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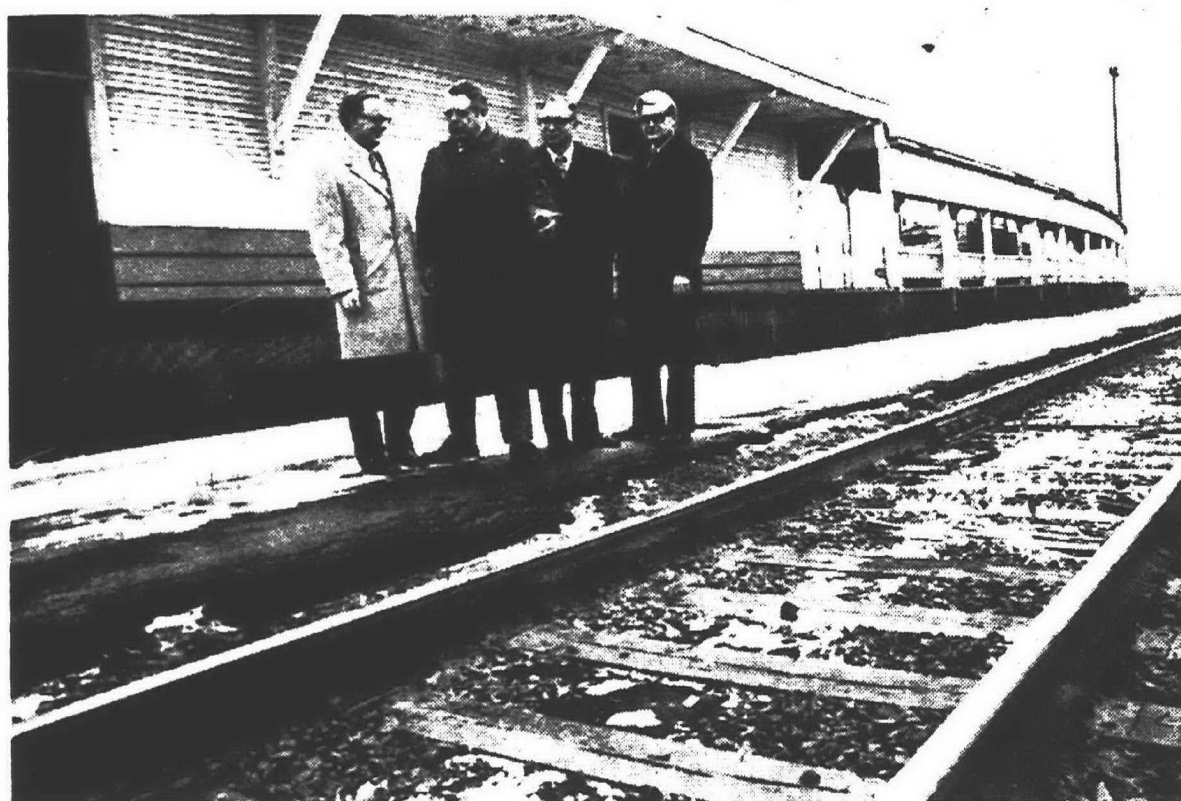

Railroads Turn To Art

C&O Aids With Artrain

It didn't come about just by accident that a railroad siding was so easy to obtain in Plymouth that the Michigan Artrain could be scheduled for an 18-day visit here, April 19 through May 6.

It didn't hurt the Plymouth cause, for instance, that the chairman of the Artrain facilities committee since it was created by the Michigan Council for the Arts has been William Henschell, northern region general manager for the C&O/B&O.

Nor did it detract from the efforts of the Plymouth Fine Arts Council, when it originally began eyeing the Artrain project, that this city is one of the state's few north-south, east-west railroad crossroads.

The whole history of Artrain

shows how the name came to be coined, for not only do its five cars constitute a rolling exhibit of the finest in art itself but without the help of the Michigan Railroads Association the state probably never would have obtained such a cultural plus.

ARTRAIN WILL be located here on a siding adjacent to the C&O freight house at the Starkweather crossing. Use of the freight house and its covered but open-sided extension for local art exhibits, and of the siding itself, are being donated by the C&O, with divisional superintendent Murray Karsten as coordinator. Beautification of the site already is under way.

The railroad motif will be so extensive during the train's

stay here that guides even will wear engineer's caps, provided by the C&O.

When the Michigan Council for the Arts was founded in 1966, the 14 railroads which belong to the association offered full cooperation, providing equipment and expertise for the redesign of the rolling stock.

The C&O donated two passenger coaches, the Grand Trunk Western another passenger coach plus a baggage car, and the New York Central provided the caboose. Whatever railroad that serves the city for which the train is booked provides the engine, and before 1972 is over Artrain will have been hauled 2,375 miles for 23 stops. Its longest stay of all will be its visit to Plymouth.

Keep Status Quo On Assessments In City, Township

Forthcoming board of review sessions, both in the city and township of Plymouth, have brought to light the fact that property assessments under both governments have remained virtually static this year.

For property owners, this means it will be a year long to remember, for no major increase in the tax bite is in sight.

Board of review sessions are scheduled each March to give landholders an opportunity to protest their assessments, if earlier satisfaction cannot be gained in conference with the assessing officers.

In the township a year ago, following complete reassessment of the value of all property in that area, the board had the stormiest period in years as hundreds of persons filed appeals. A similar scene may be in store at City Hall in 1973, for this summer all land within the municipality also will undergo general reassessment.

But for 1972, all is calm, and preliminary information from the equalization department of Wayne County has let officials in both the city and township know the equalized ratio between property in the Plymouth area and the rest of the county will stay just about where it was in 1971.

TOWNSHIP property, since last year's reevaluation, still is considered to be assessed at 50 per cent of cash value, as

the law requires. Thus, the township's equalization "factor" remains at 1.0.

The county considers that, across the board, city property is assessed at 26.36 per cent of true value, and thus has given the city an initial "factor" of 1.90 compared to 1.87 last year. City Assessor and Treasurer Kenneth Way said he was "very pleased" with this minimal increase.

The "factor" is the multiplier used against the local assessment figure to establish the state equalized value upon which the actual tax rate is then applied.

The city's board of review will be in session from 12 noon to 6 p.m. Tuesday, March 7 and from 3 to 9 p.m. Wednesday, March 8. Its members are Bill Beitner, Carvel Bentley and Fred Hadley.

In the township, the board includes Mabel Partain, Carl Hoser and Lloyd Sharland. They will meet to hear appeals from 3 to 6 p.m. and 7 to 10 p.m. on Monday, March 13 and from 9 to 12 a.m. and 2 to 5 p.m. on Tuesday, March 14.

THE CITY Commission voted last year to make a formal request of the County Bureau of Taxation for a complete reassessment to bring local property in line with the 50 per cent theory, and Way has been informed that field representatives of the county bureau plan to start this work about May 1. Way will work with them.

He emphasized, however, that the reassessing will not be done in time to have any effect upon this year's municipal tax statements which are sent out in July, or upon next December's county and school tax statements. The new figures will apply in 1973, however.

With assessments thus remaining virtually unchanged for 1972, except where there have been physical improvements in property, owners of property can figure on continuance of the status quo in the amount they will be billed — unless any of the specific governmental units increases its rate per \$1,000.

The township tax rate currently stands at \$3.50 per \$1,000 in state equalized valuation, and officials who already have started 1972-73 budget deliberations have made it plain that they want to keep it there.

City commissioners have been equally blunt in saying they hope to keep the municipal tax rate at its present \$13.85 per \$1,000, although to do it they undoubtedly will have to apply the paring knife to initial budget requests.

The main element of doubt concerns the school tax, five mills of which expire this June. Renewal of this will be asked in the June 12 election, but the board has not yet said whether anything additional will be asked.

Pair Saved From Fire By Crippled Neighbor

A Plymouth Township woman and her mother have a crippled next door neighbor to thank for rescuing them when a fire exploded in their trailer Thursday afternoon.

Mrs. Earl Hedge, 53, and Mrs. Elmer Jones, 73, both of 14333 Elm St., located in a Ridge Rd. trailer park, were burned when a leaking aerosol can was ignited by a gas stove pilot light in their trailer about 5 p.m. Thursday.

They were treated by and released from Garden City Osteopathic Hospital. Mrs. Hedge received first and second degree burns, and Mrs. Jones received first degree burns on her head and hands.

ACCORDING TO Township Fire Chief James Gignac, the women's crippled next door neighbor heard the explosion, called firemen and then — without his cane — went to his neighbors' aid.

The neighbor's name was not known, Gignac said, because when Earl Hedge returned to his home and was told the neighbor had helped, he couldn't believe it was the crippled man next door so he didn't give firemen his name.

Gignac gave the following account of the fire:

Hedge had been using drain cleaner to unplug the kitchen sink. It leaked and corroded an aerosol can of bug spray. The fumes from that can

apparently leaked into the kitchen cabinet where it was stored.

WHEN MRS. HEDGE opened the door to the trailer, the onrush of air began to move the fumes, and they were ignited by the gas stove pilot light. A flash fire resulted which spread through the trailer and burned two chairs, a rug and three kitchen cabinets.

Two windows were blown out of the trailer.

Mrs. Hedge was burned as she stood in the doorway, and Mrs. Jones was burned while sitting in the trailer's living room.

The fire had mostly been extinguished by the time firemen arrived.

Facial Composites Aid Police Search In Store Robbery

Plymouth businessmen may be getting a shock when they open their mail and see the faces of two desperadoes staring at them.

The composite photocopies of two men who held up Beitner Jewelry Store, 904 West Ann Arbor Trail, Monday afternoon, are being sent out by Plymouth police and the Chamber of Commerce in the hopes that they may foil another robbery before it happens.

According to Lt. Roger Vanderveen, who investigated the Beitner robbery, the two men escaped with about \$500 in cash and an undetermined amount of jewelry.

The composites were made by the Identification Bureau of

the Wayne County Sheriff's office from the descriptions given by Beitner clerks who were held at bay by the bandits.

The first man is described as about 30 years old, six feet tall, 200 pounds with dark hair. He was wearing a dark coat.

The second bandit was about 30 years old, five-feet, eight-inches tall, weighing 160 pounds, blue eyes and sandy hair with a small mustache. He was wearing a brown leather jacket, white T-shirt and dark pants.

Plymouth Police Chief Timothy Ford asked anyone recognizing the two men to call the Plymouth detective bureau.

THE FIRST ROBIN to be sighted in the Plymouth area this season has been reported from Canton Township, indicating that if you will just be patient spring is on its way. Mr. and Mrs. Harold Pope saw the robin Wednesday, March 1 on their Lilley Rd. farm between Palmer and Cherry Hill. Plymouthites must remember, however, that Canton is farther south - and no one yet has reported any of the birds in town.

LINCOLN, KENNEDY AND KING is the title of a live musical performance to be presented by two representatives of the New York stage in five Plymouth schools Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

George Tipton and Laurie Stevens will do excerpts from the careers of Abraham Lincoln, John F. Kennedy and Martin Luther King at East and Central Monday, Pioneer and West Tuesday and Wednesday.

THERE'S A new law suit in Federal Court in Detroit which will be of interest to the study committee appointed by Mayor James McKeon to consider what changes are necessary in the Plymouth city charter.

You'll recall that last fall the same court struck down the Plymouth requirement for residency of two years to qualify as a municipal candidate. Now, Ann Arbor's code, which demands that city council candidates be registered voters for one year, has been challenged by a resident who wants to be on the April 3 ballot with only six months residency.

The city commission last year rezoned that corner to an office area classification.

OLD BUSINESS - Ford Leasing (Application No. 170) Rezoning from R-1 to C-2. Property on the south side of Ann Arbor Road, east of K-Mart. THROUGH BIFOCALS

IT'S ALWAYS a pleasure to chew the fat with members of our judiciary, sometimes recalling odd-ball incidents from our courtrooms that bring a laugh, but a few nights ago Circuit Judge George E. Bowles and I got onto a subject of a serious nature that should be shared.

The judge, as presumably you know, resides in this bit of paradise we label Plymouth and is one of 27 men who serve on the Wayne County Circuit bench. Those in the legal profession tell me he's one of the best.

It long has been my contention that some of those 27 should sit in booming western Wayne County, rather than having the entire court and the necessary services from the county clerk based solely in downtown Detroit.

The sheriff's department and the prosecutor's office maintain out - county facilities at Henry Ruff and Michigan Ave., and it would be a service to the public of this western area if Circuit Court did, too.

I have found an ally in Judge Bowles who has even put it in writing with this strong endorsement: "You have my pledge that I would work actively and closely with any persons who want to spend some time and effort on such a project."

THE JUDGE, of course is more of a realist than I am, and without doubt has more patience. Besides, he knows more about the problems involved, which is a humble but true admission some students of this column may find out of character on my part.

"For years, I have been a proponent of such facilities," said Bowles in a kind note following our social, non - partisan tete - a - tete.

"Since the county is in a tight financial pinch, realistically I believe that steps in the direction of out - county facilities will not be taken unless there is clearly expressed need from out - county: from the public using the courts, the legal profession and the media.

"I have already expressed my views to the Suburban Bar Association of Western Wayne County. There appears to be lawyer support, but it is not effectively organized. The media can be of tremendous help in articulating a community expression. Realistically, we should start with providing some modest service and then plan from there."

IT WAS RECALLED by the judge that just a year ago County Clerk Joseph B. Sullivan sought permission from the Board of Auditors to establish a branch near the existing Henry Ruff complex, but was turned down. Sullivan stated in his unsuccessful petition:

"While the out - county population continues to grow, the office of the county clerk provides service to the residents only in its downtown office. Yet there are certain matters which could be conveniently handled in other and more convenient location for those living in an area far removed from downtown.

"If marriage license applications, for example, could be filed both in the City - County Building and out - county, and if attorneys would start their suits by filing them in an out - county office, we would provide an increased service."

In the infinite wisdom of the bench, Bowles writes, "Might I suggest what has already been tried, without success, be reassessed?" He refers, of course, to this provision for the filing of cases, plus Sullivan's proposals for other convenience of the citizenry.

The time for prodding interested persons into action on this idea is ripe at the moment, among other reasons, for the fact that new methods of selecting judges now are under consideration in Michigan. Appointment, rather than political election, is favored by many.

This also has brought forth a proposal from a state - appointed commission that Wayne County be divided into two wards. One would encompass Detroit, Highland Park and Hamtramck and the other the rest of the county. Each ward would elect "X" number of circuit judges. My point is, if we are going to elect our own, let's also give them local area courtrooms. George Bowles might like to know your reaction.

Still Seek Rossman Settlement

It's nearly three months since the Plymouth school board fired James Rossman as superintendent and still a final settlement hasn't been reached.

The delays are apparently due to two main reasons.

The board has offered Rossman the position of consultant to Acting Supt. John Hoben but refused to employ him beyond June 30.

1973—the time at which his contract as superintendent would have expired.

Rossman maintains he has tenure with the district as a teacher and has requested a hearing before the state Tenure Commission to determine his status. He expects to be notified of a hearing date this week.

The hearing would also give Rossman the opportunity to air his responses to the board's list of charges against him. Because the board acted to rehire him in a lesser position but at the same salary just after publication of the charges, Rossman didn't have the opportunity to answer the board's complaints.

Rossman's attorney, H.

Rollin Allen, and the board's attorney, Edward Draugelis, have exchanged memos but apparently have been unable to reach agreement.

Though Rossman reportedly has a list of assignments from the school administration, he has not started work as a consultant, but he is collecting paychecks from his \$28,000 yearly salary.

He has maintained his presidency of the Plymouth Area Planning Commission, which affects the school district, and still attends school board meetings but sits with the audience.

Congregation Sets First Mass

A new Catholic congregation, composed of families in Canton Center, Plymouth, Westland and Livonia, will gather for its first mass at 10:30 a.m. Sunday, March 5, in the Fiegel elementary school, 39750 Joy, Plymouth.

The congregation, without building or yet parish name, is being established because the Catholics in the area have asked for a close-to-home place to worship.

The Rev. Gerald K. Flannery, appointed pastor for the approximately 240 families, will celebrate the first mass and others to be held regularly on Sundays. He is taking on the new responsibility in addition to serving as director of the deacon internship program in the Archdiocese of Detroit.

"THE CHURCH isn't a building or a piece of property — it's the people," said Mrs. Thomas Stevenson of Canton Township, who, with her husband, spearheaded the drive to establish the new congregation.

"We're thrilled to be beginning services," she added. "We'll start with a 10:30 mass each Sunday and play it by ear as to whether others are added and what the times will be."

She said residents of the area have been working to arrange space, seating, music and refreshments for a fellowship time to follow mass.

MRS. STEVENSON said people in the area all have had to travel some distance to Catholic churches.

"Most of us heard, when we moved here, that the archdiocese had property in the area and that there would be church some time in the future," she explained.

"But under the new guidelines established by Vatican II, the church wanted the drive for a new parish to come from the people. We learned from a call to the archdiocese that there was property at Joy and Eckles, and that a new congregation might be centered there."

Mrs. Stevenson said several families interested went door-to-door in the area late in August and procured the names of 240 families that wanted to see a new Catholic worship center established.

"We met in October with the Rev. John Hooper," she said, "to talk about prospects for the new group." She said it was made clear then that there were no plans for a parochial school and no immediate ones for a church building.

"We thought it best that people who think of church in terms of buildings and marble should continue in the parishes where they now worship," she added.

FATHER FLANNERY said he is taking on his new responsibilities with a "we'll see what develops" attitude. "After a year or so a parish might be established," he said. "My responsibility is to assist these families to form themselves into a real Christian community."

Father Flannery was born in Detroit in 1934. He has a degree in philosophy from the Sacred Heart Seminary in Detroit and studied theology at the Gregorian University in Rome.

He has served parishes in Detroit, Melvindale, St. Clair Shores, Roseville and Pontiac and has been rector of St. Mary student chapel at the University of Michigan.

Plymouth Church Sets Dedication

The First United Methodist Church of Plymouth, a church that had its beginnings 162 years ago, will consecrate its new colonial building Sunday, March 5.

Bishop Dwight E. Loder, head of the United Methodist Church in Michigan, will officiate in consecration services at 9:30 and 11 a.m. in the building located on North Territorial west of Sheldon.

Later members of the congregation will show their new church home to the community with an open house from 3 to 5 p.m.

THE CONGREGATION worshiped for the first time last Sunday in the new building that seats 350 in its sanctuary and provides a large fellowship hall, a two-story education unit and a church parlor.

At that time the Rev. Paul M. Cargo, senior minister, looked back to the frontier days when the church began and told the worshippers that today "we are called upon to honor God in this frontier land of our time."

"Our frontier," he added, "is the effect of modern technology upon persons—and I would not imply that the effects are all bad."

"Our frontier now is to show the sense of joy of the of the Christian way amid the paths of self-indulgence."

"We have a new sense of what this congregation can do by working together. Now, from this new base of operations, let's see what we can do, with God's help, on the frontiers of our own day."

THE CONGREGATION'S "new base" was constructed by Stewart Oldford & Sons,

local builder. Morison Architectural firm did the designs, including the sanctuary's distinctive hung, curved ceiling.

Financing of the new building was effected through successive three-year building fund campaigns, the church's memorial fund and a mortgage loan from the National Bank of Detroit.

Ground was broken Nov. 29, 1970, and the cornerstone laid in June of 1971. The steeple was erected last August.

Participating with Bishop Loder in the consecration services will be Dr. John Jury, superintendent of the United Methodist Church Ann Arbor District, as well as Rev. Cargo and the Rev. Dean A. Klump, associate minister. Sanford Burr, lay leader for the congregation, will bring the words of welcome.

THE FIRST Methodist worship service in the Plymouth area was in 1810 when Plymouth was included in a circuit of the New York Conference. A decade later the Detroit circuit became part of the Ohio Methodist conference.

A DECISION to establish a new church home was reached after a committee was formed in 1963 to study the future of the church in a growing community.

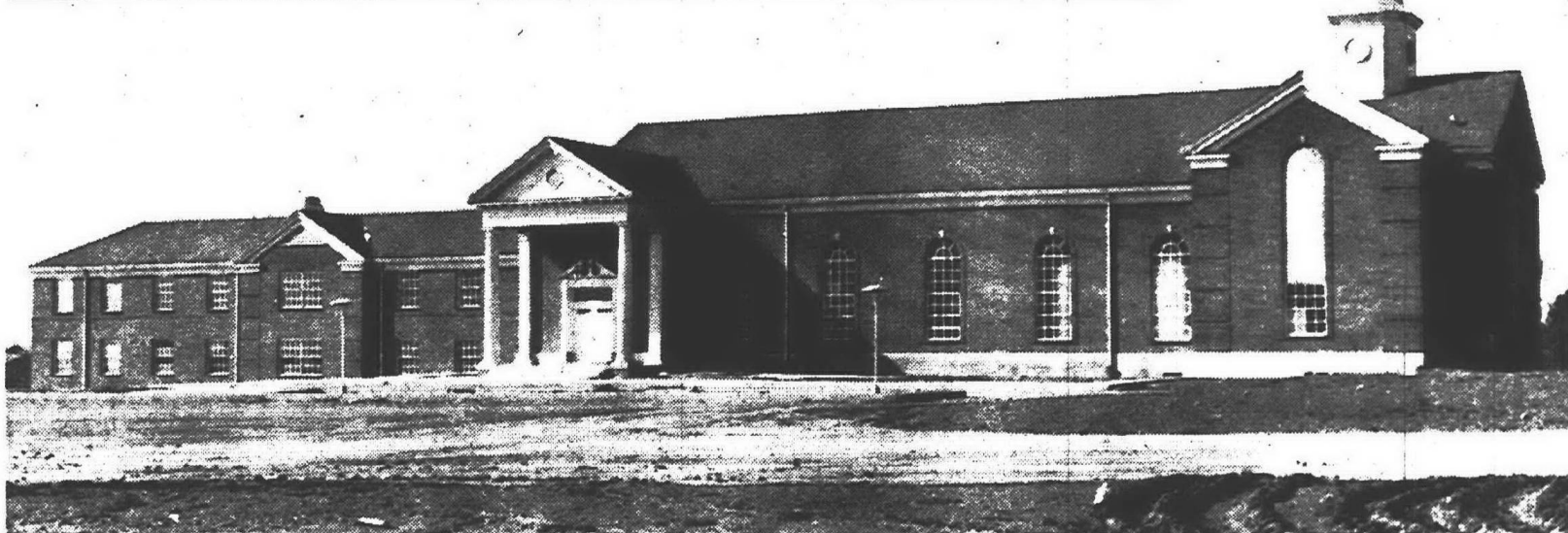
The new building has 10 Sunday school rooms and six additional ones can be made by dividing fellowship hall into four rooms and the parlor into two. The sanctuary includes room to seat a 50-member choir.

Not quite complete at the time of consecration, the church will have three stained glass windows, fashioned by the Willet Stained Glass Studios of Philadelphia, installed this week.

There will be a service of dedication for memorial gifts and gifts of thanksgiving Sunday, March 12.

February flies by as the shortest month in the year. Yet February brought us some interesting anniversaries. Ground Hog day supposedly told us about the length of our winter. We honored George Washington as the father of our country, leading our armies during the Revolutionary War and governing as our first president beginning with 1789.

We observed the birth date of another man of honesty and integrity, born in poverty rather than in affluence, who preserved the union in those dark days of the Civil War, Abraham-Lincoln.

In between Feb. 12 and 22 come St. Valentine's Day, a gay reminder of those we love and those who love us.

GOD TOLD JOSHUA to set up stones after Israel's crossing of the Jordan River that when his children asked, he might tell them, "This is what God did for your ancestors."

The debunking of great characters and the garbage hunt in our past history has fostered the cult of anti-patriotism. We do well to relive the sacrifices, the glories, the sufferings and the achievements of our fathers and forefathers.

Yes, they made their mistakes, but they passed on

to us a heritage of freedom and democracy unique in our world.

Pollution and exploitation have always marred our history and yet their multiplication today threatens our environment and our existence. Physical pollution only reflects our moral and spiritual condition.

TO SUBSTITUTE gold for God, pleasure for worship, power for humility, appetite for service, threatens the foundations of our existence. When foundations are undermined, what can the good man do? The Lord is in his holy temple, the Lord's throne is in heaven, His eye is on mankind, he takes their measure at a glance" (Psalm 11:3-4).

I suggest that we revisit our national shrines: Plymouth Rock, Jamestown, Valley Forge, Gettysburg, and the rest. I suggest that we get on our knees before God at home and in our churches as Abraham Lincoln repeatedly asked Americans to do. Will Americans today throw away the heritage our fathers have left us?

February also introduced us to Lent, a time in the church calendar that reminds us that God in Christ dealt with man's sin and rebellion and corruption and greed and lust when he died on the cross to reconcile us to God, to redeem us from our

sins, to give us a new life and a new nature.

Lent spells sacrifice and self-denial to many. We always need to reorder our priorities. What part does God have in our lives? Are we living largely for ourselves? How much do we share with the needy our time, our talents, and our money?

THIS FEBRUARY gave us an extra day that comes once in four years. Some call it Sadie Hawkins day when unclaimed blessings can reach out for a companion. Most of us would bargain for an extra day of life.

"Buy up your opportunities," the apostle Paul wrote the Ephesians. Bargains meet us today which may never return. The days come in rapid stream but some day will be our last day and the Umpire of the universe will say, "That's all."

So, bidding February farewell, we could ask that we receive wisdom to number our days so that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom. With spring around the corner, we welcome the new life in Christ.

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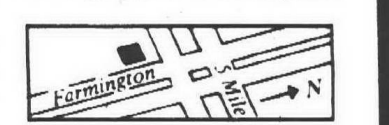
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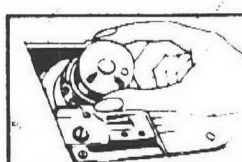


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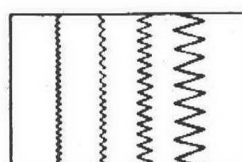
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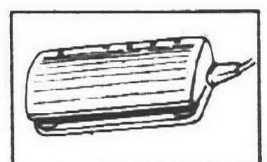
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Bentley Tips North, 54-46; Spartans Run Past Falcons

Last year's "cinderella" basketball team has found its way to another district championship clash. Stevenson knocked off Farmington High in the semifinals at North Farmington, 70-58, to meet Bentley in the battle for the district crown with the winner traveling to the Franklin regionals.

The Spartans took a regular season losing record all the way to the state quarterfinals last year and boast a 9-8 mark this season.

Stevenson won the opening tip with Dale Haberman popping in the first bucket and the Spartans never worked up a sweat afterwards with Farmington trailing after one quarter, 16-7.

THE FALCONS closed the gap to six points midway through the second quarter, 24-18, with Joe Montgomery finding the range but Stevenson's Mike Patrick and Haberman got hot from the floor and the Spartans went up at the half, 39-24.

Farmington won the second half tip and moved to within 10 points near the end of the third quarter, but Stevenson spurred to a 54-41 lead. Jeff Baker opened the final quarter with two free throws and Bill Marra popped one in to slice it back to 10 points, but the Spartans were not a squad

to sit on their lead as they proceeded to reel off seven straight points to lead 61-45.

Montgomery rebounded with a Falcon three-point play but Kelly Smith took over controls for Stevenson and mastered a Spartan victory.

It was a dismal end to a disappointing season for Coach Ray Boyle and his Falcon cagers with a 3-7 Inter-Lakes record and an overall 5-13 mark.

Turf Tips, Quips

It's later than you think, especially if you are a harness racing fan. Northville Downs moves into its second last weekend tonight (Saturday) and Wolverine Raceway, which operates at the Detroit Race Course, will open its gates to horses next Friday.

Hazel Park started the thoroughbred campaign a week ago with more than 15,000 in the stands and the mutual handle went all the way to \$1,067,000... quite a few more dollars than track officials expected for a February opening.

Which leads one to conjecture whether the Michigan tracks are ready for winter racing. The answer would have to be "yes" as far as facilities for spectators are concerned.

We're just wondering what the true answer would be if one took a good hard look at the racing strips.

Hazel Park found itself in a position where the jockeys threatened to halt racing last Wednesday because of the track. There were holes in the racing strip on the clubhouse turn and the jocks, after a couple of spills, decided they didn't want any part of races going all the way round the five-eighths mile track.

"We want all remaining races to go four furlongs and nothing else," their spokesman notified track officials.

It took a good bit of doing but arrangements were finally made with owners and trainers and the program went on with four furlong events.

Earlier in the year, Northville Downs, which installed a new surface of slag and

limestone during the break between the middle of December and January 1, found conditions almost impossible when an unseasonable thaw and heavy rains on the same day caused the strip to break down in several places.

It was quickly corrected the following day and the programs continued uninterrupted. But the fact remains that all local tracks operating in winter for the first time can expect track problems.

The lessons learned this year will bring corrections in another season and nothing but headaches this year.

WITH THE OPENING program less than two weeks away, there'll be plenty of activity starting Monday at Wolverine Raceway.

Vice President and General Manager Richard Wilson spent Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of this week introducing Earl Flora, the new PR man for Wolverine and the Detroit Racing Association, to the news media.

Come Monday, Earl will be on his own and Wilson will turn his attentions to the negotiations with the mutual clerks' union and to plans for the season opener.

Racing Secretary Bill Connors will check in midway through the week to start checking the stall allotments and drawing up a condition book for the first two weeks. Paddock Supervisor Clayton Smith has been busy checking stall applications for the past three weeks and sending confirmations to those receiving stable space.

Then there are the hundreds of odd jobs that have to be taken care of in the final 10

days before the start of a meeting. Anyone familiar with race tracks well knows the plant can look like a pig sty four days before the opening and then be spic and span and in apple pie order on the first night.

That's one of the things that has always amazed us... visit a plant a few days early and then go to the opener. You can't believe your eyes... but it happens year after year.

THOSE FOLLOWERS of the standardbreds who have been attending the nightly programs at Northville Downs are singing the praises of a speedy three-year-old by the name of Creeder Linbo. The colt may not be worth a plugged nickel when the summer campaign arrives but right now he's the talk of the midwest with his string of four straight victories.

Owned by Joe Sacco of Oak Park and Al Rosenberg of Southfield, the son of Widower Creed has yet to taste defeat this year.

He started his current winning streak on Jan. 12 with a nine-length triumph and none has come close since. Racing Secretary Harry Peterson has moved Creeder Linbo up in class in each start but the colt has whipped everything sent against him.

Creeder recorded No. 4 Thursday night in impressive style. Even though it seemed for a time that Drive-Trainer Tom Harmer had outsmarted himself when he tucked the colt in last in a seven horse field and still had him there at the halfway point.

That's when Harmer sent the colt to the outside. The field had barely turned into the backstretch until Creeder was on top and he stayed there for the remainder of the mile.

Schaner paced RU with 21 points followed by Gary Fulks with 12. Alex Massimany led Fordson with 22 points.

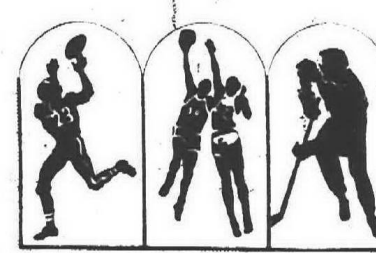

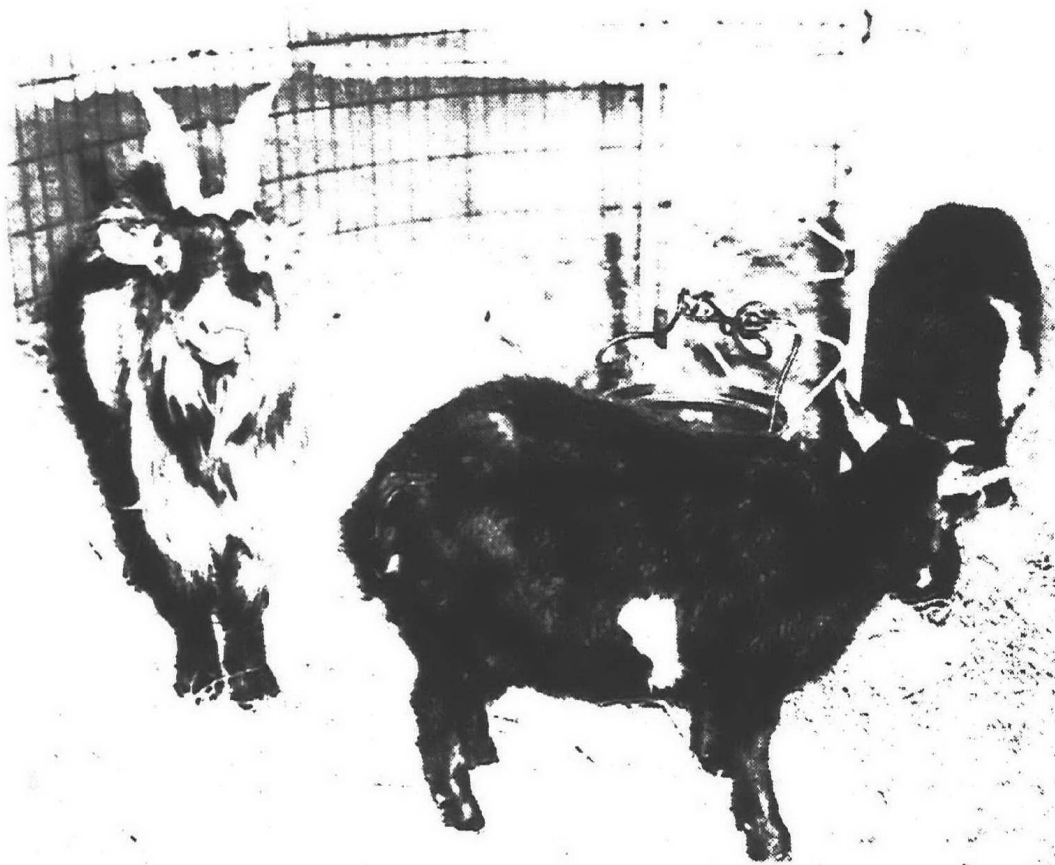

State Adds 26 Acres To Park

A 26-acre tract at the new Maybury State Park will be purchased for the development of recreational facilities, according to Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth).



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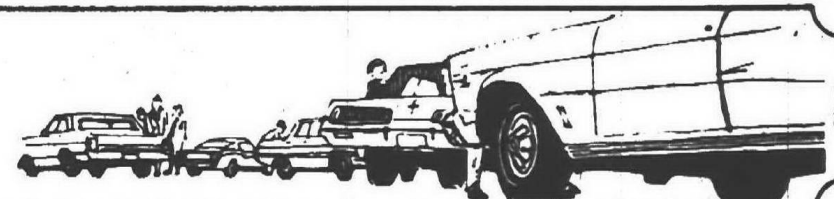
