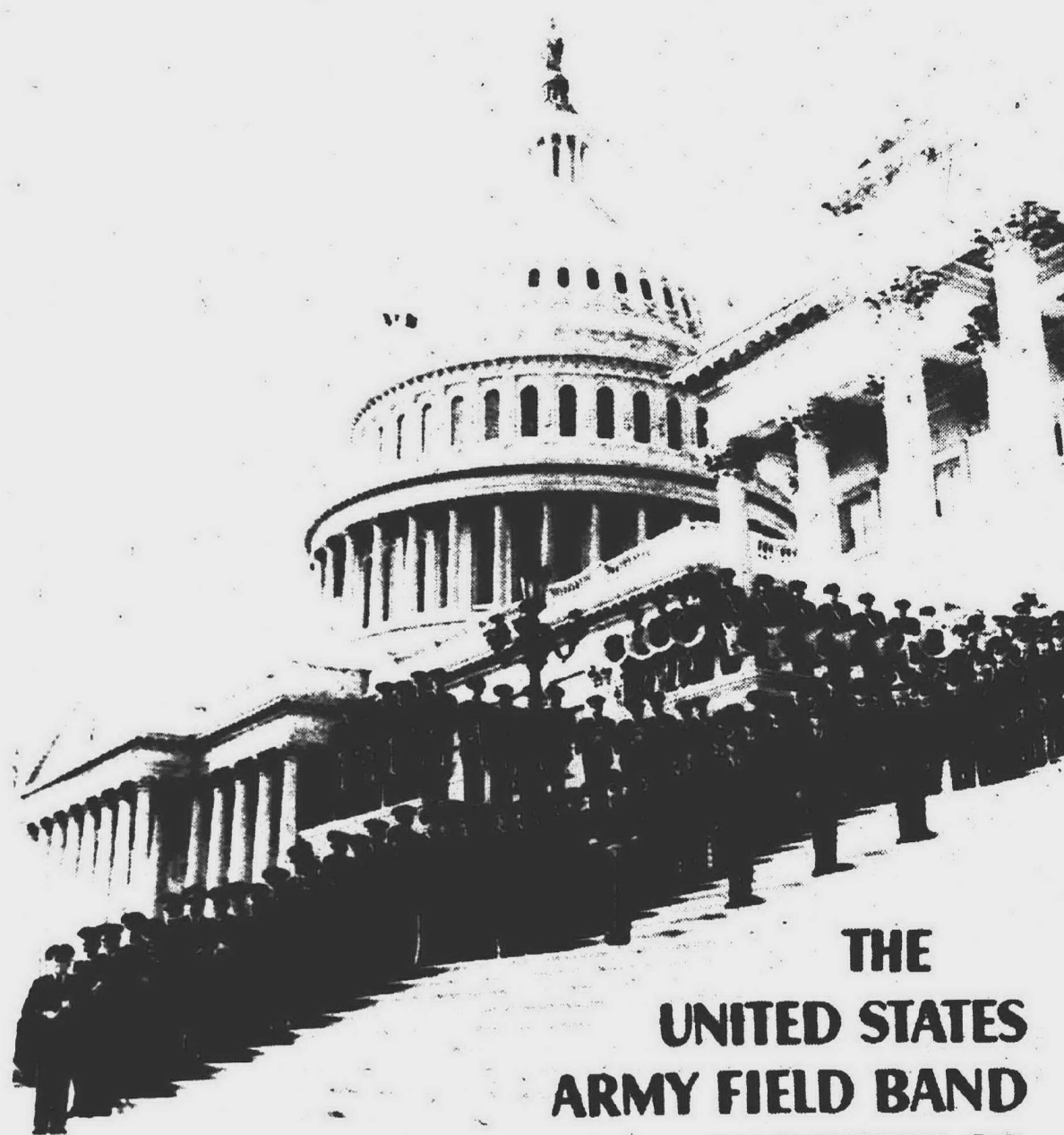

PLYMOUTH'S OBSERVANCE of Michigan Week will open May 20 with the appearance in Kellogg Park of the United States Army Field Band, which posed on the steps of the nation's Capitol Building before beginning its present tour.

## Army Band Planning Musical Review Here

"Sing Out For America," a new kind of touring music show, will be presented by the United States Army Field Band Saturday afternoon, May 20 in Kellogg Park as Plymouth's opening feature of Michigan Week.

The show includes both the band and Soldiers' Chorus and has been scheduled for 3 p.m. as a free open-air attraction. In case of rain, the 90-minute program will be shifted to the gymnasium of Central Junior High School.

Lt. Col. Hal J. Gibson, commanding officer and conductor, created the show as a musical review, utilizing the works of contemporary, young artists.

He calls the show "a bold departure from traditional

military band music," and points to 120 standing ovations in 36 concerts during a five-state tour as evidence of its resounding success.

GIBSON DESCRIBES the program in these words:

"'Sing Out For America' is a musical extravaganza that puts the accent on youth with the music of today and the 'sound of the '70s.'"

"Covering the complete spectrum of contemporary music, the band performs hard-driving, pulsating rock and modern jazz in a unique big-band manner while the Soldiers' Chorus offers today's ballads in distinctive velvety and subtle stylings."

"Every member of the chorus is a soloist, providing

kaleidoscopic versatility to the group. Further spice is added by the addition of members of the WACS, a first in the 25-year history of the Army Field Band.

"The emphasis is on America - its vastness, its proud heritage, its accomplishments and its dreams. The language is music - some of the most exciting and adventuresome that you will ever hear. It's an eye-popping, ear-filling review designed to speak for our nation with the exuberance and vitality of American youth."

Arrangements for the Plymouth appearance were made by Sgt. Robert McAndrew, commander of the Army recruiting station here.

## Slash In Service By Post Office Brings Criticism

Postal service in Plymouth - and presumably across the nation - was reduced quietly this past week with the introduction of what the newly formed U.S. Postal Service calls an "area mail processing system to gain maximum efficiency."

The chief steward of the Plymouth local of the United Postal Workers Union takes a different approach. He calls it "gross dereliction of responsibility" and says "the American public has been swindled into accepting what was purported to be the application of sound business practice."

Locally, the introduction last Monday (May 1) of new postal practices had the result of drastically cutting collection of outgoing mail from drop boxes and in reducing the hours the lobby services of the post office on Penman Ave. are available to the public.

The same is true in Livonia, Northville, Garden City, Westland, Farmington and all the rest of the metropolitan area.

The most obvious is that no piece of mail will go out from Plymouth on the day it is deposited unless it is at the post office before 6 p.m. No longer is there any opportunity to have an item postmarked for a given date if it is mailed in the evening.

A case in point would be income tax returns, or similar documents, which many persons have traditionally put into the mails at the last available moment.

COLLECTIONS OF mail at drop boxes in front of the post office and at such prime downtown locations as City Hall, National Bank of Detroit and the Mayflower Hotel have been reduced to one a day from the old standard of at least a half-dozen daily pickups.

A personal check to read the notices on these boxes showed that in all cases pickups are to be made in late afternoon.

In those red, white and blue neighborhood boxes, mail will be picked up only when the route carrier

comes along on his daily rounds. A letter deposited any Saturday after the carrier has made his pickup will rest dormant until he returns Monday.

Effective last Monday, without any prior announcement because Postmaster John Mulligan is taking a two-week postal training course at Norman, Okla., were new hours for the Plymouth post office.

Monday through Friday, windows are open from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.; on Saturdays they are open from 8:30 a.m. until 12 noon.

More importantly, the lobby is now open only from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday and from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Sunday. It used to be that a person who wanted to put a letter into the mail slot inside the post office, or check his lock box, had availability until 11 p.m.

SUCH FACTS as these led Walter J. Hochlowski, the spokesman for the local postal employees union, to declare this week, "The service is rapidly deteriorating in the hands of assassins."

Washington-prepared press releases to Observer Newspapers editors last week said of area mail processing:

"The program is intended to speed the ultimate delivery of the mail and to gain maximum efficiency through full utilization of central mail processing centers."

For instance, the Royal Oak post office is a facility serving 59 associate post offices, Farmington included.

Dearborn serves 49 associated post offices - Plymouth, Livonia, Garden City and Northville included.

Area mail processing is a plan whereby all mail originating from a given locale will be consolidated at one central facility for complete preparation and processing for outgoing letters.

For instance, unless you deposit an envelope intended for local delivery in a slot marked "Plymouth

## Area Recreation Needs Harmony

THE GRIPING and sniping that has been going on recently anent recreation responsibilities and programming in the Plymouth area could be dismissed as evidence of petty jealousies if it weren't that so much is at stake.

Maybe you don't realize at just what a turning point we stand, recreationally speaking.

That new \$1.5 million multi-purpose structure on Farmer Street which will provide us our first enclosed ice rink will be open before autumn. In the township, the 63-acre park on Ann Arbor Trail is fast being developed with diamonds and other assets, and one day could well accommodate a swimming pool for the simultaneous use of hundreds.

The school system has a new stadium, new gymnasium, new pool, new diamonds and tennis courts, etc., and yet still retains all of its former facilities.

What we don't have, yet need the most, is centralized authority over a community-wide recreation program. It doesn't belong in the hands of the city alone, or the township alone. Most certainly, it doesn't belong in the hands of the school system alone. If anything comes out of this childish backbiting, let it be a unified entity supported financially by all three governmental bodies and working for the good of the total community.

HOWARD OLDFOURD, who heads the Junior Athletic Association, told the City Commission last Monday that we need a committee of interested citizens to study restructuring the recreation program. All of Howard's devotion and dedication to the contrary, what we need the least is one more velvet-headed monster in the form of a committee.

What Our Leaders - city, township and school

- really should do is simply dust off the report submitted Sept. 2, 1969 by a group which included Ronald Hees, Donald Bidwell, Jon Kipke, Edward Meade and John Van Wagoner and proceed with its fulfillment.

That 20-page document, which was ordered by Mayor James McKeon the preceding June, is a veritable masterpiece. This was one committee which was truly worthwhile. Its study of the exist-

ing recreation inventory and its plan for future administration and financing made sense then, and do now.

No. 1 recommendation was for "the immediate creation of a Plymouth Community Recreation Authority which would assume total responsibility for the development of parks and recreation in the Plymouth community."

It was stated that "ideally, this authority would include representatives of the Township of Plymouth, Township of Canton, City of Plymouth, Plymouth School District, and eventually an authority director."

There has been some movement in that direction in the cooperation between the two Plymouths, but not enough. The time is ripe, right now, for Supervisors Maurice Breen and Philip Dingeldey, Mayor McKeon, City Manager Norman Gaffney and some designated member of the

school board to begin calm, rational talks aimed at combining their variety of recreational activities into one program under one director.

THE 1969 COMMITTEE approached its assignment with the philosophy that the term "recreation" must be applied in its broadest sense, and not merely used in reference to the physical activities of young people.

It also pointed out that there is a geographical problem, declaring:

"Two-thirds of the citizens of this area are residents of the township, not the city. Practically all activities in the area have been and must continue to be developed for the benefit of all these citizens. Furthermore, the natural expansion direction appears to be south into Canton Township."

It was added, "The success of entirely voluntary programs, such as the Plymouth Community Junior Athletic Association and its individual member groups, proves the potential success of programs when people participate and become involved. However, even these programs suffer from lack of proper facilities and basic funds. They also desire a central coordinator, but none is available."

The committee cited as one of the reasons for poor local reaction to the problem "our inability to view recreation as a total community involvement and promote its growth on that basis."

There is much more meat in the report, which certainly must still be available at City Hall - and if not, you can borrow my copy. What's happened is that now we do have the ground and buildings for a community program second to none. It can be made that way if we stop the tug-of-war and start pulling together in one direction.

**Roger Bosca Dies At 22**


A 1967 graduate of Plymouth High School, Roger J. Bosca, 22, died in a construction accident May 1 in Highland Park where he was an apprentice plumber.

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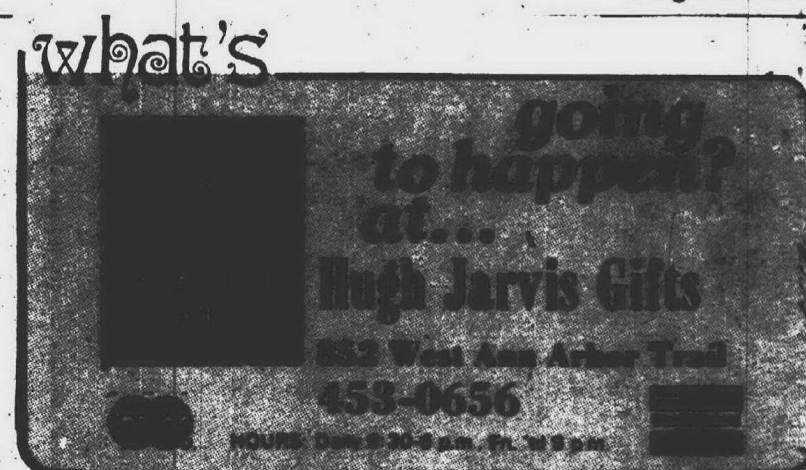

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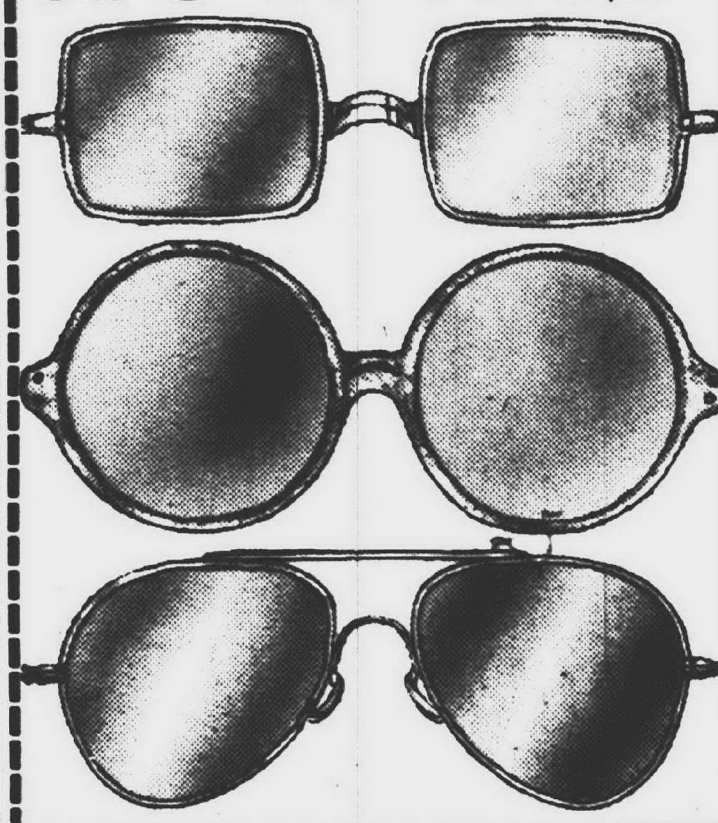
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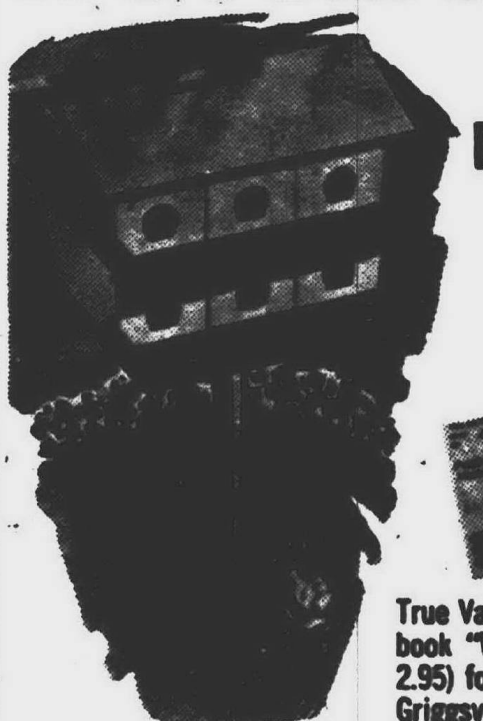

only," your letter will be chucked into a bag and transported to Dearborn for sorting and marking before it is returned to Plymouth, hopefully, the next day. Postal authorities are frank in admitting the public will need great educating to make this a routine habit.

JIM GRATER, Plymouth's assistant postmaster, found the press release pertaining to the new system that his superior never sent out and added, "This definitely is country-wide, but whether it is in operation everywhere yet I don't know."

Adding that he feels the system has been working "quite well" since instituted Monday, he revealed that nine temporary employees of the Plymouth post office have been transferred to the Ann Arbor area center. This leaves the local work force at approximately 75.

Public reaction to the changes has been slow in developing, thanks to the minimal attention courted by the postal department itself. Yet Grater conceded that public irritation is increasing as knowledge of the service cut-back spreads.

Hochlowski commented, "The present postal system is not primarily interested in service. Its prime concern is economic and the public be damned."

INTERESTINGLY, it was just last Monday - the same day these new postal practices took effect - that a representative of the In-

dependent Postal System of America came before the City Commission asking permission to deliver unaddressed second, third and fourth class mail, as well as sample products, in Plymouth.

The IPSA claims to operate in 454 cities in 31 states and the local branch is located at 12641 Stark Rd., Livonia. Its "postmaster," Phillip E. Minich, told the Plymouth commission that his firm already has been licensed to operate in Livonia.

Minch foresees development of routes for 4,000 carriers in the Detroit metropolitan area, specializing in "junk" mail placed by contract with the originating distributors. IPSA is forbidden from using U.S. mail boxes at homes and would deliver items in plastic bags to be hung on doorknobs.

At the Plymouth post office, a spokesman pointed to this as a potential infringement that would reduce revenue, although not questioning legality of the operation. When told that the commission had referred the matter to its attorney for study and a May 15 report, he had only the comment, "The mail business is up for grabs."

Hochlowski said, "The present U.S. Postal System is neither fish nor fowl, and the result of its flailing efforts are apparent to all. No one in this office seems to care how and when the mail goes out. Whether it goes out improperly or properly, efficiently or inefficiently, appears to be of insouciant concern."



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### TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH BOARD OF TRUSTEES REGULAR MEETING APRIL 25, 1972

The meeting was called to order at 8:03 P.M. by the Supervisor. All members were present.

**READING, CORRECTING AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES** - Regular Meeting, April 11, 1972. There being no additions or corrections, Mrs. Holmes moved that the minutes of the April 11, 1972 meeting be approved as submitted. Supported by Mr. Ash and carried, with Mrs. Richardson abstaining.

**Executive Meeting, April 18, 1972** - There being no additions or corrections, Mrs. Burke moved that the minutes of the Executive Meeting of April 18, 1972, be approved as submitted. Supported by Mr. Overholt and carried, with Mrs. Richardson abstaining.

**READING, CORRECTING AND APPROVAL OF BILLS** - In the discussion on the last bill under the General Fund, Mrs. Richardson stated that the Michigan Hospital Service for Hospitalization insurance should read \$324.09. Mr. Overholt moved that the last bill in the grand total amount of \$38,964.77 be paid as corrected. Supported by Mr. Burke and carried unanimously.

**OPENING OF BIDS** - Janitorial Service for Township Hall & District Court. At 8:07 P.M. bids for janitorial service for the Township Hall & District Court were closed upon a motion by Mr. Ash, supported by Mrs. Holmes and carried unanimously. The bids were opened and read by the Clerk, Mrs. Richardson. Mrs. Holmes moved that the Board accept the bid of 750 tons at \$15.85 per ton. Supported by Mr. Overholt and carried unanimously.

**COMMUNICATIONS** - Plymouth Youth Inc., Re: Urging support and suggestions for summer Rock Concerts for Plymouth Youth. Mrs. Richardson read a letter dated April 24, 1972, from Plymouth Youth Inc. Mrs. Richardson stated that she personally had not received any criticism from the public regarding the concerts held last summer, at least not after the fact. She did prior to the concerts. Mr. Breen stated that there had been complaints. Mr. Ash asked about the problem of litter. Mr. Breen stated that the youth in charge had cleaned up after each concert and that the area was as clean or cleaner than before the concert. Mrs. Holmes asked if the noise level could be lowered. Mr. Breen said that toward the end of last summer, they had been able to keep the noise down somewhat, they would see if more positive steps could be taken. Mr. Overholt stated that he had had some criticism before the concerts started, but none after. Suggested that the concerts be advertised as other than Rock Concerts. People have too many adverse feelings on the name "Rock". Mr. Ash stated there was nothing wrong with the name "Rock" and that that would provide something for the youth to do. Mr. Ash moved that the Board grant approval for Plymouth Youth Inc. to hold its Summer Music Festivals at the Township Recreational Site as per their letter dated April 24, 1972. Supported by Mrs. Richardson and carried unanimously.

**Joe Bida** - Re: Advancing the Board that Chloride will be put on the unpaved streets of the Township the first week of May. Mr. Breen stated that the Chloride treatments would take 750 tons of chloride at \$15.85/ton, for a total of \$11,887.50. This was an increase of approximately \$1,000.00 over last year. Mrs. Holmes moved that the Board approve the bid of 750 tons at \$15.85 per ton. Supported by Mr. Overholt and carried unanimously.

**OLD BUSINESS** - Helen Richardson, Re: Ordinance No. XXXVIII Prohibiting Lotteries. Mrs. Richardson stated that the new ordinance was the same as the City of Plymouth and that of Canton Township. Mrs. Holmes moved that the Board accept Ordinance No. XXXVIII Prohibiting Lotteries. Supported by Mr. Millington and carried unanimously.

**NEW BUSINESS** - Wayne County Planning Commission - Re: Gerald & Twyla Fitch, Appl. No. 174, rezoning from R-1 to T-O of property at 42434 Braden Ct., for Dental Office. Mr. Druggals appeared before the Board and stated that there was a Beauty Salon across the street and a church down the street, that the land on the south side of Schoolcraft (across the street) was zoned T-O. No new building had to be erected, as Dr. Fitch intended to use the already existing house on the site for his offices. He stated that Dr. Fitch had been practicing dentistry in Plymouth for 22 years and that he had to move from his present offices. When Dr. Fitch purchased this property, he had his family home, he had talked with the former Supervisor and had received favorable indications as to his plans for the property. Mr. Druggals stated that one of the objections of the Commission was, money and taxes to the property being inadequate. Mr. Druggals stated that this property along the Court all belonged to Dr. Fitch and that there would also be adequate parking available. As for the objection that the character of the neighborhood would change, Mr. Druggals said that the Beauty Salon had not changed the neighborhood. He also stated that six people had written letters in favor of the rezoning and that they were immediately adjacent to the property. Several had opposed the rezoning and they lived in Lake Pointe Village. The rezoning of this property has merit and needs favorable action by the Board. Mr. Breen stated it would be difficult to turn down Dr. Fitch, but that this was spot zoning and the rezoning would be nearby. It could create a domino effect. Mr. Druggals said that when this subdivision was originally developed, the fringe areas were to be commercial. Mr. Ash would have to agree with the Planning Commission. It was illegal to do contract zoning, tenants would change and the zoning would remain regardless of ownership. All the area north of Schoolcraft is now residential. Mrs. Holmes took no exception with what Mr. Ash said, but that the two houses on the court was a different situation, no objections to this. Mrs. Richardson read the comments of the people at the Public Hearing. Mr. Druggals asked that the record show that there were six letters from people who were in favor of the rezoning. Mrs. Holmes moved that the Board approve the request for rezoning from R-1 to T-O of the property at 42434 Braden Ct. for Dental Offices. Supported by Mr. Overholt. The following roll call vote was taken: Ayes: Burke, Holmes, Overholt, Richardson, No: Ash, Millington, Breen. The motion carried unanimously.

**James Griffith, Secretary** - Planning Commission, Re: Action taken at their April 19, 1972 meeting, Edgar F. Mansfield, Appl. No. 123, request for 90 day extension of Tentative preliminary plat, Plymouth Meadows Subdivision, located N. side of Joy Road, west of Beck. Mrs. Holmes moved that the Board grant the 90 day extension. Supported by Mrs. Richardson and carried unanimously.

**Charest, Clancy and Katschki**, attorneys for Township Firefighters, Re: Requesting execution of the proposed application for exemption or exception to pay the firefighters and sergeants, the wages effective as of July 1, 1971, including the period of Phase II of the economic stabilization program. Mrs. Richardson moved that the Supervisor be authorized to sign the document and forward same as requested. Supported by Mr. Ash and carried unanimously.

**Herbert Conant, 6993 Reglar Road**, Re: Urging the Township to save and use the house and farm buildings on the Township Recreational site as a typical example of an early Michigan farmstead. Mr. Millington stated he

would like to hear from Mr. Hamill about this. Mr. Hamill being active in the Plymouth Historical Society. Mr. Hamill said the house was over 100 years old and was pictured in the 1870 Atlas. He did not know the condition of the place. Mr. Breen said the house was in horrible shape. He had extended an invitation to anyone interested in spending the time and money to fix up the place. The house needed time and money and asked if the Township is willing to get involved with this kind of expenditure. He recommended tearing the house and farm buildings down. Mrs. Holmes stated that she was opposed to tearing down the buildings, and wanted to know what the hurry was. Mr. Breen said that there was no effective way to keep people out. Mrs. Richardson asked Mr. Breen if he had officially extended an invitation to the Plymouth Historical Society to renovate the buildings. Mr. Breen said no, he had not. Mr. Overholt moved that the Clerk contact the Plymouth Historical Society regarding the possible renovation or destruction of the buildings. Supported by Mr. Ash and carried unanimously.

(b) Recommending the appointment of Mr. Joe Bida as Twp. Recreational Director, and approval for Mr. Bida to occupy the home, known as the Bakhaus property at Ridge and Territorial Roads. A letter written by Mr. Breen dated April 18, 1972, was read by Mrs. Richardson. Mrs. Holmes asked what the end result would be from the discussions. Mr. Breen said he was just requesting permission from the Board, possibly a joint police effort with the City of Plymouth. Mr. Ash moved that the Board grant authority to Mr. Breen to enter into discussion with the City of Plymouth regarding recreation and police. Supported by Mr. Burke and carried unanimously.

(b) Recommending the appointment of Mr. Joe Bida as Twp. Recreational Director, and approval for Mr. Bida to occupy the home, known as the Bakhaus property at Ridge and Territorial Roads. A letter written by Mr. Breen dated April 19, 1972, was read by Mrs. Richardson. Mr. Millington said that any money spent should be based on the first 60 acres acquired by the Township. Mrs. Holmes asked if Mr. Bida had time for this added job, and if he should not have the increase in salary. Mr. Breen said that he did have time, but that this would involve night work on the part of Mr. Bida. Mrs. Richardson stated that she was at the meeting where they had allocated the \$900.00 for the position and that Mr. Bida's name had been mentioned in connection with the position but final determination had not been made. Mr. Overholt said that this was a stop gap measure for the Township, that recreation was growing and progress had to be made, and that a full-time recreational director was not necessary. The \$900.00 was to be paid to someone already on the staff and that Mr. Bida was the man for the job. The Township, at this time, did not require a man with all the necessary papers. He suggested that Mr. Bida give a presentation to the Board as to his ideas for recreation in the Township. Mr. Overholt moved that Mr. Bida be appointed Township Recreational Director for the balance of the fiscal year, effective May 1, 1972, at an annual salary of \$900.00, and that he make a presentation to the Board at the next regular meeting. Supported by Mr. Burke. The following roll call vote was taken: Yes: B. Burke, Millington, Ash, Overholt, Richardson, Breen, No: Holmes. The motion carried. It was decided that the question of Mr. Bida occupying the home be delayed to the next regular meeting. This came as a result of the discussion regarding the responsibilities Mr. Bida would have while living on the property.

**Helen Richardson**, Re: Determination on number of constables to be elected at the General election. Mrs. Richardson stated that a determination on the number of constables to be elected must be made prior to May 7, 1972, per P.A. 1967, No. 215, Section 168-358 and it was her feeling that the two constables would be sufficient. Mrs. Holmes moved that 2 constables be elected at the General Election. Supported by Mr. Ash and carried unanimously.

**Joe Bida**, Re: Requesting permission to advertise for Bids on a tractor, front and bucket, mower, rake and broom, to be opened on May 9, 1972. Mrs. Richardson moved that the request to advertise for bids on a tractor and attachments be approved. Supported by Mr. Millington and carried unanimously.

**Robert Schultz**, President, Plymouth Community Junior Baseball League, Re: Plans and minimum requirements to have 3 fields at the Township Recreation property ready for the 1973 season. Mr. Dale Siskler spoke on the growth of the Little League program in the Plymouth area. Mr. Bida said that they were in the process of getting prices on lighting the fields, and that the Crosey Field had 4 lights that they had taken down and we could possibly purchase same from them. Mr. Richardson said that when people become aware of a project of this type, and progress is seen, there are often volunteers for labor as well as donations to assist financially. Mr. Overholt moved to accept the plan and minimum requirements as laid out by Mr. Schultz and that it was the Township's intent to light the 3 diamonds. Supported by Mr. Burke and carried unanimously.

**Donald Morgan**, Re: A resolution authorizing Donald Morgan, Attorney, to sign the consent judgment, Marathon Oil Co. vs. Township of Plymouth. (Koch property on Ann Arbor Road & Haggerty) Mrs. Holmes moved that the Board grant Mr. Morgan the authority to sign the consent judgment. Supported by Mr. Millington. The following roll call vote was taken: Yes: Millington, Ash, Overholt, Holmes, Richardson, Breen, No: Burke. The motion carried.

**Breder-Hamill & Associates**, Re: Acceptance of additions to the Ackron Contracting Co. contract for the McCumpha Road water main in the amount of \$2,236.00. Mrs. Richardson moved that the additional amount of \$2,236.00 be accepted as an addition to the contract. Supported by Mr. Ash and carried unanimously.

**Frank Millington**, Re: 10 minute open discussion. Mr. Millington requested that the people in the audience have time to ask questions, give ideas, items either on or not on the agenda. Mr. Millington moved that an open forum be adopted as a try-out basis. Supported by Mr. Burke and carried unanimously.

**J. Russell Cutler for Margaret Gates**, Appl. No. 178 - Rezoning from R-1 to C-2 of the northwest corner of Joy and Sheldon Roads for gasoline service station. (Planning Commission recommended denial of the rezoning at their 3-15-72 meeting). Mr. Breen asked if a representative was present regarding application No. 178. No one being present, Mrs. Richardson moved that the Board approve the recommended denial of the Planning Commission to deny the request for rezoning from R-1 to C-2 of the northwest corner of Joy and Sheldon Roads as it would represent spot zoning, tend to encourage strip zoning and be incompatible with the Planned Unit Development of the area as reflected in the "701" plan. Supported by Mr. Millington and carried unanimously.

**Mr. Overholt** moved to adjourn the meeting, supported by Mr. Burke. Supervisor Breen adjourned the meeting at 11:03 P.M.

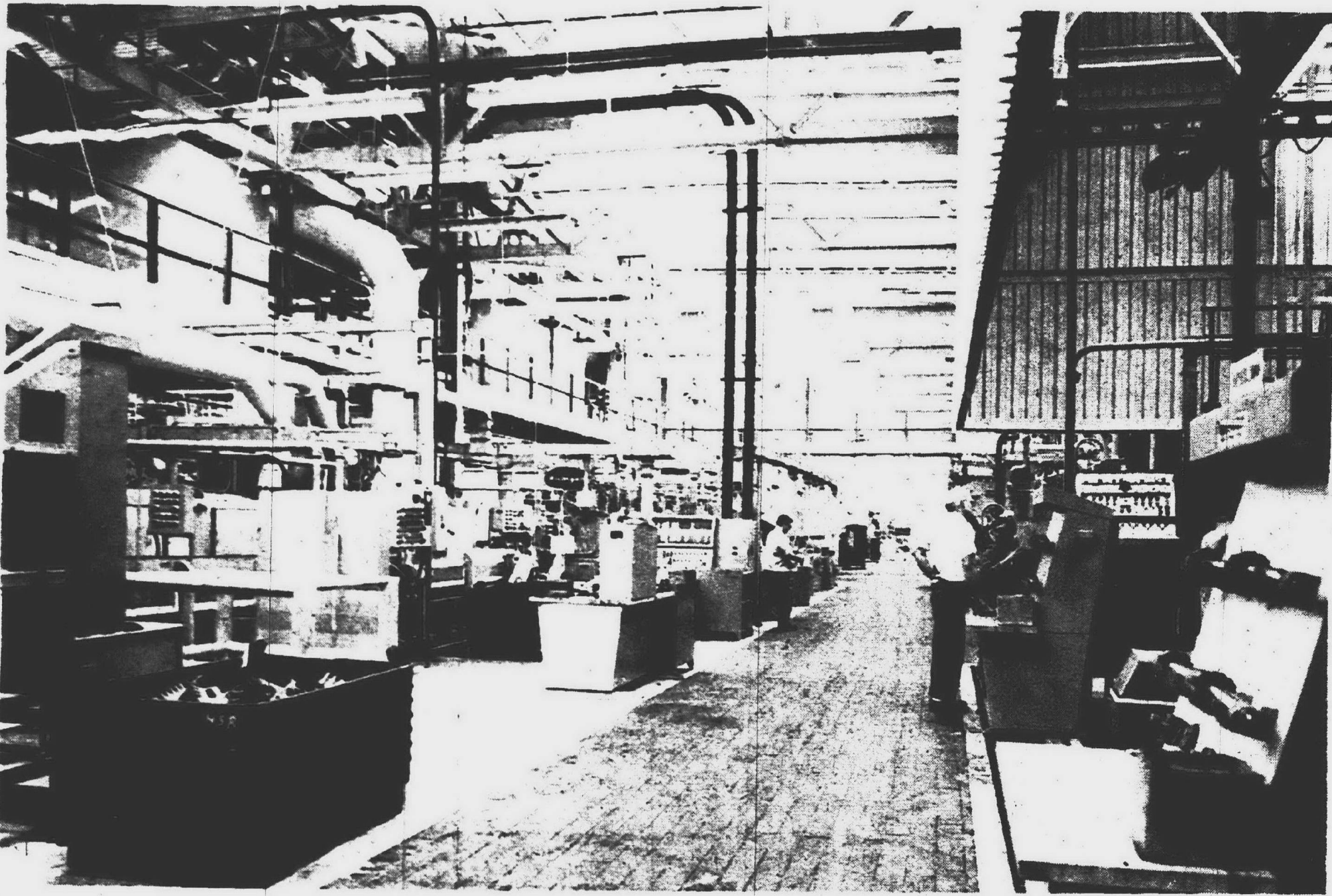

QUIET. That's how the new Cadillac-Livonia plant impressed Observer Roving Editor W. W. Edgar, who noted that the interior is soundproofed and engine blocks slide along the assembly line so quietly that one hardly notices them.

## This Factory Sounds Like An Office

Built for the manufacturing of new engine components, the Livonia plant of GM's Cadillac Motor Car Division, unveiled this week, is setting a new style for all industry.

With its wide aisles, straight assembly lines and elevators instead of the old-time electric cranes, it is far cry from the manufacturing plants of the past.

"This plant was designed to be a modern manufacturing facility," H.B. ("Bud") Brawner, general manufacturing manager of the division, explained to newsmen gathered at the inaugural press conference. "We are utilizing the latest technology to provide quality parts in a worker environment that is safe, clean, and conducive to high morale."

THE BUILDING contains 270,000 square feet of working space and is built on a 37-acre parcel of land on Middle Belt Road at the C&O rail crossing.

"From the outside, the new facility isn't much different than other plants in the area,

except that it is long and narrow with plenty of parking space. But once inside, it is much different from any other manufacturing facility in the auto industry.

On first sight, it doesn't look like a manufacturing plant. And with its soundproof interior, even to special treatment of the floor, it is more like an office building.

One scarcely notices the engine blocks sliding along the assembly, so quiet do they move. And they are lifted from one line to another by elevator instead of electric crane or manpower, as in the old days.

WHILE BRAWNER stated that it was against company policy to reveal figures regarding the cost of the facility or the amount of its payroll, he did state that more than \$1 million was invested in a treatment department to handle solid waste and other refuse, along with purifying the air.

Much of the cleanliness was handled by the use of a new down-draft system whereby iron chips from the manufacturing of the blocks and other components, along with the

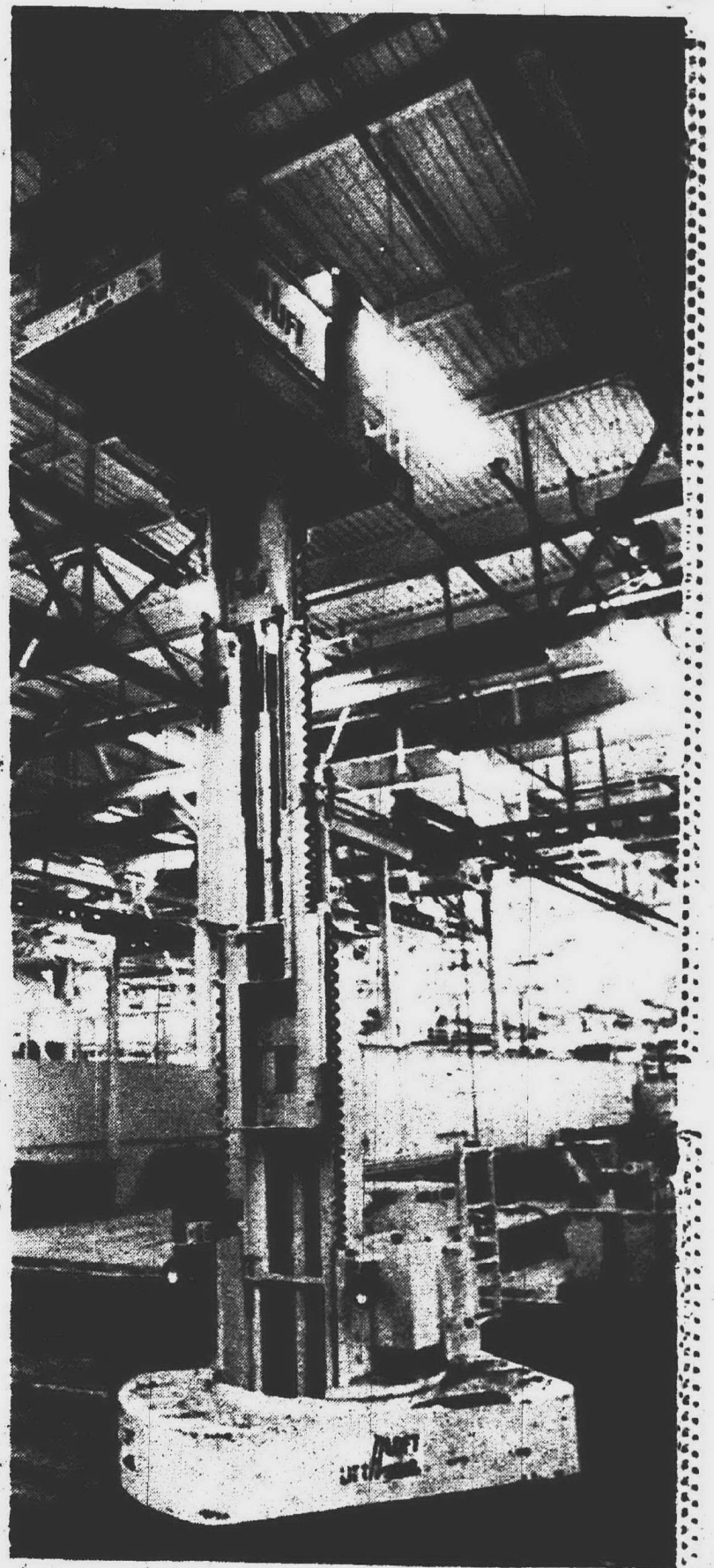
dust, is pulled down into a large chip trench under the machines for disposal to a general collection plant.

"We planned to provide employees with a plant that would look neat and orderly and could be kept clean easily. We went so far as to obtain the services of the General Motors styling experts to assist in selecting the colors for the interior. The colors chosen are a soft yellow and make for a pleasant environment."

Along with the great care taken inside the plant, Cadillac officials took a giant step in establishing a good neighbor policy. Heeding the request of the neighbors to the east, a large shade tree was spared. Instead of cutting it down to build a fence, the fence was built around the tree.

Most of the manufacturing is confined to producing crankshafts for the El Dorado model along with engine blocks, bearing caps, and cylinder heads.

The opening work force is 150 employees, most of whom live within the area. This will be increased when the plant goes into full production within the next year.



ALL ELECTRICAL control panels, ventilation and heating units are in the overhead space of the new plant, allowing cleaner work areas on the main floor and a free flow of work in the machining lines. This "cherry-picker" is used by maintenance men.

# It Takes Faith To Break Tradition

A church that dared to break tradition in its approach to Christian education is going to continue its pattern of change and growth.

Faith Lutheran Church, 30000 Five Mile, Livonia, had operated a standard Lutheran day school for grades one to eight and had regular Sunday School classes for its children and youth until June of 1970.

Then, in a move with little precedent in Missouri Synod circles, the congregation voted to discontinue its day school and move to a program that could include the whole age range of its members.

NOW, NEARLY a year later, the big church complex is pretty quiet most mornings and early afternoons. But in the after-school hours three afternoons a week, it's filled with busy youngsters enjoying a kind of church school they hadn't known before.

On Wednesdays, adults come to study in the Lutheran School of Religion that involves several other Lutheran congregations in Livonia.

And on Sunday mornings only the pre-schoolers and kindergartners go to Sunday School. Other children in the family attend church with their parents.

"It's a new beginning," the Rev. Roger Schleef, pastor, said as Faith prepared to launch the new program last fall.

"It did take a certain amount of faith," slightly punned Arnold Witt, director of Christian education, in surveying the first few months of operation.

WITT, WHO WAS principal of the Faith day school before being called to his present post, finds many advantages in the church's decision to stop putting such a large percentage of its resources into a day school that benefited only young children.

Numbers tell one success story, he said.

"Last year we had 60 enrolled in the day school and 180 in Sunday School, and of course that represented some overlapping," he said.

"Now, in our program for children up to eighth grade,

we have 265 enrolled. Of those, about 25 are not members of Faith but represent six different denominations."

Attendance regularity he described as "phenomenal."

"We never have less than 90 per cent present," he said, "and that's much better than it used to be in Sunday School."

THIS HE CREDITED partly to the new study series titled "Mission: Life" and carrying such intriguing grade course themes as "Wow, I'm God's Saint - Pow, I Do Good Things" for the fourth graders and "Decisions, Decisions" for the fifth and sixth grades.

Plenty of devotion on the part of the teachers, a larger block of time each week and the fact that the children don't arrive in Sunday finery also help make for success.

The new after-school education program and adult study series represent just a beginning in the innovations Faith wants to work out.

Another tradition will be broken this summer, Witt

said, when the church abandons the Vacation Bible School set-up.

"We realize that our program this year tends to divide families, because different ages come on different days," he said. "So our activities this summer will be family-oriented rather than a school for only part of the family."

WITT SAID many of the arrangements for the week-day school this year were based largely on convenience, and hopes for more "un-structuring" in the future.

There also are plans to expand the adult School of Religion, and hopes to begin a program for pre-schoolers in early daytime hours soon.

Also still in beginning stages is a revamped youth program.

"Instead of one youth group, we have several set up on the basis of interests," Witt said, "and this seems to be a good direction to go. Groups are smaller; and if they turn out to be not fulfilling their function, they can be disbanded without breaking up a whole program."

Teens at Faith also sing in a youth choir, and many have been regular assistants for the week-day school. The church has a room to use for its youth, and church leaders and young people are working together to determine its best use.

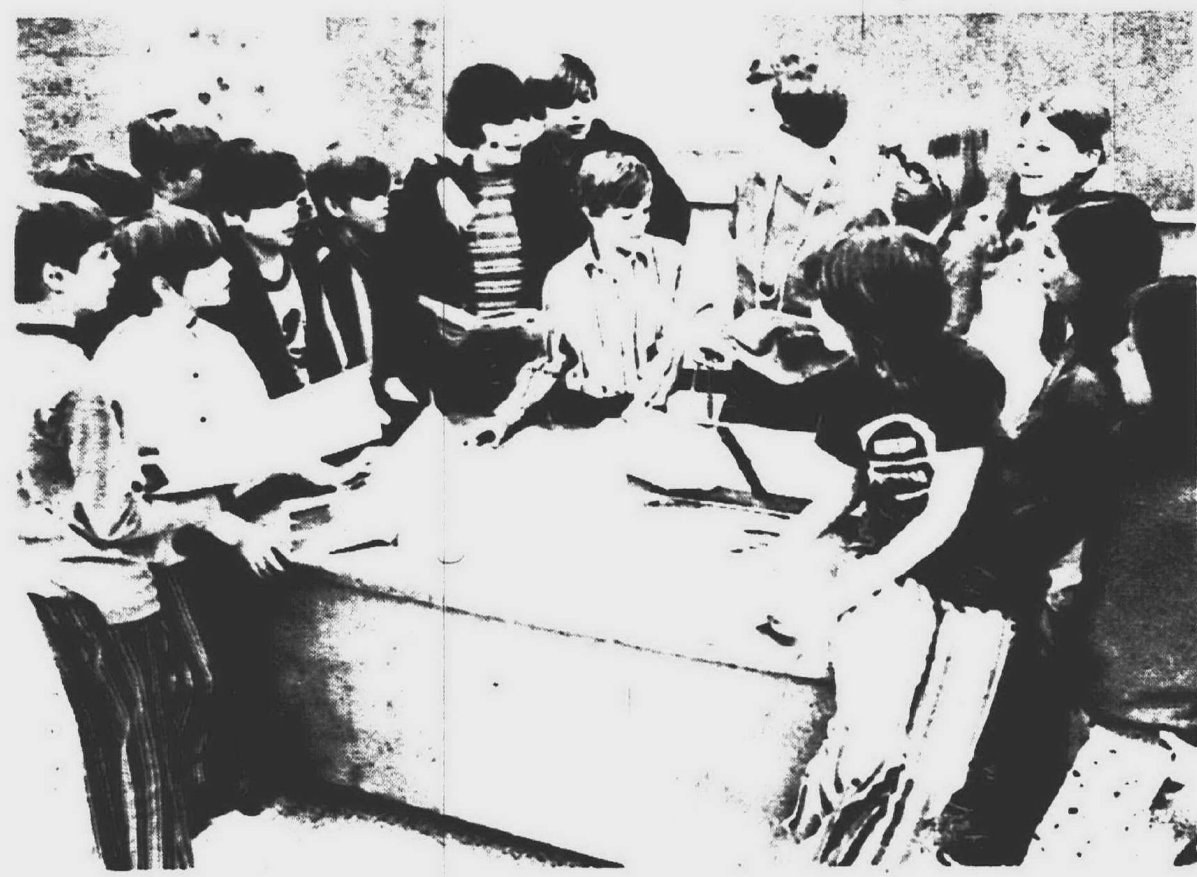
Still more attention is being given to the special needs of the post-high school young people. "More and more of our families include young people who are going to college at home or staying home while working," Witt said.

Faith is moving ahead with the idea that changes should be made carefully and with

chewan, is directed by Richard Brust.

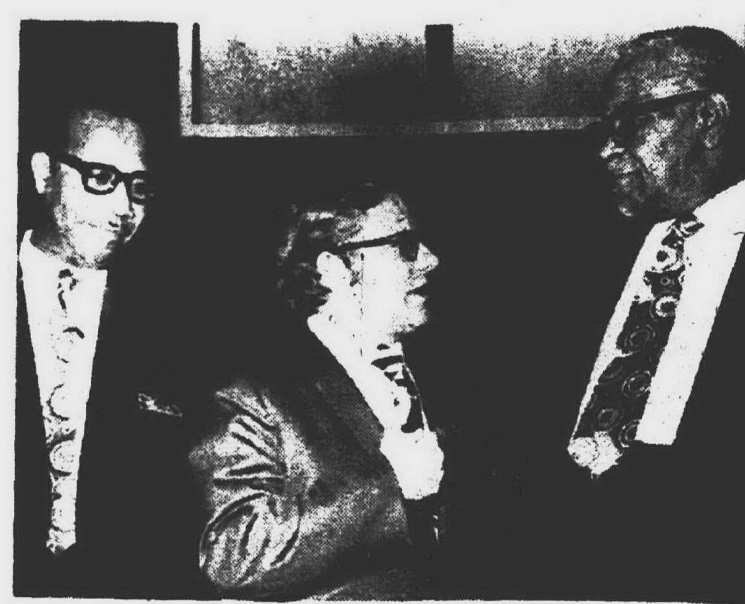
Currently on spring tour, the group is visiting 27 churches in several states as well as Manitoba and Ontario. The program includes contemporary as well as traditional music.

## Rev. Lester Kinsolving's Religion Update

Within a week of its release, Irving Wallace's fascinating new novel "The Word" — about a sensational forgery of an entire gospel (according to Jesus' brother James) — had begun climbing the best-seller lists.

The novel capitalizes upon a fascination which has been widespread ever since the momentous discovery of the Dead Sea Scrolls in 1947: the possibility of someday unearthing more information about Jesus Christ.

The book is not only as gripping as any detective story ever written, but shows the evidence of Wallace's 10 years of research, during which he consulted scholars all over the world. And the general reading public — who can hardly be imagined reading most books on Biblical archeology — will benefit immensely from the scholarly material which Wallace has assembled. So will the clergy, in that they may be relieved from the tiresome ignorance of skeptics who mouth the familiar claim

that "nothing was written about Jesus until hundreds of years after he died."

DURING A TELEPHONE interview, Wallace expressed amazement and amusement when informed that a forgery similar to that outlined in his book had actually taken place in the U.S.

And while not on anything quite like the 30-year scale in his novel, this forgery was perhaps even more astounding, considering the perpetrators and their success.

One day in 1936, two freshmen at Cambridge, Massachusetts' intellectually prestigious Episcopal Theological School (ETS) were stung by the splendor of a sudden thought — while sitting in New Testament class.

"Wouldn't it be fascinating if a manuscript turned up someday which would settle the dispute about the ending of St. Paul's Epistle to the Romans?" said their professor — with such yearning that the two fresh decided to oblige him.

So they purchased a sheepskin from the Harvard Co-Op, buried it for a month — and when that didn't make it look sufficiently ancient, they boiled it in coffee.

THEN TO HARVARD'S immense library where they learned all that was necessary about the manner of Greek in New Testament manuscripts. The ink was an amalgamation of all the ink available — and mysteriously borrowed — from fellow students. Finally the finished manuscript was rubbed on a rug by the bare feet of one of the two conspirators.

Six months after this Manhattan Project of practical jokery had begun, Professor Norman Nash (afterwards Bishop of Massachusetts) received a letter signed by one "Horace Partridge" — a name selected

at random for its piquancy. Mr. Partridge was writing Professor Nash to inform him that having recently traveled through Egypt, he had (1) Purchased an interesting-looking but mysterious scroll from a beggar in Cairo (2) Been strongly advised by an Episcopal missionary in the city to send the manuscript to his former seminary professor at ETS.

Excited, but veiled references to a sensational archeological discovery soon began punctuating the lectures of the seminary faculty — especially those of widely beloved New Testament Professor William Henry Paine ("Daddy") Hatch, whose eyes glowed with anticipation.

When the "Partridge Manuscript" passed the scrutiny of the staff of Harvard's Fogg Museum, the Rev. Dr. Hatch took special leave to write a monograph on the exciting discovery. It was then that the two students panicked and confessed all to Professor Nash.

"HE WOULDN'T believe us because we were just freshmen!" recalls "one of the hoaxes, the Rev. Reamer Kline — now president of New York's Bard College. "We had to show him the cut edges of the manuscript. And when he phoned Daddy Hatch, the only response was: 'Oh no! no! no! no!'"

For years afterwards, no one ever mentioned the magnificent hoax in Dr. Hatch's presence. But the beloved professor eventually forgave his students, especially when one of them, Chaplain Barrett Tyler, was killed in the Pacific during World War II.

In the ETS chapel is the Tyler Memorial Window. And in the lower right hand corner is a small but significant partridge — with a scroll around its neck.

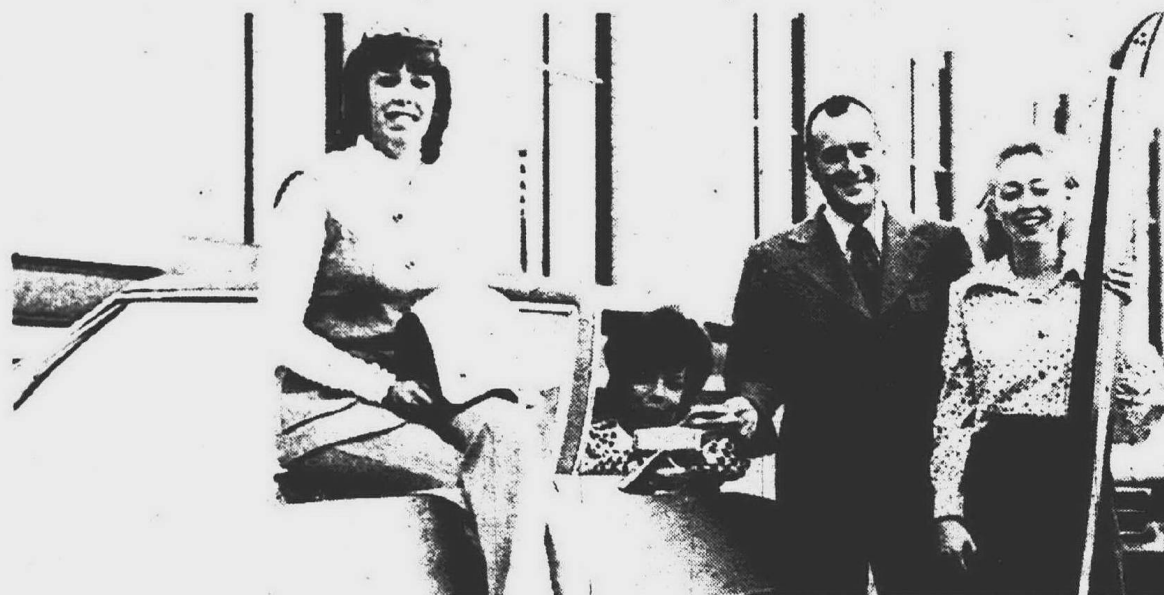

Northville left six on the

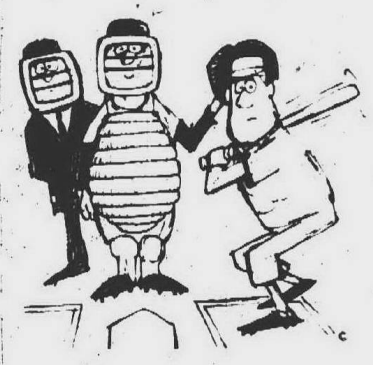

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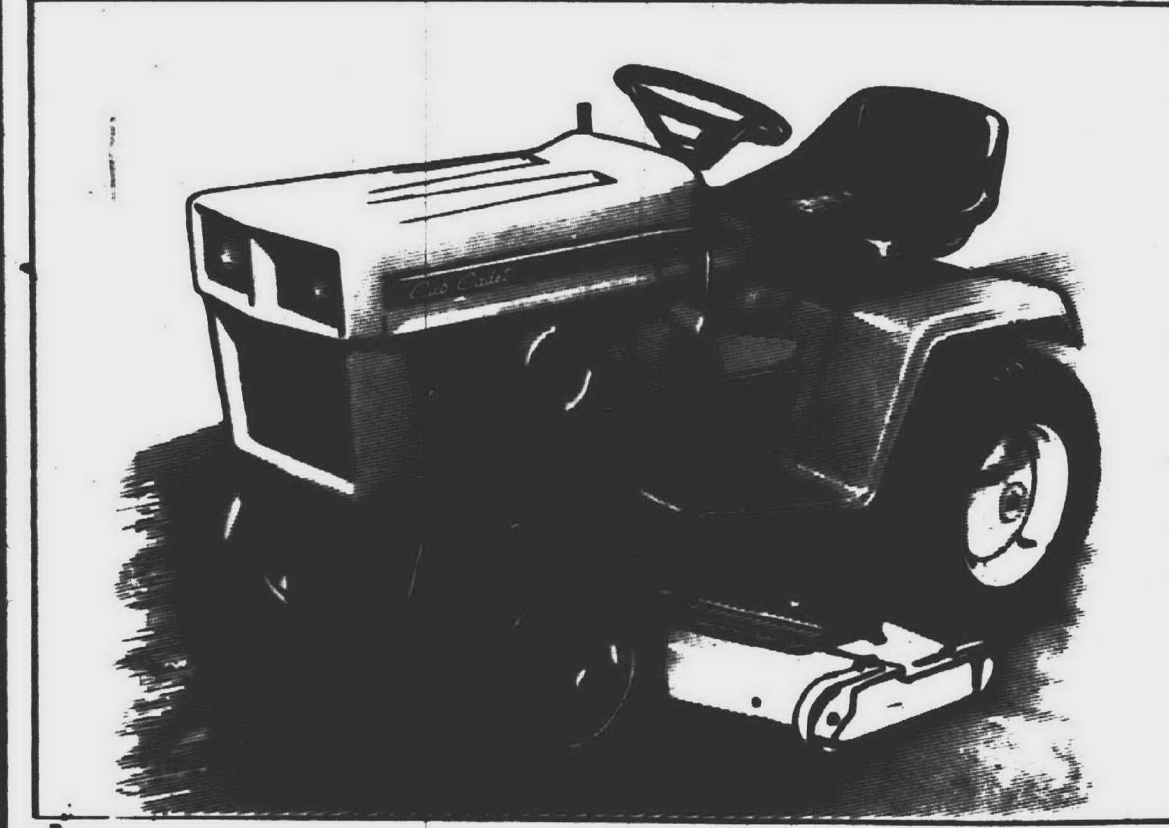

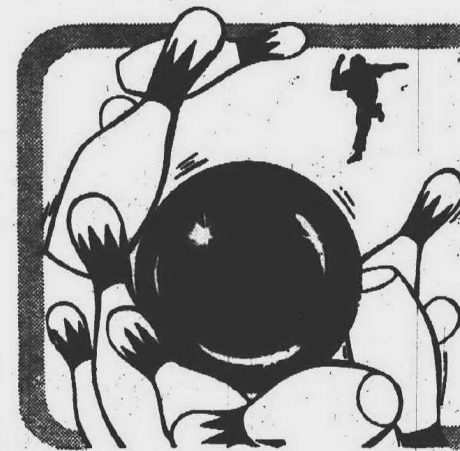
GRAVES worked in relief and struck out three in his one and a third innings. Tom Miller went the route for RU and gave up six hits, struck out three and walked one in taking the loss.

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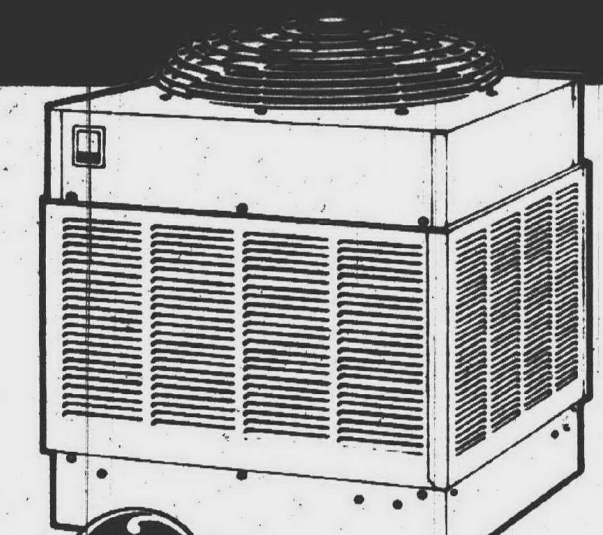

The officials had rented the school auditorium to Mrs. Mary Kenney of 26150 Greythorne, Farmington, for what they thought was an anti-bussing rally.

After receiving phone calls from Wallace's Florida headquarters and reading an article in the Observer Newspapers, school officials became aware that Wallace was scheduled to appear at the rally at 3:30 p.m. on Monday. The school is at 29995 W. 12 Mile.

Observer Newspapers became aware of the rally from a line at the end of a

lengthy story in a Detroit paper, which reported only that a meeting was to be held in Farmington. Further details were obtained from a Wallace headquarters downriver. Neither the Wallace supporters nor Mrs. Kenney made any unsolicited announcement.

"We had no idea we would be entertaining a national figure of any stature,"

business manager Bill Prisk said.

Prisk said that the district rented the facility for what was thought to be a local anti-bussing rally.

Mrs. Kenney first rented it for a meeting of the National Action Group of Farmington (not affiliated with the national NAG chapter), canceled it and then rescheduled it for a meeting for "residents of Farmington."

Mrs. Kenney, who is a candidate for Republican delegate in precinct 12, was out of town Thursday and could not be reached for comment.

Prisk said that if the district confirmed that the meeting was to be a Wallace rally it would take precautions for the "goodly crowd" Wallace is likely to attract.

Mrs. Kenney came to public attention previously when she filed assault charges against Farmington school trustee Aldo Vagnozzi. Vagnozzi, who is also 19th Congressional District Democratic chairman and editor of the AFL-CIO News, was scheduled.

Wallace is also scheduled to appear in Lansing on Monday.

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## What Tires Are Best For Driving Conditions In The Suburbs?

Say you live on the west or northwest side of Detroit, in one of the expressway suburbs where a car is a necessity, mandated by no public transportation and discouraged by a lack of sidewalks.

The chances are you will become a "replacement tire" buyer. The tire companies already depend on you.

Two-thirds to three-quarters of American tire companies business is selling second sets of tires.

How do you get through the rubber jungle with the least amount of harassment?

You probably already missed your first chance. In buying a new car, one of the biggest bargains is expensive tires as a "new-car option." Besides being able to pay for the expensive "booties" for your new car on a payment plan, the "option" price is a lot less than you would pay to a tire dealer.

For instance, a steel-belted radial tire is offered on a new compact as a \$85 option. Five identical tires at the tire dealer across the street cost \$165 with a trade-in of the car's original equipment tires.

But that's too late now, the old bologna skins on the family bus are showing their age, and its time to get new tires.

If you live in Observerland, you probably drive under a wide variety of roads and conditions.

You bounce out to the main drag over a gravel roadbed that is supposed to "keep down the traffic" according to your neighbors, slam through the potholed concrete streets typical of the west side of Detroit, and tour at 80mph (be honest, now) on the lacework of expressways.

This generally demands a pretty good tire. Today you get a choice between "belted," "bias-ply," and "radial."

At least one tire manufacturer has tried to eliminate the confusion in his ads, which did more to publicize the confusion rather than clear it up, but working from the ground up helps.

The tread of a tire tends to squish a bit when it is forced out of round by the weight of the car. "Belts" in the tires lie just under the tread, and are aimed at eliminating the squish.

So belts are good, but they cost some money. They are made of steel, or synthetic fibers -- add considerable mileage and resistance to blowouts.

With a non-squishy tread, the next choice is sidewall radial or "conventional."

Basically a radial tire is built with the sidewall fibers running around the tire -- like you would wrap a ribbon around a doughnut.

This makes the sidewalls squishy -- and in fact radial tires often look a little flat from outside the car.

The "give" in the sidewalls allows the tread to track truer, and keeps the tread flatter on the road in corners.

But bias-ply tires are cheaper, and there doesn't seem to be any way, in the near future, the tire companies are going to bring the price of radials (they start at about \$40 a tire) down.

On a used car, (even if you did the using), the belted tires, whether radial or bias ply, could easily last longer than you intend to keep the car.

But getting back to the suburban commuter -- it is nice to know you have good tires when you are driving in the rain and the mad genius of the State Highway Dept. throws you another curve on I-696.

If you are interested in the socio-economic effects of your tire purchase, consider this:

Dupont Corp. has invented a new tire fiber, that could extend tire mileage.

Uniroyal Corp. recently introduced a steel-belted radial tire.

Belted tires are getting extremely popular.

Allt his points to longer mileage -- but Wall Street, aware of how the tire companies depend on replacement sales, has reacted coolly.

So drive more. So drive more, keep America green.

You can probably do it in less than three. Larger jobs, like replacing an engine, can take an amateur weeks--a pro can do it in a day--and the cost of the engine is such a large percentage of the total is probably isn't worth it.

Tools cost a small fortune -- a single wrench can cost about \$3.50.

The problem with tools is that for the home car repairer, they are rarely used often enough to justify their cost.

Diagnosis is also crucial to successful home-repair. Just what is making that clanking noise?

Diagnosis is a problem for the pros too. Diagnostic centers have been set up -- Volkswagen has even installed electronic sensors in their new cars that are supposed to let a computer do the job.

Soliciting the advice of the mechanic you are trying to replace is one way to address the problem.

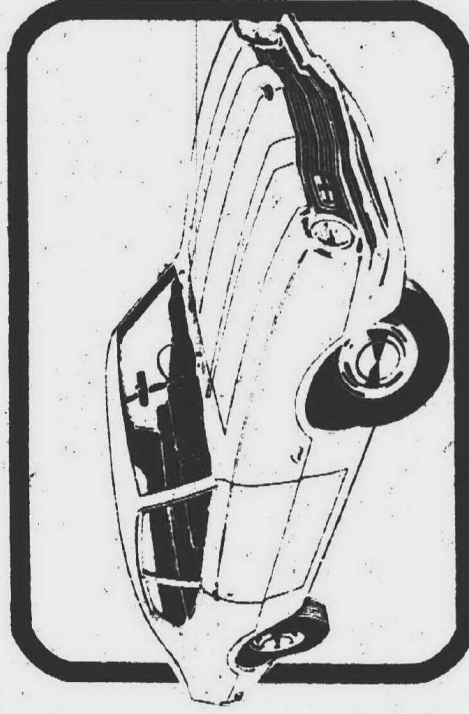
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### Here's a Most Revealing Test

One of the most revealing tests an experienced mechanic can make for you is a compression test, in which all spark plugs are removed and pressure readings are compared with specification.

This procedure helps your mechanic determine if the problem is in valves, rings or both. Such a test usually is part of a major engine tune-up, or may cost about \$5 or \$6 when done as an individual operation.

A compression test can be the first step toward putting new life in the old car.

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### Get Out, Get Under, Then What. . . ?

You've seen those cars up on the cinder blocks, the two feet sticking out from underneath, muttered curses appearing to come from deep within the bowels of the auto.

Probably in some guy's driveway. The kind of guy who always seems to have three cars, or three pieces of one car, and a spare engine that he is "going to get to" hanging from a chain hoist in the back of his garage.

Not me, you say. It's the appointment book at the dealers, the conversation with the service manager that's your scene. The wallet, not the monkey wrench.

But there is always that nagging worry. Congress is investigating the whole car service industry. At least some of the car companies are even advertising how you can "do-it-yourself." Car tools are available options on new American cars, standard equipment on a variety of European autos.

The daily papers have a story about every two months that describe the adventures of some secretary who did a tune-up with a nail file and the manufacturer's handbook clutched between her pretty teeth.

Are car repairs within the realm of the home handyman? Do you save money? Ever see a mechanic who owns a Cadillac? Since the monetary consideration seem to pop into mind first, and since the implication of the congressional investigation is that car service is a bit of a racket, just how much money can you save?

Probably not much.

Car repairs are based on parts plus labor. A new car would cost about 25 percent more if it came delivered a part at a time, a markup which partly explains why it is easy to have a repair bill higher than the worth of a seven-year-old car.

Labor is currently charged by most Detroit-area garages at approximately \$11 per hour -- not that the mechanics get that much, but their salary, overhead and profit for the dealership are included.

So to really save any money, you have to work faster than \$11 an hour -- almost impossible for the unskilled amateur.

But forget about double-entry accounting, and think about car repairs like a teen-ager. You got the time, not the money; a guy you know gets you parts wholesale.

Now you can get into it with a profit motive.

Just which job can save you money? "tuneup" usually involves most likely the smallest. A so-called "tuneup" usually involves about \$15-\$20 worth of parts, depending on the number of cylinders, and can be performed in less than an hour by a good mechanic.

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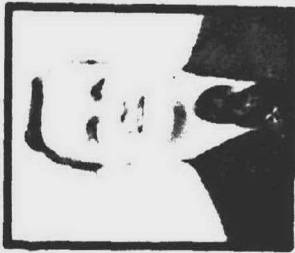

Meet The Man Who Keeps An Eye  
On Faulty Cars In Observerland.

If you live in Observerland, you may have met Sgt. Richard Hilderly. If you haven't, you may soon.

Sgt. Hilderly works for the Michigan State Police in a safety-check van. He's the guy who flags you down, checks your car to see if it meets minimum safety requirements, and maybe writes a ticket if it doesn't.

The state police van works in district two -- a large area that goes all the way to the state line, north to Eight Mile Rd., and west to near Ann Arbor.

Southfield and Farmington drivers have to contend with troopers from the Romeo Post, which polices those areas. In addition, Farmington and Livonia operate their own vans, as does the City of Detroit -- they all work about the same.

Each morning, the van pulls out from the Grand River and Seven Mile Rd. police post, taking Sgt. Hilderly and his men to a new assignment.

They park the van by the side of the road and set up a line of rubber pylons to channel the traffic into a single lane.

Everybody gets his driver's license checked by the man on "point," at the beginning of the line. On an average day, about 2,000 cars reach this point, according to Hilderly.

This gives the troopers a chance to "eyeball" the car, and see if the license is in effect. If your papers are in order (about one in ten licenses aren't valid, check yours now) and you are driving a car with no blatant/visible defects, the chances are you will be waved on.

If you are pulled out of line, they go over the car a little more thoroughly -- checking the brakes, windshield, steering, etc. Only one in three cars pass this inspection.

The police may issue a warning, or a ticket for a violation.

"We don't have any pressure to write tickets, it's up to the discretion of the officer," Hilderly said. The more serious the violation, or the more that are found, the greater the chance of a ticket.

Bad brakes are one violation that may get a car impounded, actually towed away for the owner to claim later.

The check they run through is pretty simple, and in fact a car owner could run through it in his driveway and save himself some trouble:

- Windshield: Check for cracks or impairment of vision.
- Wipers: Arms must be tight, blades flexible.

- Windshield washers: Must work (this is the most frequent cause of flunking).
- Other glass: Must be clear.
- Lights: All must work, with no broken lenses.
- Horn: must work.
- Steering: "Lash" must not exceed two inches.
- Brakes: Shouldn't go closer than 1/2 inch to the floor -- handbrake must work.
- Tires: No cuts, breaks or bulges -- 3/32 inch tread required.
- Exhaust: No excessive smoke or noise.
- License, registration and insurance all must be in effect.

Checking this kind of thing in the driveway is probably less adventurous than the State Police version.

"About anything can happen when you are dealing with that number of the public," Hilderly says. A couple of people are arrested on outstanding traffic warrants, a few stolen cars show up. Last year, one irate motorist took after an officer with a club.

Does he think the Michigan system of random inspection is the best?

"Yes, this way you get to meet a lot of people, talk to them," he says, "I think that's important."
