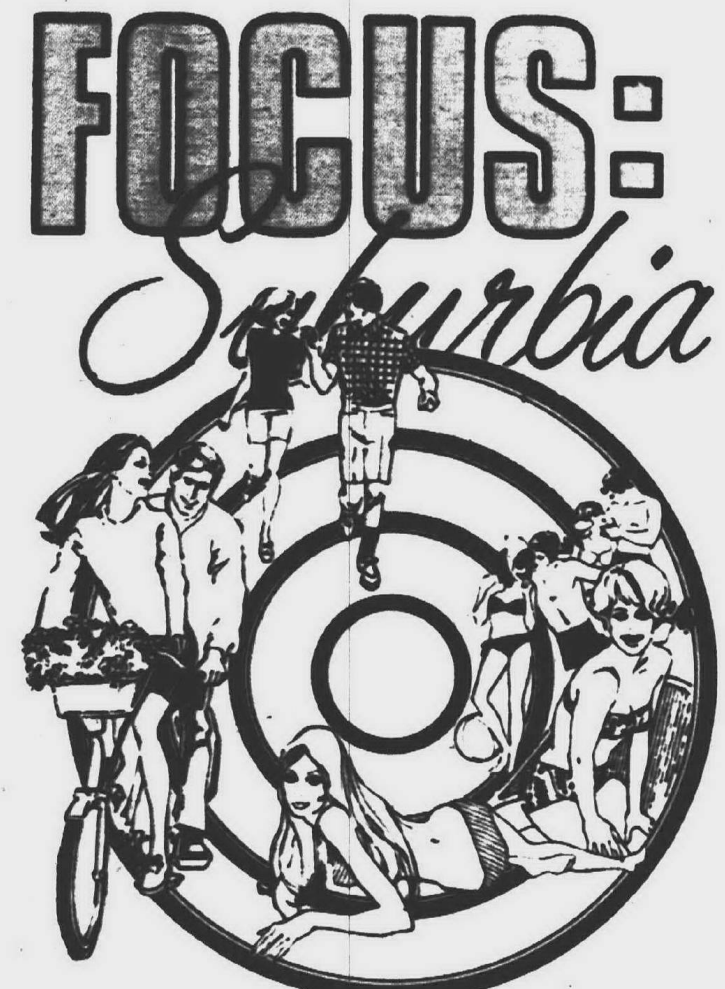

# 2 Plymouth Candidates Bid For State And County Seats

Although possessing a member of the State Senate in Carl D. Pursell, Plymouth this week also gained candidates for the State House of Representatives and Wayne County Board of Commissioners in newly apportioned districts.

Robert E. Dwyer of 1274 Penniman, former Democratic chairman of the 2nd Congressional District, was the only member of his party to file for the House in the newly created 52nd District which links most of Plymouth with eastern Washtenaw County.

Inasmuch as he is unopposed for the Democratic nomination, Dwyer will have as his November rival either of two Republican candidates, Raymond J. Smit or Douglas R. Smith, both of Ann Arbor. Smit is the current representative of the old 53rd District, having been first elected in 1966.

IN THE REAPPORTIONED county commission structure, Plymouth now is part of the new 27th District and has one of the four Democratic candidates for the board in Orville L. Tungate of 13887 Ridgewood.

Tungate is the regional manager of Shulman Transport Enterprises, specializing in the handling of air and ocean freight, and has long been active in local Democratic affairs. He was the party's nominee for Plymouth Township supervisor in 1959.

In the Aug. 8 primary he will be facing George L. Craven of Belleville, Louis J. Guilbault of Wayne and Paul Lada, also of Wayne. The unopposed Republican candidate in the 27th is Brian G. Arrowsmith of Wayne. There are no incumbents.

BECAUSE OF A redistricting plan ordered in May by the Supreme Court, the southeastern portion of Plymouth Township has been made a part of the state's 37th House District instead of the 52nd, and precinct boundaries have been changed to conform with this pattern.

This puts township precinct Nos. 3 and 9 in the 37th, which is dominated by Canton Township, Wayne and Westland.

The four Democrats seeking nomination to the House from the 37th are Michael B. Bushta of 44248 Craftsby Ct., Canton; incumbent Thomas H. Brown of Westland, Manuel L. Lentine Jr. of Wayne and former Rep. Vincent J. Pettiprin of Westland. The only Republican candidate is Jack A. Underwood of Westland.

ALTHOUGH PLYMOUTH still remains in the 2nd Congressional District, this district, too, has been reshaped to meet population conformity. The incumbent congressman, Republican Marvin L. Esch of Ann Arbor, is his party's only candidate, but the Democrats will have six names on the Aug. 8 primary ballot.

Included are Marvin Stempien of Livonia, Matthew J. Kehoe of Lambertville, Frederick J. Schwall of Ypsilanti, Walter Shapiro of Ann Arbor, Billy Turner of Ypsilanti and Bill Brown of Ann Arbor.

All of Plymouth Township's candidates for local offices were announced in Wednesday's Mail & Observer, indicating strong primary battles for the Republican nominations for supervisor, treasurer, and board of trustees.

In Canton Township, the primary battles all will be on the Democratic side, for the only Republican candidate is James E. Poole for trustee. Democrats, however, face these choices:

Supervisor: Philip Dingeldey, incumbent; Roger William Smith and Jack H. Marts.

Clerk: John W. Flodin, incumbent, and Ellen M. Rutland.

Treasurer: Grant Campbell, incumbent, and Alberta A. Thomas.

Trustees: William S. Graham Jr., incumbent; Robert H. Griffin, incumbent; Frank A. McMurray Sr.; Louis J. Richardson, Lawrence C. Baron, Walter Baran and Conrad E. Dennis.

## Retroactive Pay For Teachers Snarled By Pay Board Dispute

School's out and Plymouth teachers have gone their own ways for the summer still not knowing if they will get their retroactive pay.

The long dispute will again be discussed at Tuesday's board meeting, but a recent series of events indicates that a decision won't be made then.

The question on retroactive pay stems back to December when teachers argued they should receive full pay for the period of the federal wage freeze because their contract had been made prior to the freeze.

Two weeks ago, the Plymouth Education Assn. (teachers' bargaining unit) was notified from the Pay Board in Washington that their retro pay request was approved.

Cost to the school district is estimated at a maximum of \$139,000.

FOLLOWING the usual procedure, the school board referred the ruling to its legal counsel, Atty. John Thomas, for review before the \$300 to \$400 per teacher was paid.

The catch came when Thomas discovered that the section of the law cited by the Pay Board as reason for granting the payments didn't apply to the Plymouth case.

"I examined the letter, the law and the materials they (the teacher's union) submitted," Thomas said. "I concluded that the opinion was wrong because the Pay Board cited a section of the law that didn't fit the facts in this case."

"The section dealt with cases where the contracts expired before the wage freeze on Aug. 14. The teachers' contract expired on Aug. 31."

Thomas said he contacted the attorney in Washington who reviewed the case, who said the letter was in error and

advised that the school board file a petition for reconsideration.

The petition is being prepared and will be filed next week, Thomas added.

## More Finlan Case Arrests In Offing?

Additional arrests in the May 31 shooting of Plymouth businessman Charles Finlan may be forthcoming, it was learned Thursday.

Although he mentioned no names, Plymouth Police Chief Timothy Ford said, "We are convinced a conspiracy did exist in the shooting of Charles Finlan."

Ford said the conspiracy didn't occur in Plymouth but that evidence and information uncovered "has been turned over to other police agencies who have jurisdiction over the case."

He declined to name the other agencies, saying that "any further announcement regarding the case will come from the agencies involved."

The chief added that his department will continue to cooperate in the case whenever he receives a request.

THE MAN charged with the shooting, Donald A. Crenshaw, 29, waived pre-trial examination when he appeared Wednesday before District Judge Dumbur David in Plymouth.

This decision was reached following a long conference Wednesday morning between Crenshaw's attorney, William

conflict is a ruling by the Detroit office of the IRS that rejected the Plymouth teachers' request.

Dated June 5, the letter to PEA officials rejected their request, Thomas said.

"The teachers never told the

board or the IRS in Washington about the Detroit letter," Thomas said. "They kept it under their hats."

Thomas emphasized that the school board is "trying to be decent about this and has indicated several times it will do what the Pay Board orders."

However, he added that final clarification of the issue is necessary before the payments are made.

"I'm not at all pleased about putting it off," PEA President Bill Heath said. "This is very certainly a delaying tactic to put off payments until the next fiscal year."

"It's only a method of delaying the payments until the new fiscal year to avoid deficit payments."

Heath said there "wasn't any reason" to notify the school board of the IRS rejection because four days later the PEA received information from Washington, "the court of last appeal," approving the payments.

HE RELATED the series of events leading to the Washington ruling as this:

The PEA filed for the payments alone after the school board refused to make a joint appeal.

The Detroit IRS office notified the PEA that it couldn't make a ruling on it and referred it to a district office.

The next they knew, the application was in Washington and they received several phone calls from Washington to clarify information.

The PEA was then notified that the matter was referred to the IRS for a ruling.

When the ruling didn't come and when phone calls failed to get results, the PEA officials went to the Detroit office where they found out that the application had never actually left Washington.

**SUMMER CONCERTS** by the Plymouth Community Band will begin Thursday night in Kellogg Park under the baton of James Griffith and will continue into August. All will run for approximately 90 minutes and will get under way at 8 p.m.

This week's opening presentation will feature Ernest A. Jones as guest conductor as the band performs selections from "The Sound of Music." Jones, who lives in Bloomfield Hills, is one of the nation's top advertising executives and this will be the third year in a row that he has come to Plymouth in the role of guest conductor.

**PLANS TO** improve public parking facilities in Old Village include a proposal that Spring Street be closed between Starkweather and Mill and converted into a lot for motorists, with a fire lane being kept open for emergencies.

The matter has been submitted to the city planning commission for study and it is hoped that a recommendation will be forthcoming by mid-July. Angle parking will be considered during the analysis of that entire business sector.

**SCHOOL BUS** drivers from Plymouth brought home the

top trophy from a Michigan drivers' safety education conference which was conducted for three days last week at Romulus.

The concluding event of the conference was a rodeo of eight events testing driving skills. The Plymouth team consisted of Dianne Richard, Elaine Richards and Shirley Blackman who outdrove the representatives of 14 other districts in the same population bracket. Mrs. Richard posted the highest individual score with 325 points out of a potential of 400.

**MRS. SHARON BLIGHT** of the Plymouth-Northville League of Women Voters has been selected as co-chairman with Mrs. Sally Brown of Grosse Pointe of the organization's metropolitan housing action committee.

The committee will stress equality of opportunity in housing through the implementation of open occupancy laws, through the promotion of an adequate supply of housing for lower income families, and through efforts to put all major housing efforts on a regional basis.

**REV. FRED PEREZIOSO** of the Epiphany Lutheran Church and Dale Yagiela, director of the Youth Inc. teen center in downtown Plymouth,

have been appointed by Mayor James B. McKeon to the human relations commission. They replace Rev. Paul Thompson and Rev. Lewis Brown Jr., both of whom recently resigned.

**THE FLOOD TRAGEDY** at Rapid City, S.D., particularly saddened Capt. Warren Yoder of the Plymouth branch of the Salvation Army whose counterpart and good friend, Major William Medley, was drowned while trying to help others escape the rising torrents.

The Salvation Army has been given total responsibility for the distribution of clothing and food in the Rapid City area. Contributions should be mailed to S.A. headquarters in Detroit, 601 Bagley, and marked "Rapid City Flood Relief."

**SALE BY THE** city of the Penniman Ave. property formerly occupied by the P&A Theatre was agreed to this week, the purchaser being Mrs. Mae Wagner of 9348 Hartel at a price of \$19,500.

Mrs. Wagner's bid was the only one received and said that "our proposed business would be an ice cream shop which we feel would serve in the best interest of the community." The theater was destroyed by fire in January 1968.

## The Stroller Schoolcraft Was An Indian Agent

If you ever have wondered for whom Schoolcraft Road and Schoolcraft College were named, you have plenty of company.

Many times in his meandering through the area The Stroller has been stopped and asked—

"Who was Schoolcraft?" "What did he do to be so honored?"

This has been true especially since Schoolcraft Road has been torn asunder for the installing of the new expressway and since Schoolcraft College has been in the public eye because of its phenomenal growth.

So, The Stroller, always willing to help, has done a bit of researching and, with the aid of the Michigan Tourist Council, has learned that the man so honored was Henry Rowe Schoolcraft, an Indian agent based in Sault Ste Marie in the early 19th century.

The fact that he was an Indian agent would not seem to be sufficient to earn him the honor of having roads and schools named for him. But it so happens that the pages of history dealing with the Upper Peninsula reveal that he was the inspiration for many of Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's great poems, especially "The Song of Hiawatha."

**THESE YELLOWED** pages reveal that he was married to Jane Johnston, daughter of an Indian princess and Irish fur trader.

As well as an Indian agent, Schoolcraft was a geologist, historian, and Michigan's first publicist and travel writer.

It is said that he collected Indian legends from his wife, mother-in-law, Princess Green Glade and other Indian sources.

Longfellow, one of America's most beloved poets is said to have written in his diary: "I pored over Mr. Schoolcraft's writings for nearly three years" and it was from these writings that he was inspired to write "The Song of Hiawatha" — one of the earliest tributes to the American Indian.

One couldn't help day-dreaming just a bit after reading, "By the shores of Gitche Gumee, by the shining big sea water," and imagining Hiawatha, the Chippewa warrior, doing great deeds in the deep forests of the Upper Peninsula.

Gitche Gumee is the Indian name for Lake Superior, largest fresh water lake in the world, and the shores comprise the beaches, cliffs, forests and waterfalls.

**THE STROLLER** was reminded of this only a few days ago when, on a vacation tour, he was attracted to a sign above the Straits of Mackinac, reading, "You are now in the Land of Hiawatha."

It was here that Schoolcraft began writing of the beauties of Michigan, and to give you an idea that he was no amateur, researchers have found these paragraphs extolling the wonders of the Upper Peninsula —

"Few portions of America can vie in scenic attractions with this interior sea (Lake Superior). Its size alone gives it all the elements of grandeur, but these have been heightened by the mountain

masses which nature has piled along its shores.

"In some places these masses consist of vast walls, of coarse gray or drab colored sandstone, placed horizontally until they have attained many hundred feet in height above the water."

**WRITING OF** the thundering seas that undercut the age-old sandstone, Schoolcraft described the scene, "leaving the split and rent parts ... standing like misshapen tur-tur-turments and battlements. Such is varied coast called "Pictured Rocks."

According to Indian lore, it was into these Pictured Rocks that Pau-Puk-Keewis fled when chased by an angry Hiawatha, who then called down thunder and lightning that shook the rocks, and Pau-Puk-Keewis was killed in the rockfall.

It was this tragedy that caused Longfellow to write: "Ended were his wild adventures. Ended were his tricks and gambols, Ended all his craft and cunning, Ended all his mischief making, All his gambling and his dancing, All his wooing of the maidens."

Yes, it was a chap named Henry Rowe Schoolcraft who inspired this writing and he is entitled to whatever honor may come from having a highway and college named for him.

Shortly afterwards, the PEA was notified that its application was rejected by the Detroit office.

**THE PEA** notified the Michigan Education Assn. attorney who began to prepare an application for appeal of the ruling.

Within four days, before the appeal was made, the teachers were notified from the higher offices in Washington (which they would have appealed to) that the application was approved.

Both Thomas and Heath indicated optimism that the payments will be made eventually.

But Heath resents the delay, and Thomas wants final clarification before advising payment.

Meanwhile, the teachers have left summer addresses with the building principals hoping to get the long awaited payments as a summer surprise.

A PROGRAM which was created to foster mutual respect and understanding among the peoples of the world will bring a special guest to Plymouth next Saturday, and she will be in our midst for two months learning about life in the United States.

She is Miss Asa Jonasson, a chemistry and biology teacher from Malmö, Sweden, and her official hosts will be the Plymouth Jaycees. Unofficially, all of us who live here will have a role to play in making her welcome.

She writes in a letter, "I hope that the time I spend together with you will be as nice for you as I am sure it will be for me. The U.S.A. is for me a most interesting country. Since I was a little girl, I have been dreaming to come over there. I have always heard that the Americans are very kind and friendly."

Miss Jonasson will be staying with various Jaycee families throughout July and August, and an appointment has been made with Gov. William Milliken for July 11. She will ride in the July 4 parade and a special reception will be held in her honor the afternoon of Sunday, July 9. One would hope that when she leaves late in August she will have made many lasting friends.

MISS JONASSON is coming here under what is called the "Incoming Ambassador" program of the "Experiment in International Living" organization, headquartered at Brattleboro, Vt. This was founded in 1932 as a carefully planned, international educational exchange program. It emphasizes a personal approach to the problems of international cooperation, and our Jaycees are to be complimented for deciding to participate.

Their chairman of the project is Dennis Richardson, who has mapped a variety of experiences for the Swedish guest.

The family homestay is the essence of this "investment in friendship," and last summer Miss Jonasson spent six weeks in India under the same program. Of this she writes:

"It was a wonderful time. I really enjoyed it. The Indian people are so extremely nice." In fact, she enjoyed her stay in India so much that recently she visited there for two weeks "in order to meet some of the friends I made last summer."

A GRADUATE of the University of Lund, Miss Jonasson holds a master's degree in science and now teaches in a secondary school. She will observe her 32nd birthday while in Plymouth (Aug. 6) and her background includes five summers when she worked during her vacations as an airline hostess.

"I am very curious and interested to know more about other people and countries," she writes. "I also would like to inform about Sweden because I think there are a lot of misunderstandings abroad about my country."

Our guest-to-be says she is interested in the theater, ballet, classical and pop music, skiing, swimming, horseback riding and nature. Presumably the Jaycees will be able to meet all these tastes except the bit about skiing.

It sounds as though she will help make it a more interesting summer, and it will be interesting to hear what she thinks of Plymouth a few weeks hence.

## Old Cemetery Has New Look Thanks To Youth's Efforts

The old Plymouth Village cemetery at Pearl and York streets is getting a face lifting, thanks to a youth whose hobby is history.

Ron Collopy, 16, of Westland, who hopes someday to be an obstetrician, got the idea to clean up the cemetery while visiting his aunt, Mrs. Mary Collopy of 873 Holbrook, a few blocks from the cemetery.

"I saw all those old stones, many of them knocked down, and thought it would be interesting to study the dates on them and at the same time put the stones back in place," Ron said.

He got permission from the Plymouth city commission to work in the cemetery on weekends.

"I'M INTERESTED in historical sites and have found a person can learn about a particular area best by studying the stones in old cemeteries," he said, citing the Plymouth one as an example.

"The first burial here was in 1846," Ron said. "There are about 250 persons buried here, 12 of them Civil War veterans."

He said as far as he could learn, there hasn't been a burial there for 50 years.

Ezra F. Rotnour, chairman of the cemetery board, said the cemetery was no longer used. "It has been considered closed for a good number of years," he added.

Ron said he has set up about 80 markers in the Plymouth cemetery and is hoping to get help in obtaining stones for the unmarked graves.

"I'D LIKE to see this cemetery really made a historical site," he continued. "I've asked the Plymouth Veterans of Foreign Wars Mayflower Post for a flag pole to be erected here."

He added that he is seeking help from local businesses to have shabby and statues placed in the area.

"It would be great, also, if a sign could be erected at the gates, identifying the cemetery," Ron continued.

He is asking the DAR chapter for a plaque to commemorate unknown graves.

Ron explained the cemetery isn't entirely neglected. "The grass is kept mowed, but otherwise it is just about forgotten," he said.

AS PART of his interest in local history, Ron is hoping to contact persons who have a friend or relative buried there. "I'd appreciate hearing from them. They can contact me at my home at 6032 Berry, in Westland," he said.

The Plymouth cemetery isn't the first one Ron has worked in.

"Chubb Cemetery in Westland was my project before coming over to Plymouth. When I've done all I can here, I plan going to the Free Church cemetery on Ford Rd. It dates back to 1827," he added.

Another of his projects was getting Westland to correct the spelling of the Abel Patch elementary school.

"It had been spelled Patchen and since it was named after a pioneer of the Westland area, I thought it should be spelled correctly," he said.

LOVE of history also led him to study an "underground railroad" site used during the Civil War where slaves were led to freedom.

"This one was near the Rouge River at Venoy and Michigan Avenue that led to Ypsilanti," Ron explained.

He finds combining his interest in history with cleaning up old cemeteries interesting and exciting.

"Studying old tombstones often turns up a lot of history about the area; it's a great hobby," he said.

Perhaps his biggest thrill, however occurred last April "I was in Washington with my class when the teacher asked me if I would like to place a wreath on the tomb of the Unknown Soldier. This is an event I'll never forget."

A young man like Ron Collopy, doing the constructive work he lists as a hobby, is not likely to be forgotten easily either.

### Bennett Court Exam July 20

In spite of being confined in jail since his arrest on May 9, David L. Bennett, who was a senior at Plymouth High School, kept up with his studies, took all the final examinations, and received his diploma.

Bennett, the 17-year-old Plymouth Township youth accused of killing Mrs. Vivian Berry, is in Wayne County jail awaiting pretrial examination in Circuit Court July 20.

He was arraigned last Tuesday on a first-degree murder charge before Wayne County Circuit Judge Benjamin Burdick.

Bennett is charged with the May 9 knife slaying of Mrs. Berry, whose body was discovered in the garage of her home on North Territorial Rd.

## Redford Church Celebrates 25 Years For St. Valentine

St. Valentine Catholic Church, located on Beech-Daly just south of Five Mile, celebrates this weekend its first 25 years of service to Redford Township.

Highlight of the silver anniversary celebration for the first Catholic parish in the township is the festival on the church grounds, continuing Saturday and Sunday and featuring rides, games, good food and prizes.

The church also was honored by the Redford Township Board of Supervisors Monday evening, when that body unanimously adopted a resolution recognizing the contribution of St. Valentine religious and lay members to the community over the past 25 years.

Supervisor Bill Robbins presented a proclamation to the Rev. Alfred Sadler, St. Valentine pastor since 1969.

Also in honor of the 25th anniversary, the parish published a hard-cover book recounting its history and including pictures taken through the years.

ST. VALENTINE, named for an early Roman martyr, counts its history from June 23, 1947, when the Rev. Edmund F. Behrendt, appointed by cardinal Edward Mooney to organize a parish in the community, met with several parishioners in the garden of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Hermann.

Earlier, a census taken by the Sisters from the Mission Helpers of Sacred Heart in the area between the Marquette Railroad, Six Mile, Telegraph and Inkster showed the need for a church for 400 Catholic families there.

Even before the first mass in the auditorium of Roosevelt school July 20, the parish had an organizing committee, a confraternity class for 162 children, taught by the Sisters from Mission Helpers, and an Altar Society busy at work procuring vestments.

In the new few months, the new parish organized an ushers' club and men's and ladies' choirs, and a Holy Name society, started a parish newspaper, and began regular religious instruction for Catholic children in public schools.

GROUND WAS BROKEN for a temporary church on Columbus Day, Oct. 12, 1947, with the Rev. Behrendt turning the first spadeful. Within a week work was under way, and on St. Valentine's Day, 1948, the congregation moved into a

building that still had only sub-flooring and lacked pews and communion rails. These were added during the Lenten season, and the congregation on Mother's Day began a tradition of crowning the Blessed Virgin.

In June of 1948, the Rev. Stanley Borucki of Sacred Heart Seminary brought to St. Valentine Church a relic from the cross. That year also saw formation of a Boy Scout troop and the religious instruction for children taken over by the Immaculate Heart of Mary sisters from St. Mary's of Redford.

The parish broke ground for its first school building July 22, 1951, and construction proceeded along with work on convent for the Felician sisters who would be teaching. The first elementary school program began Sept. 4, 1952, with 325 children enrolled. The convent was finished in November.

Six classrooms were added to the school in 1955, and two more in 1959. In its years of operation, the school has had five principals, Sister M. Leona, Sister M. Eleanor, Sister Mary Mildred, Sister Mary Immaculata and Sister Mary Alfonsa.

THE NEXT FEW YEARS saw the assignment of the Rev. Frederick Bodde as assistant to Father Behrendt and the beginnings of Girl Scouting and a Young People's Club in the church. By January 1957, St. Valentine was holding six masses each Sunday and plans were begun for a new church.

Father Behrendt suffered a serious heart attack in March. He was able to read the blessing as ground was broken for the new sanctuary south of the church He died July 25.

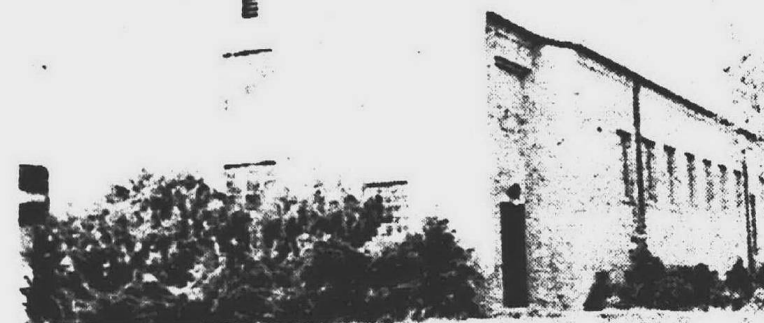
THE REV. HUBERT ROBERGE was appointed as pastor, but he too became ill and when the first mass was offered in the contemporary new church it was done by the Rev. William Foley, a special weekend assistant.

Formal dedication took place Feb. 3, 1960, after Father Sadler had arrived to head the parish. A marble altar was made possible by contributions to a memorial fund for Father Behrendt.

The original church building, which had been converted to a Parish Hall, was razed late in 1968 to make way for a new Activities building. That structure and the parish's second rectory were completed the following year.

The first St. Valentine Parish Council began its meetings in January of 1970, with Bob Totte as president. The first lay distributors of Holy Communion were named in 1971, in keeping with recommendations of Vatican II.

The Rev. Sidney Eckert has been serving since March of 1971 as associate pastor of St. Valentine.

Over the 25 years, the parish has seen four of its young men ordained into the priesthood. They are the Rev. Elgar Nadon, O.F.M., the Rev. Michael Donovan, the Rev. James Daley and the Rev. Leo Lulko.

Sister M. Timothy, also from a parish family, taught first grade in the St. Valentine school for a time.

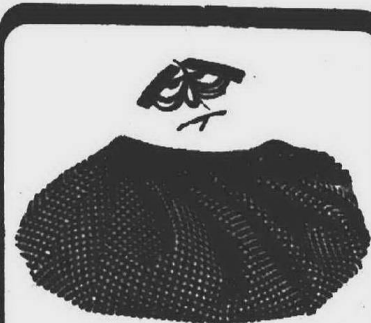

## Minister Explores India To Lead Mission Class

More than 10,000 miles of travel in India recently has convinced the Rev. Hugh C. White that "it's a wonder that country can be governed at all."

Rev. White, minister of the First United Methodist Church of Farmington until his transfer just after returning from the three-week tour of India, is using the knowledge he gained to teach in the annual United Methodist School of Missions June 23 to 29 at Adrian College.

"Every border of India is torn," he said. "You go 10 miles and you're in a different country—different language, religion, alliances."

IN MEETING both church and lay people in various sections of India, Rev. White said he found "you get the business about Vietnam" with great frequency, especially since his visit came just after the recent escalation of bombing.

"I tried to show that it's possible to get into a situation where you can't do anything right," Rev. White said. "And I also made a point of suggesting that India could well have its own Vietnam in the Bangladesh situation."

"Some seemed to understand this."

Rev. White, now minister of the First United Methodist Church of Ypsilanti, said he arranged his itinerary through Henry Lacey of the India-Nepal desk of the UMC Board of Christian Missions. His tour took him into Bangladesh as well as to

Bombay, New Delhi, Calcutta, Kashmir and the sites of many mission projects.

HIS FIRST-HAND view of the war-torn Bangladesh area came when he went with Donald Rugh of the United Methodist mission board to see what could be done to help the area.

The problems there that "cry for solution," involved first the "destitute minority of Bahari Moslems who sided with West Pakistan and lost and now are wanted by no one," and the ravaging of the Bangladesh land by the West Pakistan army.

"Bangladesh women and children by the hundreds were violated while their men were away," Rev. White said. "Polluted is what the people call it. They can't even talk about it, so it's hard to help."

Among the most impressive parts of the trip was a visit to Mother Theresa's Home for the Destitute Dying of Calcutta, Rev. White said.

Calcutta is a city that literally defies description, he added, with 100,000 regularly sleeping in the streets although it is the wealthiest of India.

"The workers at Mother Theresa's home go out into the city and bring in the dying," he said. "All they can do is offer a modicum of decency to these people's last hours. Mother Theresa also operates a baby fold, bringing in babies from ash heaps and curbstones and trying to find homes for them. The nurses there are the most dedicated I've ever seen."



## Dentist To Discuss His Work In Korea

A young Michigan dentist who founded a Korean clinic will be the speaker Sunday, June 25, in Rosedale Gardens Presbyterian Church, Hubbard and W. Chicago, Livonia. Services will be at 8 and 10 a.m.

The speaker is Dr. Dick H. Nieuwsma Jr., who founded a dental clinic at Kwangju Christian Hospital, Kwangju, Korea, following several years of military service in Japan. He has had a training program for Korean dentists and assists in various kinds of community outreach, including work with Dr. Sam Park and his Kwangju Boys' Town. Dr. Park's mission

Mrs. Richardson moved that the Board adopt the Amendment to Ordinance No. 24, known as Ordinance No. 24-C72 on Refrigerating Systems Codes. Supported by Mr. Ash and carried unanimously.

**Albert Simkin-Parklane Ravines Subdivision,** Re: Requesting a statement from Plymouth Township approving the proposed development if approved by the Water Resources Commission. Mrs. Richardson explained that Mr. Simkin was asking for approval from the Township on the condition that this was approved by the Water Resources Commission. Mrs. Richardson moved that the Board recommend approval of the proposed development, subject to approval by the Department of Natural Resources. Supported by Mr. Burke and carried unanimously.

**NEW BUSINESS:** Morton Scholnick, Application No. 160, Re: Rezoning from R-1-H to R-2-A and R-1 of 36 acres on the northeast corner of Joy and McClellan and 36 acres on the northwest corner of Joy and McClellan. (Received recommended denial from the Planning Commission on March 15, 1972; also recommended denial from Wayne County Planning Commission on April 25, 1972.) After a presentation by Mr. Scholnick, Mr. Draughn, Mr. Reimer and discussion by the members of the Board, Mrs. Richardson moved that the Board approve the recommended denial of Application No. 160 for the rezoning from R-1-H to R-2-A and R-1 of the 36 acres on the northeast corner of Joy and McClellan and the 36 acres on the northwest corner of Joy and McClellan Roads as it would increase the density activity and compound the congestion, it would be spot zoning, there was no definite reason given for requesting R-2-A zoning and not in keeping with the Comprehensive Development Plan. Supported by Mrs. Holmes and carried unanimously.

**Housing and Finance Association-** Appl. No. 182, Re: Rezoning from R-1-S to R-2-A of approximately 9.6 acres on the south side of Ann Arbor Road between Sheldon and Canton Center Roads. (Received recommended denial from Planning Commission on May 3, 1972. Also received recommended denial from the Wayne County Planning Commission on May 17, 1972.) Mr. Burke moved that the Board approve the recommended denial of Application No. 182 to rezone from R-1-S to R-2-A of approximately 9.6 acres on the south side of Ann Arbor Road between Sheldon and Canton Center Roads as it would increase traffic congestion, proposed density would be incompatible with the existing land use and the request is inconsistent with the Comprehensive Plan of the Township, the applicant has not presented satisfactory evidence that the property cannot be developed as single family. Supported by Mr. Ash and carried unanimously.

**Provisional Agreement between D.P.W. Male employees and Twp. of Plymouth,** Mrs. Richardson moved that the contract be referred to Keller, Thomas, McManus, Toppin and Schwarz for their action, negotiations and drafting of a new agreement between the D.P.W. male employees and the Township of Plymouth. Supported by Mr. Overholt and carried unanimously.

**Joe Bids, re: Policy on Fire Hydrant Rental:** Mr. Breen stated that the ordinance called for \$50.00 per fire hydrant, but the amount charged for many years has been \$10.00. The \$10.00 charge was dropped completely during budget sessions this past year, but the Auditor advised that there should be a charge made. Mrs. Richardson remarked that at Budget time there was talk of amending the Ordinance to allow for the change in the amount charged, but to date, this had not been accomplished. The question was asked as to how many hydrants were involved and Mr. Bids advised there were more than 670 hydrants. Mrs. Holmes moved that a charge of \$50.00 per fire hydrant per year be reinstated to the Water Department from the General Fund payable on a quarterly basis. Supported by Mr. Ash. The following roll call vote was taken: Yes: Holmes, Millington, Overholt, Ash, No: Burke, Richardson, Breen. The motion carried four to three. Mr. Overholt moved to amend Ordinance No. 21, Section 5 under water rates to include and reflect the \$50.00 per hydrant, per year. Supported by Mrs. Richardson and carried unanimously.

**RESOLUTIONS:** Haron Township, Re: Opposition to Wayne County Development of Downtown Sports Stadium. Mr. Millington stated that this was a good letter, but wondered if it was too late for the Board to do anything about it. Mr. Ash asked if he could use the stadium if he so wished and if not the General Fund of Wayne County should not be used for a private endeavor. Mr. Millington moved that the Board draft a similar resolution and send to all neighboring municipalities. Supported by Mr. Burke. The following roll call vote was taken: Yes: Burke, Millington, Ash, Overholt, Richardson, Breen. No: Holmes. The motion carried four to one.

**City of Grosse Pointe, Re: Tax exemption for Senior Citizens, certain Veterans and unmarried Widows.** Mr. Millington moved that the resolution be received and filed without further action. Supported by Mr. Ash and carried unanimously.

**Ten Minute Open Discussion:** Mrs. Richardson stated that the Michigan Township Association had requested an additional \$120.00 for a legal defense fund. Mr. Overholt moved that the above mentioned item be added to the agenda. Supported by Mr. Burke and carried unanimously. Mrs. Richardson stated that the Board had already approved \$1200.00, which she considered a sizable amount to this association. Mr. Ash stated that the fund was for legal purposes such as defending a Supervisor. Mr. Breen stated that the sum now paid was sufficient. Mr. Ash moved that the additional 10% not be sent to the Michigan Township Association. Supported by Mr. Millington and carried unanimously.

Mr. Overholt moved that the meeting be adjourned, supported by Mr. Burke.

Supervisor Breen adjourned the meeting at 9:31 P.M.

# Letter To The Editor

## Differs In View On Convention

**Editor's Note:** Our information was gathered after the caucus from familiar and usually reliable sources, indicating that good Democrats don't always agree among themselves. We are glad to have Mrs. Rozian's version.

### EDITOR:

As a reader and admirer of the generally high quality of journalism in the Plymouth Observer for over 10 years, I felt particularly disappointed to find that you permitted the article headed "Wayne - 2nd Nixes Delegate Deal" (Page 9A, Wednesday, June 14) to appear on your news pages rather than the editorial page where it belonged because of the writer's obviously biased point of view; also, that there was no by-line to fault the individual reporter for inaccuracies of fact and juxtaposition of information in such a way as to make the reader believe that certain actions were the consequences of others when actually the facts were taken out of context and placed as though parts of separate photographs had been spliced to mount a fictitious one.

Let us set matters straight

for the record. I attended Wayne-2nd Democratic convention on Friday, June 2. I also attended the Second Congressional District Democratic convention on June 4 in Ann Arbor and the state convention, June 9 to 11, at Cobo Hall. Your writer not only failed to clarify what took place when and at which convention but some of his biased conclusions are not substantiated by fact.

1. "There's little Wallace sentiment among Democrats in the Wayne-2nd" is hardly plausible when 61 per cent of the Democratic vote in the primary was for Wallace. True, the Wallace people had no precinct delegates, but that is not to say that the majority of the voters under the Democratic Party aegis expressed little sentiment for Wallace.

2. Marshall Manning was not "tossed out," to use your writer's colorful terminology, nor did he lose the election on the basis of having acquired a Wallace delegate for this area, as the writer implies. Mr. Manning lost election as president of the Wayne-2nd convention by a count of 24-22. With the support of nearly half the delegates present, one is not "tossed out." Let it also be

stated to Mr. Manning's credit that, because of his labors, we were able to have any delegate at all assigned from this area. It should be further noted that he lost only the chairmanship of the convention delegation but remains chairman of Wayne-2 Democrats.

3. The Wayne-2nd convention did, in fact, choose Mrs. Sandra McClellan as a McGovern delegate, but she lost out in the district caucus at the state convention in the party's effort to observe the national party's injunction to apportion delegations with proper representation of male, female, young, black, etc., and on the basis of strong Washtenaw County influence (58 of the district's 123 votes), insisting upon McGovern delegates from their area, plus the fact that the rules committee at the Second District convention decided to put emphasis upon the selection of delegates at presidential caucuses and only secondarily "an attempt shall be made" to apportion from the various geographical (county) areas within the Second Congressional District.

In fact, Mrs. McClellan's prospects for a national convention seat were seriously undercut by spokesmen from her own Wayne-2nd McGovern caucus at a pre-convention meeting of the Second District rules committee on Saturday, June 3, when they voted with Washtenaw County to void the geographical allocation previously arranged by Manning and to go instead with presidential caucuses of the district at large.

These are the elements behind the defeat of Mrs. McClellan.

4. Your writer made no friends for the Observer in the final paragraph of the article implying that the Democrats from this area would rather have no delegate than to "have to send a Wallace delegate." That kind of journalism speaks for itself and is hardly worthy of your paper.

It is my fervent hope that this was simply an editorial oversight on your part and that, henceforth, expressions such as this will be placed either on "editorial" or "letters" pages of your publications, not passed as regular news and information.

# Fire Runs Up In Both City, Twp.

May was a busy month for both the Plymouth city and township fire departments. For the city department, which answered 75 calls during May, it was the heaviest month for the past three years, Fire Chief George Schoeneman said. In April, the department had 46 runs.

THE TOWNSHIP fire department had 62 runs last month compared to 51 the previous year. Chief James Gignac said his department made 265 runs from Jan. 1 through May compared with 244 for the same period last year.

Schoeneman said his city department's alarms were running behind the previous year until May. The total from Jan. 1 through May hit 264 compared to 257 in the same 1971 period.

Fire loss in Plymouth during May was set at \$95,085 while in April the loss hit \$125,070. Total fire loss for the year through May was \$220,268, a big jump from the \$52,005 figure in the same period a year ago.

AMBULANCE RUNS in Plymouth for the Jan. 1-May 31 period hit 136. Last year in the same period, ambulance runs totaled 117.

Schoeneman added that fire runs were down this year to 20. Fire alarms last year through May 31 totaled 34.

Gignac said fire runs in the township during May totaled 20 compared with 15 for May of 1971. Fire runs from Jan. 1 through May 31 totaled 66, three below the 69 reported for the same period in 1971.

Rescue runs climbed in the township during the first five months this year. The figure hit 142 compared to 127 in the 1971 period.

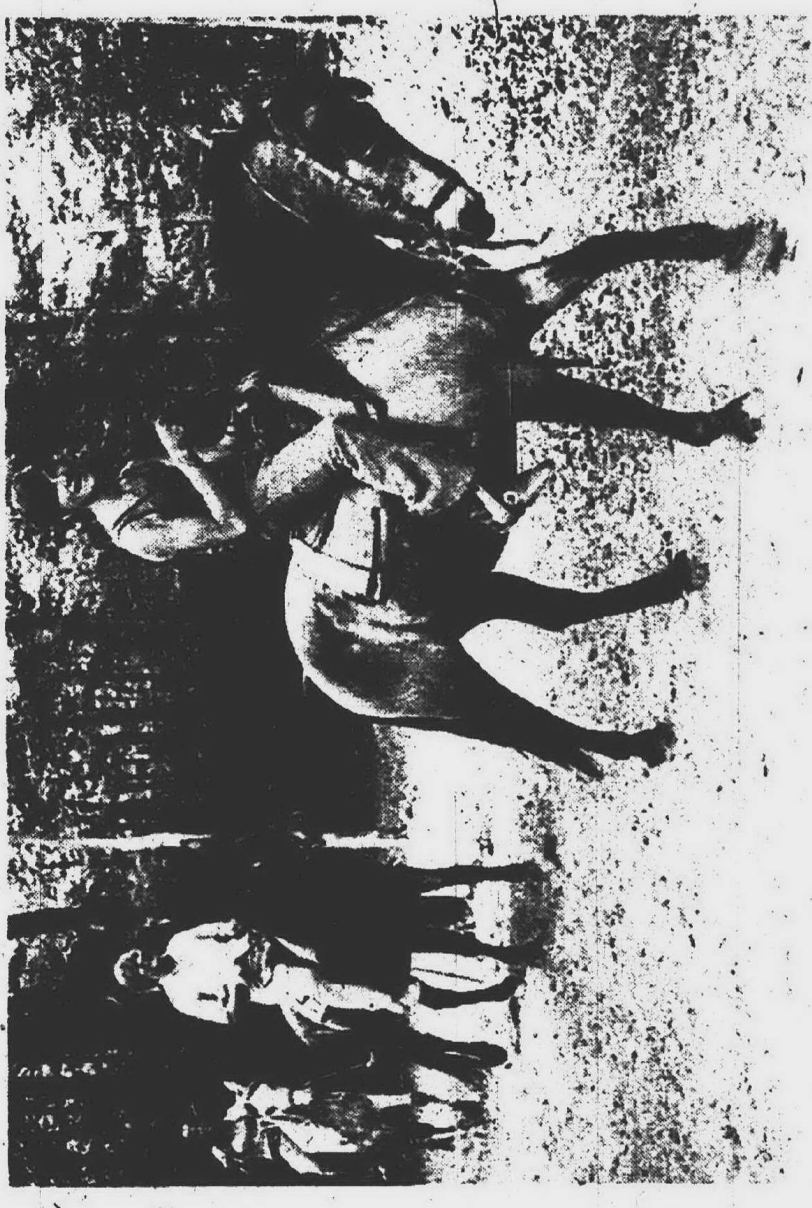

## Perch Came Back

This year, unless all the signs are completely cockeyed, there should be more perch and jumbos, enough to make veterans compare the season favorably with those before the collapse.

The Department of Natural Resources feels this will be the year of the perch comeback because 1969 was the best spawning year for Lake Michigan perch in more than a decade and perch reach good, catchable size in three years.

Perch can be caught year around, although spring is best. They are almost always hungry

and when a school is located a catch is guaranteed. The boat fisherman has an advantage, however, since he can locate the schools while shore fishermen have to wait for the fish to appear.

Lake Michigan perch are not "fighting" fish. They are more willing to be caught than resist, but they excel in the frying pan.

Floured, crumbed or battered and pan-fried to a crispy brown, fresh-caught perch are just plain delicious. The flesh is white, moist, flaky and tender, the flavor sweet and delicate, not at all "fishy."


