## Canton Set To Appeal Rate Boost

CANTON TOWNSHIP Canton Township will appeal to the State Tax Commission over new factors assigned all township property by Wayne County. Supervisor Philip Dingeldey declared the new rates, set by the county after the first reassessment of the community in several decades, were "basically wrong" and that they were "off by quite a

None of the appraisals was under previous figures, he said. "All were over, and I think we should appeal to the State Tax Commission." His recommendation met with unanimous approval from the board.

The bids were from the American LaFrance Co., of Elmira, N.Y., and the Mack Truck Co., of Michigan.

The New York firm submitted a price of \$32,000 for a custom model able to pump 1,250 gallons per minute. The Mack firm's price was \$41,676 for a similar model.

Fire Chief Mel Paulun said he would make his recommendation in a few days, noting that two years ago the township bought a similar vehicle and the price tag then was \$25,000.

We have evidence of this in the Plymouth Board of Education, The Plymouth Township Board of Trustees and in the City Commission, although the latter body long ago recognized the futility of this route and stands alone as a membership which will be counted when the issue demands it.

As James Russell Wiggs once wrote in the Washington Post, of which he was editor:

"We can have a little secrecy without a government that is altogether secret. However, each added measure of secrecy measurably diminishes our freedom."

YOU MAY ALSO REMEM-**BER President John Fitzger**ald Kennedy's comment to Editor Turner Catledge of the New York Times, whose paper had practiced a dutiful self-censorship in not reporting the imminence of the Bay of Pigs invasion:



### Lumber Shifts To New Sizes

, Every part of the couptry now is, or soon will be, supplied with framing lumber cut to new sizes backed by the U.S. Department of Commerce. reports the Western Wood Products Association, Portland, Or.

Last of the major grade supervising groups to change over completely, WWPA is calling in from its member mills all old stamps, by April 1. In early March new stamps were in the hands of mills accounting for more than 95 percent of output.

Builder and handyman alike should find new sizes easier to figure and work with, says Neal Pinson, WWPA's technical director. The new sizes:
