WESTLAND—The City Council took a major step toward resolving a controversy involving Edward Kane holding two appointed positions within the municipal government by directing the mayor to withhold Kane's \$25-per-meeting salary as a civil service commissioner.

FARMINGTON—Officials of the Michigan Municipal Finance Commission spent a day last week auditing the bond sales of the Farmington Public Schools. At issue, was the sale of a general issue for the construction of pools and auditoriums and the District's move to replace the funds by using the issue specifically approved for the pools and auditoriums. The Commission has not announced a decision stemming from the audit.

LIVONIA—The forces of primary loser Ron Mardiros humbled those supporting Jerry Raymond during the Wayne 19th District Democratic convention in Redford last week. Mardiros failed in his bid for the nomination for U.S. Congressman, losing to Gary Frink. Raymond served as chairman of the convention. The session was marked by party disunity and verbal clashes.

GARDEN CITY—The Board of Education adopted a tentative operating budget of more than \$8 million but reminded the community that contract negotiations with local teachers have not been completed.

REDFORD—A \$50,000 addition to the township hall was proposed Monday for housing the new district court facilities come January 1. Architects' preliminary plans and estimates are being sought to aid a decision between the addition and temporary rental of facilities required by the new lower court law.

WESTLAND—Contract talks in the Wayne Community School District have not progressed in recent meetings but the negotiating sessions have been scheduled on a more frequent basis. Administrators were optimistic that school would start as scheduled on Sept. 3.

LIVONIA—Contractors have been asked to submit new bids next Tuesday, August 27, for housing of senior citizens with low income. Bids will be opened at the city clerk's office and then reported to the regional office of Housing and Urban Development in Chicago.

REDFORD—Failing to overcome an impasse in teacher bargaining talks after a five-hour meeting with a state labor mediator Monday, the two South Redford teams agreed to submit to advisory fact finding. The district team stuck to a \$6,750 to \$12,420 proposal to the tenth year masters level, with a 1.80 increment. Teacher bargainers dropped their demands to \$7,450 to \$13,708 for the same range, based on the existing 1.84 increment.

City Joins Refuse Authority On 4-2 Vote Of Commission

Dad, Son Guilty Of Assault

Two defendants were found guilty of assault and battery Monday while a third was found innocent in the first jury trial ever held in Plymouth Township under the jurisdiction of Justice of the Peace James McCarthy.

Benjamin Kay, 18, of 7860 S. Wayne Rd., Wayne, was fined \$55 plus \$75 court costs in lieu of 26 days in jail, plus being given a suspended jail sentence of 88 days.

Henry Fred Kay, 43, of 22222 Beck Rd., Northville, was found guilty but was granted a new trial by Judge McCarthy because of "inadmissible evidence" during his testimony. He is Benjamin's father.

Michael H. Zimmicki, 17, of 3607 Willow, Dearborn, who also had been charged with assault and battery was acquitted.

The six-person jury, made up of four men and two women, took more than an hour to deliberate the verdict of the trio who had been accused of beating Fred Bodnar, 19, of 8595 W. Seven Mile, Northville.

Bodnar, who had claimed he was attacked by the men for no reason, said he was boarding at a house located at 42030 Ann Arbor Trail, Plymouth.

He said he was sitting in the front room of the house listening to records when one of his friends when he heard a knock at the back door.

He claimed that when he answered the knock the elder Kay grabbed him by the neck and threw Bodnar to the floor.

Bodnar said the other two joined Kay and beat him with their hands and kicked him in the stomach. He said that they dragged him outside where he managed to break free and run to a house down the street and call the police.

All three defendants testified that they had gone to the house to see the woman who owned it (she was not identified) because she had been having some family troubles.

The elder Kay testified he had been dating the woman. He said that when they arrived and went through the back porch and knocked on the kitchen door no one appeared to be home.

Kay said that Bodnar came to the door and a few seconds later he began to fight with the younger Kay.

Ben Kay testified that Bodnar hit him in the face and he "got pretty mad" and hit the boy back. He said he knocked Bodnar to the floor and kicked him.

He said he stepped back to let Bodnar get to his feet and the boy ran past him into the backyard.

This occurred Feb. 25, 1968. Judge McCarthy said that he would grant the elder Kay a new trial because of Kay's testimony that he had never been convicted of a crime.

Kay did admit, however, that he had been arrested and convicted of a City of Northville ordinance for being drunk and disorderly.

The judge said that was inadmissible evidence.

Injured In Collision

A Plymouth man received minor injuries last weekend when the motorcycle he was riding struck a Volkswagen from behind.

Stephen Duane Appelwhite, 22, of 289 Ann Arbor Trail, was treated at the scene of the accident and sent home after his motorcycle struck a car driven by Raymond Clair Schoof, 49, of 23701 Heartwood, Northville.

Both were going north on Mill St. Aug. 16 when Heartwood said he signaled to make a right turn onto Union St. Appelwhite said he thought the signal was for a left turn and when he turned around to check traffic he hit the car.

Plymouth Dentist Aids Mexicans As 'Vacation'

Dr. Gerald Fitch, a prominent Plymouth dentist, has enjoyed another unusual "busman's holiday" this summer.

Dr. Fitch and his wife, Twyla, spent their three week vacation this year doing fillings and extractions for poverty-stricken residents of small Mexican villages. And on their way, they penetrated into the jungles.

This is the third year the Fitches have taken a few weeks out of their summer to provide badly needed dental services for the poor in Mexico. On this year's trip Dr. and Mrs. Fitch were accompanied by two friends, turned dental assistants, Mrs. Lois McAllister and her daughter, Karen, 18, of 15674 Lakeside Drive.

When the Fitches' church, the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, established a youth center in Saltillo, Mexico the possibility of doing something for the destitute people they had seen on their vacations became feasible.

While the Fitches were in Saltillo they were housed at the youth center and set up their clinic on the third floor of the building. They also took a side trip 150 miles into the Mexican bush country to bring dental aid to the more isolated villages.

The Fitch-McAllister dental team traveled to Mexico in a station wagon with a car top carrier to accommodate luggage and supplies, including a portable dental drill.

During the 15 days the team actually was in Mexico they treated 85 patients, making 39 fillings and doing 102 extractions. All of this work was not completely free, though. While no charge was made the Fitches listed the payment received for services performed as, "a baby chicken, two crocheted dolls, one dozen eggs (one at a time), one bottle of gasoline, 42 pesos (\$3.36), arrowheads, flowers," and of course, "personal satisfaction."

The trip was partially sponsored by the Kiwanis Club of Plymouth, which collected a variety of items for the Fitches to give to their patients.

A few personal money contributions were made to help cover costs, and some individual acquaintances made donations of small items to be given to the poor.

Among these items was a gift of three dozen bottle openers, which the Fitches say are a very important asset in their dental work. Mrs. Fitch explained, "If they don't have an opener, they use their teeth." Most of the dental supplies

were donated by dental supply companies.

MRS. FITCH said she and her husband first became aware of the needs of some of the Mexican people several years ago when they visited Mexico as tourists.

They didn't stay in the cities during their visit because they had gone to see the archeological ruins. Mrs. Fitch said they saw the condition of the people and felt they would like to help them.

When the Fitches' church,

Where to dump the City of Plymouth's 17 daily tons of refuse after expiration of the present disposal contract in 1971 came a step closer to an answer Monday night when the City Commission voted to join five other governments in the formation of a Refuse Disposal Authority.

Plymouth expects its partners in the alliance to be Plymouth Township, Northville, Northville Township, Canton Township and Salem Township.

The two primary purposes are to develop a new mutual sanitary landfill by mid-1970 and to investigate other methods of refuse disposal, plus studying the possibilities "of working with other governmental units to meet future needs."

FAILURE to include the City of Livonia in the pact precipitated objections by Commissioner Arch Vallier, which almost led to a stalemate.

A resolution that action on the favorable report from the Refuse Disposal Study Committee be tabled lost on a 3-3 vote for lack of a majority.

Vallier and Commissioners James Houk and Peter Schweitzer voted to table, but were opposed by Commissioners Robert Smith, William Silvis and James McKeon, acting

mayor in the absence of Mayor James Jabara.

On the motion to adopt the six-community alliance, Schweitzer jumped to the affirmative, leaving Houk and Vallier alone in a 4-2 decision.

In his protest, Vallier declared, "I question whether these six governments are big enough to run a successful landfill. I am not in favor of leaving Livonia out, and without Livonia it may still be a one-horse-shay operation."

CITY MANAGER Richard Blodgett told the commission that an incinerator-type operation is not feasible at this time and that the problem of finding proper disposal sites for refuse has become a nationwide worry.

"A mutual landfill would be our most economical way of disposal until we run out of sites," said Blodgett, and in this he was backed by McKeon who called the landfill course a "stop-gap until we can provide a new means for disposal."

At the present time the residential refuse from the six entities included in the new pact is estimated at 86.8 tons per day, but this is expected to increase to a daily average of 174.8 tons by 1980.

Claim Settled, P&A Theatre Will Be Razed

Unanimous approval for the demolition of the fire-gutted P&A Theatre on Penniman Ave. plus authorization for Plymouth to join the Western Wayne County mutual fire emergency pact both were voted by the City Commission Monday.

The commission accepted a settlement of \$15,059 from the Globe Insurance Co. on the theatre structure as a result of the disastrous fire last Jan. 7.

In its resolution, the commission also instructed municipal administrators to advise realtors and industrial developers of the availability of the property for business and professional development. This appeared to rule out the prospect that, when vacated, the land will be converted to parking usage.

The action also killed hopes of a local civic committee to turn the insurance pay-off into a theatre preservation fund for the restoration of the building

as a youth cultural and recreational site.

IN ASKING approval of the fire fighting pact, Chief George Schoeneman told the commission, "It's a good agreement and I have no reservations about it."

He explained that under terms of the agreement Plymouth will work in consort with Detroit and 16 other Wayne County fire fighting units in times of emergency.

"When our help is needed elsewhere we would send a pumper and as many men as we could spare," he said, "and in turn we would receive the same cooperation from all the others if needed here."

Under terms of the agreement, each government participating in the mutual aid agreement will be responsible for the wages of its own firemen and the maintenance of its own equipment, even when used to help a neighboring community.

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Little Maria Okay With New Heart

HOUSTON, TEX. -- Maria Giannaris, 5, of Hagerstown, Md. became the second child in the world to receive a transplanted heart. The Sunday operation lasted almost two hours. The girl is reported to be in satisfactory condition in Texas Children's Hospital.

The heart transplant was performed by a team headed by Dr. Denton A. Cooley. The girl had been a heart patient for several months.

WASHINGTON -- A national task force has recommended stepped-up federal and private efforts to combat use of cigarettes and "stem the rising tide of early deaths and disabilities associated with smoking."

Among the recommendations of the task force to the U.S. Surgeon General:

Tighter restrictions on cigarette advertising and promotion; Better instruction in schools to influence youngsters to refrain from smoking;

Greater antismoking efforts by doctors and other health professionals;

Use of group approaches to prevent or reduce smoking;

More insurance plans which give reduced rates to non-smokers; and

Development and promotion of safer cigarettes.

The report was immediately attacked by the Tobacco Institute as a "shockingly intemperate defamation of an industry which has led the way in medical research to seek answers in the cigarette controversy."

LANSING -- The Michigan Legislature last week wrapped up details of a new constitutional measure which is likely to increase lawmakers' salaries next year.

The action was to pass legislation putting into effect a State Officers Compensation Commission approved by the voters as a constitutional amendment at the primary election two weeks ago.

WASHINGTON -- The U.S. balance of payments position in the second quarter of the year was the best it has been in two years, the government reported last week.

Much of the gain shown by the figures was due to special factors, however, officials said, indicating that the basic situation was much more the same as that for the first quarter.

The dollar-drain slowed to about \$150 million during the April-to-June quarter.

This was a sharp reduction from the first quarter when the figure was \$660 million.

LANSING -- Both chambers of the legislature have declared their hostility to what some lawmakers claim is "lowering of standards" in a new move to recruit non-white state police troopers.

In separate actions the House and Senate passed almost identical resolutions expressing "deep concern" and "strongly advising against" the alleged "lowering of standards."

The plan as described by legislators is to recruit equal numbers of white and black trooper candidates who previously failed to pass the written examination, give them oral and physical exams and then recruit school training and measure the results by performances in school and later on the job.

ANNAPOLIS, MD. -- The resignation of Maryland Gov. Spiro T. Agnew's only black staff member has underlined a top Republican black adviser's contention that party leaders fear black dissatisfaction is fermenting within the GOP.

Dr. Albert Ware, Agnew's liaison with the black community, said in a telegram of resignation that he was concerned over the governor's comments on "broad and vital questions of social justice."

LANSING -- Gov. George Romney said that he and other state officials have worked out what they believe is an acceptable agreement with the State Nursing Home Association to save medical patients in Michigan nursing homes from possible eviction.

He said details of the plan were being worked out and when finalized would be made public.

AUSTIN, TEX. -- President Lyndon Johnson, less than two weeks away from his 60th birthday, has been given a clean bill of health by his doctors.

Johnson's personal physician, George Burkley, said that on the basis of X-rays taken he feels "there's been no significant change in the president's physical condition since the 1966 X-rays."

CHICAGO -- Plans for an anti-Vietnam war demonstration in Chicago at the same time the Democrats hold their convention next week have been modified because of concern of police reaction to mass nudity.

A notice was posted in a Windy-City pub asking for volunteers to march in a "bare breasts for peace brigade" on Aug. 26.

Much to the noticers' surprise, Worthly N.L. Burbank Jr., a 35-year-old writer and opponent of the war, who started the movement as a joke, received calls from more than 30 willing women who said they would march and would recruit others to join in the fun.

LONDON -- The 7,500 word encyclical "Humanae Vitae" (of Human Life) which was published July 29 has received its most enthusiastic support from the hierarchies of Poland, South America and Southern Europe, a survey by correspondents of the New York Times in various countries has disclosed.

The survey also disclosed the following:

Predictions of substantial numbers of defections from the church as a result of the ruling have thus far proved erroneous.

Most clergymen who have been outspoken critics of the encyclical have not been disciplined by their superiors.

In at least one case the publicity surrounding the encyclical has led to an increase in the use of birth control pills.

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Schoolcraft, Faculty Reach Accord

Wage disputes between Schoolcraft teachers and the administration appeared headed for settlement in time for the college to open its doors, according to announcements today.

College president Eric Bradner said "there was every indication" that the contract between the school and its teachers would be ready for faculty approval Friday and board okay

next Wednesday. "I'm quite sure we will open, on time, with a full faculty," Bradner said.

He declined to release exact figures on the salary agreement. Much of the next few days will have to be spent in writing the final master agreement.

College and faculty negotiators met until 1 a.m. Tues-

day to hash out final details.

Both sides moved closer to a compromise as three things became apparent: (a.) negotiations had gone on since the beginning of the year, (b.) school opening dates were rapidly approaching (c.) a fact finder had been called in and marathon sessions with him produced new deadlines.

THEN Saturday the School-

craft Board of Trustees met in an informal meeting to discuss the situation, and apparently agreed to move from their original economic package totaling \$27,485. The teacher package had called for increased faculty wages totaling over \$390,000.

After the Saturday board meeting, matters moved amazingly fast. Board president Harold Fischer explained:

"We re-analyzed their proposal with the information gained from a financial analysis. We adjusted our offer after taking a look at the year-end cash picture of the college."

When asked to explain why negotiations took so long, Fischer said "because they began so far apart."

"Both sides had to give. We want school to open and we want to have competitive sal-

ary, especially with Washtenaw, Oakland and Henry Ford community colleges."

BOARD spokesmen would not confirm it but reliable sources said the administration wanted a two year contract to prevent prolonged negotiations next year.

The board hoped to use that as a bargaining tool with the teachers and were apparently

successful. Both sides were indicating Tuesday afternoon that there would be a two-year contract.

A Tuesday afternoon meeting was scheduled for both teams to work on specific contract language.

The hard bargaining began last Tuesday when Dr. Charles Rehms, of the State Labor Board, met with both teams. The break probably came

Wednesday when Rehms was asked by administration negotiator Kenneth Lindner for a conference on a "procedural matter."

After the conference Rehms met privately with the teachers, possibly passing on information gained from Lindner about movement in administration positions.

Then at about 10:15 p.m. Wednesday both teams returned and began hammering out an agreement. The group worked until five the next morning.

College spokesmen were cautious at week's end over certain money matters, and college board chairman Fischer had called the Saturday meeting.

Rehms had left Thursday, telling the teams that he was most likely not needed further.

The teams did not meet Friday, but bargained again Saturday evening for a short time.

They worked Monday night until 1 a.m., and announced tentative agreement by mid-morning Tuesday. A faculty ratification vote is set for Friday.

SCHOOLCRAFT is not the only school experiencing difficulty in settling teacher-administration wage disputes.

Other Observerland school districts still unsettled and facing difficulty are Garden City, Plymouth, Wayne and South Redford.

Redford Union and Farmington schools have settled, and Livonia teachers are reported very near settlement as of today.

But state mediators have entered talks in South Redford Plymouth and Garden City.

Pressure from the governor's office has been placed on slow districts. As was the case last year, Lt. Governor William Milliken has personally sent letters to 32 Wayne County districts still without contracts.

In letters to heads of bargaining teams, Milliken said that he would not become involved, but that he is determined to take "appropriate action if talks fail." He did not spell out what that would be.

Auto Show, Stars, Aerial Thrills Free At Michigan State Fair

The biggest bargain package in entertainment, information, and all-around fun will be opened at 8 a.m. Friday. It's the 119th Michigan State Fair, and it will run through Labor Day, Monday, Sept. 2.

E.J. (Jeff) Keirns, new State Fair general manager, said the emphasis is on "free" this

year. He explained that all Music Shell, Grandstand, and Coliseum big-star attractions will be free to State Fair patrons.

The lineup of such attractions is perhaps the greatest in history, with such stars as the Young Americans, Ed Ames, Arthur Godfrey, the Cowbells, Frank Sinatra Jr., and George

Kirby in the Music Shell; 15 horse shows in the Coliseum; and a smashing auto thrillshow and some of the world's best aerial performers in front of the Grandstand.

A FEATURE of opening day will be the Grand Opening Parade, which is scheduled for downtown Detroit at 10 a.m.,

with bands, floats, horses, beauty queens, twirlers and other marching units taking part. The parade will be on Woodward from the Fisher Freeway to Jefferson.

At the Fairgrounds, Eight Mile and Woodward, meanwhile, the fair itself will be in full swing, with animal judging in the Coliseum, the shrieks of youngsters on Gay Midway rides, the sniffs of visitors to the cookie and cake displays in the Community Arts Building and the swinging beat on the Teen Scene.

A record \$150,000 in premiums this year has attracted more than 20,000 entries in the various categories.

Beef cattle, dairy cattle, horses, swine, sheep, poultry, rabbits, and pigeons are among the many exhibits, along with grains, and vegetables, honey and nuts, fruit, maple syrup, and flowers.

Homemakers, craftsmen, and artists will show their wares in the Community Arts Building--from canned and baked goods to abstract paintings and sculptures.

THE TEEN SCENE will be popular with the younger set, as instrumental and vocal groups compete daily for honors. Judo and other sports events will be featured, as will career talks and information.

There will be industrial exhibits and displays from governmental units offering information and education.

Visitors even will get a chance to see the fair from the air. The Sky Glider, a 1,900-foot-long new ride five stories high, will be in operation to give patrons a panoramic view of the grounds. Helicopter rides also are being offered in the grounds.

Friday through Sunday, Aug. 23-25--The Young Americans; Gladys Knight and the Pips; the State Fair Honors Band, made up of the top high school musicians from all over the state.

Thursday through Friday, Aug. 29-30--Arthur Godfrey; the Cowbells; Tony and Carolyn. Godfrey's evening performances will be in the Coliseum horse shows and he also will perform Saturday afternoon and evening, Aug. 31, in the horse show.

Saturday through Monday, Aug. 31-Sept. 2--Frank Sinatra Jr.; George Kirby and the Gold-diggers; Ballet America.

Discover Women Better Drivers Than Men

In the age-old battle of the sexes, one of the unresolved questions has been...who are the best drivers, men or women?

Well, a recent computer study conducted by the Michigan Department of State has some bad news for the male driving population and some good news for disaff drivers, said James M. Hare, secretary of state. The study of 27,662 drivers, a sampling from a cross-section of "A" file drivers, indicates that seven of 10 women have perfect driving records while less than five men out of 10 can boast of unsullied records.

The computer probe involved both accident and violation records ranging back through the past six-year period, Hare said. "Twenty-three seems the worst age for drivers of both sexes," Hare said. "At age 23, only 19 in 100 male drivers have accident and violation-free records. On the other hand, 60 of each 100 female drivers can boast perfect records at 23."

RECORDS of men begin deteriorating at an earlier age, too, the study showed. Men begin having trouble at 18. Mid-lady, on the other hand, begins her behind-the-wheel decline at 20.

After age 23, records seem to get better for both sexes, although the records of the men never become as good as the women.

Violations are much more prevalent than accidents on both records. Some 88.8 per cent of the drivers studied were accident-free.

This compares with 59.8 per cent of the studied drivers with unblemished point records.

This means, the study concludes, that 11.2 of Michigan's drivers are responsible for all accidents. And 40.2 per cent of all drivers account for all violation convictions. The study made some other revelations. Of every 100 drivers studied, 96 who are free of violations also own accident-free records. At the one violation level, eight out of 10 drivers are without any accidents. Males constituted 15,916 of the number of persons studied. Extended, this would mean that

57.5 per cent of the drivers in Michigan are men.

ONLY TWO drivers out of the total were involved in five accidents. Only 11 had four, 68 had three mishaps, 409 were involved in two accidents, and 2,601 had one accident on their records.

Five persons had records with more than 36 points. Of these, four were involved in one accident, and the fifth was involved in two mishaps.

U-M To Seek Racial Data

ANN ARBOR--To comply with the federal Civil Rights Act of 1964, The University of Michigan will ask students to indicate their race or national origin on their registration forms this fall.

An answer to the question is not required, however, and students will be so informed at the time of registration. An information sheet, containing this fact and also telling the student that the racial data will be separately filed and will not become part of his permanent record at the University, will be distributed at registration, Vice President Allan F. Smith explained.

THE REASON for asking about racial or ethnic origin is that the federal government now requires the University to supply information on how many

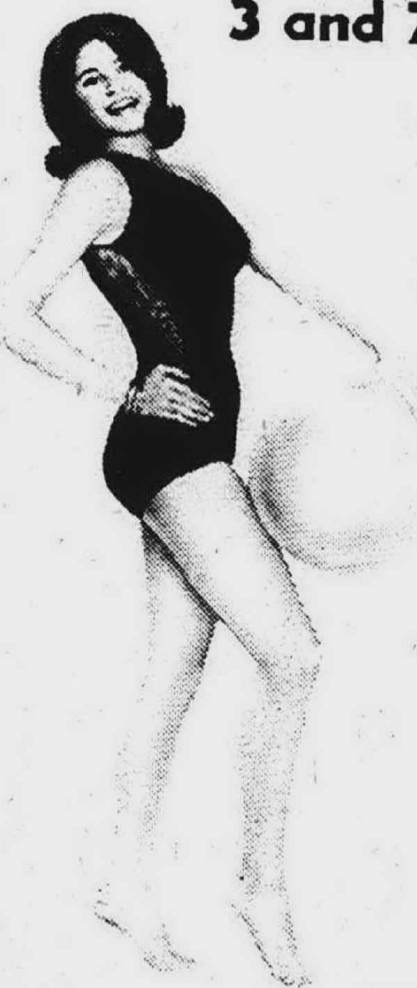

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COTTONTAIL RABBITS & SNOWSHOE HARE

The Conservation Commission at its meeting on July 12, 1968 under authority of Act 17, P.A. 1921, as amended, approved open seasons for cottontail rabbits and snowshoe hares under regulations as follows:

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Workers Get More Than Money's Worth From Social Security

Today's young workers can look forward to getting social security retirement benefits worth considerably more than the total they will pay into social security toward that retirement protection, according to Sam F. Test, District Manager of the Detroit-Northwest, social security office.

In addition, they have survivors and disability insurance under social security that may mean as much as \$75,000 to \$100,000 in payments to an individual family, should the worker die or become disabled for work before retirement.

Test said that erroneous calculations continue to circulate, purporting to show that a young worker will not get his money's worth for his social security contributions. The facts show just the opposite, he points out.

Even the group of young workers who will be paying into social security for an entire working lifetime, under the schedule of contributions now in the law, will get social security retirement benefits worth at least 15 to 20 percent more than their own contributions toward those benefits, and that includes an allowance for the interest the contributions might have earned.

"It is a practical certainty," Test said, "they will get a return even higher."

As wage levels continue to rise, he explained, income to the system increases at a faster rate than corresponding benefit liabilities. Benefits can therefore be raised without increasing the contribution rates.

"The value of your social security protection grows as the economy grows," he stressed, "unlike the usual private insurance contract which promises a fixed amount of money in return for a specified premium."

A look at the schedule of benefits and contributions in today's law assures the young worker that social security is a good investment; he can look forward to an even greater appreciation in its value.

This is true not only of his prospective retirement benefits but also of his survivors and disability protection. Specifically, the family of a young man who dies or becomes disabled will get benefits worth many times the value of his social security contributions.

AS AN EXAMPLE, Test cited the situation of a young man, who has just now started to work at age 22 and earning \$7,800 a year, the maximum amount now covered by social security.

Suppose he works and pays social security contributions

until he is 35 and then dies in an auto accident, leaving a wife, 32, and two children, one age 3 and one age 5.

His social security contributions by that time, Test said, will have amounted to \$4,790. If you add compound interest of 3-3/4 percent per year, on the assumption that he would have invested those contributions, the total would come to \$6,080.

The surviving family would upon the death of the husband and father become eligible for monthly benefits of \$434.40. The value of the benefits that would be paid over the years is about \$63,000, or more than 10 times his social security contributions up to the time of his death.

The value of this young man's disability insurance can be similarly illustrated, Test noted.

If, for example, the worker's accident resulted not in death, but in disability, the family payments including the subsequent survivors' benefits would amount to over \$65,000, if he lived on for only 5 years following his disability—much more if he survived longer.

SO YOUNG WORKERS are building survivor and disability protection for their families as they work. At the same time, they are building retirement and health insurance protection for themselves in their later years.

Relatively few will, of course, die or become disabled at age 35. And the young man earning the maximum of \$7,800 a year covered by social security will continue paying social security contributions on those earnings.

By the time he is 65, he will have paid a lifetime total of \$16,490 toward his retirement, disability, and survivor benefits -- if one adds compound interest of 3-3/4 percent, \$39,700.

With an average life-expectancy of 13 years more, the present male life-expectancy at age 65, and with a wife the same age entitled to wife's benefits (98 percent of the men reaching 65 today are married), the retirement benefits payable to him and his wife during their lifetimes will be worth \$42,860. This is \$3,160 more than the value of the contributions he will have paid.

The worker now middle-aged, or older will fare even better.

A man 50 years old this year, for example, who has paid social security contributions since he started work, say, in 1940, can expect to collect retirement benefits worth almost three times the value of his social security contributions.

BY THE TIME he retires at the beginning of 1983, the value of his social security contributions (counting in an allowance of interest they would have accumulated if he had otherwise invested them) will be \$13,583.

Based on average life-expectancy, and assuming again that he has a wife entitled to wife's benefits when he reaches 65, the value of their combined retirement benefits will be \$37,459.

If, on the other hand, he is among the 19 percent of men reaching 65 unmarried or widowed, the value of his retire-

ment benefits alone will be \$21,815 -- still over \$8,000 more than the value of his lifetime social security contributions.



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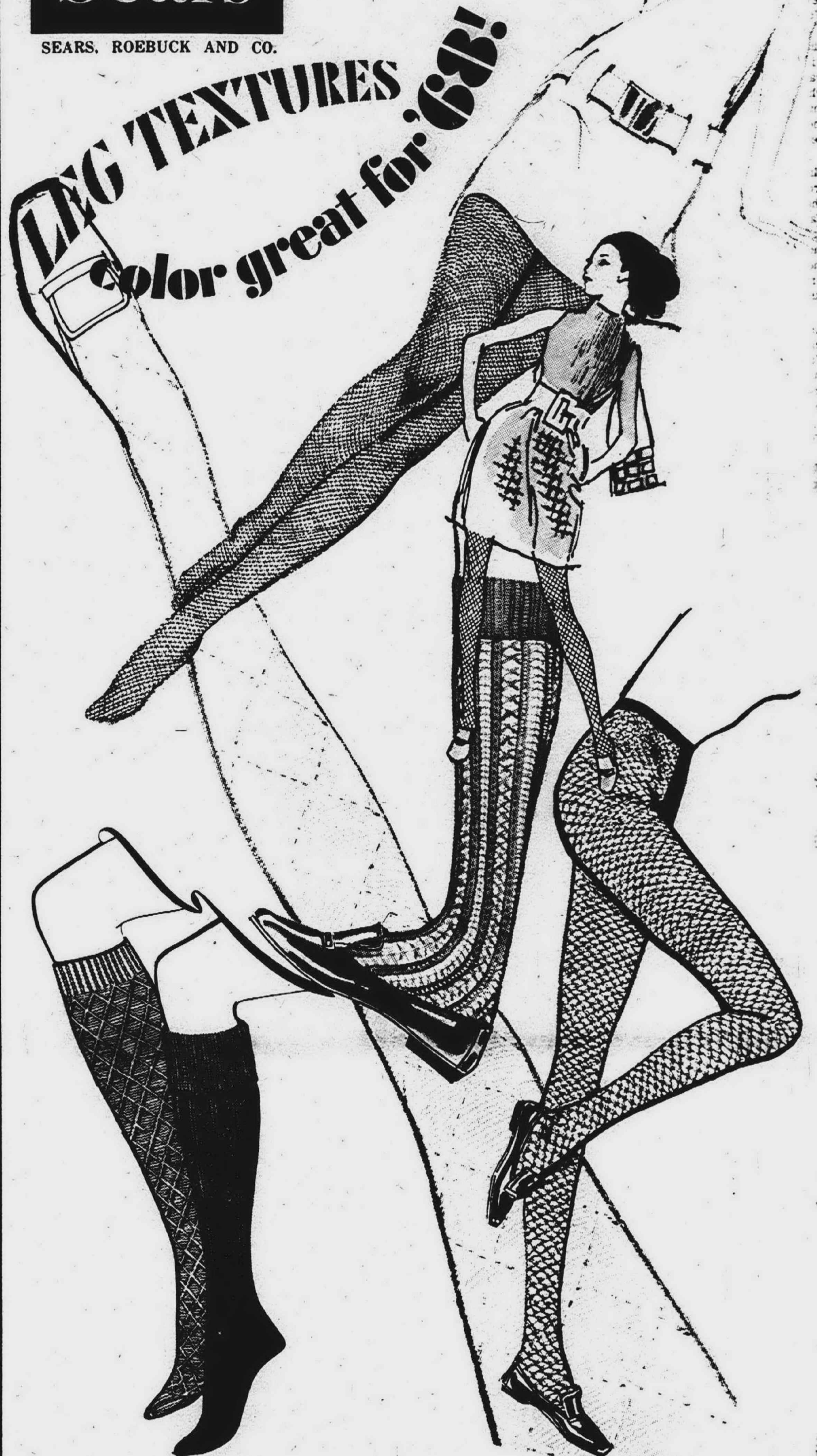

Accident Odds Are 1 In 4

If you drive, what are the odds that you will be involved in an accident on the highways during the next 12 months? About one in four, according to the Institute for Safer Living.

Odds are two out of three that the accident will occur on a straight road with one of the involved vehicles either stopped or moving slowly into or out of a lane of moving traffic. And the odds are one to eleven that as an involved driver you will either be killed or incur some disabling injury from the accident.

According to the Institute for Safer Living of the American Mutual Liability Insurance Company, most accidents are preventable because when one driver commits a driving error, he or another driver, as the case may be, fails to compensate for this error.

IN OTHER WORDS, to drive defensively and avoid preventable accidents one must be responsive to changing conditions in the mile at hand in order to be prepared to meet the hazards that will develop in the mile ahead.

The defensive driver, according to the Institute, recognizes that he is never completely free from danger. He always suspects and remains alert to detect the unexpected.

By recognizing the exposures that do exist, he is constantly planning on how he can best protect himself from them as well as from the unpredictable actions of others that could develop. A preventable accident occurs when you fail to apply yourself to your driving job in a professional manner.

Plymouth Adds Parking Areas

Downtown Plymouth motorists will find an additional 128 metered parking spaces available before the snow falls, City Manager Richard Blodgett speculated this week following approval of a \$290,000 bond issue to finance two new multiple sites.

The Municipal Building Authority received bids from four financial institutions Monday on revenue bonds, and accepted the lowest of the four to finance necessary work on the Main St. and Penniman Ave. locations.

The successful bidder was the Detroit firm of Kenower, MacArthur & Co., which offered the city a 17-year effective rate of interest of 5.02062 per cent on the total \$290,000 issue.

This compared with other interest offers of 5.02861, 5.1445 and 5.3208 per cent from other bidders.

Blodgett said work will be started before the current week is ended on tearing down the existing structures at 470 Main St. (the Wiedman building behind the Mayflower Hotel) and at 828 Penniman, a boarded-up store known as the Davis building.

Bids for surfacing the two locations will be accepted at

City Hall Aug. 28. The Wiedman lot will have a capacity for 100 cars, and the Davis lot for 28. Blodgett said he expects both to be open for motorists by Nov. 1.

Anchor Sales Boom

Libertyville, Ill. -- Anchor Coupling Co., Inc., which operates a plant at Plymouth, Mich., has announced that consolidated sales reached an all-time high for both the fourth quarter and fiscal year. Profits were up 21.2% for the fourth quarter, and down 7.1% for the fiscal year ended June 30.

Don F. Stranberg, Anchor president, said the lower earnings were due principally to effects of strikes in the automotive and construction equipment industries, and to high startup expenses in expanded production facilities during the first six months of the fiscal year. He noted that the retroactive income tax surcharge affected current earnings, helping boost fourth quarter taxes 83.6% above the same period a year ago.

Fourth quarter sales of \$11,286,000 were the highest for any quarter in the company's history, exceeding the previous high in the fourth quarter last year by 0.7%. Annual sales were \$41,536,000, edging above last year's high of \$41,521,000. Profits for the fourth quarter were \$492,000 or 40 cents per share. Earnings for the fiscal year were \$2,001,000 or \$1.67 per share.

Stranberg was optimistic about the company's performance and prospects. "Our third and fourth fiscal quarters came back strongly in both sales and earnings," he said. "Anchor's order backlog remains high. With expanded facilities and new equipment now on line, we anticipate an extended profit up-trend, and expect to see new sales records set."

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GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING USE AND OCCUPANCY OF STATE LANDS OTHER THAN STATE PARKS AND RECREATION AREAS

The Conservation Commission, at its meeting on May 10, 1968, under authority of Act 17, P.A. 1921, as amended, and Act 280, P.A. 1965, hereby orders that for a period of five years beginning September 1, 1968, use of the state-owned lands and waters within the areas described below is prohibited, except under the following rules in addition to the General Rules and Regulations Governing Use and Occupancy of State Lands Other Than State Parks and Recreation Areas:

Beginning September 1, 1968, use of the state-owned lands and waters within the areas described shall be in accordance with rules 4 and 5, in addition to the general rules governing state lands other than state parks and recreation areas.

Pointe Mouillee State Game Area, Wayne and Monroe counties:
Town 5 south, range 10 east - Sections 24, 25, 26, 35, and 36.
Town 5 south, range 11 east - Sections 20, and 21.
Town 6 south, range 10 east - Sections 1, 2, and 11.

On the state-owned lands in the described areas in rule 3, no person shall:
Hunt or shoot from any dike, road, trail, or safety zone posted against such use.

Enter any area posted "Wildlife Refuge - Do Not Enter" without proper written permission.

Enter any area posted "Retrieving Zone Only - No General Entry" except to retrieve downed game, lawfully taken.

On any area posted "State Game Area - Hunting by Permit only," construct or use a shooting pit or construct, erect, or use a blind other than a temporary one constructed of herbaceous vegetation such as cattails or one that is readily portable and is removed at the end of the person's daily hunt; except those pits or blinds located and constructed by the department of conservation for public use.

Possess or use firearms during the period from the end of the rabbit season to the opening date of the migratory bird hunting season on any area posted against such use, without proper written permission.

Camp, except on designated areas.

Trap on any area posted "State Game Area - Hunting by Permit Only," without proper written permission.

Fish on any area posted against such use.

Use a motorboat, airboat, or amphibious vehicle on any area posted "State Game Area - Hunting by Permit Only," without proper written permission.

Enter onto those state-owned lands and waters posted "State Game Area - Hunting by Permit Only" during any period(s) of the waterfowl hunting season specified by the director of conservation, except under authority of a valid written permit issued by a designated representative of the department of conservation as follows:

A permit shall be of two parts: (1) a form which is properly filled out by the hunter and then validated by the department of conservation; and (2) in their "permit only" area. No person shall hunt in any location other than that specified on his permit.

The director of conservation is authorized to determine the number of permits to be issued in total and per hunter. No person shall apply for more than the number of permits so authorized per hunter.

Each permittee shall return his permit within the time period as designated for the area covered by his permit, following the time his permit expires; and if so directed on his permit, shall present for examination all game taken and shall furnish other information about his hunting as may be requested.

The director of conservation is authorized to determine the daily hunting hours; the permissible gauges of shotguns, shot shell loadings, and number of shells in possession; and the rules governing the possession and use of dogs.

Proper written permission" as used in this rule means a written permit issued by the director of conservation or his authorized representative.

Violation of any rule or failure to perform any act set forth in the rules is punishable by a fine of not more than \$100 and costs of prosecution, or by imprisonment in a county jail for not more than 90 days, or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Marathon Session—A Pointless Ruse

The scheduled opening of classes at Schoolcraft College (on Aug. 29) and at area public and parochial schools after Labor Day brings up a point that we feel many have overlooked.

There is a distinct possibility that the opening may be delayed, principally because the school boards and teachers haven't been able to come to contract terms after months of negotiations.

All of which brings up another puzzling question. Why is it that the negotiating teams, representing school boards and teachers, have to delay until the very last minute in getting down to the money issues?

At the moment, Schoolcraft College has just reached an agreement that will have to go to the Board of Trustees and the Faculty Forum for ratification.

Plymouth, Garden City, South Redford, Wayne and Livonia are still in the throes of negotiating and although apparently within dollars of a settlement, none from any team can predict an early accord with any degree of confidence.

The Schoolcraft negotiations appear to follow a pattern that seems to follow all negotiations between administration and teachers.

It goes something like this. Meetings are called shortly after the first of the year for preliminary discussions. Then intermittent sessions are held during which proposals are made first by one side, then a delay until the other side studies the situation and makes a counter proposal.

There isn't any hurry by either group.

Then with the college year and the public school terms rapidly nearing the end, the negotiations are speeded up. But by this time each team has made some utterly impossible proposals and counter offers.

The situation is entirely stymied. A deadlock is reached and now the negotiators are beginning to get nervous and a mediator is called in. He doesn't get far for the simple reason that neither group will move from its still-impossible stand.

So, the matter is referred to a fact finder—although in most instances, neither group will agree to be bound by his proposals.

Then, and this happens in every case, the negotiators go into a much-advertised marathon session. It appears as if they want their constituents and union

members to know that they are ready for a last-ditch session.

In every instance the marathon meetings are closed to the public and it is just as well. The public most certainly would get an idea that there was a great deal of cloak and dagger doings.

There's a general meeting of both groups. Then each goes into a separate caucus with the fact finder moving from one to the other—he must accomplish something for the air of mystery gets heavier and heavier.

This kind of nonsense goes on for hours, as many as 14 in the case of Schoolcraft, when the now thoroughly tired negotiators leak a bit of information that some progress has been made.

Back to the bargaining table some six hours later for another seven or eight hour confab—again a leak that something is doing.

This goes on for another three or four days and then a joint statement is issued that an accord has been reached but no details can be announced until the proposed contract has been ratified by both groups.

So after eight and a half months of talking, the public, which actually pays all the bills via taxes, is still in the dark.

The point we are trying to stress is that it's about time the administrations and representatives of the teachers' group learn some of the fine points of negotiations.

There isn't any need for marathon sessions. There isn't any need for bargaining to stretch over periods of months—why can't the teams be honest from the very beginning and place proposals on the table that are realistic instead of waiting until the very end for 14 and 16 hour sessions?

We have never heard of anyone coming out of a lengthy meeting feeling anything but grumpy and annoyed—that kind of attitude isn't apt to be conducive to a give-and-take proposal.

There isn't any need for marathons. There isn't any need for eight-and-a-half-month-long bargaining. The ones involved in these sessions are supposed to be intelligent, supposed to have a complete knowledge of the issues they are discussing.

It's high time they began acting that way instead of announcing marathon sessions to get the public eye.

- That welfare inspectors who raid the homes of aid recipients in the middle of the night be treated as housebreakers.

- That slumlords—many of whom operate in open contempt of the law—be treated as the simple criminals that they are rather than be given the protection of government.

I COULD GO ON, but a few steps like these could contribute substantially to the restoration of law and order in our society.

I realize that these suggestions aren't precisely what many in the white community have in mind when they call for law and order, but I, for one, would feel a lot safer walking the streets at night if they were carried out.

Observerland Democrats, having watched the Republicans pour the compromise pabulum of Spiro T. (Who?) Agnew over their collective heads in Miami Beach, will be heading off to Chicago this weekend to engage in their own foolishness.

Somehow, in this year of the big political surprise, it seems terribly disappointing that the only genuine excitement generated by either convention has to do with the choice of the vice presidential nominee.

The office of Vice President, once characterized by former VP John Nance Garner as "not

worth a bucket of warm spit," has never been a particularly big deal in American politics. Who remembers, for example, the guy who ran with Goldwater? William E. Miller?

Who will remember Spiro T. Agnew? Who wants to?

I suppose John Kennedy's inspired selection of Lyndon Johnson to be his running mate at the 1960 convention brought out the modern significance of the vice presidency as a political tool. It seems reasonably clear that Johnson's effective campaigning in the South was at least partly responsible for JFK's whisker-thin margin over Nixon.

But nobody seriously argues that Agnew is going to do the same thing for Nixon.

In fact, all the attention devoted to the vice presidency lately merely serves to confirm the sad truth that our two major political parties, after much huffing and puffing, succeeded in bringing to the fore two men—Nixon and Humphrey—whose chief impact on the electorate has been to induce massive boredom.

No wonder the polls are worried about Wallace. No wonder we hear talk about fourth, fifth and sixth parties.

NIXON'S CHOICE of Agnew left Michigan Republicans a little stunned and the state's Democrats overjoyed. "Spiro T. Who?" was the happy remark exchanged on the telephone by Democrats chatting about the GOP session, and Observerland Republican delegates were hard put to produce a convincing line that Agnew was just what they really needed all along.

Unless one accepts totally the theory that the Southern conservatives dictated Nixon's choice, it's hard to see what he saw in Agnew. He won't help stop the Wallace tide in the South; he will turn off the Negroes and the big city vote which has been the backbone of past Democratic strength.

Assistant Managing Editor Tim Richard, who covered the GOP convention for this newspaper, has a theory that Agnew will run well in the suburbs. The Maryland governor's long experience as chief executive of Baltimore County, Richard argues, will pay big dividends as Nixon tries to capture the swarming suburban vote with proposals advanced by a man who knows at first hand the problems of the suburbs. Richard thinks Agnew is a sleeper.

Maybe.

My own feeling is that Nixon chose him for two main reasons: (1) To push a modified "southern strategy" by picking up votes from the border states—Maryland, West Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, Missouri, Arkansas. Nixon needs these votes to put together with his strength in the West and (Wallace failing) the South. (2) Nixon simply didn't want a man on the ticket, such as New York Mayor John Lindsay, whose glamour and charisma would overshadow himself.

MOST OF THE speculation about the Democratic convention centers on the matters of HHH's choice for VP.

In that connection, one of the bigger bubbles of this political year needs bursting.

South Dakota's Senator George McGovern announced the other day that he was a candidate for the presidential nomination. A lot of people seem to be taking him seriously.

Nonsense.

The inside speculation is that what he's really after is the vice presidency. And he's chosen a nifty way to go after it.

An announcement for the Presidency brings him all kinds of buildup in the news media. It gets him millions of dollars of free TV time. It makes his name better known than Spiro T. (Watch the way the Republicans have already started calling him "Ted.") He's a dove on Viet Nam, and he's the favorite of the Kennedy supporters who have been aimless ever since Robert Kennedy was shot. He offers HHH a route to the left wing of his badly disunited party.

In fact, it all seems so neat that I have a theory (totally without evidence) that what actually happened was that Humphrey asked McCarthy if he would take the number two spot and was refused.

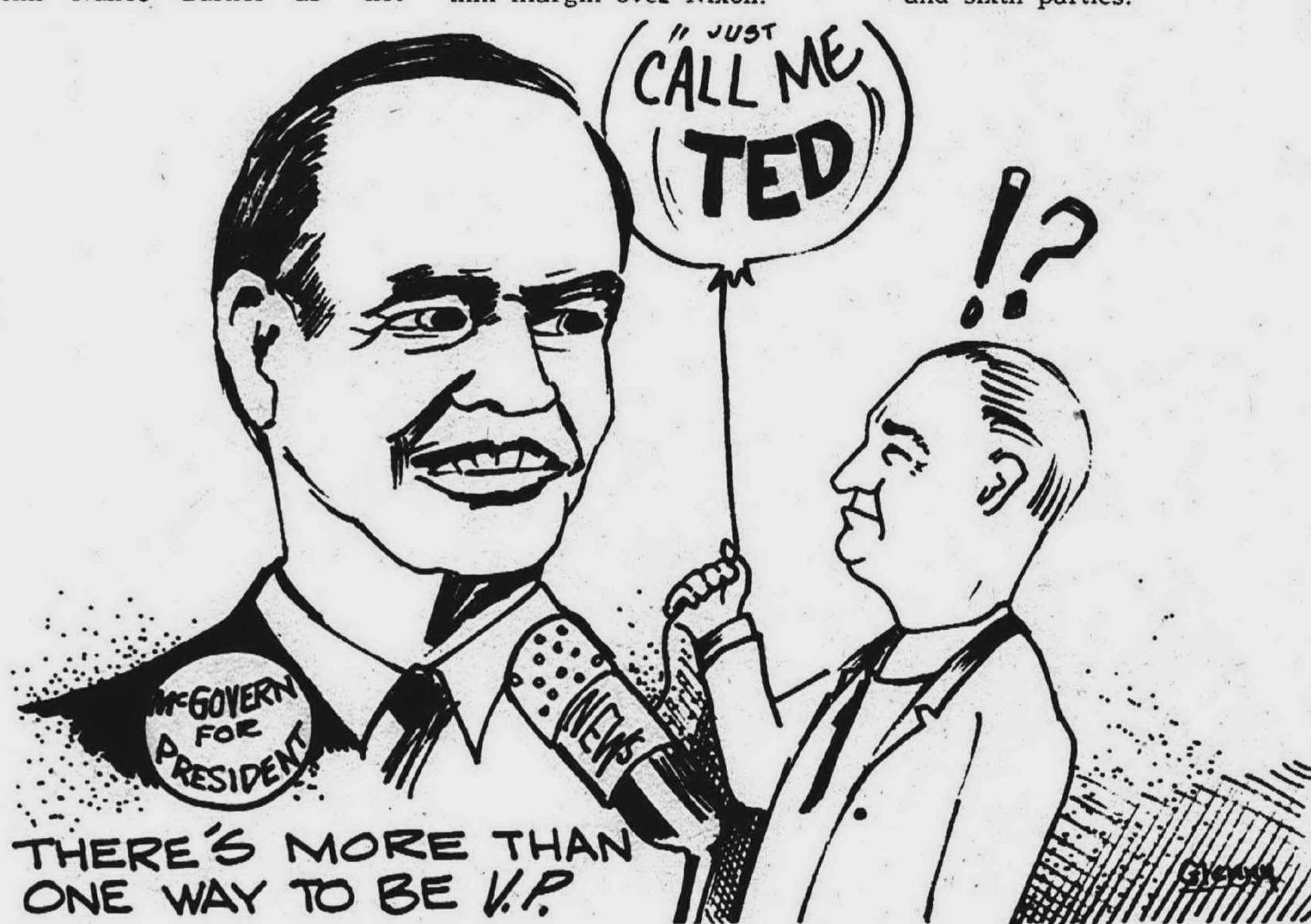
HHH then encouraged McGovern to declare for the presidency, thus hurting McCarthy's chances with the ex-Kennedy people and building up the Dakota guy in the national press, with the clear intention of offering him the vice presidential nomination when all the shouting is over.

Main objection to this theory from my Democratic friends is that the Humphrey campaign has so far been so unimaginative and goody that such a strategy is simply out of character.

Could be, but I still think when the Democrats come back from Chicago they'll be pushing a Humphrey-McGovern ticket.

In that and other forms, it is a revolution of the mind and will and of the spirit.

A few years ago Dr. Clark Kerr, of UCLA, Berkeley, said students were the darlings of the Establishment because they felt nothing, dreamed no dreams and enthroned ennui.

No more, folks. The kids are growing beards and smoking pot, they're setting fire to administration buildings and locking the president out of his office. Terrible, right?

So the middle-agers wring their hands and ponder what's happening to the younger generation, just like parents have mourned for generations.

THE GREATER TRAGEDY is the generation-gap and the hopelessness of solution.

But there is a great hope in it all, too. The kids, for the first time in decades, are interested and aware. They're unwilling to accept social clichés. They want a voice, even if they have to toss bricks through windows and wear their hair down to here.

They're reversing the old saw about training a donkey. First you hit it between the eyes with a two-by-four. That gets his attention.

The beards, the funny eyeglasses and the general irrever-

ence for their elders—they're trying to hit us between the eyes, and that's good.

But what are the adults doing about it?

They're passing laws and sneering mostly, using the only weapons they have. The theory is that anyone who is different or who has a fresh idea must be a mite strange.

You know adults are still in control of the nation's social institutions when neither major

political party is considering seriously anyone under 52 as the nation's next president.

Republicans have nominated Richard M. Nixon, 55, for president and Maryland Gov. Spiro T. Agnew, 48, as vice president.

Democrats are going with Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, 57, and who-knows-as vice president. Senator Eugene McCarthy, 52, is still in the running against Humphrey and Senator George McGovern, 45, is a political horse so dark as to boggle the law of probability.

SENSE 'N' NONSENSE

Plymouth's water has been the subject of many complaints. Its color, taste and even its texture leave much to be desired.

Do Plymouth restaurateurs complain? No, they simply serve it in amber colored drinking glasses.

We live in a wonderful age where even allergies can be checked by shots and drugs. One such victim of an allergy was a pleasant young fellow selling produce in his dad's farm market.

After selecting corn and peaches, the startled customer was asked, "Would you please put them in the bags? I'm allergic to corn and peaches."

The insured who came through an accident with battered back and found the Automobile Club's insurance division not only willing to pay for car repairs, but for doctors and medicine—while the responsible driver's employer dilly-dallied—called the branch office for a report on progress.

"The man handling your claims isn't in," said the sweet young secretary. "Any idea when?" was the next question.

"No," she said, "you see, he's had an accident—which explains why he's away, and why we don't know when to expect him back."

"You mean accidents happen to insurance claims adjusters?" "Sure," she said. "We're people, too."

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Esch Claims Waste

"At long last there is wide-spread recognition that the federal government is inefficient; that its programs are uncoordinated and overlapping; that funds are wasted through duplication of functions in numerous different departments throughout the government," claimed Rep. Marvin L. Esch, Second District Republican Congressman, this week.

"This realization has at last been accepted by members of both parties and it is recognized that it is high time that the Congress and the Administration do something about it," said Esch, who continued:

"The examples of government overlapping and duplication are numerous. There are, for instance, 56 water conservation and control programs spread among seven different executive departments and agencies. There are over 470 education programs spread among 20 executive agencies and departments and numerous divisions of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

"There are 69 manpower training and vocational education programs spread among the Office of Education, the Social and Rehabilitation Service, and seven other departments and agencies. There are 74 economic and business development programs spread among 10 separate departments and agencies and there are 43 programs relating to child health and welfare spread among the Public Health Service, the Office of Education, the Social and Rehabilitation Service, the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Defense, the Office of Economic Opportunity and the Veterans Administration.

"FACED WITH such overlap and duplication, it is little wonder that funds which come to Washington in taxes get used up and wasted in administrative and bureaucratic expenses. It is little wonder that any individual or local government dealing with the federal government is frustrated and confused about the programs which might affect his specific difficulty.

"In fact, with over 1900 separate programs dispersing aid in various forms to state and local governments and individuals it is something of a wonder that as many constructive things are accomplished as are.

"To meet this ever-growing problem of bureaucratic duplication, I have introduced legislation to create a new, bipartisan 'Hoover-type' commission. Over 110 members of Congress have joined in the introduction of this legislation to provide for an over-all study of governmental functions and programs.

"This commission would be charged with the responsibility of exposing government waste and recommending new structures within the government to handle problem areas. At the same time, it would be required to examine the inter-relationship of federal programs to similar programs on state, county, regional and local levels. It would explore the use of public and semi-private corporations as a means of marshaling private resources and private enterprise in helping solve today's complex problems.

"THERE IS a growing realization that the Federal government simply does not have the financial resources to undertake all the programs and ideas that are desirable. In order to marshal our resources effectively, we must be willing to set priorities on a rational and factual basis.

"This commission would be charged with the responsibility of establishing government-wide criteria to assist Congress in determining the relative priority for federal programs and activities in accordance with the most important national needs and goals.

"That our government needs reorganization is an established fact and that reorganization must take place on the most rational and factual basis possible. The establishment of a bi-partisan commission will assure that facts, not political considerations, are most important in the recommendations set forth.

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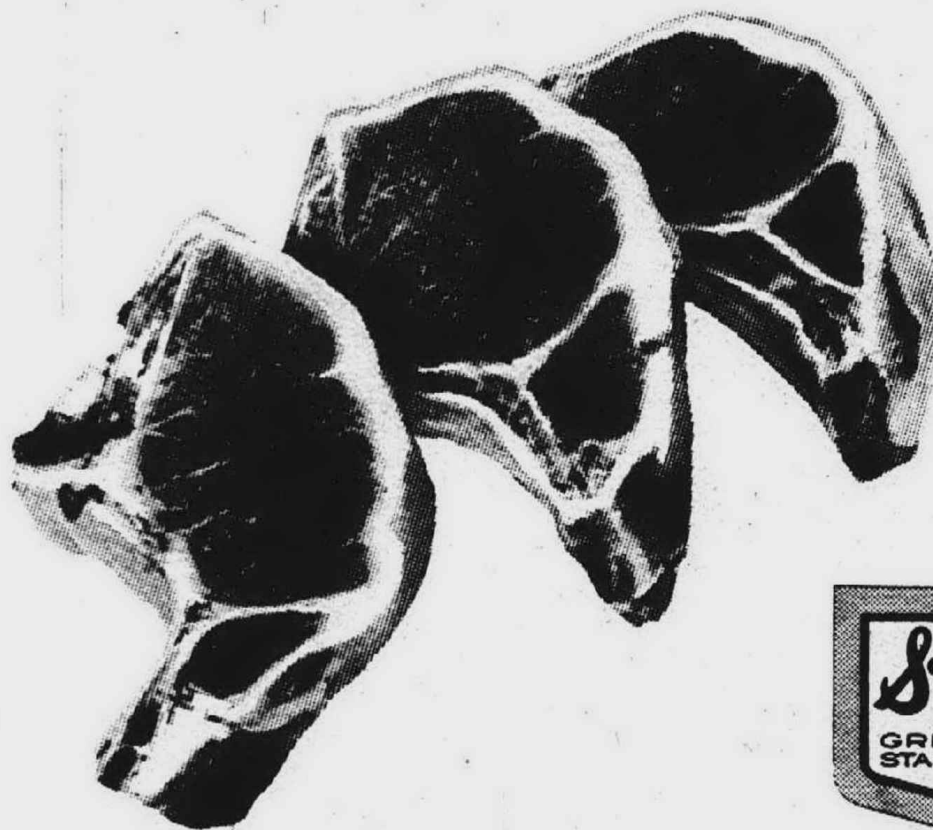

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Lawmakers Like Emergency Powers Ruling

Suburban lawmakers are quietly happy over Attorney General Frank Kelley's ruling that local communities may declare states of emergency under the Home Rule Act.

Although Kelley warned that such emergency action could result "in a crazy quilt" response to crisis, at least three

legislators in Observerland disagreed.

"The mayor or supervisor is much closer to emergency situations," George Bennett, Democrat from 34th Redford District said. "The local officials should be in a position to place the curfew on immediately. What happens when the

Governor is out of town, and the Lt. Governor can't be reached?"

(The Watts riot simmered for hours before action at the governor's office could begin; he was not immediately available when the first call for assistance came in.)

Bennett added that the "governor erred" in the issue when

he vetoed the law which would have put the power into the hands of local officials. A vote to override the veto failed during last week's two-day session as many lawmakers were absent.

The issue had passed with enough votes the first time but many of them evaporated in the face of the governor's veto.

KELLEY said in his opinion that where conflict develops, the governor's decision overrides local actions.

Kelley said cities most likely should enact ordinances detailing specific powers, rather than relying on the blanket police powers inherent in home rule charters.

"The validity of the underlying ordinance of the home rule city or other local community, is founded upon the constitutional and statutory rights of home rule cities to protect the health and welfare of their citizens in emergency is strongly supported by Michigan law, and by the public interest in reciprocal and cooperative enforcement of state police power in times of emergency by their state and city officials acting together," Kelley said.

Kelley noted that while his legal opinion would have to support local curfew rights, his own personal judgment as "chief law enforcement officer of the state" was that a "full scale response, coordinated by the state," would be wiser.

REPRESENTATIVE James Tierney (D, 36th District - Garden City, Plymouth) echoed Bennett's opinions.

"I was a local official for many years and it was always our understanding that police powers granted in the home rule charters gave us the authority to protect the health, safety and welfare of our citizens," Tierney said.

The lawmaker added that "natural or man-made" disasters should be handled immediately.

The bill giving local authorities power would have included counties.

State Senator George Kuhn (R, 14th District - Plymouth, Farmington, Livonia) said he

would try to pass a local emergency bill again in January when the legislature convenes.

"In the meantime, I'm urging local communities to pass their own ordinances, Detroit has one, as does Dearborn Heights."

But the state still needs a uniform law, like the governing city income taxes, Kuhn said. Kuhn said that the Michigan Municipal League and the Michigan Sheriff's Association were putting pressure on lawmakers to get the bill in the next session.

The senator added he would try to draft a new law to meet Governor Romney's objections on the "confusions and conflicts he claims might exist."

New Residents May Vote For President

New Michigan residents who have not met the six-month residency requirements are still eligible to vote Nov. 5 for president and vice president.

They will be restricted from voting for local candidates, however.

Michigan law says that you must live here six months to be classified an official resident prior to any election. This means that you would have to have been living here on or before April 4, 1968 to vote in November.

Edward Adamczuk, senior clerk for the Detroit Election Board, said that for the first time in Michigan national-election history, provisions have been made to avoid disfranchising anyone of his right to vote for president and vice president.

NON-RESIDENTS of Michigan, he explained, must apply to the state they moved from and get an affidavit proving they would have been eligible to vote there.

They then bring this affidavit to the election headquarters in their new home town. They will not be registered, he said, but they will receive a special ballot they will use on election day at that particular office.

The township or city clerk is the chief election officer in any town and is the person to contact.

ONCE THE PERSON affirms he was eligible to vote in his former state, he will be allowed to vote at the election headquarters in his new town. He won't be registered, the clerk said; if the person moves from out-of-state into

Michigan after Oct. 4, however, he will not be permitted to vote.

If someone moves after Oct. 4 within his city—but not out of it—he can go back to his old precinct. After the election his records will be forwarded to his new precinct and from then on he will vote there.

Adamczuk said if someone moves within the state—but not out of it—he must secure an affidavit that he moved after the registration deadline at his old precinct and then vote there also.

Michigan has never made provisions for persons who move here after the residency deadline for a national election and, Adamczuk said, the procedure is still in the experimental state.

Wayne County Seeks Human Relations Chief

Groundwork has been completed by Wayne County officials for the first Office of Human Relations at the county level in Michigan.

The office, which is being established to promote non-discrimination in the recruitment and promotion of county

employees, is expected to open late this year, following the hiring of a director for the office.

The Wayne County Civil Service Commission is accepting applications until Aug. 30. Salary for the new director of human relations has been set at \$17,961, matching that of the secretary-director of the Detroit Commission on Community Relations, as of July 1, 1967, because the responsibilities are similar.

Basic qualifications include a bachelor's degree with a major in social sciences, education, psychology or a closely related field, plus at least four years of administrative experience in social casework, group social work, public relations work, personnel, or human relations work.

Establishment of the Office of Human Relations was recommended by the Michigan Civil Rights Commission. The state agency studied Wayne County employment patterns at the request of the County Board of Supervisors.

Initially, the director and a secretary will be the only office personnel.

To Publish 'Poverty' Collection

A revised edition of "Poverty in America," a collection of more than 40 articles by a variety of experts, will be published Aug. 30 by the University of Michigan Press.

"Poverty in America" (\$9.75 hardbound, \$5.75 paper) is co-edited by Louis A. Ferman, research director of the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations at the University of Michigan and Wayne State University.

The other co-editors are Joyce L. Kornbluh and Alan Haber of ILIR.

The book covers the major issues related to poverty.

Introduced by Michael Harrington, well known author of "The Other America," the book includes among its contributors Barry Bluestone of U-M, Charles Lebeaux of WSU, and Arthur Seagull and Charles Killingsworth of Michigan State University. Well known national figures include Sargent Shriver, Civil Rights leader Bayard Rustin, and Economist Leon H. Keyserling.

Appointed

Conrad L. Mallett, assistant to Detroit Mayor Jerome P. Cavanagh since 1966, will leave that position to become director of Wayne State University's newly established City Extension Centers effective Sept. 1. The City Extension Centers will be part of WSU's Division of Urban Extension headed by Dean Hamilton Stillwell.

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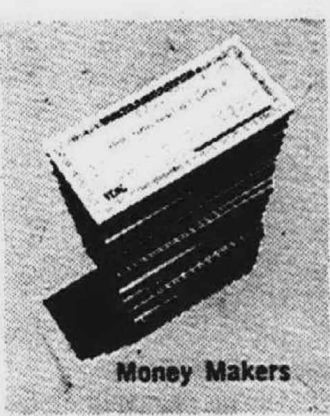
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Welcome Football! Preps To Start Drills

Redford Township Sweeps To District 'A' Crown

Manager Bill Mikel's forces swept unbeaten through the district tourney at Detroit Butzel Field to win a place in the state American Baseball Congress tournament starting Friday in Battle Creek.

Redford had to go 10 innings Monday night to nose out Detroit McCabe, 7-6, and annex the district in three straight games.

The Townshippers had downed McCabe, 6-4, in the opener, then won over Dearborn, 4-0, before finishing up against McCabe.

SOME DARING base-running by Tim Fisher broke up the game in the bottom of the tenth. There were two out when Fisher singled. He went to second on Mike Schaefer's single.

Then Jay Schwalm bounced near second. The throw to first was a little late to Schwalm.

While this was going on, Fisher tore around third and slid safely under the relay throw to the plate.

Schwalm, replacing starter Larry Salei, hurled one-hit ball during the final six innings. He fanned eight and walked only one after Salei was touched for seven hits.

Redford scored twice in the second when Brian Gilles was safe on a fielder's choice, Fisher singled and Dick Johnson doubled.

But in the sixth, Fisher reached first on a fielder's choice and came dashing around to tie the score when Mike Schaefer doubled.

Redford wound up second in the state meet last year and then followed up by gaining runner-up honors in the national regionals and world series which followed at Battle Creek.

REDFORD BEGAN the tourney by rallying for a 6-4 victory against the McCabe Aces. The big bat of Robby Masson, plus some clutch relief pitching by Chuck Viane, highlighted the victory.

Masson slugged out three singles, plus a two-run homer. Viane took over in the eighth inning and worked out of a no-out, bases-loaded situation.

Redford scored first when Tim Fisher singled in Gary Schaefer. Then in the fifth with McCabe leading, 3-2, Mike Schaefer singled, Sam Lamerato tripled and Masson homered.

G. Schaefer's double, a walk, and error and M. Schaefer's sacrifice produced two more Redford runs in the eighth.

Viane replaced Rick Berryman in the eighth with two on and none out. After the next batter beat out a bunt, Viane retired the next three without allowing a score.

THE REDFORD bats rang out for 16 hits while Tom Tanner allowed only one hit in posting a 10-3 romp against Dearborn. Dave Barth ruined

Tanner's no-hitter with a two-run single in the fifth.

Redford scored once in the fourth on hits by G. Schaefer and Brian Gilles and again

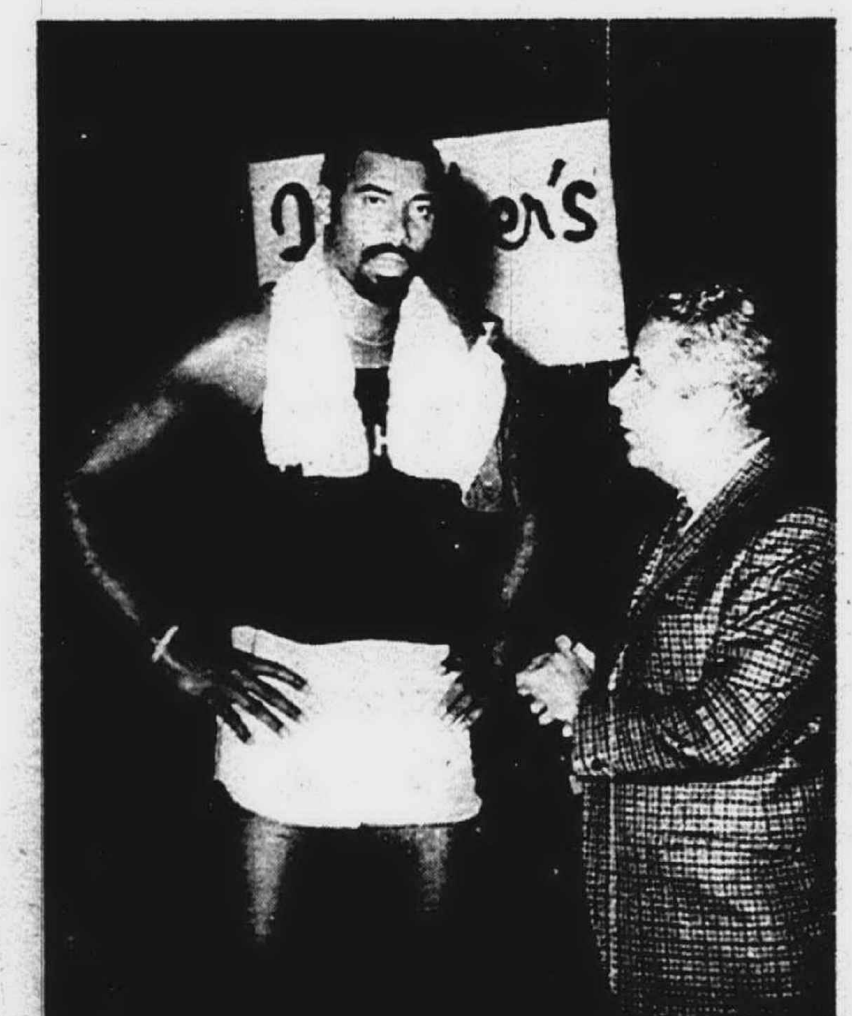

Johnson, Brown Key Men In UM's Powerful Offensive Backfield

ANN ARBOR -- Michigan's backfield is constructed in record dimensions and Coach Bump Elliott is hoping it remains that way. Spearheaded by halfback Ron Johnson and quarterback Dennis Brown, the Wolverines offer an assemblage of backs not lacking in talent or experience.

Both Johnson and Brown are among the top half-dozen players in the country at their positions, while Garvie Craw emerged as a solid fullback during his sophomore season.

THERE IS a question of depth behind this trio. Only Warren Sipp, a 210-pound Akron, O., senior, has much playing experience. He likely will under-

study Craw. Lance Scheffler and Kirby Sams are two sophomores who could develop into excellent halfback replacements, while Eric Federico, a junior, provides more insurance at fullback.

But Michigan's offense will be tied to the considerable talents of Johnson and Brown. Johnson, the first halfback to be elected Michigan's captain in more than 20 years, set an all-time school rushing record, gaining 1,005 yards. He also established an individual game figure of 270 yards against Navy, broke one Big Ten mark with 42 carries against Northwestern and tied the conference kickoff return record by handling 18 for the season.

ELLIOTT INSISTS that Johnson's unusually fine balance and remarkable strength are the keys to his running success. "Ron just isn't knocked off his feet easily," claims Elliott. "Then, too, he has de-

ceptive speed and the judgment or instinct to pick exactly the right hole." Brown came off the bench in his junior year, apparently impatient. The 175-pound Lincoln Park senior became one of the busiest quarterbacks in the country, setting two Big Ten total offense records.

His 61 plays, either running or passing the ball, against Indiana and his season total of 293 plays were all-time Big Ten highs.

BROWN ALSO completed 82 passes in 156 attempts for 913 yards and five touchdowns. His rapid development was instrumental in Michigan winning

three of its final four games. Craw, more noted for his blocking than running, still gained 101 yards, averaging 3.4 yards a carry. This 6-2, 210 pounder is a strong, hard runner, especially valuable in short-yardage situations.

Sipp, challenging for the fullback spot, turned in a fine spring. This will be only his second year at the position. Scheffler is an elusive runner with good speed, while Sams at 195 pounds is slightly larger than his sophomore running mate and has more raw speed.

JOHN GABLER, who started in the backfield last season but carried only 16 times, will be used as a wide re-

ceiver. He will be available for a running back position should injuries hit Elliott's first unit.

The quarterback situation behind Brown is untested. Don Moorhead, a rangy, 6-3 sophomore from South Haven, appears to be directly behind Brown. Elliott likes his poise.

Bill Berutti, another sophomore from Franklin, O., has developed considerably in spring drills, while Jim Betts, a third sophomore, missed spring drills with a knee injury.

John Thomas is the only senior in reserve, but this 198-pounder from Walled Lake also lacks game experience.

Historic Scoreboards Replaced At UM Stadium

ANN ARBOR -- Michigan's historic twin electrically operated scoreboards, which have

recorded Wolverines football for nearly 40 years, will be missing Sept. 21 when the University of California opens the 1968 season here.

Athletic Director Don Canham announced that a new \$75,000 complex of scoreboards 10 per cent larger, more effective and with additional information for fans, will be installed before the season opens.

The two new digital scoreboards, measuring 41 feet by 16 feet, will be placed at opposite ends of the field in positions occupied by the old boards. A third auxiliary board, double-faced and with just scoring and timing, will be constructed under the press box for fans unable to see the larger boards.

BOTH END ZONE scoreboards will include the number of timeouts left for each team and the yard line position of the ball in addition to the score, time remaining, the down, quar-

ter and yards to go for a first down.

Michigan's original scoreboards were installed in 1930, three years after the stadium was built, and were the first electrical scoreboards used as the official time. They are believed to be the first twin, electrically operated scoreboards to be installed in a college-owned stadium.

One breakdown in the timing was experienced in 1943 when Michigan was playing Notre Dame. The two teams struggled through a third period that was extended to nearly 30 minutes because of the malfunction. These scoreboards, however, recorded some of the classic football struggles over four decades.

Frank Burke, then an 18-year-old student at Michigan, sold Athletic Director Fielding H. Yost on the scoreboards. Burke, now of Berrien Springs, Springs, designed and constructed the boards and in 1938 added the time clocks at the top.

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Lions Have An 'Up' Look

When Joe Schmidt became coach of the Detroit Lions in 1967, he said there was only one way for the Lions to go: And that was up.

There also was one thing for the Lions to do.

And that was to rebuild with fresh, young talent.

In the "up" department, the Lions made small strides last season, winning more games than in the previous campaign. In the "do" category, the Lions have done what Schmidt said: They have made some drastic changes in their personnel.

IN 1967, the Lions unveiled three of the most exciting newcomers in the league--in Mel Farr, a speedy runner; Lem Barney, a cracker-jack defensive back; and Chuck Walton, a stellar offensive guard.

Now as the 1968 campaign prepares to dawn, Schmidt figures he has some more stellar rookies who'll captivate the Lions' fans and produce headaches for the Detroit club's opposition.

The Lions have come up with rookie quarterbacks Greg Landry and Gary Barton, both of whom look like they could make it "big" in the National Football League in due time.

They have added Earl McCulloch, the nation's No. 1 college hurdler from Southern California and a gent who perhaps could become the fastest man in the league.

THERE'LL BE some other new faces in Lions uniforms--although they are not new to the NFL -- when Schmidt sends his team against the Baltimore Colts in the annual Free Press Charities game at Tiger Stadium Friday night.

Bill Munson, the quarterback obtained from the Los Angeles Rams, already has been tabbed for No. 1 honors in the QB department despite the fact minor leg injury has kept him inactive so far.

Munson is the man the Lions feel will give them their most potent offense in several years. The Lions also have traded for Dave Kopay, a hard-running back from San Francisco who'll come in handy now that it appears that a knee injury may again keep Nick Eddy inactive for most of the season.

It was lunch time at Kutcher's Country Club, one of the nicest of the resort hotels in the Catskill Mountains, some 90 miles out of New York City. The occasion was the annual charity game staged in behalf of Maurice Stokes, the one-time basketball star of the Cincinnati Royals who was stricken with brain damage 10 years ago after a playoff battle with the Detroit Pistons.

Many of the biggest names in the National Basketball Association today--the Wilt Chamberlains, Dave Bings, Oscar Robertsons, Dave DeBusscheres, John Havliceks, etc., were there to do their parts in the game itself.

Present, too, were the greats of the past--men like Joe Lapchik, Nat Holman, Mac Kinsbruner. It was our good fortune to wind up along side of Holman and Lapchik at the food table, then later in between Kinsbruner and Eddie Gottlieb, the latter one of the all-time top basketball promoters.

THE SUBJECT naturally drifted backward when such oldtimers dominated the conversation. Holman and Lapchik played on the original Celtics, the first renowned professional basketball team in this country. Both later went on to college coaching and a chain of powerhouses.

Today each is near the 70-mark, but basketball still remains close to each. They spend their summers working with boys.

Kinsbruner runs the fabulous Concord Hotel, a few miles away from Kutcher's. But he can't help but remember the days when he was a member of the St. John's Wonder five.

As for Gottlieb, the National Basketball Association still relies on his "brains." He's the NBA schedule maker and the man to whom the current owners frequently look for solid advice.

THERE WASN'T MUCH we could say, sitting amidst such company.

"Yes, we played in a real cage in those days," Holman recalled.

"It was eight-foot high," chimed in Lapchik. "You needed the protection, especially when you were on the road."

The cage came down some 35-40 years ago, relates Gottlieb, but now you know why basketball players are still referred to as "cagers."

"Some of the cages were like backyard fences; some were made of nets," Kinsbruner chimed in. "It wasn't unusual for us to have our backs scraped up after a game after we bounced against and off those cages."

"Yeah, we'd look like zebras," chorused Holman.

Basketball players 40 years ago were iron men.

"We would carry six players, but only the first five would play," said Kinsbruner. "And, we'd play five and six days a week with three games usually on Sunday . . . when we'd start at 2 p.m., go again around 7 and then wind up the evening with a game at 10:30 or 11."

"We made good money, too," said Lapchik. "Of course, nothing like the pros do now, but we didn't have the big income tax to fork across."

THOSE WERE the days and the years when a road team knew it had to spot the opposition 15 or 20 points because "you knew you were in trouble with the referees" . . . when the ball was blown up with a balloon bladder and often had two or three lumps on it . . .

When no two games were played on a floor of the same size . . . when irate women fans often stuck hat pins into the backs and legs of players as they raced past . . .

When the two-hand set shot prevailed . . . when many gyms didn't have backboards, so all you shot at was the rim.

"Yes, basketball was wonderful then, but you can't compare it with basketball today," said Lapchik, who has coached the New York Knicks, St. John's of New York and other teams.

"The difference is like day and night. It all began when they started putting on big games in Madison Square Garden in New York. That's when the East and the West are united--in basketball."

The sectional aspect of basketball began to disappear and it's all gone now. Credit, too, belongs to all the clinics being staged for coaches around the country. And the interest the coaches show in attending.

"COACHES NOW GET a chance to learn from the experts. They also can exchange ideas. The biggest benefactors have to be the boys they coach. And it's certainly reflected in the way they play."

Holman and Kinsbruner nodded their heads in approval. "We thought we could shoot, but when we watch the modern players fire away . . . well, there's no comparison," said Kinsbruner.

"We always had time to set ourselves. The guys today shoot on the run, from impossible angles and with defensive players literally hanging on."

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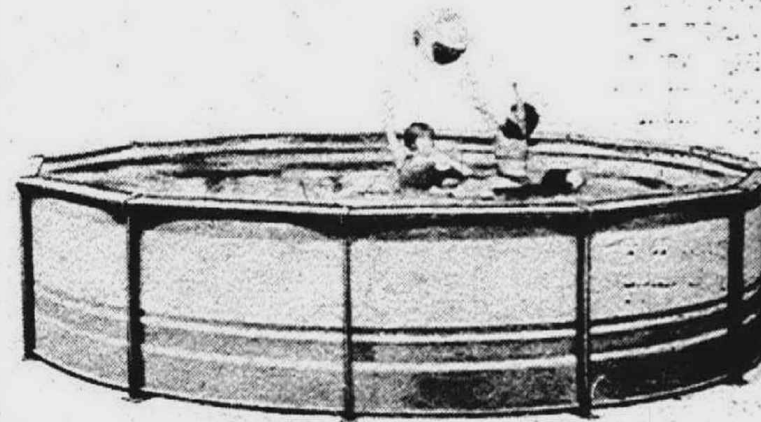

Dates for this year's Torch Drive are Oct. 15 through Nov. 7. The goal will be announced early in September.

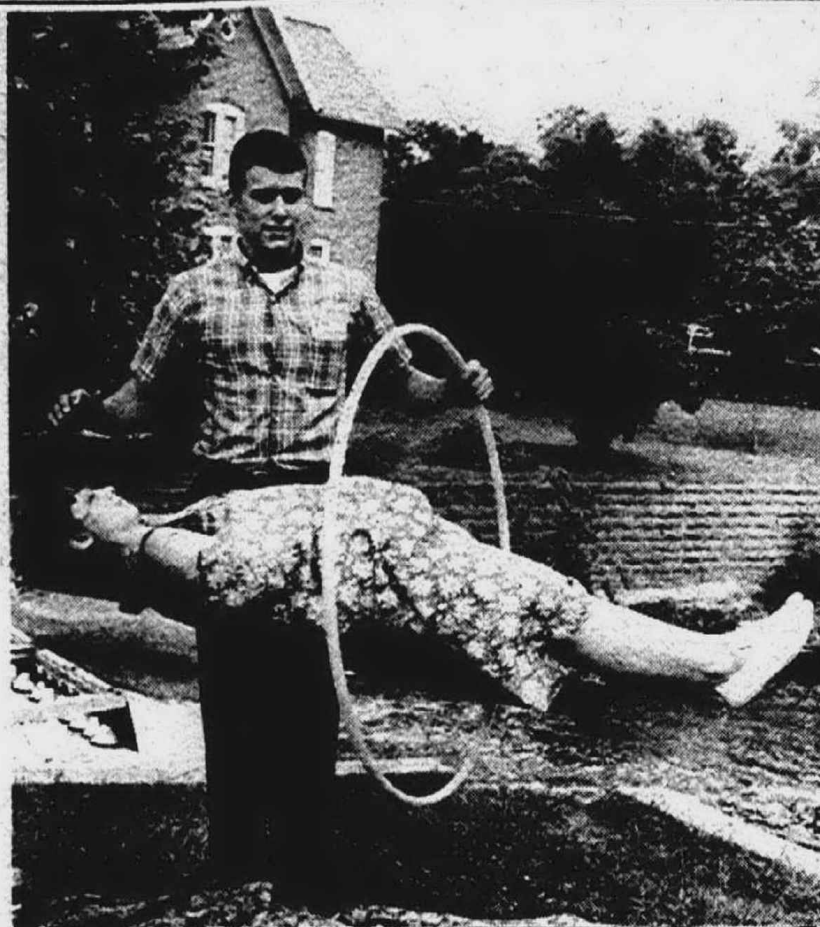

'CURTAIN GOING UP'

Historic Niagara-on-the-Lake, situated on a point of land that juts slightly out into the Niagara River as it placidly empties into Lake Ontario is the home of the annual Shaw Festival.

This quiet, quaint town of 3,000 bustles during the summer months as American tourists and Canadians from nearby Toronto visit the Shaw Festival. Now in its sixth season (June to September) the Shaw Festival is a must attraction if you go over to see the Falls. Niagara-on-the-Lake is only 15 miles north of the Falls.

Theatricality, this Festival has a greater dynamic force than Niagara and all its thunderous splendor. I'll grant you the Falls are a terrific scenic attraction and provide competition, but Paxton Whitehead, the Festival's artistic director, has given this newest of the Canadian dramatic festivals a brilliance that matches the Falls on even their best days.

THE SHAW Festival has until Sept. 1 before the Courthouse Theater closes its doors for another season. Currently, "The Chemmy Circle" is the play. Francis Hyland and John Horton, veteran members of the Stratford Shakespearean Festival company, will have leading roles. The Shaw Festival attracts many of the Stratford actors, Zoe Caldwell, Tony Van Bridge, Hugh Webster, and others have made the short Ontario journey over to the pleasant surroundings of Niagara-on-the-Lake.

Where the Stratford Festivals astound you with their munificence, two theaters worth well over four or five million dollars each, the Shaw Festival impresses you with how well they have adapted to almost impossible staging conditions. The Courthouse Theater is really a courthouse. Nine months of the year the courtroom is actively used. The jail is there. The police department and other municipal departments stay right on even during the summer months.

Mr. Whitehead has transformed the courtroom into an excellent more-than-adequate stage. The courtroom, after special platforms and chairs have been brought in, seats 400 patrons.

"HEARTBREAK HOUSE" was the production on view when old Wally visited the Shaw Festival. Tony Van Bridge as the brusque Captain Shotover piloted his cargo of talented house-guests around the shoals of boredom and brought them into a pleasurable port-of-call after three happy hours of gales of laughter.

When a Shaw play is done perfectly, the laughter so inherent in the dialogue spills out in a never-ending flow. The term, "Shavian delight," was never more apt, as this Shaw Festival Company performed "Heartbreak House" so beautifully. In less-skilled hands "Heartbreak House" can truly be a cause for real sorrow. George Bernard Shaw, always a severe critic, would have heartily approved of this production directed so expertly by Val Gielgud from England.

In a year or two, a new theater building will become a part of the historic confines of Niagara-on-the-Lake.

A Visit Beats Many Letters

A shy little Greek teen-ager and her Plymouth foster parents got together this summer after three years of letter-writing. They met in Athens, and it was the first visit to the ancient capital for both 14-year-old Ekaterini Antoniou, who lives in a mountain village, and Dr. and Mrs. Don J. Hadley.

Together they viewed the famous Acropolis and bathed in the blue Mediterranean—thus fulfilling two of the Greek youngster's greatest dreams. They also drove around Athens, dined in a restaurant, and saw a folk-dancing show.

DR. HADLEY, a psychologist in the Livonia school system, had adopted Ekaterini three years ago through the Foster Parents' Plan, Inc.

Actually, he had a foster daughter before he had a wife, and Bonnie Hadley, a Livonia school secretary who married Don in December, 1966, is just as enthusiastic as a foster parent.

They planned a visit to Ekaterini as they saved for a trip to Europe, and chose a particular National Education Association tour because it had a free day and a half in Rome.

"WE HAD MADE arrangements with the Foster Parents group," Don said, "and they brought Ekaterini and her uncle from the village of Trikala to Athens."

"They stayed in an Athens home that plays host to Foster Parents Plan children quite often—we were rather surprised to find that lots of other Americans have visited their children there."

The visit was a highly successful one, the Hadleys decided.

They were delighted to meet first-hand the little girl whose life has become so important to them, and Ekaterini, though extremely shy, seemed to enjoy the event that probably was the top excitement of her life so far.

Invaluable in making the visit go well was a long-time friend of Dr. Hadley's, Herb Ben-singer. Now working in Greece as a geological engineer, Ben-singer provided sight-seeing transportation and helped a Foster Parents representative with interpreting.

"I THINK Ekaterini enjoyed seeing the Acropolis most," Bonnie Hadley recalled. "We couldn't stay there as long as we would have liked—so much to do in so short a time—but as we were leaving she kept

turning around to look back."

The Hadleys invited their guest to their hotel room to give her some presents they had brought—a watch and a rosary and a dress Don's mother had made.

"Bonnie started to hold the dress up to her so I could take a picture," Dr. Hadley related, "and before we knew it she was slipping off the dress she wore to put on the new one. Then she insisted on wearing it as we went out on the town."

THE HADLEYS also took gifts to Ekaterini's family, her mother and three brothers and two sisters who live in a three-room mountain home.

"We had U of M sweatshirts for the boys," Dr. Hadley said. "I'll have to write now and explain what that big M means."

The Plymouth couple has been sending \$16 a month to the family. Half the money goes directly to the family to supplement the monthly income of \$38.20. The rest is used by Foster Parents, Inc., to provide them with such items as medicine and blankets.

"They really make it go a long way," Mrs. Hadley commented.

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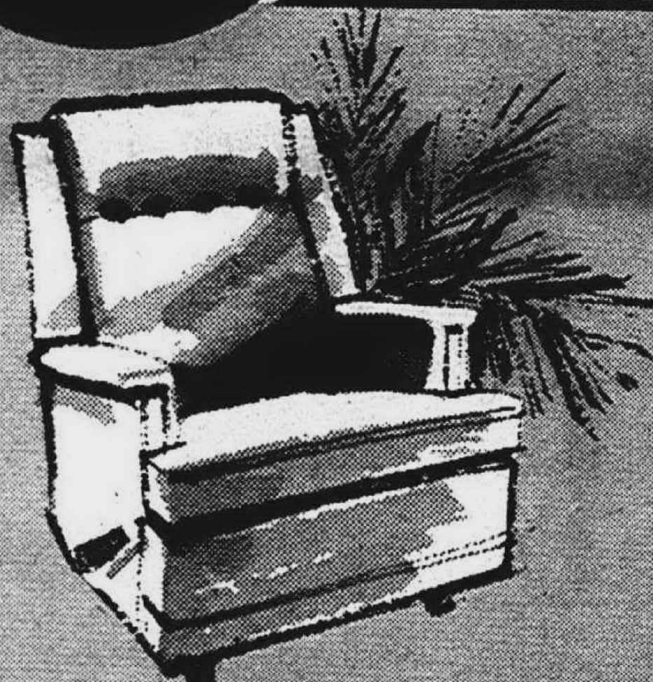
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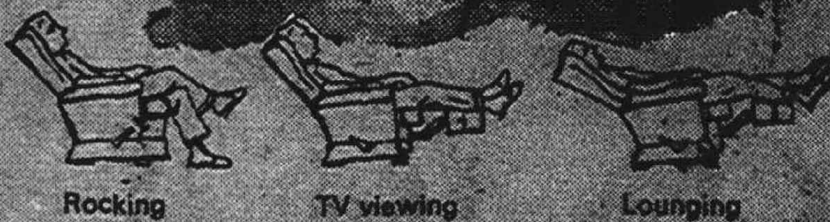
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Marriage Matters

Breaks In Family Circle
May Lead To Crises

Dr. Prince is associate professor of sociology at Eastern Washington State College, where he directs the undergraduate social work program. He is an experienced family and marriage counselor and has done extensive research into family problems.

Reactions and adjustments of families to crises will vary from family to family depending on such factors as the emotional interdependence of family members and the personality make-up of those involved.

The modern family is more likely to experience crises than the family of the past because of our complex, changing society. Situations which involve the disruption of the family structure -- departure of children from the home, divorce, and death--often become major family crises.

THE DEPARTURE of chil-

dren from the home can create serious family problems. This is particularly the case when one or both parents are overly protective or possessive; when the parents center all their hopes and ambitions on the child; when the marriage partner selected by the son or daughter fails to measure up to parental expectations; or when the child is the partial or sole support of the parents.

Separation or divorce may also be a crisis for those concerned. Studies show that the characteristic pattern of parents bringing up their children alone include such dynamic elements as a sense of incompleteness and frustration; a sense of failure; a sense of guilt; and marked overt and underlying feelings of ambivalence.

BEREAVEMENT is a compound crisis. Death of a loved one (especially a parent) is often a traumatic event. Loss of a

mate invariably calls for reorganizing the habits, routines and ways of a lifetime of married living. Loss of the father through death can mean economic catastrophe.

The focus in the following discussion will be on the personal reaction of husband or wife (especially the wife) to death of a mate.

In our society, there are many more widows than widowers. This is due to two factors, first, that women tend to live longer by several years, and second, that a greater per cent of widowers remarry.

IN THE United States, one out of four women between 55 and 64 years of age is a widow. After 65 more than half (55 per cent) of all women are widows.

In addition, three-fourths of the women who become widows at 45 can expect to live an additional 25 years. Of women widowed at 35, over 96 per cent have more than 33 years of life remaining.

Studies show that typical reactions to bereavement experienced by widows (especially those between the ages 40-45) are difficulty in sleeping, withdrawal from others and loss of interest in life, loss of contact with reality, deterioration in health, and pronounced resentment toward fate.

PARTIAL OR TOTAL failure to readjust to the death of a loved one include such patterns as suicide, early death, insanity, moral disintegration.

Job opportunities for inner-city residents will get a boost through the efforts of two area housewives.

Mrs. Glenn Arendsen, of Plymouth, and Mrs. Richard Anest, who used to live in Plymouth and now makes her home in Inkster, are helping to raise money for the People's Community Civic League with a benefit theater performance.

The benefit will be the Sept. 7 world premiere of the new musical, "Maggie Flynn," starring Shirley Jones and her husband Jack Cassidy, at the Fisher Theater.

SALE OF 2,000 tickets for the performance will be used by the league to continue its program of improving job skills for the disadvantaged.

Mrs. Arendsen, former airline stewardess who has taught volunteer grooming courses at the Detroit House of Correction, and Mrs. Anest, photographer's representative whose volunteer work has been at Veterans Administration hospitals, started work on the benefit because they wanted to give some meaningful service to the disadvantaged.

In the project, they are working closely with Alvin Bush, president, and Mrs. Irma Craft, executive vice president of the Peoples' Community Civic League.

BUSH, a porter at the Statler-Hilton Hotel for 27 years, and Mrs. Craft, a business education and English teacher in the Detroit public schools, formed the league in 1956 to help the disadvantaged of Detroit's inner city to attain a better life through improvement of their employability and through cultivation of positive attitudes.

Through fish-frys and cake walks, the league raised money.

to make a down-payment on a vacant union hall to be used as a school to improve job skills of the disadvantaged. As their self-help approach came to the attention of the community, some 75 major companies and foundations in the Detroit area came to the assistance of the league with significant financial contributions.

TODAY, the league owns outright the one-time union hall, on Fourteenth Street, just south of McGraw--near the heart of last summer's disorder. Last September, the league opened the hall as the Career Development Center, offering intensified courses in basic education and job skills.

In its less than one full year of operation, the Career Development Center has "graduated" more than 300 hard-core unemployed--largely ADC mothers--into good jobs with companies ranging from the automotive big Three to the big banks and on down to the smaller companies.

ENCOURAGED by the success of the Career Development Center, Mr. Bush and Mrs. Craft--on leave from their regular jobs to devote full time to their self-help programs--are in the process of organizing the Citizens Alliance for Self-Help, to administer a broad community service program in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb Counties, ranging from skill and educational training, attitudinal development and financial counseling of disadvantaged families to an immense year-around recreational program and a police-community relations program.

It is for the Citizens Alliance programs that proceeds from the "Maggie Flynn" benefit are earmarked.

Tickets are priced at \$25 for the orchestra seats and the mezzanine, and at \$5 and \$2 for the balcony seats. The price of the tickets is deductible for income tax purposes.

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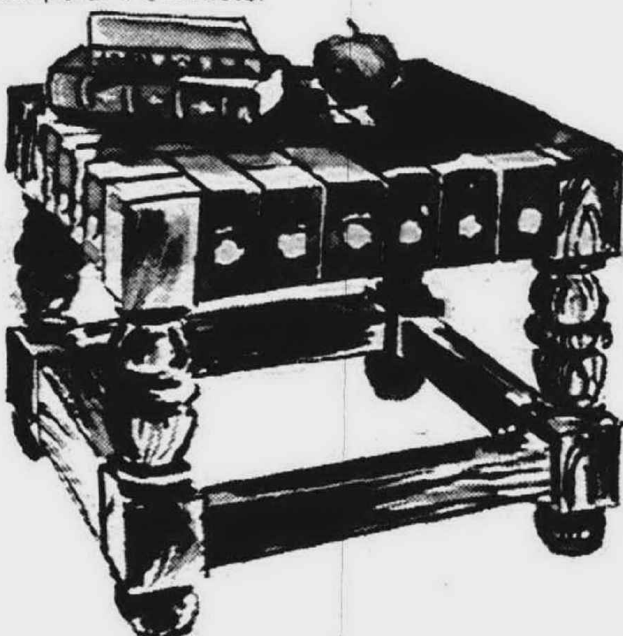

Plymouth Resident Earthquake Terror Described By Peace Corps Girl In Manila

The tragic earthquake that struck the Philippine Islands early this month caused grave concern in the Plymouth home of Mrs. Doris Fedus, Livonia teacher.

Her daughter, Sally, was serving in Manila as assistant to the Peace Corps director there.

A cable the evening of Aug. 2 relieved Mrs. Fedus' worry. Ten days later came a letter with Sally's vivid, first-hand account of one of the worst earthquakes of recent years.

Sally served with the Peace Corps in Bolivia for two years before taking on her current assignment.

PART OF her letter describing the quake follows:

"By now you probably heard all about it and what I'll say will be just 'old-hat.' However, let me take you through it and take what I say as impression only.

"About 4:20 a.m. on Aug. 2, Manila time, I was awakened by a loud noise. I assume that the violent shaking of my apartment had started to awaken me and the crash of plaster and cement in my dining room completed the job.

"Not knowing whether or not I was awake or dreaming, I looked to the ceiling and saw the overhead fan swaying violently. The door from my bedroom to the hall had been opened by the quake, and I saw the fan in the dining room shaking also.

"My first impression was to get away from the fan, which was turning and shaking, for fear that it might fall and hit me. So that is what I did. I hurried to the door and stopped, not knowing what else to do.

"AS IT TURNED OUT, I guess one of the best places to be if you are indoors during an earthquake is under a door frame, for it is braced better than anything else in the building.

"A few minutes (or was it seconds, I'll never know) later there was a calm. The lights went out so I found matches and lit the candles which I always have on hand.

"Looking around the apartment, I found that pieces of plaster in the dining room, living room, kitchen and hall had fallen, but the only significant section destroyed was the dining room.

"After surveying the place, and not knowing that there are after shocks, I assumed that it was over. I righted the lamps and went back to bed.

"About 4:40 a.m. I was just starting to fall asleep when the place started shaking again, but not as bad as the first time. I lighted the candles again and went about the apartment putting all the wall hangings, lamps, TV, etc. on the floor in case it got bad enough again to knock things down.

"THE 4:40 after-shock lasted only a few seconds. So back to bed again until the alarm woke me at 6:30 a.m.

"After my shower and half-way into breakfast we had another after-shock, this one a little longer and shaker than the one at 4:40 but not doing significant damage.

"At that time we started hearing reports of the apartment building which had collapsed. It was a six-story building and apparently it just collapsed like a vertical accordion and the walls fell in on top of it.

"Ever since then rescue crews have been working constantly, trying to get out survivors as well as those not so lucky. It has been so long now that those who have perished are beginning to decompose and the stench is almost unbearable. Those at the scene are wearing gas masks.

"I don't know the number of deaths, but it is over 100 and still rising.

"Last night we had another significant after-shock which lasted only a few seconds, but, boy, the fear shot through me. I have since then readied a nylon rope on my balcony by which I could conceivably climb down two stories if need be,

but I think all danger has passed by now.

"AS I SAID, it was an experience I shall never forget. Had it been only a physical and not a human disaster, I would say

that it was useful, for we all seem to take so many things for granted and this experience tends to open one's mind to what nature is capable of and what little man can do to avoid natural phenomena.

Council Holds New Hope For Adoptable Children

There are children of every age, race, color and physical and mental condition waiting to be adopted. This is the last of a four-part series by Nancy Robinson, Ann Arbor writer, on the problems of finding homes for them.

"Tragically often, the fears and hesitations of childless couples about adoption are based on information that is limited and out of date. The fact is, adoption has been undergoing a quiet but total revolution."

So says LIFE magazine (June 21, 1968) in the second of a series on adoption.

It is true the revolution is quiet, but it is by no means total. The personal story of an unwed mother giving up her baby and his adoption by an infertile couple took place in California, where progressive agencies have thoroughly revolutionized their adoption procedures.

What LIFE generalizes as adoption service today is an ideal perhaps reached in California, but in most states, including Michigan, this ideal is far from being fulfilled and is often vigorously resisted.

Couples are still denied adoptive parenthood, as thousands of children wait for homes, because they are fertile, do not match the child's race or religion, are too old, too young, married too short a period of time, the mother works or because of other individual agency reasons.

EACH COMMUNITY must question the policies of its local agencies and help remove any obstacles that deny children placement in loving families and homes of their own.

In the spring of 1966 the Council on Adoptable Children was formed in Ann Arbor, Michigan by five couples who had adopted children and were concerned about other waiting children, especially the hard-to-place. Their goals are to:

1) PUBLICIZE the need for adoptive homes and progressive agency policy.

2) URGE REVISION of state adoption laws (no major changes since 1939) and standardize criteria for judges granting adoptions, and

3) DISCUSS with each other and prospective adoptive parents the problems and rewards of adoptive parenthood

MONTHLY MEETINGS and newsletters keep COAC members (including laymen and professionals) abreast of activities and progress in helping place children.

Members speak to civic and religious groups, on radio and TV, and write newspaper and magazine articles on the needs of adoptable children. They are not a placement agency, but they do refer families to agencies that have let COAC know of particular children who need homes.

Trust and communication between parents and agencies are being built. Yet it all began with a few concerned families who gathered in a private living room to discuss the problem of unplaced children.

Agencies need the help of not only citizens but each other. Agencies must unite their services to get children and families together. Adoptable children are often the victims of geography because they are born in a city where there are few parents available when in the next town there may be many parents eager to adopt them.

The recently established ARENA (Adoption Resource Exchange of North America) provides a clearing house of information to agencies on parents and children available in every state. Still agencies continue to limit their services to a local area even though they may be part of a group of statewide agencies under the same name.

Departments of Social Service usually restrict placements at county boundaries. An applicant who lives over the county line may not be allowed to adopt a child in another

county, yet his taxes are collected to keep that child in a foster home or institution.

ONE NEWLY founded Michigan agency dedicated to progressive ideals of adoption service is Spaulding for Children in Chelsea, Michigan.

It plans to focus particular attention on finding homes for children whom other agencies have been unable to place. This agency has no church membership requirements and is open to couples from all over Michigan.

Many other agencies in our area have developed more flexible policies and are working hard to recruit families for children in their care.

Area Priest Named To Parish In Brazil

The Rev. Lawrence E. Dunn, who was brought up in St. Michael parish, Livonia, and studied four years in St. John Seminary, Plymouth, is enroute to Brazil for work in a special experimental parish at Recife.

His transfer to the Nossa Senhora de Lourdes parish was announced last week by Archbishop John F. Dearden. The parish is staffed by priests and nuns from the Detroit Archdiocese.

Father Dunn, who has long been interested in working in the South American parish, has recently been assistant pastor at Most Holy Trinity parish in downtown Detroit.

Father Dunn replaces the Rev. George B. Van Antwerp, now pastor of St. Joseph church in Erie, Mich., who completed four years of service in Brazil.

Father Van Antwerp, son of a former Detroit mayor, had been one of the first who volunteered for assignment after the late Pope John XXIII called on Catholic dioceses in the United States to help fill the great need for priests throughout South America.

In the Recife parish there is no pastor, but instead policy is set by a committee made up of all who serve the parish.

Father Dunn will bring a variety of experiences gained as assistant pastor at the internationally known Most Holy Trinity Parish in Detroit's old Corktown district.

FATHER DUNN has long prepared himself for South American service. He has lived briefly in Puerto Rico and Mexico to polish up his Spanish and hopes knowing Spanish will be helpful when he tackles the language of Recife, Portuguese.

He graduated from Sacred Heart Seminary in Detroit before studying theology and philosophy in St. John Seminary, Plymouth.

He was ordained in 1961 and served until 1964 as an assistant pastor at St. Clement parish in Romeo before being transferred to Most Holy Trinity parish.

Area's Missionary Internship Dispenses Training, Renewal

The sign reads Missionary Internship, Inc. and is nearly hidden by the full green trees and wild shrubs that line Freedom Road.

A narrow dirt road winds back through the trees, leading to two fairly large and very neat gray brick buildings.

The sign has probably intrigued many Farmington area residents in the six years the missionary-internship program has occupied these 24 rolling, wooded acres.

"One of the main problems is how to provide leadership in the country's emerging churches without forcing one's own ways," he added.

29 missionaries attending the conferences are staying at the "motel" right on the program's grounds.

This is one of the large gray brick buildings. The other is an activities building that houses a nursery school in the basement for children while the parents are attending the lectures or discussions, and on the main floor is a combination dining-room and classroom.

TAY AND DONNA KERSEY and their children, who range in age from 13 to two, will return to the Philippines when their furlough is up. Mr. Kersey explained that he and his wife chose the area where they wanted to work themselves.

Because of the extensive training involved in learning the language, customs and culture of a people, the vast majority of missionaries return to the same country for their entire life in missionary work.

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Homemade Ice Cream Is Great

By JOYCE TOTTON

Do you have a crank or electric ice cream freezer that has been sitting idle? Why not put it to work and make some homemade ice cream?

From one generation to the next, the fun of making a freezer of ice cream never diminishes.

It can be a family activity, and children will be delighted to help with the preparation and never forget the experience.

Deciding on what flavor to make may cause some problems since each flavor is so tempting. But once the decision is made and you have all the ingredients on hand it's time to make the tasting good recipe.

This basic recipe contains gelatin for extra smoothness. And when you use gelatin you won't need as much rich cream. The result is a refreshingly light ice cream—not too sweet and not too rich.

There are many variations to this basic mix and you can make four great flavors. There is bound to be one flavor that your family will like.

BASIC VANILLA ICE CREAM
2 T. unflavored gelatin
3 c. milk
2 c. sugar
1/4 t. salt
6 eggs
1 1/2 qts. light cream
1 (3 3/4 oz.) pkg. instant vanilla pudding mix
5 t. vanilla

Soften gelatin in 1/2 c. cold milk. Scald 1 1/2 c. milk and stir into gelatin mixture until it dissolves. Add sugar and salt, stirring until dissolved. Add remaining 1 c. milk. Beat eggs at high speed of electric mixer for five minutes. Add light cream, pudding mix, vanilla, then gelatin mixture. Pour into one gallon ice cream freezer container. Freeze following usual procedure for your freezer. Remove dasher; pack down ice cream. Replace lid. Repack ice and salt around container in a three to one proportion. Allow to stand two hours. Makes 3 1/2 qts.

PEPPERMINT STICK
Melt 1/2 c. crushed peppermint stick candy with the 1 1/2 c. milk. Proceed as above, reducing sugar to 1 1/4 c. and vanilla to 1 T. After cream is frozen, stir in 1/2 c. crushed peppermint stick candy; repack.

COFFEE-WALNUT
Add 1/4 c. instant coffee with pudding mix. Reduce vanilla to 1 T. After ice cream is frozen, stir in 1 c. coarsely chopped, toasted walnuts. Repack.

GRAPE
Substitute 3 c. grape juice for milk. Proceed as above, reducing light cream to 5 c. and sugar to 1 1/4 c.; eliminate vanilla. Add the juice of 1 lemon.

FRUIT ICE CREAM
2 cans sweetened condensed milk
1 lge. pkg. frozen fruit, partially thawed
1/2 gal. homogenized milk
Mix all ingredients. Pour into ice cream freezer and freeze. Frozen fruit may be strawberries, raspberries or peaches.

Are you willing to put the mind of your child into the hands of teachers who have no desire to keep pace with the world?

Education is a business as well as a profession. What business with an eye toward growth and profit, would try to attack only those employees who would be so complacent as to desire no further knowledge of their field than what they knew at 21?

I agree with you, Mr. Stymel-ski, on the 12 month school year. It would certainly alleviate many of the current problems. But do you really believe that the 40 hour work week rate would save money? I know few teachers who work a mere 40 hours a week. At time and a half and double time for overtime, we would probably really break your budget.

In your final point you urge more active participation by citizens to express their views. I wholeheartedly agree. But an uninformed or misinformed citizen cannot really express a view.

Why don't these concerned citizens visit their schools, talk to their teachers and learn what this profession of teaching is all about.

Then you could seek ways to meet the rising budget problems without resorting to a complete deterioration of the school system.

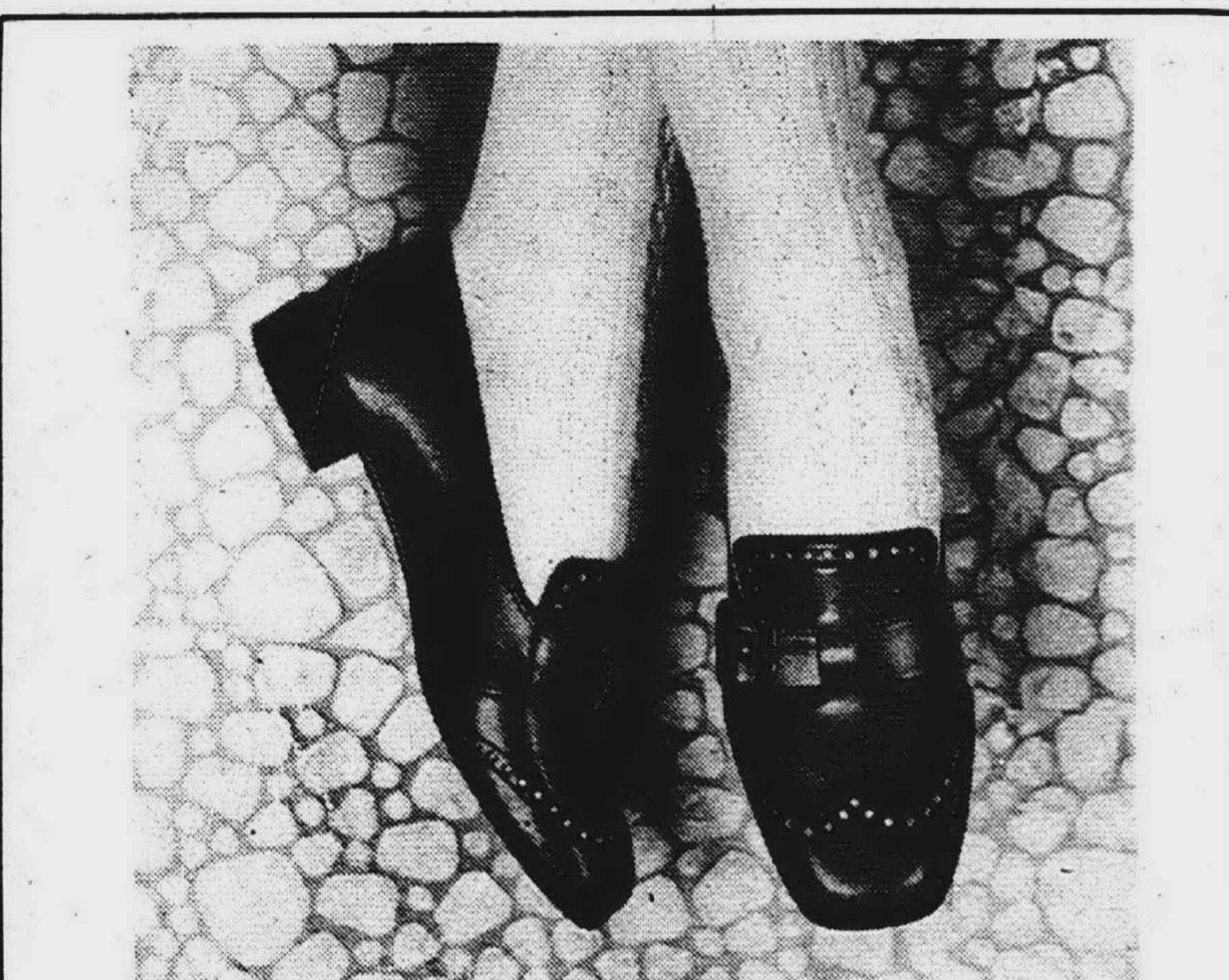

The auctioneer will be Glenn Casey, of Marion and formerly of Williamston.

The auction is authorized by law to dispose of confiscated and recovered articles whose owners could not be identified, items and equipment lost or abandoned at state parks, and the personal effects of persons who died in state institutions without leaving heirs.

Last year's auction netted the state treasure \$2,086,21.

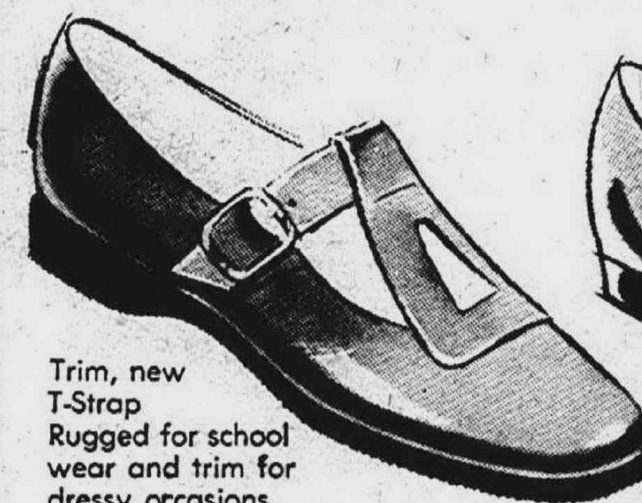

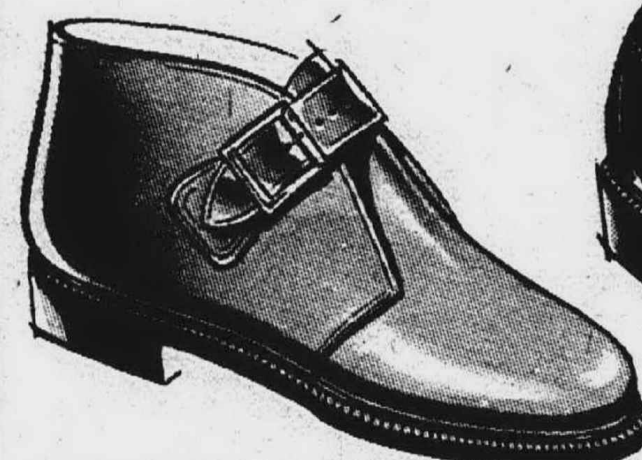

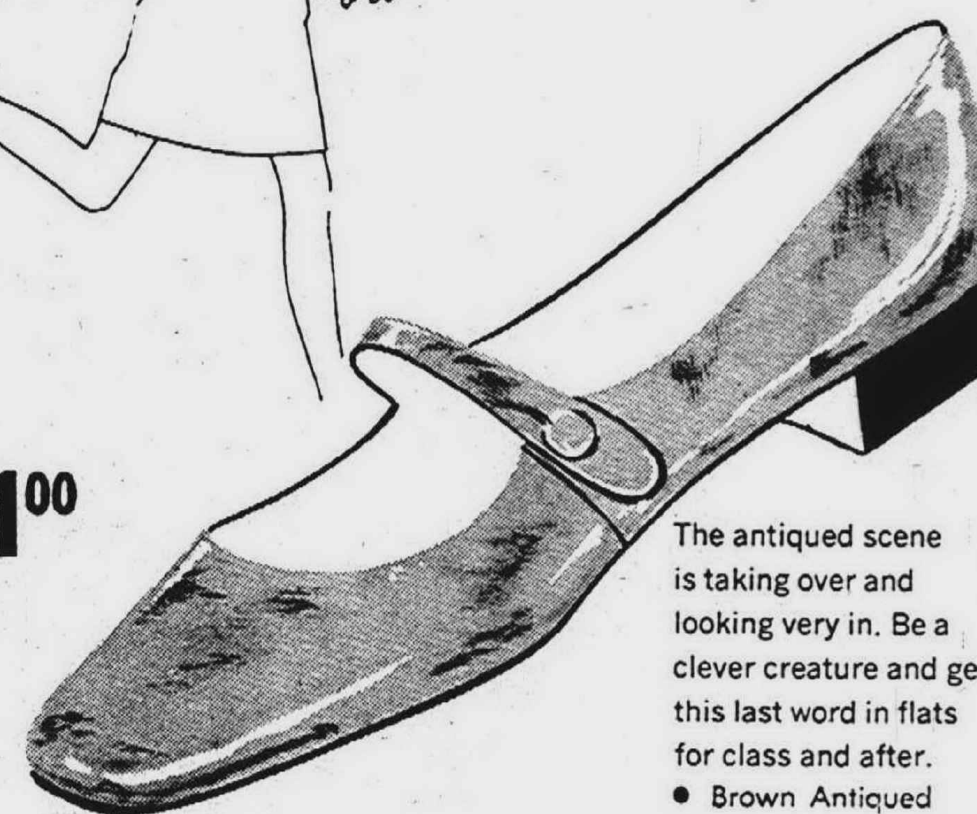

New Detroit Committee To Become Corporation

The New Detroit Committee, formed one year ago to rebuild the city in the wake of America's worst riot, will become a corporation under the laws of Michigan.

The new organizational structure will have the official title of New Detroit Inc. and hereafter will be a separate organization, Metropolitan Fund, Inc., provided the initial

staff, funds and office space during New Detroit's first year of existence.

Max M. Fisher was elected last week to the chairmanship of New Detroit, Inc. A charter member of the New Detroit Committee and chairman of its economic development subcommittee, Fisher will succeed Joseph L. Hudson, Jr., who has presided as chairman during

NDC's initial year of operation. William T. Patrick, Jr., leaves the vice-presidency of Metropolitan Fund to become president of New Detroit Inc.

He is on extended leave of absence from the Michigan Bell Telephone where he was assistant general attorney.

Fisher and Patrick will assume their new responsibilities at the Sept. 5 meeting of New

Detroit. Other officers and aides will be named.

CHAIRMAN OF United Foundation and president of the United Jewish Appeal, Fisher has decades of service in civic, community and charity programs. He said New Detroit will continue to move ahead with a \$10 million fund to help resolve some of the social prob-

lems of Metropolitan Detroit. The fund represents "plus giving" from local business and industry and the Ford Foundation.

Patrick has served as executive director of New Detroit since its beginning. His broad background of political, economic, civic and social affairs provide him with a keen insight of the problems of today's changing world.

He was the first Negro elected to Detroit's City Council. He has served as assistant prosecuting attorney for Wayne County and as chairman of Wayne County Board of Supervisors. A past vice-president of United Community Services of Metropolitan Detroit, he is a board member of several social agencies and civic organizations. He is a graduate of Howard University and the Uni-

versity of Michigan Law School.

A task force of men and women loaned by industry, business, labor, education, government and other endeavors which has provided the nucleus for New Detroit projects in the past will continue to be involved in future activities.

Hudson expressed the appreciation of New Detroit to Kent Mathewson, Metropolitan Fund president, and his staff, for their immediate availability, financial assistance and guidance through numerous and complex problems and projects during NDC's developmental stages.

He expressed the desire for a close cooperative relationship in the future.

Metropolitan Fund is an urban affairs foundation concerned with the resolution of metropolitan problems in the six-county southeast Michigan region.

Travel Aid Centers Set New Marks

Three records for serving travelers topped in July and early August at the eight travel information centers operated by the State Highway Commission.

The Commission said 209,098 persons stopped at the centers in July, topping the previous monthly high of 204,628 in August, 1967, and the previous high for July of 202,118, also established in 1967.

A seven-day record was also set in the week ending Aug. 3 when 52,883 travelers stopped for information. The previous high was 50,061 in the week ending Aug. 12, 1967.

More than 100,000 travelers were served at the centers in June, also a record.

At this rate, the Commission said, it is possible that

800,000 or more travelers will stop at the centers in 1968, exceeding last year's high by about 100,000.

The information centers are on principal highways at New Buffalo, Ironwood, Mackinaw City, Clare, Port Huron, Sault Ste. Marie, Menominee and Monroe, and another will be opened this month on Interstate 69 near Coldwater.

Some examples are: board siding for homes with a classic and batten hardboard siding for Early American homes; rough-sawn panels for rustic-looking ranch houses; grooved vertical design, and horizontal wood-grained lap siding for contemporary house styles.

Drying Flowers Colorful

Your favorite garden flowers can be dried so you can enjoy their color and charm all winter. It is not at all difficult to do, and the dried flowers make elegant arrangements for an entrance hall table, a living room coffee table or other spot that calls for an unusual decorative accent.

The simplest method is to pick the flowers and tie the stems in loose bunches and hang them head down in a dry place. Larkspur, blue salvia, statice, strawflowers, celosia, and goldenrod are among those that dry well this way.

Better color and form are retained if the flowers are treated with a special drying substance such as silica crystals or a mixture of one part borax to four parts cornmeal.

The cornmeal can be purchased in a grocery store and the borax in a drugstore. Silica crystals are sold under a variety of brand names and can be obtained from a druggist or at a garden center.

ROSES, DELPHINIUM, zinnias, daisies, marigolds and most other flowers can be dried by this method. The flowers, picked in mid-afternoon when they are at their driest, are placed in a long shallow box on a thin layer of the drying material.

Carefully sift the mixture around each flower petal until the flower and stem are covered. Then cover the box.

Drying time varies with the thickness of the flowers and the amount of moisture in them. Begin checking after a few days and remove when the petals are crisp. Do not leave in the drying substance longer than necessary as the colors will fade.

A variation of this method is to dry only the flower heads, then hook a thin florist wire

through each blossom as a stem when they are being arranged.

FERNS AND OTHER foliage can be dried for use in arrangements. Beech leaves and colored maple and oak leaves dry well.

Place the fern frond or spray of leaves between several layers of newspaper, arranging them carefully and removing overlapping leaves. Place beneath a heavy object or under a rug for about a month.

Seedpods and grasses add interest to an arrangement of dried flowers. Most seed pods dry by themselves on the plant and need no special care. Milkweed pods, and the pods on iris, daylilies and poppies have interesting shapes.

Grasses have delicate plumelike heads which give a touch of lightness which is often needed.

ed. They can be dried on the plant, or even in the arrangement.

Also, grasses, as well as other plants with flexible stems, can be dried in a gracefully curved shape if they are placed on a table or shelf so that the head and part of the stem droops over the edge.

WHEN MAKING dried arrangements try to include some spike flowers as well as round forms, but color in the bouquet will be more important than the form of the arrangement.

The dried flowers can be arranged in a metal, ceramic, wood or other opaque container partly filled with clay or sand to hold the stems in position.

Charming little arrangements can be made in a covered glass candy jar.

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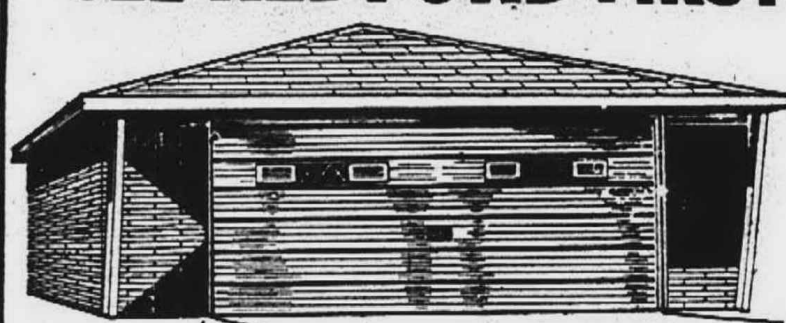

CARE OF FUCHSIA PLANT: Few house plants can match the Fuchsia (pronounced "Few-shuh") for striking blossoms. Also called Lady's Eardrops, it is a tender, woody item with bell-shaped, pendulous flowers in white, pink and violet. Most gardeners keep the fuchsia on a sun porch or in the garden in summer.

Then in fall, rather than bring the entire plant indoors, they

take "slips" or tip cuttings and root them in a glass of water. Large plants brought in seldom flower because they are so woody, and the young shoots will do better anyway.

Indoors, flower drop is due to high temperature or poor light. In fact it's seldom you get flowers to form if the temperature is much above 70 degrees. Fuchsia likes a cool, bright window and ample supply of moisture.

Two pests to trouble fuchsia are aphids and white flies. Both secrete a honeydew material and cause leaves to be sticky. Control: Wash off with warm soapy water, and spray foliage (top and bottom surface) with malathion or nicotine sulfate.

EARLY FLOWERING MUMS: Some mum plants which normally flower in fall have already blossomed out. What causes this early flowering? This often happens to garden mums which were not transplanted or cut back early in the spring.

When this happens in early weeks of June or July, you can cut the plants back and let new growth come up. Directly, after such cutting back, if the weather is warm, the plants will put up sturdy, husky shoots and usually flower by fall.

Too late to cut them back now. Just sit back and enjoy the flowers if they are out. If you happen to have some late flowering types which won't bloom by the time Jack Frost threatens, then dig up plants, pot them and bring indoors. They'll bloom for you when the days are shorter.

Or, if you want to go to the trouble, you can hurry buds along by shading them artificially using a black sateen cloth. This fools the plant by shortening the daylight, making it think that fall has arrived.

Shotgun holes in leaves mean work of tarnished plant bug. Dust or spray the leaves with methoxychlor, Sevin or malathion. Mildew on leaves can be checked by using Karathane (Mildex) or Acti-Dione, all best applied in late afternoon.

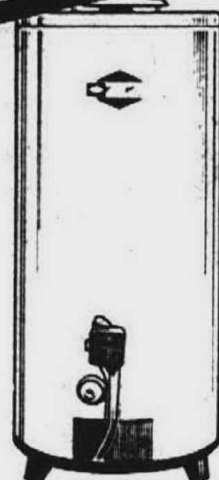
If flowers fall apart, leaves and buds blight, it's due to "Ray Blight", a one-sided sticky rot. Destroy all parts of plants, and spray with Zineb or Captan.

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Area Delegates Head For Platform, Credentials Fights

CHICAGO -- Michigan delegates started arriving today for platform and credentials battles before tossing 100 votes into the National Democratic Convention's fight over a presidential nominee.

The full Michigan delegation will confer for the first time here in a caucus at 8 p.m. Sunday in the Holiday Inn.

State Democratic Chairman Senator Sander M. Levin will head the Michigan delegation.

"I'm sure we'll be active in the major discussions of the convention," he said. "But at this point I can't see that there's a particular rallying point for Michigan."

He said the early arrivals will zero in on the platform hearings in an attempt to get a strong Vietnam plank and on credentials hearings to enforce black representation from the south, a decision of the 1964 national convention.

The Michigan party has already sent \$2,500 to the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party delegation. Alabama's National Democratic bloc has also asked for help.

Among the 17 credentials challenges will be one from Michigan's Sixth district (Ingham, Livingston, Jackson counties) over Humphrey and McCarthy groups.

nozzi and Mabel Stolz, of Owosso, members of the national convention's Rules and Platform committee, have been in Washington for hearings and were scheduled to go to Chicago today.

Delegates and alternates from this area are:

18th district: Delegates -- Eugene Cuthby, Ken Morris, Fae Weiss and Allen Zemmoll; alternates -- Phil Mastin, Jr., Marian Tymkow, Bill Merrill

and Sam Fishman.

19th district: Aldo Vagnozzi, Jerry Raymond, George Googasian, and Rebecca Woods; alternates -- Harold Julian, Glenn Hartsell, Charles Deamud, and Paul Y. Kadish.

2nd District: Delegates -- Morton Cohn, Leroy Cappaert, Gerald Sixbey and Marjorie Horkey; alternates -- Robert Dwyer, VanZatt Hamilton, Ferment Emerson and Helen Bird.

Backers of Senator Eugene J. McCarthy are claiming 12 to 13 of the 100 convention votes to be cast by Michigan, with Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey's troops claiming the rest.

The sortie into Michigan by South Dakota Senator George McGovern last week failed to jar away the Humphrey-McCarthy support, though McGovern said: "We gained some ground."

LEVIN said the Michigan delegation would be searching for support for fresh answers to urban problems and "a new emphasis on the problems of youth."

Early arrivals here, in addition to Vagnozzi and Mrs. Stolz, were Mildred Jeffrey and Rep. Charles C. Diggs, Jr., to take part in the credentials fights.

The Michigan delegation will be housed at the Holiday Inn Motel on Lakeshore Drive.

Area Republicans Back 'Block Fortas' Try

Michigan Republicans are rallying behind Sen. Robert Griffin in his fight to block President Johnson's two Supreme Court nominations.

Both the Wayne and Oakland county portions of the 19th Congressional District Republican organization Wednesday passed convention resolutions supporting Griffin.

The Michigan freshman senator has taken on the Senate leadership in his effort to block the appointment of Justice Abe Fortas as chief justice and Judge Homer Thornberry as an associate justice of the Supreme Court.

IN THE WAYNE County portion of the 2nd District, Chairman E. O. Webber commented that Griffin's movement was picking up strength, although no resolution was passed in that convention.

The Oakland-19th resolution passed with only one "nay"

being heard. The Wayne-19th resolution was passed overwhelmingly, too.

This doesn't mean that some Republicans don't consider Griffin wrong. Actually, there is disagreement in GOP ranks, but the dissenters saw they were in the minority and chose not to embarrass a member of their own party--and one whom they had labored hard to elect against big odds in 1966.

PRESIDENTIAL-nominee Richard Nixon is reported to be hoping secretly for Griffin's success.

At a meeting at the Republican National Convention with midwest delegates, Nixon was asked his opinion of Griffin's battle.

Nixon reportedly replied that he was, in effect, in a conflict-of-interest situation--he stands to gain if Fortas and Thornberry are blocked; if elected

president, Nixon would be able to make his own appointments.

But Griffin told the Observer Newspapers on the way back from the convention that Nixon is very much in favor of his stand, although he won't say so publicly.

WHEN GRIFFIN first announced he would fight the court appointments, most political commentators thought (1) he was wrong and (2) he didn't have a chance.

Since then, many have revised opinion No. 2.

Griffin has a reputation as a parliamentary maneuverer practically without peer.

Few thought he would win, as a young representative, with his Landrum-Griffin Labor Act, but he did. Everyone was surprised when he helped maneuver Michigan's Gerald Ford in and Indiana's Charles Halleck out as Republican leader in the House.

TO PLACE him in perspective, McGovern was the first United States Senator (South Dakota) to protest the United States involvement in Vietnam in 1963.

During the early campaigning, McGovern was a Robert F. Kennedy man. Kennedy people reportedly urged him not to run in a motel conference at O'Hare airport in Chicago because the time was late. But, he did.

State Democratic Chairman Senator Sander M. Levin, a veteran of Oakland County politics, introduced McGovern charitably. A touch of realism, a pinch of hope.

"Senator McGovern is helping us take a fresh look. He is appealing to our better aspirations, not to our fears."

McGovern, whose wispy hair over a rising hairline still doesn't need help on television, said he came to Michigan to "have you look me over" and said it was not at all a ploy for the second spot.

Raise Sights Of Restless Americans, Says Party Chief

State Democratic Party Chairman Sander M. Levin urged Democrats nationally to "fill the vacuum left by the Republican convention and assume the role of constructive critic of the status quo."

In a speech before the Oakland County Democratic Convention Friday night, Levin said that the "Democratic party should not shirk this important duty, even if it means engaging in criticism of some of our own party's policies and programs."

The meeting was held in the Oakland County civic center in Pontiac.

Included in the audience were delegates from Farmington and Livonia.

"We must not miss the opportunity, as did the Republicans, to utilize the national convention as an opportunity to take a fresh look at our nation's future," said Levin.

"Even though we are the party

in power we must avoid the trap of becoming automatic defenders of the status quo.

"Usually in politics the 'outs' attack the status quo and the 'ins' defend it. We Democrats must change this pattern in 1968.

"We must raise the sights of a restless America, not play on its worst fears, as Richard Nixon did in Miami.

"Richard Nixon responded to this nation's problems by dishing out a recipe of mediocrity and self-serving compromise.

"We must seek the adventure of new ideas, not the false security of a halfway position on every issue."

Levin said that the fresh look he is urging should include the following:

"VIETNAM: We must develop a candid statement of the best foreign policy for this nation in Vietnam and elsewhere, even if this should require recognition that our policies have not

always been correct. The Republicans put together a Vietnam plank which they hoped would offend no one, but in doing that they wrote a Vietnam plank which is meaningless.

"METHOD OF Nominating the President: We must be willing to admit the inadequacy of our present method of selecting the nominee. This is a complex problem, but we should strive to put together a specific platform recommendation which combines the most useful features of the national convention system with the broader base which would be provided by a national presidential primary.

"DOMESTIC Platform: We must say clearly that Richard Nixon is wrong. Of course, every American must be free from domestic violence, but no right can be given a higher priority than justice for all of our citizens. Unless both justice and freedom from violence are guaranteed, neither can

prevail.

"MINORITY REPRESENTATION: We must make good on our pledge at the 1964 National Convention by refusing to seat any delegations which are racially unrepresentative. There can be no equivocation on this issue.

"VICE PRESIDENTIAL NOMINATION: This choice must not be dictated by a desire to appease or avoid offending those in the party who believe that the answer to our problems is to stand still. We must not repeat the mistake of the Republicans in their choice of the Governor of Maryland, by selecting someone with the ideological orientation of Governor Connolly of Texas as our vice presidential candidate. Our vice presidential candidate must be a man who is in the progressive mainstream of our party and who is fully capable of being president himself."

Vietnam: Not Always Correct

Senator George McGovern Wants To Tell Country Of His Dream

Senator George McGovern is a kind and quiet man who would rather give his country his dream than have it elect him president.

His prospects for achievement of his priorities lie in the National Democratic Convention in Chicago next week.

McGovern's light suit was rumpled and creased from a day of delegate head-hunting in Detroit and the suburbs before hitting the Oakland County Democratic convention at 11:20 p.m.

But his eyes shone and his fingers danced in gestures as he told of his long anger at the 14-year war in Vietnam in a rich baritone that might have scolded a boy.

The depth of McGovern comes through. He's realistic about his dream. He's honest about his worry for the nation. He has a shy humor which must prop up his sanity in times of agony.

"I think it's quite appropriate for a candidate who announced two weeks before the convention to start a speech here at 11:20 p.m.," he said.

McGovern ended his day Friday before the convention, which brought together the 18th congressional district and about two-thirds of the 19th in the county's service complex at Pontiac.

As he spoke, Mary Ann Garlak, a longtime yeoman in the Democratic party, sat in the front row six feet away from his microphone toying with two large green and white Humphrey balloons.

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McGovern, whose wispy hair over a rising hairline still doesn't need help on television, said he came to Michigan to "have you look me over" and said it was not at all a ploy for the second spot.

"I not only don't want the vice presidency," he said, "I won't accept it."

"I want to be in a position to speak out without having to clear it with someone else. I'd much prefer to be a senator."

He said he would resign if lightning strikes on a late-ballot miracle in Chicago but, if not, he will return to South Dakota forthwith and campaign to keep his seat, at stake Nov. 5.

McGovern said he is running for the presidential nomination "to add my voice...to move our platform toward the strongest possible plank on peace and to end the war in Vietnam."

HE SAID the political issues in Vietnam cannot be decided by outside military force, that the United States should not be spending dollars and blood to preserve a regime in South Vietnam that "does not have the respect of its own people."

His own goals, he said, are:

- Stopping the bombing in Vietnam now.
- Halting the search and destroy missions which take a heavy and tragic toll among the innocents in the hamlets and kill our own men, driving the natives into the Viet Cong camp as the lesser of fiery evils.
- Telling Saigon the United States won't support a regime which put a presidential candidate in prison for five years

at hard labor for proposing negotiations to end the war.

He said the political-industrial axis in South Vietnam is more interested in profits and power than in peace.

McGovern said the political war at home is either won or almost won, that even the most virulent of hawks is seeing the folly of escalation.

He chided Republicans for their "law and order" doctrine, which "they believe is a means to somehow paper over all the despair, all the domestic wrongs in our country."

"I don't know of any candidate who is calling for lawlessness and disorder," McGovern said.

HE SAID he was not "under any illusion" about his chances at Chicago, but added that "I don't think we're going there to ratify the front runner."

If it goes to the third or fourth ballot--and he thinks he might help Senator Eugene F. McCarthy stall Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey's first-ballot bandwagon.

Georgia's Gov. Lester Maddox' late announcement left McGovern cold. McCarthy was making noises like he'd move to toss Maddox and his Georgia delegation out of the convention.

But whatever happens, McGovern said he will support whatever ticket the convention chooses.

Later, he said he favors ending the draft and employment of a well-paid volunteer army, that FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover and Selective Service Director General Lewis Hershey both "deserve a rest." McCarthy has said he would fire them.

McGovern said he favors opening relations with Red China, in slow steps, removing travel restrictions, exchange professors and other educators, lifting some trade barriers, then including Red China in the family of nations, "an international discipline."

He proposed a national presidential primary in each state to take the "nominee selection out of the back rooms" but he had no great fight with the electoral college.

McGovern's ideas drew cheers in Oakland County.

Earlier, Alan Durbin, a political science instructor at Macomb Community College, reported the results of a party survey in Oakland county.

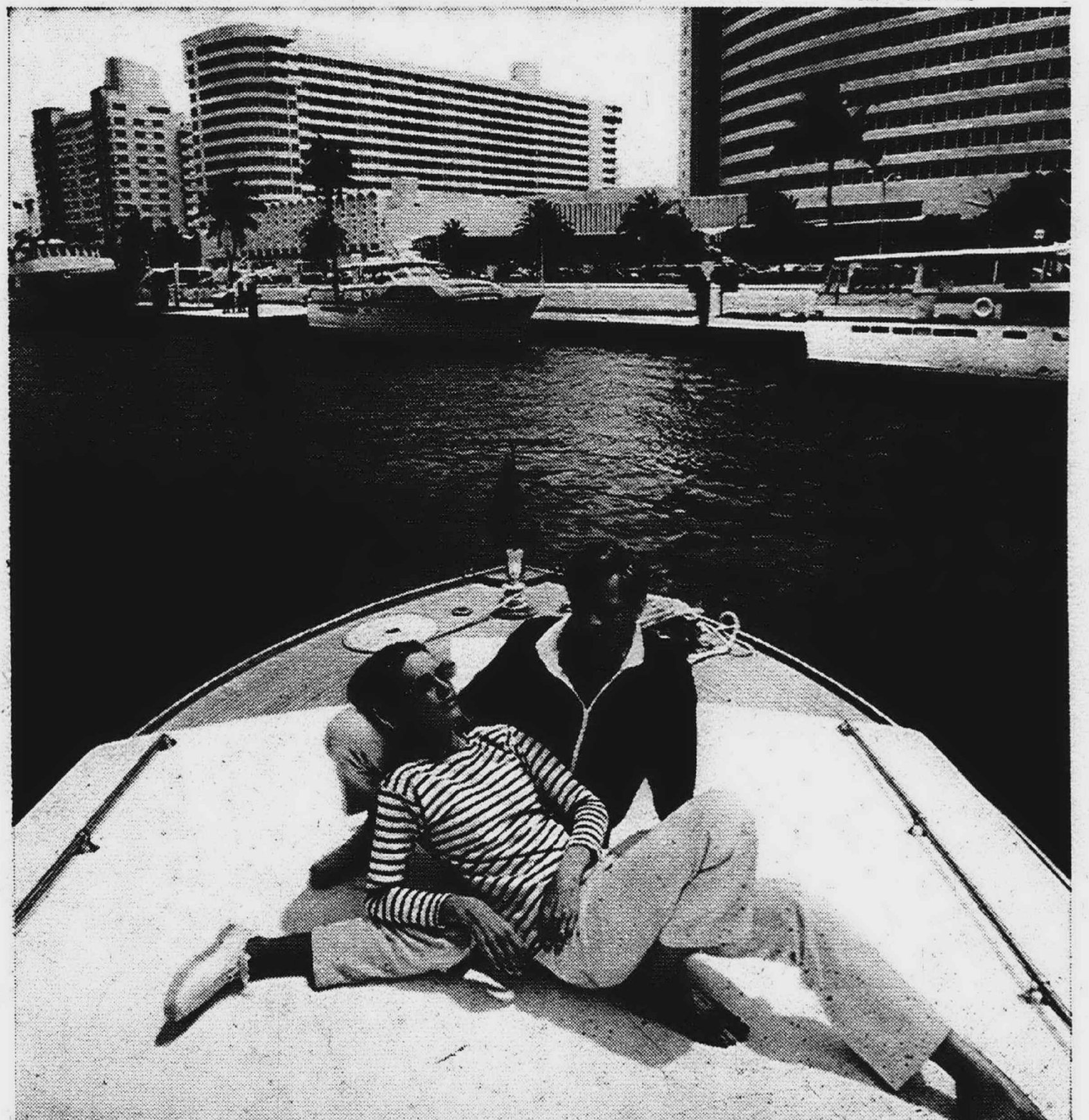
Working party members there preferred McCarthy by 58 per cent to 36 per cent for Humphrey, with 7 per cent going to all others.

There was some room left for McGovern's ideas, but hardly any for his candidacy.

Secret Service security around McGovern threatened to protect his body right into obscurity. The agents were one week on the job and eager. Like McGovern.

National Affairs Feel Impact Of Distaff Side

Women's influence on the conduct of national affairs goes far beyond the strength of their ballots in the fall elections. It's even more direct than the large campaign contributions possible by the well-publicized fact that women control a major portion of the national wealth.

Some women are so mighty their dispan hands are able to make or break a candidate for the highest controlling post, that of President of the United States.

For instance, a Redford housewife, Mrs. Delores Kory of 25721 Deborah, could have raised hers and stamped the Republican National Convention in Miami.

She was a member of the Michigan Delegation which was so dramatically considered a pivotal bloc of votes crucial to the nomination strategy of GOP candidates Richard M. Nixon, Nelson Rockefeller and Ronald Reagan.

She kept her hand down, displaying keen party allegiance despite her personal convictions, and Nixon won handily on the first ballot.

Had she put personal convictions first, it's likely she would have bolted the favorite son commitment of her companions, which kept the Michigan delegation neutral and thus non-disruptive to the first-ballot sweep by Nixon.

Mrs. Kory readily admitted to being a roofer for Mayor John Lindsay of New York, with Rockefeller as a more realistic possibility.

Had she insisted on casting her ballot for Rockefeller, others in the delegation might have, too. This would have encouraged other delegates from other states to follow suit--and Nixon would have had more trouble defeating Rockefeller.

Sage in the ways of politics and realizing that harmony was uppermost in importance in this crucial presidential election year, she desisted.

Water Pact Made For Park

The Board of Commissioners of the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority has awarded a contract for nearly \$90,000 for a tap into a Huron Township water main to supply water for a portion of Willow Metropolitan Park under development between New Boston and Flatrock.

The contract was awarded to Alana Construction Co., of Southfield, according to Kenneth L. Hallenbeck, director of HCMA, a regional park agency serving the counties of Livingston, Macomb, Oakland, Washtenaw and Wayne.

Willow Metropolitan Park covers 1,500 acres along the Huron River in western Wayne County and is expected to be open for public use sometime in 1970. Willow Park will become the ninth park in the Huron-Clinton chain of recreational sites covering the five-county area and serving over four million residents.

That same evening, a featured guest was State Senator Mrs. Lorraine Beebe, whose 12th District takes in part of Redford in the Wayne 19th Congressional District.

She made the announcement that she had been appointed vice chairman of the Nixon for President Committee of Michigan.

As such, she said, she'll be responsible for mobilizing the women's votes.

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College Eyes Record 4700 Pupils

A record number of 4,700 students awaits the scheduled opening of classes at Schoolcraft College on Thursday, Aug. 29, as the college launches its fifth year of operations.

Registrar Norman E. Dunn said his records point to a 20 per cent increase in fall term enrollment over last year.

Of the approximately 4,700 students already admitted or expected to return to the campus, about 2,800, according to Dunn, will be enrolled in the day program, another 1,500 will be taking classes in the Evening College, and 400 more will be signed up in the college's fast-growing apprenticeship program.

FALL TERM enrollment last year was 3,906, which came close to doubling the college's 1964 first-year enrollment of 2,018.

The record enrollment figure

is only one of a number of changes that have taken place at Schoolcraft this year. Fall term students will be paying a higher tuition rate, now set at \$10 a credit hour for resident students and \$18 an hour for non-residents. Actually, the rates went into effect on July 1 and applied to summer term students.

Twenty new full-time instructors have been added to accommodate the increased enrollment, bringing the faculty to 124 members.

One new building will open this fall, another has undergone extensive remodeling since May, and construction has begun on a third.

THE NEW building is the 32-classroom liberal arts building, a 40,000 square-foot structure that also houses a 180-seat theater. The remodeled building--the library--has

been given an internal facelift to provide for needed stack space and production of audio-tutorial materials, along with more reading and study area.

Just getting underway is the college's 97,000-square-foot physical education building which is expected to be completed in the spring of 1970.

Although classes won't begin until Thursday, the college year will open officially on Monday when the faculty reports for orientation. On Tuesday and Wednesday the college will open for registration for both day and evening programs.

Dunn said registration for day-program students is scheduled for those who have completed advanced registration but who wish to change programs or classes. These students will first report to their advisors to have changes approved. Then the students

will go to the library to complete registration and to pay fees.

Sophomores are scheduled to register on Tuesday afternoon in an alphabetical time sequence. The schedule: 1 to 1:30 p.m., students whose last names start with A through D; 1:30 to 2 p.m., E through H; 2 to 2:30 p.m., I through N; 2:30 through 3 p.m., O through S; and 3 to 3:30 p.m., T through Z.

Freshmen who have not completed advance registration will report to their advisors to start registration on this schedule: 8:30 to 9 a.m., students whose last names start with A and B; 9 to 9:30 a.m., C through E; 9:30 to 10 a.m., F through H; 10 to 10:30 a.m., I through L; 10:30 to 11 a.m., M and N; 1 to 1:30 p.m., O and P; 1:30 to 2, Q and R; 2 to 2:30 p.m., S and T; and 2:30 to 3 p.m., U through Z.

Registering fees must be paid in full at the time of registration.

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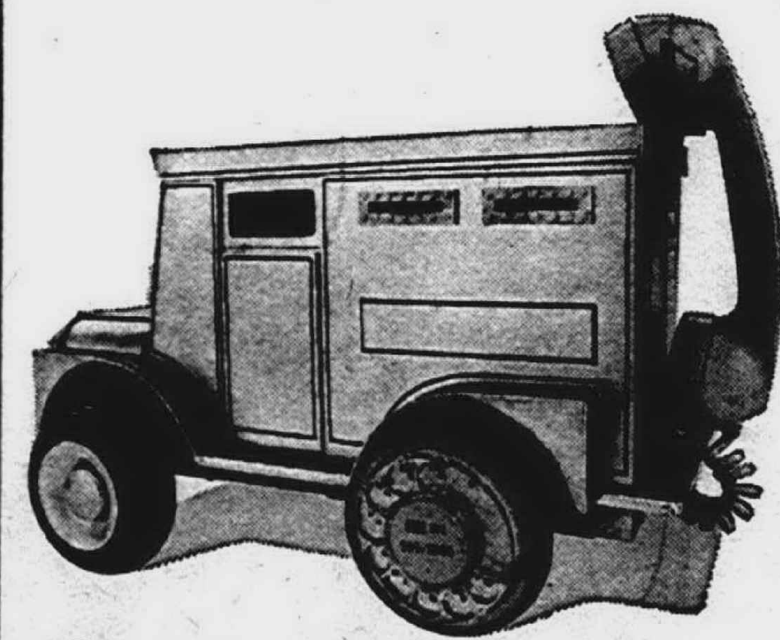
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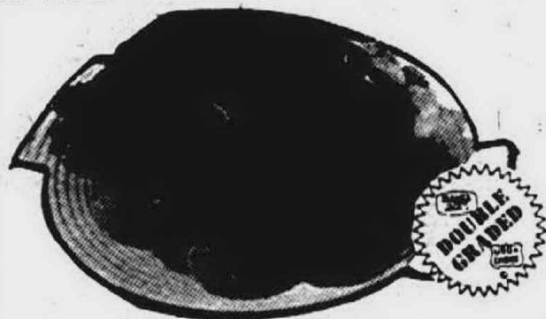

IN OTHER ACTION, the local Democrats adopted four resolutions that will be passed on to the state pre-platform committee which meets before the convention.

The four included:

- *One honoring the late Senator Robert F. Kennedy.
- *One asking for a "reordering of our national priorities," to help provide more jobs, housing, desegregated schools and a "minimum standard of living for all those who cannot work."
- *One seeking to establish a special agency to begin study of the use of land, water and air in the area from Minneapolis to Montreal. Detroit's suburbs have been labeled the center of this giant "megopolis."

*One asking for "legislation to achieve equitable statewide standards of teacher preparation, compensation, statewide seniority and retirement and other benefits." Each phase would be adjusted to account for local living costs.

The resolutions were prepared by William Kinnard, Ken Burcaw, Irv Rozlan, and Joan Voytas.

The district's delegation will caucus Friday with the entire Second Congressional District delegation, which includes Monroe, Washtenaw, Livingston and Kenawee counties.

Also at Friday's meeting was new precinct delegate Lewis Brown, associate pastor at the First Presbyterian Church. He was elected in the City of Plymouth, precinct one.

If Norm Cash still is with the Detroit Tigers next season--and the indications are that he will be--manager Mayo Smith is going to take him

aside in April and have a friendly chat, which will go something like this:
"Hey, Norm, just forget that this is April. Get into your head

that this is July...that we have just resumed action following the All-Star break."
Silly talk? No, sir.

The Cash hitting story in the first three months of every season seems to provide a major history. He just doesn't hit.

Then after the All-Star game, he comes alive and becomes one of the hottest hitters in baseball.

THINGS GOT so bad in the early going, manager Smith tried three and four different players at first base.

Cash had one of his biggest days of the season Saturday when he socked out five hits as the Tigers blew an 8-1 lead before recovering to beat Boston, 10-9, in 11 innings when Bill Freehan slugged a game-winning homer.

The victory followed on the heels of Denny McLain's 4-0 shutout that brought him his 25th victory of the season

against only three defeats.

McLain also set a record for Tiger right-handed pitchers when he soared past the 201 strikeout mark previously set by Jim Bunning.

THAT WAS the game in which McLain probably recorded his best inning of the season. Boston had runners on third and second with none out.

McLain proceeded to fan, in order, Dalton Jones, Carl Yastrzemski and Ken Harrelson. Detroit was leading at the time, 2-0, thanks to a two-run homer by Al Kaline.

In the series finale, Dalton Jones slugged a three-run homer to give Boston a 4-1 victory. But the Tigers maintained their recent mark of winning two out of every three games.

When they came out for a four-game series with Chicago, that ends with night games Wednesday and Thursday, the Tigers led second-place Baltimore by seven games.

And the magic number stood at 33...any combination of 33 Detroit victories and Baltimore defeats.

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To Ballot On County Charter, Commission

Wayne County voters, who nominated candidates for the new 26-member County Board of Supervisors in the Aug. 6 primary election, will ballot on nominees for another new county body—a charter commission—in the Nov. 5 general election.

Partisan nomination of two charter commission candidates from each of 35 districts will be on the ballot in tandem with a question asking the voters if they wish to establish a commission to draw up a county home rule charter.

If a majority votes against establishing a charter commission, the nomination of commission candidates will be void. But if the vote is in favor of a charter commission, a runoff election to select the commissioners is likely to be held early next year.

The county home rule ques-

tion was put on the ballot by the County Board of Supervisors to evaluate the Michigan County Home Rule Act of 1966 to determine whether home rule could improve Wayne County government.

The Committee of 99 concluded that significant improvements are possible under the state home rule act, and recommended that the Board of Supervisors put the home rule question before the voters "as soon as practicable."

HOME RULE WOULD give the voters of Wayne County greater latitude than they have now to determine the structure and functions of their county government, within the limits of the state home rule act. At present, virtually all aspects of county government are determined by the State Legislature.

Adoption of county home rule would have no effect on local governments within the county.

Under the home rule act, the charter could establish a legislative body (county commission) of five to 35 members elected from equal population districts on partisan basis. The home rule act also provides for an elected county executive, a "county mayor," a post that does not exist at present.

Home rule, according to the Committee of 99, would also give the county greater latitude in service arrangements with local communities and in revamping what was described as a "maze" of county boards and commissions.

The 35 districts for the charter commission were drawn by the same special five-member Apportionment Commission which drew the districts for the 26-district Board of Supervisors, which will be elected Nov. 5 and take office Jan. 1.

The Apportionment Commission consisted of three elected county officials—the Clerk, Prosecuting Attorney and Treasurer—and the county chairman of the Democratic and Republican parties.

The commission adopted the 35-district plan for the charter commission at the suggestion of the present Board of Supervisors. Members of the county board from outside Detroit came up with the plan after expressing disappointment with the commission's 26-district plan for the new Board of Supervisors.
