely has Michigan's delegation ever backed a loser at the Republican National Convention.

One time was in 1860, when Michigan's 12 votes went for William Seward instead of Abraham Lincoln.

In 1888, the Wolverine State stuck with favorite son Gov. Russell Alger as the convention nominated Benjamin Harrison.

In 1892, Michigan gave 19 of its 28 votes to Ohio's William McKinley and only seven to President Harrison, but Harrison was renominated -- and lost the election to Grover Cleveland.

And in 1964, Michigan stuck with favorite son George Romney, switching its 48 votes to Barry Goldwater only as a formality.

## Bronson, Foley Victors

The race for judge of the newly created Second District of the Michigan Court of Appeals was narrowed down to two candidates, S. Jerome Bronson and John F. Foley, by Tuesday's primary election.

The sole losers were Robert J. Danhof, 43, of East Lansing, who will remain in his job as legal advisor to Gov. Romney. Bronson, 38, of Oak Park, current Oakland County Prosecuting Attorney, will now face Foley, 40, of Birmingham, who had served as commissioner of the Michigan Court of Appeals.

A final vote tally from the entire district will not be obtained by the State Election Commission until sometime next week but the commission has named Foley and Bronson as the two winners.

The district covers Oakland, Huron, Tuscola, Sanilac, Shiawassee, Genesee, Ingham, Lapeer, St. Clair, Livingston, Macomb, Jackson, Washtenaw, Hillsdale, Lenawee and Monroe counties, which explains the state's problem getting a final total.

As could be expected, Bronson led Oakland County hands-down with 28,565 votes compared to 12,055 for Foley and 13,354 for Danhof. He is not expected, however, to do as well throughout the entire district.

Bronson garnered 1,579 votes from the Farmington area, 1,185 in the township and 394 in the city. Foley gained 844 Farmington votes, 204 from the city and 640 from the Township. Danhof collected 1,008 local votes, 795 from the township and 213 city votes.

In the life of Denny McLain, as most married men, his family comes first -- meaning his lovely wife and two children, and their well-being in their home in Farmington Township.

Next comes pitching for the Detroit Tigers.

Thirdly, there's McLain's organ career.

Denny thinks that playing the organ some day may become as big, if not bigger, than baseball in his life.

And his reason makes sense: "Heck, I won't be pitching all my life, even if I wanted to," he says as he greets you in the plush Tiger clubhouse where the ball players can escape the heat.

"Playing the organ is something else again. It's a profession that can go on well after I'm through as an active participant in baseball."

**RIGHT NOW**, the No. 1 winning pitcher in the major leagues, who's bidding to become the first 30-game victor in 34 seasons, manages to blend his pitching and organ performing happily for all concerned.

He's connected with the Hammond organ people and Grinnells and was quick to remind us that he'd be around during the week to help demonstrate a new \$6,000 instrument. Or was it a \$12,000 organ?

Also Denny has turned recording star for one of the major labels. He cut his first album the other afternoon between pitching starts.

Chances are the record will hit the streets just about the time the Tigers square off with the St. Louis Cards in the world series.

That's what you call the right timing. Consider the national publicity he'll get free -- for his record -- with sports writers from every section of the United States on deck for the series.

**WE CAN** just picture the scene in the clubhouse. Denny has beaten the Cardinals.

The scribes flock in... and head for the side of the clubhouse where Denny hangs his clothes.

"What did you throw today?" one will no doubt ask.

"How'd you feel?"

"What about that final pitch?"

Denny will politely give the answers... and somewhere along the line he may turn to his locker and pull out his new album.

"Hey, fellows... how about a mention for this?"

He'll get it.

One of the wire service guys unquestionably will write an entire feature on Denny the pitcher and Denny the organist.

**WHEREVER HE** goes these days, the question of reaching 30 victories pops up first in all discussions with McLain.

Denny still has the same answer: "I don't care how many I win personally. The big thing is our Tigers winning the pennant."

McLain should get to 30 at his present pace. All he has to do is split even in his final 14 starts, assuming he'll be called upon to work every fourth day, as he has, in the weeks ahead.

There are times, Denny says, that he wishes he could get an extra day off.

"But until the pennant is cinched, I can't expect that," he says. "If we're well ahead in September I'd welcome five days off between starts."

He's not one to think that a pitcher should be rushed to the mound without proper rest for the sake of trying to win an extra game in the stretch.

He cites the 1954 season when the Philadelphia Phillies tried using Jim Bunning all the time and they never could hold onto a lead and win the flag.

**TIGER MANAGER** Mayo Smith agrees with McLain's thinking. But if the going gets rough in September, you'll see McLain pitching out of turn.

McLain has a chance to set a couple of Tiger records this season. He may wind up surpassing the 44 starts George Mullin made in 1904 and the 381 innings Mullin pitched the same season.

But two other Mullin records are out of reach. In those 44 starts, he finished 42 of them. He also lost 23!

Here are some other Tiger records which McLain could shatter:

Most victories in a season -- 29 by Mullin (1909) and Hal Newhouser (1944); highest season percentage -- .862 Bill Conovan, 25-4, in 1907; lowest earned run average of 1.81 by Newhouser in 1945; most shutouts -- 8, by Ed Kilian in 1905 and Newhouser in '45, and most strikeouts -- 275 by Newhouser in '46.

McLain already has carved four Tiger records -- 14 strikeouts in a night game to equal a Bunning mark; most consecutive strikeouts in a game and in relief -- seven, and most home run pitches in a season -- 24.

Denny has beaten every American League club at least once this year. In fact he's done the trick in each of the last four seasons, a feat unmatched by any other American League or National League pitcher.

Little wonder that when he relaxes at the Hammond organ, Denny McLain plays such sweet and happy music.

The world never has been nicer -- for a 24-year-old father of two.

## No Deer Permits Until Sept.

Michigan hunters must wait until early September to apply for permits offered under this fall's antlerless deer and wild turkey seasons, the Conservation Department reports.

By that time, the Department hopes to have completed distribution of 1968 big game and small game hunting licenses and special application forms for antlerless deer permits to license dealers throughout the state.

Without these licenses, neither would-be turkey nor antlerless deer hunters can apply for permits. Both groups of sportsmen must first buy their appropriate 1968 licenses whose numbers must be included on their permit applications.

Besides meeting this requirement, applicants for antlerless deer permits must use the special forms which will carry their pre-marked license numbers. Those seeking turkey hunting permits will be required to enter their 1968 small game license numbers on U.S. Government postcards, which will serve as their entry forms.

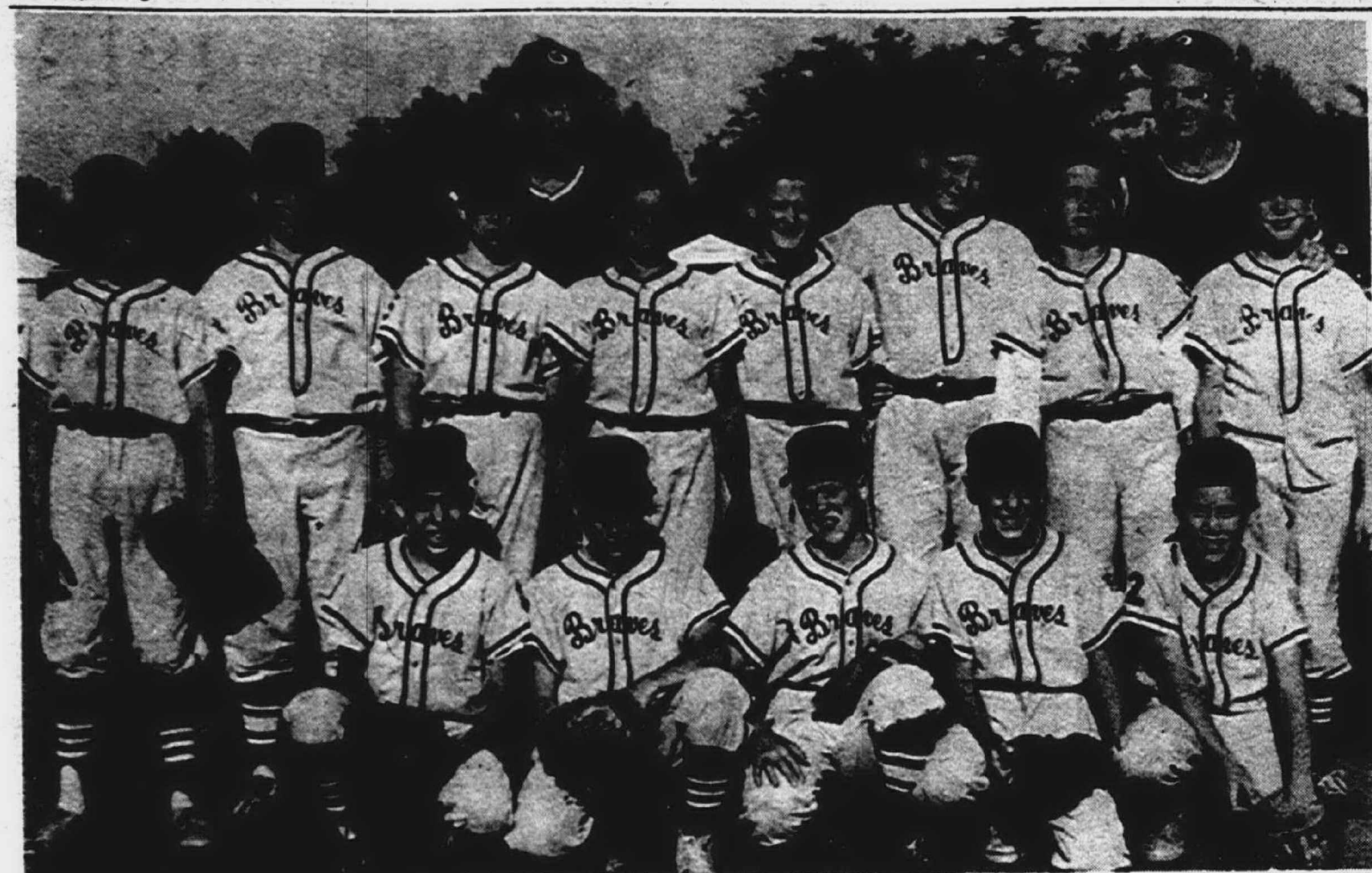

## UM's Halfback Johnson Has Summer Desk Job

The ideal summer job for the collegiate football star of yesteryear was digging ditches or building roads...fresh air, a blazing sun, and hard work were the summer combinations for fall football victories.

Those days are no more. Today's outstanding players are thinking about more than a pro football career. They consider off-season and post-playing-day job prospects as well as their chances of making the professional game.

Michigan's top All-America candidate in 1968, Ron Johnson, is typical of the new career oriented athlete. The only muscles likely to be taxed by his job this summer are in his head, not his legs. Ron is an employee of the National Bank of Detroit.

"I work in the Credit Department at NBD," Ron explains. "I have the title of loan analyst trainee. I work closely with the loan officers, doing research and collecting facts that will aid them in their decisions as to whether a loan should be made or not."

Ron, a halfback, should be familiar with records and statistics after his 1967 football season. He kept the adding machines in the press box busy as he rambled for 1005 yards, a modern-day Michigan rushing mark. In addition, he shocked Navy with 270 yards rushing, a Michigan single-game record, and carried 42 times against Northwestern, setting a Wolverine and Big Ten workhorse standard.

A STUDENT in Michigan's School of Business Administration, Johnson carries a B-average. He is concentrating in the field of finance.

He has found this summer job, especially valuable from a career standpoint. "It has given me a good perspective of business," Ron claims. "You learn the practical side of the business world from an experience like this, and how to apply many of the procedures outlined in textbooks."

Johnson has also discovered that his academic training is more relevant than he had previously considered it. "I've found that many of the things I just brushed aside because they seemed unimportant are used every day here," he laughs. "I'm not going to be so hasty about what I choose to forget from now on."

Besides his duties at the bank, Ron has kept busy in community activities. He assisted in the Junior Champ Track and Field Meet in Detroit, which involved a series of preliminary competitions at various sites throughout the city before the finals were held on June 29 at Cobo Hall. He encouraged youngsters to participate in the meet, and put in several guest appearances.

Despite his full schedule, Ron hasn't forgotten about football, and conditioning drills. "I've been playing a lot of basketball to stay in shape, and lately I've been working on football fundamentals and doing some running," he explains. "For instance, one night I'll run about a half mile, play basketball for two hours, and finish up by going over some plays."

JOHNSON is not happy about the pre-season football predictions he's seen, most of which place Michigan well down in the Big Ten pack. When asked if the Wolverines would surprise the experts, Ron's answer is

an emphatic, "Very much so. We're very anxious to get going. We've got to prove something to ourselves this year. I don't feel we really went out limit last season. This time, we will."

Referring to his selection as captain, Ron says, "It's quite challenging and a great honor for me. I think it will also help out my individual performance. I'm going to have to work harder because I must serve as an example to the rest of the team."

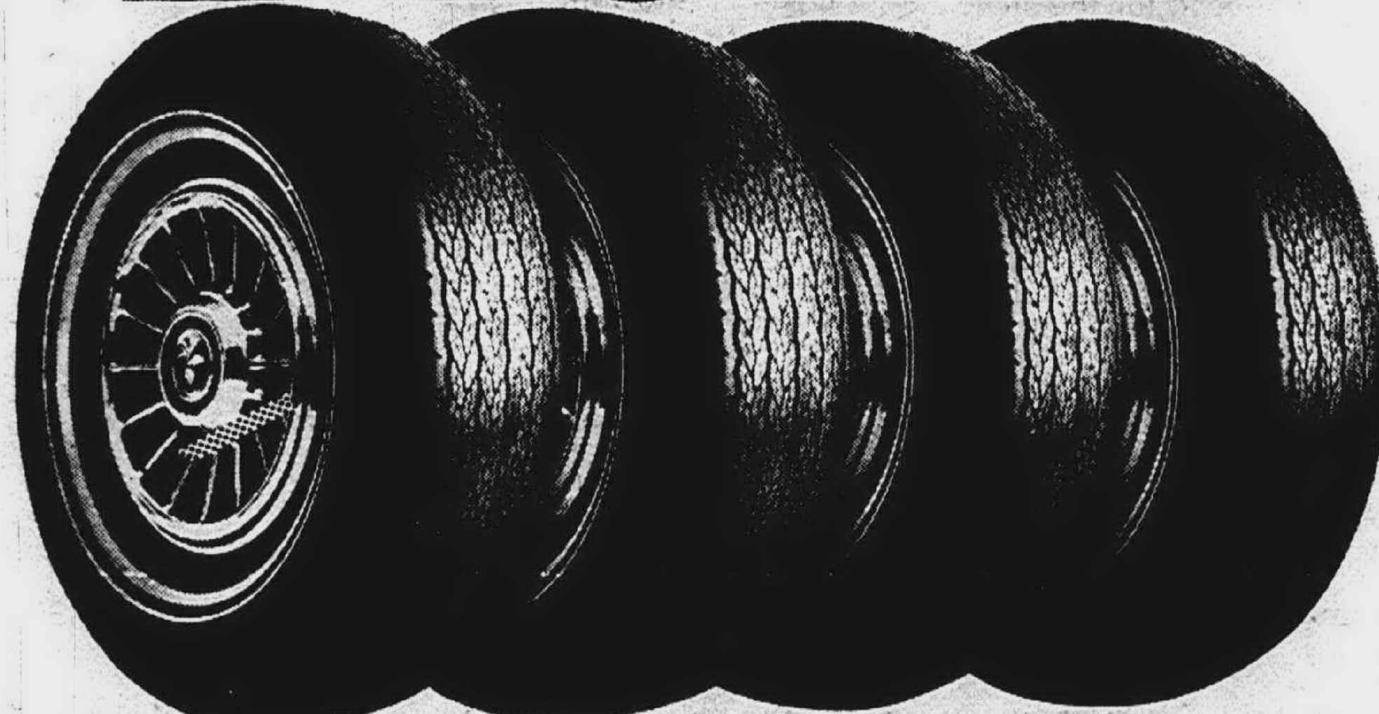

The teams were slated to meet in Mexico City in a contest to be nationally televised with Channel 2 the Detroit area outlet at 3 p.m.

The two teams will play Sunday and television will be there. But it won't be Mexico City. It'll be Franklin Field in Philadelphia.

Late Thursday, Mexican officials ordered the game canceled, claiming that student revolts made it inadvisable for such an attraction to be staged in Mexico City.

Thus the Lions, the Eagles and the CBS TV network started a swift rush which finally found Franklin Field available for the game.

THE LIONS will be seeking to get on to the victory board after losing to Buffalo, 13-9, in their opener last Friday night.

Some day coach Joe Schmidt of the Lions will field a team at full strength. But it won't be Sunday.

They went to Philadelphia without either of their first-string offensive guards, John Gordy and Chuck Walton.

Sidelined, too, is No. 1 quarterback Bill Munson.

THE CLUB also has lost for at least two months their new defensive end, John Baker, recently acquired from the Pittsburgh Steelers.

And nobody is quite certain

just what the future holds for Nick Eddy, the star back from Notre Dame, who missed most of last season with an injured knee.

The knee is kicking up again. All of which causes the Lions major concern.

Eddy may be of value to the Lions this season...and then again he may not.

The Lions are holding their breath.

Sunday's game, to be televised nationally in the United States with Channel 2 the Detroit outlet at 3 p.m., probably will see a pair of rookie quarterbacks carrying the load for the Lions.

SCHMIDT WAS impressed by the way Greg Barton from Tulsa handled himself in last Monday's loss to Buffalo.

Barton will get more of a

chance to show what he can do against the Eagles. He'll alternate with Greg Landry, the No. 1 draft pick from Massachusetts who sat out the Buffalo game because he had arrived in the Lions' camp only 48 hours earlier after starring with the College All Stars.

Besides Landry and Barton, the game Sunday will provide the Lions with their first chance to unveil in offensive patterns,

Earl McCulloch, their other first-round draft selection.

McCulloch was used primarily as a punt and kickoff return man against Buffalo, although he was in for a few passes at the end of the game.

The Lions are certain that McCulloch will be a big splash in the NFL after the performance he turned in against Green Bay in the All-Star game. He grabbed a pair of touchdowns

passes and on several occasions came within an eyelash of catching passes and breaking away for long gainers.

WITH MCCULLOUGH and Mel Farr operating in the backfield for the first time, the Lions figure to have two of the fastest players in the league to terrorize their opponents.

"This will help make the other club's defenses pretty

honest," says Schmidt.

The Lions last met Philadelphia two years ago when Milt Plum, now with Los Angeles, led Detroit to victory. The Eagles will be engaging in their first exhibition of the season.

The expectations are that after Sunday's game, the Lions will make some wholesale player cuts, unless there are more injuries.

## Kaline's Bat Helps McLain Record 23rd

As a senior citizen, from the standpoint of service as a player on the Detroit tigers, Al Kaline has only one regret: He's never played in a world series.

Comes October, Kaline and his mates are going to realize the ambition of all baseball players—to play in the fall classic and collect the extra handsome bundle of cash which goes with the series.

By the looks of things, too, Kaline will play a big role in the series despite the fact he's going to be 34 years old in November and this is his 16th

season in the majors—all with Detroit.

Even a barrage of injuries, which have affected his play for parts of most seasons in recent years, hasn't reduced his importance to the Tigers' cause.

"When you need a big hit, there's always Al," manager Mayo Smith was saying the other evening.

THERE WAS the second game, for example, of Tuesday's doubleheader with Cleveland. The Tigers came into the sixth inning trailing by a run.

Kaline was on the bench because he had worked all 17 innings of the opener won by Detroit, 2-1.

But with runners in scoring position and the Tigers desperately needing runs, Smith sent Kaline up as a pinch-hitter. He wasted no time responding with a double to put the Tigers in front.

True, it wasn't until the next evening the Tigers finally won the game, 5-2, which had to be suspended in the ninth inning Wednesday morning because of the 1 a.m. curfew.

And who was back in the outfield when the seventh inning began? Nobody else but Kaline.

ON WEDNESDAY, there was Kaline again at the plate in the first inning. Two mates were aboard. He responded with a single to send the Tigers off and winging again.

"You don't know how valuable this Kaline is," said Manager Smith.

"You know when he was hurt earlier this season and we were winning, there were many who kept telling me that we could get along without Al. Some dared to even comment that Al was over the hill.

"But look what a job he does. When we need him in the outfield, he'll play either right or center. When we asked to work at first base, he went there without almost a day of practice. And he looks like an established first baseman already.

"We have to be thankful that we have Al back for the stretch run. We wouldn't have the lead we do now if Al hadn't come back."

DESPITE THE Tigers' lead, all isn't rosy with Smith. He can't figure out what's gone wrong with pitchers like Joe Sparma and Mickey Lolich, when he starts them, and why Earl Wilson isn't consistent.

Sparma has lost a starting job after being knocked out early in the two-day game Detroit won from Cleveland. Lolich impressed in relief, but Smith says he wants to use John Hiller and Pat Dobson in starting roles against Boston this weekend.

IT WAS HILLER who started the 17-inning duel Tuesday and set a modern major-league record by fanning the first six men he faced. The old mark

was five. Hiller worked effectively for eight innings and left with the score tied at 1-1. The first Detroit run was scored by Don Wert on a homer in the eighth; the second by Bill Freehan on a single by Dick Tracewski, who is not known to pound a heavy bat.

The Tiger relief corps ex-

celled in both the first two games as John Wyatt won the opener and then got the save in the second.

The Tigers captured Wednesday night's regular game, 6-1, as Daryl Patterson took over from Wilson in the seventh to squish a Cleveland threat.

After Kaline knocked in one run in the first and Bill Free-

han followed with a two-run double, the Tigers were held scoreless until Willie Horton slapped his 27th homer in the eighth inning.

THE TIGERS REALLY had their hitting shoes on Thursday in making it four straight over Cleveland, 13-1, as Denny McLain coasted to his 23rd victory

and his 20th complete game.

The victory just about crushed Cleveland's pennant hopes. It sent the Tribe away from Detroit 12 1/2 games behind the Tigers, who still were unable to add to their lead of Baltimore which matched Detroit victories to stay 5 1/2 games back.
