### Selle Agency Hit By Fire

A Friday afternoon fire gutted the showroom and business offices of the Jack Selle Buick Agency, 200 W. Ann Arbor Rd., destroying five new cars in the showroom, two cars outside and many of the 20-year-old firm's business records.

Selle said damage would exceed \$300,000 and go perhaps as high as \$500,000. No one was injured.

City Fire Chief George Schoenemann said the fire started about 5 p.m. and did most of its damage in 15 minutes. It was extinguished by 6 p.m. Schoenemann said he believed it started in the ventilating system.

Spared were the service department in the back and seven cars undergoing repairs there. The cars were pushed out of the building.

### PHS Coed, 16, Hurt Critically

Teresa Sorensen, 16, a junior in Plymouth High, is in critical condition in Wayne County General Hospital with head injuries suffered in an accident in the faculty parking lot at the high school.

Witnesses told Wayne County road patrol deputies that Teresa was tossed off the trunk of a car, landed on her head and sustained injuries that required hours of surgical attention.

Miss Sorensen and a friend reportedly climbed on the trunk of a car, allegedly driven by Mary Ellis Johnson, 6435 Beck Road, as it entered the lot. Miss Johnson is reported to have accelerated the speed and Teresa fell off. Witnesses said the car couldn't have been traveling at more than 10-15 miles per hour.

The girl was rushed to the hospital in the Canton Township rescue ambulance and underwent emergency surgery within minutes after arrival.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David Sorensen, 41267 Wilcox, Plymouth Township.

## Artrain 'Sideshow' In Spotlight

Just as the sideshow is an important part of any circus, so will visitors to Michigan Artrain find a variety of other attractions at the site as a result of community participation with the Kaleidoscope Plymouth committee.

Artrain itself was pulled into town Thursday morning, and an invitational VIP preview is scheduled Sunday afternoon. The train will be open to the public on the C&O siding at Starkweather beginning Wednesday and running through May 6 according to the following schedule:

Weekdays, 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. and from 6:30 to 8 p.m.

Saturdays, 10 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Sundays, 12 noon to 8 p.m.

Fresh paint on the C&O freight house and covered walkway, plantings of trees and shrubs, and a unique entry way formed from

telephone poles and a 20-ton sewer collar have turned the site into a remarkable creation of beauty.

Although it is the Michigan Council of Arts that provided Artrain, local individuals and organizations have gone all out to build sideshow features of matching artistic appeal. These are some of the things visitors will find:

**SCHOOL CHILDREN** of Plymouth have designed and painted 25 murals, each four by eight feet, which have been hung in the walkway.

In the freight depot will be an exhibit of approximately 100 pieces of art from the schools selected by art teachers. These will be judged for the Russell Isbister Memorial Award, the beginning of a collection to be added to annually and displayed in the community.

Judges are Marilyn Carl,

Margie Moon, Graham Martin and Don Sellers.

Under the direction of Jessie Hudson, two large looms have been designed and built by Ed Echols, a PHS student. These will be in the freight house for community weaving. The finished work will hang in City Hall.

Also in the weaving area, Walter Lum will be demonstrating and exhibiting his weaving.

**FOUR BOOTHS** in the freight house will have craft demonstrations in progress at all times Artrain is open. In one of the booths, each day's demonstration will be by students from a different school. Johnnie Crosby is chairman of this activity.

In Artrain's studio car, citizens, students and teachers of Plymouth will be at work on metal crafts, pottery, painting and sculpture.

There also will be a group of seven students from Schoolcraft College engaged in plaster sculpturing.

On-site entertainment by musicians and dancers also has been worked into the schedule and will begin April 22. The full list of entertainers will be given in Wednesday's Mail & Observer.

The allied activities planned during the 18-day Artrain stay by organizations throughout the community are listed in the special Artrain section which accompanies today's edition.

**MEANWHILE**, judging in two special contests inspired by Kaleidoscope Plymouth is scheduled this weekend.

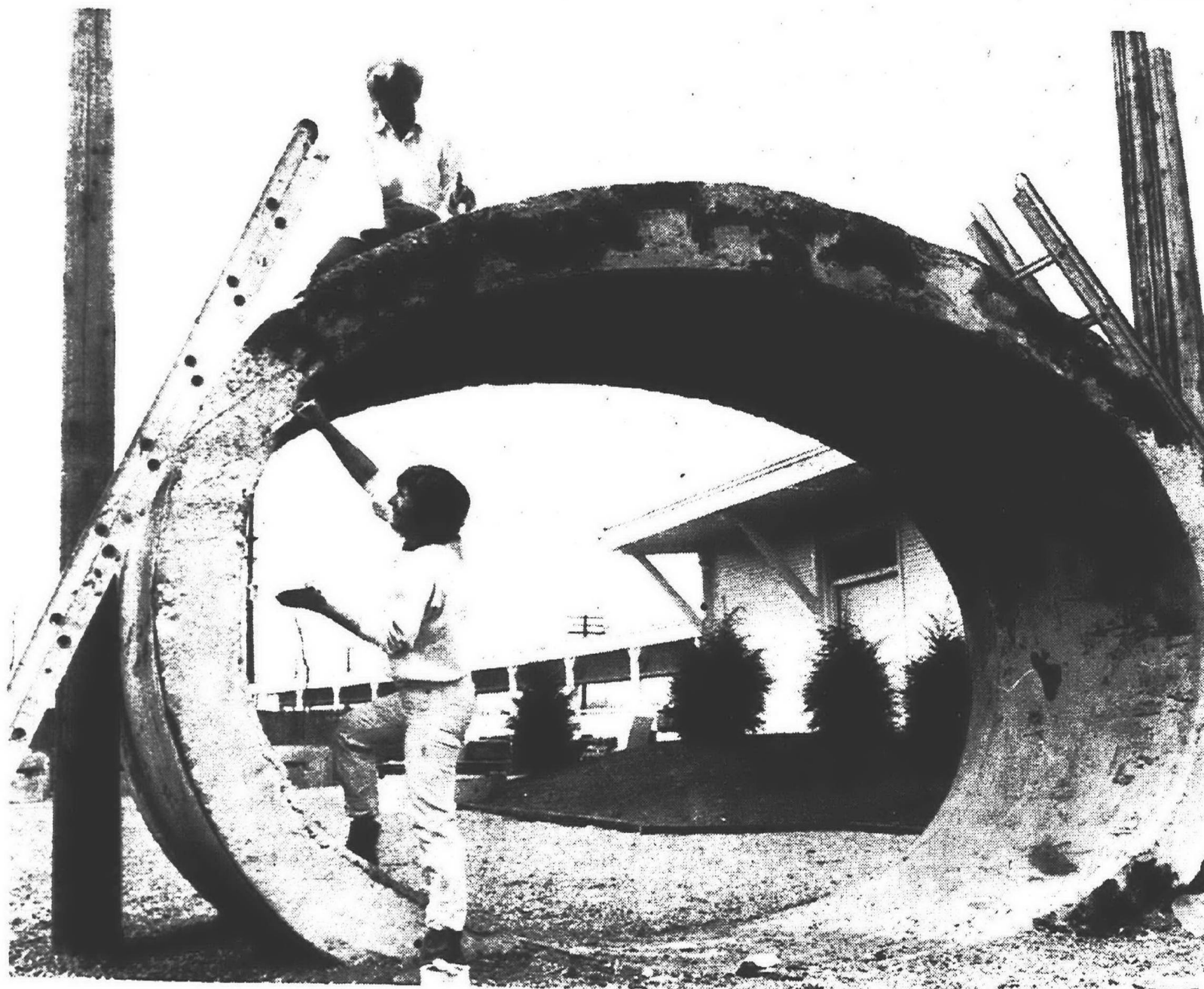
Judging of paintings submitted in the Three Cities Art Club show will be conducted this afternoon (Saturday) in Dunning-Hough Library. The juror will be Donald B. Gooch, professor of design and

faculty member of the department of art at the University of Michigan.

Contest paintings will be displayed in Plymouth store windows beginning Monday, with the winning selections exhibited at the Artrain location.

**PLYFOTOSHO** photographic entries also are up for weekend judging and these pictures will go on display in the library Wednesday, to remain through May 6.

Chairman of the contest is John Gaffield and the judges are Richard Cay of Livonia, who holds the current title of Michigan's professional photographer of the year; Robert Webber of Northville, former vice president of the Photographers Guild of Detroit, and David Bacon of Plymouth, director of photography for Graphic Communications.

## Drive Nets 153 Young Voters

The Plymouth School District's roll of registered voters gained 153 new names Tuesday during the "Age of Majority Conference" at the high school, an event which was hailed with enthusiasm by all who participated.

Designed to give seniors information on their rights and responsibilities under the new adulthood law, the program featured speakers from several professional fields as well as the opportunity for those who will be

18 on or before May 16 to register.

Mrs. James Suhay of the League of Women Voters was in charge of this activity and reported 80 new voters for Plymouth Township, 58 for the City of Plymouth, 12 for Canton Township and three for Northville Township.

THESE WERE some of the typical student comments on the conference which was conducted by a special student

committee in cooperation with the social studies department:

"With so many resource people available, it was like packing a year of experience into one morning," said Terese Kulick.

Mary Mayer commented, "Never before have I seen such a collection of information. I had a lot of questions answered in two hours that would have taken me months to collect on my own."

Pat Wilken praised Atty. John Thomas for giving an "in-depth study" of legal rulings on business contracts, and Richard Newton added, "Most of those who attended feel they have more insight into the responsibilities of becoming an adult."

**RAY HOMER**, who headed the faculty advisory committee for the conference, pointed out that students were given the opportunity to obtain facts concerning "the realities of adulthood and citizenship."

"I am grateful that so many local speakers gave up their valuable time to share their expertise with our students," said Homer.

Principal Bill Brown said the conference was "a genuine attempt to impress upon the young men and women of this high school the respon-

sibilities and the right of citizenship. Undoubtedly this program provided an impact on the lives of all."

Job termination notices were sent to 81 probationary, first-year Plymouth teachers Friday, although even the board of education president admitted the action was taken "grudgingly and under pressure."

President Esther Hulsing called the board into special session Thursday night to renew the discussion of what to do in face of the requirement that all discontinuance of service notices must be issued at least 60 days before the end of the school year.

This meant that any action taken had to be by the end of this week.

Because it is impossible to predict whether voters will approve renewal of an expiring five-mill tax levy, the board's attorneys advised issuance of the notices and there were no dissenting votes.

An administrative memo to the board advised that the prime alternative would be to "assume that monies will be made available by the electorate and that we will be able to pay all probationary staff members for the 1972-73 school year without having to dismiss."

IN ADDITION to the formal notices that went out Friday, Acting Supt. John M. Hoben

sent each of the 81 teachers a personal letter in which he stated:

"It is the board's feeling and mine that this may be a temporary action which may be turned around by the electorate at the June 12 election. The past history of millage elections in this district is an optimistic one."

"This action by the board in no way reflects upon the job being performed by you."

"It's a legal point we have to do, even though grudgingly and under pressure," commented Mrs. Hulsing.

**BOARD TREASURER** George Lawton said, "If we get the millage through, they're on the payroll. If we don't, they're not."

Member John Ohno added, "It's a matter of being laid off, not fired, and John Hanks pointed out that similar, so-called 'pink slips' are being handed out 'all over the State of Michigan.'"

The five mills in question represent an estimated \$1.5 million, of which about \$810,000 would go as salaries for the teachers involved in the lay-offs.

Mrs. Hulsing emphasized that "if we don't get the millage renewal there will be other cuts, too, but this is the only one we are legally bound to make."

CANTON TOWNSHIP was one of 10 communities in the seven southeastern Michigan counties which issued permits for construction of more than 1,000 housing units in 1971, according to SEMCOG statistics.

The top 10 ranked in this order: Southfield, 2,953; Taylor, 2,408; Troy, 1,711; Detroit, 1,685; Sterling Heights, 1,641; Clinton Township, 1,290; Ann Arbor, 1,254; Canton, 1,085; Brownstown Township, 1,044 and Avon Township, 1,037.

DR. EDWIN PAGE, director of special education of the Plymouth school district, will be the guest speaker at an open meeting of the Community School Council at 8 p.m. Monday, April 17 in Farrand School.

Members of the special education department will be present to discuss specific concerns in their areas. These will include diagnosticians, social workers, crisis room teachers, speech therapists and teachers of the mentally retarded.

of the Mandatory Education Act and its impact on the school system. Co-chairmen Lorraine Kornegger and Dick Hausman urge members "to bring along a friend who is interested in learning more about these programs."

Harriet Arnowitz, general chairman of the dinner, said the Plymouth Township resident was selected "on the basis of volunteer work done in the Wayne 2nd Congressional District."

NEW CONSTRUCTION valued at \$1.159 million was authorized through building permits issued in Plymouth Township during March, virtually all of it for new residential construction.

Building Inspector Ralph Alloway reported issuance of

15 permits for single family homes representing a value of \$592,100, and five condominiums worth \$560,664.

## Police Make Zeese Charge

PLYMOUTH A warrant charging Carl Zeese, 38, of 41181 Crabtree Lane, Plymouth with leaving the scene of a personal injury accident has been issued by Dearborn Heights police. No date has been set for arraignment on the charge.

The complaint was signed by Eugene Coby of Dearborn Heights, whose son, John, 10, was allegedly knocked off his bicycle by Zeese during a series of hit-run accidents in Dearborn Heights on April 5. Police say the boy will be in traction for at least six weeks as a result of the accident.

A five-year-old boy, injured in a head-on crash when, according to police, Zeese veered into the path of the car in which he was riding, is still in critical condition in Wayne County General Hospital. His mother was released from the hospital this week, police said.

Zeese, who is a diabetic, was reported recovering from his injuries and expected to be released from the hospital soon.

## Cannon Case Has Mystery, Intrigue

PLYMOUTH How a thousand-pound cannon with an eight-foot barrel can disappear from sight, or where one would hide it without the word soon getting around, are questions plaguing City Hall in wake of the loss early in the week of the city's World War I relic.

Adding to the intrigue was the appearance in Wednesday's classified section of all Observer newspapers of an ad reading, "Large antique cannon for sale."

However, this appeared to be the work of an opportunist seeking a laugh as the telephone number given was that of the Hillside Inn, which in turn was reportedly deluged with inquiries.

That plan went awry, at least for the time being, when the cannon couldn't be found.

A police search for the firing piece so far has been to no avail, and the question of posting a reward for its recovery is being weighed by the city commission, whose next meeting is to be Monday night.

Commodore Robert Delaney of the Tonquish Creek Yacht Club offered the services of his fleet if the search turns to local waterways, but expressed high dudgeon at a question of whether the club had had a hand in the heist to gain a club house showpiece. "We didn't think of it," lamented the commodore.

## plymouth THROUGH BIFOCALS

By FRED DeLANO / Editor Mail & Observer

WITHIN HOURS last Monday after I wrote a piece which included the assertion that Plymouth High School is among the nation's leaders in innovative approaches to education, the board of education adopted a plan which I have to call "unique," not just innovative.

It will be in effect for the more than 3,000 high school students next September, and hopefully will personalize student - faculty - administrator relationships more than any system you have ever seen.

It is called the "unit plan" and what it boils down to is that students will be divided into separate groups of about 425. At the head of each will be a unit coordinator, then a counselor, and then from 17 to 20 teachers will complete each package. Grade levels will be crossed in forming the 425 - student units.

Quoting Acting Supt. Mike Hoben's nine - page recommendation for the plan, "The times call for some new methods of coping with our school problems and even new structures to make this possible in an effective way."

I am capable of interpreting all this with the same impact as contained in the original script, so let me quote selected paragraphs from the Hoben report. They may convince you that you are on the threshold of the future.

"THE TEACHER, as a member of this task force, will be assigned the responsibility of about 22 students. While most of these individuals will require only nominal care and attention, we all know that there is an increasing number of boys and girls who need the close and friendly supervision of a caring adult.

"While this relationship often exists in the classroom, there are also many examples of completely unattached students for whom no one cares, and who in turn don't care very much either.

"It is this bond that we, as the paid professional adult educators, need to be very much concerned with, and it is hoped that working as a group in the unit progress in this direction will help to improve the educational climate in the school.

"THE UNIT COORDINATOR, working fulltime in an instructional leadership role, will be directly responsible for the well - being of all staff members and students assigned to his unit. He will hold a master's degree in one of the instructional areas assigned or have equivalent teaching experience in these areas.

"His school year will be 11 months in length and the salary factor will be set by the board.

"Working with the teachers in a group and as individuals, the unit coordinator will also deal with all but the most aggravated discipline problems. Close attention will be given to chronic attendance situations and parents will be kept fully aware of pupil problems as they develop.

"In most cases, teachers from several departments will be grouped together.

"The unit organization will make it possible for more teachers to know each other, for interaction among all departments, and for more teachers to relate more closely to students in general and an assigned group of students during their freshman, sophomore, junior and senior years.

"There will be every opportunity for a closer and more meaningful relationship to develop. An effort will thus be made to overcome the adverse effects of the impersonal aspects of a large and bureaucratic institution."

OF COURSE, what it all adds up to is a personalized approach. One can only commend the attempt and hope it works. Plymouth is

pioneering this plan in Michigan, and the closest parallels are at Evanston, Ill., and Berea, O.

Hoben says this in his instructions to teachers:

"During the coming school year, about 19 teachers, a counselor and a unit coordinator will be responsible for approximately 425 of the students in our building.

"The new arrangement calls for a real effort to become personally acquainted with the students that you will have responsibility for in your group."

Then Hoben outlines some specific areas of influence, just as he has for unit coordinators (who are yet to be selected) and among them he mentions:

"Kids in trouble need our help. What can you do about your students who have difficulties with school attendance, discipline, academic achievement, the police, or even with their home life?"

THERE ARE many more, but this, too, catches the eye:

"Many teachers at Plymouth High School are well aware that there are problems in our school that call for a more direct and united behavior on the part of the professional staff.

"Just teaching the class and getting through the book by the end of the year will not be enough to get us by any more."

To that, I can only add "Amen" and perhaps suggest to the students beginning their PHS careers in 1972 - 73 that they will mark the beginning of a new era, possibly the most exciting, personal and beneficial one that the Plymouth system of education ever has fostered.

For more than a half dozen years, The Stroller has spent many irritating moments at the C&O rail crossing on Starkweather Ave. on his way into downtown Plymouth.

He has been forced to sit in his car and wait until a lengthy freight train — and sometimes one in each direction — passed by. And as he sat there, he cursed his fate and wondered among other things how much valuable time was lost and, even worse, what would happen if an ambulance enroute to a hospital had to wait for any lengthy time.

These long delays passed the irritating stage many times even after trying to calm frayed nerves by counting the number of cars on the long train.

But the other afternoon, The Stroller, enjoyed a visit to the crossing as he walked through the Artrain display, amazed at the talent displayed by the school students and the residents who helped make the entire rail siding a thing of beauty and revealed the lengths to which sound planning and imagination can go — when properly guided.

IT WAS the first visit of the Artrain. This, in itself, was an honor to the City of Plymouth. And it gave cause to ask, — After Artrain, what?

Will it leave any lasting memories?

Will there be any tangible evidence that it was here?

The rail crossing long has been the target of criticism and all sorts of efforts have been made to eliminate it.

Now, due to the presence of Artrain, some of the thinking has changed.

"Wouldn't it be grand," City Commissioner Harold Guenther asked, "if we could keep the train here — or preserve the site for some

permanent exhibitions or uses?"

It was a good question and it caused The Stroller to recall that massive Soldier Field in Chicago is a hold-over from a great civic undertaking of years ago.

The same is true of the Kennedy Stadium in Philadelphia, which is a memorial not only to the late president, but a constant reminder of the Sesqui-Centennial Celebration.

Another landmark is the Los Angeles Coliseum, made possible through the staging of the 1932 Olympic Games.

Even the City of Plymouth has a unique reminder of its centennial in a bit of stone taken from the dock in Plymouth, England, from which the Mayflower sailed in 1620.

So, why not try to preserve the C&O rail siding as a memento of the first visit of the Artrain?

IT HAS been rumored in some circles that the Artrain is nearing the end of its usefulness in Michigan and that several other states are looking at it with longing eyes.

If that is the case, why not try to keep it here?

"We could make good use of it," Guenther pointed out. "We could keep it as an art center during the summer months — much like Hyde Park in London, England, and similar areas in other countries."

"We could have year round exhibits of the artistry of our citizens. And in the summer months we could have nice garden displays — even a farmers' market — or a series of specialties on weekends as they have in many other cities

in some of the countries in Europe."

He left another reminder — "Don't forget," he said, "Old Village is being revitalized to a great degree. There'll be a mini-park at the intersection of Mill Street and Wilcox and a permanent Artrain could become a great asset not only to Old Village, but the entire Plymouth area could profit greatly by it."

What do you think? — Wouldn't this be a great manner in which to remember the first visit of the Artrain?

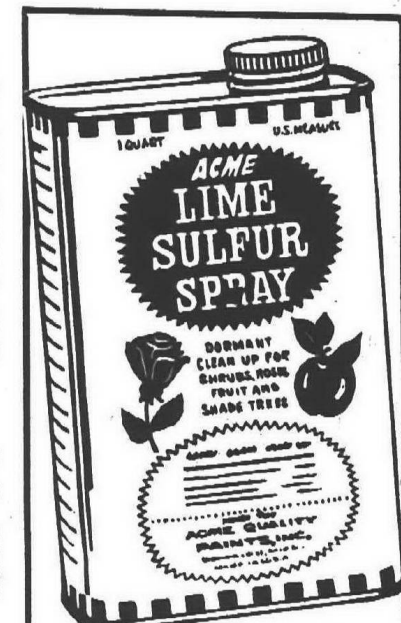

"We do not try to give continuing help or take the place of welfare agencies. But leaders of the Health and Welfare Service realize that sometimes governmental agencies cannot move fast enough to meet emergencies, or can operate in only one area of need.

"That is why we try to offer the assistance an individual may need to cope with a sudden problem he may face."

IN SOME COMMUNITIES in Michigan, Adventist churches have set up complete Welfare Service Centers. Mrs. Hall said the local church is not large enough to do so on a full time basis, but does try to have emergency supplies available.

She also said that the resources of the Seventh-Day Adventist Church in Michigan, including a huge emergency relief van, are available to people in this area in case of a major disaster.

## Rev. Lester Kinsolving's Religion Update

While there has been a welcome increase in cooperation between religious denominations, clergy and congregations throughout the nation should take careful note of a growing number of bogus clergy from obscure denominations who take advantage of this ecumenicity — such as Robert Douglas Tato.

On Oct. 28, 1968, Tato, who still claims to be a priest of the Antiochian Orthodox Archdiocese of Toledo, Ohio and Dependencies in North America, was arrested by police in Zanesville, Ohio, on child molesting charges.

Photostatic copies of these police records, which are now in the files of this writer, reveal that Tato obtained employment as a caseworker for the Muskingum County Child Welfare Board. He was charged with "exposing himself" and "attempting to take indecent liberties" with a 13-year-old boy — to whom he had promised employment in cleaning his apartment at night.

THE REV. TERRENCE BURTON, former assistant pastor of St. James Episcopal Church in Zanesville (and now rector of St. Andrew's Church, Milwaukee) told this writer during a telephone interview: "After Tato's arrest, he came to me weeping and denying the charge. We had allowed him to use our church as an ecumenical gesture and because there were a number of Syrian families in Zanesville. I believed in him, so I posted his bail."

"After he jumped bail, I called his archbishop, Michael Shaheen in Toledo, to suggest

that he might help me repay the forfeited bond I had posted to bail out one of his priests. Shaheen refused."

In Toledo, during a telephone interview, Archbishop Shaheen retorted:

"We did not authorize anyone to put up money for Tato, who was dropped from our rolls completely on Nov. 3, 1968, after we received his letter asking for leave of absence, after he left Toledo for Zanesville."

ZANESVILLE POLICE records also reveal that Tato, a 31-year-old native of San Diego, has an FBI rap sheet two pages in length. It dates from 1957 and includes arrests or receptions in San Diego, Saskatchewan, Ottawa, Butte, Los Angeles and Fargo — including charges of fraud, assault on a minor male child and repeated violations of the Selective Service law.

In February of 1971, The San Francisco Examiner first exposed Tato for identifying himself as "Father Robert Richards" and falsely claiming to be a Roman Catholic priest — while operating a homosexual commune called the "Community of St. John The Beloved" and holding services (until forbidden by campus authorities) at the Jesuit-owned University of San Francisco.

One year later, The Examiner, in another page-one story, revealed that newly elected San Francisco Sheriff Richard Hongisto had ap-

pointed Tato a chaplain of the San Francisco County Jail.

SHERIFF HONGISTO reacted to this expose by angrily denouncing the story as "trash" and by barring this writer from covering the announced worship services which Tato said he was conducting in the jail. The controversy reached the San Francisco Board of Supervisors, with Supervisor Peter Tamaras raising the issue of the freedom of the press and asking the sheriff what he was trying to hide.

But when subsequently confronted with the Zanesville police records, which this writer traveled to Zanesville to obtain, Sheriff Hongisto immediately barred Tato from the jail, admitting somewhat sheepishly, that he had not known of the police record.

Tato admits he jumped bail in Zanesville, where, after his failure to return, the charge was finally dropped on Feb. 9, 1970. He loftily dismisses this child - molesting charge as "typical harassment of homosexuals" — which should be of particular note to the vast majority of homosexuals who never touch children, but who suffer because of those who do.

This should also be carefully noted by the nation's clergy (not to mention sheriffs and welfare departments) who can consult Zanesville police records for the extensive and tragic statement of a 13-year-old boy who was apparently unaware of the existence of wolves in priest's clothing.

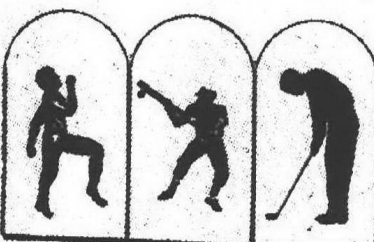

Can an almost - new cast in an almost - new musical make leaving home worthwhile?

At Schoolcraft College this weekend, the answer is "Yes."

The college's Masque Players are presenting an original work called "Little Man with Star," written by Ralph Kelley and the students. At least 90 per cent has been written by them. There are a few familiar songs. And the program explains, "Ninety per cent of this cast is new, making their first appearance on stage."

THE PLAY WILL be seen again tonight (Saturday) at 8 and tomorrow at 7 in the Liberal Arts Theater on the campus, 18600 Haggerty. It opened Thursday.

The musical has at least three things going for it... and one going against it.

First, the staging and lighting are excellent. The use of slide projections adds a great deal to the enjoyment of the play.

Second, it's a play which captures and holds your attention. The "problems" are outlined clearly and movingly early in the first act, in which we see a suburban mother waiting in an airport for her son who has just been released from an Army hospital.

But she feels no joy at the prospect of his return.

"Since he's been gone, I've learned to enjoy my freedom," she says.

And her husband comments that everything he has hoped for his son has led to disappointment.

The son, Robert, arrives

home and is greeted rather perfunctorily.

He gets the car keys, and mother and father get back to their busy routines.

"I'll be just as lonely as ever," he says.

You can't help wondering how these conflicting needs will be reconciled.

THE POSSIBLE ANSWER comes in the form of Robert's old girl friend, Jill, and her friends, and here is the best thing going for the musical.

The friends, or the chorus, in a wonderfully weird array of costumes, are the undoubted stars of the show as they dance and sing and try to convince Robert that his salvation lies in a Jesus - freak type of involvement.

Their enthusiasm is catching and they are outstanding.

The bad part is that the same cannot be said for individual performances. Lessons in diction and projection are obviously needed.

In staging any kind of a show, a community college has a terrific problem with time. Many students work as well as go to school, and in this case it looks as if the available time was taken up in directing the chorus, not the individuals.

It was probably a wise move, because the over - all impression is excellent. But one cannot help but mourn the loss of the old - fashioned elocution teacher and wish that grade and high schools would take up the slack.

Of the play itself, the denouement leaves me unconvinced.

## Show Features Trout Pond

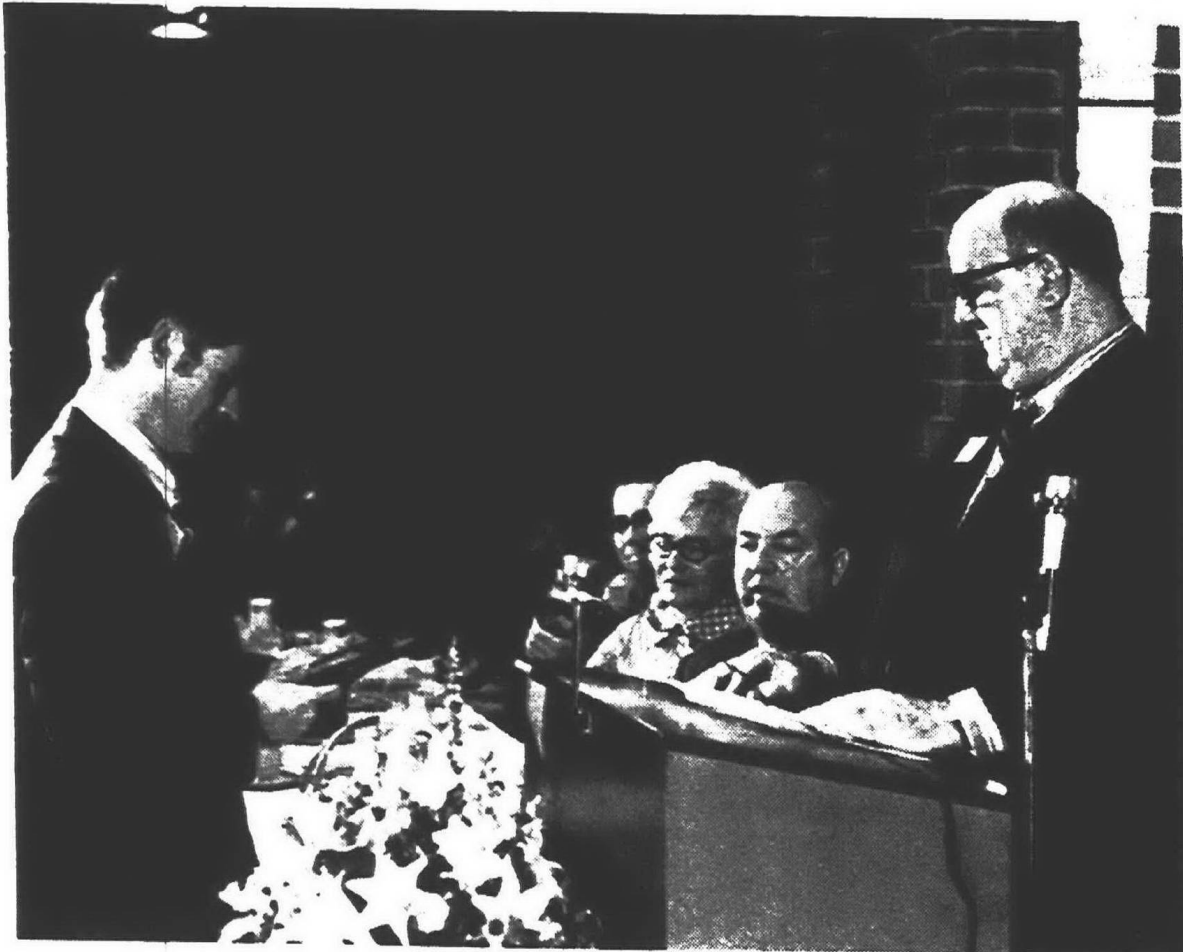
Fish will be biting at the Livonia Mall camping and sports show beginning Monday and running through April 23.

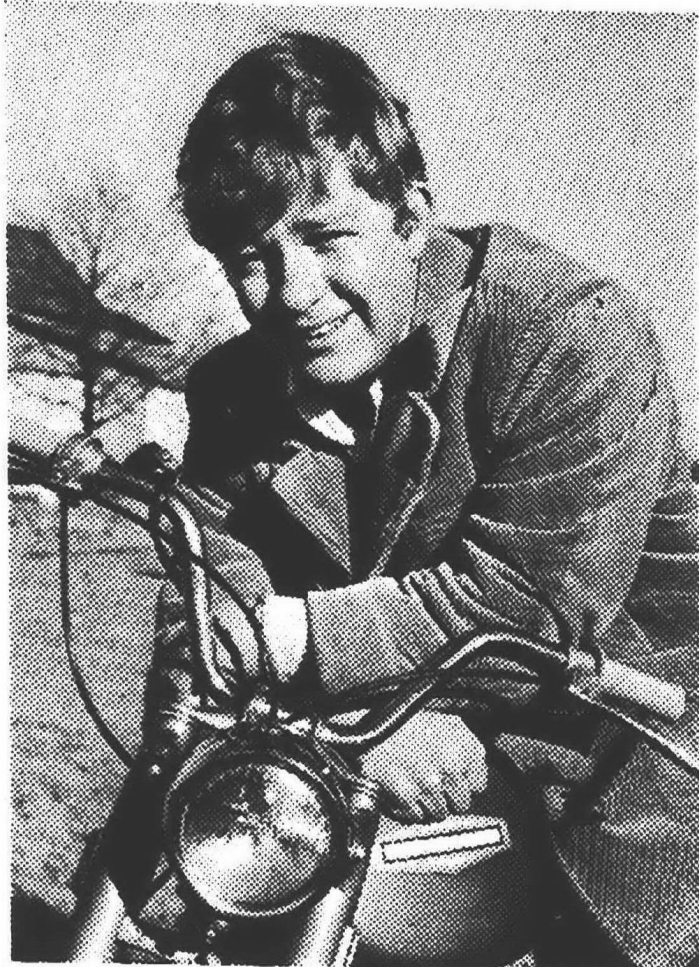

The second part of the form contains information that is fed into an IBM 1130 computer for billing information. The last part of the form serves as a record of your ad for checking purposes.

After your ad is completed the ad taker puts it into a specially designed conveyor system located within easy reach. This conveyor system was designed with speed and efficiency in mind.

The conveyor system carries your ad to a clerk who scans the ad for accuracy and completeness and then sends it on to our production department.

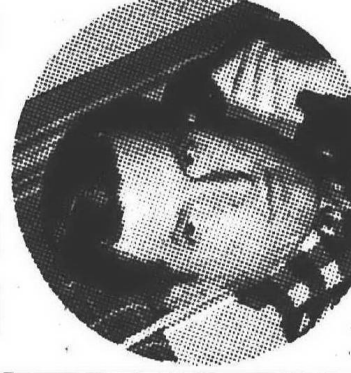

## A Fire Gave Birth To 'Wants'

Classified advertising was born by public demand. Yes, it is one of the few major business enterprises that had its beginning and is sustained by the demand of you, the people.

Classified, as we know it today, was begun in 1666 following the great London fire. More than 13,000 homes were destroyed, families were separated and anguished, distraught people pleaded, beseeched and begged the newspapers to run their plea for information regarding a lost child, missing mother or aged parent.

The newspaper responded to this need to tell the most tragic stories of love and anguish by running these messages on the very front pages of the papers. Thus was born classified as we know in newspapers. These "smalls" or "wants" as they are referred to in England, were continued on the front pages until just a few years ago.

About 35 years later, classified is still growing by leaps and bounds because it is providing answers to needs as basic, if not as dramatic, as those brought on by the great London fire of 1666.

So basic is its acceptance that in every community of this continent you'll find people taking it for granted: its ability to find a home, a job, an apartment, good transportation, find a lost pet, sell used golf clubs or boat...yes, even

to thank friends and relatives for their thoughtfulness expressed in the loss of a loved one.

Classified's history is steeped with success, humor, human warmth and love. Benjamin Franklin used Want Ads for everything and anything. For example, from the July 14, 1737 issue of his newspaper, the Pennsylvania Gazette, an excellent illustration of his unusual copy follows:

"Taken out of a pew in the church some months since, a Common Prayer Book bound in red, gilt and lettered D.F. (Deborah Franklin) on each cover. The person who took it is desired to open it and read the Eighth Commandment, and afterwards return it into the same pew again, upon which no further notice will be taken."

A five-cent Want Ad got former dime store chief Hubert T. Parsons his first job.

By answering a classified want ad, Tony Jacklin started a career as an assistant golf pro that has made him one of the most successful pro golfers.

We could go on and on citing various examples of how classified want ads have helped people in all walks of life...the outcome would be evident...classified want ads have answered the public demand.


The baggage car also provides a place for the public to observe visiting artists at work. Demonstrations will include sculpturing, ce-



## Creativity And Culture Linked Within Artrain

Construction of Michigan Artrain was made possible by an allocation from the State Legislature, matching funds from the National Endowment for the Arts, and major private contributions of services, materials and cash through the Michigan Foundation for the Arts.

Design, concept and content emphasize the sustaining tie between a creative person and his contribution to the culture that nourishes him. That tie is embodied in "A Vision of Art," the theme of Artrain which had its grand opening May 21, 1971 at Traverse City.

Artrain is largely a citizens' effort involving volunteers from all fields -- art, industry and government, working under the enthusiastic leadership of Mrs. William G. Milliken, the general chairman.

WITHIN THE train is a complete art gallery showing slides, films, photographs, sculpture, paintings, graphics, prints, pottery and jewelry.

The 80-foot-long Artrain cars are provided with air conditioning, humidity control and security in order to display and protect the

valuable art collection. Containing about 150 pieces of art, the railway cars present an effective display with skillful use of mirrors to create an illusion of much greater space.

About two-thirds of the paintings are on loan from the Detroit Institute of Arts and the balance from private galleries and Michigan artists.

THE RAILROAD cars are divided into sections. The initial part of an Artrain tour is audio-visual with presentations from slide projectors flashing across large screens, presenting a history of art, its civic significance and its meaning to man.

Another section highlights cultural landmarks, a glass display and artifacts, including a suit of armor and a jade statue. Following through, visitors are treated to color transparencies showing nature scenes as a principal source of inspiration.

Artistic works from the past to those of contemporary nature are covered. A movie presents the elements of art, point, line, volume and color. Environmental design and use of art in everyday living is also in view.
