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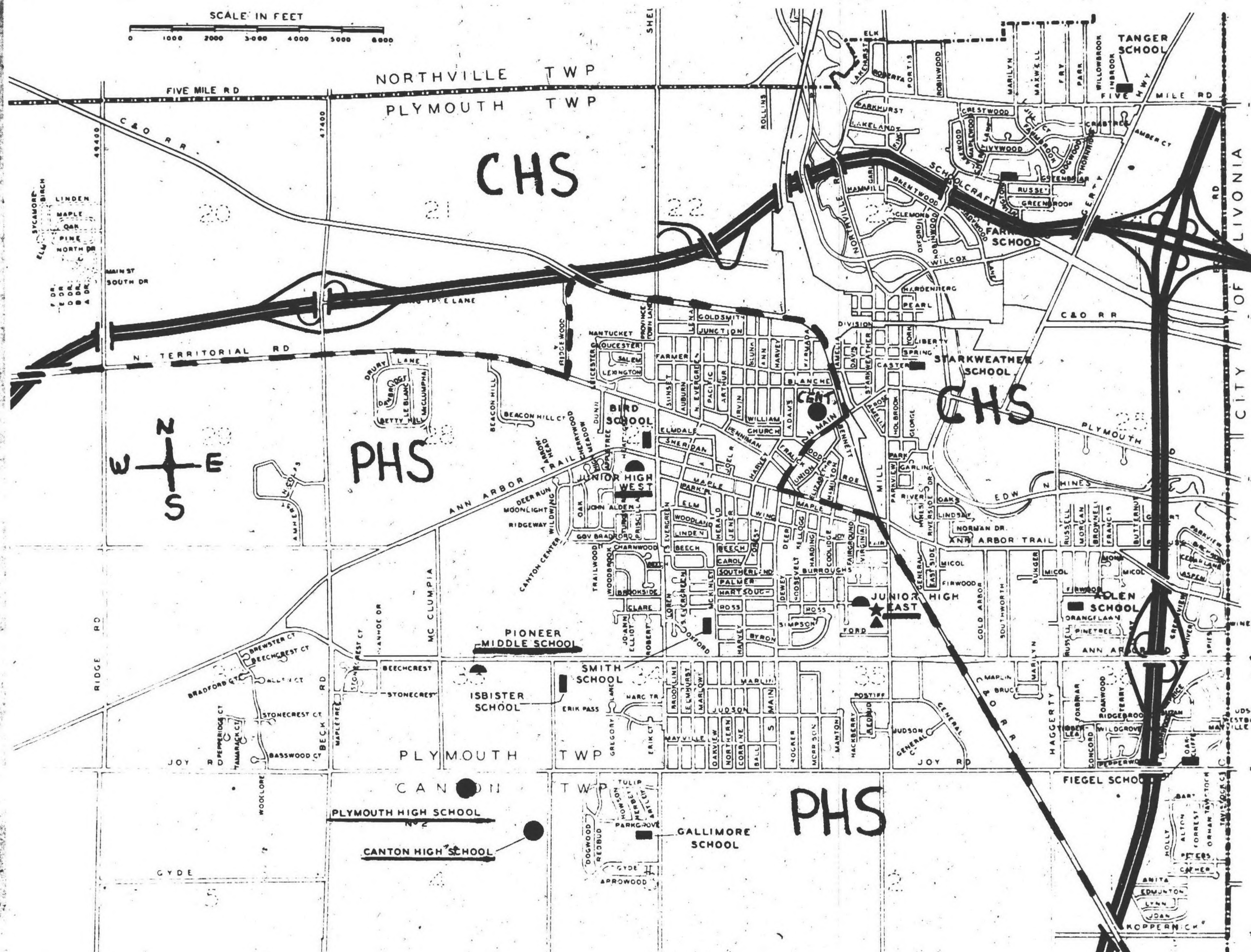

PHS, CHS Enrollment Areas Set



TERRITORIAL ROAD AND THE C&O TRACKS form the basic boundary, as shown by the dotted line, which will become effective next September to determine which students attend Plymouth High School and which ones will go to Canton High School. With minor exceptions,

PHS will draw from the area south of Territorial and west of the C&O. CHS from the north and east. The heavy divided lines show the routes the M-14 (east-west) and I-275 (north-south) freeways will follow.

Canton High School will be ready to accept approximately 1,400 students in September, and right next door on the same property in Centennial Educational Park will be Plymouth High School where the student body will number about 2,000. For one year they will operate as a single entity.

For months, the board of education has wrestled with the problem of how to let families know early in their children's lives for which school they are destined, and finally has given its answer.

Instead of drawing names from a hat, or using some blind-stab random selection system, the Plymouth School District has been divided into two areas by a line which runs along Territorial Rd. from the district's western boundary in Washtenaw County, then jogs

at Ridgewood to join the C&O tracks for most of the remainder of its southeastern course.

South and west, or "inside," that line, pupils know now they will go to PHS. North and east, or "outside" the line, their ultimate classroom home will be the structure identified as CHS.

The complications of the plan, which is based upon an elementary and middle school feeder system, demand a thorough understanding by all parents and students to avoid unnecessary confusion.

OF PARAMOUNT importance is the realization that for the academic year of 1972-73, which will open in September, all seniors will be housed in PHS, where they now are 11th graders.

For a year, it will be one campus but with two buildings and will be known simply as Plymouth High School. There

will be just one Plymouth football team, one basketball team, one band, etc. Some persons have suggested that the two buildings could be more easily identified by calling PHS, on Joy Rd., "Plymouth North" and CHS, on Canton Center Rd., "Plymouth East," but the school board has avoided this means of identification even though still a third high school - which might be "South" or "West" - is planned for the same park within the '70s.

In the fall of 1973, PHS and CHS will begin operating as two separate and full fledged high schools, each with its own program and staff in athletics, music and all other activities.

Athletically, PHS will continue in the Suburban Eight conference and CHS will take up membership in the Western Six as a colleague of Northville, Farmington Harrison, Waterford Mott,

Livonia Churchill and Walled Lake Western.

The high school complex will become a full four-year operation, ninth through 12th grades, this coming fall, thus ending Central Junior High School's service as a school only for ninth graders. At that time Central will become the fourth middle school, housing sixth, seventh and eighth grades just like West, Pioneer and East.

THIS MEANS that all present eighth and ninth grade students will go to classes at Centennial Park next fall as new high schoolers. This is how the feeder plan will identify who goes where, inasmuch as even the present eighth and ninth grades will be placed according to the 1972-73 geographic lines:

Plymouth High
1. Students from Smith and Bird Elementary Schools,

feeding through West Middle School.

2. Students from Miller, Gallimore and Isbister Elementary Schools, feeding through Pioneer Middle School.

Canton High
1. Students from Farrand, Tanger and Starkweather Elementary Schools feeding through the newly constituted Central Middle School.

2. Students from Allen and Fiegel Elementary Schools feeding through East Middle School.

The boundaries of the elementary school area in which a family lives are the real key to where the children will be going to high school, and by using this residency plan even the current ninth graders who are all in one melting pot at Central can be assigned.

The boundary through the district starts at the Washtenaw line, follows Territorial eastward to Ridgewood, swings north to the C&O, follows the tracks to N. Main St., goes down Main to Ann Arbor Trail and then eastward back to the tracks again, continuing along the C&O to the district's eastern edge.

THERE ARE two neighborhoods in which students are going to have the option of deciding whether to attend PHS or CHS. These are the pockets surrounding Central and East.

In Central's case it will be the area between the C&O, Harvey, Junction and Church. The same will be true for the East neighborhood inside the boundaries of the C&O, Coolidge, Joy and Hartsough.

'Heights' Cityhood Again On Ballot

Plymouth Township residents who live east of McClumpha Rd. - and that's about 90 per cent of the population - are about to vote for the fifth time on whether they want to incorporate as the City of Plymouth Heights. It all started in 1959 when a handful of township voters gained a slight majority in favor of independent cityhood to block annexation efforts by the City of Plymouth, but it can't be a reality until a charter is approved at the polls.

In a special election on Tuesday, March 14, the newest charter will be up for vote, along with a slate of officers who would take over if the charter is adopted.

The candidates are former supervisor John D. McEwen for mayor, Mrs. Helen Richardson for clerk, Mrs. Elizabeth Holmes for

treasurer and, as councilmen, Gene Overholt, Robert Kenyon, Richard Wickard, Martin Schomberger, Louis Norman and Mary Rorabacher.

Mrs. Richardson and Mrs. Holmes currently serve as township clerk and treasurer respectively.

EVEN THE participants in campaign efforts for approval of the charter admit the prolonged 13-year incorporation proposal is strictly a defensive measure against any attempts at piecemeal annexation, but opponents label it a sham that also blocks any serious consideration of merger between city and township.

Perpetuation has been possible because, under state law, after each defeat of a specific charter, it has been permissible to petition again

for the election of a new charter commission to begin the process all over. This has gone on since 1959 with the regularity of sunrise and sunset.

Charters have been beaten by ballot majorities of 1,589 to

35 in 1961, 658 to 46 in 1963, 1,038 to 273 in 1966 and 851 to 71 in 1969.

Despite these overwhelming margins, there is growing concern among opponents that this year the McEwen machine that once dominated

Township Hall is bidding seriously for charter approval.

Incorporation would require the new city to provide all regular municipal services, including police protection, and obviously would bring

about a tax restructuring.

THE AREA that would be included if Plymouth Heights actually comes into being covers 8.3 square miles of the township, being bounded by McClumpha, Five Mile, Eckles and Joy Rds.

It includes all of Precincts 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 8 and 9, plus about half of Precinct 6 and only a small fraction of Precinct 7. It is estimated that more than 5,300 registered voters live in the area.

For McEwen, who retired from Wayne County's employ on a pension before going to work for the township in the early '60s, running on the Plymouth Heights ballot for mayor is "old hat." He has held that de facto title since the original incorporation election in 1959, and it has been renewed at each subsequent election.

Mainland China Will Be Studied

Corresponding with a new era in international relations with mainland China, Schoolcraft College will offer a course in history entitled "China: The Old and New."

Mrs. Amelia Chan, a Chinese studies graduate student at the University of Michigan, will conduct the 10 week non-credit course beginning Wednesday, March 8.

Registration will be on the first class night March 8 at 7 p.m. in Bradner Library, Room 100. Course fee is \$12.

Chinese civilization will be examined in historical perspective. The traditional Chinese family, their education and modifications under the current regime will be discussed.

Characteristics of Chinese society will be related to current national trends and events. The course outline begins with an introductory class, and includes dominant philosophies shaping Chinese thought, basic characteristics of Imperial China, major Chinese dynasties, fall of Imperial China and rise of the republic, birth of communism and end of the republic, Chinese communist regime - political make-up, economy: industry and agriculture; Chinese family - traditional and modern; and education - traditional and contemporary.

Post Term Classes At Madonna

Registration for post term classes at Madonna College on Schoolcraft, near Newburgh Road, will take place on March 6 from 9-11 a.m. and 3-5 p.m. and on March 7 from 7-8 p.m.

There will be two post term sessions: A five-week session scheduled from May 2-June 1 and a six-week session running from May 2-June 9.

Courses in the May 2-June 1 session are: Revolution in the 20th century, race relations in American life, man and society, speech arts and forms, linear algebra and music theory I.

Courses in the May 2-June 9 session are: Elements of inorganic and organic chemistry, community health, and word of God II.

Word of God II is the second part of phase II of the Detroit archdiocesan catechist training program. The course will cover the New Testament including the beginning of the church. The course may be taken for two credits or for no credit.

Plymouth Township Supervisor Maurice Breen was elected vice chairman and Westland Mayor Gene McKinney was elected secretary-treasurer.

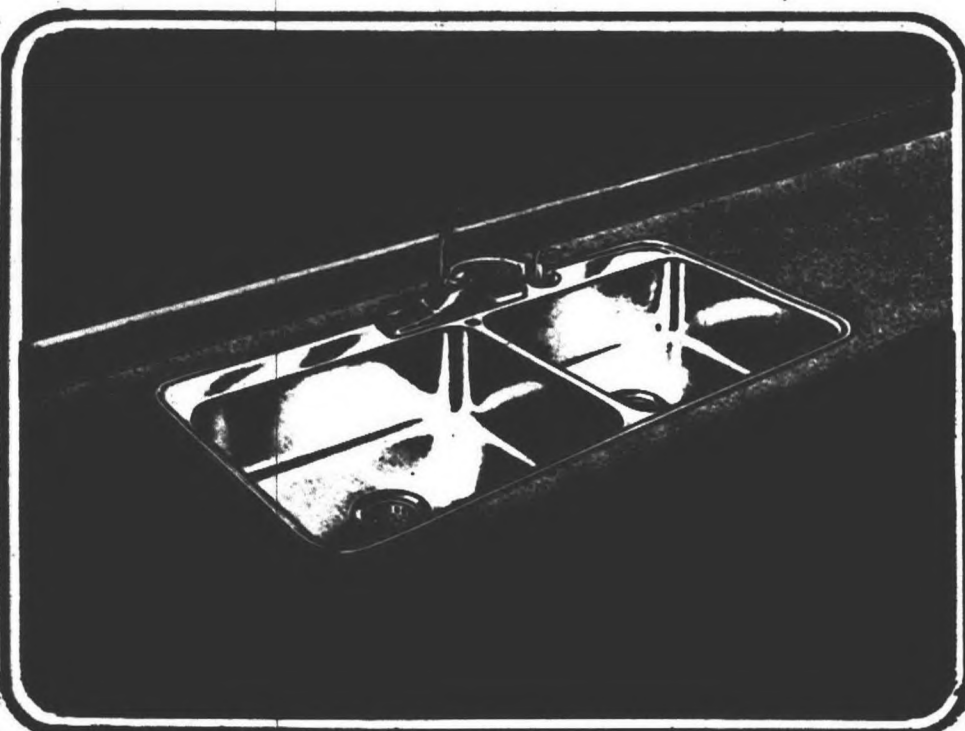
McNamara, Livonia mayor since 1970, has been active in municipal, school and county government since 1954. Before his election, he was a councilman for eight years.

The Clarenceville Board of Education authorized the drum set purchase at its Feb. 10 meeting.



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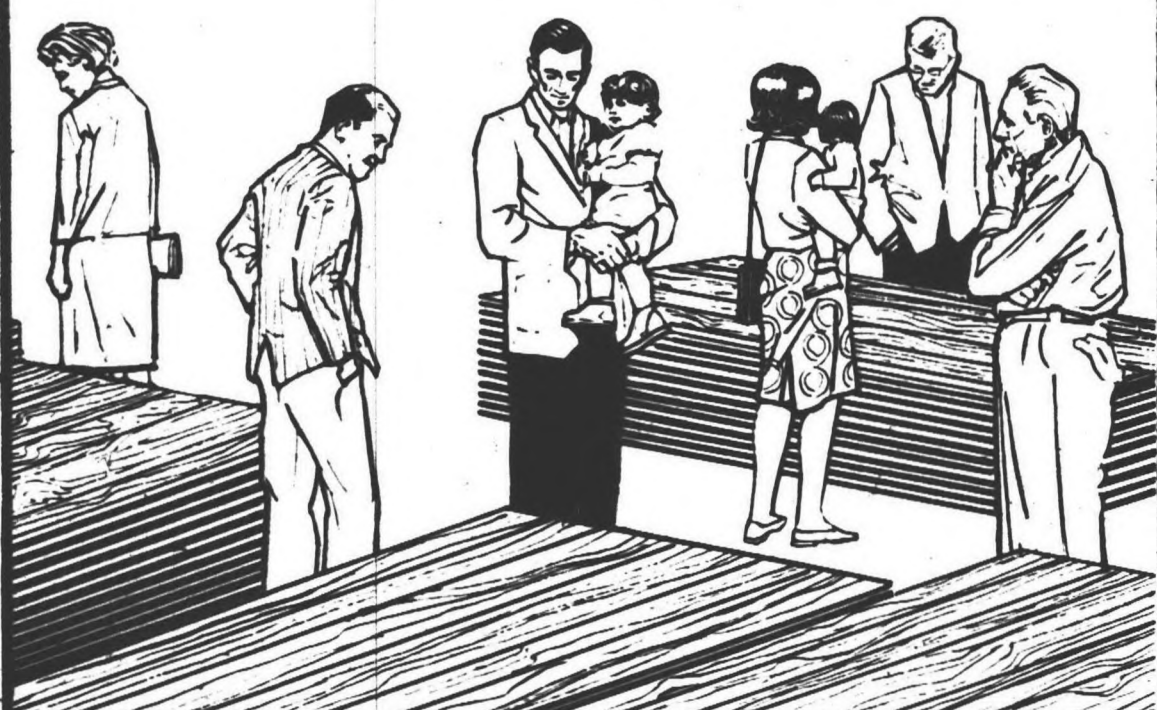
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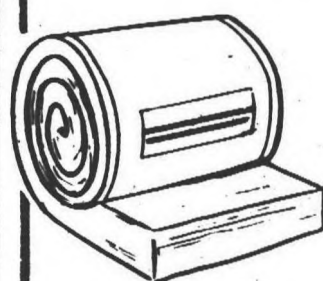
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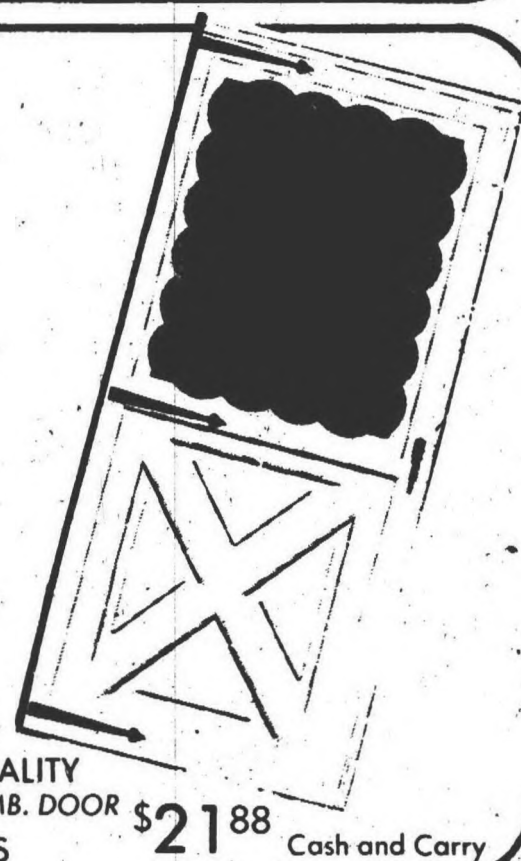
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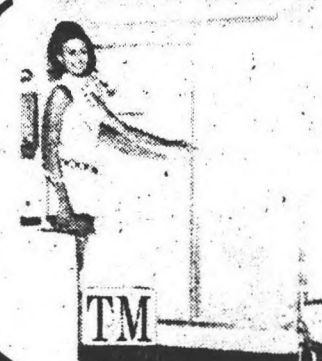
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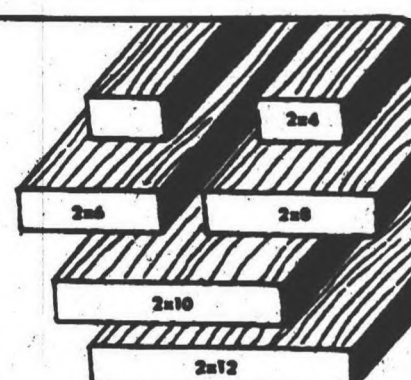
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3 Will Retire From Schools

PLYMOUTH An elementary principal, a former Plymouth High School principal and a teacher will retire from Plymouth schools in June.

At the conclusion of her 19th year as principal of Starkweather Elementary School, Mildred Field will retire.

Miss Field has served as an educator for the past 46 years, the last 24 of which have been in Plymouth.

After graduating from Bangor High School in Bangor, Mich., she taught in several Michigan communities. Miss Field came to Plymouth as a visiting teacher

in 1948 and was appointed principal of Starkweather in 1953.

In 1967 she was honored for dedicated service by an official proclamation of the board of education. Under the retirement allowance, Miss Field will be paid \$50 for each year of service in Plymouth, totaling \$1,200, upon her retirement in June.

ALSO RETIRING from the school system after 43 years of service is Carvel Bentley, co-op coordinator in Plymouth High School.

Bentley was a science teacher from 1929 to 1937 and then became co-op coordinator between 1937-51. He was appointed Plymouth High School principal in 1951, a post he held for 13 years.

For the past three years, Bentley has been directing the co-op program he originated in the Plymouth schools.

Except for one year in military service during World War II, Bentley has served in the district continuously. Under the retirement provisions, he will receive \$1,500 in retirement benefits at the conclusion of his 30th year in the system.

Evelyn Edgar, PHS English teacher, will retire from Plymouth after 12 years of teaching in the district. Mrs. Edgar is active in the Detroit and Michigan Audubon Society and has edited their newsletter in recent years.

She has accumulated a collection of environmental materials which she is willing to share with Plymouth teachers and the libraries. Mrs. Edgar will receive \$600 in retirement benefits.



DR. THOMAS KLUCKA, a Plymouth resident who is associate radiologist at Garden City Osteopathic Hospital, has resigned to become chairman of the department of radiology at the Corpus Christi (Tex.) Osteopathic Hospital. Dr. Klucka and his wife Terry and two children have lived in Plymouth eight years. He is a member of the council of Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic Church.

plymouth THROUGH BIFOCALS

I WISH I KNEW MORE about the origination of the family name Guideau, of whom we have a Chuck in our community, because at the Boy Scout testimonial banquet in his honor Friday, after 30 years as a scoutmaster, it became obvious that the words Guideau and guidance are synonymous.

It takes a special breed of man to gain the respect and love that was evidenced by friends, colleagues and many of the thousand boys who have passed under his wing. Although I know Chuck Guideau but slightly, the thing that impressed me was the down-to-earth sincerity of it all.

The Chinese are calling this the year of the rat. In my dodge, it's the year of the cynic, meaning that before the '72 campaign has run its course, testimonial dinners will be as commonplace as crabgrass and just as valuable. But there wasn't anything phony about the party for Guideau.

Here's a man, 61, who never has been elected to anything. He's never held public office and never has been appointed to any of our wide variety of local governmental boards or commissions. Yet, what he has done for the good of mankind puts many of those who have to shame.

THERE WEREN'T ANY fancy vote-getting orations at this gathering of the commonfolk in the VFW Hall, but instead there was a lot of reminiscing, many laughs born from the womb of recollection, and, yes, a few understandable happy tears -- all Chuck's.

Mr. Guideau is a painter by trade. This doesn't mean he's a Van Gogh of the canvas, but your house may look better because of his brush. What he really is most, friends, is an artist with boys and along the way this devotion and service to youth has made this native of Wyandotte one of our distinguished wearers of scouting's silver beaver.

I never was much shakes as a scout myself, winning barely enough merit badges to qualify for the rank of star, and it awes me that Chuck has guided nine of his boys to the lofty plateau of eagle status, with a 10th just around the corner.

However, the real value of the scouting program can't be measured just in numerical terms of badges attained. It starts with the opening words of the scout oath, "On my honor, I will do my best to do my duty to God and my country." Any boy who, after leaving the scouts, can look back and say, "I did my best," will be a better man.

That goes even for the guy who poured castor oil through my bugle one summer at Camp Madron many years ago. Not only did he recognize my own poor musicianship, but it demonstrated an affinity for

medicines that was to lead him into a brilliant career as an authority on cures for constipation.

THEY GAVE Chuck Guideau all sorts of keepsakes Friday -- plaques, governmental resolutions, a scrapbook of his scouting years prepared by his children, a picture of his very first troop, and a lot of well-meant stuff like that to warm the heart as the years go by.

There also were letters and telegrams, and there was one in particular from which I would like to quote because it says it all.

The opening tells of the pleasure at learning "that your colleagues and many friends are paying tribute to you in recognition of your outstanding work in scouting which has spanned three decades." Then it continues:

"Certainly great satisfaction must be yours on this special occasion. The numerous scouts who have come under your guidance have been fortunate to have a leader willing to give so generously of his time.

"Your dedication to the high standards of scouting has done much to prepare young men for the duties and opportunities of good citizenship, and concurrently has strengthened the fiber of our free society. All America will benefit from your good work."

Any one of us, regardless of political leanings, would be proud to frame and then hang that letter in the den. It came from the White House.

Crash Maims Father, Daughter

PLYMOUTH A stalled car and a call for help ended in catastrophe for a 52-year-old Plymouth Township man and his 21-year-old daughter, Thursday night. Each lost a leg.

According to Washtenaw County Sheriff's deputies, William F. Fox and his daughter Patrice, both of 49833 Pine, were maimed while trying to start her car with jumper cables from his car on the shoulder of Plymouth Road, near Ayrshire Road (one mile east of where US-23 crosses).

A Plymouth man, Russel A. Zoelling, 31, of 1199 Sheldon Road, was charged with felonious driving in connection with the accident.

SHERIFF'S DEPUTIES gave this account of the accident:

Patrice Fox had called her father, William, about 7:30 p.m. Thursday and asked him to come to her assistance because her car had stalled on Plymouth Road. Her car was parked on the south shoulder of the road, facing towards Plymouth near Ayrshire Road.

Fox went to her aid and pulled his car up nose-to-nose with her car on the shoulder and the two of them were working on her car, standing between the two cars.

At 7:58 p.m. Zoelling was driving toward Plymouth when his car left the road and struck the rear of Patrice Fox's car, pinning the father and daughter between their cars.

The crash severed Fox's lower right leg and crushed his other leg and Patrice's right leg. They were taken to

St. Joseph Hospital in Ann Arbor where surgeons amputated Fox's left leg and Patrice's right leg.

Both were admitted in critical condition, but Miss Fox's condition had improved to satisfactory and Fox's condition was listed as fair by the hospital Monday.

Several friends of the family in the Plymouth area were asked to donate blood for Fox.

Zoelling was also taken to St. Joseph where he was treated for minor injuries and released.

School Heads Ask Retro Pay

PLYMOUTH The Plymouth Board of Education will apply to the Pay Board for permission to grant retroactive pay to school administrators.

After brief discussion Monday, the board voted to apply for permission to grant the retroactive pay but did not take action on the request for maintenance personnel for application for retroactive pay.

By taking no action on the

request of maintenance personnel, the board left the decision to apply for the pay to the maintenance union.

A similar request of the teacher's union (the Plymouth Education Assn.) to apply for retroactive pay had been denied by the board in January because the board decided it was not in a position to apply for funds that are not in the current budget.

The union applied on its own for the permission.

PLYMOUTH Two sabbaticals were granted to Plymouth teachers in personnel action approved by the Plymouth Board of Education Monday.

Mrs. Margaret Kelly, French teacher at Central Junior High School, will take a one-year leave to attend the University of Nice in southern France to study the French language and culture.

She also plans to travel through France and western Europe. The sabbatical leave committee recommended the leave because it will "improve her effectiveness as a teacher

and enrich her classroom program for the students."

Jurrien Winter, mathematics teacher at Central, was granted a half-year leave to attend Eastern Michigan University to fulfill his residency requirement and his internship for his educational specialist's degree.

Winter plans to do his internship at East Middle School "which will help to give leadership to the many curriculum and administrative studies now being conducted at the middle school level," according to the sabbatical committee.

He will be on sabbatical during the second semester beginning Jan. 26, 1973.

The board also approved one new hire and two leaves of absence.

Maternity leaves were granted to Sheila Dierkes, second grade teacher at Allen, and to Arlene DeForest, sixth grade teacher at West Middle School.

Grandmother's Cooking Best

Pot shots at the sages of the Round Table - okay. Muck-raking in the township offices - okay. But this time you've gone too far when you implied grandmothers are lousy cooks.

I was fortunate in having been blessed with a grandmother who cooked soul food long before it was fashionable. Those were depression days when budget cuts of meat were turned into mouth-watering dishes whose aroma had one and all drooling and impatient to get to the table.

At her home we were treated to Spanish rice, Hungarian goulash, German fried potatoes, Swiss steak, ham Hawaiian, New England boiled dinner and Irish stew. Then there was the real soul food - salt pork gravy on boiled potatoes, fried salt pork and green beans, new potatoes and fresh peas, fried ham and milk gravy on mashed potatoes, dandelion greens and bacon, fried parsnips - the list is endless.

All these good dishes were economy meals of my youth but made so tastily that even you would have enjoyed them. Oh, yes, my grandmother hammered the round steak into submission with the edge of a dinner plate and a goodly supply of flour on each piece, but it was cooked with onions and simmered into flaky tenderness easily cut with a fork.

All these delicious dishes were prepared in the cast iron cookware, not convenient, easy-clean, teflon-coated pots and pans for Grandma.

I, too, enjoy the delicacies so carefully prepared these days by modern cooks. We should all be gourmet cooks with the multitude of conveniences at hand such as freeze-dried, fresh frozen, ready-mix and instant products. However, the grandma who turned out these same tasty items from scratch gets my vote for cook of the year.

Land Sale May Mean Relocating Art Gallery

PLYMOUTH
Plymouth's city government has come face to face with the fact that sometimes "progress" has perplexing by-products, demonstrated at the moment by the question of how Msgr. Edward J. Hickey's Art Guild gallery can be retained in the community.

The old home which houses the gallery at 687 W. Ann Arbor Trail, originally owned by the late Dr. Luther Peck, became a target for "progress" when it was found it would have to give way to permit completion of the Deer St. paving.

The city was stymied at that time because of inability to work out details with the owner of the property, Atty. Earl Demel.

MORE RECENTLY, however, Demel has sold the lot on which the gallery stands, plus his Colonial Professional Bldg. near by, to another party, and this has brought the municipal government right back into the picture in an attempt to preserve the gallery as a local attraction.

The City Commission has authorized paying \$9,700 for the 15-foot street right-of-way needed to finish the paving, this price also giving the city ownership of the house itself—either to be demolished or moved.

All parties involved, including Mayor James McKeon and fellow commissioners, Msgr. Hickey, Demel and the purchaser of the land, Jack Cooper, have embarked on a "save the gallery" course of

action, and serious thought is being given to moving the house to another site.

The location mentioned most often is a piece of city-owned property at the corner of Starkweather and Farmer, which is now vacant. However, no final decision has yet been made, nor have costs of moving the structure or lease arrangements been determined.

Msgr. Hickey brought his many works of art to Plymouth for safe keeping from Detroit during the riotous outbreak of 1967, and the public gallery resulted. It is considered one of the city's foremost cultural attractions, and civic leaders are bending every effort to work out the details that will keep the gallery in Plymouth.

Meet Lord Finnegan

Now that most of the high schools in Observer-land list wrestling as a major sport and the pro grapplers have invaded the plush sanctum of the new Plymouth High School, The Stroller can't help but feel that Adam Weissmuller would be rocking with laughter if he were living today.

You won't find Adam's name in the record books, but during the Roaring '20s — a period which often has been referred to as the "era of wonderful nonsense" — he provided more laughs per week than any other promoter, while controlling the wrestling "trust" in the state.

He wasn't always a rollicking promoter. He came by that role after a bit of misfortune that would have made cynics out of many men.

At the height of his athletic career Adam was a better than average welterweight wrestler. As was his wont, he never turned his back on a fellow in distress and one night wrestled a charity match on a dirty mat.

He wound up with an attack of glaucoma that confined him to a dark room for nearly two years. Even then he had only a partial return of vision, and during his long days of agony, he vowed if ever given the chance he would spend most of his waking hours in laughter.

WITH THIS in mind, he gathered a few friends and revealed plans to promote professional wrestling on a higher scale than it ever had been known and he added, "We'll do it for laughs."

That's how he came into the role of a promoter at the old Arena Gardens on Woodward Avenue in Detroit, and the dean of the Weissmuller School of Wrestling that attracted some of the oddest characters the sports scene in Michigan ever had seen.

Knowing that the fans would appreciate a laugh or two along with competition, Adam not only taught the various "holds" but concentrated on facial expressions. A novice was taught the facial expressions to display anger or pain. Other expressions would exemplify rage, etc., until he had a complete curriculum.

One's education wasn't complete — even with the mastering of expressions until wearing apparel entered into the picture. Any member of Adam's "stable" had to dress in a manner to attract attention.

His headquarters was much like a menagerie on Monday mornings when the "heroes" and "villains" gathered to get their weekly instructions and were told long in advance the outcome of their matches.

"If these fellows listen to me," Adam often chuckled, "I could make a fortune for a 'bum' — the rank reserved for those with little or no ability."

TO PROVE IT, one year he made the remark "I could take the worst 'bum' I have and get him adopted by Grosse Pointe society."

Well, he got the bum in the person of a rather tall, good looking blond fellow from Ohio, who had been bumming around the country successfully escaping work and had been attracted to wrestling as a last resort.

"Here's my man," said Adam.

Then his imagination went to work.

He got the bum cleaned up and dressed in a tailored suit — plus a monocle and a high silk hat.

Once the man was attired to his taste, Adam looked at the finished product and announced —

"From today on, you are Lord Lansdowne Finnegan — and you're an Irishman."

The rest was easy. The "lord" entered the ring each week with fashionably dressed seconds, and his opponents took their graceful falls on schedule until Lord Lansdowne Finnegan became the rage of the sports pages.

Then it happened.

Because of his popularity, Lord Lansdowne Finnegan was invited to display his wares for charity in Grosse Pointe and became the darling of east side social climbers.

That one triumph more than balanced many of Adam's dark days when he sat in a dark room in almost total blindness.

And while the sports world laughed, no one enjoyed the fun more than Adam, who chuckled all the way to the bank.

No wonder they called that era "The days of wonderful nonsense."

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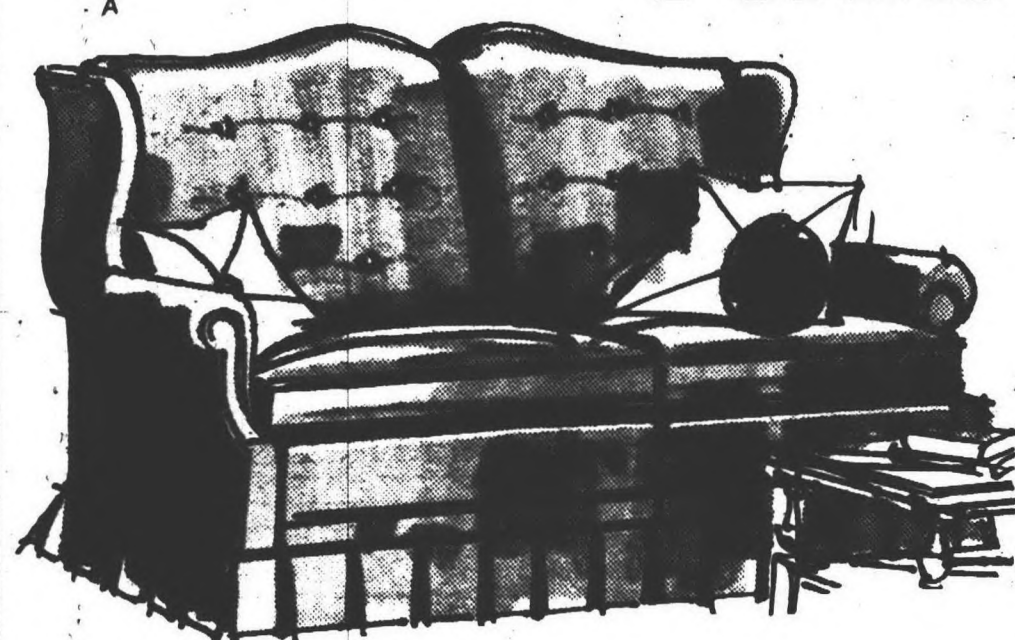

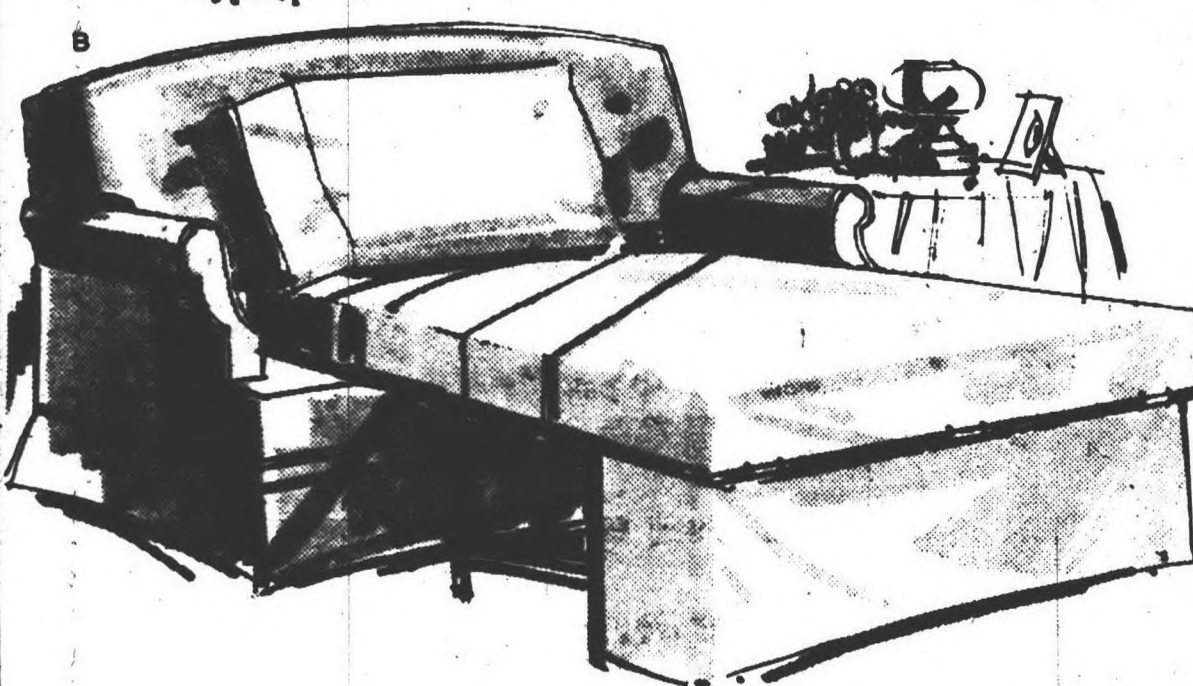

On the positive side of finance, David and Marymae Klein have written "Super-shopper," a guide to spending and saving. The authors begin with suggestions on how to increase income, describe how the market place operates, selling techniques to be wary of, and include a final chapter telling how to make sure your protest is heard.

"Annie," Paul Smith's new heroine, is a 12-year-old child of the Dublin slums who scrounges for a means of livelihood and independence. The novel celebrates the courage and resourcefulness of youth.

In Maia Wojciechowska's "The Rotten Years," an unusually "hip" high school

teacher defies local conventions to bridge the generation gap. She incurs the wrath of parents and administration and pays a high price for her courage and conviction.

"There Was a Season," relates the love story of Jefferson Davis and Sarah Knox Taylor, daughter of Zachary Taylor. This biographical, historical novel covers the period of the Black Hawk War of 1832.

In Paul Gallico's "The Zoo Gang," the glamorous Riviera is upset by crime — a jewel heist, a kidnapping, and the theft of a priceless art collection. Five men who banded together in the underground resistance 30 years ago, emerge again to fight the underworld and solve the crimes.

"Spider in the Morning," by Duff Hart-Davis pits an aggressive newswoman against a supposedly dead syndicate head. A kidnapped beauty and a deal to save her life provide action and suspense over 6,000 miles from Delhi to London.

Marsh Makes Plea For Sexual Minorities

Sexual name tags such as "heterosexual" and "homosexual" would be eradicated if Dr. Earle Marsh, nationally known gynecologist, had his way.
"There's no such thing as an unnatural sexual act," Dr. Marsh said in a series of lectures on sex at Schoolcraft College.
Emphasizing that he was speaking from a biological point of view, he said that all sexual acts are natural though some may be considered immoral, illegal or unwise by some persons.

"IT'S TOO BAD that we use terms like homosexual (between persons of the same sex) or heterosexual (between persons of opposite sexes)," Dr. Marsh said. "I wish it were seen as just one big umbrella of sexuality including under it sex between men and women, men and men, women and women and so on."

He hopes the country is approaching an era where, such as in England, any form of sex between consenting persons is acceptable.

Though it may be gaining acceptance through the Gay Liberation movement, homosexuality is still illegal in the United States.

Studies have indicated that

films, also spoke briefly about other sexual minorities.

Though the field of knowledge is limited on these minorities, Dr. Marsh asked a little understanding and sympathy for persons who vary from the so-called "norm" set by society.

He said that the child molester generally doesn't intend to do any harm, but rather is lonely and seeking some love and tenderness. He is "trying to feel a little warmth from a young tender body because he (the molester) is so alone," Dr. Marsh said.

Briefly mentioning sadists (persons who get pleasure from inflicting pain on others) and masochists (persons who get pleasure from pain), he said that "some of the most benevolent relationships I have seen are between sadists and masochists."

A transvestite (one who occasionally dresses as the opposite sex) is heterosexual and has been described to Dr. Marsh by a male transvestite as one who "likes to dress as a woman because of the sense of being able to hide from masculine responsibilities."

THE UNHAPPIEST of the sexual minorities are the transsexuals who are for the most part men who feel as "though they are females trapped in a male body," Dr. Marsh said.

"These are really the intense heartaches," he said, adding that if they do really feel trapped in their physical sex, then "why rob this individual of happiness?"

When an operation is performed to make a woman of a man, it is as "though this person had suddenly come home," Marsh told his audience.

So far an operation to convert a woman to a man has not been successfully completed, he added.
Dr. Marsh concluded with a plea for understanding "for those who are different from you."

"May you have the biological point of view."

WOMEN, ON the other hand, are developing sexual awareness between ages 19 and 25 and really "turn on" somewhere between ages 30 and 40, when heterosexual activity is acceptable, he said.

"Wow, look out for that age," Dr. Marsh cautioned. "Once she turns on it goes up from then on."

Whereas men level off in sexual drive after age 15 and continue on that level to an indefinite age, women continue to climb in sexual drive after the "turn on" age, he said.

Of the 35 per cent of men who have homosexual contact at an early age, 12 per cent continue as bisexuals and six per cent remain homosexual, he said.

"I only bring this out hoping that you can develop some compassion for people who don't follow the so-called average majority," Dr. Marsh said.

THE GYNECOLOGIST, who has written several articles and produced several

To communicate an understanding and appreciation of those notes and that symphony was one of the aims of famed gynecologist Dr. Earle Marsh who spoke to at least 500 young and old persons in a series of lectures on sexuality at Schoolcraft College last week.

"I want you to learn to enjoy the whole symphony — including the last note," Dr. Marsh said.

The physiology of sex, sexual minorities, sensuality, and cultural influences were all covered in Dr. Marsh's four evening lectures, but probably the most impressive aspect of the series was Dr. Marsh himself.

His expertise is testified to by a long list of credentials, but the spirit of the man and his love of life and living as well as his totally candid approach is what kept the audience in the palm of his hand.

"If I do nothing else, I would like to have you fall in love with who you are," he told his audience emphasizing the importance of knowing oneself—emotionally and physically.

Knowing oneself entails learning what emotion the individual is composed of as well as learning the sensitive areas of one's own body.

Learn what these areas are, he advised, and then communicate them to your lover.

"Each person has to teach his mate how to make love to him," Dr. Marsh explained, drawing on personal and professional experiences to exemplify his point.

Our culture has programmed men and women into specific roles that complicate relationships between them, he said.

Men are conditioned to be tough, aggressive, are "performance" oriented in their sex lives with an erection and orgasm their prime concerns.

But women like the romance, tenderness and affection of lovemaking.

Problems in the sex lives of couples stem from these differences but can be remedied by combining "sensuality" with sexuality. Leaving love notes for each other, showing "silly signs of affection, burning candles and playing records while slowly building into the art of lovemaking are all "corny," but somehow meaningful and sensual ways he suggested of putting romance, tenderness and renewed love into a relationship.

Dr. Marsh explained the physiology of sex with drawings of the genitals and candid explanations of the way men and women excite each other.

Though women turn on slower than men and are capable of going without sexual relations for longer periods of time, women also are more intense when they are turned on.

"The turned on female defies description," the gynecologist said. "The pattern of sexual expression in a woman is really something almost undecipherable."

And to come to that intense level of sexual expression takes a vast amount of tenderness and love.

He urged that individuals learn to open up and communicate with one another and live each moment of each day to the fullest. Should depression creep into it, concentrate all efforts on observing how depression affects the individual, until the depression becomes observation and dissolves.

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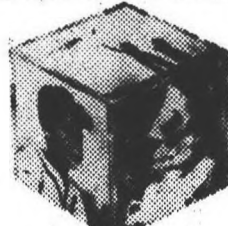
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Start Running For Precinct Delegate

Interested in becoming a party precinct delegate?

If so, you can start working toward your own election any time now. Precinct delegates, the basic unit of political party structures, will be elected on May 16 during the presidential preference primary.

All a prospective delegate need do is get a petition from the city or township clerk and collect signatures from at least 15 but not more than 20 registered voters from his precinct. The petition must be returned by March 24.

EVEN PERSONS who haven't turned 18 yet, but will reach voting age on or before May 16, are eligible to run for election.

In fact, any young adult who will be 18 in time for the primary may vote if he registers with the clerk by April 14. Even if his birthday is after April 14 and before May 16, he must be registered one month in advance of the election.

Just how many precinct delegates will be elected for each party in each precinct is uncertain.

The bill which creates the primary also provides that delegates be elected in accordance with the one-man one vote concept.

That has been the practice throughout the state except in Wayne, Oakland and Kent Counties. These counties had voted against following this practice 40 years ago and thus couldn't reverse this stance until the primary bill passed, according to Aldo Vagnozzi, 19th District Democratic chairman.

THE PRIMARY bill leaves it up to the individual party structure on what population base to use in determining the number of delegates per precinct.

Though the bill permits one delegate for every 50 partisan votes in the last election for secretary of state, the population figure used will probably be between 200 and 300 (the maximum) Vagnozzi said.

But since each precinct is sure of having at least one delegate, interested persons may start collecting signatures.

ELECTED delegates will attend county or district conventions. There they will elect delegates to the state.

ELECTED delegates will attend county or district conventions. There they will elect delegates to the state convention and at the state convention will elect national convention delegates.

Democrats will send 132 delegates to their national convention and Republicans 48.

A prospective delegate must indicate on his petition whether he intends to run

"uncommitted," that is, not committed to a specific presidential hopeful.

But a loophole in the primary bill makes it unclear if prospective delegates must indicate which candidate they are committed to on their petitions before collecting signatures. A candidate must indicate who he is committed

to when he filed the petition, if not sooner.

DELEGATES TO national conventions must be elected in proportion (as near as possible) to the number of votes received by each presidential hopeful and to the portion of uncommitted votes. Thus if one candidate draws

10 per cent of the state vote, the state convention delegates must elect a national convention delegate reflecting 10 per cent delegates for that candidate.

State party officials have until March 10 to file the rules, regulations and procedures which will govern how national convention delegates will be elected and how many delegates will be elected from each precinct.

County conventions for the 19th Congressional District have been tentatively set for June 2. A separate convention must be held for that part of the district which is in Oakland County and that which is in Wayne County.

Democratic county conventions are tentatively scheduled for June 2, and the state convention is almost certain to be June 10 and 11. The law stipulates that county conventions for the same party be held on the same date.

The Democratic State Central committee will meet at 12:30 p.m. Saturday, March 4, in Farmington on the Orchard Ridge campus of Oakland Community College to settle its plans.

The Republican State Central is scheduled to meet in Lansing on Saturday, Feb. 26.

'Clouds' Seen On Primary Law

A "constitutional cloud" hanging over the presidential preference primary bill caused State Rep. Marvin Stempien (D-Livonia) to vote against it last week.

The bill cleared the House 70 to 29 with Stempien and Rep. Raymond Baker (R-Farmington) voting against it.

Voting for the primary were Reps. Richard Young (D-Dearborn Heights), John Bennett (D-Redford Township), James Tierney (D-Garden City) and James Defebaugh (R-Birmingham). Rep. Joseph Forbes (D-Oak Park) didn't cast a vote.

STEMPIEN, WHO is House majority floor leader, and member of the appropriations committee, said there could be a question of the constitutionality because the appropriations provision is included in the bill and not in a separate appropriations bill.

The \$2 million maximum is written into the primary bill but is not included in the state's already hurting budget.

"I thought it was sheer madness to pass the bill with that provision in it," Stempien said. "It casts a constitutional cloud over it."

Stempien also questioned the constitutionality of the formula for reimbursing local government units on the cost of the primary.

An arbitrary figure of 100,000 is used. Those areas with over 100,000 residents will be paid for the election costs, while those below it will arbitrarily be paid \$180 per precinct.

"There are not clear enough guidelines on election

reform," Stempien said of the bill.

THOUGH IT is a "step in the right direction" Stempien said the bill doesn't set the procedures to be used in assuring representation of minorities in the national elections.

The state central committees "lobbed their pants off" to keep the Legislature from setting procedures and regulations, he said.

The bill says that the committees may provide for minority representation - but they may not, Stempien argued.

Despite the bill's weaknesses, Stempien said he probably would have voted for passage if it weren't for the question of the constitutionality of the appropriations provision.

"There was such an obvious way out of it," he said. "The governor (William Milliken) could have sent down a notice that he was revising the budget to include the appropriation."

Now the only chance to clear up the technicality is to get an attorney general's ruling on the constitutionality or for a dissatisfied citizen to get a court order stopping the election until it is cleared up, he said.

MARCH 3 -- Sec. of State Richard Austin must release list of presidential candidates eligible for the primary.

MARCH 7 -- State Central Committee of each party must release partisan list of eligible presidential candidates not on Austin's list.

MARCH 10 -- State Central Committees must file rules and regulations governing the number of precinct delegates and election of national delegates.

MARCH 17 -- Those presidential candidates who aren't on Austin's or either party's list of candidates must file petitions. Democratic presidential candidates need 7,965 signatures. Republican candidates need 6,853 signatures.

MARCH 17 -- Each candidate who is listed must declare he wants to enter the primary or file a disclaimer.

MARCH 24 -- Prospective precinct delegates must file petitions.

APRIL 14 -- Persons must register to vote (if they aren't already registered) to be eligible for the primary vote. Persons who will turn 18 by May 16 also must register by this date.

MAY 16 -- Presidential preference primary and precinct delegate election.

JUNE 2 -- Tentative date for county or district conventions.

JUNE 10-11 -- Tentative date for Democratic state convention.

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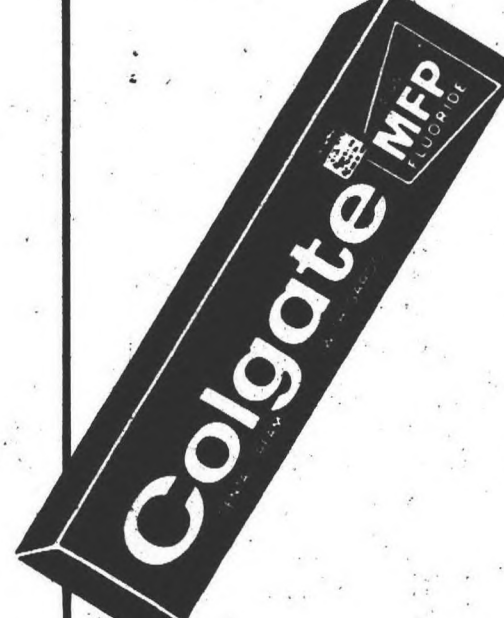
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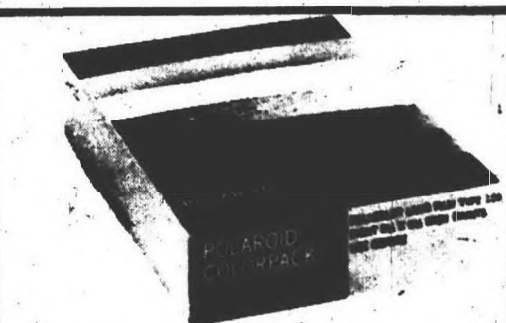
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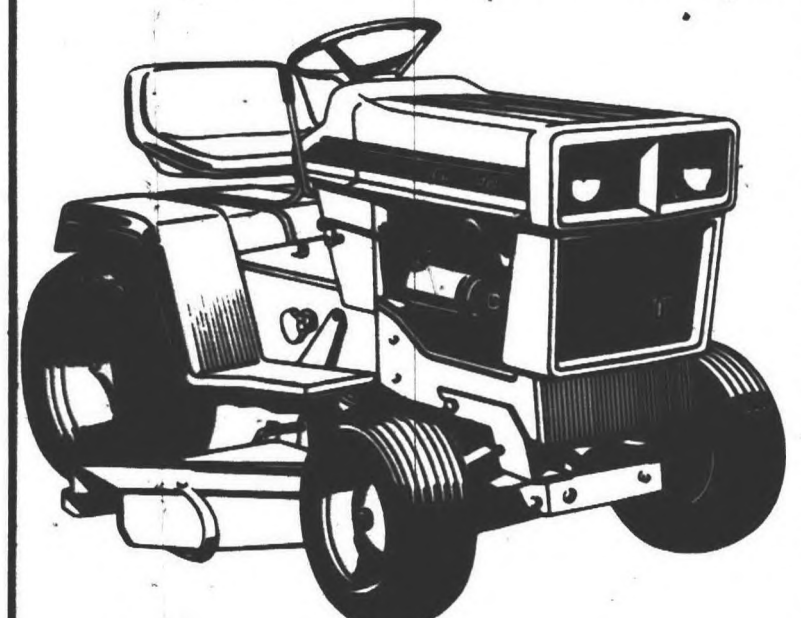
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RU Fails In Bid To Catch GC East

Franklin Edges Glenn, 55-52

After frowning on a tight, tense band of Patriots from Franklin High for three quarters, Old Dame Fortune suddenly decided it was time to smile and did it in the final six seconds of the game ... that lone smile gave the Pats three points, a 55-52 victory and their first Northwest Suburban League basketball title.

It also turned the moans and groans of hundreds of Franklin backers into huge grins and left Glenn's followers limp and forlorn after one of the most exciting games of the season.

It will be a long time before those in the stands will forget the dramatic finish. It came on a play that appeared to have gone awry with only six seconds on the clock.

JIM WILLIAMS, Glenn's lanky center, had just knotted the count, 52-52, on a one-hander after a deliberate ball-control move to get the final shot. It worked when Williams was open momentarily for a pass and split the cords.

That left Franklin with the ball under the Glenn basket and six seconds remaining. Coach Bob Visser called a time out to discuss strategy and apparently it was de-

termined to make a full court pass to Center Tim Dietz and a relay to Rick Graham cutting under the hoop.

Mark Newman took the ball out of bounds, made the long pass to Dietz a bit wild and the ball slithered off Dietz's fingers into the hands of R. Graham cutting under the basket. Rick grabbed the ball and whipped in a one hander for the game winning basket. He was fouled by Kim Horton and converted to put Franklin ahead by three points with three seconds to play.

GLENN COACH Gordon Davis called a conference of his team for the strategy on

one last shot and hopefully a foul to knot the score. Visser had his squad together at the same time and gave instructions to get out of the way of all Glenn players and allow the Rockets to get the shot.

The result was that three of the Franklin players sat on the floor while Glenn made two quick passes to get in position for the final shot and did score just after the whistle sounded ... and it didn't count.

It was Franklin's 11th victory against four losses and Glenn's fifth defeat in 15 starts. The triumph clinched the league crown since the Patriots are now 9-2 in Northwest action with one game

remaining and Glenn dropped back to 5-4.

Dietz was the dominating individual, scoring 33 points and converting on 15 of 17 from the foul line.

Matter of fact, without Dietz, Franklin would have been out of things rather quickly ... he accounted for 19 of his team's 25 first half points.

Perhaps it was the pressure and the players were tense but the fact is that Franklin's only strong point in the first half was a tight zone defense. None but Dietz came close to hitting the loop.

Meanwhile, Glenn set up a tight man - to - man defense, doubling up on Dietz. All that proved was that one man couldn't stop the Franklin star and the two defenders were constantly fouling him.

WILLIAMS had three personals early in the second period and sat out the remainder of the half. That put the burden on Dave Carlington, who was quickly in foul trouble, and Jeff Brittain, who also contributed to the Dietz cause.

Glenn had an 11 - 9 edge at the quarter and 27 - 25 at halftime.

Coming out for the second half, Glenn shirtd into a zone and Franklin used a full court press before dropping into its zone.

GLENN boosted its lead to 30 - 25 after two minutes of the third frame before the Patriots began to hit and finally tied the game, 30-all at the 5:44 point.

Franklin went ahead at 5:14 and opened up a 43 - 37 margin with 38 seconds to play in the period. Williams hit from the

free throw line in the final seconds for a 43-38 count going into the final stanza.

Then the Patriots hit another drought which found Glenn pulling up with a point at 43 - 42 after three minutes.

It was a seesaw scrap from then on with the score knotted at 46 - 46 and 47 - 47. Dietz hit twice from the foul line to make it 51 - 48 with 2:31 remaining. McBride connected from the side and it was 51 - 50. Newman made one of two and Franklin was in front, 52 - 50 with 28 seconds to play.

FRANKLIN regained the ball when Newman missed the second attempt and started to stall. A bad pass turned the ball over to Glenn with 26 seconds to go.

Coach Davis ordered a time out and Glenn came back with deliberate ball control to get one final shot. The strategy worked with Williams getting the tying basket.

Then came the play that had more than a little luck with it and gave the victory to Franklin.

The Bulldogs might not catch the Panthers but they sure took a bite out of the Panther pride.

Redford Union's Panthers were stymied in their bid for the Suburban Eight basketball crown as Bentley led for all but two minutes in a 62-54 upset.

With each team having one league match remaining, RU remains in first with a 9-2 record while Bentley sits in second at 8-3. RU hosts Belleville Friday and Bentley travels to Dearborn.

"I think our chances of catching RU are better than most people think," said Bulldog Coach John Farrar. "Belleville is enjoying a three game winning streak and RU has to be down."

Belleville pulled a surprise over Bentley a week prior in a 69-64 upset.

RU stands 13-3 overall and Bentley boasts a 12-5 mark.

The Panthers won the opening tip and jumped to a 3-0 lead on a freethrow by Mark Kenney and a bucket by Bob Schaner, but the tide was soon to change with Bentley's Tim Bollin hitting two from the corner and Brian Gates scoring on a layup.

RU rebounded on a tip-in by Schaner and a two-pointer by Kenney and the Panthers were up, 8-6, with 2:23 remaining in the first quarter, but this was the last time RU could look at the scoreboard and cheer.

BOLLIN hit from the floor to deadlock it at eight all, and Dan Weiss popped in the go-ahead basket with 1:47 left in the quarter and the Bulldogs never lost the lead again, and led after one quarter, 14-10.

The Bulldogs pulled away to a five point margin but RU kept picking away and closed to within one point on four different occasions.

Schaner connected on a bucket and Mark Durance made good one of two from the line to tie the contest at 24-24 with 25 seconds remaining in the half.

RON BAWULSKI put Bentley up with two freethrows but collected his fourth foul moments later against RU's Tom Burke. The one-and-one situation failed and Bentley led at the half, 26-24.

Kenney won the second half tip and Schaner tied it on a short jumper but Al Siterlet and Bollin put Bentley back up, 32-26. RU was nearing the freezing point midway in the quarter and Bentley spurred to a seven point margin. The Panthers missed on many scoring opportunities but fought to within one point at the end of three quarters on a bucket by Schaner with three seconds remaining, and RU had sliced the margin to 41-40.

Bentley won its first tip to start the final stanza and Gates swished home a two-pointer to put the Bulldogs up by three. RU closed to within one point on seven different occasions in the fourth quarter but just couldn't come up with the clutch basket.

WITH 1:35 REMAINING, Scott Bjerke hit on a 20-footer and RU trailed 52-51, but Bentley proceeded to reel off six straight points while RU missed on three one-and-one situations.

Tempers flared with 48 seconds showing when Burke fouled Gates on a driving layup and both crashed into the wall. Double technical fouls were assessed, and when the air cleared, Bentley was up, 60-52, and both players watched the remainder of the game of the bench.

Dan Weiss sank two from the line to close out the scoring and the Bulldogs kept their hopes alive.

"Our big key was our freethrow shooting," added

Farrar. "We were really smoking at the line, hitting on 24 of 27."

"And Bollin did one heck of a job on Kenney. This is the second time he has outplayed him. In the first round, Bollin got 25 points and 16 rebounds while Kenney totaled 22 points, and 12 rebounds."

This time Bollin hit for 22 points and hauled in 14 rebounds while Kenney collected only 10 points and 10 rebounds.

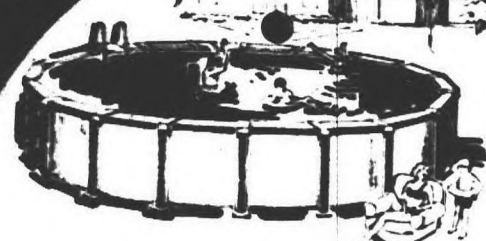

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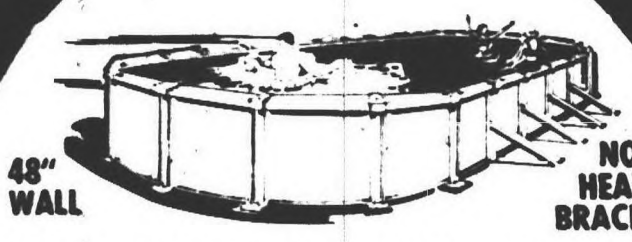

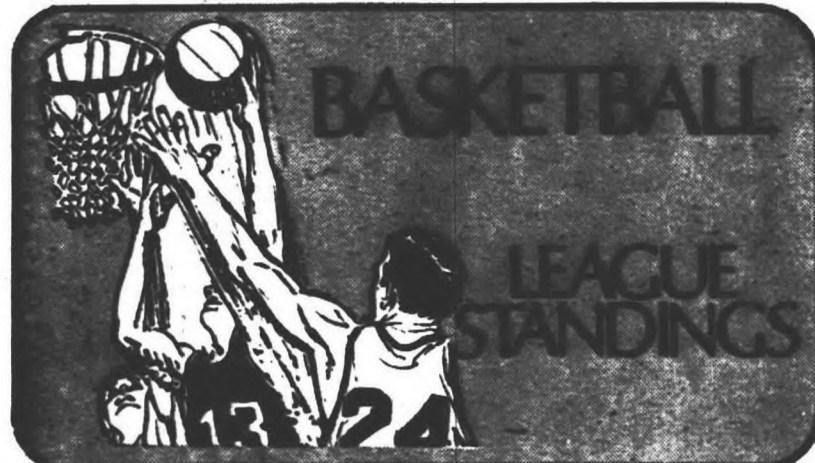
JACKSON collected 11 rebounds and Grigal added 10 with East controlling the boards, 42-32.

Ski Heil

It is a shame that this has been such a rotten winter locally. Especially with all the interest generated in cross-country (or touring) skiing. John Barnett of the Viking Ski Shop, one of the prime movers of the sport was reflecting on this subject recently. Which brought to mind my experience at Georgian Bay which I inadvertently failed to mention.

I had my group all excited about renting equipment and taking a lesson at Blue Mountain which has some excellent trails. Unfortunately our tour leader changed plans and we went to Georgian Peaks instead. When I have it in my mind to go touring, I'm stubborn enough to do it, trails or no trails.

The ski school director told me I could ride the chair to the top of the ridge and ski for miles. I decided that was for me and away I went. (They had no rental equipment but I had the foresight to bring my own).

THE IDEA of touring is to go in a group across country. This is recommended because you can take turns breaking trail. Breaking trail in two feet of snow is work, believe me. After skiing for half an hour I turned around and followed my trail back. By the time I had returned to my starting point I was soaked with perspiration right through my sweater!

During the Olympic Games, the TV announcer kept commenting that a cross-country skier will burn up

more calories than any other athlete in any sport. I believe him. What a way to reduce.

A couple of skiers noticed me standing there and struck up a conversation and then asked the ultimate question "How are you going to get down the hill?" Think about that for awhile. Have you ever seen a person's expression change from a smile, to perplexity, to outright fear?

Then I remembered my instructor at Vail telling me how their instructors could duplicate on cross-country skis, the movements of a downhill skier, so off I went. My plan was to traverse across the hill, make a stem turn, traverse, stem turn, and so on until I reached the bottom. Great plan!

As I picked myself up from the first snow bank, laughing of course, and started my second traverse, it dawned on me that my skis kept sliding because they have no metal edges and can't bite into the snow. But I was making progress.

By the time I picked myself up out of the sixth snow bank, I was almost half way down. It was then that I made the decision that discretion was the better part of valor and took off my skis and walked the rest of the way.

"I'm convinced that cross-country skiing is a great activity on flat ground or rolling slopes, but no way can one manipulate packed downhill slopes. Some of us have to learn the hard way, but we learn."

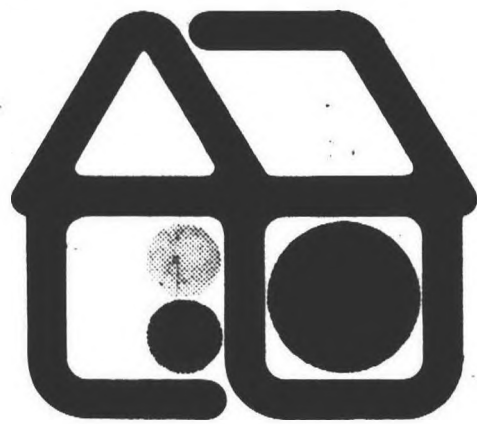
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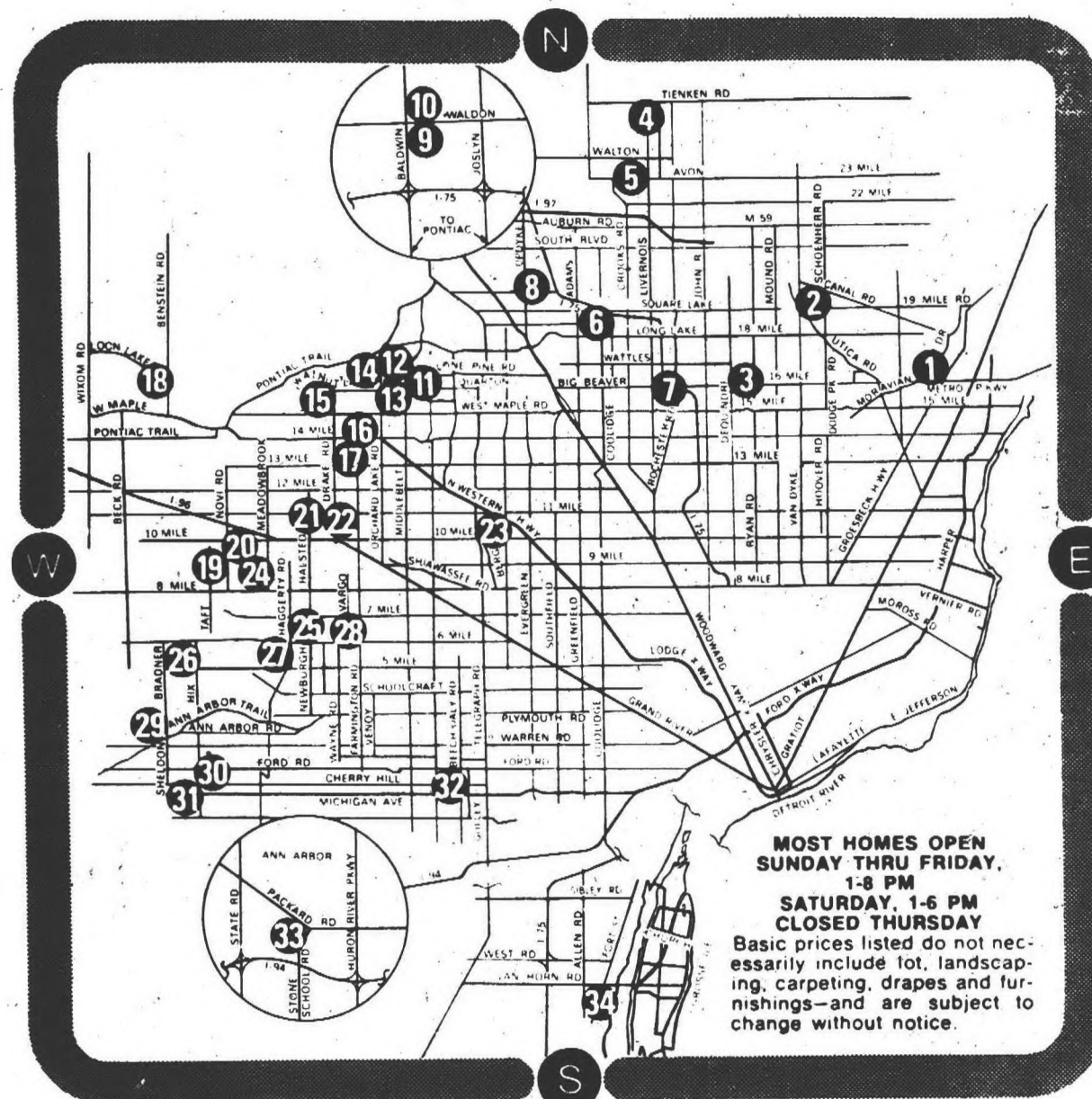


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Turf Tips, Quips

Completion of the sale of Hazel Park race track to Herb Tyner and Jack Hartman, wealthy Southfield real estate developers and owners of several large apartment complexes, probably won't take place for another month but that won't stop the thoroughbreds from the earliest opening in Michigan history.

With more than 500 horses bedded down and more pouring in from the southland and east, Hazel Park will open its 132-day meeting Saturday come snow, rain, cold weather or what have you.

And since the track hasn't been sold, the first 42 days will be under the same administration as a year ago.

PRESENT PLAN call for the current track operators to get things underway with a cheap meeting for 42 days, then it is believed the sale will have been consummated and the new owners will take over for the final 90 days.

That portion of the season is

designated as the time when top horses from all parts of the nation will check in with the smaller and cheaper stables moving on to other meets.

Bert Thompson, director of racing, reported back to his Hazel Park base Monday with news that many stables will be on the way to Michigan before the end of the week.

Thompson spent last week touring plants now operating along the Atlantic Seaboard, in Florida, at New Orleans and in Hot Springs, Ark. and believes he has corralled enough horses to assure the success of the 42 days.

Racing Secretary John Klucina, who has been handling a meeting near Tampa, Fla., also arrived Monday and has started the task of checking the barn area to see what kind of stock he has to work with.

Klucina wrote conditions for races during the first two weeks and expects to have an idea of what his opening program, next Saturday, will look like.

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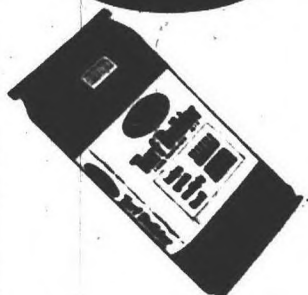
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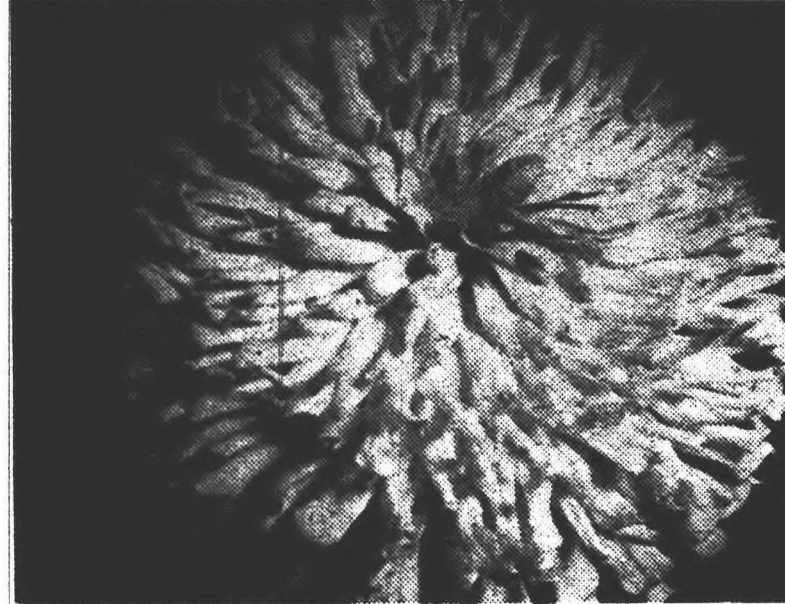


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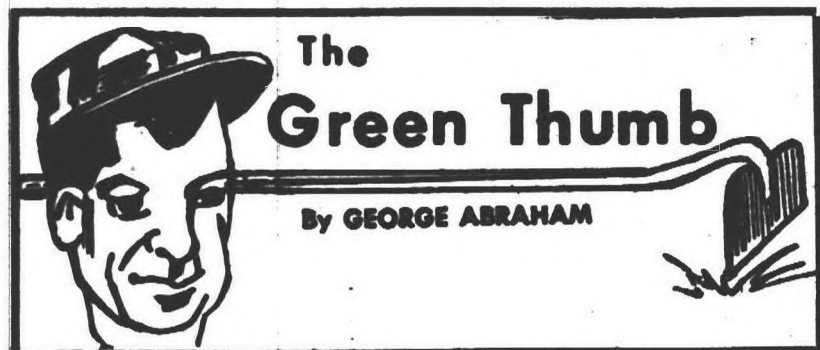

Raise herbs indoors: No reason why you can turn your kitchen into a "greenhouse" and raise various herbs to spark up your menus. Plants can be started from seed or you can buy young plants from an herb garden. The herbs you grow will add attractiveness and fragrance to any room. Florists clay pots or a standard window box with stones in the bottom are ideal for starting your herbs. The box or pot should be in a sunny window where the temperature can be uniform. Containers should be turned occasionally so that both sides can get plenty of light.

If you want only a couple herbs, the common florist clay pot is handy. These can be placed on trays two or three inches deep, with a layer of pebbles or broken clay pots along the bottom.

Watering: Watch out about overwatering. If the plants are watered frequently at the top, excess water can drain into the trays. Do not allow pots to stand in water for long periods or herbs will rot. Just apply ordinary rules of caring for the average house plant such as begonia, coleus or geranium; and you can grow herbs successfully indoors. The kitchen has plenty of humidity, favorable for annual herbs such as sweet basil, chervil, dill, sweet fennel, sweet marjoram and summer savory. You can even start perennial herbs such as lemon balm, chives, parsley, peppermint, rose geranium, sage, winter savory, tarragon, thyme and lemon verbena.

HOME GROWN strawberries: How about converting a small spot in the backyard to a strawberry patch. All you need is full sun. Any good soil will produce strawberries successfully.

Early spring is the best time to plant your patch, although you can plant them in fall if you can get the plants, and if you will take care of them. Order your plants early and be ready to plant them when the soil is in good shape. A few weeks after the strawberries are planted, they will produce blossoms. In the regular matted-row system, these blossoms should be removed the first season since the plants will make better growth.

As for varieties, get hold of a good strawberry nursery and see which varieties they recommend for your garden. There are many good ones such as Fairfax, Sparkle, Surecrop, Robinson, to name a few.

GREEN THUMB CLINIC: A reader writes: "We want to convert our old coal bin into an indoor greenhouse, using fluorescent lights. Temperature is 72 degrees. Will the ordinary fluorescent tubes be satisfactory, or should they be a special kind? Any help will be appreciated."

Answer: There are tubes which give off a pink glow, and some a white glow. It really doesn't make much difference. They're all good for starting seeds and plants indoors.

It is especially effective when no valance is used, since it gives the entire window treatment a clean-lined, contemporary look.

Window Shades Match Decor

Window shades can be handsome decorative additions to your rooms.

Shade cloths vary in texture from sheer to translucent to opaque, and come in colors and patterns too numerous to mention. You can, for

example, continue a formal decor with a boucle or moire, or achieve an informal look with a shantung or homespun weave.

If you want shades to match the pattern of your draperies or upholstery, you can have

them laminated with fabric; if you want solid color shades, they can be coordinated with up-to-the-minute paint or rug colors.

What's more, their vinyl coating makes them easy to clean with a damp sponge.

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PANSY SEEDS may be planted in spring as well as late summer and the resulting plants will start to flower as those sown in August have passed their peak. Best to use for spring sowing are the hybrids.

Spring-Sown Pansies For Summer Blooms

While most gardeners plant seeds of pansies in August, winter seedlings under protection and expect flowers in early spring, pansies also may be started from seeds sown in the earliest spring, indoors of course, and will then flower in summer.

Pansy seeds are so tiny that there are 25,000 of them in a single ounce. They need shade and a cool temperature to sprout so choose a cool room and a northern exposure for them in your home.

Use finely sieved soil, milled sphagnum moss or some other fine-textured growing mixture in which to sow seeds. Barely cover them

with fine soil or milled sphagnum. Keep seeds moist with a fine spray of water and in 10 days they should sprout.

AS SOON AS seedlings are handleable move any that are crowded to allow them room to develop. Transplant them outdoors from a flat or from individual pots as soon as plants are large enough and soil is workable.

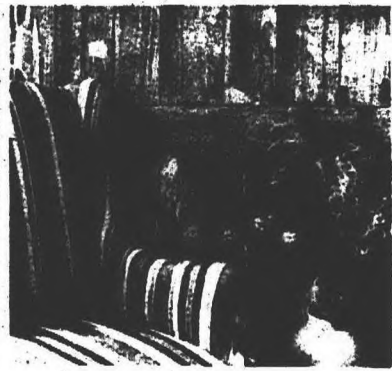
If you want a mass of bloom, space plants six inches apart.

It takes 12 to 16 weeks for pansy plants to reach flowering size. Thus plants grown in spring start to bloom

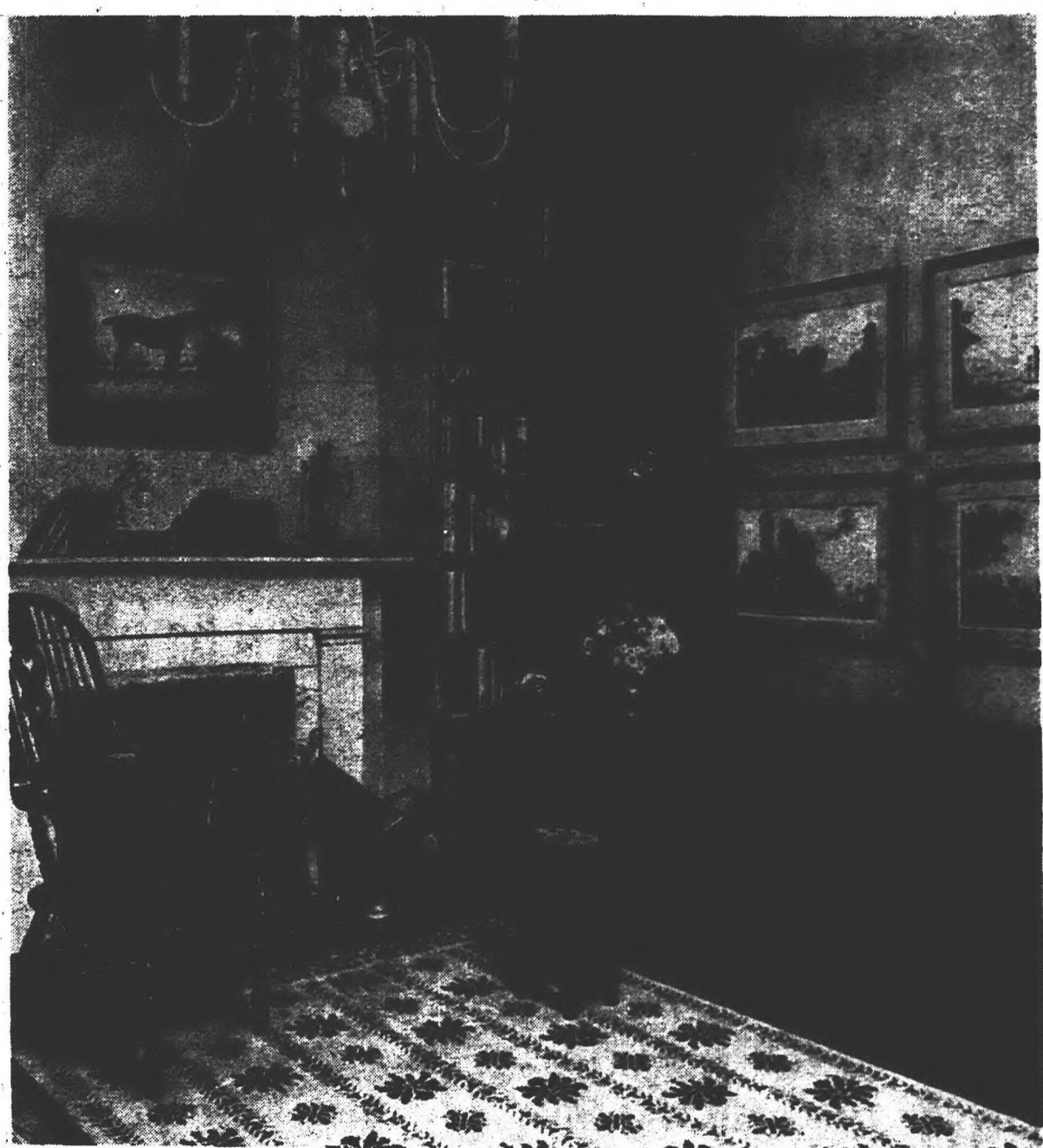
about the time that fall-sown pansies finish blossoming.

While seeds of any type or variety of pansy may be spring-sown, the best for summer bloom are first generation hybrids, notably the Majestic Giants strain. These are available in mixed or separate colors.

Their advantages are earlier bloom (a full two weeks ahead of most other hybrids), heat tolerance so that they continue to flower when warm weather arrives, and hybrid vigor that keeps plants growing and flower buds forming despite heat.

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February Ideal For Grape Pruning

EAST LANSING The secret to growing high yields of top quality grapes each and every year is pruning, say horticulturists at Michigan State University.

According to the experts the yield of next year's crop will depend on the vigor of the vine growth this year. In general, the more cane growth that a vine produces this year, the larger the potential yield of fruit next year.

However, the larger the fruit crop next year, the smaller the amount of growth the following year. A cycle is

produced in which a heavy crop one year is followed by a smaller crop the next.

To break this cycle and obtain the maximum yield from your grape vine each and every year, pruning is recommended in February. Follow these steps:

If the vine growth was weak the first year, cut it back to two buds. Strong shoots will develop from these buds, one will later become the trunk.

Cut off dead, broken or diseased canes the following year and select the largest cane to become the trunk. Tie this cane to one of the trellis wires and other long vigorous canes to the top wire. The weaker canes should be cut off above the lower wire and tied there.

Good vines will have several canes in the spring of the third growing season. Choose four of these at proper levels and train one each way from the trunk on both wires. Then cut each of these canes back between the fifth and sixth buds. If you prefer the umbrella style, choose only two canes and cut them back to 10 or 12 buds each.

How To Grow Citrus Plants

Do you want an interesting and different ornamental indoor plant this winter? Dr. Harold Davidson, Michigan State University horticulturist, recommends a citrus plant.

Select an orange, lemon, lime, tangerine or grapefruit plant. The Otaheite and Calamondin oranges, and Ponderosa and Meyer lemons are dwarf types that flower and bear fruit while very small.

Light is essential to promote flowering, Davidson said. To bear fruit the flowers of a citrus plant must be cross-pollinated. Use a small brush to transfer the pollen from one flower to the stigma of another.

Plants grow and develop fruits best at temperatures ranging from 50-70 degrees. Keep the soil moist. Use a potting mixture of equal parts of sand, garden loam and peat moss for good drainage.

To prevent yellowing of the foliage use an acid growing medium (available at lawn and garden stores). Fertilize with a solution recommended for azaleas (also available at stores) during periods of active growth. Plants that lack vigor will not bear fruit.

Meadow Brook Season Includes Opera, Ballet

A week of performances by the Pennsylvania Ballet, two appearances as guest conductor by American composer Aaron Copland, two concert performances of Verdi's "Aida" with Metropolitan Opera star Martina Arroyo, and three concerts by the New York Philharmonic Orchestra will illuminate the 1972 Meadow Brook Festival season.

The season will last nine weeks this year, running from June 29 through Aug. 27. The classical concerts, Thursday and Saturday evenings, will feature a different solo artist each week, and a different program on each of the two nights.

The festival is the summer showcase of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra. The 100-member orchestra will be conducted by its music director, Sixten Ehrling, for five of its first six weeks this summer, with guest conductors Bruno Maderna and Aaron Copland appearing for two concerts each in August.

NOW IN ITS ninth year, the festival ranks as one of the most significant summer festivals in the United States. The outdoor concerts are held in Baldwin Pavilion, which is recognized for its acoustical excellence and the beauty of its setting in a natural wooded slope. "As in previous years," said Sandor Kallai, the manager, "we have tried to plan a season that is varied in scope, and consistent in artistic quality."

Itzhak Perlman, brilliant young Israeli-born violinist, will open the festival on Thursday, June 29. Perlman has appeared at Meadow Brook during the 1967, 1969 and 1970 seasons and now at age 27 he is at the height of his career, appearing with most major orchestras here and in Europe. He will also play a second, completely different concert on Saturday, July 1.

The Pennsylvania Ballet, electric young company that in nine years has won acclaim across the nation, will take the stage for performances on July 5, 6, 8, and 9. Founded and directed by Balanchine-trained Barbara Weisberger, the company has a repertoire of more than 50 ballets, both classic and contemporary, and will vary its program each evening.

On July 13 and 15, pianist Eugene Istomin, one of America's major concert artists, will be the soloist with

the orchestra. This summer's engagement will be Istomin's second appearance at the Meadow Brook Festival.

WHITEMORE AND LOWE, the first duo-piano team to sell a million records, will be the guest artists at Meadow Brook on July 20 and 22. Considered by some critics to be the best recital and concert team of this generation, they are equally adept at both classical techniques and the music of today.

Austrian artist Alfred Brendel will appear on the evenings of July 27 and 29.

Martina Arroyo, leading soprano of the Metropolitan Opera, will sing in two concert performances of Verdi's "Aida" on Aug. 3 and 5. (This is the second concert opera to be performed at the Meadow Brook Festival, where last year's inaugural offering was Beethoven's "Fidelio.") Detroit-born basso Ara Berberian will sing the role of Ramfis in "Aida," and baritone Morley Meredith will portray Amonasro. The other members of the cast will be announced at a future date. The "Aida" performances will be Ehrling's last appearances of the 1972 Festival season.

Guest conductors Aaron Copland and Bruno Maderna will take the podium on Aug. 10 and 12, and Aug. 17 and 19, respectively. Copland, best-known living American composer, will conduct a Thursday program of classical and modern works by other composers, but will devote his entire Saturday concert to performances of his own works.

Soloing with Maderna on Aug. 17 will be Metropolitan Opera basso Jerome Hines, who will sing three Mephistophelean arias, one each from Gounod, Berlioz and Boito. Pianist Earl Wild will be Maderna's solo artist on Saturday.

The classical concerts will conclude with the Aug. 24 and 26 guest appearances of the New York Philharmonic Orchestra, under the direction of Erich Leinsdorf. Two soloists, to appear with the Philharmonic, will be announced later.

In addition to the classical series, the Meadow Brook Music Festival is scheduling its traditional Sunday Symphony pops concerts (which will include a third New York Philharmonic program), Wednesday folk series, and

Friday night jazz series. Artists and schedules will be released in the near future.

Students never had it so good!

These mouth-watering dishes are only a sampling of gourmet foods prepared and consumed by Orchard Ridge students at their very own "penthouse" restaurant, Oakland Towers.

And never before has the Top of the Flame had such stiff competition.

AFTER CLIMBING three flights of stairs to the cozy restaurant, any guest has worn off enough calories to order Beef Stroganoff without the slightest pang of guilt - and then top it off with "trifle" described on the menu as an old English dessert of "raspberries and almonds in a sherry flavored custard sauce over pound cake and decorated with fresh whipped cream."

Who can resist that?
The entire operation, from the moment a student takes

your order until the student cashier takes your check, is planned and prepared by students in the food service management curriculum.

Because students do all the work while learning their trade, the menu reflects only the actual food costs - and every scrumptious dish falls below \$2.

Every week, food merchandising students select a theme to decorate the dining area and design appropriate menus.

MANAGEMENT students take over, plan menu items, purchase ingredients, assign students to a work schedule and finally supervise during lunch.

Eventually every student has had a turn at being a waiter or waitress, cooking meals, working in the bakery, supervising the entire operation, cashiering and balancing books.

Guests three weeks ago climbed the stairs of the "J" (Student Activities) Building to find Oakland Towers decorated with rocks and snakes on the tables, furs on the floors and a cave man on the menu.

Students had come up with "BC" as their theme so the restaurant took on a prehistoric aura.

Christmas visitors were greeted with a "Yule Tide" buffet including "Mardi Gras Salad."

Halloween guests had to choose between "Gary Goblin's Broiled Ham Steaks," "Vicci Vampire's Sumptuous Salad Plate," "Marvin Monster's Electrifying Chicken Pot Pie," or "Broom Hilda's Baked Haddock Steaks for Weight Watchers."

OAKLAND TOWER'S only weakness is its short hours. The restaurant is open from 11 a.m. until 1 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

During those hours, students have fed as many as 200 guests a day - mostly Orchard Ridge students and faculty.

Last year was the first for the restaurant and it was open every day of the week. But a drop in enrollment in the two-year program caused the cutback, according to Mrs. Charlotte Korte, who directs the program along with Lawrence O'Keefe.

Several factors have contributed to the drop, Mrs. Korte said, primarily the reevaluation of college degrees by prospective students, more students working, and less pressure from the draft.

In any case, she hopes the restaurant can open in fall on a five-day schedule.

IN HER HOPES for the future, Mrs. Korte would also like to see students take over the actual ordering and purchasing of foods from vendors. Right now they order groceries from Szabo Foods, the caterer who prepares the cafeteria foods.

One disadvantage to purchasing directly from Szabo, besides the limiting experience, is that the profit from Oakland Towers (last year amounting to \$900) goes to catering company rather than the food technology program.

When students complete the food technology program, they are prepared for middle management jobs. Some go on to a four-year program at Michigan State University. But they graduate prepared for a little more than management.

"They learn what the public is all about," Mrs. Korte said, explaining that they learn what it's like to have an irritable customer and thus a pressured waiter or waitress.

And having experienced the total operation in the kitchen from cooking to washing pots and pans, they can work better with persons in those jobs.

"It's good practical experience for them," Mrs. Korte said. "They learn what is involved."

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Whole Grains Add Nutrition

"Whole Grain Cookery" by Stella Standard is now available as a paperback.

Originally written in 1951, it rates a preface by Pearl S. Buck which reads, in part, "Rain and sun, the strong sweet properties of minerals and the hidden magic of growth are contained only within the whole grains. They flavor the dishes which they make with that divine touch which man can only weakly imitate."

A bride-to-be would appreciate the little cookbook tucked in with a shower present. The younger generation seems to have a deep appreciation of the benefits of natural foods.

The following are a few examples of the recipes contained in the book:

OATMEAL DATE MUFFINS

- 1 c. oatmeal flour
- 1 1/2 t. baking powder
- 1/2 t. salt
- 1 T. light brown sugar
- 1 t. soda
- 8 dates, cut in pieces
- 2 T. butter, melted
- 1 1/3 c. buttermilk
- 1 egg, beaten

Sift all ingredients and add the dates. Mix the liquids together and combine with the first mixture, mixing as little as possible. Put into six greased muffin tins and bake in a hot oven 15 to 20 minutes.

CHEESE CORN MUFFINS

- 1 c. corn meal
- 1 t. salt
- 1 t. light brown sugar
- 1/2 t. soda
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 c. buttermilk
- 2 T. butter, melted
- 2 T. grated sharp cheese over each muffin

Mix all the dry ingredients and combine with the mixed liquids. Pour into greased muffin tins and cover with the cheese. Bake 15 minutes in a hot oven.

SOUTHERN PILAU

- 1 c. onions, chopped
- 1 green pepper, sliced
- 4 T. butter
- 1 c. brown rice
- 3 1/4 c. chicken broth
- 3 eggs, beaten
- 2 T. butter
- Salt and pepper

Saute the onions and the green pepper in the butter until they soften, then stir in the washed brown rice for a minute. Slowly add the boiling broth, cover, and simmer until the rice is tender, about 45 minutes. The pilau may be served as is, or the eggs added and cooked a minute longer, stirring constantly. Add the butter and season to taste. The eggs make the pilau a substantial main dish. Serves four or five.

DATE NUT STICKS

- 2 eggs, beaten
- 3/4 c. light brown sugar
- 1 c. dates, chopped
- 1 c. nuts, chopped
- 4 t. whole wheat flour
- 1 t. baking powder

Beat the eggs until light, add the sugar, beat again. Add the dates and nuts and last the flour mixed well with the baking powder. Spread in a greased, shallow pan and bake in a very slow oven 15 or 20 minutes. Cut while hot.

BANANA BREAD

- 1 c. light brown sugar
- 1/2 c. butter and lard, mixed
- 2 egg yolks, beaten
- 2 T. buttermilk
- 1 t. soda
- 1/4 t. salt
- 1 1/4 c. whole wheat flour
- 1 1/2 c. bananas, mashed
- 1/3 c. nuts, chopped
- 2 egg whites, beaten

Cream the butter and sugar and add the beaten egg yolks. Dissolve the soda in the buttermilk and add to the egg mixture. Add the sifted salt and flour, the mashed bananas and nuts. Fold in the beaten egg whites last. Bake slowly one hour in a greased bread pan.

Gus Scholle: The Man Who Built The Suburbs

His name was August Scholle, but they called him Gus.

They called him a lot of other things besides that. Labor boss. Honest and blunt. Dictator. Political kingmaker. Tough. Old fashioned. Conservationist. Abrasive. The sly gray fox of Michigan politics.

But one of the things that they didn't say last week when former state AFL-CIO president Gus Scholle died was that more than any one man in Michigan he was responsible for the kind of big political clout the suburbs have today.

That's too bad, because Gus was one of those guys who got a bum rap while he was alive and well, only to have a lot of people come out of the woodwork saying nice things about what a remarkable man he was after he was dead.

FOR 30 YEARS Gus ran the state CIO and, after the merger of the two big labor federations in 1958, he led the AFL-CIO.

Together with his firm ally, Walter P. Reuther, the late president of the UAW, he believed passionately that the way to help achieve the goals of the working man was to get him involved in politics.

He was one of the main architects of the union - Democratic party alliance which elected G. Mennen Williams and John B. Swainson governor, put the Democratic party on the map, and made the labor movement the strongest political force in the state.

In his political work, the flaming honesty and blunt candor which so characterized his personality made him an easy target for Republicans and political writers. He called former Gov. George Romney "a big clown" when Romney revealed in 1962 that he was seeking divine guidance through prayer while deciding whether to run for Governor.

"Does he think he has a pipeline to God?" Scholle asked.

They worked him over pretty good for that one, and for countless others like it. And as time

went on, Gus Scholle had the most consistently bad press of any public figure in the state.

BUT WHILE THAT was happening, he started working on the idea that probably has had more political impact on Michigan and brought more power to the suburbs than any other in the past 40 years.

As a resident of Berkley, in Oakland County, he looked at the state legislature and saw that legislative districts were unequal, with the result being a gerrymandered, rural - dominated state house and senate. In the 1950s, he pointed out that Oakland County would elect only one state senator to represent 700,000 people, while one Upper Peninsula district could elect a senator to represent only 49,000.

"This means that my vote in Oakland County is only one-twelfth as good as that of a voter living in the smallest district," he thundered. "The state senate represents tree stumps, not people."

Scholle, together with his brilliant Detroit attorney, Theodore Sachs, argued that legislative districting based on both population and land area violated the due process and equal protection clauses of the 14th amendment to the U.S. Constitution.

He took his campaign for "one man, one vote" to the legislature, to the state constitutional convention, to the Michigan Supreme Court, to a three-judge federal panel, and finally to the U.S. Supreme Court.

When the U.S. Supreme Court finally in 1964 issued the landmark "one man, one vote" reapportionment decision, many of Scholle's arguments were cited.

The decision led to reapportionment of Michigan's legislative and congressional districts to make them as nearly as possible equal in population.

It led to representative power in the U.S. Congress and the state legislature for the suburbs in proportion to our booming population, and it will lead this

year to even greater suburban representation after the census-required redistricting is finished.

GUS EVEN tried out the results of all his work by running in 1970 for Congress in the 18th district, covering Southfield, against popular Rep. William Broomfield.

While he lost that election, the results never deterred him from pushing ahead for what he thought was right. In particular, he served on the state Natural Resources Commission, probably the most powerful force for environmental protection in the state.

His courage and strong principles made him a particularly effective commission member, arguing that the need for environmental concern extended well beyond matters of shooting antlerless deer and to the entire quality of life for urban and suburban regions of the state.

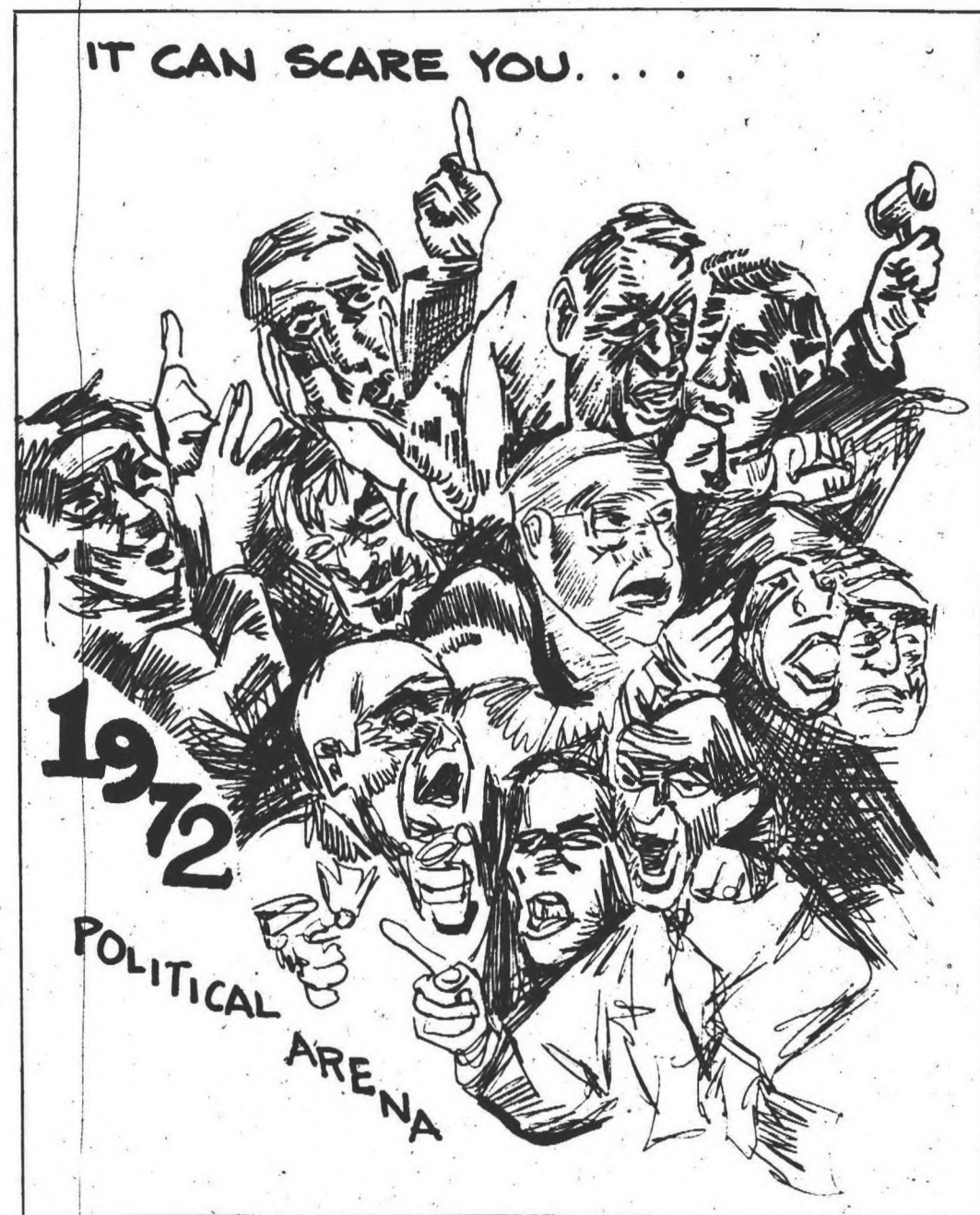
His energy and dedication never flagged. While he fought his terminal illness in Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit, he was constantly on the phone to Lansing, casting his votes for meetings of the commission.

Then, last Monday, he knew the end was near. He left the hospital and went back home to

his cabin retreat at Caseville, on Saginaw Bay. There, on Tuesday, with the lake in front of him and a life of tough and effective

public service behind him, he died.

I wish we had more men like him.



Suggests New Rules In Politics

This is the time of year when I get as itchy-footed as an old war horse hearing the bugles blare. A new political season is opening.

The presidential campaign you can have. In fact, I suspect half the politicians and three-fourths of the voters have had a bellyful already.

Congressional, legislative, county commissioner campaigns - these are the best. A reporter gets less slick guff, he can be closer to the candidates and the

voters, in these lower level contests.

EXCEPT FOR one thing: A certain percentage of the candidates are jerks who don't belong in any public office. Unfortunately, a newspaperman must deal with them, in the interests of fairness, and the voter must see their names cluttering up the ballot.

Doubly unfortunately, some of these clowns get nominated and elected, especially if they've got good political names like

Brennan or O'Brien or Novak. Check the index of the Michigan Manual if you think I jest.

Triply unfortunately, the courts are no help. The name of Damon J. Keith, federal district judge, comes immediately to mind. He recently declared a section of the Plymouth city charter unconstitutional because it required two years of residency and property ownership of city commission candidates, but in the fine print he went a whole lot further:

"Nothing in this opinion is to be construed as denying the City of Plymouth the right to fashion constitutionally acceptable requirements to stand for office, e.g., being a qualified elector."

I CONTENT that Judge Keith's list of "e.g.'s" is ridiculously short. He and his admirers are in the indefensible position of saying we may have higher standards for our maintenance men than for our lawmakers. We can't even require our candidates to be literate.

For example, if a person is running for partisan office, why can't we require that he be a paid-up member of the party under whose label he seeks to run? It's one objective way to assure he is serious about his politics.

Why not require that he have a good record at the polls? In a two-year span, the average voter has eight to a dozen chances to go to the polls - general elections, primaries, state, city, school, community college, special millage, and so on. Why not say that to get on the ballot, a candidate must have voted in 80 per cent of all elections held in the previous two years?

You'd quickly eliminate some real ignoramuses that way. It would mean, I realize, that a candidate would have to be at least 20 years of age, but that wouldn't be constitutionally fatal.

What about eliminating the requirement for petition signatures and filing fees (which have nothing to do with a person's qualifications for office) and allow a would-be candidate on the ballot if he passes a civil service test, perhaps of the Clerk II level?

Absolute extinction! That's where high school newspapers are headed unless school boards change their attitudes toward censorship and student rights.

Gone forever are the days when an administrator could look at a young editor sternly in the eye and say, "Son, you can't print that story because it's too negative and it's bad for the school's image." Or, "Your story deals with a school problem that I don't want discussed publicly, so I'm ordering you to pull it."

DON'T BE MISLEAD! It's impossible to effectively censor the high school journalist.

Reasons? For one, modern offset machinery has lowered printing costs to where nearly anyone can afford to duplicate and distribute anything he wishes.

Some students even have mimeographs and printing presses in their basements.

Also, many college and non-school publications stand willing to help underground staffs get started.

Let's talk about what happens when student papers go underground.

One result: Since the staff publishes on its own time at its own expense, the school loses nearly all control over content.

Another result: When the underground dies, as it usually does, the school is left with a journalistic vacuum - the school newspaper is discredited, the underground is gone, and journalism education has come to a standstill.

Remember also that a wide network of underground literature exists outside the school-room walls. Students are tuning in this network, dialing away from school publications because they're too heavily controlled.

Hence, many of our brightest and most productive young people are abandoning high school newspapers, allowing them to wither into oblivion.

As a matter of fact, this is precisely what happened at Clarenceville High School, where I serve as advisor. The board attempted to enforce new content guidelines. 75 per cent of the staff refused to accept them and left, and the class was nearly closed due to lack of enrollment.

(A total of five students - none editors - returned to that class, but the district kept it open anyway.)

Without students, you can't have a journalism class. And a school without a journalism course doesn't have a comprehensive curriculum.

"We're not saying we can't do it," my departing editors told me. "What we're saying is we won't do it. We won't accept imposed guidelines. We want to make our own decisions."

And I don't blame them at all. What's to be done?

And the only way education can begin moving quickly is by shedding excess weight - old, cumbersome theories that youth is seen but not heard, led yet not allowed to lead, asked to write yet told not to fully express itself.

I'm asking would-be-censors to lift their fingers off that big red panic button. Unless it's illegal (libelous, etc.), don't censor it! No harm will be done. To the contrary, editors will conclude that student publications are truly relevant and ardently seek to improve their quality. This will lead to increased student interest, a sure way to improve our schools.

Easier To Smoke Than 'Kick Habit'

As TV commercials go, the one that ominously warns you to quit smoking - "It's a matter of life or death" - is, in part, one of the more credible.

At least it beats the one about the lady octopus squirting extra dry deodorant under all eight arms before a heavy date.

The other night, I could have been a living testimonial for the "kick the smoking habit" plug. That's the one where some poor addict is having a nicotine fit, desperately scrounging through coat pockets and waste baskets for a drag or even a butt.

Being a creature of habit, I

always like a cigarette glowing in the dark as I watch the late late show in bed. On the night in question, I reached over the night stand and realized I had left my package in the car.

That should have presented no major problem except my car was parked in our "two-car" garage which in reality is big enough for a Honda and a high Schwinn. My husband's car was parked nearest to the door leading from the house to the garage, making it a tight squeeze.

Undaunted, though the wind was howling and blowing snow flakes around in the midnight air, I traipsed down in my nightgown, robe and snow boots. I got into my husband's car, slid over in order to open the door to mine, got out and was wedged between both cars.

Extricating myself, I slid back into hubby's car, got out and shivering opened the garage door and walked around to my car. It was locked tight.

When my car is loaded with packages at a shopping center at Christmas time, I never think of locking it. But when it's parked safely in the garage, all of a sudden I get cautious.

Driven by that irresistible urge for a cigarette and more determined than ever, I went

back into the house for the key, and with trembling fingers opened the door. The package was empty.

THE WHOLE shattering experience might have convinced me to kick the habit. But I remembered the times I've felt like the whole world was a tuxedo and I was a pair of brown shoes when I've gotten together with a bunch of reformed smokers.

I remembered the character who chewed nervously on a toothpick. He might not die of lung cancer but he's bound to meet his maker with an advanced case of Dutch Elm disease.

And the one who boasted, "I haven't smoked in 19 days, four hours, 33 minutes and 14 seconds and I never give it another thought."

Or the overweight matron with high blood pressure who puffed, "I've gained 25 pounds since I stopped smoking and I've never felt better in my life."

I've had to listen to withdrawal symptoms like vertigo, chills, fever, crawling sensations, nausea - sounds like someone sneaked marijuana in the Virginia Slims.

Weighing all that against sneaking into the garage in the dead of night, I'll take my chances. But the next time I won't lock the car.

Sakarelli is being assisted by Mark Rodemeyer and Brand Jones. All three are sophomores from Livonia.

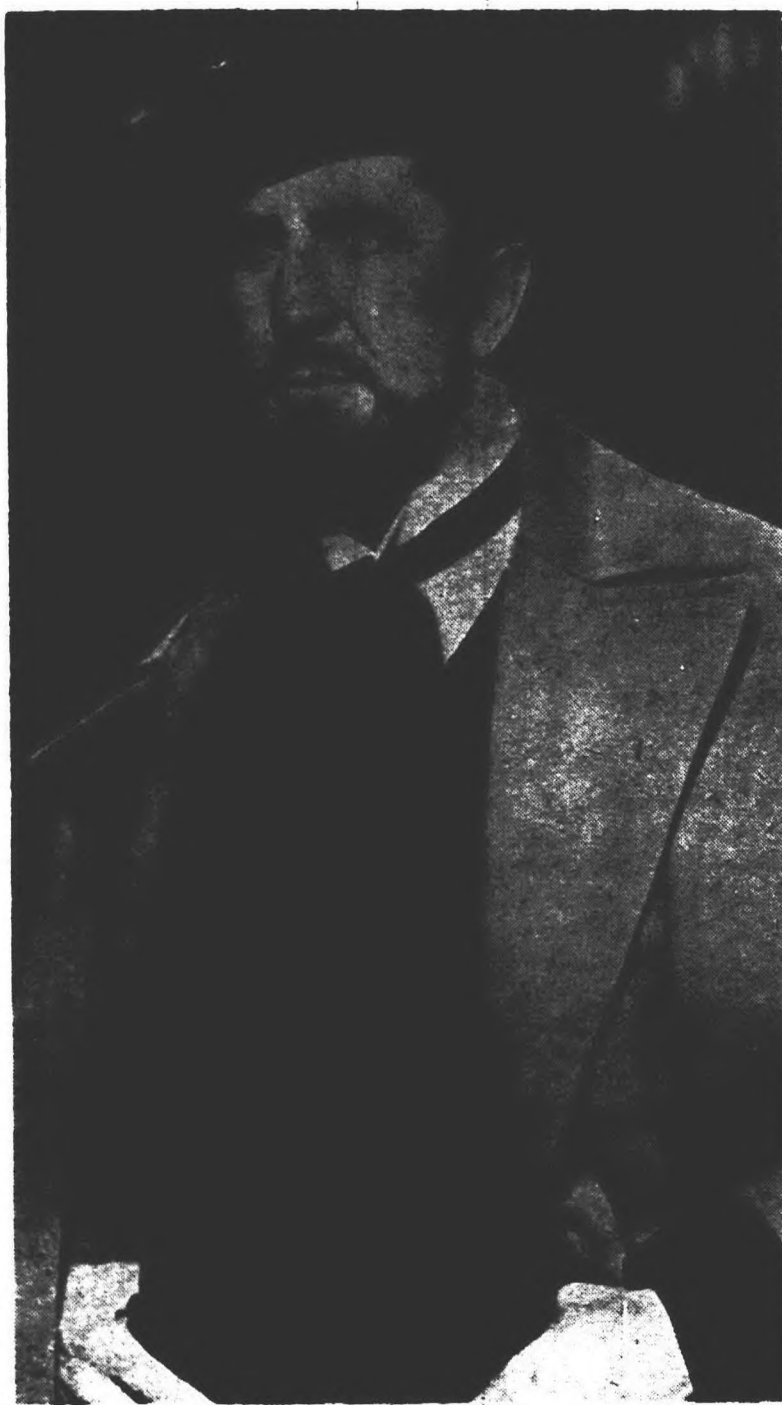

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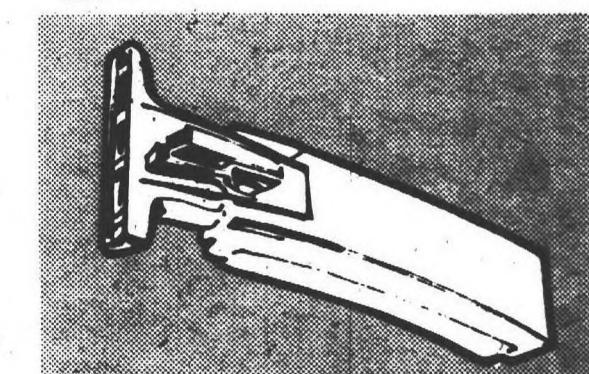
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Should Schools Belong?

How Mary Shook Up SEMCOG

Mary Dumas' outburst was a little out of order and shook up a few people in the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, but other members of the school bloc congratulated her on getting to the heart of the issue.

Mrs. Dumas is a newly-elected Schoolcraft College trustee and, in the absence of Arch Vallier, was functioning as the community college's delegate to SEMCOG's annual meeting.

The issue: What role do school districts have in a six-county regional agency? Conversely, what's SEMCOG doing for Schoolcraft, other community colleges and schools in general?

The issue is critical at the moment because SEMCOG has been standing still in the membership department overall and has been losing school members, notably Farmington, Livonia and Plymouth in recent months. The Schoolcraft board will decide, probably tonight, whether to stay in or quit. The board is split. Mrs. Dumas' vote could be the deciding one.

AND SO at last month's SEMCOG annual meeting, the soft-eyed lady from Livonia interrupted the falling gavel to lace into the regional group's new chairman, Robert FitzPatrick, otherwise known as chairman of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

School officials aren't "selfish and short-sighted," she said, blistering FitzPatrick's remarks quoted in Observer Newspapers. "We're disillusioned and disappointed at our inability to participate in the whole planning process. Some of us in the school bloc don't even

know what SEMCOG's services are."

Her outburst was brief, but it led to several polite confrontations between her and some of SEMCOG's staunchest friends. Whether they gave her satisfying answers will be known after the Schoolcraft board meeting tonight.

STEVEN WEISS, the staff man who handles SEMCOG's educational programs, said this was "one of the few councils of governments in the country with school district members." Both schools and the federal government, which insists on regional planning and provide much COG support, have difficulty seeing a role for schools, Weiss admitted, and SEMCOG itself has had no models to follow.

"Historically, some of the criticism has been valid, but now we're off the ground," Weiss went on, singling out a vocational education planning project.

He elaborated: "In the field of environmental technology, Wayne County Community College, Dearborn and Macomb community colleges all want to teach it. SEMCOG

is trying to provide a rationale for their decision-making process." Moreover, K-12 districts need a fund of planning information so that they can make decisions on what vocational subjects to teach.

HEW is showing some interest in funding it. The project could enable SEMCOG to define what kinds and numbers of jobs would be created by the blossoming of environmental programs.

In addition, he said, SEMCOG has all kinds of information tools — census data, transit plans, population characteristics and trends — that should be valuable to school officials.

MRS. DUMAS had done a lot of homework on SEMCOG's budget, pointing out that of \$1.5 million, only a few thousand dollars were allocated directly to education work.

Said Weiss: "School district's dues don't pay for more than one staff member." He added, however, that the U.S. Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare funded a health training vocational program in the past. But Berkley school board member Donn Shelton had a different approach. He thought Mrs. Dumas was asking the wrong kind of question.

When boards of education consider membership in MASA or MASB (state associations of administrators and board members), they don't ask someone to show them in dollars what they're getting out of it, Shelton began. But they do demand dollar figures out of SEMCOG.

"School districts haven't distinguished between state and regional issues," Shelton went on, referring to a 1971 incident when SEMCOG's general assembly declined to back the school bloc on a question of whether to endorse or oppose a school aid formula. "We've come in with some things that aren't in the role of SEMCOG."

The fault, said Shelton, is not so much with SEMCOG as an organization as with the false expectations which school members build up.

C. HENRY Haberkorn, a Bloomfield Hills School District delegate, congratulated Mrs. Dumas for taking on the council's leaders

but also felt that "school districts have neglected to get information" about SEMCOG.

Joe Mayfield, Taylor school board member and new chairman of SEMCOG's school bloc, agreed that schools were being shorted but felt school districts were dead wrong on quitting.

"The schools are going about this in exactly the wrong direction. Other blocs may want the schools out of SEMCOG, and the counties will pick up their (schools') votes," said Mayfield.

"The counties are willing to pay the piper, so they'll call the tune," said Mayfield.

There were a dozen school people in the education bloc caucus, and after these exchanges there appeared to be a consensus: The schools are a weak bloc in SEMCOG, but rather than quit, they should participate more fully than ever, and should recruit other schools to join.

AFTER THE caucus, Mrs. Dumas met SEMCOG Chairman FitzPatrick, the

man who had originally aroused her ire, in the friendly atmosphere of a reception.

FitzPatrick guessed school members were quitting because of financial problems they all have, but he answered her question about what school delegates should do with a frank: "I don't know."

But he did know this: "The decisions we make in SEMCOG aren't going to affect us, but they are going to affect our children. Those decisions that will affect everyone in the region are going to be made whether some units of government are members or not."

"We want all 400 units of government in. But if we don't get enough members... well, the counties will fill the appointments on the executive board."

And on that note, Mrs. Dumas' first day as an acting delegate to the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments ended.

Did they succeed in turning her around? She wouldn't say so, but she did allow as to how

she was "encouraged enough to consider" trying to keep Schoolcraft in. "I'm willing to look at all sides of it."

'We Taught Youth Impatience'

Youth has a built-in impatience and expectation of instant gratification, says a leading counselor, and parents can improve communication with their teens if they realize this.

"We taught them to be impatient," Helen E. Keane, University of Detroit counselor, told a Birmingham

Town Hall audience in Farmington recently.

"We started by putting them in the high chair and feeding them instant cereal, and they've grown up with television entertainment always instantly available."

MISS KEANE, talking about "The Quest for Understanding Mothers and Children" as part of the Temple series on womanhood

said technological change has made big differences for the younger generation.

"And two four-letter words, BOMB and FILL, symbolize the greatest change," she added. "Both approach life negatively."

The trouble with constant exposure to television, as Miss Keane sees it, is not violence or mediocrity but "the subtle innuendo, in commercials and programs, that whatever is

wrong can be cured instantly by taking a pill.

In the matter of values, Miss Keane said, we shouldn't be surprised at youth's questioning when we tell them all men are created equal but they can see that "our society denies options to some."

"We brought them up to accept 'contradictions,' she added, "And I kind of love them when they won't do it."

EITHER BEING YOUNG or being a parent can be a lonely business, she said, in today's mobile society when change is rapid, much is expected of youth and parents have many distractions.

"But we can be honest with our young people," she added. "We can try to understand them, and we can above all love them, with all their faults."

Her work as a counselor, Miss Keane said, has convinced her that today's society puts too much emphasis on a college education.

"We have the money to send our children to college, and we worry about what the neighbors will think if they don't go," she added.

"But what we should be doing is directing young people into a field where they can excel. I would rather see a young man be a cracker-jack plumber than a second rate civil engineer. He'll be happier, he'll make more money and he'll adjust to what he is."

Miss Keane conceded in response to a question that labor union restrictions often make the service fields difficult to enter if you don't have a relative already there.

"I think vocational counselors are going to have to do something about getting out and making some changes," she said. "Most service people are needed badly, and some of those plumbers' sons maybe should be going to college."

IN DESCRIBING growth and inter-personal relationships, Miss Keane quoted two psychological authorities, Erik Erikson, whom she described as "the most esteemed student of human personality today," and Eric Berne, author of the best-seller "Games People Play."

She said Erikson "takes the historical approach to human personality," dividing life into stages and designating the

traits that should develop at each stage.

FOR EXAMPLE, she said, an infant should learn trust. If he doesn't, the result is mistrust, and it may affect the rest of his life.

In early childhood, according to Erikson, an individual learns autonomy, or, failing that, self-doubt. Then comes the play stage, with initiative or guilt the opposite sides of the coin, the school stage that brings industry or an inferiority complex, and adolescence with its gift of identity or, for some, role diffusion.

Other stages and their accompanying traits were listed as young adulthood with intimacy or isolation, adulthood with generativity or stagnation, and maturity with integrity or despair.

Miss Keane said it is Erikson's contention that if the growth trait is not acquired at any stage, it's possible and necessary to go back and find it.

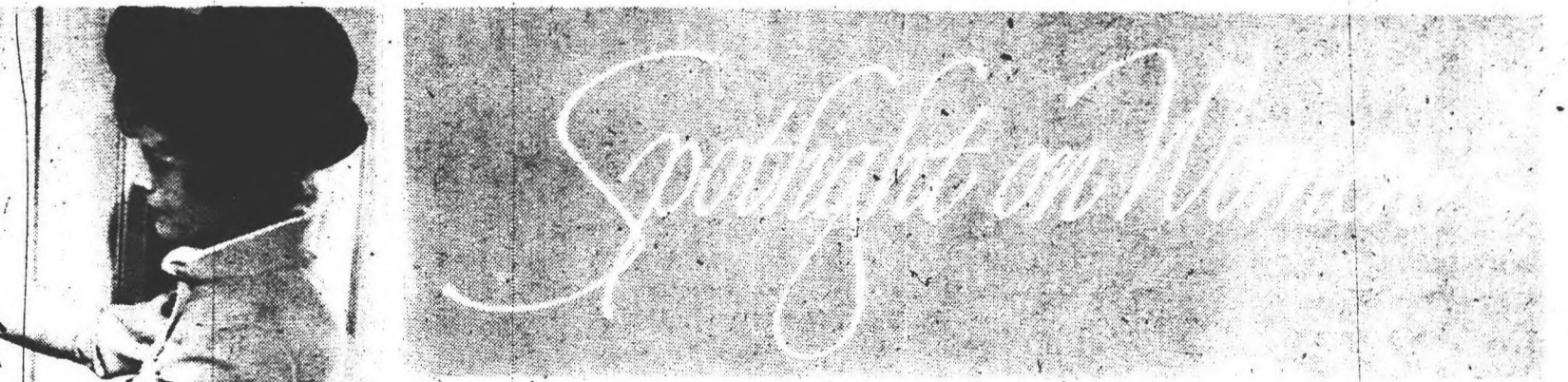
FROM BERNE, she explained the premise that in every individual there is the child, the adult and the parent; and that in any person-to-person relationship any one of three may be speaking. The idea, she said, is that the response must be on the same level if it is to be effective.

"So when a young person asks the facts about marijuana, it's the adult in him speaking and we should respond as an adult—with facts, as we have them, rather than with horror and recrimination," she said.

"But when he's worried and frightened and finding it hard to cope with his situation, he may come to us as a child. Then it's time to respond as a parent, or even as another child, but definitely not as an adult."

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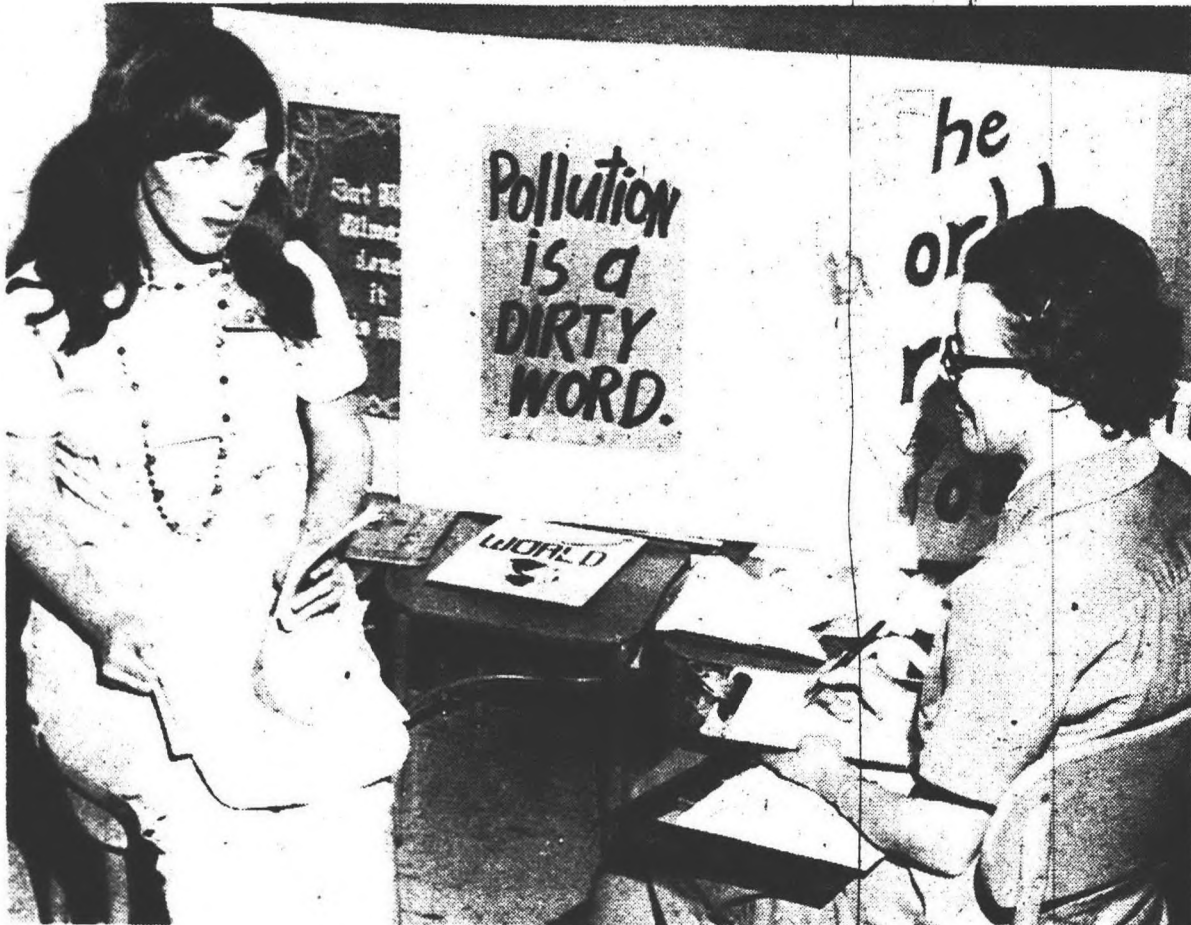

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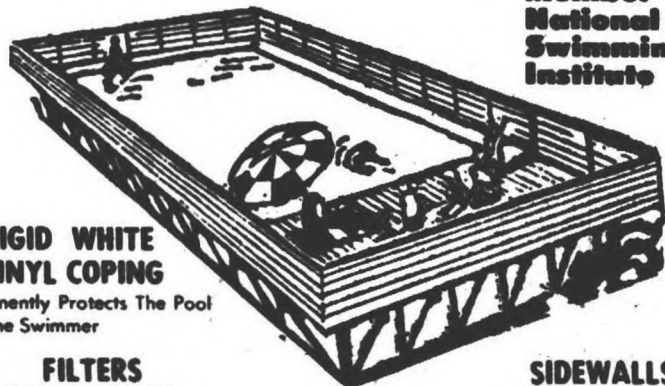
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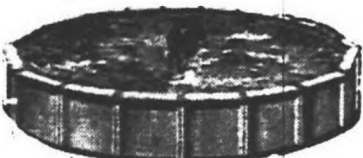
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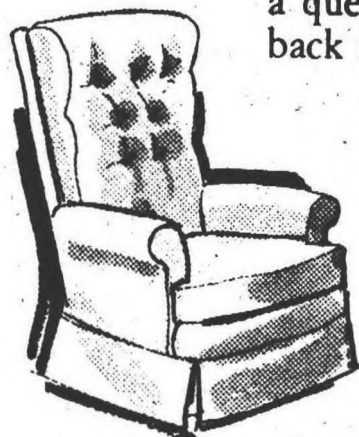
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LWV Supports Federal Minimum Income Law

The sorry plight of the "middle-class poor" has led the League of Women Voters in Oakland County to support federal legislation to provide an adequate minimum income for all people.

A recent league survey has indicated that there are 40,000 at the poverty level in Oakland County alone.

The LWV position was stated by Mrs. Richard Gould of Farmington, president of the Farmington - West Bloomfield LWV, in recent testimony before the leadership conference for welfare reform in Detroit.

Mrs. Gould, in her statement, called poverty "very democratic," not confining itself to urban and inner city areas.

A DETAILED STUDY conducted by leagues in Oakland county, she stated, shows that poverty definitely

is present in suburban communities.

"In Michigan's wealthiest county, Oakland, we have almost 40,000 people on public relief," she added.

"These figures are not diminishing. Industrial slow-downs and local factory shut-downs have forced suburban families to seek assistance. College graduates, displaced professionals, zealots of the 'work ethic' suddenly are members of the middle class - poor."

THE PROBLEM is compounded, Mrs. Gould added, by the fact that it costs more for anyone to live in the suburbs and the feeling of isolation.

"The suburban recipient has expenses not provided for in the state grant," she explained. "Items such as transportation costs, adequate shelter maintenance and service expenses such as

private garbage collection and assessments for roads, water and sewer.

"He is surrounded by affluent citizens who dislike the 'welfare dole.' Our poor people are isolates, kept in their place through intimidation, shame and confusion. Their financial problems spill into every facet of their lives and consume their dignity."

MRS. GOULD said the Oakland Leagues were supporting "federal legislation which will provide an adequate minimum income to furnish decent food, clothing and shelter" and also favored some system of periodic review to make cost of living adjustments in federal grants.

"Above all, we ask for legislation which respects the rights of the poor and safeguards their dignity," she said.

She listed three necessary parts of welfare reform legislation:

It should base eligibility solely on current need.

It should provide voluntary options for job training and placement, taking into consideration the responsibility of parenthood, and containing and encouraging work - incentive formula.

It should provide open, voluntary child care facilities which meet standards encompassing educational, nutritional and health services with fees on a sliding scale based on ability to pay and free where necessary.

THE LEAGUE of Women Voters' study upon which Mrs. Gould's testimony was based involved various social service agencies in Oakland County and was coordinated by Mrs. Paula Tobocman of Farmington.

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Diesel To Add 1,000 Area Jobs

By MAURIE WALKER

A multi-million dollar tooling and plant rearrangement for a new diesel engine series, plus the eventual adding of more than 1,000 jobs to the Detroit-Redford operations, were announced this week by Detroit Diesel Allison Division of General Motors.

"Increased business plus more jobs are expected to result from this new Series 92 diesel engine which is planned to be introduced in 1974," said James E. Knott, GM vice president and general manager.

"Slight employment increases will take place beginning in 1973 as we prepare for production, but the bulk of the increase will occur in 1975 and 1976 after we are in full production with the new engine," he added.

KNOTT POINTED OUT that to make room for construction of the new engine at Detroit Diesel, production of the Series 149 engine will be shifted to the Indianapolis plant.

"This move, in turn, frees important plant space here for the new high volume product," Knott added.

It was pointed out that moving the 149 engine production will not effect employment at Detroit Diesel. Workers will be absorbed within the plant, many of them expected to be working on the new series.

"Sales of Detroit Diesel engines have nearly tripled over the past 10 years," Knott said.

"As a result, we built to our property boundaries here. We did, however, gain additional capacity when GM consolidated the Detroit Diesel Engine Division with the Allison Division in Indianapolis in 1970."

HE SAID A DECLINING market for defense-related products made Indianapolis plant space available there and consequently opened an area for moving the Series 149 engine production to Indiana.

The new diesel engine is geared to a market trend toward higher horsepower engines.

"There is a demand for more productive power per ton in the heavy-duty trucking industry," Knott explained, "and our new 92 engine, with its range from 270 to 450 horsepower, will enable us to meet that demand."

The new engine will be built initially in six and eight cylinder, V configuration models. Later plans call for the addition of a 12-cylinder version.

Knott said that a major advantage of the new engine will be its size interchangeability with the division's Series 71 engines.

Prototypes of the new 92 have logged some 2 1/2 million miles in highway tests plus 33,000 hours in engineering laboratories, according to Knott. The results show the 92 will provide the industry with a well proven engine, he added.

DETROIT DIESEL Engine,

Redford's biggest taxpayer — between \$8 1/2 to \$9 million yearly — was organized by General Motors in 1937.

The division's facility located at 13400 Outer Drive, serves as administrative headquarters and diesel engine manufacturing site. A parts division center is located in Wayne, and a military vehicles engineering group is situated in Warren. Total employment at these three Michigan facilities is about 8,000 persons.

The division also has five plants in Indianapolis, Ind. and one in Cleveland.

Products produced by Detroit Diesel Allison include diesel engines in three series — 53, 71 and 149; gas turbine engines with aircraft versions offered in turbofan, turboprop and turboshaft models. A vehicular and industrial gas turbine engine is in pilot production.

The division also produces heavy-duty automatic and power-shift transmissions, plus locomotive parts, diesel engine blowers, precision bearings, propellers and military vehicle engineering service.

Knott said the movement of machinery needed to build the Series 149 to Indianapolis operations will begin in April.

He added that it will take some 14 months to complete the machinery transfer.

He pointed out that full capacity production on the new Series 92 diesel engine is not expected for at least two years.

MANY SNOWMOBILERS and skiers are finding those weekend sports a mite expensive, what with \$15 to \$30

per family nightly for lodging and meals and restaurants.

So more and more of them are going in for winter camping. Auto Club reports 62 state and 55 private campgrounds open during the winter — a 30 per cent increase from last year.

Some private campgrounds even rent camper units at \$16 to \$24 a night — which gets you into the motel price range again.

Since it's expensive to haul your own trailer because hauling one cuts your gasoline mileage, many parts offer winter storage. A typical one charges \$12 a month and tosses in the first three days of camping free.

Your trailer needs to be winterized, which costs about \$50, Auto Club estimates. If you don't, you may have icy floors and drafts around doors and windows.

A few tips: Park your trailer with the front facing the prevailing wind and try to reduce wind flow under it by using skirts or straw. Leave the window or vent open a crack when heating. Drain all water pipes when traveling — chill factors at expressway speeds, will drop trailer temperatures far below freezing.

Age Limit 70 Proposed For Office Holders

LANSING

Michigan voters may be asked to decide whether persons over 70 years old should be prohibited from holding an elected or appointed public office.

State Sen. William Faust (D-Westland) has introduced legislation to put such an amendment to the state constitution on the ballot in the next general election.

"Inasmuch as candidates seeking election as judges in Michigan may not be over 70, I think it's only just that candidates for other public offices be similarly restricted," said Faust.

"Certainly, those who make the law should be required to meet the same qualifications as those who administer the law," he added, noting that about four per cent of his colleagues in the Legislature are over 70.

Faust stressed that there are many competent public officials over 70 who serve the citizens of Michigan admirably.

"However, the public has expressed increasing concern over the fact that some people over 70 are appointed to public office merely as a reward for past services."

"While I fully agree that we should honor and respect those senior citizens who have made significant public contributions, thanks should not be expressed at the expense of the public good."

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Small Business Tax Seminar Set Feb. 23

DETROIT The business advisory committee and the business advisory resource bank of the Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce will sponsor a "Small Business Tax Awareness Seminar" on Wednesday, Feb. 23, from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. at Cobo Hall. The seminar will focus attention on the small businessman and his tax problems at the local, state and federal levels.

Workshop sessions highlighting specific problems will include representatives of governmental taxing agencies to answer questions about withholding; unemployment compensation; income tax and other areas of financial planning.

Lawrence Doss, president of New Detroit, Inc., and former assistant district director of the Internal Revenue Service, will deliver the opening remarks. In addition there will be representatives from local banks, certified public accounting firms, the legal profession, and some businessmen who have experienced problems in the tax management areas.

A tax information kit also will be given to participants at no cost.

Stadium Finance Plan To Cut Interest Cost

To take advantage of current low bond interest rates, the Wayne County Stadium Authority has asked the Wayne County Board of Commissioners to revise the stadium lease agreement concluded last fall.

The commissioners stadium committee, meeting last week, voted unanimously to recommend that the revised plan be approved by the county board. The committee also voted unanimously for approval of the proposed stadium user's agreement with the Detroit Tigers baseball club.

Under the proposed revisions, the authority would acquire the land by paying \$12 million of the approximate \$15 million purchase price from bond proceeds. The remaining \$3 million would be paid by the City of Detroit from bond proceeds already earmarked for Civic Center development.

The original plan was to have Detroit Renaissance, Inc. find a private developer who would purchase the acreage and then give the

acreage needed for the stadium to the county.

"THE STADIUM authority was advised by bond counsel that interest rates are not expected to go any lower than the current 6.5 per cent and are likely to start moving upward in April," explained Commissioner Thomas P. O'Rourke, the stadium committee chairman.

The original agreement between the authority and the board of commissioners was predicated on a 7.5 per cent bond interest rate. Sale of the \$126-million construction bond issue at 6.5 per cent would mean an initial savings of \$4 million and a savings of more than \$40 million in interest over the entire period of the bond issue.

Stadium authority members told O'Rourke's committee that Detroit Renaissance might not have its arrangements completed in time to take advantage of the current interest rates.

Under the original plan, the Renaissance group was to arrange for a developer to purchase 72 acres of land owned by two railroads west of Cobo Hall and give the 36-acre stadium site to the county.

Negotiations are continuing with prospective developers and investors who could relieve the authority of some or all of its obligation for the cost of the land, authority members said.

PURCHASE of the land with bond proceeds would reduce the projected stadium annual reserve fund from \$1,757,000 to \$1,480,000.

However, the Legislature's passage of legislation designed to provide \$4.5 million annually for the stadium, coupled with the agreement with the baseball club and the lower interest

rates have made the project's financial outlook "better than ever before," declared Detroit Controller Robert P. Roselle, an authority member.

O'Rourke commented: "It must be strongly emphasized that our committee feels that no tax money will be needed out of the county general fund. I don't believe any Wayne County commissioner would approve this project if he felt monies were needed from the general fund."

O'Rourke said committee members spent "several weeks of study and review" in deciding to recommend approval of the agreement with the Detroit Tigers.

"Any benefit derived by the baseball club are balanced by improved revenue projections as a result of the lower bond interest rate and other factors," he added. "We feel the agreement is equitable for both parties."

THE AUTHORITY also revised its projected football revenue downward, reducing the original figure of \$1,221,000 to \$369,000 due to the continued insistence of the Detroit Lions owner that his team will play in a new stadium near Pontiac. The former figure was based on nine professional games. The new figure is based on five college games.

"However, we think it is still a good prospect that we will get other professional teams into the stadium," Roselle told the commissioners.

The revised site acquisition plan and the agreement with Tigers owner John E. Fetzer will come before the Ways and Means Committee, which includes all 26 commissioners, at 2 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 24. If approved, final action would come at the next full board meeting March 2.

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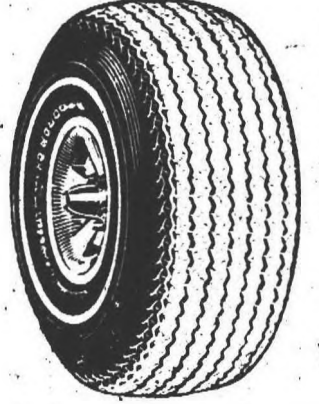
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News Research Gets A Boost

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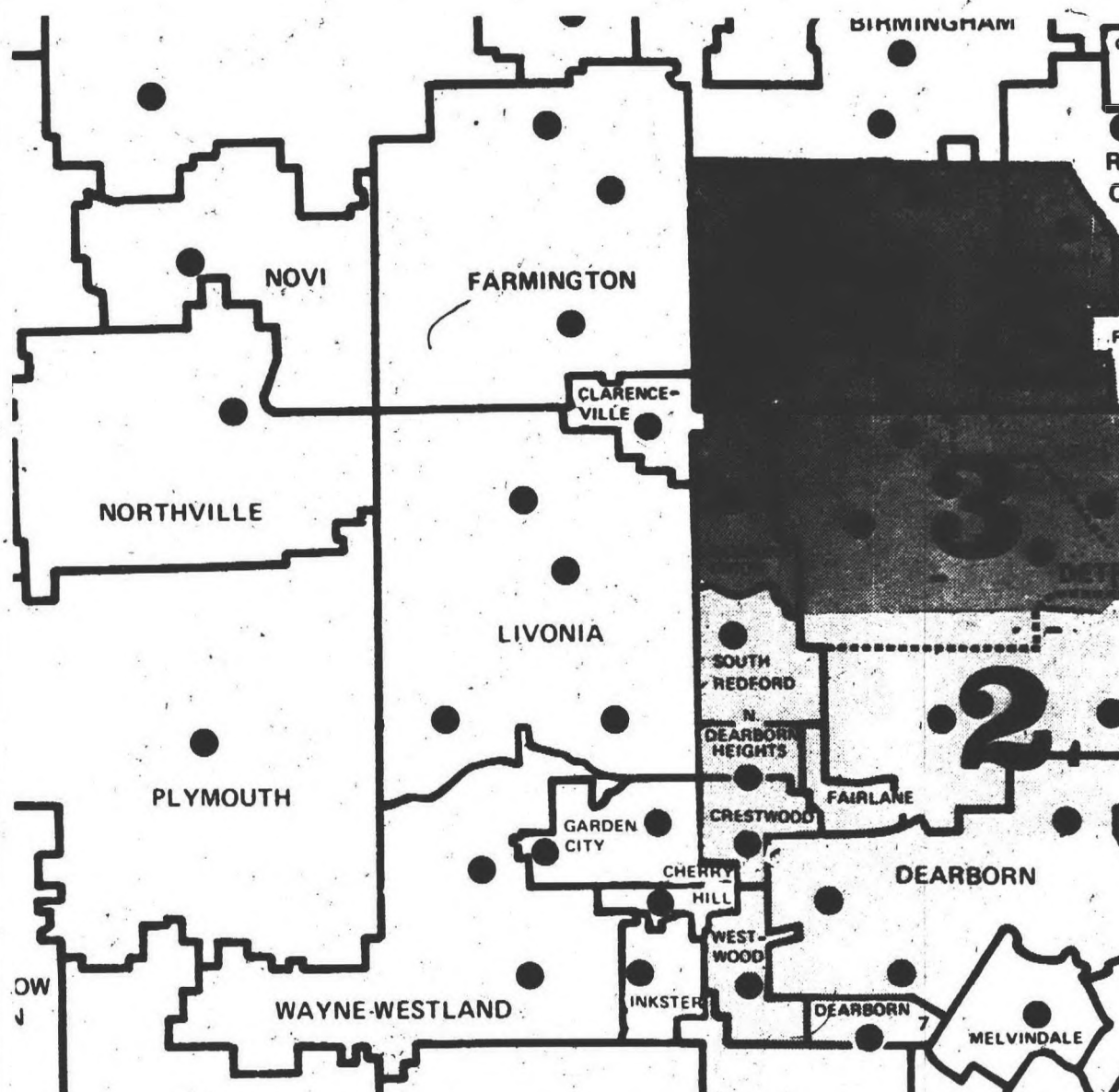

BOGOLEA WILL conduct the seminar beginning at 7 p.m. The first meeting will be in Room 100 of Bradner Library on the campus. The library is next to the south visitors parking area off Haggerty Rd. between Six and Seven Mile.

Lasting for 10 weeks and with a \$12 charge, the seminar will be flexible but will attempt "to bring about community solutions to community problems through a well conceived program of coordinated community involvement."

"All too often the solution to local problems is right in the community, but we bring in

outside resources to solve them," Griffith said. "We want to identify some of the resources in the community and get people to solve our own problems."

One essential by-product of such involvement is that "if you're part of the decision, you are more willing to live with it," Griffith says.

BOGOLEA SAYS the seminar is designed to get community residents interested in becoming volunteer leaders or workers in community programs. It will

give residents direction in determining where and how they can put their talents to work.

Among areas Bogolea hopes to cover are how to mobilize community power bases, develop a nucleus of well-trained volunteers capable of accomplishing the goals of an action program, coordinate volunteer efforts, set goals and action time tables, and organize and conduct public meetings.

Interested persons can register for the seminar on the first night of the class.

Child Care Course 2-College Offering

Wayne County Community College and Schoolcraft College will jointly offer a child care worker curriculum -- the first joint program offered by the two colleges.

Dr. Robert Keene, Schoolcraft's vice president of instruction, said the two colleges will continue to work together on joint courses.

"Such cooperation would minimize the cost of some expensive programs, locate the programs so that students may commute to the areas of instruction without much difficulty and eliminate duplication of efforts by several institutions," Keene said in a memo to the board.

Students can register at either college for the two-year program. Schoolcraft will offer the general education courses and WCC will offer the child care training at Wayne County Child Development Center. The vocational division of the State Dept. of Education gave approval for the curriculum. Graduates will be awarded associate degrees from either institution.

Keene said that the curriculum is designed "to train students to work with children in a variety of institutions, such as cottage parents, house parents, children's supervisors, camp counselors, and nursery school workers."

"The student is trained to work effectively with an institutional team and the program provides training for

working with the normal child as well as the physically handicapped, mentally retarded, emotionally disturbed and socially maladjusted children and youth.

"Skills for working with children are developed through study and practical field experience in institutions located within commuting distance of the college," Keene said.

Eventually the child care center run by Schoolcraft may be utilized as an observation laboratory or used for student training, he said.

The potential enrollment for the program is 50 students.

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Do Women Discriminate Against Themselves?

EAST LANSING
An assistant director in the Placement Bureau at Michigan State University believes that employment discrimination against women is real, but that "women unwittingly discriminate against themselves."

Gail Morris, who recently entered a new post in the Placement Bureau established especially to help women find jobs, is a walking array of programs, projections, problems and probabilities of employment for women.

She said that a placement bureau survey has shown, for example, that females holding bachelor's degrees from MSU in business and the social sciences earn respectively \$1,927 and \$1,110 less than the average graduates from these colleges.

"On the national level," Mrs. Morris said, "98 per cent of the persons earning \$15,000 or more are male."

"There is no question," she said, "that women on the whole earn less and hold fewer high-status positions than men."

BUT MRS. MORRIS is not one to shout "male chauvinist" at the figures.

"Many women unwittingly discriminate against themselves," she said. "They place more restrictions on location and travel than men do. They are not training for the professions that are in high demand. And they are not aspiring to the job levels that their male counterparts do."

"We have found that women, for the most part, are majoring in the over-supplied, low-demand fields — especially liberal arts, education, and social science," she said. "Many of the recruiters who come to the campus are in business, industry and government. And I would say that 80 to 90 per cent of the students who have

scheduled interviews for these positions this term have been male."

Citing a projection for 1980 given to a House committee by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, Mrs. Morris urged women to "train for the fields where the most progress can be made, in demand, in salaries and in upward mobility."

"This report shows that the greatest demand in 1980 is going to be for chemists, counselors, dieticians, dentists, physicians and physicists," she said. "Women who want jobs need to consider these fields."

WHAT RECOMMENDATIONS would Mrs. Morris give a job-seeking female college graduate?

"First and most important," she said, "she must know herself. She has to formulate a well-defined employment objective and strive to reach it. Employers are not hiring students who come in and say they'll take anything the company has to offer."

"Second, she must stop thinking in the narrow categories of teaching, social work and nursing," she said, "and be willing to consider using these same skills in positions in business and industry. There are more companies specifically requesting interviews with women."

"The opportunities are there, just waiting for the right woman."

Add water, onion, dill seeds. Cover tightly; simmer, don't boil, over low heat, turning occasionally to cook it evenly throughout about 4 to 4 1/2 hours or until fork-tender. About 45 minutes before meat is done, add remaining ingredients and simmer, covered, about 45 minutes, or until tender.

Remove meat to heated platter and keep warm. Skim fat from broth in roasting pan. To broth, add water to make 2 to 3 cups liquid. Heat; thicken and season if needed for gravy. Serves a family of 4 for 2 meals.
