Dear Mr. Gaffney:

You have written requesting our opinion regarding the applicability of the fifteen mill tax rate limitation contained in the Plymouth City Charter to the total amount of taxes levied by the City for all purposes. Based upon your letter and further amplifications by Mr. Paul Brumfield of the City Administration, I understand that you have proposed a budget which would require a total levy by the City of 15.86 mills. Of that amount approximately .5 mills would be levied for the payment of principal and interest on general obligation bonds of the City and to meet payments on a contract with the County for payment of County-issued bonds pursuant to the Michigan Act for the payment of County-issued bonds.

This provision has a history dating from the original fifteen mill constitutional limitation adopted in 1932. In the case of *School District of the City of Pontiac v. City of Pontiac*, 262 Mich. 338 (1933), the Michigan Supreme Court held that charter tax rates adopted as a part of a home rule charter were not subject to the fifteen mill limitation. Later in 1946 in the case of *Hazel Park v. Municipal Finance Commission*, 317 Mich. 582, the Court held that the provisions of Chapter 7, Section 1a of the Municipal Finance Act, requiring levy of sufficient taxes for payment of principal and interest on bonds without regard to charter or statutory limitation, constituted a part of the charter of every city and therefore such taxes are in addition to those levied within the charter tax rate limitation. Similar statutory language regarding tax levies is found in Act 342 of 1939, as amended, which is the

authority pursuant to which the City of Plymouth contracted with Wayne County for issuance of the Rouge Valley System Bonds. Thus, the .5 mills levied by the City to pay debt service on its general obligation bonds and its contract payments to the County are, by act of the state legislature, not subject to the fifteen mill charter tax rate limitation of the City.

As a part of the 1963 revision of the constitutional tax rate limitation set forth above, the constitutional convention extended the debt service exception to all instances where debt service levies are involved. Thus, the constitution now provides that the fifteen mill limitation shall not apply to taxes imposed for the payment of principal and interest on bonds and for the payment of assessments or "contract obligations in anticipation of which bonds are issued, which taxes may be imposed without limitation as to rate or amount." This language has been construed to include taxes levied to meet rental payments to municipal building authorities since these are made pursuant to "contract obligations in anticipation of which bonds have been issued." *Betz v. Berrien County Building Authority*, 12 Mich. App. 304. Most recently in the case of *Butcher v. Grosse Ile Township*, decided March 9, 1972, the Michigan Supreme Court upheld this construction of Article 9, Section 6. Thus, the 1.9 mills being levied to meet rental payments to the City of Plymouth Municipal Building Authority are not subject to the City's charter tax rate limitation, but may be levied in the amount sufficient to meet the payments to the Building Authority as they become due.

Is 15-Mill Tax Limit A Myth?

Legal advice that 2.4 mills included in Plymouth's proposed 1972-73 city budget are not subject to the 15-mill charter tax rate limitation gives added significance to Monday night's City Commission meeting when the budget will be up for adoption.

As proposed by City Manager Norman Gaffney, the budget would require a tax levy of 15.86 mills — meaning a rate of \$15.86 per \$1,000 in comparison to the present \$13.86.

Anything in excess of 15 mills has been challenged as being illegal by Chairman Anthony Licata of the Plymouth Civic Federation, who points to this wording in Section 10.5 of the city charter adopted in 1951:

"No later than the first meeting in May the commission shall adopt the budget for the next fiscal year and shall make an appropriation of the money needed for municipal purposes and provide for a levy of the amount necessary to be raised by taxes upon real and personal property, which levy shall not exceed one and one-half per

cent (15 mills) of the assessed valuation of all real and personal property in the city."

HOWEVER, THE law firm of Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone — which is one of Michigan's most prominent and which acts as bonding counsel for many cities — has informed the commission that only 13.46 mills fall within the charter limitation.

This would be the money that is used to defray general expenses.

It is the firm's contention, backed by Supreme Court decisions, that neither the half-mill which would go toward payment of general obligation bonds, nor the 1.9 mills for rental payments to the Municipal Building Authority on the bonded Cultural Center, fall within the charter limitation.

The letter from Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone declares, "The constitution now provides that the 15-mill limitation shall not apply to taxes imposed for the payment of principal and interest on bonds and for the payment of assessments or 'contract obligations in anticipation of which bonds are issued.'"

AS SUBMITTED to the commission, the Gaffney budget proposes general fund expenditures of \$1,816,004, an increase of approximately \$158,000 over the amount budgeted for 1971-72. It would be impossible to meet such expenditures without a 15.86 mill levy.

Commissioners met on the budget again Thursday night and when that broke up scheduled another work session for 8 a.m. today (Saturday).

Mayor James B. McKeon said Friday that it is the intention of the commission to make enough reductions to come up with a finished product that will keep the levy under 15 mills.

He called the opinion from Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone "a bit disillusioning" but added that he "assumes they are right." McKeon also said he still feels that it was the intent of the voters to put the maximum levy at 15 mills for all purposes "and I want to keep it that way."

The mayor has promised citizens that anyone who wants to speak on the budget Monday night can have the floor.

Activity Here 'Thrills' First Lady

"I can't tell you how absolutely thrilled I am with what you've done... I hope the story of Plymouth will be recorded and shown to other communities."

These were the words of Michigan's first lady, Mrs. William G. (Helen) Milliken, when she was guest of honor at a luncheon Tuesday in the Round Table Club. The event was sponsored by the Plymouth Community Arts Council.

The guests at the luncheon included 31 women who have had much to do with making

Artrain's visit and Kaleidoscope Plymouth a success.

MRS. MILLIKEN'S hope was quickly gratified when Mrs. Ray (Jo) Hulce, Kaleidoscope coordinator, presented her a book containing all of the publicity the Mail & Observer and other newspapers have given Artrain, as well as artifacts, such as crossword puzzles, print kerchiefs and announcements made for Artrain and all the events built around it.

Mrs. Milliken also received a gift she called "unique," a check for the support of Ar-

train from the city of Plymouth. The donation was \$100 and was presented by Mrs. Beverly McAninch, a member of the Plymouth City Commission.

Mrs. Milliken has been honorary chairman of Artrain since it was first thought of, in 1969. Mrs. Hulce is on the community involvement committee of Artrain. Artrain was designed to create a community-wide interest in the arts.

MRS. MILLIKEN pointed out that Artrain cost \$1 million, and that for every \$1 of public funds put into it (from the National Endowment for the Arts and the Michigan Foundation for the Arts), \$4 has been contributed in private funds.

"If every government program could generate this kind of support, it would be fantastic," said Mrs. Milliken. "Fantastic" was also the term she applied to Plymouth's cooperation with Artrain's aims, after visiting the C & O site on Starkweather and after touring art exhibits throughout Plymouth.

She revealed that rumors had reached her in Lansing "they're doing some very special things in Plymouth," and she was glad to find that the rumors were true.

"I haven't seen this anywhere else in Michigan," she said. Artrain made its debut last May 18 in Traverse City and has visited more than 25 communities since then.

She praised particularly the work that has been done at the site, "a striking entrance," the on-site music programs (during her visit Sally Rocco's string quartet from West Middle School performed), and the enthusiasm of the coordinating group and the volunteers staffing Artrain.

AT THE luncheon she heard how more than 300 women have volunteered their services as guides and are loving the experience.

One volunteer has been so emboldened by her success as a guide, she told her husband to invite his boss home for dinner.

For many it has meant new friendships, and for all a greater pride in saying "I live in Plymouth."

Another volunteer finds that working on Artrain is good for the waistline... there's no food available there. Yet, it's so enjoyable she spends a good deal of time there.

Nancy Cooper, who assisted with landscaping the site, is

"ready to go on to something bigger."

Still another volunteer told Mrs. Milliken it's "so much fun, you don't know how to stop."

Mrs. Hulce revealed that the committee doesn't want to stop either. They're hoping to be able to use the C & O location throughout the summer as a farmers' market and arts and crafts center.

THE GUEST list included Mrs. W. E. Ackerman, hostess to the staff of eight which

travels with Artrain; Mrs. Thomas Carl, who arranged for the school art exhibit at Artrain; Mrs. Robert Cooper, a co-ordinator with Mrs. Hulce; Mrs. Eugene Crosby, who arranged for the craft demonstrators at Artrain; Mrs. Fred DeLano; Mrs. Pat Hann, representing Old Village and chairman for the "Caboose Toot" to be held May 5.

Mrs. Smith Horton was in charge of the on-site entertainment.

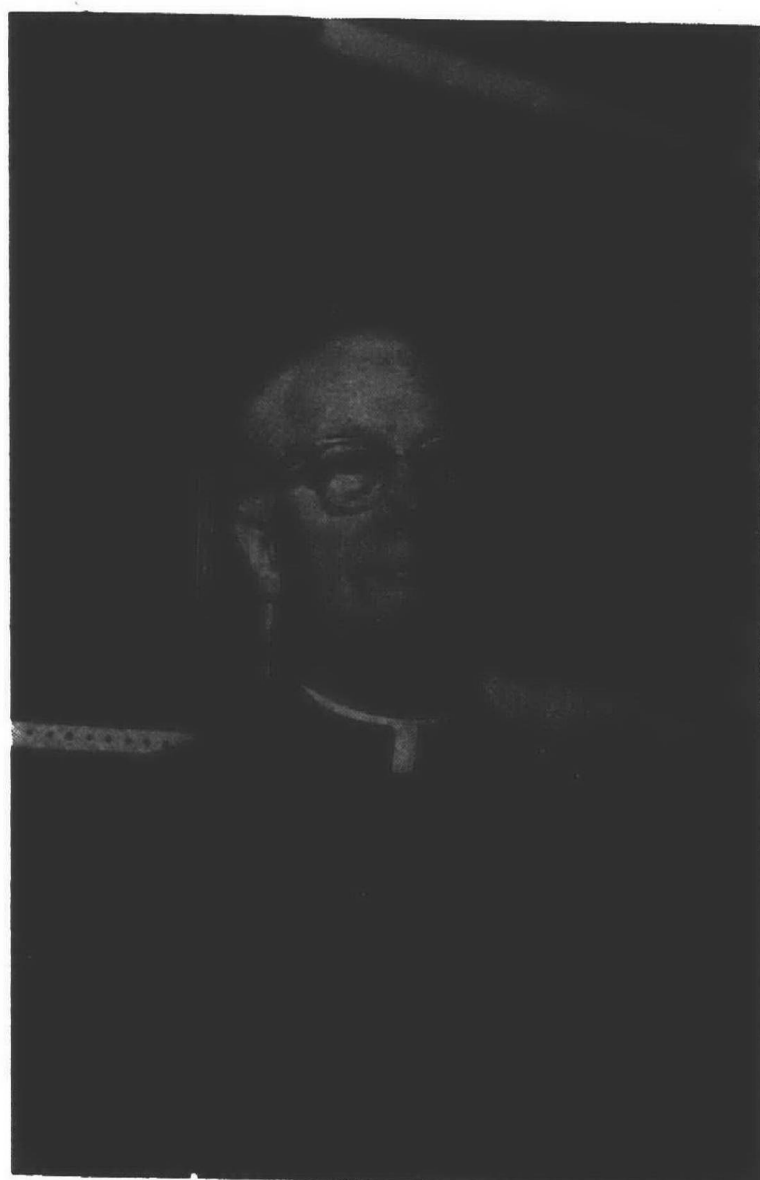

5-Year Stay Ends For Gallery Here

A treasure of art objects will be trucked out of Plymouth this weekend as Msgr. Edward J. Hickey's Art Guild-St. Mary's comes to the end of the trail.

During the coming week the old house at the corner of Ann Arbor Trail and Deer, which had housed the Hickey gallery, will be destroyed. Because of this, all of the art pieces are being taken into Detroit where Msgr. Hickey operates a second gallery.

He brought his art works to the Mayflower Meeting House in Plymouth for safe keeping in 1967 when Detroit was beset with racial strife and wound up renting the old Dr. Luther Peck house at 687 W. Ann Arbor Trail as a gallery which had existed for nearly five years.

city which wound up owning the house itself and a strip of land that will permit completion of the Deer Street paving project.

The city has contracted with the Norwest Demolition Co. for the house to be destroyed, the commission having determined it is structurally unsound and not worth moving.

City officials sought to find another site in which to house Msgr. Hickey's art possessions, but none proved acceptable.

BEFORE BRINGING his paintings and sculptures from Detroit, Msgr. Hickey had already had a long relationship with the Plymouth area through his work in the archdiocese.

He was directly involved in choosing the Sheldon Rd. location for St. John's Seminary.

Bida Adds Duties Of Rec Director To Township Post

Mr. Holmes argued against such payment, but lost her fight on a 6-1 roll call vote.

THE ADDED \$900 puts Bida's annual salary at \$14,000, second among township administrators only to Breen's \$16,450. Clerk Helen Richardson is third at \$13,800 and Mrs. Holmes now drops to fourth place at \$13,650.

Bida was hired as DPW director two years ago and has long been active both in that area and in recreation. He is a former City of Plymouth superintendent of public works and previously in Garden City served both as DPW director and assistant director of recreation.

In baseball he has played, managed and coached and helped found the junior baseball as well as the junior basketball program in Plymouth. At one time he was vice president of the Plymouth Community Athletic Association.

His prime responsibility in the immediate future will be to develop a program of activities for the 63-acre recreation park which the township is developing at Ann Arbor Trail and McClumpha. An outline of this program is to be given to the trustees by Bida at their next meeting.

TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDINANCE NO. XXXVIII

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE PROTECTION OF THE BUILDINGS AND LANDS OF SCHOOLS LOCATED IN THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH; TO PROVIDE FOR THE PEACE, QUIET, AND GOOD ORDER IN AND AROUND SCHOOLS LOCATED IN THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH; TO PROVIDE FOR THE REMOVAL OF THOSE NOT HAVING LEGITIMATE BUSINESS IN AND AROUND THE SCHOOLS LOCATED IN THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH; TO PROHIBIT THE USE OF PROFANE, INDECENT OR IMMORAL LANGUAGE IN AND AROUND SCHOOLS LOCATED IN THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH; AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE.

THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

- Section 1. No person shall mark with any substance, or in any other manner deface or do damage to any building owned, occupied or otherwise used as a school within the Township of Plymouth.
- Section 2. No person shall mark with any substance, or in any other manner deface or do damage to any fence, tree, lawn or other fixture situated on lands owned, occupied, or otherwise used by a school within the Township of Plymouth.
- Section 3. No person, while on public or private grounds adjacent to any building in which a school or any class thereof is in session, shall willfully make or assist in making of any noise or diversion which disturbs or tends to disturb, the peace, quiet or good order of such school session or class thereof.
- Section 4. No person while on public or private lands adjacent to any building or lands owned, occupied or otherwise used by a school within the Township of Plymouth, in or on which any gathering or function is in progress, whether in the day or nighttime, shall willfully make or assist in the making of any noise or diversion which disturbs or tends to disturb the peace, quiet or good order of such gathering or function.
- Section 5. No person, while in any building or on any lands owned, occupied, or otherwise used by a school within the Township of Plymouth, shall utter any profane, indecent, or immoral language towards any person or while within the hearing of any other person.
- Section 6. No person not a student or employee of any school located in the Township of Plymouth, or parent or guardian of any student enrolled therein, shall remain within any school during normal school hours without securing the written permission of the principal or person in charge of said school.
- The term "student" as used herein is hereby defined as any person of school age and enrolled in the school at which he or she then is present.
- Section 7. Any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be sentenced to pay a fine not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars or by imprisonment for not more than ninety (90) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the Court.
- Section 8. This Ordinance shall become operative and effective upon publication.

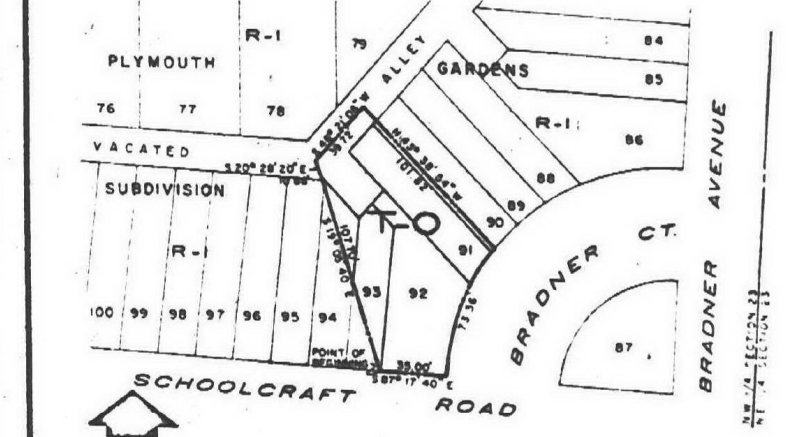

McGovern Gets Help

PLYMOUTH The momentum of Sen. George McGovern's political boom showed up in Plymouth this week with establishment of a local campaign committee under chairmanship of Robert E. Dwyer.

Dwyer is former chairman of the 2nd Congressional District Democratic Party and currently serves on the Democratic State Central Committee.

He has called for a meeting of McGovern volunteers, to be held at 3:30 p.m. Sunday.

April 30 in the Pilgrim Room of the Mayflower Hotel.

WHEN HE FILED his petitions for the May 16 precinct delegate contest, Dwyer said he was uncommitted on the question of presidential preference. His acceptance of the McGovern chairmanship is the first break among local ranks of similarly uncommitted precinct candidates.

Dwyer will organize McGovern support in all of the Plymouth-Northville area and

was selected by R. Michael Stillwagon, Plymouth attorney who is 2nd District "McGovern for President" coordinator. Stillwagon was the district's Democratic candidate for Congress in 1970, losing to the GOP's Marvin L. Esch.

"LAST MARCH, when the filing time for delegate petitions came, I, like many other Americans, had reservations about which candidate could stand up to the rigors of the campaign, convince voters, unite diverse groups and still address himself clearly to the real issues which face us in this critical year," said Dwyer.

"At that time I had almost centered on a choice. It was not George McGovern. When I filed as a delegate to the county convention, it was with an uncommitted status.

"For a number of reasons I intended to stay that way until some candidate convinced me. George McGovern has done that job. I now wish I could have said, 'I was with you all the way.'"

In Dwyer's own precinct (City No. 3) he is one of six Democratic candidates, only four of whom are to be elected.

Of the other five, the only one who declared for McGovern on her petitions was Mary Eileen Healy, whose father, Thomas Healy, also is a candidate but under the banner of Sen. Edmund Muskie.

The three others, all uncommitted, are Richard Wernette, John J. Gillis and William Grimmer.

Rock Ballet Has Emotional, Visual Impact

his mother breaks a mirror in despair.

"Tommy," the first rock ballet, is a vivid visual and emotional experience as performed by Les Grand Ballets Canadiens.

It's a great beginning for anyone who has always thought he hated ballet.

"Tommy" is playing at the Masonic Temple auditorium in Detroit this Saturday (April 29) at 7 and 10 p.m. and Sunday, at 2:30 and 8 p.m.

THE MUSIC alone is worth the admission. It's sung by The Who, the group which first introduced "Tommy" as a rock opera. The music and lyrics are by Peter Townshend, John Entwistle and Keith Moon. Fernand Nault is the choreographer.

"Tommy" is symbolic of a generation which has been raised on violence throughout the world.

As an infant, Tommy sees his father killing his mother's lover. The shock causes him to become deaf, dumb and blind.

All efforts to cure him fail, and the violence continues. He is molested by his Uncle Ernie, tormented by his cousin Kevin, and eventually brought back to reality when

While he was handicapped, Tommy developed his only remaining sense, the sense of touch, to a great degree, and using this as a basis, he establishes his own harsh religion. His impact on his followers and the final destruction of his camp provide some of the most shattering moments in the ballet.

THE COORDINATION between the dance, music and lights is outstanding.

In Tommy's encounter with the Acid Queen, the lighting is particularly impressive, creating a hallucinogenic effect that makes you feel for Tommy in his pain.

"Tommy" has been triple cast for its Detroit run. Manie Rowe was excellent in the title role Wednesday night, as was Manon Larin as the Acid Queen and Eileen Heath as Sally Simpson, the girl who tries to touch Tommy and is disfigured for life.

Les Grand Ballets Canadiens has been noted since its formation in 1958 for its ability to master a variety of styles, from classical ballet to modern jazz.

With "Tommy," they prove that their reputation is well-deserved.

135 Crosses Tell Many Tales

The cross, that almost universal symbol of Christianity, can be found 135 times in the home of a new Farmington resident, Mrs. Mae Clement.

Mrs. Clement, who moved out from Detroit a year ago, brought along an extensive collection of Catholic and Protestant crosses, sent from many corners of the world made of a wide variety of materials.

It was at the Easter season in 1968 that Mrs. Clement began the collection — and a hobby that has brought a great deal of satisfaction.

"I had been wanting to start an unusual collection," she said, and I was visiting in Reading, Pa., when I saw a newspaper story about a woman there with a large collection of crosses.

"I decided to start my own."

MRS. CLEMENT buys some of her crosses, but many are given to her by friends and relatives. Of course, many have a special story connected with them.

One brass cross worn by a nun who headed an orphanage in Minnesota for 50 years was

given to Mrs. Clement by a friend who is sister to the nun. "Its corners and face are worn smooth from years of brushing against her robe," she pointed out.

Then there is a thick, chunky crucifix that has an inner compartment containing a bit of wood listed as a relic from Christ's cross.

It belonged to a priest who had parishes in Hawaii, Italy, and Bolivia, Mrs. Clement said.

A fragile glass cross was sent by a niece who lives in California and had a Disneyland glass-blower make it, and a friend who owns a gift shop secured a plastic and gold dust cross made by the late Chester Conklin, the last of the "Keystone Cops."

ALSO VALUED in the collection are two natural crosses.

The skeleton of a crucifix sailfish forms a perfect cross and is considered to be lucky for anyone who finds it on the beaches of Florida. A friend sent Mrs. Clement one.

And a young neighbor gave her a cross-shaped twig she

found in the woods. "I call it my old rugged cross," she said.

A granddaughter who is a nurse in Hawaii has sent several crosses, one of lava, several of ivory and some of gold and silver. The most recent gift from her was olivewood.

MRS. CLEMENT catalogues her crosses, and her records show they come from a wide variety of countries including Malaya, Tahiti, Hawaii, Italy, France, Austria, England, Israel, Germany, Cuba, Spain, Mexico, India, Ireland, Japan and many cities in the United States.

The materials on her lists include steel, palms, ivory, stone, glass, seashell, coal, copper, brass, olivewood, lead, quartz, lava, cedar, china, dogwood and ebony.

Additions to the collection are becoming more difficult because Mrs. Clement doesn't want to have duplications.

But she'll keep working on a hobby that has brought a lot of new knowledge as well as enjoyment.

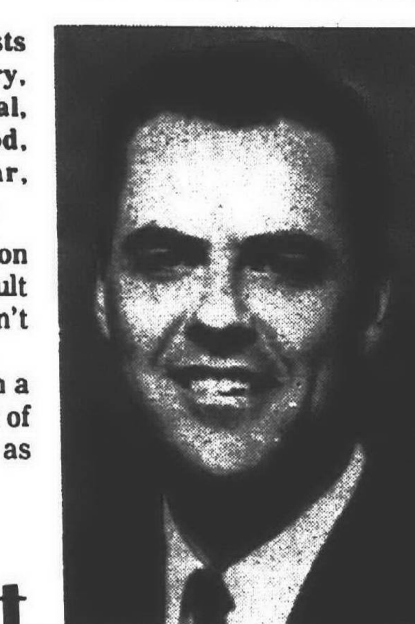

A message from Cardinal John Dearden, archbishop of

Catholics residing in Wayne, Oakland, Macomb, Lapeer, Monroe and St. Clair Counties, explains that contrary to a widespread belief, the ADF carries forward more than works of charity.

"Each year there are special charitable goals," Cardinal Dearden says. "Your ADF 72 gift, for example, will help bring cheer and comfort

to the lonely aged. It will give a forward thrust in helping the retarded to attain useful lives. It will help trapped girls escape to a decent life.

"Additionally it will carry forward programs started in the past, as expressions of Christ's love. But that is not half the ADF story."

CARDINAL DEARDEN then pointed to expenditures of \$542,000 last year in various areas of education, including that of the handicapped. He said the cost in 1971 of a ministry to college youth "at a critical period in life" was \$212,000.

Religious education was among other areas cited as major costs to the ADF in maintaining traditional services to parishes in a way more economical and efficient than would be possible if each sought to provide the services independently.

NO ADF GOAL has ever been set, nor is there a quota on gift size.

Rev. Lester Kinsolving's Religion Update

President Nixon should be interested to learn that one of his White House guest preachers - whom he hailed as "one of our great Lutheran leaders" -- has now announced:

"We believe that Jesus Christ is the only way to heaven and that all who die without faith in Him are eternally damned."

Nixon's "great Lutheran leader" is the Rev. Dr. J.A.O. Preus, president of the 2.8 million-member Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod -- whose embattled liberals, taking cognizance of President Preus' initials, as well as his methods of "leadership," coined the phrase: "Freedom now -- with Chairman Jao!"

AS AN EXAMPLE, President Preus has for the past two years been leading the most absurd heresy hunt since the Scopes "monkey trial" -- with just about as much success as that Tennessee judicial circus had in suppressing the teaching of the theory of evolution.

Preus' target has been the third largest theological seminary (700 students) in the nation -- Concordia, in St. Louis. And after two years of this hilarious holy inquisition, the mountain, having labored, has now brought forth a mouse -- in the unsuccessful attempt to fire and later to suppress the teaching rights of just one of Concordia's 50 professors, the Rev. Dr. Arlis Ehlen.

Dr. Ehlen, explained Preus in an open letter to the Missouri Synod's membership, was questioned for "considerable time" last Dec. 13, "regarding the existence of angels and a personal devil." Furthermore, wrote the great Lutheran leader, Ehlen "did not believe certain miraculous events recorded in Scripture in connection with the Exodus had actually taken place."

CONCORDIA'S president, the Rev. Dr. John Tietjen, has defied Dr. Preus' directive that Prof. Ehlen be prohibited from teaching any Biblical courses. Tietjen noted that the limitations on what a professor may teach must be stated in writing at the time of his appointment -- according to the denomination's own by laws.

"If I were to carry out President Preus' directive," observed Tietjen, "I would be responsible for a course of action which -- because it bypasses the authority and responsibility of the seminary's board of control, faculty and administration -- would have serious consequences for the accreditation not only of this seminary, but of every accredited institution in the Missouri Synod."

At the time of this writing, a team of examiners from the American Association of Theological Schools, the nation's theological seminary accrediting agency, had

arrived on the Concordia campus to investigate the Preus-probe. Their report is due sometime this spring.

In addition to the medieval antics of President Preus, Dr. Tietjen has an additional cross to bear, because Chairman Jao's brother, the Rev. Robert Preus, is still a member of the Concordia faculty.

That "Brother Bob" may well be behind President Preus' great assault on Concordia Seminary is indicated, among other reasons, by an incident which this writer observed in a hallway just behind the speaker's platform at the Missouri Synod's national convention last summer in Milwaukee.

I CAME UPON Robert Preus even as he was in the act of trying to pressure the elderly convention parliamentarian, William Von Spreckelson, of Orlando, Fla.

And just prior to Preus' almost indescribable outburst of rage when he found himself caught in this act, I distinctly recall hearing him say to the parliamentarian: "Regardless of what Jack says."

"Jack" is the Rev. President J.A.O. Preus, who comes up for reelection in July of 1973 at the New Orleans convention, of a denomination which he has so significantly caused to live up to the familiar nickname of "The Misery Synod."

For each organization there is a statement of its purpose and services rendered as well as meeting place and time and president's name and telephone number.

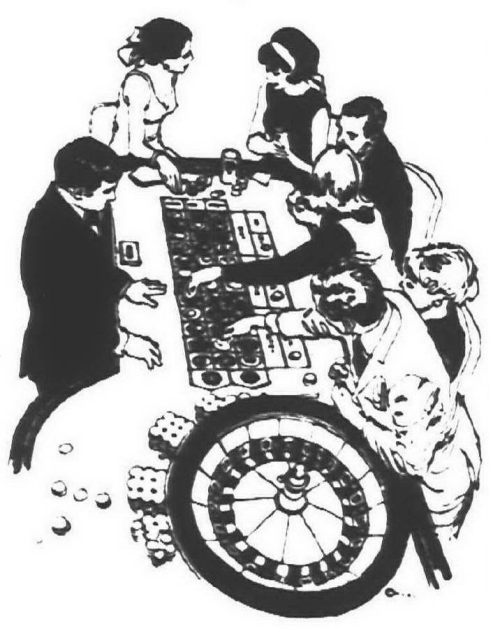

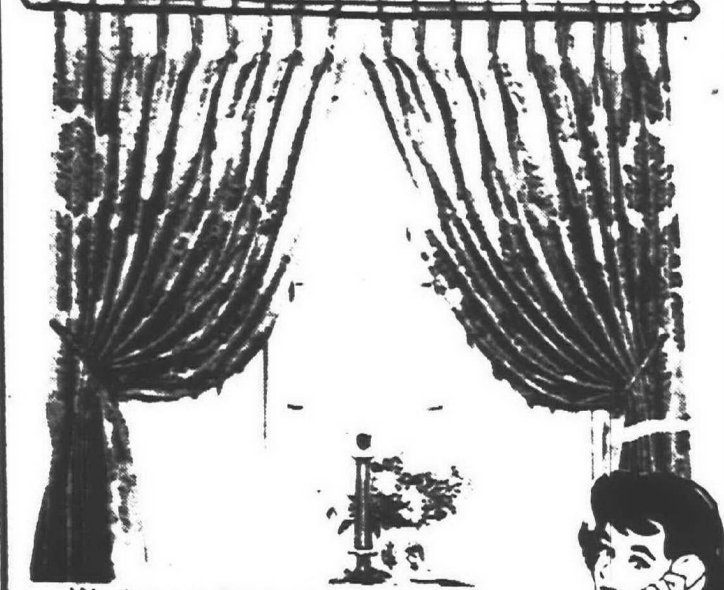

Spotlight on Women

Advises Interior Designer

Don't Match Everything

Early attic collectors of suburbia, relax.

You have in your corner Carleton Varney, young and handsome and nationally known as an interior decorator.

Visiting the Farmington Town Hall last week, he made known a number of decorating preferences and unpreferences, but an aversion to the "railroad look" with everything neatly matched in pairs kept creeping into his remarks.

"Where did the American public get the idea everything has to match?" he asked. "What's wrong with mixing furniture - using something that's beautiful in itself?" "Did you ever see a forest where the trees were all alike?"

HIS TALK in the Northland Theater in Southfield led one of his listeners to note during the celebrity luncheon that followed:

"After 25 years, nothing matches, so thanks for what you said today!"

Varney, in discussing how homes could look, included among his favorite ingredients natural woods, clear, bright colors, fresh flowers, window treatments that "let the outside come in," and especially homes that are

planned for living instead of showing off.

He doesn't like plastic surfaces everywhere, the color dusty rose, artificial flowers, water beds and inflated furniture, valances that are too short for proper proportion, designing rooms around television sets and new homes supposed to fit a whole new life style without carryover from the past.

He acknowledged that one problem with fine wood surfaces - on floors or furniture - is that effort is needed for upkeep and "nobody seems to want to take the time."

"But I keep seeing this sea of plastic," he said, "and I have the feeling someday there will be no wood finishes."

VARNEY, whose newest book is titled "Decorating with Color," said he likes to see color schemes taken from nature and considers blue the most neutral of colors and because it is the color of the sky.

"I like to do a room like a summer garden," he said. "With blue and green and yellow and touches of purple and pink."

"Or, if you like the fall, you can blend the avocado and gold and pumpkin shades. Then there's the room with winter's colors, royal blue with white and scarlet."

In the New York apartment where he and his wife and two children live, Varney said he has designed a living room with yellow walls, bright geometric carpet and liberal use of his paintings and those of friends.

"But our library is a different sort of thing, with clay colored walls and English period furniture," he said. He has pictures of friends in a red, white and blue hallway.

"I like to put around me the things and people who are important," he said. "The look of our home is a love experience, constantly growing."

VARNEY SAID that in working with a client he tries

to find out what colors are really favorites - "looking in the linen closets is a good way to tell because people buy towels and sheets on impulse" - and tries to use as much as possible of the furniture already on hand.

"If you're moving to a new life style in a new home, you can't leave the old self completely behind," he said. "It just doesn't work. You wind up with a house that's a museum, not a home."

He let the audience in on several favorite decorating tricks, like using stripes to make a room appear more high-ceilinged and covering pillows with shag carpet for floor use.

He also recommended liberal use of hassocks with coasters as storage space to the mother who complained of scattered playthings constantly spoiling her attempts at decor.

"I have the same problem," Varney said, "But would we really want to be without it?"

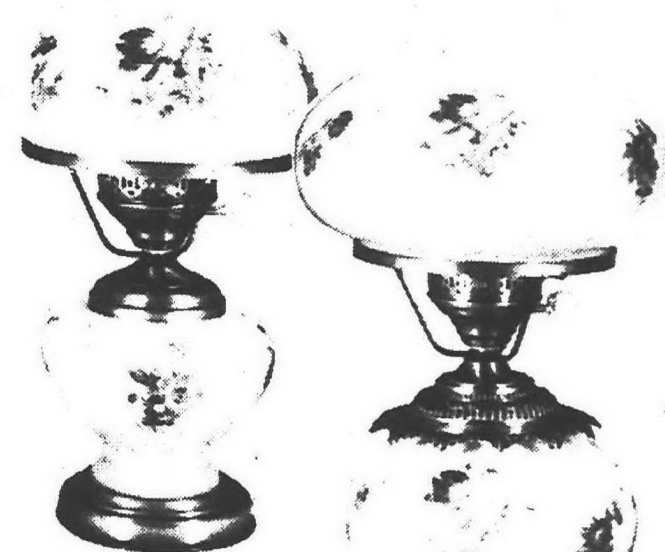



Germany) guiding Barrel of Fun; Doc's Betoken, Gilbert Martens (Belgium); HoBo Burnbby, Giuseppe Guzzinati (Italy); Good Pal's Billy, Herve Filion (Canada); Bascum Hanover, Joe O'Brien (United States); Helen Doyle, Vic Frost (Australia); and Kingdon, Peter Wolfenden (New Zealand).

They'll be back in the fifth, another trot, with O'Brien on the rail this time with Song Key. In order of the draw, the drivers will follow Guzzinati (2), Rode (3), Martens (4), Frost (5), Wolfenden (6), Filion (7), and Ubleis (8).

In the seventh, a \$2,700 pace, Ubleis drew the rail for the second time followed by Frost (2), Wolfenden (3), Guzzinati

(4), Filion (5), O'Brien (6), Martens (7) and Rode (8).

Guzzinati, the slender Italian, will have the rail for the fourth appearance, the eighth race, which matches many of the better pacers at the track with a pot of \$4,000 up for grabs.

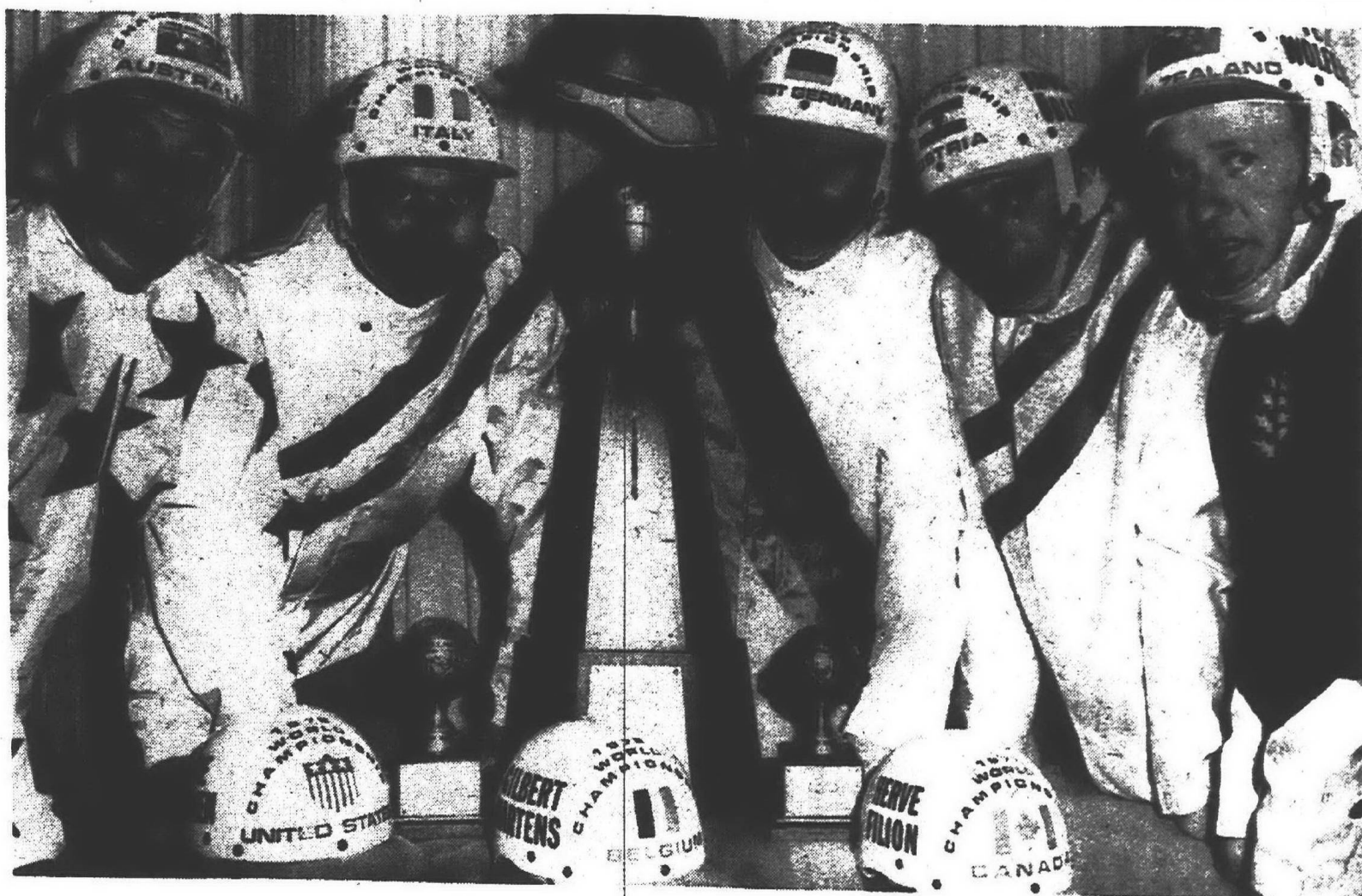
Following the Italian ace are: Ubleis (2), Rode (3), Martens (4), Frost (5), O'Brien (6), Wolfenden (7) and Filion (8).

It isn't so much that racing fans will be seeing the world's top drivers in action as it is they will have an opportunity to see how the reinsmen in North America compare with those from distant places.

In addition the Wolverine appearance will be the only one of the 11 that finds the men competing on a mile track. It should be interesting to see how O'Brien and Filion handle their horses under familiar conditions as contrasted to many of the invaders who will be on the big mile track for the first time.

One thing is certain, area fans won't be treated to the same record-making performance that Filion made in his last appearance in Metropolitan Detroit. That's when he visited Windsor Raceway on a Sunday and drove seven winners in 10 races to set a world's record. Filion is only entered in four races this time.

It seems certain that Ubleis won't repeat since he is far down the list but O'Brien and Filion are very much in the running and either could wind up on top.

Turf Tips, Quips

There's no time like now to tell harness racing fans they'll have a chance to see the world's best drivers in action Monday at Wolverine Raceway.

The occasion is the third world driving championship... a series that matches eight titleholders from as many nations in races at 11 tracks in the United States and Canada. The program is sponsored by Harness Tracks of America and each of the participating plants is a member.

This will be a first for Wolverine, the first time the series has been raced over the big mile track. Inasmuch as the championships are conducted each spring, then it follows that it will appear in Livonia only when Wolverine has the early dates... otherwise it goes to Hazel Park.

Tiny Joe O'Brien, who has had horses at Wolverine practically every year, is the current United States champ and the spectacular Herve Filion, of Canada, who won 543 races a year ago to reign in the U.S. and Canada, will represent his country.

Herve raced at Wolverine last fall but has not been a regular at Metropolitan Detroit tracks. Area followers of the pacers and trotters won't soon forget his last appearance in the area at Windsor...remember he set a world record with seven victories in 10 races.

Filion has been a bit slow in the world series but could be at his usual best Monday when he will have entries in four races.

RULES OF the series make it mandatory for a track to conduct no less than three races and no more than five. Acting Racing Secretary Ron Giehls has four scheduled at Wolverine.

Fans will quickly learn why the eight pilots are competing for the world crown when they see them driving cheap claimers and making the horses look like champions.

During the past two series, the drivers improved the marks of practically every horse by as much as two seconds. Remember these are not special races set up for the competition, the events can range from the cheapest claiming events to the richest overnights.

In addition, racing secretaries at the 11 sponsoring plants try to split the races into two paces and two trots. This doesn't make much difference to Filion and O'Brien, who handle both gaits with the same skill.

But it's a slightly different story for the foreign champs. The two from New Zealand and Australia drive nothing but pacers down under. Those from Europe have reins on nothing but trotters.

All of which adds interest to the competition. It will be recalled that Adolf Ubleis, who is one of the eight, is the defending champion from Austria. Adolf was in the sulky behind as many pacers as trotters a year ago and still wound up in front of United State's Billy Haughton with 680 points to 638 in 34 races.

THERE'S ANOTHER sidelight that could interest those who follow the standardbreds. Filion and O'Brien are among five in the United States and Canada with more than 3,000 victories. Herve has 3,519 as of April 1 and Joe 3,046 as of April 8.

Herve is a former world champion. He won the opening series in 1970 in the final race of 25 and edged George Sholty, 470-418.

None of the invaders comes close to Filion and O'Brien in wins, principally because there isn't that much racing in any of the other countries.

Ubleis won the Austrian crown with 79 firsts and has a career total of approximately 600.

Willie Rode, the West German representative, drove 288 winners in 1971 and boasts of 1,400 during his career. The 34-year-old dethroned his teacher, Eddy Freundt, a year ago, marking the first second place finish for Eddy after 11 straight championships.

The champions range in age from 27-year-old Gilbert Martens, of Belgium, to 54-year-old O'Brien.

Filion is 32 and the others include: Vic Frost, of Australia, 30; Giuseppe Guzzinati, of Italy, 41; Rode, of West Germany, 34; Ubleis, 34; and Peter Wolfenden, of New Zealand, 37.

Each is a personable guy who wants nothing more than the gold medal that goes to the winner along with the \$2,500 top prize.

O'Neil Sees 'Massive Disorder'

WASHINGTON
The possibility of cross-district school bussing has metropolitan Detroit "teetering on the brink of massive civil disorder," James F. O'Neil told a U.S. Senate committee here.

A member of the State Board of Education of Michigan, O'Neil, a Livonia Republican, said the flash point may occur if Federal Judge Stephen Roth orders cross-district bussing to achieve racial balance.

O'Neil testified in favor of President Nixon's proposed bussing moratorium and equal educational opportunity proposals as well as for U.S. Rep. William Broomfield's proposal that all appeals be heard before any bussing is ordered.

"The question before the schools and society is not how many blacks and whites are in each school but how can we provide quality education for everyone?" said O'Neil.

The state board member charged Judge Roth with "judicial tyranny" for "going far beyond the publicly announced intentions of the U.S. Supreme Court" and impinging "upon the educational process."

Two courses which are part of a new major and minor in business computer systems will be offered by the department of general business at Eastern Michigan University during the new spring term, May 1 through June 21.

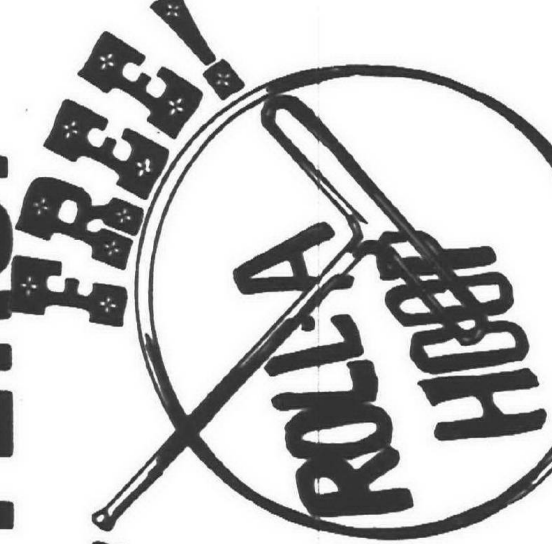

Plastics -- Something New Under The Sun

Furniture for outside the home is making big news in 1972 as the preference for outdoor living in the warmer months grows stronger.

"The boom in housing has really brought people out into the open, giving many families spacious backyards, patios, and even swimming pools for the first time in their lives," points out David Vaughn, a leading furniture manufacturing executive.

"Even apartment dwellers have benefitted from the boom," he added. "Many new apartments feature outdoor balconies which permit a modicum of fresh air living. And many new apartment complexes feature community sun decks and pools where the outdoor life can be enjoyed to its fullest."

ALL OF THIS has brought forth even greater interest in suitable furniture for the outdoors. To meet the interest, manufacturers are bringing out new styles and materials.

Among the most eye-catching of the new outdoor designs is Modulus, a line of patented modular seating and table pieces in rigid structural urethane. This is the newest development of Vaughn, Inc., of which Vaughn is president.

Consisting of a basic chair, demountable arms, and a variety of connecting tables, Modulus can be used to produce an almost limitless variety of individual or group seating arrangements, Vaughn said.

MODULUS was designed to

have wide application for outdoor use, and to be equally suitable for casual seating inside the house, too.

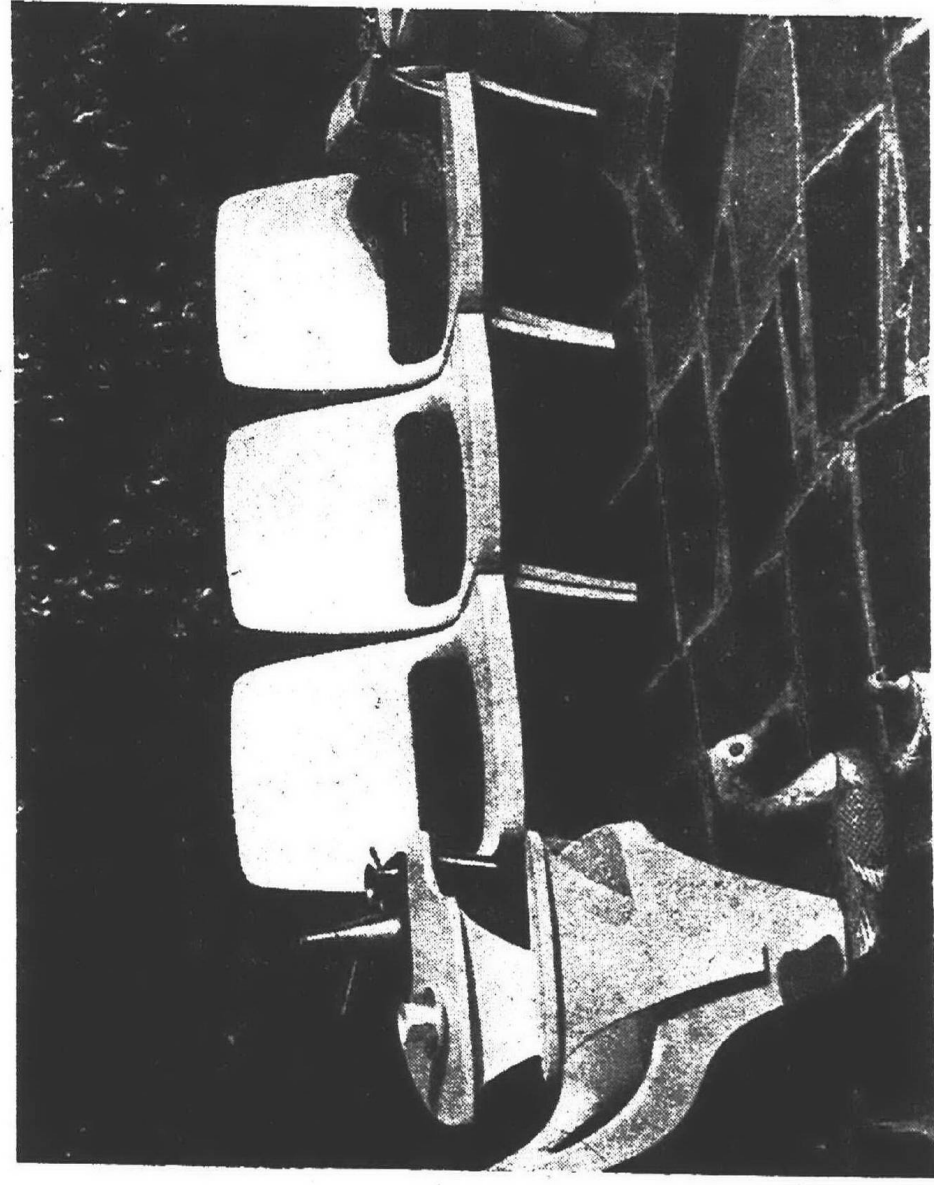
The basic chair is an armless lounge model molded of Uniroval's Rubicast, a structural self-skinning rigid urethane. Separate molded arms slip easily and snugly into V-grooves on the chair sides.

If two chairs are placed side by side, a single arm will lock the two together. If an arm is not desired, a connector fits into the grooves to link adjacent chairs.

"BY USING connector arms and other chairs, the basic piece can be extended to become a love-seat, three-seater sofa, or a row of seats," Vaughn said. "Arms and connectors fit into place without any tools, and can be easily changed by the user. The same applies to the six styles of table pieces designed for the chairs."

For added comfort, Vaungarde offers two-piece seat and back pads at extra cost for the chairs. Pads are foam-filled and covered with Naugahyde in House & Garden colors: Beach Plum, Bittersweet, Goldenrod, Lettuce, Moss Green, Oyster White, Space Blue, Sun Yellow, Velvet Brown, and Real Red.

Vaughn sees the Modulus line finding wide residential use on the patio and terrace; at poolside; on the sun porch, and in family and recreation rooms.



FOUR MODULUS SEATING units are lined by a 90-degree table to form an unusual corner arrangement. The pieces are locked together by inserts which fit into grooves in the legs; grooves also hold the arms and the table. An almost unlimited number of configurations can be produced in this manner. The manufacturer is Vaungarde, Inc. of Owosso, Mich.

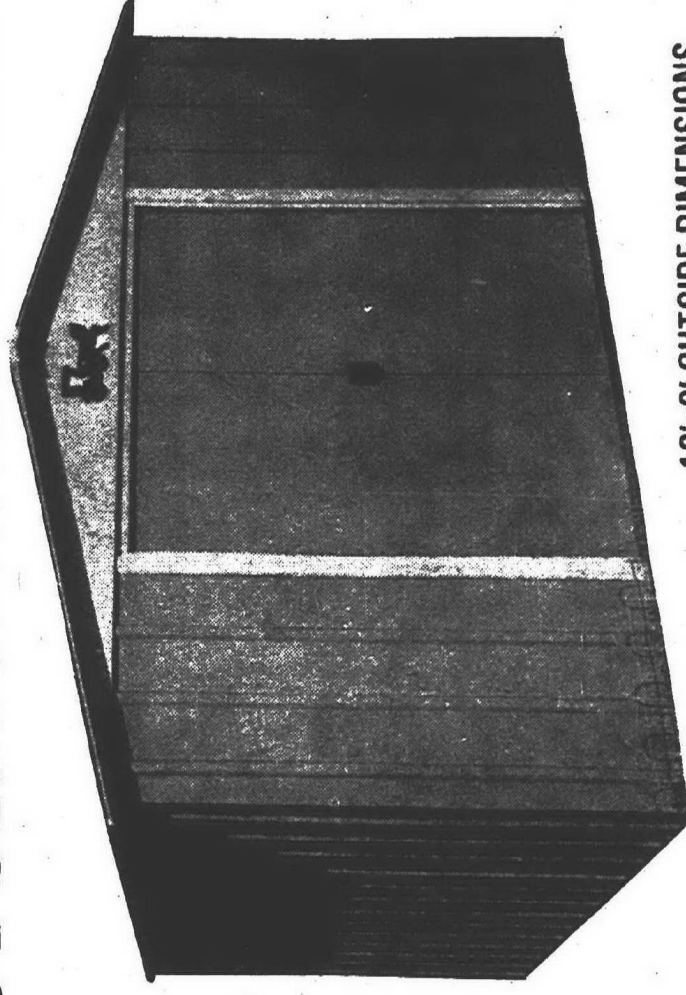
