Parenthood In A Hurry

6 Included In Adoption

It's official now—Harry and Elizabeth Theisen are parents of six. And it happened all at once.

The Plymouth couple, who live at 9065 Lilley, have had the four sisters and two brothers with them for about 2½ years.

So last Monday they went to Wayne County Probate Court in Detroit and legally adopted them all. Judge James Lincoln called the action "most unusual."

"He seemed a little shocked," Mrs. Theisen said later.

The story began several years ago. Elizabeth Theisen explained. She and her husband had no children and decided to try to adopt "a

small family." She's 32 now and her husband is 35.

Children's Aid in Detroit came up with a family, but it wasn't exactly small. There were two sets of twins, one teenaged and one pre-teen, and a younger girl and boy.

"THEY HAD BEEN living apart, in foster homes, for about six years," Mrs. Theisen said.

The couple decided they wanted the clan, but thought they had better start as foster parents.

After the youngsters' arrival came many months of working out assorted problems, helping personalities develop, seeing six young people through happy and perplexing situations.

"But really, not much that

was unusual," said Mrs. Theisen.

And finally, there was the decision, reached gradually, to make the adoption official for everybody.

For the children, it was an event of such importance that some of them changed first names as well as last.

"It's an identity thing," said their understanding mother. "It's fine, but I keep getting the names mixed up."

But she enumerated without a slip the names of her gang—Deborah and Jennifer, now 16; Robert and Brenda, 14; Darlene, 12; and Jonathon, 10.

THE HOUSE ON Lilley held the big family without much trouble, but the Theisens did add a family room. Everyone pitched in to help Dad, who

works for C & O Railroad.

"It isn't quite finished yet," Mrs. Theisen said.

The years between arrival and adoption have been filled with the usual happenings of childhood. Mrs. Theisen said, and the children now go to Plymouth High, East Middle School, and Isbister elementary.

They attend church at both Calvary Baptist and the Salvation Army, although Mr. and Mrs. Theisen are not church members. The older girls baby-sit, and young Jonathon delivers the Plymouth Mail and Observer, with an occasional assist from Darlene.

Nothing very unusual about this family, the parents would tell you. Except those legal papers filed in Probate Court.

Twp. Bans Open Fires For Trash

Trash fires, leaf fires and all open burning are now illegal in Plymouth Township.

A recommendation by Plymouth Township Fire Chief James Gignac that the township's ordinance regarding open burning be changed to conform with the Wayne County and State air pollution regulations, has been approved by the board of trustees.

Michigan pollution regulations state that no open burning is permitted in the state. The township ordinance, which will be amended subject to review by the township attorney, says, "The chief of the fire department may prohibit any or all bonfires and outdoor rubbish fires when atmospheric conditions or local circumstances make such fires hazardous."

The chief explained that because there have been many instances of direct violation of State and Wayne County regulations, there has been a general crackdown and strict enforcement of applicable air pollution regulations.

"The result of this enforcement is that Wayne County has instructed me not to issue any permits to burn," the chief said.

"Briefly, this action means that all open burning is prohibited in Plymouth Township and Wayne County."

GIGNAC EMPHASIZED that the Wayne County Air Pollution Board is the only agency in the county which has the authority to issue permits to burn.

"We can supply residents with applications," he said. "However, these applications must be taken to the Air Pollution Board at 1311 E. Jefferson in Detroit for approval. There is no guarantee approval will be granted. When an application is submitted to the board, an inspector will make an on-site investigation of the situation and make his recommendation to the board."

Gignac said the township fire department is not an enforcement agency of Wayne County.

"However, whenever a complaint is received, even though this department is not an enforcement agency of county air pollution regulations, the fire department has a duty and responsibility to all residents

of the township.

"Consequently, a fire department officer or myself must make an investigation of the complaint to ascertain no immediate hazard to life, health or property is involved."

THE PROCEDURES for receipt and investigation of complaints were outlined by Gignac.

"When a burning complaint is made, the caller is asked to identify himself and provide not only the location of the fire but also his name, address and telephone number. He is then given the alternative of making a formal, signed complaint, or an informal one."

Gignac said an informal complaint is handled by the investigating officer, responding alone to make an on-site inspection and informing the burner if he is in violation of state and county regulations.

"The fire department officer also will make a determination as to the hazard involved and or violation of the township's fire prevention ordinance. The burner will be instructed to extinguish the fire," said Gignac.

He said should the burner refuse to extinguish the fire, the complaint would then be referred to the Wayne County Air Pollution Board for investigation and prosecution under the applicable regulations.

"Upon receipt of a signed formal complaint, the fire department officer will make an on-site investigation," Gignac explained. "The investigation will also reveal if a hazard to life, health or property exists and the burner will be instructed to extinguish the fire."

"The formal complaint would then be referred to the Wayne County Department of Air Pollution for prosecution."

GIGNAC SAID the complaint would then go before a duly constituted court and upon conviction of a violation of the air pollution regulations, a fine of \$100 or 90 days in the county jail, or both may be imposed for each violation.

Prior to the crackdown by the air pollution board, the fire department was able to issue a permit for all open fires. These were issued on a one-day basis.

"With the change in the township's ordinance, this will no longer be true," Gignac emphasized.

Radtko Killer Hunted

An intensive manhunt is underway by police and sheriff's deputies from Wayne and Oakland Counties for the killer of Kathy Radtko, 17, of Novi, whose nude body was found Thursday evening floating in three feet of water just off shore of a small lake near Holly, Mich.

Kathy was last seen Jan. 31 in the company of John Keyes Jr., 19, of Northville who was found shot to death in his car on Napier near Six Mile Rd. in Northville Township on Feb. 1. Oakland County Undersheriff Leon Hazen told the Observer Kathy had been shot once through the chest and had been strangled.

THE FIRST CLUE that the body was Kathy's came when police noticed two rings on her fingers, one a class ring from Novi High School bearing the initials K.R. The other ring, containing a blue stone, matched the description of a ring given her by Keyes.

Hazen said that although the bullet had passed completely through the girl's body, leaving no clue as to the caliber, police feel certain the same person killed her who murdered Keyes.

Dr. John Burton, Oakland County Medical Examiner told the Observer that identification of the girl's body was made by a friend of the Radtko family. He said the body was partially decomposed.

The body was discovered Thursday by two Livonia boys, Michael and Donald Hayden, who were returning to shore after a fishing trip. It was floating in the reeds near the shore line.

Police from various surrounding communities as well as Wayne County Sheriff officers have been tracing clues for 3½ months in an effort to locate the girl. Countless tips had proved fruitless, including one that the girl's body had been buried in a large dump at Six Mile and Napier roads.

The site where the body was found is 30 miles north of the spot where Keyes was found dead. The lake is a mile west of I-75 in a small state park with a few cabins and a small sandy beach.

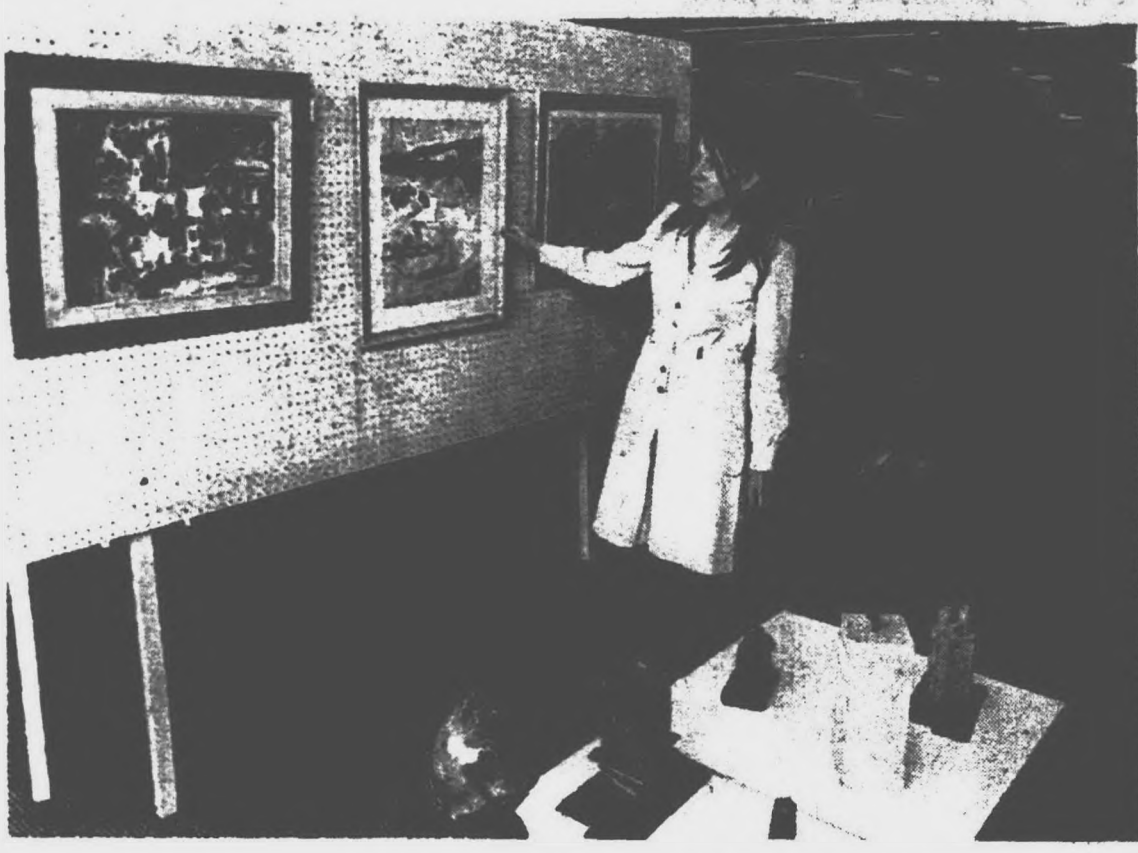

TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH BOARD OF TRUSTEES SPECIAL MEETING MAY 4, 1971

The meeting was called to order at 7:38 P.M. by the Supervisor. All members were present.

ITEM NO. I - TOWNSHIP RECREATIONAL PROJECT. The Board members agreed with the concept of the Recreational Project, and it was felt that baseball diamonds should be the first project. Mr. Green will co-ordinate the personnel, and something should be realized by July 1, 1971. Mr. Holmes moved that the Township Board of Trustees authorize the building of the Little League Diamonds and the signing of an agreement with the Little League Association for their use; also, the building of the road. Mr. Green is to report back to the Board the first meeting in July. Supported by Mr. Ash and carried unanimously.

ITEM NO. II - STORM SEWER STUDY. The reports on the Storm Sewer Study, both Phase No. 1 and 2 were discussed, and the Committee recommended a "no pay back" policy for developers. Mr. Overholt moved that the Township Board approve the recommendation of the Committee for the Township to continue their past practice of requiring developers to satisfy the Engineer's requirements. Supported by Mr. Burke and carried unanimously.

ITEM NO. III - BRENDER-HAMILL & Associates, Inc. Re: Current status of Township Storm and Sanitary Sewer and Water and recommendations for extension of the system. Discussion was held on storm sewer priorities. The following projects were presented: 1. Tonquish Creek Retention Basin-west from Sheldon Road. 2. Plymouth Gardens Subdivision. 3. George H. Robinson Subdivision. 4. Sheldon Industrial Park. 5. Joy Road Extension, west of Sheldon Road. It was moved by Mr. Millington, supported by Mr. Ash, that Plymouth Gardens Subdivision and George H. Robinson Subdivision be given priority because the sanitary and storm sewers are combined, and because of the pollution factor, those people presently living in these areas should be given first consideration on future projects. It was further stated that the Tonquish Creek Basin should be the second project, and the Sheldon Industrial Park and the Joy Road Extension should be held in abeyance. The motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Hamill and Mr. Brender presented aerial views and maps covering Sanitary Sewer and Water projects for the Township, showing water going along N. Territorial Road and from Back Road to Ridge Road and along Ridge Road to the House of Correction before the expressway is built. Mr. Millington stated that Mr. Ruggirello had agreed to take it from Territorial Road to the Trailer Court at his expense. Mr. Hamill gave an estimated cost of \$134,000 for this water project. The proposed water project on Back Road from Powell Road to Ann Arbor Trail and Ann Arbor Trail westerly to Ann Arbor Road and westerly to the Pino Property was discussed at length and agreed that this project should be in the township's first consideration. It was moved by Mr. Overholt, supported by Mr. Ash, that the Engineer proceed with the plans and advertise for bids at an estimated cost of \$100,000, to be paid from the Water Bond issue. Carried unanimously.

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Jaycettes State's Best

The Wayne County Child Development Center assistance project of the Plymouth Jaycee auxiliary recently was awarded first prize in community service competition among all Michigan Jaycee auxiliaries. This marks the first time

that the Plymouth Jaycettes ever have won a first place award at the state level.

The project began last September when it was decided by members of the auxiliary to expand an existing program at the Child Development Center to include one visit a month rather

than the previous four visits a year.

As outlined in a report submitted to the competition judging committee, the purpose of the program was to "provide a series of pleasurable experiences and activities for the girls in cottage No. 2 at the Child Development Center". This was accomplished by meeting with the girls one evening one night each month from October through May.

Kari Miller was appointed chairman of the project by President Dianne Conrad, and with her committee of Sue Harper, Linda Quinn, and Kathie Dalgard was responsible for setting up the calendar and program for the monthly visits.

THE MONTHLY programs consisted mainly of craft-type activities which the girls were able to complete in one evening. Through these visits, the Jaycettes were able to fulfill at least partially two basic needs of the girls, those being the need for contact with people outside the institution and a need to do things that they as young girls are interested in but unable to do because of a lack of funds.

The challenge to the auxiliary through this project was formidable, to say the least. For many of the auxiliary members this was their first experience with institutions such as the center.

In the beginning, they admit, the girls were suspicious of them, and tension was obvious in both groups initially. However, the auxiliary members were able to convey a feeling of genuine interest in the girls and a mutual trust resulted.

Several years ago while on an enjoyable vacation in Colorado, The Stroller sat with a group of veteran tourists looking up at Pike's Peak.

It was the first time he had cast his eyes on it and after seeing such sights as Mt. Rushmore in the Black Hills of South Dakota, and the scenic trip down through Cheyenne, Wyoming, through the famed Thompson Canyon and the beauty of Estes Park, it seemed as though the ultimate had been reached.

As a youth he had studied about Pike's Peak, never thinking in those days that he'd ever get the chance to see it, and now The Stroller was thrilled beyond words.

That is, until one of the tourists who had traveled the mountains from end to end, turned, and with a smile on his face, remarked -

"This is the greatest monument to publicity I ever have seen."

The Stroller must have looked surprised for his touring friend explained - "You know Pike's Peak isn't the tallest peak in this range. Neither is it the most beautiful."

DeHoCo Graduates 16

The continuing education program of the Plymouth Community School District will award 16 inmates of the Detroit House of Correction with their high school diplomas in graduation ceremonies to be held at 6:45 p.m., Friday, May 21.

The students have completed the requirements for a high school degree as a result of a pioneer program initiated at DeHoCo last year by the continuing education department.

Consisting of 61 classes and 15 tutorial periods, this year the program involved 185 students and 26 teachers, a considerable increase over last year.

Course offerings at DeHoCo vary from music appreciation, home and family, and art to literature and business courses. Teachers are employed from the Plymouth and surrounding areas, and are under the supervision of William Bannon, warden. Strict security arrangements are enforced.

Teachers are required to make the adjustment of working in an environment where they are not free to do as they please, but rather as the rules permit. This sometimes presents problems, as experience has shown. But as time goes on and the program matures, the problems become fewer and the program smoothes itself out, according

to Herbert Woolweaver of the Plymouth schools.

An integral part of the program is the counseling that it offers. The continuing education department employs a full-time counselor at the prison, and all teachers perform this service when it is required of them.

The commencement exercises will be closed to the public, although parents and families are invited. Supt. James Rossman of Plymouth will be the guest speaker.

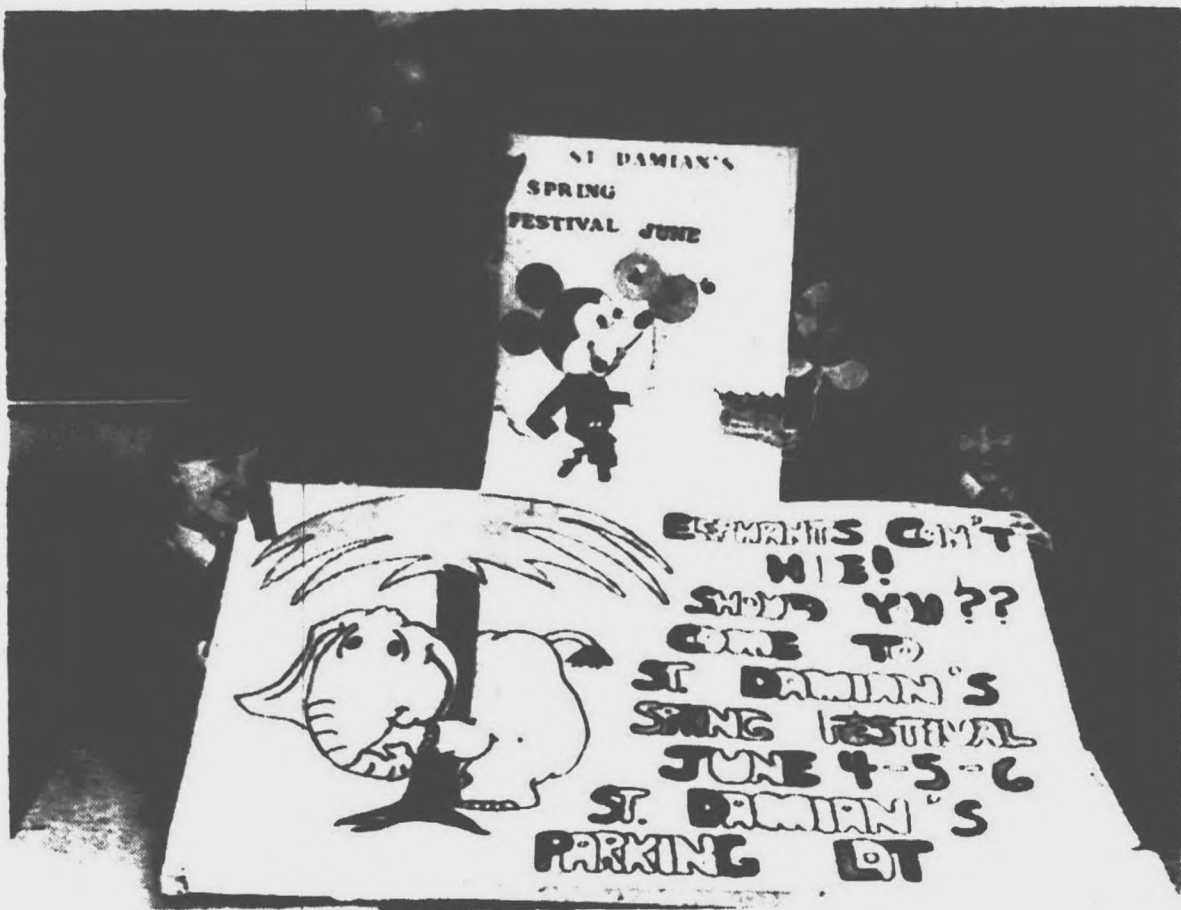

The Rev. Patrick J. Clifford, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church in Plymouth since 1949, will retire Sunday, May 23.

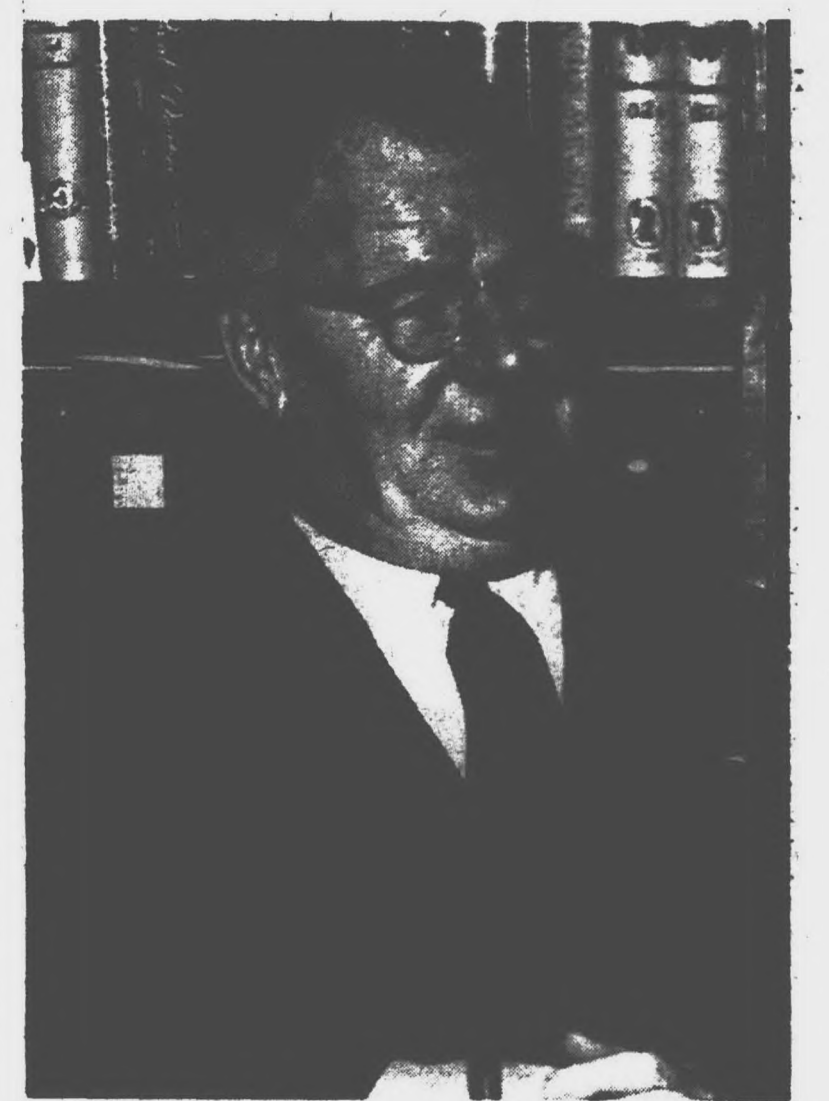
However, the clergyman who has seen Calvary through three building expansions and watched its attendance quadruple, will not leave service to the larger church.

Religion Update

Church standards in the Episcopal Diocese of Washington, D.C. are, if anything, complex.

Bishop William F. Creighton recently issued strict orders and invoked the canons (church laws) in prohibiting the parish of St. Stephen and the Incarnation to provide facilities for one of the homosexual wedding services which are now taking place throughout the nation.

But Bishop Creighton apparently saw nothing wrong in this same parish sponsoring a benefit performance of the musical "Hair," which, for all its superb music and choreography, is a non-plot garbage pile, replete with every conceivable and studied obscenity save on-stage defecations.

THE BISHOP also remained mute when presiding Bishop John E. Hines allowed the consecration of one of his fellow bishops to be ceremoniously soiled by the singularly asinine antics of the Episcopal Peace Fellowship. Not content with being allowed time to challenge the bishop-elect (consecrated to serve as a bishop to the Armed Forces), this group continued their assault on the freedom of worship by shouts and finally by hurling round collars to the floor and stomping out.

Three weeks later, in Bishop Creighton's imposing cathedral (patented as the National Cathedral), a "service" was held which may have had a national impact which is far more serious than one gay wedding. What had been advertised as "A Plea for Justice for the People of the Holy Land" resulted in what was later described by the weekly Near East Report as "a partisan political rally—a platform for a political and propaganda offensive against Israel."

PRINCIPAL SPEAKER was Christopher Mayhew, a member of Parliament, whose attack on Israel was so bitterly strident as to motivate the dry comment of Near East Report: "Britain can hardly lecture Washington on Palestine."

In New York, Rabbi Marc Tannenbaum, national director of interreligious activities for the American Jewish Committee, observed: "What is difficult to comprehend is the fact that several nationally prominent Christian and political leaders agreed to lend their prestige to an obviously one-sided program."

And Sen. Adlai Stevenson III (D-Ill.) was so disgusted with Mayhew's anti-Israel

harangue that he publicly disassociated himself with the speaker after having sent a message to the meeting.

Yet the meeting was sponsored or attended by such prominent Christian leaders as Cynthia Wedel, president of the National Council of Churches, and the Rev. Edward L. Elson, chaplain of the U.S. Senate—and hailed as a "crucial humanitarian effort" by Sen. Edward Kennedy.

PARTICIPATION of Christian leaders in such blatant pro-Arab, anti-Israel affairs is serving to increase a seriously growing Jewish bitterness. And while most Jews are trying to forgive centuries of persecution by Christians, they were confronted by the spectacle of a majority of Christian leaders who were silent in 1967, when Arabs like the late President Nasser announced their intent to destroy Israel.

In San Francisco, visiting lecturer Rabbi David Lieber, vice president of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, asked:

"Why did the Christian press (such as The Christian Century of Chicago) remain undisturbed by 19 years of Jordanian control of the Christian holy places—and desecration of Jewish cemeteries and synagogues— but become greatly agitated by Israeli control? Why does it fill its pages with accounts of the plight of Arab refugees, but rarely even mention the nearly as numerous Jewish refugees from Arab countries?"

"Does anybody seriously believe that the two million Jews of Israel could survive the destruction of their state? Is any Christian view that the survival of the Jewish state is a 'merely political' matter to which I must be 'religiously' indifferent if I am to be a worthy partner in Jewish Christian dialogues?"

AS FOR SUCH dialogs, Rabbi Tannenbaum has observed that in comparison to the Vatican's Secretariat on Christian-Jewish Relations, "No American mainline Protestant denomination has any such commission, or even a single full-time person to maintain communication with American Jewry, the largest and strongest Jewish community in the world."

One antidote to such concern (and American Jewish concern for Israel is well nigh unanimous) is the establishment of a new organization called Christians Concerned For Israel. It is headed by the Rev. Dr. Franklin Littell of Temple University in Philadelphia and includes such Christian leaders as Reinhold Niebuhr, who were among a number who did speak out in 1967.

There is always something interesting to pick up when the world's most famous harness racing drivers come to town for the annual appearance in the championship series at nine tracks in Canada and the United States.

For the past two years the reinsmen have competed at Hazel Park, doing their thing a few nights ago there.

For instance Gordon Rothacker, of Australia, is known as the "Del Miller" of Australia. Principally because he has a marked resemblance to the American millionaire driver and also because he is the top winner down under.

Gordon also races two days a week, Friday and Saturday, but still manages to keep his name before the public. He told how the race announcers call the horses on the two days and then are auctioneers at the hundreds of livestock sales during the other four days.

"You'd be surprised to learn how much an announcer can make in a year," he said, "Of course much of it comes from the sales but they also are well paid for the 'mike' work."

Gordon was the first Australian driver, we know of, to deny the oft repeated tale that pilots there handle nothing but pacers.

"There are a lot of trotting races too," he smiled, "But then we do drive many more pacers than trotters."

Adolf Ubleis, the Austrian who is leading the series and probably will be the winner, had to talk through an interpreter but managed to get his thoughts across.

He has to be the best in Europe, showing more than 100 wins in a season that only has something like 1,025 races. All of which means that he is in the winner's circle in one of 10 races. We never heard of any U.S. driver with a record like that.

All of which leads one to conjecture...why doesn't Wolverine, Northville Downs or Hazel Park, stage a similar series on a single night with the eight top drivers in the standings handling the field in as many as five races on the same open draw basis. It would be interesting to see how some of the better reinsmen, who usually have the better stock, would do when driving ordinary pacers and trotters.

We bring to your attention: Duc's Devil, Jittery Child, Skeed, Nickey Nirue, Devil's Holiday, Erullah, Uninterrupted, Viewette, Dunington, Salvo, Metric Mile and United Prince.

With all of the troubles

Windsor Raceway had in getting horses, jockeys and mule help, one wonders if the strike of the ticket sellers wasn't just another excuse.

Perhaps the truth of the matter is that management decided it didn't want to compete with the successful Detroit Race Course and Hazel Park meetings.

Most certainly the track would have done some business on Sundays but the remainder of the time...it's questionable if Windsor could even crack the nut as they say in the racing language. Actually it means breaking even.

With the national trend towards a decline in attendance and a slight increase in wagering, it wasn't exactly a surprise when the Detroit Racing Association decided to open show betting windows at all levels and Hazel Park Raceway added a perfecta.

The DRA decided to go along with several other plants and test the effect on show betting. It did have combination wagering (\$2 across the board) and show betting at three-way \$5 windows but there wasn't a \$2 show window anywhere in the plant.

The original theory being that the daily handle at the show windows didn't warrant the help needed to handle the machines.

But there were so many complaints that the Association decided to go back to show betting shortly after the start of the summer meeting. Officials learned rather quickly, via the betting public, that there were many patrons who did nothing but show betting and they made the fact known.

The reason behind the addition of the perfecta at the Hazel Park harness meeting was a matter of economics. The handle is down from last year's record meeting and this additional wagering gimmick is an attempt to get more money through the machines.

And it means that Hazel Park now has wagering on 10 races, a daily double, two perfectas and the Big Perfecta...a total of 14 for an evening. It wasn't too many years back that tracks were satisfied with eight races and a daily double...not so any more.

The Waterford Park track near Chester, W. Va. and East Liverpool, O. has a total of 17 wagering events on a single program and still handles less than \$300,000.

All of which proves to us that there is only a certain amount of money in any crowd at the track and that's it. Tracks can add all the gimmicks they want but folks still only have a certain amount of greenbacks.

Incidentally, the Jockey Club of Ontario tried to get along without show betting at its running and harness operations. Effective at the next meetings, which open next week, show wagering has been reinstated.

The reason given "economics" and the demands of the public.

DURING THE PAST couple of weeks, thoroughbred racing lost two prominent figures in the deaths of Marion Van Berg, the famed Nebraska horseman, and George Haggerty, former executive vice president of the Michigan Racing Association which operated the Detroit Race Course.

Haggerty, a lawyer, was a close associate of E. E. Dale Shaffer, when that group took over the track. George was the track's legal advisor for some time and then took over as executive vice president.

But that job wasn't for him and he left the organization after a few years, returned to his law practice, retired and was one of the nation's top senior golfers at the time of his death.

Mr. Van was a tradition at metropolitan Detroit area tracks. He was the leading owner and trainer for years and always checked in with a large stable that consistently won the most money at Hazel Park and DRC.

He was stricken with a heart attack three or four years ago and turned most of the track operations over to his son Jack and to trainer Robert Irwin.

He'll be missed and so will his stable since word from Nebraska is that the Van Berg name will fade out of horse racing and announcement of dispersal sales are expected most anytime.
