# AAA Plans Shift To New Site In Plymouth Township

Another familiar business face is departing from the downtown business scene.

After more than three decades in the immediate vicinity of Kellogg Park the Automobile Club of Michigan is leaving its present quarters in the First Federal Savings and Loan building for a new site on Ann Arbor Road - just west of Sheldon in Plymouth Township.

"With the present expansion of the population and the utter lack of parking in our present site we had no other choice but to find new quarters," said Plymouth Manager R.A. Roberts.

The move is not expected to be made until fall when a new building to be erected between the

shopping center and the Diack Cabinet plant on the south side of the road is to be completed.

"WE REGRET leaving downtown Plymouth," Roberts confided, "But while we spent considerable time looking for a site there just wasn't anything suitable to be had. Most of the places were old buildings that needed renovation. So it was thought best to build a new office entirely."

At present the AAA office has 37 employees and this will be increased to 40 in a few months. The plan is to add three employees each year to keep pace with the increased demands.

The Auto Club office was established in Plymouth when quarters were set up in the Mayflower Hotel in 1937. After a time, a move was made to the

Metting House. Then, 10 years ago, the office took over its present quarters in the bank building.

"With the manner in which Canton Township is exploding - business wise - and the other activities in the outlying districts," Roberts explained, "it was deemed necessary to centralize our offices - and with easy access and parking. This we will have at the Ann Arbor Road site."

Roberts explained that the Plymouth office caters to an area that runs from Haggerty Road on the east to Dixboro on the west and from Joy Road on the south to the Grand River Expressway on the north.

The move of the Plymouth office is only the first of several shifts in location planned by the Automobile Club to keep pace with the expanding population in the suburbs.

## Downtown Walkway Takes Rank As "Jewel"

It never will match Wall Street, that tiny avenue of financial institutions that serve as the heart beat of the monetary world.

It can't match the curves on Lombard Street that the folks in San Francisco refer to as "the crookedest street in the world."

But there's a tiny new thoroughfare right in the heart of downtown Plymouth of which the populace can be justly proud. And the time might not be far away when it will have a special designation as one of the tourist attractions in Southeastern Michigan.

IT IS THE so-called "walkway" that joins Main Street with the central parking lot and, until a few weeks ago, housed Dave Agnew's jewelry store that was considered the smallest jewelry store extant, with a frontage of less than 10 feet.


Development of the "walkway" with its concrete benches, flower pots and other decorations is the answer to a problem that has plagued city officials for more than a decade.

Over that time they were plagued with two problems - the unsightly narrow entrance from the main business section to the parking lot and what could be done with the little city-owned jewelry store that once housed public washrooms.

On one occasion the city commission became bold enough to ask Dave, one of the real oldtime clock makers, to find another location.

EACH TIME the order was issued with tongue in cheek and the deadline delayed.

Meanwhile Dave, knowing that his days in downtown Plymouth were numbered, just bided his time. He served his oldtime customers and

stuck to his role as the headquarters for high school class rings and other bits of jewelry favored by the young high school students.

Then, along came City Engineer Tom Waffan, a real imaginative soul, with a plan that struck the fancy of the powers that be - and Agnew's jewelry store passed from the scene.

In its place now is a 10-foot walk, with concrete steps, plants, trees, park benches

and the like, that have been combined into a walkway of beauty as well as a real service to the public.

"WE'RE NOT finished yet," City Manager Norman Gaffney remarked, "We plan to paint the sides of the adjoining buildings, but haven't quite decided on the decor. Former Mayor James Houk has suggested that we acquire an artist who could paint an

either side to give the walkway a natural street look.

"Others have suggested that we have the artist paint snow capped mountain peaks on either side to give the walkway the appearance of a canyon."

Whatever plan is chosen the tiny walkway has become the cynosure of all eyes.

And as an oldtime baseball writer remarked - "The city made a good trade - Agnew's Jewelry Store for a picturesque walkway."

## Teachers Ask Old Benefit In New Pact

When Plymouth's teacher negotiations resumed this week the shape of the table was the same but the composition around it was different.

For the first time a school board member sat silently and listened as the two teams bargained.

Mrs. Marda Benson joined the session as an observer at the request of the teachers' negotiating team.

Bill Heath, president of the Plymouth Education Assn. and captain of the team, invited the board to send a trustee as an observer or a member of the board bargaining team in order to increase communications between teachers and the board.

The board bargaining team is composed of school administrators.

THE BOARD AGREED to have members sit as observers and Mrs. Benson, who was elected in June, became the first to experience the privilege.

Some teachers may also join the sessions to listen to their team bargain.

Negotiations had been stalled for nearly a month before they resumed Tuesday.

The most crucial question at present is whether to maintain teacher increments.

Under past contracts, teachers have worked their way up a 12-step ladder (equivalent to 12 years) before reaching their top professional salary.

While still on the ladder, teachers have received a percentage salary increase plus increments. Those beyond 12 years in the district receive a flat percentage increase.

THE BOARD TEAM wants to eliminate increments and put all teachers on a flat percentage increase.

Teachers want to keep the increments because the increments reward teachers for professional growth after each additional year of experience and because the ladder has been presented to the teachers as the method of working toward their professional salary.

If the increments are eliminated in midstream, teachers will, in effect, be climbing up a ladder that keeps adding more steps. The result would be that teachers would get no nearer the top than they are currently.

Progress of the negotiations hinges on the outcome of bargaining over this complex issue. Both the board and teachers hope that having board members personally

present at the sessions will increase the flow of information between the board and teachers.

## Court Gets Finlan Case On Sept. 18

Important trial dates have been set in two trials involving Plymouth cases. Both were set during pre-trial conferences Thursday.

In the case of Donald Crenshaw, 29, accused of shooting Charles Finlan on May 31, trial has been set in circuit court for Sept. 18 at 9 a.m. A judge has not yet been assigned.

Crenshaw will be charged with assault with intent to commit murder. His defense attorney is William Vanderkloot of Birmingham.

In the second case, David L. Bennett, a 17-year-old Plymouth student accused of the May 9 slaying of Mrs. Vivian Berry, will go on trial Monday, Aug. 21. Bennett's attorney is Dan Buress, of Livonia.

The pre-trial conferences are held between the prosecutor and the defense attorney.

## Storm Keeps Police, Fire Squads Busy

Township and city firemen were busy with storm-related calls Tuesday afternoon.

According to township Fire Chief James Gignac, his department responded to 11 calls, including one false alarm, during the wind and rainstorm late Tuesday afternoon.

They put out several small fires, and responded to calls about downed wires, he said. City Fire Chief George Schoenneman with his department working at full strength, answered 12 calls from about 3:34 until 10 p.m. Tuesday. Of those calls were two rescue runs not related to the storm.

Half of the city was without electrical power from about 3:30 until late evening, the chief said.

City police records show at least two storm-related accidents. In one, a car driven by a Livonia man, Clifford Morgan, was struck by a tree, and damaged; he was not injured. The accident occurred at the corner of N. Mill and Wilcox Rd.

# Recreation Program Getting Into Full Swing

With the "dog days" of August just around the corner the City of Plymouth recreation program is getting into full swing.

The program released this week shows there will be activity for groups of all ages and something interesting for

anyone inclined to take part in some sort of activity in the hot weather.

For example, two classes were started during the past week that are as far apart as the north and south poles.

The first of these is the dog obedience class which is

scheduled each Wednesday at 7 p.m. and it will run for 10 weeks.

AT THE OTHER extreme Acting Director Dan Venezia has arranged for guitar lessons on Thursday mornings at Central Junior High. There also is a class for beginners during the noon hour in the Community Building.

Meanwhile five playgrounds are going full swing with movies for the youngsters every Wednesday evening.

Featured weekly in the program are swimming on Mondays and Wednesdays with bowling on Mondays. Entitled with these activities are special events for the Junior Olympics to qualify entries for the big event in Metropolitan State Park.

With this farflung activity, three trips also have been arranged for the playground children. They will be taken to

the Detroit Zoo, Greenfield Village and Kensington State Park.

While much of the activity is

centered on the younger element the senior citizens are not being forgotten. Aside from the monthly Golden

Record, two trips are being scheduled for them.

THE FIRST of these is a cruise on the Detroit River, scheduled for Aug. 2. This is a four hour sight-seeing cruise up the river for 102 senior citizens.

The second trip is scheduled on Saturday Aug. 19, when the seniors will be taken to Tiger Stadium to watch the Tigers in action against California.

One of the most popular of the activities thus far is softball where 17 men's teams are competing and seven women's teams are meeting regularly on the city's three ball fields. Returns are coming in daily from the helium balloon contest and thus far 35 points have been heard from: The most distant places thus far are Scotland and Aylmer in Ontario, Canada, and Lake Orion, Mich.

## TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH BOARD OF TRUSTEES REGULAR MEETING JULY 11, 1972

The meeting was called to order at 8:01 P.M. by Supervisor Breen. All members were present except Mr. Ash.

**READING, CORRECTING AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES** - Regular meeting, June 27, 1972. Mrs. Holmes moved that the minutes of the June 27, 1972 regular meeting be approved as submitted. Supported by Mr. Burke and carried unanimously.

**READING, CORRECTING AND APPROVAL OF BILLS** - Mr. Burke moved that the last of Bills in the Grand Total amount of \$40,109.46 be paid. Supported by Mrs. Richardson and carried unanimously.

**COMMUNICATIONS** - Gerald Remus, Gen. Mgr. Detroit Metro Water Dept. Re: Increased water rates. Mr. Overholt moved to table any action on this item for one month to give the communication adequate consideration and due to the fact that a full board was not present. Supported by Mr. Burke and carried unanimously.

**OLD BUSINESS** - Donald Morgan, Re: Ordinance prohibiting mini-bikes, etc. Mrs. Holmes moved to table this item to the next regular meeting as the proposed Ord. was received by the Board members only this evening. Supported by Mr. Burke and carried unanimously.

**REPORT ON ADDITION TO WATER SYSTEM** - The following resolution was offered by Elizabeth Holmes, supported by Gene Overholt:

**RESOLVED** that the Township of Plymouth Board of Trustees, contemplates the extension of the Township Water System. The Engineer has estimated the cost of this construction including Engineering and Contingencies to be \$60,000.00.

**NOW THEREFORE** the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees request the Wayne County Road Commission to release to them the approximately \$60,000.00 from the Plymouth Township Water Bond Issue, dated January 1, 1968, Series III, to be used in extending the Township Water System.

**Establishing fee for inspections of single family dwellings at the time of resale when requested by V.A. F.H.A. and Conventional Mortgage companies.** Following discussion with Mr. Alloway, Mr. Overholt moved to accept the recommendation of the Building Inspector to amend the Building Code to allow for the \$50.00 fee and inspection procedure for V.A. F.H.A. and Conventional Mortgage inspections when requested. Supported by Mr. Millington and carried unanimously.

**Recommended Planning Commission appointments to expire July, 1975.** Mr. Breen recommended that the present Commissioners, Mr. Stecker, Mr. Trover and Mr. Siefker be appointed to the Planning Commission. Mrs. Richardson moved to accept the recommendation of the Supervisor and reappoint Mr. Stecker, Mr. Trover and Mr. Siefker to the Plymouth Township Planning Commission for a three year term. **James Griffith, Sec., Planning Commission.** Re: Edgar F. Markfield Appl. No. 123. Final Preliminary Plat of Plymouth Meadows Sub. Mrs. Richardson read communications from Brender Hamill and from the Water Resources Commission. Mrs. Holmes moved that the Board accept the recommendation of the Plymouth Township Planning Commission and approve the final preliminary plat of Plymouth Meadows Subdivision and approve the recommendation to grant an area variance on lots 4, 8 & 9 as provided in Subdivision Ordinance No. 32, Section 8.01. 

## New Books In Library

"An American Death," by Gerold Frank. "The True Story of the Assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., And The Greatest Manhunt of Our Time" is the subtitle of this suspenseful documentary.

In his note to the reader preceding the first chapter, Frank says, "It is important for us to know the truth about the assassination of Dr. King, who murdered him, why he was murdered, and what actually took place from beginning to end. We want to know this, if not for the sake of our own sanity in a world where the bizarre all too often becomes the commonplace, then at least in the hope that by knowing and understanding it, perhaps in

some way — still unfathomable to us — we can help prevent such things in the days to come."

## Plymouth Man Held On Assault Charge

A Plymouth man was arraigned Wednesday on charges of aggravated assault against a police officer, with bond being set at \$5000.

Paul E. Thams, 21, Apt. 2, 887 Starkweather, was arrested by Plymouth police about 2 a.m. Wednesday morning, after police received a complaint about the suspect beating on the side of a house at 392 Farmer.

Visiting Judge Richard Hammer (from Garden City) entered a mute plea for Thams after he pled guilty without an attorney present.

Thams had not posted bond as of Thursday.

Examination has been set for Monday in the Plymouth District Court.

According to police reports, the suspect hit officer William Fletcher, cutting his lip, after he and another patrolman tried to stop and question him.

The officers chased Thams around the block near Starkweather and Spring St., and finally subdued him in front of 620 Starkweather, police reports show.

He was arrested by Fletcher, Lt. William Guldner and Ptl. Larry Ray. Witnesses say the suspect Thams was clad only in his underwear during the chase and arrest.

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## The Stroller... Faces Tell A Story

During the course of an hour the other afternoon The Stroller viewed two scenes that left him with lasting mental pictures and not a little disturbed.

First, as he walked through Kellogg Park, he watched as a group of youngsters looked with longing eyes into the pool at the fountain.

As he moved along, The Stroller came to Wilcox Lake where there he saw a young couple trying to paddle a canoe, only to be frustrated by the large beds of weeds. They made a noble effort -- but it was in vain.

AS HE STOOD there on the banks watching the hopeless battle The Stroller couldn't help letting his mind drift back to a day last summer when he visited Camp Dearborn, out near Milford, and watched literally hundreds of youngsters enjoying swimming and paddle boating. Even the adults had a hilarious time on the oldtime side-wheeler.

Yet, here we are in the Plymouth area, without any such thing as an ol' swimmin' hole or a place to go and paddle a canoe.

One of the great joys of childhood are the days

spent first in learning to swim and then enjoying the water by the hour in the hottest days of summer.

Many carry those memories through life and The Stroller well remembers the first time he paid a visit to the ol' swimmin' hole back home.

It was a beastly hot afternoon and the only place for comfort, it seems, would be in the pool of water that was an offshoot of the Lehigh River at the edge of a huge lumber yard.

After watching the other youngsters cavort in the water he felt the urge -- but there was a certain fear that he couldn't shake.

Finally, an uncle induced him to try it, saying with a comforting voice, "I'll be right here to watch you."

WELL, THE URGE finally overtook him and The Stroller, then a young lad of about eight or nine years, disrobed and cautiously waded in.

After being shown the proper use of his arms in the various strokes his uncle explained that the most important thing to learn was to swim under water and learn the trick of holding your breath while "down under."

With that he stood beside The Stroller and slowly ducked his head under the water -- just for a second or two -- and then let him up to gain his breath.

Things were going great until the mud-battle -- always a feature of the days in the ol' swimmin' hole -- got under way.

Uncle Pete had just pushed The Stroller's head under the water when, from somewhere, came a chunk of mud that hit him on the face. In the surprise of being hit and looking around to learn the identity of the culprit who threw it he forgot The Stroller.

BY THE TIME he did think of him and let him raise his head it was almost too late.

The neophyte of the waterways was so filled with aqua pura that he had to be rolled over a barrel until brought back to normal.

It was an unforgettable afternoon that left a lasting mark, a fear of the water that he has carried through life. And he still can't swim.

But there are other memories more enjoyable -- memories of the canoe rides up and down the river of a moonlit evening and the strumming of guitars under the stars.

It's too bad the youngsters in the Plymouth area are being denied such pleasures.

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




## Epiphany Worship In Woods

The congregation of Epiphany Lutheran Church of Plymouth is enjoying worship in the woods this summer. For a number of summer Sunday mornings, members and guests have carried blankets and chairs through a footpath to a clearing where an informal service takes place before a portable red pine altar and three standing crosses.

"We've had a tradition of varying our services in a number of ways," said the Rev. Fred Prezioso, pastor, "and for a couple of years now we have held outdoor services in front of the church for Reformation Sunday at the end of October."

"That's living dangerously, but we've been lucky and had good weather."

SUCCESS of those services, plus a far-reaching church reorganization that has included development of the three wooded acres on which the church is situated, has led to this summer's "green cathedral."

The congregation has worshipped in the natural setting two Sundays in June and two in July and is planning to continue the practice, perhaps into September.

"People seem to appreciate the change," Rev. Prezioso said.

"There is a formality that just has to happen once you're in the sanctuary with the chancel and pulpit and all the chairs facing the same way. 'That's neither good or bad—just a fact. And it's a different feeling outdoors.'"

THE CLEARING had its beginning when the congregation decided over a year ago to develop its wooded back yard. Several trails were hacked through the woods and a site was set up for outdoor campfires.

Youth of the church used the clearing. So did kids in the neighborhood around the church site on Five Mile Road. Then this year the church council decided to expand the clearing and try outdoor worship.

"We encourage people to come in picnic clothes and bring blankets," the pastor said, "but we do provide chairs for those who prefer to do their worshipping seated that way."

"It's a more informal service—if we have music, it's furnished by guitars. There's more speaking and interchange of ideas."

THE ALTAR, built by Roger Kubilis and Fred Stutzman, is made of several pieces that can be assembled easily. The crosses, replicas of the three tall ones that stand beside the church, were constructed for an Epiphany float in the Plymouth Fourth of July parade and are carried back to the site each time the worship is outdoors.

The services have had their light moments. One member mentioned that he liked "God's natural air-conditioning" and Pastor Prezioso wondered aloud if the commandment "Thou shalt not kill" applied to mosquitoes.

He also mentioned that "we set the altar way back, and then after people are seated we move it up to them—even out here people tend to sit at the back of the church."

## Foundation Begins New Program Aiding Children

NORWALK, CONN.

A remote mountain valley on an island in the Caribbean may well be the 70s landmark in child welfare that formation of Save the Children Federation was in the depression days of the 30s.

In a gold new move to widen the impact of SCF's worldwide child sponsorship program, David L. Guyer, the executive director of Save the Children Federation and the Community Development Foundation, has chosen the Hipolito Valley bordering the mountain frontier in the Dominican Republic to launch a new concept in sponsorship which will benefit the lives of 1,000 children under 15 years of age in this impoverished area.

"We have long been aware that the one child, one sponsor concept more often than not left out many equally needy youngsters in any given area," Guyer said.

UNDER THIS NEW form of sponsorship, the two agencies will cooperate in projects through which entire villages or communities will receive pooled sponsor funds. This extension of SCF's historical role in sponsorships will benefit directly hundreds of children in a given area.

However, the vital ingredient of contact between sponsor and child will be maintained, Guyer emphasized. Sponsors will still receive photographs and case histories of a child, as well as information on self-help community development projects in progress.

The sponsor will also be put in touch with and can correspond with an individual child in the area.

In addition, the sponsor will receive status reports and two letters annually from one child who will, in effect, be writing for all the children in the sponsored village or area.

"These letters will attempt to bring the sponsors into closer contact with all the children. Their problems, their successes. In short, these letters will seek to give the sponsor a closer involvement with the total society of a region as seen through the eyes of their sponsored child," Guyer added.

SCF HAS SPONSORS and contributors in every state in the Union and is celebrating its 40th year of service to children.

Under the new format, sponsorship funds will be designated for community use with the one important stipulation that one half of the

allocated funds will be applied to projects directly benefiting all children. The remaining half will be available for community development projects selected and carried out by the entire village.

"Under this new plan," Guyer said, "a child, in a sense, becomes a spokesman for his community to the outside world. And rather than deriving all the benefits of the sponsorship relationship, he learns to share them with his brothers, sisters and his friends in the community."

The Federation is registered with the U.S. State Department Advisory Committee on Voluntary Foreign Aid, is a member of the International Union for Child Welfare and the American Council of Voluntary Agencies for Foreign Service and of the International Council of Voluntary Agencies. 

The still explosive issue of abortion took up more than two hours of the Democratic (half-million-dollar-a-day) Convention here — and exposed presidential candidate and former Methodist pastor, George McGovern, as something less than Joe Clean The Straight Arrow. "St. George of the Plains" told this writer on May 11, during an exclusive interview, that he was opposed to denying abortions to victims of rape, incest and threat to health.

Yet when he addressed the Women's Caucus at the convention here, he pointedly ignored questions on the subject (which President Richard Nixon has undeniably made into a presidential issue.) McGovern also told the press conference that he was opposed to the following minority report to the Democratic Platform: "In matters relating to human reproduction, each person's right to privacy, freedom of choice and individual conscience should be fully respected, consistent with relevant Supreme Court decisions."

**BOTH BETTY FRIEDEN**, author of "The Feminine Mystique" and Jaqueline Ceblos of the National Organization for Women, told this writer of widespread pressure from McGovern headquarters to keep this plank off the platform.

But the vaunted discipline of the McGovern machine, which plowed under such hoary stalwarts as Chicago's Mayor Richard Daley and President George Meany of the AFL-CIO, came apart on this maneuver.

No less than 1,101 of the 2,673 delegates rebelled and came within 471 votes of hammering this plank onto the platform. Delegations from Califor-

nia, New York, Illinois, New Jersey — and even Massachusetts — among others, voted in favor of the pro-abortion plank.

**THIS UNPRECEDENTED** action should be of particular interest to the National Council of Churches — whose black militant staff members and certain general board members have been able to forestall any pro-abortion resolutions, allegedly in the name of the black community.

For there was by no means any black-white separation on this vote, with large numbers of blacks (especially women delegates) supporting the pro-abortion plank.

For instance, there was the convention's beautiful vice chairman, California legislator Yvonne Brathwaite Burke of Los Angeles, a candidate for Congress. Recently Minnesota's ultraconservative unofficial Catholic periodical, The Wanderer, headlined a protest of her support of liberalized abortion laws.

Yet, when asked about this protest, which the Wanderer's reportage seems to suggest was something on the scale of the Watts riot, Mrs. Burke laughed and recalled: "One lady called a press conference, denounced abortion, and then went home. We felt sorry for her, so we sent over some soft drinks."

**A SIMILAR FARCE** was provided by Hollywood actress Shirley MacLaine, a California delegate who, from her gyrations on this issue seems to be as cute and politically profound as Shirley Temple Black.

After a round-house brawl on the abortion issue during the pre-convention platform hearings in Washington, D.C.,

Miss MacLaine explained, "My whole point was to get abortion off the platform so George (McGovern) wouldn't have to run with it."

This column's recent statement that if Sen. George McGovern is elected president he will be the White House's first president-pastor (which claim was made after hours of research by the Legislative Reference Bureau of the Library of Congress) has been challenged by several readers.

They contend that James A. Garfield was a frequent preacher for the Disciples of Christ (Christian) Church. But headquarters of this denomination in Indianapolis discloses that while Garfield was indeed a frequent preacher and president of that denomination's Hiram College, he was never pastor of a congregation, nor was he ordained.

But when Miss MacLaine addressed the convention — having been announced as an opponent of the pro-abortion plank, she advised all delegates to vote their conscience. (She subsequently declined to tell this writer just how she herself had voted.) But just prior to mounting the convention podium, glamorous Shirley had been confronted and pointedly advised by New York's imposing congresswoman, Bella ("The Hat") Abzug.

The meeting was called to order by President Hulsing at 8:05 p.m.

It was moved by Member Ohno and seconded by Member Graves to approve as corrected the minutes of regular meeting on June 12 and special meetings on June 7 and 15, 1972, with the following correction:

June 12: Add paragraph at top of page 3 to read: President Hulsing announced that a special meeting of the Board would be held on Thursday, June 15, 1972, at 8:00 p.m.

It was moved by Member Lawton and seconded by Member Penar that the following resolution be approved:

WHEREAS, an invitation has been received by the Plymouth High School band to participate in the Rose Bowl activities January 1, 1973 in Pasadena, California; and

WHEREAS, the total expenses for the trip would be the responsibility of the Plymouth High School Band and no school district money whatsoever would be expended;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the written administrative procedures of the school district be followed to determine if permission for the trip will be granted. Explicit financial, transportation and accommodation details must be provided. A secret ballot survey of parents will be conducted and 90% of the parents must favor the trip. Prior approval of any and all fund raising projects must be obtained from the Board of Education. The proposed costs of the trip must not cause undue financial strain on the students or parents. Upon receipt of all pertinent information the Board of Education will determine if permission for the Rose Bowl trip will be granted or denied.

Attorney John Thomas from the law firm of Sempliner, Thomas and Guth explained the differences in the sections of the Federal Register which had applied to this case. He felt a ruling on reapplication would be forthcoming from Washington within two to three weeks. Ray Homer also spoke to the issue. 

## U-D To Honor DeBusschere

It'll be a tenth anniversary homecoming for Dave DeBusschere at the University of Detroit's Memorial Building on Friday, Sept. 29.

The all-time U-D basketball and baseball great will return to the college's Memorial Building as a player for the first time in a decade when the New York Knicks take on the Detroit Pistons in a pre-season National Basketball Association game.

The game will be sponsored by the U-D athletic department.

"We plan something special for Dave," said U-D athletic director Bob Calihan, who was DeBusschere's basketball coach when he sparkled for the Titans.

At U-D, DeBusschere led the Titans into post-season NCAA and NIT competition both in basketball and baseball. Many of his cage records still stand.

After being graduated from U-D in 1962, he became one of the few athletes to turn

professional and reach the major leagues in two sports. He signed both with the Pistons in basketball and the Chicago White Sox in baseball as a pitcher.

DEBUSSCHERE combined in the two sports for four years until deciding to stick strictly with basketball. He has emerged as one of the NBA's standouts, playing in six all-star games and being named to numerous post-season all-star teams.

DeBusschere, who has averaged 16 points and just over 10 rebounds since entering the NBA in the fall of 1962, was the only unanimous choice on last season's NBA All-Defensive team.

DeBusschere ranked No. 7 on the Pistons' all-time scoring list with a 16.1-point average and second in rebounds with 4947 during his seven seasons with the team before being traded to New York in December, 1968.



Mozart interpolates an extra movement, a minuetto, in the middle of the third movement. This additional section, marked cantabile, is itself unusual in that it includes several free, cadenzalike passages.

This concert will mark the conclusion of the 1972 summer festival and will be presented in the Northville State Hospital Theater at 8:30 p.m. Entrances off both Seven Mile and Haggerty Roads which lead to the theater are clearly marked.

# Art Stars Give Picture 'Of Man At His Best'

With paintings by art's "superstars" commanding higher and higher prices, "what is art worth other than money?"

This was the question posed by Richard Muhlberger Thursday at the 20th annual conference of Michigan artists held Thursday in the Rackham Building, Ann Arbor.

Some 400 artists and art fans turned out to hear Muhlberger, who is the recently-appointed chairman of education at the Detroit Institute of Art, and to view an outstanding collection of works by Michigan artists in U-M's invitational art exhibition.

"Obviously," said Muhlberger, "I think it's worth something other than money, or I wouldn't be working in a private gallery or some commercial center."

IN ARRIVING at his answer, Muhlberger painted a word-profile of a superstar, with the conclusion that all superstars die, some young, some old, but "all leave us

with something more valuable than anything else I can think of. Their art allows us to see man at his best."

How did art's superstars get there was the question posed by Muhlberger? "If we look, perhaps we can find values to measure our own art. Why should Jasper Johns get \$100,000 for a painting and not you?"

In studying the superstars through Velasquez, Titian, Rembrandt, Renoir, Monet, Picasso, Warhol and others, Muhlberger noted several things to common to their backgrounds and approaches.

AN ART superstar was not born into a family of artists. Some of his teachers were famous, some were not, but he was always recognized as being better than his teachers. He learned to draw early and no matter what medium he worked in, drawing remained a valuable and important asset.

He did not develop in isolation. He fed on the art of others and inspiration came from walking in museums. But he did seek isolation in later years. He usually felt

somewhere between being an innovator and a refiner. He was always a problem-solver.

He was always well-publicized, sometimes by himself or by his friends. He seldom had spare cash.

He never based art on formulas. He based his art on vision, on what he saw in the world around him, in art and in his imagination.

He reached what psychologists call "the peak experience" or complete absorption in a creative endeavor and sustained it in his heart. Often this absorption is mistaken for stubbornness or a kind of arrogance.

MICHAEL P. CHURCH, director for cultural activities at the U-M's extension service, in commenting on Muhlberger's talk pointed out that "artists are also soloists. You can't organize artists, they're all rugged individualists," he claimed. "Now musicians are just the opposite. They're happy working in groups."

Church recommended that artists let their senators and representatives know when their clubs are assisted by

support from the Michigan Council for the Arts it gave a grant for the conference, but also let them know about the great number of volunteer hours at the local level. "State support is still a miniscule amount of the total," he said. "Be sure to invite your senators and representatives to your open houses and meetings, so they really know the facts of life."

He also called on them to cancel their subscriptions to art magazines coming out of New York unless their editors start writing about the work that is being done in Michigan and the Midwest.

"Some of the high jinks on the New York scene have done a real disservice to art," he said.

Observerland was represented at the conference with a talk on painting and collage by Kegham Tazian, assistant professor at Oakland Community College in Farmington, and by paintings by Marilyn Jenks of Farmington and John Kearfoot of Southfield.

The conference was held in conjunction with the Ann Arbor street art fair which runs through Saturday evening.

The invitational exhibit will be open in the Rackham Gallery through Aug. 4.

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
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

**FORTUNATELY, A 10-YEAR** guarantee on the furnace still had a year to go and the furnace company picked up the tab for the repair work.


