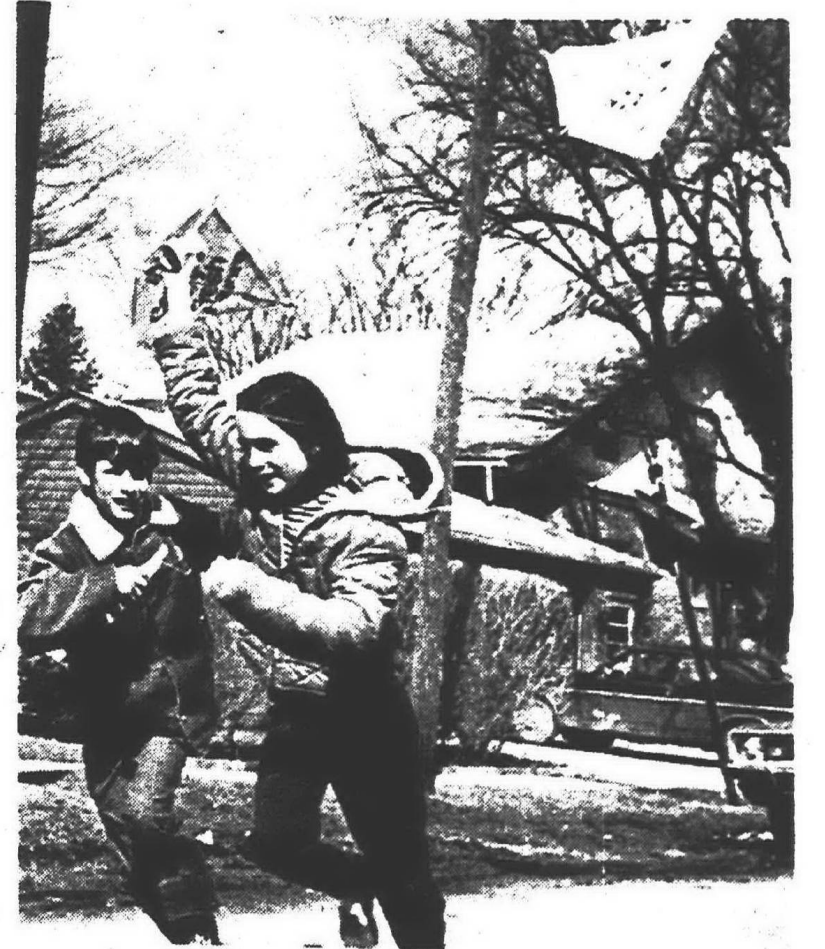

Troy-Type Plaza Eyed For Canton

CANTON TOWNSHIP It was during one of Canton Township's recent planning commission meetings that a prominent Detroit developer referred to the bustling township as the "Troy of the west."

He was referring to Canton's enviable geographic position—close to air and rail facilities plus easy access to two major expressways, key factors for rapid growth and expansion.

That analogy had even greater impact this week with the announcement that the developer of the highly successful Somerset Plaza, one of Troy's apartment complexes, was proposing a similar development for Canton Township.

The Canton development—like the one in Troy—would be built around a 25-acre, nine-hole "executive-type" golf course on Haggerty Rd., in the Koppernick-Warren Rds. area.

"It would not be a full golf course," explained Gilbert Franklin, spokesman for the developer, Biltmore Homes, "but neither will it be a pitch-putt course."

Clusters of multi-family dwellings would be scattered throughout the 150-acre site, known locally as the Hough farm.

CO-DEVELOPER of the site is Detroit's Dominic Mocer, whose proposal for a shopping center and multiple dwellings in the Joy-Sheldon Rd. area also is before the planning commission.

The future path of Haggerty Rd., envisioned by the Wayne County Road Commission as a service drive for the future I-275, was a major obstacle at one point in the planning, Franklin said.

Only after several meetings with the road commission were the problems tentatively resolved, he added.

The future path of Haggerty Rd. through the project really "chopped up" the site, Franklin said—so much so that a pedestrian underpass at Warren Rd. will be needed to link two portions of the golf course.

But even that isn't too bad, Franklin said wryly.

"It'll make a natural 'dog-leg' to the right—that's if you get by Willow Creek that meanders through the upper part of the course," he said.

Old Village 'Toots' Link With Artrain

The Old Village Merchants Association has announced plans for a dance Friday, May 5 at the Meadowbrook Country Club as a means of raising funds to join with the city in a beautification program for their area.

The affair will be on the night before Artrain's final day in Plymouth and has been given the name of "The Caboose Toot." It is the hope of the association to gain enough money so that a contribution also may be made to Kaleidoscope Plymouth to perpetuate this organization's spring art festival plans.

Artrain will be in Plymouth 18 days, beginning April 19, on a C&O siding at the Stark-weather freight depot in Old Village.

This has helped spur a long-range program of area im-

provement with which the city commission and municipal administration are cooperating. The immediate project will be to beautify Wilcox Park at the northern entrance to Plymouth from Northville Rd. Improved street lighting and better parking facilities also are being discussed.

Doug Blunk is president of the association. Frances Kontos is secretary and Alice McDonald is treasurer. The chairman of the steering committee is Pat Hann.

The May 5 party will be semi-formal and will start at 9 p.m. It will include dancing and an hors d'oeuvre supper. Tickets are priced at \$8.50 per person (\$17 a couple) and are available at all stores and shops in Old Village. Music will be provided by Frank Sidney's orchestra.

PHS Voter Plans Head Conference

The in-school registration of students old enough to vote, and seminars led by local leaders in several professional fields, will highlight Tuesday's "Age of Majority Conference" at Plymouth High School.

Designed essentially for the nearly 700 members of the senior class, the conference will inform young persons as to their rights and responsibilities under the law, which lowered the age of adulthood from 21 to 18.

Anyone who will be 18 on or before May 16 may register to vote in the statewide presidential primary election scheduled for that date. Representatives of the League of Women Voters have been deputized to take registrations for the City of Plymouth and Plymouth, Canton, Salem, Superior and Northville Townships, according to each student's place of residence.

All of this is in keeping with a declaration from Gov. William Milliken and Secretary of State Richard Austin to school districts throughout Michigan that the period of April 10-14 is to be considered "In-school voter registration week."

"YOUR ASSISTANCE in the registration of high school seniors is greatly needed," said the state's two top executives in their joint letter to local governmental leaders. Then they added:

"The recognition of a special day set aside for voter registration of seniors would emphasize the importance of their new right to participate directly in their government."

"With your cooperation in this important non-partisan effort, we will all help create a better future for all Michigan citizens."

Under direction of faculty advisor Ray Homer, a student committee at PHS has gone far beyond the primary concept of having a voter registration day to include other facets of adult responsibility.

calls for students to break up into 11 separate meetings which will be repeated twice more during the day to afford as great an opportunity as possible for individual participation.

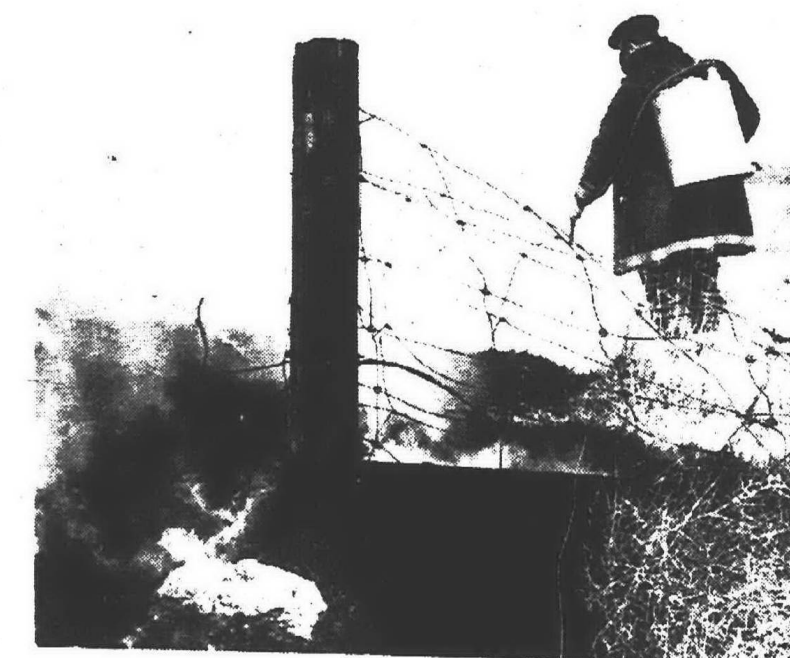

Said Homer of the new age of majority law:

"The schools will particularly feel the impact of the new law since not only will some students who are still in school now be within the age of majority, but, further, students in secondary schools will now be much closer to their age of majority. Trash Fires Need Permits

According to the calendar, spring is here, which means the annual cleanup time is at hand. Along with this is the annual confusion regarding the rules and regulations of trash burning.

Plymouth Fire Chief George Schoenneman and Township Fire Chief James Gignac point out that no open fires are allowed without a permit from the Wayne County Health Department's Air Pollution Control Board.

"Absolutely no open fires are allowed without approval of the Air Pollution Board," Gignac said. "To obtain a permit, a person must get in touch with the board which is located at 1311 E. Jefferson in Detroit."

He stressed the fact that rules laid down by the board

have changed as of May 1, 1971.

"Up until then, our department was allowed to issue burning permits," he said. "This is no longer true. The Air Pollution Control Board now controls all burning."

SCHOENNEMAN said that while the board controls all open burning in Wayne County, in the city a permit to burn is also required from the Plymouth Fire Department.

"A permit must be obtained first from the board. Then a second permit is required from us. This is only on the safety of the burning site," he added.

"Even when a person receives a permit to burn from the pollution board," he stressed, "he is still required to get a permit from us that

Dream Fulfilled For Hobbyist In Building Ships

Few persons ever have the opportunity to make a childhood dream come true. They'll go along, year after year, hoping -- yet never quite making it.

But Charles W. Langell, a retired sign printer, who lives at 5700 Canton Center Road, is not numbered among them.

He's having the time of his life -- and he's only 53 years old -- building model ships in the little workshop at the rear of his home.

"I WAS BORN and raised in Marine City, not too far from the Chris Smith Boat Works. And most everybody in that area was boat minded. They either helped built boats or sailed them on the Great Lakes," he'll tell you.

"So, ever since childhood I've been boat-minded and hoped the day would come when I could spend my time just building model ships."

How well he succeeded is evidenced by one quick look around his tidy, little home, where model ships are on tables, special shelves and any place he can show them making it.

AMONG HIS prizes are seven models that range from the San Felipe, a 120 gun Spanish boat built in 1690, to the smaller Agate whaling ship used for oyster fishing in Chesapeake Bay.

"Now that I've given up commercial sign painting," he explains "I have the time and I spend about four to eight hours each day working on the boats."

As he spoke, he pointed to one of the models -- the Feleipe -- and smilingly recounted that there are more than 2,000 knots on the shroud alone.

"And I tied every one of them by hand," he says.

proudly. "I worked for three solid days just tying the knots. All told, it took me 4 1/2 months to build the model."

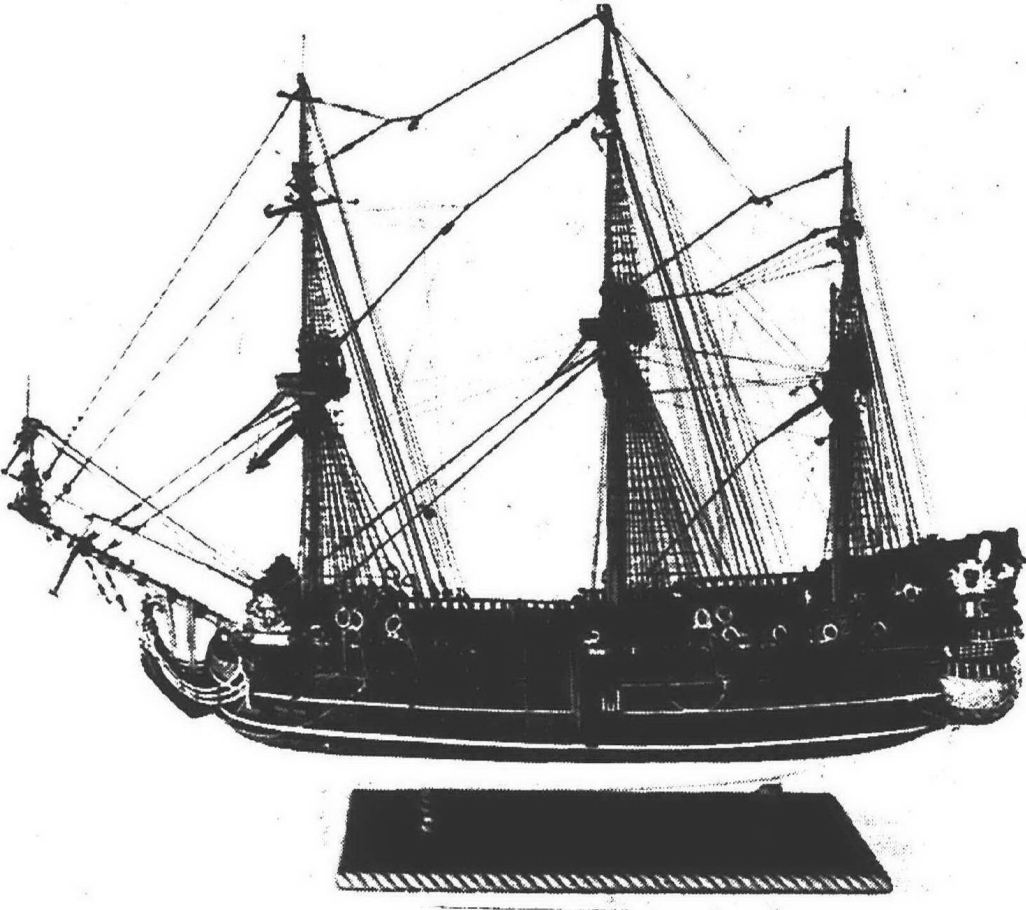
Although he worked, along with his father, in the Boat Works in Algonac, he prides himself in the fact that he was a commercial sign painter and chuckles when he tells that he got the inspiration from watching a tombstone cutter.

"I WAS AMAZED at the manner in which he carved

out the letters, and I copied the style," he explained.

"Then one day during the tough times in 1926, I had a bucket of water color paint and walked along the streets in Marine City seeking work as a sign painter. Many of the businessmen responded -- and I was in business.

"I always kept thinking about the boats, and I still can see Gar Wood and his mechanic, Orlin Johnson, in the famous Miss Americas

AAA Traffic Survey Begins Here Monday

PLYMOUTH A traffic survey, requested several months ago by Police Chief Timothy Ford as well as the City Commission, will get under way in Plymouth Monday.

The study, a full-scale survey of Plymouth's traffic and accident problems, is the second since 1965. It is performed as a public service by Automobile Club of Michigan.

It begins with an analysis of the accident records maintained by the police department to determine high-

accident locations within the city.

In addition to studying the accident and traffic records, Auto Club's research team will measure traffic volumes and movements at hazardous or potentially hazardous intersections.

From data obtained, the Auto Club will determine if improved traffic control or physical improvements are needed to reduce accidents.

Ford had requested the study because of growing concern over changing traffic patterns and asked that emphasis be given to speed

regulations, traffic patterns and control devices, which may help Plymouth to be safer.

A complete report, including recommended solutions for traffic problems, will be presented to Plymouth officials later this year.

The entire cost of the survey is borne by the Auto Club.

Ghosts, Too, Await Opener

There'll be a lot of ghosts hovering around Tiger Stadium on opening day.

It will be far cry from the days of yore when opening day was a holiday with parades and marches from all sections of the city to the stadium, giving the entire community a carnival atmosphere.

True, they'll have the traditional presentation of a floral horseshoe at home plate, and the fans will stand for the raising of the flag in center field and the singing of the national anthem.

But unlike the old days, there'll be no parade from the Sheraton-Cadillac to the ball park, and there'll be no marching of the players from home plate to the centerfield flag pole for the raising of the colors.

And somewhere up there, old Bill Finzel will be shaking his head in disbelief, for no opening game was official unless Bill, bedecked in his white uniform with the gold braid, was leading the

procession to the outfield and later providing the musical interludes between innings.

FINZEL WAS an institution and, no doubt, many of the old timers at the Tuesday opener will still be hearing echoes of the off-key notes for which he and his men were famous in the world of sharps and flats.

And if you look sharp, you might be able to see Frank J. Navin, the Tigers owner, seated in his private box, waving and smiling to all and sundry. Opening day was one of the great days of the year to him.

He was always in the lead "tally ho" (before automobiles were common) going along Michigan Avenue through Corktown, and after reaching the ball park he held court until the opening pitch.

Some of the real old timers might be able to recognize the ghost of Hughie Jennings, the fiery manager at the early days of the century, standing in the third base coaching box

shouting his famous "Ee-Yah." It was the cry that carried the Tigers to pennants in '07, '08, and '09.

And some of the younger old timers might be seeing again the picture of Mickey Cochrane, another fiery leader, who walked to home plate with the starting lineup in 1934, calmly announcing "It's great to be with a winner." On that slogan he piloted the sixth place club to the pennant in 1934 and 1935.

OPENING DAY was always a great day for the politicians, too, as the governor of Michigan and the mayor of the City of Detroit, formed the battery. More often than not they were of different political factions, and the first pitch was always fodder for argument.

If the pitch was bad, the hurler blamed the catcher for not trying-just to make him look bad. And if the catcher was of the opposite political clan and caught the ball, the cry went up from his followers "that he saved the pitcher from embarrassment before the gathering."

It was always a lot of fun. But, in the memory of The Stroller, who will be covering his 49th consecutive opener, the 1925 opener will never be forgotten and not because of any brilliant play on the diamond.

In those days there were no stands in left or center fields, and there was a home with a long, narrow roof facing Trumbull avenue at the Corner of Cherry Street.

At the time, the roof was leased by John Roesink, owner of a pants store on Griswold in downtown Detroit.

Canton Studies Shopping Area Of 40 Acres

CANTON TOWNSHIP Canton Township planners are studying a new proposal for a regional shopping center.

This latest plan calls for a 40-acre center at the corner of Joy and Sheldon Rds, surrounded by multiples, an office complex and single-family dwellings.

Developer of the 195-acre site, once the Burch family farm, is Detroit's Dominic Mocer. He is also the co-developer of the proposed development in the Haggerty-Koppernick-Warren Rds. area that calls for cluster housing on the perimeter of a nine-hole golf course. His Pickwick Village development is also under consideration by the planning commission.

In announcing the plan to the commission, Mocer said the Burch family home will remain at its present location on Joy Rd. A nearby wooded area will be retained "as much as possible."

The plan was referred to the township's planning consultant, Michael Manore, for review and a recommendation.

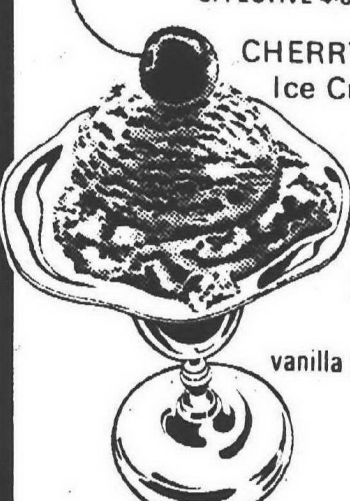

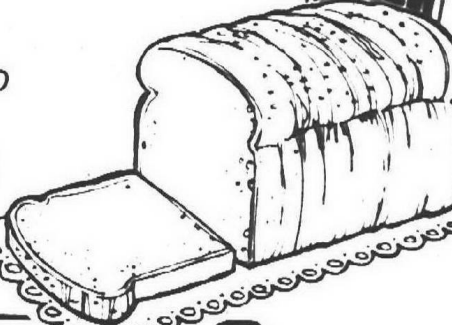

Religion Update

It was something like having a psychiatrist denouncing his patient's entire family in public.

The University of Chicago's priest - sociologist, Rev. Andrew Greeley, was retained by the U.S. Catholic Bishops to do a \$500,000 study on the priesthood. And apparently disgruntled by the bishops' less than enthusiastic reaction to his labors, Dr. Greeley recently attracted international attention by announcing that the U.S. Catholic Bishops are "morally, spiritually and intellectually bankrupt."

This irresponsible clergy - beating sounded more like the profitable petulance of an ex-White House maid than a priest - professor. And Catholic priests who have suffered far more at the hands of certain bishops were disgusted by this outburst of over simplification. Delegates to the National Federation of Priests Councils convention in Denver voted down a proposed resolution thanking Greeley for his efforts.

THE PUBLIC is also generally sensible enough to recognize that like the U.S. Senate, the U.S. Conference of

Catholic Bishops has both giants and pygmies, who are capable of both greatness and mischief.

Yet senators are accountable to the electorate every six years, and their handling of government funds is subject to audit -- or to the omniscient eye of columnist Jack Anderson.

By unhealthy contrast, the strongly liberal Catholic Church in Holland has had two archconservative new bishops thrust upon it despite anguished protests -- by order of Pope Paul VI.

This authoritarian flirting with ecclesiastical revolution, in what is essentially a voluntary organization, has another disastrous effect: if His Holiness continues insisting upon the sole right to appoint bishops who have no accountability to anyone but himself, then the Holy Father must be held responsible for such things as the recent scandal in the Diocese of Santa Rosa, Calif.

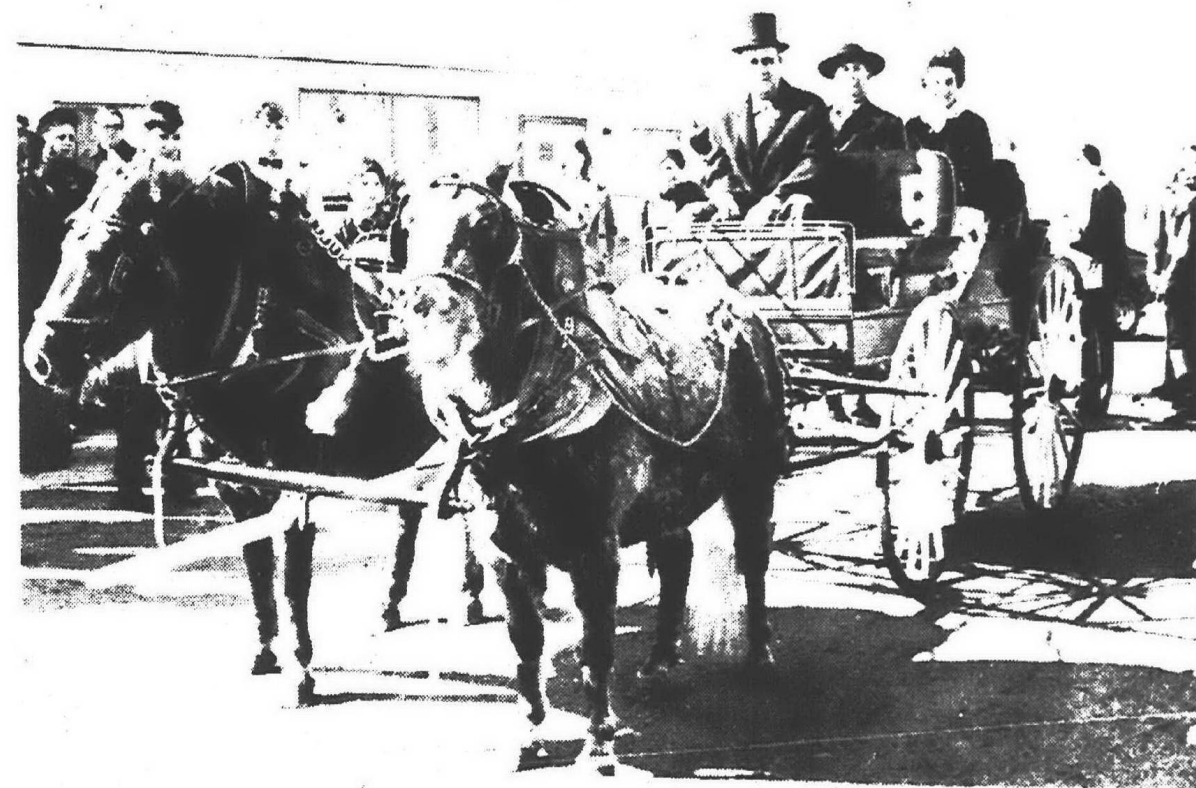
IT WAS ONE of the best-kept secrets in California church history -- until exposed by the San Francisco Examiner. For the Most Rev. Leo T. Maher, now bishop of

San Diego, during his seven-year rule of the newly created Santa Rosa Diocese, completed a palatial mansion for himself, which is now on the market for \$275,000, during the same period in which he was running his diocese into external and internal debts of more than \$12 million.

And what is even more appalling was the legal but highly questionable use of nearly \$3 million in funds belonging to Hanna Boys Center -- the "Boys Town of the West" -- which funds had been deposited in the Santa Rosa Diocesan office.

Hanna Boys Center is a noble cause, supported among others by many non-Catholics who can hardly be expected to be enthusiastic about their contributed funds having been used by a diocese engaged in such projects as the acquiring of a 14-room mansion with swimming pool, wine cellar and bar -- for Bishop Maher.

ONLY AFTER an investigation by the California attorney general's office was there a full financial accounting and a promise that these funds will be repaid by the Diocese of Santa Rosa to Hanna Boys Center.

"FINCHES FABULOUS Furnace," by Roger W. Drury. The Finch family arrives earlier than expected in Ashfield to find out there is only one house available for them. It had been vacated suddenly by the previous tenants and had stood empty for a year because of the incredible and fabulous furnace. What they did about it, and what it almost did to them is the story.

"EDDIE'S Happenings," by Carolyn Haywood. Many children who are already friends of Eddie Wilson will be eager to read this new addition to his adventures. the burning site meets our safety requirements. Just because he has a permit doesn't mean he can burn trash next to a garage or in any way cause a fire hazard."

Gignac said the only open fires allowed without a permit are camp fires for cooking and fire department fires used for training fire fighters.

Otherwise, both fire departments, as is the case for all in the Wayne County area, are guided by the Michigan air pollution control rules and regulations originally adopted under the provisions of the Air Pollution Control Act of 1965.

ALONG WITH the advice on trash burning, the two fire chiefs also sounded a warning on brush and grass fires.

Last year the township fire department responded to 88 grass and brush fires. There have been several reported this spring in spite of the damp weather.

"With warmer and drier weather on the way, the danger of grass fires will increase," Gignac said. "These fires are potentially dangerous. However, many can be prevented by a little caution on the part of residents."

Both Gignac and Schoenneman said persons should be careful about throwing cigarettes or matches into a field, as these are quite often the cause of this type fire.

Persons obtaining a burning

permit still have the responsibility of keeping the fire under control and not letting it spread to vacant lots or into grassy areas.

ANOTHER warning sounded by Schoenneman is for drivers who park their cars on the street during hot weather.

"It's a temptation in hot weather to leave the windows of the rolled down when parked. It is advisable to close them as a safety measure."

The chief said by leaving the

windows down, there is danger a passing motorist may toss a cigarette out of his car, the cigarette landing on the seat of the parked car.

"We had four or five automobile fires caused this way last year," Schoenneman said.

While trash burning has tapered off in the past due to the Wayne County ordinance, both chiefs feel that the more people who are aware of the regulations regarding burning, the less confusion there will be.

The dedication plaque for Canton High School was discussed and it was determined that it should contain a short quotation and a dedication to the youth of Plymouth. Mr. Blunk was requested to prepare formats for the two schools, plaques for consideration by the Board on February 22.

A Facilities Report was received from Supervisor Goble. After discussion it was recommended that the athletic personnel be consulted relative to their preference on the type of gymnasium floor at the high school and that a \$50,000 bond be obtained from the Contractor who installed the tartan floor enabling the contractor to get his money and guaranteeing a new and acceptable floor as well.

It was moved by Member Hulsing and seconded by Member Lawton that authorization be given to sign the Agreement with Wakeley Kuster Associates, Inc. for Phase III of Canton High School (physical education facility, music facility and planetarium) at the rate of 2 1/2 times applicable payroll for schematic drawings and in the event these schematic drawings become the basis for construction drawings, the amount of fee paid would be deducted from the total fee charged for the project.

PLYMOUTH COMMUNITY SCHOOL DISTRICT Plymouth, Michigan BOARD OF EDUCATION MINUTES

A regular meeting of the Board of Education of the Plymouth Community School District, Wayne and Washtenaw Counties, Michigan, was held on Tuesday evening, February 22, 1972, in the Board Room of the Administration Building, 1024 South Mill Street, Plymouth, Michigan.

The meeting was called to order at 8:06 p.m. by Vice President Hanskat.

Present: Members Graves, Hanskat, Ohno, Penar and Sick.

Absent: Member Lawton arrived at 9:00 p.m.

Administrators present: Acting Supt. Hoben, Assistant Supts. Blunk and Gibson, Directors Gaertner, Kee and Page, Assistant Director Masteller, Principals Elston, Gorgue and Smith, and Assistant Principal Oppie.

Others present: Sharon Belobradich, Dolly Carter, James Griffith, Marilyn Hazlett, Tom Lee, Candi Mar and Betty Skingley, Staff Members, Chester Hill, Shirley Mack, Stewart Oldford, Aggie Quirk, James Rossman, Phyllis Sullivan, Jim Symonds, and Flossie Tonda, Bill Heath, Plymouth Education Association, and Kathy Moran, Plymouth Mail & Observer.

It was moved by Member Penar and seconded by Member Sick to approve the tabling minutes of the regular meeting of January 10, 1972, with the following change:

Pg. 7, para. 5 last part of motion should read "and that Plymouth Centennial Educational Park also be used on diplomas for both schools at graduation."

Ayes: Members Graves, Hanskat, Ohno, Penar and Sick.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

Dr. Edwin Page reviewed a written report as presented to the Board on Special Services, calling attention especially to the Appendix which describes the mandatory legislation effective December 22, 1971, which will require all school districts in Michigan to provide an education for handicapped persons from age 0 to 25 years by the 1973-74 school year or to file with the State reasons why this is not possible. Dr. Page also pointed out his projections on the numbers of students who might be involved in such a program over the next five years.

Mrs. Sharon Belobradich presented a written report on the recommendations of the Social Studies Committee of the Curriculum Coordinating Council for grades K-8. She reviewed the budgetary and release time requirements to implement the recommendations and requested a meeting with the administration to further explain the plan. Member Graves asked for more information as to specific requirements for the social studies program at the high school and elementary levels and expressed his view of the need for more contact with the community whenever possible.

Mrs. Dolly Carter and Mr. Robert Smith presented a written report on the Middle School Structure as proposed by the Curriculum Coordinating Council. The proposed program would involve expansion of the team teaching approach and would require more allowance for team planning and individual planning time. Nine 41-minute periods are suggested, with teachers in the classroom six out of eight periods, a reduction of one period from the present pattern. Added budgetary requirements were also discussed for this program.

Member Lawton arrived during the discussion of the Middle School Structure plan.

Mr. David Oppie reviewed a written report on the proposals for 1972 Summer School, requesting especially that the bulk of classes be moved to the new high school. He requested a shuttle bus from Central and West Middle Schools running to the high school daily. Mr. Hoben was asked to obtain cost of running part of the Physical Education Program for high school credit during the summer months to alleviate crowding in this program next fall when Canton High School is open and facilities at Plymouth High School will be used more extensively.

Acting Supt. Hoben reported on information obtained from attorneys on requirements for setting school election dates and the notification schedules to be followed.

It was moved by Member Lawton and seconded by Member Ohno that the proposed April 10, 1972, millage election date be canceled and this millage election rescheduled to June 12, 1972.

Ayes: Members Graves, Hanskat, Lawton, Ohno, Penar and Sick.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

A letter from the American Civil Liberties Union regarding a handicapped child in this School District was presented for information. The matter has been resolved.

Mr. Hoben asked that reservations to the Southwestern Michigan School Board Conference in Kalamazoo be made by March 10, 1972.

It was moved by Member Sick and seconded by Member Graves that Change Order No. 7 to the F. W. Fordon Company be approved with no price change involved to revise library equipment and layout at Canton High School.

Ayes: Members Graves, Hanskat, Lawton, Ohno, Penar and Sick.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

It was moved by Member Lawton and seconded by Member Ohno to approve Change Order No. 2 to the J. A. Ferguson Company, a credit of \$3,263.00 for catch basin and drain tile work on the south side of Plymouth High School.

Ayes: Members Graves, Hanskat, Lawton, Ohno, Penar and Sick.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

It was moved by Member Lawton and seconded by Member Penar that the firm of Wabrey-Kushner Associates be retained as Architects for the Farland School Library and the Gallimore School rehabilitation at a fee of 7% of projected cost of project.

Ayes: Members Graves, Hanskat, Lawton, Ohno, Penar and Sick.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

It was moved by Member Sick and seconded by Member Penar to approve payment of the following Operating Fund bills presented for review:

Operating Fund Vouchers No. 16640 to 16650, incl. \$19,856.32

Ayes: Members Graves, Hanskat, Lawton, Ohno, Penar and Sick.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

It was moved by Member Sick and seconded by Member Ohno to approve Building and Site Fund No. 3 bills as follows:

Bldg. & Site Fund #3 Vouchers No. 548 to 550, incl. \$43,149.84

Ayes: Members Graves, Hanskat, Lawton, Ohno, Penar and Sick.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

An estimated cost sheet for four proposals was presented by Assistant Supt. Blunk for the Willow Creek Crossing at Plymouth High School Complex. The Board asked for further study and recommendation by the Administration on Plans 3 and 4, including facts about parking lot traffic control after construction of such a bridge.

Assistant Supt. Gibson reviewed the written report on the Rural Life Center at Plymouth Centennial Educational Park, including animals in residence, equipment, land use, farm maintenance and expansion, farm tours and a summary of the farm activities. Members of the Board expressed concern over the relatively ineffective use of the facilities available and requested that the Administration look into the possibility of providing credit courses based on farm activities.

It was moved by Member Lawton and seconded by Member Penar to approve the change in salary from the present \$7,800 to \$8,500 per year, prorated from February 1 to June 30, 1972, for the farm manager.

Ayes: Members Graves, Hanskat, Lawton, Ohno, Penar and Sick.

Nays: Member Sick.

The motion was carried.

Mr. Hoben reported on the fine programming of the new FM Station at the high school, WSPD. He discussed a proposal to employ a radio aide to assist in the work load of the media specialists and to be in charge of the station during vacation times. The Board asked that Mr. Hoben look further into this matter, including the possibility of offering a broadcasting course for credit during the summer months and make recommendations to the Board at the next meeting.

Mr. Hoben reported that Plymouth High School had received accreditation from North Central Accreditation Association and that for the first time in ten years there were no violations cited. The Board commended the Administration on the fine performance. Member Graves requested a chance to review the entire report.

An informational report was given on "The Schools without Failure Concept" being studied by the Wayne County Intermediate School District. The Wayne County District will pay for in-service time in its entirety for training in this philosophy, and four principals have expressed a desire to become involved.

Mr. James Griffith, Plymouth High School Band Director, presented a glowing report on the band trip to Hattiesburg, Mississippi, and to New Orleans. He distributed copies of letters which had been received from those involved in the conference in the South. He publicly commended the persons who had done so much to make the trip successful - including band members, parents, teachers, bus drivers, administrative personnel, the newspaper for its publicity, the City of Plymouth for proclaiming PHS Band Week, private citizens, businessmen and service clubs for their contributions, the hosts in Mississippi, and the trip coordinator, Mrs. Wilma Newton.

Assistant Supt. Blunk reported that the offer to purchase the Michigan Bell Building on South Harvey Street had been accepted by the owner, the contract signed and \$5,000 deposited in escrow. The terms of the contract call for payment on June 1, 1972, and January 2, 1973 and 1974, the rate of interest to be determined by what the School District receives on investments on June 1. Possession of the building will be on June 1, 1972, with the District receiving rent from Michigan Bell following that date until they can move in prior to November 1, 1972.

Mr. Blunk also reported on the completion of Plymouth High School, especially the matter of replacement of tarran floor in gymnasium area. He reported the receipt of a \$50,000 Bond from the contractor to replace this floor as per plans and specifications. Included with the Bond was a Certificate for payment of \$85,000 on the contract, leaving balance due to cover other minor open items of \$15,000. Mr. Blunk recommended that the payment not be made until the gymnasium floor matter was completely resolved. In the discussion that followed, it was pointed out that acceptance of the Bond was an effective guarantee that repair would be made to the District's satisfaction and at no cost to the District.

It was moved by Member Lawton and seconded by Member Penar that the Contract Bond from the J. A. Ferguson Company, underwritten by the Travelers Indemnity Security Company, be accepted, subject to approval of School District Counsel, in the amount of \$50,000 or more as determined by the Administration, for the satisfactory repair of the tarran gymnasium floor at Plymouth High School, and that the Certificate No. 42 in the amount of \$85,000 be released for payment to the J. A. Ferguson Company.

Ayes: Members Graves, Hanskat, Lawton, Ohno, Penar and Sick.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

Mr. Blunk reported that the other minor areas of concern for Plymouth High School completion include a water leak between Units B and C, new leg braces for greenhouse tables, a shop heating unit to be made suitable for air conditioning and a leak in the boiler room piping. The fire marshal has made some suggestions for changes, and the owner has requested a change in duct work in the cafeteria kitchen.

The proposed alignment of team management for the Park Complex was again discussed by Mr. Hoben with the Board. A letter from counsel was reviewed stating that any changes in structure must be announced 60 days prior to contract talks with P.E.A. Mr. Hoben reported concurrence in the proposal by the administration but not by department heads. Cost estimates involved were distributed by Member Hanskat for review and comparison.

It was moved by Member Ohno and seconded by Member Lawton that this matter be discussed again at the next meeting of the Board and the matter be left on the table.

Ayes: Members Graves, Hanskat, Lawton, Ohno, Penar and Sick.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

Mr. James Rossman presented some concerns as an individual taxpayer with regard to completion of Plymouth High School.

It was moved by Member Penar and seconded by Member Ohno to cancel the March 6, 1972, special meeting of the Board of Education which had been scheduled to review budget and millage matters to permit more time for preparation of the material.

Ayes: Members Graves, Hanskat, Lawton, Ohno, Penar and Sick.

Nays: None.

The motion was carried.

The motion by Member Hanskat to remove a motion from the table regarding the starting time of schools failed for lack of a second.

No report was available on the inscription plaque for the high schools as listed on the agenda.

Member Graves expressed concerns pointed out to him by parents regarding modular scheduling at the high school. He asked for a clarification report on those students who received E's and whether or not they are given more E's now than in the past.

Member Sick requested that Acting Superintendent Hoben contact Dr. Grote, President of Schoolcraft College, regarding Schoolcraft's request to Mr. Sick that the Plymouth School District provide space in its facilities for Schoolcraft's use on a rental basis until their new buildings are funded and built. The consensus of the Board was that this was not feasible at this time, except possibly on a one-year basis.

Memorandums were received on "Written Descriptions of Proposed Attendance Areas," and on "Building Projection" from the Administration.

It was moved by Member Sick and seconded by Member Penar to adjourn the meeting at 11:55 p.m.

If you don't believe that lightning strikes in the most unexpected cases consider the case of Mrs. Marge Lewandowski who recently bowled a perfect game at Thunderbird Lanes in Troy.

She is a 30-year-old mother of five sons who carries a mere 140 average and bowls mostly for the fun of it.

But last week when she appeared for her regular turn on the approaches there was nothing unusual as she opened with a 124 game -- 16 pins below her average.

Then it happened. As if by magic she "found" the lanes and started piling up strikes until she posted the much coveted No. 12 and assured herself of a place in Detroit bowling history.

Then, when the excitement died down, she returned to herself again and finished her series with a 180 game for a 604.

When the 12th strike of the second game was recorded she became only the sixth woman in Detroit bowling annals to roll a perfect game. The others were: Hattie Wooster, Doris Knecht, Edna Pikulinski, Ann Setlock and Catherine Hannan.

And to make the perfect game all the more unusual is the fact that Mrs. Lewandowski is no student of the game and confesses that she doesn't know whether she is a three step or a four step bowler.

She's the last person you'd expect would bowl a perfect game -- but she did.

THE ANNUAL tournament of the Greater Detroit Bowling Association, which opens at Thunderbird Lanes in Allen Park on Saturday, April 22, may be the largest association event held in the nation this year.

The entry of 738 regular

teams and 121 seniors is 25 per cent above the entry of a year ago when only 500 teams battled for the regular title.

"We just can't explain the reason for the big jump," Tom McKay, GDBA secretary confided, "but perhaps our improved prize list was the lure."

Thus far this season 29 perfect games have been bowled in sanctioned league in the Greater Detroit area. This is one less than a year ago and only about half the number of the record 58 registered some years ago.

WELL, AT LAST, the real reason for the American Bowling Congress Awards Committee turning down 175 high scores, including Ray Orf's 890 -- the highest series ever bowled -- has come to light.

On his return from the ABC convention Tom McKay revealed that there was nothing wrong with the machines now used to "dress" the lanes -- except that in most cases -- including Orf's -- the lane mechanic shut off the end brushes on each side, thus causing the dressing to pile up in the middle and, as a result, fall from ABC specifications.

THE CELLAR-DWELLERS tournament-- the most unusual in the area-- gets underway again this year at Ark Lanes on May 5 and entries will be taken until midnight of July 15.

This is the tournament in which only the bottom four teams in any sanctioned leagues are eligible to compete for the top prize of \$3,000.

FRED McLEAN and his wife, Penny, seem to be taking turns in grabbing the spotlight in the area bowling leagues.

This week Fred paced the Garden Lanes Classic with a

759 series and gained a 54 pin margin over Jerry Szoscak who landed in the runnerup spot with a 705.

Other high scores included Dick Preston 677, John Grinnod 688 and Bob Grenier 648.

Meanwhile Hal Jolley paced the Westland Classic with a 680 to make a bid for high average honors.

SALLY SCHROEDER, who does her bowling in the Thursday morning mixed league at Westland Bowl, rolled one of the oddest series of the year.

A 165 average bowler she started with a 265, then faded to 212 and closed with a 121 for 598.

THE SPOTLIGHT turned on Milt Smith in the Mixed League at Country Lanes when he posted a 693.

Ginny Gertz, a 136 average bowler, took a share of the honors with a high single of 208.

Janet Krahn took high single in the Ladies House League with 247 and another Janet, this time, Janet Balogh followed with a 243.

VANALSTEN came back to win first the high hurdles at

0:16.0 and you guessed it ... Bowby came in second.

Dave Drake of Thurston clocked in at 2:03.4 in the 880 run ahead of Stevenson's Walker and Thurston's Rick Westphal won individual honors in the 100 yard dash along with the 220 sprint.

Thurston's Lou Torcolacci won the mile with a time of 4:46.8 and Coach Williams has to smile a little brighter with the performance of Westphal and Torcolacci. Both are sophomores.

Stevenson's Rich Fuerst won the 440 in 53.0 and the

Spartans waltzed to a first in the two mile with Kevin Maly and Rick Galindo hitting the finish wire together with a time of 10:41.7.

Thurston's next meet is at Redford Union Tuesday and Stevenson hosts Edsel Ford the same afternoon.

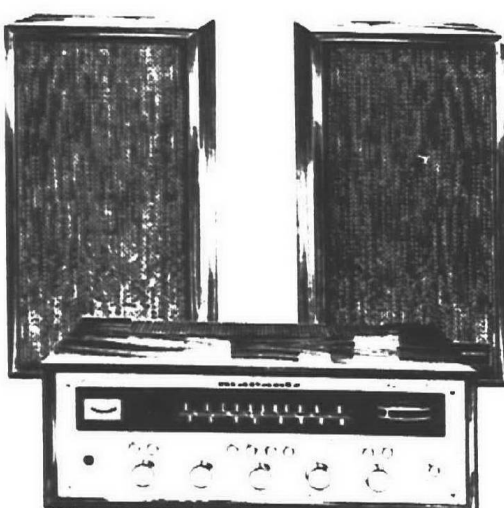

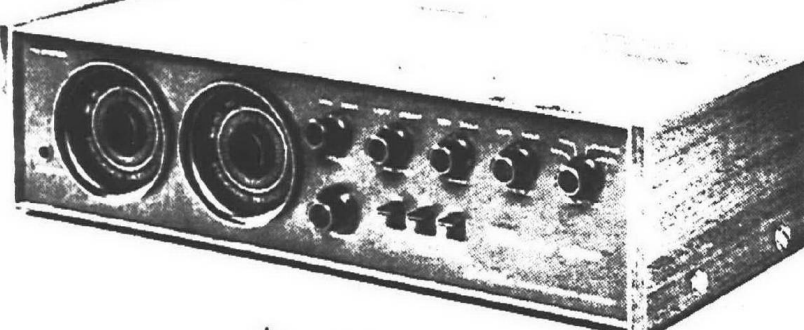

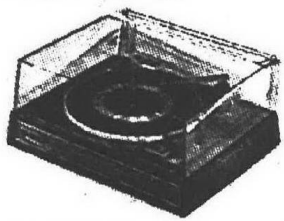

What A Finish! RU, Farmington Tie

The story of the Bishop Borgess, Farmington, and Redford Union track meet was nearing an equilateral triangle with the last event in the 440 relay the deciding factor.

The victory was up for grabs with Borgess holding the slight edge. The Spartan cindermen needed only a second place in the 440 for an overall win but the unexpected happened.

RU was dashing off to an unchallenged first and Borgess was in second, 15 yards ahead of Farmington going into the fourth and final exchange.

Borgess timing was off and the baton exchange was completed out of the zone by a mere six inches, and Borgess was disqualified and hopes of a surprise upset vanished.

Farmington and RU finished with 53½ points for a first place tie with Borgess third with 49.

It was a satisfying afternoon for Farmington Coach Jerry Young and RU Coach John

MacKenzie but for Borgess Coach Steve Strauch, it was a rewarding experience.

"I think Farmington and RU thought us a weak sister," said Borgess Coach Strauch. "Here we took on two of the stronger teams in the area and we gave them a run."

REDFORD UNION walked away with the relay honors. The Panthers won the 880 in 1:33.5; the mile in 3:41.7; and the 440 in :45.7.

Dave Schoof, of RU, captured two firsts with top billing in the 120 high hurdles and the high jump. Schoof clocked in at :15.4 in the high hurdles with Mark Sopko and Mark Cesarz of Borgess next in line and reached a height of 6'2" in the high jump.

Farmington's Nat Durham also peaked to 6'2" but Schoof had fewer misses and captured the first. RU's O'Grady and Falcon Chris Haase tied for third at 5'8".

The other individual winner for the Panthers was Beal in the 440 yard dash. The RU sprinter ran :53.4 for first ahead of Farmington's Sandy Campbell.

Farmington captured five firsts with senior Durham soaring to 11'6" in pole vaulting to pace the Falcons. Dennis Cummings also reached 11'6" for Borgess but had more misses.

Jim Nuttall was clocked in the mile at 4:44.5 for a first with teammate Kim Day second and Doug Kruecher and Mark Oller of Borgess third and fourth.

FARMINGTON'S MARK TIMMONS spurred to a first in the 100 yard dash with a :10.1 showing. Tom Burke, of RU, was in second with Al Nemzek of Borgess in third.

Timmons also won the 220 yard dash ahead of Neil Falls

of Borgess with a :22.5 showing. Falcon Mike McGuire easily won the two mile event at 10:05.9. Rick Krizman of RU and Jim Bearden of Borgess followed in the placing.

Borgess sported four individual winners with Craig Lanto pacing the quartet with a first in the 880 run. Farmington placed second and third with Mike Mansfield and Ron Maniewski in the running.

GREG BATTLE scored a Borgess first in the 180 yard low hurdles at :20.9 with teammate Jim Doherty a close second. Farmington's Durham ran third.

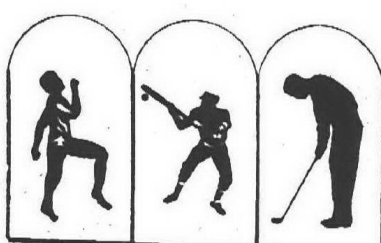
sophomore Rick Cudini won shot put honors with a toss of 47 feet. Tom Tullock of RU placed second and Crichton also of RU finished third.

When the Tigers finished as runner-up to the Baltimore Orioles last September the hue and cry had to do with the

absence of a fourth starting pitcher to maintain a regular rotation.

"If we can come up with that fourth starter," it was said, "things will be a lot different."

But now, with the spring training behind them the "ifs" have multiplied.

HERE ARE JUST A few of them that are running through the minds of the fans -- and the Tiger officials.

If the strike hasn't taken the edge off their prime condition. If Willie Horton and Manager Billy Martin have buried the hatchet and found a way of life in a spirit of togetherness.

If Mickey Lolich and Joe Coleman can come through with big years again.

If Norm Cash can carry on for another out-standing year at first base.

If Al Kaline can escape injury and carry on as part of the platooning system.

If Bill Freehan's back doesn't bother him and he can assume most of the work behind the plate.

These are just a few of the ponderables. There may be many more, including the attitude of the players and the reaction of the manager and officials as an aftermath of the strike.

WITH ALL DUE credit to Lolich, who won 25 games last year, and Coleman, who won 20, it is doubtful if either or both can repeat. Between them they won close to half of the Tiger victories a year ago and that's a big order to expect in another year.

Horton again is a bit temperamental and prone to injury. He was in a slump in spring training and escaped injury -- but he is one of those unfortunates who are susceptible to injury.

Cash is fighting advancing years as a baseball player. He went all out a year ago to prove he still was capable of playing major league ball. It could be that he is going to the well once too often.

The same is true with Al Kaline. Al is a great competitor, but he has reached that stage where he must conserve his energy and needs rest periods. The others in the outfield -- Gates Brown, Mickey Stanley and Jim Northrup can do the job when called upon.

The infield, outside of first base, is well set with Dick MacAuliffe sharing second base with Tony Taylor, and the "gifts" from the Washington Senators a year ago -- Ed Brinkman and Aureli Rodriguez -- should have good years at shortstop and third base.

Now, tie all those "ifs" together and balance them against the Orioles, minus Frank Robinson, and you can form your own opinion regarding the Tigers chances.

As SEMCOG Limp, Turner Quits

One way of looking at it is to say that E. Robert Turner is advancing to the top of his profession by becoming city manager of Cincinnati on May 15.

Another way is to say that Turner has either found little job satisfaction or sees no future in continuing as executive director of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments.

Either way, SEMCOG, already in shaky shape, has been hit hard by the loss of Turner, a straight-forward, affable, tough-minded, intellectual sort of civic professional.

CINCINNATI is one of the half-dozen biggest cities in America with a city manager system, and Bob Turner is a city manager by trade.

He started in eastern cities, moved to Boulder, Colo. and then to Burbank, Calif. before trying his hand at regionalism by coming to SEMCOG in March 1968.

Getting the Cincinnati job for him is like becoming president of General Motors for an auto man, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff for a soldier, or editor of the New York Times for a journalist.

He'll make more money — \$40,000 there compared to \$35,000 here — although the notion that he was out to make an extra \$5,000 a year is probably preposterous.

SEMCOG is in a time of great opportunity and a time of great trouble. A man like Turner undoubtedly balanced one against the other and decided to go to Cincinnati, where, he says, he will have an opportunity to work on "regional systems."

SEMCOG's troubles are great. The staff today is 57, compared to a high of 103. Membership has stagnated around the 100 mark; the recession has played havoc with the budgets of the 400-plus counties, cities, villages, townships, school and community college districts in the six-county region.

The voluntary agency lost some important school members — Dearborn, Farmington, Plymouth, Livonia — and almost lost Schoolcraft College. After changing its financial system last year to a more heavy dependence on the county governments, SEMCOG was struck a serious body blow by Macomb County's decision to quit.

The budget blows not only mean staff cuts but a demoralization of high-class staffers. The politics-conscious Detroit News and Free Press rarely wrote about it unless they were writing about some "crisis," and no broadcast newsman ever

understood regionalism well enough to do more than the most trivial job of coverage.

THOSE ARE the bad points. There are, however, some good ones.

Turner and his staff pushed the region forward in terms of developing major "systems" — land use, transportation, water-sewer-drainage, open space, recreation, housing.

Regional cooperation is clearly the wave of the future. That became a matter of federal policy in 1964 when a highway act required all metropolitan areas (those with a central city of 50,000 or more) to engage in regional planning if it expected any kind of federal road money.

Gradually, the importance of regional planning grew to the point where SEMCOG's planning division, and those of other councils of government, were reviewing nearly all local applications for federal money — water and sewer, transportation, health care, law enforcement programs, housing.

HUD Secretary George W. Romney showed clearly where the Nixon Administration stood when he threatened to cut off all aid to Macomb County communities unless the county rejoined SEMCOG.

And SEMCOG was tremendously cheered when Gene McKinney, mayor of Westland, asked his city

council to adopt a budget that included dues for joining SEMCOG. With a population of nearly 90,000, Westland would be SEMCOG's biggest plum since Pontiac and Livonia jumped in a couple of years ago.

SO FAR AS ANYONE on the outside could see, Turner got along tremendously well with staff, politicians and whatever news media bothered to talk to him. He comes across like an easy-going plumber, wearing his slippers after a hard day's work and nursing a can of beer.

He did, however, have one policy clash. That was with one of the most important men in southeastern Michigan — Kent Mathewson, president of Metropolitan Fund, MF, as most Observerland readers know, is the research and

education foundation that spawned and staffed not only SEMCOG but TALUS (Transportation and Land Use Study), New Detroit and SEMTA (the Transportation Authority). Some pretty knowledgeable people even claim that Mathewson was the person most responsible for bringing Turner here from Burbank in 1968.

Mathewson strongly believed two things about SEMCOG: (1) It should assume something resembling the character of a metropolitan government, with a chief honcho elected by the voters at-large; (2) it should never go after private funding because that is where MF gets its money.

But to Turner and the political leaders of SEMCOG, it was an unspeakable thing to talk about great power for

SEMCOG. "Voluntary regional cooperation" was their thing. Moreover, Turner decided to go after business and industrial funding for a solid waste disposal study.

On these two points, Turner seems to have won out over Mathewson. One day after Mathewson suggested an elected chieftain for SEMCOG, the idea was forgotten, and Turner got half or more of the private funding he sought.

THE CURRENT chairman of SEMCOG is Robert FitzPatrick, the energetic and reform-minded chairman of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners. In a single sentence, FitzPatrick, in bidding Turner adieu, revealed that Turner had made his points. Said FitzPatrick's carefully worded public statement:

"Bob Turner came here in 1968 strongly committed to the ideal that local governments would cooperate and coordinate on matters of regional concern, and that the private sector would participate with vigor in the council of governments."

"As a result of Turner's guidance, we now have a council of governments capable of carrying out regional programs needed for the future," to which Turner himself added: "... I leave convinced that the council of governments in southeast Michigan will prove of inestimable value in the months and years to come."

In summary: SEMCOG isn't dying but growing — but it wasn't growing vigorously enough to suit a man of the calibre of E. Robert Turner.

OCC Offers 5 Short Courses

A series of five non-credit short courses will be offered on campus by the extension division of the Orchard Ridge Campus, Oakland Community College, in the spring of 1972.

These courses will begin the week of April 17 and, running six, eight, or ten weeks, will be offered at the Orchard Ridge Campus, I-696 between Orchard Lake and Farmington Roads.

OCC students and senior citizens of the community (65 or older) will be admitted free.

Beginning 7 p.m. Tuesday, April 18, for eight weeks in Room D-114, an Advanced Cinematography Workshop will be offered for the serious film student.

This workshop will cover all aspects of 16 mm sound film production.

Attention will also be given to the use of these techniques in 8mm production.

John C. Carlisle, an independent filmmaker and president of Interphase I Productions, an interdisciplinary intermedia production company located in Ann Arbor, will cover such areas as single- and double-system sound shooting, work-print editing, A & B roll conforming, sound track production and composition printing for answer prints and release prints. Fee: \$45.

Also starting at 7 p.m. Tuesday evening April 18, for 6 weeks in Room D-210, a course in "Selective Service - And You" will be offered by Fr. Stephen Reckker, who has been actively involved in draft counseling at the Orchard Ridge Campus for the past three years.

This course will deal quite extensively with the many times complicated process of applying for a conscientious objector status.

This course will also consider any particular selective service problem that any individual might have. Fee: \$15.

For those women interested in learning to be a model, a unique course in "Modeling" will be offered Tuesday evenings beginning April 18 for six weeks in Room L-300, from 7-10 p.m.

This course will be taught by Miss Phyllis Newman Morrison, who has modeled professionally and has been a buyer for Hudson's and Himeloch Brothers.

It is designed to offer a technical as well as objective view of modeling with a

subject matter ranging from posture, the art of walking, make up techniques, basic grooming for the individual, as well as directions in following this area as a career. Fee: \$20.

Finally, OCC's Orchard Ridge Campus will offer two unusual, experimental, college level extension courses this spring.

"Anti-Establishment Communications," a 10-week course in dissent, will premier at 7 p.m., May 2, in Room D-201.

OCC believes the class will be the first attempt anywhere to apply an academic approach to the deliberate questioning of established ideas.

The second new offering will be "Contemporary Questions," a course engaging students in conversation on the future of civilization. The first of eight weeks is scheduled 9 a.m. Saturday, May 6, in J-191.

Anti-Establishment Communications is a "how-to" course for people who want to change existing majority-conformist ideas, according to instructor Ted Rancont.

"The only alternative for someone in a minority-dissent position too frequently involves taking to the hills with a machine gun," says Rancont. "This course offers something more effective than throwing bombs."

"Civics, political science and other courses give people an idea of how the so-called 'establishment' works and how political and social change might be brought about. But nowhere are the practical communications and propaganda tools brought together and handled as a coherent, workable bag of tricks."

Rancont, an assistant professor of communications, also serves as coordinator for the contemporary questions class.

Registration for these courses will be taken at the first meeting of the class.

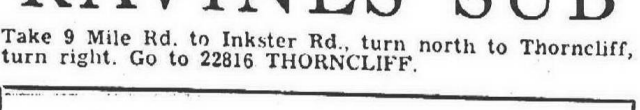

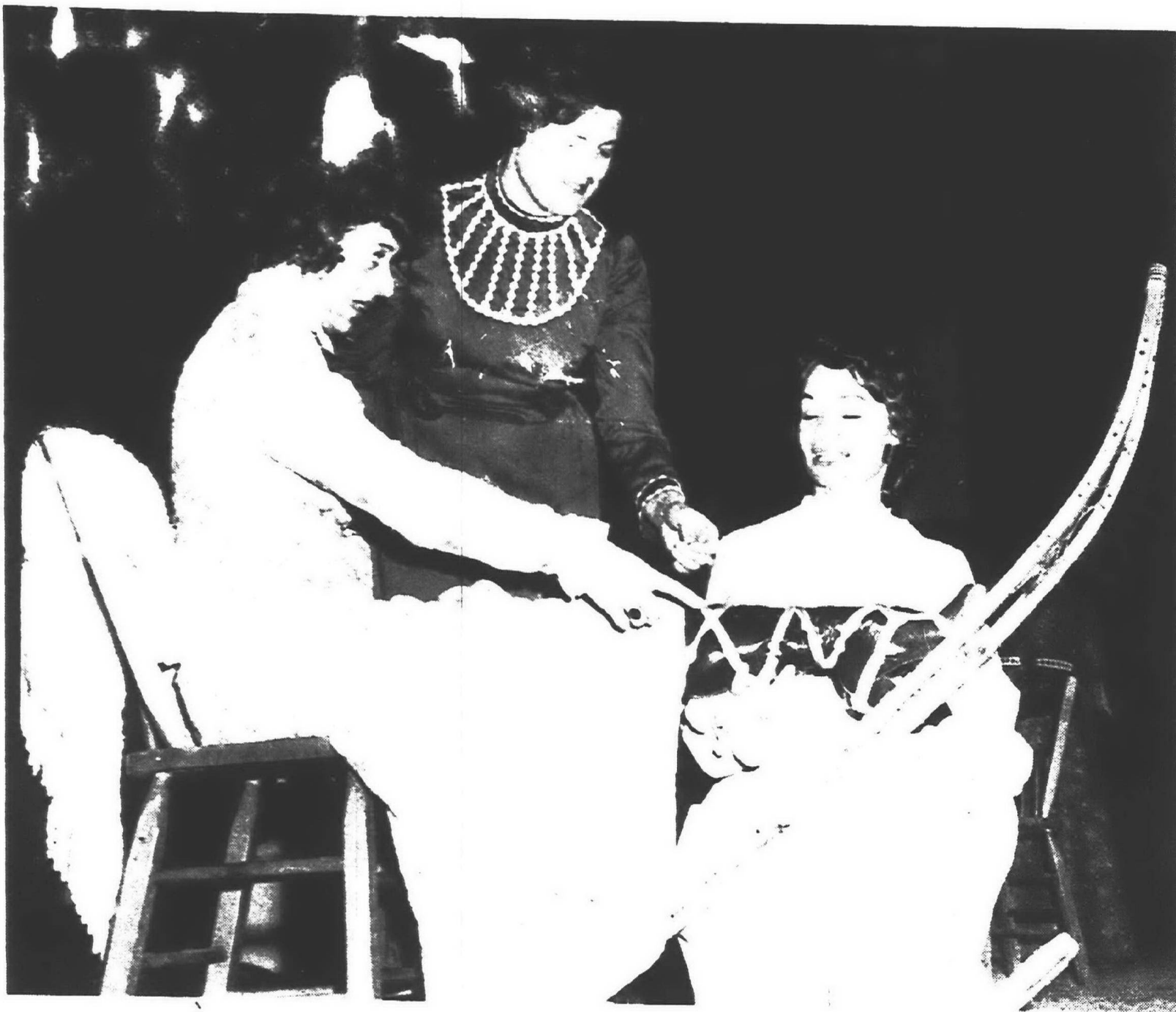

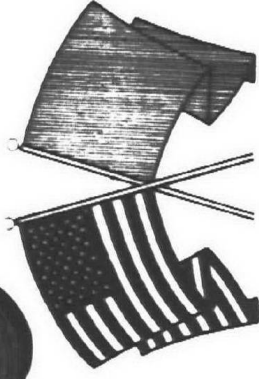
For a delicious, basic pot roast recipe try the following: Lightly brown 2/3 C. chopped onions in 1/4 cup oil over high heat in a Dutch oven; next, add a 4 pound chuck roast and brown evenly on all sides. To the meat add the following seasonings: 1 crumbled bay leaf, 1 tsp. salt, 2 tbsp. grated orange peel (fresh is best), 1/4 tsp. allspice and a dash of pepper. For liquid, put in one can of undiluted, condensed consommé. Tightly cover and simmer over low heat for about 3 1/2 hours or fork tender. To pair with biscuit dumplings, add 1 1/2 cups water to meat and bring to boil. While water is heating, combine in a bowl the following: 2 cups biscuit mix and 2/3 cup milk. When mixed, drop by tablespoonsful around the meat and cook over low heat for ten minutes uncovered -- cook ten minutes longer with cover on. Serve immediately with the pan juices as gravy.

Shrubs: Building Blocks Of Your Yard

Luscious cantalopes can be grown in area gardens. Start the seeds indoors in peat-pots and transfer to the garden in late May.

Flowers on shrubs are like the frosting on cake -- an extra bonus that adds to our enjoyment. However, just as there is more to the cake than the frosting, there is more to a shrub than its flowers.

Let's not overlook the other benefits. Shrubs are dependable and durable. They demand little care but live on and on.

They come in all shapes and sizes from little low mounds a few inches low to large masses over ten feet high. They are the real building blocks used to shape the spaces in the landscaping around your home.

LITTLE SHRUBS can be used in the rock garden, in front of the house under a low picture window, as a mini-hedge to edge a flower bed, or as a ground cover beneath other shrubs.

Here are some shrubs for a sequence of bloom all season:
FORSYTHIA, a medium to tall shrub has bright yellow blossoms in mid-April that really proclaim Spring.
FLOWERING QUINCE has equally early blossoms of coral or rose on either low spreaders or medium upright shrubs.
FLOWERING ALMOND, Purple Leaf Plum, and Nanking Cherry - all large shrubs with small delicate pale blossoms.
SPIREAS are old fashioned shrubs that are still popular. Forms with delicate white flowers are called bridal wreath. Sizes range from rather small to quite large. Bloom season varies, too.

ULACS are all-time favorites. Persian lilacs, with smaller leaves on a more compact medium-size shrub, is a better landscape choice than the common lilac or the French hybrids.

DEUTZIA is a dainty little shrub with white or pink blossoms. It combines well with lilacs.

MOCK ORANGE has fragrant white flowers.

grant white flowers in June on medium to tall plants.

WEIGELA has rose pink flowers in May and June, but the shrubs are rather stiff and coarse.

There are many kinds of HONEYSUCKLE. Most have rose or white flowers in May or June on tall, bushy plants with small, fine-textured leaves. They thrive in poor soil.

PONTENTILLA and HYPERICUM are little summer-blooming shrubs with charming yellow flowers. Both need a sunny spot.

TAMARIX is one of the few shrubs blooming in late summer. It has feathery foliage and flowers like pink plumes.

The P.G. HYDRANGEA rounds out the season of bloom with cones of white flowers that turn bronzy pink as autumn progresses.

Crab Most Popular Of Flowering Trees

Flowering trees are the great est! Nothing can beat them for sheer beauty when they are in bloom, and they are good landscape specimens, too.

They can shade a patio, be part of a background planting, screen an unwanted view, or provide a special accent by the front door in a small yard or by a low house, they may be all the tree that is needed. They are in better scale than a large shade tree would be.

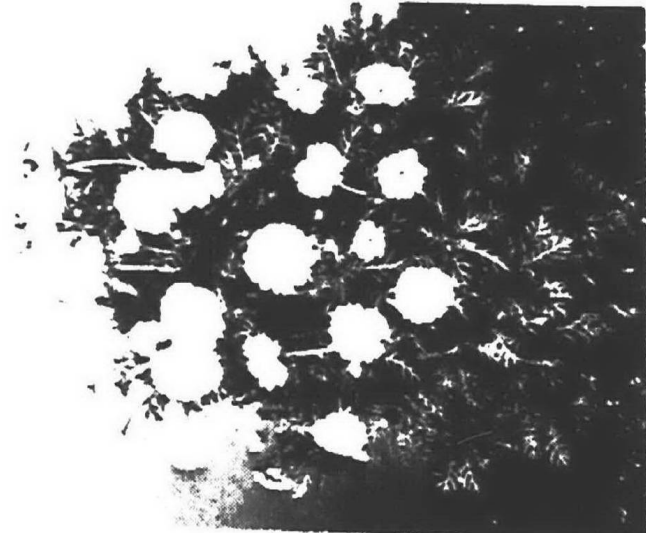
Crabs are among the best flowering trees for this area. They range in size from the Sargent's crab, which is seldom over eight feet tall, to kinds such as Dolgo crab and Siberian crab which can be 40 feet tall.

Color can vary from the white of Japanese crab to the delicate pink of Katherine to the deep rose of Crimson Brilliant. Fruits are a bonus. They vary in size and color but are an attraction in fall and are relished by the birds.

Among the most popular kinds are Red Jade, Redbud crab, Van Eseltine, Tea crab and Hopa crab. Among the newer

kinds, that are especially disease resistant and free flowering every year, look for Radiant

FLOWERING CHERRIES are not quite as hardy as crabs, but are justly famed for their other eal beauty when they are in bloom. Kwanzan is a popular form with double, pink flowers

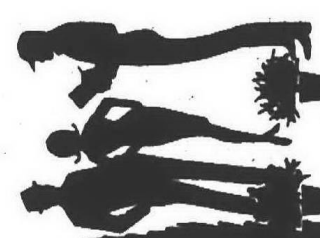

This Grass-Roots Campaign Is Winner!

Portulaca, or moss roses, make a bright colorful ground cover. They grow quickly from seeds sown after the weather is warm, or little plants may be purchased.

Republican? Democrat? No matter which, it's time to join the grass roots movement. The lawn care season has arrived.

First make sure the machine (mowing, that is) is in good working order — motor clean, blades sharp, gas in tank, and that it WILL start.

Next a clean sweep. Give the lawn a brisk raking to remove dead grass, clippings and to untangle the snarls. Then give it a close cut. Looks better already.

If there is a thick layer of "thatch" next to the roots that raking didn't remove, rent a power "dethatcher" to do the job. Thatch keeps air, water, fertilizer from getting down to the grass-roots level.

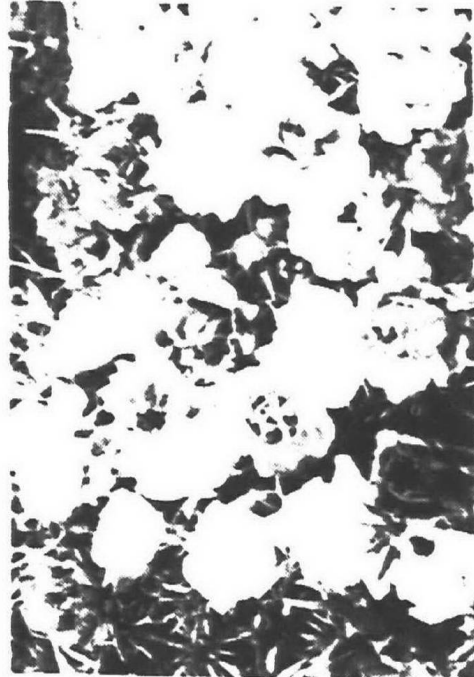
Any thin or bare spots. Those are the precincts for special attention. Scratch up the surface of the soil

with a rake and scatter seeds evenly over the area.

NOW THE MAJOR campaign!
Feed the lawn.

Without nourishment that lawn just can't be strong and healthy. Unless you are a real purist who casts his vote only for organic fertilizers, split your ticket and give your lawn a light dose of a commercial chemical fertilizer high in nitrogen (that's the first number in the formula on the bag). This will give the lawn a quick boost and bring out the green.

Follow this in late spring with an application of urea-form (synthetic organic) or a natural organic fertilizer. (Dehydrated manure, sewage sludge, cotton seed-meal).



Don't put a \$50 tree in a 50 cent hole. That bit of old-time advice still holds true. When you are planting a tree, make the hole big enough. Don't crowd the roots.

Large trees should be moved with a ball of earth around their roots. However, smaller trees and most shrubs can be moved with bare roots. Care must be taken to keep the roots protected so they do not dry out. Keep them covered with damp straw or burlap or even damp newspapers.

DIG THE PLANTING hole about a foot wider than the roots spread, and make it at least a foot deeper than needed.

Discard about half the soil removed from the hole and mix peat moss with the remaining soil.

Put a thick layer of this mixture in the bottom of the hole, and position the tree in the hole so it is at the same level as it was growing before, and so it looks most attractive from the main point of view.

Fill the soil mixture in around the roots until the hole is half filled. Work the soil down around

the roots. Fingers work best for this.

Pour on a bucket of water to help settle the soil around the roots. Then finish filling the hole with the soil down firmly around the roots. This is best done by stepping firmly but gently on the soil while the tree is held to keep it upright.

MOUND SOME SURPLUS soil around the edge of the hole to form a basin or saucer around the tree. Water thoroughly. The saucer keeps the water where it is needed.

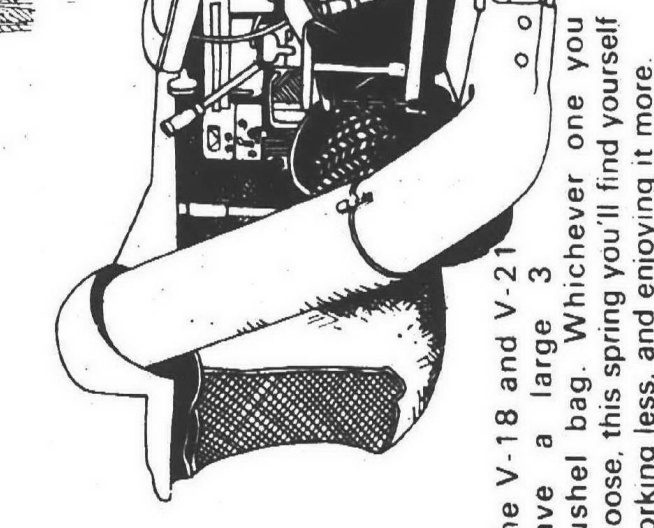
Plan to give the tree a good soaking every week throughout the spring and summer. However, don't keep the soil constantly soggy. Let it dry out a bit between waterings.

Fertilizer should not be used in the planting hole because it may burn the tender roots. If desired, some can be used later in the season.

Staking may be necessary to keep the tree vertical.
