

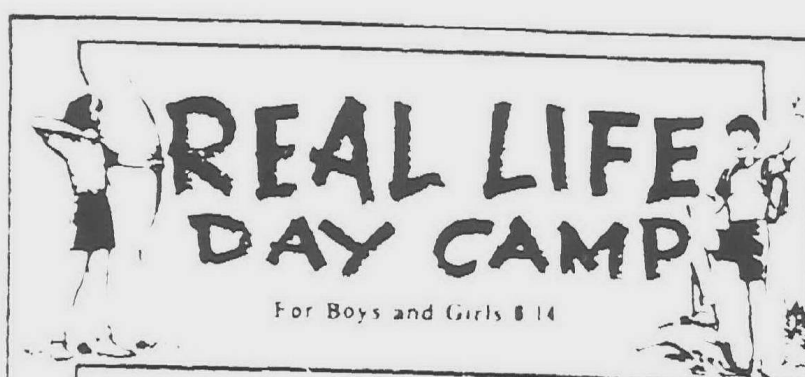

Fourth Of July Thrills

While countless thousands will be hurrying to the beaches and parks across the land Tuesday to celebrate the 196th anniversary of our nation's birth, The Stroller is planning an unusual trip.

Far from the crowded highways and the glare of the bands in the time honored Fourth of July parades, he plans to sit in the quiet of his backyard, weather permitting, and enjoy a mental tour of the many unforgettable moments he has experienced on this day that was set aside years ago to celebrate our independence from England.

He'll see himself again as a lad visiting Independence Hall in Philadelphia in company with his Aunt Fanny and, at her insistence, place his hand on the Liberty Bell and offer a prayer for the country.

These annual visits to the hall where the Continental Congress met to establish the new nation left an indelible impression on a youthful mind that has lived through the years.

ON THIS mental tour, The Stroller will live again one of the most emotional experiences of his life.

It was the morning of July Fourth some years ago and,

purely by accident, we got to Old North Church in Boston at noon after a visit to Lexington and Concord where the "Minute Men" fired "the shot heard round the world."

After standing on this sacred ground—America's first battle field—the group was taken for a view of the U.S. Constitution, affectionately referred to in history as "Old Ironsides."

It was in this same Boston harbor that the Pilgrims staged their famous "Boston Tea Party," and standing there, listening to the narrative, one could almost see the tea landing in the water.

But the real thrill came at Old North Church, famed in history as the site of the belfry from where Paul Revere received the signal that the British were coming.

YOU REMEMBER the bit of history that reveals the plan worked out with Revere for the displaying of lanterns in the belfry—"one if by land and two if by sea?"

We had been seated in the old church just a few moments when the white-haired minister who guided the tour stood at the pulpit for the noon service and recalled that Mr. Smith (SF) who wrote the words to the song, "America,"

lived only a few blocks away in the early days.

After telling us that Mr. Smith used to visit the church daily to practice on the famed old organ, he asked—

"How would you like to pay tribute to him by singing 'America' to the same music he used when he wrote it?"

With that, the strains of "America" rang through the old church. Everyone stood, but few completed the words. So great was the emotional impact that we all suffered from lumps in our throats and tears ran down our cheeks just at the thought of such an experience.

It was a few moments The Stroller wishes every one could enjoy; for he'll never forget that Fourth of July morning in Old North Church.

ANOTHER UNUSUAL Fourth of July morning that will be recalled on the mental tour was one spent in the Mormon Tabernacle in Salt Lake City.

As the regular program ended, the leader of the famed Tabernacle choir announced—"Because of the fine acoustics in the auditorium that pick up the least bit of sound—and the fact that we are on a national radio network—we ask that you remain seated

quietly during the closing number."

With that the choir gave a rendition of "The Star Spangled Banner," the like of which we never had heard before.

The thought of sitting at a time like that—on a Fourth of July morning during the singing of the national anthem—gave one a feeling of chills running up and down his spine—but one that will live on and on.

These are just a few of the stops The Stroller will make on his unusual tour Tuesday morning—and he's looking forward to a grand time.

Wish you could come along.

costs.

The board stipulated that any community solicitations or fund-raisers must be cleared by it before taking place.

Both trustee George Lawton and Supt. John Hoben emphasized that there aren't any school funds available for such a trip.

Hoben said in a note to the board that he was concerned about the effect of the trip on the bond issue that will be put before the voters in October or November. The issue is for school facilities needed in the coming years.

"INASMUCH as we are on an extremely reduced budget which may force us to make some major changes in the curricular structure of our schools and very serious cuts in our operational budgets, no money would be available from the general operating fund to support such an activity," he said.

"My second concern deals with the process by which they would gain \$40,000 to \$50,000 needed—whether public solicitation would be used or whether this would be stood solely by the parents—and the effect that this could have on an October-November bond issue."

"Although I am extremely thrilled with the possibilities of our children marching down Colorado Boulevard on New Year's Day, I do have reservations over the effect that a project of this magnitude would have upon the administration of the Plymouth Schools."

Hoben also said it is "disconcerting to note that the sponsors of this activity provide only a box lunch at the end of the march but no tickets or reservations."

In the spirit of friendship that exists with the people of Plymouth, England, the Stars and Stripes will be flown from the Municipal Building over there as a tribute to those who have made these bonds of friendship possible.

These friendships had their beginnings in 1967 when the then lord mayor, Frank Chapman, and three members of this council journeyed across the sea to help Plymouth,

Michigan, celebrate its centennial.

In turn, two years ago a delegation of 50 from here played a major part in the celebration of the 350th anniversary of the sailing of the Mayflower over there.

Two years ago, on a stopover on a tour of the eastern United States, Alderman George C. Creber, then the lord mayor, referred to Plymouth, Michigan, not as a "sister" city, but as a "twin," so strong are the bonds of friendship.

OUR MOONLIGHTING included publicity services and pictures for the "Miss Universe" pageant, which brought to our midst such cleavage specialists as Anita Ekberg, and no one was surprised when John and I set up shop on our own, so to speak.

Our "Miss Petite" idea called for a contest limited to girls who stood no more than five feet tall. The only other stipulation was that they be at least of the age of consent.

What we really had in mind was to sell the idea to the House of Nine as a national promotion and get rich quick. Needless to say, that inspiration went awry.

We lined up a plethora of "spinners" from the mile-long beach that faces the Pacific Ocean and made a deal with the pub owner where we had run up the biggest tab to hold the contest in his saloon, which sure enough was packed to the walls when the great day arrived.

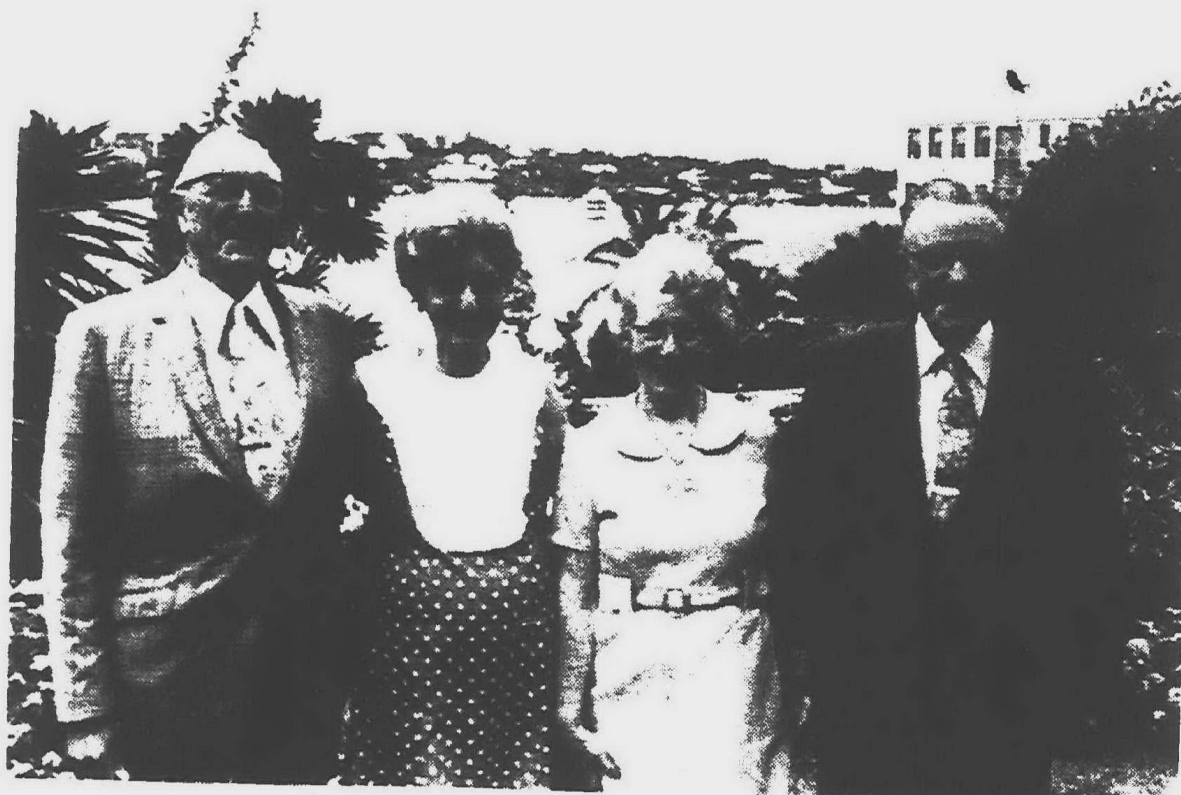
So there we were with a good crowd and plenty of pretty girls when John and I realized we were a little shy on the prize money. Whiskey salesmen had contributed willingly enough to build up a pretty good pot, but our public relations campaign had caused most of it to be reinvested.

I CAN RECALL having known only two females in my life named Ida, both of them lovely and talented, and one of them was our winner. Our publicity had stressed the fact that an all-expense, prepaid weekend in Las Vegas would await "Miss Petite" and this dumb broad expected us to live up to it.

Not only was Ida openly irritated when we attempted to negotiate a gentlemanly settlement, but her attorney was downright rude.

Once again, however, our savior -- that managing editor of whom I spoke -- stepped into the breach.

Ida got her expense-free weekend in Las Vegas, thanks to the paper, but "Miss Petite" ended right there. I remember very well where I worked next, but I have no notion what ever happened to Brother John.

Kendall Sees Both Berlins

14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Kendall of 765 Parkview Drive, Plymouth, tells of visiting the two Berlins earlier this year while on a European hiking tour.

I'm coming from Berlin this morning in an east German train, pulled by a steam engine.

Yesterday I visited East Berlin but had to cross back to the west side the same day. It makes quite a contrast with West Berlin, which resembles many west German cities--busy boulevards crowded with attractive stores and tasteful new construction--brightly lit up at night.

The eastern half is also filled with new buildings, some of them quite modernistic and forming an interesting skyline at dusk. But the majority were boxy and uniform as if built from a single pattern, spaced widely apart and adorned with colored tile, shiny metal and mosaics.

There are boulevards as wide as 12 lanes with parking areas in the center, but very few cars, and huge plazas that

are almost empty of people in the middle of a weekday.

The temperature was near zero when I visited, and the wind through those open spaces was strong enough to keep many people indoors, perhaps.

But there weren't many stores either and most of the merchandise remarkably seedy and old-fashioned.

Perhaps it's too easy to run down a society that's different from what one is used to, with different priorities, and where one can't tell the policemen from the mailmen.

There are a lot of uniformed people walking about whose duties are none too clear.

You are obliged to exchange West German marks at official exchanges for an equivalent number of East German marks, although their western value is supposed to be only one-fourth of that. Hence, prices are about the same, although you can cut them by not declaring all your money, then change it with people who approach you, at a better rate.

It would really take a much longer stay to form a reliable

impression of a country so different.

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Ground-Breaking Opens Unity's 2nd 10 Years

Unity of West Suburbia, with ground broken for its new church building and its third minister installed, moves this week into its second decade in Livonia.

The congregation that held its first services in Bentley High School July 1, 1962, expects by the first of next year to be worshipping in a new sanctuary to be located on Five Mile between Middle Belt and Inkster.

Gene Sorensen, just arrived from Los Angeles to succeed Marilyn White as minister, was on hand for the ground-breaking Friday, June 23.

So were Livonia Mayor Edward H. McNamara, Tom O'Connor representing William Lindhout & Co., architects, Tom Kowalsky, president of the church board and quite a few of the members.

THE CHURCH. affiliated with the Unity School of Christianity in Kansas City, Mo., had its beginnings here a little over 10 years ago when Diane Seaman, a Unity minister, started a series of lectures May 1, 1962, in Bentley.

By May 23, an advisory committee to form a new Unity center had been set up, and the first service was held July 1.

Two years later the congregation moved to its first home, located at 30025 Curtis, Livonia. Existing buildings there were remodeled to meet the congregation's needs, and formal dedication took place July 19, 1964.

MISS SEAMAN served as minister to Unity of West Suburbia until July of 1969, when she left for a Unity ministry in Barbados in the West Indies.

In the fall the post was taken over by White, the youngest Unity minister in charge of a full time ministry.

The following year it was decided that the Curtis location did not allow sufficient room to expand the church's program. The 3½ acres on Five Mile were then purchased, and had been paid for completely by the time ground was broken for the new building.

The property on Curtis was

sold this year to a Baptist church moving out from Detroit, and the Unity congregation, now numbering about 200, has been holding Sunday worship services and Sunday School in Clarendonville High School until the new building is completed. Midweek classes are located in a home that remains temporarily on the new property.

THE NEW BUILDING will contain over 6,000 square feet of space, with the sanctuary

designed to seat more than 250 persons.

A carefully-planned arrangement provides that no seat in the sanctuary will be more than seven rows from the pulpit.

Gene Sorensen, the new minister, accepted the charge after White was called to a ministry in Tampa.

Before coming to Livonia, Sorensen was associate minister of Christ Church, Unity, in Los Angeles, a 5,000 member congregation. He was responsible for youth education and could be heard

daily on Unity's Dial-A-Prayer and on Sundays on KLAC radio.

A graduate of Sacramento State College with a degree in philosophy, he was ordained by Unity School of Christianity in 1962 and has served ministries in Fort Worth, Ventura, Calif., and Shreveport, La. He and his wife, Lucille, have three sons.

Sorensen said in his talks he emphasizes "the practical application of the eternal truths taught by Jesus Christ."

When Is Lord's Day? On Thursday At Pilgrim

For the third summer, Pilgrim United Church of Christ in Livonia has changed its worship time from Sunday morning to 7:30 p.m. Thursday.

The Thursday services began June 29 and will continue through Aug. 31, with the next Sunday worship scheduled Sept. 10.

The church, located at 36075 Seven Mile, tried midweek services replacing those on Sunday for the first time in 1970. The schedule was followed for five weeks that year and for eight weeks in 1971. This year the church council voted to expand the program for 10 weeks.

THE REV. JAMES W.

Schaefer, minister of the church, wrote in a newsletter to the congregation that "we must agree that worship is possible at any time, at any place, on any day of the week," and added:

"The decision of Pilgrim Church has been to move to Thursday, which is just a good Lord's Day as Sunday for corporate worship during the summer weeks."

WRITING of the tradition of the Sabbath, he stated: "Old Testament Sabbath was the last day of the week, Saturday. Because the Resurrection occurred on the first day of the week, Sunday, the early church made that

day a time of rest and worship.

"But the idea of the day of rest is confused. Our western tradition seems to come from Genesis saying that one should work six days and rest on the seventh. But most people work only a five-day week. Housewives are exempted from such restrictions; they get to work seven days a week.

"But we don't rest on the sixth or seventh days—we have a long list of tasks to do around the house, so we may work harder physically on weekends than we do at our job during the week.

"AS LONG as the day of rest and the sabbath were the same day, it made sense to worship on Sunday.

"Just as the old 'blue laws' have been removed by the courts as discriminatory, so the old custom of relaxation and rest on Sunday has changed. For some people, the long weekend allows time for a journey or visit or some activity that requires more than one day."

Of the previous summers of Thursday worship, Rev. Schaefer added: "I remember how it felt sort of funny not to get up on Sunday to go to church. Habits aren't easily broken. On the other hand, the atmosphere and attitude of worshipping in the early evening was a pleasant and refreshing feeling."

Proceeds will benefit the retirement fund of the Felician sisters.

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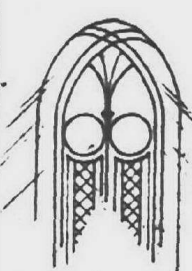

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Salvation Army Officer Loses Life In Flood

Detroit's Salvation Army offices have reported that Major William Medley, the Salvation Army commanding officer in Rapid City, S.D., gave his life while trying to help others escape the flood.

Witnesses say that Major Medley had just reached two persons from an area below the dam and placed them in a truck when the water broke through and swept him and his passengers to their deaths.

Mrs. Medley last saw her husband when they waded out of the Salvation Army Building in waist-high water. Major Medley set out to help people escape, while his wife set up temporary shelter for evacuees.

Buescher Is New KC Head

James D. Buescher has been elected Grand Knight of Father Daniel Lord Council, No. 3959, Knights of Columbus. His term is the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Buescher's board of officers will consist of John Ray, deputy grand knight; George Metz, chancellor; Vern Allie, warden; Leo Hamper, treasurer; Gerald Brisse, recorder; Tony Rogers, advocate; Joseph Sisson, Daniel Crowley and William Koenig, trustees; and Augie Acosta, Milton Vingsness and Marion Witowski, guards.

DURING THE HOURS that followed, Mrs. Medley organized scores of volunteers and worked to feed and house hundreds of evacuees in makeshift quarters in the city auditorium.

Few who saw her guessed at her anxiety for her husband. On the second day, when the major's body was discovered, Mrs. Medley went to identify it. Then she returned to work among the people.

Within 36 hours of the beginning of the disaster, Salvation Army workers were serving 5,000 meals daily. Five tons of clothing was distributed the first day.

Food was delivered by helicopter to people in isolated areas beyond the reach of roads.

SEVERAL HUNDRED local volunteers joined with Salvation Army workers.

The Salvation Army has been given total responsibility for the distribution of clothing and food in the flood disaster. Money is needed and the Army is now looking for contributions.

All donations will be forwarded to Rapid City. Salvation Army personnel and equipment will be on duty in Rapid City as long as the need exists.

Church Names Chapel For Rev. Elsie Johns

The chapel in the nearly completed sanctuary of the Clarenceville United Methodist Church of Livonia will be named the Elsie Johns Chapel in honor of the lady minister who is beginning her 32nd year of service there.

Rev. Johns was told of the decision when many of the church's 1,246 members gathered to honor her following services June 11.

Clifton Miracle, lay leader, made the announcement, and Les McCabe handed over a

check with suggestion that it be used for a good vacation.

THE LONG-TIME leader, known to everyone in the church as "Elsie", also received an orchid that was pinned on by Mrs. Harry Johns, former president of the Women's Society of Christian Service.

Rev. Johns, who found a church without members or money when she arrived in 1941, has guided the church through remarkable expansion.

The original building on Grand River at Collingham first was rebuilt and remodeled, and then the congregation moved to 20300 Middle Belt, where an educational unit was built initially on the 8½ acres.

Last July the mortgage on that building was burned and ground was broken for the new sanctuary. It is expected that it will be ready for occupancy by August of this year.

Rev. Lester Kinsolving's Religion Update

When convicted murderer Vaughn Booker was accepted as a candidate for the priesthood last January by Philadelphia's Episcopal Bishop Robert DeWitt, the news made understandable headlines throughout the country.

This novel ministerial recruitment was also the lead in Newsweek magazine's feature story on DeWitt, former Episcopal prelate in the Detroit area, which was headlined "The Maverick Bishop." Yet the content of this story hardly suggested a maverick, but rather a grand champion bull of penal redemption and social relevance.

The Newsweek story made no mention, however, of the fact that less than two years prior to Bishop DeWitt's designation of Booker as potentially deserving of Holy Orders, a court of law ruled him deserving of life imprisonment.

(News of DeWitt's plentiful redemption had hardly hit the wires before Berl Estes McDonald, an inmate of Leavenworth Penitentiary, filed a petition asking a U.S. District Court to order prison authorities to allow him to organize a Southern Baptist church behind bars.)

NEWSWEEK'S REFERENCE to the 20-year-old Booker was also devoid of any mention of another aspect

of the case — which makes any comparisons to Saul of Tarsus or Gollatha's Good Thief appear tenuous indeed.

For Booker confessed to having dispatched his spouse Annabelle, mother of two small children, with a bow and arrow.

Moreover, his bow had a 47-pound pull and he also confessed that he had used hunting arrows, which he described as "three prong, razor tipped" — which he shot from a distance of "about eight feet."

After the first shot, Booker recalled: "I was then aware of the pain and agony she was in, so I went to my quiver and pulled out another arrow; this one striking her in the throat."

After three more arrows, Mrs. Booker was dead — for the reason explained by Booker:

"Bickering arguments over the cleanliness of the house and the care of the children. I guess you might say we had basically economic problems."

SUCH EXPRESSED motives for killing his wife pose serious questions as to how Pastor Booker might react to the possibly infuriating negligence of an untidy altar guild, a haphazard Sunday School faculty, or a financially irresponsible (or stingy) church board.

Christian ideals do hold that the possibilities of rehabilitation are limitless. So, by all means, are the possibilities of a bishop and diocese being fooled — which was recognized by Jesus in his admonition to be "wise as serpents and harmless as doves."

Hence, Episcopal Church law requires an extensive scrutiny of the character and background of all candidates for the ministry — many of whom have been turned down for considerably less cause than the conduct of Vaughn Palmer Lorenzo Booker.

IF BOOKER is ever released and is ordained, he could provide another notable addition to the "outspeak young priests" with whom DeWitt "has surrounded himself" — according to Newsweek's elegant puffing of the 55-year-old prelate, whom the news magazine described as "wiry."

These include the Rev. David Gracie, a DeWitt assistant whose graceful manner in approaching a vast number of controversial issues was well illustrated at the recent Ecumenical Witness for Peace in Kansas City. During a speech by an elderly and dedicated pacifist, Rev. Gracie expressed his gratuitous dissent at one point — by shouting a vernacular for bovine excrement.

Another DeWitt associate (who is now an employee of the Union of Black Episcopalians — which has been subsidized by national Episcopal Church headquarters) is the Rev. James ("Jungle Jimmy") Woodruff.

The Rev. Mr. Woodruff has lectured widely — with essentially the same speech: a Mau Mau act consisting largely of a wildly imaginative diatribe, a bowl full of hate whitey.

His latest accomplishment, notes Philadelphia magazine, is a book calling for urban guerrilla warfare by blacks, since "White people are the enemy!"

Building, now under construction to house the Historical Museum, is being doubled in size.

Originally, the plans called for a building 50 by 75 feet when Margaret Dunning announced that she was

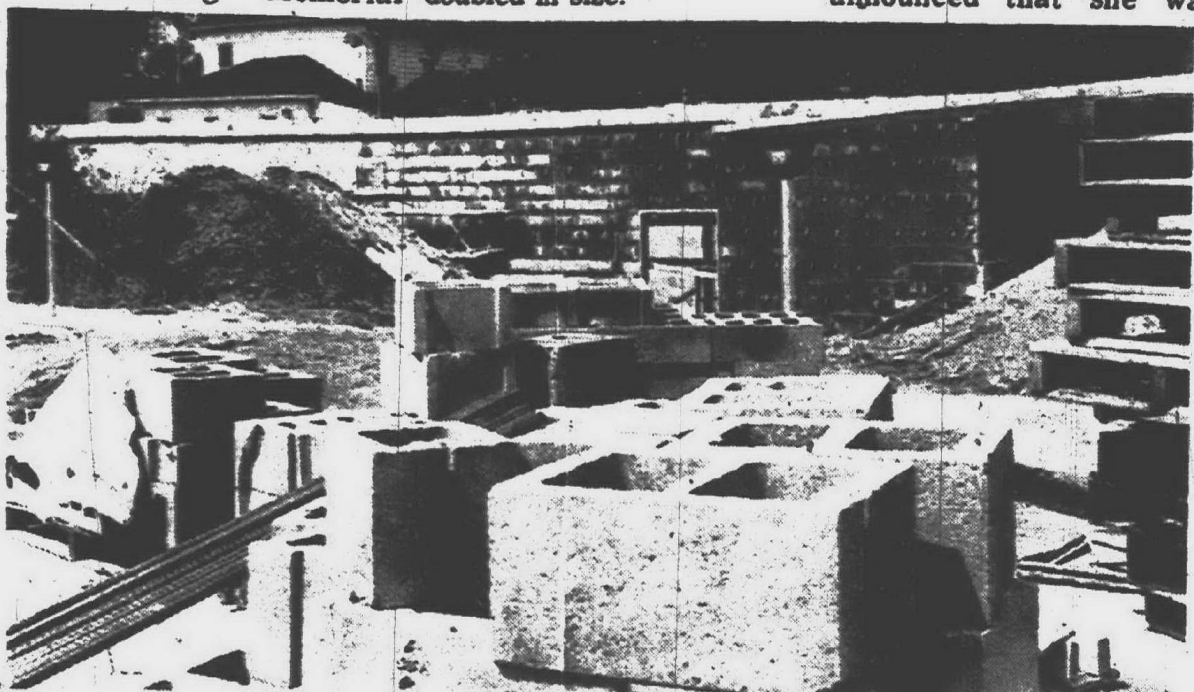
donating it to the community as a memorial to her parents. The extension will be 40 by 97 feet, which actually makes the building more than twice the size of the original plan.

Second, with the increased size, the basement can be used for a showing of antique cars. Always interested in antique models, Miss Dunning is planning one of the finest showings outside of Greenfield Village.

The third factor, is the opportunity to save a considerable amount of money. It is understood that these savings would amount to more than \$38,000 by building now instead of waiting for two years.

PART VIII. EFFECTIVE DATE. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety and general welfare and are hereby ordered to take immediate effect and be in force from and after the earliest date allowed by law.

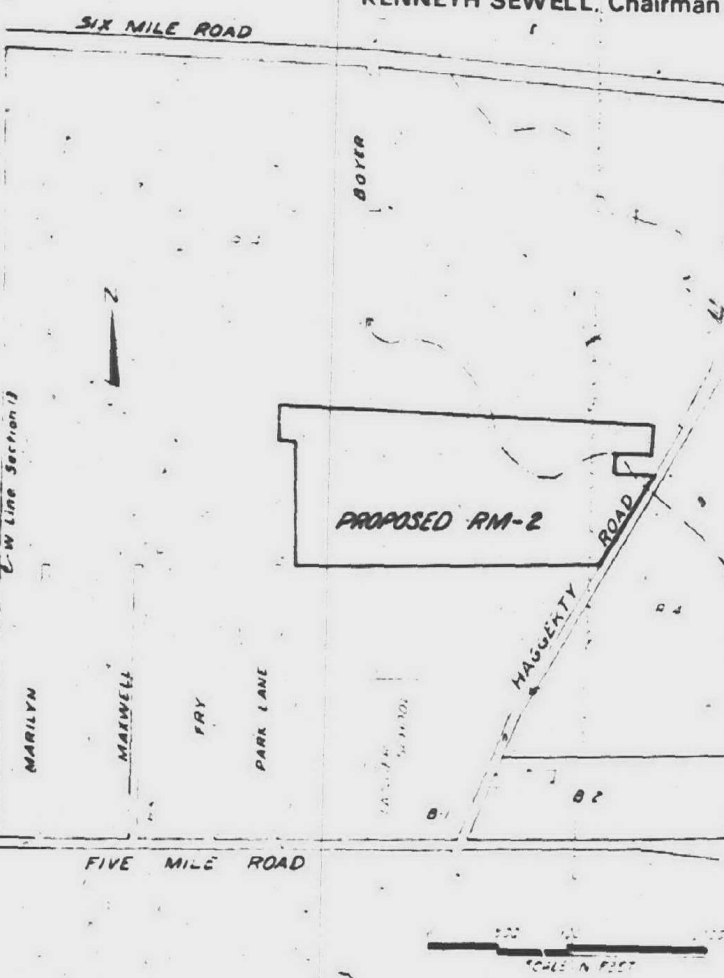

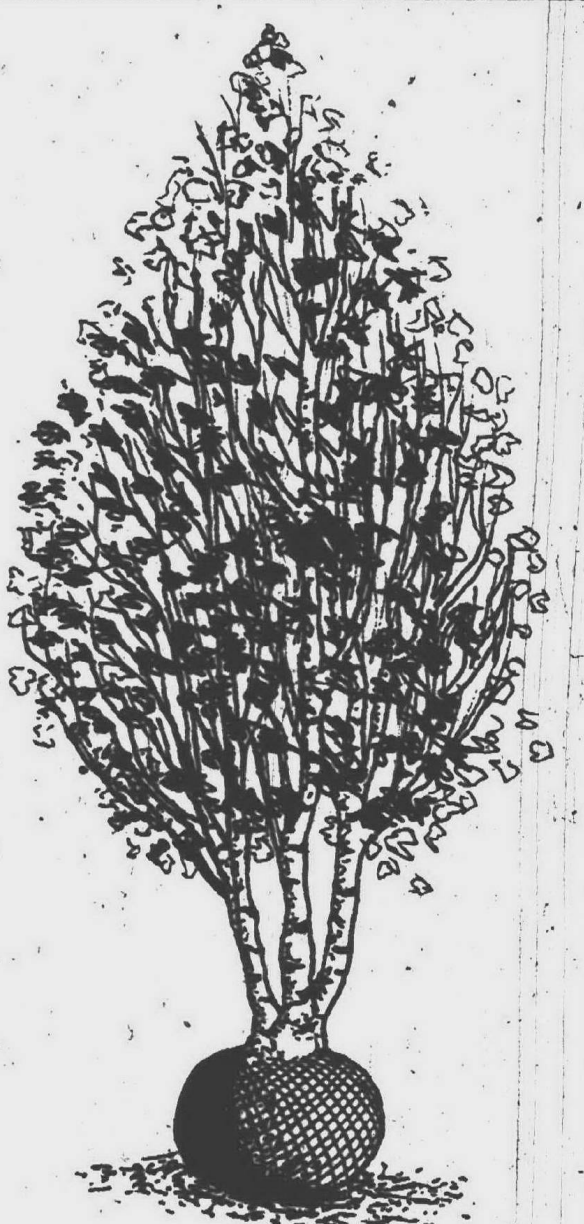

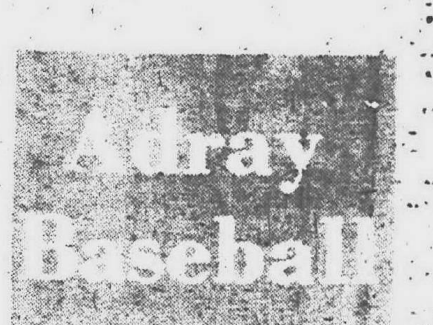
With two out, and two strikes, Bob Fields lashed a single past first base and

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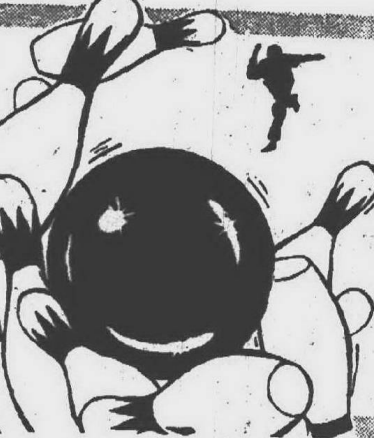
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IN THE POCKET

Bowlers from Observerland and all other sections of the nation will have a new goal to aim at when next season gets into full swing.

It will be known as the Presidential Sports Award and the announcement from the White House gives further proof of the impact the ancient game of bowling has on the American scene.

Announcement of the new award was made by the President's Council on Physical Fitness and Competition for it will be open to all bowlers, starting with the 18-year-olds.

THE REGULATIONS and standards announced by the Council call for a regular and steady, but not rigorous schedule of bowling. It asks that 150 games be bowled over a period of four months and no more than five games a day can be credited toward the total. Further, the 150 games must be bowled in not less than 34 different days.

Regular league games may be applied to the total. In

general the standards call for the bowler to bowl nine or 10 games each week with not more than five games each day.

To register for participation in the program, the bowlers are asked to write to:

New York City, N.Y. 10010.

Plans for a recording book in which the record of games bowled in kept and the Council then will decide on the recipients of the award and the winner given a chevron to wear and a certificate bearing the Presidential seal.

THERE'S A new struggle going on along the Observerland bowling front—and it is a battle for star bowlers to fill the various classic rosters for the September get-away.

There is scarcely a Classic in the area that is not on the hunt for new bowlers—and even new sponsors and teams.

The Westland Bowl Classic, for instance, lost three teams since the season closed and thus far has accepted only one replacement. There is a hunt on for the two other teams needed rather than reduce the size of the circuit.

WITH ONE more month to go before the ABC year ends, the metropolitan area bowlers are behind their schedule in registering perfect games.

Thus far only 41 have been

certified, against 45 last year.

"Of course we had three in July last year," Tom McKay, secretary of the Greater Detroit Bowling Association explained, "so there is a chance to equal the count of a year ago."

The 298, and 299 counts are relatively the same as last year with 25 that were one pin short of perfect games and 17 that were two pins short of last year's count.

ONLY THREE bowlers were able to better double century figures in the Summer Mixed League at Garden Lanes.

Immer Santee showed the way with a 633. Right behind him came Al Kowalski with 624 and Harvey Wilson with 615. Loretta Buresh paced the women with a 554.

AN 11-YEAR-OLD boy stole the show in the Merri-Bowl Junior league with a 507 series that came on games of 204, 159 and 144.

ANOTHER JUNIOR -- Robert Novak, 16 years old, -- paced the Junior House League at Cloverlanes with a 244 game that came between games of 147 and 157.

TWO MORE weeks of bowling and training are scheduled at Cloverlanes before the Livonia Parks and Recreation big summer program gets under way.

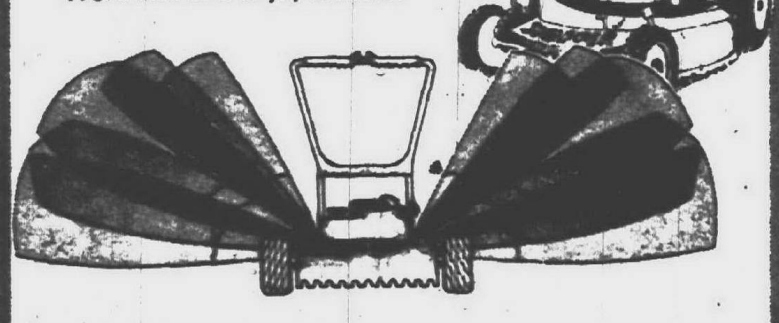

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Parades Bring Back 50 Years Of Memories

When the "drums go bang and the cymbals clang" at community band concerts and parades this summer, it will bring back a lot of memories for Wilfred Blackney of Hubbard Street, Livonia.

At 87, he finds it too difficult to get out to concerts in person, but he'll be there in spirit and he spends "all day and all night" listening to band concerts on radio and television.

His memories include playing under the baton of Victor Herbert, who died in 1924, and John Philip Sousa, who died in 1933.

BLACKNEY was a bandman for more than 50 years. He started when he was 14.

He was born in Cornwall, England, and was 14 when he joined the British Army. He started as a band boy and after 12 years of service (1899-1911), he wound up as a band corporal "which was an exalted rank in the British Army." He had also traveled to India, Ceylon and South Africa.

He learned to play what he calls "a conglomeration of instruments," including the trombone, the euphonium and the string bass.

Just before the outbreak of World War I, Blackney left the Army and went to Toronto, Ont., where he lived for five years and met his bride, who had also come from England. Although he worked delivering coal and ice, he was also in demand for band concerts and parades. He played in the Anglo-Canadian Leather Company Band, "one of the finest in Canada."

He came to Detroit on the invitation of the conductor of the Dodge Brothers Band and played with them for four or five years, and with other bands "for funerals and weddings."

IT WAS while with the Dodge Brothers Band he played under the baton of Victor Herbert. Herbert was hired to conduct the band at several performances in a large New York hotel. The band also played with other noted conductors of the time. He played several per-

formances with the Great Lakes Sousa Band.

"Sousa was a great conductor, but I didn't care for the Sousa Band. Some of the musicians weren't that good," he says. "Sousa was a drawing card though, with his pointed whiskers."

According to Blackney, a good conductor "has to know music and how to take charge of musicians. They were an awful bunch, some of them."

IN DETROIT, Blackney worked as a house painter, eventually working for the city, but his band playing was very important not only as a musical outlet, but also as an added income. The Blackneys have six children, most of whom are living in Observerland.

"In those days you'd get pretty good money, at least six or seven dollars for a two-hour parade," says Blackney. For a week-long engagement, \$70 was a good salary. Blackney played with an Elks' band which won four different championships and took him to Miami, Fla., and Portland, Ore. He also played with the Shrine Band, and for 14 years was with the Detroit Police Band.

'Mackinac!' Cast, Crew Call Visit A Success

One of the most unusual weekend trips of the summer has been termed a terrific success by those taking part. And as a result, the Little Stone Church on Mackinac Island is a little richer.

Between 300 and 400 persons turned out last Sunday evening to see Michigan's original musical "Mackinac!" staged in its entirety in the casino of the Grand Hotel.

ALL THE proceeds went to the church, but the cast and crew and their families had the fun of getting themselves from Farmington to Mackinac Island for the performance and back ... with all their costumes and props.

About 70 persons and 20 cars made the trip, which required months of planning.

"Mackinac!" is the production which was written by June Rado of Farmington and Charlene Slabey of North-

ville for the Farmington Musicales. It played to some 1,500 persons in two performances in April, at Harrison High School.

The musical is based on the history of the early settlement of Mackinac Island. It has a cast of 11, a chorus of 14, two husbands of Musicales members, plus a nine-piece band. Almost all involved in the premiere production were there and all agreed "it was their best performance."

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
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
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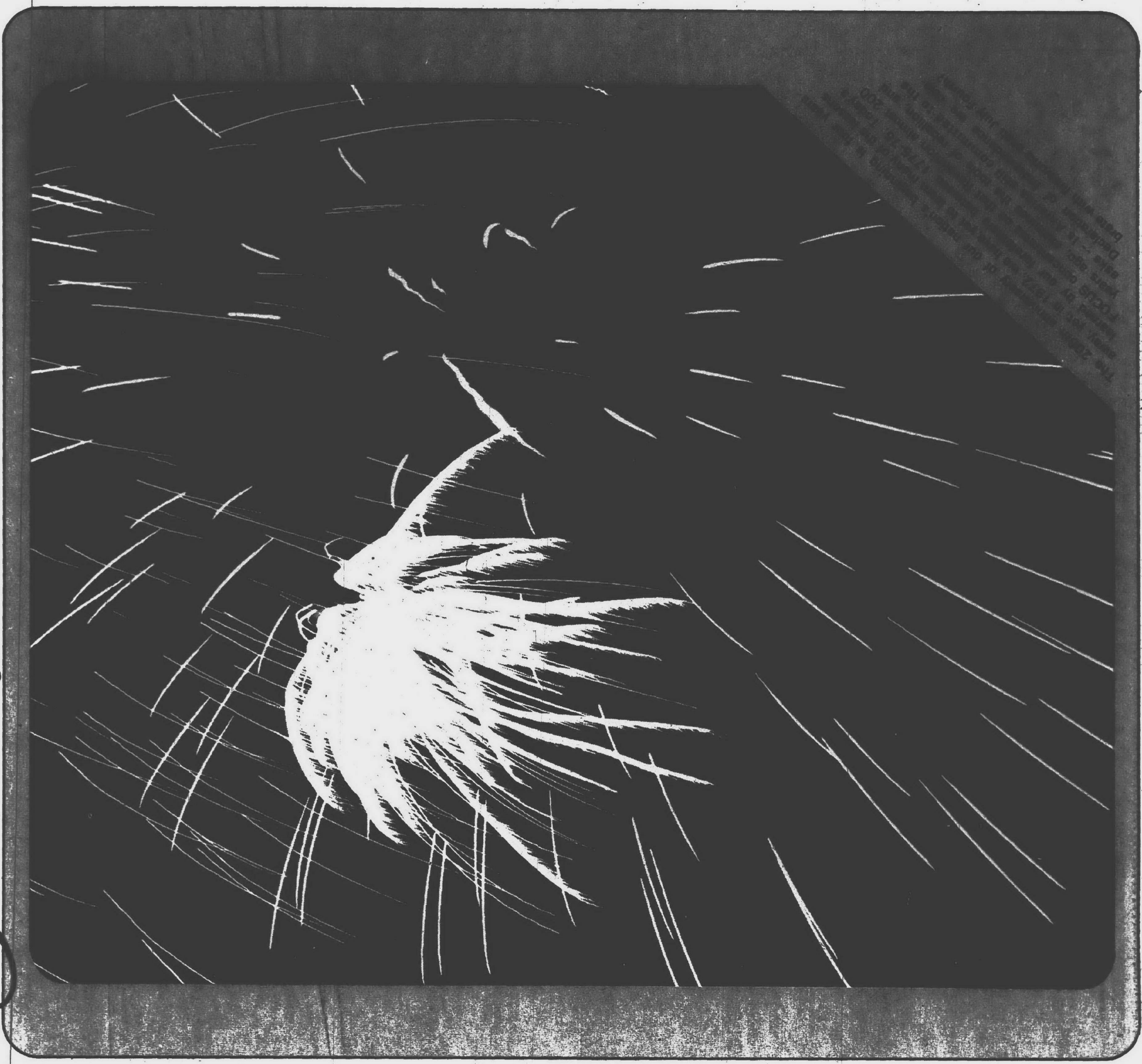
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Nation's Bible Should Be Read July 4, 1972

The low ebbs of man's journey
on earth are repeated when his-
tory is forgotten or unlearned.

The fool ignores history, and a
nation of fools is journeying to-
ward the folly and tragedy of a
past era which met its fate after
failing to learn from the history of
an earlier age.

Our nation will flourish or floun-
der depending upon whether fools
will comprise the majority of our
populace. If Americans can keep
our history in mind, there is hope
that any present or future crises
can be overcome. Otherwise, the
future is bleak.

JULY FOURTH, 1976, will be
the 200th anniversary of the sign-
ing of the Declaration of Inde-
pendence -- an announcement of
independence in 1776 which
demanded a war be fought to
become fact.

But has it become fact? The
Revolutionary War, indeed, did
grant this country freedom from
the mother country and the Con-
stitution enacted supplied liberties
the patriots decreed worth fighting
for. An examination of the Decla-
ration, however, would indicate
we have yet to execute the ideals
so proudly professed 196 years
ago.

The Declaration lacks basis
in law because it was simply an
announcement, and was left out
from the pages of the Constitu-
tion. As an announcement,
however, it defined the reasons
why the patriots felt revolution
was mandatory and laid an
ideological foundation upon
which were added the legal
document of the Constitution

and the Bill of Rights contained
therein.

When the Constitution is vio-
lated, the courts are able to pro-
tect the rights of individuals or
uphold a principle under attack.
The violation of the Declaration,
however, lacks any provision for
redress except in the consciences
and souls of all Americans.

A CONTEMPORARY commenta-
tor recently stated that the Decla-
ration of Independence and U.S.
Constitution are a package to be
considered the "Bible" of Democ-
racy.

He suggested that, just as
Christians read the Scriptures of-
ten, so should Americans refer
frequently to the Constitution and
Declaration.

"Can we claim to be 'good
citizens' if the last time we read
the Constitution was 20 years
ago in a school civics class? Can
we speak of 'Americanism'
without having read the Decla-
ration within the distant past?
How can we 'stand up for our
rights' without reading what
these rights are?"

July 4, 1972, might be
well spent reading aloud to the
family the Declaration of Inde-
pendence and Bill of Rights. A day
of patriotic devotions might help
decide whether we are a nation of
fools or real Americans committed
to preserve Democracy for tomor-
row instead of merely appropriat-
ing it for today.

A nation which learns to
gather grows and will dispel the
prophecy of pessimistic historians
that all great empires must fall.

ern world's first orchestra leader
of revolution. He knew that voters
are moved by their emotion rather
than by logic.

"A master of propaganda, he
realized that the general run of
people prefer drama and ritual,
both older than reason, to a well-
thought out exposition."

AGITATION and destruction
were the dual geniuses of Adams
who confused issues by describing
England's taxation policy as a
conspiracy of oppression by Mas-
sachusetts Governor Bernard and
Justice Hutchinson instead of
being the brain-child of King
George's ministry.

The conspiracy explanation
gave colonists a "visible hate fig-
ure" and avoided the necessity of
testing their loyalty to the crown
before 1770.

During 1765, Adams called
out the mobs to stir opposition to
the Quartering Act. In 1767, the
Townsend Acts were passed to
stop colonial smuggling and Bri-
tish commissioners seized the
"Liberty", a sloop owned by Han-
cock. But, the commissioners
were attacked by the mob and
forced to seek refuge aboard the
British frigate the Romney in the
Atlantic.

In 1770, reconciliation between
crown and colonies seemed possi-
ble until the infamous "Boston
Massacre" in March, 1770.

"Here, Sam Adams, fertile
organizer of resistance and ad-
vocate of separatism, saw that
the struggle was now reaching a
crucial stage," writes Churchill.

"This 'massacre' was just the
sort of incident Adams had hoped
for." The incident was played up in
the Boston papers and Sam revi-
talized his Committees of Corre-
spondence to spread the word
with letters to 75 colonial towns.

Thereafter, Adams staged
anniversary celebrations of the
"massacre" with street dramas re-
enacting the events according to
Sam's script. The last massacre
observance was held in 1784
when July Fourth was declared a
national holiday.

(For verification of how
minor an incident the Boston
Massacre actually was, readers
may wish to refer to a book en-
titled "The Boston Massacre" pub-
lished in 1970.)

Adams managed the Bos-
ton Tea Party after Parliament
passed a bill in 1774 closing the
port of Boston. It was, in part,
sympathy for Bostonians which
prompted the other colonies to
form the first Continental Con-
gress in 1774.

At this point, the arrest of
Adams and Hancock was ordered
and troops attempting this move
were met by the "embattled farm-
ers" on the hill at Concord.

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Sam Adams Led The Rebels

THERE HAVE been many indi-
viduals since Sam Adams who
have provided leadership, with
more legal techniques employed,
to help correct inconsistencies
between life in America and how
life should be led as defined in the
Declaration and legally required in
the U.S. Constitution.

There is still an inconsistency
between the way we Americans
live and the way we declare we
ought to. A leader someday will
step forth again to make latent
grievances patent and passive
causes dynamic.

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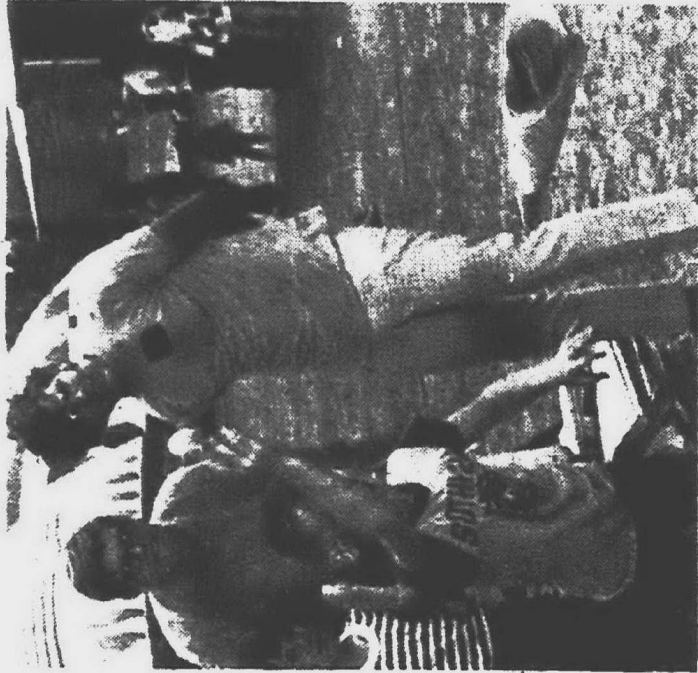

A Maturing Baby

Who were the men we have so fondly labeled our "founding fathers," and what were the tools they used to prepare public opinion in the colonies for a war against England to gain independence?

The men included Samuel and John Adams, Patrick Henry, John Hancock, Paul Revere, Thomas Paine, George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, and James Madison.

The tools used were the church, the press, demonstrations, public meeting places, ad hoc committees, and tradesmen.

THE CHURCHES in the 13 colonies played an important role in encouraging dissent against the crown, and in participating in events leading toward independence.

The lanterns used as signals for Paul Revere and his fellow riders were hung in Christ's Episcopal Church which still stands in Boston.

Christ's Church was used because it had the tallest steeple in Boston, and because Revere as a boy had a part-time job as a bell-ringer for that church and was familiar with how far one could see from its steeple.

The church was also chosen because the lantern hanger, Robert Newman, had access to the church keys because he was

working part-time as a sexton at the time.

Early contributions to the cause were sermons from the pulpits, especially from the Mather brothers, and debates on church porches after congregations were finally dismissed.

New England Puritans referred to their churches as "meeting houses," but they could more accurately be described as hotbeds of sedition.

These were the days of three-hour sermons and one-hour prayers. Churches were centers of intellectual life and Samuel and Increase Mather, who both pastored at Old North in Boston, often ban-died King George about for his treatment of God's people in the colonies.

The Sunday following the famed "Boston Massacre," a blistering sermon was presented by the Rev. John Lathrup. Using Genesis 3:10 as a text, he exhorted that the "British Lobsters" (troops) be put to death for their sins.

Churches were used as meeting places because most of the public halls, such as Faneuil Hall in Boston, were unable to accommodate large crowds.

CHURCH BELLS were used to summon townsfolk toward the church building, and not just on the Sabbath either. Peal of bells in

on a stamped paper. The stamped paper carried a tax of one-half penny for each copy for a two-page edition and a tax of two shillings for each advertisement.

The act did not radicalize Gazette Publishers Benjamin Edes and John Gill, however. They were already dedicated patriots and ignored the act by refusing to pay the tax. Edes was a politician and member of the Sons of Liberty group which John Adams labeled the "Loyal Nine."

The Gazette "news" columns were filled with political articles written by a group of Boston radicals, and helped prepare the minds of readers for the idea of independence.

Reporters drawn from the Caucus Club included such men as Sam and John Adams, Joseph Warren, Josiah Quincy, Thomas Cushing, Samuel Cooper, James Otis, and John Hancock.

Sam Adams used pen names, at least a dozen. Historian Frank Luther Mott states: "Through his writings in the Gazette and his talent for political organization and propaganda, Sam Adams doubtless did more than any other individual to bring independence forward as a practical measure."

John Adams, later in life, wrote of the revolutionary press when he stated: "The printers
