### Dr. Clark Dies In Prison Fall

Dr. Ronald E. Clark, 61, former Farmington Township physician, died Thursday morning in Jackson State Prison when he fell 30 feet from a fifth floor corridor to a concrete floor below.

Clark was serving sentences for the deaths of Mrs. Grace Neil of Livonia and Mrs. Hannah Bowerbank of Detroit, both former nurses of his. The courts found Clark guilty in the deaths of both for administering an overdose of sodium pentothal (truth serum).

Jackson Prison Lieutenant Jesse Worth said Clark apparently fainted and slipped beneath the iron safety rail. State Police report there are two eye-witnesses to the incident. Clark had been suffering from a bleeding ulcer, but cause of the fainting is unknown at this point.

Mrs. Violet Clark, the doctor's widow, says she and attorney James E. Wells of Southfield have several questions about why the ailing prisoner was allowed to be kept in the top tier of cells.

Wells, who defended Clark in the Mrs. Bowerbank manslaughter trial, said he would raise these questions at the coroner's inquest to be held Monday before a six-man coroner's jury in Jackson County.

Wells claims Clark had been harassed by prisoners and was frequently approached by homosexual inmates. A letter he wrote to his wife on Thursday indicated the doctor was in good spirits, says Mrs. Clark.

### Nostalgia Marks Beyer Sale

On one wall was a souvenir calendar given to the customers in 1920. On another was a full page ad taken from the Plymouth Mail in 1921 lauding the performance of the old Edison phonograph. And all over the place there were reminders of a by-gone day when Beyer's Pharmacy was one of the most popular places in Plymouth.

Now, amid these bits of nostalgia, Bob Beyer, the smiling pharmacist, leaned back in his chair, grinning from ear to ear.

"Wait till you hear the arguments now," he chuckled as he revealed the terms of the impending sale of the two Beyer Rexall stores. "They'll be arguing over the old question — which is the oldest continuing business in Plymouth."

"I can just hear Bud Schrader, the McLarens and even Ralph Lorenz up at the Mayflower putting in claims for the honor."

The, with a sly wink, he added, "What they'll be forgetting is that the two stores still will carry the name Beyer Rexall Drugs and should be entitled to the honor — regardless of who owns them."

BOB POINTED to a large certificate presented to him by the Plymouth Historical Society at the time of the Plymouth Centennial in 1967, certifying that the Beyer Pharmacy was started more than 100 years ago and that it was the oldest continuing business in Plymouth.

"That's enough for me," Bob said. "Up to then I was advertising that we were 50 years old. But with the Historical Society certificate I quickly changed that to 100 years."

According to the research done by the society, The Stroller learned that the pharmacy was established by Dr. John Meiler as an apothecary shop on Liberty Street in 1865 and was taken over by Otto Beyer, Bob's father, who also was an apothecary, in 1905.

"The shop remained there until I moved it over to Main Street in 1960," Bob explained in tracing the history of the institution.

"Dad died in the fall of 1941, shortly before Pearl Harbor, and I bought it from my mother in 1947. She passed away a year later."

"So, you see," he went on, "this has been a continuous business for much more than 100 years. Let the others

argue. I'll stick by the Historical Society."

THE QUESTION, "Which is the oldest business in Plymouth?" always has stirred a debate. That's why Bob is laughing now, knowing that it will start again.

If you drive along Main Street, as you approach the railroad you'll see the McLaren sign, saying "Since 1900." Schrader often has intimated that the Schrader Funeral Home, founded by his father, is the oldest "continuing business, and Lorenz always has filed a claim as the individual who has done business in the same location for the longest time — a matter of 40 years.

"Let them argue," Beyer smiled, "the Beyer Rexall Drugs has been established as the oldest continuing business. It has been in our family since 1905, but was started 40 years before that."

THE BIG question in Bob's mind now is not which business is the oldest, but what he will do to keep active.

"I've been in pharmacy all of my life," he vouched. "I graduated from Ferris State College as a pharmacist and have known nothing else. Even the three years I spent in the Navy were in the pharmacy."

"Both my wife and I like boats and maybe I'll try to get established in that line. I don't know — but that's what I've been thinking."

Through the years, Bob claims Main Street and Plymouth haven't changed very much. He still lives in the old house on Mill in which he was born.

"And I still see many of the fellows I went to school with, so really things haven't changed much, if any."

"The biggest change," he chuckled, "will come now when I start looking for a job — for the first time in my life."

## Twp. Pact Gives 10% Pay Boost

After a year of off and on bargaining sessions, Plymouth Township's Board of Trustees and its fire force have agreed to a one-year contract which already is within five weeks of its April 30 expiration date.

Except for the first two wage categories which cover the first year of employment, firemen receive straight 10 per cent wage hikes under the new pact, which is retroactive to last June 30.

Back pay currently is being calculated for the period of July 1 to Aug. 15, when the wage-price freeze went into effect, and for the period of Nov. 13, when the freeze was lifted, to the present.

Township officials said they do not expect the wage terms to be negated by the federal government, even though they are above the recommended 5.5 per cent level, because the contract was worked out in consort with a state-appointed mediator.

sergeant now becomes \$11,880 compared to the previous figure of \$10,800. After six months at that rank, the sergeant category increases to \$12,210 whereas it formerly was \$11,100.

**FIRE CHIEF** James Gignac has a full-time force of nine men: six regular firemen, two sergeants and one acting sergeant. He has asked the board for authorization to hire three more firemen plus a fire inspector and this will be decided when the trustees meet Tuesday night to consider the township's 1972-1973 fiscal budget.

In addition to granting raises in salaries, the trustees sanctioned greater longevity pay and an increase in the clothing allowance in their unanimous approval of the 1971-72 fire contract.

The prolonged bargaining between the board and representatives of Local 1496 of the International Association of Fire Fighters had been punctuated by confusion resulting from the wage-price freeze, and by the local's demand last August that the matter be submitted to binding arbitration.

Although the Michigan Employment Relations Commission appointed Atty. Robert G. Howlett of Detroit as arbitrator in the dispute, the eventual terms principally were the work of direct talks between department representatives and the board's team of Supervisor Maurice Breen and Trustee Frank Millington.

Already, however, the board has been asked officially by the fire fighters local to name its representatives to engage in new negotiations on the 1972-73 contract — and this, too, is a decision which the board has promised to make Tuesday.

The attitude of the board, as expressed in last week's session, is to retain a professional labor negotiator instead of trying to conduct negotiations on its own.

The new township contract retains a starting salary of \$8,200 as it was before, but the figures go up at every following level.

After six months, the guaranteed salary is upped from \$8,500 to \$9,000, an increase of 5.88 per cent. All other jumps are 10 per cent.

After one year, the salary is now \$10,120 compared to a previous \$9,200; after two years, \$10,780 instead of \$9,800, and after three years, \$11,660 instead of \$10,600.

It will be a scholarship benefit concert, with proceeds supporting scholarship funds of both orchestras. Ticket donations will be \$2 for adults and \$1 for students, and tickets are available at most music stores and pharmacies in the Plymouth area as well as from symphony members.

The Michigan Youth Symphony will be under the baton of Norval Withrow, a member of the university music faculty. The group's repertoire includes many of the major works for symphony orchestra.

The Plymouth orchestra will be directed by H. Michael Endres and during its half of the program these selections will be performed:

"Finale from the 5th Symphony," by Beethoven; "Brahm's First Symphony, Fourth Movement," "Berceuse and Finale" from the "Firebird Suite," by Stravinsky; highlights from "West Side Story," by Bernstein, and "Scarborough Fair."

Assistant director of the Plymouth orchestra is Dr. Carlyle Hume, of the music faculty at West Middle School.

## Plymouth Police OK 4-10 Plan

PLYMOUTH  
Plymouth police, who have been working under a 10-hour-day, four-day week schedule since the beginning of the year, probably will continue with the plan.

While the formal evaluation of "The 10 Plan" is not due until April 8, when Police Chief Timothy Ford will compile statistics on the 90-day trial period of the four-day work week, both the Plymouth Police Officers Association and Ford have indicated they prefer the plan.

The PPOA voted unanimously March 10 to support the plan and the platoon system which was implemented to insure 24-hour a day coverage every day.

In a letter to Ford, PPOA President William W. Fletcher said, "The response to this type of work schedule from the association membership was a unanimous vote that we accept this type of schedule on a permanent basis."

The police chief told The Mail and Observer he also favors the plan because it has resulted in a significant drop in overtime and sick time and has increased training time. He also credited the plan with the development of a chain of command within the department.

"I think I'm going to recommend to the city that we continue the 10 Plan for the rest of the contract year," Ford said. The contract year expires June 30.

"After that we'll see what the budget holds for us," Ford said.

Under an agreement between the city and the PPOA, parts of the policemen's contract that dealt with the eight-hour day, five-day week-work schedule have been put aside.

The city commission has said it will base its decision to make the 10 Plan permanent on the reports from Ford and the PPOA. If the new plan is adopted, it would mean that the city and the police union would have to agree on a revision to their current contract.

THROUGH BIFOCALS

IT WAS just two years ago Friday -- March 24, 1970 -- that the electors of this city decided that Plymouth should join the Detroit water system, which finally came to pass slightly less than four months ago. As you know, this was accompanied by approximately a 50 per cent increase in the rates.

Well, guess what.

When Our Leaders assemble for a city commission committee of the whole meeting Monday night, one of the topics up for discussion will be a written proposal from Mayor James B. McKeon that the rates be increased again -- now.

The mayor, with some support from his colleagues, asserts that an adequate surplus to meet the city's objective of covering all bonds by Jan. 1, 1976 can not be built up under the present rate structure. He suggests a very small increase for householders, but still an increase, and that the city really sock it to major industrial water users.

His Mayorship will not have easy sailing. Some commissioners are opposed to any increase until it is demonstrated that McKeon's financial doodling proves accurate, and some think it's just poor timing.

THE PICTURE is complicated by several factors. Not the least is a warning from the Detroit Water Board that it may raise the price next fall for the water it provides to the suburbs by as much as 15 or 20 per cent.

It doesn't take any wizard to figure out what the commission probably would do in that case. That the increase will be passed on to consumers in all municipalities hit by the Detroit action is a foregone conclusion.

Then, too, Our Leaders are thinking about requiring installation of outdoor meter - reading devices at all homes, which will mean another bite out of John Q. Citizen's pocketbook if the plan actually is approved.

At the root of it all is the indisputable fact that the city's No. 1 customer -- the Burroughs Corp. plant -- has gone steadily downhill in water usage. This means that revenue anticipated from Burroughs simply is not coming in and, in the words of the mayor, "Nothing I hear indicates Burroughs consumption will improve."

In a nutshell, this means that sooner or later the rest of us are going to have to pick up the slack.

SEVERAL WEEKS AGO the commission gave first reading to an amendment to the water ordinance that would change the billing pattern from a bi-monthly schedule to a quarterly system. Final adoption has been stalled while Our Leaders wrestle with the money issue, for if rates are to be changed it might as well all be done at one fell swoop.

It has been the city's objective to operate the water department on a rate schedule that would yield a surplus in excess of \$30,000 a year to get rid of bond payments by '76.

McKeon's arithmetic calculates the annual surplus at about \$10,000 the way things stand at the moment, but some members of the administration say his slide rule is all wet. What the mayor wants is to put the rates at a level where the \$30,000 - plus target can be assured, even if the city has to face a court challenge in the process.

Commissioner Harold Guenther commented a few days ago, "It isn't good business if we have a surplus of only \$4,000 or \$5,000 a year. This is nothing but breaking even."

On the other hand, Commissioner Norbert Battermann has announced himself as opposed to any increase at this time, calling it "poor policy." Monday's meeting will be just an informal talk session, but the matter could come to a vote April 3. Right now it's difficult to predict which philosophy will prevail.

The program is predicated on the number of students who volunteer to take physical education during the summer. If 80 to 100 students volunteer, the classes will likely be offered according to acting Supt. John Hoben.

The summer classes were suggested to alleviate some of the demands on the physical education facilities which will be utilized by most of the students.

The cost of offering the summer classes is estimated at \$3,800.

# Farmington Clan Braids Palms For The Cardinal

Palms for the cardinal on Palm Sunday are a tradition for Farmington's Frederick Wenson family.

A tradition that the Wenson clan intends to keep going a long time.

Their palms are not the ordinary strips of green associated with the age-old rites of Palm Sunday.

Each is a complete branch, with most of the leaves intricately braided into rosettes and flowerets to make it a thing of beauty.

THE DAY BEFORE each Palm Sunday, Wenson delivers two freshly braided palms to the Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament in Detroit for Cardinal John Dearden and one of the bishops to carry in the walk that begins the celebration of Holy Week.

"We make them only for the cardinal," said Wenson, who learned the craft from his mother and is passing it on to his six children. "The only other person I would consider making one for is the pope, and this it would have to be as a gift from the cardinal."

The story of the beautifully-braided palms goes back more than half a century to the days when Wenson's mother, the late Mrs. Katherine Wenson, was a small girl in one of Detroit's Catholic schools.

"The nuns had taught her class some elementary methods of braiding palms. I guess as a means of putting to use the palm leaves all Catholic children receive on Palm Sunday," her son said.

SHE KEPT WORKING at the craft, and as she grew up her creations became more intricate, he added. When she married and had children in Catholic schools, there were more palms to braid.

"By the time I was in eighth grade," Wenson remembers. "We were living in the Blessed Sacrament parish and my mother used to send braided palms back to the school. My teacher, Sister Ludmilla, was in charge of decorating the altar and asked if my mother would consider making some of her braided palms for the occasion. Mother said she would be honored."

The whole family pitched in to work on two large palms and several smaller ones, Wenson said. Cardinal Edward Mooney carried them in the Palm Sunday procession, and from then on the Wenson palms were an annual part of Palm Sunday at Blessed Sacrament Cathedral.

After Cardinal Mooney's death the palms still were gratefully received by his successor, Archbishop Dearden, later to become the second cardinal to head the Detroit archdiocese. Frederick Wenson and his sister worked with their

parents on the project each year. He got away from palm-braiding after he went into the service, but started helping his mother again after she began being troubled with arthritis. Since her death three years ago he and his family, who attend Mass at Our Lady of Sorrows, have been the palm braiders.

WENSON PICKS UP his palm branches a week before

Palm Sunday. This year he and the family did most of the work in two or three days -- he took a couple of days off from his manufacturer's representative job.

"We now make about 16 different kinds of roses and other flowers," he said, "and we keep developing new ones."

The finished palms must be kept damp until they are delivered to the cathedral.

"We just fill the bathtub and

stick them in," Wenson said. "and take showers the week before Palm Sunday."

Besides the makings for the cardinal's palms, Wenson always brings home leaves to make a special palm for his wife and others for home use -- and some to practice on.

"A lot of traditions are lost, but we want to maintain this one," Wenson said. "As long as our family goes on, we'll keep braiding palms for the cardinal."

## Historian To Speak In Livonia

## Religion Update

A new highlight (or lowlight) in the tiresome crescendo of irresponsible church-beating was issued recently by staffers of a new section of the National Council of Churches (NCC), called the Corporate Information Center.

Ten major denominations -- as well as the NCC itself -- were publicly charged with complicity in the "irresponsible, immoral and socially injurious acts" of 29 major U.S. corporations.

The reason for this bitter excoriation: these 29 corporations all have contracts with the U.S. Department of Defense, and the denominations hold stock in the corporations.

IN POINT OF FACT, however, only seven of these corporations have more than one-fifth of their sales in military contracts -- and of these, only Lockheed (71 percent) and United Aircraft (37 percent) have more than a quarter of their sales to the military.

Moreover, only the Disciples of Christ (41 percent) has more than 14 percent of its stock portfolio invested in such firms. Yet this denomination, as well as others such as the Presbyterians, the Methodists, the Episcopalians, the United Church of Christ, the Church of the Brethren and the Unitarian-Universalists, stand accused of "immorality" by these NCC staffers.

The suggestion that these denominations are therefore guilty of hypocritical, money-grubbing war-mongering by their investment in a

collection of Krupps is evidence of the boundless make-work enterprises of some of those who have managed to infiltrate the staff of the NCC.

THE REV. Carroll Simcox, editor of The Living Church magazine, gives these staffers the benefit of the doubt in observing editorially:

"The authors of this report believe that any firm that manufactures military goods should be blacklisted, on the principle that such production is immoral in itself. Their premise is that of absolute pacifism, which condemns the very concept of a national defense system based on military strength."

THESE CORPORATION informationers of the NCC are apparently bent upon a wide-scale harassment of the corporations of their choice -- with the apparent approval of the General Assembly of the NCC. For despite a continuing downturn in denominational support of the NCC, there is apparently enough money to fund their new periodical, "The Corporate Examiner." And in further support of these ecclesiastical investment sleuths, Dr. William P. Thompson, stated clerk of the Presbyterian Church USA, advised the denominations not

to "rush to sell their stocks, for that obviously negates their opportunity to address management."

IT WOULD BE interesting, however, if some intrepid corporation officer were to turn the tables on these confrontationists by addressing them in return.

He might, for openers, ask these NCC staffers whether the NCC would be willing to call upon all its 33 member denominations to require their local churches to refuse any financial support from any church member who either works for or invests in any of these 29 "war-mongering" corporations.

If it were replied that this would be impractical (given local churches' understandable aversion to bankruptcy), he might ask why these pacifist purists have not then demanded that the NCC refuse financial support from any denomination which refuses to do so.

And as a final grabber, he might ask how many of these sacerdotal Nader-Raiders have turned in that portion of their NCC salaries equivalent to what they have exposed as church income from alleged war industries.

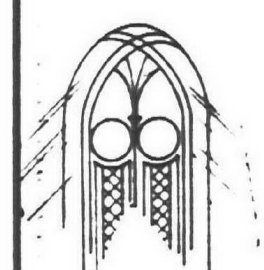

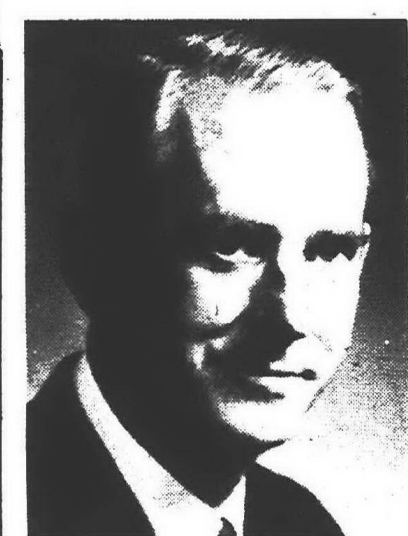
The group, led by youth director Burris Dennis, put together a costume production during the Lenten season of 1971, acting out the rock opera while the record was played.

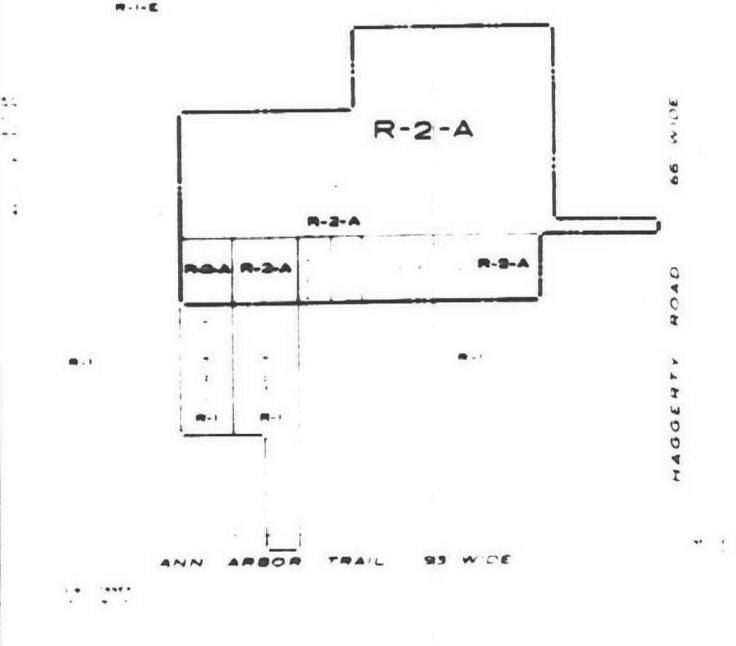

# City To Raze Gallery; New Art Site Needed

Plymouth's City Commission voted 5-2 this week to demolish the city-owned structure at Deer and Ann Arbor Trail which houses Msgr. Edward Hickey's art gallery rather than move it to another site for preservation as a historical relic.

Although this left unanswered the question of whether the gallery can be retained in Plymouth, the commission did pledge support in helping the cleric find another location where his art treasures can be put on public view.

"Msgr. Hickey wants to stay here and has looked around, but at this point he doesn't have anything that looks promising at all," City Manager Norman Gaffney told the commission.

**COMMISSIONERS** Norbert Battermann, Beverly McAninch, Robert Sincock, Ernie Henry and William Silvius voted for the resolution to destroy the building, which was built early in the century and for many years was the office of Dr. Luther Peck. It was opposed only by Mayor James McKeon and Commissioner Harold Guenther.

Removal of the building will make it possible to complete

the paving of Deer Street and to go ahead with the project of linking Deer and Union with a pavement that will cut across the east end of Kellogg Park.

Those who favored razing the art gallery building pointed out that the house is structurally unsound and many problems would be faced in trying to move it. "If you took off the aluminum siding, it would fall apart," commented Battermann.

The majority also agreed that the building lacks enough historical significance to try and save it.

# ECUMENICAL REFLECTIONS

One of the greatest evils against which the church is fighting today is the evil of neutrality in daily circumstances which call for clear-cut confessions of our Christian faith.

Someone has well said that the hottest places in hell are reserved for those people who, when a great issue is involved, prefer to remain neutral. It doesn't take too much courage to talk forcibly to a group of like-minded, professing Christians about the lack of dedication in the church, and the growing deterioration of standards in the world.

Some people are very eloquent as long as they're with their own. About the only time they can be silenced is when someone gets specific and suggests: "What are you doing about it? How often are you ready to stand up and be counted in daily life?"

THE FIRST PLACE we should stand up and be

counted is in the home. Children, in God's plan, do not supervise and train parents. Exactly the opposite is God's will!

It is high time that parents stop giving outwardly poised, but inwardly immature, boys and girls their "complete trust" by being "pals," no matter what, and start assuming their obligation to act like parents.

THE SECOND PLACE we should stand up and be counted is in the church itself! There seems to have developed a cult among Christians -- "sophisticates" they like to call themselves -- who pride themselves upon warming themselves at the sinful world's fire.

These are the people who always want to be "neutral" on any subject. They won't talk one way or the other on such important subjects as false doctrine or the importance of regular church attendance!

As a result of their lack of conviction, many seeking souls are learning first-hand to treat God's saving Word with indifference.

THE THIRD PLACE where we should stand up and be counted is in the world. If we do not tell our unchurched neighbors and, more important, our leaders in government and education, how we Christians feel about the breakdown in law enforcement and moral standards, how will they ever get the message?

We are citizens of our country, as well as citizens of God's Kingdom, and as such, we have God-given obligations to contribute to its well-being.

During this Lent season may we recall Jesus' forthright confession before His hostile judges. He bore witness to the truth though it meant His crucifixion.

To us this Savior says, Neutrality is impossible for My followers. You have to stand up and be counted. "He that is not for me is against me, and he that gathereth not with me, scattereth abroad." Matt. 12:30. We stand up to be counted when without fear or favor, we confess Him as our Savior and then live and promote His absolute standards of righteousness!

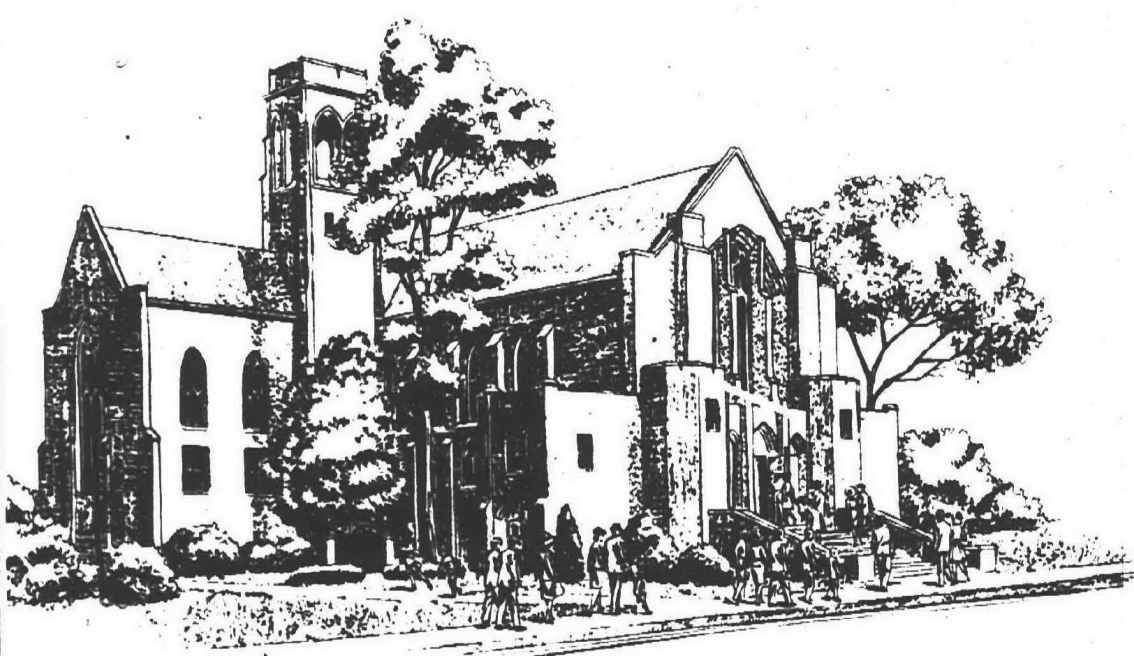

The same thing could be true again since Winter Dean shows three victories in four January starts and a winning time of 2:01.1. For sure he won't have that kind of clocking at Wolverine at this time of the year but it does show Winter Dean is near top form and could win regardless of the track condition.

Racing Secretary Bill Connors lined up one of the

best races of the year as Saturday's headliner, matching nine of the fastest pacers on the grounds.

**IN ADDITION** to Winter Dean, there are two others from Pompano Park in Tricky Dale, handled by Tom Merriman; and Star John, with Dr. Frank Todd in the sulky.

Then there are Our Nibbler, piloted by Doug Hamilton, and Dixie Beau Patch, guided by Gerry Bookmyer, from Windsor Raceway.

The remainder of the starters are: Johnny G. Nehru, winner of a fast class event a week ago; Bedford Jet and Knight Desire, who sped away from the field last Saturday to win handily.

There's nothing but pacers on the 10-race program with two \$3,900 events sharing honors with the preferred.

Easy Adam is the early choice in the first of the

Briar Lea Febe, with the services of Merritt Dokey, and Last Stretch, which won four this year at Windsor, are co-favorites in the seventh race, second half of the co-feature.

Details of the incident aren't available but ruling of the stewards, after a hearing, won't soon be forgotten by Butt.

He has been suspended for the remainder of the year, a suspension that means he won't be able to race at any track in United States or Canada and will not be granted admission to the tracks during the term of suspension.

The official suspension, signed by Presiding Steward Ed Casey, State Steward Frank Meharg and Associate Steward Malcolm Linehan, calls for full suspension for the remainder of 1972.

The reasons given are for violation of Michigan Racing Commission rule 147: for committing an act detrimental to the sport, namely assaulting a racing official and also for using loud, boisterous, offensive and profane language to a racing official.

The suspension became effective Wednesday. It is the most stringent ruling handed down by stewards at a Michigan harness racing meeting in several years.

Butt still has the opportunity to appeal the ruling to State Commissioner Leo Shirley and is expected to do so.

**HENRI** Filion, brother of the famed Herve who rewrote most of the driving records a year ago, will be on the grounds at Wolverine in the near future with seven trotters and pacers. Four baggers are few and far between at any race meeting and Mal recorded his after one week of racing.

This past February saw Jerry compete in the regional eliminations in Chicago, for the right to travel to the World Karate-do in Paris, France.

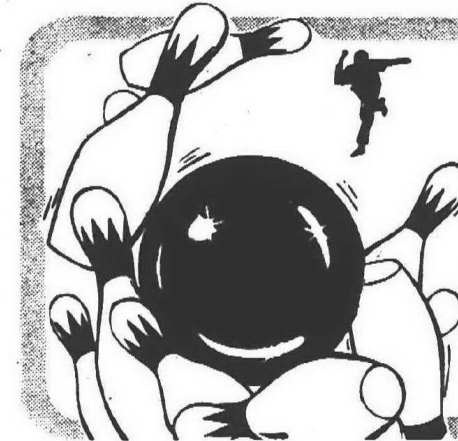
**JERRY PLACED** in Chicago and positioned in the Los Angeles tourney to make

# Wings' Karlander On Move

Hockey is booming in Livonia, and the city can now boast the residence of a Detroit Red Wing center in Michigan Tech All-American Al Karlander.

The 26-year-old native of Lac La Poudre, British Columbia, and Elizabeth, his bride of three months, have made the move to the suburbs, and Karlander couldn't be happier.

Well, he could be happier... the Red Wings are currently in the battle for the final playoff berth in the East Division of

the NHL with Toronto, and Karlander is one of the main reasons Detroit has surged forward in the closing weeks.

The Red Wing center is sixth on the squad in goals scored with 15 to his credit and 19 assists for a 34 point total. The 5 feet 8", 174 pounder is in his first complete year for the Detroit organization after playing portions of the 1969-70 and 1970-71 seasons.

**KARLANDER PLAYED** one year of freshman hockey and three years for the varsity squad at Michigan Tech in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association. In this senior

year (1969), he slugged in 31 goals in 32 games for a Michigan Tech scoring mark, and earned a berth on the All-American squad.

He was drafted by the Red Wings in his sophomore year at the age of 20 and obtained his bachelor degree in business administration.

The 1969-70 hockey season saw Karlander play 24 games for the Fort Worth club and 41 for the Red Wings. He was notching better than a point a game when called up to the Detroit club.

He impressed the Detroit critics with five goals and 10 assists while wearing the Red

Wing colors and was named Detroit's rookie of the year by the Detroit Sports Broadcasters Association.

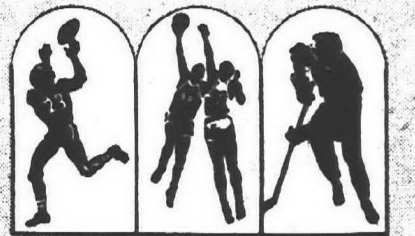

## U-M Grid Coach Says 'We'll Be Quick Team'

There's only one thing certain about the University of Michigan football team as it starts its second week of spring drills - it will be what Coach Bo Schembechler refers to as a "quick" team.

There is more potential speed in the squad of 97 candidates than the Wolverines have known in years, according to the coaches, and this year's team has all the ear-marks of an interesting combination.

The fact that 13 starters from last year's squad have graduated has heightened interest among the candidates, and there will be a great battle to gain berths before the fall schedule begins.

"We had so many candidates reporting," explained George Mans, one of the coaches, "that we ran out of numbered jerseys. We didn't go any higher than 85, and it presented a bit of a problem for the first few days."

**FROM ALL** indications, after one full week of practice, most of the battles for starting positions will be in the offensive line where such stalwarts as All-America Guard Reggie McKenzie, All-Big Ten center Guy Murock, tackle Jim Goode, tackle Tom Beckman and tackle Jim Brandstatter have been lost.

The loss of Billy Taylor, Glenn Doughty and Fritz Seyferth from the starting backfield has left a large gap. But from what was shown in the first week of drills, "Bo" will concentrate on a backfield that will include Tom Slade at quarterback, Alan (Cowboy) Walker, of Cincinnati, and Harry Banks, a speedster from Cleveland, at the halves, with Ed Shuttlesworth, the pilerdriver from Cincinnati at fullback.

Aside from Thornbladh there are five other Observerland candidates on the squad. Among them are Craig Mutch, of Thurston, who was handicapped by injuries all of last season; David Brandon, a former quarterback at South Lyon who is being shifted to a defensive end; Jon Cederberg, of Plymouth High who saw limited service at quarterback last season; Mike Day, a junior back from Livonia Bentley and Art Fediuk, a tight end from Divine Child.

One of the biggest shifts in positions made during the practice sessions has moved Paul Seymour, the tight end from Berkley, to a tackle spot. Considerable attention again will be placed on the quarterbacks where Coach

Schembechler will have to choose from Slade, Kevin Casey, last year's starter, Larry Cipa, and Jack McBride, returning lettermen.

**IT IS NO SECRET** that an effort will be made to develop a passer, and "Bo" hopes to have this accomplished by the time the annual spring game rolls around on Saturday, April 22.

In the role of defending champion, Michigan opens its Big Ten season against Northwestern on Sept. 16.

While Coach Schembechler faces a great rebuilding job through the loss of 19 lettermen, he is planning for a slightly different offense.

"I think we will look for more ways to move the ball," he said. "Still our running- and speed- will be the essential feature of our attack along with an emphasis on defense."

## Dem Blames Debt Rise, Job Loss On Nixon

U.S. Rep. Martha Griffiths told a 19th District Democratic issues conference Saturday that President Nixon, in just four years, will have been responsible for more than 25 per cent of the

total national debt in the nearly 200 year-history of the country.

Mrs. Griffiths (D-Detroit) was highly critical of Nixon economic policies which have brought high prices and high unemployment. She said the so-called Nixon "game plan," announced when the president came into office, has turned out to be nothing more than "the old Hoover game plan."

She said the basis of the Nixon plan is to reward bankers with the highest interest rate in history and industry with special tax concessions which fail to create the jobs they are supposed to provide.

Mrs. Griffiths said the Nixon Administration is doing nothing to stop the movement of plants to foreign countries nor is it trying to figure out how to help out the hard-pressed American worker.

MRS. GRIFFITHS served on the economic policy panel — one of six held during the day long conference which took place on the campus of Schoolcraft College in Livonia. The other panels

considered party reform, foreign policy, ecology, education and the young voter.

Oakland County Prosecutor Thomas Plunkett, featured luncheon speaker, talked on "Revolution or Retreat." He said that those persons who have been retreating from the cities to the suburbs and from the inner suburbs to the outer suburbs have suddenly decided "to stop and fight."

Plunkett said this phenomenon has spurred the revolution of majorities which, unlike the revolutions of the past, lacks leadership with visions and courage.

Annetta Miller, member of the Michigan Board of Education, told the education panel that instead of concentrating on the emotional issue of bussing, we should be trying to solve other problems such as providing scholarships to the pre-college student who can't remain in high school without financial help.

Oakland School Board Vice President Gary Lichtman told the same panel that the biggest issue is not bussing but providing quality education. He said that we have developed a "college bound syndrome" which does not recognize the educational needs of students who don't go on to higher education.

THE 19th DISTRICT Democratic chairman, Aldo Vagnozzi, opened the conference with a call for unity among Democrats in pursuit of the defeat of President Nixon. He criticized both the far right and far left for promoting the politics of dissension.

The conference closed with a panel composed of representatives of the various presidential candidates. Represented were Shirley Chisholm (Steve McCargar), George McGovern (Dave Vaughn), Edmund Muskie (Sandy Silver), Henry Jackson (Morris Binkow), and John Lindsay (Jerry Friedman).

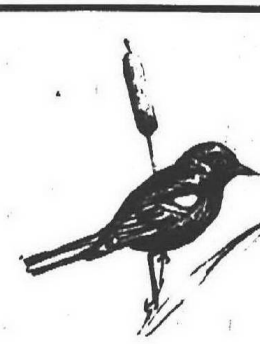

## Dateline Outdoors

Lakes are turning mushy in southeastern Michigan, but ice fishing on some of them closed with a bang last week.

Panfish activity was good on Cass, Grass, Pickerel, Pontiac, Teepie and Tiptico lakes in western Oakland County. A friend of ours and four associates caught their limit — 125 — on Grass Lake near Highland last Sunday.

Brown trout fishing is spotty on Lower Froid Lake, where adult fish were stocked after last fall's cleanout, but the keepers are coming in at a good size.

DETROIT'S municipal marina at Memorial Park, open to all Michigan residents, has boatwells and slips available for the 1972 season. Season rate is \$275 for 26-37 foot boats, \$200 for 17-25 foot boats and \$65 for outboards. Marina season is April 15 to Oct. 15. The marina is on the Detroit River at the foot of Hubbard, off E. Jefferson, between the River House and the Whittier Hotel.

For an application, write to: Public Service Division, Detroit Dept. of Parks and Recreation, 735 Randolph.

Detroit, 48226. Include your name, address, phone number, type of boat, length and beam.

DURING TWO weeks of February, 2.4 million young coho died mysteriously at the state's Platte River Fish Hatchery.

But the Dept. of Natural Resources has partially filled the gap by getting a million coho eggs from the State of Washington. They were flown to Chicago and trucked to the DNR Wolf Lake hatchery west of Kalamazoo for hatching and early rearing.

Afterwards, the young coho will be moved to the northern part of the state for final

rearing. If rearing losses are no greater than normal, a half-million or more coho smolts should be ready for planting next spring.

Between those and other coho which survived, the DNR will plant about three million of the battlers in spring, about two-thirds of the original goal of 4.5 million.

What caused the die-off at Platte River? DNR Fisheries Chief Wayne Tody suspects "some unknown disease or environmental deficiency." Fortunately, that die-off didn't affect young chinook and other species being raised in separate rearing tanks.

# It's No Surprise-But Winning Is Great!

"I shall carry this experience with me throughout the rest of my life," said Owen Dodson in his critique of the Livonia - Redford Theater Guild's presentation of scenes from "Lion in Winter."

Dodson, former professor of drama at Howard University and now consultant to the Harlem School of the Arts in New York, was one of three judges in the competition sponsored by the Metropolitan Detroit Community Theater Festival last week (March 13-19) in the Detroit Institute of Arts Auditorium.

Thus it didn't really come as a surprise when word came Tuesday that the LRTG had won \$1,000 for having the best production.

But it was a tremendous thrill, to its cast, to its director, Mary Ann Vosgerchian of Livonia and to all the guild members and fans.

ADDING TO IT was the delight of learning that two more (of a total of five awards worth \$2,100) had gone to Observerlanders.

Rosemary Moorehead of Westland was named best director and won \$200 for her production of Elaine May's comedy, "Adaptation" for the Wayne - Westland Civic Theater.

Louise Martin of Redford Township received best actress award (\$200) for her portrayal of Mary Todd Lincoln in an original drama, "A Thin Line," presented by the Players' Guild of Dearborn. The awards for best original play and best supporting actress went to Detroit companies.

Twelve groups in all competed, including those from Troy, Southgate, Wyandotte, Clawson, Warren, Grosse Pointe, three from Detroit, and of course, "ours."

HOW DID WE do so well? Attention to every detail, as well as love of the theater, seems to be the common denominator among all three of our winners, individually and in groups.

"You pick good scripts, you set high standards, you have open casting ... and you get good shows," according to Mrs. Martin, who is one of the busiest community theater actresses in the Detroit area. She is a former president of the LRTG, and being on its play-reading committee, she helped pick "Lion" as its winter production.

Of her own role, Mrs. Martin comments, "I really researched Mary Todd Lincoln. I know all about her. I even know what diabetes (which she had) does to people."

Attention to detail for Mrs. Vosgerchian meant "working ensemble." Every member of the cast and crew was important. She even put her cast members through a series of exercises to increase their sense awareness and worked with them to help rid them of 20th century mannerisms.

For Mrs. Moorehead, it meant the constant drill and discipline which is essential to achieve the right timing in a comedy production. Choosing the right play was also important. She has a penchant for comedy, Elaine May's in particular. She won a Community Theater Association of Michigan award last year with another play by Miss May, who is also a successful director.

IT'S ALSO THE culmination

of many years of hard work. All three started in theater when they were children. All three have been active in local productions and have been featured in Observer articles.

For all of them, theater is an avocation, just another part of extremely busy lives. Mrs. Moorehead (more commonly known as Ducky) not only helps her husband, Ed, in his roofing and siding business, but also holds down another office job, and "directs" the seven of their nine children still at home.

And while "Adaptation" was still very much in her mind, she and two of her children tried out for and landed parts in an original musical being staged in Windsor in June.

Mrs. Vosgerchian is working on her PhD degree in theater at the University of Michigan and also teaches creative dramatics for children to teachers at its Flint and Dearborn campuses. She has three children.

Mrs. Martin is a fashion worker at Hudson's, a grandmother and an expert seamstress who is helping with costumes for the LRTG's next production "Plaza Suite."

This multiplicity of talents and the fact that there's no generation gap have helped unite these groups into award-winning units. Both have won before, at CTAM conventions and at the Detroit - Windsor theater competition held in 1961.

BOTH DIRECTORS are enthusiastic in their praise for their stage crews, who went into the strange (to them) Arts Institute auditorium and performed like professionals.

The Wayne - Westland crew consisted of Fred Button, Marty Moorehead, Lois Shafer and Norm Schwartz.

Angus Wrigley as stage manager and assistant director and Warren Reinecker who did the scenery and costumes for "Lion in Winter" helped in the production's success, along with Dick Franklin, who set the mood with 12th century music, and Phil Matara, Mark Thomas and Fred Matara, on lighting.

The two lead roles in "Lion" were taken by two guild regulars and long-time members, Howard Egan of Milford and Moya Taormina of Livonia. Egan, who is also a guild past president, is the branch manager of Dictaphone Corp., a gentleman farmer and the father of six children. Mrs. Taormina, the mother of eight, often works on local radio and television as well as appearing in LRTG plays.

Also in the cast were Katie Beddow, who has also had leading roles with the Farmington Players and with LRTG children's plays; Reinecker, a graphics designer at the GM Tech Center, who is also building chairman for the LRTG, as well as being a talented set and costume designer; J. Craig Collicott, who has been active in civic theater for almost 16 years and is currently working on a locally-produced feature-length film, "Freedom RIP"; Russ Vogel, who is just out of Livonia's Franklin High School and is hoping to make a career in stage and cinematography; and Hamilton (Rusty) Aldridge Jr., a member of the LRTG for more than three years, who has also designed sets for its children's shows.

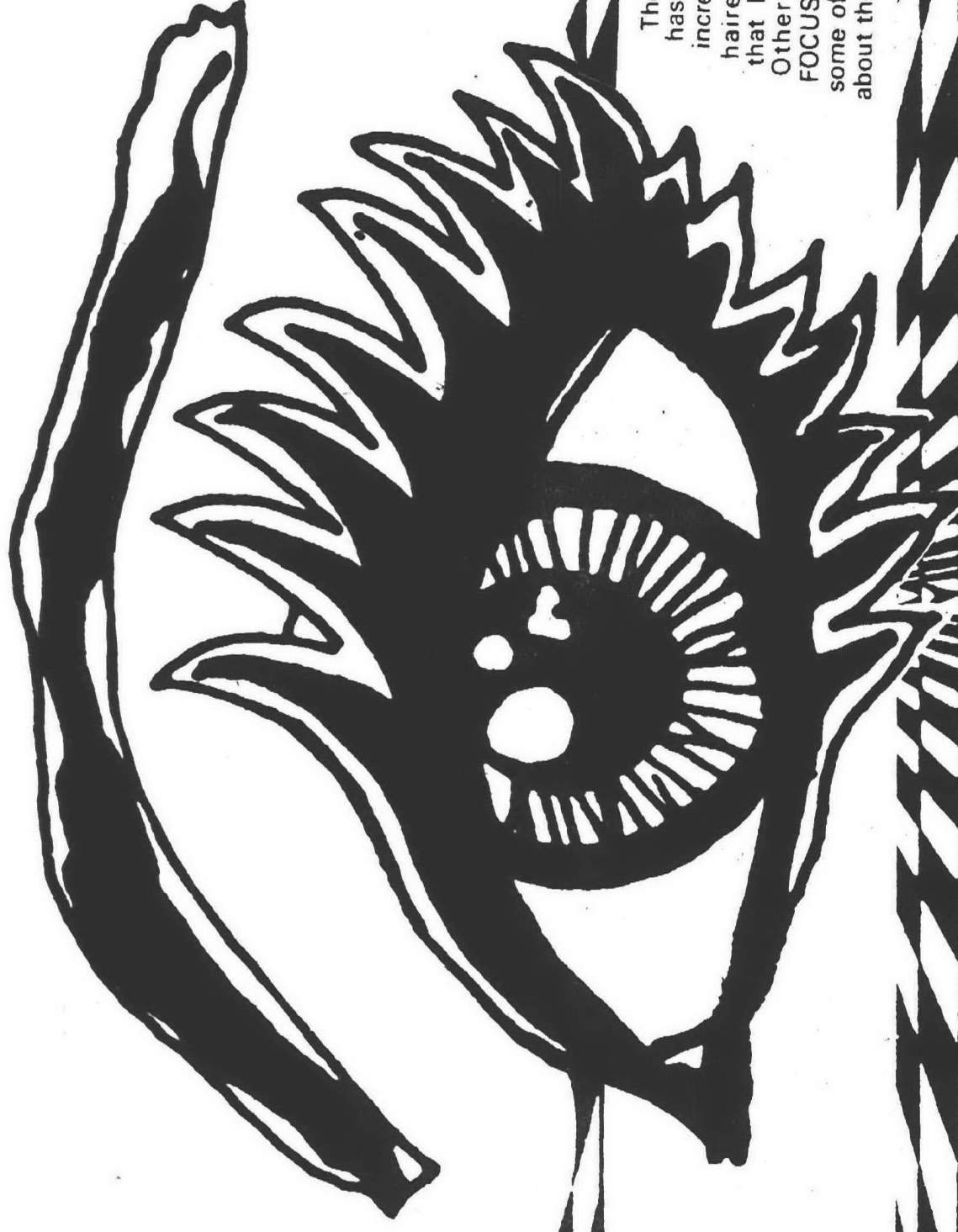

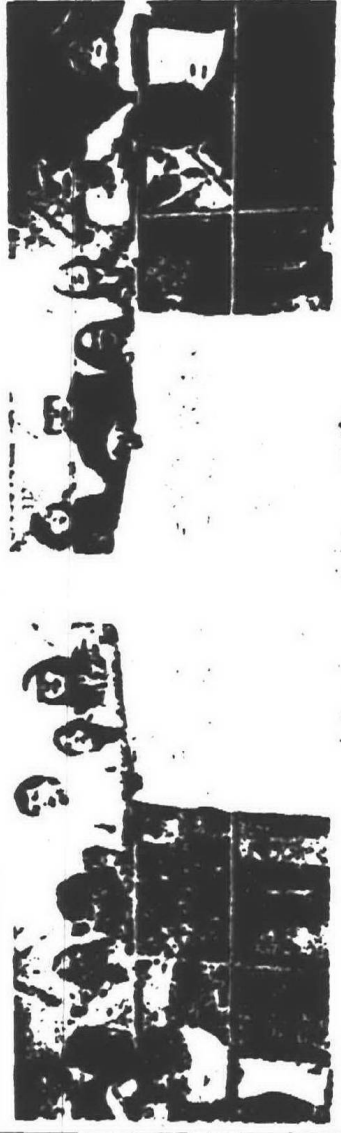

## The Radicalization Of High School Journalists

One of the most obvious ways "suburbia's other culture" has made itself felt, is by public expression.

College and high school papers have often changed from what they used to be. Sometimes suburban "underground papers" have sprung up where students felt the established school and college papers did not afford them a voice. Perhaps because they are closer to home, the radicalization of high school papers has touched suburbia's nerve.

One such instance occurred in April 1968 when an 18-year-old Plymouth High School senior, James Kalliel, was arrested for selling an "underground paper" without a permit.

He started the paper, called "Free Verse," because he wanted to write a literary paper and he thought the school newspaper was a bore. His attorney, Bob Delaney, said,

Plymouth's Ordinance 269 requires anyone who wants to sell something "on the streets or in public places" to have a license. This is issued by the city clerk for a fee, a health certificate, a photograph and any other information he considers necessary.

The U.S. Supreme Court declared a similar ordinance of Griffin, Ga. unconstitutional 35 years ago.

Kalliel won his case.

Friction between the Clarenceville Board of Education and the staff of the high school newspaper, The Prophet, over the paper's policies began in 1970, when three articles were deleted from the paper by Clarenceville High School Principal Dr. Ray Renbarger.

The issue first arose over a news story containing the phrase, "get the bastard," which according to The Prophet had been directed at a teacher by a community resident during a school board meeting.

Other conflicts arose over an

## Is The School Situation Coming To A Head?

One of the areas in which the impact of "suburbia's other culture" is increasingly being felt, is education.

High school students today have begun to consider their role in society. And they are exerting pressure by vocalizing their dissatisfaction with education.

Not only are students speaking more in school newspapers, but in the classroom as well. Some changes in curricula and teaching methods have been made but high school students are often still dissatisfied. Often, teachers share these feelings.

A former public school teacher sees education as "steeped with tradition."

"Schools are basically the same form they were in back in 1850," he said. "Most innovations in education made in the last 20 years were fads and fads fall quickly," he said.

One teacher, trying to shock his class out of their boredom, suddenly pelted them with marshmallows.

One student, now in college, gave the following account of his growing disenchantment with public education:

wonderful things you could do with static electricity, like sticking balloons to walls.

"I was being taught things I could find out for myself. I wanted my teachers to introduce me to new and different things; I wanted my horizons expanded. Instead I was being trained to operate within institutions.

"My interests in what they (school) had to offer began to lag and I looked elsewhere. Most of my interests were outside school and my grades began to drop as a result. The school became a prison instead of an institution of learning."

"I developed the ability to 'schuck' people and fake my way through to get the grade. But half way through my junior year I realized that I wasn't doing myself any good by faking it. I learned the value of being intellectually honest with myself and my instructors.

"During the middle of my junior year I also became the editor of my high school paper. I was stifled by censorship there. Things I am saying now couldn't be said in my high school paper.

"I see members of my graduating class with no idea of who they are or where they are going. 'Schools are going to have to change. I am reminded of Bob Dylan's song, 'The Times they are A' Changin'."

## Return To The Soil! Heads Are Gardening

There's nothing like home grown natural food -- as many suburban heads have come to realize.

The far reaches of some suburban Detroit communities offer large garden spots for growing enough fruits, vegetables and herbs to give some to your friends and still have enough left to put up a winter supply. Even smaller suburban lots often afford the space to plant a small plot where a few tomato or pepper plants can help you fight food prices.

Somehow the garden's rewards taste better when you grow them yourself -- and you're sure that they're not loaded with chemical fertilizers or artificial coloring that some stores use to spruce up their produce.

And now, as planting time draws nigh, garden centers and greenhouses are seeing an influx of long-hairs who come in to purchase seeds, (if they haven't saved their own), and gardening implements.


Maybe the hostility often shown to members of suburbia's other culture drives them to gardening and self-sufficiency. Or maybe it's just a Woodstockian return to the country that makes a

home in "the sticks," a pleasant retreat from red-neck neighbors. Whatever the reason, it will be a common sight this spring to see a head-band bedecked long hair toiling over his garden patch.

writing about proms and football games, they never thought of questioning the traditional fare," Kucharski said.

He recalled a time when "an article on the Beatles was centered from a high school newspaper because they were too controversial."

There is little chance of radically dissenting students getting on the staff of Bentley High School's newspaper, because, as staff advisor Wayne explained, "I select the staff."

"I don't teach freedom of the press," he said. "I teach responsibility of the press."

There have been about three underground papers at Bentley in the past few years, Wayne said. So far they have only lasted an issue or two because "an underground paper is an expensive proposition," and the students who start them eventually graduate.

It was with the "advent of long hair and sloppy dress" that the underground paper "began to show its ugly head," he said.

The Livonia School Board adopted new administrative rules on students' expression Jan. 3.

Not allowed under the rules are: expressions deemed obscene by the principal; statements advocating disobedience of "established laws or official school policies"; articles advocating the use of illegal substances; statements or innuendoes which may subject any person to hatred, ridicule or injury to his reputation; and those deriding others for their race, creed, color or origin.

Under the Livonia school guidelines, the representative school principals have the final say on circulation of material to students -- both in the school paper and by individuals. An appeal of his decision could go to the school board.
