McLaren, Holmes Lead Republican Twp. Ticket

Life-long Plymouth resident John D. McLaren scored a 50-vote victory Tuesday over incumbent Plymouth Township supervisor Maurice M. Breen in a major local primary election upset as he captured the Republican nomination for the township's top administrative post.

Other primary victors included:

Republicans - Elizabeth Holmes for treasurer, Helen Richardson for clerk and both of the incumbents, Russell Ash and Gerald Burke, for the board of trustees.

Democrats - Joseph Krochmalny for supervisor, Lois Lane for clerk and the twosome of Earl Dey and Joseph Rey for trustees.

McLaren polled 678 GOP votes to 628 for Breen, who had been elected supervisor in 1970 after serving previously as a trustee and before that on the plan-

ning commission. Trailing in third place in the party contest was Wilson-Augustine with 312.

THE OTHER major Republican contest was for the nomination for treasurer and in this the Breen-supported candidate, Anna Milligan, was beaten by 18-year incumbent, Elizabeth Holmes, 953 to 654.

Incumbent GOP Trustee Russell Ash paced his six-man field with 915 votes, followed by Burke, 556; Richard Gornick, 373; Gordon Campbell, 319; William Evans, 318, and Soren Pedersen, 223.

Democrats, in their only party contest, cast 296 votes for Dey in putting him on the November ballot as a candidate trustee, and 261 for Rey. Ralph Goble lost out by finishing third at 246. Both Dey and Rey carried the official endorsement of the local Democratic organization.

BY 9 P.M. Tuesday, when results had become known, Plymouth Township Hall had become the

scene of a victory party for the McLaren-Holmes ticket, these two having campaigned as a team in their newspaper advertising.

A Republican primary triumph is considered tantamount to victory in the heavily GOP-influenced township, and the McLaren ticket will be heavily favored in the general election Nov. 7.

For McLaren, a former member of the Plymouth school board, the victory was particularly sweet as it came on the eve of his son's wedding ceremony, to be held today. He said that if elected in November, his big concern will be with "the influx of developers and how to improve police protection in the township."

"I have no intention of turning this office upside down," said McLaren. "It is full of capable people, and first I must get my feet on the ground."

A former city resident, he is owner and manager of the McLaren-Company, McLaren-Silkworth Oil Co. and the McLaren Transit Mix Co.

Park Curfew Delayed Incumbents Win Big In Canton

Plymouth's City Commission voted 4-3 Monday night to give final approval to a measure regulating the home parking of recreational vehicles, but put off decisive action on a proposed park curfew ordinance - probably until September.

The oft-stormy meeting lasted until midnight as one resident after another in a crowd of about 100 rose to voice opinions on one or the other of these two measures.

The park control legislation, which would establish an 11 p.m. curfew among other regulations, will undergo further examination in a conference to be scheduled between commissioners and representatives of Youth Inc., the Council of Community Concerns and the Human Relations Commission.

A status report on the ordinance will be given at the Aug. 21 commission meeting, and at that time it will be decided on what date to put it

back on the formal agenda for final reading. Indications were strong that the language will be tempered to bring about a compromise, if there is to be any approval at all.

THE LEGISLATION controlling recreational vehicles was in the form of an amendment to the zoning ordinance, and it will become effective Jan. 1.

Mayor James McKeon and Commissioners Norbert Battermann, Ernie Henry and Beverly McAninch cast the affirmative votes which put the ordinance on the books after two years of off and on haggling.

It was strongly opposed by many owners of campers and trailers who objected to its main provision that vehicles be stored "only within the confines of the rear yard."

The three commissioners voting against adoption were Harold Guenther, Robert Sincock and William Silvius.

A few minutes earlier, a motion by Guenther to defer final consideration until Sept. 18 went down to a 4-3 defeat, Guenther being joined only by Battermann and Sincock.

MARY CHILDS, chairman of the municipal planning commission, was one of the few in the audience who urged adoption, declaring to the opponents, "We do not want to prohibit you from having a good time, but we are concerned where you park these vehicles."

The mayor backed her up with the assertion, "The ordinance isn't intended to run these vehicles out of town, but only to require adherence to setback."

Planning commissioners, who drafted the measure, say there have been frequent complaints from residents that neighbors have blocked their view by the locations campers and trailers have been parked. They admit,

however, that most of the complaints have been verbal, only a few being put in writing.

Date for the ordinance to take effect was put off until January to permit those residents who find it necessary to move shrubs, fences or vehicle pads.

The attitude of opponents was summed up best by a spokesman who declared, "It doesn't accomplish a damn thing except create further harassment of the people."

THE PARKS ordinance was under debate for nearly two hours. Although it covers all public lands, it is admittedly aimed primarily at control of Kellogg Park in the downtown area, where there have been numerous incidents of vandalism.

Police Chief Timothy Ford, who prepared the measure, said it brings all restrictive

As in the other key posts, there was no Republican candidate.

Democratic incumbents in Canton's supervisor, clerk and treasurer's race were swept back into office in Tuesday's primary.

Because of no Republican opposition, incumbent Supervisor Philip Dingley was assured of a fourth term. He polled 840 votes, defeating opponent Jack Marts, 236, and Rodger Smith, 304.

In the clerk's race, incumbent Democrat John Flodin won out over his opponent, Ellen Ruland, also a Democrat. Flodin received 785 votes to Mrs. Ruland's 496. There was no Republican opposition.

Incumbent Democrat Grant Campbell won a second term as treasurer by beating his opponent, Mrs. Alberta Thomas. Campbell received 719 votes to Mrs. Thomas' 440.

IN THE trustee race with two posts open, however, it was a slightly different story. Incumbent Democrat Robert H. Griffin, appointed to the board two months ago to fill a vacancy, led the race with 472 votes.

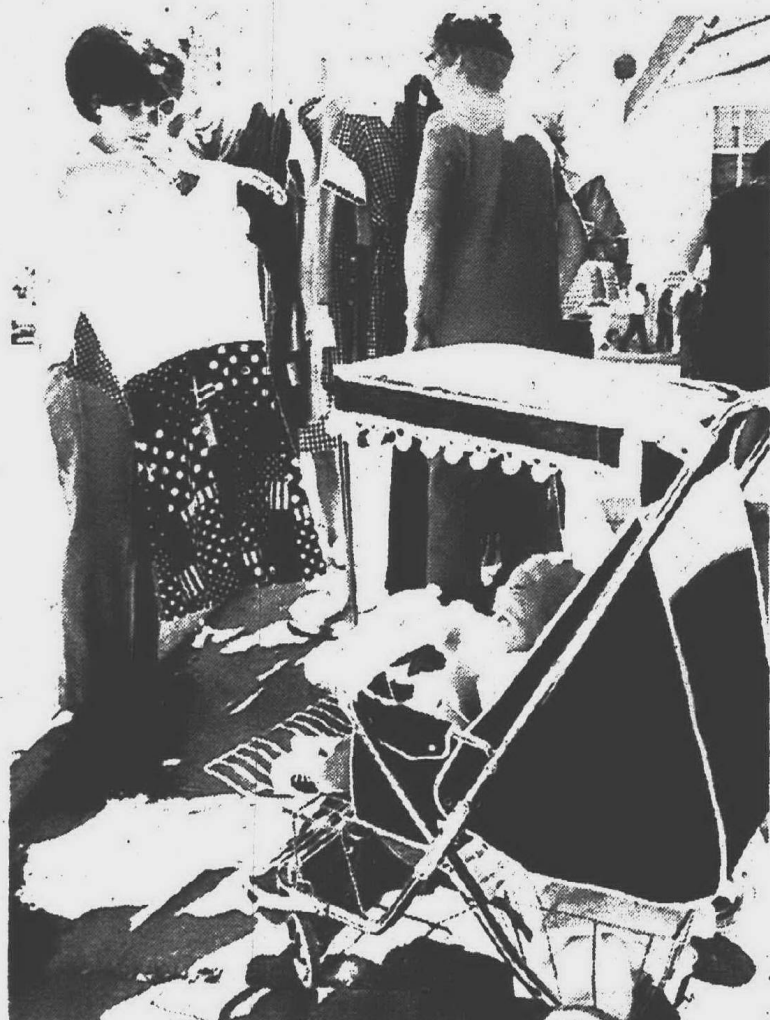
Winning the second nomination was Conrad V. Dennis, Schoolcraft college student and a member of one of Canton's pioneer families.

Third was incumbent William S. Graham Jr. who received 394 votes. Fourth was Frank McMurray with 374. Others were: Walter Baran, 101; Lawrence Baron, 133; and Louis J. Richardson, 96.

The lone Republican trustee candidate was James Poole, who received 198 votes.

Highway Projects Started

Work has begun on four highway projects totaling \$3.37 million in Garden City, Westland and Livonia, according to Sen. William Faust (D-Westland).

A 1.4 mile stretch of Middle Belt Rd. from Michigan Ave. north will be completed in November at a cost of \$1.4 million. The project includes widening, paving, grading and drainage structures and construction of a three-span bridge to carry Middle Belt over the Lower Rouge River in Inkster.

Two miles of Cherry Hill will be widened from US-24 west in Garden City, Westland and Inkster at a cost of \$1.56 million. The project is due for completion in November.

Improvements at the intersection of Merriman Rd. and Marquette Ave. in Garden City are being financed by federal funds at a \$210,000 cost. The project will be completed in September.

Also due for completion in September are improvements to the intersections of Wayne and Joy Rds., Wayne and Ann Arbor Trail, and Wayne and Plymouth Rd. in Livonia and Westland. The \$170,000 project is financed with federal funds.

Stolen Goods Proposal OK'd By Senate

LANSING — Proposed legislation requiring that persons who receive stolen goods must prove they thought the items were legitimate passed the Senate with approval from two Observerland senators. Sen. William Faust (D-Westland) and Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) both voted for the bill, which passed 23-8 and was sent to Gov. Milliken for signature. The bill had passed the House several months ago.

Sen. David Plawewski (D-Dearborn Heights) voted against the bill, and Sen. Daniel Cooper (D-Oak Park) was absent.

The bill would make the receiver of stolen goods liable for the same penalty as the thief.

Supporters argued that it would dry up the market for the goods and discourage young people from attempting to make easy money through selling stolen goods.

Opponents argued that the bill presumes the person guilty until he proves his innocence.

The 12th annual Lower Huron Class A swim meet will be held Wednesday and Thursday, Aug. 9 and 10, at the pool of Lower Metropolitan Park near Belleville.

Boys and girls, ages 17 and under, are eligible to compete in the AAU sanctioned, all-timed finals, beginning at 5 p.m. on Wednesday and continuing at 9 a.m. Thursday until completion of all events.

Medals, provided by the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority, will be awarded to first, second and third place winners, while fourth through seventh place winners will receive ribbons, according to Park Supt. George Giblin.

Mrs. Sally Prior, of Orchard Lake, general swim chairman of Amateur Athletic Union and chairman of Junior Olympic Swim Committee, is the meet director.

Assisting Mrs. Prior are members of the Mercy Aquatic Club of Farmington.

THROUGH BIFOCALS

WHEN THE MULTITUDE pleaded, "Music, Maestro, Please," and then sat back in a great sense of anticipation as the genius on the podium raised his baton... well, that's when I woke up. It hadn't been quite like that Friday night in Kellogg Park when the Plymouth Community Band presented the last in its summer concert series.

There was a goodly crowd on hand, but hardly a multitude. They didn't shout, and they certainly didn't beg for an encore from the guest conductor who was unexpectedly thrust upon them — the most non-genius type available.

If there was any sense of anticipation, it was in wondering whether the guy could keep time at all.

Thanks only to the professional musicianship of the members, the band and the director finished the march, "Men of Valor," on the same beat. As a good friend told me later, "You follow well."

What it proved, though, was that in music-minded Plymouth, anyone can get in on the act, and if I can lead a band, so can you.

What I'm really getting around to is that in these next few weeks there are going to be many opportunities for all of us either to lead or follow, not in the actual playing of a musical score but in helping our high school band attain its financial goal for that New Year's appearance at Pasadena.

A COMMITTEE of parents was created recently under the chairmanship of Mrs. Richard (Wilma) Newton, and inasmuch as no tax money will be used to send the band to the Tournament of Roses parade, these two important decisions were made:

First, the general approach will be one of

attempting to reduce the package price of \$220 per student as much as possible. While no exact goal was established, it was pointed out that a "kitty" of \$10,000 would reduce the per student cost to approximately \$150. Each boy and girl in the band is to try to earn and save that on his own.

It then was mutually agreed not to "nickel and dime" the Plymouth community to death with numerous small activities such as car washes, bake sales, etc. The consensus was that two or three large-scale events, plus unsolicited contributions by private individuals, etc., would help to preserve the luster of the trip "rather than tarnish our image with incessant doorbell ringing."

The band will have a booth at the Fall Festival four weeks hence, and there will be a decal sale some Saturday in October. The VFW already is making plans for a series of pancake breakfasts from which proceeds will go to help the band, and other organizations undoubtedly will find ways to help out, too. It's a good approach, and certainly the cause is a worthy one.

THE BAND will make the trip on a chartered American Airlines B-727, leaving Thursday, Dec. 28 and getting home the night of Tuesday, Jan. 2. Twenty-four parents have indicated a desire to accompany the 144 bandmen as chaperones, paying their own expenses totally, of course.

Other interested persons could make their own plane reservations and still stay with the band group in UCLA dormitories, if they wish, at the same rates the official party will pay — \$10 per day per person, including both room and board, two to a room.

Proposed side trips include sightseeing jaunts by chartered buses to Universal Studios, Knott's Berry Farm, Marineland of the Pacific and Disneyland. The parade itself would occupy New Year's Day, obviously.

The Plymouth High School band has established an enviable reputation and proud tradition of excellence in performing both on the marching field and concert stage. This tradition has been achieved through the hard work, loyalty and desire of its members to "not be as good as — but better than!"

Next Jan. 1, through the miracle of television, millions across the nation will get a look at Bandmaster James Griffith's 1972-73 product. It would be a shame if back home in Plymouth there was anyone who had failed to help make it possible.

McGuire Gets University Teaching Post

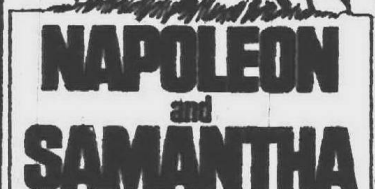
PLYMOUTH David O. McGuire of Plymouth has accepted a teaching position on the history faculty of Bob Jones University, Greenville, S.C.

provisions into one ordinance. "We must have specific language," he said. "We have worked through the tools we have, using every technique, yet still have mounting destruction."

"We have no authority to close the park except the gun on our hip. The department feels the ordinance as written is called for and that we should have some authority in law to be able to close the park when public safety requires it."

AN ALTERNATIVE proposal, drafted by several residents who identify themselves as "a group of concerned citizens," was read by Steve McGlinn. The copy submitted to the commission also bore the names of William McQueston, Pastor Fred Prezioso, Tom Webber, Greg DeLauro, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Masters, William McAninch (husband of Commissioner McAninch), Richard Bowling and Dale Yagiela.

Their document contained such statements as these:

"The ordinance, as it is presently drafted, does not provide an adequate solution to the dilemmas plaguing citizens using public areas. These dilemmas should be faced in terms of the resources that are available with in the community."

"In examining the city ordinances already in effect, one finds laws already covering many of these areas. The new ordinance, in terms of practicality, will face the same problems as the old ordinances, that is, the difficulty of enforcement."

"The proposed ordinance places in jeopardy the harmonious development of relations between the young people and adults within the Plymouth community."

"We feel that we can develop and implement a positive mechanism to provide a solution; utilizing mechanisms already in existence. Our proposal utilizes the following:

"Enforcement of existing ordinances, continued presence of the community service officer in the park, and formation and continuing operation of the 'park patrol,' a community-based group to deal with park problems and composed primarily of young people."

Don't Padlock Gar's Home

It was only with great difficulty that the architect of this pillar was able to swallow the huge lump that formed in his throat when he learned that a move is afoot to padlock the late Gar Wood's mansion in Grayhaven at the lower tip of Lake St. Clair.

It seems that the once fabulous residence with its spacious lawns has been taken over by hippies, dope addicts and motorcycle gangs, much to the discontent of the neighbors who have asked that it be closed.

The big, gray mansion, now standing as a symbol of the past, may not mean much to the present generation. But there was a time in the depth of the depression in the early '30s when it was a beacon of light in the darkest hours when the streets were filled with unemployed and the City of Detroit was surviving through the use of "scrip" for money.

It was during these deepest dips in the economy that Gar Wood, the mechanical genius who made a fortune with his invention of the hydraulic hoist, became the central figure in a series of speedboat races that developed into what was termed an international scandal. These verbal battles served as a tonic to those who were suffering the doldrums of despair.

SOME YEARS BEFORE, Gar had become involved in speedboat racing and brought to America the famed Harmsworth Trophy — a British symbol of the world championship — and now, in the midst of the depression, he was called upon by the British to defend it on Detroit waters.

And all of the planning and strategy was done around the dining room table and on the costly rug in the living room of the castle they now want to have padlocked.

It was from here that Gar and his mechanic, Orlin Johnson, made their wild dash to the starting line at the Detroit Yacht Club on Labor Day afternoon of 1931 amid the cheers of thousands who lined the banks of the river.

It was this wild dash that lured Kaye Don, the challenger, over the line ahead of time and caused his disqualification moments before his boat capsized near the Belle Isle bridge turn.

Don had won the first heat and the manner in which he lost the second — and the race — created the wildest scene the Detroit River ever has known.

IT WAS AFTER this race that Gar, always an inventive type, conceived the idea for a new boat — one that would far outdo anything the speedboat world had known to that time.

Under the rules of the Harmsworth, a pilot had

to use engines built in the country it represented. At the time America had nothing to cope with the Rolls-Royce motors developed by the British. But Gar had an idea.

He summoned the members of the press who always coveted the opportunity to visit Gar's home, and the country's top engineers. After dinner he led the way into the living room and there, kneeling on the floor, he drew the design of a power plant with his four motors hooked in tandems that would run in opposite directions.

While The Stroller, along with the others, sat dazed as Gar used crayon on the costly rug, one of the engineers spoke up and said, "Gar, you can't do that. You'd blow yourself to pieces."

"What have you to worry about?" Gar chuckled. "You won't be in the boat. Orlin and I will."

And so it was that the famed Miss America that won the Harmsworth and set a world record of 124.85 miles an hour was conceived. It was the greatest speedboat ever built to that time.

BEFORE THE GUESTS left that evening, Gar attempted to soothe them with organ music. He had the costliest and largest pipe organ in any residence in America.

As the sounds of "Old Man River" wafted across the room, they suddenly lost their mellowness and turned tinny.

"Don't be alarmed," Gar laughed, "I have it hooked up so that the Steinway piano in the next room plays the chorus."

The old gray mansion was the scene of many so-called miracles that gave the minds of the unemployed citizens mental relief in the dark days of the depression.

There are still many ghosts that walk through the halls and over the lawn at Grayhaven.

It never should be closed. It should always remain as the castle that served as the beacon of light when days looked darkest.

New York City also will be visited by the new plebes for a cultural orientation program.

Since many of the Kings Pointers will be in New York City for the first time, a series of visits are planned: to the United Nations, Metropolitan Museum of Art, Hayden Planetarium, Museum of Natural History and the Museum of Modern Art.

Requirements for appointment as midshipman, U.S. Naval Reserve and qualifying for the college entrance examination board tests must also be met. Details can be obtained by writing: Admissions Office, U.S. Merchant Marine Academy, Kings Point, N.Y. 11024.

Holt will participate in an "Acceptance Day" review on Saturday, Sept. 2 when he officially becomes a member of the regiment and is sworn in as a Midshipman in the United States Naval Reserve.

4 From England Have 75 Teachers In Class

Three headmasters and one headmistress from primary and junior schools in England are teaching a special class to about 75 area school teachers at Isbister Elementary School in Plymouth.

The class is being conducted by the school of education, Oakland University, and being directed by Mrs. Shirley A. Spaniel, principal at the new Miller School in Plymouth.

Teachers from Plymouth, Livonia and Farmington as well as other areas are attending the class.

The teachers are taking the class for graduate credit; among them are eight from Miller school.

Focus of the class is "learning from the environment," with heavy emphasis on getting teachers to use the mundane things often overlooked.

"WE WANT them to learn to use things found near the school, as well as the resources of the community," Mrs. Spaniel explained. The four English visitors, considered to be experts in teaching, all are heads of schools in England. They are enthusiastic about their approach to learning. Harry Ducker, headmaster of a county junior school, explains:

"This course for your teachers is about the open classroom. By that, we do not mean a physical condition, but rather an 'open' curriculum."

"We are advocating a child-centered curriculum, that still serves the requirements of academic disciplines," Ducker said.

THE FOUR teachers from England said two things were important to an open school: extensive planning by the teacher, and a good deal of self-discipline on the part of the children.

Whether such an open classroom concept means mixing grades or classrooms would depend on the individual schools, the visiting educators said.

The workshop itself is set around teachers doing things that they can have students do in their classroom next year. For example, simple block printing and other craft ideas get their content and form when a student examines those things in the school yard, such as mushrooms, grass, trees, leaves.

Through this, students learn about patterns in nature.

What they see is transferred to a piece of cloth; the cloth then becomes the cover for a book they make; the pages of the book are filled with what they have learned.

"With the art and book binding activities, we hope children can learn about craftsmanship," said Eleanor Nisbet, headmistress at a primary school in England.

IN ANOTHER example, she showed the teachers in the workshop using straws to make three-dimensional shapes, such as a pyramid.

"From this kind of exercise, students are learning about geometry, math, counting, statistics, even logic," Mrs. Nisbet said.

She pointed out how wood, shells, an old clock and other natural things can be used by a teacher to stimulate.

"Take this old clock," she said, holding up an inexpensive alarm clock. "A student can take it apart, and learn a great deal about gears and mechanical things. Then, I think, we would ask the students to find other ways of telling time."

David Martin, another of the English teachers whose specialty is music, agreed in principle:

"Often, our judgements about schools and education are based on our own experience in schools."

"There are basic minimum standards for a formal education; we feel we have looked at that, and tried to evaluate the needs of the children in more personal terms."

Martin said their concept of an 'open' classroom meant that there is a very delicate and intricate structure operating. "But, there is order, progression."

"WHAT WE wish to avoid is the sausage machine -- feeding raw material in one end and getting identical things coming out of the other end," Martin said.

"We really are not abrogating old techniques," Ducker added. "We think teachers should correlate the whole activity with the entire curriculum, using outside resources as much as possible."

He said that the business of making books is "functional, purposeful, rather than purely academic."

All four of the guest teachers agreed that the emotional and social development of the child is just as important as academic growth. Mrs. Nisbet, Ducker, Martin and Fred Meyrick compose the team of four.

On the question of assessment, they explained that they tried to use standardized test "in a diagnostic way."

"Learning is a whole thing, and we like to evaluate by our knowledge of our children and their attitudes," Ducker said.

"We feel we are accountable to parents," Ducker added. Martin said he felt that the open classroom concept requires that parents see the school "while it was working."

"If a parent can see what his child is doing, this satisfies them more than checks in a box or a letter, 'A', 'B', and so on."

IF THE student is functioning at his very best, then they have been successful, the visiting teachers said. They also said they would probably reject criterion referenced tests, where a student is "stretched to reach pre-set standards."

"Students learn by responding to stimulus rather than being told what to learn," Ducker said. Martin agrees, and said that they see each student as being at a different level. "They can't be passed

through a school in one wave," Martin said.

For the teachers in the workshop taught by the four, the work has been geared to doing things students would do.

"We have tried to set up things that would stimulate the teachers; they can hopefully extend this to their classroom," Mrs. Nisbet said.

Where necessary, more traditional, direct instruction is used, the four said.

Their theories in no way should be linked with Summerhill, a so-called 'free' school founded in the '20s by A.S. Neill on Freudian principles. Neill and his school never have been concerned with academics, and it would be a disservice to link his controversial school with the concept of 'open' classrooms as espoused by the visitors from England.

States Chairman Gerald Olson: "We feel that the parents of the band members should have the full support of the community in this trip to the Rose Bowl parade."

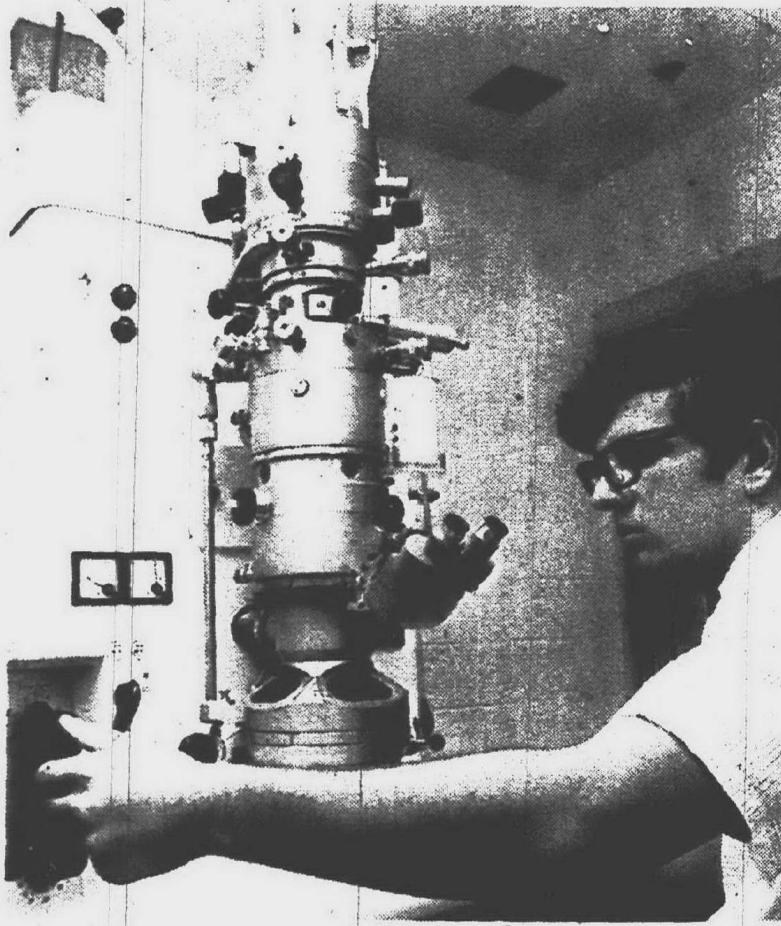

PHS Student Gains Training In Science

PLYMOUTH Algae was the subject of a study by Alan Petro, a Plymouth student, during the 14th annual high school honors science program at Michigan State University.

Under the direction of the Science and Mathematics Teaching Center and Dr. Charles R. Peebles, assistant professor of natural science, the six-week summer program was cosponsored by MSU and the National Science Foundation.

Fifty-two high school students who have completed their junior year in the top 10 per cent of their classes were chosen from test scores and teacher's recommendations to

participate in the program. Students selected majors and minors from four natural science areas: biology, chemistry, computer science and physics. Individual experiments in the students' major fields were conducted and the results reported.

The daily schedule included morning classes in biology, chemistry, computer science and a guest lecture series. Students then spent afternoons working on their individual projects. Special field trips were arranged on Saturday afternoons.

City Pushes New Water Meter Plan For Easy Reading

PLYMOUTH Plymouth City Hall began an organized campaign this week to sell water customers who do not have them on the advantages of installing an outside meter reading device.

The theme of the promotion, which was given City Commission endorsement some time ago, is that "outside reader meters should make housewives happy."

The former price of the conversion unit has been \$25, but City Manager Norman Gaffney announced Monday that "for a limited time" the recording unit will be installed on the outside wall of the home at a cost of \$15 per installation.

This may be paid in one payment, or divided into three equal payments of \$5 each. Payments will be added to the regular water bills after installation.

GAFFNEY POINTED to these as a few of the advantages of the system:

More convenience and privacy in the home, elimination of estimated bills, no mud or snow tracked in during bad weather, elimination of the risk of accidents in the home for the meter reader, and no interruptions of the household schedule or children's naps.

A schedule for installation of the Badger Read-o-Matic outdoor registers will be set up by the water department after the first group of applications are received.

GAFFNEY SAID use of the outdoor devices throughout the city "should turn customer complaints into compliments." It also is assumed that it would reduce call-back demands upon water department personnel.

Said Gaffney: "The Badger register is a self-operating mechanism in two parts. One of the parts, called an impulse generator, is installed near the top of the water meter in the basement or service room of a building.

"By the flow of water through the meter, the generator sends out electric impulses to activate the other part of the device on the outside of the building, enabling it to register the water consumption in figures on a dial.

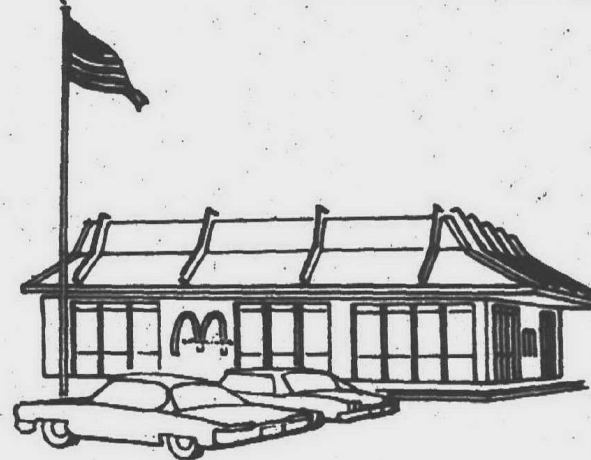
"Many housewives object to having men go through their homes to read or service meters of public utilities.

"In many cases, the meter reader must go through the living room and, in slushy weather, there is danger of leaving tracks on the rug.

"In many cases, the meters are placed in spots that are difficult for the meter reader to reach.

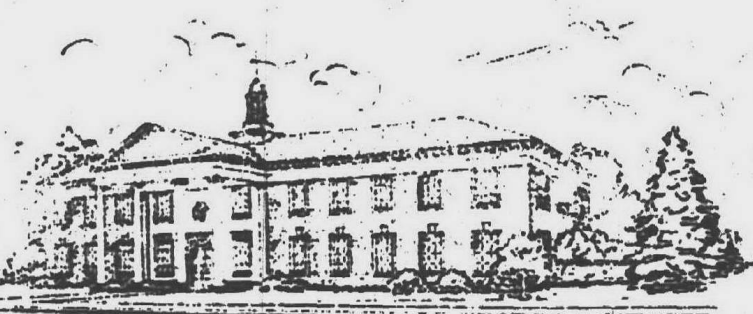

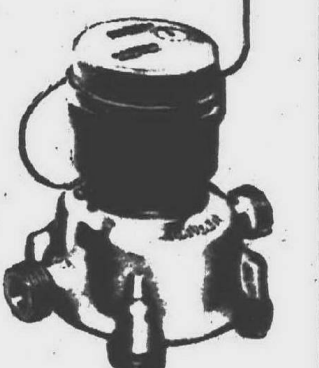
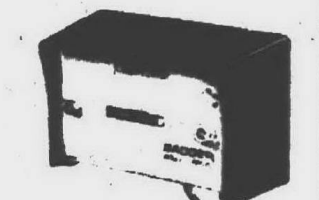

Redford Adray is making no qualms about it... this is the year to take all the marbles in the Nationals at Johnstown, Pa.

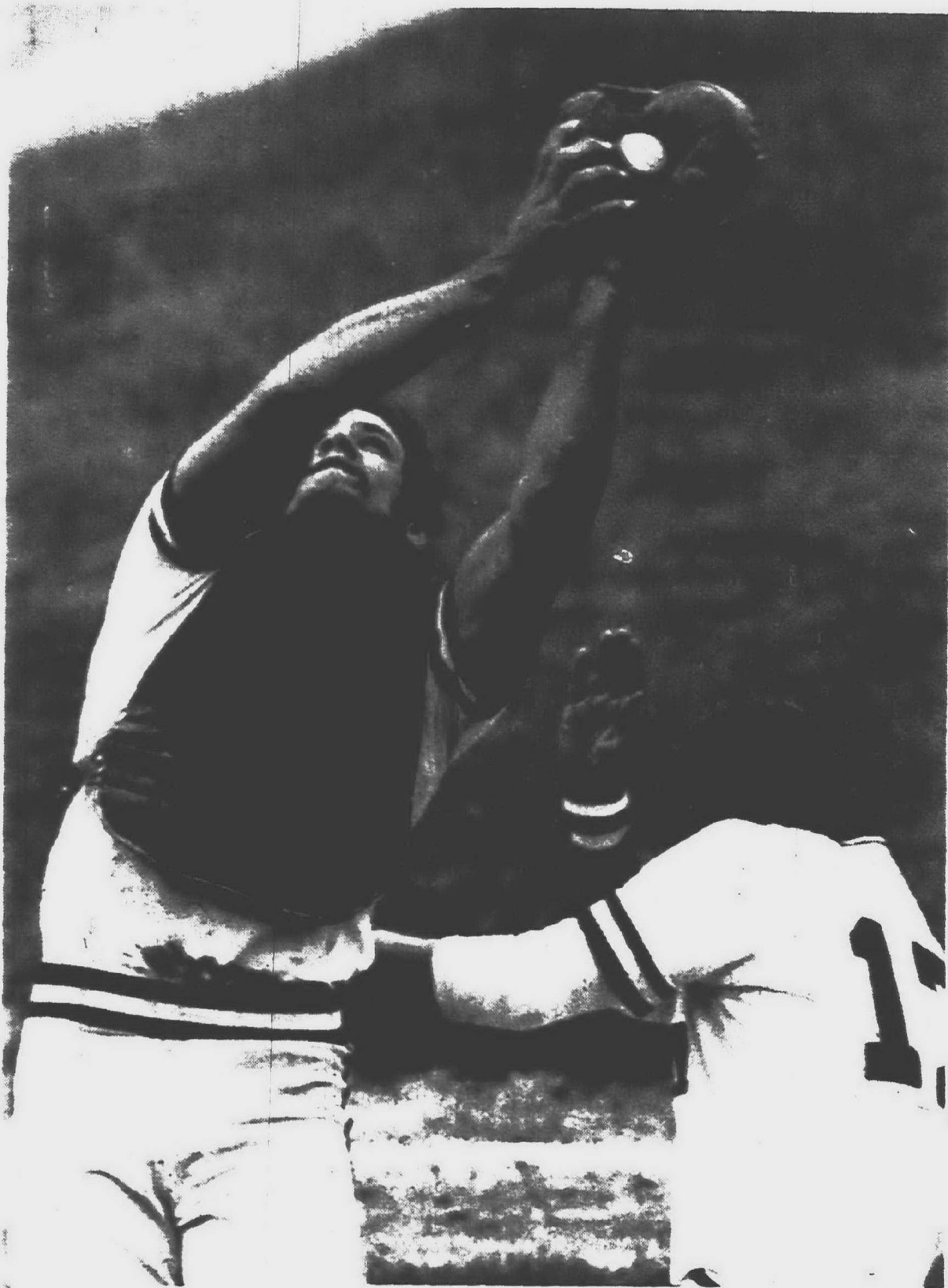

The Court Jester

Our Women's League is off and running! The last report from Mrs. Moulton and Thomas showed a total of 22 matches played last week. The scores ranged anywhere from 10-9 to 10-0 but everyone appears to be enjoying the competition. Even some of the losers are having fun.

One of the rules that we forgot pertains to scheduling and forfeits. If one player cannot play during the week scheduled, she should forfeit her match, rather than attempting to make it up at a later date. Rainouts do not count as cancelled matches in point standings.

In other words, if you have a match scheduled, and rain causes cancellation, but you are unable to re-schedule it during that week, report the match as rained out. We'll try to keep everything as simple as possible.

IF YOU ARE having off days, when you can't seem to keep the ball in the court, it

may be due to the type of court surface you're playing on. You will get a different bounce on cement than you will on asphalt or composition.

The cement courts at Churchill High School are ridiculous. You will find that the ball reacts differently on each half of your court. The finish is smooth on one half and rough on the other. You may find depressions in some asphalt courts which make for tricky bounces.

Generally you will find a truer bounce on cement. The ball skids more on asphalt and composition. It will "stand-up" longer on clay, which gives you more time. Grass creates a very low, skidding type of bounce. Wood is considered the fastest surface compared to some of the slow carpeting popular in indoor courts.

So don't always blame yourself. The timing is different and you may have to get more knee bend to get the lower bounce.

Plymouth High Names Basketball Mentor

There will be a new head coach behind the whistle this fall when Plymouth High begins practice for the 1972-73 basketball season.

Fred Thomann has made the jump from top mentor at Willow Run High to Plymouth to fill the shoes of Dick Bearup who accepted assistant principal duties.

Thomann is far from new to the coaching ranks with a State Class B championship under his belt in his "rookie year" at Willow Run in 1967-68.

The physical education teacher, who will be teaching at Allen Elementary School, stands six foot, eight and one-half inches, weighs 240 pounds, and has quite a background as a player.

THOMANN WON All-State honors in his senior year at Taylor Center High School in 1960 when he averaged 25 points. He attended Michigan State University on a basketball scholarship where he was selected most valuable player his senior year with a 17.9 point per game average.

The Spartan center returned to the Taylor public school system as a teacher in 1965 and was assistant cage coach at Holy Redeemer in 1966-67.

Next followed five years as coach at Willow Run with the state championship in Class B.

"That 1967-68 season had to be my greatest thrill ever," said Thomann. "We went into the tournament with a 9-7 record and caught fire, finishing with a 17-7 mark."

THOMANN DIRECTED his cagers to the district title the following year, the regional finals in 1969-70 along with coaching assignments in cross country, football and track.

The 29-year-old Thomann played semi-pro basketball in Muskegon during 1964-66 with his highest playing day figure 34 points against Brigham Young in a Spartan uniform.

conference," said Thomann. "But coaching in Class A has to be more of a challenge."

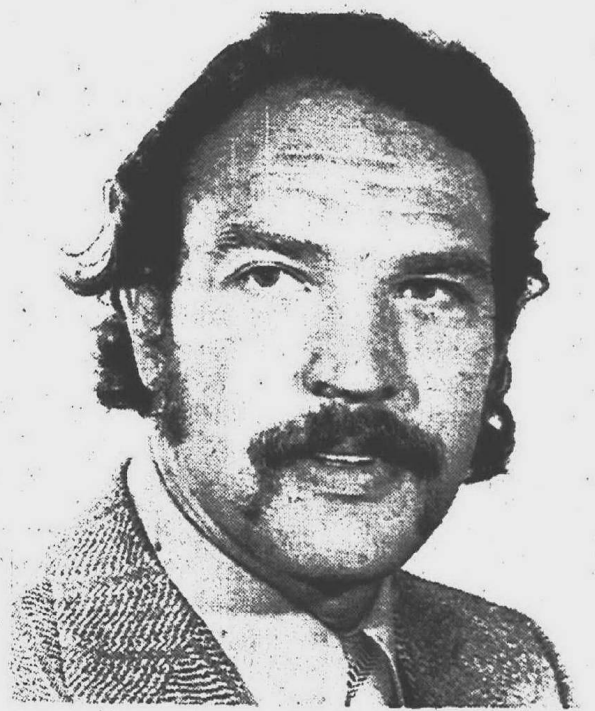

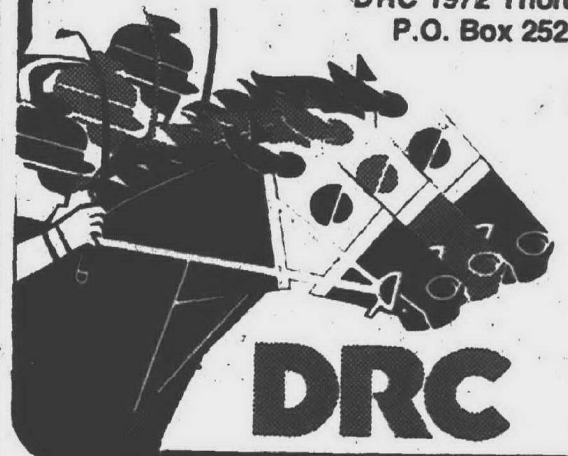

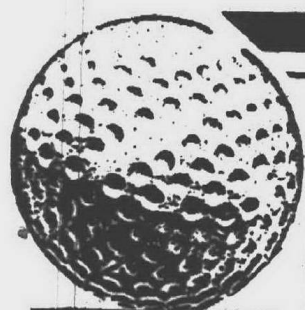

Turf Tips, Quips

Play that hunch, bet a bunch.

That old moth-eaten saying of true followers of the thoroughbreds certainly would have paid off with box car figures had anyone decided to use it at the Detroit Race Course during the first week of the 108 day meeting.

In the first place, one has to doff the topper to Jack Van Berg, the nation's leading trainer a year ago when he collected the most wins to follow in the footsteps of his late father, M. H. Van Berg.

Jack, who checked into the DRC with 56 horses from Ak-Sar-Ben, Chicago and Monmouth, saw four of his horses finish first Saturday to give him a total of nine for the opening week. That gives him a commanding lead in the trainers' race.

Matter of fact, Van Berg saddled 16 horses in the first four days and only two wound up out of the money.

BUT HE ISN'T the only one in the spotlight. Jockey Phil Ribbico had a three bagger early in the week. Larry Snyder, everyone's choice for leading rider honors, had three in a row Saturday and veteran Billy Phelps recorded the first four-bagger Monday through the slop and heavy going.

Phelps took the first half of a daily double worth \$776 when he guided Dukes Orphan home to pay \$27.

He popped again in the third with Youth Passport at \$28.40 and came right back with Ressa Beaux in the next for \$21.60.

The fourth victory came in the eighth with Fleet To Market. But the bettors were beginning to catch on by this time and the win ticket was only good for \$9.

With such riders as Rubbico, L. Snyder, J. Gavidia, Phelps, Ronnie Campbell, Bobby Baird, M. Cedeno, Jerry Santage, Bruce Brown, Larry Kunitake and Jerry Engle, the DRC has the best group of riders in several years.

And would you believe it, there isn't one feminine jockey on the grounds.

ONE BEGINS to wonder if area race tracks are beginning to feel the effects of the economic conditions and the unemployment situation existing in Metropolitan Detroit.

Hazel Park hasn't come close to matching the business of the recent Wolverine harness racing meeting in its first four nights. The attendance has been very good but the

handle leaves some thought for conjecture of the future.

For instance, Hazel Park had more than 11,000 in the stands Saturday night and fell below \$800,000. All of which means the per capita is way short of what it was during the late spring and early summer.

When Wolverine had a crowd of 10,000 or more, the management knew the handle would be in the high \$800,000 bracket and a gathering of 11,000 was almost certain to bring in more than \$900,000.

Hazel Park has had two crowds of that size and has yet to hit \$800,000. It will be recalled that Northville Downs had a high of \$608,000 a year ago and was over \$500,000 practically every weekend and didn't reach \$500,000 once during the recent meeting.

THE SAME STORY can be written about the Detroit Racing Association meeting at the Detroit Race Course where management is well aware that per capita wagering is down.

A prime example would be the Monday program. The DRC had more than 9,000 customers and a handle of \$756,000 on a rainy afternoon that turned the track into a muddy, slippery strip.

On that same day, Chicago had 300 more patrons but the handle was \$500,000 more. Another indication that the per capita in this area is far below that in other metropolitan centers that have harness and thoroughbred racing.

Thus it is small wonder that DRC officials are thinking about adding some of the popular gimmicks that have boosted the wagering.

At the present time, DRC has the daily double and two trifectas but there are rumblings that management will ask permission to add a perfecta and a quinella. If it is going to happen, it will in the next week.

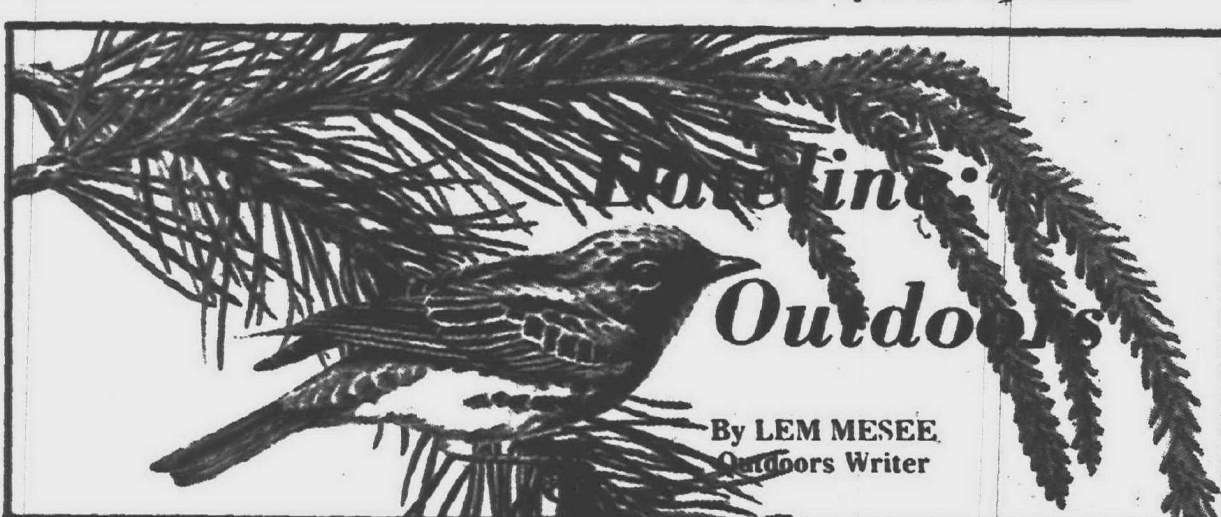

The Jitterbug is the name of a popular dance of the 1940s. It's also the name of a fishing lure that wobbles noisily on the top of the water.

When you fish 'em at night these days, you've got a good chance to nail a largemouth bass out of the area lakes. Some anglers use a continuous retrieve, but others favor short jerks with intervals of several seconds.

Wolverine Lake is yielding some fair catches, and a few

big boys in the four to five pound class are coming from Lakeville Lake. Pontiac Lake is producing some two to three pounders, some 11 to 12-inch perch and some pike.

Deer and Maceday lakes have yielded a few pike and bass; Union Lake has very good bass fishing, some splake at night and good bluegill and crappie fishing.

Proud Lake, where trout were stocked last fall after the existing fish populations

eliminated, is reporting some limit catches, but the trout fishing in the connecting streams has slowed down.

If Lake St. Clair is your choice, walleyes have been hitting very well in many areas, with limit catches at the B marker in Baltimore Channel, North Channel, middle Channel, off Goulette's Point, near Selfridge Field, off the Delphine and about 1,000 feet offshore from 11 and 12 Mile Roads. Muskies are hitting off the Belle River dumping grounds.

South of us, the Huron River at Flat Rock is producing spotty, fair catches of small perch and 'gills, and Pointe Mouille is yielding fair to good sheephead.

Big walleyes are hitting in the Detroit River channels around Stoney and Sugar islands for three hours a day—but never the same three hours. The Sugar Island area is also producing good, but spotty, catches of rock bass, sheephead and medium-size white bass.

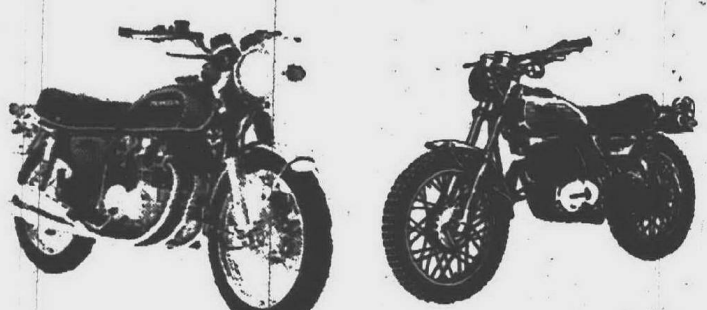

Suburban Gardener

August Gardens Reward For Earlier Efforts

Early goldenrods coming into bloom along the roadsides are a reminder that summer has passed the mid-point and is edging on toward fall. There are still many weeks of summer left, however, and this is the time to sit back and enjoy the fruits of earlier labors.

Annuals are finally fulfilling their promise of masses of bloom. Bright strips of orange and yellow marigolds, spreading pools of vivid pink petunias, and zinnias, alysum, calendula, snap dragons and so many others are reaching the peak of their perfection.

Keep faded flowers picked from annuals to encourage continued blooming. If your annuals still look sparse and leave something to be desired give them a boost with a dose of a quick-acting water soluble fertilizer. Avoid using one that is high in nitrogen. This will force out leafy growth at the expense of flowers. Instead use one that is high in phosphorus.

IF PETUNIAS have gotten long and lanky they can be sheared back. This treatment

seems rather drastic, but in a week or two they will be blooming again and the plants will be bushier and more compact. Shearing works on sweet alysum, annual phlox and violas, too.

Vegetable gardens are yielding their harvest now. A "hill" or two of yellow summer squash or green zucchini produces an amazing abundance. Keep the squash picked and the plants keep on producing. These vegetables are at their best when they are picked about six inches long.

If you miss a small squash hidden beneath the large leaves, in a few days it has grown to huge proportions. It is still good to eat, though, just seedier and not quite so crisp and tender.

Pick lima beans while they are still green. Pick green beans while they are still small. For a delectable treat, then cook them quickly, just until they are tender but still rather crisp.

Keep a mulch around tomatoes so weeds won't grow and moisture will be conserved. Black vinyl sheeting is good and the experts say the black absorbs heat and helps the tomatoes ripen more quickly. This is good for peppers and eggplant, too.

PERENNIAL gardens often experience a lull at this season. If your perennial beds are looking a little drab, you can buy a few container-grown plants to fill in the bare spots. Among the perennials blooming at this season are phlox in many shades of pink and rose, red and white. They are easy to transplant, even in full bloom. Just give them lots of water after transplanting. Look, also, for late-blooming varieties of daylilies. A clump or two of these could brighten up the garden. Rudbeckias, or cone flowers, are just beginning their season of bloom.

Also, there are perennial

asters, either low cushion mounds of pink or mauve or purple or tall kinds known as Michaelmas Daisies. Put the latter in the back of the garden. They can reach over four feet in height and tend to sprawl.

Early chrysanthemums are coming into bloom. Earliest to flower are the "cushion" mums. These form low spreading masses of bloom, generally in pastel colors. They are good for the foreground or as an accent in front of shrubbery, or try them in a pot on the patio.

To keep the roses blooming for another couple of months keep up the regular spray program on them. This is the season to prune climbing roses. Trim back long waving canes.

THIS IS the time to replant iris, oriental poppies, and bleeding heart. A spading fork is the easiest tool to use for digging clumps of perennials. When transplanting iris check the rhizomes for borers and for rot. Cut off any damaged or diseased parts and dust the entire surfaces with sulphur. It is a good idea to expose the rhizomes to the sun for a few hours before planting.

Plant a few rhizomes in a cluster to make a nice sized clump. Make a shallow hole and place the rhizomes on a saddle of soil so they are near the surface. Spread the roots down around the saddle so they are deeper. Iris like an alkaline soil so work a little bone meal into the soil around the roots.

Oriental poppies have a long fleshy rather brittle tap-root. When transplanting them care must be taken not to damage the root. At this season they are dormant and the leaves have yellowed and died down. Soon a new rosette of leaves will grow which will remain green all winter.

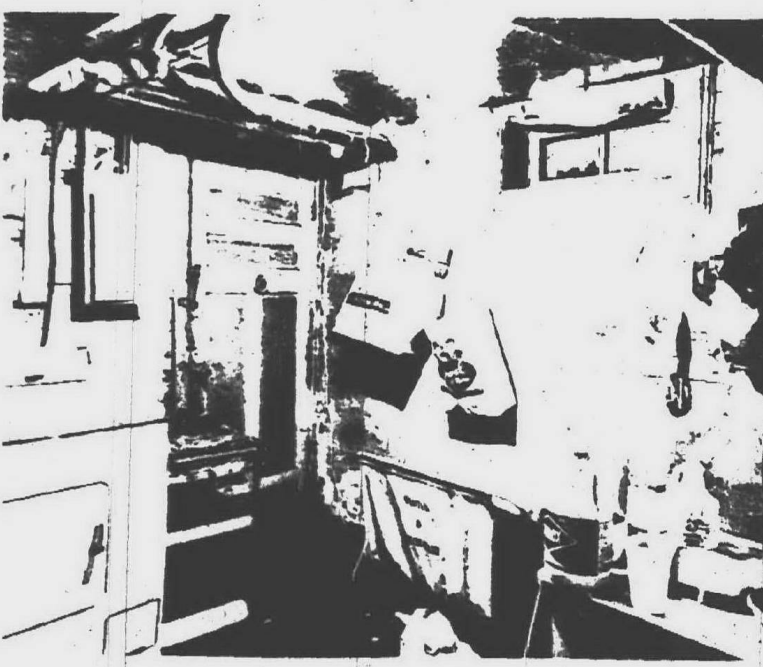
Plant bulbs of madonna lilies for bloom next spring. They should be planted as early as possible. Plant them so that the tops of the bulbs are only two inches below the surface, since they need shallow planting.

For "something different" plant a few bulbs of colchicums and autumn crocus. A clump of the pale mauve crocus flowers are a pleasant surprise blooming in front of the shrubbery in early fall.

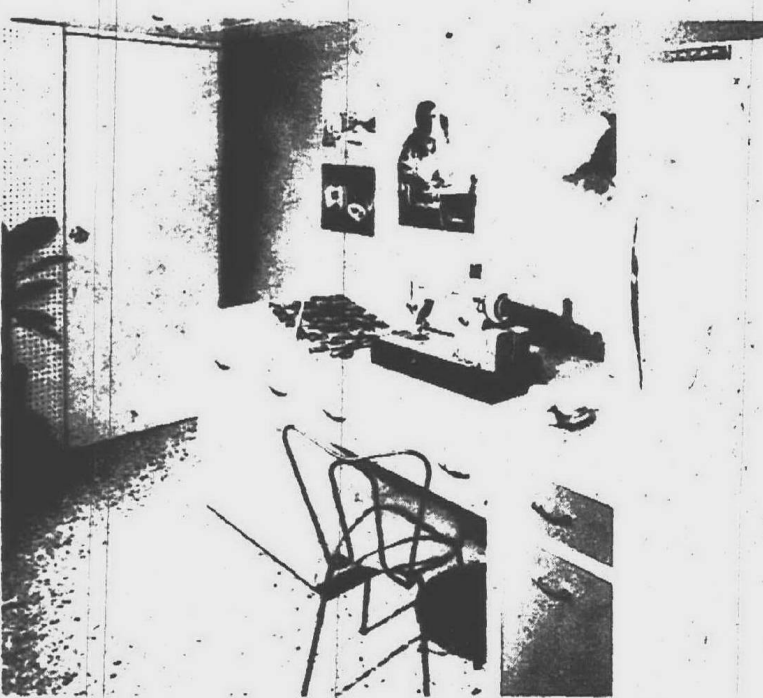
Sow seeds of pansies, English daisies and forget-me-nots for bloom next year.

Pick strawflowers and other everlasting for winter bouquets. Pick them just before they are fully open and hang upside down in loose bunches in a dark dry place.

Other garden flowers and wild flowers, too, can be picked and dried in this manner or dried using silica crystals. It is nice to capture a bit of mid-summer bloom to enjoy next winter.

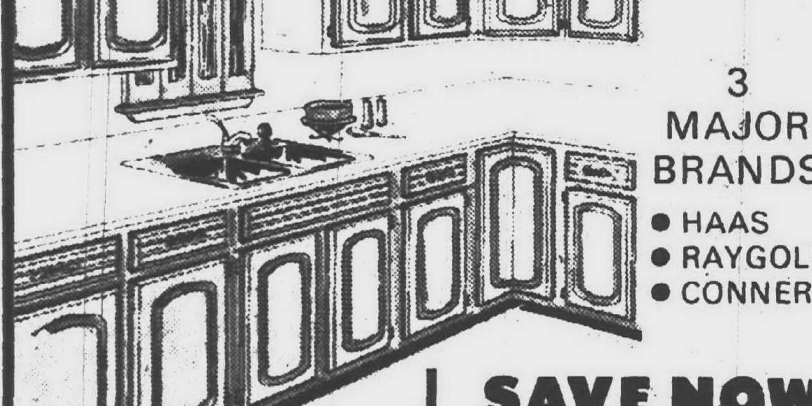

Use Systemics To Battle Fungus

Systemic fungicides have helped plant doctors control many diseases of turf-grasses, according to Michigan State University.

Dollar spot is a common fungus disease of golf course greens, and to control it the greens had to be sprayed once every two weeks throughout the season.

Now, however, systemic fungicides provide control with one spray a month because the chemical is inside the plants and isn't washed away or lost during mowing.

SYSTEMICS also provides us with a much needed answer to striped smut. This fungus disease is systemic in nature, so the old contact fungicides didn't work at all. Before systemics came along, an outbreak of striped smut meant replacing affected turf areas, MSU experts say.

Then benomyl came along. Dr. Joseph M. Vorgas, MSU plant pathologist evaluated the effectiveness of the compound for controlling striped smut, and has published recommendations for using the chemical to control outbreaks of the disease.

"Systemic fungicides have helped tremendously, but these chemicals may have drawbacks just like the compounds they are replacing," says Vargas.

He cites the disease powdery mildew as one example. "For about a year and a half we got good powdery mildew control using a systemic fungicide, then the fungus developed resistance to the chemical and we were right back where we started," Vargas says.

"At least we learned something, though," he notes.

"The systemics are very specific in action, affecting only one vital system of the disease-causing organisms."

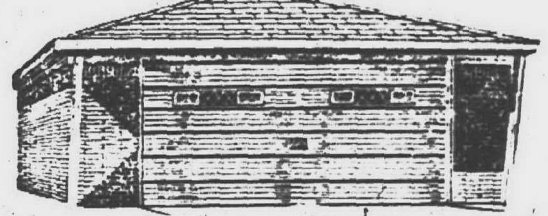

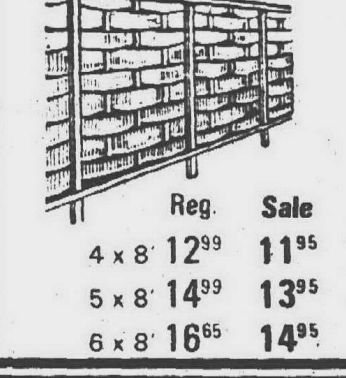

The Green Thumb

Save grass clippings? There are two schools of thought on this. Some lawn devotees gather

every clipping. The rough and ready gardener lets his clips fall where they may. We never bother to catch our clippings. They decompose and re-enter the soil for nourishment to the grass.

As for nutrients, there probably aren't many, although you'd be surprised to see how much grass you do mow in a single season. The average person mows some 30 times a year, and if you measured the length of the clippings, added them together, you'd see you cut nearly 36 inches of grass.

On an acre of grass this amounts to about five tons of "hay" you cut and let fall to the soil each year.

Many homeowners feel that these clippings which fall and are left to decay build up what is called "thatch," a roof-like layer that supposedly prevents light, moisture and food from reaching the roots. Actually, clippings do not cause the thatch problem.

Thatch consists mostly of the wire-like stems of the grass growing in the soil. If you catch your grass clippings, don't discard them. Use as a mulch in the vegetable or flower garden to keep weeds out, and moisture in. Or you can recycle the grass by catching the cuttings in a catcher and place them on your compost pile.

If you haven't a compost, start one now. Take some cement blocks and build a container for lawn sweepings, weeds, leaves, sawdust, wood chips—whatever is available. Place these on the pile and keep them moist. Mix in some liquid plant food (such as 23-

19-17) or a dry fertilizer such as 5-10-10.

EVENING PRIMROSE: Dozens of plants are called "evening primrose" but one that causes a lot of comment is the dandelion-leaved sundrop, also called Missouri primrose (erroneously). This plant looks like a dandelion, and its real name is Oenothera (EE-Noth-er-a). Buds are arrow-shaped, and open every night between 8:30 and 9 p.m. Within two or three minutes the outer covering rolls back and a lovely pale yellow flower unfolds.

Flowers close during the day. You can divide the plant in spring, or dig up young plants in summer. It does fine in bright sun or in semi-shade and plant is perfectly hardy in winter.

GREEN THUMB CLINIC: "I heard that crushed leaves of walnuts is good for preventing skin burn. Is that true?"

Answer: Yes. Freshly ground walnut leaves rubbed on your skin before you go out in the sun will prevent sunburn. The beneficial material is called Juglone, the same chemical which prevents certain plants from growing when next to a walnut tree.

Kitchen Designs Have More Than Meets Eye

What type of kitchen best suits your needs?

According to Hotpoint's kitchen planning service, there are four basic kitchen floor plans - U-shaped, I-shaped, corridor, and one-wall.

There are variations of each of these plans, caused by door and window locations, but nevertheless each basic shape retains its essential advantages and disadvantages.

KITCHEN planning experts rate the basic designs as follows:

The U-shaped kitchen is the most popular, adapting easily to efficient work patterns and, when properly designed affording ample counter and storage space. To be effective, however, a U-shape requires enough space so that all major work centers function well.

It is often used in connection with a breakfast area or family room, with one arm of the 'U' as a room dividing peninsula.

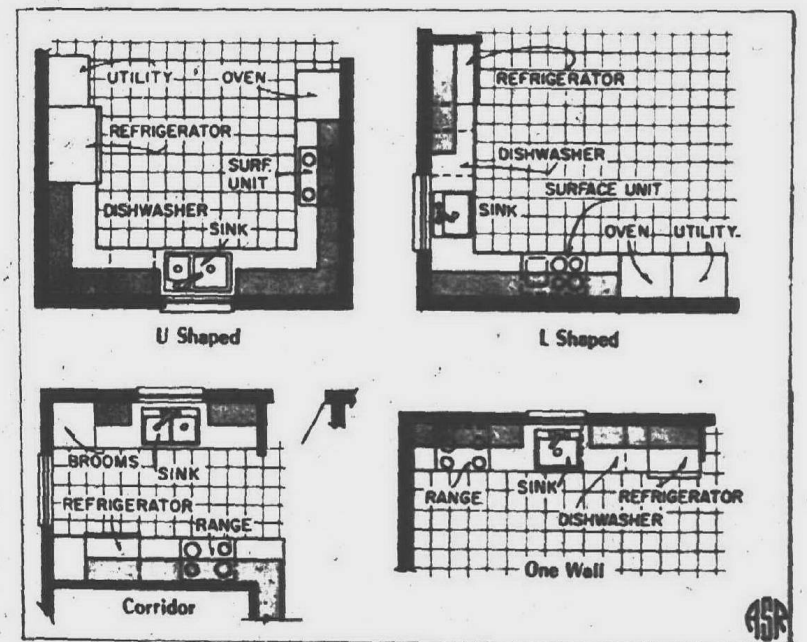
The popular I-shaped kitchen utilizes two walls and allows great flexibility in the placement of appliances and storage and eating.

The arrangement usually allows space for a breakfast area of dining room.

When the kitchen is used as a dining room, however there is no separation of the dining and kitchen facilities.

THE CORRIDOR arrangement is a favorite for apartments because it adapts readily to efficient work patterns and is economical to install.

Often part of one side is used as a snack bar or room divider. The corridor kitchen sometimes has a door at each end, which often results in an

inefficient traffic pattern through the work area.

With careful planning, this problem can be eliminated.

While the two wall kitchen utilizes all its space, very often it is arranged with a too-narrow aisle or insufficient space between appliances.

This results in unsafe or uncomfortable work patterns for the homemaker; open appliance doors often block the aisle. The aisle should be 48 inches wide for comfort.

The one-wall kitchen generally is seen in efficiency apartments, summer homes or mobile homes because it is a real space-saver.

IN EACH of these four shapes one basic rule must be allowed: the major appliances and the sink must have adequate counter space available which is suited to the function of the work center.

Senior Citizens Asked: What Can Schoolcraft Do For You?

As a "senior" citizen, you may be observing your environment from a different perspective than in your younger days.

Do you find that after years of working 40 hours a week, you now have more time on your hands than things to do?

Are you a widow who suddenly has to assume responsibility for financial matters that were previously your husband's concern?

After years of cooking for a large family, do you find it difficult and bothersome to scale down nutritional meals for just one person?

If any of these problems is even remotely familiar to you, then the community services office at Schoolcraft College is looking for you.

Headed by Ron Griffith, the office has a special committee combing local communities to find out how the college can be of assistance to the estimated 14,000 senior citizens in Livonia, Plymouth, Clarendonville, Garden City and Northville.

MANY PERSONS plunge into retirement with high expectations but no real planning, Griffith says. Then they encounter unexpected difficulties and have nowhere to turn.

So the first step in helping the older citizens is to identify their interests and problems.

That's Betty Andrews' job. Mrs. Andrews is taking her sign and a stack of senior citizen survey forms wherever she can get ideas and suggestions directly from the people who know by experience.

So far, Mrs. Andrews has surveyed those older citizens who belong to senior citizen groups. Her problem is identifying the hundreds of residents who don't belong to organizations.

She spent two days sitting in a school gymnasium waiting for responses from the unorganized portions of senior citizens, but her vigil in the gym was lonely.

NEXT SHE MAY try to set up her table in a shopping center or any highly traveled spot where she might bump into citizens who are willing to spend a few moments answering questionnaire on their interests.

The survey is short but inclusive. If the older citizens want information on medical care and services, social security benefits, legal matters living on retirement income, or even concerts and plays, they just have to check a box.

If enough people check the same boxes, the college hopes to set up classes or seminars to fill these needs.

"Our institution won't be able to provide all the services right away," Griffith said. "But we will be able to direct our resources to bear on certain areas this fall."

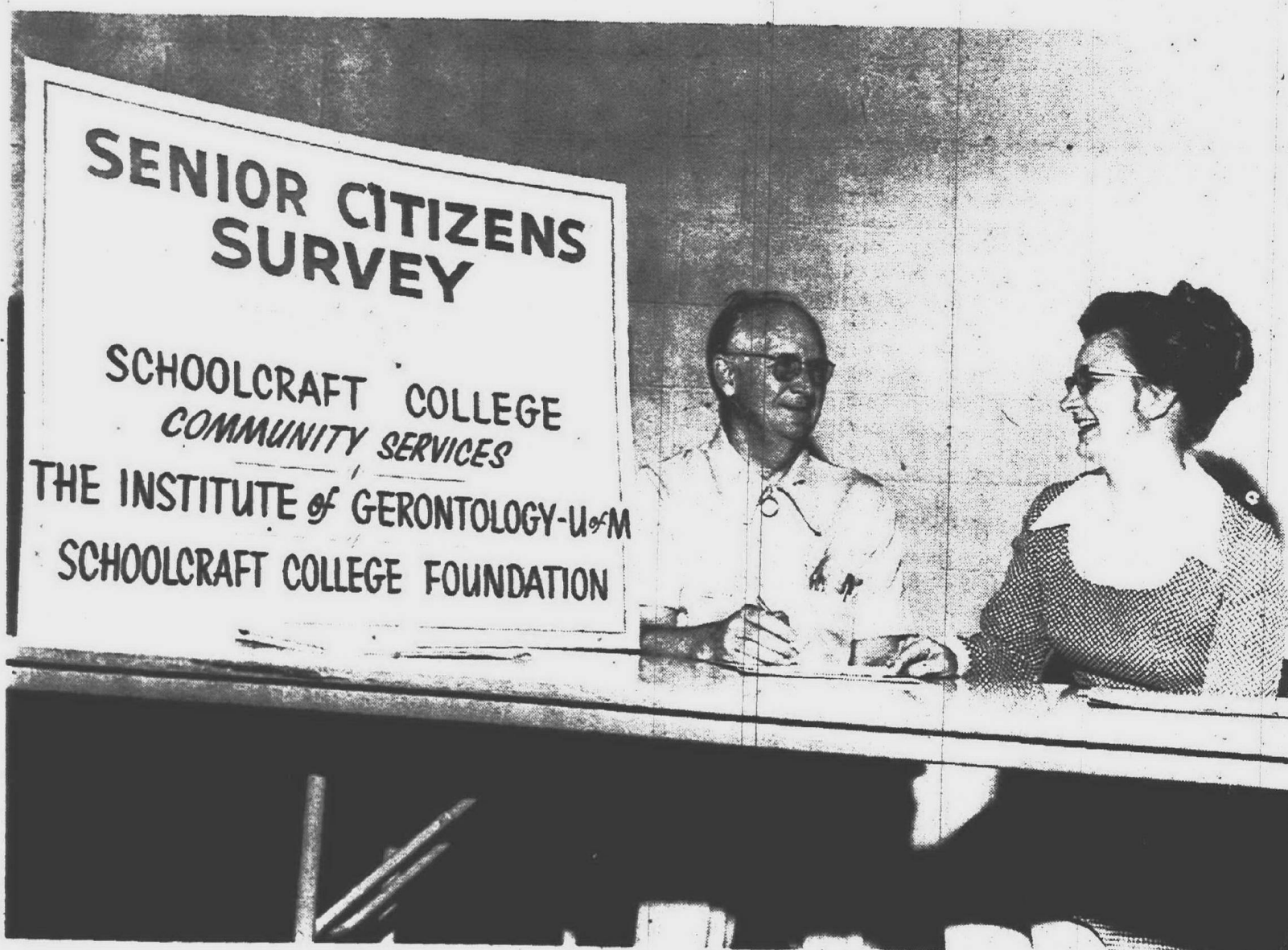
"The nice thing about it is we aren't limited to offering courses on our campus. We can offer them in churches, schools, or halls convenient to the senior citizens."

"WHAT MANY don't understand," Mrs. Andrews said, "is that we are not encouraging them to go to college. We hope to provide helpful information rather than the traditional way of going to schools. And we hope to bring these things free of charge."

Since those already surveyed have indicated interest in information on social security and medical care, the college might draw on authorities in these areas for advising senior citizens.

Eventually the college hopes to provide information on retirement to those persons in the district approaching this stage in their lives. Pre-retirement information is seen as a way of helping citizens move into this phase with the least amount of difficulty and the maximum amount of enjoyment.

Also working on the senior citizens study are Gladys Grasjean of Livonia representing the Plymouth area, Emil Schroeder of Garden City, Mrs. Richard Sharon of Northville and George Van Husen of Livonia.

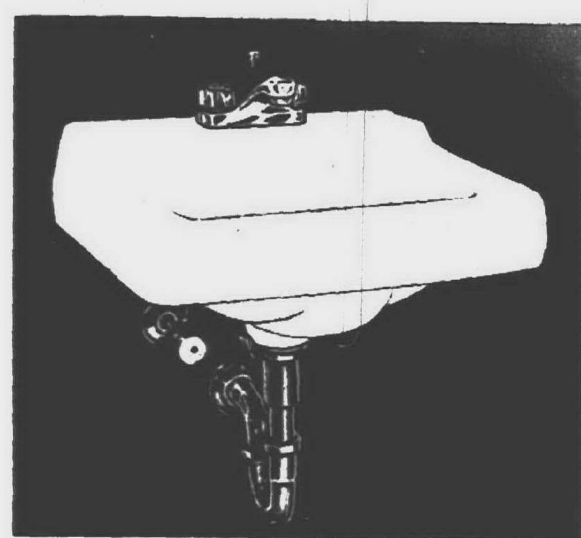
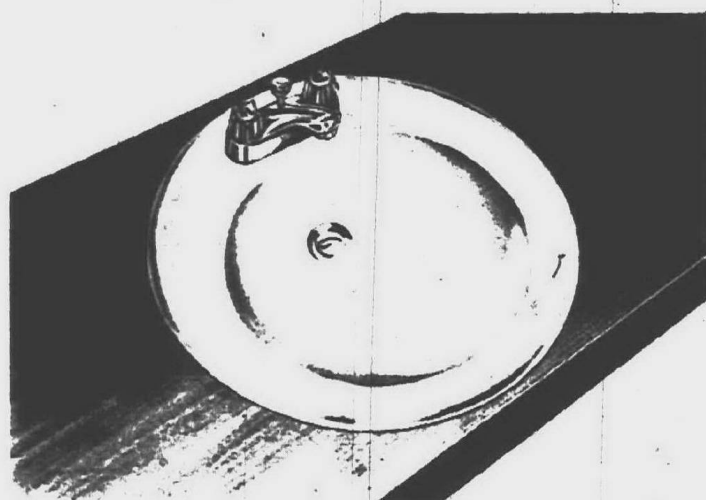
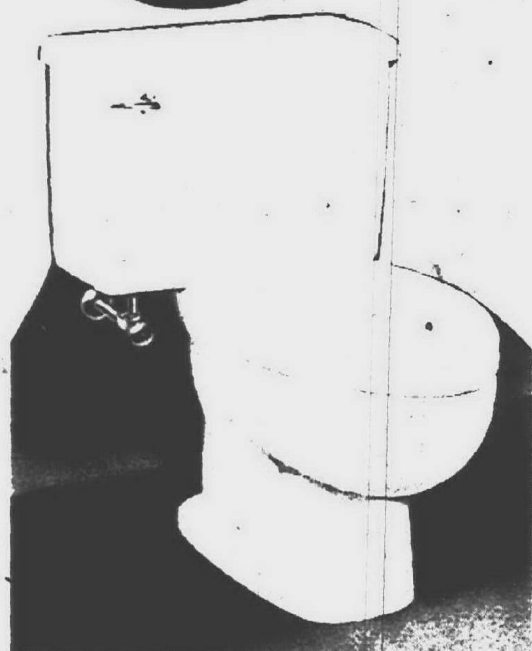

Griffin Calls Kelley Part-Time Opponent of Forced Busing

U.S. Sen. Robert Griffin, a Republican, keynoted his campaign against state Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley Friday night by saying Democrat Kelley was a part time attorney general and that as far as busing was concerned, Kelley's heart wasn't in the case.

Of the Roth busing decision to integrate metropolitan schools, now being considered in the Sixth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Cincinnati, Griffin said:

"We need a full time attorney in Cincinnati. Kelley endorsed busing after the first ruling in the Roth case. He said at that time he supported the immediate implementation of busing."

Griffin addressed a crowd of more than 500 enthusiastic anti-busing supporters at an hour-long outdoor rally sponsored by the Farmington Voters Alliance and held at Oakland Community College.

THE SENATOR endorsed congressional and court action for the anti-busing advocates. "We need the best case

possible in Cincinnati, but that's not good enough," he said.

He reassured the crowd that even though Congress might not have the anti-busing votes this session, a McGovern defeat in November will bring more Republican congressmen to Washington so busing can be stopped.

Griffin questioned Kelley's stand on supporting the president's proposed moratorium on busing, withdrawing jurisdiction from the federal courts to enforce busing, and the constitutional amendment outlawing busing.

At the conclusion, Griffin urged the enthusiastic crowd to be prudent in their actions, to keep their heads and not listen to those who advocated lawlessness to obtain their goals.

"We can change the law and be a force for peace and reason in the home, neighborhood and community," said Griffin.

FORMER NAG Attorney L. Brooks Patterson, a Republican candidate for Oakland County prosecutor, brought the audience to their

feet in loud cheers when he referred to busing as the yellow plague and stressed that intra-city busing is as bad as cross-district busing.

"There is no moratorium if there isn't any legislation. Don't go home and abandon Pontiac and Detroit. If they divide us, they will pick us off one at a time," said Patterson.

There was another standing ovation when Patterson attacked the Michigan Education Association-endorsed proposal to end school property taxes which is supported by Gov. William Milliken.

"When the governor makes his annual labor day walk across the Mackinac Bridge, let's meet him with one or two thousand people in the middle and ask him about it," said Patterson.

From the crowd came several, "Let's throw him off."

Former State Sen. Robert Huber (R-Troy) made a short speech praising George Kuhn, former state senator and candidate for the Oakland County drain commissioner. Huber sought the 18th Congressional District

nomination Tuesday.

OTHERS SPEAKING at the rally were U.S. Congressman William Broomfield and the chairman of the Farmington Township charter commission, Robert McConnell. All speakers were Republicans.

U.S. Rep. Jack McDonald (R-Waterford), who was scheduled to speak at the meeting, didn't show up but was heavily endorsed by Colorado Congressional Candidate Sam Cavnar, chairman of a Colorado anti-busing group called Project Bus Stop.

All speaking at the rally were there to support the Farmington Voters Alliance action to elect those candidates who are anti-busing.

The alliance is composed of private citizens who have organized to accomplish four objectives: to identify adults in the community who believe in forced busing; to identify with political candidates who are opposed to forced busing and will be most effective in preventing it; to initiate the necessary action to insure the election of these candidates; and to implement all legal and

peaceful programs to prevent forced busing.

The rally had a political flavor, a mini-convention. Signs were toted, reading, "This family will not be bused."

Loud boos were elicited with the mention of Detroit Congressman John Conyers and U.S. Supreme Court Justice William Douglas. There was even some vocal opposition as an occasional heckler could be heard.

If you like plant tours, there's a wide variety to choose from in Michigan, ranging from auto assembly to nuclear energy plants, according to a survey prepared for Automobile Club of Michigan.

It would take more than 10 days to visit approximately 130 plants which welcome visitors, allowing a meager two hours for each and not counting travel time between cities.

Some 46 of the state's cities offer tours, many several. Surprisingly, Grand Haven offers 17 tours, more than any other city, with 12 by Grand Rapids second, followed by

Detroit's 10. Port Huron and Ypsilanti have nine each.

VISITOR RULES vary, and an advance call is advised to learn each tour requirements. All establishments open to the public have specified tour hours. Some ask advance notice, a day or even a week prior to the visit. Some plants bar children. A call to the plant or to the chamber of commerce in the particular city you wish to visit is the best way to get the latest information.

There are some seven automobile plant tours, but a few are closed to visitors during late summer or during model changeover. At other times, auto assembly operations can be seen in these cities:

Dearborn, Ford Motor Co. Rouge Plant, open all-year; Detroit, Cadillac Motors (no tours from June to December); Chrysler Corp. Hamtramck Assembly Plant, Jefferson Assembly Plant and Lynch Road Assembly Plant (no tours at latter from June through Sept. 15); Flint, Buick Motor (no tours from mid-summer to September); Chevrolet Assembly (no tours at time of model changeover); Lansing, Oldsmobile Division of General Motors; Pontiac, Pontiac Motors Division of GM; Ypsilanti, Chevrolet Motor Division of GM.

FISHER BODY Division plants of GM can be visited in Flint, Grand Rapids,

Kalamazoo, Lansing, Livonia, Tecumseh and Ypsilanti.

Automotive parts plants are AC Spark Plug in Flint, Chevrolet Spring and Bumper in Livonia and the hydraulic Division of GM at Willow Run.

The General Motors Technical Center in Warren is a showplace of engineering and automotive development. Guided tours are offered from June 1 through Labor Day. Visitors can see various research, design and engineering displays and exhibits.

Another showplace is the Big Rock Nuclear Power Plant near Charlevoix, in northern Michigan. The information center is open the year around.

Michigan also has three breweries which offer tours. They are the Stroh Brewery Co. of Detroit, which also makes ice cream; Carling Brewing Co. and Geyer Brothers Brewing Co., both of Frankenmuth.

Retired LNB Head Dies at 79

Guy Spencer, 79, former president of the Livonia National Bank, prominent in Michigan banking circles and in service club activities in Livonia, died Sunday in Venice, Fla. He retired from the Livonia bank in 1964 and moved to Florida shortly thereafter.

Mr. Spencer, a former commissioner for the Michigan State Banking Department, was one of the incorporators of the Livonia bank in 1952. Prior to that he had served as president of the First National Bank in Ypsilanti.

During his years of service as head of the Livonia bank, he was president of the Rotary Club and the Chamber of Commerce. He was a past president of the Michigan Bank Commissioners Assn. His wife, Mary, died a year ago.

Surviving are: a son, Jack of Jacksonville, N.C.; two daughters, Mrs. Peggy Wheeler and Mrs. Mary Lynn, both of Ann Arbor; five grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

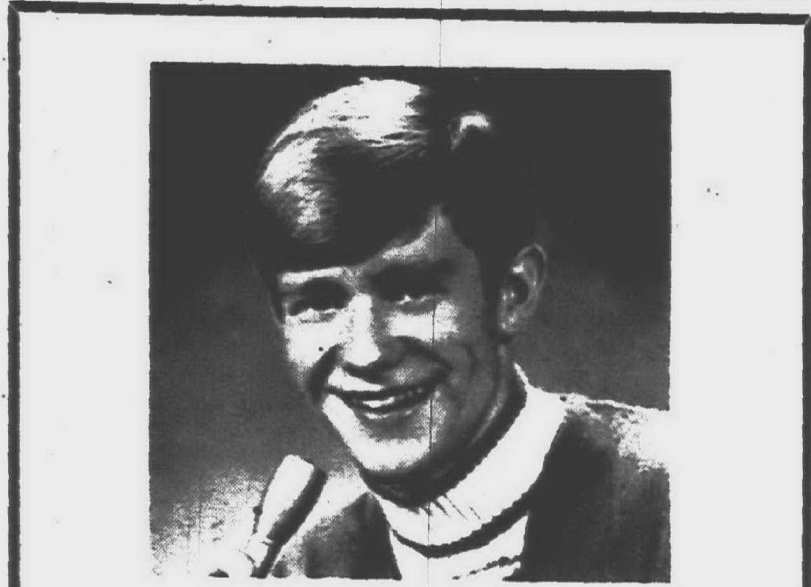
He handled the Farmington, Northville and Plymouth areas for the Observers and was one of the best liked salesmen when forced to retire due to illness.

Conviction Rate Low Prosecutor's Costs Hit

The chairman of the special budget committee of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners has charged County Prosecutor William L. Cahalan with departmental inefficiency and unwillingness to economize.

Commissioner Richard E. Manning, of Redford, made the charges in response to Cahalan's threat to cease certain prosecutions unless he is allotted more manpower by the board of commissioners.

THE TEXT of Manning's remarks is as follows: "As chairman of the special committee on budget, I feel it is my responsibility to respond to the prosecutor's recent statement in which he declared an intent to refuse to prosecute certain crimes committed in Wayne County because of the refusal of the county commissioners to give him additional manpower."

"We must take issue with his use of scare tactics in an attempt to force the committee on budget to change its position and curtail hospital facilities, public health immunization and venereal disease programs, Juvenile Court operations, Circuit Court operations, and sheriff's operations for the purpose of beefing up an operation which we found to be top heavy with expensive department heads who do not try criminal cases."

Booklet Tells How To Claim Medicare

Copies of a new and expanded edition of the Medicare leaflet, "How to Claim Medical Insurance Benefits," are available upon request, said Sam F. Test, manager of the Detroit-Northwest Social Security Office.

The new edition includes information on how Medicare determines the "reasonable charges" for physicians' services. For elderly people signed up for the doctor bill insurance part of Medicare, he noted, the law provides payment for 80 per cent of the "reasonable charges," over and above an annual deductible of \$50. Single copies of the new edition of the leaflet "How to Claim Medicare Insurance Benefits," can be obtained without charge by writing or calling the Detroit-Northwest Social Security Office. The address is 17500 Lahser, Detroit.

For the Medicare beneficiary who has already paid the first \$50 of his covered medical expenses for the year — the deductible amount — the Medicare payment will amount to 80 per cent of the "reasonable charge." If the doctor has agreed to use the assignment method of payment, the patient will owe his doctor only the remaining 20 per cent.

In the 60 per cent of claims submitted under the assignment method, Test said, the doctor absorbed the amount of any reduction.

Nighttime Driving

Since 90 per cent of all driving decisions are based on vision, driving at night, when visibility is reduced, presents special dangers to the motorist. Drivers should take extra precautions when night driving is a necessity since darkness doubles the possibility of a serious crash.

UNDER THE assignment method, the doctor agrees to send in the bill and to have the Medicare payment made to him. He also agrees that his full charge will be no higher than what is decided to be the "reasonable charge."

Medicare will pay the beneficiary 80 per cent of the "reasonable charge" minus any part of the \$50 deductible that has not yet been met. The Medicare beneficiary is then responsible for paying the full amount of the doctor's charge as billed, even though it may be higher than the "reasonable charge."

The leaflet emphasizes that although a doctor's bill may at times be more than the Medicare "reasonable charge," this does not necessarily mean that his charge for the particular service is not reasonable.

UNDER MEDICARE law and regulations, a charge is considered "reasonable": (1) if it is no higher than the doctor has been customarily charging all his patients, Medicare and non-Medicare, for the particular service; and (2) if it is also no higher than the charges made for that service in three out of every four cases by the other doctors in that locality.

If a doctor's bill for services to a Medicare beneficiary is higher than his customary charge, or higher than the charges made by most other doctors in the locality, the Medicare payment is not

Medicare, like many other health insurance programs does not recognize a higher charge until it has been in effect long enough to be considered "customary."

COG Budget \$1.8 Million

A 1972-73 fiscal year budget anticipating expenditures of \$1,817,000 and new financial aid from the State of Michigan highlight a new Southeast Michigan Council of Governments fiscal report.

Failure To Heed Signals Cause Of Fatal Crashes

ANN ARBOR
Lack of respect for railroad warning devices may be a principal reason for fatal train-vehicle accidents, according to a University of Michigan researcher.

In a study of the 366 fatal railroad-vehicle accidents occurring in Michigan between 1964 and 1970, Research Physicist John A. Green of the U-M Highway Safety Research Institute (HSRI) found that in 52 per cent of the cases "Failure to Observe a Traffic Control Device" was noted on the police report.

IN THE SAME time period, Green reports, a total of 13,458 fatal auto accidents occurred in the state. However, only eight per cent of this total were said to have ignored a traffic control device. In making the study, Green utilized the Michigan Fatal Accident file maintained by HSRI through cooperation of the Michigan State Police.

Green does not accept the statistics at face value, for he believes the fact that a driver passed a set of warning devices and struck a train suggests he disregarded the warnings.

Consequently, the U-M researcher notes, the violation may have been coded as failure to observe a traffic control device although the real violation might well have been "speed too fast for conditions" or some other violation that prevented the

driver from responding to the warnings.

Although the statistics may be affected by such possible biases, Green maintains that lack of respect for railroad warnings is probably a significant contributor to such collisions.

Age Bias Prohibited In Esch Bill

Congressman Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor) has introduced a bill which extends the Age Discrimination in Employment Act of 1967 to state and local government employees.

Esch commented that it is incongruous that we now prohibit private employers from discriminating in hiring and employment practices against people between the ages of 40 and 65, but fail to protect employees in state and local government against this form of discrimination.

The Civil Rights Act of 1964 was recently extended to state and local government employees. Esch continued, "I think it is appropriate that we now extend this parallel anti-discriminatory legislation in a like manner."

The Esch bill re-defines the term "employer" to include agencies of states and political subdivisions of states. The term "employee" would be re-defined to make it clear that elected officials, political appointees and their staffs would not be subject to the act.

"Most drivers have encountered a warning device that is operating and interrupting traffic for a stopped or nonexistent train," he points out. "Such experiences erode the public's respect for railroad crossing indicators as a valid warning of oncoming danger and the warnings gradually assume a 'Yield-Right-of-Way' status."

GREEN SAYS his study was prompted when, in October, 1971, two fatal railroad collisions took place on the same day in Ann Arbor.

In one instance, the driver ignored both flashing lights and warning bells and even failed to stop before attempting to cross the tracks.

In the other, the driver deliberately drove off the pavement onto the shoulder in order to circumvent a drop-gate warning system that blocked the intersection.

Green believes education programs in conjunction with improved railroad crossing devices are needed to re-establish the authority of these warnings.

Several other factors apparently distinguishing fatal railroad accidents from the overall class of fatal auto accidents emerged from the HSRI physicist's study.

For example, two-thirds of fatal railroad accidents occur during daytime—the peak period is between 4 and 6 p.m., when people are leaving work—whereas more than one-half of fatal auto accidents occur at night.

Since most railroad accidents happen during the day, it would be expected that drinking would play a less important role than in all fatal accidents. Green confirmed this expectation, calculating

that alcohol is involved in only 12 per cent of railroad accidents as compared to 26 per cent for all the fatal accidents.

Environment Group Lauds Rep. Stempien

House Majority Leader Marvin R. Stempien (D-Livonia) says he has been listed as "outstanding" by the Detroit Area Coalition for the Environment (DACE) in its July 24 release regarding the voting records of legislators on environmental and consumer issues.

Robert Magnuson, spokesman for the group, said Stempien has "consistently voted right on environmental issues, even when such a vote meant defying some of the biggest polluters in the state."

Bills taken into consideration by the group when deciding whom to endorse included a strict air pollution bill recently passed by the State Legislature, Gov. Milliken's proposed bill that would have aided mass transit, a wilderness protection act, a bill that increased water pollution penalties, one that restricted the size of billboards, two bills concerning inland water control, and an environmental education measure.

Area Firm Is Transit Leader

SOUTHFIELD Sundberg-Ferar of Southfield has emerged in recent years as the nation's leader in the design of mass transportation vehicles and facilities.

Among the firm's most important assignments was creating the design of transit cars for the New York Port Authority Trans-Hudson (PATH), and a full size prototype rail car for the revolutionary San Francisco Bay Area Rapid Transit System (BART).

The BART system, with its ultra-modern passenger facility to be in operation this year, was designed to end traffic jams and save the time of future commuters.

The firm, which received the 1968 HUD Honor Award for excellence in design of the BART car, is expected to set the pace for rapid transit development throughout the country.

SUNDBERG-FERAR of 25500 Telegraph, Southfield, was also commissioned by Lockheed-California Co. to design a new flight environment for passengers traveling in the new TriStar Jumbo Jet.

The Southfield company was founded in 1934 by Carl Sundberg and Montgomery Ferar as an independent industrial design organization to serve manufacturers of various products.

Through the years, the

firm's rise in the design field has been constant. For 27 years, it has designed Sears and Whirlpool Corp. major appliance lines.

The products the company designs includes a vast range of items, such as coffee makers, typewriters, power mowers, automatic washers, time clocks, refrigerators, automobiles, vending machines and electronic computers.

The Southfield headquarters are located on an eight-acre site in a 15,000 square-foot building. The first level is equipped with versatile wood and metal working machinery, and the second level is the design studio.

Other buildings on the property house photographic, silk screening, and storage facilities.

Design capabilities are augmented by unique model shop facilities under the same roof as the design studio. This makes possible immediate communication between the designer and his three-dimensional visualization.

The firm is one of the few design organizations capable of making full-size transit car prototypes on its own premises.

Most of the men employed in the model building team have had years of automotive modeling experience and can produce three-dimensional models with accuracy and finish comparable to production quality.

THE FIRM'S many assignments in recent years include:

The Long Island Rail Road Commuter Car built to lure motorists off crowded Long Island freeways by offering living room comfort and 100-mile-an-hour speed;

An Auto-On-Train for use between Washington, D.C., and Florida, via the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad, was designed for the Department of Transportation to carry autos and provide an air conditioned ride with food service and recreational facilities for the auto's passengers;

Rohm & Haas "Idea" Cars, Explorer IV and V, shown to the Society of Automotive Engineers in 1967, 1968, combined advanced styling and technical refinements in a demonstration of increased automotive uses for plastic and chemical materials;

General Electric Co. engaged Sundberg-Ferar as design consultants for the General Electric Aerial Transport System (GEATS) for airport-downtown high speed service;

Washington, D.C. "Metro" is a full-size prototype designed and built for the Washington Metropolitan Area Transportation Authority with groundbreaking already being held for this 97.7-mile, \$2.5 billion rapid rail transit system; Illinois Central Railroad double deck commuter car designed for the Chicago South Suburban Mass Transit District is America's first, bi-level, air-conditioned commuter car powered by a catenary system. The cars are now in service with the second

gallery adding about 50 per cent to the seating capacity.

The R-44 Subway car designed for New York City Transit Authority, will be 75 feet long and soon be in use;

Jones Excels As 'The Man'

By KATHY MORAN

His people want a Black Messiah, and his colleagues want an Uncle Tom.

But James Earl Jones becomes neither after he is catapulted to the presidency in "The Man" opening today at the Livonia Cinema.

Originally produced for television, "The Man" isn't spectacular as a movie, but Jones' stirring performance as the country's first black president makes it worth seeing.

Jones is the ex-professor

who becomes United States senator and is made "token" president pro tem of the Senate. The "tokenism" backfires when both the president and speaker of the House are killed in a fluke accident while abroad.

The vice president is ill and wheelchair-ridden and refuses to take the office, leaving the next in line the "token" black senator (much to the dismay of ambitious secretary of state and his even-more ambitious wife).

AS JONES assumes his role of president, he is weak and uncertain of himself. He becomes the pliable man,

leaving the country to be run by his cabinet.

The dramatic change of course begins when Jones is challenged by a black reporter at a press conference who was angered at Jones' hesitancy to answer any questions without first consulting his crib sheets.

The audience is ready to cheer when Jones tosses aside the prepared answers, stands on his own two feet, and begins to answer the questions with his own honesty and wit.

From this point, the film moves uphill—especially when Jones recognizes that he had been deceived by a black Dartmouth student accused of trying to assassinate a South African official. Though popular sentiment was to keep the student in the U.S., Jones agrees to extradite him, regardless of his race, to face justice in South Africa.

Meanwhile, Jones has taken over the leadership, leaving the Secretary of State (William Windom) in a precarious position as he is attempting to be nominated as presidential candidate in the upcoming election.

THE CLASSIC scene is between Windom's wife, portrayed by Barbara Rush, and Jones' college-age daughter, portrayed by Janet MacLachlan, who exchange knife-sharp cuts during a dinner party.

All ends well when the black president earns the respect of the country and leaves the audience certain that he will win election in his own right.

The film is good family entertainment, but leaves one wondering if this country has erased enough of its prejudice to make it believable.

Aug. 22 to Sept. 1, in the Rubiner Gallery, 621 S. Washington Street, Royal Oak. A champagne reception, open to the public, will be held from 7 to 10 in the first evening.

THE FOUR artists are Eileen Schenkel, Wanda Northern, Annette Lind and Dolores Gasior, who claim exciting things have been happening to their paintings since they started studying with Raymond Frost Fleming, sponsor of the show. Seven other Fleming students from Birmingham - Bloomfield Hills will also take part in the show.

Fleming, who has a MFA in painting from the Cranbrook Art Academy is former head of the Kingswood School of Art at Cranbrook. Presently affiliated with the gallery, he has a studio in Bloomfield Hills, and has exhibited widely in local and national galleries.

The four women have been interested in drawing and painting ever since they were children, but really began to be serious about it with the formation of the Farmington Artists Club in 1965. Mrs. Schenkel and Mrs. Gasior are two of the original founders of the club. Mrs. Gasior was its first president. All are also members of the Palette and Brush Club of Detroit, and have won many awards in area exhibits.

MOST OF their work is impressionistic and very colorful. Included in the show will be "Orange Window," a still-life in acrylics by Mrs. Northern; "Georgian Bay," a landscape featuring an orange sky, by Mrs. Schenkel; "Snow Fence," a beach scene, by Mrs. Gasior; and "Ladies Quilting," an acrylic in blues and greens, by Mrs. Lind.

This may very well be the first of many shows for the four.

"If someone asked us who we were 10 years ago," they say, "we would have answered mother - wife - artist."

"Today our families are older and need us less, and we'd answer artist - wife - mother."

Even though painting is hard and "serious work - it's lots easier to scrub floors," all find it a satisfying outlet and spend several hours each day at it.

But with their many similarities, they do disagree on one thing.

Two like to get up early in the morning and paint, and two do their best painting in the evening.

All, except Mrs. Schenkel, who comes from Toronto, Ont., are from Detroit originally.

Among their teachers have been Ray Fleming, Carol Wald and Marvin Beerbohm.

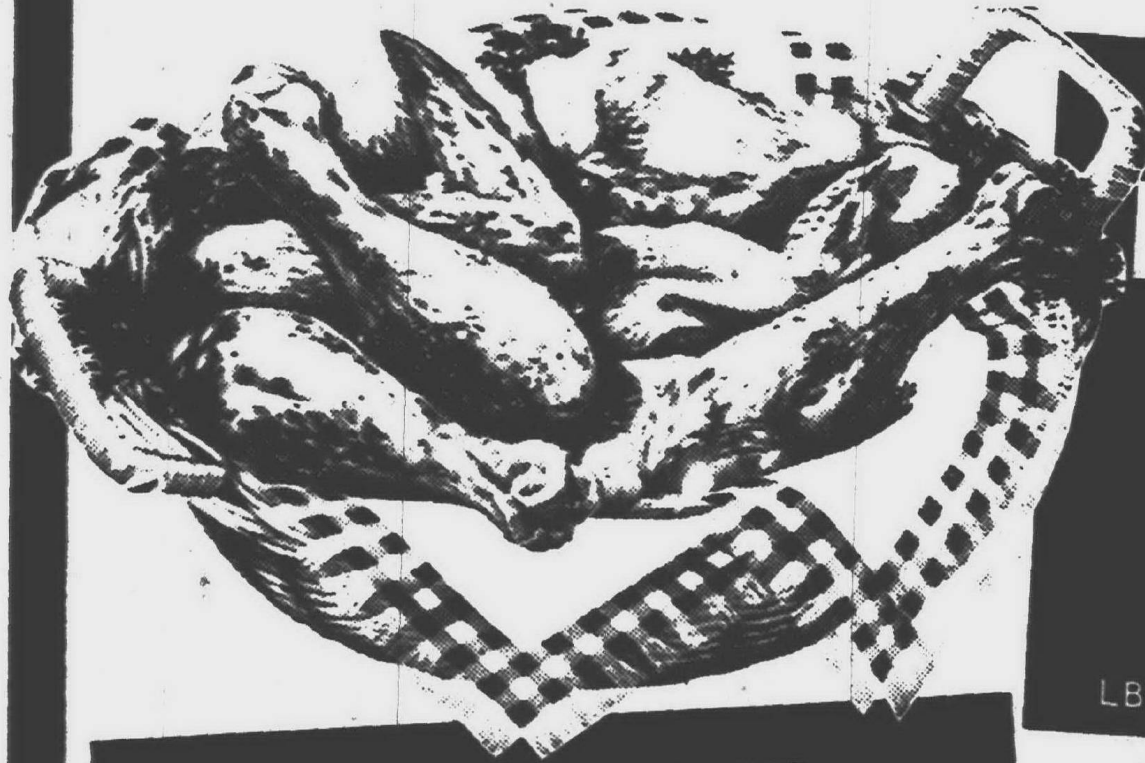

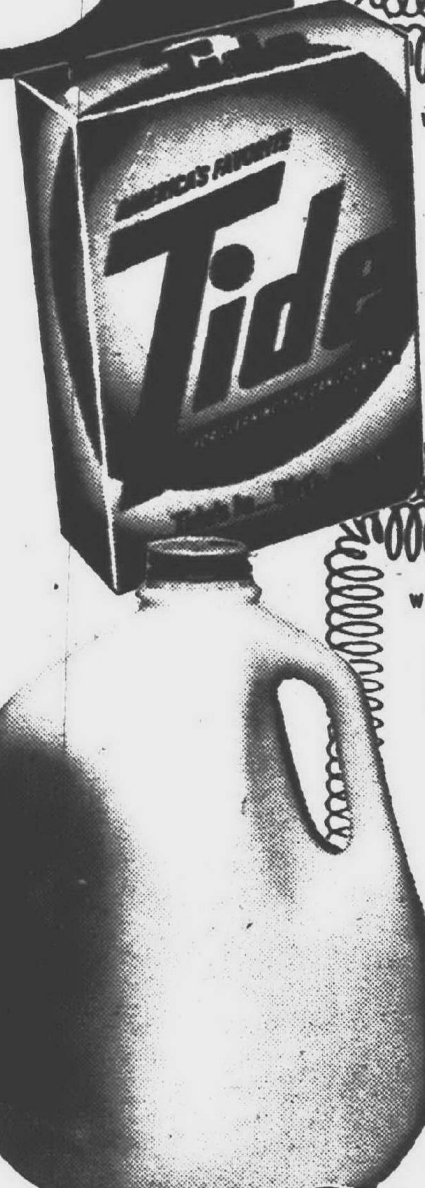

Independent Mail Routes For Sale

Plastic bags with the insignia "IPSA" have been turning up on the doorknobs of Observerland homes.

They usually contain two or three local advertisements and a flyer urging you to become a mailman for the Independent Postal Service of America, (IPSA), a privately owned four-year-old company which delivers second through fourth class mail.

"We're looking for an owner for an IPSA postal route in this area," one flyer reads. "You may qualify for an exciting and profitable career in your own neighborhood. \$1,000 investment required, but call now! Only a limited number of routes available."

LIVONIA OFFICE manager Phil Minch, a former retailer who pioneered the Detroit area for IPSA in March, said he has sold 20 of his 143 routes in Livonia, Redford and Plymouth.

Mail delivery began May 11. The mail carrier buys the route (400 names in a several block area) for \$1,000. One route should take about two to three hours to serve, Minch said. The carrier makes his money by getting a percentage of the price of each piece of mail he delivers. He can buy up to five routes.

Theoretically, an eager-beaver carrier could make a couple hundred dollars a day, but most Observerland route owners are making about \$12 a day part time or about \$24 a day full time with a four to five day work week.

Route owners must supply their own car and accident insurance, mail bags, etc.

Minch said most of his route owners were retirees, housewives and students who work part time.

If things don't work out, a route owner can sell his route to an IPSA-approved buyer or back to IPSA. Under a contract, the route owner can also forfeit the route (and the \$1,000) if he goes bankrupt, commits a crime that reflects unfavorably upon the company, or fails to abide by the manual which outlines appearance and delivery techniques.

IPSA is barred from using regular mail boxes and from delivering first class mail, a suit filed by the American Postal Workers Union of Detroit, which would ban IPSA from delivering any mail or "characterizing itself as an authorized of legal system of mail delivery" is pending in federal court.

Minch and Mario Ferri, manager of the office serving Westland, Garden City, Wayne and Inkster, are named in the suit.

IPSA is rewriting the route owner handbook, purging it of such words as "mailman," "post office," and "postmasters," in an attempt to get the postal union off its back. The IPSA terms are "route owner," "branch office" and "dealer."

IPSA was founded by Thomas Murray, an Irish immigrant and former hotel owner, who found he could deliver mail for a few cents less per piece than the U.S. Post Office and make a profit. He points out that the U.S. Post Office lost \$2 million last year and recently requested that the rate of second class mail be increased 127 per cent by 1976.

IPSA has 115 offices in 30 states. Six branch offices in the Detroit area are coordinated by regional headquarters in Southfield. Service in Observerland is

presently limited to third class advertisements.

MINCH AND his wife Maimu, who staff the small Livonia office, 12641 Stark Rd., are enthusiastic about the company's future.

They predict daily deliveries to every home in their three-city area within a year. "There is nothing under the rug in this company," Minch said. "It's not a get-rich-quick scheme. Just an honest business."

He said he expected more suits against IPSA "because we're serious about challenging the mail monopoly of the U.S. Postal System."

Philip Laux, of the Detroit Better Business Bureau, said the government has made no attempt to sue IPSA.

A three-page report on IPSA by the Council of Better Business Bureaus concluded: "Prospective route owners should realize that part of their individual success depends on IPSA securing clients who advertise nationally."

"To obtain these, IPSA must develop a national private mail system, thus, there is an element of unavoidable risk for all concerned."

"It is the view of the CBBB that, as with any other new and expanding enterprise, investors should seek individual legal advice before entering into permanent contracts at any level."

Laux said there were no complaints or derogatory information on file about the Detroit area offices.

Funeral Chapel Opened

The new facility has a traditional American design and will be operated by Robert S. Rice, who has been with the business since 1940, and his sons Park and Ronald.

Harold Ward of Dearborn has been with the business since 1951 and together with the Rice family runs the Fred Wood Funeral Home at 8450 Plymouth, Detroit.

The business was founded in 1927 by Fred Wood, who headed it for 22 years until his death in 1949.

Robert Rice left the organization in 1941 to serve as a medical administrator in the Army for five years and has been with the business since he returned in 1946.

SC Day Care Center Permanent

Mothers who have small children at home need not let that keep them from attending classes at Schoolcraft College this fall because a day care center is now a permanent service at the college.

The center accepts children ages 2-5, and is open from 7:45 a.m. until 5 p.m. on all class days. It will continue to operate in the Pilgrim United Church of Christ at 36075 Seven Mile, Livonia. The center's popular supervisor, Mrs. Shirley Pollack, will again direct its activities.

Costs at the Day Care Center involve a \$5 semester registration fee for each participating family, and a hourly charge of 60 cents for

each child. Enrollment forms are available at the office of Vice President Edward McNally on the Schoolcraft campus, or may be obtained at registration times.

Registration for the fall semester will be held Aug. 21 and 22, with classes starting on Aug. 24.

The day care center operated last year on a trial basis and proved so successful that it has been established by Schoolcraft's Board of Trustees as a permanent service at the college. There is a limit to the numbers of children the center can accommodate hourly, and placement is on a first come basis.

Give Bride An Elegant Shower

If you have a special summer bride how about putting your entertainment skills to work on an afternoon tea. Few occasions offer a hostess an opportunity to entertain so elegantly so easily.

Delicate, light and dainty are the keywords. Organdy, lace or embroidered cotton tablecloths, a small bowl of flowers, silver and china will all complement the small cakes and sandwiches served with the tea.

The tea should be prepared in a china pot just before serving. Fill the teapot with boiling water to heat it. Empty the water and put in the tea leaves, about one teaspoon per cup. Pour rapidly boiling water over the leaves, put the cover on the pot and allow the tea to steep for five minutes.

Everything else can be prepared ahead of time.

SCOTTISH SCONES

2 c. sifted all - purpose flour
4 t. baking powder
1/2 t. salt
1/2 c. butter, softened
2 eggs, beaten
6 T. milk

Sift flour, baking powder and salt twice. Cut butter into flour mixture. Add eggs and then milk. Turn out on a floured board and knead a little. Roll to one - half inch thickness. Cut into small rounds with cookie cutter or glass. Put on buttered cookie sheet and bake at 400 degrees 12 to 15 minutes. Serve with butter and marmalade or jam.

FRESH STRAWBERRIES

Arrange unhusked washed fresh strawberries in circles on two large plates. Put a small mound of confectioners' sugar, for dipping, in the center of each plate. Refrigerate until ready to serve.

OATCAKES

Old-fashioned rolled oats
1 1/2 c. all-purpose flour
1/2 c. sugar
1 t. salt
1/2 t. baking soda
3/4 c. shortening
1 1/3 c. cold water (about)

Combine 1 1/2 cups oats with next four ingredients. Cut in shortening. Add enough water to make a stiff dough. Separate into two balls. Roll each to one - eighth inch thickness. Dust on top with rolled oats. Press oats down into the dough with rolling pin. Cut into small squares and put on buttered cookie sheets. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes.

TEA SANDWICHES

Have a variety of bread, rye, whole wheat, white, raisin, date nut. Remove crusts. Cut into several different shapes, round, square, triangular or diamond. They may be open or closed. Make them early in the day and keep them covered with foil in the refrigerator until serving time.

TEA SANDWICH FILLINGS

- Cream cheese, strawberry marmalade, chopped pecans.
- Cream cheese, chopped walnuts, raisins, maraschino cherries.
- Mashed salmon, lemon juice, mayonnaise.
- Creamed Roquefort cheese, sherry, cream cheese.
- Sliced tomatoes spread with smoked cheese.
- Minced chicken, almonds, curry powder, sour cream.
- Chopped dates, minced nuts, cream cheese, pineapple juice.
- Chopped water chestnuts, softened butter, grated onion.

CHEESE ROUNDS

1 c. butter or margarine
2 eggs
2 c. grated sharp Cheddar cheese
2 1/2 c. sifted all - purpose flour
1/2 t. salt
Dash of paprika
- Cream butter, add one egg and mix well. Stir in next four ingredients. Form into a ball and chill for one hour. Roll out one - fourth of the dough at a time about one - quarter inch thick. Cut into 1 1/4 inch rounds. Put on buttered cookie sheet. Brush with remaining beaten egg. Sprinkle with sesame seeds if desired. Bake at 400 degrees for 12 minutes.

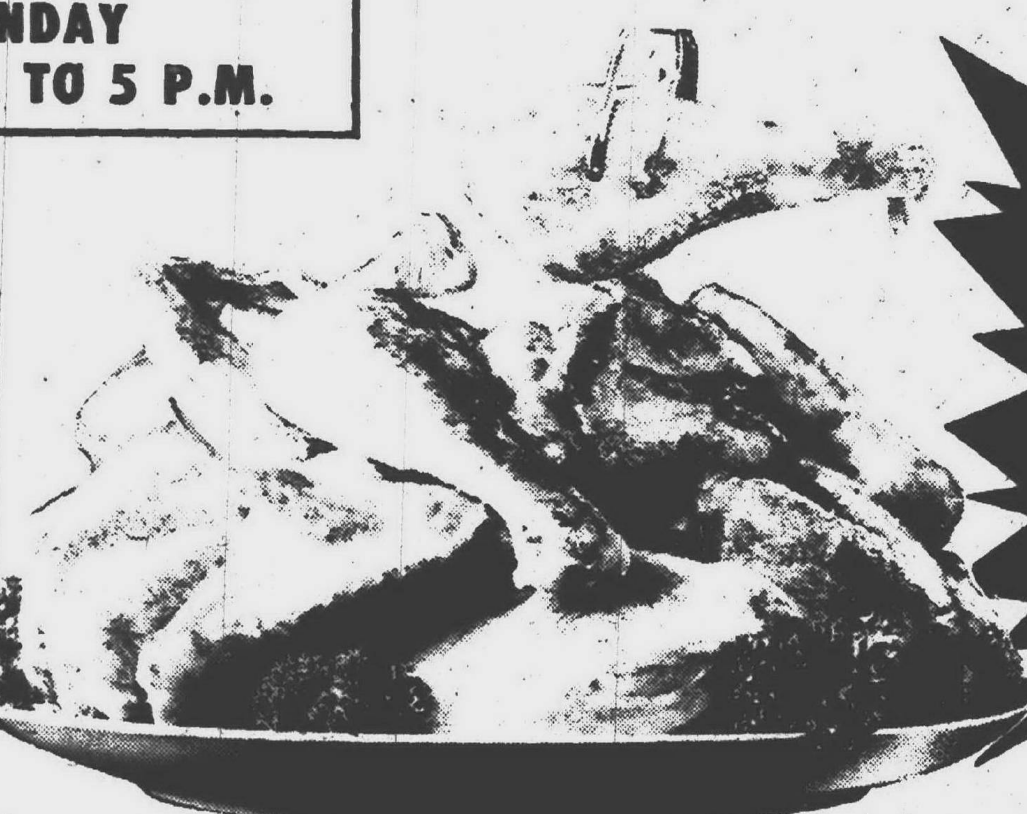

Primary Election Leaves Busing Issue Still Deeply Frustrated

To frustrate is a transitive verb. The dictionary in my office says it means:

"1. to make (plans, efforts, etc.) of no avail; defeat; baffle; nullify.

"2. to disappoint or thwart (a person)."

It is also the best word I can find to describe the net results of yesterday's primary election, which turned more than any I have ever seen on people's strong feelings about one issue: busing.

Virtually every candidate who appeared on yesterday's ballot was against busing. Some important races for congress and for the state house were decided on the basis that voters felt one candidate was more firmly opposed to busing than another. Discussions, speeches, ads, and leaflets concentrated on busing

nearly to the exclusion of other issues.

But after all the rhetoric and sound and fury, the situation is just about as it has been for the past six months: The overwhelming majority of people living in the suburbs fear and detest the idea of their children being bused to some inner city school, but they sense that there is very little they themselves can do to stop it. That's frustration.

SOME PEOPLE and some newspapers have attacked local politicians for being excessively concerned with the busing situation, to the exclusion of thoughtful discussion of other important issues.

That's a fair enough point to make, given the importance of tax reform, land use control, housing scandals, mass transit,

and so on. But when balanced against the passion that people here feel about the busing issue, these admittedly important issues fade into insignificance.

The politicians know this, and although they might like to discuss other things than busing, they also know full well that in a political system where office holders are supposed to represent to at least some degree the concerns of their constituents they have a realistic obligation to talk about the central overriding concern of the day.

That's busing.

And although there is very little a county drain commissioner or a township trustee or a local judge can do about affecting the way the busing thrash turns out, the demands of the electorate that these candidates talk about busing are irresistible.

THE REAL point of frustration now, of course, is that we have voted and our candidates have either won or lost, we are all still just where we were before election day with respect to busing.

Judge Roth is still issuing orders of various sorts. The Circuit Court of Appeals is still cranking up for an appeal hearing on the busing ruling, and the U.S. Supreme Court is still standing majestically in the wings waiting for an eventual appeal.

And the ordinary guy who hates the idea of seeing his kid bused away but who isn't a

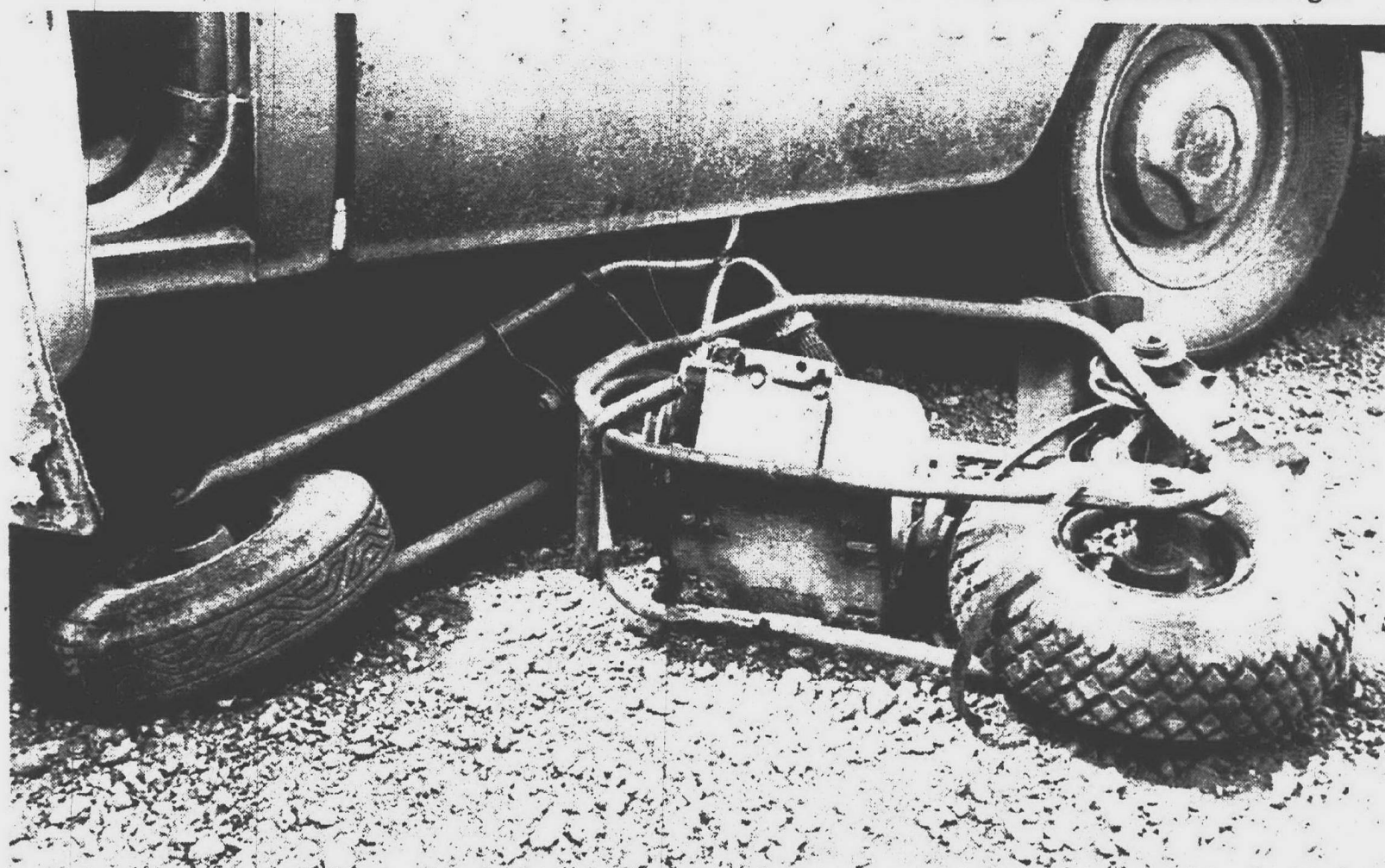
lawyer stands around wondering what in blazes he can do.

That's why things like local advisory votes on busing, even though they have no bearing at all on the way the issue turns out, have such a high voter turnout. And that's why candidates for offices which have no way of affecting the busing issue win elections on a strong anti-busing stand.

And that's why anti-busing meetings like last week's in Livonia draw such a big crowd, even though the outcome of such a meeting probably won't affect the issue much.

It may be fashionable to call all the outpouring of words and meetings and advisory votes pointless and ill-directed. But they do offer something very important to people who feel frustrated in their need to do something directly to express their feelings about busing.

After all, busing is the most deeply felt issue to hit this area since the depression. And if you felt that some court was about to order a depression purely on the basis of its legally constituted authority, wouldn't you be going to anti-depression meetings?

What Is Needed To Teach Parents?

A 13-year-old Livonia boy is in Wayne County General Hospital in critical condition. He has been for the better part of three

weeks...as the direct result of collision between a mini-bike and a small truck on Schoolcraft Road near the intersection with Melvin.

That brings to mind the question: "When will parents learn that mini-bikes can be very dangerous, are forbidden on any public thoroughfares unless the driver has an operator's license and by ordinance and law must not be driven anywhere except on the private property of the parents or on specially designated mini-bike lanes?"

In this particular instance, the police report shows the youngster was going south on Melvin and then scooted out in front of the truck without any chance of stopping, since the bike lacked brakes.

Only by the grace of God did he come out of the accident alive, and only because of the skill of the staff at the hospital is he alive today. The last reports from the hospital was that he is still in critical condition and was in intensive care only a few days ago.

ALL OF WHICH brings to mind the repeated warnings of the various police departments in Observerland that mini-bikes are dangerous and shouldn't be placed in the hands of youngsters.

The Livonia department has had numerous calls of violations and has a policy of taking the bike into custody and then making the parents go to the station to retrieve the property.

For a long time, officers thought this type of action would make parents wake up and make them realize that the mini-bikes aren't for children. They mentioned the numerous complaints about noise, and one

had to admit that they do make a lot of racket.

They mentioned the danger of driving along the sidewalks and the possibility of hitting youngsters or aged persons who just can't move as fast as they did years ago and make perfect targets for fast-moving bikes.

They told parents of the city ordinances and state laws forbidding mini-bikes on public thoroughfares unless handled by one with a driver's license. They pointed out that a youngster has to be 16 before he or she can get a driver's permit.

AND WHAT EFFECT did all of this talk have? Very little, officers point out.

Even though parents know that youngsters under 16 can't operate a motor driven vehicle legally in Michigan, they persist in buying the mini-bikes and then seem to have an idea they can flaunt the law.

Parents spend money for the bikes and then want their children to use them. There probably are a good many that insist their children must follow the rules, but there apparently are a good many more that tell Junior to go out and have a good time.

These are the ones that scream like wild Indians when told by the police they have to come to the station to retrieve their property.

And that leads back to the start of this editorial. What will it take to get the message home? Does it mean that a youngster has to be killed before parents realize they have given a lethal machine to their youngster?

We hope not... but it appears that's going to be the only solution. Most certainly that is learning the hard way.

Put Blame Where It Belongs

ST. IGNACE In this little resort town at the north end of the Mackinac Straits Bridge, a small band of long-haired collegians is digging away the ground around the little statue of Father Jacques Marquette in the cemetery next to the Catholic church.

They have my strong sympathy, these archaeologists and students from Michigan State University, because as a newsman who has conducted investigations with bits and pieces of evidence, I have a "feel" for their problem.

THE TEAM, headed by the blond, bearded Dr. Jim Fitting, is looking for the foundations of Pere Marquette's mission church and other buildings that clustered along the northern shore of Lake Huron in the 1670s.

From tiny shreds of evidence sifted from the soil, archeologists can make fantastic deductions about what sort of society existed on this outpost of Christian civilization three centuries ago. And so the area is staked out and divided by strings, and each shovelful of dirt is sifted and strained for clues.

What was in the buildings? How were they arranged? Was Pere Marquette's church arranged on an east-west axis, in the style of European cathedrals, or parallel to the shore?

And especially, what kind of impact did the fur traders have on the economy of the Huron and Algonquin Indians?

Dr. Fitting says the businessmen's impact must have been

"tremendous," but businessmen, unfortunately, don't write histories or diaries, and so there is little written evidence on their activities.

One French explorer, Dr. Fitting said, made latitude and longitude surveys, did soundings of the harbor and may have had accurate maps of the shoreline. But in one of those accidents which profoundly affects history, the civilian explorer's canoe was upset on the way back to Montreal, and all his records were lost.

So what do we really know about St. Ignace or the Jolliet-Marquette trip down the Mississippi? This evening I delved into four different histories of the region, and repeatedly the foot notes refer to "Jesuit Relations" — the tales related in reports by the missionary priests of the Society of Jesus.

This is not to knock clergymen. This is only to say that they wrote chiefly about the things they were interested in — saving souls — and not about the real history of the place.

Any student of history knows that traders, with their iron kettles, iron axes, beads, iron fishhooks, brandy and rum, did far more to destroy the economy and society of the Indians than any black-robed Jesuit or blue-coated soldier. And yet the traders almost never wrote history.

I THOUGHT OF these things as I read the newspaper accounts (when the bass weren't biting) of the proceedings in the Judge Roth school desegregation case.

The Detroit papers and ours have done a brilliant job of covering the court case and the anti-busing meetings, yet like the "Jesuit Relations," we have failed miserably to tell what the private economy — the builders, developers, Realtors (that's a trademark, and they want it capitalized), and common homeowners — have done to create this segregated society.

We report the trivia at township board and city council meetings, which are public, but never get into the board meetings of the Realtors and developers, where the real power to segregate is exercised.

So that's why I stood at the edge of the MSU "dig" at St. Ignace, with my camera around my neck like any fudgie tourist, reflected on the problems of writing the story of mankind, and said a silent prayer to St. Ignatius Loyola in favor of the archeologists.

Schoolcraft Traffic Snarls Getting Worse

Inasmuch as those who travel Schoolcraft Road, east and west, know it will probably be another two years before the freeway is completed, it would appear that those in charge of the construction should make their plans known ahead of time and give motorists some idea of what to expect.

In the past three or four weeks, some of the main arteries that cross Schoolcraft have been reduced to one lane for traffic with a resultant long backup of cars everytime the traffic signals change.

We see no reason why the contractors on the freeway can't make it known to the public in advance when they intend to make such drastic changes in the traffic pattern.

FOR INSTANCE, a driver going north or south on Farmington Road suddenly runs into what appears to be a roadblock without any suitable signs of trouble. Farmington changes from two lanes of traffic each way to one at the Schoolcraft intersection.

If the contractors, the State Highway Department or the Wayne County Road Commission — whichever is responsible for the change — had posted large signs along the road or had taken the time to notify area news media of the upcoming changes, one

wouldn't complain... but apparently this isn't to be.

The traffic jams have happened at the intersections of Schoolcraft with Middle Belt, Merriman, Farmington, Stark, Levan and Newburgh in recent weeks, all without any advance notice to the motoring public.

We expressed a similar feeling earlier when sudden changes were made in the Schoolcraft route going east and west. It's kind of miserable to be driving along one of the main arteries and then suddenly find that the two lanes of traffic has become only one and motorists become involved in long snarls because one lane of cars is trying to work its way into the other. Just try and get into the one open lane when traffic is at its highest peak.

THEN THERE'S another problem caused by the many large trucks hauling tons of dirt from the area being removed for the depressed portion of the new freeway.

Wonder how the truck drivers would feel if a couple of motorists drove side by side on Schoolcraft and refused to allow any car to pass. We shudder to think of the language that would be used. Yet, place the shoe on the other foot, and such things are perfectly all right.

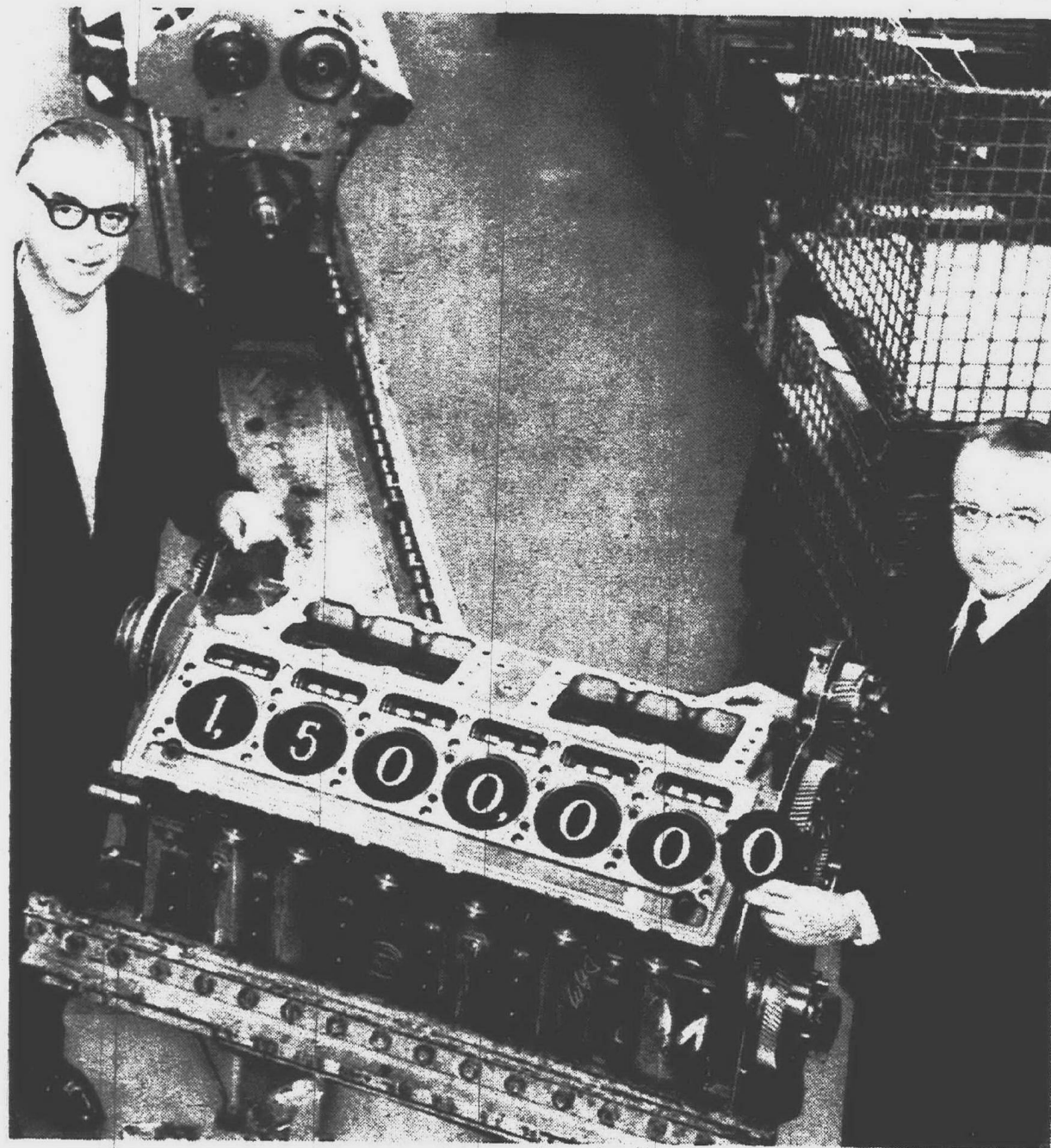

Milestone For Diesel: 1.5 Millionth Engine Made

Detroit Diesel Allison Division of General Motors in Redford Township has reached the milestone of 1,500,000 engines.

According to the division's general manager, James E. Knott, the major significance of the event is how quickly it has been achieved.

"Production began in 1938 and it took 29 years to build the first one million Detroit Diesels," Knott stated. "We are already halfway to our second million in less than five years."

Plans are already under way to further increase the

division's diesel engine capacity.

Production of the big Series 149 engines, which range from 800 to 1600 horsepower, is being transferred to one of the division's Indianapolis plants. This will provide space at the division's local facility for the new high volume Series 92, scheduled for production in January, 1974.

"The new Series 92 engines will provide improved power coverage," explains Knott. "Combined with our current Series 53, 71 and 149 product line, it will strengthen our future competitive position."

Parks, Police Top Requests For U.S. Aid

The Southeast Michigan Council of Governments processed 168 local, county and state agency applications for federal and state funds totalling \$99.2 million during the first six months of 1972. Total cost of the proposed projects was \$1.45.5 million.

The agency's role is to compare proposed projects to be financed with federal or state funds with long-range regional development plans and with existing or proposed facilities, James L. Trainor, SEMCOG's acting executive director, said.

Federal and state agencies use the SEMCOG review and comment on the proposed projects as guidelines on funding decisions, Trainor said.

On the grant applications during the first six months of 1972, 61 were for recreation-related developments that would cost \$22,263,000; grants sought totalled \$11.4 million.

Another 90 grant applications for federal funds for criminal justice programs under the Safe Streets Act were submitted. Grants sought in this category totalled \$12.9 million, to help finance programs costing a total of \$18.8 million.

Highway projects reviewed would cost an estimated \$36 million, with \$28 million provided by state and federal funding.

Itemization of June applications when requests for \$4.8 million towards projects costing a total of \$9 million were reviewed by SEMCOG indicates the general nature and scope of the activity. These requests:

A Detroit Board of Education request for \$983,500 to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for acquisition and development of playfields and school recreational projects to cost a total of \$1,967,000.

A Wayne County Board of Commissioners' request for \$325,000 to provide court-related services through the Wayne County Juvenile Services System costing a total of \$433,334.

A City of Dearborn request for \$208,600 to the U.S. Department of Justice (DJ) to help buy radio equipment costing \$278,133.

A City of Detroit Police Department request to DJ for \$1,741,693 to implement radio and telephone change-over costing a total of \$2,322,257.

A Highland Park Police Department request to DJ for \$5,531 to install alarms in high crime areas at a total cost of \$7,375.

A Highland Park Police Department request to DJ for \$230,935 to make an operations analysis costing a total of \$314,097.

A City of Wayne Police Department request to DJ for \$17,736 to update radio communications at a total cost of \$23,648.

A CITY OF WAYNE request to DJ for \$152,800 to fund specialized patrol operations in Garden City, Inkster, Wayne and Westland at a total cost of \$203,733.

A City of Plymouth request to DJ for \$27,700 toward the cost of a police school liaison unit.

A City of Westland police department request to DJ for \$57,429 for improved communication system equipment to cost a total of \$76,572.

A City of Allen Park Police Department request to DJ for \$31,132 for communications equipment costing \$20,680.

A Redford Township-Dearborn Heights request to DJ for \$175,654 to develop a joint police radio system costing \$235,207.

A Wayne County Prosecutor's Office request to DJ for \$22,332 to conduct a consumer fraud prevention program costing \$29,776.

A Wayne County Sheriff's Department request to DJ for \$118,337 to develop a model jail information system costing \$157,783.

OAKLAND COUNTY
An Oakland County request to DJ for \$96,135 for a joint inter-agency narcotics enforcement effort with state police, county sheriff, and Southfield, Royal Oak, Troy, Pontiac and Ferndale police departments; total cost \$254,183.

An Oakland County request to DJ for \$35,612 for a consumer's fraud protection unit costing a total of \$46,568.

A City of Pontiac request to DJ for \$30,679 for a police/community relations unit to educate businesses and residences of a target area in preventive burglary measures; total cost \$44,216.

ONLY THREE HIGHWAY projects -- a relatively low number for a 30-day period -- were reviewed.

These were Michigan Department of State Highways proposals for a \$914,000 reconstruction project on Huron River Drive in Ypsilanti, a \$118,000 project to remove unused ramps on the John Lodge Freeway (US-10) at Greenlawn in Detroit, and a \$125,000 preliminary engineering study for reconstruction of M-150 from M-59 relocated to Avon Road in Oakland County.

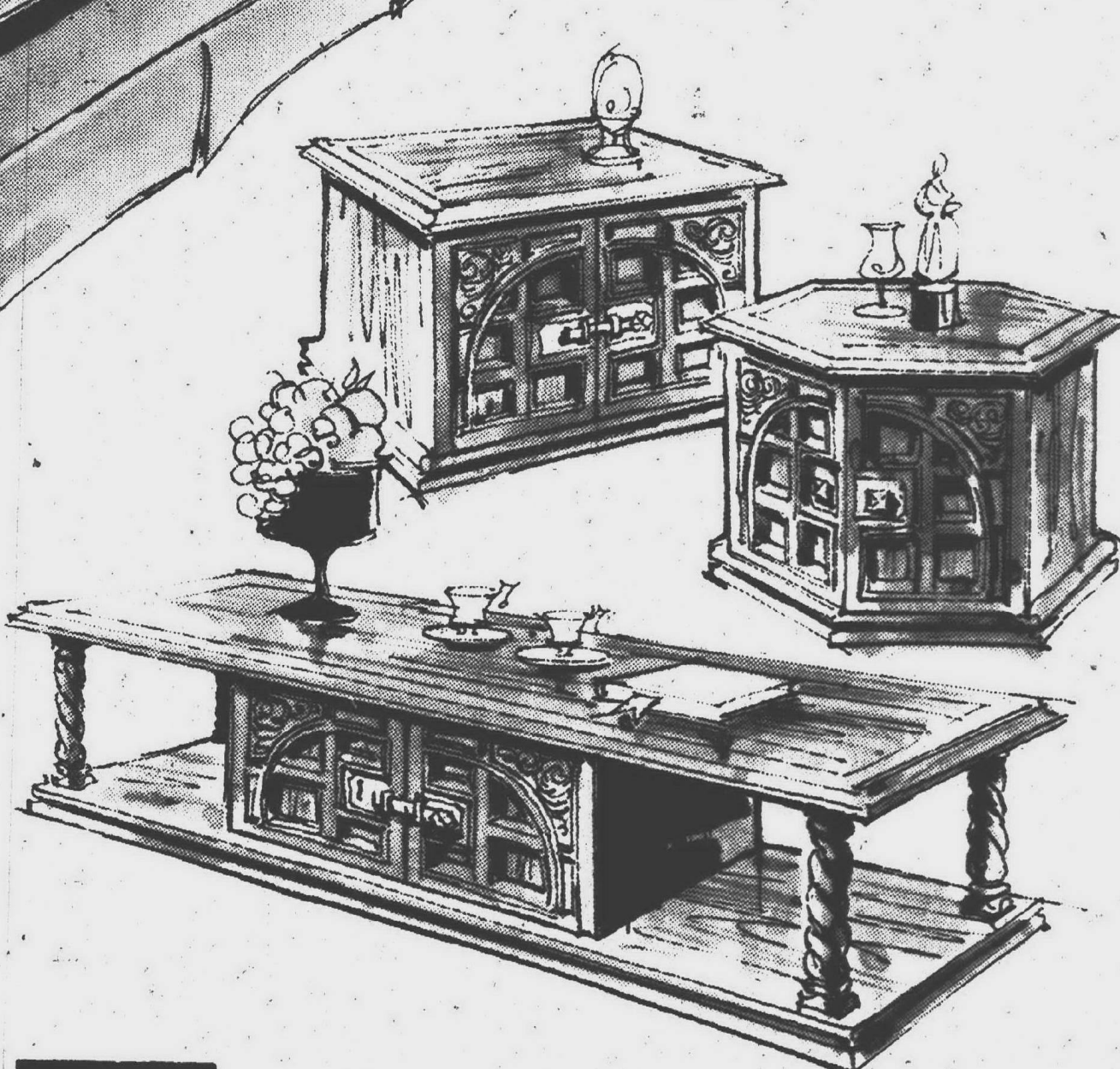

Traffic Flows On A New Map

The Southeast Michigan Council of Governments has published a traffic flow map indicating the 24-hour traffic counts on all major roads in southeast Michigan in 1970.

Potential uses of this mapped data included site location analysis of businesses dependent upon large traffic flow for successful sales volumes, or for study by traffic and safety officials in helping to determine the location of traffic control equipment or analysis of high-accident-rate areas. Gary Krause, SEMCOG manager of transportation and land use planning, said:

"The information contained in the traffic flow map is part of the council's ongoing monitoring of traffic growth trends and the development plans for future highway and transit facilities in Southeast Michigan."

Development of the traffic flow map was the result of efforts by the council's office of transportation planning in cooperation with the Michigan Department of State Highways, the seven county road commissions in Southeast Michigan, and many local governments in the region.

This map is approximately 48 by 50 inches and is available to the public at \$5. It can be obtained by contacting SEMCOG's information services office, 810 Book Building, Detroit.

Forced Maternity Leave Struck Down By Court

School board policies regarding the amount of leave time a pregnant teacher must take before and after the birth of a baby have been ruled "arbitrary and unreasonable" by the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit in Cincinnati.

The appeals court acted July 27 to reverse a lower court ruling in the matter of mandatory maternity leave.

In a case brought by the National Education Association on behalf of two Cleveland teachers, the court struck down a requirement by the Cleveland Board of

Education that a pregnant teacher begin maternity leave five months before the expected birth of a child and continue such status until the beginning of the first school term after the baby is three months old.

THE TEACHERS, Jo Carol LaFleur and Ann Elizabeth Nelson, had contended the policy, in force 20 years, was unfair because it required them to take involuntary unpaid leave although their physicians had given them permission to continue working as long as they wished.

The court noted that "Three months enforced unemployment after birth has no relation to the employer's interest at all," and added: "Under no construction of this record can we conclude that the medical evidence presented supports the extended periods of mandatory maternity leave required by the rule both before and after birth of the child."

THE APPEALS COURT noted that the rule is inherently based upon a classification by sex, stating: "Male teachers are not subject to pregnancy, but they are subject to many types of illnesses and disabilities. This record indicates clearly that pregnant women teachers have been singled out for unconstitutionally unequal restrictions upon their employment."

The school board had argued that the rule originally was established for instructional continuity, to avoid administrative problems and to spare pregnant teachers any pointing, giggling and snide remarks by students.

However, the appeals court pointed out, pregnant students are permitted to stay in class in Cleveland schools without any apparent ill effects upon the education system.

THE NEA is awaiting a decision in a similar case argued this session before the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit in Richmond, Va.

In that case the lower court handed down the first ruling in the nation to the effect that maternity leave decisions are matters best left to the mother and the physician.

The teacher in that case, Susan Cohen, was awarded back pay and accrued benefits for the time she was forced to take leave.

The court tests of maternity leave policies on the part of school boards come six decades after another litigation in which teachers in New York state fought first for the right to marry and then to obtain a leave of absence for the purpose of child-bearing.

Dems Set New Conventions

Four Democratic district conventions are scheduled within the next week, but the 19th Wayne district has not scheduled a local convention.

LIT Tells Schedule For Fall

SOUTHFIELD

Registration for both day and evening college will begin Aug. 15 at the Lawrence Institute of Technology.

Interviews with new students already have started to allow sufficient time for the arrival of high school transcripts and other data.

Offices are open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. at LIT, Northwestern and 10 Mile in Southfield.

Classes in the evening college will begin Aug. 28, two weeks in advance of the day college, which starts Sept. 11.

LIT is one of the few colleges in the U.S. which offers planned and scheduled bachelor of science degree work entirely in its evening college. The work is identical to that offered in the day college but takes six instead of four years. Evening college classes are held Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights while the day college operates five days per week.

Bachelor of science degrees are granted in architecture; mechanical, electrical and construction engineering; physics; chemistry; mathematics; computer science; industrial management; accounting and other fields.

Also offered at LIT are associate degree programs in various technologies on Tuesday and Thursday evenings. These are: building construction, computer, electrical and electronic, chemical, industrial supervision, and mechanical. Preparing students as technicians, these courses take 3½ years to complete.

Some 200 evening college courses also are open to special students.

2 Real Estate Courses At SC

Schoolcraft College is getting into the real estate business this fall, but it won't involve buying or selling houses.

The college is offering two evening classes in real estate for the first time when the fall semester gets under way Aug. 24. They will be taught by professionals for people wanting to get started in real estate, or for those already working in the field who are in need of a refresher course.

Registration for fall semester evening classes at Schoolcraft is being held from 6:30 to 9 p.m. on Aug. 21 and 22.

THE NEW REAL estate classes will be taught by Weldon E. Clark, who heads his own agency by that name, and James Stevens, a group vice president and sales manager with Real Estate One. Two sections of each will be offered on alternate nights, Monday through Thursday, from 7 to 10.

The classes have been established by Schoolcraft's director of business education, Roland Anderson, and are designated Business 181 and 182. Both have been approved by the United Northwestern Realty Association, Western Wayne Oakland County Board of Realtors (UNRA/WWOC-BR).
