The Stroller... Political Tactics

In this day and age when long hair, beards, goatees and mustaches are common, it sounds almost impossible that not too many years ago a small, neatly trimmed mustache helped to defeat a candidate for the presidency of the United States.

Yet that's exactly what happened to Thomas E. Dewey, the dapper native of Owasco, who succumbed to a heart attack several days ago.

It all happened back in 1944 when he challenged Franklin Delano Roosevelt when FDR was bidding for a fourth term and was known to be a rather sick man.

Grasping at almost anything in an attempt to beat him, the opposition took occasion to level a heap of criticism on him for having a government plane return the presidential dog, "Fala," to the White House.

This was the start of the political tit-for-tat game that leveled the most unusual criticism at Dewey, the GOP candidate.

"Beware of the man with the mustache," they chanted across the land. These critics and political foes pointed out that only two presidents in this century wore mustaches — Teddy Roosevelt and William Howard Taft.

ALL THE OTHERS, starting with William McKinley in 1896, were clean shaven. On the list, were Woodrow Wilson, Warren G. Harding, Calvin Coolidge, Herbert Hoover and FDR.

Admitting that Teddy Roosevelt was popular, the critics pointed out that, at heart, he was a military man who flaunted American might in the face of other nations in a manner that could have been dangerous. Taft, they claimed, was a weak president. So, they chanted, "Beware of the man with the mustache."

By a queer twist of fate, The Stroller was in the center of a discussion with Candidate Dewey one Saturday evening on the train platform in Grand Central station in New York.

He had covered the Michigan-Penn football game in Philadelphia that afternoon, and on the return trip during the war years the Michigan entourage had to make train connections in New York.

In the station at the time was Dewey's campaign special. On hearing that the Michigan football team was on hand, as a loyal alumnus, he came out to greet the group.

In his hands he held one of the late editions of a paper calling attention to his mustache. He was dumbfounded. In that resonant voice, he stated his amazement that the opposition would stoop to such tactics.

"Why, that's my trademark," he said. "Without it, I wouldn't be Tom Dewey."

BUT WHEN THE VOTES were counted that fall, he was defeated. And when he tried again, against President Truman, he was doomed to defeat again...this time by the smallest of margins.

It was so close that the Chicago Tribune had one of its editions on the street with glaring headlines "Dewey Wins."

But it was not to be.

In the end, the race was so close that those who shouted, "Beware of the man with the mustache," could have turned the tide.

No telling what course the nation would have taken had the dapper little fellow from Owasco been a clean-shaven man.

Retain 'No Left Turn' Signs On Sheldon Rd.

It appears the "no left turn" signs on Sheldon Road are going to stay.

That is, unless the City Commission's request to Wayne County to consider a "left turn only" signal at Sheldon and Penniman, with a controlled left turn, wins the County Road Commission's approval.

Acting Police Chief Capt. Loren Johnson, in a letter to City Manager Norman M. Gaffney, said that despite complaints from some Plymouth residents, "the only possibility of solving this problem is that a fifth lane be added on Sheldon at Penniman."

Johnson said it is his feeling that the inconvenience that is caused by the delay of persons wanting to make left

turns is small in comparison to the possibility of a child being struck on one of the residential streets that intersects with Penniman.

"I CANNOT recommend any change in the signs on Sheldon Road," Johnson said. He said that in the spring of 1968, the police were having a number of complaints regarding traffic coming off Sheldon and onto Junction, Farmer and Blanche and then using the north-south streets to avoid the traffic light at Penniman and Sheldon.

"We found the count on these streets to be quite high from 3 to 6 p.m.," he said.

He said that through a resolution by the city commission, he then asked the

Wayne County Road Commission to install "no left turn 3 p.m. to 6 p.m." signs on Sheldon at Junction, Farmer, and Blanche.

"AFTER THESE signs were installed, the complaints stopped," Johnson pointed out.

He explained that after Goldsmith was paved, the department began getting complaints of the traffic using Goldsmith to avoid the traffic light.

"We made a count there last August and found more than a normal amount of traffic from 3 to 6 p.m. We then asked the Wayne County Road Commission to install a 'no left turn 3 p.m. to 6 p.m.' sign at Sheldon and Goldsmith," he said. This was done late in 1970.

Boys Basketball Banquet To Feature EMU Coach

Boys in Plymouth's junior basketball program will have the chance to hear one of the sport's most successful coaches Tuesday night.

The guest speaker at the Class A and AA banquet at 6:15 p.m. in the Elks Building, 41700 Ann Arbor Rd., will be James D. Dutcher, whose Eastern Michigan University teams have posted a 102-43 record since he took the reins in 1966.

This season's Huron quintet was Dutcher's best from the standpoint of winning percentage, winning 23 of 33

games. The team reached the finals of the NAIA national tournament at Kansas City, the fourth straight season that the Hurons have been in post-season tournament action.

Dutcher was an outstanding athlete at Alpena High School, but knee surgery cut short his playing career at the University of Michigan.

The Plymouth junior basketball program has just completed its seventh and biggest season. Championship games are being played today (Saturday) at Pioneer Middle School.

Letter To The Editor

EDITOR:

On March 9, some 200 petition signers from most areas of the township reopened an old can of worms for our Plymouth Township Board of Trustees with a request for a sidewalk ordinance aimed at providing safe walking routes along busy and dangerous roads and highways, particularly where children must walk to and from school.

The drafters and circulators of the petitions have no intention of putting sidewalks all over the township, or forcing them onto people who don't want them in front of their homes. We don't believe it is fair that abutting property owners should pay the tab for the benefit of a large group of families who would use such service walks.

But the walks are still needed, and there should be a way of providing them in spite of some antiquated rules and framework under which we must labor at this point in history.

The movement began last fall as an effort to get busing to East Middle School for children (some as young as 10) living within the 1 1/2 mile "no busing" radius who are forced to walk M-14, with the

railroad overpass and other hazards elaborated to the Board of Education.

That effort resulted in busing for the remainder of this school year only. The school board has declared a policy of no more busing (except for the very young) for those within the state-prescribed 1 1/2 miles. Where this state requirement is violated, the school district suffers a penalty in state aid (another law that might call for some scrutinizing).

A volunteer committee of parents met with Supervisor Maurice Breen before circulating the sidewalk petitions and came away with some hope that the mechanics could possibly be brought about whereby something like this might happen:

Citizens could request a sidewalk for a specific route. An agency of the township

government could determine which taxpayers would be benefiting from this sidewalk and determine the area to be assessed. Those being assessed then could vote for or against the project, not necessarily by voting booth ballot but hopefully by mail or some other less expensive method.

It ought to be a system simple enough to encourage interested and concerned citizens to use it to fill needs that are obvious and serious. The needs are here today and there will be many more coming up as the community grows.

The matter will be on the township agenda again March 23. Some citizenry on hand to add their voices would be in order.

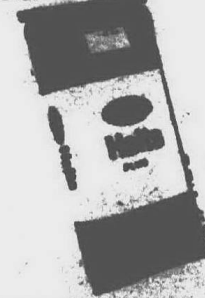

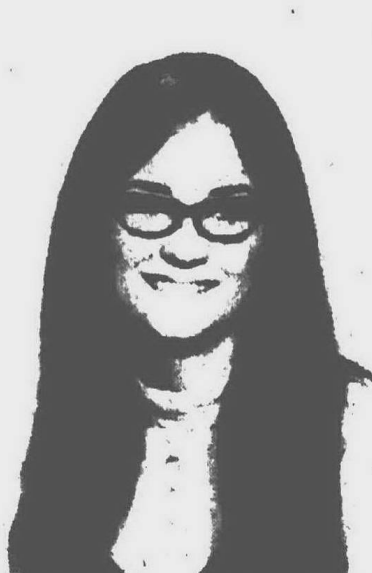

Figure Skating Takes Courage

It takes more courage to be a figure skater than a hockey player, according to Hyman Shenkman of Southfield, otherwise known as "Mr. High" of Livonia.

He has still another name this month...he's the "Big Spender" around Ford Rink in Livonia.

Shenkman is half of the grownup (and over 30 male representation in Livonia's big ice show now in rehearsal for performances April 2, 3 and 4.

The rest of the cast consists of some 548 girls and small boys and about 50 women. They come from all parts of Observerland and even from such fringe areas as Detroit and Northville.

The other half of the male contingent in "Four Seasons on Ice" is a Northville resident, Fred Hart. Hart looks a little like Arthur Godfrey, but this may not be apparent during the show because he'll be behind Santa Claus whisks.

He'll be working with a group of small boys. In his role of "Big Spender," Shenkman will be starred with women skaters.

SHENKMAN CLAIMS that figure skating is more dangerous than hockey, because if you fall you're more or less on your own. "You're not protected by all that padding," he explains somewhat disdainfully.

He and Hartt both should know. Both played hockey in their younger days. Shenkman started taking figure skating in the last few years. Hartt began lessons only this year, credits his progress to the excellent instruction.

Both got back into skating in Livonia's lunchtime skating special for businessmen and both were told that they showed promise by one of Livonia's six regular instructors, Sondra Morrill.

That's all it took to get them out of hockey skates, and into classes. Shenkman, who operates his drapery business in Livonia, takes lessons twice weekly.

ACCORDING TO Hartt, "All my life I wanted to skate and this is the best bargain there is."

Hartt's wife teaches school in Nankin Mills and doesn't skate, and he has two daughters in college, who can boast about their father being in an ice show. He works for American Airlines at Metropolitan Airport and skips the skating lessons now and then for another love, travelling. He is back from trips to

Hawaii, for golf, and Rome, Frankfurt, London and Florence.

Shenkman played hockey as a boy in Lithuania, and has a 17-year-old hockey playing son, who scores figure skates. He may yet be converted by his father's enthusiasm. His wife doesn't skate, but supports his interest. "Anything that makes

you feel young, she's all for," he says.

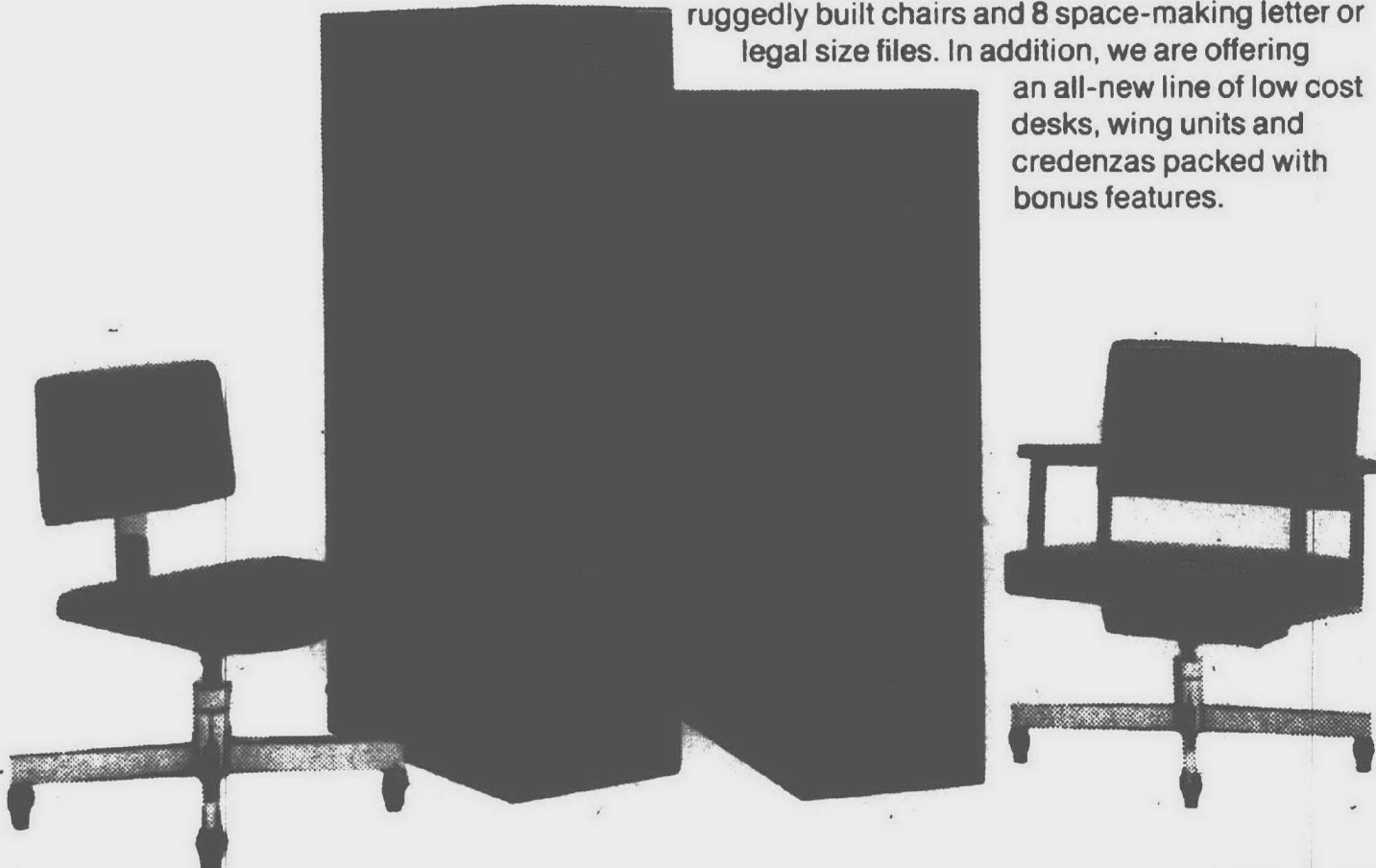

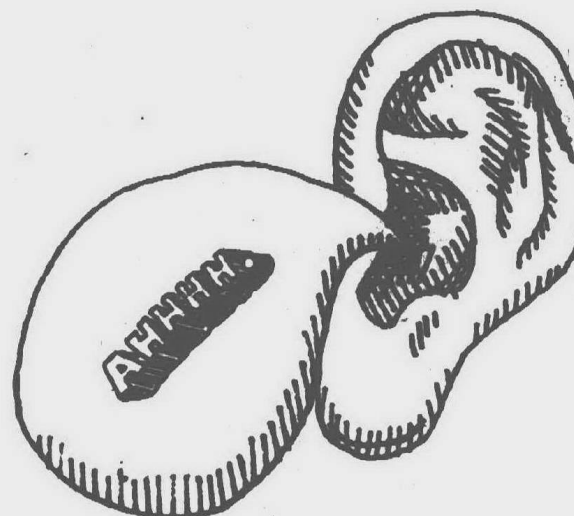

Pontiac Too Much For Stevenson

It didn't come at the stroke of midnight but the state championship aspirations of Livonia's "Cinderella" team from Stevenson High ended abruptly as most folks figured Thursday night at Birmingham Seaholm when Pontiac Central, everyone's favorite to win the 1971 crown, crushed the Spartans, 75-62.

Playing before the largest crowd ever to view a game in the Seaholm gym, the unbeaten Chiefs pulled away from Stevenson in the final

four minutes for a rather easy victory.

IT WAS the 19th straight triumph for the Chiefs who now meet Detroit Kettering in the Class A semifinals Saturday at 8:30 p.m. in Michigan State's Jenison Fieldhouse.

Although no more than 3,400 tickets were sold — the capacity of the gym — there were more than 4,000 jammed into the building of which at least 900 were in on counterfeited ducats.

As a result tournament officials placed chairs on the

ends and allowed spectators to sit along the sides of the court. It didn't bother the players but there were plenty of uncomfortable customers.

For a time it appeared as if Stevenson, which ended the regular season with a 5-11 record and then won six straight in tourney play for a 11-11 mark, might give the Chiefs a bit more than they could take.

THE SPARTANS dominated the backboards and their slow, deliberate style had Pontiac confused for at

least eight minutes since Livonia held an 11-6 lead at the end of the first quarter.

Stevenson was first to score, taking a 1-0 lead when Mike Patrick tossed in a free throw. Ted Exarhos whipped in a basket, one of four in the opening frame, and it was 3-0.

Myron Brock broke the ice for Pontiac at 4:33 and Exarhos hit again from the side. Larry Russell tapped in a rebound and the score was 5-4. Patrick connected from the edge of the foul circle and Exarhos tapped in his third field goal for a Stevenson 9-4

margin with 1:34 on the clock.

Tony Styles, one of the holdovers from the Pontiac team which lost in the finals a year ago, scored twice from the field and Exarhos added his fourth two-pointer in the remaining time.

collected eight of Stevenson's 10 points with Dale Haberman getting the other two on a rebound.

Campy was responsible for nine of his team's 22, getting four from the field and one free throw.

Coming back after the rest,

the Chiefs unleashed their fastest fast break offense and quickly built a 12-point lead as Larry Russell, Styles and Campy Russell tallied six points in the first minute for a 20-11 score.

The teams exchanged field goals before Stevenson tallied seven straight points to reduce the deficit to eight points at 30-30.

It was 40-30 with two and a half minutes to play in the period when the Chiefs struck again and quickly had a 40-35 margin.

Four successive free throws enabled the Spartans to slice the difference to 10 points at 40-30 before Campy slipped in a basket as the whistlesounded and it was

61-30 going into the final stanza.

SPARKED BY HOEKSTRA and Exarhos, Stevenson sliced the deficit to 61-55 with four minutes to play and it was still anybody's game. That is, it was anybody's at that moment.

Glover converted on three free throws, added a field goal along with baskets by Brock and Larry Cole for nine consecutive points and the season was about over for Stevenson.

Trailing 71-55, the Spartans were never close in the remaining two minutes and it was just a question of playing out the clock as both coaches inserted second and third stringers.

Campy, generally rated the state's No. 1 player, went scoreless in the first and fourth quarters and wound up the evening with 18 points. He was tied by Glover for most points for the Chiefs.

Exarhos, the first Stevenson player to score more than 1,000 points in three years, was the top scorer with 20 on nine baskets and two foul shots. Hoekstra and Kelly Smith were in double figures for the losers with 10 and 11.

Exarhos picked up 20 points against the Chiefs, the state's top rated Class A team. What's more, Exarhos netted four baskets in the opening period to give the Spartans an 11-8 first quarter edge.

Billy Joe Young, Garden City East's cage coach, doesn't make a habit of praising rival players, but he had this to say after his Panthers bowed to the Spartans in the regional final: "Exarhos is one of the finest players I've seen this year."

The Spartans didn't always wind up on the long end of the score this year — their overall record was 11-12 — but they were always No. 1 on the boards.

They out rebounded every team they played, including the taller Pontiac Central squad.

This takes pride, class and

They're still talking around Farmington Harrison High School about the swimming exploits of Mike Rado in the state high school Class B meet.

And they'll be talking about Rado for a long time to come...not only at Harrison, but throughout the state.

You see, Mike is 15 years old and just a freshman.

But in the state meet he performed the rare feat of capturing two state titles. That's something which few upperclassmen achieve, much less a ninth grader.

RADO CAPTURED the 200-yard individual medley and then won the backstroke in the smallest times of 2:16.4 and 2:11.1.

All of which naturally brought considerable joy to coach Mark Holdridge, who

cracked the select circle in his first try and with a team which still doesn't boast a single senior. There aren't any seniors in Harrison High, and won't be until next fall.

In discussing Rado, Holdridge compared his sensation to Tom Saba of Dearborn High, who won two Class A crowns and generally has been regarded as the No. 1 prep swimmer in the state this year.

"Mike's times as a freshman are just about the same as Tom turned in," declared Holdridge.

"Mike has been coming along really well. He can do anything he puts his mind on and works hard for. I think he knows now what he's capable of accomplishing."

Mike never thought he'd develop into the swimming star he has.

He admits to "just picking up swimming from neighbors." When in junior high, he merely swam in class, not in any school meets.

MIKE CHOSE to contest in AAU competition for boys of his age level. It all has paid off for him, his teammates and coach Holdridge.

This was Harrison's first year of competition and with the new school pool late in opening, the team had to shift around to find a spot for workouts.

Now Harrison is over the hump in swimming.

With Rado around for three more years, there's no telling how high the school may climb.

It's a good bet, Harrison surely will be a name to be reckoned with in prep swimming circles.

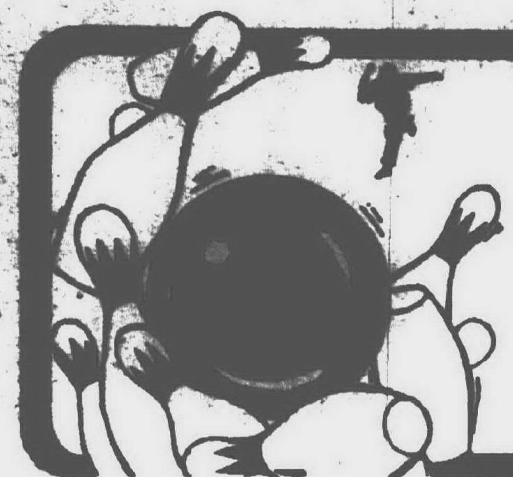

Turf Tips, Quips

Racing Commissioner Leo Shirley, who is deeply involved in legal moves to force five directors of the Hazel Park Racing Association to resign, will have time to study the impact of the state's first midwinter harness racing meeting within another week.

Beset by inclement weather for most of its early season, Northville Downs will lower the curtain on its activities next Thursday with the thought that the two months of darkness from the end of the Jackson-at-Northville campaign on Dec. 1 to the start of the current sessions on Feb. 3 were death blows to a successful meeting.

Naturally the final conclusion is based on attendance and mutual handle — the Northville session isn't going to set the world on fire on either count.

At the start of the season, shortly after receiving the dates for the midwinter, Executive Manager John Carlo felt that it would take an average nightly handle of \$250,000 to meet expenses.

Indications at this time point to an average handle of around \$240,000 with the crowd figures still not available.

There isn't any question but that Carlo and his associates had to spend hundreds of dollars for work on the racing strip that wasn't in their budget.

If nothing else, the midwinter meeting proved that more than the normal all-weather track is needed. Northville has long been known for having the best half-mile track in the midwest. It had never been used for anything but harness racing and thus had been beaten down to the kind of surface needed for the pacers and trotters.

But heavy snowstorms, unseasonable rains, unpredictable weather, all added up to some of the worse track conditions ever encountered at the Downs.

Only because the Michigan Harness Horsemen's Association had agreed to race regardless of conditions kept the meeting going on more than one occasion. The drivers agreed rather reluctantly but did race with the option of scratching if they preferred not to compete.

Eventually everything worked out and the meeting is grinding to a close... but there are a great many matters that should be ironed out by the commissioner and the tracks come another year.

AFTER THE BIGGEST opening in Detroit Race Course history, thoroughbred racing has settled down in much the manner expected by Detroit Racing Association officials.

The earliest meeting in Michigan history has run into the same problems of Northville Downs. Principally unpredictable weather with snow, rain and all of the things that happen in Michigan in the spring.

But officials are looking for a break in the near future and then will start making plans for the arrival of the big stables from the sunny south with the top horses.

Actually DRA executives figured the first 30 days of the 120-day campaign would be turned over to the cheaper horses, those that had been racing at small ovals during the winter plus those who winter trained in Michigan.

That's exactly what is on the grounds. The result has been excellent racing with cheap, evenly matched horses. The big problem comes at the end of the 30 days when track officials will have to decide whether they will ask the cheaper stables to leave and take off for the meetings of that type in Ohio, Illinois and New York and perhaps Windsor Raceway, or try to keep them on for some cheap events.

The big problem is that there will be early meetings in years to come and the small stable owners may decide the heck with Detroit, we can go elsewhere and stay for the summer.

It is interesting to note that the DRA, with the consent of the Building Services Employees Union which represents all workers in the mutual department, has retired all those 70 and older.

Originally this program was to have started at all tracks a year ago but by mutual agreement it was delayed for a year.

Schembechler Sees M Top Contender In '71

Michigan will be in the thick of a four or five way battle for the Big Ten football championship next fall and Bob Thornbladh, the former Plymouth High School star, could play a great part in the campaign.

You can take the word of Head Coach Bo Schembechler for it.

Wearing a broad smile of optimism as he awaited the opening of spring practice, "Bo" leaned forward in his chair during an exclusive interview and said—

"This will be a much different race this year than we've had in some time.

"Last year, it was obvious from the start that the title would go either to us or Ohio State. That isn't so this time. Here's why.

"Michigan State is certain to be stronger — much stronger — and could be a contender. Northwestern looks very good and from all reports Purdue will have a fine team. And you can't count

Ohio out of it, even though it has been hit hard by graduation. The Buckeyes had fine backup material. We'll be hearing from them when the season starts."

AS FAR AS Michigan is concerned "Bo" admitted a great deal of optimism.

Despite the loss of his two star linemen, including All-American Dan Dierdorf, and Henry Hill and Quarterback Don Moorehead he feels confident these gaps will be filled adequately.

"One of our biggest problems," he confided, "is not finding a quarterback, but choosing one from five candidates. Many coaches have a difficult time making a choice of two. We have five and they all have some fine attributes."

Topping the list is Jack McBride, the backup man last year. With him are Larry Cipa, a promising sophomore a year ago, who injured his knee and didn't play a minute; Greg Koss, Kevin Casey, and Tom Slade, from last year's freshman team.

Of the group Casey is considered the most promising. The Saginaw youth has caught the fancy of some coaches who claim he will be the quarterback for the next three years.

While the rest of the backfield returns intact with Bill Taylor at tailback, Glen Doughty at wingback, and Fritz Seyferth at fullback, Schembechler is keeping his eye on Thornbladh.

"He can't expect to break into the first team as things stand now," Bo said, "but he's got a lot going for him. He's big and strong, and I like his speed."

Then he added, "We'll find out this spring."

THORNBADH HAD an outstanding year as a freshman.

He scored five touchdowns, carried the ball 47 times — tops on the team —

and gained 139 yards. He also caught four passes for 19 yards, making him the biggest ground gainer.

Five other Observerland players are among the 96 candidates who turned out.

One of the most interesting is Jon Cedarburg, who quarterbacked the Plymouth Rocks for two seasons.

He is the only candidate without a scholarship and, ordinarily, wouldn't be given much chance.

But "Bo" admitted, "He's the kind of a fellow you like to have around. He's enthusiastic, has a lot of pep, and can inspire a group. We're trying him as a defensive back and he could make it."

The others include Craig Mutch, of Thurston, who is being transformed from a running back to a defensive role; Dave Brandon, the place kicker from South Lyons who is being groomed for a specialty role and two Livonia Bentley High representatives, Mike Day, a defensive back, and Carl Fedink, a tight end.

The Wolverine chief admitted that many things could happen in the long trail from spring to September but he likes what he has seen thus far.

As he departed for practice he repeated,

"You can count on us. We'll be right in the thick of it."

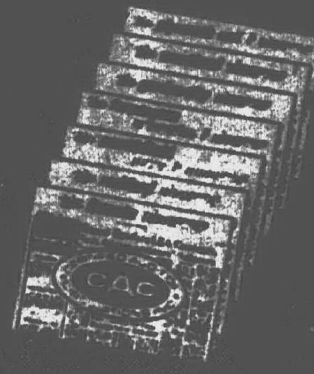
