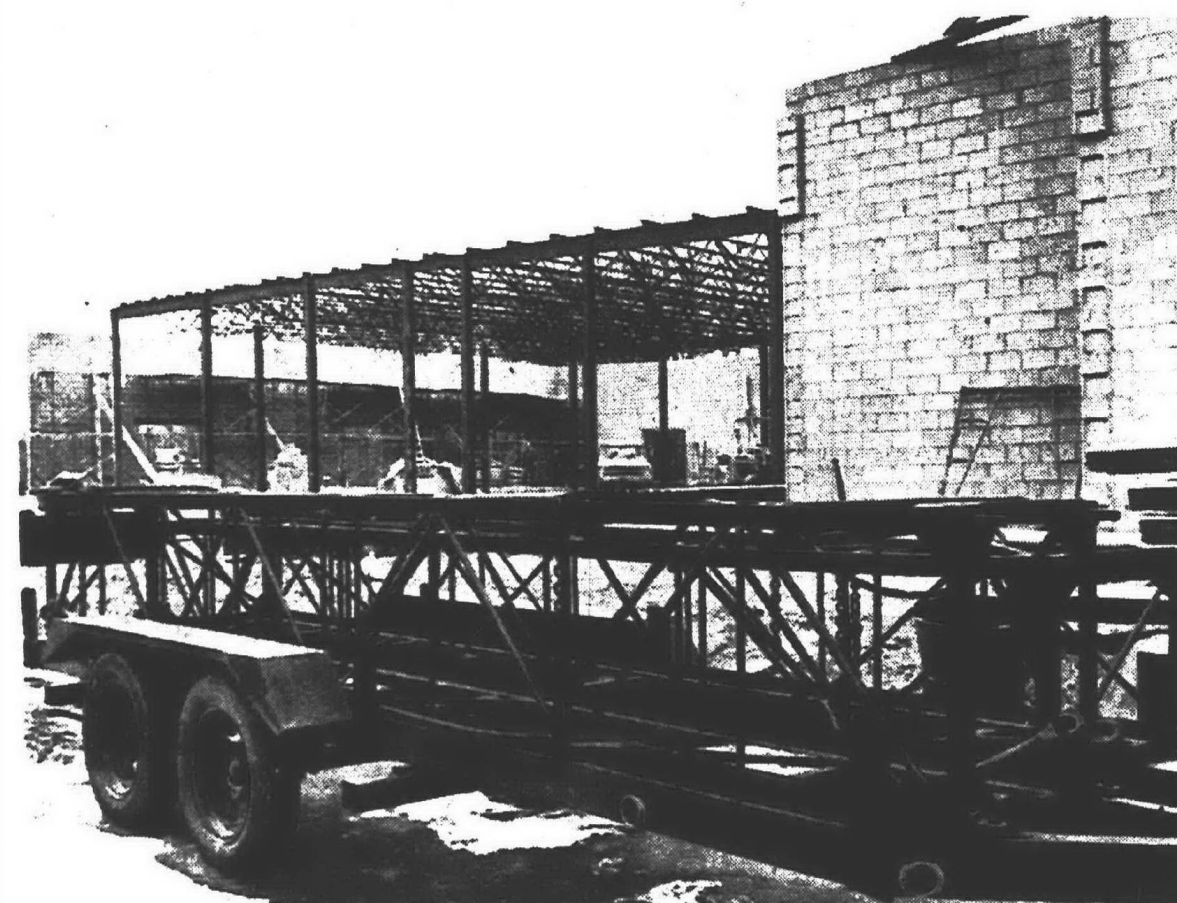

## Plymouth, Canton Building Booms To \$36 Million

Construction authorized in Greater Plymouth in 1971 soared to record heights and in the city and township of Plymouth, plus Canton Township, amounted to more than \$36 million, a compilation of building permit reports revealed this week.

Canton alone accounted for \$23 million of this, Plymouth Township adding \$8.7 million and the city \$4.3 million.

In contrast, the 1970 figures had been \$15 million for Canton, \$4.7 million in Plymouth Township and \$689,000 for the city.

Biggest individual projects for which permits were issued in 1971 were the Thunderbird-Hilton Motel at \$2.5 million on Northville Rd. in Plymouth Township and the \$1.4 million cultural and recreational center in the city. Both are now under construction.

NEW DWELLING units led the list in all three areas, with Canton approving 291 single-family homes along with multiples that totaled 662 living units.

Plymouth Township issued permits for construction of 138 new one-family homes last year, carrying a combined value of approximately \$3.5 million. These figures were up from 106 homes and \$2.4 million in 1970.

Among the township's overall total of 399 permits were 46 for swimming pools estimated at a combined value of \$103,000. The township had approved 41 new pools for \$77,000 the year before.

New commercial buildings were listed in the township report at \$504,000, five permits having been issued.

EVEN THOUGH the city is

extremely limited in the amount of space available for new housing, 11 single family homes were authorized in 1971 after only four had been approved in 1970. The value of the 11 is estimated at \$225,000.

Eight new multiple dwellings with a valuation of \$965,000 also were approved by the city.

Commercial permits totaled 23 with a value of \$2.8 million, the combined cultural and recreational project topping the list. This multi-purpose structure at Farmer and Theodore will give the community its first enclosed ice rink and also will include recreational rooms for many other purposes by groups of all ages.

The number of building permits issued by the city totaled 196 for the second straight year.

## Light Vote Seen In Twp. Election

No more than about a fourth of eligible voters can be expected to participate Tuesday in a Plymouth Township election involving two routine matters plus the controversial City of Plymouth Heights charter issue.

All registered voters in the entire township may cast ballots on Propositions B and C, but only those who live east of McClumpha Rd. may vote on Proposition A, which is the fifth submission of a Heights charter since 1959.

The question in "B" asks authorization for the township to dispose of a 1.3 acre parcel of land known as the McAllister Well Site. It is located near Five Mile and Northville Rds. and is an old water well operation for which the township no longer has need.

The township government cannot dispose of it without voter approval.

Proposition "C" is equally routine, asking that the franchise granted to Consumers Power Co. to provide gas service in the township be approved. It is a question which the law requires be submitted to the voters every 30 years and has now fallen due.

THE PROPOSED cityhood for all of the township area lying east of McClumpha is involved in the charter being submitted under Proposition "A." It is the only question on the ballot which has stirred any debate.

Incorporation of that area was approved in a 1959 election by a vote of 575 to 510 but cannot be effectuated without adoption of a municipal charter.

Proponents for the Plymouth Heights charter, which has gone down to overwhelming defeat on four previous occasions, say their prolonged 13-year efforts have been to avoid annexation

of any part of the township. Opponents call it a sham blocking serious consideration of any possible merger between the city and township.

FORMAL opposition to the charter proposal has been voiced by the local branch of the League of Women Voters and by the executive board of the Wayne 2nd District Democratic organization.

A statement this week from the latter body declared, "The service, safety and recreational needs of the residents of the community will best be served by consolidating the governmental units of the City of Plymouth and Plymouth Township."

The charter also is opposed by Supervisor Maurice Breen, although his predecessor, John D. McEwen, is the only candidate for mayor of Plymouth Heights. McEwen would take office only if the charter is adopted. Polls will be open Tuesday from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

### Errors Found In Assessment Notices Here

Computation errors have been made by Wayne County in many notices sent to Plymouth Township property owners notifying them of changes in assessments, Supervisor Maurice Breen said Thursday.

Breen added that when the township Board of Review

meets Monday and Tuesday he will recommend that 1971 assessment figures be retained except where there has been an actual physical improvement in the property.

"I want to get it across that there has not been an increase in assessments this year," said Breen. "Most of the

changes on the notices prepared by the county are small but persons who have received them are screaming and I don't blame them."

The notices went out in mid-week and the supervisor said he estimates there have been computation errors in least 800.

## Drug Abuse Program Gets \$2,000 City Aid

Financial aid of \$2,000 for the fiscal year beginning July 1 has been pledged by the Plymouth City Commission to the Council for Community Concerns which has been sanctioned as the official drug coordinating agency within the area.

The council is a recognized member of the Western Wayne County Drug Alliance and is asking similar financial help from Plymouth Township, Canton Township, Northville Township and the City of Northville.

Plymouth is represented on the council by Youth Officer Carl Berry who told commissioners that the local grants are needed to bolster efforts to obtain federal funds.

He said that the \$10,000 would enable the council to hire a director and to expand

its programming by establishing satellite centers in Canton and the Northville community. Operations now are headquartered at "Our House," 185 S. Harvey, a structure which has been donated for council use by its owner, Judge Dunbar Davis.

"WE ARE SURE that you recognize that drug abuse presents a severe crisis to the quality of life in our community, a crisis which cannot be ignored," Berry told the commission.

"The money we raise locally will go into a professional program of drug rehabilitation and to assist young people in job placement. Our budget now is only \$1,200 and our staff is made up totally of volunteers."

None of the other area governments mentioned by Berry has yet acted on the financial request.

POLICE CHIEF Timothy Ford added strength to Berry's plea to the commission by pointing out that the Plymouth officer has served as temporary chairman of the Western Wayne County Alliance. He is the only police officer on the board of that organization.

"This is in keeping with our philosophy that the police department must serve the community and do it in more ways than just arrest people," said Ford.

The commission's decision was unanimous to earmark the \$2,000 for the council in the 1972-73 budget.

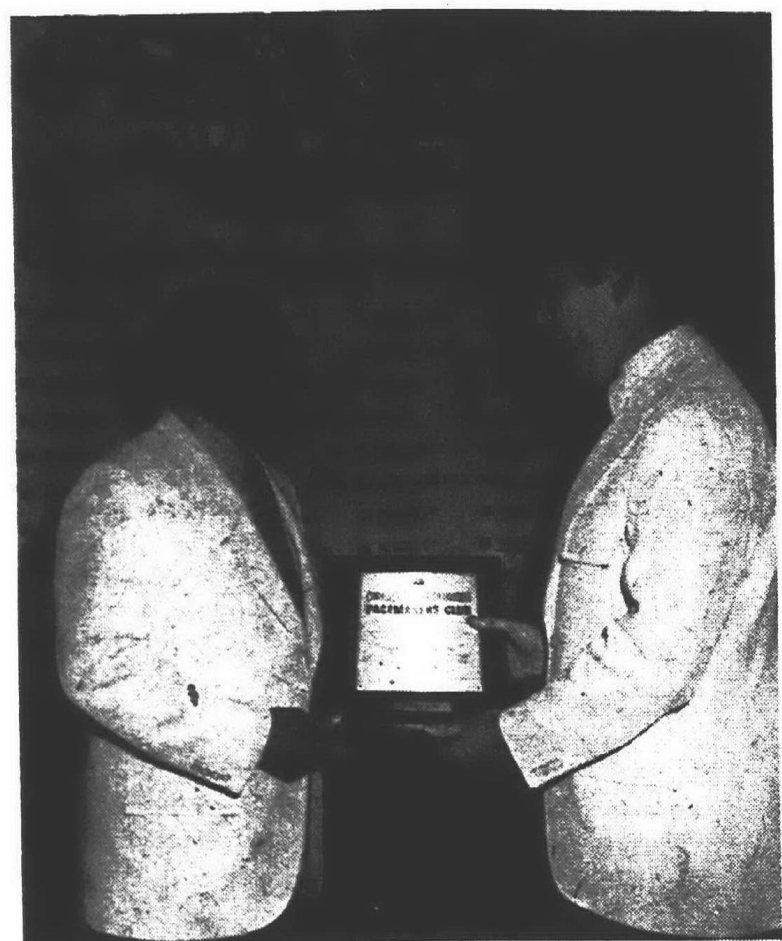

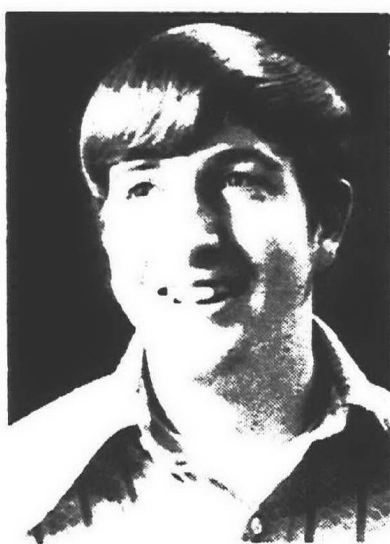

WHEN THE real Irish and the pseudo Irish observe St. Patrick's Day Friday, don't be amazed if you see City Manager Norman Michael Gaffney attired totally in green. Faith and begorra, this man practically considers St. Patrick's Day to be a personal possession and insists that all he touches with his wand share in the gaiety.

I am reminded of this impending observance by receipt of a letter from a pair of Chicagoans who have formed a committee to make St. Patrick's Day a legal holiday.

This is something that would be right down Gaffney's alley, and if he could accomplish it by executive decree, you can bet that he would. There are others, too, in our village who would fit well into this new campaign, notably the landlubbers of the Tonquish Creek Yacht Club.

I mention this because the way the Chicagoans put it, this sounds like the next best put-on to trying for that \$30 million in federal funds to connect Plymouth to the sea.

"Change Song," by Lee Hoffman, is a new science fiction offering. A fantasy about another world in which the elements control the actions of the people and are, in turn, controlled by the governing council of 12 nightmen. It's a strange eerie world, one of wraiths, familiar and magic powers, where the weather is running wild and the spells of the nightmen have suddenly become ineffective.

"The Hindenburg," by Michael Mooney is a minute-by-minute account of the final flight of the Nazi airship Hindenburg, filled with gripping suspense and growing fascination as undercover Luftwaffe officers and the crew try to prevent the sabotage of the great zeppelin while the passengers casually go about their lives, unaware of the deadly game about them and the disaster which threatens.

The friendship began on a winter evening in 1774 at the Opera Ball in Paris, when a lighthearted princess approached a youth of surpassing physical beauty. It ended for one of them at the scaffold in the Place de la Revolution in the famous death scene in French history, and for the other at the hands of an infuriated mob in a Stockholm square. 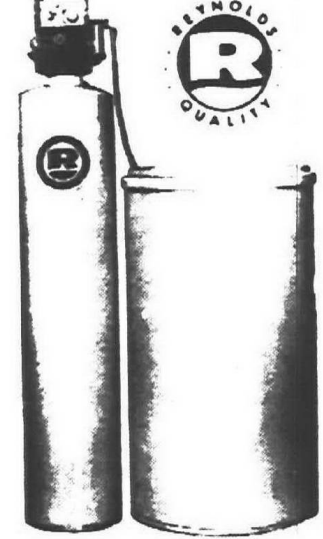

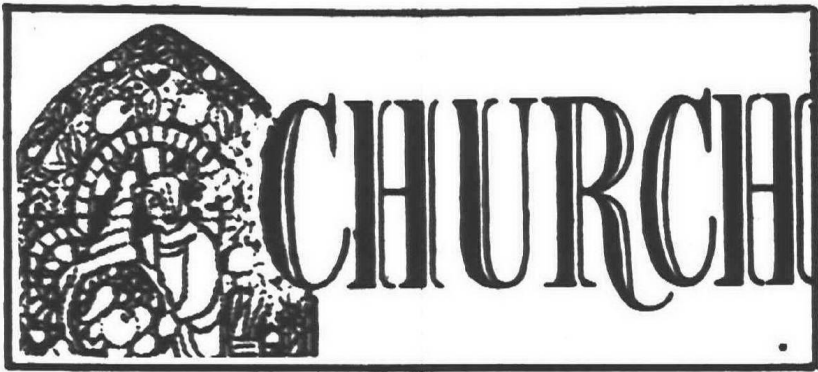

# Author-Professor To Lead Panel On Jewish Identity

Professor Simon Herman, author of "Israelis and Jews: The Continuity of an Identity," will lead a five man panel on Monday, March 13, at 8:30 p.m. in the Louis and Esther LaMed Auditorium of the United Hebrew Schools, 21550 W. 12 Mile Road, Southfield.

The panel will discuss "The Elements of Jewish Identity" sponsored by The American Jewish Committee, the Jewish Community Council and United Hebrew Schools.

Professor Herman, of Hebrew University in Jerusalem, will join panel participants George M. Zelzer, chairman of the Education Division of Jewish Welfare Federation; Rabbi David Lieberman, principal of Yeshiva Beth Yehudah; Dr. Benjamin Yapko, superintendent of United Hebrew Schools; and Rabbi Joel Poupko, director of Hillel Foundation at the University of Michigan.

Moderator for the panel will be Robert Kasle of the executive board of the Detroit Chapter of the American Jewish Committee.

The event is open to the public. Some of the issues raised by Professor Herman in his latest book are: What does being Jewish mean? What form is the Israeli-Jewish identity taking for the first generation of born Israelis and how does it differ from that of their parents? How strong are the bonds between them and the Jewish communities of the Diaspora?

It is these issues that will form the basis of his presentation when he appears in Detroit and Southfield as part of the panel discussion on Jewish Identity. His visit to the Detroit area begins with a visit to study groups which are part of the national American-Israel Education Program in Contemporary Jewish Civilization.

# Christ Is On Trial In Lutheran Lent Series

"Ladies and gentlemen of the jury: You have heard the testimony of Simon Peter, the prince of the disciples of rabbi Jesus, the man on whom He wants to build His church. "Judging by his own testimony, what kind of a man is he? He is a miserable coward, a bag of wind, a fraud. "And remember, Simon is not a loosely attached member of the church. He is Mr. Church."

SPEAKING is the prosecuting attorney in a "trial" going on during Lent in many Lutheran churches in Observerland and around the country.

The defendant in the trial is Jesus. In each segment of his trial he has a prosecuting and defending attorney, and in each there is a witness, friendly or hostile, who takes the stand.

Always, the congregation that gathers for Wednesday evening Lenten meetings serves as the jury. "Christ in on trial," explained the Rev. Joel Benbow, assistant pastor at Faith Lutheran Church in Livonia. "The witnesses for him are Peter, Nicodemus and Mary Magdalene, and then there are Judas and Caiaphas whom you might call hostile witnesses."

Members of the congregation in each church following the series take the parts of the witnesses. The attorneys are played by the pastors or by other laymen.

FOR EACH SEGMENT of the trial, there is a script distributed by Morse Press, the Lutheran publishing house that worked out the series, "We, The Jury." "The people taking the parts familiarize themselves with the script so they won't have to read," Rev. Benbow said. In Livonia, the series is a joint venture of five churches. Faith, All Saints, Sword of the Spirit, Holy Cross and Christ the King.

Each church has furnished one segment of the trial, and the witnesses and attorneys appear at a different church each week.

"That way," Rev. Benbow said, "the congregation members can attend Lenten services in their own churches and get a chance to meet clergy and laymen from the other churches."

TWO LUTHERAN churches in Farmington using the series are Antioch and Prince of Peace. The Rev. Carl Kaltreider of Antioch is playing the role of prosecuting attorney and the Rev. Victor Mesenbring of Prince of Peace is serving as defense attorney.

Several Lutheran pastors indicated the series is being well received.

"It's a relatively new thing in Lutheran churches to have this much participation by laymen," said the Rev. Roger Schlee of Faith. "This is new and interesting and the people seem to find it worthwhile."

The 26th annual Catholic Relief Overseas Aid Fund collection will be taken up in the Catholic churches of the Archdiocese of Detroit and throughout the nation on Sunday, March 12. The Rev. Kenneth Untener, deputy delegate for the clergy, is the 1972 campaign chairman for the archdiocese.

"It is very fitting that the overseas aid fund collection is taken up on the middle Sunday of Lent," said Fr. Untener. "This gives American Catholics a great opportunity to share generously, in the spirit of self-denial, with those who lack the necessities of life."

THIS YEARLY collection supports the emergency relief, social welfare and self-help programs operated by the Catholic Relief Services, the overseas aid and development agency of American Catholics, in 72 countries of Africa, Asia and Latin America.

Last year Catholic Relief Services (CRS) shipped over 483,000 tons of food, medicines, clothing and building materials that reached over 27 million impoverished men, women and children without regard to race, creed or color.

From March through December 1971, CRS provided over 70,000 tons of relief supplies, valued at \$11 million, to the East Pakistani refugees in India. Enriched bread was baked daily in Calcutta and distributed to 800,000 refugees.

On Feb. 18, a DC-8 jet chartered by CRS carried 38 tons of aluminum roofing, baby food, medicines, and a Jeep ambulance to Dacca, Bangladesh.

ALMOST FIVE MILLION school children in Africa, Asia, and Latin America receive daily lunches through the global feeding programs of CRS. For many of these children, it is their only meal of the day.

This "high and dry" symptom is what keeps people out of churches. It upsets a man to put himself out to attend worship on Sunday and then come out feeling just as dry as when he went in. After all, that is why he goes to church; to touch life, to have that God-sized vacuum inside filled with God's life!

Now certainly, all "Christ-ones" (Christians) are called to social responsibility within their areas of personal influence, but the mandate that Jesus left us is the divine solution to all social disease.

THE CHURCH does not have to be dry! God's purpose for the Church is that it is to contain and display the Life of Jesus! It is not a question of "how righteous am I?" Anyone can fake that. The real questions are - "Is there life in me?" and "When others meet me do they touch that life?"

THE REASON for this high and dry development is that the church has launched itself on a massive diversion from primary to secondary issues.

THAT MANDATE, the God-given primary issue of the church is the propagation of the gospel of Jesus.

When God is within, there is life.

By simply receiving Jesus into one's life, by a prayer of faith, man becomes reconciled with God and with men around him, whether the alienation be racial, economic, or social. Only God

Real God - life in a church cannot be faked! It cannot be explained! However, when you touch it, you know it is His. Church should be alive - not with activity only - with the life of God! Church is exciting!

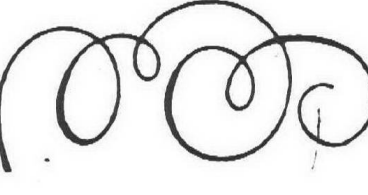

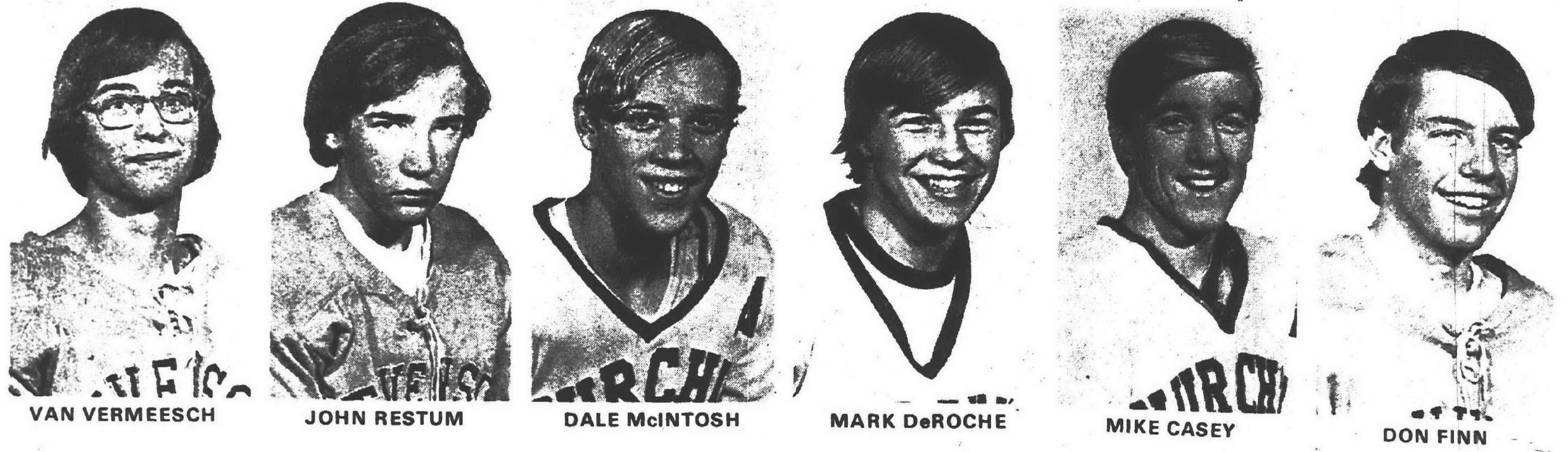

## Turf Tips, Quips

Spring is catching up with us rather quickly this year. Seems like we hardly celebrated the New Year before harness racing moves into the first major meeting of 1972, that opening at Wolverine Raceway next Thursday.

The 84 night campaign could well be one of the most important in recent years since it will be the first to attract big stables, fast horses and top drivers for the biggest purses offered in Michigan.

There is one major obstacle that must be hurdled before Thursday, the tracks and mutual clerks union have been busy negotiating for several weeks and from what information that has dribbled out of the meetings, they are just as far apart today as after the initial session.

A CONTRACT is of most importance for both groups. Wolverine Raceway wants to open on schedule without pressure. Hazel Park wants to continue operations without interruption, the union hopes for a settlement because it doesn't want to start picketing and it wants to keep its members employed.

Look for marathon negotiating meetings from now on as each group tries to solve the many problems.

Perhaps one of the biggest stumbling blocks is the recent action of the state legislature giving the tracks an additional one per cent of the mutual handle for operations.

The track managements, both for thoroughbreds and standardbreds, knew that half of the additional revenue would go to the horsemen for purses in contracts already in effect and they expected the unions would make demands that would eat up the other half.

They were right on both counts. Now the question is whether they will be able to reach an agreement with the unions that will allow management to retain a portion of the one per cent hike.

It could result in a costly stalemate. Any shutdown of the tracks by a strike would cost the horsemen purse money, the state revenue from the tax on wagering, the union members wages and on down the line with nobody gaining.

Michigan going back a few years when Northville Downs lost a 35 night late winter meeting, Wolverine Raceway lost 10 nights and the thoroughbreds a few days because of union activities and a dispute with the horsemen over purses.

It will be interesting to see what the next few days bring up. An agreement of some sort must be reached by Wednesday... remember, Wolverine is slated to open Thursday night.

MEANWHILE, HORSES started pouring into Wolverine Friday morning and by Monday most of the 1,200 stalls will be filled. That is with the exception of those allotted to stables shipping in from Pompano Park and from California.

Racing Secretary Bill Connors will make the first draw Monday morning and expects to have a full entry box with more than enough to make the opening card one of the best in recent years.

Bill flew in from Pompano Park and expects to have his complete staff on hand within a few days.

## DKC Show At Cobo Has 3,402 Entries

The Detroit Kennel Club's 54th annual all-breed dog show, which will be held at Cobo Hall Sunday, March 12, has drawn a record-shattering enrollment of 3,402 dogs from 114 breeds.

This smashes the previous all-time Michigan high of 3,295 dogs from 112 breeds for the DKC show two years ago. The entry was limited to 2,500 last year.

"The DKC show will be the biggest one-day show in North America in 1972," predicts Chris Teeter, DKC president. "We will use 24 rings for the judging, which will start at 8:00 a.m."

The Afghan Hound tops the list this year with 189 of this unusual and exotic dogs. This is the greatest number of dogs from any breed in DKC annals. The old record was 171 Afghans in 1970.

The Borzoi is second with

141, followed by Poodles with 139, Doberman Pinschers with 138, Irish Setters with 114, Newfoundland with 111, German Shepherds and Dalmatians with 89 each, St. Bernards with 87, Collies with 83 and Alaskan Malamutes with 80.

All the popular breeds will be well represented in the show. So will many of the uncommon breeds, including Rottweilers, Rhodesian Ridgebacks, Salukis, Whippets, Vizslas and Belgian Terriers.

This will be a benched show. Dogs will be required to remain on their benches from 11:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. when they are not in the show ring.

The show will include conformation judging, obedience trials, and special exhibitions of obedience training and police work with dogs.

# It's GC East Against Northwestern For Cage Regional Championship

The Bulldogs were on the cage tourney prowl but the Garden City East Panthers tightened the leash and ran Bentley out of the state tournament with a 58-51 regional victory.

This marks the third time in five years that East Coach Billy Joe Young has guided his cagers into the regional final, Saturday at Livonia Franklin, 8 p.m. (March 11).

East was upset last year in the championship by Livonia Stevenson, 74-62, and was toppled by Catholic Central in the state quarterfinals in 1968, 77-59.

Bentley was carrying an overall mark of 15-5 after tourney wins over North Farmington and Stevenson. East was 15-4 after a rather easy district romp over Franklin, Churchill, and Plymouth.

THE PANTHERS won the opening tip yet failed to score on three trips up and down the court with each team suffering from early moment jitters.

After three minutes of fruitless shooting, East's Jeff DeHarte popped in a two pointer. Bentley's Ron Bawulski responded and the two pumped in another round of buckets to notch it at four-all.

With five minutes elapsed, Bentley's Tim Bollin provided the Bulldog fans with a scene they weren't going to enjoy for long... the lead.

BOLLIN HIT from the corner and Bentley went up, 6-4. Dave Jackson tied it but again Bollin put the Bulldogs in front, 8-6. Jack Hayes rebounded for East with a tip-in, DeHarte scored and John Grigal followed suit and the Panthers were on top, 12-8, and never fell behind again.

With four seconds remaining in the quarter, Jackson hit on a layup and East was up after one quarter, 14-10.

The second period saw each side pump in 14 points with Bentley working for the good shot in its attempt to slow the pace.

The Bulldogs were very much alive at this point, trailing by only four at the half, 25-24.

"I was satisfied at the half," said Bentley Coach John Farrar. "But I knew that we had to stick to our game plan. 'We weren't putting enough pressure on Jackson but it was still anyone's ball game.'"

EAST won the second half tip and Randy Mastako scored to put the Panthers up by six.

Jackson popped in a 12 footer and Hayes scored on a drive and the Panthers were on the rampage, 34-24. Hayes hit from the line and Bollin finally opened the second half scoring for Bentley with a freethrow and it stood, 35-25.

Jackson then outbattled Bollin for four points. Bollin was forced to leave after picking up his fourth foul and East was up by 14 points, 39-25.

DAN WEISS connected on the first field goal for the Bulldogs midway in the quarter, but without Bollin in the lineup, Jackson took control and East was up after three quarters, 48-31.

The Bulldogs didn't stay in the doghouse... they opened the fourth quarter with eight straight points by Al Siterlet, (his only eight of the game), and the margin was sliced to 48-39.

Grigal fouled out for Bentley and there was a East "hope" twinkling somewhere in the Franklin gym. Gates scored with one minute remaining to narrow it to 56-49, but Bollin picked up his

fifth foul and the twinkling appeared a little dimmer.

GATES sank two freethrows with 30 seconds remaining but Jackson broke in all alone for a Panther bucket and with 15 seconds remaining, East was in command, 58-51.

Gates came back with a final two pointer and the final buzzer sounded with Bentley packing up its gear for next season.

East outshot Bentley, 46 per cent to 42 per cent, with the Panthers hitting on 22 of 47 from the floor and the Bulldogs popping in 21 of 50.

The Panthers held a commanding advantage on the boards, outbounding Bentley 33-20, with Grigal hauling in 12 and Jackson collecting 11.

"We have played better defensive games," said East Coach Young. "But our change from a 2-3 setup to a 1-3 proved to be the turning point in our favor."

Jackson led all scorers with 30 points, hitting on 13 of 20 from the floor and making good four of 10 at the line.

The grant can be used to cover up to half of any one performer's fees.

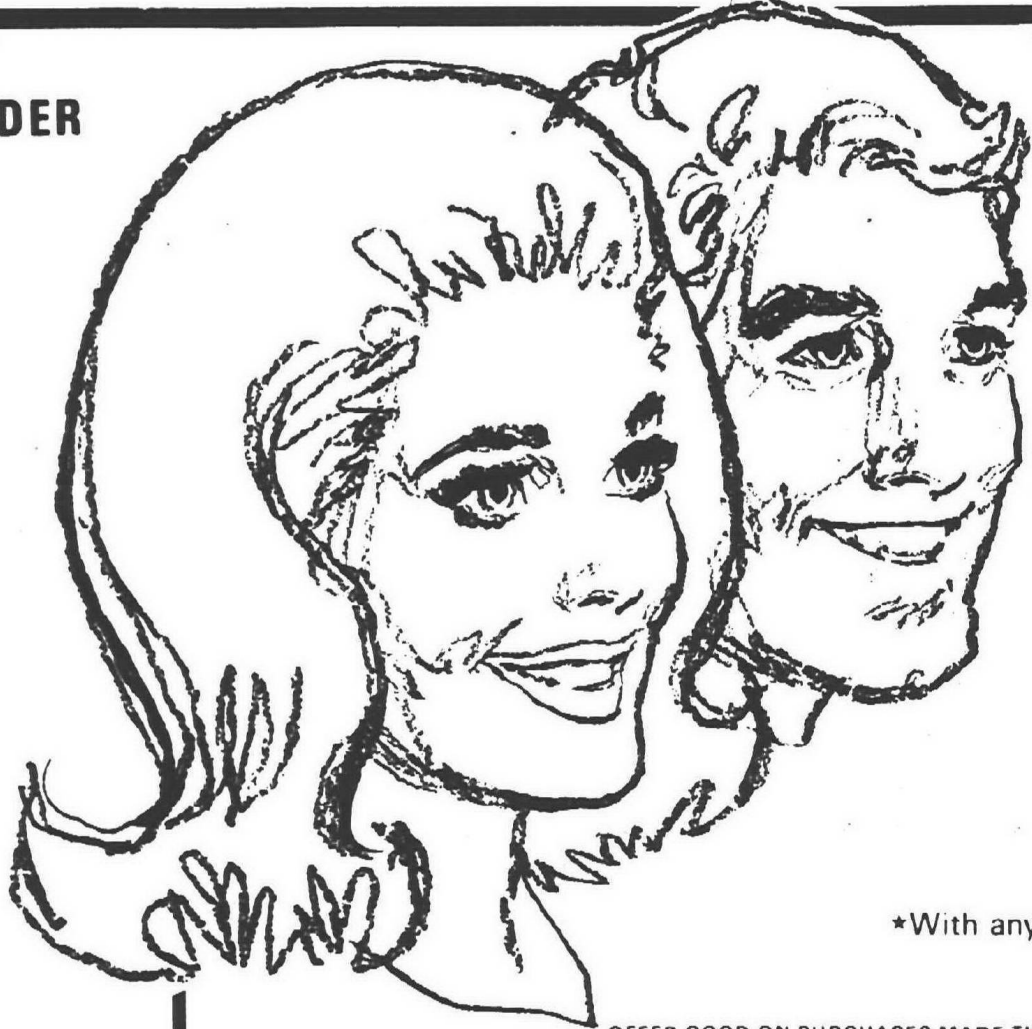

George Peppard and Julie Harris will not be acting in the 1972 Metropolitan Detroit Community Theater Festival this week, but a few years ago they might have been according to festival chairman Shirley Harbin.

Peppard once acted with the Dearborn Players and Miss Harris was with the Grosse Pointe Theater.

With two theater groups competing, Observerland has many possibilities for acting honors. It also has one actor who will be competing twice.

RUSS VOGEL of Livonia is appearing in the Wayne-Westland Civic Theater's production of the comedy, "Adaptation," Saturday evening (March 18). In it, he plays The Contestant in a "this-is-your-life" type of show. Vogel describes it as a play "which pokes fun at everything and everybody."

March 16, he dons another hat and another personality, when he appears as King Henry II's favorite but rather dull son, John, in the Livonia-Redford Theater Guild's dramatic comedy, "The Lion in Winter."

Vogel, who graduated from Franklin High School last year, is a multi-talented youth who is planning a career in front of the footlights and behind a camera.

With help and encouragement from his stepfather, he's been laying the foundations for the future, including doing some acting on local television and writing a play. Unlike many parents, who would have some qualms about a stage career, Vogel's family is heartily in favor of it. Maybe this is because Vogel's stepfather is band-leader Lennie Schick, a long-

time favorite in night clubs.

VOGEL'S PLANS for the immediate future include mounting his original children's play, "Guess Who We're Having for Dinner?" and touring it in local schools. According to Vogel, the play is a "freaked out" fantasy, loosely based on the story of Hansel and Gretel. He also hopes to get it produced on television.

Vogel wants to study cinematography, and eventually produce children's shows for network television.

He'd like to aim them at what he calls "a neglected group," children between the ages of eight and 14. According to him, small children have "Sesame Street," and the over-14s can watch adult programs, but there's nothing for this age group.

As far as his acting career is concerned, he would "rather do stage than TV. I like playing around with audiences, especially audiences at children's shows."

He most recently appeared in the Wayne-Westland production of the children's play "Many Moons," and two years ago, he was in the LRTG's "Sleeping Beauty." Some time this year, Vogel is planning to go to New York City. Whether or not he comes home from the festival with an award, his Detroit experience should be a help when he starts his tour of casting offices.

## In Theater Festival They'll Try For \$1,600

Two Observerland theater groups are putting finishing touches on productions this week, hoping to bring home some \$1,600 in prize money from Detroit.

Also in the cast are Kati Beedow, Warren Reinecker, Russ Vogel, J. Craig Collicott and Hamilton Aldridge Jr. Mary Ann Vosgerchian is the director.

The Wayne-Westland group is presenting "Adaptation," a one-act comedy by Elaine May on Saturday, March 18. Directed by Rosemary Moorehead, the cast includes Ed Moorehead, Russ Vogel, Carol Katz, Al LaCroix, Larry

## Tsar's Family Life Is Subject Of 'Nicholas'

Had he been strong and understanding, Tsar Nicholas II of Russia could have changed the fate of the country he loved.

The reasons he didn't change that fate are the subject of the film "Nicholas and Alexandra."

The film concentrates on the personal lives of "Nicky" and his German wife "Sonny" and especially the cruel illness of their only son and heir which dominates them. Tsarevich Alexis was born with hemophilia.

THE FAMILY'S desperate efforts to keep Alexis alive lead to episodes with the monk Gregory Rasputin and to Nicholas' obliviousness of the revolution that builds around him.

The movie misses its chance for excellence by never getting into the revolution and the heart of events that culminated in the deaths of millions and a new tide in history.

It also underplays the influence of Rasputin, who had a heavy hand in the fall of the 300-year-old Romanov dynasty.

Because Sonny believes Rasputin can keep her son alive, she becomes dominated

by the monk and in turn influences her weak-willed husband. Before long, all Rasputin's idiotic friends are in powerful positions, and Nicholas' autocracy crumbles below him with hardly a whimper.

But it would have much more significance if the viewer were given more than just a glimpse of men like Kerensky, Lenin, Trotsky and Stalin and events like the massacre outside the Winter Palace which were the pulse of the time.

Despite its shortcomings, the movie is interesting and easy to follow and reveals the "other side" of the man and his family who are murdered in the end.

## You Don't Have To Look Like A Kid Anymore -- Unless, Of Course, You Are.

An interesting thing is happening in fashions. There are fashions for kids and there are fashions for adults this spring. People can once again look their age without fear of being out of it. All ages are in style.

According to the 1970 census, most Americans are over 25 years old. (The median age in Oakland county is 26, in Wayne county, 28.) Youth worship is fading and as the country's biggest population block -- all those post-war babies -- moves into its late 20s the image of Mr. and (Miss, Mrs. Ms?) Superchic has lost its baby-fat and shows a few wrinkles.

Designers spring fashions, those who cater to the established, monied crowd, both male and female, project the image a mature, modern person.

Designers have been trying to do this for over a year, rummaging through the apparel of the 40s and 50s, dusting off padded shoulders, midi-skirts, seamed nylons and red lipstick for women and costuming men to look like an Edwardian courtier, Hollywood gangster or the Red Baron.

Young people who didn't want to look like the stars of the late night movies clung to their mini-skirts, bell-bottoms and levis. Then there was counter-culture garb, gleaned from Army surplus stores, anything that looked like it had been worn "by the people" for at least three generations.

Hot pants were a welcome relief last spring. Youthful, exciting, they drew almost the same reaction from conservative employers as the mini did several years before.

Several simple, tasteful and well accepted styles emerged in fall fashions. The knee length skirt looks good on most women and the mini is still around for those who can wear it. Men's clothes, which had broken out in a box of colors and ruffles, began to settle down.

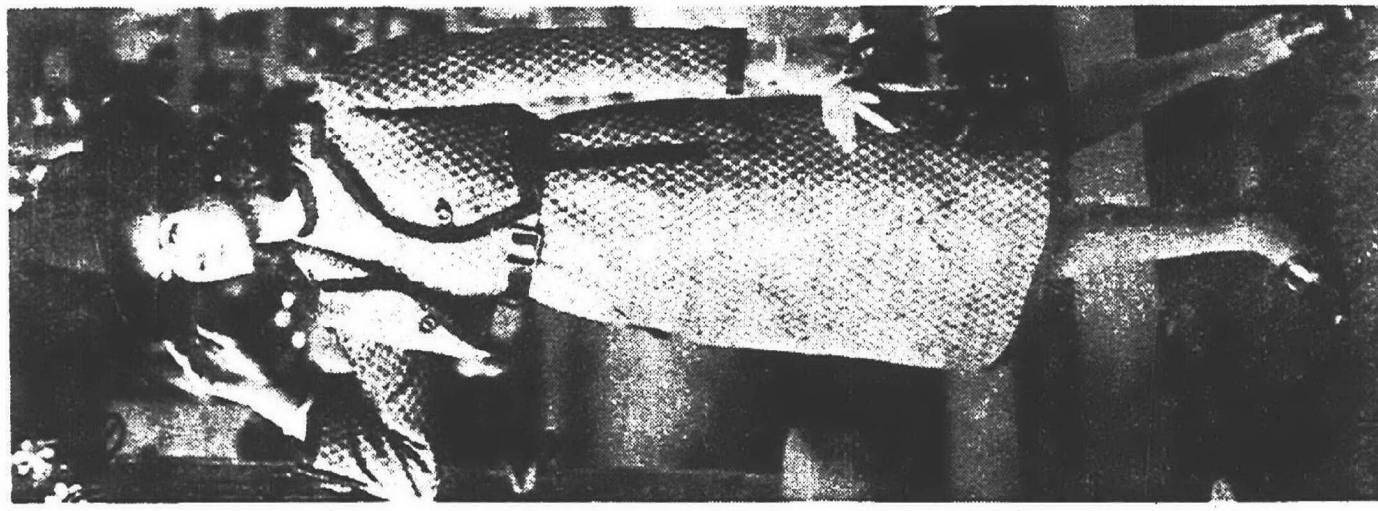
Spring fashions on the whole are contemporary designs, rather than period costumes. The best of them combine versions of the time honored suit, coat, dress and pant styles with elements of the more successful youth fads.

Denim, for example, the badge of the worker adopted by the radicals as the badge of the revolution, has

been copied by businessmen. The businessman's denim is the stretch, brushed variety often dyed a patriotic red, white or blue or an ecological earth color.

The impossible-to-wear-a-bracket halter dress, available in any boutique last year, was one of the dominant items in the Paris couture collections this spring.

There are a number of extreme styles on the market like Ferraud's four-inch high heels for women and a white jumpsuit-with-tails-tuxedo for men (which led its model to quip, "I feel like an albino penguin"). But for the most part men's and women's spring styles seem to concentrate on simplicity and comfort.

An area women's store owner said younger teens (12, 13 and 14) buy only casual, comfortable clothes.

"They don't even wear dresses to school any more," she said.

She carries brightly colored slacks, shrinks and halter tops -- proper party attire for a young teen.

Older teens (15 and over) are more sophisticated, she said. They enjoy brightly flowered ankle length halter dresses for parties and long or short skirts as well as slacks for day.

Teens haven't accepted the

knee length skirts which their mothers are welcoming back with open arms, Mrs. Rath said.

"They either wear skirts long or short," she said. "They don't go for in-between."

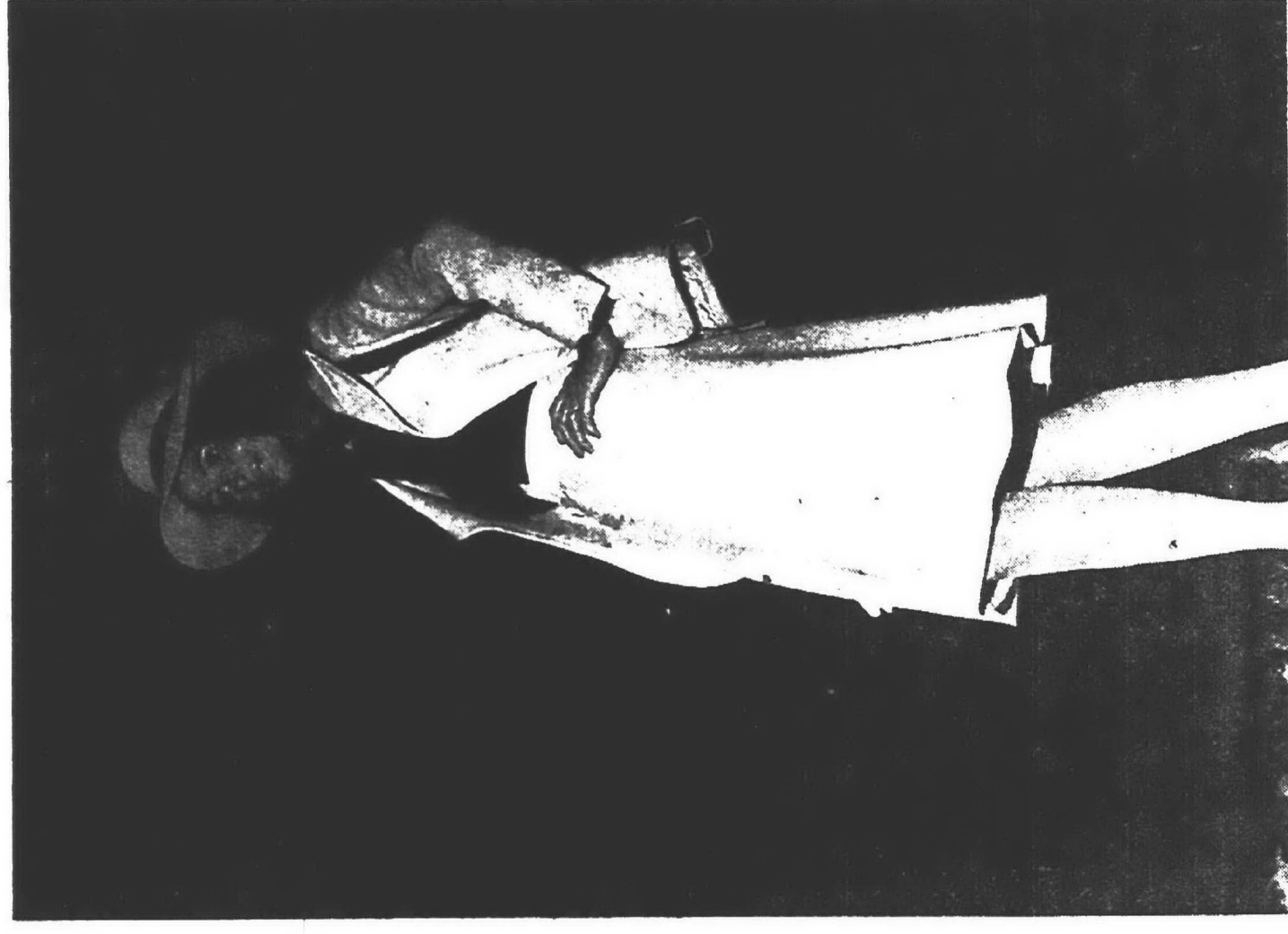
On the whole teen-age fashions tend to be wilder, more faddish and this year sexier, than men's and women's fashions.

"Junior fashions are about a year behind women's fashions," she said, "and children's fashions are about a year behind juniors."

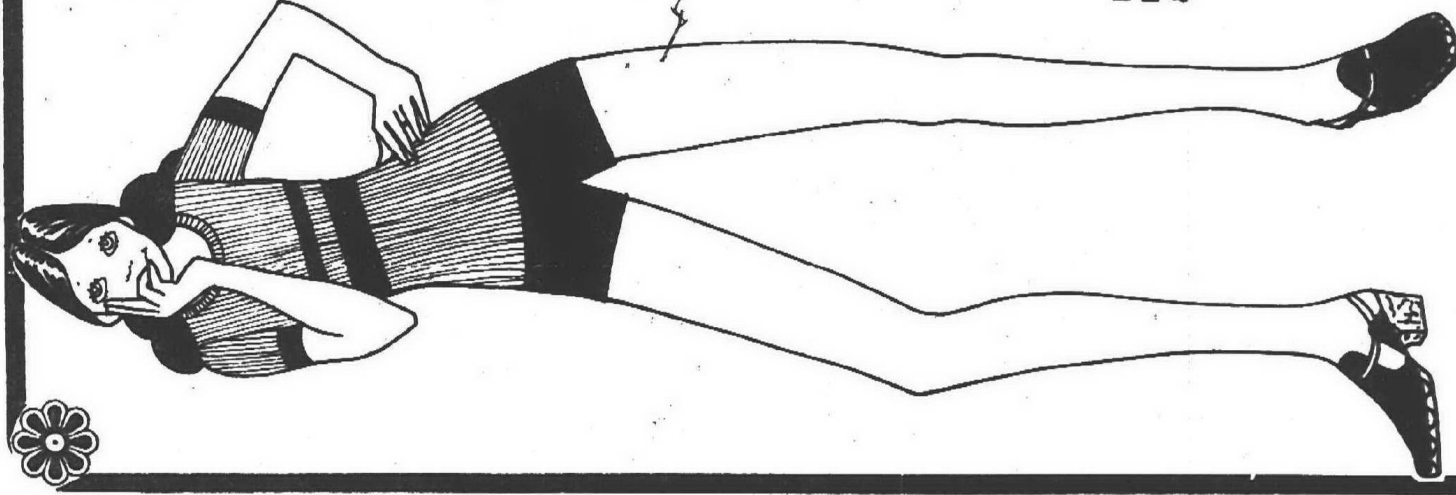
