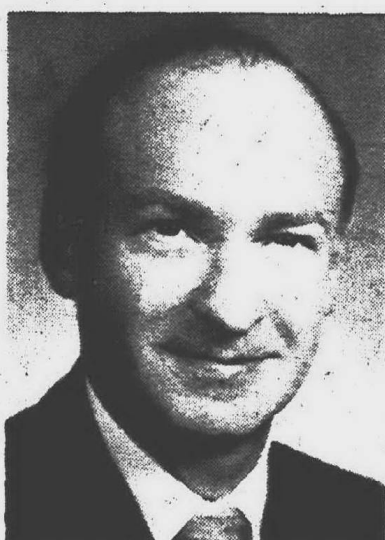

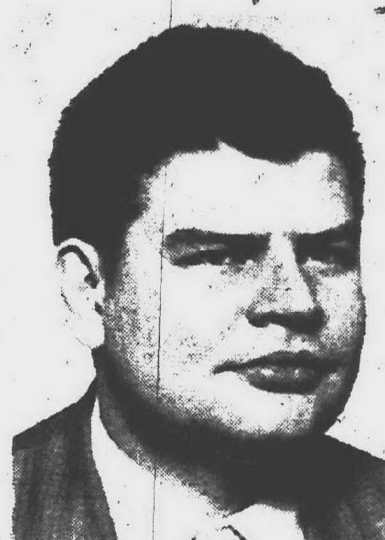

9 Vie For Township Board

Plymouth Township voters will have to make a choice in Tuesday's primary election among six Republicans and three Democrats as each party selects two candidates for the board of trustees.

The terms expiring are those of Russell Ash and Gerald J. Burke. Both are Republicans and both are running for reelection. (The two trustees whose current

terms carry over to 1974 and thus are not involved in this year's campaigning are Gene Overholt and Frank Millington.)

THESE ARE the Republicans in the race. Russell Ash, 47192 Stonecrest Court; Gerald J. Burke, 11232 Russell; Gordon T. Campbell, 45050 Joy Rd.; Williams L. Evans, 15114 Maplewood Lane; Richard Gornick, 11849 Amherst Court, and Soren T. Pedersen, 9011 S. Main.

Seeking nomination under the Democratic label are Earl A. Dey, 11580 Parkview Drive; Ralph Goble, 15149 Bradner, and Joseph A. Rey Sr., 11456 Mona Court.

The following biographical information, and positions on a variety of township issues, has been provided by the nine candidates in response to requests from the League of Women Voters and the Mail & Observer.



JOSEPH REY

ASH, 47, is a graduate of

Plymouth High School and holds an electrical engineering degree from the University of Michigan. He has lived here 45 years, was a member of the planning commission before his election as a trustee, and is product development supervisor at the Chrysler Proving Grounds. He states: "In light of the county's efforts to eliminate the

sheriff's road patrol in the area, and the greater need for increased enforcement resulting from increasing population, high priority must be placed upon providing greatly improved police protection. "The most effective and economical method to accomplish this is through a cooperative authority of several communities. This is a logical precession to area consolidation when this becomes a desire of the majority."

BURKE, 30, is a graduate of Henry Ford Community College and Schoolcraft College. He is a plant engineering supervisor for the Ford Motor Co. He states:

"To continue to serve the people and maintain the high quality of our public services is our foremost priority. Our recreation program is progressing at a pace conducive to our present and near future needs. "Our fire department in the

past few years has been brought up to a standard ranking among the finest. Our police protection up to now has been adequate for our township's need, but with the elimination of the sheriff's road patrol lurking in the near future, my ideas have turned toward the sharing of our neighboring municipal police force.

"Updating of the comprehensive development plan has alleviated some of the problems of developing the western part of our township."

CAMPBELL, 37, graduated from Plymouth High School and from Cleary College in industrial management. He is a production supervisor at the Chevrolet spring and bumper plant. He also has been active in Cub Scout leadership and is a lifetime resident of the township. He states:

"It is essential that Plymouth Township be developed to its full potential in a manner consistent with the present rural-suburban atmosphere without

sacrificing industrial and commercial growth.

"There is a need for improved access to existing recreation facilities, for better traffic movement, and for more adequate police protection for all areas of the township.

"I am especially concerned that there be fair and equalized tax assessments for

City, Twp. Offer Election Contrast

Although heavy participation is expected in Tuesday's primary election in Plymouth Township, a light turnout is anticipated in the city where residents have not been particularly stirred by the ballot issues.

The township owes its high degree of interest to the contests raging within Republican ranks to gain that party's nominations for supervisor, treasurer and the board of trustees.

In contrast, no local offices are at stake in the city, leading to election apathy within the municipality which fills its governmental posts in odd-year elections.

Polls will be open throughout Michigan from 7 a.m. until 8 p.m., with voting to be done by party to select the candidates whose names will be on the ballot in the Nov. 7 general election.

THE ONLY issues of general interest to members of both parties in this area involve one proposed state constitutional amendment, three county propositions and the 12-man nonpartisan contest for nomination as Wayne County circuit judge.

Democrats in city and township alike are involved in choosing one of six candidates to repre-

sent them in bidding for the role of congressman for the revamped 2nd District, a seat now held by Republican Marvin L. Esch, who is unopposed.

They also have a three-man contest to settle in picking a candidate for the new 27th District seat on the Wayne County Board of Commissioners. The only local candidate among the three is Orville L. Tungate, of Ridgewood Rd., who may pick up some support, too, from cross-over Republicans in the city.

Most of the Plymouth area is now in the 52nd State House of Representatives District, where the

November rivals already have been determined. Robert E. Dwyer of Plymouth is unopposed for the Democratic nomination to that office, as is Ann Arbor's Raymond J. Smit for the Republicans.

MAJOR INTEREST here focuses on the township, where four Republican incumbents all have competition. These include Supervisor Maurice M. Breen, Treasurer Elizabeth Holmes and Trustees Russell Ash and Gerald Burke. Only Clerk Helen Richardson lacks primary competition.

The fact that no Democrat filed nomination petitions for township treasurer led to speculation this week that the party may put on a last-minute write-in campaign to have someone on the ballot in November. If this fails, Tuesday's Republican nominee will be an automatic winner.

However, for this to be successful, it would require that an individual have support equal to at least 15 per cent of the total vote gained by the same party's leading vote-getter for all township offices. Most observers consider this too big an obstacle.

Of the county issues, the two that command most interest are a proposed renewal for five years of a one-mill general tax levy and a proposition that the levy for the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority be increased from one-fourth mill to one-half mill.

Park Curfew Issue Up For Debate

Two thorny issues which are to be on the agenda of the Plymouth City Commission Monday night are expected to produce a packed house for the first August session.

One is the proposed final approval of an ordinance which would establish an 11 p.m. curfew for occupancy of Kellogg Park, as well as establish other regulations over park areas throughout the city.

The second measure concerns a proposed amendment to the zoning ordinance to set further restriction on where privately owned mobile homes or recreational vehicles may be parked in relation to one's dwelling.

It would ban front and side yard parking and is to be the subject of a public hearing. The problem of parking such vehicles has been through the public hearing route before, and at that time the owners of campers and trailers were out en masse to voice opinions.

INDICATIONS ARE that their ranks will be augmented Monday by a large number of persons who wish to comment pro or con on the proposed regulations for parks.

This ordinance was given tentative approval on a

4-1 vote of the commission July 3, with two members beings absent. At that time, the negative vote was cast by Beverly McAninch. However, final adoption needs passage on one more reading, which still gives the commission time to revamp the wording, if it chooses.

As prepared, it is a four-page document which among its provisions would ban presence in any park between 11 p.m. and 6 a.m. unless permitted by the city manager. Police also would be authorized to close parks earlier than that if they considered the circumstances warranted.

The ordinance also would ban groups of more than 20 persons congregating in any park without having obtained a city permit for a particular activity.

ADMITTEDLY, control of Kellogg Park in the downtown area is the main purpose of the legislation.

A police report dated July 12, addressed to City Manager Norman Gaffney, lists 15 occasions on which officers were called to the park in 1971, and 18 similar incidents so far in 1972. Sixteen of the latter were in May and June.

DPW Director Kenneth Vogras, whose department maintains all parks, said in a letter to Gaffney: "I am requesting that the proposed curfew

ordinance be passed. If this ordinance is not passed, we will continue playing into the undesirables' hands."

Vogras stated most of the vandalism has occurred "during the late hours of the evening when they cannot be seen." He added:

"When some of the undesirables are approached, they just state, 'Try and do something about it.'"

VOGRAS CITED such destruction as the following:

An evergreen hedge around the fountain was destroyed by persons jumping in and out of the fountain, then replacement bushes also were destroyed.


Several times this summer, soap has been put in the fountain, requiring that it be drained and cleaned.

Recently a public address system speaker was stolen, and it also has been necessary to replace several sprinkler heads. Several of the "name stones" in the brick walks have been broken and Vogras said, "Every morning alcoholic beverage bottles and cans are removed from the grounds and fountain."

He said it is necessary to keep a man continually in Kellogg Park "to watch for any person destroying or defacing our property."

all taxpayers. I will seek out opinions of individuals and local organizations and attempt to implement those ideas which will be beneficial to the community as a whole."

EVANS, 24, is a graduate of Plymouth High School after which he attended Schoolcraft College and then graduated from Wheaton (Ill.) College with a major in political science. He is a production supervisor for the Chevrolet spring and bumper plant. He states:

"I find that in light of the continuing urban spread, one of the most pressing priorities both now and in the future is the organized development of the community."

"Implementation can be achieved through a vigorous effort by the board to prevent patchwork zoning and development, and follow a precise plan."

"With the ever growing number of people and homes in the township comes the problem of adequate police protection. I feel that we as a township government should seriously consider and ultimately provide the service, either by contracting with the city to form a 'community force' or establishing our own."

GORNICK, 39, holds bachelors and masters degrees in administration and supervision and is principal of an elementary school in Livonia. He also has been an Army officer and college instructor, as well as an officer in three civic associations. He states:

"To develop responsive township government, I would form a citizens' advisory group representing all township areas. Regular meetings would feature dissemination of information on critical issues: unification, police protection, etc., and feedback on these issues."

"I would opt for planning policies which assured a logical, consistent and thorough approach to the development of the township. This would replace the present emphasis on outdated con-

cepts, and decisions based on the personalities involved in a given issue."

"I propose an exhaustive analysis of the priorities for spending in the township to maximize the quality of life for all citizens."

PEDERSEN, 28, attended Plymouth High School, Eastern Michigan University, Henry Ford Community College and Michigan Tech University. A journeyman diemaker, he now is a real estate consultant for Hartford Realty, Inc. He states:

"There is no hard disagreement on my part of the past board's performance, but I must say that we should look toward:

"(1) Increased planning for the future; (2) seek more involvement of citizens in their government; (3) seek the most value for the tax dollar while keeping taxes to a minimum; (4) seek improved police and fire protection for the township citizens and their property."

"We must attend to the daily business of the township in order to maintain our awareness of the problems of our local government and coordinate our planning so that there are few if any major problems in the future."

DEY, 42, has worked as a cost accountant at Evans Products for six years and has been a township resident for three years. He was raised and educated in Canada but later served in the U.S. Army. He states:

"I feel I am capable of serving the people of Plymouth Township for several reasons. My accounting background has equipped me with proficiency in implementing the effective utilization of funds."

"I wish to seek out and listen to the views and concerns of the residents of the township. I am aware that Plymouth Township is influenced by tremendous change and growth. I am also cognizant of many of the resulting problems and challenges."

"My desire is to work with the people of the township and to help by serving as their voice in seeking solutions to these problems and meeting these challenges."

GOBLE, 28, graduated from Ypsilanti High School and attended Eastern Michigan University. He is now supervisor of new construction in the Plymouth school system. He states:

"I have been involved in zoning and land development, and therefore I have been subjected to many people and their boards."

"I would like to have more police protection for the township and would negotiate with the different police departments in the area to see which would be more beneficial and less of a hike in taxes."

"I would like to see the township have garbage collection of its own with little hike in taxes. I have a very sincere interest in the problems of the people, and would not negotiate but would follow through."

REY, 45, graduated from Chadsey High School in Detroit and from Wayne State University as a political science major. He is vice president of the C. W. Morris Co. and was city comptroller of Dearborn Heights for 2½ years. He states:

"The 2½ years I served as the first comptroller of Dearborn Heights undoubtedly would be the most beneficial work experience for the office I seek. As comptroller, I centralized the accounting functions of a city of 70,000 people."

"Truth in government or better citizen communication: The present administration either purposely or through oversight failed to state what they intended to do with the money derived from the reassessment of township property. I have not learned of any new services provided taxpayers or of any significant tax rate reduction to offset the reevaluation."

"Elimination of what appears to be a perpetual effort to divide the township by repeated efforts to form a city from a portion of the township. I propose we become a charter township, eliminating the possibility of piece-meal annexation and, if successful, doing away with the costs of repeated special elections trying to achieve city status."

This proposed amendment alters the provisions of the present constitution relative to the guarantee of a trial by jury in criminal prosecutions. The proposed amendment permits a trial by a jury of less than 12 members in any court if the offense is a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment for not more than 1 year.

THROUGH BIFOCALS

**MAURIE BREEN** is a killjoy who deflates a newspaperman's balloon even before the latter's hot air fills it. And I'll tell you why.

During my recent highly deserved and hard earned vacation, the Plymouth Township trustees were torn one night in one of their usual ho-hum sessions when the question came up for the umpteenth time in the last decade as to when would there be a traffic light at Ann Arbor and Haggerty Roads.

When a colleague of sorts (who owns the paper) saw a paragraph which quoted Elizabeth Holmes as saying, "We've been trying to get a traffic light on that corner for years, and for some reason or other we can't get it," he saw to it that the first message I would find upon my return would be his inter-office memo "suggesting" that we "campaign" for that light.

Beautiful. When another chief for whom I once worked many years ago ordered a similar public-spir-

ited campaign for highway improvements in Flint, I remember that not only did we milk it for numerous trips to Lansing, but it also produced a brief romance with Pat Van Wagoner's secretary. Yup, we got the overpass, but Good Heavens, don't tell my wife. We'll also get this light, but without such fun and games.

**SUPERVISOR BREEN** got the word this week that this much discussed traffic light -- and one which is most badly needed -- will be installed "any day now." That shows how fast a Mail & Observer campaign gets results, right?

You have to understand, of course, that any time a local government -- any local Michigan government -- wants a traffic light correction, there is a mountain of red tape to unravel with its particular county, plus the state.

For instance, the City of Plymouth has been trying for Lord-knows-how-long to get something done to reduce the dangers at Penniman and Sheldon. This has to be done through the Wayne County Road Commission, and to this date this latter body has been brilliantly derelict in its response to public demand.

But back to Breen. He can recite at the drop of a hat the play by play efforts that have gone into the Ann Arbor-Haggerty light project since it was known nearly two years ago that Kmart would locate there. Parents of Allen School children joined in the demand, and trips to Lansing followed.

**THE MECHANICS** of this thing, because Ann Arbor Road still is State Highway M-14, place all jurisdiction in the hands of the state. In turn, the county does the actual work upon receipt of written orders from Lansing. But when it comes to putting in a traffic light, Detroit Edison winds up stringing the lines, et cetera.

Last December, state officials said they would issue the necessary order to Wayne County. Two months ago it came through, but Edison people said they didn't get their copy, which confirms what we already know about the status of current mail service. Now that oversight has been corrected, and Edison even has dropped a pole at the site to indicate interest.

The necessary surveys have been taken to get a traffic count, and everyone from Lansing on down agrees that no intersection in Plymouth needs such an installation more than this one. It took persistence, but at last it is on the verge of reality.

The problem has been a historical one, government's attitude being that "We don't put up lights in anticipation of a problem, but only when justified by experience." One wonders when in the devil enough accidents and injuries will be recorded at Penniman and Sheldon to get turning lanes and arrows added there. Maybe the city, which has led that effort, should ask the township how to get it done.

## Fire Class Draws 100

**PLYMOUTH** The Plymouth fire department hosted a two-day regional fire school Thursday and Friday when approximately 100 firemen from various departments in southeast Michigan attended sessions conducted by Wallace F. Gannon, University of Michigan fire instructor.

Plymouth Fire Chief George Schoenneman said the school was held from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. each day in Plymouth

City Hall. All Plymouth firemen attended.

The first session covered five categories: The three phases of fire: how fire ground size-ups are made; the value of the first five minutes at a fire; how to prevent injuries and excitement at fires; and the seven steps in fire fighting a fireman should be familiar with.

Friday's session included: the principles and techniques used in fog fire fighting; and nine approved steps in fog application.

Gannon, who has been an instructor at University of Michigan for 15 years, has conducted similar schools this year in Three Rivers and Alma.

Last year he conducted schools at Ishpeming, Northport and North Muskegon.

Locally at least, most of the suspense of November's general election will be settled next week for Canton Township residents.

That's because, with the exception of two candidates, all the candidates running in the township primary are Democrats.

In the supervisor's race, incumbent candidate Philip Dingeldey is seeking his fourth two-year term. Challenging him are Jack Marts, Plymouth High School teacher and area farmer, who opposed Dingeldey in the supervisor race two years

TWO INCUMBENT trustees, William S. Graham, Jr. and Robert H. Griffin, both Democrats, are seeking reelection. Graham is an assistant bank manager and native to the area and is

completing his second term on the board.

Griffin, a Detroit News pressroom supervisor, was recently appointed to the board to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Vern Rorabacher.

Opposing them are Democrats Walter Baran, Lawrence C. Baron, Conrad V. Dennis, a Schoolcraft College student who is a member of one of Canton's pioneer families, Frank A. McMurray, a local insurance agent who was one of the driving forces in the creation of the township's recreation commission

of which he is currently chairman; and Louis J. Richardson, owner of a party store.

**JAMES E. POOLE**, a real estate and insurance agent, is running on the Republican ticket.

Poole has been an outspoken critic of the manner in which parks have been provided for in some of the township's early planned unit developments that give builders more flexible density factors in exchange for more open space and park areas.

In the constable race, incumbent Democrats Gene W. Reaves and Jack L. Blevins are opposed by Frank Chakrabarty, a Democrat. Ralph M. Foote is the lone Republican seeking the post. Foote is a former justice of the peace.

# The Stroller ...

## Cobo's Ditches

Scarcely a day goes by, as he peers out of the office window to watch the workmen slowly proceed with the transition of Schoolcraft Road into the Jeffries Freeway, that The Stroller doesn't wonder what little Al Cobo, the fellow who started it all, would think if he could see what has happened to his "ditches."

Long gone to his reward, dynamic little Al caused quite a furor when he ordered work to go ahead on the super-highway system almost two decades ago. From morning 'til night he heard nothing but criticism of what were referred as "Cobo's Ditches."

The highways were not his idea. But when he took office as mayor of Detroit, he found the plans for the super-highways and a massive convention hall on his desk.

"If these plans are so good," he told his advisors, "we'll go through with them, even if it takes quite a bit of doing."

With that, he arranged for the financing, and before anybody fully realized what was happening, a large pathway was being cut northward through Detroit, along Hamilton Avenue. It later became the Lodge Expressway. At the same time, he ordered an east-west thoroughfare and it is now the Ford Expressway.

THEY WERE designed to ease the traffic that was fast choking Detroit—but Al had to take a lot of abusive criticism.

Many were the times when he visited the old newspaper haunts in Detroit that he'd smile at his critics and warn, "some day they won't be big enough."

Little did he dream at the time that the day was not far off when his "ditches" would spread all over the metropolitan area—and far into the suburbs and out into the state.

And little did he think that the day would come when the cloverleaf intersections would require hundreds of acres to handle the traffic. But that's exactly what is happening.

The big intersection at Schoolcraft and Haggerty, which will eventually take in traffic from the proposed I-275, will cover more than 400 acres. And a bit farther north, where I-275 will join with I-96, the intersection will take in 663 acres. It's almost unbelievable.

But one thing is certain. If little Al Cobo, the dynamic public servant who, almost single handedly, lifted Detroit out of the depression, were alive today he would be enjoying a good laugh at those who called the highway venture "Cobo's ditches."

AND AS The Stroller drives along Schoolcraft these days, he often recalls the night, away back in 1952, when he was told what was going to happen—and didn't believe.

At the time, as a city official in Livonia, he had arranged a meeting with all of the utility and service companies to tell them of the vast plans for the

At the close of the meeting, he singled out the representatives of the State Highway Commission and asked—

"When are you fellows ever going to do something with Plymouth Road? Why can't it be improved on this side of Ann Arbor as it is on the other?"

"That won't happen," he was told. "Too many hills and curves. And especially so when you have another road."

"You don't mean Schoolcraft?" The Stroller answered. "It doesn't start anywhere and doesn't go anywhere."

The state highway man smiled and retorted:

"It could," and he let it go at that.

MIND YOU, that was 20 years ago—and now they're getting around to seeing that Schoolcraft starts somewhere and goes someplace.

It will be Jeffries Freeway that starts at the Ambassador Bridge and comes out through Livonia, Plymouth and other points west and north.

## Rail Plan Suggested By Tungate

PLYMOUTH Township residents. Tungate went on to say, "The current commissioner lives in Livonia, and has hardly been seen in Plymouth since his election."

The candidate promised he would communicate regularly with the voters, attempting to make the "forgotten branch of government" better known.

ON THE issue of mass transit, Tungate stated, "numerous studies have already been conducted, and could be used immediately in planning some kind of mass transportation. We could use existing rail right-of-ways and run commuter trains on the C & O tracks through Plymouth and Livonia."

Tungate made these and other remarks at an informal candidates meeting held in Canton Township last week. Tungate is general manager of an air freight firm.

## Sewer Cost Delays Office

PLYMOUTH Because of the high cost of installing a sewer system to meet all requirements developers of the plan to erect a 10-story office building on the Northeast corner of Haggerty Road and Schoolcraft have asked for more time to study a suitable system for the entire area.

The project had received approval of both the Township and Wayne County Planning Commissions and was tabled for a month because of the sewer.

Additional time was asked Monday night when it was learned that a sewer system—both storm and sanitary—would cost approximately \$300,000. This is for the parcel south of the new expressway.

In asking for the tabling of the plan the developers claimed that additional studies will be made to include tunneling under I-275 and take in a large tract on the north side of the expressway.

The Township Board approved the delay.

The meeting was called to order at 8:04 P.M. by Supervisor Breen. All members were present except Russell Ash who was out of town on business.

**READING, CORRECTING AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES** Regular Meeting July 11, 1972. Mrs. Holmes moved that the minutes of the July 11, 1972 meeting be approved as submitted. Supported by Mr. Burke and carried unanimously.

**READING, CORRECTING AND APPROVAL OF BILLS** Mr. Overholt moved that the List of Bills in the corrected grand total amount of \$61,151.27 be paid. Supported by Mr. Millington and carried unanimously.

**COMMUNICATIONS** Post, Smith, Lutz, and Ziel. Re Comments and Recommendations. Mr. Millington stated that any report was only as good as the recommendations. Mr. Millington asked if there was any money in the Building Fund, and was advised there was not. Mr. Burke asked that copies of the previous report made by the Site Committee be mailed to the members of the Board. Mrs. Richardson agreed to send same. Mrs. Richardson said that Mr. Barnes of Woodbrook had requested a copy of the Ordinance and asked if he was present and would comment. Mr. Barnes was not present. Mr. Overholt said he would like to comment on Mr. Burke's suggestion. He said he was of the impression that Peace Officer included Constable. Mr. Breen said Peace Officer was a generalized term to include all such persons. Mr. Burke mentioned that the Constable was not used enough to enforce Ordinances. 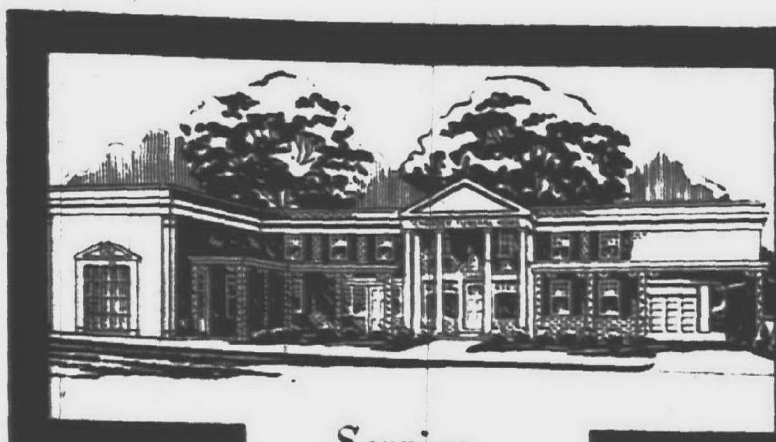

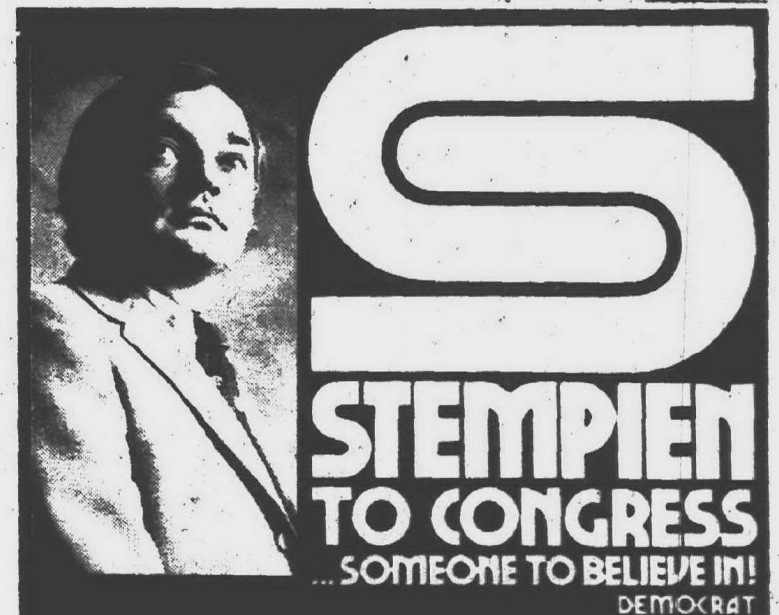

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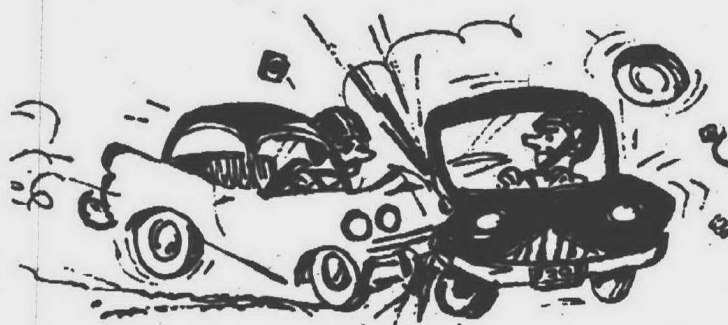

## St. Paul Installs Rev. Scherger

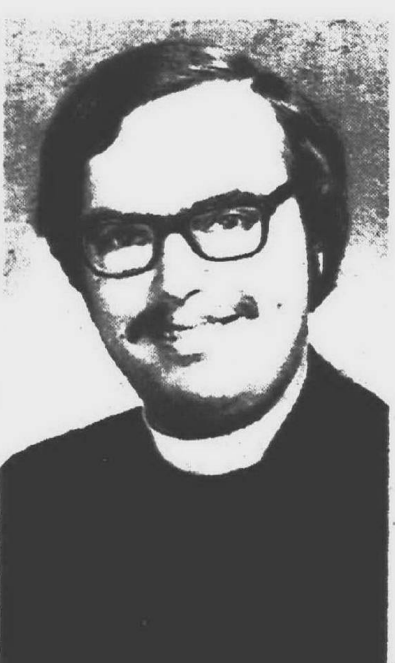

"It's not what I would have chosen," says Mrs. Georgalyn Wilkinson, who took over the work of her late husband in directing the Japan operation of the Far East Broadcasting Co.

But the enthusiasm and dedication she puts into being the first woman director in the far-flung mission enterprise are more than evident as she tells about her work.

In Livonia for a talk in Ward United Presbyterian Church last weekend, Mrs. Wilkinson told how she had worked with her husband, David Wilkinson, to direct the FEBC work in Tokyo and help establish a huge new station in Korea, and how she assumed top responsibility after he died suddenly of a brain tumor last summer.

"HE WAS TAKEN ILL while working on our new Korean station, which will be the largest Christian radio station in the world when it opens next year," Mrs. Wilkinson said.

So this mother of two young daughters, daughter of Far East Broadcasting Co. missionaries still working in the Philippines, took over the work of preparing broadcasts from Japan and working out details of the new Korean station.

The FEBC is a network of 25 Christian radio stations, privately owned, that reach into large areas of the Orient, including Communist China. It has broadcasting facilities in Okinawa and the Philippines as well as Belmont, Calif., and the Seychelles Islands in the Indian Ocean.

There also are a number of recording studios, including the one in Tokyo, and these send complete tapes for broadcast.

IT'S GEORGALYN Wilkinson's responsibility to ready tapes for three hours of broadcasting in Japanese each day as well as to oversee the total operation in Japan and work on the new station in Korea.

"I shuttle back and forth from Japan to Korea," she said.

Personnel for the FEBC includes a large number of missionaries, skilled in many technological branches of the broadcasting business as well as nationals throughout the Far East.

The local people are on salary, but the missionaries all receive support from churches in this country, and Ward is one of the principal contributors to the support of Mrs. Wilkinson and her daughters, nine-year-old Barra and Janel, seven.

"Dave and I first visited here three years ago," Mrs. Wilkinson said. "We were total strangers then, and this congregation really welcomed us as well as being so helpful in supporting the mission work."

work is "being able to reach into the homes of so many people representing so many different cultures."

"Even the Iron and Bamboo Curtains don't keep us out," she said. "Manila and Singapore broadcast into China, and we know from the letters we receive, mostly from young people, that our broadcasts play an important part in their lives."

One of the most popular programs, carried twice a day, is one that brings the Bible at dictation speed in various language and dialects. "We get so many letters from people in Communist countries thanking us for sending them the Bible," Mrs. Wilkinson said.

She reported that jamming of FEBC stations—broadcasting of noise and static to drown them out—is far less prevalent than it used to be.

"At one time the Russians and Chinese were spending more money to drown us out than we were spending to put the programs on the air," she said, "but both have cut down on this activity."

BESIDES OPERATING the recording and transmitting studios, the FEBC utilizes Portable Missionaries, known as PMs, which are small radios sent with individuals into the bush areas.

"They are wonderful avenues for getting the word to remote places," Mrs.

Wilkinson said. She also told of printing press facilities in Manila, a bible correspondence course in various languages that has had 1,250,000 enrollees and extensive libraries of all sorts of records.

Georgalyn Wilkinson, besides being the first woman director, is the first second-generation missionary in the Far East Broadcasting Company.

As a teenager, she helped her parents, the Rev. and Mrs. Hann Browne, in the Manila operation. She met her husband at Bob Jones University.

"He was interested in radio and communications and also wanted to get into some kind of Christian work. After he met me he put in an application for the FEBC. I had one in two so eventually we joined our names on the applications."

The Wilkinsons were sent first to Okinawa in 1969 and moved to Tokyo in 1964.

MRS. WILKINSON has done work toward a master's degree at Michigan State University. Recently she completed a correspondence course in flower arranging and now is licensed to teach Japanese arrangements.

Her daughters, both bilingual, attend school at the Christian Academy of Japan in Tokyo and "travel and hour and half every day by foot and bus and train to get there."

## Community Study Involves Youth

A special program to define community problems and seek solutions is involving 66 high school students and 11 college supervisors this summer.

Co-sponsored by the Detroit Board of Education's in-school Neighborhood Youth Corps, the federally funded Urban Corps of Detroit and the Detroit Catholic Youth Organization.

The program is an exercise in awareness which seeks to make young people alert to community needs and problems, to help the students realize their own capacities and responsibilities, and to train them in effective cooperative endeavors.

STARTED LATE in June, it will continue into late August. The NYC will pay the high school student and the Urban Corps will pay the college trainees who are engaging in the project as part of their work-study programs. The CYO is providing supervision and liaison.

The assignment is intended to acquaint the student, in a practical way, with a major problem area. Students are also required to formulate a hypothetical community organization in which they can cooperate effectively.

Among suggested areas that they are investigating are youth employment, welfare reform, alcoholism, draft information, drug abuse and race relations.

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# ECUMENICAL REFLECTIONS

A small group of rich aristocrats run "the Establishment." The majority of the population are laborers and tradesmen, eking out a living and making the "fat cats" fatter! Moral corruption abounds! Cruelty and rebellion are so commonplace that no one is disturbed when hearing about it. Sex is glorified in its devastating, man-made distortions.

Although this may sound like today's world, it is a description of the days of Nero, the emperor of Rome. What is the task of the church in the midst of this kind of mess? What is the answer to the same cries for justice and relief? Simply this: The answer now is the same one the apostle Paul gave the church then... "live a life worthy of being called 'Christian.'"

THE NATURE and function of the church are too be a body of people in special, personal relationship with God. The church is not a human institution, left to devise its own strategy and set its own goals. It is not an independent organization, existing merely, by the means of large numbers filling up the pews. God never has been impressed with how many people hear the sometimes sorry

sound of the minister's voice every Sunday.

It is not a matter of "how many," but rather, it is who is worshipped—God... or man?

If it is God, then that special "instruction in the way of God" is important so that I may live for His sake. If it is man who is worshipped, then, how many come, how much money is received, what the minister's philosophy is on a certain subject, and the involvement of "the church" in social action is uppermost.

I REALLY BELIEVE that the widespread confusion in the churches today can be explained by the fact that we are looking at things that are seen rather than the unseen. We see human need obvious everywhere. Suffering, bigotry, injustice, hate and misery everywhere you look! So the obvious solution seems to be to throw all our human efforts into the endeavor to meet these tremendous needs. The attitude is "let's go to work and do something about these things."

However, what sounds so logical to us is shallow thinking as far as God is concerned. Seeing only the visible, external problems causes us to treat the symptoms not the causes. It's sort of like putting band-aids on cancer.

WHAT IS DESPERATELY needed is the keeping of the practical instruction of the apostle Paul: "Lead a life worthy of being called Christian." The young Jesus people have a song that says it best, "They Will Know We Are Christians By Our Love."

God strikes right at the root cause of the ineffectiveness of the church in meeting today's great needs. When church people are faithful in being Christians in their own lives daily, then the church becomes a healing agency in society, able to lift the surrounding community, even a whole nation to a higher plateau of wholesome living.

The church does not need to talk about itself—its buildings, its progressive thought, its spirit of cooperation, or endeavor to advance its prestige.

The church is not the savior of the world—the Lord of the church has that position! We do not need to spend our lives for the church in its social outreach ministries, but for the Lord of the church.

Then, with priorities right, our living unto the Lord in being Christians personally, sets up a non-stop flowing desire to do things to meet the needs of people in the community and world around us.

## Religion Update

Hordes of tourists stand in awe each day before a massive statue entitled "The Christ of the Ozarks"—which towers seven stories high above the pre-need burial plot of the Rev. Gerald L. K. Smith at Eureka Springs, Ark.

The irony of a statue of Jesus being erected as a monument to a man whose virulent attitudes toward Jesus' fellow Jews have been notorious for decades is apparently lost upon Rev. Smith. For among his literary efforts is one production entitled "Jesus Was Not A Jew."

Each evening from May through October, an average of nearly 1,000 paid admissions gather in Dr. Smith's tax-exempt, 3,000-seat outdoor amphitheatre to witness another of his productions, this one entitled "The Great Passion Play."

A PROMOTIONAL BROCHURE contends that "The Great Passion Play" has been "recognized by the severest critics as the greatest presentation of its kind in Christian history."

Precisely which critics (and just how severe they were) is not listed. But no matter. For history has rarely seen anything in which such a generally-impressive natural setting, lighting, costuming and sound have more effectively set off a production which in all other respects constitutes one of the worst massacres since the Holy Innocents.

Jesus is flogged by order of Herod (Jewish) rather than Pilate (as in the Gospels). And the script includes a thoroughly spurious death sentence, in which Pilate attributes Jesus' execution to "the desire of the entire Jewish people."

This pageant's director, Robert Hyde, has cast himself in the lead role—which he plays as if The Nazarene were an acrobat rather than a carpenter—and

as if he were auditioning for lead ape in a Tarzan movie. (When he is speared on the cross by a Roman soldier, for instance, Hyde's twitch is so gigantic as to suggest that instead of being dead, he is in reality a hemorrhoid sufferer who has been cruelly goosed.)

Hyde's voice suggests a casket salesman, not a Messiah—except when he is trying to convey pain or exhaustion, by means of an almost incomprehensible gurgling, which suggests that he has surely swallowed his tongue.

The crowd, which is almost entirely local townspeople (who should not be blamed by Hyde's abysmal direction) cries for the crucifixion, while shaking their fists in perfect unison, suggesting no crowd which ever gathered, and all of the individual spontaneity of either the Rockette's legs or a seig-heiling SS platoon at Nuremberg.

HYDE CONCEDED that his almost entirely amateur cast had on occasion proven frisky. But he denied reports that some unidentified backstage culprit had filled Pilate's wash basin with glue, ("It was actually a blue dye," said Hyde), or loaded his sedan chair with rocks. It was also untrue, said Hyde, that one

member of the Sanhedrin had wrought havoc by arming himself with a water pistol—or that anyone in the cast had told earthy stories during the crucifixion scene, under the cover of distance and a pre-recorded, broadcasted dialog.

But no such hi-jinks could match the bizarre and devastating effect of the ascension of Jesus in this Gospel According to Hyde. Jesus ascends, all right—right through the ceiling of the Upper Room. If this was shattering, the "ghost parade" was worse.

For Hyde's enactment of St. Matthew's unique report of unnumbered and thenceforth unheard of resurrections at the hour of Jesus' death (Matt. 27:52) is quite dreadfully embellished—with a ghastly procession of figures, all of whom appear as if understudies in "The Mummy's Curse."

DIRECTOR - WRITER - STAR HYDE, during an interview, revealed that he has been in outdoor theatre since the early '50s; most recently associated with a production featuring Chief Crazy Horse. He also disclosed that having done (in) Jesus in Arkansas, he looks forward to future productions, such as working on (or over) Abraham Lincoln in Springfield, Mark Twain in Hannibal and Will Rogers in Oklahoma.

Now that this atrocity has reportedly become one of the state's two top tourist attractions (along with "Dogpatch, USA"), the lure of holy lucre has spread to Mobile, Ala.

Promoter Bill Caywood has announced plans for "Holyland, USA", a virtual Disneyland of commercial sacrilege, which will allow visitors (\$6 per) a chance to tour (among other things) heaven, hell and the belly of Jonah's great fish.

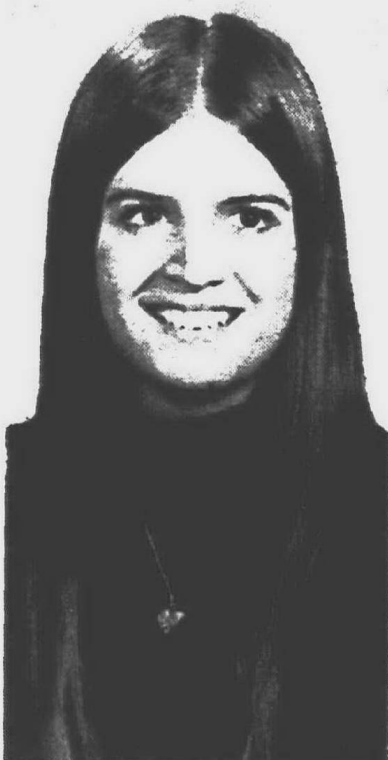

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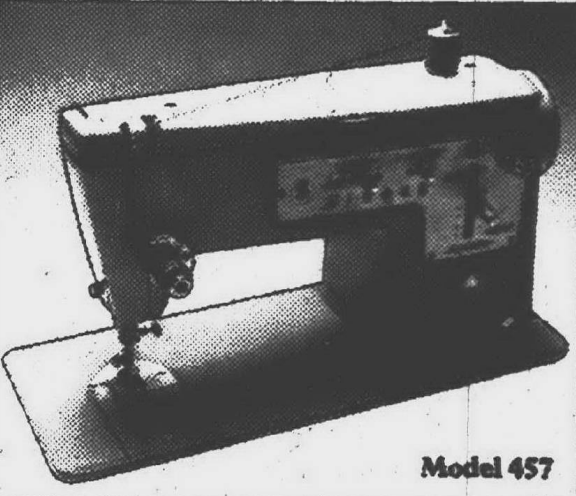
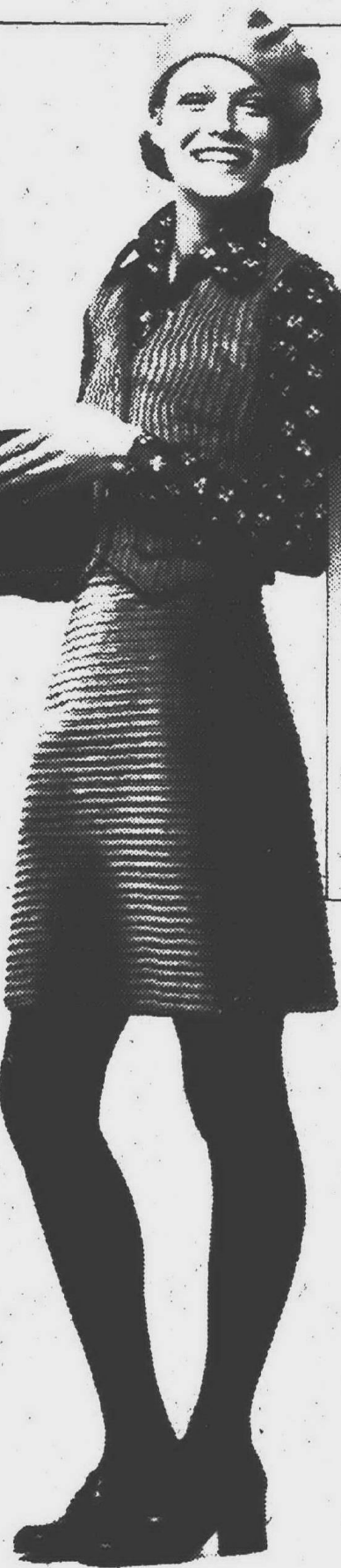

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## Turf Tips, Quips

All signs point to a successful Hazel Park harness racing meeting after an opener (Wednesday) that attracted 7,239 with a net handle of \$556,354.

Inasmuch as Northville Downs never reached the \$500,000 plateau during its 36 night summer meeting which ended Tuesday, it appears that business is picking up again and Hazel Park may reach the high standards set by Wolverine Raceway earlier in the year.

SATURDAY'S all-pacing program features a \$6,200 preferred and an \$8,500 open invitational.

The invitational could bring the first under 2:00 clocking of the meeting since the field of eight lists several performers who are capable of that kind of speed.

Spring's Pride, pacing champion at Northville with two sub-2:00 miles at Wolverine, has to be considered the early choice. But there's plenty of speed in Local Time, Gaviland, Mamie's Knight, Perley Hanover, Shiaway Lad, Tarzan Hanover and Yankee Creed.

Appropo, the three year old with the second fastest mile at Wolverine, steps into the spotlight in the preferred event against eight challengers.

Facing the fleet star of the Chris Boring stable are: Ohio B Lee, Trenchoat, Tricky Dale, Argo Time, Dave Butler, Michigan Mack and Esmond Hanover.

ON THE OTHER side of town, the Detroit Racing Association swings into its first week end with high hopes

of bettering attendance and wagering marks for the same days a year ago.

Particularly are officials interested in the figures for the first Saturday. A year ago on the opening Saturday, a crowd of 13,990 poured \$1,264,093 through the machines.

The track management isn't saying much but it would be very happy to have more than 16,000 in the stands with the handle soaring over \$1,500,000. The track has a good chance despite the rough conditions on the Schoolcraft and Middle Belt Roads.

Those planning to go to the DRC should consider using the Schoolcraft and Inkster entrances and save a lot of headaches.

THE PACERS and trotters ended the summer meeting at Northville Downs with the only plus that it bettered the wagering and attendance records of Windsor Raceway in the head-on battle for the greater share of the betting dollar.

That may be some consolation to Racing Commissioner Leo Shirley, who predicted Michigan competition would make things miserable for the Canadian operation, but the fact is that Northville ended the 36 night session with betting and turnstile figures far below those of a year ago.

This was apparent midway through the meeting when the handle on weekends never passed the \$500,000 mark. A year ago the 'Downs had an all-time high of \$608,000 and was well over a half-million on numerous occasions.

Final figures released after Tuesday's final program show the track handled a total of \$12,956,291 for a nightly average of \$359,897. This represents a drop of 12 per cent from the \$417,584 last

summer when the 'Downs shattered all wagering and crowd records.

Attendance for the 36 nights was 161,703 with a nightly average of 4,491...a decrease of almost 20 per cent from the 5,595 during the summer of 1971.

Of course one should realize that Northville operated without competition from a harness track in the Metropolitan Detroit area a year ago. So, it did better the figures at Windsor but discovered it was a losing battle...the final figures attest to that fact.

It will be interesting to see what happens at Hazel Park which opened an 82 night campaign Wednesday with high hopes of bettering all the records set at Wolverine Raceway during its late winter early spring meeting.

One thing is certain, Hazel Park will have to get its business during the first six weeks...after that (Sept. 15) tradition shows that wagering and attendance dips. The meeting goes through the first week in November.

FROM JACKSON Raceway, which opens its 60 night season on Aug. 21, comes word that the accent will be on experience among the officials named to preside over the meeting.

Leon Slavin, president and general manager, has assembled a group of top officials that provides depth in experience.

Named as presiding judge is Bruce Steward of Flint, who is known as a strict official with a deep understanding of harness racing's rules and racing situations.

The state steward will be Frank Meharg, of Yale, and completing the group in the judges' stand is Frank Utter, of Fowlerville, who served as presiding judge at the Northville meeting.

Roger Anderson returns for his eighth year as starter and Tom Smith, one of the youngest directors of racing in the sport, will return as race secretary. He will be assisted by Phil Mauger who also will handle the announcing duties.

WITH THE Hamblesonian classic, for three year old trotters, coming up late in August and the Little Brown Jug, for three year old pacers, slated for the third week in September in Delaware, O., top contenders for each performed in stunning fashion last week.

The top pacers tangled at Yonkers Raceway in the Best Of All stake and Silent Majoriey, as expected, won the first division in 2:01.3. Then Strike Out, returning to his best form, took the second in 2:00.4.

Among the trotting eligibles, Super Bown won both heats of the Founders' Gold Cup at Vernon Downs in 2:01 and 1:58.3.

However, a pair of fillies, Romalie Hanover and Delmonica Hanover stole the show. Romalie Hanover paced in 1:57.3, fastest ever for a filly on a five-eighths mile oval.

Delmonica Hanover was clocked in 2:00.1 a few nights earlier for the fastest mile ever by a three year old filly on the same oval. The filly trotter is eligible for the Hamblesonian and may be the only one of her sex in the big event.

### Call Is Out For Grid Coaches

The call is out for interested grid mentors to join the Michigan High School Football Coaches Assn.

North Farmington football coach and Oakland County Regional Director Ron Holland reports that the four-month old association has already drawn 400 members.

Dave Driscoll, football coach at Jackson Parkside High School, is president of the association, which sports 18 regional directors.

At the recently held meeting in Traverse City, the association decided upon a Jan. 26-27 football clinic for coaches on the high school and junior high level.

It was also determined that a "coach of the year" will be selected in each class at the Dec. 1 meeting at Central Michigan University.

## If You Seek Historic Buildings, Look Around

Michigan has nearly a hundred buildings including Botsford Inn which deserve more than the casual glance they get from persons who go by them every day, according to Automobile Club of Michigan.

They are houses, public buildings, churches and other structures which have unusual historical significance, given this honor by the National Park Service's Historic American Buildings Survey, working with the American Institute of Architects and the Library of Congress. The Michigan Historical Commission also has tagged many of the same buildings for its own list.

The largest concentration of historical buildings is in Washtenaw, Calhoun, Kent, Eaton and Wayne Counties. Some are privately owned and not open to the public. Others are open by appointment or have regular seasonal hours.

NUMBER ONE on everybody's list is the 93-year-old state capitol at Lansing, one of the state's top tourist attractions. The architect, Elijah E. Myers, also designed the state capitols of Colorado, Idaho and Texas.

Also in the Lansing area, midway between East Lansing and Williamston on Meridian Road, is St. Katherine's Chapel, built in 1887 for John Harris Foster, a dairy farmer, who presented it to the Protestant Episcopal Church.

In 1955, Detroit's picturesque Mariners' Church was saved from demolition by being moved and restored. Built in 1849 for the sailors on the Great Lakes, it is one of Detroit's revered landmarks. Formerly located near the foot of Woodward Avenue, a short distance from the Detroit River, its new site is a few blocks east on Jefferson Avenue.

Detroit has four other churches on the HABS list, the oldest built in 1844-48.

Old Fort Wayne on W. Jefferson Avenue in Detroit, built in 1845-48 when border tension with Canada ran high, was the last of the great redoubts built in Michigan. Its guns were never fired at an enemy. The fort, including barracks, gun emplacements, powder magazine and Sally port, are now maintained by the Detroit Historical Commission.

Only railroad station on the list is the Michigan Central or Penn Central depot in Battle Creek, built in 1887-88. It is a brick and stone structure with tower, hip roof, wide-bracketed overhangs, wide arched doorways and porch. Presidents William McKinley and William Howard Taft spoke to crowds gathered there.

MARSHALL, the Calhoun county seat, is almost in a class by itself in historic and unique homes. It has some 61 examples of mid-19th century architecture, some of the finest in Michigan.

The HABS lists seven residences, all except the 1860

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Honolulu house still private homes. The Honolulu House, now headquarters for the Marshall Historical Society, was built by Abner Pratt, a justice of the Michigan Supreme Court and U.S. consul to Hawaii who reputedly modeled it after a house he occupied in Hawaii.

Two inns are recognized. Botsford Inn at Farmington is the oldest in Michigan still providing food and lodging. The original portion was built in 1836. Henry Ford purchased the property in 1924 and restored it, retaining ownership until 1951.

At the intersection of US-12 and M-50 at the western edge of the Irish Hills is the Walker Tavern, a stagecoach inn which dates from 1830. The Eaton County courthouse at Charlotte is the only Michigan courthouse to make the list, but others are under consideration.

## Shapiro Supports Busing

Democratic candidate for the 2nd Congressional district nomination Walter Shapiro expressed support for cross-district busing of school children as "one means of working toward the goal of a society which is fully integrated - racially and, more importantly, economically."

"I support the concept of neighborhood schools," Shapiro said in a forum in Ypsilanti Township hall, "but only when the neighborhoods themselves are integrated, racially and economically."

"Until then, busing must be accepted as a necessary, but awkward, tool for moving society in that direction."

Economic segregation in housing patterns is preventing integration of neighborhoods, he said.

"In cities like Livonia, for instance, zoning laws have been used to discourage any apartment construction," he said. "Whether you are black or white, you must be able to afford a down payment on a house if you wish to move into the community. That's economic discrimination against the poor. Because many blacks are also poor, it often becomes racial discrimination, as well."

"To alleviate this problem I would support legislation such as the Ribicoff Amendment.

This would threaten to cut off federal funds for all those installations located in communities which fail to provide adequate housing for all those who work there."

## Searchlight, Alliance Favor Mill

Two non-partisan, good government organizations - Civic Searchlight, Inc. and the Urban Alliance - are among the organizations which have endorsed Wayne County proposition B in the Aug. 8 primary.

Proposition B would extend for five years an existing one-mill voted property levy which is due to expire on Nov. 30, 1974. One mill equals \$1 per \$1,000 of equalized valuation.

OTHER organizations which have endorsed the proposition include United Community Services, the Metropolitan Detroit AFL-CIO-COPE, the United Auto Workers Union - CAP, the Teamsters Union - DRIVE, the Metropolitan Detroit Building Trades Council.

The levy produces \$13 million annually to help support general county services.

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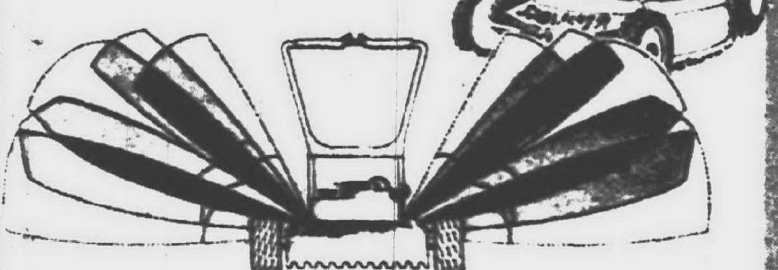

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# Readers Debate Congressional Issues

## Stempien View Against Busing

**EDITOR:**  
I would like to take strong issue with a letter to the editor written by Ray Konrad in the Observer of Wednesday, July 26.

Konrad referred in his letter to a recent meeting of the Livonia Interested Democrats where the six Democratic candidates for Congress appeared. Konrad's reference to what occurred at that meeting was a clear distortion of the truth. For example, Konrad inferred that State Rep. Marvin R. Stempien supports cross-district busing

and that he believes that the majority of people do also. This statement is preposterous.

I WAS at that meeting and, like every other person there who listened carefully, I know that Stempien spoke out against cross-district busing. Likewise, Stempien never made the claim that he thought most people supported cross-district busing. For the record once and for all, and for Konrad's benefit, Stempien has opposed cross-district busing in the legislature for the past three years.

Further, Stempien has spelled out for the record that he will continue to oppose

Asked if proof of rape would then be placed on the woman, he replied no. One envisions the headlines: "Incidents of rape soar after passage of

Stempien bill!" He stated that, "We can't leave to society the resolution of constitutional protection. This is what due process is all about."

Further evidence of his contradictions on issues is shown in his statement at the meeting that he did not believe in victimless crime laws. But the women had learned that Mr. Stempien was co-sponsor of a bill that would make defaming the flag an offense with a \$1,000 fine and a term in prison!

The women left the meeting with the clear idea that unless Stempien changes and clarifies his positions on issues of such concern to all Americans, he hardly seems the individual we need to fight for women's rights and for the viable legislation needed to solve society's complex and real life problems.

## Esch Blasted On Busing

In his recent letter to the Observer, lawyer Charles W. Chandler of Five Mile Road was not only unfair to Rep. Marvin Stempien, but dishonest in the way that some lawyer-politicians excel - by omission. Lawyer Chandler failed to state that he is the Wayne 19th District Republican Chairman.

In lawyer-like fashion, he then tries to find something to pick at about Rep. Stempien's opposition to forced busing. He should read the paid political advertisement of one of Rep. Stempien's Democratic primary opponents on Page 4A of the very same edition of the Observer which says, "Mr. Stempien opposes busing."

But the Republican chairman's more important omission was his failure to mention the ham-handed

attempt of his congressional candidate from Ann Arbor to hide his record favoring busing by improper mass mailing at taxpayer expense outside his district. In his improper mailings Esch also fails to tell Livonians that he voted against the Ford amendment to delay busing plans at least six months; that he voted for the money to purchase buses and that he voted to exempt school districts from the busing ban where they are already under a court-ordered plan.

When Livonia voters become aware of what it is costing them to pay for candidate Esch's political mailing outside of his district to explain away his record in favor

of busing, they too will reject him as I do.

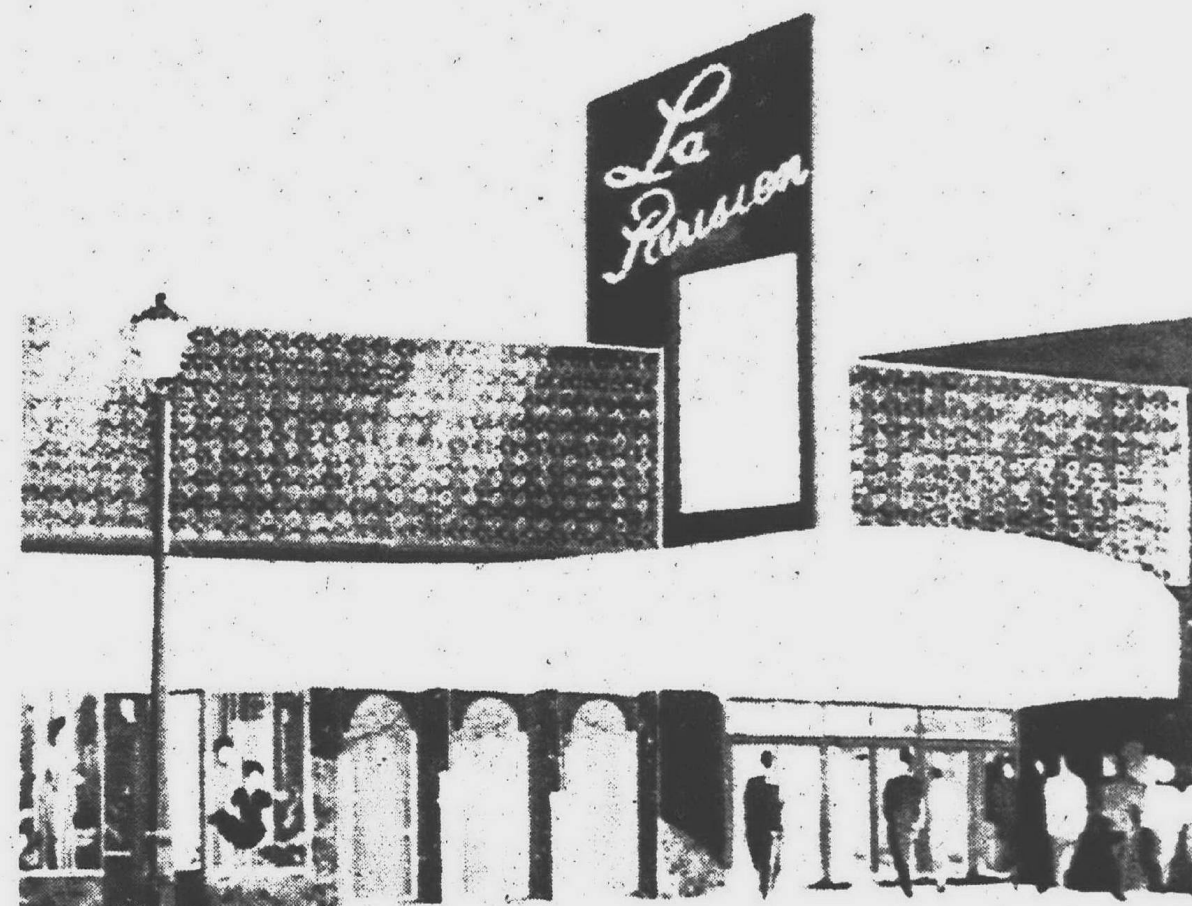

## Shopping Centers Offer Good Grazing For Suburban Autos

The automobile, the machine that built and unbuilt Detroit, is primarily responsible for the form of shopping centers which have mushroomed throughout America's fertile suburbs.

The centers have attached themselves to the periphery of big cities bleeding the cities of their commercial blood, often only to find themselves bled by bigger shopping centers further out or smaller neighborhood centers.

Shopping centers offer three big pluses most downtown shopping centers can't provide -- free parking, separation of cars and pedestrians, and security.

Most people are willing to walk across a football field of asphalt to save a couple bucks on parking. Isn't it enough you should pay for gas and oil and parts and insurance and car payments without having to pay to let the car just SIT THERE?

And there aren't any carbon monoxide fumes or crazy drivers in a shopping center. Not only are the hazards eliminated but many shopping centers offer tropical greenery, exotic animal exhibits, a controlled climate, trade shows (everything from pottery to house trailers) telephone and rest rooms.

And security. The crime rate at your average shopping center doesn't approach the muggings and purse snatchings that go on downtown. But there are problems. Northland, the granddaddy of all regional shopping centers, was hit by crowds of restless teenagers a few years ago and shoplifting has been an increasing problem.

Other centers admit to problems with shoplifters, bad check passers and theft from parked cars.

Wonderland, a small open regional center, claims a negligible security problem. "We have the lowest crime rate of any center in six counties," said promotion director Del Vanetta. "We have some minor incidents but they are insignificant compared to other centers."

The June issue of Shopping Center World, a five month old trade journal for the industry, warns about the "declining center" which metropolitan growth and business has passed by. Livonia Mall General Manager Robert Coris said the suburbs will probably follow the fate of the cities as the population expands and stretches city services to the breaking point. There is the possibility the now thriving shopping centers may become ghost centers as the population moves on.

But suburbs are set up differently than cities and that may make a difference in their life expectancy, he said. Where downtown Detroit is a focal point for all types of city

functions -- commercial, civic, recreational, business, industrial -- newer suburbs have separated these functions and placed them at different locations.

"A shopping center isn't like a downtown," he said. "It may be like the retail district of a downtown. We have stores, restaurants, services and entertainment here but we don't have offices or churches or a wholesale industry like a downtown."

"We also have a definite geographical boundary -- we are limited to 54 stores. We can't expand outward like a downtown," he said.

Merchants within a center also must stick together like no downtown merchants ever did. Besides paying rent of their own stores they share the cost of heating, cooling and lighting the rest of the mall, maintaining the parking lot security force and mall promotion. They must pay dues to a Merchants Association which elects officers to make certain promotional decisions.

The Mall owners have a stake in the success of their tenants because they get a percentage of their profit.

The shopping center outburst began after World War II with small "strip centers" -- a row of neighborhood stores housed in the same building and sharing a common parking lot. Some housing developers made provisions for these centers near their developments.

The first attempt at a giant regional center was made by the J. L. Hudson Co. in the early 1950s. In 1954 it opened Northland, the shopping center that urbanized soggy Southfield Township and is the epitome of planning as far as shopping centers go.

"Everything is planned to bring the people here to shop," said Bruce Andrews, director of Shopping Centers Inc., for the Eastern Region of Dayton Hudson Properties. "The people who work in the offices can shop here in the daytime and the people who live in the apartments can shop here at night."

The incredible Northland complex includes several office buildings, hotels, restaurants, a night club, theater, apartments, a medical center.

Hudson's acquired 500 acres of land in Southfield Township just touching Detroit in the early 1950s and planned every acre of it to bring business into their store.

Armed with market research studies they leaped ahead of the population surge to the northwest suburbs.

# Comparative Mall Shopping

The average woman shopper at one of four major shopping centers in Observeland is a housewife who completed high school and is married to a skilled worker with an income between \$10,000 and \$15,000. They have two cars and she does her shopping in the community in which she lives. She makes about 40 trips a year to a regional shopping center which is a 15 minute drive from her home.

These statistics were gathered by Market Facts Inc. for Owens Corning Fiberglass which interviewed 397 women in 1970. (The interviews did not include the area served by the Tel-Twelve Mall.)

Northland shoppers, they found, are slightly older, are more likely to have a college degree and a husband who is an executive. They are also more loyal to Northland. Westland and Wonder-land shoppers are the most likely to flirt with other shopping centers.

Only seven percent of the Westland women shoppers bring their husbands but 21 per cent bring their men to Wonderland. Usually they go to a particular mall because of its closeness and because of the stores it contains. Each group of shoppers had complaints and complaints for its favorite center.

Livonia and Westland shoppers said they liked their closed mall because it kept the weather out. Westland shoppers were more enthusiastic about their mall's decor and exhibits. On the other hand only five percent of the Northland Shoppers and 17 per cent of the Wonderland shoppers complained that their malls were not enclosed.

traffic congestion, parking lot small for the crowds.

Ten percent of the Westland shoppers complained about high prices (compared to one to five percent at other malls). They also complained about facilities and a lack of variety in stores and merchandise.

Wonderland shoppers also complained about facilities and inconvenience. Wonderland and Westland shoppers were the most satisfied.

Here is a summary of the comparative image of each shopping center:

**LIVONIA MALL:** Rated about the same as the others on most characteristics and higher for reasonable prices and being easier to get to by car.

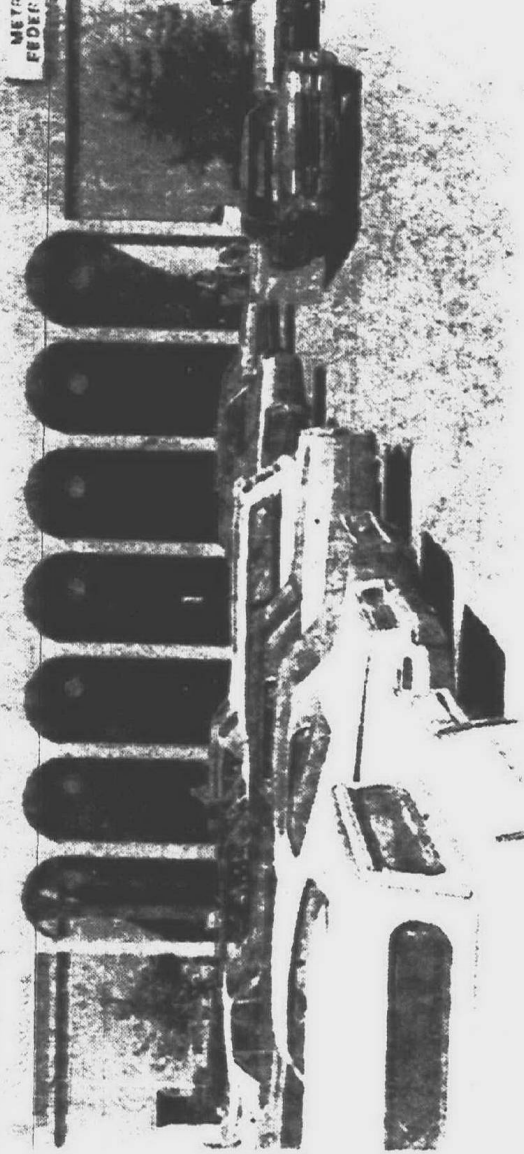
**NORTHLAND:** Rated lower than others for not being safe and secure, cleanliness, sales people; rated higher for the class of people who shop there.

**WESTLAND:** Rated lower than the others for reasonable prices, variety of stores, easy to get to by car; rated higher on quality of stores, easy to get around in.

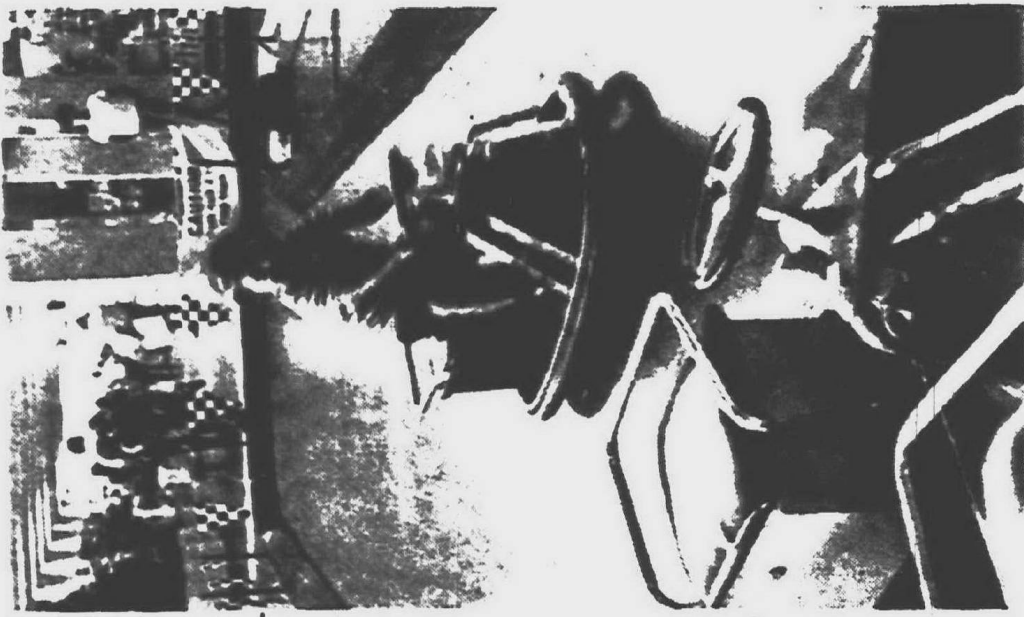
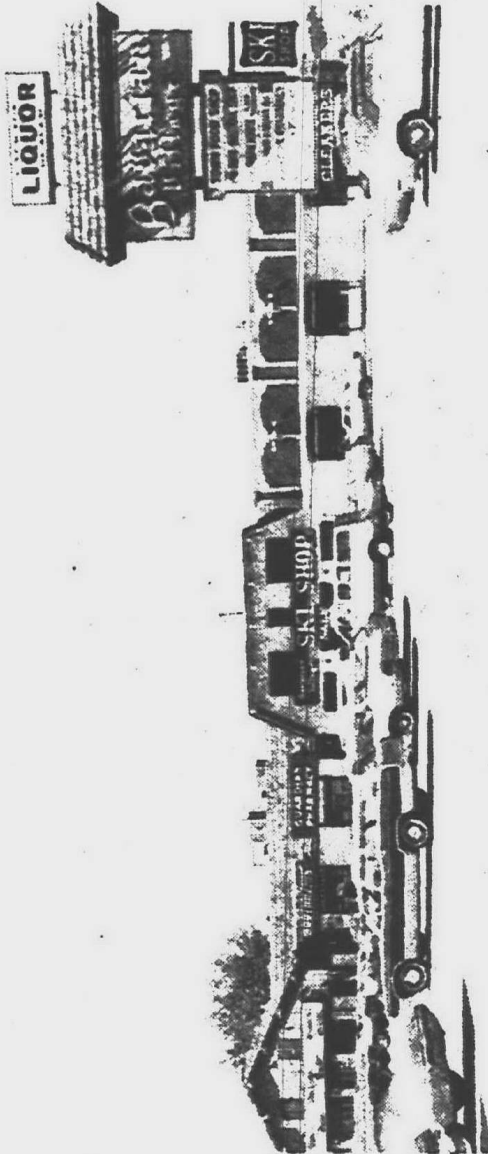

# Northland: A Planned Community



Plans are being made to completely enclose Northland within the next five years. Two of the courts will be turned into indoor malls and the other two sidewalks will remain open but the sidewalks will be enclosed, heated and air conditioned, said Bruce Andrews, director of Shopping Centers Inc., for the Eastern Region of Dayton Hudson Properties.

"You'll still be able to go out and sit in the mall if you want to but you won't have to walk outside in bad weather," he said.

Livonia Mall, at Middle Belt and Seven Mile Rds., pioneered the concept of a closed mall in this area. Pontiac Mall was the only closed mall near Detroit in the early 1960s when Livonia Mall was on the drawing board and there were only six others in the world, Pors said.

"The owners decided to go with a closed mall and it looks like they made the right decision," he said.

"Livonia Mall opened in 1964. Westland, the next major mall in the area which opened the following year was also enclosed."

"By 1966," Pors said, "70 per cent of the malls being planned were closed malls."

When Westland opened in the summer of 1965 it stressed the convenience of renting a locker in the mall in which to deposit coat, boots and packages -- and then -- "step into springtime comfort."

Tel Twelve Mall in Southfield, which opened in 1968, attempted to bring an illusion of an outdoor court into a closed mall with its circular fashion arcade fitted with astro turf and park benches. The arcade is the home of the annual Channel 56 auction.

Wonderland opened in 1959 as an open mall and defends its openness.

"People seem to appreciate the opportunity to shop in a large open center," said Mrs. Yanetta. "They eat lunch on the park benches and bask in the sun. Most of them said they used to shop in a closed mall."

But she admits that "when it's 100 degrees out it might be different."

All of the area malls have a side show going to attract customers. Wonderland specializes in animal exhibits and carnivals, Livonia Mall and Tel-Twelve frequently exhibit local artists and craftsmen, Northland with its large open terrace can bring in house trailers.

Westland has permanent exhibits of birds, fish and numerous sculptures, many done by local artists.

Livonia Mall recently presented a miniature circus, all hand carved by a former circus clown and a troupe of Ukrainian dancers. Tel-Twelve Mall officials say they are

shopping centers don't stay on their toes and find out who their customers are and serve them. They will die too.

So far their birth rate has greatly exceeded their death rate.

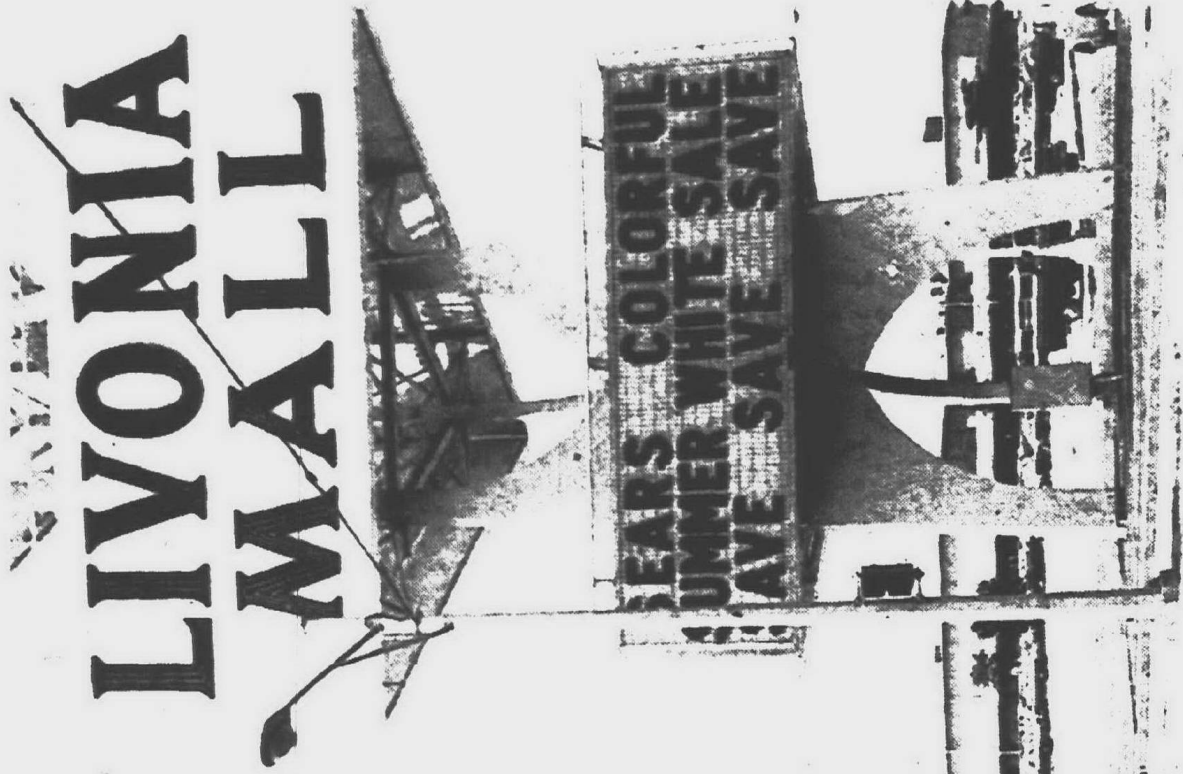
Ninety-seven shopping centers announced their openings in the July issue of Shopping Center World.

The latest regional centers have multi-level malls, with a tropical womblike atmosphere. They are anchored by three or four major department stores, may have a movie theater (or theaters) and nightclub on the premises but probably don't have an attached grocery store.

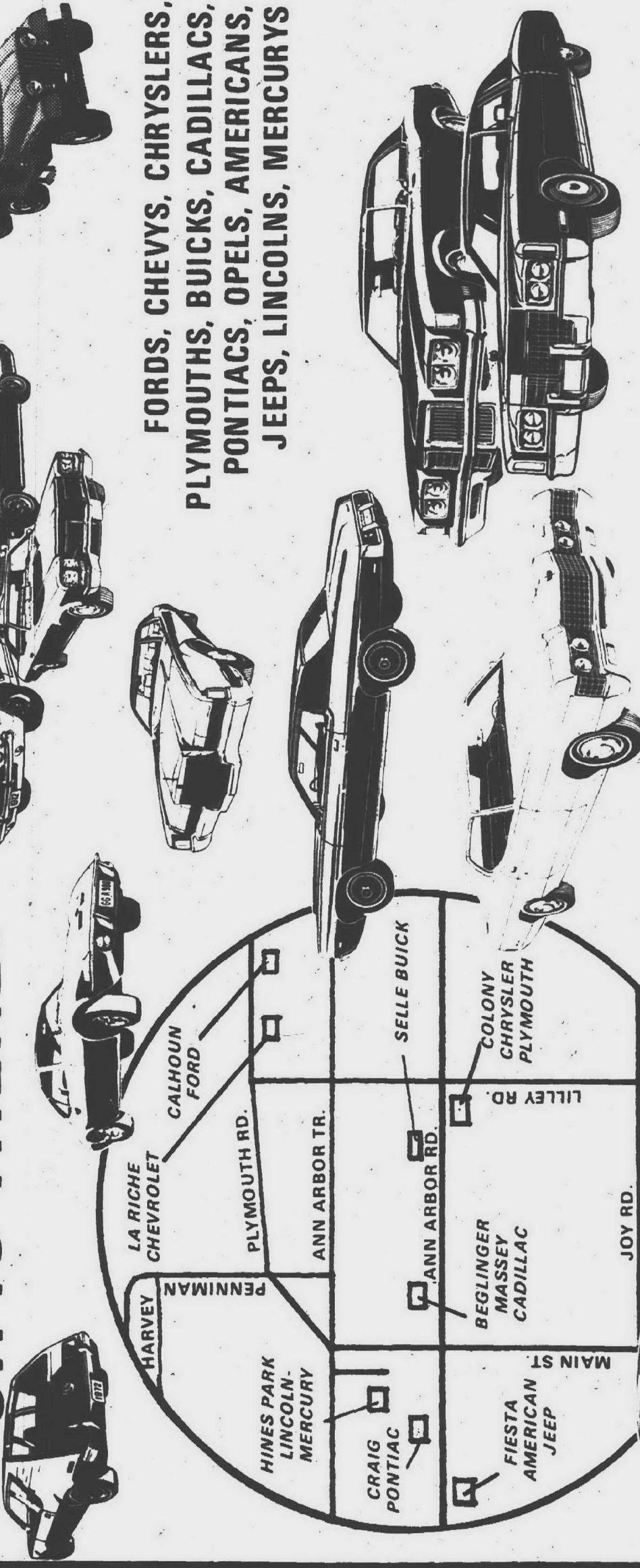
Andrews said the Kroger Supermarkets, which used to have a store at Northland, found that grocery shoppers didn't like to wade through a parking lot, fountains and greenery to buy their food. Shopping Centers Inc. built Kroger a new store at Westland, separated from the mall, which has proven more successful.

But some people, Shopping Center World reports, are turning up their noses at regional malls altogether and spending their money at neighborhood "strip centers."

Free parking is one of the big attractions of shopping centers and there are plenty of parking places between the Livonia Mall sign and Livonia Mall.

booked for shows and exhibits through May of 1973.

Malls seem to be trying to outdo each other in extravagant displays. Tel-Twelve recently purchased a small train to tour children through their Christmas exhibit. Westland offers shoppers a ride to the mezzanine on a wrought iron elevator in a glass tube.

Community activities play a big part in mall planning. Each mall has a community room which is rented out to local clubs.

Many malls welcome carnivals to their parking lots as outdoor tenants. Livonia Mall doesn't.

"Everything we do is planned to bring people into the mall," Poris said. "We tried a carnival once but we won't do it again."

Many malls go to great lengths to draw customers into their domain, but a 1970 study of 397 women in this area by Market Facts Inc., of Washington D.C., showed that 80 per cent of shoppers go to a particular mall for two main reasons: it's close to home and/or they like the stores.

The survey found that most women who shop at Northland, Tel-Twelve, Livonia Mall, Westland

and Wonderland are within a 15 min. to drive of their favorite shopping center.

About half the shoppers said the last time they went to the mall was to make a specific purchase at a specific store rather than because of advertisements or shows they averaged about 40 mall trips per year.

Poris said he takes great care in selecting new tenants to achieve a good "tenant mix."

"When we first opened it was important to get well known chain stores to come in," he said. "Now I try to get independent stores -- they are what gives character to a shopping center."

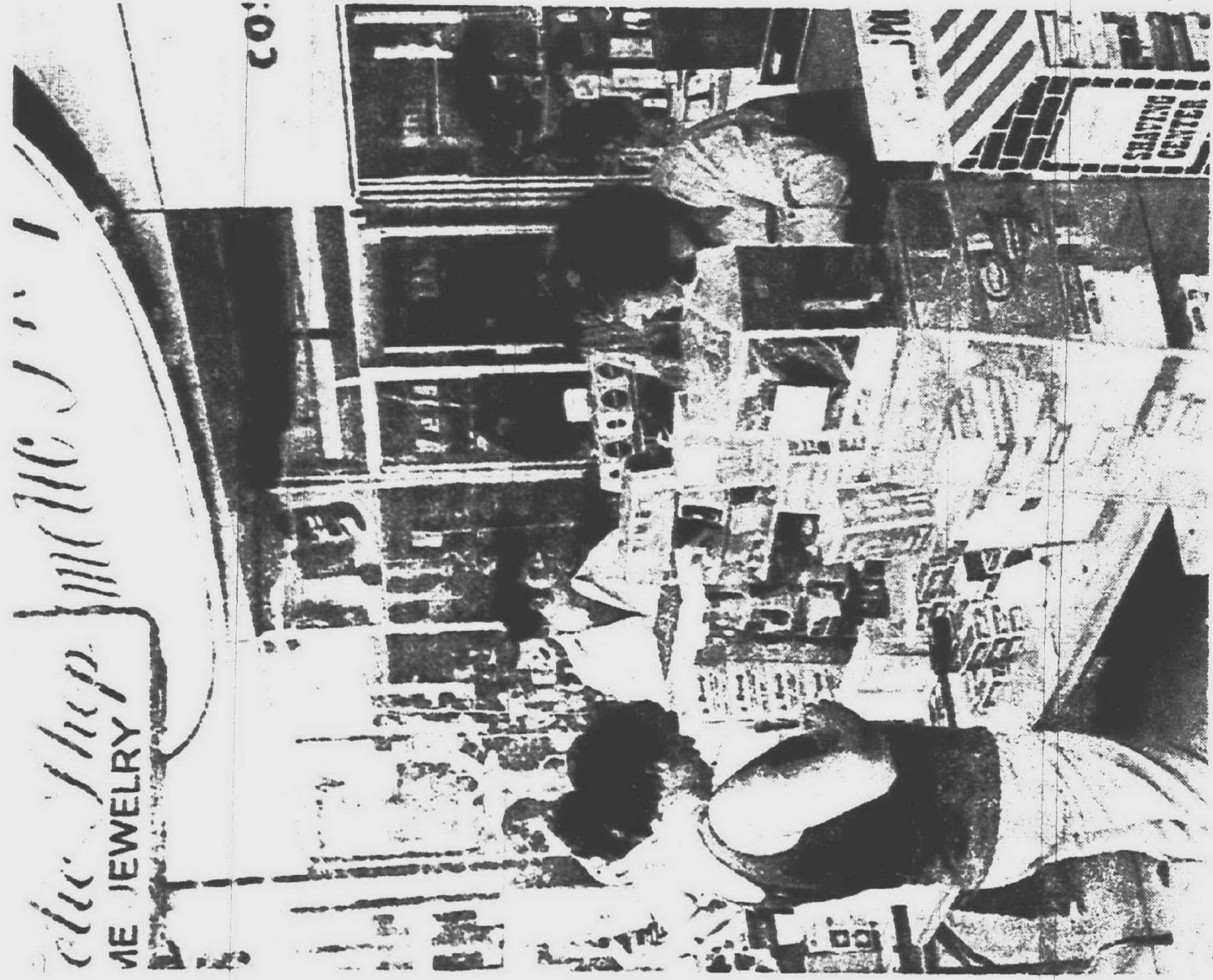
"Fifteen of my tenants are in every major shopping center. What makes a difference in shopping centers is the tenants we don't have in common."

He said about 20 of the mall's 54 stores were independent -- a high percentage for an area center.

Livonia Mall was rated the highest by shoppers in the Market Facts survey on variety of stores with Wonderland a close second.

Small shops can have a hard time meeting the finances of mall

"There was just Crystal Pool across the street and a little community called Magnolia," said Andrews. "Southfield was just a huge swamp with a nasty habit of flooding every spring."

"The day they first looked at the site for the center you could stand at the present Hudson store and see for a mile or more in any direction," said Richard W. Frey, president of Shopping Centers Inc. "It was all just fields, empty pasture."

"We wondered if we could really build -- and rent -- a million square feet in a shopping center in a cow pasture. It hadn't been done before."

Hudsons planned their store in the cow pasture and wrapped a carefully planned new city around

it to keep it nourished. The first year of operation, 1954, they exceeded their expected revenue of \$50 million by \$20 million.

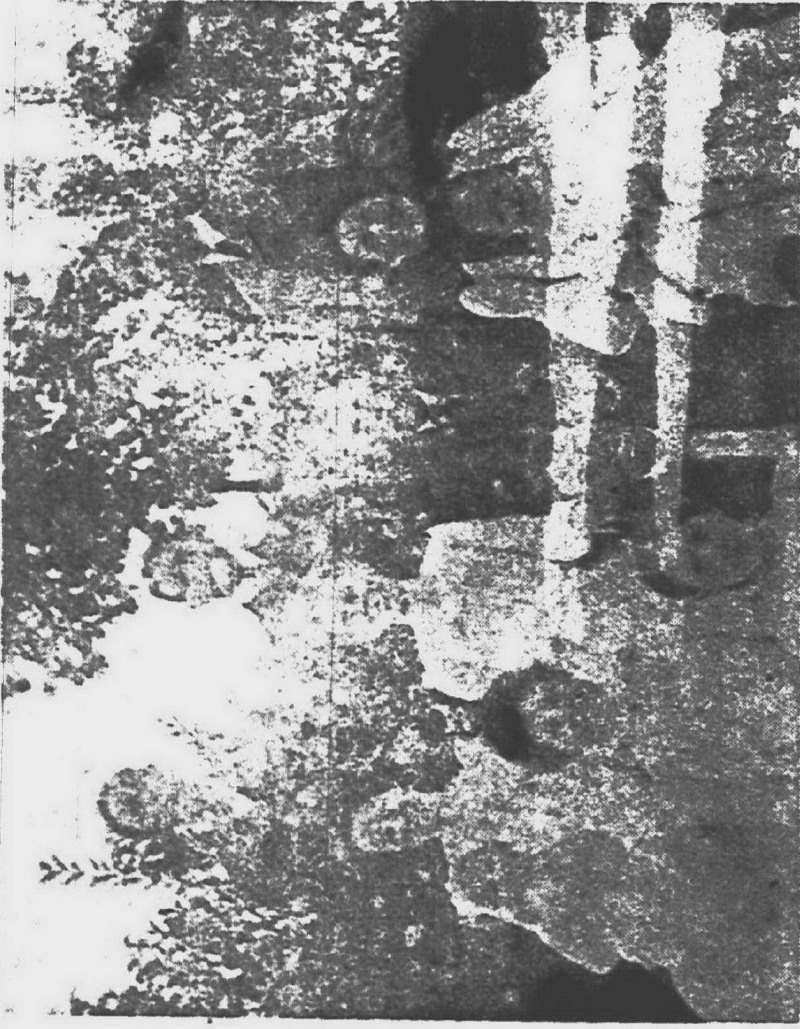
Northland, now 18 years old, and outsized and outclassed by newer supercenters across the country, is still the most successful shopping center in the world (based on sales per square foot).

Only about 160 acres of the original 500 remain in the hands of Shopping Centers Inc. The rest was sold to build offices, a hospital, etc. plans for which were approved by SCI.

A 14 story office building, Tower 14, now under construction, a 19 story Western International Hotel, a string of fast food service stores, a department store and a cluster of boutiques will complete Northland's neighborhood.

But even before the last building is up the center is scheduled for shopping center renewal.
