Crenshaw Court Exam Postponed

For the second time within a week, the pre-trial examination for Donald Alan Crenshaw, 29, accused of the May 31 shooting of Charles P. Finlan, has been postponed. The new date has been set for Wednesday, June 21, before Judge Dunbar Davis in Plymouth.

Originally scheduled for June 12, the examination was

rescheduled for yesterday (Friday). The second postponement was granted late Thursday.

Crenshaw is free on \$35,000 cash bond, having been released from the Plymouth jail June 8 when his attorney, William VanderKloot, posted the bond.

At the time of Crenshaw's arraignment, Davis set bond

at \$25,000. This was reduced by Circuit Judge Nathan J. Kaufman at the request of the defense attorney.

Finlan, as of Friday, was still confined in Wayne County General Hospital. His condition was reported as "fair."

He is paralyzed from the waist down after being shot four times in the parking lot outside his officer at 500 S. Main.

Finlan estimated it would be six months before he will be able to return to work.

Until June 7, Finlan was on the critical list. He had been removed from the intensive care unit and moved to a private room earlier.

Finlan has declined to discuss publicly any aspects of the shooting.

Roth Appeal To Include Plymouth?

Even though the Plymouth School District was not included in Judge Stephen J. Roth's cross-district busing order, there are indications that the local board of education will join with other metropolitan districts in appealing the decision to the Supreme Court.

Throughout the community, conversations that followed Roth's ruling Wednesday indicated a sense of relief that Plymouth had been excluded from the 53 school districts that have been ordered to start busing in September to end racial segregation in Detroit schools.

The reason for Plymouth's exclusion obviously is the district's distance from Detroit.

Nonetheless, a broadening of the cross-district plan still can be ordered by the court. Also, it is within the authority of the nine-man panel that was created to work out busing details to recommend inclusion of more suburban school districts if it feels this is necessary to accomplish effective desegregation.

SUPT. JOHN M. HOBEN said Thursday he believes the Plymouth district should continue to cooperate with the other metropolitan districts who agreed some months ago on joint intervention in the case.

"Yes, we would be part of the appeal," he stated.

"Our stance really hasn't changed, even though we were left out of the immediate busing order," said Hoben. "We strongly support the neighborhood school concept. We, too, want to see a quality education program throughout the metropolitan area, but it can't be accomplished by busing."

Mrs. Esther Hulsing, retiring president of the school board, said that she also favors Plymouth continuing its alliance with other tri-county districts, even though not directly involved at this time.

A SOMEWHAT different but related problem was voiced by George Lawton, treasurer of the board. After Mrs. Hulsing's retirement at the end of June, Lawton will be the board's senior member and is a strong possibility for the role of president. He also is a member of the Canton Township Planning Commission.

Lawton expressed the view that "white flight" may accelerate the population explosion already under way here.

"Our basic responsibility is to provide an education for the young people in our own district," said Lawton.

"Now we will be forced into a difficult situation to provide facilities to meet the growth coming from the Roth case even though that case itself is not in the area of our board's authority."

Howe Is Named Starkweather's New Principal

John Howe, a Plymouth teacher for 15 years, will take over as principal of Starkweather Elementary School in July following the retirement of Mildred Field.

Currently a classroom teacher in Starkweather, Howe, 45, got a pledge of support from Starkweather teachers after the announcement was made at Monday's board meeting.

Originally the board had planned to re-institute the intern program, having two interns split their time directing the school. Plans were changed as budget revisions were made eliminating the intern program as too costly.

Howe has taught fourth and fifth grades at Starkweather for the past nine years. Previously he spent six years as a physical education teacher traveling between Gallimore, Bird, Farrand, Hough, Truesdell and Cherry Hill Elementary Schools in Plymouth.

TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDINANCE NO. XXIV-B '72

REFRIGERATING SYSTEMS ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. XXIV, (REFRIGERATING SYSTEMS) REGULATING THE SAFE DESIGN, CONSTRUCTION, INSTALLATION, ALTERATION, INSPECTION, TESTING, MAINTENANCE AND LICENSING OF REFRIGERATING SYSTEMS AND APPURTENANCES THEREOF IN THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH, AND TO REPEAL ALL ORDINANCES AND REGULATIONS INCONSISTENT WITH ANY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE.

THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

PART I. That Ordinance No. XXIV, known as the Refrigerating Systems Ordinance of the Township of Plymouth, Wayne County, Michigan, be and the same hereby is amended to read as follows:

Section 1.0. Scope. This Ordinance shall apply to new refrigerating systems hereafter installed, to the replacement of used equipment, to existing refrigerating systems, and to the servicing, alterations or additions to existing refrigerating systems subsequent to its adoption. This Ordinance does not apply to refrigerating systems using water as the refrigerant, nor to refrigerating systems installed in aircraft, railway cars, waterborne craft, motor vehicles and motor driven vehicles with refrigerants designated as Group I Refrigerants in the American National Standard Safety Code for Mechanical Refrigeration, ANSI B 9.1, adopted for the purpose of this Ordinance in Sec. 10.5.

Section 1.1. ANSI Standard. All refrigerating systems shall be constructed, installed and maintained in accordance with the provisions of the American National Standard Safety Code for Mechanical Refrigeration, ANSI B 9.1, adopted for the purpose of this Ordinance in Sec. 10.5, and with the rules adopted herein. This Code provides reasonable safeguards to life, limb, health, and property, defines certain practices which are inconsistent with safety, and prescribes standards of safety which will properly influence future progress and developments in refrigerating systems.

Section 2.2. Alter. The addition to or removal of any equipment or refrigerant in a refrigerating system by which the refrigerant, refrigerant capacity, refrigerating capacity, pressure allowed or location of any part of the system is changed, Major replacements, as defined in Section 2.1.0, shall be considered as alterations.

Section 2.3. Application for Contractor License. Application for Refrigeration Contractor License shall be made on forms furnished for such purpose by the Department. The application, in affidavit form shall, as a minimum, provide the following information:

1. Name, age and address of applicant;
2. Refrigeration experience of applicant, including refrigerants and sizes of equipment;
3. If applicant is a corporation:
 - a. Full and accurate corporate name;
 - b. When and where incorporated;
 - c. Name and refrigeration experience of officer or supervising employee designated to take the examination for the corporation;
4. If the applicant is a partnership,
 - a. Names and addresses of members thereof and the name and refrigeration experience of the partner or supervising employee designated to take the examination for the partnership;
5. If the applicant conducts business under a trade or assumed name, the following additional information shall be given:
 - a. Complete and full trade name;
 - b. Name of the person or persons doing business under such trade or assumed name;

Section 3.10. Home Owners Installations. Nothing herein contained shall prohibit a bona fide owner of a one-family dwelling as provided in the Zoning Ordinance which is, or will be on completion, the owner's place of residence, from personally installing therein refrigerating systems regulated hereunder.

Provided that the said owner shall:

- (a) Sign an affidavit on a form furnished by the Department showing the applicant to be the bona fide owner and occupant, or will be the occupant on completion of the residence; and that the applicant will personally install the equipment therein for which the permit is requested.
- (b) Pass an examination showing that the applicant is possessed of the necessary qualifications for installing such equipment in accordance with the applicable provisions thereof. Such examination may be oral or written and may include practical demonstrations.
- (c) Apply for and secure the required permit or permits.
- (d) Obtain the required inspection within seventy-two (72) hours after the installation has been completed and the equipment placed in operation.

Section 6.0. Permits Required. No person shall install, alter or make major replacements in any part of a refrigerating system without first securing a permit from the Department, except as exempted from such requirement by Section 6.1; provided that, in case of emergency, the permit shall be obtained within seventy-two (72) hours from the time that the installation, alteration or major replacement was started. Permits shall be issued only to persons licensed by the Department as Refrigeration Contractors, except as

TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDINANCE NO. 24 C-72

REFRIGERATION SYSTEMS CODES

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE SAFE DESIGN, CONSTRUCTION, INSTALLATION, ALTERATION, INSPECTION, TESTING, MAINTENANCE AND LICENSING OF REFRIGERATING SYSTEMS AND APPURTENANCES THEREOF IN THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH, MICHIGAN, AND TO REPEAL ALL ORDINANCES AND REGULATIONS INCONSISTENT WITH ANY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE.

THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

The Refrigerating Systems Code. The Refrigerating Systems Code, subject to the following amendments, is hereby adopted by reference:

Definitions. The words "Commission," "Board of Appeals," "Township," and "Department" in the Refrigerating Systems Code shall mean respectively the "Building Inspector," "Township Board of Appeals," the "Township of Plymouth" and the "Township Clerk."

Section 3.1 of the Refrigerating Systems Code is hereby deleted from said code and alternate Section 3.1 of said code is hereby adopted and amended so as to designate the Board of Examiners of the City of Detroit, Michigan, as the Board of Examiners of the Township of Plymouth.

Section 9.5: EFFECT, CLAUSE of the Refrigerating Systems Code is adopted as follows:

This Ordinance is hereby declared necessary for the preservation of the peace, health, safety and welfare of the Township of Plymouth and shall take effect 30 days after its passage.

THROUGH BIFOCALS

IT WOULD SEEM that with the school election now a matter of history, a relaxing summer might be in the offing for the administration and our board of education. After all, it's vacation time for the kids, and what possibly would there be for the brass to do between now and Labor Day?

The answer, of course, is that there actually is much of importance that must be decided during the weeks of summer, even though none of it may stir community interest to the same degree as the election.

There must be an overhaul of the budget in light of the rejection of the two supplementary one-mill tax proposals. Plans must be completed for the occupancy of the new Canton facility which will operate as part of the high school set-up.

The James Rossman case is far from dead, and there are many internal procedural and personnel matters with which the administration must wrestle, with board guidance. And, oh, yes, there's the matter of a new contract with the PEA.

FOR TWO YEARS in a row the great unwashed public has been told in early spring by the negotiating teams of both sides that every effort would be extended to complete a new contract between teachers and board by the time school was out.

They didn't make it in '71, and they didn't make it in '72. The big reason for the current impasse is the same one that it always has been—money.

Ultimately there will be a compromise, as there invariably is. But at the moment the PEA is asking more than the administration bargainers will give. One wishes they could agree as quickly as their counterparts did in Birmingham last week, and at no worse a rap for the taxpayers.

The settlement in that posh suburb gives the teachers a 4.9 per cent boost next year in salary and fringe benefits, and that includes those annual built-in longevity raises called increments. Bear that in mind in the weeks ahead and see how it compares with Plymouth's final settlement.

RESULTS OF MONDAY'S voting must be considered as highly satisfying. We wound up with three fine persons gaining positions as new members of the board. Also, approval of the five-mill renewal demonstrated Plymouth's belief that fine educational processes must be sustained.

Of great significance was the old board's willingness to heed the public voice and immediately name Carl Berry to fill the John Hanksat vacancy after Carl had polled the third largest number of votes.

Legally, this did not have to be done. However, the timing of the situation was such that the decision was evidence of statesmanship which the board has not always demonstrated. It also can stand as an example for our City Commission to follow when faced with a parallel appointment.

And what politics will now dominate local conversations? Well, in case you have forgotten, 4 p.m. Tuesday in the deadline for filing for the rest of our elective offices, and at Plymouth Township Hall in particular the line may be a long one.

Licenses Are Sought

CANTON TOWNSHIP Two requests for Canton Township's three remaining Class C liquor licenses are under consideration by Canton trustees.

One, filed last month, is from an Ann Arbor man who plans to convert an industrial

building on Michigan Ave. into a bar-restaurant pending approval of building plans by the township and the State Liquor Control Commission.

THE SECOND request came at the June meeting of trustees from officials of the Anchor Inn restaurant chain.

The proposal, as outlined by a spokesman, said that a new building would be built on a 2½ acre site on the north side of Ford Rd. and the east side of Canton Center Rd.

The combination cocktail lounge-dining room would have approximately 10,000 to 12,000 square feet with banquet facilities.

Trustees were invited to view first-hand the two other Anchor Inns located in the area. One is in the Kmart shopping center in Redford Township and the other is in the downriver community of Riverview.

"A Class C liquor license is an absolute necessity to our operation," said a spokesman representing the restaurant owner.

5,000 Cheer PHS Seniors

Plymouth High School's first commencement program in the new football stadium drew more than 5,000 persons Wednesday night as 615 members of the Class of 1972 received diplomas.

The open-air program was impressively staged, and despite day-long storm warnings the rain which might have devastated the affair held off until later in the night.

A highlight was the presentation to Mrs. Esther Hulsing, retiring president of the board of education, of a resolution commending her for her many years of public service which had been adopted by the Michigan Senate and House of Representatives.

The presentation was made by Sen. Carl Pursell of Plymouth.

BILL BONDS, WXYZ-TV newscaster who was the choice of the senior class for guest speaker, decried prejudices which he finds rampant in the nation and declared, "To live is to act and to die."

"Welcome to the instant society," was Bonds' opening comment to the graduating class. He then emphasized that in his view "we are in a value crisis."

"Detroit schools are broke, and yet people are talking about building a domed stadium even while thousands will bed down tonight with rats and cockroaches," said Bonds as he pointed to a need for reevaluation of priorities.

Other speakers included Principal Bill Brown, who praised the seniors for their accomplishments; class president Tom Gottschalk, and Mrs. Bonnie Dore of the high school faculty who declared:

"Not only are you the best we have, you are the best we have ever had."

POET MAX Ellison, a former Plymouth School District resident, opened the ceremony with the reading of an original poem, and Rev. Robert Shank delivered both the invocation and benediction.

Seniors were seated in a special section of chairs on the

football field, and their processional onto the gridiron had the accompaniment of the high school band. They were presented diplomas by Mrs. Hulsing and other school board members.

A Non-Game Of Life

The time of the year has come around again when us adults (ahem) give the annual pat on the head to the year's crop of graduating seniors and send them on their way into the world outside.

Not really. They are mostly going to college, a fact that dominates the attitudes of seniors in some suburban schools so thoroughly that they duck graduation ceremonies.

So many college credits have been compiled that the ceremony of the high school diploma kind of slides by, something like a giant report card.

GRADUATION is a chance for some of us adults to get a chance at a captive audience at commencement. Unfortunately, not many commencement speakers are very candid about the world the students are about to enter.

Some of this is due to the basic inexperience of the average commencement speaker—he is not really a part of the world the kids are living in, knows precious little more about it than those eager young faces.

The speaker probably knows, too, that life is not like a game. It is more like a game played in a secret stadium, with a different rule book for each player, with the players paying admission and the audience getting in free.

BUT MOST OF US like to give advice to young people, and mine, if anybody asks, is this:

- Learn technology, whether or not you think it concerns you. It does. Learn about machines and civil rights, machines and cities, machines and ecology, machines and politics, machines and the unions.

- Work backwards through your heroes. Find how somebody you admire lived his life when he was your age. This protects you from idealism. Your father will probably lie to you. Find out why.

- All human beings are alike. One way in which they are alike is they all feel they are different from everybody else. Remember this and you will offend only those you really want to.

- Remember all occupations, with the exception of unskilled labor, pay pretty much the same, regardless of what your mother tells you. You also can get rich doing about anything, with luck. Is Heroin Addiction Curable?

Questions should be sent to the Community Commission on Drug Abuse, P.O. Box 48151, Livonia, 48151.

Q. If you become addicted to heroin, are you an addict for the rest of your life? I was certain that there were cures for heroin addiction; some of my friends say they have heard "Once a junkie, always a junkie." What's the answer?

A. The question you raise is certainly an interesting one. Five years ago the answer would almost undoubtedly

have been that heroin addiction was a lifetime proposition. More recently, the answer would most likely

have been that heroin addiction could be cured. Today, thanks to our greatly advanced knowledge, we can state confidently that we are not sure.

The problem revolves around one point: Does heroin addiction produce irreversible changes in body chemistry which create a lifetime need for heroin or other narcotic substances? Oddly enough, the strongest proponents of the concept that addiction is "forever" are the developers of the methadone treatment—to date the most widely used "cure".

There is a larger body of experts who claim to have documented that such addictions are reversible. The preponderance of evidence to date would seem to support this more optimistic theory. What remains, unfortunately, is the simple fact that the high relapse rate for addicts is almost impossible to explain by any simple theory.

What clouds the issue is an undeniably strong, and sometimes overwhelming, psychological desire to return to an addicting drug such as heroin. This makes it more difficult to determine whether there is in fact an underlying physical need to "shoot up." There does seem to be a number of addicts who can be classified as "cured." Such classifications are of necessity rather arbitrary. Just as a cancer patient who has not had a re-occurrence of the disease within five years of treatment is arbitrarily classified as cured, so could an addict who has not returned to drugs for a comparable period of time be classified. And yes, there are a number of such people around.

Perhaps the most important point to stress from a practical point of view is that getting off of such drugs—and staying off—is an extremely difficult thing to do. There is a distressingly high number of people who just don't respond to any sort of treatment—be it self-help, medical supervision, psychological or psychiatric treatment. Of these people it would have to be said, however reluctantly, "Once a junkie, always a junkie."

These are the unfortunates who should be borne in mind by anyone who has even the remotest idea of trying addicting drugs. Because they too, at some earlier time, wanted to try it... "just once."

Deep Rest Is Subject Of Lecture

John Lyons of the International Meditation Society will lecture on deep rest at 8:30 p.m. Tuesday, June 20, in the social hall of St. Kenneth Catholic Church, 14951 Haggerty, Plymouth.

The International Meditation Society is a non-profit educational

organization that advocates the techniques of transcendental meditation as taught by Maharshi Meher Yogi.

J. Andre Tardif, religious education coordinator at St. Kenneth, said the lecture was being offered as a public service to the area.

"Recently I came across the International Meditation Society and its technique for deep rest, and I was naturally cynical and doubtful," he said.

"But I became more interested upon knowing that it was neither a philosophy or a religion. It is just a good way of overcoming the anxieties and tensions which cause people so much frustration and fatigue today."

Rev. Lester Kinsolving's Religion Update

The changing of the name of the Presbytery of Southeast Missouri to the Lovejoy Presbytery, by action of the Presbyterian General Assembly meeting in Denver, is a long-deserved tribute to one of the nation's most courageous journalists, the Rev. Elijah P. Lovejoy.

Both a Presbyterian minister and editor of "The Alton Observer" in Illinois, a strong anti-slavery newspaper, Lovejoy was shot and killed by a mob on Nov. 7, 1837.

His martyrdom (as Abraham Lincoln put it) in the cause of freedom of the press was vividly demonstrated when he was shot five times while trying to defend his printing press from the hands of a pro-slavery mob which was setting fire to the warehouse where the press had been installed.

Three previous presses had been seized by critics and thrown into the Mississippi, the first of these having been brought from St. Louis, where another mob had severely damaged it. Lovejoy had excommunicated St. Louis for the atrocity in which a free Negro had been tied to a tree and burned alive.

AN IMPRESSIVE monument has been erected in Alton near Lovejoy's grave. Its two eagles and an angel on tall columns were designed to symbolize the ultimate triumph of Lovejoy — whose assassination provoked a

storm of protest from editors all over the North and West, as well as the dedication of his life to anti-slavery by a man named John Brown.

Lovejoy's memory is also enshrined in an annual award given in his name for editorial courage.

Lovejoy's double career as an ordained clergyman, as well as a secular journalist, should provide both a criterion and a hallowed tradition for the growing number of ordained clergy who have entered the field of secular journalism.

Among these are Roy Larson (Methodist) of the Chicago Sun Times; Ted Fiske, (Presbyterian), New York Times; Jim Bowman (former Jesuit), Chicago Daily News; Jim Adams (former Benedictine monk), St. Louis Post Dispatch; Earl Hansen (Lutheran), Seattle Post-Intelligencer; Ken Briggs (Methodist), Newsday; and John Knoble (Episcopal), New Haven Register.

The Rev. William Wineke, who was ordained by the United Church of Christ specifically as a religion writer, is religion editor of The Wisconsin State Journal in Madison.

Bill MacKay of The Washington Post took courses in an Episcopal seminary — and gave up a White House assignment for the infinitely greater excitement of the religion beat. As one religion writer puts it: "We Cover Eternity!" And The Cincinnati Enquirer

er's inimitable religion writer Ben Kaufman — whose intriguing questions simultaneously madden and charm assorted hierarchs at press conferences, was very nearly a rabbi after two years in Hebrew Union College.

SOMETIMES ordained religion writers (like this writer, with 14 years in the Episcopal parochial ministry) are asked, angrily, how they can stoop so low as to "wash their church's dirty linen in public," — as if any dirty linen gets cleaner under concealment, which is often the reason it's dirty in the first place.

In addition to the answer provided by Lovejoy's dual role, history records prominently another clergy-journalist — although he is far better remembered as the author of Gulliver's Travels than as an Anglican (Episcopal) priest.

But the Very Rev. Jonathon Swift was made dean of St. Patrick's Cathedral in Dublin by Queen Anne — despite the fact that he had incurred powerful wrath by a devastating (and quite dangerous) expose-lampoon of the archbishop of York.

This provides an especial poignant for this writer, whose home paper is The San Francisco Examiner. For the Very Rev. Jonathon Swift contributed this ecclesiastical "muckraking" to a journal called The Examiner.

ECUMENICAL REFLECTIONS

I think the most pathetic people in the world are those who hear the exciting message of Jesus Christ, that they can have their sins forgiven and be clean clear through, and then go right back and do "their own thing" again.

They are like those spoken of in the scriptures, "like dogs returning to their own vomit," because they do not believe that Jesus meant what He said, "Go and sin no more."

In other words, go and live like a child in the light of God's instruction from the scriptures.

THE DIFFERENCE between the man with "childlike faith" in Christ, and the "pathetic hearer" is that the first one wants to be a Christian because he wants God in control of his life. He genuinely desires to love God.

The "pathetic hearer" is the one who wants to be a Christian on his own terms — and no one, not even God, is going to dictate the terms of living.

All he wants out of being a Christian is serenity, prosperity, happiness and an easy conscience.

MANY LOOK upon church, where learning to be a Christian hopefully is taught, as a kind of spiritual shower room. So we come to church and get washed off — then we go out into our world and get dirty. This process is repeated weekly, monthly or yearly, whatever the case may be, and we go out and do it all over again.

Now the idea of this religious game is to keep the "sin-dirt" down to a minimum by taking spiritual showers as frequently as needed. If this is all church means to you, then you are wasting your time. Furthermore, it is a presumption on God's mercy to run back and forth to the church to get your sins forgiven, and never overcome and conquer sin in your life.

No! Church is not a Spiritual shower room where you go to wash off your guilt. Maybe you do have confession of sins as a part of your service, but that is not the primary function of church.

Church is a place where God gives you power to live His kind of life. In fact, He wants to bring every man way beyond the point of just having sins forgiven — He plans to develop that man into the very likeness of Jesus Himself.

GOD ISN'T KIDDING when He says He wants every man

to have Jesus' power in his life. "As many as received Him, to them gave He POWER to become sons of God."

Just now you are probably thinking, impossible! ... And you are correct! Humanly speaking, godly living is impossible. This is what leads so many church-goers into nervous frustration and almost psychosis! Trying humanly to "live up to" all the minister preaches about will drive anyone to the wall.

But God says He wants to give to every man His spirit and power. When we open ourselves, by commitment, to His powerful life, then we can know forgiveness and freedom from guilt as well as the ability from Him to conquer sin.

CHURCH IS A PLACE where men find this conquering power through peace with God and themselves. The result is that those who find God's peace and develop in this conquering power over sin can then help still others to know this same peace with God and themselves.

No more need for church spiritual showers. Rather church becomes what God intended — a place where people gather to know more and more of God's power!

(Royal Oak), a 1966 All-American, was second and Steve Danosi third.

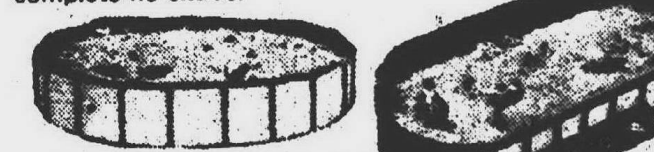

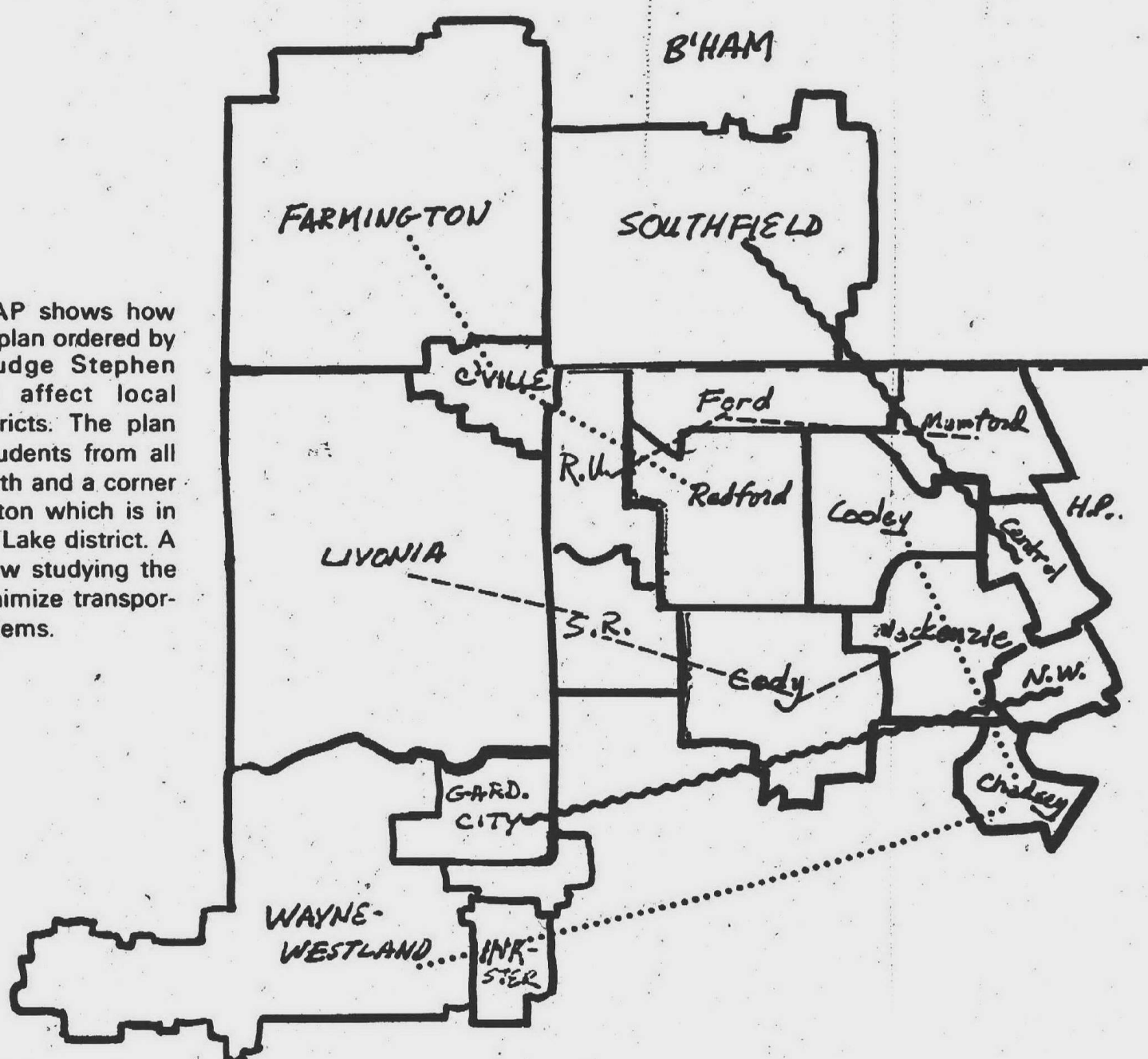

School Pairings Listed

Plymouth is the only school district in Observerland to be excluded from the "cluster" plan for school integration accepted this week by U.S. District Judge Stephen Roth. Eight other districts are matched with schools in Detroit where students will be bused to achieve racial balances in all the schools.

Proposed by the NAACP, the plan groups entire school districts with Detroit attendance areas. Fifteen clusters are created with non-white student populations varying from 22 to 30.8 per cent of the total number of students.

Roth appointed a nine-member panel to review the plan and "to minimize administrative inconvenience or time and or numbers requiring transportation."

UNDER THE PLAN Southfield students will be clustered with those from Berkley, Ferndale and Detroit Central to achieve a 30.8 per cent non-white student population. Currently, of Southfield's 16,333 students, only two-tenths are non-whites.

Redford Union's 9,382 students will be combined with those from Bloomfield Hills, Oak Park, West Bloomfield, Detroit Ford and Detroit Mumford students for a total of 51,879 students, 27.8 per cent non-white.

Redford Union now has two black students compared to

11,190 from Mumford and 2,680 from Ford.

Another group puts Clarenceville's 3,832 students and Farmington's 16,367 students with those from Detroit Redford. The total students would be 50,385 of which 23.6 per cent would be non-whites. Clarenceville has no non-white students and Farmington has 20.

LIVONIA, 38,239 students with 10 non-whites and South Redford, 7,778 students with no non-whites, will be grouped with those from Detroit Eady and Detroit Mackenzie achieve a total student population of 83,324 of which 26.3 per cent would be non-white.

Students from Garden City would be grouped with those from Crestwood, Dearborn Heights, North Dearborn Heights and Fairlane, all of which do not have non-white students, Dearborn, which has two, and Detroit Northwestern which has 14,771. The result would be a total student population of 64,251 with 22.9 per cent non-white. Garden City has 13,669 students.

The 23,218 students from Wayne-Westland, including 30 non-white students, would be combined with students from Cherry Hill, Inkster and Detroit Chadey plus one fifth of Cooley and Cadillac Junior High School for a total student population of 43,420 with 22 per cent non-white.

55 Garden Clubs Will Host Show

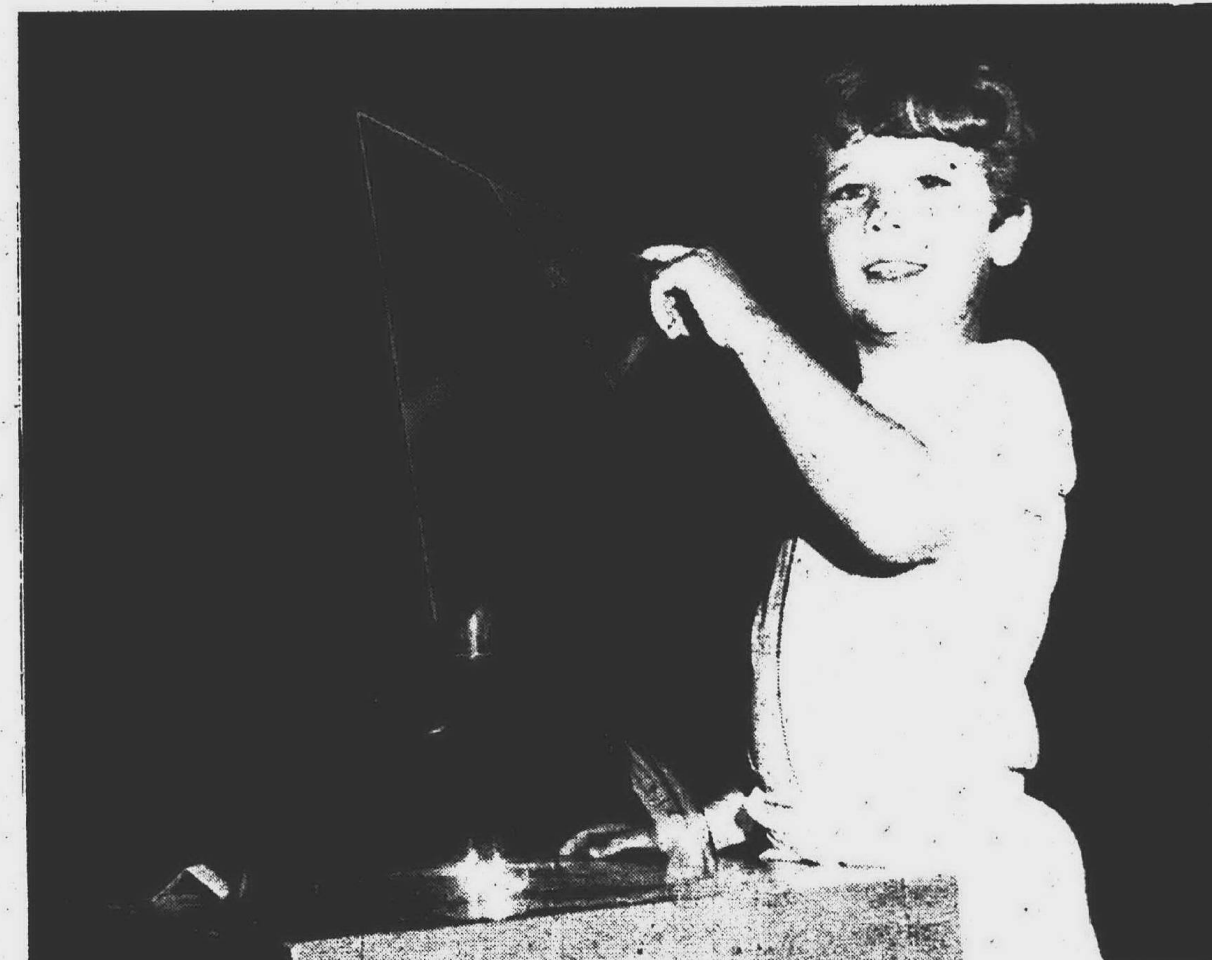

Accessories Can Make A House YOUR Home

"No one ever comes in to buy just one picture anymore," says a head of one of Observerland's most complete and elegant furnishings stores.

"Pictures are bought and hung in groups. Bare walls really are no longer acceptable."

However, she added, for most people it's hard to know how to work out groups of pictures. Amateur decorators see effects they like, but aren't sure how to go about adapting them to their own homes. A pretty common request for help might begin with "I want to do something about the walls of my living room, but I'm not sure just what."

OF COURSE, the knowing "just what" takes years of experience, and the arrangements seen in fine furniture stores don't just happen. But there are some basics that the inexperienced decorator of

Frames, if used, need not be alike but should blend well.

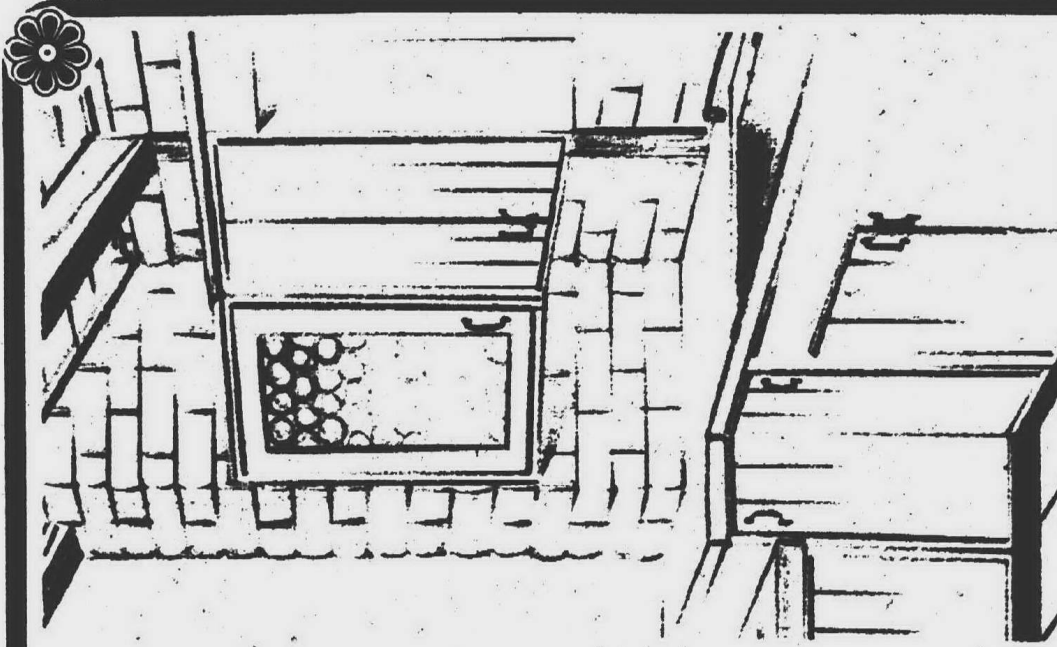
YOU CAN WORK out your own arrangements by laying the component parts out on the floor or a

The main rule for a former arrangement is that is should stay within a general outline and the lower edge should be no more than eight inches above the piece of furniture on that wall, a sofa, for example.

The lower edge should be straight and so should the sides, but an uneven effect is fine for the upper edge. And, of course, there are walls and furnishings that call for informal arrangements.

Follow your own taste and work out the groupings that satisfies you; then measure carefully and move your pictures to the wall.

Clocks, from the tall grandfatherly to the tiny enameled ones that provide a table accent, can enhance every room.

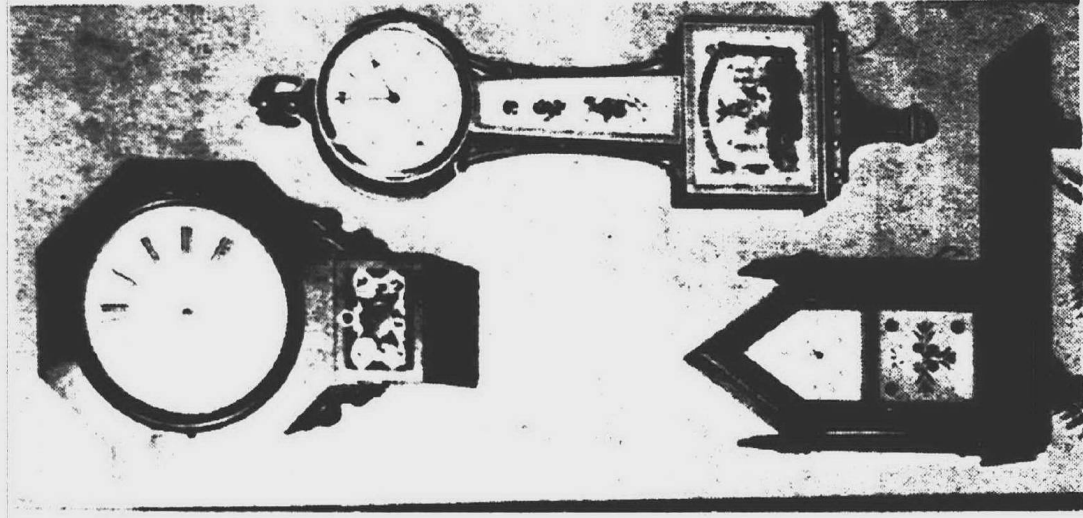
Now a new group of six authentic copies of museum clocks is available, and Hearstside in Livonia is one of the few places where Henry Ford Museum Clocks can be purchased.

PICTURED HERE are three of the reproductions. There's a Welch school clock, at the top, the original of which was built in 1884 by the E.N. Welch Manufacturing Co. It now hangs in the museum comb shop.

The original of the Hull Banjo Clock, center, came from Aaron Willard's Boston shop and probably was made to special order about 1802.

Dating back at least to 1844 is the original of the steeple clock, below. It came from the Brewster and Ingrahams Co. of Bristol, Conn., and can be seen in the McGill Jewelry Building in Greenfield Village.

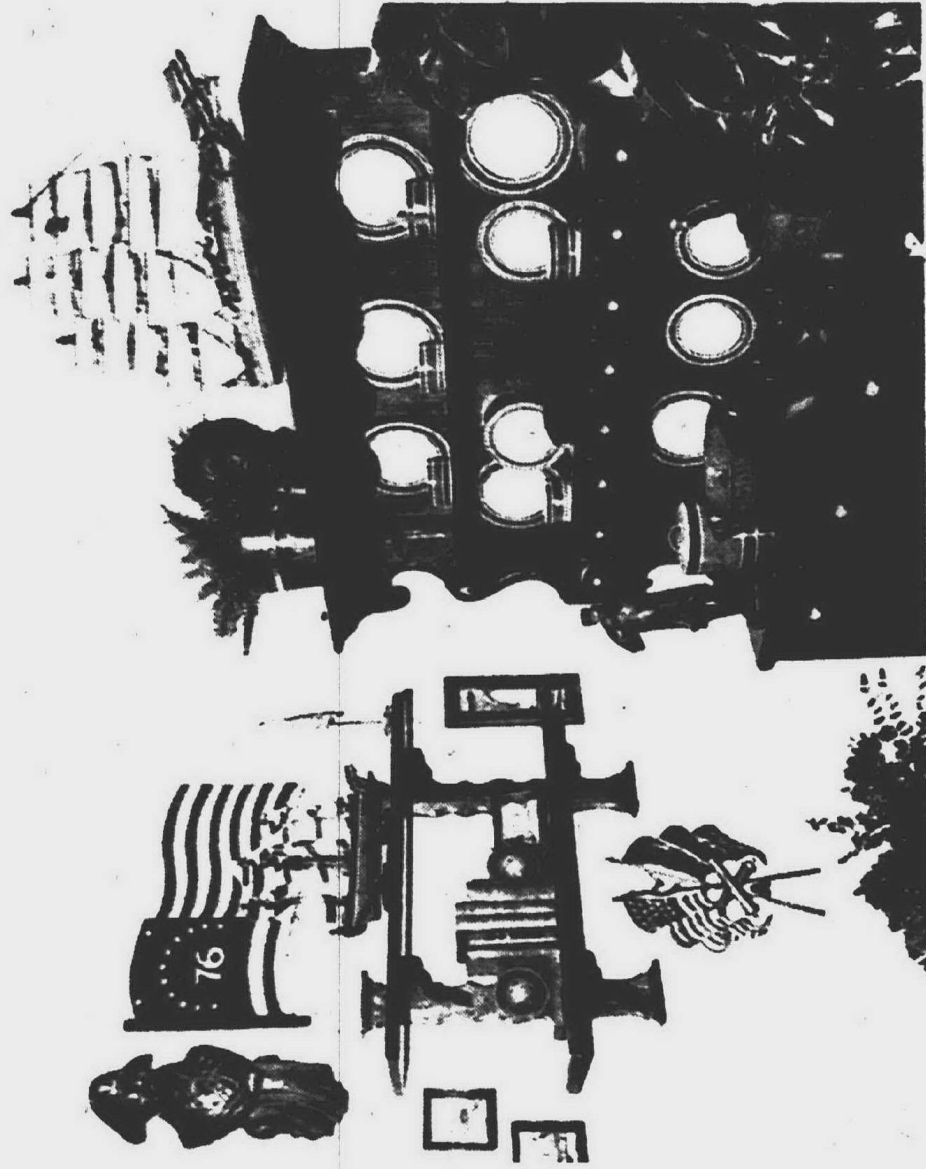
THE COLLECTION also includes reproductions of three grandfather type clocks, the Aaron Willard tall clock, the Lancaster County painted clock and the Jo-



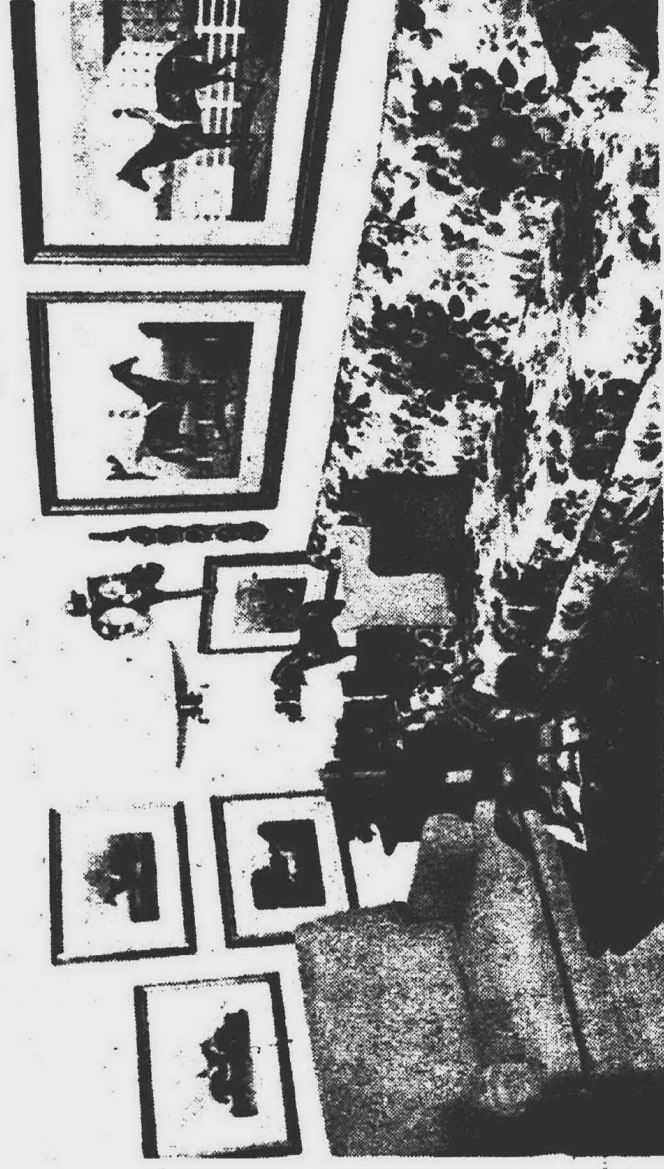
THREE CLOCKS that are reproductions of museum time pieces (Observer photo by Bob Woodring)

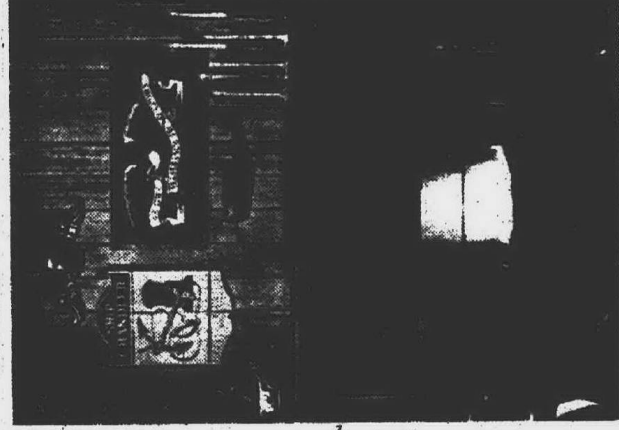

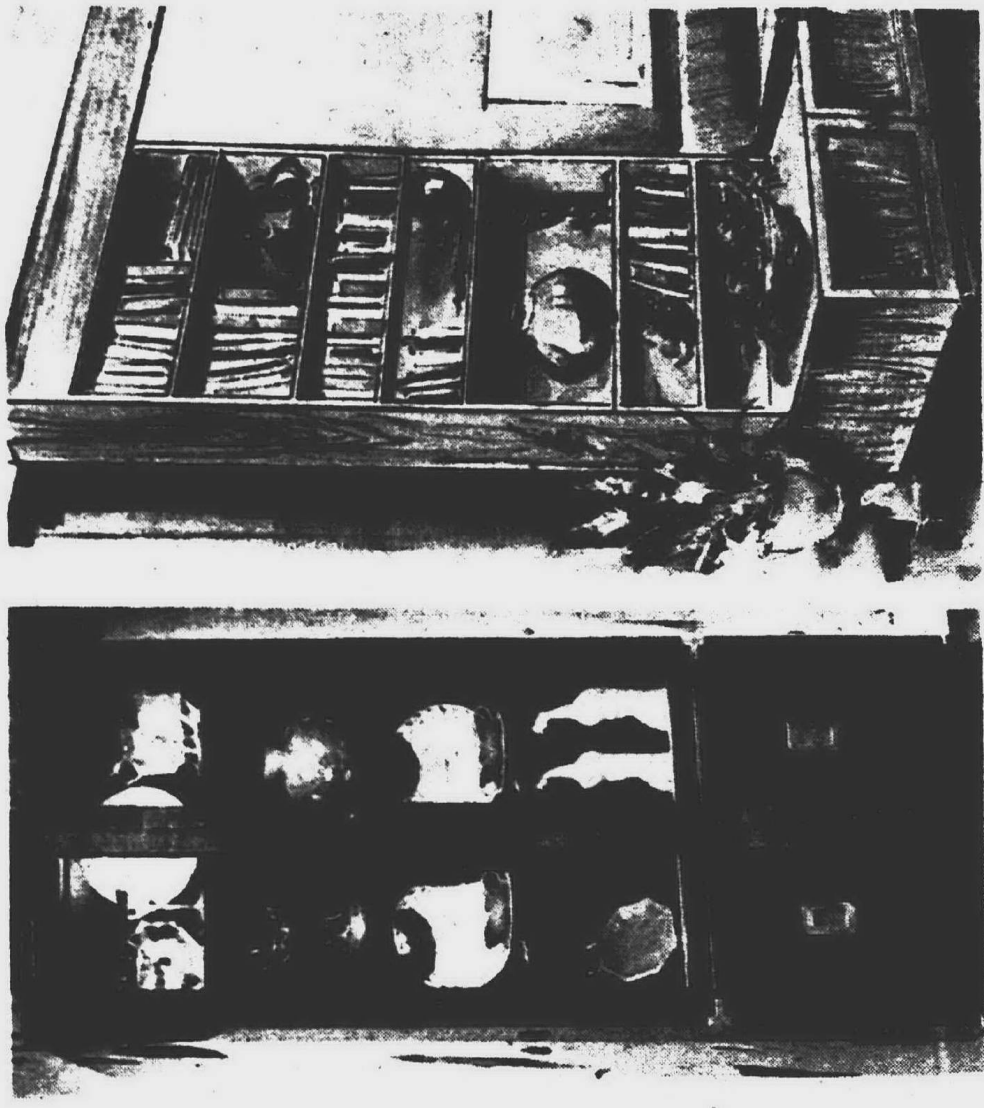
