## Proposed City Budget Asks 2-Mill Hike In Property Tax

A two-mill increase in the City of Plymouth's property tax would be needed to meet the 1972-73 municipal budget presented Monday night to the City Commission. Translated, this means \$2 per \$1,000 in state equalized assessed valuation.

City Manager Norman M. Gaffney's draft of a preliminary budget proposes general fund expenditures of \$1.8 million, needing a tax rate of \$15.86 per \$1,000 to produce the revenue called for.

The present rate is \$13.86 per \$1,000, and in 1970-71 it was \$12.36.

The budget for the current fiscal year which ends June 30 was established at \$1.657 million when adopted last May, but it is estimated actual expenditures will exceed that figure by \$35,000.

It is anticipated that the city's cash balance June 30 will be only \$2,600 compared to having carried a cash excess of more than \$50,000 into the fiscal year.

"ALTHOUGH the president has set guidelines and imposed the 'freeze,' cost of local government has spiraled to the highest level in its history," Gaffney told commissioners, who will start their budget analysis meetings April 11. The public hearing on the final document will be April 24.

"The demands by unions in salaries and fringe benefits, plus escalation in Blue Cross, retirement, social security, etc. alone demands an increase of 10.5 per cent over last year's budget," said Gaffney.

"In dollars and cents, this increase alone amounts to approximately \$90,000 in Plymouth."

Gaffney declared that he and department heads had spent "many hours" attempting to provide the most equitable budget for taxpayers, striving to keep tight strings.

He emphasized, however, that "Plymouth must meet the same demands as other Michigan cities and realize that if it were just to give the same services as last year, it will be faced with two

choices: either raise taxes, or cut services and lay off personnel."

SEVERAL commissioners have indicated in recent weeks that they had hoped to stay within the present \$13.86 tax rate, and Mayor James B. McKeon commented after seeing the proposed figures, "I never expected a request for two mills!"

Gaffney said that because the commission recently indicated it would approve a 15 per cent salary increase for firemen, "we find the requests of other employees accepting that guideline." The budget provides an across-the-board raise of 5.5 per cent for all non-union employees.

"The projected raises for police are over \$50,000 and for the fire department over \$20,000," said Gaffney. "The fringe benefit increase for all departments adds approximately \$34,000 over last year's budget and, like the union contracts, we have no control."

## Spaniel To Be Miller Principal Study Of Charter

### Put In Hands Of 7

When Miller Elementary School opens its doors this fall, Mrs. Shirley Spaniel will be there to greet her first student body as principal.

Mrs. Spaniel, who has been Plymouth's language-arts reading coordinator, was selected from a long list of applicants to head the new modern facility. Her appointment was unanimously confirmed last week by the Plymouth Board of Education.

Since becoming curriculum coordinator in 1968, Mrs. Spaniel, 36, of 18276 Arselot, Northville, has directed the development of curriculum guides in reading, creative writing, and listening skills.

SHE HAS HELPED develop creative writing activities and implement a reading program for all students with an emphasis on early identification

of reading problems at the lower grades.

She also has helped revise the ninth grade English program to a variety of elective mini-courses.

After joining Plymouth schools in 1965 as a reading teacher at Farrand Elementary School, Mrs. Spaniel was a reading consultant and conducted workshops in Plymouth and at the University of Michigan. She taught at U-M one summer and was a supervising teacher in U-M Elementary Lab School and Eastern Michigan University's Lincoln Laboratory School.

She was a classroom teacher in schools in Bay City and Ypsilanti before coming to Plymouth.

MRS. SPANIEL attended Bay City Junior College and completed her undergraduate

work at EMU. She received a master's degree from U-M and did post-graduate work at U-M and Oakland University.

Her memberships include the American Assn. of University Women where she is education representative; Michigan Reading Assn.; International Reading Assn.; Assn. for Supervision and Curriculum Development; Michigan Elementary Principals Assn.; National Education Assn. and Michigan Education Assn.

Mrs. Spaniel is a member of Pi Lambda Theta, honorary society for women in education.

She is co-author of a parent handbook, "Teaching Around the Clock."

Mrs. Spaniel is a member of the coordinating curriculum council of Plymouth schools and a consultant to Plymouth and other schools on the open classroom approach.

Her interest in open education was heightened by a visit to British primary schools last spring and to Michigan and Colorado schools this year.

She and her husband, George, have two children, Julie Ann, 6, and George, 8.

Gruening, 85, was at one time managing editor of "The Nation" magazine and under President Franklin Delano Roosevelt was director of Territories and Island Possessions. He later served both as governor and senator for Alaska.

## plymouth THROUGH BIFOCALS

**VERILY, THE SCENT** of politics is in the air, and it is an aroma which is causing many a local pulse to quicken. You know how it is when something tasty is roasting in the oven and the odor permeates the whole house, creating an excitement of anticipation. Well, to many, that "oven" is the Greater Plymouth political arena of 1972.

The fever is building not because of any major stimulation from Washington, but rather because of purely local issues that will surface at the polls long before the general election is held throughout the nation Nov. 7.

For instance, pay heed to these intervening dates: Deadline for filing nominating petitions for the school board will be May 15, with the election itself on June 12—and what a furor that one may stir. Those who seek township and, for that matter, all partisan offices must file by June 20, and their extremely critical primary will be on Aug. 8.

That schedule is enough by itself to assure a highly vocal spring and summer hereabouts, for already candidates are beginning to spring up for school and township posts. Couple with this the interest in the May 16 precinct delegate contests, plus the impending redistricting for Congress and the State Legislature, and we have the makings of some furious politicking.

**IN MANY QUARTERS** it is assumed we are likely to have a field of board of education candidates that will be both large and loud just because the school year now drawing toward its close has been fraught with so many problems.

Evidence that the assumption may prove correct is found in the fact that already at this date, which is unheard of in Plymouth, three persons have taken out nominating petitions: Joseph Gray, Gary Mirto and Mrs. Marda Benson, widow of the late Dr. Paul Benson.

In Plymouth Township, Supervisor Maurie Breen's opponents within his own Republican party are seeking to come up with a strong enough candidate to unseat him in the primary—but Breen has built an organization of his own which has no intention of yielding without a fight.

On the Democratic side, a pair of proven fighters have again been seized by the political bug and are being urged to jump in with both feet in the township wars: Earl Demel and Orville Tungate. If they accede to the pressure, the township could rediscover that we really do have a two-party system.

**THERE ARE** other factors, too, in helping build the sense of anticipation that we are on the brink of one of our more interesting campaign years.

Inner-party squabbles are part of it, heightened by the uncertainty over what new boundaries will be drawn for the congressional and legislative districts of which we will be a part.

Then, too, there's the probability of the creation of a new 27th Wayne County Commissioner District, which would include Plymouth. The tentative plan is to identify this as a strip along the western side of the county, and former local Democratic Chairman Bob Dwyer has the backing of many to take a stab at that commission post.

At this point in time only one certainty looms on the local political horizon. This concerns the 35th District Court where Judge Dunbar Davis will be up for reelection in a non-partisan race. If there is a lead-pipe cinch on any of the '72 ballots, his victory is it.



William W. Fletcher, president of the Police Officers Association, said in a recent letter to Ford that the men favor accepting this type of schedule "on a permanent basis."

# Township's '71 Fire Loss Up

PLYMOUTH During 1971, the township fire department responded to 674 alarms, calls of all types, a busy year compared to the previous year's runs of 537. Fire losses to dwellings were actually down, and the biggest reason for the increase was fires at businesses - mainly the Lofy's fire which destroyed the night club last fall. Fires in the township last year resulted in a total loss of \$908,643, which was \$761,938 higher than the 1970 figure of \$146,705. Fire Chief James Gignac stated in his annual fire loss report.


Arson was expensive to the township last year. Gignac said the value of property destroyed through arson totaled \$75,118.

## 'Snip And Take' Your Telephone

Michigan Bell has introduced the latest in "do-it-yourself" plans which could save you \$6 if you are moving.

By arranging with Bell in advance, you can now take the telephone along with your furniture and receive a credit for your efforts.

The plan is called "Snip and Take" according to John Peard, local Michigan Bell manager. It's designed, he said, not only to save the customer money at moving time but to help reduce costs as well.

To take advantage of "Snip and Take," a customer merely has to advise the nearest Michigan Bell office in advance of the day of the move and the day new service should be installed, he said.

"THEN ON moving day, the customer simply cuts the cord


next to the small connecting box on the wall with a knife or pair of scissors and takes the phone with him," explained Peard.

Should the move be out of the customer's local area — such as a move from Detroit to Traverse City — or out of Michigan Bell territory, the credit is still available.

Though more than one set may be returned, the maximum credit is \$5 per move, he noted.

At least my grandmother would have been happy.



# Democracy Shown In The Raw Row

If ever you have wondered why many of our legislative officials become gray prematurely, or why it is claimed they must have elephant hide, you can get the answer in a hurry — just attend the council meetings in most any one of the suburban communities.

These weekly or bi-weekly sessions are a throwback to the days when our forefathers conducted the town meetings on the Commons, and almost anyone was permitted to take part.

According to the yellowed pages of history, some of these meetings were extraordinary, especially those on the Boston Commons or those down in Virginia in the days of Patrick Henry and Thomas Jefferson.

But fiery as they might have been, they would have little on some of the sessions being held hereabouts where democracy is shown in the raw.

After visiting these sessions throughout the suburbs, The Stroller came to this conclusion a few weeks ago and couldn't help listening in amazement as the public tried to "stump" the very men they voted into office.

America long has been noted as the land in which the people take keen delight in establishing heroes — just for the pleasure of trying to prove they have feet of clay.

JUST THE other evening, in one of our suburbs that is making a valiant attempt to lure industry and thus broaden the tax base to provide more and better services, the dialogue was worthy of an admission price.

For the past few months this community has been offering a five year tax "freeze" and a waiver of the tap-in fees for sewer and water as a lure to industry.

In several cases this lure has been successful and not a word was said in protest.

But the other evening the same lure was being offered to a funeral home with the statement by the legislative sponsor, "this is for an addition with an estimated cost of a quarter million dollars, and if we don't grant it, he may move elsewhere."

With that, a woman spectator — and taxpayer — leaped to her feet and asked —

"I am planning to build an addition to my home and may even build a garage. Will you give me the same tax 'freeze' and fee waiver to keep me here?"

"We are offering these lures," a council member stated, "in an effort not only to improve our tax base, but to provide more jobs."

"How many jobs will an addition to a funeral home bring?" the woman asked. "All they attract is dead people and their families."

"My household help and lawn care maintenance men are workers. So, if I threaten to move out of the city, will you give me same concessions to keep me here?"

She hasn't yet received an answer — but she gave the legislative body something to think about with her logic.

IN ONE OF our other communities a few months ago, the problem before the legislative body concerned the rezoning of a piece of property to permit high rise apartments directly across the street from a school.

In the midst of the discussion a woman arose and asked to speak. Given permission, she made this eloquent presentation:

"I have been sitting here for months, listening to you folks telling the taxpayers that apartments are beneficial to the community because those who live there have few, if any, children."

"If that's so — and you have stated it many times — why are you considering an apartment across from the school, making the families with children live on the outskirts? Why not the reverse? Why not deny this request across from the school, but grant it on the edge of town?"

"Then, we families with children, can build near the school. Our children can walk to class — and you will be saving the cost of busses?"

She didn't get an answer either.

Democracy in the raw can take some strange twists.

## Baker Urges Adoption Bill

Upset over what he called serious irregularities in adoption practices in Michigan, State Rep. Raymond Baker (R - Farmington) has introduced a concurrent resolution into the Michigan House calling for a special 10 - member committee to study adoption procedures.

Baker claims laws of this state are very vague on adoption procedures. Many times the qualifications of would-be adoptive parents are determined by one person, usually a social worker. This often leads to a conflict of personalities which in turn could create unjust decisions.

"After receiving an increasing number of complaints from would-be adoptive parents," Baker said, "it is imperative that not only the children but the

would-be parents be entitled to justice that they have not experienced."

The lawmaker cites "the irregularities that exist not only within adoption agencies but between different agencies. With agencies having varying rules governing the adoption of their available homeless children discrepancies arise."

The resolution proposes the creation of a special committee composed of five members of the House and five members from the Senate.

The committee would have the power to subpoena witnesses, administer oaths, and examine the books and records of any person, partnership, association or corporation involved in a matter before the committee.

## Principal Forge Dies



Ingham County News staff for a year and was on the editorial team of the Hartford (Conn.) Courant before joining the Observer Newspapers Inc. in 1971.

Walker, a member of the Observer Newspapers staff since 1969, will have new assignments in Redford, Livonia and Plymouth as a reporter - photographer. He will concentrate his efforts in Redford Township but will also cover the police and fire departments and district courts in all three communities.

Walker has served as acting editor of the Redford Observer for the past 10 months but indicated a preference for the roving reporter assignments.

## CHS Carnival Set April 29

The second annual Clarenceville National Honor Society spring carnival will be held on Saturday, April 29. Several community groups have already reserved booths. Last minute reservations are still being taken by Mrs. Dorothy Bennett in Clarenceville High School counseling office.

The Orchard Ridge newspaper, Recorder, will publish another edition this week after a seven-day suspension was lifted.

The newspaper, published by students from the Farmington campus of Oakland Community College, was put on indefinite suspension last week after apparently slipping back into its old habits.

The weekly tabloid was living out a three-month probation imposed by the college's board of trustees when it published articles in its last two editions which inflamed college administrators.

Up to that point the paper was said to have been improving. It was using fewer "four-letter" words and had not printed the "Dr. Erotica" column where sex-related questions are answered.

THE NEWSPAPER printed an article on homosexuality on March 13 which first stirred administrators and was notified of suspension immediately after the next edition appeared with the Dr. Erotica column.

"In the last two issues, we had a return to an extensive use of four-letter words and the appearance of Dr. Erotica," Dean of Students Don Nichols said.

Nichols, who also serves on the student-dominated Publications Board, took the action that resulted in the paper's suspension. The board reversed it seven-days later.

The publications board had passed two motions directing the newspaper to cease from printing Dr. Erotica unless it was used in an educational way and to cease using of-fensive four-letter words except in context, Nichols said.

"In my opinion the editorial board of the paper completely

ignored these motions," he added.

WHEN THE publications board met to discuss the suspension on Thursday, Nichols was outvoted, and the paper was given another chance.

He said the board felt he had not given the newspaper enough time to implement a previous change which put the paper under the governance of a five-student editorial board instead of one editor.

"I will permit it to continue publishing without reivev, but I have reserved the right to evoke the suspension again," Nichols said.

"We have mobilized the political forces to keep the

paper open," said student John Morris, member of the editorial board said. He said the paper will come out as scheduled on April 5.

STUDENTS HAD charged that Dean Nichols was attempting to censor the paper and infringe on their right to publish. Faculty advisor Ted Rancot had asked to resign if the paper was censored.

Rancot was not available for comment.

"He's equating my action with censorship," Nichols said prior to the publications board meeting. "I have said the paper will not be published unless I can review the copy before it is printed. I have said

I will not change a word of it. I will no censor it."

Asked what he would do if he found an article he considered offensive, Nichols said he would advise the newspaper but not stop it from publishing the article.

"I want to be on the record saying I objected to the article," Nichols said, explaining that if the paper were sued for something it printed, the administration would be held responsible.

Though the publications board acts as a publisher, students and faculty can't be sued.

"But you certainly can sue the administration," he admitted.



# How 'Cluster' Plan Would Affect Area

**An Observer Roundup**  
Most suburbanites are waiting apprehensively while Federal Judge Stephen J. Roth combs over school integration plans that affect their local school districts.

Since Judge Roth threw out all the Detroit-only plans proposed by the Detroit school board last week, Observerland residents are almost sure to be affected by the metropolitan plans now under consideration.

At least one plan—the tri-county school cluster proposal—gives local residents a concrete idea of how their children could be involved in a metropolitan plan.

**THE CLUSTER** proposal groups entire school districts with Detroit attendance areas. It would keep all elementary, junior high and high school students from each district in the same cluster of schools.

As the proposal now stands, all Observerland students would be involved. This would include residents of the Wayne-Westland, Garden City, Plymouth, Livonia, Redford Union, South Redford, Southfield, Clarenceville and Farmington School Districts.

Proposed by the Detroit Board of Education, the plan creates 18 clusters with non-white student populations varying from 21.3 per cent to 29.7 per cent of the total number of students involved in each cluster.

Currently, Observerland school districts vary from three-tenths per cent to 1.1 per cent in their non-white student populations.

**THE 22,911** students from Wayne-Westland would be grouped with those from Westwood, Cherry Hill, and

Inkster School Districts and the Detroit Chadsey High School area.

Wayne-Westland's non-white student enrollment currently is 1.1 per cent or 252 students. By combining the five school districts, the total student population would be 43,679 students including 9,286 non-white students or 21.3 per cent.

Garden City students (totaling 14,031) would be combined with those from Crestwood, Dearborn, Dearborn Heights, Fairlane, North Dearborn Heights and Detroit's Northwestern High School area.

Seventeen non-white students are currently enrolled in Garden City Schools (.9 per cent) but combination of the seven areas would make 22.9 per cent of the 64,822 student involved non-white for a total of 14,847 non-whites.

**ANOTHER CLUSTER** of schools would put Livonia, Plymouth, Northville Redford Union and South Redford students in the same plan as Detroit's Cody and Mackenzie High School areas.

All the suburban districts in this plan have less than a six-tenths of one per cent non-white enrollment of Northville's 3,120 students (16 non-white), Plymouth's 9,543 (48), Livonia's 38,133 (229), Redford Union's 9,715 (39), and South Redford's 7,907 (40).

Since Mackenzie is 97.5 per cent non-white and Cody is 17.1 per cent, the total grouping would have 22.2 per cent non-white students of the total 105,215 students.

Southfield's 16,367 students would be combined with those

in Ferndale, Oak Park, Berkley and Detroit's Central High School area for a total student enrollment of 51,932 with 28 per cent or 14,525 non-white. Southfield currently has 98 non-white students or six-tenths of one per cent of its enrollment.

**CLARENCEVILLE** and Farmington students would stay together in a cluster including Novi, Detroit Cooley

and Detroit Redford students for a total student population of 56,734 of which 29 per cent or 16,860 students are non-white.

Farmington 16,366 students include 82 non-whites (five-tenths of one per cent) and Clarenceville's 3,922 student include 12 or three-tenths of one per cent non-white.

In total there are 18 clusters proposed involving students

from Wayne, northern Oakland, and northern Macomb Counties.

**THE OTHER** two main plans now being considered include one plan combining 35 suburban districts and Detroit. The area would be split into six integrated districts.

Another plan would create seven "boroughs" by com-

bining 65 suburban school districts and Detroit.

All the plans raise numerous questions on school financing, teachers, extra-curricular activities, and the length of bus rides.

Teachers are concerned both because of contracts and retirement benefits. Since each district's teachers bargain for varying salaries, teachers are concerned about

being set at one salary level. Detroit beginning teachers are now the highest paid of beginning teachers in the metropolitan area.

Detroit teachers are also under a different retirement plan and are concerned about losing retirement benefits if shifted to a suburban school.

If students attend school a considerable distance from home, high school athletic and

extra-curricular programs are apt to flounder from lack of participation.

But the most concern is expressed in the area of school financing where residents now pay varying millage rates.

The financing angle may be closely tied to efforts now under way to prohibit funding schools from area property taxes.

## Ford Backs Discharge

**WASHINGTON**  
Prompted by the rejection of Detroit-only school desegregation plans, U.S. Rep. William D. Ford (D-Taylor) became the third Observerland congressman to sign a discharge petition for consideration of a bussing amendment.

The petition, which now has 151 of the 218 needed signatures, would force House consideration of a constitutional amendment to prohibit court-ordered bussing to achieve school integration. The amendment is currently locked in the Committee on the Judiciary.

U.S. Reps. Jack McDonald (R-Farmington) and William S. Broomfield (R-Royal Oak) have signed the petition to force the amendment out of committee.

U.S. Rep. Marvin Esch (R-Ann Arbor) has refused to sign the petition because it would circumvent the normal procedures.

**FORD REPORTEDLY** criticized Federal Judge Stephen Roth's rejection of the Detroit-only plan before hearing from suburban attorneys on the metropolitan plans.

"The judges's decision in the light of all the Supreme Court decisions seems to be outrageous," Ford said. Ford signed the petition along with four other Michigan Democrats after Judge Roth's action. Others were Reps. John D. Dingell, Martha Griffiths and Lucien N. Nedzi, all of Detroit, and James G. O'Hara of Utica.

**A JOINT** statement released by the five states: "Yesterday's ruling by the District Court that a desegregation order would be entered before September and that the Detroit suburbs must be included in the order adds immediacy to the need for congressional action to stop further court-ordered bussing.

## 2 Reps Hold Out On Bus Plan

**LANSING**  
Observerland's two liberal state representatives remained opposed when the House picked up 12 more votes last week to force an anti-bussing proposal out of committee.

Both Reps. Marvin Stempien (D-Livonia) and Joseph Forbes (D-Oak Park) continued to vote against the measure to pry the proposed constitutional amendment out of the Committee on amendment and Revision of the Constitution.

Voting in favor of the maneuver were Reps. Richard Young (D-Dearborn Heights), John Bennett (D-

Redford Township), James Tierney (D-Garden City), Thomas Brown (D-Westland), Raymond Baker (R-Farmington), and James Dedefaugh (R-Birmingham).

The first vote the previous week fell three votes short of the 56 needed for passage and failed 53-43. The legislators scraped up 12 more favorable votes for the March 29th vote when it passed 65-36.

The amendment would prohibit assigning pupils to specific schools for the purpose of achieving racial balance without the written permission of the child's parents or guardians.

# Baseball Image Scarred

The baseball players strike that put an abrupt end to the training season and cast a shadow over the opening day festivities may leave a permanent scar on what often has been referred to as the national pastime.

Ever since the game was invented by Abner Doubleday way back when it has enjoyed popularity from high and low and nothing in the athletic world outranked it in prestige. Even in the Congress of the United States--the last word in legislation--it has been granted privileges unknown to any other group.

It has been as American as apple pie and even the most stubborn players in the past have capitulated to the thought that by their actions they were hurting the youth of the land.

**THERE WAS** a time, some years ago, when even the Mighty Babe Ruth, then at the top of his career, yielded to the pleadings of the country's youth to give up extra curricular habits and act like their idol should act.

The late New York Mayor Jimmy Walker took "The Babe" in hand and reminded him of the thousands of freckled faced kids he was letting down.

With tears in his eyes "The Babe" pledged himself to the nation's "kids" and again became their idol to the end of his career.

Meanwhile many things have changed in baseball. No longer is it a game in which the lads from the hills and the small towns make all sorts of sacrifices just to get a chance to make good. They walked to training camps with little thought of such a thing as a bonus.

Today's ball player, in most instances, is a collegebred who reports for work with a portfolio.

They realize the value of money. More than that, they realize that their careers are short at best and they have only a few years to earn "big" money and they make every effort to get it.

**THIS IS** the reason they have been stubborn in their demands for increased pensions. Their bodies burn out much quicker in the world of athletics and they are hopeful of setting up funds to care for them in old age.

Meanwhile management has changed with the players. No longer are the club owners the real fans they were in the days of Frank J. Navin, of the Tigers, Charles Comiskey, of the White Sox, Barney Drefuss of the Pittsburgh Pirates; Connie Mack of the Athletics; and Clark Griffith of the Washington Senators.

First, they set up the "reserve clause" that literally makes slaves of the players. Once a player signs with any of the major leagues he becomes their chattel to be

sold or traded at will until the end of his career.

This is considered a violation of the anti-trust laws of the land. But baseball was granted the exception by order of the United States Congress.

Next television came on the scene and dumped untold millions into the game in the way of sponsorship of the major classics.

So money became so available that a question often

has been asked, "Is baseball a business or a sport?"

All the while the game lost none of its prestige until a few years ago when professional football entered the scene. The pro football game became "poor man's college games" and jammed every stadium in the country.

Because of this trend baseball's right to be rated the "national pastime" has been challenged.

Now the baseball players

strike may turn many fans away from the game and the ranking will be lost.

Likewise, should the U.S. Supreme Court rule against the reserve clause in a case brought by Curt Flood, former St. Louis Cardinal outfielder, the managers will lose their hold. Players no longer will be "slaves".

So, the entire face of the game could be changed all because of the baseball players strike that is bringing matters to a head.






The lone returning starter is All-League outfielder John Gentz and surprisingly enough, Klozik is excited about the challenge with a new young team.


"We have a great group of enthusiastic players," added Klozik. "With a few breaks it could be a very interesting season."

Bentley opens with Bloomfield on April 4 and clashes with Belleville in the first Suburban Eight contest on April 18.







Senior Bob Graustein was to be the starting catcher for the third consecutive season but has decided to concentrate on football. Graustein won acclaim this past football season as the area's top quarterback.

"I felt Bob had the makings of an All-League catcher," said Majeski. "But he has made his choice to stick with football all the way and I am behind him 100 per cent."

Football has made its move into Thurston sports in more ways than one. A total of 12 of the 18 man baseball roster played varsity football in the fall.

Murdock is returning to his third base slot with a .280 mark and has been voted captain of the '72 squad. Poma is the "little man" in the starting lineup at 5-7 and 160 pounds and is looking to improve upon his '71 average of .240.

MARK FALVO, Bruce Hoben, Scott Irwin, and John

Stein round out the list of lettermen with a new face breaking into the backstop duties left vacant by Graustein. Junior Mike Robinson is expected to take over the chores with Majeski highly optimistic on his capability.

"The real battle is at the shortstop position," added Majeski. "Sophomore Tom Dowdy and Mark Falvo are in the running."

Falvo is also the No. 3 hurler in the Eagle attack with Sophomore Ray Ivey the No. 4 man. Falvo chalked up a two win and no loss record last season with the reserve squad.

THURSTON opens with Plymouth Friday on the Eagle diamond and has four more non-league clashes before the first Northwest battle with North Farmington on April 17.





## Turf Tips, Quips

Three betting marks in as many nights including a record high handle for a Saturday night . . . that's the impressive mark established by Wolverine Raceway during the past weekend and Monday.

Wagering for Thursday, the day before Good Friday, was an all-time high for a Thursday of \$654,400. That bettered the previous high of \$555,455 set on April 11, 1968.

Most everyone connected with harness racing knew Saturday was going to be one of the biggest nights of the entire season. Racing Secretary Bill Connors had arranged a card that included all of the best races from what normally would have been Friday and Saturday programs.

Michigan tracks by state law are dark on Good Friday. . . thus Connors was able to come up with a 10-race program that was second to none offered in the area this year.

And the fans bought it in large numbers. Saturday's crowd of 10,899 was the largest of the year and it follows that wagering had to be a high and it was . . . \$334,895 . . . most ever for a Saturday and the third largest handle in Wolverine history.

Then to top it all . . . the track started Monday with 5,896 braving a snowstorm and a tricky racing strip to pour \$521,415 through the machines for one of the better Mondays.

One would have to say that Wolverine is off to the best spring start in several years and if business continues . . . the track should break all of the records established.

THERE'S ONLY one rub . . . the tracks are still negotiating with the mutual clerks' union on a new contract and the information is that the parties are still far apart and haven't settled down to a discussion of money.

It will be recalled that the mutual clerks' union didn't receive a salary hike a year ago when money matters remained at status quo because the state legislature didn't grant the tracks an additional one per cent of the mutual handle for operations.

The union had agreed that any increases in 1971 would be hinged on the additional one per cent . . . Inasmuch as the additional funds were not forthcoming, neither was the raise.

And that's one of the reasons why the union negotiators are being so hard to get along with this year.

Hazel Park, which started rather slowly in February, is now beginning to show signs of the increased business as attested to a handle of \$1,319,000 on Saturday.

That was a high for the year and is an indication that racing may be on the way to its best year after the thoroughbreds suffered through a bad time a year ago.

What we're trying to say is don't discount the possibility of a walkout. The weather is getting warmer, business is getting better and what would be a more opportune time to put pressure on the track managements than a strike when things are at the peak? Only time will provide the answer. We hope an agreement is reached without picketing, it's much better for all.

HARNESS RACING'S third world driving championship, a tournament unique in horse racing, will pay its first visit to Wolverine Raceway, Monday night, May 1.

Wolverine will be one of the 11 tracks in the United States and Canada to stage the colorful international competition, sponsored by Harness Tracks of America and held this year between April 24 and May 6.

General Manager Dick Wilson said that Herve Filion of Canada, the world record holder with 543 victories in 1971, and Joe O'Brien, leading U.S. driver last year in HTA's all around championship standings, have been selected as the first drivers to compete and will race against six other international driving stars.

The championship tournament will get underway April 24 at Maywood Park in Chicago and will conclude some 45 races later with the crowning of the 1972 champion driver at Liberty Bell Park in Philadelphia, May 6.



## Cut Flowers Like Soft Drinks, Too

**EAST LANSING** There are several things a person can do to extend the vase life of cut flowers, says Dr. William Carpenter, Michigan State University horticulturist.

He offers these tips: The most unusual - but effective - flower preservatives are Sprite and 7-Up. The citric acid and carbonation in the soft drinks control the development of microorganisms that can block water-conducting vessels of rose stems and reduce firmness. Sugar in the soft drinks sustains life.

Carpenter recommends mixing one part water with each part soft drink and adding a half teaspoon of chlorine bleach to each quart of solution. The bleach cuts bacterial growth.

Floral foams, used by retail

florists for improving floral designs and ease of handling, can extend rose vase life as much as two days more than just water. Foams have been developed for various uses, including holding flowers and supplying water, but they also contain chemicals that extend rose life. MSU research is investigating new chemicals that will further extend flower vase life.

Immersing the stems of carnations and roses in a solution containing an experimental chemical (TH 6241) and a floral preservative for 12 to 14 hours can increase vase life 30 to 40 per cent. After that the flowers are put into the floral preservative alone.

The chemical will soon be released for commercial use and the procedure is expected to be widely adopted by commercial flower producers.

## Miracle Plant 'Con Men' Sign Of Spring

**LANSING** Spring time brings the annual warning to home gardeners against the miracle plant con men and the miracle plant racket by Attorney General Frank J. Kelley, Director B. Dale Ball of the Michigan Department of Agriculture and the Michigan Association of Nurserymen.

This warning is emphasized by the increased desire of the public to improve environment and fight air pollution because trees, shrubs and even grass give off needed oxygen and absorb carbon dioxide.

The public is warned against high pressure salesmen and mail order advertisers using fancy names for ordinary shrubs and plants and making exaggerated claims for their plant material.

Beware of glowing word descriptions and faked photographs of climbing vine peaches, giant climbing strawberries, 1,000 giant red roses on a single bush, flowering shade trees that grow roof high in a single year, etc.

"All consumer complaints, including verbal misrepresentations are received by the Consumer Protection Division of the Attorney General's office and appropriate action is taken, said Assistant Attorney General Edwin M. Bladen. "It is our experience that purchasers who deal with established local merchants can see what they are buying and are not misled by photographs or lurid verbal pictures."

"One cannot expect to get high quality stock at ridiculously low prices," said Dean F. Lovitt, chief of the plant industry division of the Dept. of Agriculture.

"Purchasers should always demand a certificate of inspection with the stock as their assurance that it has passed inspection for insects and diseases. Local nurserymen usually are familiar with local conditions and the varieties likely to do well in an

area, and their advice can be helpful," he said.

There are reliable mail order houses but there is no substitute for the expert service on selection, planting and care of the plant that your local nurseryman can give you," said M.A.N. Exec. Sec. Victor C. Beresford. "He wants to protect your interests so he can continue to serve you. That's why we advise - 'Ask Your Nurseryman First.'"

## How To Multiply Your Dahlia Crop

**EAST LANSING** Care to multiply your dahlia crop this summer without any extra cost? According to horticulturists at Michigan State University, several plants can be propagated from a single dormant clump. Just follow these steps:

1. Plant the dormant clump in a box or pail of moist soil. Place the container in a warm location near light with the roots covered but the crown exposed.
2. When the young shoots produce three to four sets of

leaves, cut them off and stick them in a propagating media (sand and soil).

3. Water lightly every day to keep the sand moist.
4. When roots develop, in 15 to 20 days, plant in a protected area in the garden or in pots.

To propagate even more plants, grow an extra crop of cuttings from the cut stumps or divide the roots with one or two buds on each root. Dahlias grow best in hot weather with full sunshine and rich soil.



A word about apples: How many apple varieties have there been since the days of Adam and Eve? No one knows, but we do know that over 7,000 different apple varieties have been given names in recorded history.

Is there anything to the idea that "an apple a day keeps the doc away?" I think there is. In fact, all fruits are healthy for you.

A study at Michigan State University revealed that students who ate two or three apples daily and regularly over three experimental periods made significantly fewer calls at the University Health Service clinic for treatment of upper respiratory illnesses and tension - pressure illnesses than the balance of the student body.

A study in Russia at about the same time revealed that 177 of 180 cases of hypertension were relieved by an apple diet.

IN 1965, another study was made at four small institutions of higher learning in Rochester, N.Y. A part of the subjects ate just one apple between dinner and bedtime each day, for one consecutive year. A control group had no restrictions or special diet requirements.

Of the subjects eating an apple each day 24.2 per cent were free of illnesses associated with colds during the year of the study.

Only 8.5 per cent of the non-apple eaters were free of colds during the same experimental period... a three to one ratio in favor of eating apples for cold prevention.

Some ingredient in apples seems to have the effect of producing greater immunity or resistance to upper respiratory illness.

Why not set out some dwarf fruits this spring? You get double bonus: fruit, plus shade, and you help improve our environment, since the trees suck up pollutants and give off oxygen for us to breathe.

All trees are a joy forever. Bring joy to your little corner of the world. Plant a tree today for tomorrow.

**HOME GROWN tomatoes:** If you're starting your own plants indoors, remember that they like uniform heat for germination. Start them at 72 degrees, and keep them moist. After they are sown in an artificial soil mix, fine - ground compost, or Jiffy pellets, keep them in a cool room, around 65 degrees if possible.

Transplant as soon as the plants are large enough to handle, water thoroughly and keep slightly shaded for a day or two. It's good to harden them off a bit in a cold frame. This year why not grow your tomatoes on a wire fence so

you can pick them on both sides?

**GREEN THUMB CLINIC:** "I raised some day plants from cuttings taken from the parent plants brought indoors last fall. Now the young plants have pieces of glass - like crystals on them. I can't find any insects."

Answer: Day plants or Impatiens have the strange ability to absorb fertilizer salts and deposit them as tiny crystals. They also have nectaries which give off sugar - like crystals. Sometimes aphids will exude a honeydew material which is sweet. Wash them off in the bathtub.



**DELICIOUS IS THE WORD** for Brussels sprouts when they're harvested while young, stripped of outer leaves and boiled just a few minutes, then seasoned with butter, salt, pepper.

## Cabbage Clan Can Be Started Early

Broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower and kohlrabi are all members of the cabbage clan and all are grown in much the same way.

Cabbage is the hardiest of the five; transplants able to survive even zero temperature. Broccoli, cauliflower, sprouts and kohlrabi should be planted 10 days later than cabbage and transplanted a bit later too.

Depending on how early you wish to harvest a crop, seeds of all the clan may be sown in a hot bed, cold frame or in one corner of the garden, covered by kotkaps, then, after seedlings have been thinned and weather moderates, transplanted to the garden row.

However, both broccoli and kohlrabi need no transplanting and can be sown as soon as soil is workable where they are to grow.

Thin the seedlings to allow 6 inches between plants for kohlrabi, eight or 10 inches for broccoli.

After the center heads of broccoli are picked, side branches produce smaller heads, thus prolonging the yield. But successive small sowings, every two or three weeks, of either vegetable, will keep them on the table until frost.

**SEEDLINGS** of cabbage, sprouts or cauliflower, started early and thinned to leave husky plants, can be moved to the row beginning, in the North, about April 10 for cabbage, April 20 for the others.

Space transplants 15 inches apart and, if there is little

room, set them in any vacant spot. Successive sowings are possible if desired.

Harvest all crops when young and tender, cabbage beginning when heads have formed, kohlrabi when stem enlargement is golf-ball size (no larger), broccoli while flower buds are still tightly folded, cauliflower while curd is firm.

Special care for cauliflower includes tying leaves up around the curd when it is half-dollar size to keep out light and blanch it.


All of the cabbage clan are beloved of pests. Cutworms are controlled by placing stiff three - inch - wide cardboard collars around stems, 1/2 inch from stem and extending one inch below the soil level.

Cabbage loopers, cabbage maggots, cabbage worms are kept at bay by a weekly dusting with rotenone and aphids yield to malathion.

## Suburban Gardener Good Landscaping Is Functional, Esthetic

Take a look at a new house—almost any new house—sitting in solitary splendor on its bare new lot. You don't need a second look to know that what that house needs is landscaping. It is landscaping that makes a house a home!

It needs a nice green lawn. It needs a tree or two. It needs a few shrubs.

Perhaps it needs a paved patio, a fence, a flower bed, or a vegetable garden.

Obviously it isn't the house that needs these things, but the people who are going to be living in the house.

**THE OPEN** grassy area is needed to give the kids a soft, springy relatively clean place on which to run around and play or on which to sprawl and relax.

A tree is needed for the shade it casts in summer. It can be like an oasis in the desert and make the difference between a pleasant habitable yard and one that is unbearable and unusable.

A border of shrubs or a hedge can enclose the back yard giving the privacy needed for outdoor living. Or shrubs can be used to separate one part of the yard from another, creating several different areas for different uses.

Perhaps a deck is needed to create a level space in a sloping yard, or a patio may be desirable to provide a firm, dry area for outdoor cooking and eating.

**DON'T OVERLOOK** the need for maintenance. Design the outdoor spaces so they won't be too difficult for you to take care of. Choose plants that will not need special care or babying.

Use ones that like the conditions you have—that are right for the sun and shade, the wind and moisture, and soil fertility that they will be growing with.

In addition to the functional reasons for having landscaping, there are esthetic reasons—the things that are done just for eye appeal. These are less definite, but are just as important.

That green grass that makes such a good play surface also makes a beautiful uncluttered setting for the house and for flowers.

The tree that casts a needed oasis of shade is a transition between the house and the surrounding world. Visually,

trees tie the house to its environment.

**TREES ALSO** have psychological values. They give the feeling of protection and shelter. The leafy canopy, which is the roof in your outdoor room, brings the outdoor space into a scale in which people feel more comfortable than when "the sky is the limit."

In addition there are also other esthetic considerations. Tree trunks are strong vertical accents. The branches create patterns and forms and shadows. The leaves have texture and color and movement.

On some trees there are bonuses such as beautiful flowers and colorful fruits that attract birds to the yard.

Shrubs, so useful for screens and barriers, can provide visual delights, too. Flowers, fruits and leaves provide color and texture. Evergreen shrubs give color all year.

Shrubs can soften the rigid lines of a house corner or even camouflage an awkward architectural line. They can be a focal point in the back yard, or the accent that calls attention to the front entrance.

**THE PAVING** used in a yard for walks and drives and patios can have esthetic appeal. Bricks, and concrete, stones and railroad ties have texture as well as color. Interesting compositions can be worked out either subtly blending various textures and hues or else boldly contrasting them. Use the building materials of patios and walls and drives with an artistic eye.

Consider also, the design and form of the beds and patios, the walks and walls. Patterns can be devised that add interest to the yard.

A patio of a particular shape may not be more functional than one of another form, but it may make the yard more esthetic. It may "tie in" better with other features such as the slope of the land, or a blower bed or a tree.

Shapes and forms and textures and other details can be repeated with variations to create a beautiful unified yard. Keep this "Theme and Variations" idea in mind. It is the basis of all artistic compositions.

When you plan the landscaping for the new house on its bare lot, or for an established home with inadequate landscaping, or for an older house smothered in overgrown greenery, the problems may be different but

the principles are the same. Plan first before you do any planting or transplanting. Keep in mind both utility and beauty.

**CONSIDER FIRST** the ways the yard will be used. Plan for an entrance or arrival area in front or wherever your main entrance is located. Plan for a service area, and plan for an outdoor living area. Consider function first and plan so the area will work well.

Then consider the esthetics, and plan so your yard will create the impression you want—formal or casual, natural or controlled, lively or serene, traditional or contemporary.

Decide first on the mood or atmosphere you want to create. Then by planning and selecting the proper building materials, the right trees and shrubs and flowers, and by careful attention to details you will have beautiful landscaping that really pleases you.

## Seedling Or Weed?

Many amateur gardeners share a problem each spring when the seeds they have planted for flowering annuals first begin to come up. The problem is to determine whether the new bit of green growth is a weed, which should be pulled, or a seedling to be protected.

The American Association of Nurserymen suggests a simple step to help solve the dilemma. Sow a small quantity of each variety of seeds indoors with appropriate labels to identify them at the same time the seeds are sown outdoors in the garden.

The ones inside will come up before their outdoor relatives to give the gardener a chance to get used to their appearance.

A number of brief and helpful gardening suggestions have been compiled by the American Association of Nurserymen in a folder, "More Pleasure from Your Plantings," available free at many nursery garden centers.



## How Do Alcoholics, Drug Users Compare?

Alcoholism is the drug abuse of the middle aged and the established - while other drugs are abused by the young and the alienated.

This picture comes out of a preliminary report of the Oakland County Alcohol and Drug Abuse Center, which compiled statistics of the "clients" that have entered their treatment program.

The drug abuse center, located in Royal Oak, accepts mainly court referrals.

With a professional staff and the clout of a threatened prison sentence behind it, their program has been lauded by Southfield's 46th district court as the most successful developed so far.

Both the alcoholics and the drug addicts enter the program after they have been convicted by a local court. The alcoholic is typically arrested on a drunk and disorderly charge, or a traffic violation, according to Barbara Katke, a staffer at the center.

A drug user usually tangles with the drug laws.

MORE DRUG ADDICTS enter the program than alcoholics, despite the larger number of alcoholics in society, reflecting mainly the court arrest and referral attitudes.

On a typical month, about 35 alcoholics enter the "information program" at the center, and about 20 drug addicts.

Only two to three alcoholics enter a full scale treatment program, but about half of the drug users do.

It was from these people who entered the treatment program that the profile of the two kinds of drug abusers was drawn.

There were 17 alcoholics and 52 drug addicts interviewed for the study.

THE AVERAGE ALCOHOLIC in this sample is

35 years old, with a 50-50 chance of being married, the study says.

He is living with his spouse rather than alone or with friends.

The drug abuser, on the other hand, has an average age of 19 years. Forty-nine of the 52 people in the sample were single. Two-thirds of the group were still living at home.

In education, 13 of the alcoholics were high school

graduates and of these, five had gone to college.

The educational background of their parents tended to be at the high school level. Only one of the mothers had any college.

Only one alcoholic was still in school.

The drug abusers, being much younger, had a more varied educational background.

Of the 52 cases, only 15 were high school graduates.

The remaining 37 had not gone past the 11th grade.

In spite of this fact, only 16 were still in school at the time the data was collected. Thirty-one had either quit or were thrown out.

"THIS RATHER dismal educational record occurs," the study says, "in spite of an educational level among the parents of the drug abusers, which is far superior to that of the alcoholics."

## In Bus Case, 'Every Shot Is Desperation'

While the rank and file membership of Tri-County Citizens Thursday overwhelmingly supported Attorney Robert Lord's plea to "keep cool and let the courts decide" the busing issue, the dilemma of what to do if the busses finally roll was mentioned.

About 450 persons attended the Tri-County Citizens meeting at Pearson Junior High School Thursday night - the first such meeting since Federal Judge Stephen J. Roth ruled Tuesday that the solution to desegregating Detroit's schools lies outside that city's limits.

After Lord, who is representing the Tri-County group, explained the events leading up to Roth's March 15 decision to allow Tri-County Citizens to enter the Detroit school desegregation case as a defendant, the meeting was opened to questions from the audience.

IT WAS THEN that emotions began to run high.

A few persons asked what the "chances" were of "beating" a metropolitan school busing plan.

Lord said, "You've got as much chance as you can persuade three judges on the (U.S.) Appeals Court and nine on the (U.S.) Supreme Court." The audience moaned when the attorney described their day-to-day battle in Roth's court by quoting billiards champion Luther Lassiter who said, "Every shot is desperation."

"What do we do if we don't get a stay (prohibiting busing until all appeals have been heard) and the busses are here?" one man asked Lord.

"DO WHAT YOU have to do lawfully and trust in the courts," Lord said, although audience moans drowned out the end of his statement.

When the man again got up and said he wouldn't send his children to school, the audience cheered.

One woman suggested that every mother drive her child to the Detroit school he was ordered to attend rather than send him on the bus. This, she reasoned, would cause mass traffic tie-ups in the city.

Another woman, who asked Lord to estimate more specifically the chances of avoided busing between

suburban and Detroit schools, began to cry.

She said she had lived in Detroit for 20 years and had gone to school there herself as well as sending her children to the city's schools. "The Negro race's intentions were to run us out of town," she said. "I'm not going to send my children back there."

Turning to the audience she said, "I don't know how you feel ..." The audience applauded.

BUT THE TRI-COUNTY members ended the session by backing whatever legal means could be taken to avoid busing and reaffirmed their support of Lord.

"There are other assaults brewing," Lord told the group. "This organization should be permanent so that we have eyes and ears everywhere so that when anybody starts something we can smash back legally."

The attorney, who sometimes paced back and forth while others were speaking, said that in the present case they should continue to pursue "an honorable, lawful way."


## James Dvorak Assigned To Ohio AFB

# Billboard Law Gets More Local Support

LANSING Sens. David Plawecki (D-Dearborn Heights) and Daniel Cooper (D-Oak Park) voted for the final version of billboard control-law last week after opposing a weaker version that passed the Senate in January.

The final vote also drew support from Sen. William Faust (D-Westland), who was absent for the January vote, and from Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) totaling 31-0.

House support came from all but two Observerland representatives, James Defenbaugh (R-Birmingham), who voted against it, and Rep. Joseph Forbes (D-Oak Park), who did not vote.

Favoring it in the 56-32 vote were Rep. Richard Young (D-Dearborn Heights), John Bennett (D-Redford Township), Marvin Stempien (D-Livonia), James Tierney (D-Garden City),

Thomas Brown (D-Westland) and Raymond Baker (R-Farmington). All had voted for it previously except Tierney, who was ill at that time.

THOUGH slightly stronger than the original Senate version and weaker than the first House version, the bill gives cities, villages, counties and charter townships with populations over 50,000 power to regulate billboards by ordinance provided it doesn't conflict with state law.

In Observerland it means that Westland, Livonia and Southfield can regulate the size, lighting and spacing of billboards as long as they don't conflict with the state regulations.

Local governments who currently ban billboards can maintain their ban.

THE BILL cleared the House in time to save the state \$19.6 million in federal highway money which would have been lost if state guidelines were not brought into harmony with federal regulations.

It will permit up to 50 billboards per mile on highways inside city limits, up to 17 per mile on business routes outside city limits and a maximum of 10 per mile along interstate highways and freeways.

Permits must be obtained for each billboard and serial numbers given. Those signs unnumbered four months after the law takes effect will be considered abandoned and be removed.


It is estimated that the legislation could lead to removal of more than half of the 33,000 billboards along interstate and federal highways.





Originally Gilbert intended to satirize two rival curates in "Patience," but his fear of attacking the respectability of the established church prevented him.

Looking for another twosome to parody, he decided upon Reginald Bunthorne, "A Fleishy Poet," and Archibald Grosvenor, "An Idyllic Poet."

"Patience" is an attack on the esthetic craze then rampant in London, described by Richard D'Oyly Carte, producer of Gilbert and Sullivan operas, as the "outpouring of a clique of professors of ultra-refinement who preach the gospel of morbid languor and sickly sensuousness, which is half real and half affected by its high priests for the purpose of gaining social notoriety."

The strange conduct of Gilbert's poseurs in "Patience" is a fair reflection of pale Victorian dandies who actually did go about with sunflowers in their hands and who wore no colors but dull green and cobwebby and gray. There is no symbolism, no inquiry into the meaning of life - just a lot of happy Charlestoning (do-wacka-do) and spicy tunes you can hum all the way home.

If the actors had been allowed to deliver their lines in a more natural tone of voice, the periods between musical numbers would have been more enjoyable.

Miss Bell's portrayal of the saucy Hortense, although overmugged, was well received by the audience. Her one big number, "It's Nicer in Nice," provides some naughtiness to offset the purity of the young lovers, Polly and Tony.

Another bit of naughtiness is provided by Tony's dirty-rich-old-man father, Lord Brockhurst (Geoffrey Webb), who has a tendency to grab young ladies.

Webb is also the show's choreographer and deserves the most praise in that capacity.

# How OCC Can Improve Your Learning Skills

You wouldn't try to build a house without the necessary tools, yet many people try to build an education without the necessary skills.

This analogy is drawn by instructor James Orr of the Orchard Ridge campus of Oakland Community College who has proven to both young and old students that learning can be hampered without the necessary tools.

And because one of the goals of the Farmington Campus is to reach as many people in surrounding communities as possible, the college is offering a "summer enrichment program" to teach people how to use their learning skills.

The program was first offered last summer and drew so much attention that it continued during the fall and winter semesters.

HIGH SCHOOL juniors and seniors as well as adults can register for the six - week program, which meets three mornings a week. A tentative schedule is set for 9 a.m. until 12 noon July 3 to August 11 at a cost of \$30.

By its very nature, the program is flexible, and different time schedules can be arranged.

Most crucial among the tools that the program concentrates on is eye movement in reading. Also closely related are vocabulary, spelling and listening skills.

All these are improved by individual teaching, counseling and practice in the Individualized Programmed Learning Laboratory (IPLL).

But anyone can use the resources in the IPLL to learn more about any subject area whether it be basic mathematics or advanced calculus.

"UNFORTUNATELY in our schools today, we don't prepare students with the proper skills, Orr says.

Though the ability to read is so important, teachers don't train students efficient eye movement.

So in the IPLL, a student's eye movement can be recorded on film and mapped to show the student how efficiently or inefficiently he uses his eyes. Then using films and a special projector, the student can be guided into using his eye movement to maximum efficiency.

"Those are skills that can be taught," Orr said.

Along with improving reading skills, the professionals in the IPLL work individually with students to help them improve spelling and vocabulary - all necessary ingredients for a good reader.

GUIDANCE IN OTHER subject areas depends entirely on where the student is in his knowledge.

A student who is at a low level in math begins at that level and, through guidance and programs that the student works on alone, advances at his own speed.

The student who is at a high level of competency in science can use the programs to advance at a faster rate.

The summer program is a replica of programs that go on throughout the year on the campus. The resources in the center are available free to all students and for a \$30 charge (same as the charge for a three credit course) to anyone else who wants to improve their skills.

One of the most enthusiastic supporters of the program is Mrs. Audrey Jackee who works in the IPLL.

"I could sell this program backwards and forwards," she said. "It's not because I work here. But being a mother of a high school student, I think it's wonderful.

"I know these kids (high school students) have problems, and one of the really big problems they have is that they can't read efficiently.

"WE'RE NOT SAYING that you are going to fail if you don't take this course. But if we're introducing an easier way, why not take it?

"It's great for the students because it's not embarrassing for them. An instructor works with them individually," she said.

Orr said that their basic premise is that every student can achieve when he efficiently uses his skills.

"You don't try to build a house unless you have the necessary tools, so why try to learn without the basic skills?"

## Bill Would Ratify Rights Plan

LANSING Legislation to ratify the proposed U.S. constitutional amendment guaranteeing equal rights for women was introduced in the State House by Rep. Marvin Stempien (D-Livonia).

"In an age when many women find themselves cast in the roles of wage earners, homeowners and other situations formerly considered the sole province of males, it is utterly wrong that discrimination against women should continue to exist in public housing, employment accommodations, education and any other area," Stempien said.

The proposed amendment was recently approved by the U.S. Congress but must be ratified by 38 states before it can be added to the Constitution.

The proposed amendment states that equality of rights



# The Coming Apart Of Fortress Suburbia

Bert Lahr used to do an act with an 11-foot pole. It was called "The Things You Wouldn't Touch With a 10-Foot Pole," and it conveyed very nicely the attitude of the suburbs towards New York City.

For most suburbanites, the city means crime, filth, racial tension, social disorder and traffic congestion. It embodies all the troubles they wish would stay away from their doors. So, to keep the city at a distance, suburbanites have built thick walls in the form of exclusionary taxes and zoning laws enforced by an incredibly complex series of interlocking townships, municipalities, school districts and other authorities.

Now these walls are beginning to crack. The crumbling process, which is going on all across the country, is perhaps the dominant feature of American political life today. And powerful outside agents speed the coming apart.

For one thing, courts all over the country are upholding civil rights groups which challenge zoning and tax privileges.

For another thing, federal agencies, notably the Department of Housing and Urban Development, are pushing the suburbs to take on some of the burden of urban problems.

But these visible efforts are making headway only because they harmonize with a hidden force inside the suburbs. Rapid, headlong growth -- that quintessential suburban quality -- has created a subversive influence, a kind of time bomb within the suburban fortress...

## Who's Left Out?

Bus drivers, repairmen, janitors and electricians -- the blue-collar workers who man the industries and facilities the suburbs now need to be self-sustaining -- cannot afford to

live in the suburban areas where they work. The same applies to operatives in the factories that are increasingly locating in the suburbs -- often for tax reasons.

A second group of suburban malcontents is older people -- many of them first generation residents of the suburbs. Their children have grown up, and they no longer want their large homes on big lots. Still less do they want to move back to the center cities. They would like relatively cheap homes or apartments in the suburbs. But these are not to be had.

As William Cahill, governor of the essentially suburban State of New Jersey, put it in a recent housing message to the legislature: "Our senior citizens living on fixed incomes cannot continue to pay spiraling property taxes on their homes, nor the high rental cost of an apartment, if any at all are available."

The younger suburbanites are in the same fix as their parents. They have spent much of their lives in suburbia, and they want to work and raise their families there. But they don't have the money for larger homes. The kind of apartments they need are in especially short supply, since 80 per cent of the zoning laws in the New York suburbs, devised with the idea of cutting down education costs by limiting accommodations for children, forbid apartments of more than a single bedroom.

However, the post-war baby boom means that young people in the family-forming age bracket are the fastest-growing segment of the population.

One suburban sociologist, Professor Herbert Gans of Columbia, believes that the pressure of the young couples is itself powerful enough to crack existing restrictions. "So many young families are already starting to form," he says, "that change has to come."

## Realtors React

The cumulative effect of all this push for change inside the suburbs finds its most sensitive register in the marketplace.

Those prime movers and shakers of American society, the real estate developers, sense the shift of demand, and they are rapidly lining up to capitalize on it. Perhaps the most striking feature of the New York Times' survey of the New York suburbs was the near unanimity of the comments by builders and developers.

Here is David Bogdanoff, one of the biggest developers in Westchester (N.Y.) speaking: "Setting yourself up as a prestige town with large-lot zoning won't work anymore. There just aren't that many people who can afford upper-middle-class housing to fill all those towns."

This is Peter Taylor, of Levitt & Sons: "We're a mass builder. But our market is rapidly decreasing. We've tried to drive the costs down, but we still can't sell a guy who makes under 17 grand a year."

In the townships and counties, zoning and tax decisions regularly go against projects for more apartments and small homes. So intense is the feeling that the chairman of New York State's Urban Development Corporation, Edward Logue, has preferred to negotiate with suburban officials for new housing rather than to invoke his power to override zoning laws...

Riding to the rescue of the forces for change is a potent new ally -- the Department of Housing and Urban Development and its chief officer, Secretary George Romney.

For most of its life, and in most of its activities HUD has been a brick-and-mortar outfit. Its primary function has been to subsidize building, either indirectly through guaranteed mortgages on private homes or directly by doling out funds to local public housing authorities.

During the Johnson Administration, the amount of funding rose sharply, and it was directed very largely at housing in the center cities. The result has been a fiasco...

In city after city, and especially in the older downtown sections of the oldest cities, new projects have foundered fast. Maintenance and upkeep were inadequate. Mortgage and rental payments fell behind. Many units were abandoned after only a few years of use.


## HUD A Slumlord

Now, as the cycle of failure and foreclosure runs its course...Secretary Romney is becoming the biggest slumlord in history.

Not surprisingly, this experience has had an impact on the outlook at HUD. Romney gathered in his years as governor of Michigan a keen awareness of the social factors in housing. But the Nixon Administration has not exactly had as its chief objective the notion of mixing whites with blacks -- least of all in the suburbs.

So, Gov. Romney and his men were obliged to fall in with the brick-and-mortar emphasis at HUD. At the start, anyhow, their big program was Operation Breakthrough, a scheme for bringing assembly-line efficiency to bear on the production of housing. But with more and more new housing going bad, Romney and the department were virtually shoved off the production kick. As burgeoning slumlords, they suddenly had their noses rubbed in the social side of the housing problems.

As the Nixon Administration entered its fourth year, Romney was as a man converted. He had become a leading apostle of the view that pouring new housing into the ghetto was a self-defeating game.



"It's impossible," he said in a press conference early this month, "to solve the problems of the central cities in the central cities alone." Having laid down that truth, he was cautiously prepared to take the consequences.

For one thing, he established a basic guideline, effective Feb. 7, which bars the concentration of more public housing in the inner city.

For a second, he has begun promoting the idea of housing allowances paid to ghetto families. That proposal, originally pushed in the Nixon Administration by Pat Moynihan, would give at least some city residents the opportunity to look for apartments or homes in the suburbs.

Thirdly, the secretary has been lavish in his support of the regional arrangements now in effect in Dayton, O., and Washington, D.C. whereby public housing is distributed on a quota basis by agreement between the central city and the surrounding counties.

Finally, Romney has been talking up Operation TACLE -- Total American Community Living Environment. This project was pushed on Secretary Romney and other HUD officials by James W. Rouse, developer of the new, racially-integrated town of Columbia, Maryland, who is now working on a multi-million-dollar project for reviving downtown Hartford.

What Romney now has in mind, essentially, and what TACLE seems to point toward, is the development of new towns within towns.

That is, a concerted effort by the federal government, local business, and suburban authorities for joint ventures to rebuild the central cities in a way that will connect them with the outer cities.

To be sure, George Romney is not all that powerful -- even within the Nixon Administration. It is known that

he was once lectured long and hard by (then) Atty. Gen. John Mitchell on the need to stay loyal to the president or to resign. It remains a question whether he is on Mr. Nixon's first team or even on his taxi squad.

## The Courts Rule

There is yet another force pushing the elbow of Romney and all other federal officials: state and federal courts, in a wide-ranging series of decisions, many of them arising from civil rights actions, have been obliging officials to batter down the walls between the inner city and the suburbs.

Four key decisions have been handed down in the housing field.

The first (in the so-called Lackawanna Case) questioned zoning by the city of Lackawanna, N.Y. A federal district court threw out that town's zoning provisions on the ground they were merely a subterfuge to protect white neighborhoods against public housing apt to be occupied by blacks. The Lackawanna decision was upheld by the Supreme Court last April.

The second ruling (in the Gautreaux Case) questioned the location of housing subsidized by HUD and the Chicago Housing Authority. A federal district court first ordered an end to concentrating public housing in all-black neighborhoods. It has now ordered that public housing be scattered in white neighborhoods throughout metropolitan Chicago.

The third ruling (in the Shannon Case) questioned the siting of public housing in fringe ghetto areas. A federal district court ruled that HUD could not locate projects in mixed black-and-white areas, if the result would be to tip the district into an all-black neighborhood.

Finally, in the case of Crow vs. Fulton County Commissioners, there is an absolute breach of the suburban barrier. A federal district court in Georgia has ordered Atlanta and suburban Fulton County to develop a housing plan for the whole metropolitan area. This ruling will, in effect, foster the scattering of public housing projects in the white suburbs.

## School, Tax Cases

On top of those cases, there are related rulings in the education and housing fields. In education, the new landmark is the Richmond decision handed down by Federal District Judge Robert Merhige, Jr. on Jan. 11, which is now up for appeal.

It holds that, to achieve school desegregation, the predominantly black inner city school district must be merged with two almost entirely white suburban school districts. It strongly implies that such

merger procedures should apply to northern cities and the suburbs, not merely to the South, which has been the explicit target for civil rights legislation.

As to taxes, the landmark cases are the Serrano decision of the Supreme Court of California and the Rodriguez decision of the Federal District Court in San Antonio, Texas. In both cases, a decent education has been accepted as a constitutional right.

In both there is a finding that the practice of financing education through property taxes yields grossly unfair results. Specifically, there is evidence that the relatively heavy taxes paid by parents in the inner cities produce schools of poorer quality than those generated by the relatively low property taxes of the more affluent suburbs.

In both cases, therefore, the whole basis of financing education through property taxes is called into question. The issue has escalated above the level of suburban government, where restrictions are entrenched, up to the state and national level.

Partly as a result, California is already moving toward a uniform state-wide property tax. The Nixon Administration is preparing a scheme (known as VAT 73) which would, by next year, introduce a value added tax, or national sales levy, in place of the property tax as the chief producer of school funds. These two possible changes are surely portents of further change.

Financing education through property taxes has been such a dominant feature of the city and suburban landscape that nobody knows what consequences will result from its obliteration.

## Cracks In The Wall

Which is precisely the point. The present relationship between inner city and outer city, between decaying black downtown and thriving suburbia, is not stable. Ongoing social, political and legal forces keep the suburbs in tremendous flux. Nobody seems to see, even through a glass darkly, where the next 10 years will lead, to say nothing of the longer perspective.

Certainly no one should imagine that there will soon emerge that dream of the planners -- large scale metropolitan government embracing in unified jurisdiction both the inner and the outer city. But neither is the future likely to be characterized by the present split between city and suburbs.

The only sure things are the cracks in the suburban wall. They augur yet more of the eternal pulling down and rebuilding that has been the recurrent feature of American life.

## RE One Has Service Contract

Real Estate One is offering a free one-year service contract to buyers of houses that have been listed and sold by that firm.

President Richard S. Elsea said the contract "will be paid for by Real Estate One and will be serviced by Palace Guard, a division of American Homeowners Association, Inc., headquartered in Milwaukee."

The contract will cover all needed repair or replacement of heating, plumbing and electrical systems in the house. The contract is currently available on a limited basis but will be expanded so that in three months all the firm's sales will be covered.

Elsea added: "The contract is not all-inclusive and is limited to specific but very important systems in the home. The home must be owner-occupied. This is a repair service contract and does not cover updating or building code compliance, nor does it include structural repairs or such things as household appliances, air conditioning or water softeners."

Elsea credited the plan, begun two weeks ago, with drawing both buyers and sellers and predicted 1972 sales would jump 35 per cent above '71s.

## 136,000 New Phone Numbers

"Please look in the book first," says Michigan Bell as it began distribution of its 1972 phone directories in Farmington, Garden City, Livonia, Northville, Plymouth, and a part of Westland.

John Peard, local Michigan Bell manager, said the Northwest suburban books contain some 136,000 new numbers and other changes in the white pages listings since last year's publication.

All area numbers are up to date as of Jan. 18.

"For these reasons," Peard said, "we urge telephone users to use the new directory for looking up numbers instead of dialing our 'new number information' operators."

THAT SERVICE, he said, is for those customers who wish to reach telephones installed with new numbers since Jan. 18. In addition, that service is also for those located where no directory is available, where one simply cannot find a certain listing in the book and for the physically handicapped.

Peard said recent surveys showed that 10 per cent of customers make about 50 per cent of all calls to new number information.

"This means that a majority of customers are bearing the burden of cost for the small per cent who regularly make excessive use of this service," he said.

Michigan Bell has ordered some 216,000 directories for distribution in the area. It will take 3,000 men and women more than three weeks to complete delivery of the phone books to residences and businesses in the tri-county area.

BRINGING THIS multi-million book load, the largest of its kind in the country, will be nearly 200 railroad box cars and piggy-backs and 15

trailers. Now arriving daily, these loads will continue until April 10.

If any customer wants an extra directory for a telephone location in his home or business which hasn't had one, Peard said that customer may call Michigan Bell's local business office and an extra copy will be sent to him.

## What Do We Owe Children?

By BETTY MASSON

How much do we really owe our children.

"Practically nothing," says Rabbi Mordecai S. Halpern, "... as far as material things are concerned."

"It is absolutely appalling to watch how kids in our community are pampered, spoiled and deluged with gifts, clothes, cars, money and things. No wonder some of them are living in communes and in the hills."

RABBI HALPERN, spiritual leader of Congregation Beth Shalom of Oak Park, made his observations recently for the Town Hall series of Birmingham Temple in Farmington.

They grew, he said, out of three years' research on "what has been happening to you as adults - and to our children as the forthcoming generation."

What do we owe our children?

Two things, according to the Rabbi.

"First, to teach him or her to be a 'mensch' (a fine human being). How? Through example."

"Second, to give them a first-rate education, general and Jewish, combining the best elements and teachers of Western culture, with the finest possibilities of Jewish learning."

Rabbi Halpern implied that a third thing parents owe their children is time. He told of

meeting one 12-year-old in his religious school who seemed to be wasting a great potential.

"He looked up at me and through tears said, 'My father doesn't care what I do and my mother is never home,'" said the Rabbi.

RABBI HALPERN told his audience to "ease up a bit."

"Life is short enough. I know. I'm in the ICU (intensive care unit of hospitals) every week visiting our members in their 40s."

"After you've given your best, you owe your children nothing more - they owe you. They owe you a modicum of respect, affection and friendship, and they've got to earn their own way and deserve, just like you did."

There are four things parents do not owe their children according to Rabbi Halpern - money, beyond their education, over-protection from the raw elements of life and death, the license to do as they please and continuous attachment.

"And," he said, "we owe ourselves as parents, more than we owe them, the ability to let go."

He added, "I have one simple statement to make to parents. When older teenage children cause great pain - on heavy drugs - or miserable disrespect - or refusal to bear their responsibility in the household - to use the vernacular - tell them to shape up or get out!"

"At some point, for each parent to determine, a child should learn that the parent is Number One, not the child. That the parent has rights, just as does the child, and when that line is crossed, it is going to be the child who changes most, not the parent!"

RABBI HALPERN said that he was brought up as an environmentalist, "but I am becoming more and more of a hereditary person."

He advised his listeners to

think of raising children in terms of baseball. Two out of four is not a bad average and three out of four would be phenomenal.

"By what right ofchutzpah (nerve) do you think you will develop two out of two or three out of three or four out of four superb children?"

He discussed at length all the changes which have affected the modern family, bringing with them changing attitudes toward discipline. In a sign he saw, the advice was

"spank," in 1910; "deprive," in 1920; "ignore," in 1930; "reason," in 1940; "love," in 1950; "spank lovingly," in 1960; and "to hell with them," in 1970.

"AT THIS particular time, we have less control over the direction of our children's lives than ever before. In the early years we should give love and understanding, and then just pray. Our kids are going to live their own lives and we should live our own lives."

## African Princess, 3 Men Livonia Town Hall Stars

An African princess will share the spotlight with humorist Sam Levenson, journalist Charles Bartlett and oceanographer Jon Lindbergh in the Livonia Town Hall's 1972-73 lecture series.

Princess Elizabeth Bagaya of Toro also is a lawyer, model and actress - and United Nations ambassador - at large from Uganda.

She will open the Town Hall series Wednesday, Oct. 18. Levenson, the former teacher famed for his homespun wit, will be the headliner Nov. 15.

Pulitzer prize winner Bartlett is scheduled on Jan. 17, and Lindbergh winds up the series March 21.

Later she was asked to be a special envoy from the president of Uganda to the United Nations. Her talk is expected to cover a lot of African history as well as give a look into the worlds of modeling and diplomacy.

LEVENSON, who started telling funny stories while teaching in Brooklyn, is known nationally as a television personality and writer as well as night club humorist.

His books are "Everything but Money," in which he recalls his boyhood, and "Sex and The Single Child," which he has said was designed to "overcome the sexification of American life."

Bartlett is a Washington correspondent who is a long-time friend of the Kennedy family. He earned his coveted journalistic prize in 1956 for exposing the conflict of interest that led to the

resignation of Harold Talbott, secretary of the Air Force in the Eisenhower administration. He now writes a four-times-a-week column, "News Focus" for the Washington Bureau of the Chicago Sun-Times.

Lindbergh is senior staff advisor to the president of Ocean Systems, Inc., chairman of the Oceanographic Commission of Washington, director of Environmental Sciences Corp., vice president of Marine Technology Society and a presidential designate to the Peace Corps National Advisory Council.

A man who has spent his life on and under the sea, he was a special field adviser in the search for the lost H-bomb off the coast of Spain a few years ago.

His press releases don't say so, but he's the son of American hero Charles Lindbergh and equally famous writer - mother, Ann Morrow Lindbergh.





"They took pictures of me in my car and in my apartment and also showed some of some older people in the inner city," she said.


"They helped make me realize again how lucky I am to have my health and a place like this to live."



## Bill Would Aid Women

Women will have the right to deduct alimony payments from their state income tax if legislation introduced by Sen. William Faust (D-Westland) is approved.

"I have also proposed an amendment to the state in-

come tax act which would eliminate a clearly discriminatory provision enabling men only to deduct alimony payments," said Faust.

"The courts have found that some women are capable of supporting their husbands and ordered them to pay alimony."

"Well, I think it should work both ways: if a woman has the 'right' to pay alimony, she should also have the 'right' to use alimony as a deduction in computing her state income tax."

"I can't see anyone voting against legislation which would eliminate such an antiquated provision of the law," he said.

undergraduate education, including the Cornell Female Studies program.



## Retardates' New Home Is Setting For Meet

The Evangelical Home in Detroit, new residence for 48 trainable retardates released a few months ago by the Plymouth State Home and Training School, will be the place for the April meeting of the Northwest Communities Association for Retarded Children.

Members will gather at the home on West Outer Drive across from Sinai Hospital at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 11. They will see the four cottages where the former

Plymouth Home residents are living and also will hear a talk by an official of the home.

The move of the residents, aged seven to 16, from the Plymouth State Home is in line with a new policy by state institutions to move retardates in the trainable and educable mental range from institutions to the community.

In the Evangelical Home, the children live in cottages with supervisors, and the state Department of Mental Health considers this situation more advantageous than an overcrowded institution.

The problem, spokesmen for the Northwest Communities Association have pointed out, is that the Evangelical Home and similar facilities serve retardates only up to age 16.

The April 11 meeting will be open to the public and all interested in the problem of retardation are invited to attend.

## State Schools' Power Cutback Is Endorsed

The Wayne-Westland School Board last week endorsed state legislation to strip the State Board of Education of its potential powers to run local schools.

The school board, however, split 4-3 on the resolution sponsored by State Sen. James Gray of Warren.

The resolution would change the state constitution to stipulate that "supervision over all public education is the responsibility of the boards of education of local school districts and intermediate school districts and the state board as the legislature shall provide."

AS PRESENT, the constitution provides that "supervision over all public education is vested in a state board of education."

Wayne-Westland school board members opposing the endorsement of Gray's proposal felt the state board doesn't want control over local schools and has never said that it did.

If Gray's resolution is approved by the House and Senate, it would be placed before the voters for adoption as a constitutional amendment.

Board members opposing the Gray resolution were Trustees Mrs. Anne Harbison, Ronald Scott and Fred Warmbier.

In favor were President Donovan McCreery, Vice President Gerard McGrath, Secretary Robert Reichard and Treasurer Thomas Barrett.

IN STATEMENT sent to all school boards, Gray said:

"I've come to the conclusion that the state school board, as a direct function of constitutional prerogative, exercises too much authority over local and parochial school districts.


"I'm convinced that such a situation is not in the best interests of the children in local school districts, and thus we must return to those districts the power which has been systematically eroded over the years and delegated to the state, due in great part to the lack of participation by local school boards in political matters outside of their own little world."

# Granola: Snack Food Or Cereal

By ELLY

Two special books, each reflecting a facet of the times, have been added to our kitchen cookery shelves in the last few months.

Joy and gentleness are inherent in "The Tassajara Bread Book." Tassajara, a valley in Monterey County, Calif. is the site of the first Zen Buddhist monastery in the Americas.

Edward Espe Brown, the cook and collector of the recipes writes:

"A recipe doesn't belong to anyone. Given to me, I give it to you. Only a guide, only a skeletal framework. You must fill in the flesh according to your nature and desire. Your

life, your love will bring these words into full creation. This cannot be taught. You already know. So please cook, love, feel, create."

An activist attitude pervades "Diet for a Small Planet" by Frances Moore Lappe. In the foreword she writes, "This book is about protein - how we as a nation are caught in a pattern that squanders it; and how you can choose the opposite - a way of eating that makes the most of the earth's capacity to supply this vital nutrient."

One book is soothing, the other is shocking, but both have some excellent recipes including variations of the delicious breakfast or snack food, Granola.

## TASSAJARA GRANOLA

- 3 parts rolled oats
- 1 part sesame seeds
- 1 part sunflower seeds
- 1 part raisins
- 1/2 part peanuts
- Other possibilities:
- 1 part almonds, chopped
- 1 part walnuts, chopped
- Pine nuts
- Buckwheat groats
- 1/2 part wheat germ
- 1 part dates, chopped
- 1 part dried apricots, chopped
- 1 part coconut

To every 10 cups of dry ingredients add one-half cup oil, one-half cup honey and just enough water to moisten all ingredients and aid in mixing in oil and honey. Spread out on a cookie sheet and roast in 250 degree oven for about an hour or until crunchy brown, stirring occasionally. Add raisins, dates, dried apricot, dried apple or other dried fruit as you choose.

## CRUNCHY GRANOLA

- 1/4 c. vegetable oil
- 1/2-1 c. honey
- 1 T. vanilla
- 5 1/2 T. instant powdered milk
- 2 T. brewer's yeast
- 1 c. wheat germ
- 1/4 c. sesame seeds
- 1/2-2 c. coconut shreds
- 1 c. rolled wheat
- 7 c. rolled oats

In a large saucepot heat together oil, honey, and vanilla until the mixture is very thin. Stir in the remaining ingredients in the order given, coating each one lightly with the honey mixture. The cereal can be toasted one of two ways: (1) Put all the cereal in a large shallow pan, and place in cold oven. Turn heat to 350 degrees and watch for the browning to begin. Stir the browned parts and check every five to 10 minutes, stirring to scrape sides and bottom of pan. Continue cooking until all of the cereal is deep golden brown. (2) Spread thin layers of the cereal on baking sheets and toast in 225 oven for about 1 1/2 hours.

THIS RECIPE will make about 12 cups. Each cup will supply 21 to 25 per cent of the daily protein allowance.

Granola is really a delicious way to start the day with milk, yogurt, nuts and dried or fresh fruit. In this recipe, the milk powder complements the sesame seed. But to complement the grains, you will need to add milk or yogurt.

# OCC To Cut \$300,000 -- Good-Bye, Creativity

While most institutions are fighting to keep their budget projections slightly above their current expenditures, Oakland Community College is fighting to plan a budget that is \$300,000 less than the current budget.

And to make matters worse, an expensive cloud that could cost the college \$1.5 million in state appropriations is floating over head.

Wary after 111 hours in budget study meetings, Orchard Ridge Provost S. James Manilla said the college budget council has pared down the budget to the point where "there's no fat."

The council is made up of four administrators and four faculty members from each of the college's four campuses. Orchard Ridge is the Farmington campus.

THE COUNCIL was confronted with the task of cutting \$2.6 million out of projected budget requests. The college is currently operating on a \$14.9 million budget but anticipates a \$385,000 deficit by the end of the fiscal year.

The new budget must be planned in accordance with the \$14.6 in projected revenues and must absorb both the deficit and \$420,000 in increased salaries that have already been bargained.

Since salaries make up 83 per cent of the budget, Dr. Manilla said the council had to closely examine the college's

operation and recommend "drastic cuts."

"Every aspect of operation within the institution is going to feel the results of the cuts," Dr. Manilla said.

"WE ARE assuming we will get no less state aid this year," he said, explaining that the proposed state appropriations formula would cut \$1.5 million or 28 per cent of the college's \$5.2 million in state aid.

The formula would penalize institutions with more than \$300,000 in assessed valuation behind each student. Since OCC has \$500,000, it could be penalized heavily.

The formula is based on a false premise, Dr. Manilla said, because the only way the college could offset the ratio would be by increasing enrollments. And as it is, the college has dropped in enrollments rather than increased.

The Legislature is currently restudying the proposed formula.

DESPITE ITS financial woes, the college is not planning to increase tuition again next year, Dr. Manilla said. This year in-district tuition went up from \$9 to \$10 per credit, out-district from \$12 to \$20, and out-of-state from \$28 to \$30 by legislative mandate.

Community colleges were created to provide education to students at a lower cost and where it is easily accessible to students, Dr. Manilla said.

Raising tuition would defeat

this purpose by putting the college out of reach of those for whom it was created, he said.

"The principle of it is what bothers me," he said. "When you keep raising tuition, pretty soon the student reaches the position where he can't attend college."

And since the board feels the time is not ripe for a millage campaign, the college has to make adjustments to live within a tight budget and the state is being forced to examine college financing.

A REDIRECTION in financing is needed, Dr. Manilla said, because unless the college closes its "open door policy" or voters approve more millage, the college will be crippled by tight budgeting.

Tight budgeting has an advantage because it "forces us to take a real hard look at our priorities," and to streamline and affect changes for effective and efficient programming, Dr. Manilla said.

But it also "limits creativity on an institutional level and forces us to do it the way everyone does," he added.

Currently the college's creative approaches to teaching are acclaimed by educators across the country who have duplicated all or part of the programs, he said. But the college could become so crippled by budget problems that it would have to wait until other colleges create programs and then copy theirs.

AFTER EXAMINING all facets of the college's operation, the budget council had to evaluate the productivity of every faculty member.

In cases where the council found the faculty member was not producing up to expectations, the council recommended that the person be transferred or have split assignments between campuses.

Dr. Manilla said he doesn't expect to lose faculty from the Farmington campus, but at the same time he says he can not meet the needs based on current credit hour projections with the existing staff.

Orchard Ridge generates about 50 per cent of the credit hours produced by the four campuses.

Right now, his main concern is preserving some of the college's innovative programs.

"The students get hurt by it ultimately," he said of severe cutbacks.




