### Recount Passes County Millage

A recount of the Redford Township primary election results has apparently added enough votes in favor of the Wayne county millage proposal (Proposal B) to pass it by a 114-vote margin.

In the unofficial tabulation Thursday night, which was called by the state and county elections bureaus to check suspected errors in the computer program, it was found that the original tabulation of the Proposal B results in Redford was short by 1,688 yes votes.

It was previously thought that the proposal had been defeated county-wide by 1,574 votes.

The official figures will not be known until the local and county canvassing boards have certified the results. The proposal renews a one-mill property tax for county operations.

## 4-Day Fete Here Gets New Look

There seems to be no end to the growth of the Plymouth Fall Festival.

What started out as a one-day Rotary Club outing in 1956 now stands as one of Michigan's outstanding community fetes of its kind, and the 1972 renewal which will run Sept. 7-10 will be the biggest ever.

"This definitely will be the largest year we've ever had," commented Tony Flum,

general manager of the festival as he discussed the new format which will see Main Street closed to vehicular traffic from Ann Arbor Trail to City Hall for all four days.

This concourse will see concession booths strung its full length along the east side of the street. At this point, 36 organizations have signed up as sponsors of the booths, compared to last year's record 28. Flum expects it will

pass the 40 mark by the time the festival opens.

As large as the '72 festival may be with its myriad of attractions, the 1973 renewal undoubtedly will set still new records, for at that time both the historical museum and cultural center, now under construction, will be in use and will be worked into the festivities.

THE CONCOURSE plan was suggested several months ago by Police Chief Timothy

Ford as a solution to the perennial quarrel of where to locate the booths. It will turn Main Street into a pedestrian mall anchored by Kellogg Park at one end and Central School at the other.

This will help focus attention on the arts and crafts show at the school which was launched last year with tremendous success by the Community Arts Council. It will be held Sept. 9 and 10. The festival board of

directors, headed by John M. (Mike) Hoben, has been meeting weekly to update plans for the funfest which is expected to lure at least 60,000 persons into the downtown area during its four-day run.

There will be free entertainment at the Kellogg Park bandstand every afternoon and evening, and the park also will be the focal point of the numerous feasts which have become an integral part of the celebration.

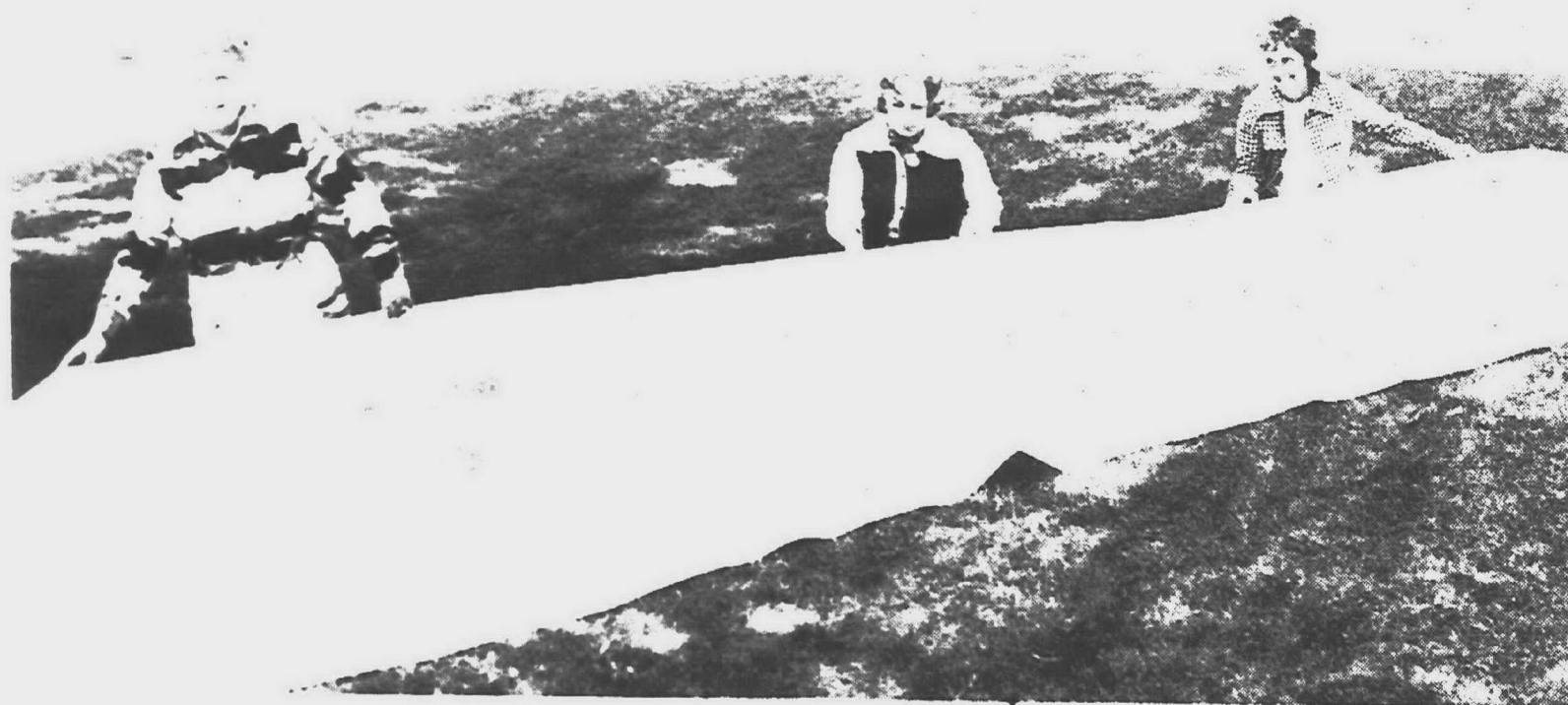
through Sunday, and the youngsters of the area can look forward to their annual pet show, which will be on Saturday morning.

"Turn of the century" costumes are being urged, and this competition, as well as the mercantile window display contest, will be in the hands of the American Association of University Women.

The Old Village Merchants Association also has come up with a special plan that will bring visitors into that section of town. Interim stops will be made at Central School and the Cultural Center.

Another festival board meeting will be held Wednesday night and any organizations which have yet to submit applications to sponsor special attractions are requested to do so immediately. When Flum predicted, "This will be the largest year we've ever had," he wasn't fooling -- and it's a far cry from that Sunday picnic of 16 years ago.

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## Area Seeks Stronger Voice On Water Board

Suburban city and township officials will seek a stronger voice and representation on the Detroit Water Dept. board, which approved a substantial increase two months ago in the wholesale water to its customers outside of Detroit.

THE DECISION was taken at the monthly meeting of the Western Wayne County Mayors and Supervisors Assn., a loosely-organized group of leaders formed last fall on the suggestion of Mayor Eugene McKinney of Westland.

Taking part in the association's discussion Thursday in the Plymouth Township hall were officials from Livonia, Westland, Garden City, the city and township of Plymouth, and Redford Township.

During a 45-minute meeting, the officials expressed skepticism about the need for Detroit's raising its wholesale

water rates to the suburban cities and townships by 15-20 per cent. The rate boost goes into effect Nov. 1.

THE SUBURBAN political leaders voiced past criticism about the water board raising water rates outside of Detroit without the suburban communities having any voice or influence in the water board's decisions.

There was limited discussion about placing the Detroit Water board under the jurisdiction of the Michigan Public Service Commission, which regulates and passes on rate hike requests from other utilities.

But the discussion on what to do shifted direction when it was pointed out that similar rejected legislation in 1968 would have included state controls over the resale rates set by the suburban communities to their local water consumers.

MAYOR JAMES McKeon of Plymouth questioned the need for Detroit's raising its wholesale rate and its reported 11 per cent water loss during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1971.

McKeon said the figures reflect an 8.5 per cent loss outside Detroit and only 2.5 per cent inside Detroit -- a figure he questioned.

Others also felt that the Detroit board's most recent rate hike isn't justified because the added revenues are pegged for bond issues floated to add water lines to cities joining the Detroit water system.

Supervisor Maurice Breen of Plymouth Township, who chaired the association meeting, commented that the rate hike is "excessive" for the payment of bonds.

THROUGHOUT the meeting, officials repeated past comments that the water board generally follows recommendations by Supt. Gerald Remus.

They also felt that there was a general lack of good information about the water board and its revenues.

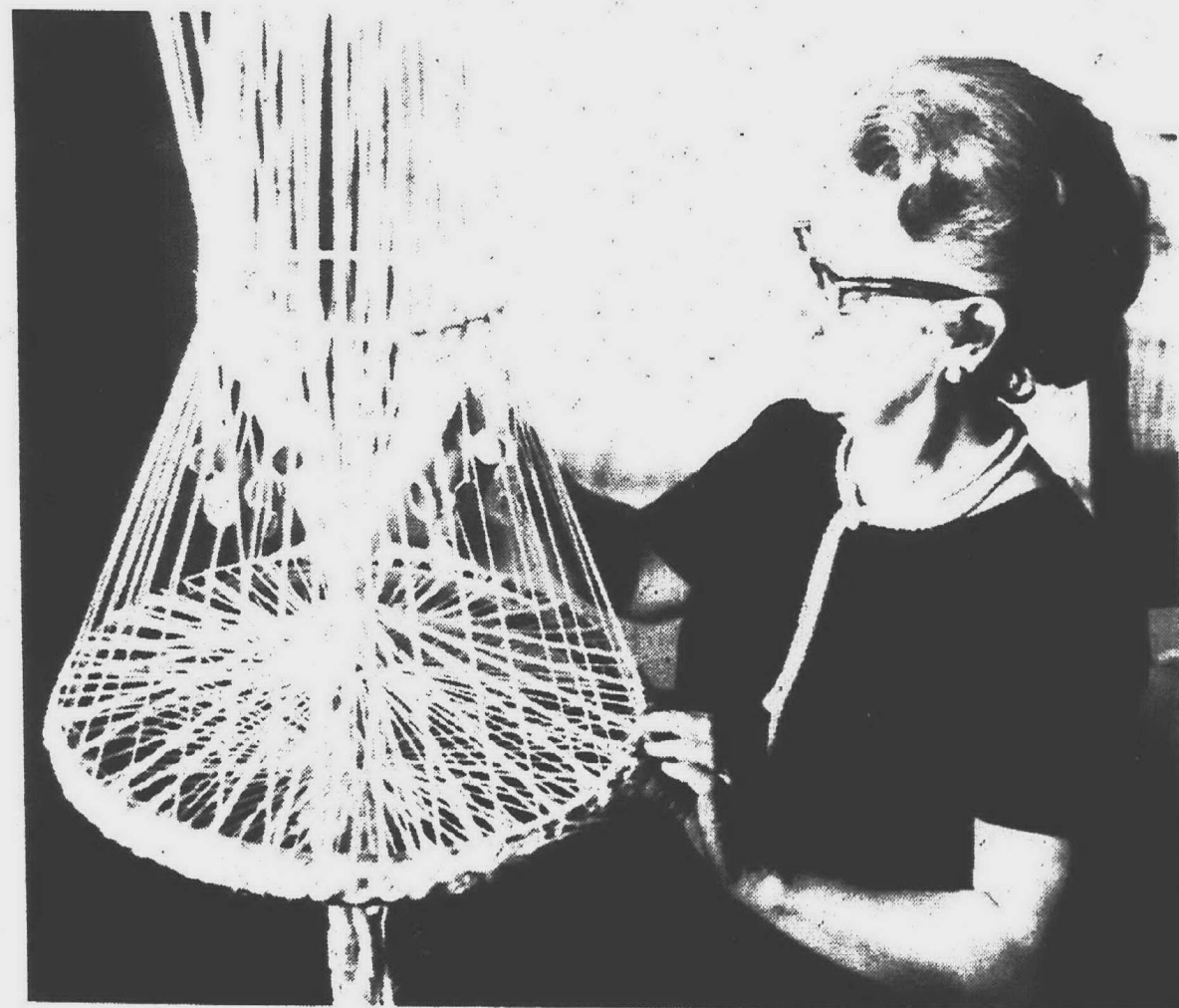
"We have no one to turn to except Remus," said Westland's Mayor McKinney, who questioned whether Remus supplies accurate answers all the time.

George Langford, Garden City's public works superintendent, commented that the Detroit water department is trying to arrange private, individual meetings with its suburban water customers to discuss the water rate increase.

A formal request for more suburban representation on the board will be written by McKinney, association secretary, and sent to the County Board of Commissioners Chairman Robert FitzPatrick, the Detroit City Charter Commission and the water board.

The selection procedure of water board members is spelled out in the Detroit city charter, which is now being revised by the charter commission. FitzPatrick, as county board chairman, is also involved in the selection of board members.

Association members were brought up-to-date by Supervisor Bill Robbins of Redford on a lawsuit filed by his township against the Detroit water board challenging the water rate schedule and the alleged violation of an agreement with Detroit banning rate boosts to that community.

## McQueen Murder A Hired Killing?

REDFORD The slaying of Michael P. McQueen, 25, who was found strangled Aug. 10 along a roadside in Redford, is believed by police to have been a hired killing.

Redford Police Chief Edwin Gleza said, "Investigation has led us to have strong reason to believe McQueen was slain by a person or persons who were paid to do the job."

Police are certain more than one person was involved in getting McQueen to leave his car and get into the murder car.

"McQUEEN WAS of a fairly good size build, weighing 170 pounds and was five feet 10 inches tall," Gleza said.

"It is not likely that one person could force him into a car alone, drive the car and strangle the victim without assistance," he added.

Police believe McQueen was strangled and then dropped by the roadside. Until a few weeks ago,

McQueen was living with his wife and two young daughters at their home at 8477 Doe Lane in Canton Township. Police say he was estranged from his wife and living with his parents at 20587 Woodworth in Redford.

McQUEEN'S CAR was found by police in the parking lot of a bar at 34810 Grand River in Farmington Township. They are seeking his whereabouts between 8 p.m. on Aug. 9, when he was seen leaving his parent's home, and the time his body was discovered by a passing motorist at 10:10 p.m.

Gleza said police are seeking help from anyone who may have seen the car in the lot or noticed McQueen alone or with other persons.

Information may be given through Redford's secret witness program or by calling Redford police.

A reward of \$2,000 leading to the arrest and conviction of the killers is being offered.

## Bennett Trial Delayed A Month

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP The trial of David L. Bennett, the 17-year-old youth accused of killing Mrs. Vivian Berry last May 9, has been postponed to Sept. 19 from its original date of Aug. 21.

### Someone Just May Get Wet

Defense Attorney Jerry Raymond said the postponement was granted because the approximately 1,100-page transcript of the pretrial examination was just completed about 10 days ago, giving Raymond and his partner, Dan Burress, little time to study it.

"In addition," Raymond explained, "the psychiatric examinations of David have not been completed, and all pretrial motions made by us have not yet been heard."

# Township's Vehicle Ordinance Stirs Questions

**PLYMOUTH**  
Recent adoption by the Plymouth Township board of trustees of an ordinance requiring that residents

owning such vehicles as mini-bikes and motor scooters register them by Aug. 31 has resulted in a myriad of questions.

Clerk Helen Richardson has put together a series of questions and answers pertinent to the ordinance which she hopes will be helpful to those who come under its terms.

Mrs. Richardson also emphasizes, however, that her synopsis does not relieve a person from knowing and following all the terms of the ordinance. Copies of the measure are available at her office in Plymouth Township Hall, 42350 Ann Arbor Rd.

The licensing procedure was set up in hopes of gaining better control of the problem created by this type of vehicle and to alleviate the noise problem.

Mrs. Richardson's compilation of a few of the questions and answers that residents of the township might like to know follows.

**Q. MUST I register my lawnmower?**

A. No. It is not a motor-driven "vehicle" the purpose of which is to convey a person from one place to another by means of motor-driven drive of power." Sec. 40.1 f.

**Q. MUST I register my snowmobile?**

A. No. Snowmobiles are exempt from registration. Sec. 40.2. However, snowmobiles are subject to the regulations and controls concerning operation.

**Q. MUST I register my automobile, truck or motorcycle?**

A. No. Those motor vehicles must be registered through the Secretary of State under the Michigan Motor Vehicle Code (Act 300, P.A. 1949) and are exempt from the registration and the regulations of Ordinance 40. Sec. 40.1 f. But, Ordinance 39 does contain certain regulations pertaining to such vehicles and operation of them on private land.

**Q. I HAVE rented a mini-bike for the summer for my son to use. Must I register it?**

A. Yes. An "owner" who must register a mini-bike includes a person renting a mini-bike for more than 30 days. Sec. 40.1(b) (3).

**Q. MUST I register my son's mini-bike when it will be used only on my land?**

A. No, so long as the mini-bike is exclusively operated on the owner's land and not on the public land or on another's private land.

**Q. WHAT do I do when my mini-bike doesn't have any place large enough to locate the identification number?**

A. Improve. If the fenders or frame are not sufficiently large to permit painting the identification number in three-inch high characters, try taking a metal plate such as the toy license plates sold in the dime store, paint the ID number on it and securely hang it from the handlebars or the frame.

**Q. WHAT if I lose the certificate of registration?**

A. A duplicate certificate of registration may be obtained from the township clerk; the fee is 75 cents. Sec. 40.4e.

**Q. THE children on our street wish to participate in a**

neighborhood parade or mini-bike competition; what do I do so they may use the public sidewalk?

A. Obtain a permit from the township supervisor who may authorize the use of a motor-driven vehicle on a public highway, street, parking lot or land for a special event of limited duration conducted according to a pre-arranged schedule. Sec. 40.6.

**Q. THE peace officer gave me a citation because someone operating a motor-driven vehicle bearing my registration identification number was supposedly violating the Ordinance No. 40. Can he do that?**

A. Yes. In a proceeding involving prohibited operation or conduct, the registration number displayed on the vehicle constitutes prima facie evidence that the owner of that vehicle was the person operating the vehicle at the time of the offense. Sec. 40.11.

**Q. THE last time John Smith, who owns the vacant**

five acres next to me, was in town he said I could operate my mini-bike on his property. Now I have a citation for operating my mini-bike on another's land without permission. Why?

A. Any person who operates a motor-driven vehicle upon land owned by another must present the written consent of the landowner to the peace officer. Failure to do so constitutes prima facie evidence that the person was operating that vehicle without the landowner's permission. Sec. 40.5a.

**Q. I HAVE read the ordinance and there's no requirement for the wearing of a safety helmet, so I am going bareheaded and barefooted when I operate my mini-bike.**

A. You are correct that certain safety appliances are not required by the ordinance. But, common sense and many safety organizations point out that an operator of a mini-bike should wear a safety helmet, sturdy footwear and

protective clothing in order to avoid serious injury.

**Q. MY neighbors are old crabs who don't like my kids riding the mini-bike in our backyard. Let them complain. Mini-bike riding is good, clean recreation for my kids.**

A. You and your children may operate the mini-bike in your backyard. Yet even "old crabs" should not be subjected to unreasonable operation of that vehicle. Thus, between 7 p.m. and 9 a.m. you may not permit or allow your children to operate the mini-bike within 500 feet of your neighbor's dwelling. Sec. 40.7 and Sec. 40.8.

**Q. THE person who owns 10**

vacant acres near us has given written permission to many persons to operate their mini-bikes in Summer or their snowmobiles in Winter on that property. Most operate their vehicles in a careful manner, but a few operate their vehicles in such a dangerous manner that I am afraid someone is going to be hurt. Aren't there any regulations pertaining to this situation?

A. Yes. A person may not operate a motor-driven vehicle (whether mini-bike or snowmobile) at a rate of speed greater than is reasonable and proper having due regard for the conditions or in a reckless or careless manner. Sec. 40.12(a) and Sec. 40.12(d).

## COTTONTAIL RABBITS AND SNOWSHOE HARE

The Natural Resources Commission under Act 230 P.A. 1925 as amended, approved open seasons for cottontail rabbits and snowshoe hares as follows:

Zones 1 and 2 are October first to March thirty-first, inclusive and Zone 3 from October twentieth to March 1, inclusive. The bag limits are combined: 5 a day, ten in possession, fifty in a season.

## RUFFED GROUSE

The Natural Resources Commission under Act 230 P.A. 1925 as amended, established the following open seasons and bag limits for ruffed grouse:

Zone 1 is September fifteenth to November fourteenth, inclusive. Zone 2 is September fifteenth to November fourteenth, inclusive and December first to thirty-first, inclusive and Zone 3 is October twentieth to November fourteenth, inclusive and December first to thirty-first, inclusive except in portions of Gratiot and Saginaw counties bounded by highway M-46 on the north, M-52 on the east, M-57 on the south and U.S. 27 on the west. The season is closed during the December first to thirty-first season.

## SQUIRRELS

The Natural Resources Commission under Act 230 P.A. 1925 as amended, established the following open seasons for taking squirrels:

Zone 1 open to gray and black squirrels only on September fifteenth to November tenth, inclusive except no open season on Bois Blanc Island Mackinac County. The bag limits are combined: five a day, ten in possession, twenty-five a season.

Zones 2 and 3 open to fox gray and black squirrels September fifteenth to November tenth, inclusive. The bag limits are combined: five a day, ten in possession, twenty-five a season.

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## PHEASANTS

The Natural Resources Commission under Act 230 P.A. 1925 as amended, orders the following open seasons and bag limits for the taking of pheasants:

Zone 1 shall be October first to tenth, 1972, inclusive, in Menominee County south of highway US-2 and Delta County south and west of the Escanaba River. The bag limits are one male pheasant per day, two in possession, four during a season.

Zones 2 and 3 shall be October twentieth to November tenth, 1972, inclusive, except no open season in Sheridan Township, T 15 N, R 12 E, Lincoln Township, T 17 N, R 13 E, Meade Township, T 17 N, R 12 E and Dwight Township, T 18 N, R 13 E all in Huron County. No restriction of statutory bag limits of two male pheasants per day, four in possession, eight during the season.

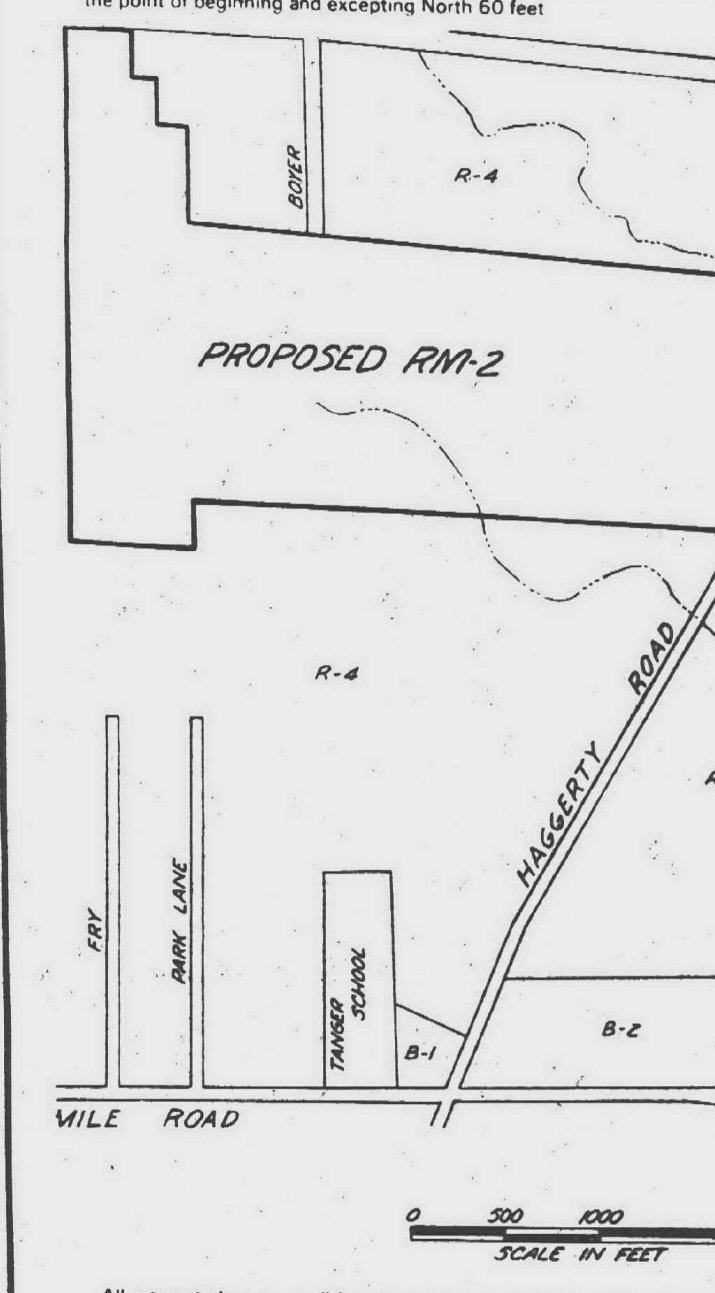

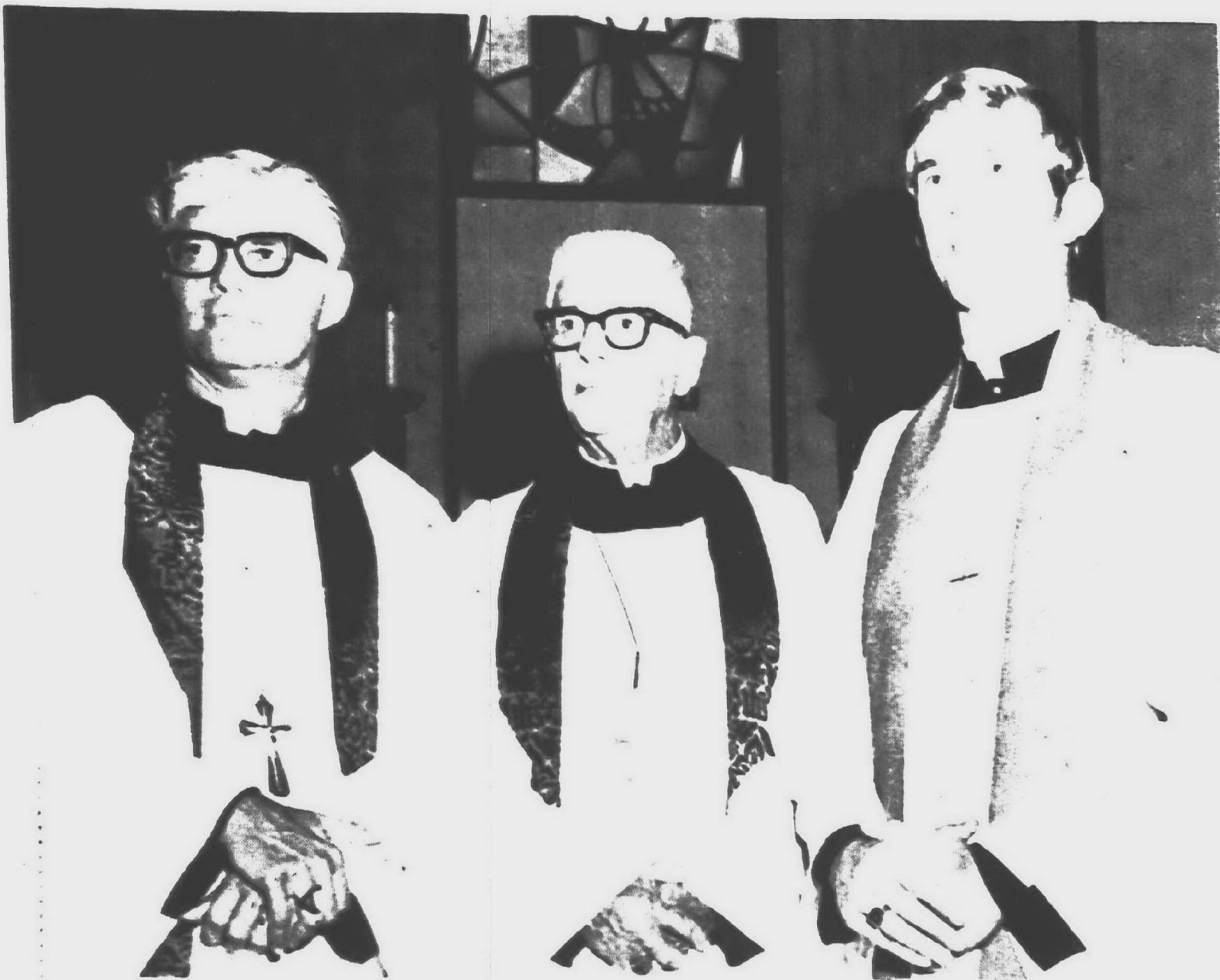

## No Generation Gap For Redford Church

There's no generation gap in the ministry of Grace Lutheran Church of Redford Township.

The generations all are represented -- and by clergymen to whom the Lutheran ministry is a family tradition going back through several forebears.

The Rev. Victor F. Halboth Sr., a man of the cloth like his father and grandfather before him, came to Redford in 1946 to lead the 59-member Grace congregation.

In 1959, with the church well on its way to its present 3,000-member ranks, he was joined by his son, the Rev. V. Frederick Halboth Jr., after the latter graduated from Concordia Seminary in St. Louis.

AND THIS MONTH the staff was boosted to three with the arrival of the Rev. Rodney A. Hilpert as assistant minister. Fittingly enough, he represents the fourth generation in his family in the ministry.

Rev. Hilpert, who graduated from Concordia this year, was ordained and installed in his new post Aug. 6 in the church located at 25636 Grand River. The preacher and officiant of ordination was his father, the Rev. H.M. Hilpert, pastor emeritus from Paris, Ill.

Also officiating in the service were the Rev. Harold L. Hecht, executive secretary of the English district Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, and the Pastors Halboth, father and son.

THE HALBOTH family ministry began back in 1868 when the Rev. Markus Halboth, grandfather of Victor Halboth Sr., was ordained at Concordia and went to serve his first charge in Trinity Lutheran Church of Dearborn, still a strong church.

"In 1968," mused the Rev. Victor, "I considered having some sort of commemoration service marking 100 years in the ministry."

"But then we got busy and forgot about it," said his son. Rev. Markus Halboth did a lot of traveling in his ministry, serving in Adrian, Elkwood, Ind., Buff Creek, Mo. and Fisherville, Ont., before ending his pastoral career with a long stay in Zion Lutheran Church of Pittsburgh.

HIS SON, the Rev. John Halboth, was ordained in 1893 and served churches in Accident, Md., and Cascade, Wis. "Accident was where I was born," said Grace church's elder minister, "and it's always good for conversation."

His own ordination took place in 1929, and he was for some time a traveling preacher like his grandfather. After serving an internship in the Coyners Church of Waynesboro, Va., one of the country's oldest Lutheran churches and dating back to revolutionary times, he was

assigned first to Marysville, Calif., where he led a congregation that built a church and parsonage.

He also organized two more California parishes before being called to active duty as a chaplain in the U.S. Air Force in 1941.

Sent to the Detroit area by the Lutheran Missions of the English District Lutheran Church, he helped establish the Jim Daly mission, which later became part of Redeemer Lutheran Church of Dearborn Heights and Our Savior church in Royal Oak before beginning the building program at Grace.

Rev. Frederick Halboth came directly to Grace Church after graduating in 1959 and serving an internship in Rome, N.Y.

WHILE BUILDING an extensive church plant, they have put major emphasis on a community-oriented ministry.

Rev. Frederick Halboth is a chaplain in the Michigan State Police and is especially proud of the fact that, at the invitation of Congressman Jack McDonald, he gave the prayer that opened the U.S. Congress last spring.

He also is chairman of the Lake Erie pastoral conference of the English District Lutheran Church, and in June was elected to the board of directors of the district.

His father, now a lieutenant colonel in the Air Force Reserve, recently became chaplain for the Five Points Composite Squadron, Civil Air Patrol, and will conduct moral leadership classes for the CAP young people and give counseling when needed.

THE TWO MEN also point with pride to the church's recent vacation Bible school, in which about 40 per cent of the children were from families not affiliated with the church.

"And besides having a real community school," said Rev. Frederick Halboth, "our teaching staff included great-grandmothers, grandmothers, mothers and teen-agers. How's that for covering all generations?"

Joining the team to handle an expanded program for youth, Rev. Hilpert brings along an impressive string of Lutheran credentials.

His great-grandfather was a pastor in Saxony, Germany, and his grandfather immigrated from Germany and served St. John Lutheran Church in Pierce, Neb. His father for most of his life was pastor of St. Paul Lutheran Church in Winside, N.Y., retiring to Paris.

"He's still preaching regularly," the new clergyman said.

And is there a fifth generation in the Grace ministry?

"Well, I have two sons," said Rev. Frederick Halboth Jr. "They're 14 and nine, so it's too soon to tell. But it's possible."

The group will be kept to no more than 20 persons, Rev. Moseley said, adding that if more than that number are interested a second group will be formed. All interested are welcome, he added.

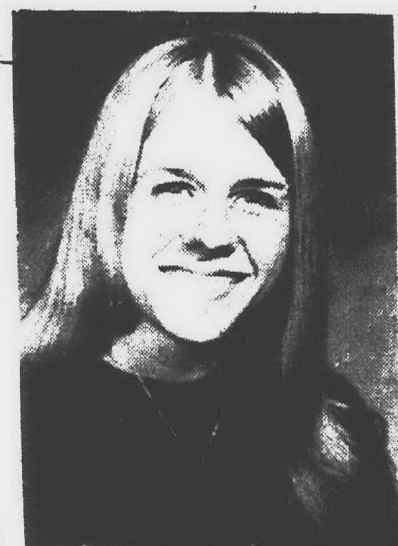

But the ministerial substitute they have procured to fill in for fired pastor Charles Marshall has done something of the sort.

Church of Christ elders cannot be removed—even for immorality or if in jail.

This was a bit much for the majority of the congregation, who, having had their petition for the reinstatement of pastor Marshall disallowed by the elders, proceeded to organize the Central Church of Christ, with the initial service that Sunday in a rented hall.

MEANWHILE back at Hobbs Street Church of Christ, substitute (and apparent candidate for Marshall's pulpit) Humphries, after a dutiful defense of the elders who hired him, made a significant mistake. He allowed questions during the post-sermon Bible class.

Brother Humphries appeared at something of a loss to explain why, if church elders deserve such unquestioning obedience, one elder named Cephas (St. Peter) was strongly and publicly denounced by a comparatively recent convert named Paul (as reported in the Epistle to the Galatians).

But in answer to another question, Humphries rapidly replied: "The Apocryphal books have no standing!"

The question related to one of those books between the Old and New Testaments (which some denominations regard as Scriptural) which is the account of Susannah and the Elders.

Susannah was "very fair" and "beauteous," so much so that the two elders were "inflamed with lust." They

For two Sundays in a row following the sacking of Becky's father, Brother Jerry Humphries (Church of Christ ministers do not use the title "reverend"), a handsome and unctuous Bible college official from nearby Florence, Ala., utilized every conceivable scriptural admonition to try to convince the Bible-devoted congregation to obey and respect their church's elders. (Most clergy preach on texts—some on pretexts.)

AMONG OTHER THINGS, his sermon on July 30 cited the ominous fate of certain murmurers against the authority of Moses (whom he described as a church elder): They were destroyed by heavenly fire.

Only a remnant of the congregation was present for this sermon, however. For the previous Sunday, Brother Humphries had affirmed that

attempted to seduce her and, when she resisted, charged her with adultery, a capital crime. They were, however, exposed in the nick of time by the cross-examination of Daniel.

WHILE the sometimes stodgy Memphis Commercial Appeal published a cartoon captioned "Becky and the Elders," no one here in Athens has contended that the four Church of Christ elders have tried anything like this—certainly not with Becky Marshall.

For this gorgeous 17-year-old is as devout, gentle, courteous and vestally virginal as she is im-

peccably wholesome young girl who, despite the internationally notorious assinity of her church's elders, still wants to attend a Church of Christ college.

Yet her presumably God-given beauty was derided by Brother Humphries, who piously explained that HIS wife would never swim in public unless "adorned modestly," (specific details of which fashion guide he never managed to provide). Asked rhetorically:

"Would any Christian woman want that picture (Becky in a one-piece bathing suit) sent to the Lord on Judgment Day?"

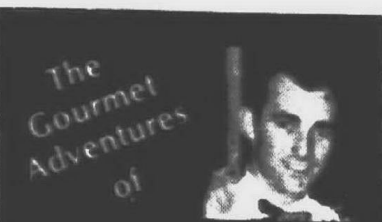

Speedy Crown, last year's Hambletonian king, captured the \$64,200 Maple Leaf trot at Greenwood track in Toronto, beating Flower Child and Une de Mai in 2:00.3. Fresh Yankee was a distant seventh. The Maple Leaf was the richest trotting race in Canadian history.

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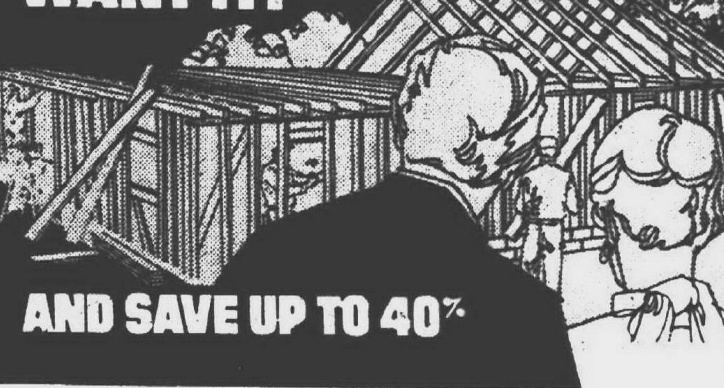

"This ruling has to benefit us," said Holland. "We have geared our team to the importance of the specialist and we have a good kicker in senior John Dwyer."

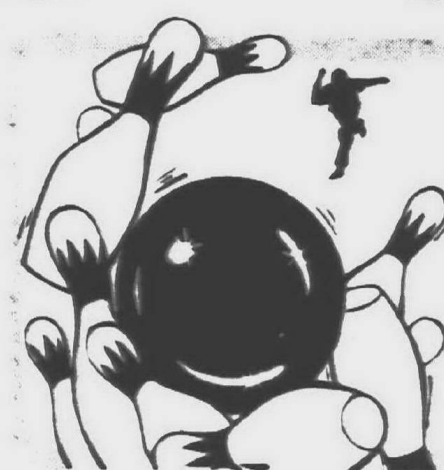
North Farmington has its first practice game in a four-way clash with Milford, Warren Fraser and Lansing Okemos on Sept. 8.

The Detroit Woman's Bowling Association, to which most Observerland women affiliated, has left little doubt

that Detroit is the capital of the bowling world.

In the annual report, just released by the Woman's International Bowling Congress, Detroit was at the head of the list in individual membership with 100,614 and topped the country in the number of sanctioned leagues with 3,006.

It marked the first time any city had passed the 100,000 mark and much of the credit goes to the untiring efforts of the Detroit officers. For years they have set the 100,000 mark as their goal—despite to some critics who claimed they were aiming too high.

First, it was Mrs. Lillian C. Jacob, as president, who put in long hours in quest of membership. And, following in her footsteps, is Mrs. Agnes Ekstrom and another able staff.

FOR YEARS Detroit and Chicago competed for national membership honors. But for the past two years Detroit has left Chicago far behind. In fact Chicago finished the past year with 76,167 and that's almost 25,000 behind the leaders.

New York leads all states in membership with 306,691 and Ohio is next with 304,284. California landed third with 273,429 and, Michigan because of Detroit's great showing, gained fourth place with 264,626.

While the women were going to the top, the men's group also posted some outstanding figures for the past season.

When the membership rolls were closed the Greater Detroit Association boasted 132,515 members in 3,138 leagues. This does not include the substitutes who competed during the season. With them

the total would have reached close to 145,000.

So, combining the membership of the two groups Detroit can boast a membership of 233,129 sanctioned bowlers—which is far and away above any other city in the country.

THE OLDEST of the individually sponsored tournaments in the metropolitan Detroit area—the John Gavis Sweepstakes—will have its 35th renewal on Aug. 28 at Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park.

This event attracts all of the leading all-stars as it is their last warm-up before the leagues start on the following night.

When the event gets underway at 7 p.m. Gavis, former president of the Greater Detroit Bowling Association, expects to have a complete complement of 40 teams comprising the best in both the men's and women's classics.

THE WOMEN, who open their season at Pine Tree Bowl on Sept. 13, are looking forward to a keen race between Luola Brown, of the Motown Record team, and Penny McClean for top average honors.

Each won a league title last year and each will not only be trying to repeat, but to sweep top honors in both leagues.

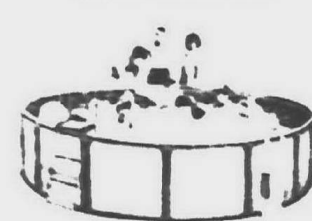
And right behind will be well known veterans—Elvira Toepfer and Ann Setlock, both former "queen," to move in if either of the favorites fall.

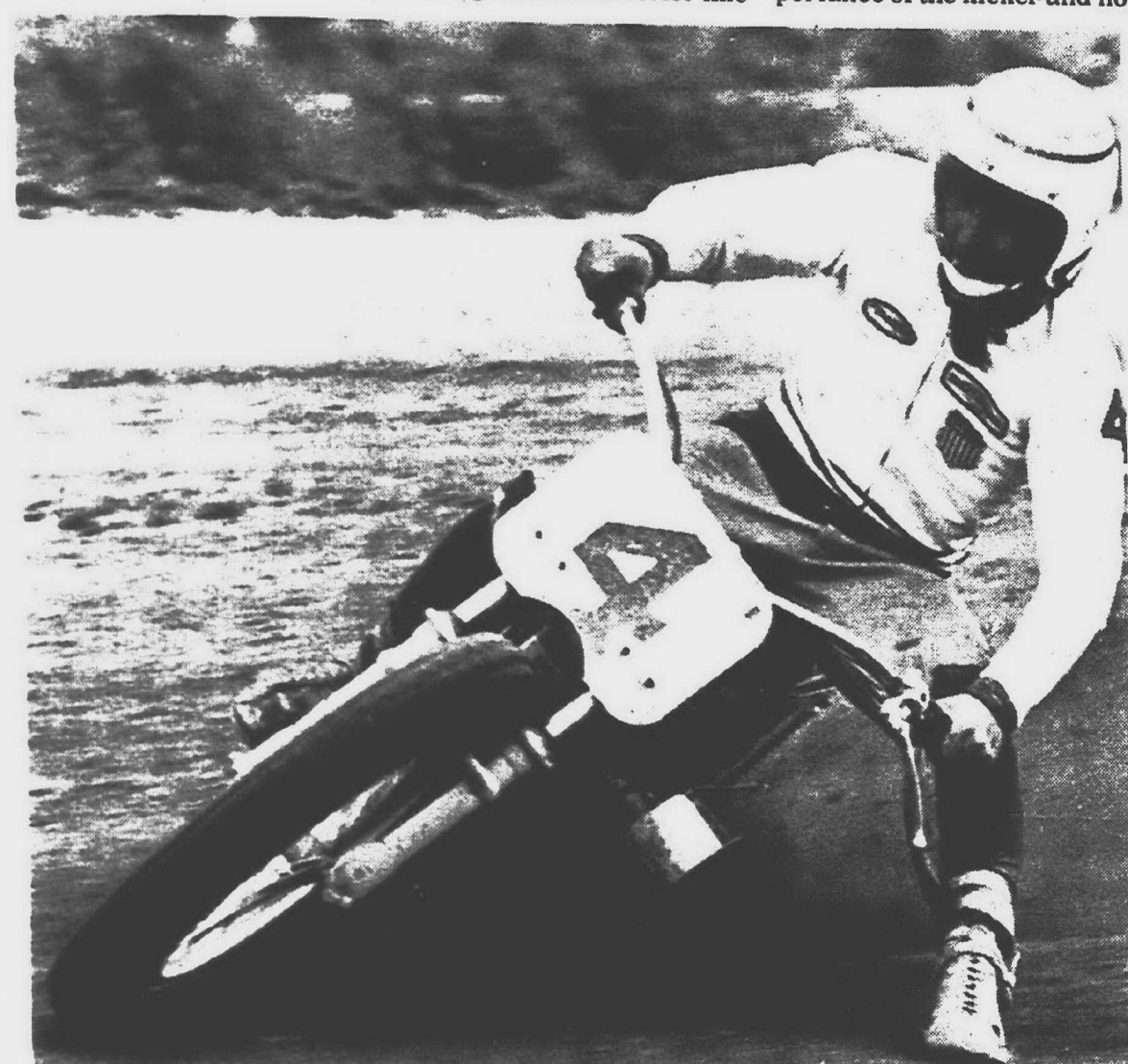
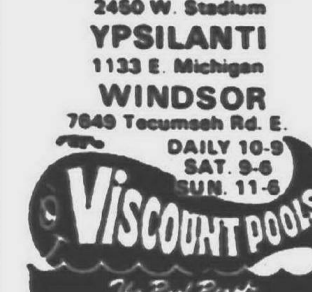

## Thousands 'Scared Away' From Michigan Parks

### LANSING

Michigan's state park system has been seriously hurt by "bad publicity" on people problems this season, and it shows in latest attendance and camping figures, reports an official of the Department of Natural Resources.

Through mid-July, day use at state parks was down 17 per cent from a year ago, while camper turnouts were nearly five per cent off the record pace of 1971. At that point, daily attendance for those areas stood at 9.3 million, representing a loss of 1.8 million visitors from last year's count through the middle of July.

Campground registrations at state parks have slipped by about 10,000 this season, totaling 194,825 through the first half of July.

DNR Parks Chief O. J. Scherschligt told the Natural

Resources Commission recently that the drop in daily visits and camper use is partly due to periods of cold weather earlier this season and a resistance to this year's fee increases for state park vehicle entrance permits.

However, he said what bothers him most is the impression that many would-be park users are literally being "scared away" from these areas by reports of the mass media which play up parks disturbances.

SCHERSCHLIGT pointed out that his Lansing office has been receiving many telephone calls from people who ask if it is "safe" to come to state parks. Meanwhile, state parks have also been getting a large number of calls with the same question being posed at the other end of the line.

The DNR official explained

that most reports of confrontations at state parks last spring were "greatly exaggerated." He also noted that since then the DNR has beefed up its crowd control program at state parks by placing 46 extra seasonal rangers on duty for the remainder of the peak summer period.

The extra manpower, pay-rolled from a special \$15,000 appropriation of the State Legislature, is enabling state park crews to run these public recreation areas with a firmer hand.

Scherschligt stressed that he and his staff recognize that there is a generation gap among some park users, just as there are differences in ideologies and life-styles between age groups in many other areas of today's society.

## Picking The Lineup Out Of A Hat Could Be Answer

If picking a lineup out of a hat insured a victory, the Tigers might go undefeated for the rest of the year -- and all of the next 248 seasons!

Such a feat would defy all imaginable theories except mathematical ones, but perhaps the possibility entered the mind of Billy Martin when he sought to shake the Tigers out of a recent losing streak.

For the first game of the Aug. 13 doubleheader at Tiger Stadium the Bengal skipper had each starter except the pitcher pick a spot in the batting order out of the manager's cap. The result was a victory over Cleveland ace Gaylord Perry with a lottery lineup that featured slugger Norm Cash batting first and light-hitting Ed Brinkman batting in the cleanup position.

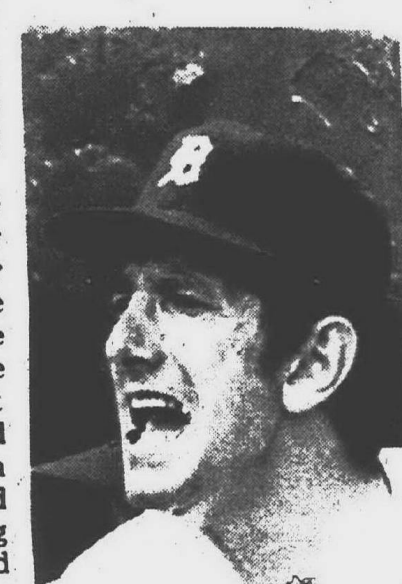
Mathematical calculations show there were 40,320 possible lineups in Martin's magical cap. If the Tigers won each time the skipper took a new lineup card to the plate, the club would not be defeated for all 40,320 games, or 248 straight seasons, assuming the present 162-game schedule.

If Billy had included all nine positions in his lottery, that would have meant 362,880 different lineups, 362,880 straight victories and 2,239 undefeated seasons -- all the way through the year 4211.

Actually, Martin has used 69 different lineups in 110 games this season. The most he has employed the same order is eight times. Fifty times he has

used a batting order, then discarded it completely.

The lineup most frequently used has a 5-3 record, while the Tigers have a 27-23 log in games with unique batting orders.

Forty-seven per cent of those interviewed ranked the vocational-technical school as the number one new priority for the district, while

41% said some other needs should be met first.

Forty-five per cent of those interviewed believe Livonia should build its own vocational-technical skill center as proposed on the March 29 ballot, while 42% said they would prefer the district to join in a Wayne County system.

Finally, those interviewed were asked their first and second most important sources of news about the schools.

Sources listed as either first or second by at least 5% of the voters included the Observer-67%, talking with neighbors - 28%, children - 26%, PTA - 11%, school newsletters - 10%, friends or relatives employed by schools - 10%, Detroit News - 5%, and children's teachers - 5%.

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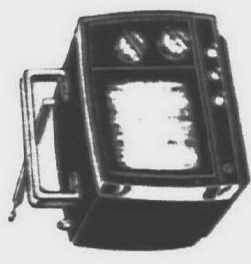

## THE NEW EDUCATION

An army of critics has sprung up who are exposing an educational system that does not work and a teaching process in which no one learns. Advocates of Video Cassette believe they have the answer.

In the 1960's great advances were made in education through technology. Schools began to be outfitted with computers and

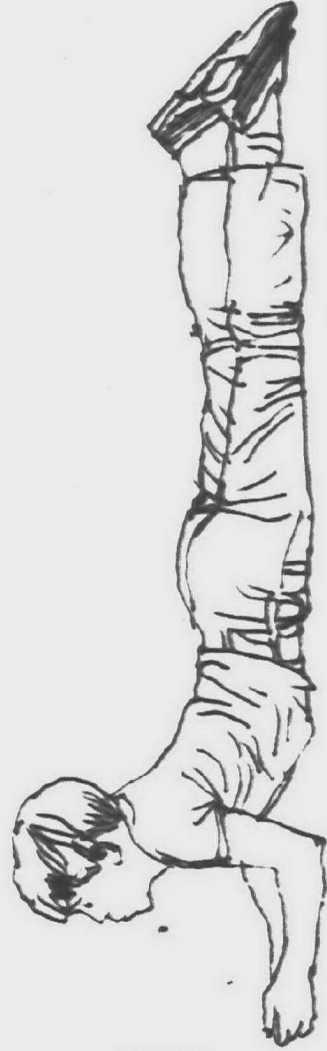
televisions. Students viewed a vast variety of subjects in semi-darkness with the entire class. These educational advances were rejected by students. They rebelled against the dehumanization through machine.

On all levels... elementary, secondary and college... education has been impeded by poor teaching and financing. It has been unresponsive to the individual needs of learners, and has become anachronistic by making limited use of the latest technological advances. What has gone wrong?

According to Stanley C. Gabor, assistant dean of the School of Continuing Education at New York University, we have clung to a medieval pattern of education where the teacher "tells it" and the curriculum is rigid. Why do we continue to follow as Alvin Toffler points out in "Future Shock," the industrial concept of education where the student is the raw material, processed by the worker-teacher in a centrally located factory-school?

Any educator would agree that 40 students taking American History on Friday mornings between 9:30 and 11:00 a.m. in room 503 would not receive the same learning experience.

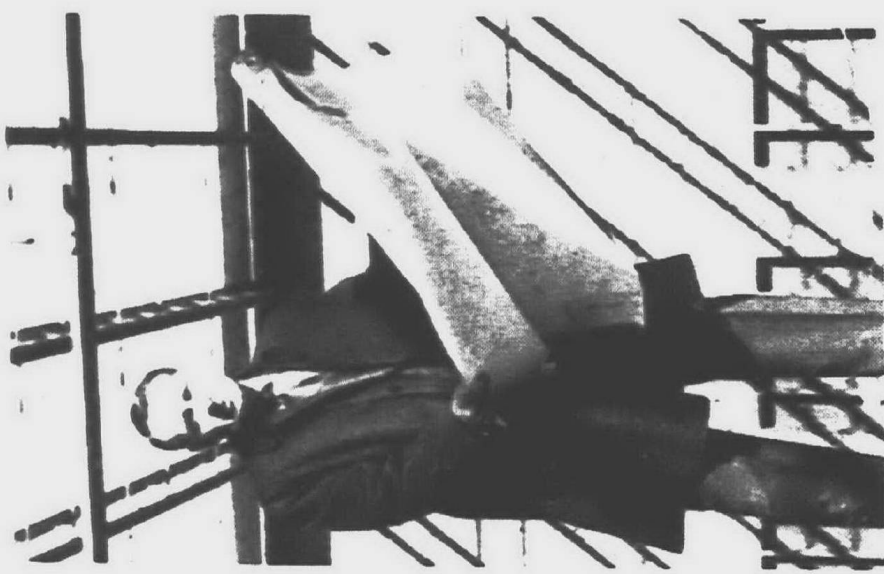
The video cassette, much like a taped television, is a more logical answer. Unlike television, the new medium gives the student individual control over the actual running of the program by providing for freeze-frame, slow motion, fast forward and reverse. It allows instant viewer response and machine feedback for reinforcement.



nent and reward in learning. By progressing at his own speed, the student supplies his own motivation, without the harmful prodding of the teacher.

According to Dr. Gabor, the video cassette frees the teacher from the mechanics of teaching.

Areas besides special education where at least 20% of those interviewed think too little is being spent include renovation of old buildings (20% - too little, 32% about right, 6% - too much) and keeping class sizes small (20% too little, 56% - about right, 12% too much).

Areas where more of those interviewed think too much is being spent than think too little is being spent include new buildings, being spent include new buildings, teacher salaries, administrative salaries, and experimental programs.

Areas where more people believe too little is being spent than think too much is being spent include special education, renovation of old buildings, music, physical education, foreign languages and art, and keeping class sizes small.

Verifying the old saying, "one man's meat is another man's poison," 4% of those interviewed split their answers on whether too much, too little or about right is being spent on music, physical education, foreign languages and art courses, putting those courses they like in one category and those they don't like in another.

One of the strongest responses in the survey came on the question, "do you feel the state income tax is a better way to finance local schools than the property tax?"

Sixty-seven per cent of those surveyed said they would prefer

the state income tax approach to the local property tax. The Board has been fighting for such legislation from Lansing for a long time.

Asked whether they think the School Board and Administration are in general running the schools the way the people in the district want them run, 54% of those interviewed said "yes," while 37% said "no" and 10% had no opinion.

Reaction to a proposed vocational technical school, bonding for which will be on the March 29 election ballot, was extremely favorable.

Seventy-five per cent of those interviewed said such a school would help reduce the dropout rate. Seventy-two per cent said it is needed to train those not going on to college and 64% said they would support the vocational technical school even if it costs a little more to operate than a regular school.

# Conducted by the League Of Women Voters in the Livonia Public Schools What single thing do you like most?

Livonia school district residents apparently like the teachers and educational product of the schools, are worried about taxes, think the district is spending about the right amount of money in most areas, except Special Education, where it is spending too little. The way the people want them run, support the building of a vocational-technical school, and overwhelmingly believe local property taxes should be replaced with a state income tax.

Those are the principal conclusions to be drawn from the results of the first Livonia Public Schools Community Attitudes Survey conducted by the League of Women Voters from February 22 through 28.

The League interviewers talked by telephone to 454 Livonia School District residents whose names were selected at random (every 60th name on a list of the district's registered voters was drawn). With such a sample, the results of the survey, according to statistical tables, should be an accurate reflection of community thinking within a range of plus or

minus 5% on any given question.

Those interviewed were first asked "What single thing do you like most about the Livonia Public Schools?" The answers most given were: good curriculum (13%), good teachers (12%), programs and personnel meeting needs of individual student (7%), good basic education (6%), and the convenience of having schools nearby (6%). Only 2% said they didn't like anything about the school system. Twenty-three per cent said they didn't know what they liked best. Other areas cited by between 2 and 5% of those interviewed included "like schools in general," "good buildings" and "high educational standards."

Asked "What single thing do you like least about the Livonia school system?" 11% of those responding said high taxes. The second highest ranking answer given by 10% of those responding was "nothing wrong" with the schools. Lack of discipline was cited by 8%. Frills and waste were named by 6%. Other areas cited by at least ten respondents (between 2 and 5%) were "teachers," "half days," "modular scheduling" and

much is being spent. Twenty-two per cent had no opinion.

The district's spending budget for teachers received the highest approval with 70% saying spending in that area is about right.

Areas where at least 20% of those interviewed think too much is being spent include new buildings (36% - too much, 50% - about right, 3% - too little), administrator's salaries (28% - too much, 37% - about right, 3% - too little) and experimental programs (20% - too much, 26% - about right, 12% - too little).

"Street" was the first with its zinging rhymes and flashing repetition of numbers and letters. The jive music and rock beat gave the show an appeal that "Ding Dong School" could never have captured.

"Sesame Street," now joined by "Electric Company," is reaching its target, but many of the shows' most loyal viewers aren't inner city youngsters. Regardless of where they live, kids love the beat of the programs. Words laugh, run jump. Immovable objects zoom absurdly about.

Children are exposed to things and ideas in their environment that they might never have learned at home.

"Misterogers, aimed at the very young, has joined Captain Kangaroo with the same type of programming. With mild mannered politeness, both men introduce animals, toys, and music to the youthful viewer. Mr. Rodgers doesn't swing, his appeal is more friendly than zippy. His approach is fatherly. For many of his fans he is the constant male or father figure in their lives.

Preschool television has been judged by educators to be a terrific aid to mothers of young children in preparing them for that first day of school.

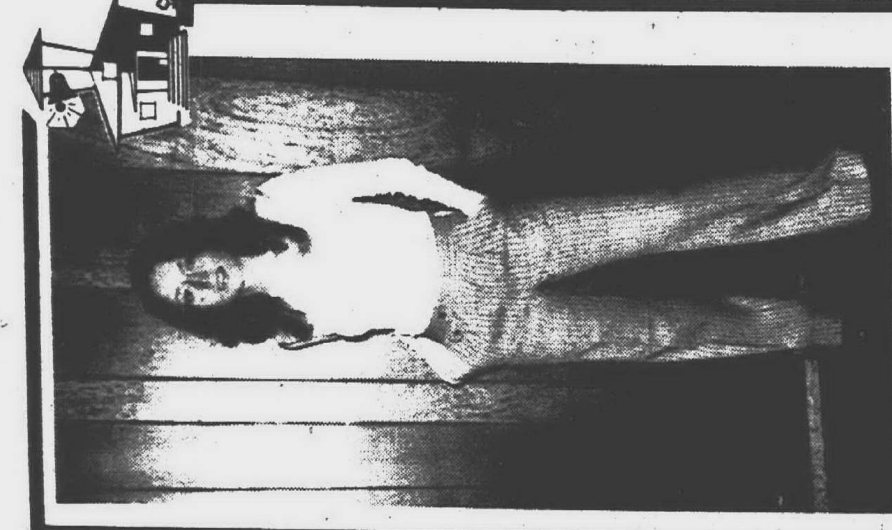

Psychologists say crafts have long been recognized as good therapy for a weary mind. The main point, however, is that it's fun.

Needpoint in brilliant colors Grandma never saw, for uses she couldn't imagine are being made by thousands. You can still make covers for the dining room chairs, but you can also send a friend a needlepoint cover for his tennis racket emblazoned with his initials.

Women are painting and decoupage their homemade purses. Graduating students are likely to receive a memento preserved under a layer of varnish and mounted into a lovely plaque. The decoupage process of layering coat after coat of varnish can transform a dull and uninteresting picture into an interesting work with an unusual antique look, complete with the cracked signs of age when desired.

The relatively new art of papier tole has created a sensation with its three dimensional look encased in a shadow box. In papier tole, the artist mounts a print. He then very carefully cuts two or three copies of the same print outlining the predominant figures. 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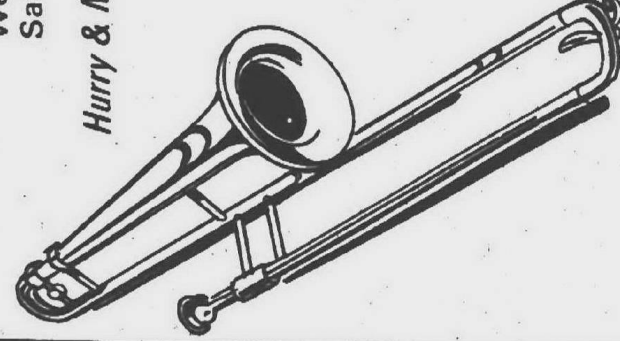
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
