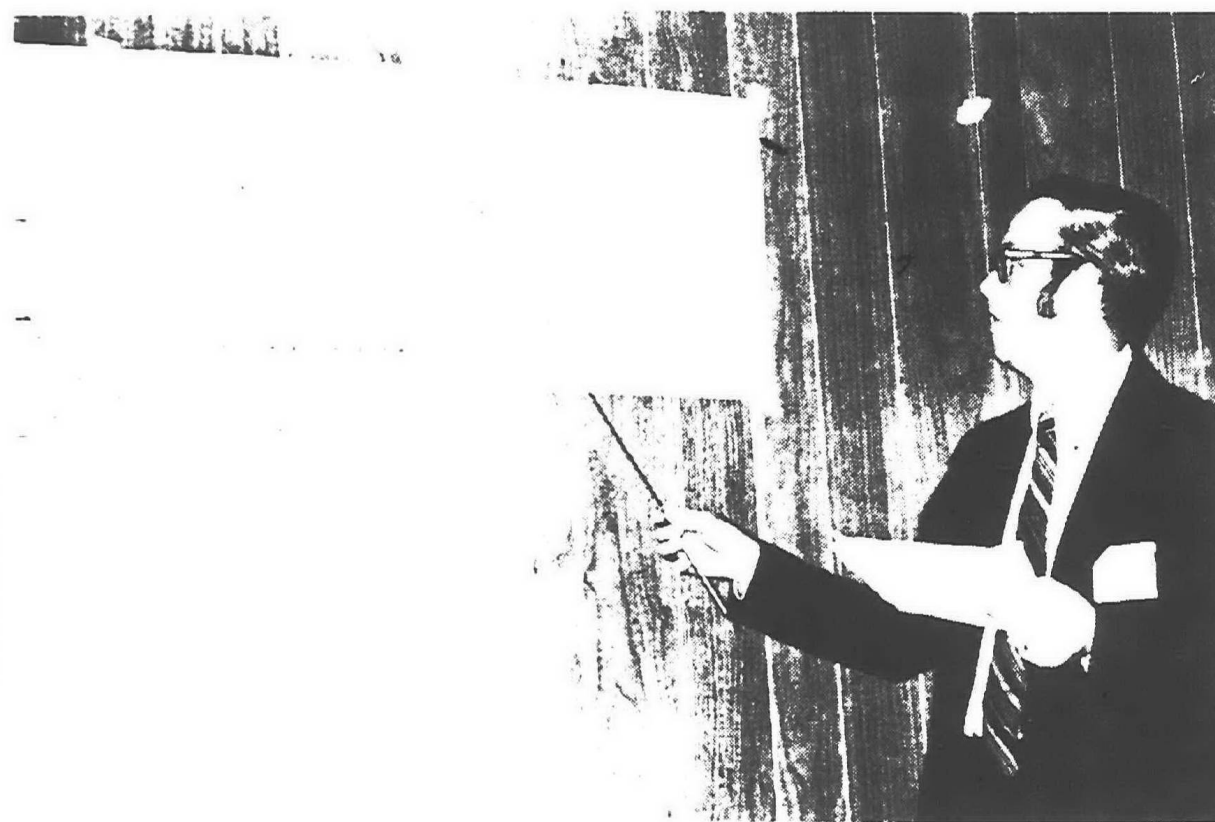

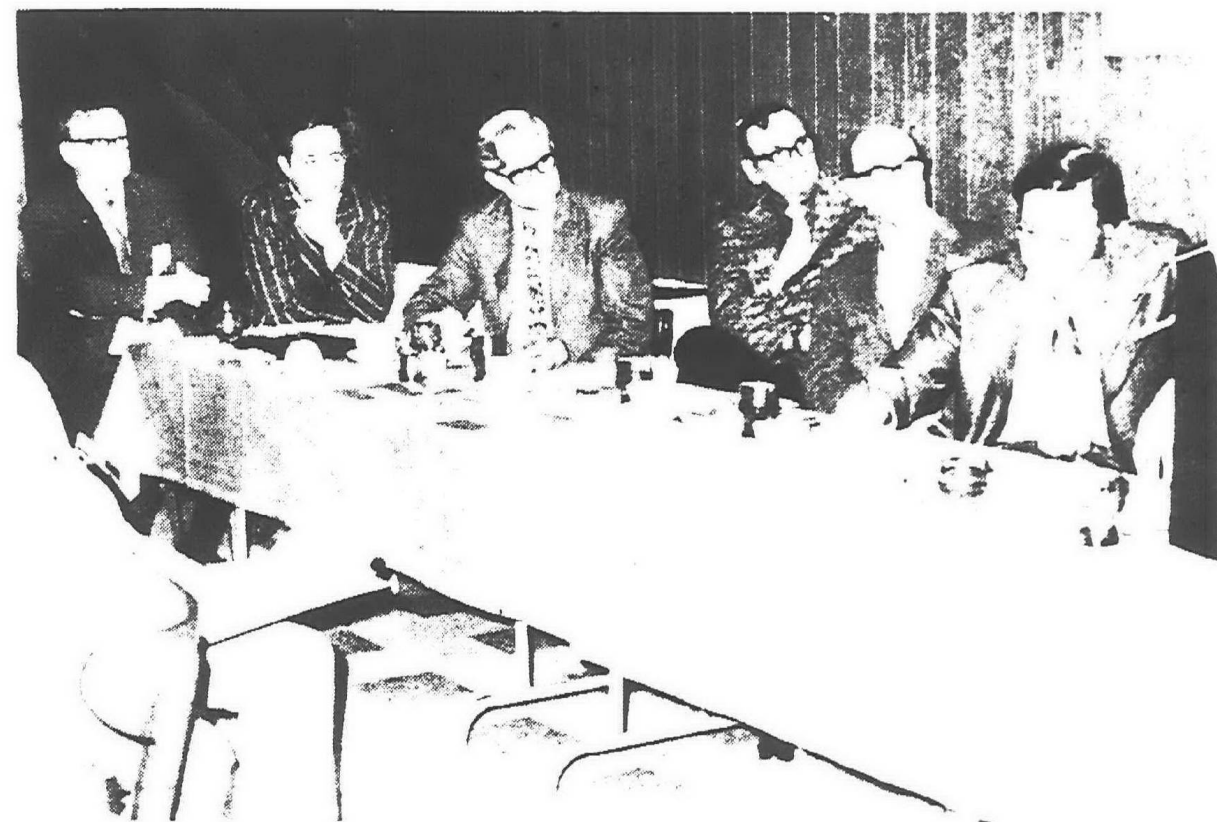

## Widening Of Ann Arbor Rd. Seen As Certainty By '75

SMITH HORTON, of the township planning commission, said the route as planned splits the township ...

At issue is the question of cutting across St. John's Seminary land. Horton commented, "This is the tail wagging the dog. The interests of the township are being subordinated by the interests of one entity. I think it is high time the state responded to the needs of the public."

When asked whether there is any likelihood of entrance and exit ramps being added to M-14 plans at Northville Rd., as local officials desire, a spokesman for the state said the department has recommended against it.

It would add \$2.5 million to the cost and delay construction of the freeway by at least five years because we would have to start the process of public hearings and right of way purchases all over again," it was stated.

ACTING SUPT. John Hoben of the Plymouth school district, pointing to the ever

increasing number of bus runs necessary because of growing enrollment, said that the greatest road improvement sought by the schools is completion of the proposed curve that would link Sheldon and Canton Center Rds. as one continuous thoroughfare. This would ease traffic problems in the area of the two high schools.

Robert Larson, planning engineer for the Wayne County Road Commission, dashed hopes for any immediate attention to that project when he declared, "There are \$23 million in front of it in county priorities."

It has fallen by the wayside because of greater priorities throughout the rest of the county," said Larson.

Larson outlined many projects which the county does have in its 1972 and 1973 plans, a number of which are in Canton Township where Supervisor Philip Dingeldey

said improvement of Sheldon south of Joy Rd. is one of the greatest needs.

Dingeldey also cited the need for improving Canton Center, Warren, Haggerty, Cherry Hill and Morton Taylor Rds. but was given no specific timetable as to when all this can be accomplished.

STATE SEN. Carl Pursell told the meeting, which was called for the Thunderbird Inn by the Plymouth Area Planning Commission, "While you're stating needs, don't forget that someone is going to have to pay for all this."

He and the representatives of state and county were emphatic in saying that much of the program will depend upon whether funds become available through passage of the major transportation package now in front of the Legislature.

McKeon told the group that even though Main St. has a

traffic count of 20,000 vehicles a day. "We do not believe that a grade separation on Main at the C&O tracks should be our No. 1 priority. He gave that designation to the widening of Ann Arbor Rd.

Our second priority involves Sheldon Rd. particularly an improvement at the Territorial-Penniman intersection," added the mayor. "We also highly recommend a grade separation at the railroad on Sheldon."

Larson answered that by saying, "That grade separation probably would cost from \$2.5 to \$3 million, and the problem is strictly a lack of funds. We won't be able to touch this for a minimum of five to 10 years."

Breen defined improvements in Ann Arbor Trail, Sheldon Joy, Beck and Haggerty Rds. as the township's greatest needs after Ann Arbor Rd.

## LWV Opposes 'Heights' Charter

Proposed adoption of a charter which would create the City of Plymouth Heights within that area, the rest of the township, drew the ...

If the charter is approved it would leave the City of Plymouth landlocked by a new municipality, founded by ...

Eckles and Joy Rds. An estimated 60 per cent of the township's population lives within that area, the rest in the western portion, which would be left an orphan by charter adoption.

Officials of the League of Women Voters said their organization has taken a position on the charter issue as a part of their study on community planning. They issued this statement recommending defeat of the charter.

THE LEAGUE is opposed to the adoption of the charter for the City of Plymouth

Heights because they are opposed to the formation of that city.

In 1959, the City of Plymouth Heights was originated to avoid annexation, and the residents of that portion of Plymouth Township affected have not really had an opportunity since 1959 to indicate by vote whether they want a city, only a chance to accept or reject the charter.

There is no accounting for new community members and or population increase.

League members also believe that the plan for a City of Plymouth Heights leaves a problem of equitable division

of liabilities and assets. There is no provision for western Plymouth Township in this plan.

The fragmentation into governmental units (i.e. City of Plymouth, Plymouth Township, the League adds, could tend to lead to competition and not cooperation among governmental units, blocking orderly growth and development of the community."

THE 1959 vote referred to saw the idea of incorporation as a separate municipality approved at the polls by a margin of 575 to 510. As a

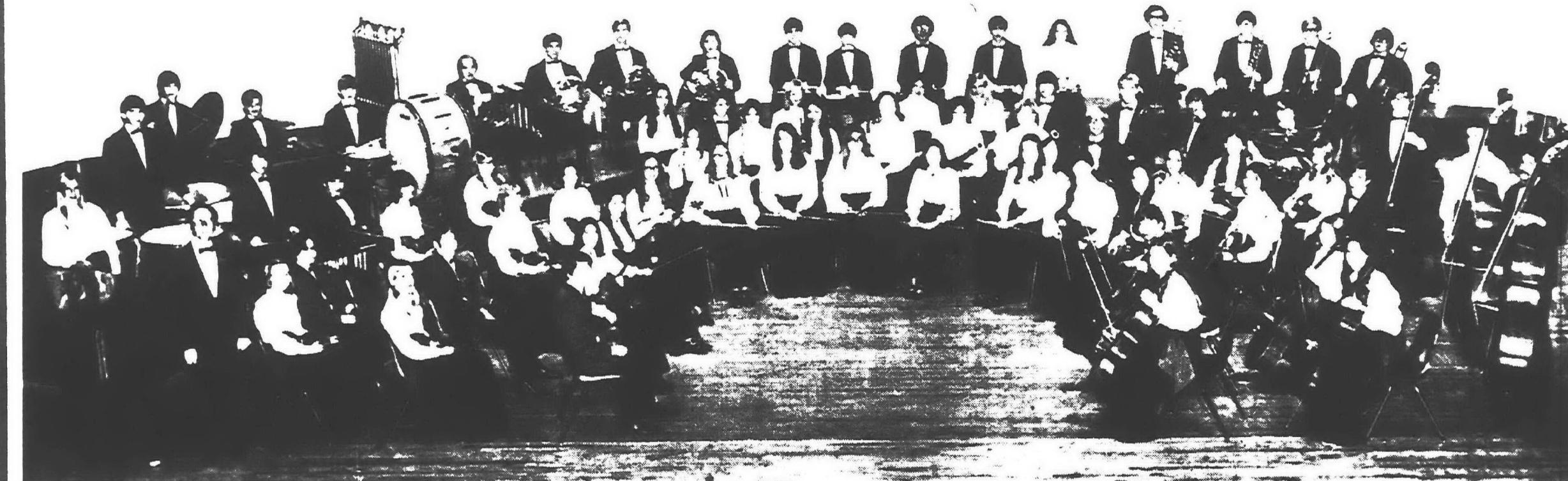
result of that slim decision, Plymouth Heights charters have been submitted to the electorate in 1961, 1963, 1966, 1969.

Each time, the "no" vote has been overwhelming, but this has not stopped proponents from going right back to the firing line in the legal process of petitioning for the election of a new charter commission. Each time, this brought another subsequent vote on the document itself. Cityhood cannot be official without approval of a charter.

Supporting the LWV's complaint that "there is no accounting for population

increase" is the fact that compared to the 1959 outcome of 575 to 510, the number of registered voters in the suggested Plymouth Heights area now stands at more than 5,000.

At the same time as voters consider the charter, they will vote for a slate of municipal officers on an "if-comes" basis. The candidates are former supervisor John McEwen, mayor, Mrs. Helen Richardson, clerk, Mrs. Elizabeth Holmes, treasurer, and as councilmen, Gene Overholt, Robert Kenyon, Richard Wickard, Martin Schomberger, Louis Norman and Mary Rorabacher.

## Alcohol Bad As Heroin?

Questions should be sent to

Q. I am a concerned parent  
who is trying to learn  
something about the very  
serious drug problem which is  
a threat to all of our children.  
My attempts to become in-  
formed have not made me an  
expert, I'm sure. But the one  
rock-solid thing I learned from  
various sources is that heroin  
is far and away the most  
dangerous drug being abused.

In recent weeks, however, I  
have seen newspaper articles  
stating that heroin is less  
harmful than alcohol. The  
research "documenting" this  
was supposed to have been  
funded by the Ford Foun-  
dation, no less.

Should I throw out every  
fact I've learned, or is this  
report totally irresponsible?

P.S. I try to answer  
questions on drugs for our  
church Youth Study Group.  
Believe me, these kids are  
aware of this report too. We'd  
ALL like an answer.

A First of all, let us  
reassure you that you are  
basically correct in your  
understanding that heroin  
addiction is the worst form of  
drug abuse. It's an un-  
fortunate thing that your hard-  
earned self-confidence has  
been undermined by a few  
newspaper articles.

What the report in question  
states is true only under one  
set of extremely improbable  
(and generally impossible)  
circumstances. Subject A  
drinks, let's say, a quart a  
day.

Subject B uses pure, sterile  
heroin, injected with ab-  
solutely sterile syringes and  
needles. The amount of heroin  
is precisely measured and  
gauged to the tolerance of the  
user. The shots are given by  
someone thoroughly trained in  
injection techniques. Then the  
drinker may be at greater  
peril than the user of heroin.  
(This points out the con-  
siderable dangers of alcohol.)

But...

But pure, sterile heroin is  
not available. No way. The  
average heroin addict uses  
injection equipment that is not  
merely unsterile but is  
generally grossly con-  
taminated. The amount of  
heroin in a "bag" is always an  
unknown quantity to the user.  
Poor injection techniques are  
usually the rule rather than  
the exception.

The result?

Medical journals today are  
full of articles documenting  
profound damage in heroin  
users to the eye, the brain, the  
heart and other muscles, the  
lungs, the liver-to virtually  
every tissue system and  
organ. Sometimes heroin is  
the cause; sometimes im-  
purities or contaminants,  
sometimes other drugs used to  
dilute the heroin.

It would be no exaggeration  
to say that heroin addicts are  
literally dropping like flies  
from overdoses. Hepatitis  
becomes a threat not merely  
to health but to life. Con-  
tamination and poor  
techniques all too often  
produce abscesses at the site of  
injection that can result with-  
in all too many cases -- in life-  
threatening systemic in-  
fections.

More could be said, but at  
risk of belaboring the point.

The point is simply that  
heroin addiction is fan-  
tastically more dangerous  
than alcohol -- if you look at it  
in the setting in which it oc-  
curs: the street, and not in an  
ivory tower.

Thank you for your concern.  
We hope this has given you a  
somewhat better perspective  
on the problem.

THROUGH BIFOCALS

"THE PRISON interested me the most. You see pictures on television and think nothing of it, but to really see it is something you'll never forget - to see human beings caged up like animals when they haven't had a trial yet. I think the animals in the Detroit Zoo are treated better."

The speaker was a ninth grade Plymouth girl, age 14, who had gone with her classmates on one of those "extras" local schools frequently provide, a field trip. This one had been to the Wayne County jail and also included two hours in Records Court, plus a 45-minute discussion with the prosecuting attorney and the Detroit police commissioner.

There's going to be a school millage issue on the June ballot, and sure as shootin' some of the taxpayers will bark about money being wasted to give the kids more than the basic three R's. Whether field trips are to visit Cranbrook Academy, the Detroit Historical Museum or the County jail, this always is one area of attack.

A proper question is whether they help educate students. Another is whether a field trip helps bring students into reality. At what age should they be freed from the cocoon to see the world as it is, good or bad?

There aren't many who would wonder where I stand, for I have said before that there is much more to education than book learning. The word "enrichment" has come into play recently in discussions of Michigan school financial reform, and in Plymouth this is what our tax money is getting...enrichment.

WITH THE HELP of the Central Junior High School civics teachers who arranged and chaperoned the trek of ninth graders to the Frank Murphy Hall of Justice, candid observations concerning their experience have been obtained from a number of students.

As usual, these kids are uninhibited in their comments. Taken collectively, they convince me that they learned something not available in the classroom despite one lad's assertion: "I didn't learn anything. We just went up and down the elevators and the escalators and stairs."

But listen to others, and ask yourself whether as a youngster you ever saw life in the raw like this:

"Going on trips like this one is better than just talking about the government and what goes on in the world."

"I thought it was very interesting. At least it will keep me out of trouble after I saw how they live."

"It's an OK place to visit, but not to live in."

"Where the prisoners were staying, I thought it was pretty scary. It looked like they were really cooped up in those tiny cells."

"I learned that when a person is charged with something they take him down to the station and book him. Then they get finger-printed and go to see the judge and he sets bail. Then they go to the jail and wait until their trial."

"FROM THIS TRIP I've learned that crime doesn't pay. If everyone could see how those prisoners have to live, I really think it would help and show people what they get into if they commit a crime!"

"On the 12th floor we visited with Mr. James Garber and Mr. William Cahalan. Our discussion was about the right to a speedy trial and what some of the inmates were in for. I learned from the trip that crime doesn't pay because you will just wind up in jail."

"I like the preliminary hearings because I saw what really happens in a courtroom instead of just reading about it, and for once I understood it."

"We were walking down the little aisle next to the jail cells. The feeling I got was unbelievable. It was something like I never felt before. I was scared. I felt like the prisoners were in a showcase where everyone comes to look at them on display. I'm never going through a jail again."

"The Wayne County jail does not look like a very nice place to be, especially if you are not yet proven guilty."

"I learned that jail is not a cool place to go, and that is was very sick."

"I enjoyed the field trip but I didn't like what I saw in the jail. They should try to improve it and make something for the prisoners to do. Otherwise they will just waste away in their cells. If they don't try to rehabilitate them, how can the prisoners change or even make something of their lives? They will just always know one way - crime."

In addition, each evening, there will be a special showing of a 28-minute color film entitled "Art Is..." which has been produced by the Sears-Roebuck Foundation in cooperation with the Associated Council for the Arts.

IT IS HAILED as one of the finest films of its type and attempts to answer the age-old question, "What is art?"

Mrs. Jo Hulce, coordinator of the Artrain project for Plymouth, said that the film "explores the many opportunities to respond with our senses to the world around us and how art reflects the meaning of life on a number of different levels."

Appearing in the film are leading artists from a variety of art forms, conductor Leonard Bernstein, dancers Edward Villella and Patricia

McBride, metal sculptor Robert Murray and mime Tony Montanaro.

Mrs. Hulce also announced that the Artrain slide series is available to any service club or organizational group for showing. Arrangements may be made by calling the Community Arts Council office in Central Junior High School any weekday between 9 a.m. and 12 noon or from 1 to 3 p.m.

While Artrain is in Plymouth it will be located on a C&O siding at the railroad's freight house on Starkweather. Work has been started on beautification of the site in keeping with the purposes of the sponsoring Kaleidoscope Plymouth organization to make the train's visit an occasion for artistic expression throughout the community.

## YMCA Hails Success, Sets '72 Sights High

PLYMOUTH You can't beat success and Plymouth's YMCA officials

are not going to try. But they may try enlarging on it.

In recapping the year's progress at the Y's annual meeting Monday at Allen School, Y President Mark Wehmeyer reported "...that strong and varied programs are still in effect, with good participation by the various age groups."

"We will continue to keep our groups small," the annual report stated. "It is a time-tested program that produces. We will work with those that are most in need of this help, according to our observations and those that are directed to us by community organizations."

WEHMEYER SAID that one of the Y's goals in '72 will be to concentrate on those students who are not "college material," by helping them to familiarize themselves with local opportunities.

One instance, he said, would be to let the non-college students observe local industry which would be able to hire them upon completion of school.

"By working with the younger people, it is possible to help them carry out their dreams before they become discouraged or set in the old patterns that their families have followed, such as putting off doing things and not caring about improving themselves," his report stated.

THE Y WILL continue in '72 to give disadvantaged youth a "taste of success" which they may not have experienced, even though they may be in high school.

"This is done by helping them have a successful experience in small ways at first, leading into sports competition, project work and small leadership roles," the report continued.

A second and significant action taken by the Y Board during the past year, Wehmeyer said, was to make a serious and detailed feasibility study on a building campaign.

"Possible sites were investigated," he said. "Potential building plans and costs were reviewed and a cross section of community leaders were interviewed to determine their interest in a Y building."

The studies led to the conclusion that the best site would be in the township west or south of Plymouth, Wehmeyer said.

Also, he continued, the building should have a full range of athletic facilities, including a pool.

"HOWEVER, OUR interviews in the community indicated that we need more exposure for our program before a large fund raising campaign would be feasible and we should start on a smaller scale," he said.

In light of this, he added, the board will begin a search for an existing modest cost (or no cost) facility which could be utilized for office space and some programs.

"With the Y name prominently displayed and people using the building for Y activities, the board of directors feel that the community soon would be better acquainted with our program and goals," Wehmeyer concluded.

# Judge Davis Reports Court Docket Up To Date

**PLYMOUTH**  
Despite the fact that approximately 10,000 cases annually come into the 35th District Court, Judge Dunbar Davis said this week in a review of his first three years on the bench that "the court is current in its work."

This is in sharp contrast to many courts in the state where judges report a serious backlog of cases, thus often leading to long delays before trials are held.

The District Court system was created by the State Legislature to replace justices of the peace and came into being Jan. 1, 1969. Davis was elected in November 1968 over Thomas Healy as judge of the 35th District, an area which covers Northville, Plymouth and Canton.

His first term expires this year, and this will be one of the posts to be filled in the general election next November. Although Davis has made no formal announcement as yet, he is expected to be a candidate for reelection. This is his statement on the first three years of court activity:

"EACH YEAR in the 35th District Court 10,000 cases are started. Approximately one-half are started in the Plymouth city division of the court, which takes cases that arise in the city and in Canton Township. Filed in the Plymouth Township division of the court are 20 per cent of the cases, and the remaining 30 per cent of the cases are filed in the Northville division.

"Despite this flow of cases, the court is current in its work. Non-jury cases are set for trial two weeks from the date of plea or date of being at issue, unless the parties request a later date and show cause for a delayed date. Jury cases are heard whenever a sufficient number accumulate to warrant calling a jury, approximately bi-monthly.

"Over 500 cases a year are referred to the probation department. The probation department is staffed by 75 volunteer counselors, four part-time probation officers

and two part-time clerks, all working under the supervision of the director of probation, Dennis Diddy.

"The probation department has many functions in addition to that of the volunteers, including pre-sentence reports, the work detail, where the basic idea is to punish without creating a court record, alcoholism treatment, and psychiatric - psychological referral.

"Also, George Hudson, working in conjunction with the probation department, has rendered valuable services in pollution cases and in recommending changes in operations by the C & O Railroad, in order to reduce the length and number of crossing violations by freight trains.

"ONE OF THE most significant changes in the law

affecting District Courts was raising the court's civil jurisdiction to \$10,000, effective Jan. 1, 1972. This should mean a substantial convenience to parties, witnesses and attorneys, and also should lighten the load of our overburdened Circuit Court. It is too soon at this time to estimate how widely this change will be used by the legal profession.

"One of the main thrusts of the 35th District Court has been to encourage youth interest and participation in the court and in our system of justice. With the aid of various teachers, many mock trials, demonstrating the judicial process, have been held in schools of the community. Classes often visit the court to watch trials.

"Advisory juries, composed of high school students, have been used in numerous instances and comparisons are made between their advisory decisions and the decisions made by the judge. On several occasions, court has been held in an improvised courtroom at the Central Junior High School.

"Each year the court appoints as its court officer a high school senior, a young person who plans on making law a career, and who has been recommended by the high school community services department.

"THE 35TH District Court has been fortunate to have the services of a 'live' court reporter to make a stenographic record of all court proceedings. "In setting up the District Court system, the state purchased electronic equipment for recording the proceedings for each District

Court, contemplating the elimination of a regular court reporter, but the equipment without an operator has not proven satisfactory, and the Supreme Court has seriously considered a suit against a manufacturer of the electronic equipment.

"Our court committee, comprised of one representative each from the Cities of Plymouth and Northville, and the Townships of Canton, Plymouth and Northville, wisely insisted that we have an experienced and trained court reporter.

"Drafting the legal documents upon which many of the cases are based, keeping an accurate record of each of the 10,000 annual cases, and being able to locate them on a moment's notice requires a staff of skilled clerks. We are fortunate to have such a staff. The turnover has been extremely low.

"In conclusion, the court has as its motto and seeks to follow the words of Socrates, 'to hear courteously; to answer wisely; to consider soberly; and to decide impartially.'

## OK Twp. Dues For SEMCOG

Plymouth Township's elected trustees have decided to continue their membership in the Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) for at least one more year.

The vote to pay the township's 1972 dues of \$440 was unanimous. At the same time Supervisor Maurice M. Breen was selected SEMCOG delegate, with Trustee Gerald Burke as alternate.

## 100-Plus Seek Job As Superintendent

More than 100 applications for the superintendent's position have been received by the personnel committee of the Plymouth Board of Education.

John Hanskat, board member and chairman of the committee, said the position has been advertised in placement agencies throughout Michigan and in adjacent states and the response has been from a "far-reaching area."

"We have some very, very qualified persons that have applied," Hanskat said. "I'm pleased with what I have seen come in."

THE JOB OF evaluating the applications will begin with a team of placement directors from Michigan universities.

Dr. Evart Ardis, placement director for the University of Michigan, will draw together a team of directors from Eastern Michigan University, Wayne State University, Michigan State University, Central Michigan University and Western Michigan University.

The team will go over the applications and divide them into three categories, those who are currently qualified, those who have the potential to reach what the district wants, and those who do not measure up to what the school district wants for the top post.

On March 20, the team will meet for a dinner with board members to discuss the attributes of the leading candidates.

The team is providing the service to the community at no charge.

AFTER HEARING the team's evaluation, the board members will discuss the applicants and select around 10 candidates who will then be asked to come to the district for interviews.

After the interviews, the board will meet again and narrow down the list. The remaining applicants will then have in-depth interviews.

Hanskat said that he hopes a decision on the new superintendent will be reached sometime in April with a starting date of July 1 to correspond with the new fiscal year.

Acting Supt. John Hoben is among those who have applied for the post.

This center runs JA programs four nights a week

An economic education program to prepare youth for business leadership, Junior Achievement is business oriented and its funds come from private sources, both corporate and individual. JA has operated in the six-county southeastern Michigan area for 22 years and has 27 centers.

# County Board To Reform Self

Sweeping reorganization of its committee structure in order to streamline the legislative process is contemplated by the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

The board's rules committee has approved a proposal by Board Chairman Robert E. FitzPatrick that the present structure of 14 standing committees, two special committees, and 11 subcommittees be reduced to five committees and one subcommittee.

FitzPatrick estimated the new structure would reduce the time taken to consider many items by as much as four weeks.

Of the present structure, only the Ways and Means Committee, which consists of all 26 commissioners, and its special budget subcommittee would be retained. The subcommittee was created to deal with the problem of a potential budget deficit of some \$13-million.

THE WORK NOW handled by the other committees

would be distributed among four new committees—Human Resources, General Government, Public Works, and Public Safety and Judiciary.

A key change would be elimination of the committee-of-the-whole session which is held at each meeting of the full board on the first and third Thursdays of the month. At present, all items from committees other than Ways and Means must go through the committee-of-the-whole before final consideration.

FitzPatrick proposed that the four new committees each have 11 or 12 members and meet on a specified day each week. Present committees vary in size and meet irregularly at the call of their chairmen.

"With each committee meeting on a specified day, commissioners and county department heads will be able to arrange their schedules accordingly," FitzPatrick explained.

UNANIMOUS APPROVAL of the concept at last week's

meeting by the rules committee indicated a good chance of approval by the full board. The rules committee will meet at 10 a.m., March 6, to act on the necessary amendments of the board's rules of procedure, with consideration by the full board anticipated March 16.

In submitting his proposal FitzPatrick stated:

"This Board of Commissioners has, on numerous occasions, discussed the necessity for streamlining and making more effective the operations of various county departments. I believe this streamlining should begin with our own operation and that this revised committee structure is an immediate and positive step in this direction."

THE HUMAN Resources Committee would encompass health, education and welfare, economic opportunity, juvenile affairs, human relations, housing and other matters.

General Government would take in legislation, county

reorganization, personnel activities, rules, equalization, taxation and apportionment and other governmental matters.

Public Works would encompass transportation, industrial and commercial development, planning and sewer, capital improvement, sewer,

water, parks and other public works activities.

Public Safety and Judiciary would combine the present law enforcement and public safety committee and the judiciary committee and also handle other matters pertaining to courts and law enforcement.

## Racing Fans Can See Old-Time Competitors

In its 20th year, the renowned "Sports Cars in Review" at the Henry Ford Museum March 3 through 26 salutes the long and exciting history of auto racing in the U.S. with its theme, "Great American Racing Cars."

One of the most universally enjoyed sports in the world, automobile racing is not as modern as one might think. It has been an important part of the automotive scene almost from the beginning.

and gasoline models in a 50-mile race a year earlier.

The first and second place winners of the famous 1902 Manufacturers Challenge Cup Race are featured in the show also. Barney Oldfield, driving Henry Ford's new "999" in his first automobile race, bested Alexander Winton in his highly respected "Bullet" and thus took the first step in establishing his world-wide racing fame and that of the "999."

As featured cars in the 1972 Sports Cars in Review, these leviathans represent the earliest days of American automobile racing. They stand together with vehicles of every breed and vintage to span every era and type of racing through contemporary and experimental models, including nine premier showings.

Although American sports cars are featured, there are nine countries represented in the show from a variety of manufacturers including some home-crafted ones. They are displayed against the background of the museum's Street of Early American Shops.

Nearby the regular collection of 200 antique,

classic and historic automobiles complements the sports cars which are gathered from all over the country for the review.

A VARIETY of other activities round out the event. Of interest to all sports car enthusiasts is the Sports Car Film Festival presented several times each weekend in the Museum Theater.

It will feature a film of the last race on Daytona Beach in 1956 at which the "999" was a special guest and filmed highlights of the 1971 Indianapolis "500."

Also on weekends, members of the Sports Car Club of America will be on hand in the exhibit area to discuss the cars and answer questions about auto racing as a sport.

The museum will remain open until 10 p.m. Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings for the four weekends of the review. Regular museum hours of 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. will remain in effect Mondays through Thursdays. There is no additional charge for the activities of Sports Cars in Review beyond the regular museum admission of \$2 for adults and \$1 for children six through 14.

As early as 1900, steamers, electrics and gasoline models all competed for victory on American race tracks, spurred by the interest generated by the great 1428 mile Tour of France Race in 1899.

By 1901, not only was money to be made on the tracks — \$10,000 in prizes in the Chicago races alone — but reputations as well.

AMONG THE more than 60 cars in the show are some that made money and reputations for their builders or drivers in these early days. The 1901 Riker Electric Racer is the oldest vehicle in this year's exhibition and a sister of the one that beat both steamers

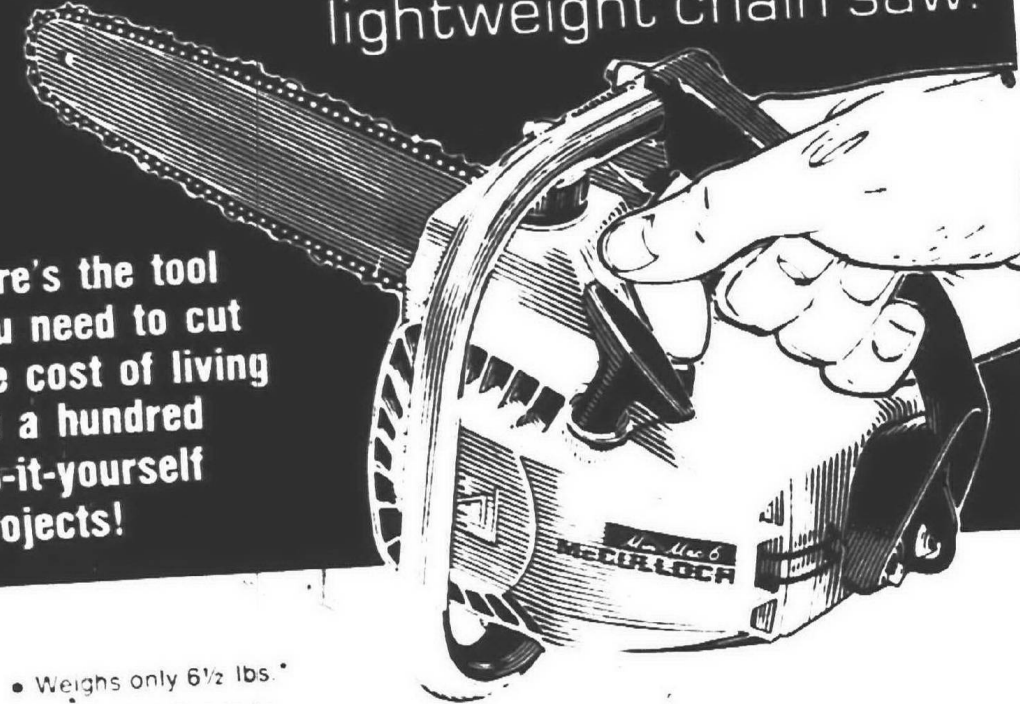

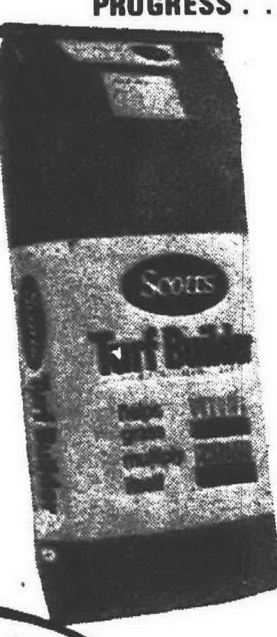

# No One Asks Young Folks Their Opinions

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** Emory Daniels' column, "Daniels Den" usually appears only in the Farmington Enterprise & Observer, but his thoughts on how suburban governments treat young people can apply to almost any town around here.

While rummaging through the files looking for something else, an editorial fell out written two years ago stating that it would require something close to super efforts by the community to curb the growth of drug abuse.

Two years ago the Rap Line program was being operated in North Farmington Baptist Church, and the city, township and schools had not yet joined to sponsor the Farmington Area Advisory Council.

**THE MESSAGE** editorially was that drug abuse was a symptom of a greater problem which required community attention. That greater problem was what was and should be available to occupy the leisure time of youth.

The challenge given then was that the community needed to have guts enough to ask youth what recreation facilities are desired and then seek means of providing them.

In my opinion, that challenge remains unmet. The FAAC has been organized and is doing great things but the larger issue of recreation for youth is unresolved.

Jack Mingo recently talked about that unfilled gap in a Dissent column on the editorial page of this newspaper. Mingo quite

distinctly expressed why kids might turn to drugs. Yet, there has been little response from the community.

**THE FACT** there has been little response does not mean the community is callous or cannot recognize the need.

Like other problems, this one will require expenditures of money and planning which go beyond the traditional government agencies.

The planning must involve youth as advisors, and governments rarely listen to youth. The idea of youth advisors turns off politicians because it is generally assumed only adults know how to best spend money, even if the money is to be spent on youth.

There have been steps taken to improve recreation in the Farmington area. One is the proposed Waldron Park in Farmington Township. This is a great thing and long overdue, but the excited township must remember that the park will be limited in providing recreation for teens.

The Farmington Area YMCA is constructing a center which could be used by teens, but the majority of YMCA participants are early-teens and under.

The Community Center continues to expand its programs, but the Center is not intended to meet the recreation needs of youth and its offerings are understandably limited.

The drop-in centers organized this past summer were an important beginning but only a beginning toward teen programs. The proposed employment service is commendable but answers only a part of the problem.

**TO ARGUE** that all these programs combined adequately meets the challenge is a poor argument. Seldom is a smattering of programs equal to A Program.

There are immediate challenges facing the community in the near future, such as the millage election in April and incorporation vote in May.

In June, schools will be letting out for the summer, and high schoolers will be looking for jobs and things to do. Maybe one thing to do would be serve on a community-wide Youth Task Force on Recreation to examine what type of programs would be best suited.

Let the kids detail what is needed and then the politicians can find the money. But keep first things first because maybe much money will be unnecessary.

Well, back to the files. The story looked for was about a heroin user. Wonder if he's in jail now? Maybe he could serve on a committee to ...



My learned research staff has just reported on the term "baker's dozen."



# Livonia GOP Looks Over Esch

Livonia Republicans, who tend to be on the conservative side, took a hard look last week at Congressman Marvin Esch, who tends to be on the liberal side, and generally thought he was all right.

Esch (R-Ann Arbor) is likely to see his 2nd Congressional District extended eastward to Livonia, and he has been cultivating the marginally Democratic city of 110,000.

His district man, Richard Raison, has been making many Livonia contacts in recent weeks, and Esch was guest speaker when the 19th District-Wayne Republicans held their annual Lincoln Day banquet in Vladimir's.

DINNER CHAIRMAN Arthur Hogarth introduced Esch as the area's new congressman, even though the Legislature has yet to act on congressional redistricting. Hogarth is not alone in that

assumption; Livonia's Democratic State Rep. Marvin Stempien also expects to be in Esch's district and is casting eyes on that office in Washington.

While the Wayne County portion of the 19th Congressional District includes Northville and Redford Township, most of the 60 persons who attended the banquet were Livonians. Even the incumbent congressman, Jack McDonald, didn't show up; he has moved to Farmington and expects to be in an Oakland County district for the '72 election.

Redfordites expect to be in the 17th District (with northwest Detroit) and didn't bother with the 19th-Wayne banquet.

ESCH IS A former college professor with a PhD in speech and education, and so academically he's a little out of place in a Livonia Republican gathering heavily laced with salesmen and realtors.

Moreover, Esch ranks in the lower 40s on the ACA conservatism index (Sen. Philip Hart ranks 0, Barry Goldwater 98 to 100), and Esch frankly admitted he was a Rockefeller man until Richard Nixon was nominated for president.

Yet Esch had praise for President Nixon's peace-making efforts, and that went over well with the assembly.

AFTERWARDS, Esch was NAGGED over his position on bussing to achieve school integration — specifically, his refusal to sign a discharge petition to get an anti-bussing constitutional amendment out of the House Judiciary Committee. Asked his reasons, Esch told Observer Newspapers:

said in this newspaper's interview. Whatever he told members of the anti-bussing NAG group failed to please them, and afterwards at the bar, there was some muttering that fellows like Esch and Gov. William Milliken weren't really good Republicans — at least not good NAG Republicans.

IN HIS SPEECH, Esch said he now respects President Nixon as the only man who "has made a significant difference."

"The last three years have been characterized not by promises or a panacea, but by performance," Esch said.

He cited the President's trip to Peking, progress in the SALT talks, negotiations in the Middle East, and withdrawal from Vietnam as steps taken by Nixon "to move our nation and the world toward peace."

"And domestically we must give recognition that there is a shift in our national priorities. For the first time in this year's budget we are allocating more for human resources than for military expenditures," he said.

His criticism of the Democrats, "the old coalition," rested well with the listeners who kept referring to Esch as "our" congressman.

# Stadium Finance Plan Revised On Acreage

Plans designed to speed construction of the domed stadium on Detroit's riverfront have passed a key test with preliminary approval by the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

The commissioners, meeting as the Ways and Means Committee last week, approved the revised stadium financing plan by a vote of 17 to 2, with five abstentions.

The new plan calls for purchase of the stadium site and surrounding acreage by the Wayne County Stadium Authority. This will permit early sale of \$126 million in revenue bonds to take advantage of current low interest rates.

**UNDER THE NEW** plan, the Stadium Authority will use \$12 million of the \$126 million to purchase most of 72 acres of land west of Cobo Hall, including the 37-acre stadium site.

The authority will ask the City of Detroit to spend \$3 million from revenue bonds floated for Civic Center improvement to buy property which will complete assembly of the 72 acres, now owned by two railroads.

Originally, Detroit Renaissance, Inc., a group of business leaders formed to help bring about redevelopment of the central city, was to find a private developer who would purchase the

acreage. Through a series of trades, the stadium site would have been donated, with the surrounding land developed by private interests.

The stadium authority still hopes that the Renaissance group will help find developers and investors who will buy the land surrounding the stadium and develop it.

**PURCHASE OF** the land without increasing the stadium cost will be accomplished by reducing the authority's annual reserve fund from a projected \$1,757,000 to \$1,480,000.

Sale of the bonds at 6.5 per cent interest instead of the 7.5 per cent interest rate originally anticipated would result in an initial savings of \$4 million and a total savings of more than \$40 million over the entire life of the bond issue, the authority reported.

"It must be strongly emphasized that our committee feels that no tax money will be needed out of the county general fund," declared Commissioner Thomas P. O'Rourke, of Detroit. He is chairman of the board's stadium committee which recommended approval of the revised plan.

His committee also recommended board acceptance of the user's agreement with the Detroit Tigers Baseball Club. The agreement is accepted automatically unless the commissioners formally reject it at their next meeting, scheduled for 2 p.m. Thursday, March 2.

Estimated annual income from the contract is estimated at \$2,844,000, compared with \$3,027,000 at Philadelphia.

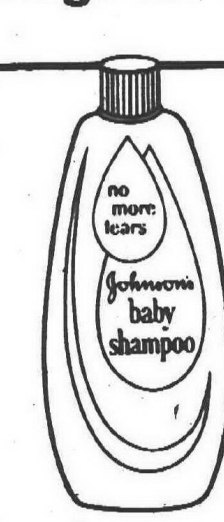

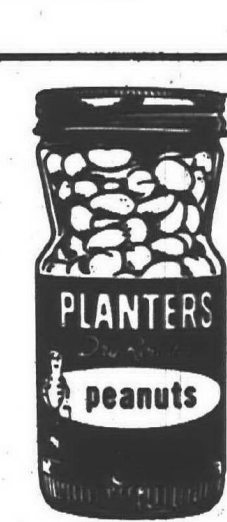

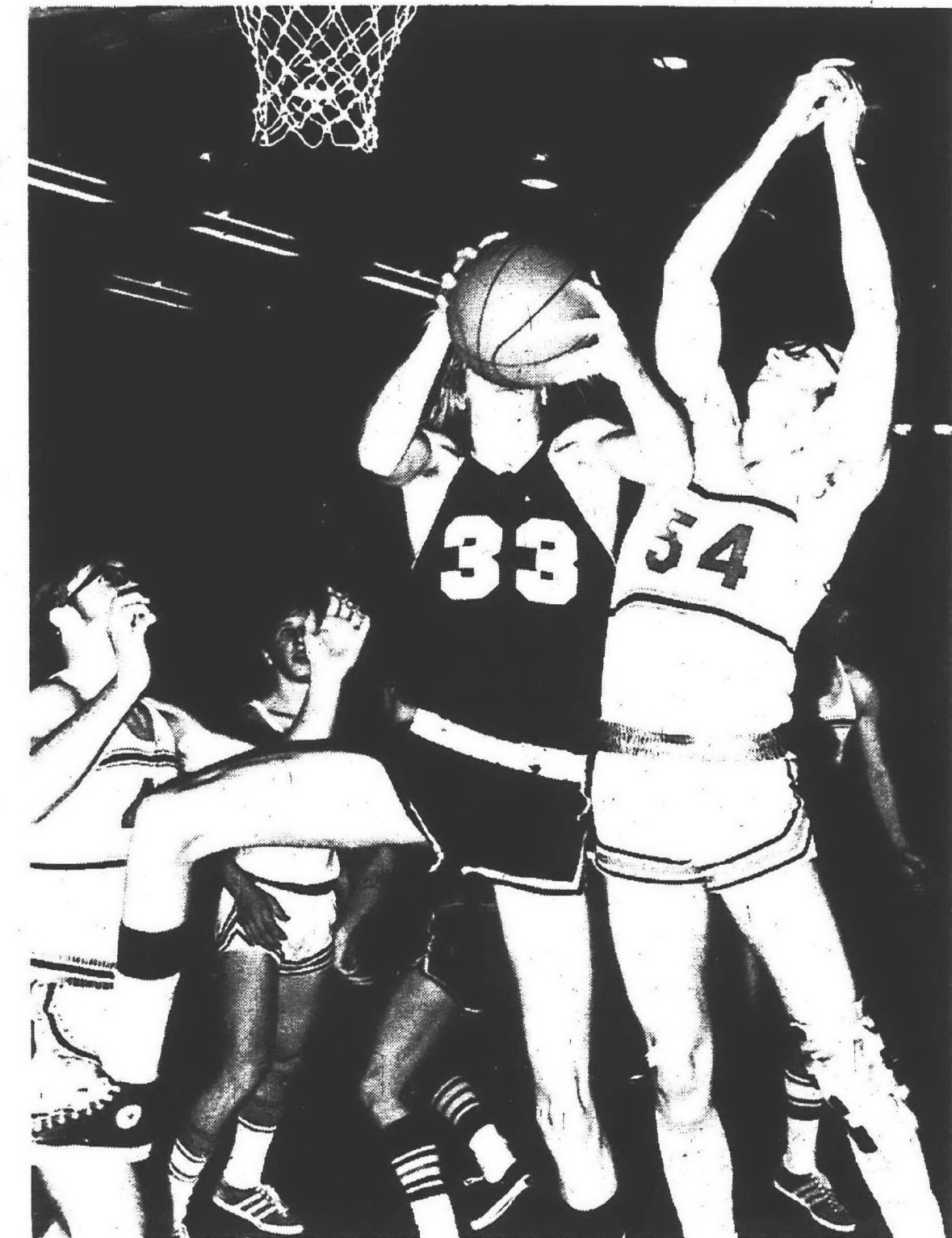

# Fans Won't Forget 'Bandanna Kid'

The death of Paul (Dizzy) Trout, who succumbed to stomach cancer on Monday, stirred the memories of the old-timers who recall him, not as one of the pitching greats but as the last of the colorful "hillbillies" who dominated the game before the collegians took over.

He came on the baseball stage just as the era of the Dean boys—Dizzy and Daffy—was ending and he more than made good as a replacement.

Few will ever forget his appearance at the Tiger training camp at Lakeland, Florida, in the spring of 1927 when the Tigers were considered a real puzzle.

Mickey Cochrane, the fiery manager, was attempting a comeback after being "beaten" in Yankee Stadium the previous summer and

there were some questions regarding his ability to carry on.

There was an air of dead seriousness in the hotel lobby when Trout, the big, rawboned rookie from Sandcut, Indiana, walked over to the Tiger boss and unhesitatingly remarked:

"You won't have to worry any more, Mike, I'm here, rarin' to go, and your troubles are ended."

Black Mike just glared at him.

THAT FIRST afternoon Trout walked up the main street in Lakeland, spotted a few old-timers pitching horseshoes, and walked over to watch them.

Grabbing four "shoes" he let go with all four and they all circled the spike for ringers.

The old-timers stood aghast as Trout brushed his hands and said,

"If you fellahs want any lessons on how to toss those Dobbins slippers, just come to see me. I'm at the hotel down the street."

Next day at the ball park Cochrane lost little time in trying to see how much pitching ability Trout had.

Asking him to "throw a few" in a warmup, Trout started to throw pitches that cracked when they hit Cochrane's glove.

"Have you got a change-up?" Cochrane asked, and Trout nodded.

In came the next pitch so hard and fast that it popped out of Cochrane's glove.

"I asked for a change-up, Cochrane hollered.

"That's my change-up," the rookie answered, "fast, then faster."

From that moment on he started to pester Cochrane for a chance to pitch. Finally he

was assigned to pitch against the Brooklyn Dodgers in an exhibition game. First thing he did was to start seeking bets that he wouldn't allow a hit.

He even bet Cochrane a necktie.

"Wait till they see my 'red bandanna' pitch," Dizzy chuckled.

And what a day he had. He didn't allow the Dodgers a hit through his three inning stint. He did the same against the Red Sox and the Washington Senators and soon became the talk of the southern camps.

But he met his "Waterloo" against the St. Louis Cardinals at Daytona Beach on Easter Sunday before an overflow crowd.

"I'll give them the old bandanna," he said, explaining that he's waving a red handkerchief at them just

as a bull fighter tosses a cape at an oncoming bull.

"When they see that old bandanna, they'll get mad—and then I'll get 'em."

Well, as we walked into the park that afternoon, and he passed the Cardinals bench, he looked at the legendary Frankie Frisch and Ducky Medwick and asked, "How do you hillbillies feel with shoes on?"

That was enough.

WHEN HE WENT to the mound to replace Schoolboy Rowe in the fourth inning, Medwick went to the first base line. Ducky could throw his voice. And with Dizzy's every pitch, he'd holler, as if coming from the stands, "Is that the best you've got?"

The trick finally worked. Dizzy lost his control. He walked six men in a row before being removed. But on his way from the mound he

raced for the Cardinal dugout and only an ankle tackle from behind by Billy Rogell prevented what might have been a free-for-all.

Shortly thereafter, Cochrane sent him to Toledo "to learn to be a gentleman."

When he returned in September he said, "No more Diz, my name's Paul."

He came from there to become a Tiger star and his 20 victories in 1945 helped the Tigers win the pennant.

And he was the hero in one of the wildest games ever played in Tiger Stadium. It was the famous night game against the Yankees when it seemed every hit on either side was a home run and "Diz" finally won his own game with a bases loaded homer.

Yes, he's gone. But his memory will linger on. There may never be another like him with the Tigers.



LANSING Michigan's Natural Resources Commission has announced it will adopt rules, including a watercraft permit system, at its March 9-10 meeting in a move to safeguard environmental values and calm use conflicts on heavily-pressured sections of northern Michigan's Au Sable, Manistee, Pine, and Pere Marquette rivers.

The commission gave that assurance as it withheld action on the Department of Natural Resources' final set of proposed river-use rules for problem stretches of the four streams.

Commission Chairman Harry H. Whiteley, of Rogers City, explained the DNR's policy-making board was postponing its decision until next month's meeting to provide time for incorporating final changes in the package of river regulations.

On the question of setting reasonable volumes of canoe traffic, final details of the river rules will also take a bearing from last-minute recommendations to come out of a special Au Sable River use study conducted by the University of Michigan.

Following approval by the commission at next month's meeting in Lansing, the rules must pass through several other administrative checkpoints before they can take effect.

First of all, they must be filed with the Legislative Service Bureau and Attorney General's office for review. After gaining clearance at those two points, the final draft of rules must then go to a joint legislative committee on administrative rules which, upon receiving the measures, will have 60 days to approve, reject, or take no action on them.

DNR officials are hoping the rules will be able to pass all of these points of review in time to take effect on parts of the four streams on April 29, opener of Michigan's general trout season.

The DNR's basic plan calls for establishing a permit system covering certain stretches of the four heavily-used streams on weekends and Memorial Day from the last Saturday of April (April 29) through June 30.

It also spelled out that permits should be issued on an hourly basis so that no more than 30 canoes could be launched each hour on problem sections of the Au Sable, Manistee, Pine, and Pere Marquette rivers.

The DNR's deferred set of rules also recommended that use of watercraft come under a 7 a.m.-6 p.m. time restriction on specified sections of those streams from the last Saturday of April through Labor Day.

These and other proposed controls underscore, in the DNR's judgment, the need to safeguard stream values and to restore quality recreation by reducing traffic loads when and where heavy use has created the most serious problems.

SPOKESMEN for several groups urged the commission to set up a system for issuing canoe permits on a daily basis rather than under an hourly schedule, as previously proposed by the DNR.

Favoring that change were representatives of the Sierra Club's Mackinac Chapter, the Environmental Law Society at the U. of M., and Trout Unlimited. They pointed out that a daily system for permits would work just as effectively as an hourly program in protecting environmental values of the streams.

Spokesmen for the three groups also noted that the daily system would avoid considerable confusion among canoeists and leave the DNR with a much lighter administrative load than would be the case under an hour-by-hour scheduling of permits.

Several spoke in favor of having the permit system in force from the start of the trout season through Labor Day or the end of September, rather than having it lifted at the close of June as the DNR previously recommended.

Citing preservation of the rivers' resources as the first and foremost consideration of any such rules, they voiced the need for extending the protective permit controls to cover the streams' entire season of substantial use.

## New Lettuce Available To Home Gardeners

This year, for the first time, there is plenty of seed available of a new lettuce, so new it was released for seed production just two years ago.

Named Ithaca, for the home of Cornell University, this lettuce was developed by Prof. Peter L. Minotti and Prof. Emeritus George J. Raleigh, both of the Department of Vegetable Crops, New York State College of Agriculture, a part of the university.

Ithaca is intended to be used for commercial lettuce production and it already has proven outstanding in field

performances in New Jersey, so that demand for seed is particularly high from that state.

But it also is excellent for the home gardener who wants early lettuce that will transplant perfectly in cold, less than perfect spring weather.

Ithaca was bred for spring planting on well-drained mineral soils. It matures early; has a firm, bright green, attractive head with shiny green leaves.

Heads in a planting mature at the same time, a characteristic vital for harvesting for

commercial use but neither necessary or particularly desirable in the home garden.

THUS IT would seem sensible for the home gardener to make several small, successive sowings of Ithaca in a cold frame or seed bed, transplanting the seedlings to the garden as they become large enough.

This would insure a supply of high quality early lettuce and also the best performance from this variety, which needs to be transplanted to mature satisfactorily. But this is its only foible, one that is not too hard to cater to.

Ithaca has two characteristics that will particularly endear the variety to the home gardener: it resists upburn—that browning and drying of the margins of the tender leaves—and it is slow to go to seed after heads have formed.

**The Green Thumb**

**Window sill tomatoes:** Move our sun porch right now we have tomatoes the size of an oxheart cherry, ready to eat. These tomatoes can be grown in a pot regardless of how much space you have in your home or apartment.

Try growing Small Fry, a bright red fruited tomato, one inch in diameter. This hybrid bears enormous numbers of round, red fruit, with a mild flavor. Vines grow about three feet high, so must be staked if you grow them indoors.

Small Fry is resistant to both verticillium and fusarium wilts. Patio is another small fruited tomato for indoor culture. Also you might want to try Sugar Lump, a good cherry tomato.

**WATCH THE lawn mower:** Pretty soon you'll be getting the lawnmower out. Keep in mind that lawnmowers have ruined many trees. Mower wheels scrape off bark and expose the tree to infestation and disease, not to mention rot. This weakens the tree and may cause fungi infection to set in. A small circular area of gravel, ground cover, or mulch (or fence) will avoid lawnmower damage.

**PIGNUT hickory:** Pignut is a common name for a confused group of hickories known as *Carya glabra* and *C. ovalis*. Some types are stringy, others have nuts that are sweet.

If the nuts of your trees are sweet you can use them for food, as they are not toxic as many think. Most of the pignut hickories we've tasted are quite sweet. Tree trunks are rough and not shaggy as in the shagbark hickory.

Other hickory nut trees include the pecan (nuts do not mature in north due to short, cool seasons); the mockernut (*C. Alba*) and the bitternut (not the butternut), good for timber and ornament, though nuts are not edible.

Most hickory trees are hard to transplant because of their long tap roots, and the shagbark needs particular care in transplanting.

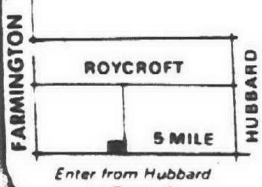

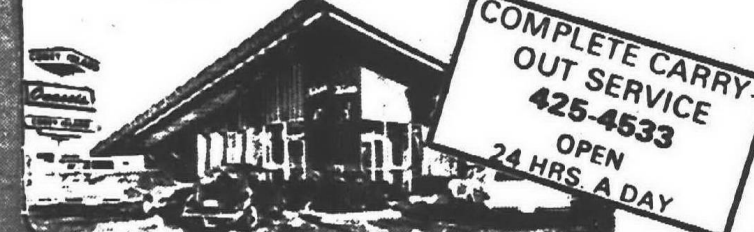

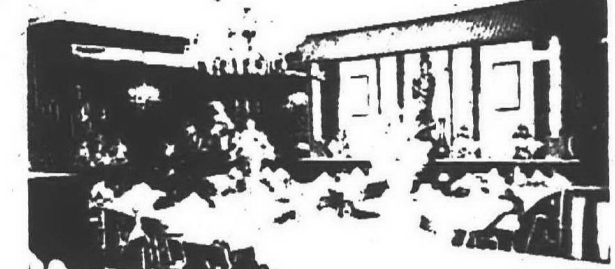

Soprano Carolyn Grimes will be featured artist Sunday, March 5, when the Plymouth Symphony presents its fourth concert of the season.

The concert will begin at 4 p.m. in Plymouth High School auditorium, Joy Road west of Canton Center Road. Tickets are available on Sunday or at Melody House, 770 Penniman. Wayne Dunlap will direct the 95-member orchestra.

Miss Grimes, who has been a soloist with the Kenneth Jewell Chorale since its beginning, has had leading roles in operas with Wayne State University, Overture to Opera and the Piccolo Opera Company.

When the cantata "Laudate Pueri" was presented in Cranbrook recently, she was the featured soloist.

The performance will include only the opening movement (allegro molto), the slow third movement (adagio non troppo) and the closing rondo (allegro).

**GUSTAV MAHLER'S** Symphony No. 4 in G major will comprise the second half of the program. Miss Grimes will be heard in the fourth movement, which includes a solo for soprano voice set to a text taken from a collection of German folk-poetry called "Des Knaben Wunderhorn" (The Wonderhorn of Youth).

The poem, which on the surface seems a bit absurd, does manage to point out what has been called "an amusing and tender picture of the musical and culinary pleasures to be found in Heaven."

Although less tragic and less introspective than his other symphonies, the fourth is still rooted to Mahler's love of nature. The opening movement is laid out in a clearly defined sonata-allegro plan, and as Mahler himself said, "it is built up with the greatest, well-nigh academic, regularity."

The second movement is indicated "scherzo" and resembles the dance movements in the two symphonies preceding the fourth. This movement was supposedly inspired by the Viennese artist's painting of the "Dance of Death."

This is followed by the tranquility and peace of the adagio, one of Mahler's most lyrical works.

Miss Grimes graduated from Cornell College, Mt. Vernon, Iowa, and studied in New York City. In Detroit she has studied with Avery Crew and now teaches voice herself. She has collaborated with composers Paul Paray, Roberto Gerhard, Clark Eastham and Harold Laudenslager in demonstrating their compositions in concert.

# Whatever Happened To 'Ritin' And The Copybook Of Old?

On the road to higher education, a horrible thing has happened to one of the three "Rs" that form the foundation of all book learning.

The three "Rs" — readin', 'ritin' and 'rithmatic — used to be the first things a child encountered when starting school, and the mastery of them marked advancement along the way.

Readin' has advanced through the years, and there are very few high schools in the land — or even colleges and universities — that do not stress reading from the simplest form up through the classics.

And 'rithmatic has moved along from simple adding, subtracting and multiplying of grade school days to the combined work of mathematicians and scientists that made possible the landing of a man — and machine — on the moon.

MEANWHILE, 'ritin' has been pushed aside — yes, even ignored — with the result that penmanship of the average person today would qualify him or her to write prescriptions for doctors, who, as a class, have long been noted as the world's worst scribblers.

Gone are the days when a person prided himself on attractive penmanship. Take a look at the Declaration of Independence and you'll note the signature of John Hancock that still stands as a model. It was written almost 200 years ago.

What has brought about the change?

Whatever became of the old time "copy" book that provided a sample line of the finest Spencerian letters atop each page that had to be copied by the students?

WELL, SCHOOL officials will tell you that three things have helped bring about the change.

First was the switch from making slanting ovals to the block system for beginners.

Second was the decision made some years ago to end the grading of penmanship on report cards when the students finished the fifth grade.

Third, was the trend to typing that has now reached the point where most schools ask that reports be typed instead of being written in longhand.

Other things — such as the

stereotype, which eliminates the taking of shorthand, and the tape recorder — make the jotting down of notes unnecessary.

As a result, it has been pointed out, few students are encouraged to concentrate on penmanship and there is a steady decline in the art of handwriting after the eighth grade.

IT HAS BEEN pointed out by school officials that the world is going at such a fast pace that in our haste to take notes, we have become scribblers of the top rank. They claim the average person doesn't take time to write more than a word or two to guide himself in writing a report.

Years ago this was always referred to as "newspaper shorthand," on the pretext that newspaper reporters didn't have time to write down lengthy notes. They preferred to "scribble" a word or two — just as a guide.

Even this style has been tossed aside in most instances today as newsmen equip themselves with tape recorders that enabled them to hear the actual voice of their subject when it comes time to write.

Another interesting theory is the switch from spiraling ovals to block letters for the beginners.

Today's first grade students are given "copy" books — just as of old. But instead of the Spencerian lettering and the pursuit of the "Palmer" method, the pages are lined both horizontally and vertically. Lines are even spaced in the design of blocks so that the beginner can draw letters.

AS HE ADVANCES, the lines are more compact and the student draws smaller letters. Some add little twirls at the corners and add other little curves to attract attention.

In these cases, the teachers observe traits of originality and move the student along with the notation, "ready to pursue handwriting."

From then on, more stress is placed on composition than handwriting. As a result, the child improved by slow stages through the fifth grade.

From there on, when his

ability — or lack of it — is no longer shown on his report card, there is a tendency to cast aside a desire to improve penmanship.

This is the first step toward making us a nation of "doodlers." Just watch any group around a table — even at meal time — and you'll see them "doodling."

There are few John Hancocks among us anymore.

This is too bad — because the hardy stock from which we came was raised on the three "Rs."

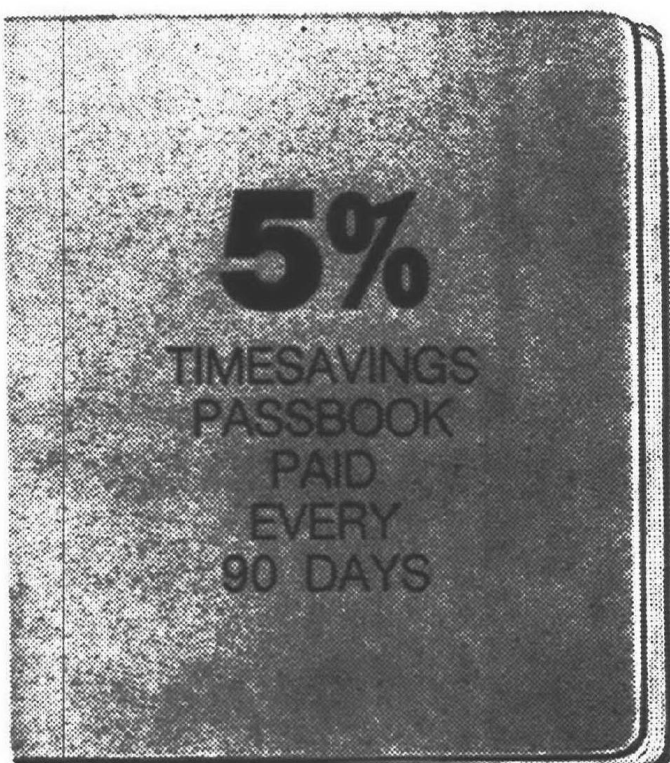

# Shakers Knew How To Cook

High above the palisades of the Kentucky River in the fertile Blue Grass country lies the small, 19th century Shaker community of Pleasant Hill. The village began in 1805, when three Mercer County farmers accepted the Shaker faith with its demands of celibate purity, confession of sins, separation from the world, and community of goods. By 1820 the village of nearly 500 industrious inhabitants had achieved a prosperous and self-contained existence.

The Shakers were a practical and advanced people in the agricultural and mechanical arts. Their brooms, preserves, garden seeds and herbs made the name Shaker a hallmark of excellence in the market places of the midwest and south. The Shaker venture officially ended in 1910.

When we visited there a couple of springs ago with the Plymouth Antique Club, we lodged in the East Family Dwelling House built in 1817. We marveled at the simple dignity of the buildings and furnishings. Meals were served in the old Trustees Building, and we are still marveling at the wonderful Shaker food.

From the Shaker "Manifesto," the order's monthly newsletter, came this advice on preparing salads: "To make a good salad, four persons are wanted; a spendthrift to furnish the oil, a miser to measure the vinegar, a councilor to dole out the salt and spice, and a madman to toss it!"

## SHAKER EARLY SPRING SALAD

- 4 c. dandelion leaves, cut 4 slices bacon
- 1/2 c. vinegar
- 2 T. sugar
- 1/4 c. water
- 1 t. salt
- 1/4 t. pepper
- 1 T. onion, chopped
- 4 hard-cooked eggs

Gather the first dandelion leaves before the plant blooms and cut in two-inch lengths. Fry the bacon crisp. Remove from pan, reserving the fat. To the bacon fat add vinegar, sugar, water, salt and pepper and stir until well blended. Cool and toss dressing through greens and onion. Heap salad in a mound and garnish with strips of bacon and slices of eggs.

## MOTHER ANN'S BIRTHDAY CAKE

- 1 c. butter
- 2 c. sugar
- 3 c. flour, sifted
- 1/2 c. cornstarch
- 3 t. baking powder
- 2 t. vanilla
- 1 c. milk
- 12 egg whites, beaten
- 1 t. salt


Cream butter and sugar. Sift together flour, cornstarch and baking powder. Add flour mixture alternately with milk to butter mixture. Beat after each addition, about 200 strokes in all. Add vanilla and lightly fold in the beaten egg whites to which the salt has been added. When cool fill between layers with peach jam or jelly and frost with any delicate icing.

Ann Lee, who fled from Manchester, England to the colonies with seven of her followers in 1774, was the founder of the Shakers. Mother Ann's birthday fell on Feb. 29 but was celebrated on March 1st. The original recipe for her birthday cake adds: "Cut a handful of peach twigs which are filled with sap at this season of the year. Clip the ends and bruise them and beat the cake batter with them. This will impart a delicate peach flavor to the cake."

## CORNED BEEF AND CABBAGE

- 4 lb. corned beef
- 6 potatoes
- 6 turnips
- 6 carrots
- 6 onions

1 small cabbage, cut in 6 parts  
Soak choice brisket of corned beef in cold water for an hour. Drain and cover with fresh cold water and bring to a boil. Skim well. Let simmer gently for four hours. Thirty minutes before meat is done, boil, in a separate pot the potatoes, turnips, carrots, and onions, lightly salted. In another pot, cook the cut cabbage 15 minutes. Lift the brisket onto a large, well-heated platter and surround with the cooked vegetables. Serve with fresh horseradish or mustard.

## OBSERVATION POINT

# Regional Thinking Makes Sense In Suburban Life

Consider an average family living here in the suburbs.

Their house is in a subdivision in Livonia.

The kids go to a school in the city of Westland, but part of the Livonia school district. After school, they buy Cokes from a drug store in Westland, and that city's solid waste disposal system takes care of the empty bottle.

The husband works in Southfield, where his company pays personal property and real estate taxes to the City of Southfield. Because there is no area wide mass transit system, he drives to and from work in the family car, on roads controlled and financed variously by Wayne and Oakland Counties and by the State Highway Department.

His wife's parents live in Plymouth, and when she goes shopping she'll do so at one of the Livonia shopping centers or in downtown Plymouth when she visits her folks. While she drives through Plymouth Township, she keeps her eye out for the Wayne County Sheriff patrol, which handles traffic and police work in the township.

When the family comes home

at night for dinner, the water for coffee comes from the Detroit metropolitan water system.

When the family goes out with the kids, they go to the Detroit Institute of Arts or to the Detroit Zoo, which are controlled and supported by the City of Detroit. Admission fees do not cover the cost to the city of their visit.

### SOUND FAMILIAR?

It is.

We may live in Plymouth or Livonia or Southfield. But in so many of our daily activities we are interconnected by a bewildering maze of government units and services into the entire metropolitan area.

That's the real point behind the argument that "regionalism is an idea whose time has arrived," presented by Metropolitan Fund president Kent Mathewson last week at the annual meeting.

Mathewson, whose organization is the key supporter for the Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG), has been making this point for some time. He's also become aware

that pure regionalism doesn't make much sense: "The type of regional system which separates the regional functions from the purely local, which strengthens local government by allowing local officials to spend 100 per cent of their time on those matters purely local in nature."

The problem, of course, is to sort out which functions are local and which regional. Then it's a problem of getting the politicians to go along with regional programs.

IN RECENT weeks, we have seen some developments which bear directly on Mathewson's ideas for regionalism.

In Lansing, the House finally has passed legislation for a metropolitan area mass transit system, which is clearly regional in scope. The challenge to the local property tax as a base for school financing has led to ideas about state or area wide school taxes. Belle Isle, down in the Detroit River, will be transferred to the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority, which has worked

effectively to build regional recreation facilities.

Much of the push behind these moves to regionalism is coming through SEMCOG, which has had a hard time lately.

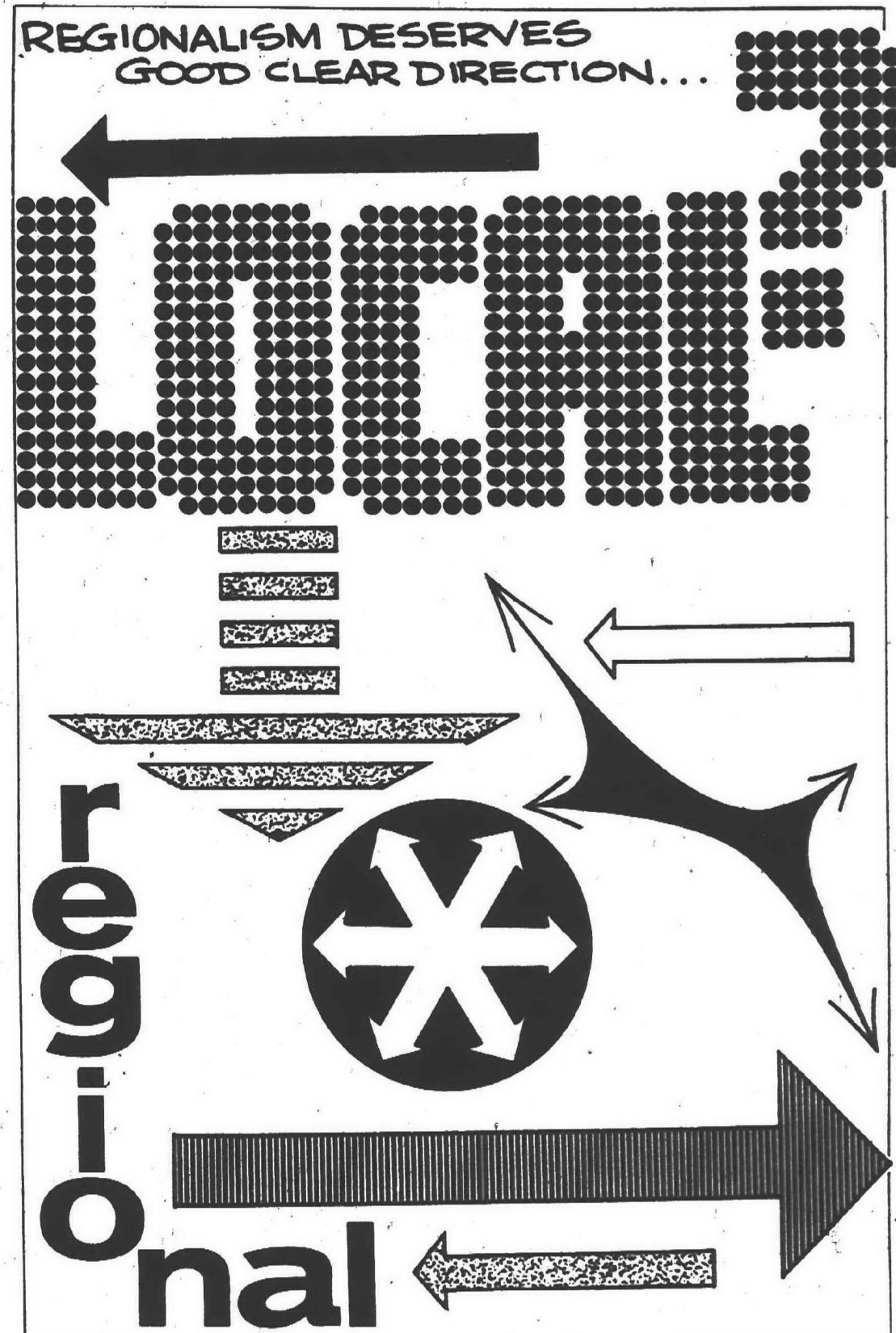
School systems in Livonia, Plymouth and Farmington, have recently quit. And although Schoolcraft, Oakland and Wayne County Community Colleges are still hanging in, it's no secret that school people are sore at what they consider to be SEMCOG's failure to perform.

Further, when school budgets are tight, it's an easy item to cut.

My own feeling is that the schools and SEMCOG never really figured out how best to use each other's talents. In fact, it may be that schools have so many of their own service organizations that SEMCOG never could do the kind of job some hoped it would.

But it has acted as a very useful catalyst for developing regional thinking over the past four or five years. And as the mass transit package proved so clearly, regionalism is coming.

The only question is how and where it comes.



## Why Property Tax Just Can't Be Worked Well

The simple principle establishing property taxes in some long-last century has little if any legitimate basis for a continued existence.

The Observer and other journals have editorially argued for the abolition of property taxes — or at least a substantial reliance of it — for public school support.

A good argument can be made for reducing or eliminating the property tax for other governmental services for the same reasons — it is unfair, unjust, forces low-income and middle income families to pay more than their share of the taxes and is generally something that should be dropped.

But only a few persons are willing to discuss the other valid reasons for dropping the property tax as a means for supporting governmental services — the basic administration of the tax.

One of the most serious problems in the administration of local property taxes is the sheer lunacy which leads to the final tax bill business men and residents get twice a year from city hall.

The state constitution requires that property be assessed for tax purposes on a uniform basis. It also requires that property be assessed up to a maximum of 50 per cent of market value for tax purposes.

IN SIMPLE terms, this should mean that a man owning a \$20,000 home (to keep the figuring easy) in Detroit, Plymouth, and Timbucktoo, Mich., should have as closely as possible the same property assessment — that is \$10,000, which represents 50 per cent of true market value.

But it never works that way. The Wayne County bureau of taxation — which has a lot to say about the eventual tax bill in Detroit and its suburbs — has a different method of determining the market value.

IT LISTS all of the sales of homes in a specific town and matches the sales price with the local assessment listed down at city hall.

In the current housing inflation, the county finds that the local assessment is far under the 50 per cent of market value level and applies an equalization factor to bring the assessment up to 50 per cent.

But there are a few inherent problems in the system used by the county — which has been told about it but still refuses to do anything about it.

FIRST OF all, suburbs with a quick turnover of homes are more apt to have a longer list of home sales than cities within 100 miles which have little movement in the housing market. And that slow movement tends to keep prices — and thus assessments — considerably lower than in other cities with a faster changing housing market.

In addition, the sales price listed in the county records downtown includes more than just the lot and home. In many cases, it includes carpeting, appliances in the kitchen, and a portable swimming pool the seller didn't want to take with him.

THESE little extras can add up to five per cent to the basic price of the house and is reflected in the county's figuring local equalization factors.

And this doesn't even take into account the realtor's commission and mortgage "points," which the seller has to pay but obviously is included in the selling price of the house.

Another problem is that assessments for land itself bounce around like a ping pong ball in a national tournament.

IF A home or business is already assessed at about 50 per cent of market value, the application of the state equalization factor will boost the equalized value of that land and building beyond the constitutional maximum of 50 per cent of market value.

There is a good possibility that the pure administration of local assessments compounded by the state equalization factor could lead to a homeowner being assessed for tax purposes at 100 per cent of market value.

This could happen if a family moves into a new \$30,000 home, watches city hall set an assessment at \$15,000 (which is 50 per cent of market value) and have the state equalization factor of 2.0 boost the equalized valuation back up to \$30,000 — or 100 per cent of market value. Fascinating, isn't it?

## Safety First At Tournaments

State basketball tournament time is with us again...the zaniest, wildest period of the entire schoolboy winter sports, one that requires some cool heads to keep the situation in control at all tourney sites.

Observerland, which includes the seven communities covered by the Observer Newspapers, has been awarded four district meets and it would be a sad state of affairs if there would be unforeseen incidents.

Why bring this up after the teams have played all season with no reported incidents?

The principal reason is that there have been incidents not reported that could have resulted in serious trouble. The reason they were not reported was that cooler heads intervened immediately and the hot heads were rushed into the locker rooms before they actually began throwing fists.

TOURNAMENT TIME is always a big headache to the tourney directors, usually the athletic boss of the sponsoring high school.

Knowing their team is starting its bid for the much coveted state championship, team followers who haven't bothered to

attend many games during the regular season suddenly get the urge with the result that seating capacity is overtaxed, and in some instances the doors are closed to hundreds of latecomers.

This leaves the tournament director with two alternatives: (1) close the gates when the seats are taken and not allow any standees or (2) allow admissions until the floor is completely ringed with wild-eyed spectators.

In the first instance, there is a good chance that those shut out will begin hammering on the doors and cause a ruckus that only police officers can handle.

In the second case, tourney officials can be sure of trouble — and big trouble — from those gathered along the sides of the court. If the game is close, the supporters of the losers are almost certain to claim they were "robbed" if it is a runaway, then backers of the losing team take their disappointment out on any one that happens to be close by.

AGAIN THE QUESTION, "Why do we think this way?" We must point to experiences of the past few years, experiences that have been detrimental to high school sports of all types.

We point to the fact that a

near riot broke out last year in Crisler Fieldhouse at the University of Michigan after the class A final where Flint Northern upset Pontiac Central.

So what did the Michigan High School Athletic Association do to try and prevent such happenings this year? It has ordered the A championship to be played on a Saturday afternoon at Michigan State University. The state board shifted the finals schedule so that the two big games in B and A will be played in the morning and afternoon with C and D in the evening.

The reasoning is that it can better control the conduct of crowds in daylight than at night when incidents can break out in the parking lots.

ONE CAN BE assured that each of the district managers in the four Observerland tournaments will have adequate police protection if he is able to convince city officials that such protection is needed.

But here again, there is a question of the money to pay special police and those members of the regular staff who are on an overtime basis.

It is our understanding that some of the cities involved are demanding that the tournament pay the full costs of police protection. That poses an additional problem since each manager has guidelines that must be followed, and they do not allow enough to cover the costs of police officers.

It is our opinion that each of the cities or townships involved should be proud of the fact that a

# State Shorting 2-Year Colleges

## EDITOR:

Schoolcraft College is in the enviable position of having almost \$1.5 million in bond money and having working drawings completed on two projects, the Community Cultural Center, and the Vocational - Technical building addition. We are in the unenviable position of having been unsuccessful in obtaining either state or federal matching funds to assist in these projects.

We have decided to go ahead with the Voc-Tech addition at a cost of almost \$1 million because of the pressing need for the facilities. In some respects, we are damned if we do because we are using up funds which might be later available to match with, and damned if we don't because of the needs of the students now and in the near future.

The governor's budget requests clearly show his priorities. He is recommending \$350 million for the four year schools and \$55 million for operation of the community colleges. His capital program is \$19 million for the four - year schools and \$1.5 million for the Community Colleges.

All the community college funds are to be used as matching funds to three schools, while the four year appropriations include full funding of a \$400,000 maintenance building at Grand Valley, and \$1.9 million to complete a six million dollar field house at CMU.

While I do not deny the needs of those schools, projects such as these do not lead to the enrollment of one more student. Similar funds at the community colleges would lead to higher education being borne by the state government.

I hope you might be persuaded to investigate the relative priorities assigned in this state and use your influence to divert some matching funds to schools such as Schoolcraft so that we may provide both the vocational education opportunities and the cultural opportunities to this community, which has demonstrated their

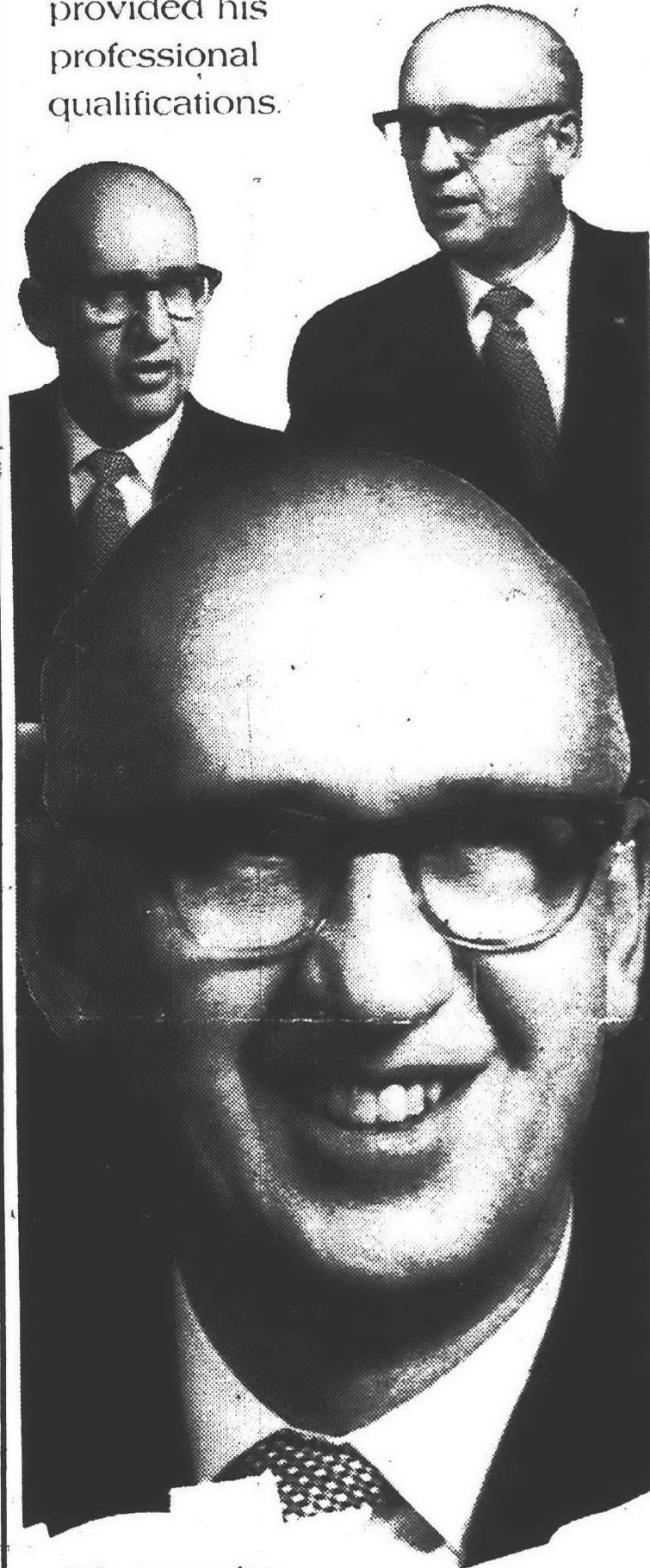

# Baker's Vote Helps Transit Package

State Rep. Raymond Baker's vote for the transportation package bill last week was one of nine votes that resulted in passage on the second try.

Baker (R-Farmington) was absent for the first vote on Feb. 12 when the package went down 50 to 54. Last week's vote was 59 to 43 (56 votes are needed for passage). The bill was sent to the Senate.

Also voting for the bill were Reps. Marvin Stempien (D-Livonia), Joseph Forbes (D-Oak Park) and James Defebaugh (R-Birmingham). Rep. Richard Young (D-

Dearborn Heights) voted against the bill.

Not voting were Reps. John Bennett (D-Redford Township), James Tierney (D-Garden City) and Thomas Brown (D-Westland). All had voted against it the first time.

THE TRANSPORTATION package includes bills to raise the gas tax by two cents per gallon to increase highway funding for local governmental units, primarily those in urban areas. A portion of the tax will be used to develop urban and public mass transit systems.

Baker's affirmative vote was based largely on the in-

crease in funding for Oakland County roads, he said. He did not mention rapid transit.

The Oakland County Road Commission will realize a 44 per cent increase in funding under current proposals. The increase is the largest for any county in Michigan.

"If the governor's proposals are enacted into law, Oakland County would receive over \$5.4 million in additional funds each year, beginning during fiscal year 1972-73. This money would be used for much needed and long overdue construction of county township, city and village roads," Baker said.

"Of this total, the Oakland County Road Commission would receive an additional \$4.4 million annually for use on county and township roads. Cities and villages in Oakland County would also receive over \$1 million in additional funds next year."

BASED ON conversations with officials of the Oakland County Road Commission, Baker said that more than \$700,000 of the additional money would be made available each year for 27 construction and reconstruction projects in Farmington and West Bloomfield

townships and in the Lathrup Village and Southfield areas, all in Baker's district.

"This additional revenue will greatly accelerate road programs in our part of the county," Baker added. "For example, this new money would allow us to immediately begin the widening to five lanes of Orchard Lake Rd. from Grand River to Pontiac Trail."

"According to our road commission, this desperately needed project will have to be put off for another 10 to 15 years unless this additional money is made available."

Without the additional funds provided in the package, the road improvements in Oakland County will proceed at just one-third the rate provided for in the bill, he said.

"Because of inequities in the distribution of state gas tax revenue, Oakland County has accumulated an overwhelming backlog of road needs over the past 10 years," Baker said.

CITIES AND villages in Oakland County would receive more than a 43 per cent increase in funding also, he said.

## Board Votes 7-1

# Schoolcraft Stays In SEMCOG

After listening to pleas from two Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) officials, the Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees voted 7-1 to remain in the regional planning organization for a one-year probationary period. Trustees had considered

withdrawing their \$352 yearly membership because of a lack of tangible results affecting schools in the organization. "I wouldn't sit here at this table and tell you we've gotten back by the dollar what we've paid into it," Joe Mayfield, Taylor school trustee and SEMCOG school bloc chairman, told trustees prior to the regular meeting. "If you think you can't get your value from it, then shake it (SEMCOG) up a bit and fight for it on the inside," Mayfield said.

MAYFIELD and SEMCOG staff coordinator Steven Weiss discussed the future of the school bloc in SEMCOG with trustees prior to the regular meeting. When the meeting adjourned, trustee Mary Dumas, who led the initial opposition to renewing membership in SEMCOG, distributed a prepared motion and moved that membership be continued. Only trustee Erv Brown voted against renewal. Brown had expressed disillusionment with SEMCOG at earlier discussions. Mayfield told the trustees that just after he was elected to the Taylor school board, "the first thing I did was move not to pay SEMCOG dues (amounting to \$2,640)." "I thought that SEMCOG was a good concept and was needed by other types of government, but I didn't think it was beneficial for the schools," he said.

AFTER HIS MOTION was defeated, Mayfield said he was appointed SEMCOG delegate and soon learned that it is "the most misunderstood organization I have ever been associated with." He stressed that SEMCOG is not a metropolitan super government, but that the voluntary members retain local autonomy and utilize the organization for regional planning — an area needed by school districts. It is the only organization where schools can meet with other governmental units. Admitting the weaknesses in the school bloc, he cautioned that if it dissolves it will mean a loss in communication. "The school bloc has been rather weak in terms of accomplishing things—but it has been rather vocal," Mayfield said.

It can be more effective if the members "speak up and have the changes made from the inside rather than imposed from the outside," Mayfield stressed. IN RECENT months Farmington, Livonia and Plymouth have withdrawn from SEMCOG leaving Schoolcraft as the only representative from the Observerland area still in it. The drop in school membership could result in the school bloc losing its representative on the SEMCOG executive committee, Mayfield said. Several school trustees told Mayfield and Weiss that recent statements made by SEMCOG Chairman Robert FitzPatrick were making local units feel they are being

coerced into joining or continuing in SEMCOG because non-membership means they could be overpowered by SEMCOG decisions. "This is the boogie man that all your local governments have been afraid of all along," Mrs. Dumas said. Mayfield agreed saying they are trying to clear up this misconception. Discussion among trustees never hit on the tactic of a temporary pull-out to pressure SEMCOG into giving community colleges more power. This alternative was proposed by Mrs. Dumas at the January meeting. But the motion to renew membership states that "representatives of the SEMCOG executive board and staff have given assurances

that the restructuring of SEMCOG and program direction will more adequately reflect the needs of community colleges and other school bloc members."

## Presidential Contenders Taped For SC Series

Prior to Michigan's presidential primary on May 16, Observerland's new and experienced voters can get an inside view of the presidential candidates through a videotape series at Schoolcraft College. Tapes of interviews with eleven of the presidential candidates will be shown through closed-circuit television on five consecutive Tuesday evenings in the Waterman Campus Center. The series is open to the public at no cost. Three

televisions will be set up on the second floor of the center to make viewing easy. THE TAPES feature a panel of college students quizzing each of the candidates individually. The interviews with each candidate are an hour each, beginning at 7 p.m. March 7. Since the tapes are closed-circuit, they have not been censored by the Federal Communications Commission or by the college. Thus, no subjects will be too controversial for discussion.

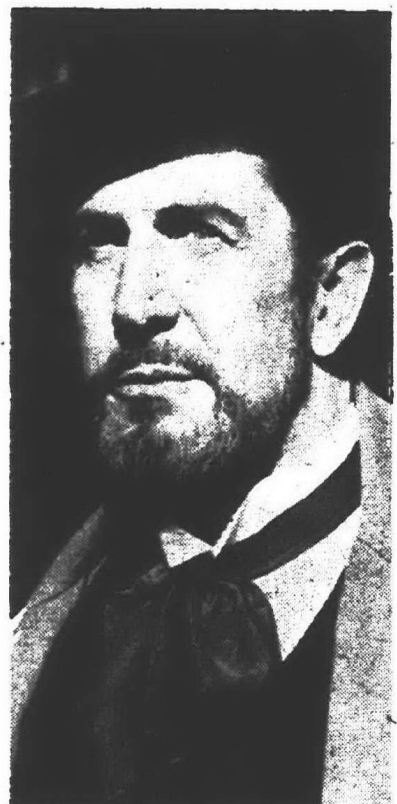
The first night of the series will be March 7 and feature Sen. Robert Dole (R-Kansas), chairman of the Republican National Committee, along with Larry O'Brien, chairman of the Democratic National Committee. Both will discuss the series and the coming elections. INTERVIEWS with the candidates will begin March 14 with Rep. Paul McCloskey (R-Calif.) and Sen. Vance Hartke (D-Ind.). Sen. Edmund Muskie (D-Maine) and Sen. Eugene McCarthy (D-Minn.) will be on March 21. The March 28 tape will feature Sen. Henry Jackson (D-Wash.) and Democratic New York Mayor John Lindsay. Rep. Shirley Chisholm (D-New York) and former vice-president and presidential candidate Hubert Humphrey will talk on April 14. Sen. George McGovern (D-S. Dak.) and Los Angeles Mayor Sam Yorty will be on April 18. The series will conclude with an interview of Rep. Wilbur Mills (D-Ark.) on April 18.

## SC Board Can't Pick Own Team

If the February meeting of the Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees is any indication, the college may have a long faculty contract negotiation ahead of it. It took the board longer to approve the administration bargaining team for the faculty contract than any other single item on the agenda — and then the matter wasn't finally settled. College President C. Nelson Grote had recommended that Personnel Director Gerald Munro and social sciences Director Clay Fechter be named to the team and a "floating chair" be established leaving the administration the opportunity to call in professionals for different areas of the negotiations.

BUT SOME board members objected to naming Fechter to the team because of a possible conflict of interest. Fechter, and all other area directors, are directly involved with the faculty and even teach a class. After an hour of discussion, the board voted to let Dr. Grote to decide whom to

appoint to the permanent seat, hinting that Fechter and other area directors should be excluded. The board also appointed teams for the negotiating teams for the physical plant contract negotiations and the food service contract sessions. Munro will be on both teams, Business Manager E. Frederick Petersen Jr. will negotiate on the physical plant contract and Robert Brethaupt, director of culinary arts, will be on the food service team. Floating chairs were established on all the administrative bargaining teams.

# How Can Schoolcraft College Help YOU?

You're an Observerland homemaker, wanting to stretch your horizons a bit.

Or you're an employed woman, wanting to increase your on-the-job proficiency or gain skills that could lead to promotion.

You're thinking of returning to college or employment after years of staying home.

Or perhaps you're a high school junior or senior, puzzling over the which-college decision.

If you fit into these categories or many others, you're one of the reasons-for-being for Schoolcraft College's Citizens Advisory Committee on the Career Needs of Women.

Made up of women in the five school districts that Schoolcraft serves and coordinated by SC director of admissions Barbara Geil, the committee seeks to increase the ways that the school can serve the needs of women in this area.

"Women are here in the community really more than men," said Miss Geil in explaining the beginnings of the advisory group.

"They're here all day, rather than just evenings and weekends, and so there are many more hours when the college could serve them.

"But as we looked at the school a couple of years ago, it seemed that men were using more Schoolcraft services than women. And last fall's 38 per cent figure for women enrolled in various courses was the highest yet."

So the idea developed, Miss Geil added, that for women in the community Schoolcraft was "not providing much service and not getting the word out on what was available."

That was why, about a year ago, Miss Geil and others on the administrative staff polled women's organizations such as American Association of University Women, League of Women Voters, Business and Professional Women and church and garden groups.

### Her 'Cold' Was Named Jonathon

Mrs. Mary Lou Kopchia, Westland mother of five, hadn't been feeling well along about the middle of February.

"I had a bad cold, and I thought it had settled in my kidneys," she said.

But the cold in the kidneys turned out to be tiny Jonathon Paul Kopchia, born Feb. 17 to a mother who had no idea she was pregnant.

Mrs. Kopchia, whose children range in age from 19 to 11, was sure she was through having children and had been taking birth control pills for several years.

She said her medication had been changed during the last year, but that she had not seen her physician, Dr. Kenneth Carbon of Garden City, for six months.

"He was surprised, too," Mrs. Kopchia said.

The baby was born in Annapolis Hospital and weighed two pounds, eight ounces at birth. His weight dropped to two pounds, two ounces, but he was reported holding his own Monday, Mrs. Kopchia said.

The mother said she had had no reason to suspect she was pregnant and had not felt life. She went bowling the night of Feb. 16, she said and the contractions started after she returned home.

"THEN I knew exactly what was the matter," she said.

Her husband, Joseph, a former major league baseball player, was "pretty shocked" by the birth and encountered amazement and disbelief when he started telephoning relatives.

"We found it hard to believe ourselves," his wife said.

Catherine Walker looks ahead to what could be a new sort of world for young mothers and their small children.

She sees communities with more day care centers, more counseling service for families and more drop-in centers for mothers and children - like the one she heads in Plymouth.

And the dream isn't so fantastic for this attractive and resourceful mother of three who is Plymouth's 1972 "woman of the year."

SHE NEEDS to look just a little way back into her own life to see how much can be accomplished when there's determination and some old-fashioned neighborliness and cooperation.

Cathe Walker's story is a real success story - if you count as success the overcoming of tremendous obstacles and moving on to a productive place in the community.

To start it, you go back just a couple of years, to see a frightened young woman, deserted and left on her own to raise two small sons and a baby daughter, needing Aid to Dependent Children just to feed her small ones and desperate and bitter because she felt the folks in her own town had turned their back on her.

It was a depressing time, to say the very least, and Cathe credits the Plymouth Family Service counseling with pulling her out of the depths.

BUT JUST REGAINING her own self-respect wasn't enough. She wanted to help others in rough circumstances, and when oldest son Alex started kindergarten at Starkweather School, she became room mother chairman and started working with families that had problem children.

Mrs. Walker was convinced that the thing that would help young mothers out of their feelings of isolation would be a center where they could get together.

Mrs. Ruth Abell, who had taken over as Family Service head, thought so too. They talked about the need for a friendly drop-in center where children could play and mothers could talk, and there wouldn't be things like tuition costs and assigned duties to get in the way.

"And one day I was in a cocky mood," Cathe recalls, "and I decided to go to my church, Our Lady of Good Counsel, and see if we could get some help."

That was less than a year ago. Leaders of the Catholic church agreed, and by early last summer a neighborhood

drop-in center for mothers and tots was in operation.

Mothers of varied financial status came and found the fellowship good. Children who started out occupying lonely corners began to bloom and mingle with the others.

Cathe managed and organized, and she and her children, Alex, Jamie and Peggy, found the experience enjoyable.

BY FALL, interest in the center was growing, but OLGCC needed its gym for school, so the center moved to the Salvation Army building in Plymouth at the invitation of Capt. Warren Yoder.

He had been helping all along, providing a bus for to-and-fro from school transportation and field trips for

the mothers and children and occasionally arranging bus jaunts for the mothers. In the new set-up, the Salvation Army provided space and clean-up equipment, too.

So, in the pleasant SA playroom and under Cathe Walker's guidance grew what Mrs. Abell called "a return to the neighborly bit." It now is open Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9 to 11:30 a.m. and Wednesdays from 12:30 to 2:30 p.m.

"We didn't want to be a structured co-op," Cathe explained. "No one was to be made to feel she must help. We want a place where people care for people and give help where it's needed."

Most of the mothers do help run the center, its leaders said. Nina Goodman, a social work student from Eastern Michigan University, comes twice a week to help.

"We're sort of feeling our

way," Cathe said. "There isn't any other center just like this, and we have to experiment in its operation."

WITH THE CENTER running well, Mrs. Walker was ready for two other major changes in her life.

She qualified for one of the Federal Housing Administration loans available to low-income families, and recently moved her brood from the downtown Plymouth apartment to a brand-new home in Westland.

"I was lucky and got a good contractor, and it's just beautiful," she said.

AND FAMILY SERVICE decided she was a staff member who needed more professional training, so Cathe now is enrolled in Wayne State University's Child Care Center program, set up with federal funds to provide more and better day care centers.

Carrying four credit hours at a time, and with babysitting costs covered by a grant from the Plymouth Jayettes, she hopes to earn a degree in 2½ or three years.

And that gets back to her dreams for the future.

"I'd like to have my own drop-in center," she said. "Well, what I'd really like is a big building with separate parts—a drop-in center, a day care center, a nursery school, a place for mothers."

"We could meet so many needs of mothers and children in one building. I think such a program should be federally funded, and I want to be one of the people trained to run it." Meanwhile, she concentrates on making a few needed improvements for Plymouth's successful center—things like fencing and outdoor play equipment to use when the weather warms up—and on spreading the word so more mothers and children may know its benefits.

With Cathe Walker's record for getting things done, that shouldn't be hard.

some action. A day-care center at Schoolcraft and a spring session with Mrs. Isabelle S. Streidl of the U.S. Department of Labor were included in the schedule.

Far more can be done to make Schoolcraft more responsive to women's needs, said Miss Geil.

There's the matter of career counseling.

"The last couple of years," she said, "have seen the shift from teaching, for so long the one big field for women, to concentrating on health fields, and those too may close soon."

"There are women in this area in less traditionally feminine fields—engineering, veterinary science,

chemistry. We want to draw on them as resource people."

Then there's more research into what fields have the best employment outlook, bearing in mind the fact that "suburban women don't want to travel great distances for employment," Miss Geil added.

A lot can also be done, she added, in setting up times for courses women want to take, so they could, for example, spend one day a week at Schoolcraft instead of an hour a day and thus need a baby-sitter only once.

"We're even thinking in terms of once-a-month weekend courses," she said. "That would require a lot of independent study, but any woman who has been running a household for a number of years has to have some organization."

## Malnutrition Damage Can Be 'Irreversible'

Although the effects of later malnutrition are also serious, Dr. Herbert Birch of Albert Einstein College of Medicine in New York City believes that the most terrifying and permanent damages of malnourishment occur during that period of human life from conception to age two.

One of the most challenging experts to speak at the annual Merrill-Palmer Infant Conference, Dr. Birch addressed a capacity crowd at the conference banquet held in the Founders Room of the Engineering Society.

FETUSES IN THE womb of a mother who is malnourished during the first seven months of pregnancy, he said, often are born below normal mentally and physically. Because the brain reaches its full size by the seventh month of intrauterine growth, these fetuses can experience what he called "permanent alterations in brain organization and structure" which may be irreversible. Malnutrition at this prenatal time interferes with cell number, cell division, and cell multiplication.

Even the most creative and stimulating later environment cannot totally reverse the physical impairment caused by malnutrition in these early months.

Another problem according to Dr. Birch, arises between the ages of seven months to two years when the supportive network of the infant's brain is developing. Malnourishment during this time causes serious disorganization of cells in this network and consequent permanent impairments.

# The Stroller... Descendants Of Tu Ling Sen?

Like the millions of others who sat in the quiet of his living room staring at the tube while President

Richard Nixon was writing a new page in world history with his arrival in China at the Peking airport, The Stroller was rather dumbfounded by the cordial, but very cool, reception the President was given.

As he sat there, his eyes glued to the screen, watching the Chinese people go about their daily business so unconcerned about what was happening within a few yards of them, The Stroller couldn't help wondering if they were descendants of Tu Ling Sen.

You possibly never heard of Tu Ling - for he was a rather quiet man who, some years ago, was the proprietor of a Chinese laundry on Detroit's east side, not too distant from the hoi poloi of so-called ritzy country clubs.

Quiet as he was, Tu Ling figured in one of the strangest -- and most laughable -- incidents ever recorded on a Detroit area golf course.

It happened some years ago when The Stroller was eking out an existence in the "toy department," a name affectionately given to the Free Press sports department. And his daily assignment was to follow the fortunes of those who whacked away at a little ball and then walked miles to find it each day.

ON THIS particular occasion, he was about to record the happenings of a tournament, billed as a benefit for Chinese relief, at one of the ritziest of all golf clubs.

The membership in this club was not only limited to those whose veins carried blue blood, but it had to be a certain type of blue -- or you were persona non grata.

Well, on the morning of the event, after a typical society breakfast, the members took their turns at the first tee.

Stiff and sedate, there were few smiles on any of their faces as they took off on what was supposed to be the social thing to do -- play for Chinese relief.

Came noon and there was a question whether the "great unwashed" of the press would be welcome in the grill room for the mid-day snack.

Finally, the late Leo McDonald, portly golf writer of the Detroit Times, said, "To hell with this -- let's go some place and eat."

On the way to a glorified hamburger stand on Gratiot Ave., Leo, who would do most anything for a laugh, commented:

"This is a helluva tournament. Imagine, playing

all day for Chinese relief and not a Chinaman in sight. We'll have to take care of that."

The remark was passed off for a few minutes -- until the hamburgers were devoured.

"LET'S TAKE a short ride before we go back," Leo said off-handedly. Then he added, with that sly grin that was so well known in newspaper circles and a signal that a laugh was not too far away -- "I want to find a Chinaman."

That's where Tu Ling Sen entered the picture.

Leo spotted the Chinese laundry and in he went. "Did you know," he said, addressing himself to Tu Ling, "that those ritzy people down there are playing golf for the relief of your people back home?"

"I think you ought to go down and thank them. Come, we'll take you."

Tu Ling tarried a moment. Then he appeared, face washed, a long queue dangling down his back,

and the little round black hat cocked atop his head.

Moments later we arrived at the scene of the society golf affair -- and one would have thought the world was about to turn topsy-turvy when we approached with Tu Ling.

"We brought him down," Leo said, "to thank you for what you're doing for his people."

Tu Ling smiled graciously. But before he could say a word, these "blue-bloods" turned their backs and were off for the first tee. Seemingly, they wanted no part of the Chinese visitor.

He was stunned and turned away, disappointed at the affront.

The "great unwashed" weren't invited for the evening meal at the club, either.

Tu Ling long since has passed from the laundry on Gratiot.

But The Stroller couldn't help wondering if the Chinese folks who "coolly" received Nixon weren't his descendants.

## Canton Finds Full-Time Fire Department Plan A Success

The fire bell rings and suddenly three lounging firefighters spring into action as one stations himself at the radio while the other two rush to the scene in a bright red pumper.

This is what happens now when the Canton Township fire department covers an emergency fire call. The department previously operated on a volunteer basis only.

The quarters adjacent to the station at Cherry Hill and Canton Center Rds. were occupied by Larry Longwish and his family who gave round the clock phone service, Longwish also serving as a

fireman in exchange for residence.

Since the beginning of the year, the department has changed to a full-time paid staff of 10 men. The men are required to live at the adjacent residence two days a week in shifts of three. Each shift does its own cooking and general housekeeping.

"THERE HAVE been no problems with the men living here," commented Fire Chief Mel Paulun. "As far as the families objecting -- well, there haven't been any divorces over it yet."

The department still has 15 volunteers along with the regular paid staff. The rapid

growth of the township was one of the main reasons why the board of trustees decided to switch to a full-time staff. There were 15 to 16 calls received monthly, making it almost impossible to handle the department as a voluntary program.

"The greatest advantage of the new set-up is that the department can give residents quicker and more efficient service," said Paulun. As far as he can see, there have been "no disadvantages so far."

The station houses one two-year-old pumper and one brand new \$35,000 pumper, two jeeps used for grassfires and one tanker which holds 1,200 gallons of water used at no-hydrant places.

THE DEPARTMENT is also operating a cadet training program which is accepted at Plymouth High School as a credited course.

"The main purpose of the student operation is to see if they are interested. By the time they are old enough, they may apply with our department if there is an opening," said Paulun.

The cadet trainees help with general housekeeping chores, radio or may go as spectators to the scene of a fire.

"A fireman's training is never completed," said Lt. Vern Rorabacher. "There is something new to learn every day."

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** Is Dan McCosh merely one of the funniest young writers alive? Or does he have a superb insight into the changing scene of suburbia? Both, we think, and here reprint his column from the Southfield News & Observer.

A problem formerly the worry of a certain exclusive east side suburb seems to be looming in these north side areas that attempt to offer something for the more discriminating suburbanite.

Grosse Pointe does not seem to be the favorite roosting place for the more successful elements of organized crime anymore.

Southfield, Bloomfield Hills, Beverly Hills, even Warren addresses have become common in stories about income tax indictments, gambling raids and the assorted mayhem associated with the "the organization" in the Detroit metropolitan area.

**IS THERE A PATTERN** to the residency of the successful criminal?

Apparently not, according to an investigator for the task force on organized crime in Detroit.

"I don't notice the addresses; I just write the indictments," he said.

The only common denominator seems to be a certain penchant for peace and quiet and a chance to preserve an illusion for legitimacy after they come home from work.

Just like everybody else.

## Esch Bill On Science Is Passed

**WASHINGTON** A major science and technology bill proposed by Congressman Marvin Esch (R-Ann Arbor) recently passed the House of Representatives to establish and Office of Technology Assessment.

"The basic responsibilities of the new office would be to provide information on the probable impacts on the environment the economy, and society as a whole of the applications of new technological techniques," Esch said.

"A thorough understanding of the impact of a technological advance would be extremely helpful to the Congress and the Administration in determining the relative priorities of the programs they are considering and could help to avoid negative influence."

He said the use of technology to solve serious environmental, economic and social problems would be facilitated by the office which would relate the information to policy makers who are attempting to solve those problems.

Esch pointed out that the government has had to deal with a great many issues containing complicated technological factors, such as the supersonic transport, urban mass transit, and the electric auto engine.

"If we had had the Office of Technology Assessment during the debates on these issues, the Congress could have made its decisions on a more substantive and objective basis," Esch said.

## Poll On Budget

# Cut 6 Directors, Says SC Faculty

 A study of Schoolcraft College's finances by a faculty task force touched an administration sore spot and came up with recommendations aimed at saving the college more than \$200,000.

Responding to an invitation by College President C. Nelson Grote for recommendations on the budget, the Faculty Forum Senate (elected officers of the faculty union) appointed a budget task force to gather budget information.

Most of the college's 150 faculty belong to the union. All were surveyed by the task force, and 62 per cent returned the questionnaires.

The college already dealt with one major budget cut-back this year and will face another if the U.S. Pay Board orders retroactive pay for faculty members.

COPIES OF the survey and suggestions on saving the college money were given to

board members at the recent meeting.

Several board members expressed pleasure with the report. It was referred to the administration for investigation, and the administration was directed to report back April 26.

Among the recommendations was the elimination of six area directors' positions which have been a sore spot with faculty since the positions were created last year. In all, the college has 10 area directors, but four were excluded from the recommendation because of the structure of their areas.

AREA DIRECTORSHIPS were created on the recommendation of a management firm which reviewed the college's structure.

Before the positions were created, faculty from each department elected a chairman, who both taught and handled some administrative responsibilities.

Area directors are supposed to concentrate on administrative responsibilities and teach one class.

But some faculty members claim the directors only make the college administration top-heavy and add little or nothing to efficient operations.

Of those surveyed 83.4 per cent said the positions could be decreased without a loss in "quality of services offered and the practical business of the college," 76 per cent said the area directors haven't significantly improved the administration and operation of their department, and 71 per cent said they would prefer to return to electing chairmen "as the primary means of administering and facilitating the affairs and business" of their departments.

THE JOBS that would get the ax under the report are directors of social science, industrial education, business education, mathematics and

science, fine arts and liberal arts, for an estimated total savings of \$130,600.

Forum President Richard Arlen said that elimination of their jobs would put most of the directors out of work, though a couple might be taken back into the faculty.

"The survey responses give no evidence of a significant gain in department administration or in the quality of education being offered," the report states.

"During the past seven years, elected chairmen perform the same duties and for the most part continue to do so. The role of the area director is nebulous and/or

duplicates the role of chairmen."

OTHER recommendations include starting laboratory fees, leasing the bookstore to a private concern, starting monthly budget statements with income and expenditures for each department to determine true costs of various courses and programs, and starting a cooperative effort with neighboring colleges and universities for exchanging and purchasing books.

They also make recommendations for cooperative course offerings with other nearby colleges to avoid duplication of expensive programs and initiate systematic recruiting

for programs with light enrollments.

"The efforts put forth are a clear indication that the faculty is genuinely interested in the overall welfare of the college," Arlen said in a letter to the board indicating their willingness to continue a cooperative effort with the administration.

## Board Reacts Against Plea Of 4 Instructors

An appeal by four faculty members to the Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees did exactly what it wasn't supposed to do by incurring the board's disfavor.

In an apparent attempt to get board sympathy, a letter typed on college stationery was mailed to each trustee with the typed names of four faculty members who weren't granted sabbaticals.

The letter, which wasn't signed, asked for a meeting with trustees because the faculty members involved stated they could not get in to see college President C. Nelson Grote.

"WE HAVE requested a hearing with the appropriate administrator, but we have been ignored in our attempts to follow the proper channels of authority," the letter states.

The names typed on the letter were Dr. Larry Vandermolen, Michael O'Toole, Albert Agosti, and Dr. Ralph Atchley.

The normal channels would be first to see the president and then the board.

Dr. Grote told board members that he wrote letters to each of the five faculty who had applied for sabbaticals and indicated he would meet with them individually if they

had questions on why their sabbaticals were not acted on.

However, the four dissatisfied faculty repeatedly insisted on a group meeting with Dr. Grote. Stating it is an individual matter, Dr. Grote refused to see them in group but agreed to individual meetings.

SEVERAL TRUSTEES voiced their disapproval with the faculty members skipping the channels and writing directly to them.

In addition, trustee Leroy Bennett objected to the fact that faculty members used college stationery and postage for the letters and failed to sign the letter themselves but had their names typed in. A faculty secretary typed the letter.

In today's complex economy, standardization of weights and measures is an absolute necessity to assure the consumers of confidence in goods and services they buy, and the businessmen of fair

competition. We take for granted those who work in this field! Seldom do we give credit to those who try to guarantee the accurate measurements of the items we purchase. Though the main duty of the Weights and Measures official is to protect the buyer and insure that he gets fair value for what he purchases, the officials have also found instances where an in-

accurate scale, if left uncorrected could have put a store owner out of business!

What better time could there be to point out the advantages of our modern electronic scales used in prepackaging meat, and inspected regularly. They excel in production, efficiency & uniform accuracy. Price lists are posted, and so is the drain on time and labor lost in relabeling

wrongly priced items. However, consumers say they have difficulty in reading the new price tags for the weight is measured and shown in pounds and increments of 1/100th pound. . no ounces. The price of the package is also computed to the nearest 1/1000 (.01) of a pound. But they are easy to understand if you follow this example:

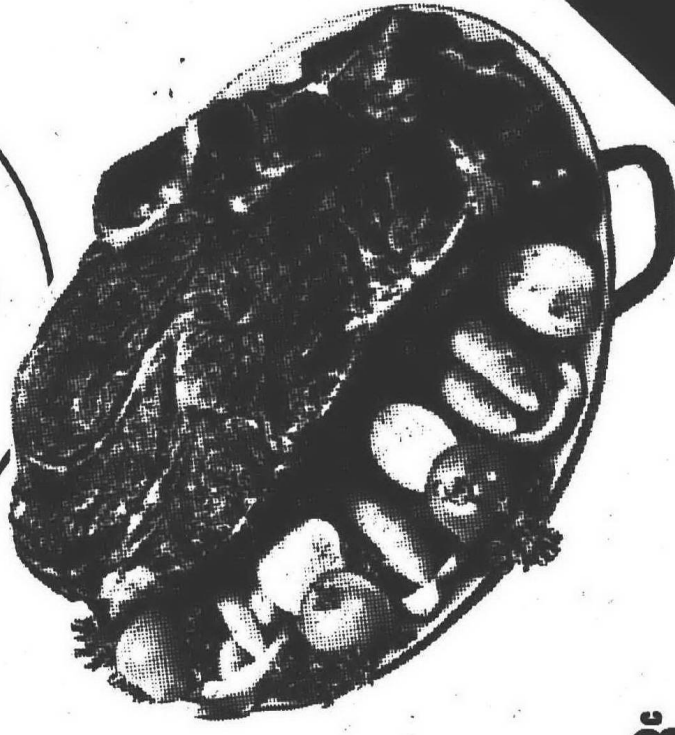
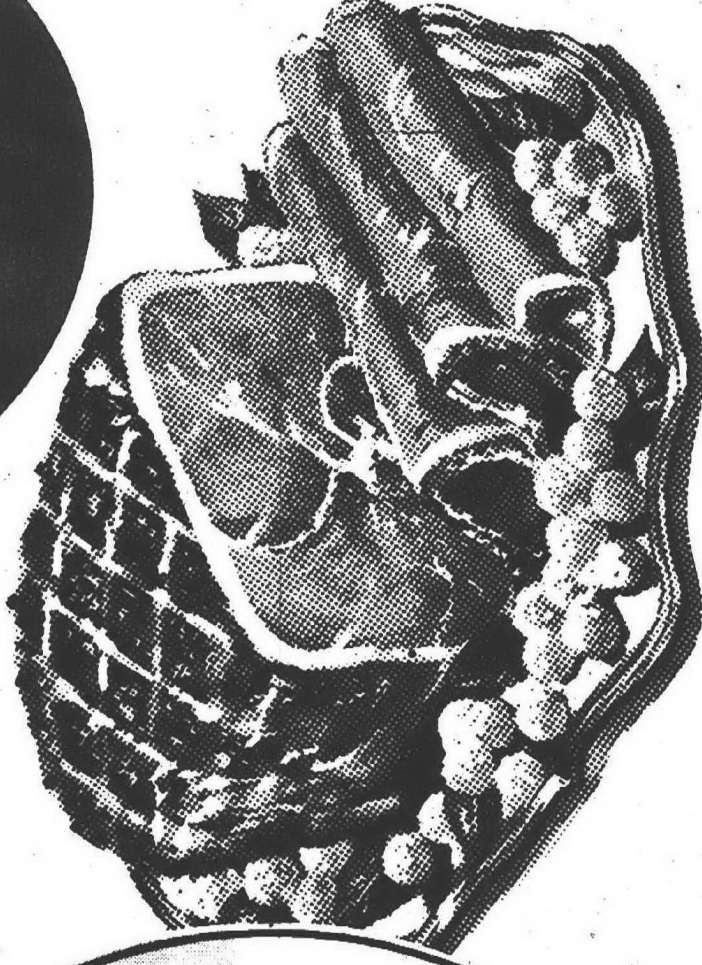
