

(Mike) Hoben, assistant superintendent in charge of education, has prepared the following information for the Mail & Observer to enlighten students and their parents in answer to program as well as supplying the question, "What is independent study?" resource information for the I S program.

A regular meeting of the Board of Education of the Plymouth Community School District. Wayne and Washtenaw Counties, Michigan, was held on Tuesday, July 27, 1971, in the Board Room of the Administration Building. 1024 South Mill Street, Plymouth, Michigan, beginning at 8:00

The meeting was called to order by President Hulsing at 8:04 p.m. Present: Members Graves, Hanskat, Hulsing, Lawton, Ohno, Penar and Absent: None

Administrators present: Superintendent Rossman, Assistant Superintendents Blunk, Gibson and Hoben, Personnel Director Kee, Special Projects Director Doyle. Adm. It was moved by member Lawton and seconded by Member Ohno that Robert Watson, School Farm Manager, be authorized to purchase 1,000 bales of hay at 70 per hale for winter feeding needs at the farm, cost not

Superintendent Rossman reported on the latest revision of Senate Bill No. 804. State Aid Proposal, which proposes the gross allowance to be increased to \$564.90 per student from a previous figure of \$530.50. He also reported that the "grandfather clause" is still unknown but will probably cost the state more during the next year. He feels that Senator Carl Pursell is most interested in the views of the Board on this legislation. Any new information on state action will be reported to the Board for

assistance with the budget study.
Assistant Superintendent Hoben reported in a memo dated July 23, 1971. on concerns relative to the student population of Canton and Plymouth High Schools. He included three alternatives for consideration: (1) random^o selection of student population; (2) single-achool concept; and, (3) the two-achool concept. Mr. Hoben's recommendation to the Board was that the single-achool concept be adopted and felt the administration would be more simple in this method, especially while only Phase I is

completed.

Board members expressed opinions and asked many questions regarding all three concepts. It was felt that any decision could be reconsidered when Canton High School is a separate and complete facility. It was moved by Member Hanskat and seconded by Member Graves that the Assistant Superintendent-Instruction be authorized to proceed on the single-school concept for Plymouth High School and Canton High School

and that the March directive by the Board relative to the random

"selection of student population be withdrawn.

President Hulsing appointed the Personnel and Public Relations Committee of the Board to submit a recommendation at the regular meeting of August 9, 1971, rela-

Mr. Hoben also submitted a recommendation to the Board in the July 23, 1971, memo relative to parking lot control at Plymouth High School. His recommendation (with estimates by Sup'r of New Construction Goble) was to extend the fence on the present lot for student parking, install a 7 was to extend the fence on the present lot for student parking, install a 7 or 8' fence with an overhang, require a sticker on the ear and the showing of an identification card for entry, and a co-op release or early permit as well as identification when exiting the lot. This would require one more outlet from the lot and installation of 1,700' of fence at an approximate cost of \$6,100 with gates. A possible charge for parking was discussed. It was moved by Member Hanskat and seconded by Member Lawton to proceed with plans for fencing in the parking lot at Plymouth High School in accordance with the recommendations made, including another gate.

Mr. Hoben also reported to the Board that the call letters for the FM radio station had been approved by the Federal Communications Commission and are WEDP (School District of Plymouth). He also reported he had received word that the tall light pole installed on the athletic field, which might interfere with flight patterns, would not require notification to the Federal Aviation Authority.

Eli Stanesa, Project Manager for Widrig, O'Neill and Assoc., Inc., presented a recommendation that the contract for the Centennial Athletic Field Lighting be awarded to Jacobs Electrical Construction, Inc., Troy.

It was moved by Member Hanskat and seconded by Member Ohno that Canton High School Change Order No. 3 in the amount of \$14,091 be approved to provide architectural trades, mechanical trades and electrical trades for general shop area; \$615, \$5,245 and \$8,231 respectively. Aves: Members Graves, Hanskat, Hulsing, Lawton, Ohno, Penar and

Nays: None. The motion was carried.

A report and recommendation regarding a change in Transportation Policy was received from the District Safety Committee as requested by the Board June 14, 1971. The list of recommendations was read by President Hulsing. There was considerable discussion as to whether the Board should revert to the State law except where there are severe safety hazards and the feeling that educational dollars should be spent on education alone. No lives should be endangered for any reason. Member Hanskat felt that he could not concur with the recommendations as presented but there had not been sufficient time to collect and evaluate data. Member Penar thought that pressure should be put on Township government as soon as possible to provide safety devices and Parents' Committee was asked to cooperate on this. Mr. Blunk presented figures indicating about \$9,000 per bus would be required plus \$20.02 per student per year for operating costs, or about \$25,000 per year total.

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

President Hulsing asked that the budgeted figure be available The Final Report from the Report Card Committee to the Curriculum Council dated June 4, 1971, and submitted to the Board on June 22, 1971. was discussed in more detail. Assistant Sup't Hoben introduced the Committee members present and stated that the concern of the Committee had been with the major change in content for the elementary cards. Mary Fritz reported on the amount of citizen involvement which had preceded the recommendations made; i.e., pilot studies at Allen, Flegel. Bird and Isbister Schools. A "Code of Student Conduct for Elementary Schools" as presented to the Board in draft form dated June 10, 1971, by a Committee chaired by George Lawton was discussed. The Code would be provided as guidelines for parents, teachers and administrators in K-5 grades and would be an

It was decided not to adopt this policy until a uniform suspension and expulsion procedure can be written into it as well as other changes suggested. In view of a large number of changes in wording suggested by the Board following a lengthy discussion, it was decided to defer action on this procedure until a new draft can be presented and a uniform suspension and expulsion procedure written in. NEW BUSINESS - William Murdoch, Secretary. Planning Commission. Re: Action taken by the Planning Commission at their June 16, 1971 meeting. (a) Calvin C. Rock - Appl. No. 153. Rezoning of Outlot B. Arbor Village Subdivision No. 2 from R-1 to C-2. Property located north side of Ann Arbor Road, 300 feet east of Haggerty. Mr. James McCarthy, attorney, came before the Board on behalf of his client, the petitioner, Mr. Calvin C. Rock, and with the use of architectural drawings he described the location of the area under discussion and the proposed shopping center which would contain a drugstore, hardware store, dental and optical clinics, and a sit-down restaurant. He stated that C-1 requirements would be sufficient for their needs, with the exception of the need for the license for the drugstore to dispense alcoholic beverages. He indicated the egress and ingress in this area and the space for the parking of approximately 275 cars, and where the petitioner would erect a wall at the back of the property, said wall to meet the requirements of the residents in the area. Then in response to Mrs. Holmes' request the action of the Planning Commission as follows was read: "That application No. 153 for the rezoning of outlot B, Arbor Village Subdivision from R-1 to C-2 be given recommended denial to the Board of Trustees for the following reasons: (1) C-2 zoning as requested is more than is actually needed for the use contemplated, (2) the corner property is zoned T-0 which is a more restricted use, and to reverse that use would be backwards, (3) it represents an extension of strip commercial zoning." Following this, Mr. Rock came before the Board stating that during the public hearing on his petition there were no objections from contiguous property owners; or any statements that it would be an undesirable development, just that the residents thought the services to be rendered would represent a surplusage. Following these remarks, Mr. Breen stated that currently a study is underway on commerical development in the Township, and that it would be difficult for the Board to act on any request such as covered in Application No. 153.

In his capacity as chairman of the study committee, Mr. Ash stated that it is their feeling there should be neighborhood shopping centers throughout the Township, and where possible, they should be located adjacent to expressways and on section line roads, but that the commercial area should be concentrated in small or large units located throughout the Township and that strip-type commercial development should be done

Mrs. Holmes stated that she believed no action should be taken by the Board prior to the study committee submitting its recommendations, that she saw nothing wrong with the proposal in Application No. 153, other than being premature, but for the aforesaid reasons, she would move that the Board accept the recommendation of the Planning Commission and deny the request for the change in zoning from R-1 to C-2 as covered by

Application No. 153. Seconded by Mr. Ash and carried unanimously. Following this, and in response to a question by Mr. McCarthy, Mr. Breen stated that the reasons for the denial were those stated in the motion made in the meeting of the Planning Commission on June 16. 1971, as mentioned above, and for the reason that a study is presently being made as to the commercial needs of the community.
