ABOUT SIX MONTHS AGO, our city's police department joined hands with the State Police in a program which has as its purpose the establishment of better communication and better understanding between law enforcement officers and the youth of our schools. Those who are on the inside think it is working.

Basically this effort is in the hands of Youth Officer Carl Berry of the Plymouth police and Trooper David Ford of the state agency. They hae been in our local schools so many times -lately that they look lonesome without their textbooks. Compared to police action we've been reading about in some school areas, that's not bad.

The program starts at the kindergarten level, steps up in the pace of its content as it moves through the grades, and in the high school broadens out even to include discussion of police work às a career.

What everyone is seeking is to bring about an improved attitude on both sides. That means respect and understanding of each other's problems and motives. It means a free exchange of ideas, with a healthy rapport born of individual contact. From what one hears, we are moving in that direction.

BILL BROWN, the principal of Plymouth High School, was on hand a few nights ago when the City Commission heard a report on this program. He told Our Leaders he is "very pleased" with the progress.

"Carl Berry has a very difficult position; it is not an easy role for anyone," commented Brown. The inference was that there is an inborn antipathy among today's students toward the law, and that hopefully such a planned effort as this will help tear down the wall between them.

It is a program which begins on the assumption that a positive, constructive exposure to a police officer can be provided at a tender age through training in proper safety habits. Between the time the child is taught bicycle rules and the year as a high school senior when he may contemplate a career in law enforcement, both sides can gain materially through continuing dealings.

Already we have four high school students serving as the observers of actual police work at City Hall. This is only a beginning in a co-op program that may lead to some young people having the chance to ride occasionally in the patrol cars.

State Police Detective William Allen summed it up quite well when he pointed out that most contact young people have with police "is negative." He brought up that they meet policemen when they're stopped for traffic violations or questioned. The emphasis now is to make the contact a positive one, and while it's no cure-all, an improved relationship can result.

ONE PARTICULARLY encouraging facet of this undertaking is that officialdom has conveniently overlooked the fact that 10 of our 14 schools lie outside the jurisdiction of city police.

It would be the height of stupidity to say that a municipal officer could not go into Plymouth High School, for instance, on such a program as thiis just because it is in Canton Township. Or, for that matter, into Bird, West, Pioneer and all the rest when they really are "our" schools -- and there is no one else to do such a job.

So much is being made these days about how the young people are abusing the law that it is interesting to recall an experiment which has been tried in District Court here. Whenever an advisory jury of students has sat in on a case, its recommended penalty has almost always been more severe than that actually handed down by Judge manding officer of the battal- Dunbar Davis.

It would be interesting to see a pilot program The captain received a tried which would let the youths set up their own unofficial agency to police themselves. It might prove they are more adult than many members of the establishment suspect.

Esch Pushes For Manpower Bill

a bill seeking approval of a revenue sharing manpower training program that will public service employment and reduce joblessness in sections of the country where there is heavy

unemployment.
Under the proposal, the manpower training provisions would lump into one program more than a dozen categorical grants that were funded in the past. Esch pointed out that the Manpower Special Revenue Sharing Act of 1971 would provide \$4 for every \$3 that is now spent, and \$2 billion in the first year of operation.

In his remarks on the floor of the U.S. House of Representatives, the 2nd District congressman said that the legislation he is introducing on behalf of the administration would free the states and municipalities from "a bureaucratic maze of red tape that has been responsible for hindering manpower programs."

"MANPOWER TRAINING particularly is an area where flexibility to adapt to local conditions and needs is vital to assure that more people are served in a more responsive way," said Esch.

"Last year, Congress concluded that we must eliminate the confusion. duplication and inefficiency of our present manpower training system. Under the present program, one man, speaking for one department, makes decisions on 10,000 grants and contracts affecting at least a half a million persons - and involving \$1.5 billion in federal funds. And yet manpower needs multiply and local problems become more diverse. Decentralization will alleviate many of our manpower bottlenecks.

"This legislation builds on the foundation of the Comprehensive Manpower Training Act of 1970, approved so strongly by the 91st Congress. It acknowledges that manpower training should be a partnership - but an organized and efficient partnership. In his message to Congress, the President stated that manpower special







Griffin Forecasts Faster Pullout Of American Troops

U.S. Sen. Robert Griffin told Garden City and Westland leaders Friday that President Nixon will announce a speeded withdrawal of American troops from Vietnam next month.

His prediction, followed by applause from the crowd of nearly 200 persons, came at the second annual legislative program co-sponsored by the Garden City, Westland, and Wayne Chambers of Commerce. The dinner-program was in the Garrison House.

GRIFFIN, assistant minority leader for the Senate Republicans, discussed the Vietnam War and the president's proposed revenue sharing program, which calls for \$16 billion to be returned to state and local govern-

Griffin, returning to Garden City where he spent the first 17 years of his life, told his andience that Nixon war plan and reduced American deaths in Vietnam by 80% while cutting in half the cost of maintaining the war.

At the present rate of pulling out troops - 30,000 a the number of American troops in Vietnam from 550,000 when he took office two years ago to 130,000 by the end of this year, the senator said.

Griffin, who is expected to seek a second six-year term in the 1972 election, also defended Nixon's recent "incursion" into southern Laos.

He said that action has disrupted the enemy's flow of supplies and ammunition into South Vietnam.

"This means a faster withdrawal of American troops and getting our men home faster." Griffin said.

Griffin noted that of the \$16 billion proposed, \$11 billion would be in five general areas: education, law enforcement, urban development, rural development and transportation.

The other \$5 billion would be without strings for local and state governments to use as they see fit.

Nixon's program would reduce the cases of cities now using federal funds for projects they don't need but are building projects only because there are federal funds available.

IN THE question and an-Griffin said he would continue to oppose spending more funds for development (SST) aircraft when it is scheduled to come up for a vote in the Senate today (Wednesday).

Griffin also favored a constitutional amendment to allow persons between 18 and 20 years of age to vote in local and state elections. Those persons already have the right to vote in federal elections only.







It makes it difficult to single out one above the other, when you think back to the days you worked under the late Eddie Powers at Detroit Northern up until the modern regime hereabouts at the various Observerland schools.

But, somehow, you have to feel that there's nobody who would protest if you pointed a finger at Lotton Greene of River Rouge High and said something very special about him.

HERE'S THE MAN who has coached more state high school basketball champs than any other in Michigan. Ten to be exact.

Next Saturday morning, he'll go for No. 1 when Rouge plays Muskegon Heights in the Class B final in Crisler Arena at the University of Michigan.

No ordinary coach could have accomplished such a feat...especially in an area which has known its problems over the years.

Yet, Greene has met the challenge and he has overcome all the very obstacles.

One relished reading his answers the other day in the Sports Quiz of the Free Press when he told Joe Falls.

"A player's color makes no difference." Unfortunately, there are areas where color does make a difference...when we all know it shouldn't.

Those who know Lofton Greene simply stand and look up in awe of him.

How can any coach turn out so many powerful teams in succession? How can one man produce so many outstanding boys...many who have gone on to college fame?

The answer is pretty obvious.

LOFTON GREENE works at basketball the year around. He takes youngsters and gives them the coaching, the support, the encouragement they need.

He works with them in the summer on the hot recreation fields. You'll find him with the boys in the morning, the afternoon and in the evening. when the situation demands it.

This isn't to say that other coaches don't work as hard. They do. And that goes for coaches in our particular area.

But there has to be something special about Lofton Greene. How else would the man enjoy the success he has in a profession where many don't stick around too long.

Greene certainly has had the chance to leave coaching. For many years he was a principal in River Rouge. As Rouge athletic director now, he could cut down on his work load.

But because men like Greene stay in our schools, there has to be hope for our future.

We can't see why it's necessary to stage four games on one day and make just about everybody basketball weary.

There's no reason why there can't be two games Friday night and then two more on Saturday.

From what we've observed over the years. the state finals weekend is the biggest thing of the year for the schoolmen.

It has afforded, too, chances for various colleges and universities to hold reunions for their grads now out in schoolboy coaching and teaching. It has provided an ideal occasion for the prep coaches themselves to hold a dinner and salute their 25-year heroes.

So, why all the necessity to stage a jam session?

A little spreading out would make it better for all concerned. Nobody would have to get up in the early a.m. and rush to a game.

There'd be time for the college reunion breakfasts...for a game in the afternoon...for the coaches' banquet...for the big "A" game in the evening, perhaps at 7:30 p.m., instead of waiting until 8:30 ... and then off for the ride home.

From where we sit, there's more to the state baskethall tournament finals than just the games themselves.

After all, only eight schools get that far...but there are folks from 750 other schools who are interested...very interested in what's going on.

So, gentlemen, what about a minor change in the procedure for next year?

It'll make a lot of people just a little happier.

Culinary Arts Are Men's Work

By KATHY MORAN

They look as if they belone on the football field instead in the kitchen. But instead of toting a football, the young men are busy making fancy pastries and scrumptious

In what was traditionally considered a woman's domain, more than 60 Schoolcraft students (56 of them men) get practical experience in their cafeteria in the field they intend to make their careers-cooking.

But "cooking" is an understatement of their professionalized training.

THEY WORK in teams with the first string in the kitchen by 7 a.m. and the second string taking over by

Not only do they prepare the necessities for every student's diet-hamburgers and French fries-but a single menu might include chicken in wine sauce, a seafood plate, veal catatori, beef ala mode and Spanish rice.

Robert Breithaupt, chief chef and director of the culinary arts program, said that they normally have six main entrees on the daily menu and try not to repeat a single entree in their five-week

Under the direction of four fine teacher-chefs, the students learn preparation and decoration of fancier foods as well as ice carving.

A day's work might include preparing fancy hors d'oeuvres and decorating a large ham or turkey for an evening function of a club or civic organization besides the cafeteria's breakfast and

Breithaupt said that about 75% of the culinary arts students are in the Gourmet Club where they devote their own time and talents to preparing more exquisite foods.

The club has featured German and French "Nite" dinners where they prepared specialties from the respective countries and served them to 350 residents, students and faculty.

Already most of the tickets are taken for their Italian Nite scheduled for March 26. The two previous dinners had won the students such undisputable reputations that the tickets were at a premium for the next dinner before they were even printed.

Students learn to prepare food in large and small quantities and to cook without desdestroying its nutritive

Students can spend their two years gaining experience at the school or can be put on a cooperative training program where they can spend the second year working 40 hours a week in an approved food establishment.

At the conclusion of their two years the students are qualified to begin at a second cook's position and can work their way up from their personal experience.

Suburban Gardener

Gardener's Schedule Adjusts To Nature's

Spring has arrived. For the next three months traversing the nodiacal signs of Aries, Taurus and Gemini,

the sun moves north, the days grow longer, and the earth miraculously comes alive again. Hesitantly and much too slowly the season comes. We

joyously note the arrival of the red winged blackbirds, the first robin to strut across the greening lawn, the swelling buds on pussywillow and forsythia and silver maples, and the first crocus offering its cup filled with sunshine.

The gardener has been waiting through long, icy, barren months, while the sun passed through Scorpio, Saggitarius, Capricorn, Aquarius, and Pisces. Now he can gather up the bright packets of seeds and take rake and spade and commence his arduous but soul satisfying labors.

The season can't be rushed, however, and the work must be adjusted to fit nature's schedule.

Early chores that can be done right away include cleaning up any debris that blossom-set hormone sprays may have accumulated durshrub and flower beds, but

> CHECK TREES and shrubs for broken branches trees and shrubs can be done now, too, but to avoid loss of flowers prune the early bloomers after they have had their crop of flowers. Remember to use tree wound paint, especially on any cut larger in diameter than a 25cent piece.

> Cut a few branches of forsythia and flowering quince to force into bloom ahead of time in the house.

Seeds may be started indoors now so the little plants will be ready for the vegetable garden or flower beds in late May. Try petunias, snapdragons or others that take a long time to reach blooming size, or start marigolds or zinnias merely to give them





Community College Bombi Could Produce Backlash

Any notion that we might be able comfortably to escape the troubles new haunting the big universities at our own suburban community colleges went up in the smoke of last week's bomb blast at Oakland Community College's Orchard Ridge campus in Farmington Township.

The bombing followed the now typical pattern of black and liberal student demands for change, meeting with college administrators, scuffles on campus, and at least one reported threat to "blow the place up."

In many ways, colleges and universities are where the cutting edges of the generation gap and pressures for social change are the sharpest. Merely because community colleges happen to be here in the suburbs is no reason to assume that the pressures there will be any less intense than at big schools.

BUT THIS IN no way can change the fact that those who were responsible for planting three bombs on the OCC campus were clearly nuts. They should be arrested and prosecuted.

Some far left theorists have argued that planting bombs, so long as no one is hurt, is an effective means of forcing the establishment to consider seriously the need for rapid social change.

I don't agree with that argument, And those responsible for the Orchard Ridge bombing didn't even go that far: No warning calls were made to the college warning of the bomb and urging that people be evacunted; the bombs themselves had eight-penny nails wrapped around them, with the clear purpose of producing shrapnel to injure people.

No possible argument can be made that the bombing was in any way an effective step to resolve the problems at Orchard Ridge or at Oakland Community College generally.

It was a criminal act, and should be treated accordingly.

THERE IS SOME reason to conclude that the OCC administration has been somewhat less than anxious to resolve student demands presented by the Association of Black Students Orchard Ridge Student Coalition. A list of demands was presented last October, and only last Wednesday did a meeting take place which Orchard Ridge Provost S. James ' Manilla says was effective in

resolving differences and working out agreements.

But in Manilla's defense, it should be pointed out that only two of the 14 demands could be resolved by independent action of Orchard Ridge authorities themselves. Settlement of the other issues has to come from Oakland Community College at

Manilla says that he doesn't think the bombing will harden the attitude of Orchard Ridge authorities against trying to work out solutions to student problems, but I don't see how such an event can make negotiations with the students any

IN THAT LIES the real point of the horror and idiocy of the bombing, an event which has the backing of a miniscule minority of OCC students and which probably involved some people who were not even students at Orchard Ridge.

Bombings produce backlash from an important - and too often forgotten -- constituency of any community college: The

Oakland County taxpayers now pay a large hunk of the College's \$14 million budget. At present, they are paying one mill of property tax for operating budget and another half mill for debt retirement. The rest of the money comes from the state (also tax-supported), student tuition and fees, and private gifts.

Approximately 20% of the College's students come from outside of Oakland County. Outsiders pay a higher tuition than Oakland County residents (\$16 per credit hour versus \$9 per credit hour), but tuition doesn't make up for the general support given the College by Oakland County residents.

It's that support which is seriously threatened by last week's bombing.

THROUGHOUT THIS AREA, people are saying, "Why should I spend my tax money to support outsiders going to the community college, when all they do is bomb the place. Let's throw them out. In fact, why should we subsidize the college at all?"

It's an easy conclusion to come to, in the face of the shock of the bombing.

In the past, some privatelyraised money (mainly from the New Detroit Committee) had been used to provide transportation for students from Detroit to Farmington. But this program has wound down by

now, and College officials say that no College funds are being spent for transportation for outsiders.

But this won't change the rage and backlash produced by the bombings.

College officials, in their

meetings with students, have warned, "Don't push us too hard. You see, we have a constituency to worry about -- the taxpayers."

The student reply reportedly was, "That may be, but right now we're speaking about



Time To Stop Pornographers

Pornographers must be feeling the heat of public indignation. Or maybe they're just getting more blatant than ever.

It used to be they would send samples of their wares in plain brown envelopes, but a lot of people objected to getting it. So one particularly low-level outfit, with three different box numbers in New York and Brooklyn, sent an unsolicited piece of mail to an Observerland resident. On the envelope, in smudgy red type, was this

"First Class Mail -- Personal - Sexually Oriented Ad - Read This Notice before Opening!"

THE MESSAGE: "This envelope contains written and/ or photographically illustrated sexually oriented advertisements. As defined by Section 3010 (d) of the Postal Reorganization Act of 1970, a sexually oriented advertisement 'means any advertisement that depicts, in actual or simulated form, or explicitly describes, in a predominantly sexual context, human genitalia, any act of natural or unnatural sexual intercourse, any act of sadism or masochism, or any other erotic subject directly related to the foregoing."

"If you do not wish this mail, please return it to sender or destroy its contents without opening. Thank you."

Our friend commented: 'Can you imagine anyone reading that warning and NOT tearing the envelope open as quickly as possible, whether they like pornography or not?" His point is well taken: The

disclaimer on the envelope is insufficient; the stuff shouldn't be allowed in the mail in the first place when it hasn't been requested. . . .

THE ADVERTISEMENTS, frankly, were the same old thing, with amateurish photography to boot, but the order form was interesting:

"Gentlemen: Please send me. the items that I have indicated

below. I am an adult, being over 21 years of age. I believe that books should be free to portray to adults, matters pertaining to sex or nudity. I understand that the purpose of these books is to further sexual knowledge and to help free us from our outdated puritanical mores and beliefs concerning

"I am not endeavering to purchase these books in order to harass the sellors of same. or to interfere in any way with the exhibition to adults of material dealing with sex or nudity. I am not a member of any law enforcement agency, a Postal Inspector or Postal Department employe, nor am I working for any such agency directly or indirectly.

"Neither am I a member of any censorship group or working for any such group, directly or indirectly. I understand and believe that the more a person knows about sex, the less likely that person is to have marital or personal difficulties."

Thus, if you're a homosexual, a lesbian, a sodomist or some other kind of pervert, you are entitled to buy the stuff, but not if you're a healthy person who belongs to a church group or works for the PO.

If there can't be a law against pornography, then there oughta be a law against insulting the public's intelli-

Sign Slashing Is Fun?

There is an ancient maxim at area police departments to the effect that news stories of vandalism of one type invariably lead to a rash of incidents.

Such is the story in Livonia and Redford Township where police officers have been busy for the last few weeks trying to track down vandals who have been slicing street signs and placing them in other spots... much to the consternation of drivers strange to the areas.

It will be recalled that during the past several weeks officers of the Michigan State Police have been patrolling the expressways for gangs who have been cutting down the large billboards.

A couple of arrests were made but it didn't stop the sign cutting in other areas.

THE VANDALS, - there isn't any evidence whether they are youthful or adults have to have the use of cutting tools since they have been slicing the iron poles in two and then moving the street signs to another location.

This has been especially bad in Redford Township along Schoolcraft Road where homes have been removed for the new highway and even residents have trouble locating crossover streets in the sea of mud and water. It is bad enough in daylight but almost an impossibility at night to locate a street.

A pound of dates left over from Christmas baking and getting a little dry around the edgies was responsible for a great recipe search last

We hadn't had catmeal date equares in years and nothing nsier to make. So the dates were boiled and sugared and cooled. The relied oats, flour, butter and brown sugar were assembled, but I couldn't remember the amounts.

There was nothing in the recipe file. Looking through the Os-for outmeal and the Defor dates in five cookbooks did not reveal the elusive recipe.

Finally, under mincement squares, there it was, "Dates may be substituted." Just what we'd been looking for.

In the process of the search many old favorites were brought to mind that are just too good to be forgotten. Perhaps you would like to remember them too.

DATE SQUARES

1½ c. dates 2/3 c. water % c. sugar 1 c. brown sugar 14 c. rolled oats 1½ c. flour ½ t. salt % c. shortening

Cook dates with water and sugar until thick. Cool thoroughly before spreading. Combine brown sugar, rolled oats, flour and salt. Mix well. Blend in shortening with pastry blender until it is the consistency of course crumbs. Spread half the mixture in a shallow, 7x11x2-inch baking pan. Pat down until it is even and smooth. Spread with the date mixture. Cover with the remainder of the oatmeal mixture. Bake in a 400-degree oven for 20 to 25 minutes When cool cut into squares or bars. Must admit ours were half gone before they were

BETTY'S HAWAIIAN DESSERT

1 can Eagle Brand ¼ c. lemon juice 10 marshmallows, quartered ½ c. crushed pineapple,

drained 10 maraschino cherries, quartered

½ c. heavy whipping cream, whipped Ladyfingers Combine milk and lemon

juice and stir until thickened. Add marshmallows, pineapple, therries and whipped cream. Line angel food pan with waxed paper or use a spring mold. Separate ladyfingers and stand on edge, lining outer perimeter of pan. Fill with fruit mixutre. Cover top with split ladyfingers. Chill in refrigerator for at least six hours before serving. Delicious.

LEMON SPONGE PUDDING (Another old timer)

1 c. sugar 1 T. butter 2 T. flour

Juice and rind of one lemon 1 c. milk 2 eggs

Cream butter and sugar. Separate egg yolks from whites. Add yolks to butter and sugar and mix well. Add lemon juice and grated rind, then sifted flour and milk. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold into first mixture. Pour into baking dish. Place this in a pan of water and bake for 30 minutes in a 350-degree oven.
