Police Ponder Premeditation In Finlan Case

Evidence that the shooting of Charles P. Finlan was "prior planned and premeditated is piling up," as Plymouth police continue intensive investigation of Wednesday's crime.

While police won't discuss the full nature of the evidence without conferring with the prosecutor, they revealed that Donald Alan Crenshaw, accused of the shooting, did rent a room at the Royal Motor Lodge on Plymouth Rd. the day Finlan was shot.

According to Plymouth Police Chief Timothy Ford, Crenshaw checked into the motel about 2 p.m. Wednesday, using an assumed name.

"He made the mistake, however, of giving the correct license number of his car," the chief said.

Ford stated that they know Crenshaw, 29, who lives in Bloomfield Township, purchased an electrical appliance in a Plymouth hardware store that afternoon.

Police also are convinced that Finlan got out of his car just prior to being shot because they believe his car was bumped by the car driven by Crenshaw while in the parking lot next to Finlan's office at 500 S. Main.

"WE HAVE further evidence that this shooting was planned well in advance but can't release that information at the present time," Ford added.

The chief said there is no concrete evidence that the shooting was a "hit", a term used for a planned shooting.

In studying the possibility, Ford said there are two conflicting circumstances:

"The suspect could be an ideal 'hit' man because he is quiet, could stand in a crowd all day and no one would notice him. His appearance is of the 'establishment' type."

On the other hand, Ford stated, it doesn't seem likely a "hit man" would use the type of gun Finlan was shot with, nor would the shooting be done on a busy street in late afternoon.

"The 9-mm Browning pistol doesn't do the job that a .45 automatic would do. With the 9-mm gun, you can shoot at a person all day, and if you don't hit a vital organ, the bullets would just go through. A .45, on the other hand, would blow a hole right through the victim."

IT ALSO was pointed out by the chief that it was unlikely robbery would be a motive, since Crenshaw has \$15,000 in a bank account, money the chief said he learned was part of an inheritance.

"He also has a safety deposit box. However, its contents are not known to us," said Ford.

Police have not questioned Crenshaw, who is being represented by two attorneys from Birmingham, William R. VanderKloot and Harold Young. He is being held in the Plymouth jail in lieu of \$250,000 bond. Pre-trial examination is set for June 12.

"We hope to be able to talk to Finlan by Monday," Ford said, "providing doctors will let us."

As of Friday, Finlan was still in intensive care at Wayne County General Hospital, and his condition was listed as critical.

Police hope to be able to question Finlan regarding a statement he made to one of the witnesses shortly after being shot.

"At that time, he indicated he suspected who was responsible for the attack," Ford said.

ALTHOUGH THERE were at least a dozen gunshot wounds found on Finlan, police believe he was shot four times. Ford explained that a 9-mm bullet would make several holes in a person if its direction was changed by hitting a bone.

Crenshaw was arrested approximately 20 minutes after the shooting occurred at 6:10 p.m. Wednesday in the parking lot.

Ford credits alert police work by Michigan state troopers who spotted the car on N. Territorial Rd. near Napier, about four miles west of Plymouth.

Licata Picked As GOP Chief Here

Anthony C. (Tony) Licata, a Plymouth resident for less than two years, was chosen this week as the new Republican chairman for the area.

He succeeds Eugene Stermer, who submitted his resignation at the district convention held Wednesday night in the Mayflower Hotel. Licata's election came without opposition and the switch in command stole the thunder from selection of the party's state convention delegates and alternates.

The fact of Licata's brief residency in the community belies his political activism, for he certainly is no neophyte in Michigan GOP circles.

Prior to moving from Detroit to his home at 1290 Woodland Place in August 1970, Licata had served on the Republican State Central Committee during the regime of Gov. George Romney and also was the 19th District's state representative for the 1967-68 term.

NOW 53, Licata was born in Illinois and came to the Detroit area in 1929. He attended Wayne State

University and by his own definition has been active politically since 1958.

He also is one of the Republican members on the present state reapportionment commission.

That Licata would become a key figure in local GOP affairs was indicated soon after moving to Plymouth when he was the prime force in organizing the Plymouth Civic Federation of which he is chairman. Mrs. George H. (Nancy) Johnson is vice chairman.

The latest news release from the organization now identifies the group as representing "Greater Plymouth," and although Licata said recently that the membership count is only 19, that figure includes the core of local Republican officialdom.

"The federation is a non-partisan political group, with members living in Plymouth, Plymouth Township and Canton Township," was the statement in a news release a few days ago. "Organized in 1971, the group is active in local elections at the city, township and school district levels."

LICATA ALSO will serve as chairman of the nine-member Plymouth-Northville delegation to the state convention to be held June 17 in Detroit's Cobo Hall. At that time, Michigan's delegates to the national Republican convention will be selected.

The eight state delegates, in addition to Licata, who were chosen Wednesday were Robert Geake, E.O. (Bud) Weber, Stermer, Mark McKelvey, James McCarthy, Don Morgan, Charles Newland and John Harper.

Alternates are William Evans, Richard Byrne, Paul Groth, Leon Paler, Niels Hanson, Soren Pedersen,

James Walker, Pat Krolikowski and Thomas Range.

McKelvey quite possibly will be the youngest delegate from all of Michigan at the state convention.

A PLYMOUTH High School senior, he reached his 18th birthday just the day before the May 16 election in which he was chosen one of two delegates in Plymouth Township Precinct No. 8.

He is the son of James and Barbara McKelvey of 44743 Brookside Dr. and has been one of the outstanding members of the PHS student body.

A member of the debating team, McKelvey was presented an honor key at last week's PHS convocation ceremony for his outstanding work in speech.

Also, this spring, he has been selected for the Elks youth leadership award, the Soroptimist youth citizenship award, the Kiwanis Club of Plymouth award and has qualified for a Michigan competitive scholarship.

McKelvey's decision to get into the political arena was made "entirely on my own," he commented after the GOP convention and said that his goal is "to help people get involved."

Set Dates Of Center's Dedication

A three-day celebration involving as many groups as possible is being planned for the dedication of the new Plymouth Cultural Center on Sept. 8-9-10.

From the time Mayor James McKeon cuts the official ribbon on Friday night there will be activity in all areas of the building. There also is a possibility that the Detroit Red Wings will play an exhibition game either

Saturday evening or Sunday afternoon.

The program of activities and tours is being designed so that every room of the new facility can be shown to advantage to the hosts of visitors expected to attend.

The three day event marks the climax of a five-year drive for a cultural center. It includes an ice rink and the dedication has been set at the time of the Fall Festival when

Plymouth puts on its best bib and tucker to greet countless visitors.

None of the dedication events, however, such as the proposed hockey game, will conflict with the annual Jaycee roast beef dinner or the Rotary Club's chicken barbecue.

City Commissioner Robert Sincov is chairman of the group arranging the diversified program.

Pursell felt it would help their case if the Township Board showed their support in this matter.

Mr. Ash moved that the Board draft and issue a statement of support to the State Highway Director, Mr. Henrik E. Stafeth, for the recent fence application made by the Cambridge Homeowners Association Freeway Committee. Supported by Mr. Overholt. 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Plymouth Pair Called Couriers For Cocaine Ring

A preliminary hearing is set for 9:30 a.m. Friday in Federal District Court for LeRoy Collier and his wife, Lizzie, both of 18470 George Washington, on narcotics charges of possession with intent to distribute.
A federal indictment on the charges will also be sought before then, according to Assistant U.S. Atty. Robert Hulbert, and additional charges will be placed.
The pair were arrested in

their Southfield residence Wednesday, and a team of 22 agents from five government organizations confiscated 15 pounds of cocaine valued at about \$5 million at "street level," \$36,000 in cash and six guns.
Kenneth Aschim, special agent in charge for the U.S. Bureau of Customs, said that the case is still under investigation by bureau agents.
Aschim added that the bureau believes there are no accomplices in Miami, where U.S. Customs agents picked up the trail of two couriers who were traced to the Southfield address Tuesday evening.

THE ALLEGED couriers who reside in Plymouth — Douglas R. Kapp of 8740 Antler Circle, and Kathy S. Lucas of 42560 Postiff — have been flown back to Miami for arraignment on the same charges. Neither police nor Customs officials have any record of previous offenses for the four who were placed in custody. The Southfield couple have been released on \$25,000 cash bonds.

Customs agents took up surveillance in Miami after receiving information on the smuggling operation. Aschim declined to reveal how the information was obtained.

Aschim explained that couriers brought the cocaine in from Colombia, South America, by "body carry" — in other words, hidden in girdles under their clothing. The narcotic was carried in plastic bags, possibly used for laundry, Cal. Colombia. It was discovered by Customs in a secondary inspection beyond the normal entry inspection.

Upon arrival in Miami, the couriers took a Delta Airlines flight under the supervision of Customs agents and arrived in Detroit at 11 p.m., Tuesday. Customs agents continued to trail the couriers to Southfield, where Aschim said they "assumed" the delivery was made. He added that "forces" had already been "alerted," so a search warrant was issued the following morning and the raid took place about noon.

TALK ABOUT a whirlwind courtship, that fellow Raymond J. Smit from over Ann Arbor way certainly has embarked on just about the fastest get-acquainted crusade Plymouth political circles have seen in many a day.

Thomas, party unknown, also is said to be eyeing the same swivel chair at Lansing. Neither has confirmed nor denied his candidacy — at this time.

What would you think of Jim Rossman, our deposed superintendent of schools, joining the fray as an opponent to Maurice Breen for the Republican nomination for Plymouth Township supervisor? For the nonce, just be satisfied with the information that he is being coaxed to do just that.

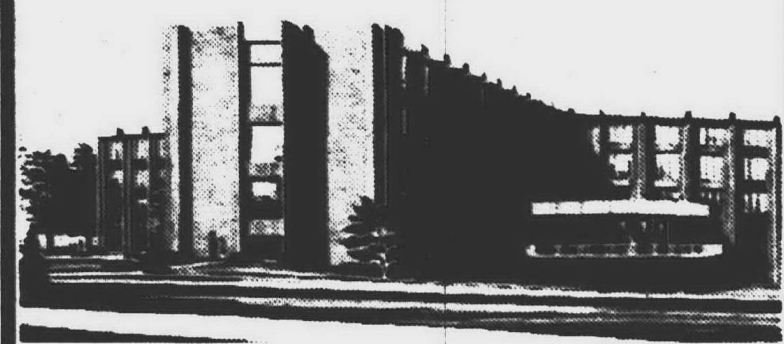

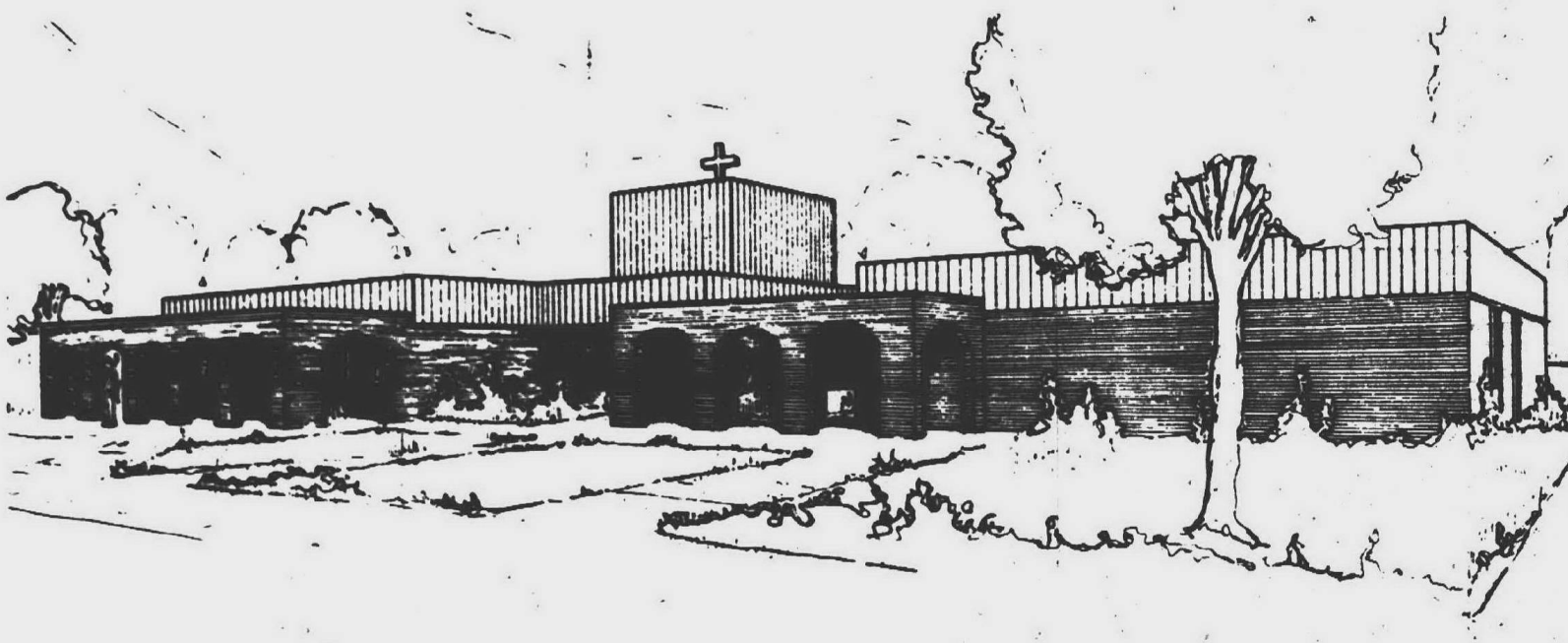

St. Aidan Church Launches Parish Development Program

St. Aidan Catholic parish in Livonia will begin Sunday, June 4, a development fund program designed to renovate and expand its present building.

The parish hopes to make architectural changes and construct four multi-purpose classrooms for the church, located at Farmington Road at Six Mile. Estimated cost is \$250,000.

A team of 80 workers will visit each member of the parish, asking a donation over the normal weekly offering to cover the cost of the expansion program.

THE PRESENT St. Aidan structure, built nine years ago, was intended originally as one that would house a new parish temporarily and then be used for schoolrooms.

But with the Detroit arch-

diocese trend away from parochial schools in each parish, that idea had to be changed.

The Rev. J. Edward Seifen, St. Aidan pastor, said the present plan was worked out after serious consideration of various alternatives open to the parish.

He said he had worked with the Parish Council to develop it, and added that all concerned felt "this is the best course of action to take in order to keep St. Aidan's vibrant powerhouse of faith it has been in this area for the past nine years."

The renovation will make the building more "church-like" said a brochure to be distributed in connection with the development fund program, and the multi-purpose nature of the new classrooms will enable St.

DeFiore urged prompt action on the part of St. Aidan members, adding this is the time for the parish to move on a project that will aid all its people.

HE MIGHT just as well have been ordained, for his parishioners recall him having exercised all the sacramental and preaching functions of the Methodist ministry. And according to one of his successors as pastor of the church, the Rev. George Groh:

"He was very much loved by his congregation." Parishioner Esther Mills recalls, "George was a very good preacher, with an excellent delivery. He wasn't a backslapper, although he called on people a lot. And you know, he wrote us a letter on our 50th wedding anniversary."

McGOVERN'S BIOGRAPHER, former Time magazine staffer Robert Sam Anson, makes brief mention of this one year pastorate, in a book with which McGovern cooperated, but readily agreed to make no attempt to edit. As a result, Anson claims the South Dakota senator left the ministry and switched to teaching, because:

"He had long since become disillusioned of the value of organized religion." But during an exclusive interview, the senator told me: "I think Anson has superimposed his own views. I have talked about the limitations of the church -- and of all other human institutions for that matter -- but the church has played an enormous and generally uplifting role in human society."

McGovern went on to disagree with his biographer's speculations that he left the ministry because of scanty attendance at services, a greater desire to write sermons than minister to the bereaved, and disillusionment with a hierarchy which was overly concerned with money. "That was a cheap shot,"

commented the senator. "The hierarchy I served under weren't at all like that. I just remember hearing one district superintendent from another area mention a \$10,000 (salary) church which I thought was a bit mercenary. As for my own congregation, the size doubled."

"Sure, I liked to preach, but I believe I demonstrated that ministering to the bereaved was every bit as important. I left only because I didn't feel I was cut out for the ceremonial functions and administrative minutiae of the parochial ministry."

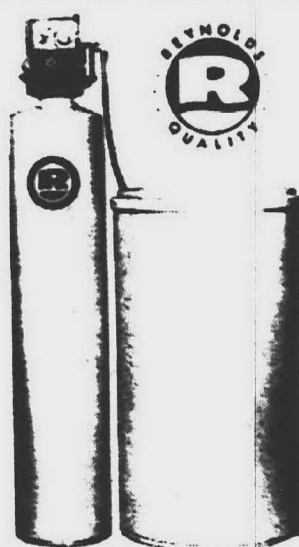

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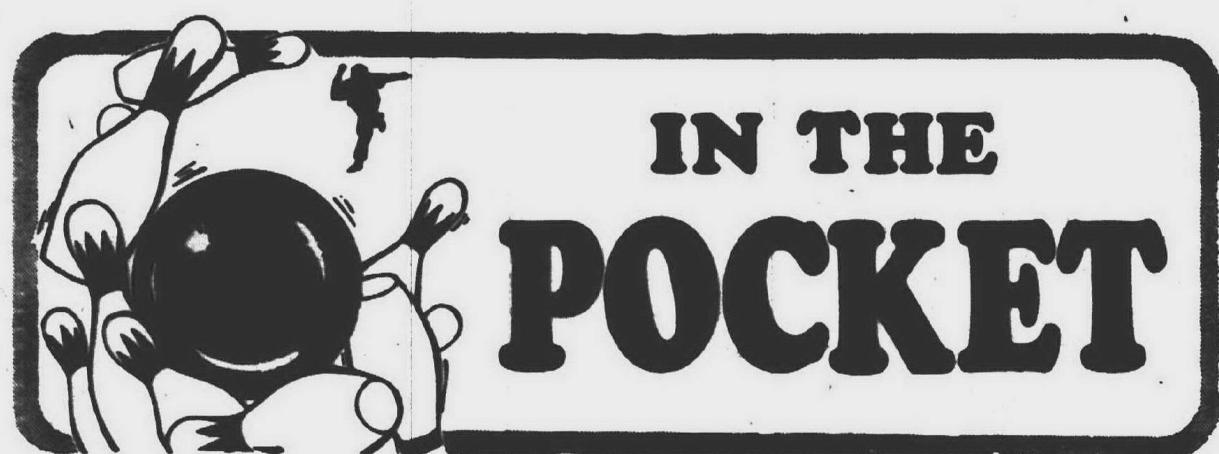

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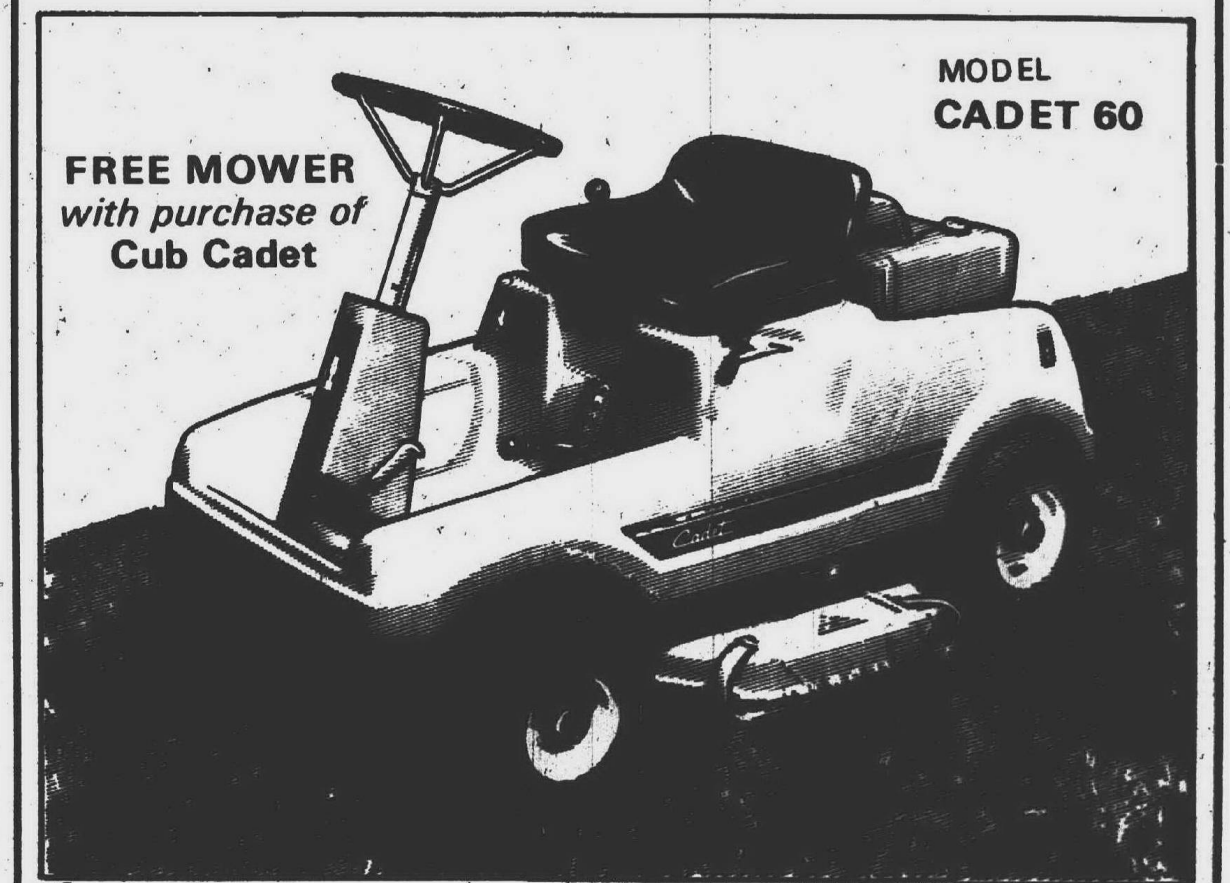
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Les Anders Finale Favors Wayne Over Falcons

The doings at Wolverine Raceway continue to astound everyone close to the racing picture. Just a week ago the track had purses totaling \$66,000 for the 10 races on Saturday, the most ever offered for a program that didn't include a rich early closing stake.

That seemed like the high point of the meeting, which is scheduled to end on June 30, but Vice President and General Manager Richard Wilson and Racing Secretary Ron Giehl put their heads together and came up with \$66,200 for tonight's (Saturday) card.

Those who attended the races a week ago and thought they had seen the best program ever in Michigan will have another treat in store tonight...the racing figures to be even better than last Saturday.

The \$10,000 invitational has six starters but seldom have Michigan harness racing enthusiasts seen so much class in an overnight event.

Heading the cast is Windy Way, winner of the invitational last Saturday, who is the likely favorite. But the going may be much tougher this time since Korkie Woolen, star of the Russell Valles Key stable from California, needed a race over the big mile track and he had it.

Matter of fact, Korkie Woolen had the lead for the better part of three laps Saturday before Wilting and Windy Way came charging by for the decision.

OTHERS in the field include: Bramble Hall, winner two weeks back; Scram, another import from the west coast; Shiaway Lad and Tricky Dale.

There'll be more than the usual interest in the ninth race, a preferred pace with a value of \$6,300, which brings Creeder Limbo, the spectacular three-year-old, back to the attention of fans.

The most talked-of pacer at the winter Northville Downs meeting, the colt was shipped east for a stake with Driver Tom Harmer in charge. Shortly before the race, Creeder Limbo collided with another pacer and suffered bruised legs...bruised enough to keep him idle for several weeks.

Creeder is in a bit rough this time. He goes against seven challengers including: Kimtrader, Chief Okemos, Baby Tears, Saucy Wave, Freight Catch, Knox Abbe and Spring's Pride.

Incidentally, Saucy Wave is another three-year-old who has been attracting a great deal of attention. It could be a duel between the two sophomores all the way in what may develop into one of the best races of the meeting.

THE \$8,000 invitational matches a field of eight with Gaviland, winner a week ago, tangling with Apropos, the three-year-old from the Chris Boring stable that has bettered 2:00 twice in three weeks.

Other starting are: Mighty Fire, Knox Patch, Trench Coat, Keystone Aaron, Yankee Creed and Local Time.

All in all it appears to be the kind of card that one interested in the pacers and trotters can't afford to miss.

We won't mention the possibility of a million dollar night inasmuch as we indicated a week ago that if Wolverine didn't make a million on the holiday Saturday, it wouldn't hit the target this season.

We'll stand by that regardless of the much publicized appearance of the great Albatross on June 18 combined with the annual "Good Ol' Times" celebration.

IN WHAT APPEARS to be strictly a matter of bookkeeping, control of the Detroit Racing Association has passed from Fred Van Lennep and the estate of Frances Dodge Van Lennep to Castleton Industries Inc.

The "purchase" was announced Wednesday with no price mentioned and no further comment from Castleton officials.

Van Lennep, who operated Castleton Farm in Lexington, Ky. with his late wife, negotiated the purchase of the Detroit Race Course from Dale Shaffer in 1968 for a reported price of \$13.5 million.

He became chairman of the board of the new Detroit Racing Association of which Jack Davis, a former Ford

Motor Co. executive, is the president.

JUDGING from the performances of Michigan's two and three-year-old pacers and trotters during the series of eight \$5,000 events at Wolverine Raceway, Chris Boring of Adrian may have two state champions in his stable.

Alshire Scamp, a three-year-old son of Elby Hanover owned by the Maple City stable of Adrian, trotted away from his competition to win by eight lengths in 2:07.

The Scamp, who was one of the best of the two-year-olds of 1971, took the lead from the start, dueling with Mr. Colwell to the top of the stretch and then pulled away in convincing style for the easy victory.

Chris also is handling Some Dreamer, an Adios Cleo filly owned by Mal Linehan of Adrian, in the two-year-old filly pacing division.

Some Dreamer made up more than four lengths in the stretch to win in 2:08. It was an amazing performance and demonstrated that the juvenile filly will be tough to beat when the season long stakes series resumes on the county fair circuit.

And it's nice to see Mal, who also serves in the judges stand at Wolverine on occasion, come up with a good one. He has owned pacers and trotters for years and is still waiting for that one great horse that's the dream of every standardbred owner.

McDonald's Lead Pushed Too Far

PONTIAC Congressman Jack McDonald almost snatched defeat from the jaws of victory.

McDonald, heavily favored by Republican precinct delegates in his battle against fellow Congressman William Broomfield in the newly reapportioned 19th District, pushed his luck too far Wednesday when his supporters asked delegates to endorse McDonald.

Delegates to the old 19th-Oakland district convention were willing to give McDonald two standing ovations and only polite applause to Broomfield, but they wouldn't stand for a party endorsement of a candidate in a primary.

After 37 minutes of floor debate and research in Robert's "Rules of Order," the convention adjourned without endorsing McDonald and without deciding on a followup resolution asking Broomfield to run in the new 18th District.

THE BATTLEGROUND was set up by a Democratic reapportionment plan.

McDonald was supervisor of Redford Township in 1966 when he won election in the old 19th District, which included western Wayne and western Oakland counties. Anticipating reapportionment, McDonald two years ago shifted his residence to a Farmington Township apartment, putting himself in the Oakland portion of the district.

Reapportionment, however, put even Farmington into Democrat Martha Griffiths' new 17th District (which also includes northwest Detroit, Redford and Southfield). So McDonald moved to Waterford Township, safely in the new 19th.

Broomfield was a state legislator from Royal Oak when in 1956 he won a congressional seat in the 18th District, which at the time included all of Oakland County. Reapportionment after the 1960 census left him only the eastern portion of Oakland.

The 1972 reapportionment cut his Oakland territory even more and assigned him Democratic territory from Macomb County. Calling on old loyalties, Broomfield

shifted his residence to Bloomfield Township and decided to run in the new 19th - against McDonald.

THUS, BOTH incumbent congressmen changed residences to run in the new 19th, but the overwhelming sentiment was against Broomfield's move.

McDonald told Observer Newspapers that of the 467,000 persons in the new 19th, 318,000 were from his old 19th, 126,000 from Broomfield's old 18th and 22,000 from the old 2nd.

Among Oakland Republican precinct delegates, the prevailing sentiment was that Broomfield, with his great ability to draw Democratic votes, should have stuck it out in the new 18th.

There was applause at the 18th District convention when McDonald denounced the reapportionment plan and declared: "Oakland County - needs and deserves two Republican congressmen. The only way to get them is if the 19th District congressman

runs in the 19th and the 18th district congressman runs in the 18th...Both can win."

McDonald's 10-minute talk assailed Democrats and praised President Nixon on foreign policy, welfare reform, the economy and revenue sharing.

Broomfield, on the other hand, recalled "old loyalties and friendships" in the western part of the county, adding: "I was born in Oakland County - BORN in Oakland County." (McDonald was born in Detroit.)

IDEOLOGICALLY, there is little to separate the two men.

Broomfield has a better reputation for "case work" - ombudsman work for constituents. Broomfield's specialty has been foreign affairs; he has been on the delegation to the United Nations and is third ranking Republican on the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

On the cross-district school busing issue, Broomfield has succeeded in getting the higher education bill amended to prohibit any busing until all court appeals are settled, while McDonald has plunked hard for HJR 620, the proposed constitutional amendment to bar busing. McDonald's committee work has been in public works and the merchant marine.

Their impending clash has saddened most Oakland Republicans. Even those who favored McDonald were embarrassed by, and successfully talked down, the resolution giving him a party endorsement - a resolution that McDonald certainly knew about ahead of time.

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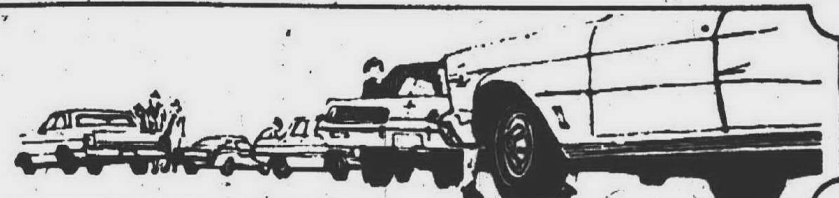

The factors of conformation, finish, and quality are the measuring sticks used in judging beef, veal, pork, lamb and mutton, but they differ to some extent with each of the five meats. For example, veal shows practically no marbling of fat with the lean; consequently the flesh is less firm than is found in comparable grades of beef. Veal also has a moderately thin outside covering of fat as compared with beef. Generally speaking, the fat of each kind of meat is progressively firmer as the meat increases in grade. Lamb and mutton produce the hardest fat with the highest melting point, while pork fat is the softest with the lowest melting point.

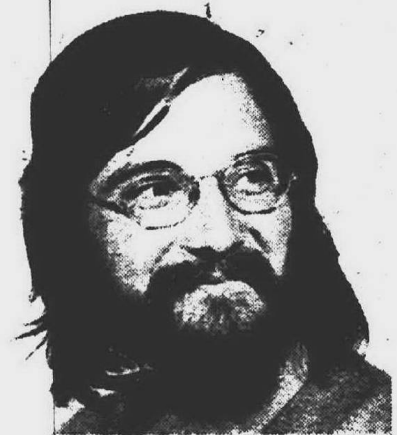
Plymouth Student To Perform On TV

Teens Are Long On Fashion Know-How, Survey Finds

Teen-age girls appear to be more fashion conscious than middle-aged women, but less sure in their buying choices, a University of Michigan study indicates.

Claude R. Martin Jr., U-M assistant professor of marketing, directed surveys of retail sales personnel, management officials and consumers in four Southwestern states.

He reveals some of the differences and similarities between two generations of women shoppers in "A Comparison of Fashion-Buying Behavior Between Teen-Age Girls and Middle-Aged Women," a working paper published by the Bureau of Business Research of the U-M Graduate School of Business Administration.

"There are notable differences in the purchasing and shopping behavior of teen-age girls and middle-aged women," Prof. Martin concludes. "The teen-ager shops for clothing in more stores and in more different types of stores. She enters the market place with less preplanning and fewer predispositions, and relies less on newspapers and sales clerks in her decision process. She relies more on her peer group. The teen-ager's

fashion awareness is shaped primarily by fashion magazines, and she tends to shop with others."

The boutique, a new kind of retail shop aimed primarily at the younger market, has been particularly successful with youthful consumers, Martin reveals, adding: "Other retailers get the teen-age girl inside their stores, but are not very successful in selling to her."

"The newspaper has little influence on the teen-ager's purchase decision," Martin continues, "nor does it contribute to her fashion consciousness. Evidence also indicates that selling to the teen-age girl is not accomplished by sales clerks or fashion shows, but by point-of-purchase displays aimed at her specific tastes."

"Certainly she is different from the older woman--she is a more active shopper, she is more aware of current fashion, and she enters the market place with less predisposition toward either the place of purchase or the merchandise to be sold."

The responses by more than

350 women shoppers indicate that the older women (between the ages of 30 and 50) may also be highly aware of fashions, but that they place far more importance on in-store shopping and

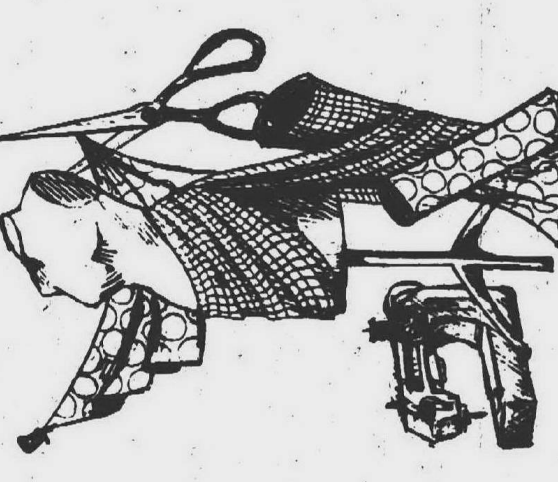
newspaper advertisements or editorial content in making purchase decisions, according to the U-M study. Older women are much less apt to take a companion on a shopping trip.

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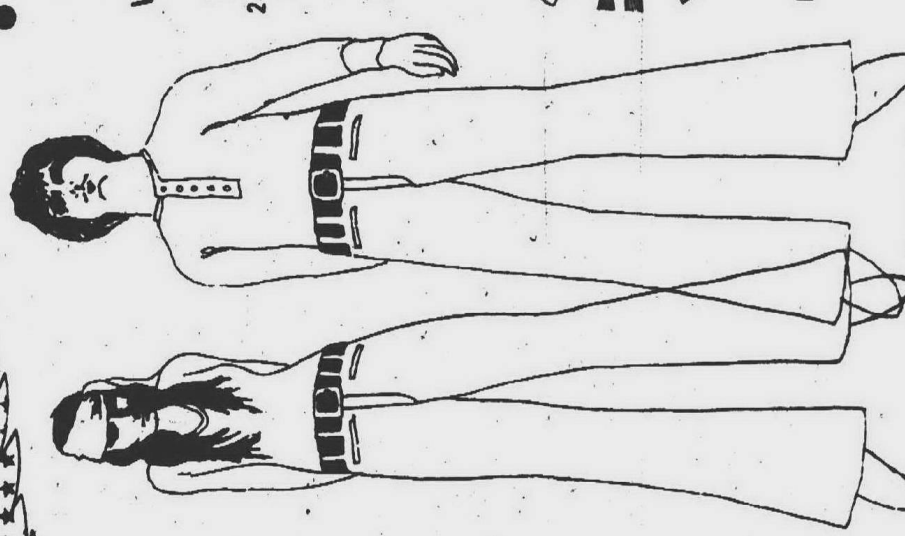
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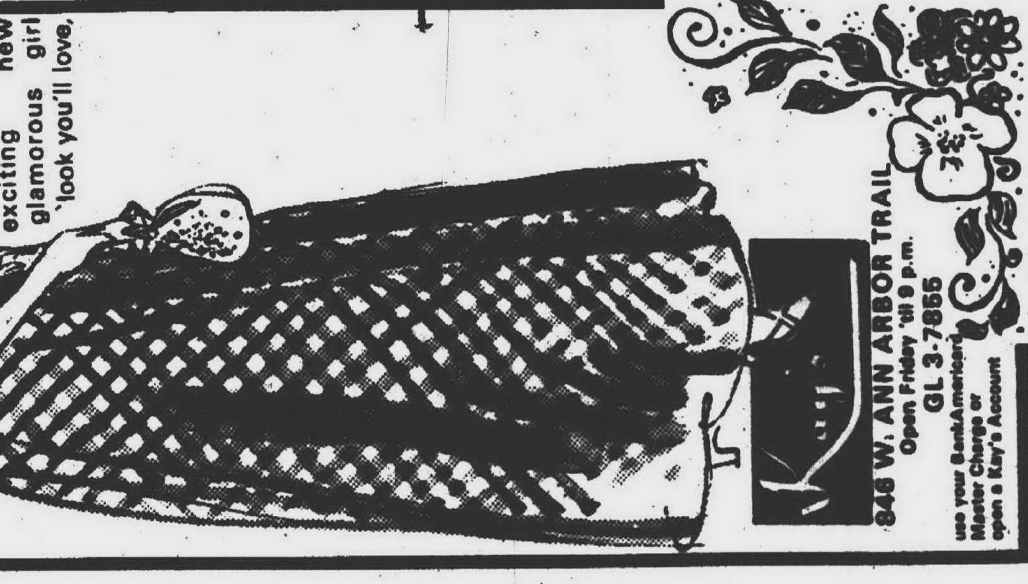
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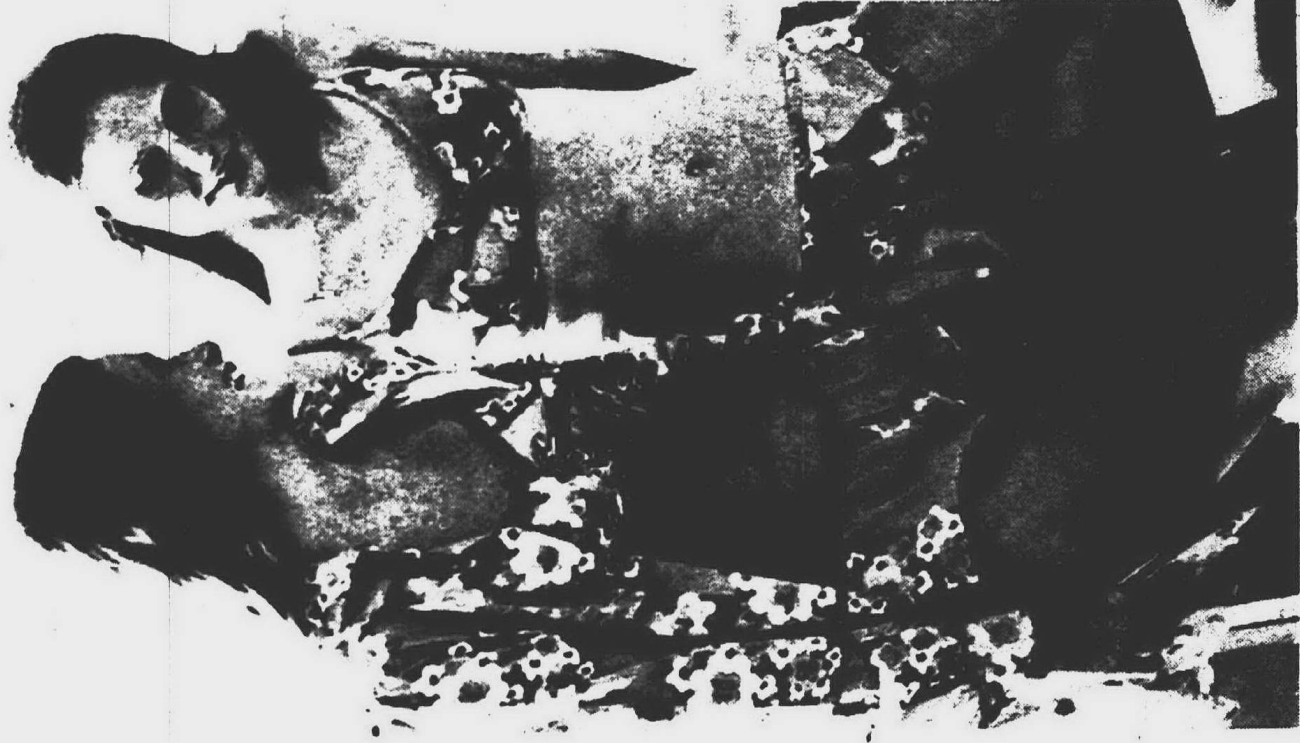
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There's A Cover Story In New Beach Wear

And of course they add immeasurably to the fashion picture.

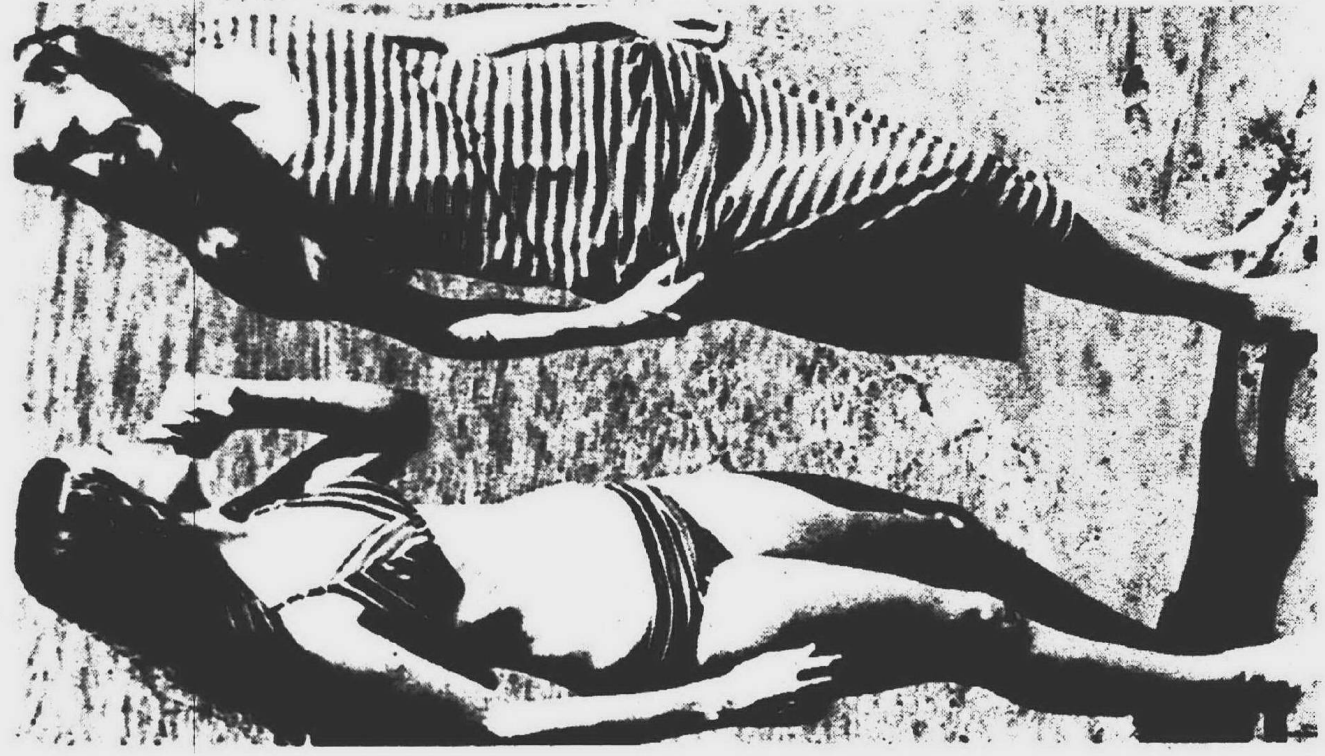
You can choose your cover in a long-sleeved floral shirt top like the set at the left or pick a striped shirt that falls ankle-length over a bikini that also sports stripes.

Shifts and pant-dresses stay in the scene for casual wear. Many women are trying a new longer culotte and finding it flattering.

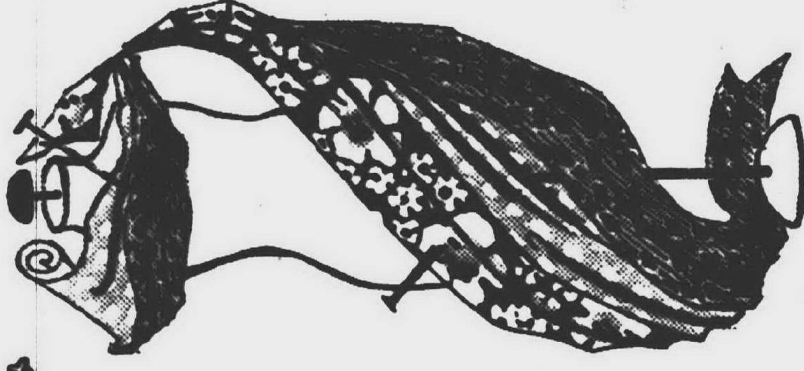
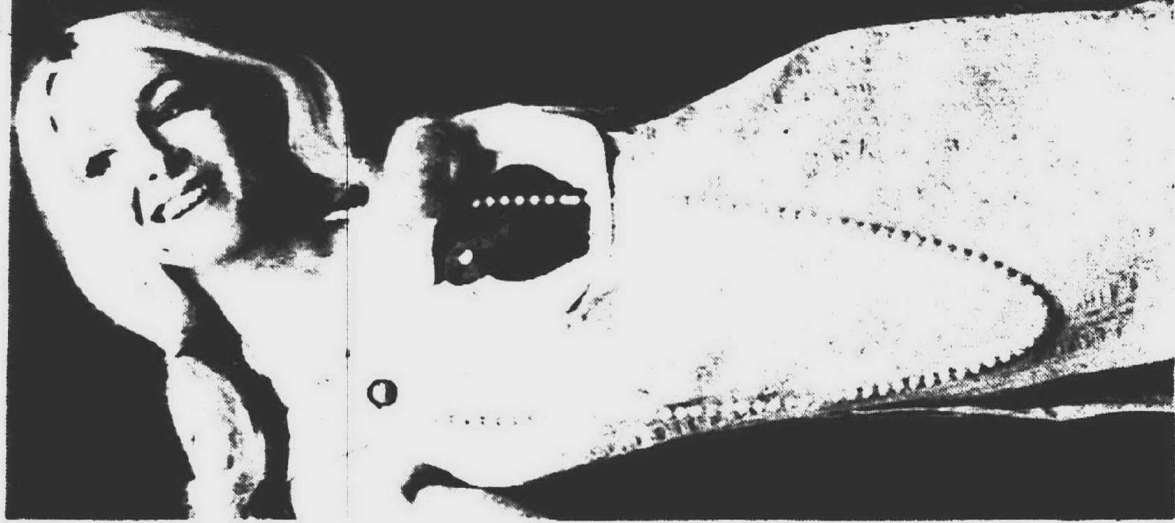
In jackets, the blazer keeps its hold on top favor. The youngest customers are buying single-button styles for a more tightly fitted look, but the two and three button variety also remains popular.
