State To Hear Rossman Issues

After several delays, former Supt. James Rossman's case will finally be heard by the State for discharge. Tenure Commission on Friday morning in Lansing.

Because of the numerous delays, Rossman has continued to collect his \$28,000 yearly salary without working for the district.

ROSSMAN HAS maintained since being fired by the board in December that he has tenure in the school district. The hearing will determine if he has tenure and may give him an opportunity to air his answers to charges made against him by the attorney fees and funds lost as a result of his board.

A month after his firing, Rossman was offered a settlement by the board which would employ him as a consultant in the school district until June of 1973.


Socially speaking, there's more than the difference of mileage between the Box Bar and the Old Club, but this guy Jones will take them both in the same stride.

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

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



Selections of Honey Locust (Moraine, Shademaster, Sunburst, etc.) are being severely damaged by leafhoppers at this time. Almost all trees are showing leafhopper feeding. Severe cases resemble mite damage with mottled and speckled leaves. On many trees new growth is severely damaged. Shaking of branches on small trees will detect the presence of these sucking a hybrid tomato, than the total insects. Several instars, from small pale green to the adult which is green with black wing covers, are on the trees now.

CONTROL: Spray with two tablespoons per gallon water of 50 per cent w.p. Sevin. Thorough coverage of leaves and twigs is essential for good control. Don't spray when temperature will be likely to rise above 80 degrees for two hours after application. Malathion or Diazinon also will control these insects.

Scales Sign Of Insects

Oystershell Scale is one of the most common and troublesome scale insects in Michigan. It attacks a wide range of woody plants, causing retarded growth and yellowing of leaves. Its presence is shown by grayishbrown scales - about 1/8 inch long - attached closely to the bark.

Oystershell scale can be controlled with sprays of Malathion, Sevin or Diazinon. Spray the entire plant.



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
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

Woody Plants Are Targets

Woody plants are the targets for lecanium scales. The oval, mahogany colored insects suck the plant juices, reducing vigor and causing leaves to yellow and wilt. A heavy infestation of scale insects can kill small or immature plants.

For control in late spring or summer, use a spray containing Malathion. Sevin or Diazinon. Make sure all plant parts are covered and repeat the spray 10 days later.

The so-called residence has little more than paper walls, inadequate plumbing and a water furnace in the hot center of a room- and the furnace has never been inspected.

"Another thing that puzzles me," Councilman Taylor said, "is why HUD selected the worst of the HUD homes in the city to accommodate Mrs. Hamilton. The house is just about unlivable- and the price - \$16,900 - just about floors me."

Later Mrs. Hamilton informed city officials that when she started cleaning the windows she noticed the red tag- and asked HUD about it and what it meant.

"Just ignore it," they told me, "that will all be taken care of. So I didn't bother anymore. Since then there have been all kinds of inspectors out to look at the house- but nothing ever has been done to improve it."





It is hoped in the future that the Youth Commission will extend into some cultural programs that will have a lasting effect on the youth of the Township.

WE WANT TO BE ABLE to foster and perpetrate long term projects and programs where the young people can think back and say they were first enlightened about a certain aspect of life by the Redford Township Youth Commission. I feel the commission will alert the young people and make them want to participate in whatever is available. It will destroy the hopefully resistance some of our young people have against organized programs.

It is hoped the commission can more than fill the leisure time void. There is nothing quite so discouraging as to have a whole free summer and to not have had anything to do.

In its short duration the success of the Youth Commission has been phenomenal. A concept has been translated into meaningful programs that meet the needs of our youth. To counterphrase George Bernard Shaw "Youth is such a wonderful time of life that it is imperative that all of us make it as meaningful as possible." It is the belief of the Township Board and myself that youth, what ever age you consider that to be, will have been served

well by their public officials in the decade of the 70's.

City Gets A Lesson Hard Way

The Westland City Council recently took a sock at regionalism but was caught with its conflicts showing.

At the annual budget action to approve the spending for the upcoming fiscal year, the city council chopped out a \$3,500 expenditure for membership in the Southeast Council of Governments, a voluntary organization of governmental units in the Detroit metropolitan region.

THE SAME night the council approved the new budget - sans the SEMCOG membership dues - it approved an additional \$600 for the Livonia - Westland **Community Commission on** Drug Abuse.

The commission is made up of four governmental units to fight a problem which crosses city and school district boundaries. The city has already pledged about \$24,000 to the commission and some people think that the figure is less than what is really needed.

Another segment of the new city budget calls for \$768,000 in funds for the Central Wayne Sanitation Authority, of which Westland is one of five neighboring cities joining in a common effort to provide a public service which would be too expensive for just one city to handle financially.

Another \$117,203 is budgeted for the Peoples Community Hospital Authority, in which Westland and 22 other communities joined many years ago to provide health care at a reasonable cost. SEVERAL YEARS ago, the city council joined with Dearborn Heights to have the Michigan Humane Society construct an animal shelter fer the two cities - something which would have been toc expensive for just one community to handle. A new development which makes it more advantageous for Westland to join SEMCOG is the federal requirement that the council of governments review all applications within its region for federal funds. Since the city is about to ask the federal government for about \$2 million in funds for a senior citizens' housing project, it would be nice if the community helped support the organization for the services performed for it. THE SEMCOG people were polite in telling Westland that it would cost the city \$100 for the service to non - members. With Westland and other suburbs getting more involved in environmental quality and other regional programs, it's about time that city officials working outside of SEMCOG realize that they should get together on a lot of things besides uniting to oppose cross district busing.

WE WERE MOST fortunate in the timing of the Federal unemployment money. This became available in August of 1971, and we were able to hire a fulltime Youth Commission director to conduct the activities of this commission. A nine man non - paying commission was formed and things got under way.

The objective and goal of the Youth Commission is twofold. It is:

No. 1. to strive to organize and implement their own programs.

No. 2. to work within the framework of existing clubs and organizations in the Township to help assimilate some of our youth into these programs.

Further, the Youth Commission is inviting various organizations to have ex - officio members in advisory non voting capacities. This will lend many different and worthwhile views to many matters that will affect the youth of the Township.

ONE OF THE FIRST things that was achieved by the commission was to help find jobs for the young people of the Township. As of this writing our

Snob Zoning Strengthens Roth's Case

It's one thing to call Federal Judge Stephen Roth's school busing order illogical, absurd, asinine, ridiculous or shocking, as many of us have done.

Tim Richard writes

The consensus seems to be that busing is at best a poor way t. end segregation in Detroit and the suburbs. Even the most liberal folk in these parts qualify their acquiescence by saying: "Well, if busing is the only way we can desegregate, then we'll have to do it."

Fortunately, there are indeed other and better ways to desegregate. If you are one who frankly doesn't want black people anywhere around, stop right here. But if you honestly oppose segregation, there are alternatives to Roth's buses.

ROTH HIMSELF found that

"residential segregation throughout the larger metropolitan area is substantial, pervasive and of long standing," and that "governmental actions and inaction at all levels, federal, state and local, have combined with those of private organizations, such as loaning institutions and real estate associations and brokerage firms, to establish and to maintain the pattern "

There's the irony of it: School children are to be hauled around for desegregation purposes because of governmental and business actions on housing.

The most blatant example is the snob zoning enforced in our suburbs. Our planning commission members aren't even subtle about it; they frankly

say they want high - priced housing to be built.

planning commissions accepts a plat for that kind of housing

FEDERAL POLICIES call on a quota basis throughout here April 5.

Kraft noted that this kind of arrangement can be worked out "by agreement between the central city and the surrounding counties." To the extent that our good ol' home town officials work out these

can agreements, we desegregate without busing. And in the unlikely event Roth's order is upheld by higher courts, it will reduce the amount of busing required.

Kraft also pointed to four federal district and Supreme Court decisions that forbade the misuse of local zoning in an attempt to segregate. The sooner similar suits are filed here, the better our chances of avoiding Roth - type decisions.

Roth's busing order would mix kids in a classroom a few hours a day, but it would do virtually nothing to truly integrate us with our fellow Americans in this region.

To be flippant: "Bus planning commissions and realtors - not kids."

Trout Is A Tasty Entree By ELLY

Here's a tasty entree that is great eating any time of the year but is especially appropriate in the summertime when fishermen are proudly bringing home their catch.

The recipe for crispy fried rainbow trout may also be used for other pan - sized fish.

If you do your fishing at a seafood counter it is nice to know that pan - dressed rainbow trout are available the year round.

Trout are now raised in great numbers in large ponds of cold clear running water on trout farms in the United States. They are fed carefully balanced diets and are selected for market when they have grown to exactly the right size. They are cleaned, packaged, fresh or frozen, minutes after being caught. Market forms include whole, dressed, filleted, boned and breaded. Frozen trout are usually sold in packages containing two, four-ounce trout.

Fresh trout, packed in ice, are usually from five to 10. ounces in weight.

Trout are highly nutritive and are low in fat.


Crispy fried rainbow trout is an easy - do recipe that may be prepared at home, on the patio, or over a campfire. The fish are dipped in milk, then rolled in a cornmeal, flour and paprika mixture. Fry a few minutes on each side until the fish are golden brown and the flesh flakes.

CRISPY FRIED RAINBOW TROUT

6 pan - dressed rainbow trout or other small fish, fresh or frozen 1/4 c. evaporated milk

Dash pepper ½ c. flour





Thaw frozen fish. Clean, wash and dry fish. Combine milk, salt, and pepper. Combine flour, cornmeal and paprika. Dip fish in milk mixture and roll in flour mixture. Fry in hot fat at moderate heat for four to five minutes or until brown. Turn carefully and fry four to five minutes longer or until brown and fish flake easily when tested with a fork. Drain on absorbent paper. Serve with lemon slices, makes six slices.

FOILED TROUT

2 carrots 2 small white onions 2 shallots or green onions 2 stalks celery Butter or margarine Salt and pepper 6 trout **Cooking oil**

Chop the vegetables fine and saute in one quarter cup of butter until soft. Season to taste. Clean the trout and stuff each one with a little of the mixture. Dot with butter and place about three inches from broiler. Broil for four minutes. Seal each in a piece of foil. Oil the foil. Place on a buttered cookie sheet and bake in a preheated 425 - degree oven for 15 to 18 minutes.

TRUITE AU BLEU

This is the classic French and Swiss way of cooking fresh trout. Prepare a mixture of three parts of water to one part vinegar. Add six peppercorns, piece of bay leaf and one teaspoon salt to each quart of liquid. Bring this to a boil. Plunge in the freshly cleaned trout and poach just long enough to cook through. about four minutes for the average fish.


Serve them hot with melted butter and boiled potatoes, or chill them and serve cold with mayonnaise.

The vinegar in the water turns the skin of the trout bright blue, hence the name, "truite au bleu."
