**LIVONIA**—Plans have been revised to extend the proposed new boulevard for Five Mile Road by a quarter of a mile. The boulevard will start at Berwick, the first street east of Bentley High School, and continue to Yale, west of Farmington Road.

**LIVONIA**—Tentative agreement between the Livonia Secretaries Association and the Board of Education reportedly has been reached. The new contract, if ratified and approved, would give employees a six per cent pay boost and additional fringe benefits.

# City To Petition County For Assistance On Drains

Following a concerted study of the drainage problem in the entire area the Plymouth City Commission has decided to petition the County Drain Commission for relief in the Tonquish Creek district.

The decision was made at a study meeting Monday night following reports from Phil Hampton, an engineer from Johnson and Anderson, official city engineers and Chester C. Pierce, drain commission attorney.

It was pointed out by the engineers that only about 10 per cent of the drain plain is in the city, with another seven per cent in Northville Township and about 80 per cent in Plymouth Township.

However, according to the engineer, each improvement in the Township takes something away from the drain plain and forces that much more water into the city. This is true, especially, of the North Branch that flows through the business district.

### Diversion of Tonquish Creek Branch Is Planned

"THUS FAR we have escaped a bad flood," Commissioner Arch Vallier pointed out, "but the last heavy rain was not too far from becoming a disaster. Another hour of rain and the water would have been over the door steps and the stores in the central business district would have been flooded."

Hampton explained to the Commission that two courses were open for relief, and both would entail the diversion of the water from the north branch into the south branch just west of Sheldon Road.

He cited two points at which the diversion could be made to send the water on a southerly route and bypass the central

business district. He explained further that some of the route would entail tile and the remainder an open ditch at an approximate cost of \$350,000.

SOME QUESTION arose as to the increased water flow toward the City of Westland, but Hampton pointed out that the two branches join just a short distance south of Ann Arbor Road and that the diversion at the suggested point would make little difference.

In making his point the engineer also stated that under the ordinary scheme of things with Township development there was a chance that the city drainage system would be asked to carry 100 per cent increase shortly unless some relief was granted.

At this point Pierce, suggested that the Commission agree to petition the Drain Commission for relief.

"I know there is a lot of work on the boards right now," he Continued on Page 9A

## Schools Set Marathon Talks On New Wage Pact

An around-the-clock bargaining session has been scheduled August 21 in hopes of avoiding any delay in the opening of school this fall by

the Plymouth Education Association (PEA) and the school district. Settlement of the teacher-school dispute is being dis-

cussed with guarded optimism by both sides.

Whether school will open on time in September is not known and neither side is willing to predict when a tentative agreement will be reached.

James Rossman, superintendent of schools, and Ray Homer, president of the PEA, hinted that "teacher services may be withheld" if no agreement is reached as a result of the marathon meeting.

BOTH SPOKESMEN said their positions are virtually the same as when negotiations began early in the summer.

Salaries and class size are no closer to being settled than they ever were but there is hope tentative agreement may be reached when they will begin their first marathon bargaining session at 10 a.m.

Rossman and Homer said they will stay in negotiation until all problems are resolved and if no settlement is reached then there is little hope of opening school on time, they added.

Homer said the state labor mediator, Walter H. Quillico, has helped tremendously and Homer is certain Quillico will bring even more help at the round-the-clock meeting.

BEFORE THIS session, the two sides will gather on an informal basis, without the state mediator, and attempt to agree on other minor points.

That meeting will take place Friday and the spokesmen said they will simplify these problems so the following Wednesday only the key issues will remain to be decided.

## Back Porch Diplomacy Ends Police Deadlock

The City of Plymouth is employing a bit of back porch diplomacy in an attempt to settle the wage negotiations with the police and firemen.

The negotiating committee has switched the site of the meetings from City Hall to the back porch of Commissioner Arch Vallier's home and, according to reports, some headway is being made.

"We have had one meeting so far", Vallier reported Monday night, "and we got along just dandy. Pets (Schweitzer) and I met with the police and I think we made considerable headway."

Vallier wouldn't go beyond that and simply stated that another meeting was scheduled and that when the terms are reached that seem justifiable he will make a recommendation to the Commission.

When the negotiations broke off for the vacation months, there was a reported difference of \$1,060 in the starting wage scale.

The police had asked for \$9,000 plus fringe benefits. When this was turned down they lessened their demand and dropped most of the fringe benefits. Still, the city refused the basic wage demand.

At the time the City of Detroit had settled with a contract calling for \$10,000 in a

two-year period and Plymouth Township agreed and settled for \$8,000.

The Plymouth police and firemen insisted that the \$9,000 request was not out of line and steadfastly stuck to it.

Now, with the resumption of negotiations on Vallier's back porch, the deadlock is being broken.

### Schools Set '68 Tax Rate At 31.15 Mills

The Plymouth Board of Education Monday night approved a 1968 tax rate of 31.15 mills.

This is an increase of 4.20 mills over 1967 when the tax rate was 26.95.

The operation fund of the total is 22.15 mills while 1.7 mills has been set aside for the building and site fund and the remaining 7.3 mills will provide money to meet the school district debt.

## Three School Books Called Inaccurate

The Plymouth Community School District uses three textbooks which have been called "historically inaccurate" by a panel of nationally-known historians in a report to the State Board of Education last month.

"History of Our United States" by Eibling-King-Harlow, 1964; "Exploring Our Country" by Hammer, 1965; and "In These United States" by Preston - Tottle, 1965, were among 12 texts singled out by

the panel. William Harding, secondary superintendent, and Earl Gibson, elementary superintendent, said the texts are supplementary materials used in conjunction with other classroom books.

Both explained they were aware of inadequacies when using single texts for any one subject and have always attempted to remedy a situation by providing two or three books covering a subject.

The charges laid by the panel were outlined and documented in the findings of a special Social Studies Textbook Committee appointed by State Superintendent of Public Instruction Ira Polley.

The committee zeroed in on history books most widely used in social studies and enlisted six historians who had been recommended to them.

The panel selected 12 of the most used history books. They are, excluding those mentioned above:

"History of a Free People" by Bragdon, 1967; "Making of Modern America" by Canfield, 1964; "Story of the American Nation" by Cassner, 1967; "The Story of America" by Eibling-King-Harlow, 1965;

"They Made America Great" by McGuire, 1964; "Our Country's History" by Muzzey, 1965; "Exploring American History" by Schwartz, 1966; "Rise of the American Nation" by Todd-Curti, 1966; and "History of the United States" by Wade-Wilder-Wade, 1966.

As an error of omission, the report said, "The Negro does not exist in these books."

The Negro is "absent from colonial society, ignored in the Civil War, disappears after Reconstruction and there is nothing on the black codes, the KKK, white supremacy, poverty, and the other problems that plagued the Negro in the South after the Civil War."

Harding and Gibson pointed to their "excellent and complete" book facilities and added students are encouraged to use the library at all times.

## Cal Strom Resigns From School Board

Calvin B. Strom resigned from his post as member of the Plymouth Community School District Board of Trustees Monday night and expressed regret that he was going to leave Plymouth.

Strom, who is serving the second year of his first four-year term, will be moving to Buffalo, N.Y. as a marketing specialist with Baxter Laboratories.

He is leaving his position as a pharmaceutical salesman for Bristol Laboratories in metropolitan Detroit.

"We count everybody in Plymouth as our friends and hate to leave after living here for

seven years. However, the new position affords such a great opportunity that I can't pass it up," he said.

This news came suddenly to the Board members who did not know about Strom's resignation until Monday afternoon, a few hours before he formally resigned.

Board President Esther Hulsing said, "He's a great person to have on the board and will be missed by both the community and the board."

She pointed out that Strom was valuable to the board because he had direct liaison with the young progressive men of

## Romney Vetoes Bill To Ease Liquor Code

LANSING -- Gov. George Romney has vetoed a bill which would have permitted the State Liquor Control Commission to license package liquor, beer and wine takeout stores within 500 feet of a church or school.

"Proponents of this measure argue that the 500-foot rule was not intended to apply to takeout stores, that it imposes undue hardships on business expansion and that the (liquor control) commission should be given the latitude called for in this bill," Romney said in his veto message.

"There should be a specific and firm dividing line, and I do not believe that a division of 500 feet between these frequently conflicting purposes is too much to ask. I see no sound purpose to be served in permitting this type of exemption to the 500-foot rule."

TOLEDO -- The City Council unanimously approved a handgun ordinance Monday that may halt the flood of unregistered pistols from Toledo to metropolitan Detroit.

The ordinance orders: All Toledo residents who now own guns to obtain proper registration identification cards from the police within 90 days; All Toledo gun dealers and pawnshop owners to purchase licenses within 30 days or discontinue sale of guns; All individuals (including Michigan residents) who wish to purchase guns in the city to fill-out an application form and wait for police to determine if the applicant has a criminal record.

The police chief and safety director have the power under the ordinance to refuse an application. This ordinance covers the City of Toledo only. Its suburbs and surrounding cities have no like safeguards.

PARIS -- Nguyen Thanh Le, spokesman for the North Vietnamese delegation to the Paris peace talks with the United States, has blasted both the Republican and Democratic Parties, but saved a special attack for the GOP presidential candidate Richard Nixon.

Le said that the Republican platform and Nixon's personal stand could not possibly lead to an end to the Vietnamese War.

He asserted that he did not want to interfere in the internal affairs of the United States, but thought it was pertinent to give his views on Republican statements concerning Vietnam. He added that he was referring only to their stand on Vietnam.

WASHINGTON -- Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, expressing confidence he'll win the Democratic presidential nomination on the first convention ballot, has pegged his delegate strength at 1,600 votes.

Meanwhile Georgia Gov. Lester Maddox says he may turn the Democratic race into a four-way battle to show Americans the party "offers more than liberals and socialists."

The Democratic nomination in Chicago in two weeks will require 1,312 votes.

Humphrey said, "Let me tell you I feel rather relaxed, I feel good, I think we ought to be looking forward to November." Maddox said his candidacy would offer the party its only conservative contender.

GROSSE POINTE -- John S. Pingel, a 1939 graduate of Michigan State University who served on the Board of Trustees in 1964, has announced he will seek the Republican nomination for one of the two trustee posts to be elected in the fall. He said he is trying for the nomination because he loves MSU and wants "to help in the formation of some policies that I think are forward looking."

IONIA -- Three straight days of sunshine drew big crowds to the Ionia Free Fair last weekend, making up for admission losses in the grandstand and midway incurred earlier last week due to rainy weather.

The fair set a record with over 920,000 paid admissions for the rides on the midway. The Saturday night grandstand attendance also set a record with 5,760 paid. Total for the 10 days was 34,520 compared to last year's 22,358.

LANSING -- The Michigan State Police reported that 1,270 persons had lost their lives on Michigan highways so far this year compared to 1,127 deaths for the same period last year. Twenty persons were killed over last weekend, they said.

Detroit traffic fatalities were up nearly 30 per cent this year over the same period last year and the number of tickets written for moving violations was down almost 45 per cent.

LANSING -- Michigan Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley has ruled that counties which operate a water system may not lay pipelines under or through city streets without permission.

Kelley wrote the opinion to Wayne County Prosecutor William L. Cahalan, who said that Wayne County had installed pipelines within city streets there. Cahalan said that Detroit wanted to use its streets to lay large water mains to connect parts of county owned and operated water systems.

Although Kelley said that counties must first get permission from cities before laying water pipes, he added that "the city may not withhold such consent arbitrarily and unreasonably."

DURANGO, Colo. -- A tragedy, that will not be forgotten by the patrons of a tavern in Durango, struck when Gene Guitierrez, 39, who had dressed as the legendary Mexican outlaw Pancho Villa for the Durango rodeo, fired his .38-caliber pistol loaded with blanks and killed a 19-year-old girl.

When the man entered the tavern the girl, Claudia Garcia, jokingly asked him to shoot her and, all in fun, he shot the gun in her direction. The girl fell to the floor bleeding.

She was rushed to a local hospital where she died later of a wound inflicted by a blank cartridge that was smaller than the gun barrel. Police said the undersized blank was fired through the gun when the trigger was pulled.

TOKYO -- Japan is taking a serious look toward the Soviet Union both for markets and for raw materials.

The reason is twofold. Most important, trade with Peking continues to decline. Also, the Soviet Union is an important source of lumber and logs which is becoming increasingly attractive as the United States restricts exports of logs from the Pacific Northwest.

# Fact Finder Steps Into College Snarl

Schoolcraft's teachers outlined their demands Tuesday, before State Labor Board representative Dr. Charles Rehmus in the opening round of fact finding aimed at ending the teacher-administration wage deadlock at the college.

Rehmus, co-director of the University of Michigan-Wayne State University Institute of Labor Relations headquartered in Ann Arbor, began the meeting briskly at 10 a.m. by outlining the rules to both parties.

He then received evidence from the teachers' chief negotiator, Attorney Bernard J. Fieger, who said their case would revolve around proving three points: (1) the college's revenues were up in excess of \$1 million over last year (2) comparable salaries in the area show the college to be well below the norm, and (3) internal irregularities in salary schedules of certain staff members were unfair.

"IT IS OUR argument that

there are ample funds to meet the demands. The board found itself with additional funds this year, and decided to use them for debt retirement at levels higher than last year. This (the \$1 million excess) would permit the acceptance of our demands which total \$396,000," Fieger said.

Fieger opened their round with a demand for making the results of Rehmus' investigation binding on both parties. Attorney for the college, Edward

At one point, economic proposals of the teachers dated April 11 were submitted to Rehmus and the administration bargaining team.

"This is their demand of April 11?" Draugelis asked. "Their proposals," Rehmus cautioned.

FIEGER SAID that 21 new teachers had been hired, and some had been placed higher in the schedule than allowed by the contract.

Rehmus set that charge aside for the moment, indicating that if it were "germane," he would examine it later.

Item one outlines the negotiated contracts at two area community colleges—Henry Ford and Macomb Community. At Henry Ford, the starting is \$8,000, the top \$12,450 for a masters degree. At Macomb, it's \$8,500 to start, \$13,600 top. Schoolcraft is at \$7,500 to \$11,500, Fieger's figures show.

THE COLLEGE HAS countered the Faculty Forum (teacher's bargaining unit) demands with an offer totaling \$27,485. Fieger said the college's revenues were up \$513,000 due to tuition and fees, up \$373,000 through state aid increases and up \$164,000 through local taxes on property.

THERE WAS every indication Tuesday by 11 a.m. that the fact finding sessions would continue for long hours.

It is expected that each charge and piece of evidence submitted by the teachers will be examined and disputed by the administration team, headed by Draugelis.

Marathon sessions were expected as the meeting got underway.

In addition to the attorneys for both sides, Anthony Rizzo, captain of the negotiating team, sat with the teachers, Kenneth Lindner, vice-president in charge of business, and college chief executive, President Eric Bradner sat with the administration team.

The meeting was open with observers coming and going. And it appeared the meetings would remain open.

REHMUS WAS called the last week in July as both side filed separate letters with the State Labor Board.

The letters arrived on July 31, and Rehmus was appointed Aug. 1.

## Prof. Rejects U.S. Service By All Youths

ANN ARBOR—A University of Michigan business economist sees universal service—military or otherwise—as a poor alternative to the Selective Service draft.

Ross J. Wilhelm, U-M associate professor of business economics, opposes any measure which would require all U.S. youth to serve the country in some way for a given period of time. He cites three reasons: an unnecessarily large manpower buildup, excessive cost, and curtailment in the freedom of young people.

DISCUSSING THE SUBJECT, Wilhelm says that based on today's population figures, if every male went into the proposed service at age 18 or 19, there would be a force maintained of around 3.2 million. If women were to serve as well, there would be 6.7 million in the service.

"What in heaven's name would we have them do?" he asks. "The typical young person age 18 or 19 has few skills, even though he may have graduated from high school. The military has no need for such numbers, of course, nor do any of the other agencies such as the Peace Corps or VISTA.

"Universal service would require that we create a huge number of additional jobs to be done for which we feel no strong need at this time, and which can be performed by unskilled individuals."

According to Wilhelm, the belief that many of our basic domestic and foreign problems would be solved by harnessing all of the power and energies of our youth is simply not true.

Furthermore, he says, the cost of operating such a program would be prohibitive.

\*\*\*

WILHELM SAYS it is unlikely that the government could pay, house, feed, clothe, transport, train, and administer the force for less than \$5,000 per person per year.

If only males serve, then the cost for the program would be about \$16 billion annually. If women were included, the figure would be around \$33 billion.

"This," says Wilhelm, "seems to be a great deal of money to perform jobs we have no need to perform."

# Citizens Chided For Lack Of Clues In Schell Murder

Inability to uncover any clues in the slaying of Joan Schell, Plymouth co-ed, more than a month ago while hitch-hiking between Ypsilanti and Ann Arbor, has upset the authorities according to a recent story in the Ann Arbor News.

Most outspoken of these is Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Thomas F. Shea, who chided the citizens during the past week for their attitude of "let George do it."

"It's the old story of no one wanting to get involved," Shea said. "Someone in this county is right now sitting on a piece of information which could solve this murder and bring a killer to justice. But they just won't come forward."

THE ASSISTANT prosecutor said the five police agencies in the Ann Arbor-Ypsilanti area still working on the brutal stabbing murder have now checked out "hundreds" of futile leads in the killing. He said there

are still angles in the murder to be investigated.

"But much of the information we've received from citizens was obtained only after considerable persuasion on our part," Shea said. "If it was fear of personal safety, that would be understandable. But most of the time the people just don't care. They think it's none of their business. And, of course, it is."

Miss Schell's battered, nude corpse, riddled with stab wounds, was found in bushes off Glacier Way near Earhart Rd. on July 5. The Eastern Michigan University co-ed had been missing for five days at the time. She was last seen getting into a red-and-black, late model car with three young men in front of EMU's McKenney Union on the night of June 30.

SHEA SAYS "scores" of red-and-black cars have been checked out and cleared since

the lengthening murder probe began. Names of a dozen possible suspects have come up, been investigated and the persons cleared.

To date police from the city departments in Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti, troopers from the Michigan State Police post at Ypsilanti, officers from the Eastern Michigan University's security force and detectives from the Sheriff's Department have run into blind alleys in every lead given them.

Typical of those blind alleys was a tip given by an Ann Arbor man last Friday. The man said he knew of a red-and-black car, had copied down its license number and could describe its occupants. When teams of detectives rushed out to investigate they found the man had seen the car more than two weeks ago and the license number was non-existent.

THE RED HANDBAG Miss Schell was carrying the night she was slain has never been found and a dozen searches of the Glacier Way fields where the body was discovered have failed to turn up the weapon used to kill her. Officers believe she was stabbed a dozen times and her throat cut with a long-bladed knife, probably a hunting knife.

"This murder is everyone's business," Shea notes. "We've got a sadistic sex killer on the

loose somewhere in Washtenaw County. For our mutual protection and safety we've got to move as a single force in apprehending him."

The assistant prosecutor said numerous times investigating officers would be told bits of information which might be vital in the case from a second or third party. When the information is traced back to its source the person usually declined to provide further data or reluctantly furnished it.

Police felt the more than \$5,000 in reward money offered for the arrest and conviction of the slayer would bring almost immediate results. But apparently even money is not the

prod which will loosen a tongue and provide investigators with that "one tip."

THE PROBE for weeks has centered on persons who were in the McKenney Union area about 11 p.m. on the night of June 30.

"Someone, besides the persons we've already interviewed, saw Miss Schell get into that car," Shea says. "Or they saw the car later in Ann Arbor or on Washtenaw Ave. or even on Glacier Way. And because they saw something other witnesses failed to see, they can give us the last few pieces which will solve this puzzle and bring an arrest."

Shea said many people who have provided police with tips on the case "never realized the significance of what they knew." He said citizens should give police a chance to evaluate the worth of their tip before deciding not to volunteer the information at all.

THE ASSISTANT prosecutor said Eastern Michigan University authorities have been helpful to detectives in relation to the questioning of students on the campus. Shea pointed out that Miss Schell at one time worked in the cafeteria in the McKenney Union and while on that job met a number of persons eating there.

"We feel it is possible she met her killer there also," Shea said.

He urged persons who feel they have information about

possible suspects in the case or who have any piece of data which might prove significant in the probe to contact their nearest police agency at once.

# Knows His Job Well DPW Chief Helped Build Township Hall

Robert W. Rorabacher is a lifetime resident of Plymouth Township and knows every nook and cranny of the Township area.

To most people this would mean nothing, but to Rorabacher it means he can perform his job a little bit more efficiently.

After six years as crew leader of the township's Department of Public Works, he was appointed superintendent last April.

The only thing he regrets about receiving his new post is the circumstances that led to the appointment.

SINCE HE CAME to the township as a fulltime employe in the DPW, he worked under Matt McLellan, head of DPW and the building department.

As Rorabacher put it, he and McLellan worked together so closely they were like brothers.

McLellan died of a heart attack last fall while on a hunting trip and Rorabacher was appointed acting director of the two departments.

For awhile he functioned as superintendent of DPW and chief building inspector for the township.

Then, at budget time, the Township separated the two departments and gave Rorabacher the newly opened superintendent's post.

THE 39-YEAR-OLD township employe was born in Plymouth on Sept. 8, 1928 just a few blocks from where the present township offices stand today.

After attending Plymouth High School, he went to work for the Detroit Trussell Company as roof installer.

One of the first roofs he helped install was on the Riverside Arena in Livonia.

A bit of nostalgia was connected with this job for Rorabacher—he had met his wife-to-be, Mary Knittle, while roller skating in the old arena, just a few months before.

In 1946, Rorabacher came to work for the township as a carpenter and all-around handy man. He worked under Ernie Rossow, the township's first building inspector.

During this time he helped build the township hall, and some of the first township projects in the area.

A YEAR AFTER he began working for the township he and his former roller skating partner were married. They now have one daughter, Sheila, 7, a second grader at Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic School.

In 1950, he left the township's employ and became a cabinet maker for Homes Woods Products on Haggerty and Ann Arbor Trail.

The company suffered a slight depression a few years later and he bought it in 1958.

He operated it until 1962, when the building and land were sold to the developers of Salem Square Subdivision. That summer he went back to work for the township as crew leader.

THE SUPERINTENDENT explained the township DPW's main job is maintaining the 48

subdivision roads that are not paved.

WHAT MOST PEOPLE do not realize, he pointed out, is that the DPW employes are on 24-hour call the same as firemen and policemen.

It is not unusual for him to be called at 3 a.m. to repair a break in a water or sewer line or help a harried home owner who is experiencing some unexpected trouble.

However, he also is on 24-hour call as a volunteer fireman.

He has been with the fire department since 1949 and in 1954 was promoted to a lieutenant.

In his capacity as fireman, Rorabacher has become a member of the Plymouth Metropolitan Club, which is composed of postal, police, fire and DPW employes in the greater Plymouth area.

The club's main function, Rorabacher commented, is to lend financial assistance to local organizations and to families who have been burned out of their home.

He added that every Christmas it puts on a holiday show for the children of the Plymouth community.

SPEAKING OF THE FINER points of his work, he complained of the low salary the township pays its three DPW employes.

"All municipalities traditionally pay their DPW workers less than they should and Plymouth Township is no exception," he remarked.

"I have a feeling this will change. In my estimation the Department of Public Works is just as important as police and fire—if there is no water in the fire hydrant, they can't fight the fire."

"As the township expands, it will have to recognize the importance of keeping its DPW employes on the same par as other government services," he concluded.

### GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING USE AND OCCUPANCY OF STATE LANDS OTHER THAN STATE PARKS AND RECREATION AREAS

The Conservation Commission, at its meeting on May 10, 1968, under authority of Act 17, P.A. 1921, as amended, and Act 380, P.A. 1965, hereby orders that for a period of five years beginning September 1, 1968, use of the state-owned lands and waters within the areas described below is prohibited, except under the following rules in addition to the General Rules and Regulations Governing Use and Occupancy of State Lands Other Than State Parks and Recreation Areas:

Beginning September 1, 1968, use of the state-owned lands and waters within the areas described shall be in accordance with rules 4 and 5, in addition to the general rules governing state lands other than state parks and recreation areas.

Pointe Mouillee State Game Area, Wayne and Monroe counties:  
 Town 5 south, range 10 east - Sections 24, 25, 26, 35, and 36.  
 Town 5 south, range 11 east - Sections 20, and 21.  
 Town 6 south, range 10 east - Sections 1, 2, and 11.

On the state-owned lands in the described areas in rule 3, no person shall:  
 Hunt or shoot from any dike, road, trail, or safety zone posted against such use.

Enter any area posted "Wildlife Refuge - Do Not Enter" without proper written permission.

Enter any area posted "Retrieving Zone Only - No General Entry" except to retrieve downed game, lawfully taken.

On any area posted "State Game Area - Hunting by Permit Only," construct or use a shooting pit or construct, erect, or use a blind other than a temporary one constructed of herbaceous vegetation such as cattails or one that is readily portable and is removed at the end of the person's daily hunt; except those pits or blinds located and constructed by the department of conservation for public use.

Possess or use firearms during the period from the end of the rabbit season to the opening date of the migratory bird hunting season on any area posted against such use, without proper written permission.

Camp, except on designated areas.

Trap on any area posted "State Game Area - Hunting by Permit Only," without proper written permission.

Fish on any area posted against such use.

Use a motorboat, airboat, or amphibious vehicle on any area posted "State Game Area - Hunting by Permit Only," without proper written permission.

Enter onto those state-owned lands and waters posted "State Game Area - Hunting by Permit Only" during any period(s) of the waterfowl hunting season specified by the director of conservation, except under authority of a valid written permit issued by a designated representative of the department of conservation as follows:

A permit shall be of two parts: (1) a form which is properly filled out by the hunter and then validated by the department of conservation; and (2) in their "permit only" areas. No person shall hunt in any location other than that specified on his permit.

The director of conservation is authorized to determine the number of permits to be issued in total and per hunter. No person shall apply for more than the number of permits so authorized per hunter.

Each permittee shall return his permit within the time period as designated for the area covered by his permit, following the time his permit expires; and if so directed on his permit, shall present for examination all game taken and shall furnish other information about his hunting as may be requested.

The director of conservation is authorized to determine the daily hunting hours; the permissible gauges or shotguns, shot shell loadings, and number of shells in possession; and the rules governing the possession and use of dogs.

"Proper written permission" as used in this rule means a written permit issued by the director of conservation or his authorized representative.

Violation of any rule or failure to perform any act set forth in the rules is punishable by a fine of not more than \$100 and costs of prosecution, or by imprisonment in a county jail for not more than 30 days, or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

This amount of time would be required, he said, to get the right of way through the Township; prepare all the legal papers and the plans. He also let it be known that each political subdivision in the area could make its choice of a covered or an open ditch.

AFTER hearing all of the reports and looking at the plans Mayor James Jabara suggested that the petition be filed and the Drain Commission be asked to make the decision regarding the site of the diversion.

Under the law when the first petition is filed all other political subdivisions are notified and they then can take action or ask for explanations. In this case it would be Northville Township, Plymouth Township, Canton Township, plus the cities of Plymouth and Westland.

According to the time schedule prepared and approved Monday, the petition will be filed within the next 10 days and the wheels put in action for the much needed relief.



# This Is The Week That

LANSING—It would be easy or the cynics to imagine Gov. Romney coming back from Miami Beach after midnight wearing a rubber mask. He didn't, of course.

People who know him best figure Romney believes his performance was statesmanlike and proper.

"Whatever was left of his national political career was drained out in the sawdust before 30 million television viewers," said one critic here:

Republican insiders stated privately before going to Miami Beach that Romney's national star, which started falling during his abortive campaign for the presidency, had plunged to minus-zero.

THERE WERE REBELS in his own tent when he arrived. Four votes in the 48 which had been committed to Romney were announced as defecting. They finally went to Nixon on the first roll call. Romney held 44 to the end. He still has them.

His first move, to get his ideas into the GOP platform, failed. A floor fight he promised over a resolution attacking the concentration of economic power in big business and big industry also went up in smoke.

At that point, it was Everybody Else 2, Romney 0.

Then Romney, in a floor interview with Television's Martin Agronsky, blamed the press for wrecking his own chances for the presidency. When pressed for specifics, the governor ended the interview. Whew!

In another floor interview, he told NBC he had quelled a rebellion in the Michigan delegation. Seconds later, a Michigan delegate, George S. Gillian, of Grosse Pointe, said the delegates rejected a rebellion Romney tried to foment.

ABOUT THIS TIME, Channel 4 in Detroit, WWJ-The Detroit News, presented S.L.A. Marshall, retired military writer of The News, in an examination of the GOP platform plank on Vietnam. Sam allowed as how the plank said nothing, was beautifully

written to appease everybody and missed the only soft phrase still unused, a reference to mother love.

And George Romney, looking at the plank, said: 'Finally, they're accepting some of my ideas.'

That brings us, folks, to the presidential candidate balloting. Romney clutched his 44 remaining votes to his political bosom when the Nixon bandwagon rolled by. It left Michigan with nothing but statehood should Nixon become the next president.

FINALLY THERE CAME the Spiro (who?) T. Agnew episode, which party leaders are still trying to explain.

Romney became the patsy of the dissidents and allowed his name to be entered. It is a rare form of heroics to jump off a building to please the crowd in the street.

The roll call droned on. Romney was swamped. Agnew got 1,128 to his 178, five of them from Michigan. State Senator Emil Lockwood, the governor's right hand in Lansing, fled with the four earlier Nixon votes.

It was a time to have a cookie and fluff up the pillow for a long nap.

He had by this time fought Nixon, his own delegation, the press, Agnew, Rockefeller and everybody in sight.

To add to it, Nixon let his press secretary read off a list of 12 vice presidential possibilities. There were congressmen and senators, including Michigan's Sen. a t o r Robert P. Griffin, but no Romney. He could have been No. 13 or No. 7,013. We'll never know and it's really not important.

Romney, a mite hors de combat from it all, left Convention Hall announcing a press conference the next day.

There he reasoned that his self-immolation was a sacrificial act motivated by eleemosynary considerations and served the greater purpose: That of uniting the National Republican Party.

What's left for Romney? Well, to start, he's a jolly good fellow.

# Grand Jury Justice Dissatisfies Many

The full impact of the one-man grand juries in Wayne County was realized within a two-day period last week.

Both Grand Jurors, Judges Edward Piggins and George Bowles, owed their start to a traffic ticket filing controversy in then-Nankin Township.

Grand Juror I, Judge Piggins, went into many areas and one of his victims was then-Wayne County Sheriff Peter L. Buback.

Grand Juror II, Judge Bowles, followed Piggins' trail and some of his victims were three Garden City municipal officials or former officials, Edwin Freeh, Jr., Evan Callanan, and Eugene Salvatore.

THE TRIO WAS indicted in October of 1967 on charges of conspiring to steal public funds in the purchase of the Civic Center site in the summer of 1961.

All three maintained their innocence although the case has been pending for nearly two years.

Each said that his innocence would be proven when they get their day in court.

Buback said the same, although he had to take a different legal route. Faced with removal from office proceedings, Buback resigned before the hearings were to start and then quickly became an active candidate for the job he had held for several years.

On Monday, Aug. 5, Circuit Court Judge Joseph Rashid dropped the conspiracy trial against the three Garden City men on the basis that the chief witness, an elderly retired realtor, would not be able to testify.

So their case ended without the defendants having the satisfaction of having their names legally cleared in a court of law.

BUBACK WAS swamped by the voters in Tuesday's primary election in his try to regain the Sheriff's post.

Although the two Grand Jurors issued a number of warrants and indictments and a lot of persons were arrested and placed under the glare of publicity, not one major conviction was gained—and quite a few men were affected by the actions.

# The Fight Over Agnew Nixon Gets A Northern Warning

The "Romney for Vice President" boomlet in Miami Beach last week wasn't that at all.

The Michigan governor had no intention of seriously trying for the nomination and no dream of getting it once his name was placed in nomination.

And no one really had anything against Nixon's choice for vice president, Gov. Spiro Agnew of Maryland.

Why did Romney do it?

HE DIDN'T lead it, really. What happened was that a lot of big state and northern delegations were trying to warn Richard Nixon that he shouldn't play footsy so closely with the Thurmuds from Dixie.

Nixon apparently got the message. He has assured the northerners he will consult them more

closely in the future.

As soon as Nixon announced his VP choice Thursday morning, this observer began tracking down the reaction of Michigan delegates. They were shocked. People who are normally reserved in their political comments were bitter.

Romney claimed that in running for the VP nomination, he was only letting his name be used

as an instrument to let delegates vent their anger at Nixon's methods. Everything the local delegates said backs up that story.

IT'S EASY TO SEE why Nixon was dealing with the south, although that doesn't necessarily justify it.

The Reagan forces were trying to swing South Carolina's Sen. J. Strom Thurmond into their camp, and with him most of the southern votes. Had they succeeded, Nixon would have been shot down.

Nixon on Tuesday held closed door meetings with groups of delegates by region of the country. The Miami Herald obtained a tape of what he said to the southerners, and Nixon gives the impression that he won't pick anyone unacceptable to the south.

That eliminated Oregon's Sen. Mark Hatfield and New York's Mayor John Lindsay. Michigan delegates liked both, Hatfield in particular.

Whether there was a "deal" between Nixon and Thurmond is beside the point. Nixon obviously gave prime consideration to the south.

HE COULD ILL afford it. Although Nixon got votes from 90 per cent of the states and territories, he did poorly in the big states—nothing in California, nearly nothing in New York, a fraction of Pennsylvania, nothing in Ohio, only anti-Romney tokens out of Michigan.

The anti-Agnew revolt was like the anti-Viet war demonstrations. The doves will never change U.S. policy, but they have made certain that no president will ever escalate such a conflict again without a clearer mandate from Congress and the people.

In the same way, the anti-Agnew revolt has shown Nixon that he had better pay more attention to the big states and the north.

Especially if he gets elected and has a chance to appoint a chief justice of the Supreme Court.

# How A Single Vote Was Crucial Many Times For Mrs. Rohm

This is another of those election year stories about the importance of one man's vote.

It's true. It's recent. And Observerland people were involved in it.

It came to light last week during a session of the credentials committee at the Republican National Convention.

THE STORY STARTS April 27 at the Iowa Republican state convention. A nominating committee picked 10 delegates at-large, among them Mrs. Joy Rohm, blonde, pink-cheeked 33-year-old housewife who was head of something called the Iowa Republican Workshop.

On the state convention floor, however, the crusty old Rep. H. R. Gross took issue with the fact that no congressman had been made a member of the delegation. A movement was made to suspend the rules, bumping out Mrs. Rohm and substituting Gross.

Some 2,320 votes were required, and the tally showed that Gross got 2,321—just one more than he needed.

But the story doesn't end there.

IT SEEMS THAT Sioux County changed its vote from Gross to Mrs. Rohm before the tally was announced. The changed vote was recorded, but the final tally was never changed.

The next day, a sharp-eyed Des Moines Register reporter named George Mills noticed the discrepancy. If the vote tally had in fact been miscounted, then Mrs. Rohm should be the delegate.

There were all sorts of arguments and appeals, but to make a long story short, the case finally wound up in the hands of the national convention's credentials committee.

The credentials committee voted 32-31 to seat Mrs. Rohm. (Incidentally, E. O. Weber, of Northville, a 2nd District delegate, was a member of the credentials committee and voted for Mrs. Rohm.)

But wait! The matter wasn't over yet.

THE CHAIRMAN, Orvas Beers of Indiana, hadn't voted. Under Robert's Rules of Order, a chairman can vote either to break a tie—or to create one.

Beers voted for Congressman Gross, and the vote was 32-32. Thus, the motion to seat Mrs. Rohm, who was suspected of being a Rockefeller supporter, was defeated, and the delegate badge went to Gross, a Reagan supporter.

If that doesn't convince you three times over of the importance of a single vote, then consider these additional gems of political warfare.

One Iowan on the platform committee disqualified himself from hearing the case. His vote could have changed the outcome.

Another Iowan refused to disqualify herself. Mrs. Rohm's attorney considered this unethical conduct. Moreover, that delegate voted for Gross. Had she disqualified herself, Mrs. Rohm would have been seated.

And so time after time, the case of Mrs. Joy Rohm of Iowa was decided by a single vote.

Keep that in mind Nov. 5.

# Livonians Aid In Grape Boycott

Jim and Audrey Gomon, with three or four other Livonia residents, last weekend were picketing a grocery store hoping California grape pickers would get a break.

The small group was urging persons entering the market to buy food somewhere else because the store sold California table grapes.

The couple said they were a group of "concerned Livonia citizens" who are in sympathy with the plight and generally bad working conditions of grape pickers on the west coast.

"We are asking people not to buy California table grapes and not to patronize the store," they said.

"We hope this pressure will affect the stores and they won't purchase from or make contracts with anymore table grape growers in California."

Their strategy is to work through the smaller food store chains and then carry the results--if there are any--to the bigger chains and exert stronger pressure there.

Eventually they think they will gain support throughout the state and hope this will spill over into nearby states.

MRS. GOMON, who has been active with the Interfaith Council of Detroit and worked on the Poor People's Campaign when it came through the area,

said she was called by representatives of the United Farm Workers of California to lend a hand in the Detroit boycott of the stores.

Organizations already involved in the Detroit boycott range from the City of Detroit, Jewish Community Council, Catholic Archdiocese of Detroit to the Hotel and Restaurant Workers Union, Amalgamated Clothing Workers and United Steel Workers.

A flyer, with these and other organizations names on it, claims, "The farm workers of America do not ask for pity or charity. We ask for our rights. Rights you accept as your due."

Another flyer issued by the United Farm Workers urges shoppers to "not buy California grapes during our life-or-death boycott, to consider not shopping at stores...until they show sympathy for the cause of hungry American families in their third year of strike for decency and justice."

An information sheet printed by the United Farm Workers Organizing Committee--AFL-CIO (UFWOC) explained what the grape boycott is all about.

The National Farm Workers Association (NFWA) was established in 1962 and three years later in September the Delano grape strike began against 34 grape growers in the Delano, Calif. area.

THE NFWA merged with the Agricultural Workers Organizing Committee in 1966 and formed the UFWOC.

As of April 1968 the union has contracts with Schenley, DiGiorgio, Perelli-Minetti, Goldberg, Christian Brothers, Novitiate, Almaden and Gallo.

Currently, the sheet read, the union's major activity is directed against the Giumarra Vineyards, Inc., the largest grower of table grapes in the United States.

On August 3, 1967, after re-

peated attempts by the union to communicate with Giumarra, 950 of his 1,000 workers walked out on strike. An international boycott against Giumarra was started the same year in 15 major cities in the United States and Canada.

It goes on to tell how the company imported cheap, "wet back, green carders" to do the picking and also began using labels of other growers to foil the effectiveness of the boycott.

THE UNION SAID the "phony labels" are Arra, Grape King, Big G, GVC, Honeybunch and Uptown. It said Claudio Caranza, an agent of Giumarra, has been convicted in Federal Court of illegally recruiting Mexican nationals.

"Because of the mislabeling the decision was made in January, 1968 to boycott all California table grapes, with the exception of those of the DiGiorgio Corp. which is under union contract."

The union explains that the average income for a farm worker in California is \$1,500 a year and the average migrant farm worker in California works about 134 days a year.

At the federal minimum farm worker wage law of \$1.15 an hour a farm worker who worked 40 hours a week 52 weeks of the year would earn \$2,386.

If he worked what the av-

erage farm worker does--134 days--assuming an eight hour day, he would earn \$1,232 a year.

THE UFWOC claimed, "Workers are at the mercy of contractors who can cheat them

out of their just wages. There are no laws protecting the agricultural worker. Wages for women and minors are set by the California Industrial Welfare Commission, but enforcement is inadequate.







That was the story as Redford Township and Livonia collided at Thurston Sunday.

At stake was the Greater Livonia Class A baseball title and the right to advance into the regional starting Thursday at Detroit's Butzel Field.

Livonia had fought back twice in a row with the chips down against Redford in the last week. In equally "no tomorrow" situations, Livonia had downed Redford, 1-0, to win the third-round of the regular-season championship; then Livonia won, 5-3, in the opening round of the playoffs.

REDFORD AROSE to capture the big one, 4-0, and now meets Detroit McCabe Thursday evening at Butzel in the opener of a three-team, double-elimination tourney to decide which goes on to the state meet at Battle Creek.

Dearborn will be the third team at Butzel. Redford will be shooting to regain the honors it gathered in a year ago when it won the league, the district, and placed second in the state, the national regional and the national world series.

Much has been written about the rallying Tigers, how they have won more than 30 games in which they were tied or trailing as late as the seventh inning.


But, how about the knockout blows the Tigers keep delivering?







# OU Continuing Ed Roster Matures Over Last Decade

Oakland University's Division of Continuing Education enters its 11th year of service this fall with a roster of 217 courses.

This September, classes in 49 different areas of interest are open to adults wishing to further their training. Special certification programs are available to students completing required courses in real estate and the fundamentals of management.

This course line-up is a far cry from 10 years ago when the first classes at Oakland were sponsored by the division and were held in converted chicken coops on the Wilson estate. One of those first students was the late Mrs. Alfred G. Dodge, who with her late husband, helped establish Oakland University with the gift of their estate and \$2 million.

Since that time under the leadership of Dean Lowell Eklund, more than 30,000 adults have taken 1,500 courses in the evening program. The fall enrollment averages at the 5,000 mark, also a far cry from the first class of 10 years ago which numbered 413.

THIS SEPTEMBER, 38 new courses have been added to the curriculum which includes traditional and well-established classes in the areas of liberal arts, business and professional development. Instructors are drawn from agencies, businesses, and corporations in the tri-county region and from the Oakland University faculty.

Most classes will begin in the last week of September with the evening sessions meeting Monday through Friday at the Rochester campus, one mile off the I-75 Freeway.

Among new classes added this fall are those delving into the place of man in his society today, how to cope with that society and how to understand it. Other courses offer training in a better understanding of the self and of others.

"World Syntheses--A Cultural Updating for the Industrially Oriented Man" is a course which stresses the philosophical impact of technological achievements. The emergence of the individual is traced from the Last Ice Age through Western culture.





### Congressman Esch Reports

# Urban Education Needed To Cure Unrest

Violence and unrest have plagued our nation's cities and the underlying causes and solutions have been the subject of extensive debate and discussion on all levels of government.

Though there are many theories as to the proper steps to take on a short-term basis, there is widespread agreement that the long-term answer lies in better education—an education designed to meet the unique problems of disadvantaged students and give them an opportunity to break out of the cycle of poverty and ignorance which has too long plagued our cities.

A seven-month intensive study in the House of Representatives has joined me in recommending major new efforts in urban education.

The Plymouth Citizens for Peace and Equality will conduct their first march Sunday afternoon.

Starting at 3 o'clock, they will parade through the central business district. The march will begin at the high school, move down Main Street to Pennington Avenue, thence to Harvey, to Ann Arbor Trail, Forest to Wing Street, and return on Main Street to the park.

They have extended an invitation to the public to join in the march.

The Marathon gas station on the corner of Pennington Ave., and Harvey St. fell victim to vandals early Sunday morning.

Jack Lewis, owner, reported that Plymouth Police called him about 4 a.m. and said that four plate glass windows and the glass door had been shattered.

He and the police explained they had no idea who might have done it. Lewis added that a woman across the street from the station said she saw a person run across Pennington with a baseball bat in his hand, jump into a car, and drive away about 2:30 a.m.

Lewis estimated the damage at more than \$500.

--Federal support which encourages consideration of the value of a synergistic curriculum—a curriculum based on planning which considers each and every aspect of education and its effect on every other aspect, including basic skills, study of this problem has indicated that both federal and local programs must be reorganized to meet the pressing needs in this field. Ten of my

vocational/technical education, recreation and extracurricular activities, remedial aid, and a wide range of quality academic subjects. Most important to any curriculum, support programs should encourage the urban center to use relevant cultural background material and to include programs for develop-

ment of personal creativity and self reliance.

---FEDERAL SUPPORT which requires community participation in the development of education plans and utilizes the talents of officials of private independent schools, private industry, higher education

institutions, and local citizens.

--Recognition that racial integration—in society at large and in the schools—is of vital importance for the growth of a progressive and harmonious community; but that alone, integration will not solve the education needs of urban America.

--The appointment of an Associate Commissioner for Urban Education in the Office of Education of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

--A massive increase in teacher training programs emphasizing instruction designed especially for the urban area.

# Readers Speak Up On Controversial Issues

## Advisory Board Feels Left Out

**EDITOR:**  
Because of the suspension of the Livonia School Board Advisory Committee general meeting during the summer period, I forward this letter to you and the public.

As a member of the Livonia School Board Advisory Committee, I question and fail to understand what appears to be, during this period of negotiations, the reluctance or oversight of the Livonia Board of Education to have officially contacted our Advisory Board regarding millage and teachers salaries.

I certainly believe that the Advisory Committee, because of its structural setup, is well qualified to represent itself as the "Listening Post" for the Livonia citizenry.

The "Big Question of Today" appears to be how much of an increase in millage and salaries is feasible in the face of "strike threat" or citizens ability to pay.

I believe Livonians, who pay the school tax load and represent the majority of the city taxpayers, are becoming alarmed at the idea of the "Ask and You Will Receive Attitude" that seems to be so prevalent.

These same citizens are beginning to express a desire for a more comprehensive review of school problems and logical answers in simple language. Their feelings indicate the fear of being pressed into haphazard agreements.

Most Livonians I have talked to feel that the cost of teachers salaries are becoming too large a part of the overall school budget and that a more realistic approach to the problems must be found.

They feel, and I concur, that once the salary structure is balanced, other areas of the budget, such as busing, can be more fully studied for greater savings.

During my contacts with homeowners, taxpayers, etc., I found that most of their reactions to current negotiations and millage increases can be grouped into these areas:

1. Teacher minimum wage standards at state-level: This action certainly would go far toward eliminating what could be considered "legal blackmail" by one party using the other's gains for each following period of negotiations;
2. Hourly rate system: Research into the question of paying teachers on an hourly-rate system based on comparable trained "white collar" workers in industry and business. This "rate system" appeared to be a

popular suggestion for use as a "yardstick of value."

3. Savings based on degrees: Returning to the "cost conscious idea," it was indicated that a teacher with a BA degree is sufficient for most

areas of instructions, certainly from K-9 and many believed that it should be K through 12 grade level.

4. School needs and area growth: The need for additional schools based on growth in-

dicated the need of a "12 months school year," with teachers salaries being within the structure of a 40 hours-work-week-hourly-rate-system.

5. Millage: Most homeowners appear to be against an increase

in their current tax-load and indicate we must now think of "holding the line, and adjusting" accordingly.

6. Active participation: A very large percentage of our local citizens believe that our

civic and homeowner leadership must take more positive steps in expressing the views of the organizations they represent.

I close this "open letter" to the editor of the Livonia Ob-

server by appealing to all concerned homeowners and organizations to make sure your delegates attend all Livonia School Board Advisory Committee meetings.

Remember! Only through this method can the true expression of the will of the local citizenry be realized and be effective.



The girls were able to put all their new knowledge to practical use Friday when they gave a luncheon for the Madonna staff and several guests, including Martin Thomas, academic dean of Detroit Institute of Technology. They prepared a completely homemade meal.

Did they use package mixes? Dean Thomas asked.

"Everything was made from scratch, and we even used a hand mixer," came the emphatic answer.

COOKING WAS one of the favorite aspects of the program.

"The cooking class was a big help to me," one girl said. "When my mother is sick or away I can cook something, and if we are having a party I can bake some cookies."

Sewing was also a favorite. JoAnn Stranquist, a seventh grade student said, "The program has given me more confidence in sewing."





## YWCA Volunteers Help Johnnys Who Can't Read

"Really, Really Read" is the name of the volunteer program winding up this week.

Lots of little kids in schools in Inkster and the Salina area of Dearborn couldn't, even after a year or two of school. So volunteers from the Western Wayne County YWCA set out to give them some special tutoring for two and a half hours a week, to see if they could help the youngsters look at a printed page with anticipation and enjoyment.

TEENS AND ADULTS joined in the program. They came from all over the western Wayne area, including most Observer-land communities.

And if the children haven't come all the way along the "Really, Really Read" trail, they have at least known the satisfaction of having a helper's attention focused entirely on them, and caught a glimpse of the fun waiting for one who can master the printed word. "For some of the children,"

said Mrs. Carol Foss, of Dearborn, "it was the first time anyone took the time to help on a one-to-one basis."

"It was also the first time they saw reading as something besides hard work. They realized that to be in a play with other kids, they had to be able to read their parts, and to take part in a game there were rules to be read."

MRS. NANCY WORSNOP, of Plymouth, felt the program is just a start.

A mother of four who wanted to make a constructive contribution to needs of the underprivileged, Mrs. Worsnop read about "Really, Really Read" in The Observer and decided to volunteer.

"But most of us were flabbergasted at how little the kids could read," she said. "We could offer them friendship and support, but they need a great deal more help. This is just the beginning."

THE PROGRAM was organized under "Y" auspices by

Mrs. David Vincent, of Northville.

She made arrangements to tutor the children in three areas, the Carver School and the LeMoi Community Center in Inkster, and a school in the Salina area.

Then, armed with lists of first to third graders recommended for special help by their teachers, she knocked at doors and left notes in mailboxes to round up students.

By the time she finished, there were 50 children enrolled to get reading help from about 20 tutors.

**Convention Alternate Sees National Primary Valve**

Farmington's Isabel Haynes came home from Miami convinced that a national primary would be better than a national convention for selecting presidential candidates.

"My reaction is that the whole system is wrong," said the president of the Republican Women's Federation of Michigan, who was an alternate-at-large in the state's convention delegation.

"Several of us talked a lot about it in Miami," she added. "I have the feeling that before too long both the Republican and Democratic parties will move to a national presidential primary.

"It shouldn't be held too early. The state primaries come much too soon, and people's feelings and the national picture can change so much between February and November.

"With fast transportation and television, six weeks should be enough for a campaign, so the primary vote could be taken in late August or early September."

**NATIONAL CONVENTIONS**, Mrs. Haynes added, just don't reflect our concept of one-man one-vote.

"Ruth Robertson, the Michigan woman on the platform committee, pointed out that in committee she had exactly the same say as the woman delegate from Mississippi," Mrs. Haynes said.

"And think how many more Republicans Ruth represented!"

**BUT ISABEL HAYNES**, who attended her first national convention in San Francisco four years ago, also wanted to emphasize two other distinct reactions to the 1968 GOP meet.

"Definitely, there was a good feeling about this convention," she said. "Entirely different from the one in 1964.

"And I know the Michigan delegation is completely behind the ticket of Nixon and Agnew. Now we have to get to work."

Present at all the caucuses of the Michigan group, she said the delegates from this state were among those who reacted against the nomination of Spiro Agnew as vice president because "it came as such a shock."

Afterwards, though, she said the delegation asked Governor George Romney for his appraisal of the nominee.

"He said he had known him in governors' meetings and

sure he is a most capable man," this alternate reported. "And the Governor felt no question about his honesty and integrity."

\*\*\*

THE CONVENTION excitement behind her, Isabel Haynes was ready to plunge into the political work that has filled a large share of her life for a long time.

She's a life-long Republican who as a child growing up in the Corktown area of Detroit "didn't know there was such a thing as a Democrat."

A retired Detroit school teacher, she moved to the Farmington area in 1951 with her husband, Charles, and her mother, both of whom died in 1954.

It was several years later that Arthur Elliott, then Oakland County Republican chairman, began encouraging the organization of women's GOP groups.

Isabel Haynes helped organize and served as first president of the Women's Republican Organization of Farmington, one of the first members of the Oakland County Council of Republican Women's Clubs. She also served for a time as treasurer of the council.

In the years she has been actively engaged in politics, Mrs. Haynes has noted a big upswing in grass roots interest, and she credits it to the great increase in women's organizations.

"More and more women are getting involved in the clubs, and that means political work," she said. "After all, it's the women who do the work, like putting on banquets and telephoning and stuffing envelopes."

\*\*\*

CURRENT GOP activities for Isabel Haynes take two major forms just now.

She's been president of the state women's federation since January, and operates the group's business from her independence Green apartment, with Mrs. Helen Davidson, of Farmington, as a part-time secretary.

Besides taking care of membership rolls, program plans and a myriad of other details for the Federation, they publish a once-a-month newspaper called the "Bulletin" for the group, which now numbers more than 150 clubs and over 9,000 members.

She also is both delegate and captain of her Farmington Township precinct, which includes three apartment developments as well as a large number of single homes.



### Children Without Homes

## Adoption Agencies Must Review Rules

There are children of every age, race, color, physical and mental condition waiting to be adopted. In this third in a series of articles by Nancy Robinson, Ann Arbor writer, we learn of adoption agencies' hampering rules.

Picture a child who is waiting for parents. Each day in a foster home or institution seems longer than the day before.

He yearns for the permanent love and security of a family of his own that he will belong to forever.

He hopes and he waits, and each day gone by makes his chances a little less of getting that family.

He may wait in vain. Despite advances made in adoption service over the past 15 years, too many adoption agencies throughout the United States still adhere to outmoded policies which doom thousands of children to live in dreary institutions or a succession of foster homes.

When the ratio of parents to infants was 10 to one, agencies manufactured requirements simply to weed out surplus applicants. These rules may have been a necessary evil then. Now they are an unnecessary evil that discourages good parents, all of whom and more, are needed for waiting children.

THE MOST COMMON agency policies still enforced require applicants to:

1. BE PROVEN INFERTILE (through medical affidavit). This rejects, out of hand, fertile families who want both to enlarge their family and provide a home for a needy child, especially the hard-to-place.

2. MATCH THE CHILD in race, religion and culture. This means no Negro child can be placed in a white home, though there is a tremendous shortage of homes for minority or mixed-race children.

This means a Catholic mother, who has signed off all responsibility for her child, can still demand he be placed only in a home of her faith.

He cannot be adopted by loving parents who are of another religion even if their home is the only alternative to foster or institutional care for years.

3. FALL WITHIN a specified age span, usually so there is no more than 38 years between parental and child age. This eliminates many older families who could provide a good home for children in our modern era where overall life spans are longer than they were a couple of decades ago.

4. AGREE NOT to allow the wife to work, even part time outside the home. This means mothers who must work for financial reasons cannot adopt, and others who make better mothers if they are away part of the day are forced to quit their jobs.

IN ADDITION, most agency workers are trained in Freudian casework methodology which searches for the complex motivation of applicants. What makes this couple want to take children for adoption? What might be wrong with them that would make them unacceptable parents?

Too often, this negative approach leads to rejection of needed families.

Mrs. Muriel McCrea, Director, Children's Service Centre in Montreal, challenges this attitude. Her agency discarded psychological analyses for an educational, interpretive ap-

proach toward adoption.

Now the Centre places every child who comes into its care and places children from other provinces, as well.

She says: "We assume when a couple comes in they're perfectly normal, healthy people and there's nothing pathological in their request to adopt." The Centre's workers discuss with applicants the meaning of adoptive parenthood and then describe to them all the children available to determine what kind of child a couple feels best equipped to parent.

The agency philosophy is simply to match parent potential with child need. "We don't manufacture, we only distribute," declares Mrs. McCrea. One family might accept an asthmatic child, but could not handle one with epilepsy.

Another couple could parent an older child, but not one with a speech defect. Yet another would like a mixed-race child, but not a retarded infant. Three other families could deal with the reverse of these examples.

Mrs. McCrea's agency has found to its great satisfaction that somehow everything comes out even--each child finds a

loving, accepting home.

MORE AGENCIES must evaluate present attitudes and open wide their doors to interested applicants. They must eliminate needless requirements and also inform their community that applicants for adoptive parenthood are welcome. Active recruiting to find homes is a crucial agency responsibility.

Agencies also need to review foster-care arrangements that presently refuse to let foster families adopt the child they may have raised and loved since infancy. How can a family qualify as a foster home, but not an adoptive home?

Parents can be found for these children who wait, as demonstrated by Mrs. McCrea's agency. One hundred thousand may be a figure, a large figure, but each statistic is an individual child who has love to give and who cannot speak for his own needs. Someone must speak for him and help him find the home he cannot reach himself.

How can the community help agencies in their search for homes? Can you become an adoptive parent?

## Youngdahl Will Preach In Fair Sunrise Service

Judge Luther W. Youngdahl, senior member of the U.S. district court in Washington, D.C., will be the speaker at the 18th annual Sunrise Service on Religion Day at the 119th Michigan State Fair, which runs from Friday, Aug. 23, through Monday, Sept. 2.

The announcement was made by E.J. "Jeff" Keirns, State Fair general manager, and Dr. Robert L. Kincheloe, executive director of the Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches, co-sponsor of the Sunrise Services.

Religion Day will be Sunday Aug. 25, with the service at 8 a.m.

Worshippers will be admitted free to the Fairgrounds until that time.

JUDGE YOUNGDAHL was speaker for the first State Fair Sunrise Service in 1951 when he was governor of Minnesota and again in 1953 and 1965. He has been one of the most popular of the long list of speakers at the Sunrise Service which annually attracts up to 10,000 persons.

Judge Youngdahl became a senior U.S. district judge in 1966 on his 70th birthday and has since served by assignment in the U.S. District Courts of San Diego and San Francisco, Calif.

A native of Minnesota, Youngdahl received his law degree from the Minnesota College of Law in 1921 and later was assistant dean of that college. He became a municipal judge in 1930 and rose through the bench until he was elected to the Minnesota Supreme Court in 1942. He resigned in 1946 to run for governor, winning three terms.

Judge Youngdahl always has been known as a great champion of youth and unrelenting spokesman for justice and humanity. He is a national director of the Big Brothers, an organization which helps fatherless boys; has served actively with the YMCA, Boy Scouts, PTA, and the National Council on Crime and Delinquency.

HE HAS RECEIVED a long list of awards, including the Grand Cross of the Royal Order of the North Star, presented by King Gustaf V of Sweden; the Finnish Order of the Lion;

## Msgr. Valade Named To New Archdiocese Post

In the fourth in a series of moves designed to prepare the Archdiocese of Detroit for implementing impending renewal programs, Archbishop John F. Dearden appointed the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Arthur L. Valade director of a newly created Department of Christian Formation.

It will encompass all educational activities of the Archdiocese--juvenile and adult, religious as well as academic. Msgr. Valade, 39 years old, has been Archdiocesan Chancellor.

"There will be other adjustments to be made later," Archbishop Dearden said, "but a sufficient base now has been built to prepare for many of the major programs expected from the 1968 Archdiocesan Synod."

THE SYNOD, reflecting Vatican Council directives and the first general Archdiocesan assembly to give laymen major roles, has involved hundreds of thousands of Catholics in preparations extending over a year. Its formal session is expected later this year.

A division of the new department, the Archdiocesan School System, is one of the largest educational enterprises, private or public, in Michigan.

Others include the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine program involving almost 150,000 students attending public schools, the nationally-recognized Institute of Continuing Education and the Newman Apostolate, which has installations in public universities and colleges. Msgr. Valade also will coordinate Archdiocesan relations with Catholic institutes of higher learning, will be in charge of the Archdiocesan educational television network and will oversee various special educational projects.

"EDUCATION quite obviously is the force of the future," Msgr. Valade said. "The signs of the times tell us that and

that message has been underlined thousands of times in thoughtful Synod proposals. Education in our day is no longer something that ends with childhood but instead is a force that all of us, formally or informally, can profit from through all of our lives. I look forward with eagerness to helping to pioneer in this exciting area."

Msgr. Valade, as Chancellor, was in charge of the study that produced the series of changes. Dr. Arthur Deegan, manage-

ment consultant, conducted its technical aspects, including surveys of the operations of all Archdiocesan departments.

A recommendation was that the Chancery be decentralized as a preliminary to carrying out expected Synod projects.

THE CHANCERY'S responsibilities for parishes were transferred to Auxiliary Bishop Thomas J. Gumbleton, as Vicar for parishes; its responsibilities involving the priests were given Auxiliary Bishop Walter J. Schoenherr, as Delegate for Clergy, and its responsibilities for charities, social service and social action were given to the Rev. Robert V. Monticello, as director of a newly created Department of Christian Service.

Earlier, in a move reflecting Vatican Council decisions but not directly involving Synod actions, Auxiliary Bishop Joseph M. Breitenbeck had been given charge of activities involving Sisters and Brothers. His title is Delegate for Religious.

## Old Hymns Will Get New Mod Treatment

Old hymns of the Christian church have great relevancy in today's mod world, believes the Rev. Carl Kaltreider, pastor of Antioch Lutheran Church, Farmington. To point up his belief, he's setting some of the most familiar hymns he knows against the most bizarre and psychedelic background he can dream up. He'll show the combination at 8 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 20, as part of the "Something Else" series of services sponsored by his own church, North Farmington Baptist and Orchard Methodist, also of Farmington. The "psychedelic hymning" will be held in North Farmington Baptist. PASTOR KALTREIDER is using three movie projectors and a slide projector to get the effect he wants. Two films will be run with waves of color, one sharply focused and one diffused. Simultaneously, another movie will show scenes from everyday life, and interspersed will be slides of scenes of nature. And while all that goes on, the congregation, if it can concentrate on the printed word or remember the familiar lines, will be singing well-known hymns like "Holy, Holy, Holy," "Rock Of Ages," and "Onward, Christian Soldiers." EXPLAINED Pastor Kaltreider: "We're trying to show, in pictures, but also with the use of flashing light and color to symbolize the hectic pace of life today, that the message in the old hymns, without change, is as applicable now as it was 80 to 100 years ago when they were written. Today's young people understand the background, but they connect it with the words of the popular song-writers. I want to put the old hymn words into it." "THE PROGRAM actually is a gimmick of incongruities," the clergyman said, "to show there is no incongruity." In that respect, it follows the pattern of the Tuesday night services in the "Something Else" series sponsored by the three churches. All have aimed at telling the religious message in various new ways. The summer series is coming near its close, and Pastor Kaltreider said he and the Rev. Ralph Rideout, minister of the North Farmington Baptist, and the Rev. Eric Hammar, Orchard Methodist minister, had agreed it has been successful. "Congregations ranging from 31 to 149 have been present during the various Tuesday evenings," he said, "and several of the speakers were so inter-

### Jewish Studies At UD

The University of Detroit and the Midrasa College of Jewish Studies are cooperating in offering a Program of Jewish Studies beginning with the fall semester, credits for which will apply toward a bachelor's degree, according to Father Malcolm Carron, S.J., U. of D. president. Both Father Carron and Albert Elazar, president of the Midrasa College, expressed extreme gratification at this cooperative agreement between the two schools. Father Paul Conen, S.J., dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, explained: "The program's aims are to foster knowledge of Judaism both among Jewish and non-Jewish students as one of the basic influences of Western religion and culture, leading students to a deeper understanding of contemporary western civilization and to guide both groups toward unprejudiced mutual understanding." THE PROGRAM will allow students to major or minor in Jewish studies with a maximum of 64 credits toward the 128 required for graduation from the curriculum required by the College of Jewish Studies for its Bachelor of Hebrew Letters degree. U. of D. students who wish to work beyond this toward an additional or simultaneous degree from the College in either a bachelor of Judaic Studies or bachelor of Hebrew Literature will be able to do so. Courses will be offered both on U. of D. campus and at the College. Dr. Shlomo Marenof will be coordinator and adjunct professor for the program. From the College will be Adjunct Associate Professors, Naphtali Wiesner and Benjamin L. Yapko; Adjunct Assistant Professors, Simcha Berkowitz, Jay Braverman, David Kadosh, Samuel S. Stollman; and Adjunct Instructor, Solomon Schimmel. FOUR COURSES will be offered in the fall on campus: The Jews and Western Civilization; The Spanish Center to the Industrial Revolution; Sects in Judaism During the Second Commonwealth; A Survey of Jewish Thought; and The Philosophy of Martin Buber and Existentialism. These will be taught by the faculty of the College of Jewish Studies.

# Parties Set Local Conventions

August Congressional District conventions have been called by both parties to nominate delegates for fall state conventions planned for later this month.

All Republican conventions will be held Wednesday (tonight) beginning at 8 p.m. The state meeting of the party is Aug. 23-24 in Grand Rapids. All Democratic conventions will be held Friday night Aug. 16 at 8 p.m. Grand Rapids will also host the Democrats, beginning Aug. 30.

THE FALL STATE conventions will nominate one candidate for the State Supreme Court and two positions each on the State Board of Education, the Michigan State University Board of Trustees, the Wayne State Board of Governors and the University of Michigan Board of Regents.

In addition, Democrats will pick 21 presidential electors. Republicans did this at their spring convention.

Attending the district conventions this week will be new batches of delegates who were elected in the Aug. 6 primary.

THE PRECINCT delegate and convention structure is provided for by state statute, and this is where the control of party power rests.

For instance, delegates to the Democratic convention in Chicago in August were elected by a caucus of the local delegates at the June state convention in Detroit.

Thus, presidential hopefuls seeking to establish a power base in Michigan politics must begin at least two years in advance, when local delegates are elected.

# How Michigan Dems See GOP Strategy

EAST LANSING -- Michigan Democrats joyfully contemplated the Republican Nixon-Agnew ticket and put their house in order to take 96 votes to Chicago.

There were some questions still unanswered in their own party as the delegates met here for a briefing and to make travel and convention arrangements.

But barring a massive collapse of what they choose to call political judgment, the delegation figured Democrats would put together a more attractive slate for November.

"I shed no tears, whatsoever," said National Committeeman Neil Staebler. "I don't believe they put their best foot forward."

DEMOCRATS said Republicans, by their selection of Spiro T. Agnew, governor of Maryland as vice presidential candidate with Richard M. Nixon, kissed off the big cities and geared themselves to run in the suburbs and in Dixie.

To others, the GOP ticket took on a faintly racist tone, with Nixon capturing the remnants of the 1964 Barry Goldwater organization and with Agnew pictured as a "Law-and-order" governor wooing the south.

Strategists here speculate that Nixon was building a backfire in the south against George Wallace, despite guesses that the former Alabama governor will siphon off the electoral votes of at least seven states.

THE PURPOSE of the meeting here was to accomplish housekeeping chores before the convention opens in the cavernous Chicago amphitheater Aug. 26.

They settled the tote-bag issue by agreeing the ladies could accept them as gifts, but they adopted a nonproliferation policy on payola. The major house-keeping problem was visitor passes to the bleachers.

Nationally, there are 1,500 tickets and Michigan will get about 50 a day. The formula will give one-eighth of the tickets to officers of the delegation, one-eighth for officers of the Democratic State Central Committee with the rest distributed among the 19 districts.

"What it is distribution of a headache," said Plymouth's Robert Dwyer, Secretary of State branch manager. "There won't be enough, of course."

Delegates recommended that the Democratic convention avoid the droning nominations of favorite sons whose only interest is national publicity.

Republicans have been criticized nationally and locally for permitting non-candidates to monopolize prime television time which resulted in Nixon's nomination being held back until 3 a.m. Friday.

MICHIGAN'S DELEGATION is clearly in the hands of Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey. The count for Senator Eugene F. McCarthy hasn't changed since the state convention in Detroit.

"We've still got 12 or 13 votes for McCarthy with the rest going to Humphrey," said State Senator Roger Craig, of Dearborn, a McCarthy man from the start.

There was little reaction at the time to the new candidacy of North Dakota Senator George S. McGovern, a Kennedy man in the spring and early summer before the murder in Los Angeles.

Some Democrats speculated that McGovern got into the running with Humphrey's encouragement to relieve the pressure from President Johnson on behalf of fellow-Texan John Con-

nally for vice president. McGovern, they reason, is almost as unknown as a national political figure as Agnew and that his appeal would be sectional, if at all. They said a Humphrey-McCarthy ticket is the kind politicians dream about, but that it is unlikely to happen.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, Democrats, who already have sent \$2,500 to Mississippi Freedom Party delegates to wage their credentials fight against the establishment slate pledged to Wallace, heard a request from Alabama.

They listened to Dr. John Cashin, a dentist, describe the Alabama fight against "electors" -- delegates already pledged to Wallace -- who will go to Chicago prepared to pledge their loyalty to the Democratic choice.

THE MOST NOTABLE absentee at the meeting was former State Chairman Zoltan Ferency, who the day before resigned as a fourth alternate delegate.

"For me to get any of the action in Chicago, three delegates would have to drop dead," he said.

The position as the fourth alternate, he said, ranks him as the 28th most important Democrat in Michigan, a spot he considered demeaning to a former state chairman who walked the plank as candidate for governor against Gov. Romney in 1966.

With all their large and small problems, Democrats -- for political watchers -- are just as spirited as ever.

Sassy Teen Dems put up a large sign in the delegation meeting area: "Spiro who??? Isn't that some kind of a notebook?"

# Agnew's Appeals Are Ethnic And Suburban

MIAMI BEACH--Spiro T. Agnew has become Richard Nixon's Republican running mate under something of a cloud, but he will also bring two interesting appeals into his vice presidential campaign.

One is ethnic; the other is suburban. Agnew is reportedly the first person of Greek ancestry to become governor of a state.

THIS IMPRESSES Sal Lauricella, one of Michigan's alternate delegates-at-large by virtue of his post as head of the Republican Nationalities Council.

"I think his appeal will carry over to other ethnic groups," Lauricella said. Ethnic minorities haven't been a Republican strong point since before the Depression. The nationalities councils have been a major GOP effort to break down that wall.

Lauricella said Michigan Republican efforts in that field are among the most advanced in the nation.

AGNEW IS ALSO a suburbanite. He was chief executive of Baltimore County, which surrounds the City of Baltimore.

The county has made some long steps toward regional government that southeastern Michigan can study.

His official biography says that in his early career, "he was active in moves to obtain open spaces legislation in the county and also in the successful drive for charter 'home rule' government which replaced the Board of County Commissioners in 1957 with a full-time County Executive and Council."

Baltimore County has a reputation in the field of regional planning, and its department has been raided by some Michigan units for regional planners.

If Agnew is, as some political observers contend, a conservative, then he's not the kind of conservative who will be popular with the enemies of metro government, regional planning and county reorganization.

AS GOVERNOR of Maryland, Agnew set up a Federal Relations Office in Washington to assure his state full participation in federal programs. This is the sort of thing that interests small suburban local governments, which can't keep track of all the federal aid available.

Of late, Agnew's stock with the law-and-order breed of southern conservatives has risen because of some remarks. Yet his official biography gives a different impression on the civil rights issue:

"The Agnew Administration sponsored the first statewide Fair Housing bill enacted south of the Mason-Dixon line.

"The century-old Anti-Miscegenation Law was repealed, and Maryland's Public Accommodations statutes were extended to conform with federal measures.

"Agnew was the first Maryland governor to appoint a Negro to his personal staff and to promulgate a Governor's Code of Fair Employment Practices outlawing discrimination in state service and in any firm doing business with the state."

This year's GOP platform repeatedly calls for strengthening local and state governments, relying more on local and state activity, providing bloc grants to local and state units.

Agnew seems to be in line with the platform.

# Right Wing Folds Up

A conservative Republican group has gone out of business in the Oakland County portion of the 19th Congressional District.

Headed by Christian Powell and Arnold Jones, the group had set up its own organization parallel to the regular party structure after Powell's forces were ousted in a 1967 district convention.

It had regularly lost attempts to be seated at state and national GOP conventions.

THE POWELL-JONES group voted formally to discontinue, according to an announcement from David Bradbury, its publicity chairman. The announcement quoted co-chairman Jones as saying:

"Such a move on our part would be a positive indication of our desire to get behind the entire Republican ticket, both national, state and local, and work for their election in November."

In general, the regular Oakland County Republican organization had lined up behind Gov. Romney while the Powell-Jones had been associated with 14th District arch-conservative Richard Durant.

IN THE AUG. 6 elections for precinct delegates, the pro-Romney regulars won heavy victories--100 seats to 47 for the conservatives in the 19th District portion of Oakland County, and 300 of the 400-plus in the county as a whole.

# Attends Platform Hearing

Democratic leader Aldo Vagnozzi of Farmington will travel to Columbus, Ohio this week to attend the second of his party's regional platform committee hearings.

Vagnozzi is one of Michigan's two members on the Democratic National Convention platform and resolutions committee.

Also attending the Columbus meeting will be State Democratic Chairman Sander Levin of Berkley and Mrs. Mabel Stoltz of Owosso, the other Michigan committee member.

The hearings involve three states--Michigan, Ohio and Wisconsin. The first hearing was held in Detroit on Aug. 3 when 22 speakers appeared during the full day session.

Vagnozzi said the hearings were initiated by the Michigan Democrats as part of the party's continuing policy of seeking out all viewpoints in helping to shape platforms and resolutions.

# Profile Of A Michigan GOP Delegate

By TIM RICHARD

MIAMI BEACH -- Observerland's delegates to the Republican National Convention ran a bit younger than the average Michigander, but otherwise they fit the profile of the typical delegate fairly well.

Local delegates -- from the Second, 15th and 19th Districts -- have an average age of 38 and one-half compared to the state average of 46.

Yet this year's state average is five years lower than the 51 average of Michigan's 1964 delegation.

OF THE 48 DELEGATES, only 14 (including Gov. Romney) haven't earned a college degree, although a number of that group have at least attended college.

Of the 31 with college degrees, 18 have gone on to graduate school, mostly in law or business administration, one in medicine. There are no Ph.D. s. Occupations are sometimes

difficult to detect from official listing, but several groups stand out -- lawyers, realtors, insurance salesmen and auto executives.

THE GRAND OLD man of the local area is E.O. (Bud) Weber, 44, of Northville, who works in personnel at Ford. Weber was elected an alternate from the Second District, which includes Plymouth, but moved up when a delegate couldn't attend.

Weber has a bachelor's and master of business administration degrees from the University of Michigan.

The other Second District delegate is Norman Jamieson, 34, an insurance manager and justice of the peace in Livingston County. He is a Michigan State University graduate.

John Cartwright, 40, a 19th District delegate, is senior attorney in the general counsel's office of Ford Motor Co. He lives in West Bloomfield, earned his degrees at Albion and

Deerfield College of Law. Mrs. Defores Kory, 40, earned a bachelor's degree in economics at the University of Michigan. She has sold real estate and been active in a batch of civic and political groups. A Redford resident, she represents the Wayne County portion of the 19th District.

The 15th District is represented by Dwight Vincent, 38, and Howard Payne, 34, both of Dearborn Heights. Vincent is an attorney and U-M graduate; Payne is an automotive designer who studied at the Cleveland Institute of Arts.

ALL THE LOCAL-district delegates are "party" people -- they hold party offices but not governmental jobs, although Weber has been on the Northville school board.

They have an average of 2.3 children, a bit below the state delegation's average of three-plus.

They are different from other Michigan delegates in that

there are no millionaires among them, no self-employed, small industry owners, no government office holders.

The at-large part of the delegation was set up to include several office holders -- Gov. Romney, Sen. Robert Griffin, Congressman Elford Cederberg

of Bay City, State Rep. Russell Strange of Clare, and State Senate Majority Leader Emil Lockwood of St. Louis.

The at-large group also includes Max Fisher, whose occupation is listed as "industrialist and philanthropist." One of Fisher's philanthropies,

of course, is the Republican party.

Most Observerland delegates attended Michigan colleges, but the total listing shows a scattering from Ivy League schools along with one Rhodes Scholar -- national Committeeman John B. Martin.







and at minimum cost, a bald cement wall, a bare fence or a tiny balcony can become the focal point for a setting almost as lovely as a miniature English country garden.

How? With a flower fall. Visualize a grouping of five long plant boxes really attached --one above the other--to an outdoor trellised framework, to a fence or a cement wall. In the highest box there are red trailing geraniums, in the next white petunias, in the third --just below eye-level--blue ageratums, in the fourth red petunias, and in the planter closest to the ground, pink wax begonias. This colorful cascade of fragrant blossoms is a flower fall.

The size of each flower box depends, of course, upon the dimensions of the area the entire grouping will cover. They might be from three to five or six feet long.

For the most dramatic, flowing effect, be certain that all are of uniform size. Front boards are tapered, or angled so that plant boxes are narrow at the bottom and wider at the top.

This allows the flowers abundant sun and light. Box construction must be strong. If made of redwood or rot-proofed pine and provided with drain holes, they will last for at least five to six years.

BREATHTAKINGLY lovely beauty is available at the florist shop--and at modest cost.

Trailing red geraniums are the ideal choice for the top box of your flower fall. Long a favorite potted flower in this country, the geranium is most often thought of as a fairly heavy, upright plant.

But there are many different varieties, and one of the loveliest is the trailing geranium which grows rapidly in cascades and falls.

Blue ageratums, incidentally, is an ideal choice for the eye-level box. Not only because of its beautiful color, but also because in contrast to the trailing blossoms the growth of its flowers is full and compact.

THE LAZY MAN'S way to create a flower fall is to leave the flowers in their pots and place directly into the tiered plant boxes. This method will suffice, providing flowers receive sunlight and normal watering care.

But, there is a better way if you have just a little extra time. Put a mixture of one-half soil and one-half peat in the plants boxes.

Then upon your geraniums, petunias, ageratums and begonias and plant the flowers in this mixture.

# Seed Pods Great For Bouquets

Interesting forms are found in many seed pods -- the boon of dried-flower arrangers. The pods are gathered long before they are open, then transported to florist shops for fall and winter arrangements.

There are the spartan Catalpa, otherwise called the Indian cigar plant; the round-formed iris and roseacacia; pods; honesty pods, globe-thistle, poppy and Chinese lantern pods; tulip tree, sumac, milkweed, eucalyptus, and lotus pods.

The Lotus pod resembles a brown beehive with big round seeds in each open pocket.

## Soak; Don't Sprinkle

One thing that every vegetable and flower needs in order to grow is water. If Nature fails to provide it in form of rain, the gardener must step into the breach.

Sprinkling plants doesn't do much good. It just wets the surface of the soil causing plant roots to grow toward the moisture and then risk injury from the sun because they are too close to the surface.

Thorough soaking to a depth of 5 or 6 inches is the kind of watering that makes a real difference to plants.

Flowers or vegetables growing in rows can be irrigated by letting water run between rows, but gushing water will wash soil away. To break its force, a board can be placed under the hose, protruding well beyond the end of the hose. The resulting water flow will be gentle.

Allow the water to run for an hour and then investigate the depth to which it has penetrated by digging a hole to see how many inches are dark with moisture. Knowing the time the water has been running and the number of inches depth to which it has gone in that time will allow you to determine how long the water must run to reach the plant roots.

# Roots Indicate Health Of Plant

Whether your shrubs and trees will be healthy and beautiful depends largely on whether the roots are sturdy.

Fertilizer should be applied in a way that will permit plant roots and absorb it rapidly and easily.

If you apply fertilizer to the soil surface, some of it may not reach the roots.

THE FOOD elements first must dissolve in water before the feeder roots can take them into the plant.

By supplying water, plant food and good drainage, you guard against dangers from drought, starvation and suffocation.

And remember, a healthy plant not only is more attractive, but it is more resistant to

trouble from insects and disease.

One way to feed roots is to bore deep holes around the plant, partially fill them with water to dissolve the fertilizer, or wait for rain.

Another way is to use plant

food cartridges.

ONE ROOT feeder device (Ross) connects to the garden hose, and has a transparent chamber for plant food, a water valve and a 27-inch pointed tube.

Plant - food cartridges are loaded into the chamber and the tube is pushed into the ground under the drip branches (outer-branches) of the plant.

When the water is turned on,

it dissolves the food cartridges and carries the solution to the feeder roots.

This method feeds, waters and aerates at the same time.

Feeder roots are beneath and a little beyond the outside branches of a plant, 15 to 30 inches under the soil surface.

Improper watering by hose may encourage roots to develop close to the surface where they will dry out in summer sun and wind.

# The Green Thumb

By GEORGE ABRAHAM

CHECK THOSE WEEDS; The best weed killer you can use in the flower or vegetable garden is the hoe or cultivator. Hoe them while they're young and you can keep them under control. Best time to pull weeds is when the soil is wet, such as after a rain or a good soaking.

Right now, one of the most persistent weeds is the "pussley", or Purslane ("wild portulaca"), a sprawling plant with thick succulent stems and leaves. It pulls out easily if the soil is moist, but breaks off if the soil is dry, and within a week or so, it'll be right back.

In Mexico, "pussley" is recognized for its food value and offered for sale in the markets. Many home gardeners eat purslane, a good way to get rid of a bad weed. The whole plant is harvested, washed, boiled and salted, and a few of them make a good, generous meal for any hungry group.

**MORNING GLORY NOTES:** If the bottom leaves of your morning glories are turning yellow, it might be due to too much water, or poor drainage. Keep the soil uniformly moistened, but never allow water to stand around the roots for any length of time.

A sickly yellow color now could mean an infestation of red spider mites. Spray plants with Kelthane, tops and bottoms. Also, give the vines a feeding of liquid plant food such as 23-19-17, or similar balanced fertilizer to get the green color back.

**A GOOD HOUSE PLANT:** More home gardeners are discovering the value of the Red or "Flame African Violet", Episcia, a handsome trailing greenhouse and house plant

which does resemble the violet, except that it is more handsome.

Pronounced e-pisk-kee-ah or e-pis-ee-a (the last one most common), it likes a rich fibrous loam, mixed with peat, leaf mold and sand. Has the same light requirements as the violet, and is very touchy about chill.

Do not expose to temperature less than 60 degrees. Water from top or bottom, using warm water. You can start new plants by rooting single leaves in water, sand or vermiculite.

# Failure To Remove Elms May Be Costly

Michigan residents who neglect removal of dead and diseased elm trees may be risking serious hazard to themselves, or possible liability claims from others.

This warning was issued by Director B. Dale Ball, Michigan Department of Agriculture, in connection with a report showing that 24,954 dead elm trees were condemned in 1967. Orders for removal of the trees, victims of Dutch elm disease, were issued by the department's plant industry division, working in cooperation with municipalities and home owner associations having ordinances regulating elm tree inspection and condemnation.

ACCORDING TO DEAN LOVITT, chief of the department's plant industry division, serious hazard develops when dead elms are left standing.

As the tree rots, limbs become increasingly fragile and there is added danger of them breaking in a wind or storm.

Some homeowners whose trees have contracted Dutch elm disease delay removal because of the cost involved. Yet it is more dangerous and expensive to have a tree taken out after it has decayed. And the cost of injury to a person or to property could be much greater than the price of immediate removal.

Late in 1966 newspapers reported the death of a 10-year-old boy when a dead elm fell in southeastern Michigan. A similar incident in a neighboring state claimed the life of a three-year-old girl.

Michigan's millions of elm trees have an estimated value of more than \$700 million, according to the Michigan State Tree foundation. A native of

this state, the elm has long been a favorite because it grows rapidly, endures crowded city conditions well, withstands drought, and has an attractive shape.

DUTCH ELM DISEASE, now making deadly inroads on the elm-tree population, is caused by a fungus which is carried by the European elm bark beetle. As the fungus grows it causes the tree to form gums which plug water-conducting tissues.

The tree actually dies from drought. Most trees die the same year as infected; a few survive for another year or two. There is no known cure. Bark beetles move from infected to healthy trees, carrying with them the fungus spores and resultant infection. In some areas of Michigan, about 95 per cent of the elms have been

## Sow Perennial Blooms For Winter Growth

By BETTY FRANKEL

Perennial flowers, the mainstay of many beautiful gardens, can be raised from seed planted in mid-summer. There is still time this season to sow delphinium, pansies, columbine or other perennials which will be of blooming size by next summer.

One packet of seeds will yield many plants, so this is an economical way to obtain a good supply of the plants you want. The lavish use of a single type of plant will give a garden a real "lift" and help create a spectacular scene. Also, the easiest way to obtain unusual varieties, or flowers of a particular type or color is to raise your own from seed.

THE VERY BEST place to sow perennial seeds is in a cold frame, but if there is none available, choose a sheltered spot near a hedge or wall. A makeshift cold frame can be contrived from a shallow wooden box, or from some planks nailed together, with a window sash or a piece of transparent plastic laid across the top.

A constant supply of moisture is important. The soil should not dry out while the seeds are germinating or while the plants are small. However, although a moist soil is essential, it should not be soggy.

Protection from direct sun is desirable, and if the seeds are sown in the open ground, some protection from wind is needed.


PREPARE THE SOIL thoroughly. A mixture of one-third good garden soil, one-third peat moss and one third sand is ideal. Sow the seed in shallow troughs or grooves made in the prepared soil. Cover large seeds with twice their diameter of soil. Fine seeds should merely be pressed into the loose soil.

Water gently with a fine spray and cover the cold frame or the soil with a layer of newspapers or something that will provide shade and keep the moisture in. Remove this covering when the seeds germinate. This usually takes two to three weeks.



# Parochial Schools Feel Pinch Of Rising Costs

Catholic school officials Tuesday predicted a bleak future for the Archdiocesan School System as 68 inner city schools face deficits.

The announcement comes in the wake of news last week that over 1,200 pupils in nine Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of Detroit would have to find space in other schools--public or Catholic.

The closing of the nine schools included Girls' Catholic Central High School, the all boys Detroit Cathedral High School, St. Cecilia High, St. Mary Commercial High and St. Patrick High in Wyandotte.

The Rev. John Zwiers, superintendent of Catholic Schools, told the Special Legislative Committee on non-Public Schools that enrollments in Catholic schools in the eight-county area have declined 10 per cent in the last four years.

The most serious financial problems, Fr. Zwiers said, are being experienced by Catholic schools in the inner city of Detroit. Sixty-eight inner city schools had deficits totaling more than \$1,200,000 last year, he said.

"IN GENERAL, most of Michigan's nearly 1,000 non-public schools face difficult financial problems, but the financial picture of non-public schools in Detroit's inner city is far worse than the economic outlook for the Detroit public schools," he said.

EVEN MORE DRAMATIC is the fact that for the first time in the 20th century, the Archdiocese won't be opening any new schools this fall and no new ones are even on the drawing boards.

from a peak of 201,669 students during the 1963-64 school year to the estimated 180,000 pupils who are expected to enroll in Catholic schools in Wayne, Oakland, Macomb, St. Clair, Lapeer, Washtenaw, Monroe and Lenawee counties next month.

Despite declining school populations, the Archdiocesan School System still is the second largest in Michigan. Its student

populations exceeds the total public school enrollments in 40 of Michigan's 83 counties.

FR. ZWIERS said the increase in the number of lay teachers in Archdiocesan schools and higher teacher salaries have forced many schools to increase their tuition rates.

"In some cases, especially at the high school level, parents have had to withdraw children

from our schools because of the increased expense of tuition," he said.

The Archdiocesan School superintendent said the number of lay teachers in Catholic schools in southeastern Michigan has increased from 814 in 1957-58 to nearly 3,000 next year.

"The percentage of lay teachers has increased from 19 per cent to 45 per cent in 10 years and I foresee the day in the not

too distant future when lay teachers will outnumber teaching Sisters in the Catholic schools in the Archdiocese," he said.

Fr. Zwiers said the Archdiocese, in order to remain competitive with public schools, has found it necessary to raise salaries and offer fringe benefits for its lay teachers.

BETWEEN 1964 AND 1968,

the beginning salary for a provisionally certified teacher has increased from \$4,800 to \$6,300, an increase of \$1,500 or 31 per cent, compared to a 27 per cent increase in public school teacher salaries, he said.

Despite its financial problems, he concluded, the Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of Detroit are making every effort to provide quality edu-

cation for the students who attend its schools, especially those in the inner city.

"WE ARE FORGING AHEAD rapidly with new and meaningful programs for inner city children in an attempt to make our contribution to solving some of the nation's problems of our ghetto poor," he said.

"In my position I come into daily contact with many parents,

I am continually more and more impressed with their sincere determination to maintain their schools at all cost.

"This is an example of American traditional effort at its best. However, in my position I also see the hard practicalities of the situation, and the ceiling is closing in very rapidly on many of our deficit operations," Fr. Zwiers concluded.

# 'CURTAIN' GOING UP

"Lovers and Other Strangers" is having its world premiere at the Fisher Theater for the next four weeks. The five humorous sketches on view are difficult to genuinely love and seem quite strange when considered in an objective fashion.

In the world of the theater certain standard forms of presentation exist: the musical comedy, the straight drama, the sophisticated comedy, the fast-moving farce, and the melodrama. There are other forms, but these are the more common "garden" varieties.

"LOVERS and Other Strangers" fits none of these categories. It comes closest to the musical revue form where short sketches of a comic nature alternate with song and dance numbers. No such musical relief highlights the evening at the Fisher.

The five humorous sketches authored by Renee Taylor and her husband are strung together quite tentatively on the "love-marriage" theme. You meet wedded couples, pre-marital duos, and couples about to be divorced...in the five sketches.

No storyline complicates the evening's entertainment. You are plunged immediately into the situation. As Frank says in the divorce sketch, "Well, Richy, what's the story?". The situation moves ponderously

and goes on and on into the night, Miss Taylor and husband never knew when to quit. Brevity in many of the sketches would have improved their comic impact.

Several times during the evening an effort was made to test the audience's "shock quotient" by inserting the four-letter word for defecation on three occasions. As used, it did fit the occasion. However, many in the Fisher Theater audience reacted in a negative fashion and left at intermission.

At least 10 per cent of the dialogue strained a bit too hard for nervous laughter that comes when language gets too salty. Domestic comedy often skirts the edge of indecency, but in the main it tries to stay on the happy side of the ledger. Of course, "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf" used about every obscenity in the book, but then Edward Albee was doing this for a different purpose.

TWO OF the five sketches in "Lovers and Other Strangers" do have some merit, especially the short one about the jittery groom and his understanding bride. They are discussing the impending wedding at 4 a.m. and his sudden fear of being wedded has real heart and hits home.

If Miss Taylor had been able to bolster her other sketches with more of this perceptive

material, "Lovers and Other Strangers" might have made some friends.

Another approach might have been to have taken five talented people and let them do the 12 roles in the five sketches as a tour de force display of theatrical talent. This approach to the curious combination of five sketches might breathe only a slight bit of relief.

All 12 of the actors involved in this mish-mashed marriage-ground exude heaps of talent. They do their damndest to give you your money's worth, but for too much of the time during the evening the real fault lies with the material given the actors. The dialogue just ain't funny or it is too dreary or too far out even for a hippie-yippie.

"Lovers and Other Strangers" starts the Fisher Theater out on a might low key. The only direction the season can go from here is definitely up.

## Guests Enmasse By Thousands On Rouge Plant

What do a Metropolitan Opera singer, the Yugoslavian minister of economics, a star of "Cabaret" and members of the American Society for Microbiology have in common?

They were among 96,287 visitors touring Ford Motor Company's Rouge plant in Dearborn during the first six months of 1968.

AND AUGUST, annually the biggest tour month with more than 50,000 visitors, is yet to come. With these and thousands more, company officials predict a record 250,000 Rouge visitors during 1968.

"Rouge tours have become increasingly more popular in the past ten years and we might well have passed the quarter-million mark in 1967 except for the auto strike which curtailed tours for two months," says R.G. Fischer, acting special events manager.

During summer months, the company operates as many as 14 buses at one time and supplements its permanent staff of

24 guides with 24 college students.

Last year, visitors came from every state and all U.S. possessions and 105 foreign countries. France, Switzerland and Japan contributed the largest numbers of foreign visitors.

The 1,200-acre Rouge plant is the only industrial area encompassing every facet of the automobile manufacturing process, ranging from steel-making to vehicle assembly.

THE AREA includes 229 coke ovens, three blast furnaces, a highly advanced basic oxygen steel-making facility, steel-rolling mills, one of the largest production foundries in the U.S., an engine plant, stamping plant, tool and die plant, a glass and an assembly plant.

During tours of steel operations, visitors see glowing ingots of steel and rolled ribbons of sheet steel ready for fabrication into car roofs, fenders and side panels.

Admission-free tours of Rouge are held from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday except for holidays. The 90-minute tours begin in the visitors' reception lobby in the east concourse of the Ford Central Office Building, Michigan Ave. at Southfield in Dearborn.

Large groups are asked to make advance reservations.
